Deaths

Ralph Grosjean, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Grosjean of Columbia Ave., died at an early hour on Monday morning, January 2nd, of diptheria. He was sick for only a few days and was not considered seriously ill until the day before his death. This was a very unexpected and sad bereavement. Ralph was a promising, kindhearted and affectionate boy, He was aged 13 years. He leaves to mourn his death his parents, a brother and sister. Some, of course, will want to deposit several pennies or a nickle a day. The amounts collected in these boxes are to be applied upon the funded debt of the church. The boxes will be ready for distribution very shortly. A penny a day, or two pennies a day, is a small amount to contribute, but 365 pennies multiplied by three or four hundred, will mean quite an amount, and where is the member that cannot spare this small amount each day during the year? We are of the opinion that the ladies have hit upon a good plan and we are auxious to have it put into operation to see what can be done. The plan seems to meet with general favor among the people, and we hope every member will take a box and begin to save the pennies for our church debt.
