SEASONS OF REFRESHING.



UR church is at the present in the midst of a gracious season of grace and salvation. Since the week of prayer, special services have been held in our lecture rooms, almost every evening. At the beginning of these meetings we were confronted by a multitude of hindrances. The weather

was unfavorable, and in almost every family in the church, there was more or less sickness. The attendance was, therefore, necessarily much smaller, than it would have been under other circumstances. But in the face of these difficulties and many others, night after night a little band of anxthe church for prayer, in behalf of the church, and the salvation of souls. There was a deep conviction in these hearts that the church was in need of an awakening, of a baptism "with the Holy Spirit and with fire," of a deeper work of grace and a fuller cousecration unto the Lord. And then when such a state of things exists in a church, the power of God in the saving of sonls aud the nurture of spiritual life, will not be manifest. With a seuse that Grace Church was in need of a baptism from on high, prayer was made day and night before the Lord, until the days of refreshing came. By and by the meeting began to grow iu interest, and in increased attendance. Awakened souls began to inquire after the way of salvation. Solicitous friends made requests for prayer in behalf of dear ones who were uusaved; confession of sins of indifference and lnkewarmness was made; cheerful testimony was borue of the goodness of God. These are all gracious indications of the presence of the Lord, and a revival of grace in the hearts of God's children. And now the church rejoices in the salvation of souls, and in the manifest work of the Lord among his people. Many of our

people have felt the Holy Spirit moving upon their hearts, and have received a blessing of grace, and of divine power. The weak have been made stronger, and the timid have received courage to confess their Lord and Master in prayer and in testimony.

While we have much over which we can justly rejoice, let as remember that this work of grace and harvest time among us is not completed. The work is not yet even fairly begun. Are there not yet some "dry bones" among us that need to be revived? that have need of being quickened into newness of life? Yes there are yet many who need to be vitalized by the divine Agent and Guickener of souls. Let this work of grace go on until the wayward and straying shall all be reclaimed, and every soul shall rejoice in a conscious knowledge of its salvation through Jesus Christ! Such a state of grace is productive of infuld good to a chnrch. It bears a frnitage of unity, of fellowship, of brotherly love, of hope, of charity, of more earnest and devoted consecration unto the Lord.

It is the privilege of the church to be continually in the midst of such a season of refreshing The Church of the Apostles eujoyed such a state of grace and sonl-saving continuously. "The Lord added to them day by day those that were being saved." "The word of God grew mightily and prevailed," continuously. How our hearts yearn for such a continuons revival of grace among our people. How then continuously, as now, our doors shall be ithronged with worshippers. With what eagerness of heart the word of God will be heard and received. With what a willingness of spirit the Lord will evermore be confessed by his people. Blessed state of grace and of the divine life.

And now then that this season of refreshing may abide with us, and be a fountain of perpetual blessing, our toils and prayers must also be perpetual. In a very few weeks hence we shall come to our glad Easter Season. Last year we enjoyed an abundant ingathering of souls during this festive occasiou. From this time forth until the Easter communion our efforts shall be persistent to accelerate the work of grace among

us. Let every soul of Grace Church be penitent before God, and turn uuto him with a full and expectant heart that our sins may be blotted out, that the Lord may continue among us with saving power, and may add unto his people many souls,

REVIVALS.

In answer to the inquiry. Can a church maintain constantly a revival spirit?

Joseph Cook, recently made this reply.

"A revival spirit may be constantly maintained by the churches, for that spirit consists in a desire to rescne men from the love of sin, and the quiet of it, and this is, or should be, the constant supreme mood of every Christian. Aggressive religious activity may take many appropriate forms and keep the fire on the alters of the church constantly bright. Prayer meetings are continuous, and ought always to be full of the revival spirit. There should no sermon be delivered that does not make religion a personal matter. All preachers should be in some sense evangelists, and our church members should be ready to engage in conversation on personal religion with the religiously irresolute."

In reply to the further inquiry What are the chief hindrances the revival spirits. same learned divine replies, "Unbelief, doctrinal indifference, worldliness, secret sins, absorption of the church in secular affairs are among the chief obstacles to revivals. Any form of preaching that does not make a broad distinction between the converted and the unconverted hinders revivals. Denominational greed, schisms and cliques in particular churches, aversion to the severe truths of religion, lax unscriptural lukewarm liberalism, constitute an atmosphere in which revivals do not easily originate."

Friends read these words with care and take heed to the counsel imparted in them, and pray for the Lord's continual presence with us.

HOM MUCH OWEST THOU?

At a recent meeting of the Consistory and Board of Trustees, the deacons reported that nearly \$200 of the last two years' subscription to the church remained unpaid up to date. How these arrearages occur we are not prepared to explain. Misfortunes sometimes eome, and meu eannot meet their obligations. But is it not right that when a man cannot meet his whole obligation he should at least do what he ean? Contributing to the Lord according to a man's ability is all the Lord asks, and it is all the church expects, But this is one of the first duties members owe to their church, and owe to their master. There are hundreds of Christian people who deny themselves not only of the foolish unuecessaries of life, but even of many comforts in order that they may give unto the Lord. And this in many instances explains why some people always are able to contribute systematically for the support of the church. A young man who had been a member of the church for several years, and never contributed anything for the support of the gospel, was interrogated once by one of the eiders of the church, why it was that he had no credits upon the church treasurers' records? The reply was. "I have nothing to give." The elder's further inquiry, "How many of those five centers do you smoke a day?" Reply: "Two a day." Elders "Then you conclusion. spend per seventy week for ceuts smoking, and have nothing for the Lord. Your profession is all smoke. You love tobacco seventy cents worth a week, and the Lord nothing." Now this is about the solution of the same problem with many others. Seventy cents a week for unnecessaries, and five eents a week for the Lord, and with others still worse, nothing for the Lord. Lay aside each week, on the first days of the week, an offering for the Lord, and theu on the Sabbath day bring it to the house of God.

Christians often-times become negligent of their duties, but never so without a serious loss to themselves of peace of heart. Our Lord's inquiry is always eoming up in the heart, "How much owest thou?" David said, "My sins are

ever before me." So our sins of negligenee are ever before us to eondenin us, and to stand as hindrances to our spiritual growth and happiness. Our debts are ever before ns. They trouble our hearts. They disturb our peace of soul. They are hindrances to us in our Christian life. When Zacheus was converted he made restitution. He paid his debts. Fullness of grace within the heart will enable us to know our debts, and will constrain us to give unto the Lord as we are indebted to Him. "How much owest thou?" Settle this question between yourself and the Lord. Only let the Lord stipulate the amount of your indebtedness. When we take this matter into our own hands we are prone to err, not to our advantage, but finally to our sorrow. If you cannot do more, then bring the widow's offering to the Lord, the Master will accept it, and you shall be blessed in the same.

The deacous of the church hope to have all these accounts squared in the near future. And they feel confident that at as early a date as possible each member who is in arrears will pay his full obligation. If any errors have occurred in the accounts of any, let them report to any member of the consistory, and the matter will be adjusted.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

Sabbath evening, February 16th, the young people of Grace church met in the lecture rooms of the church to organize a Young People's Society. The meeting was opened with singing and seripture reading and prayer by the pastor. The object of the meeting was then stated. The pastor acted as temporary chairman, and Eugene Mathis was chosen as temporary secretary. The Model Constitution of the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor was read, also the pledges of the Active and Associate Members. A list was then circulated to ascertain how many of the young people present were in faver of organizing under the Model Constitution. Seventeen signatures were seeured. The meeting then adjourned uutil Tuesday evening to complete the organization.

Tuesday evening, February 18, the young people met again, with a number of new recruits. After religious services the society proceeded to complete its organization. An opportunity was extended to others to become charter members, when the names of eight more young people were entered upon the list, making a mem-

bership of twenty-six, twenty-two active and four associate members. The constitution was then adopted and the society christened Grace Reformed Church Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor. For the convenience of the members of the society and the information of all who are interested, the constitution will be printed in a later issue of the Visitor.
