Thanksgiving Day.

The President's proclamation has been issued, setting apart Thursday, November 30th, as a day for National Thanksgiving. Grace Church will observe the day as in former years. At 10 a. m. there will be appropriate religious services at the church. This service will consist of singing, thanksgiving, responsive scripture reading, and an address by the pastor.

At 12 o'clock to 3 p. m. the ladies of the church will serve their Annual Thanksgiving Dinner. The afternoon will be devoted to a fellowship meeting and family reunion. An opportunity will be afforded for acquaintanceship, conversation, and greetings. At this time also the ladies of the church will present their dollars to the treasurer of the society, and relate their experiences in earning them. This will, without doubt, be an interesting programme. One hundred or more women will indulge in speech-making. We expect that now and then the audience will be served to a slice of pickled tongue. The next issue of the VISITOR will give the names of all the ladies who will contribute dollars.

In the evening at 7:30 the cantata "Little Red Riding-Hood" will be rendered by the young people of the Sunday School.

We believe our programme is

complete for the day. Provisions are made for heart, mind and body. Our chief design now is that our people may all respond cheerfully and heartily, and be present to enjoy the good things that are provided. The Thanksgiving service should be attended by every member of the church. The President's wish is that this day may "be kept and observed by all people of our land." That "on this day we may forego our ordinary work and employments, and assemble in our usual places of worship, where we may recall all that God has done for us, and where from grateful hearts our united tribute of praise and song may reach the Throne of Grace."

Our people should also, arrange to eat their Thanksgiving dinners at the church, and invite their friends to come with them. The ladies are making extensive preparations for this dinner. They will be prepared to serve four or five hundred dinners. We publish in another column the bill of fare, and we are confident that our ladies will do themselves great credit in serving this dinner.

We hope there may also be a large attendance in the evening to hear the pleasing cantata which will be rendered. The proceeds of the dinner will go to the Ladies' fund for the new church, and that of the evening's entertainment to the Children's fund for the church. Tickets for the dinner can be had as follows: Adults, 25 cents; children under ten years age 15 cents. Entertainment tickets: Adults, 15 cents; children under ten years of age, 10 cents.

THE Teachers' Meetings are becoming very interesting and profitable. Quite a number of those who attend the prayer meeting remain for these meetings. We are glad of this. There are, however, still several of our teachers who do not attend these meetings, for which we feel very sorry.

Little Red Riding-Hood.

The Cantata with the above title will be rendered Thanksgiving evening at our church parlors. The children are all familiar with the story of Little Red Riding-Hood and the Wolf, and we know they, as well as the adults, will be interested in the rendering of this cantata. In this entertainment the children will have an opportunity of seeing and hearing "Red Riding-Hood," "Her Mother," "The Wolf," "Fairy Queen," "The Fairies," and "The Will of the Wisp."

The entertainment will begin at 7:30 o'clock. Admission 15 cents for adults, 10 cents for children under ten years of age. Tickets have been issued for the entertainment and in as much as the receipts will go to the Sunday School fund for the new church, it is hoped that the children will take a special interest in the sale of these tickets. There will be no difficulty in selling three or four hundred of them if the proper effort is made.

Obligations for the New Church.

A call has been issued by the Board of Trustees for the payment of the subscriptions for the church auditorium. The payments are to be made in six installments, as follows: December 15th, 1893; March 15th, June 15th, Sept. 15th, and Dec. 15th, 1894, and March 15th, 1895. Making the obligations payable in this number of installments will make it quite easy for our people, and give them ample time. The payments are to be made to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, Elder D. W. Souder, who will have a list of the subscribers, and the amounts obligated. Persons who may desire to pay their subscriptions in full at once can do so. The money will be put out at interest until it will be needed. It is the intention to begin work on the building next spring as early as possible, and it will be well to have as much of the fund subscribed on hand, for use, as can conveniently be paid in. Our people are waiting with great anxiety for the new church, and if there is united effort and liberality, the work will be pushed along as rapidly as possible.

ARE you curious to know how the ladies earn their dollars for the church? Come and take your dinner with them on Thanksgiving, and they will let you into the secret.


DR. KUELLING, pastor of the Salem Reformed Church, has so far recovered from his illness that he is again able to attend to his pastoral duties.


