#### Duties of Members of the Grace Reformed Church.

It shall be the duty of every member to labor diligently to promote the well-fare of the church, and contribute according to his or her ability to the support of the church, and to such objects as require the contributions of the congregation. A neglect of such duty and of attendance upon divine service and the Holy sacrament for one year shall be sufficient to subject any member to discipline, or forfeiture of membership.

## How Can I Become a Member of the Grace Reformed Church?

Answer. If you have not as yet been baptized you may be admitted by a profession of faith on the Lord Jesus Christ, and by baptism and confirmation. If you was baptized in infancy you will be admitted by a profession of faith and confirmation. If you are a member in full and regular standing with some other church you may be received by securing a letter of dismissal from your church, and upon presentation of this letter to the church consistory you will be elected to membership in Grace Church. If you have been a member of some church and have no letter you will be received by reprofession of faith on the Lord Jesus Christ. Any other information you may wish relating to your becoming a christian and a member of Grace church, feel free to consult with the pastor, he will be glad to give you any counsel you may wish. At our Easter communion our church doors will be open for applicants. This will be your time to come into the church. A large number of applicants are already upon the pastor's book for membership on this day. Do not neglect this opportunity.

#### Lost-A Runaway Boy.

He fell in with bad companions. Lost his money and good name. Came to shame, sorrow, hunger and rags. He thought of home, repented and came back, became an obedient son and a useful man.

A series of seven sermons on the parable of the Prodigal Son, by the pastor, illustrated with twelve large Bible paintings. Four of these sermons have already been delivered to large and appreciative audiences.

Wednesday evening, March 22: "The Joy of Salvation," "The Father's House," "The Banquet," "The Guests." Text: "Bring hither the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat, and be merry." Luke, 15:23.

Thursday evening, March 23: "The Angry Brother," "Pouters," "Grumblers," "Hypocrites." Text: "And he was angry and would not go in." Luke, 15:28.

#### At Work.

THE Soliciting Committee is slowly pushing its work ahead, and finds a favorable response from all our people as far as the canvas has been made. As soon as our special evangelical services are concluded, the pastor will devote his entire time to this work for a few weeks.

#### Why You Should Join Church.

There are many who think they can be Christians just as well without joining the church. This is a great mistake. Christ has joined the church. So intimate is his connection with it, that he affectionately calls it his church, his body; he is its head. Such confession of him is not He has said: "Whosoever shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father. whosoever shall deny me before men, him will I also deny before my Father." As Cortez entered Mexico, burning his ships behind him, so every Christian must go irrevocably over to Christ.

The Christian can do more good in the church. Organized and united efforts are most effective. It was the great army of the Potomac, not unenlisted single shooters, that took Richmond. Any Christian who thinks he can do a better service to the cause as an outside skirmisher stands a better chance of capture than of laurels.

A Christian is more likely to live and grow in holiness within the church. A tree outside of the orchard fence will be exposed to the abuse of every passer by, and will soon die. The sequence of staying out of the church is to get farther and farther out. The fact of being publicly pledged is always a stimulus, and soul anchor. Becoming an inside worker, will prevent one from becoming an outside critic.

Within the fold of the church one can consistently partake of the sacraments. Every Christian is to be baptized, and to partake of the Lord's Supper. "This do in remembrance of me," is the command of Christ. If one stays away from the Lord's table, because he thinks there are hypocrites at the table, let him remember that he does not partake of them, but of the body of the Lord.

Joining the church is the only consistent course any Christian or any one hoping to become a Christian can take. In neither politics, reforms, nor religion, do men make a success of standing or the fence. One of the common excuses is, "I am not fit to join church." This may be only a modest expression of humility, and as such it is not to be found fault with. The only

fitness possible is that which Christ's blood provides.

Some recoil from the new duties which a public profession necessitates. This is certainly not looking at religion on its valiant side. One who aims at being only just enough of a Christian to be saved, runs the risk of not being saved at all.

If any think the church is too stiff, or dull, or worldly, then it is capital, missionary grounds; and they are just the ones to come in and help correct its blemishes. Many good souls wait outside the church to determine first, how long they will hold out, overlooking the fact that church membership is a divinely appointed means of holding out in the Christian life. this cautious plea youths are often dissuaded from joining church. Suppose a farmer, finding a new-born lamb out in the icy sleet, at nightfall should say, "If I find it is going to live through the night, I will bring it into the barn in the morning and take care of it." So many parents talk about their children coming into the church. And no doubt many babes in Christ die outside of the fold, making experiments in toughening, in the cold.

Some believing wives stay out of the church waiting for their husbands to become converted, and join with them, not realizing that the strongest argument is example, and that their course is only confirming their companions in an irreligious life.

To one fearing that he will bring dishonor in the church, let me say, Christ will take care of his church; the great question is, what is to become of you.

Many hesitate from fear that they may regret joining the church. Possibly they may. It is just for these times, when the storm of passion, or temptation, or of despair, has siezed upon our bark, that a strong anchorage to the church proves serviceable.

It is a great step to join the church, but it is a greater step not to join. First join Christ "Get married to Him," and then join Ais church. Take this matter to heart. On bended knees think of your duty as well as of your soul's need, and your privilege. Join the church that you may grow in grace, that you may do effectual work for the Lord in saving your friends. Be not an ambush soldier of your Lord. Belong to his full uniformed and organized army.

It might be profitable for the members of Grace church just at present to read the following from the *Youth's Companion*:

A man who attempted to raise some money on a subscription paper for a necessary church out West relates his experience as follows:

"The first man I went to see was very sorry, but the fact was he was so involved in his business that he could not give anything. Very sorry, but a man in debt as he was owed his first duty to his creditors. He was smoking an expensive cigar; and before I left his store he bought of a peddler who came in a pair of expensive Rocky Mountain cuff bottons.

"The next man I went to see was a young clerk in a banking establishment. He read the paper over, acknowledged that the church was needed, but said he was owing for his board, was badly in debt, and did not see how he could give anything. That afternoon, as I went by the base-ball grounds, I saw this young man pay fifty cents at the gate and go in, and saw him mount the grand stand where special seats were sold for a quarter of a dollar.

"The third man to whom I presented the paper was a farmer living near the town. He also was sorry; but times were hard, his crops had been a partial failure, the mortgage on his farm was a heavy load, the interest was coming due, and ne really could not see his way clear to give to the church, although it is was just what the new town needed. A week from that time I saw that same farmer drive into town with his entire family and go to the circus, afternoon and night, at an expense of at least four dollars.

"The Bible says, 'Judge not, that ye be not judged;' but it also says, 'By their fruits ye shall know them.' And I really could not help thinking that the devil could use that old excuse, 'In debt,' to splendid advantage, especially when he had a selfish man to help him."
