BRIEF HISTORIC SKETCH.

The Grace Reformed Church was organized May 13, 1883. The lot of 95 feet, on East Washington street, where the Church edifice and parsonage are now located, was purchased June 13, 1883, at a cost of \$4,000. Later 35 feet on the east side of the lot were sold for \$1,500, and repurchased April 1, 1888, for \$1,800. The lecture rooms of the Church were erected in the summer of 1884, at a cost of nearly \$4,000. The parsonage on the east part of the lot was built in the summer of 1889, at a cost of \$2.125. The new Church building was begun April 1, 1894. The corner stone was laid June 3, 1894. The Church when completed and equipped will cost \$15,000. Of this amount about one-half is unprovided for. We are hopeful that a good portion of this amount may be provided for at the dedication, by free-will offerings and pledges. The new Church has been very highly spoken of by the citizens of Fort Wayne as well as visitors from abroad who have seen it. The congregation can congratulate itself upon the progress it has made, and the work which has been done. The Church has a very hopeful future before it, and with persistent and united effort, and confidence in the Lord, it will be able to do efficient work for the Master to whom we ascribe all honor and praise for what has been achieved in the past.

Waldo & Bro. were the contractors, and did very excellent work for us, proving themselves to be men thoroughly reliable and competent. The stained glass was furnished by the Gentzin Stained Glass Co., Anderson, Ind. Their work speaks for itself. It is said by many that Grace Church has the finest glass of any Church in the city. The beautiful fresco work was exe-

cuted by O. J. Kover & Son, of this city They have given us excellent work and far exceeded their contract. We are no longer surprised that they have such a rush of business all the time. They are perfect gentlemen and masters of their profession. The gas and electric light fixtures were bought from the Seavey Hardware Co., of Fort Wayne, and were manufactured by the Vosburgh Fixture Co., Brooklyn, N. Y. Every person admires our fixtures and the Seavey Hardware Co. were very reasonable in their prices with us. The pews were made by the Fort Wayne Furniture They are well made and are very comfortable, and are a pretty design. The pulpit chairs were bought from the Pape Furniture Co., and are also very handsome. The carpets were furnished by the Foster Furniture Co. They are a very pretty design and look very tasty in the floors. carpets were made and laid by the Zimmer Carpet Cleaning Co. Their work is a good advertisement for their business windows in the Church were all paid for by families and the different societies of the Church. Many of the pews were donated by friends abroad, and in the city, and families of the Church. The pulpit was donated by Mrs. C. Neireiter in memory of Henry Neireter. We shall feel greatly relieved when the Church is completed and dedicated, and we shall pray that the Lord may accept our offering and greatly prosper the Church.

OBITUARY.

Abram Cope died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. David Walters, 146 East Lewis street, January 20th. He was born in West Moreland county, Pa., and was married to Catherine Sowash. In 1845 Mr. Cope removed with his family from the east and located in DeKalb county, Ind., and about nine years ago came to Fort Wavne where he resided until his death. He was consecrated in infancy to the Lord in Holy Baptism, and at an early age was received into membership with the Reformed Church. After coming to this state he united with the Luthern church of which he remained a devoted member until death. His wife and one daughter preceded him to the future world. Four sons and five daughters remain to mourn his departure. The funeral services were held on Thursday; January 24, and the remains were taken to Maysville, Ind., and laid away to rest in the cemetery of that place. Mr. Cope was well known in De-Kalb and Allen counties, and was highly respected by every one. He gave full evidence of his acceptance with the Lord, and of his preparation for death. During his last illness he was only waiting from hour to hour for the time when the Lord might take him unto Himself and when he might join those of his family and friends who had gone before. May the Lord kindly lead and comfort the sons and daughters who mourn the death of a pious and devoted father.

William Arthur, son of Charles and Agnes Thicson, residing on Wells street, died January 15. He was aged 4 years, 10 months and 26 days. John Felix Racine died at the home of his sister, Mrs. C. Hostman, 86 West Jefferson street, February 7th, aged 43 years, 8 months and 7 days. He was born in Allen county and remained a resident of the same during his life. He was a quiet industrious and peaceable citizen with a large circle of acquaintances and friends. His parents, four brothers and two sisters had preceded him to eternity. Three brothers and two sisters remain to mourn his death. The funeral services were held Sabbath afternoon, February 10th, and the interment was in the cemetery some five miles north of the city in the locality where Mr. Racine was born and reared.

John E, son of Mr. and Mrs. Valentine Monn, departed this life Tuesday morning, March 17th. He was aged 18 years, 7 months and 12 days. Death came to our young brother and to the family without a moment of warning. A few evenings before he left home cheerful, happy and full of hope and life, when two mornings later the Lord came and claimed him as His own. While assisting a neighbor in felling some trees, he was caught by a limb of a falling tree and instantly killed. accident occurred some four miles away from his home and as soon as possible a messenger was sent to bear the sad and distressing tidings to the family. After the body had been tenderly cared for it was brought to the home to the grief stricken father and mother and family. Death came to this home all unexpected, without a moment of warning, and we were not surprised to find the father and mother, brothers and sisters almost heartbroken with sorrow. Of all bereavements those sent upon us by such unexpected deaths, are the most shocking and afflicting, and only those who have had the experience can know what these things are John was a very kind and obedient son and an affectionate brother. He was dedicated when a child to the Lord in baptism, and received into full membership with the Grace Church five years ago. The funeral services were held from the Church Friday afternoon, March 22nd. After the service the body was laid away to sleep in "Lindenwood" until the resurrection morning, when the Lord shall come to raise His own to life and immortality. The bereaved father and mother. two brothers and three sisters, have the sympathy and prayers of the Church, and their friends and neighbors in their sorrow May the Father of and bereavement. infinite love and comfort console their hearts, and shelter them in their day of affliction. The Lord Jesus says: "Be of good cheer. It is I, be not afraid."

Enoch Garman and Samuel Fredrick, neighbors and old pioneer settlers of Allen county, residing twelve miles north of the city, departed this life, the former March 27 and the latter March 30.

Mr. Garman was born in Lehigh county, Pennsylvania, Jan 28, 1824. Was aged 71 years, 1 month and 20 days. He came to Seneca county, Ohio, in 1833, and Allen county, Indiana, in 1849, purchasing and locating on the farm where he afterwards lived and died. He was married to Mary Warner in 1850. This union was blessed with nine sons and two daughters. The wife and ten children survive to mourn his death. Mr. Garman was baptized in infancy and became a full communicant, member of the church at the age of 16. The funeral services were conducted by the pastor at the Salem Reformed Church,

Saturday morning, March 30. He was a great sufferer for the past year, having been afflicted with cancer of the stomach, but was always patient and hopeful. He was quiet and unassuming in his life but an ardent and devoted child of the Lord. He knew of his approaching death and had made full preparation for it. It is a source of great comfort to the family to know that he was so well prepared for the coming of the Lord. He selected for the text for the funeral service 2d Tim. 4: 6 7, 8, Scripture words very appropriate for his life and his hope.

Mr. Fredrick was born January 20, 1822, in Burkes county, Pennsylvania. He was aged 73 years, 2 months and 10 days. He came from Pennsylvania to Ohio in 1844 and later removed to Allen county, Indiana, locating on the farm where he lived during the remainder of his life. In 1848 he was united in marriage to Lucy Garman, sister of Enoch Garman. This union was blessed. with thirteen children. His wife, five sons and five daughters live to mourn his death. He was baptized in infancy and reared in the fear and nurture of the Lord, and at the age of fifteen became a communicant member of the Church. For several years past Mr. Fredrick has been in failing health, though it was hoped for a long time by the family that he might regain his health, and it was not until a few months ago that it was ascertained that he was suffering from Brights disease and could not recover. He was very patient in all his sickness and fully resigned to the will of the Lord. His great comfort was found in the hope which he had in the Lord Jesus and the life to come.

The funeral services were conducted on Tuesday morning, April 2nd at the Salem Reformed Church. The funeral services of Mr. Garman and Mr. Fredrick were both attended by a large number of friends and neighbors, and in the death of these men the community loses two of its most highly respected citizens, and men who were pioneers in planting and establishing the church in their locality. Our prayer is that the Lord may comfort these families in their sorrow and raise up other men who may take their places in the church and community.
