Church Dedication at Goshen.

Sabbath, Nov. 19th, the pastor had the pleasure of being present at the dedication of the new church at Goshen. This was a day of happy realizations for the members of this church. For nearly six 'years they have been looking forward to the time when they might worship in a new house, dedicated to the Lord. To this end we had worked, and prayed ourselves, and had great anxieties, so we could enter fully into the spirit of rejoicing with these people in seeing their hopes and prayers so fully realized.

The new church is the finest in the city. It is altogether modern, and we do not see what improvements could be made upon it, either to enhance its beauty or convenience. The church building cost between \$8,000 and \$9,000. This amount was all provided for before the day of dedication. To the liberality, ingenuity, and zeal of Elder Platter is to be attributed much of the success of this enterprise. building was largely planned and superintended by him. Cass Chapman, of Chicago, who has furnished the plans and drawings for our new church, was the architect of the Goshen church. After seeing and speaking in this church, we have full confidence in the ability of Mr. Chapman as a competent architect for church buildings, and we feel certain that our new building will be satisfactory in every particular.

The dedication of the church at Goshen took place on Sabbath morning. The sermon was preached by Dr. Van Horn, President of the Seminary at Tiffin, Ohio. Sabbath evening, the pastor, Rev. B. B. Royer, was installed. The attendance at the services morning, afternoon and evening, was large. The audience room of the church will seat about two bundred and fifty, the Sabbath School rooms about the same number; so that when the doors are thrown open between the rooms, about five hun-

dred people can be seated. The people at Goshen feel greatly encouraged with their out-look. They have now an excellent building, and a pastor who promises to do a good work among them. We pray that the blessing of God may rest upon this church and prosper it abundantly.

Rededication of a Reformed Church.

Sabbath, Dec. 10th, the pastor spent with Rev. L. B. Clayton, pastor of the Bunkerhill Charge, in Williams County, Ohio. It was the occasion of the rededication of one of the churches of this charge and the installation of the pastor. Rev. J. H. Albright, of Hudson, Ind., was also present and assisted in these services. The Bunkerhill Charge is composed of three congregations, and is located in one of the best farming communities in Northwestern Ohio. The churches are within short distances of Bryan, the county seat of Williams County. Services were held on Saturday evening at Pulaski. The evening was very unfavorable and the attendance was not large. This congregation has a large and handsome brick structure capable of seating about five hundred people. In this little town and near by the church we found the parish home, the residence of the pastor and his good wife. Sabbath morning Brother Clayton took us into his carriage and conveyed us over the icy roads four miles to north of the little village, to Salem Church, more commonly known as the Bunkerhill Church; here the rededicatory and installation services of the day were to be held, and for once we were to have the privilege of speaking on Bunkerhill. This congregation has a very fine church property, a brick structure with a seating capacity of about four hundred. Recently some repairs and changes were made on the church, within and without. The tower was lowered and reconstructed. Inside, the ceiling was lowered and altered, and the church papered

throughout. A choir stand was built and carpeted. Repairs were made on the church at an expense of nearly \$400. The church now presents a very attractive appearance. The means for the requisite changes and repairs made were about provided for, so there was no special soliciting to be done at the reopening service. The dedication service was held in the morning at 10:30. Considering the inclemency of the weather and the amount of sickness in the community, the attendance was quite large at this service. In the afternoon the installation service took place. Rev. J. H. Albright preached the sermon. This was also a very interesting and impressive service. The sermon was replete with good thoughts, and with excellent counsel to the people. The members of this church are to be congratulated upon the work which they have been doing, and upon their promising out-look for the future. The membership is not large but the people are willing and eager to work, and the church is in a community where there are many people who are available to the church, and we feel confident that with a full and hearty co-operation with their devoted pastor this church will grow. In the evening Brother Albright preached at what is called the Beaver Creek Church, the third congregation belonging to this charge. We have never been to this church, but the pastor informed us that this congregation has also a very handsome brick church building, and a great field for work. Sabbath evening we were privileged to preach for the congregation at Pulaski. We were very much pleased with the outlook for the Reformed Church in this locality, and we shall hope for great results from the work of these churches and their pastor during this winter. For many years we have been solicitous about our church interests in this community, and in the town of Bryan. In this growing city we have a large number of Reformed families. Some have gone

into other churches, but many are still without church homes. We have no doubt but that a congregation of twenty or more members could be organized in this place without much difficulty, and we trust the day is not far distant when a Reformed church will be planted in this city. Steps should be taken to this end soon or our opportunities will be gone.
