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
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

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THE

PREFACE.

Reader.

tleman, having by his Display, freed Heraldry from the Charge of Confusion under which it labour'd, thereby engag'd the Gentry of this Nation to the Study of it, as a necessary and useful Art: But notwithstanding his Performance, excellent in its kind, notwithstanding the many Books since written, by others, the Glory of Heraldry has been ever since rather decaying than encreasing; The Reasons of which I conceive to be, Want of suitable Methods to teach, of Encouragement to practice, or due Deference paid to such as profess the Art. The two last are out of my Province, but I endeavour in this to furnish thee with Methods of learning, in Hopes to bring thee into a Habit of loving it.

Tet I would not be mistaken; Let no one think I set up this, as a Standard to try all Controversies of Arms by; for I confess with all Humility, that I am (like others) subject to Errors, and for a Work of this Nature, far unfit. My design then, is, (in Order to take away yet farther, the principal Objection against Heraldry) to present thee with some General Rules, in which 'tis impossible to mistake; some Particular ones, consistend by Authentick Writers, and Common Practice; with such Examples as

are scatter'd up and down in Books, &c. If I have mistaken (as I believe I sometimes have) I desire those whose Arms they are set for, as well as those who have granted or recorded them, to excuse that Error, because I have mostly committed them by too close following the Authors. I transcrib'd from, in whose time Bearings might possibly differ from what they are now. I say then, that such as wou'd without Fear of Challenging, be assured of their true Arms, ought to seek them in that Place which the Law has made their Repository, and not here, where they are incerted rather as Examples of Bearing and Blazon, than real, authoritative Arms, tho' indeed they are such.

I likewise desire the Reader to observe, that the Method I proposed, of Printing the Arms of all the Peers, &c. would have left but little Room for the Arms of Gentlemen, and then 'twere impossible to give you all the Forms of Rearing; and on the other Hand, to have made the Book much larger, tho some might like it, wou'd certainly have been displeasing to the Majority: So that I am not to be restected on, but rather thanked, for not sticking to my own Proposals, seeing what I have done is more advantagious to the Buyer than that could have been: And this is the reason of that Desiciency there seems to be in the Alphabet of Examples, which really is not a Desiciency; because I never pretended to insert all the Names in England, which could not be contain'd in six times the Bulk.

On this Account I forbear making Excuses for that not above 1200 Arms are found here in all; they being (as I have observ'd) enough for a GRAMMAR, the Multiplicity of Coats which some People perhaps expected, would better suit the Title of DICTIONARY. However, in this Case, my little Grammar of 6s. is on a Level with the Voluminous Gwillim of 35s. their falacious Proposals containing a Promise of more Additions than the whole Book will contain, as I can easily make out.

I have added several Arms without Cuts, some useful Observations and Catalogues, more than propos'd, which

I doubt not but thou wilt be well satisfy'd with, especially because they take up no Room but that of white Paper.

As for the Subscribers Arms, and what is said of 'em, I am not to answer for any thing therein, having printed no more than what they authoriz'd me to do, and is what they will answer.

There are some Faults escap'd the Press, which I have discern'd and taken Notice of elsewhere; there are more (perhaps) which are Faults, but not to my Knowledge: For the first Sort, as they are small and few, I hope to be

forgiven, of the other I desire to be inform'd.

I am certain (with the Candid) I have sufficiently interceded for a favourable Acceptance of my first considerable Attempt, which they will be farther induc'd to, when they consider that Horace himself did no Wonders, 'till he was twelve Years older than I am. But however, to such as cannot relish this coarse Dish, I promise to study

their Palates better, 'ere I write again.

But I had almost forgot to beg Pardon on the Cutter's Behalf, which he has desir'd me to do, when any Thing appears worse than was expected; some Charges by Reason of their smallness he has made Black, which should have been left White, some again, on the same Account, are not so well shap'd as they might else have been, and as for other Mistakes of his, they are corrected by the Blazon. He owns it to be his Fault, that you have been so long disappointed in the Publication, and thereby clears

Introduction.

Ltho' I had design'd nothing less than to swelf this Treatise into a large Volumn, yet the Multiplicity of Coats, that came importuning for Admittance into so useful a Tract, have oblig'd me to enlarge it beyond my first Intentions; for which Reason I shall drop the Account I would else have given, of the Invention, Antiquity and Dignity of Arms, lest it prove too cumbersome for the Pocket: Only, in brief we may observe, That in the very earliest Ages after the Flood, Nations began to distinguish themselves by Armorial Ensigns or Devices; insomuch that some say Osservices (Grandson of Noah) was the Inventer of 'em, and that his own Device was, Jupiter, a Scepter Royal in pale, insigned at the Top with an Eye, Sol.

All the flourishing Kingdoms and States of the Old (or Poetick) World, that were any thing civiliz'd, had a different Portraist on their Shields, for Distinction;

the Athenians, who were Schollars, bore an Owl, the Bird of Pallas, their Goddess of Wisdom; the Persians, who used Bows an Arrows, had them for their Ensigns; the Romans, an Eagle; the Egyptians, an Oxe; the Phrygians, a Swine; and the Warlike Thracians, bore Mars the God of Battle.

The more Savage Countries (in Imitation of their Neighbours) took up the Fashion by Degrees, and so the Scythians painted a Thunderbolt in their Shields;

the Corali, a People of Pontus, bare two Wheels.

The Heroes, of whom we read in Homer, Virgil, and other Poets, had their Shields adorn'd with some distinguishing Figure; Achillis had on his, the Celesti-Sphere; Amphiarius, a Dragon; Capaneus, the Hydra; Polynices, a Sphinx; Agamemnon, a Lion; Ulysses, a Dolphin; Perseus, Medusa's Head, &c. These Instances are sufficient to show the Antiquity of Arms, and in some Measure, the Dignity and Use of them. I hasten therefore (in the two following Chapters) to give such plain Directions for Blazon and Marshalling, as are adapted to the meanest, yet worthy to be regarded by those of the highest Capacity.

Chap. I. Of Blazon.

BLAZON, Strictly taken, signifies, the Explication of Arms, in apt and significant Terms; more largely, it is taken for a Display of the Vertues of the Bearers of Arms. A certain French Armorist has comprehended both in a Word, viz. To Blazon is to express what the Shapes, Kinds, and Colours of things born in Arms are, together with their apt Significations. This Chapter will contain Nine Sections, whereof the first is,

Sect. L.

Sect. I. Rules of Blazoning in General.

on before you enter thereinto, for having once begun, it argues an inconsiderate Folly to recall what you have said.

2. The fewer Words you make use of in blazoning a Coat, the better it is blazoned: Be cautious however, that while you endeayour to be short, you are not mysterious, and that you omit nothing which

ought to be mention'd.

3. In Blazon you must take special Heed to Words, for Arms differently blazoned cease to be the same; and tho' one Coat may be blazoned two ways, yet they do then both come to the same, the Phrase only chang'd, as in the Arms of Akelont of Gloucesters. in the following Sheets.

4. You must not be too full of Conceits in Blazon,

nor over forward of Speech.

5. You must use no Repetition of Words, in the self same Coat, viz. the Names of Metals, Colours or Furrs, the Numbers of Ordinaries or Charges; but especially not of the Words

Of Or For the Repetition of these, is reckon'd an unpardonable Crime.

How to vary your Words, to avoid this Fault, you may see among others in the Arms of Cecil E. of Salisbury, Addison, Atkins of Saperton.

6. In blazoning you must have Regard to the things that are born in Arms, and to what they may be refembled, whether Natural or Artificial, and so com-

mend them accordingly.

7. Begin to blazon with the Field, then proceed to the Charge, if any be: Also, if there be more Charges b 2 than one, you must evermore name that first, which is supposed to lie nearest the Field; see the Arms of

Dyxton, Capt. Aldridge, Villiers E. of Jersey, &c.

3. The Arms of Gentlemen, Knights, and all Perfons not enobled, are to be blazoned by Metals and Colours; all the Degrees of Nobility have their Arms blazoned by Precious Stones; Emperors, Kings and Princes, by Planets; as hereafter will appear more plainly, by Rule and Example.

Seat. II. Accidents of Arms.

T Hose are called Accidents, which are not Necessary Parts, but such as being taken away or chang'd, the Substance of the Arms is still the same. They are two, Tinctures and Differences.

Paragraph 1. Tincture is the different Hew of Arms, and things born therein; and is common to the Differ-

ences, as well as to the Arms themselves.

Tincture is either of Colour or Furr.

Diatriba 1. We have nothing to do here with the Natural Colour of Things (tho' that also must be carefully regarded) but our Business is to make mention of such Colours only as are us'd in Heraldry; and they are Nine, viz.

Two Simple, as White and Black.

Seven Mixt, as Red, Yellow, Green, Blew, Purple,

Tawny and Sanguine.

Note 1. The Two last seldom serve for the Colours of Fields, being called Stainand Colours, and used to signify some Disgrace, or Blemish of Honour or Vertue, in the Bearer; as you may read in the 3d Section of this Chapter, in the 2d. Diat. of the 1st. Parag.

Note 2. White and Yellow are called Metals, repre-

fenting Silver and Gold, the rest Colours,

Note 3. That Coat is affuredly false, wherein there is Metal upon Metal only, or Colour upon Colour only, that is, Gold upon Silver, Silver on Gold, Blew, Red, Occ. upon one another: But this Rule ceases, if

a Coat be Paly, Barry, Quarterly, Checkie, or Party per Pale, Chevron, &c.

Note 4. In blazoning the Arms of Gentlemen, &c.

Diat. 2. Of Furrs; and they are in Heraldry, White; Ermine, which confifts of White diftinguish'd with Black Spots; Ermynes, which is Black powder'd with White; Erminois, Black powder'd with Yellow; Pean, the contrary; Ermynites, the same with Ermyne, only it has a Hair of Red on each Side the Black.

There are other Sorts of Doublings (or Furrs) differing from those I have mention'd, in Form and Name.

1. Verrey, which is compounded of Argent and Azure; an Example of which is in Dr. Atterbury's, Mr.

Afton's of Gloucest. and many other Coats.

But if your Verrey consist of any other Metal, Colour or Furr, and not (jointly) of Argent and Azure, you must say Verrey of such a Metal and Colour or Furr; see the Arms of Dussield, Estanton and Drake of Grestow.

2. Po-

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2. Potent-Counter-Potent, of which (because I do not remember to have seen it in all my Collections) the Form follows,



Neither do I find that it is fix'd to any Colours, but that the Blazoner is to name those whereof it does at any time consist.

3. Vaire, which (as some will have it) consists of sour Colours together, viz. Argent, Gules, Or and Sable; but I chuse (with Gwillem) to make it the same as Verrey.

Parag. 2. Differences; Differences are extraordinary Additaments, whereby Bearers of the same Coat-Armour are distinguished each from others, and their nearness to the Principal Bearer is demonstrated.

Differences are { Ancient, or Modern.

Diat. 1. For Differences in ancient Times they us'd

Bordures and Imbordurings of feveral Sorts.

The Plain Border first, which is said to resemble the Fimbria's the Israelites wore on their Garment: And in blazoning must be called a Border, without mentioning its Plainness. The Content of the Border, is the fifth Part of the Field.


Note. When the Field and Border are both of one Tincture, you are not then to say, He beareth a Border, but He beareth such a Metal, Colour or Furr, Imbordured.

Besides this, there are other Borders, which consist of one Tincture only, but being compos'd of the different Lines, hereaster mention'd, have quite another Form.

Note.

Note. Some Borders confift of more Colours than one (these are mostly composed of the strait Line) and are

Counter-Componed, as in the Example following,



He beareth Azure, a Border Countercomponed, Or and Gules.—Countercompony consisteth of no more than 2 Tracts.

Checkie, which is like the former, but that it confifteth of many Tracts.

Borders (as the Fields themselves) are subject to be charg'd with things Natural and Artificial; as with Birds, and then your Border is said to be charg'd with Enaluron of such or such Birds, to such a Number; Beasts, and then it is Enursy; Vegitables, and then 'tis call'd Verdoy; Furrs, and then Perssew; a Border charged with things inanimate, of what kind soever, is said to be Entoyre. See the first Appendix.


There are several other Kinds of Borders, of which in the following Sheets you will find Examples.

Diat. 2. The Modern Differences, which not only distinguish Houses, but the different and subordinate Degrees in each, are, the File, Crescent, Mullet, Martlet, Annulet and Fleur de Lis. Of which view the following Scheme, which distinguish'd by Figures on the Top and in the Margin, shows the different Houses and Degrees.

Sect. III. Essential Parts of Arms.

THE Parts of Arms are, The Escocheon, and
The Ornaments without the Escocheon.

PARAGRAPH 1. An Escocheon is the Form of a Shield, of what Kind soever, so call'd of the Latin Word Scutum, which signifies the same thing. It confists of


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Points, and Abatements.

Diatriba 1. Points, which are Nine, and denominate the several Parts of the Escocheon; the Knowledge of which (as you will find hereafter) is of absolute Necessity. They are as follows,



Diat. 2. An Abatement is an accidental Mark annexed to Coat-Armour, denoting some ungentleman-like, dishonourable or disloyal Demeanor, whereby the Dignity of the Coat-Armour is greatly debased. They are these Nine.



He beareth Argent, a Delfe, Tenne: This is due to him that revoketh his Challenge, or eateth his Words.



He beareth Or, an Escocheon reversed, Sanguine: This is given to him that discourteously useth a Maid or Widdow, against her Will; or sies from his Sovereign's Banner.


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He beareth Argent, a Point dexter parted: Given to a meer Braggadochio.



He beareth Or, a Point in Point, Sanguine: Which is due to one that does not demean himself well in Fight.



He beareth Or, a Point Champaigne, Tenne. A Diminution due to one that kills his Prisoner.




He beareth Or, a Plain Point, Sanguine. The Mark of a Tale-Bearer and Liar.



He beareth Argent, a Goare sinister, Tenne. The Reward of a Coward.

Note. A Dexter Goare is not an Abatement, tho' it should happen to be of a Stainand Colour.

He



He beareth Argent, two Gussets, Sanguine. In Abatement there can be but one Gusset; and he that is given to Lust shall wear it on the right Side, a Drunkard on the left. But two Gussets together do not imply a Disgrace, several Families bearing them, particularly

that of Conningham, who bear Sable, two Guffets Argent.

Note. All the above Marks of Diminution, must be Sanguine or Tenne, which are Stainand Colours.

2. When you find two or more of 'em in an Escocheon, it is not by way of Abatement, but Charge.

3. Judge the same (tho' single) if they be of any Metal, or charg'd upon.

The last (and worst) kind of Abatement, is call'd Reversing, and that is, when the whole Escocheon is turned upside down, contrary to the usual Form of bearing: This is never given but to the finish'd Traiter.

The Second Paragraph of this Section will be spoken to in the next Chapter.

Sect. IV. The several Kinds of Escocheons.

Plain Shields were anciently used, as many Authors testify, and as we may inferr from the History of Solomon in our Bibles, and the Lives of Alexander Severus, and Alexander of Macedon, where Mention is made of Golden and Silver Shields, but not of any Portraist or Imbossiment upon them. In the History of King Edward I. of England, Mention is made of Eumenius de la Brest, who bore his Shield only Gules.

Some have confifted only of Furrs, as among others

(for Example) the Arms of Gresly of Drakelowe.

In all these there was no Distinction of Field and Charge; but Instances of this kind are very rare.

Sect. V.

Sect. V. What Field and Charge are.

THE Field is the whole Surface of the Shield or Efcocheon, overspread with some Metal, Colour or Furr, and comprehendeth in it the Charge, if there be any.

Note 1. There are as many feveral Fields as there

are Tinctures.

Note 2. When ever a Field consists of one only Metal or Colour, it is said, that in such a Coat, such a Colour or Metal does predominate. But in some Coats the Field consists of many Tinctures.

A Charge is whatsoever is contain'd in the Field, whether it occupy the whole, or only a Part thereof.

All Charges are Proper or Common.

Those which are common only to and in this Art, are called *Proper* or *Honourable Ordinaries*.

Such as are compos'd of things Natural or Artificial,

are called Common Charges.


Sect. VI. The several Kinds of Honourable Ordinaries and their Diminutives.

Onourable Ordinaries are Nine, as follows,

I. The Cross, which contains the 5th part of the Escocheon, when uncharg'd, and charg'd, the 3d. See the Arms of Allesbury.

2. Chief the 3d. See Workfly.

3. Pale the 3d. See an Example in the Arms of Aveskine, Dodge, &c. The Diminutives are,



4. Benda

4. Bend, which contains when charg'd the 3d Part, uncharg'd the 5th part of the Escocheon; and has the following Diminutives,

A Bendlet.

A Gartier.

A Riband.

There are also Rends Sinister, with proper Diminustions, as,



Note. The Battune is a Mark of Bastardy; and every Bearer may have it of what Coulour he please, but only the spurious Sons of Princes, may bear them of Metal or Furr.

5. Fesse, containing the 3d part of the Escocheon; see the Arms of Abbehall.

6. Escocheon the 5th part; see Hulgreve's Coat.

7. Chevron, containing the 5th, or as others, the 3d part of the Escocheon; see one in the Arms of Avene. Its Diminutives are,

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
There is extant a rare Example of bearing a Chevron, which I have thought fit to infert, for that Reafon.



He beareth Or, a Chevron in Chief, Azure. This Charge (faith Gwillim) was not remov'd from its proper place, without good reason; nevertheless, the Bearing it as usual, had been better.

8. The 8th Ordinary is the Saltire, which uncharged has the 5th, charg'd, the 3d part of the Escocheon; there is a plain Saltire in the Arms of Aston.

o. A Bar, containing the 5th part of the Field, of which there are in the Book, numerous Examples: The Diminutives are,





Note 1. When you have any of the Ordinaries born plain, you need not mention their Plainness, for that is their natural Form.

Note 2. All or most of these may be born, inveck'd, ingrail'd, indented, &c. voided, couped, cotised or surmounted, as in the 8th Section will surther appear.

An Orle, of which you will find Examples; as also of Common Charges born in Orle, or Orlewise.


I purposely forbear to mention the several Kinds of Crosses, because such as are now used in Arms, are very frequently to be found.

Sect. VII. Of Lines with their diverse Forms.

ALL Ordinaries are supposed to be made of a strait Line; therefore when they are composed of a crooked one, you are to take particular Care to mention such Crookedness by a proper Appellation.

The following Scheme contains such Forms of Lines as are used in Heraldry, with their proper Names a-

gainst them, viz.



The Lines Indented and Dancette do not differ in Form, but Quantity; the last being much larger and deeper than the other.

Sect. VIII. Some sew Coats referr'd to, for the diverse bearing of several Ordinaries.

1. THE Cross is born Plain, in the Arms of Allesbury, Hussey, Shelton, Wall, Smith of Suffolk, Rainsford, &c. Voided, Atkinson of Stowel. Voided wavy, Duckenssield. Couped voided, Woodnoth. Couped peirced, Grill. Peirced, Ralphson. Ingrail'd, Norwood, Warner of Norfolk, Mickletsield, Cidul, &c. Checkie, Paris of Lincoln, Whitney, &c. Surmanted, Malton. Reguled, Warner of Suffolk.

2: A

2. A Chief is found Plain, in the Arms of Bruce, Scambler, Worksley, Sylgard, &c. Crenelle, Ryncester. Indented, Escourt, Basset, Butler, Dyer, Black-hall, &c. Nebule, Roydenhall. Verrey, Wilcocks.

3. A Flain Pale is in the Arms of Wyche and Woodward. Cotifed, Heathcot. Radiant Rayonee, Colman.

4. A Plain Bend in the following Coats, viz. Callis, Delyne, Whetnall, Annelly, &c. Indented, Craycroft. Cotifed, Bowyer, Plummer, Wingate. Voided, Pulter, Ireton, &c. Lozengy, Lenthal, Pye. Wavy, White, Anteshye, Webster, Wallop. Dancette, Carrick, West of Oxford. Ingrail'd, Waller of Suffolk, Colepeper, &c. Flory, Kelke. Crenelle, Walleys. Raguled, Warner of Essex, Payne of Cambridge.

5. There is a Plain Fesse in Covil's, Carsey's, Abbehall's, Burkin's and Winter's Coats. Checkie, Courtis, Wright of York. Ingrail'd, Ely, Ashsield, Slysield, Appleton, &c. Dancette, Plowden, Vavasour, West of Bucks, Somers, &c. Verrey, Wright of Surry. Wavy, Weld of Lancashire, Hawes, Watson, &c. Cotifed, Weaver, Smith of Devon. Nebule, Weld of Salop, Thorpe, Harewell. Raguled, Payne of Norfolk. Crenelle, Glover.

6. The Chevron is born Plain in the Arms of Stafford, Avene, Barlow, Warwick, &c. Ingrail'd, Child of Essex, Wood of Gloucester, Wilford, Smallpiece of Norfolk. Voided, Pynfold. Verrey, Wilmore, Wilkinson of Kent. Cotised, Smith of Surry. Quarterly,

Wincoll. Rompe, Sault, Allen.

7. Plain Saltires are frequent, as in the Coats belonging to Crathorn, Wakeman of Gloucester, Williams of Pembroke, &c. Ingrail'd, Clarke of Creeton, Polwheel, Wotton, Watton. Flory, Webber. Verrey, Willington. Surmounted of another, Andrews. Surmounted of a Cross, Prince.

These few Forms of Bearing, and the Instances of them, I made Choice of to mention here, not because there are no others, or that all of 'em may be found in the following Sheets, but because they are such as

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I cou'd most readily call to mind. I suppose I need make no Apology for inserting a Section of this Nature, seeing (as 'tis a Sort of Table to the Ordinaries) it can scarce fail of being useful to the Reader.

Sect. IX. Cautions: Containing the Names of Roundles, Guttees, and other Matters.


IN Heraldry there are several Kinds of Charges, which tho' alike in Form, differ in Name, either by reason of their Colour, or some Dissimilitude in their Shape, not very conspicuous.

Of the 1st. Sort are the Guttees and Roundles.

The Word Guttee in French fignifies a Drop; and whatever Charge or Field these are found upon, such Charge or Field (according to the Tincture of the Drops) is said to be Guttee



So likewise Roundles, according to their different Colours, have new Names assign'd them; for




* Or Pellets.

But when they are so born as to be counterchang'd, you can call them nothing but Roundles, as in the Arms of Abtot, once Earl of Worcester, which is, Per Pale Topaz and Ruby, three Roundles counterchang'd. Take the same Course, when the Drops above mention'd are counterchang'd, of which you have an Example in Mr. Gwillim's Display of Heraldry, p. 370. viz. the Arms of Grindour.


Of the fecond Sort, viz. Such as feem alike in Form, yet differ really both in Shape and Name, are

The Fufil.

The Lozenge.



The Mascle.



The Difference to be observed in them is, That the Fusil is longer than the Lozenge, and narrow; the Lozenge has between the two middle Angles as much or more Space, as the Length of either of the Lines 'tis made of; and the Mascle is always voided, i.e. the Field is seen thro' the middle of it.

And thus have I finish'd what I thought necessary to mention concerning Blazen, which I hope will be to Satisfaction: I now proceed to the Rules of Marshalling.

Chap. II. Of Marsballing.

Arshalling is an orderly bestowing of Things,

Sect. I. Within Sect. II. Without the Escocheon.

Sect. I. Of the Disposition of divers Coat-Armours in one Shield (or Escocheon) which is the first Part of Marshalling.

Oat-Armours of different Families, are Marshalled in one Escocheon, on Accounts, Manifest or Obscure.

The Manifest Reasons are, (I.) Marriages. (II.)

The Gift of the Sovereign.

(I.) Under the First Head we must observe, That sometimes only two Coats are born together, conjoined Paleways in one Escocheon, and this is called Baron and Femme; concerning which take the following Notes.

on that Side of the Escocheon which lies to your left Hand, for in Heraldry that is the Right (or Dexter).

Side.

If a Man do marry two Wives, he shall bear his Shield per Pale, on the Sinister Side his two Wives Coats, the first in Chief, the second in Base. If three Wives, the two first shall have the Chief Part, the third all the Base. If he have a fourth Wife, she must participate of the Base, with the third Wise.

I remember to have seen in some Author, an Example of a Baron impal'd between his two Femmes, viz.

the

the first Wife on his Dexter, the second on the Sinister; but I cannot find that fuch a Form of Marshalling is common or commendable.

2. No Man can (legally) impale his Wife's Arms with his own, unless such Wife was an Heiress.

Nevertheless, Custom has so far prevail'd, that all who have married Women whose Parents bore Arms, do joyn their Wives Arms with their own. Whether they ought to do so, or not, I leave to be decided by fuch skilful Heralds, whose Province 'tis determine' things of this Nature.

3. In the Arms of all Femmes, joyn'd to the Paternal Coat of the Baron, the proper Differences by which. they were born by the Fathers of such Women, must

be inserted.

4. If a Coat-Armour that is Bordered, be joyn'd in Pale with another, as a Marriage, then shall that Part of the Border, (whether of the Baron or Femme's Coat) which is next to the other, be wholly omitted.

Note here; That all Archbishops and Bishops do. bear their own Arms thus impal'd with that of their See, only, Honoris Causa, the Dexter Side is given to the See. Also Note; That the Bishop of Winchester. being always Prelate of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has the whole of his Arms inviron'd by the Garter, as tho' he were a Knight Companion.

The Kings at Arms do also sometimes marshall the Arms of their respective Office, with their Paternal,

taking the Sinister Side to themselves.

2. Unto this Head also must be referr'd the Escocheon of. Pretence; and herein the Person that marries an Heires, has a Priviledge above others; for after Issue receiv'd by such Wife, he is at Liberty whether he will continue to bear her Arms impal'd, or on an Escocheon of Pretence, in the Centre of his own Coat or Coats.

An Escocheon of Pretence is so call'd, because he that bears it does pretend (God willing) to maintain in his

Family, the Inheritance receiv'd by his Wife.

3. The

3. The Eldest Son of such a Match as is just mention'd, doth bear the Arms both of his Father and of his Mother, Quarterly, i. e. twice each; and that because he is Heir to the Inheritance of both, as well as to their Arms. There are some Examples of this Kind in the following Sheets, as that of Id. Arundel, Mr. Walker, and others.

(II.) Under the fecond Head, viz. Such Forms of Marshalling as manifestly betoken a Sovereign Gift, are those given of special Favour, or Remuneration of Ser-

vice.

Of the first Sort are all such Armorial-Signs as the Sovereign thinks sit (for the Honour of the Bearer) to annex to a Coat-Armour: Which are marshall'd Paleways or otherwise. In all such as are plac'd Paleways, the Dexter Side (ob Reverentiam Muniscentia Regalis)

is to be given to the added Coat.

Those marshall'd otherwise, have the whole Sovereign Ensigns, or a Part of them, in or upon some Part of their Escocheon. His Grace the D. of Somerset bears Or, on a Pile Gules between six Fleurs de Lis Azure, 3 Lions of England. His Grace the Duke of Beausort bears, Quarterly France and England, within a Border compone, Argent and Azure. Other Examples may be observed in reading.

Among such Augmentations as these, we may add, the Baronet's Mark, or Arms of the Province of Ulfer in Ireland, which was granted to them by King James I. who began this Dignity, and for certain Monies paid toward the Plantation of the said Province, created divers into it. The Arms are, Argent, a Sinif-

ter Hand couped, Gules.

The second Kind, which are given for Remuneration of Service, to such as are imploy'd in Warfare, or in Civil Affairs, are 1st. Such Badges as belong to the several Orders of Knighthood, every Companion having Right to joyn them with his Paternal Coat.

2dly. He that takes Prisoner in lawful Wars, some General, Admiral, or other Person of Note, has some-

times

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times the Arms of his Prisoner joyn'd to his own, in a Canton or otherwise; where note, that in blazoning such Additament, 'tis no Fault to repeat the Names of Tinctures, &c. used in the Coat.

Hitherto the Occasions of Marshalling divers Coat-Armours in one Shield, are manifest; now I come to treat of such as be obscure, that is, when Hereditary Coats are so Marshall'd, as that the Beholder cannot give any probable Conjecture why they are so join'd, and often cannot tell whether they are two Coats or but one.

Upton gives the two differing Rules, both for dif-

covering and ordering things of this Nature.

He fays, 'When a Man has large Possessions by his 'Mother, and little by his Father, he may bear his 'Mother's Arms on the nether part of the Shield, and

his Father's on a Chief.

Again, 'It is certainly the best way of bearing die vers Arms in one Escocheon, to marshal one as an entire Coat, the other on a Bend, &c. But these two are dislik'd by many Armorists, who reckon them Conceited Forms.

The like may be faid concerning that odd Form of marshalling the Barox's Arms, viz. Paleways between his two Wives, of which Blome has an Example.

Sect. II. Of Things Marshall'd without the Escocheon.

A ND here, e're we proceed further, 'tis proper to tell you what an Atchievment is in Heraldry; and according to Leigh, 'tis the Arms of every Gentleman, well marshall'd, with the Supporters, Helmet, Wreath and Crest, with Mantle and Words. But the proper Term of this in Blazon, is Deadone and Ctmbre: The first seems deriv'd of the French Word Heaulme, which we translate Helmet, the other is a Dutch Word, signifying Apex, i. e. the very Top.

In Order to understand the true Manner of placing the Ornaments just mention'd, let us consider each of

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'em fingly: But we must observe, that the Ornaments of an Atchievment are placed either above, under, round

about, or on each Side of it.

Of fuch as are plac'd Above the Atchievment, that which comes first to be observed is the Helmet, whereof there are several Forms, for as there are sundry Degrees among the Bearers, they are all distinguished (in some fort) by their Helmets; for



The Esquire bears a sidelong Helmet, after this Manner; as it were attentively beholding his Master the Knight, to receive his Commands; for an Esquire has his Name of bearing the Shield, quasi Scutifer, and in time past, each Knight had two of these to attend him, wherever he went, who bare his Helmet and Shield.



The full-fac'd Helmet signifies Direction and Command, and therefore this here, is proper to the Dignity of Knight hood: It is greater Honour to bear the Beaver open, than close, the close signifying a buckling of it on, as a Preparation to Battle, the open Beaver betokening a

Return from Battle with Victory, I Kings xx. 11.

This Sidelong Helmet, open, with the Gard de Visor over the Face, is common to all the Degrees of Peerage under a Duke.

For Leigh allows none lower than a Barron to bear them.



A Duke is the lowest that may bear his Helmet in this Manner; for it properly belongs only to Sovereign Princes, or such who have the Government of free States or Countries. Now concerning the placing of Helmets; take these following Notes:

I. For

1. For the Way of placing a fingle Helmet, you need only look on the Figures in the former Page.

2. If you have two Helmets on one Shield, they must be plac'd as it were looking towards one another.

3. When you have three, let the middlemost be looking directly forward, and the others towards it.

The next in Order of the Exterior Parts of an Atchievment, is the Mantle, which with us is taken for a long Robe. This was a Military Habit, used by great Commanders to preserve their Armour from the damage that might come to it by Rain, Snow, &c. Perhaps it was the same with the Toga Militaris of the ancient Romans. What we now a-days call Mantleing, may better be call'd Flourishing, for 'tis not to be imagin'd, that such jagged and frownced Stuff as is in use, was ever design'd to keep off Cold or Rain, which was undoubtedly the first Occasion of the Invention of Mantles.

But in Blazoning (what ever Name you chuse to call 'em by) you must ever more say that they are doubled, i. e. lined throughout with some one of the Furrs a-

bove nam'd.

Next to the Mantle, the Cognifance doth take Place, and is feated upon the most eminent Part of the Atchievment, yet so that it admitteth the Interposition of some Escroll, Wreath, Chapeau, Crown, &c. and is call'd a Cognisance, a cognoscendo, because by them fuch Persons as do wear them are eminently known whose Servants they are.

I will now proceed to treat of fuch things as are fometimes interpos'd between the Mantle and the Crest, beginning with those of inferior Rank, and so proceed-

ing to the better Sort.



Altho' Examples of a Crest on an Escroll, of this, or some other like Form, be now worn out of Use, yet formerly it was of fo great Estimation, that none under the Degree of a Knight was fuffer'd to bear it. And it may be observ-

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ed, that even now our most noble Prince of Wales, so

beareth his Badge.



The Wreath (or Torce) so call'd because made of Silk of two or more Colours) is an Ornament of the Head, in use with the Turks and Saracens. For the orderly composing hereof, you must evermore begin with the Metal, and end with the Colour.



This Kind of Headtire, is call'd A Cap of Dignity, which Duke's accustomed to wear in Token of Excellency; as also great Commanders, for Testimony of their Triumphs and Victories. This Cap must be of Scarlet Colour, and lin'd with Ermine.

Next to these are the several Sorts of Crowns and Coronets, of which the following are Icons.

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Such Ornamients as environ the Coat-Armour, are the Badges of the feveral Orders of Knighthood; where 'tis to be observ'd, that if any Person be a Member of two of 'em, he shall place the Ornament of one next to his Shield, and the other without.

Things placed on the Side, are either Living, and then to be called Supporters; or Dead, and then you must say the Arms are Cotised of such and such things. Note. None of less Degree than a Baron, is allow'd to

bear his Arms cotifed and Supported.

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The last Ornament proper to an Atchievment, is the Motto or Word, which is the Conceit of the Bear-er, in three or four Words, set in an Escroll or Com-partment at the Foot of the Escocheon, and is to be last blazoned.

Observe upon the whole, That in blazoning these Ornaments, 'tis no manner of Fault to repeat any

Term of Art, Names of Tinctures, &c. twice.

And now, to illustrate what has been faid, take the following Examples, by which every Rule before given will be fully explain'd.

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The Atchievment of an Esquire, or Gentleman.



In Gratitude to the Rev. Mr. Joseph Bokenham, Rector of Stoake Ash in the County of Norfolk, who has been on several Accounts an Encourager of this Book, I make bold to insert his Coat here, with proper Ornaments, tho' that Gentleman has modestly resus'd to communicate to us the suitable Instructions, having only sent the Coat and Crest, without Quarterings; He beareth Argent, a Lion rampant Gules, armed and langued Azure. Crest. On a Torce Argent and Gules, a Lion rampant as in the Coat.

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The Atchievment of a Baronet or Knight.



THE Right worshipful Sir Nicholas Carem of Bedington in Surry, Baronet, bears quartered Twelve
Coats, viz. 1st Or, three Lioncels passant Sable, on
a Canton Argent, a dexter Hand couped at the Wrist
Gules. 2d. Argent, three Snakes nowed proper. 3d.
Gules, a dexter Arm proper, habited with a Maunch
Ermine, holding a Fleur de Lis Or. 4th. Quarterly
Sable and Argent. 5th. Gules, a Fesse checkie Sable
and Argent, between six Cross-Crossets of the third.
6th.

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6th. Azure, three left Hand Gauntlets Argent. 7th. Ermine, on a Chief Azure, three Cross-Pattees Argent. 8th. Azure, a Frett Argent, and Chief Gules. oth. Or. A Lion rampant double quevee Sable. 10th. Gules, a Fesse dancette between six Cross-Croslets Or. 11th. Barry of fix Ermine and Gules, over all three Crescents Argent. 12th. Argent, three Piles wavy iffuing out of the chief, and meeting near in Base Vert. within a Border Azure, charg'd with entoyre of ten Bezants. In the Nombril Point an Escocheon of Pretence Argent, three Fleurs de Lis in Bend, between 2 Cotifes Gules, all within the Escocheon, and above it a Helmet befitting his Degree, mantled Gules, doubled Argent; over which is placed a Torce Or and Gules, above, a demy Lion rampant between fix half Pikes. bendways dexter and fiinister, all issuing from the Top Mast Head of a Ship, Or. The whole Supported on each Side by an Antilope Gules, attir'd and unguled Or, and for the Motto, Nil conscire sibi.

N. B. Tho the above Arms are found to be Supported, let not the Reader inferr, that all Knights or Baronets may bear theirs so, for this Honourable Person, having had the Peerage in his Family, retains the same form of bearing with his Noble Ancestors.

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The Atchievment of a Baron.



THE Right Honourable William Temple, Lord Cobham, bears Quarterly two Coats, viz. 1st and 4th.
Topaz, an Eagle displaid Diamond. 2d and 3d Pearl, 2
Bars Diamond, each charg'd with three Martlets Topaz.
On a Crown fitting the Degree of a Baron, a like Helmet proper, mantled Ruby, doubled Ermine, thereon a
Crown Topaz, above a Martlet of the same. And for
his Supporters, on the dexter side a Lion party per
Fesse Topaz and Ruby, on the sinister side a Horse
Pearl, semy of Eaglets Diamond. The Motto Templa
quam dilecta.

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The Atchievment of a Viscount.



THE Right Hon. Charles Townshend, Visc. Townshend, bears Quarterly, 1st and 4th Saphire, a Chevron Ermine between 3 Escallops Pearl. 2d and 3d Quarterly Ruby and Topaz, in the Dexter Point a Mullet Pearl, and a Crescent for Difference Diamond. Impal'd with Walpole, viz. Topaz, on a Fesse between 2 Chevrons Diamond, as many Cross-Croslets of the 1st. Above on a suitable Coronet, a Helmet proper, mantled Ruby, doubled Ermine, and over it on a Torce Pearl and Saphire, a Stagg tripping proper, attired & armed Topaz. The whole supported on the Dexter side by a Stagg proper, attir'd &c. Topaz, on the sinifter by a Greyhound Pearl.

The Atchievment of an Earl.



THE Right Hon. Charles Spenser, Earl of Sunder-land, bears Quarterly Pearl and Ruby, in the second and third a Fret Topaz, over all on a Bend Diamond, three Escallops of the first. Impal'd with Churchil, viz. Diamond, a Lion rampant Pearl, and a Canton of the last charg'd with St. George's Cross. And above the same, on a Coronet sitting his Degree a Helmet proper, thereon, issuing out of a Crown Topaz, a Griffin's Head with Wings displaid Pearl, gorg'd with a Gemew Ruby. Supported by a Griffin party per Fesse Pearl and Topaz, &c. on the dexter side, on the simisfer side a Wivern Pearl, &c. Z. The

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The Atchievment of a Duke.



LIS Grace Thomas Hollis Pelham, D. of Newcastle, bears quarterly, ist and 4th Saphire, three Pelicans Argent, vulning themselves proper. 2d and 3d Ruby, two demy Garters paleways Pearl, all within the Garter. And above the same, on a Helmet proper, &c. a Peacock displaid Pearl. Supported on the dexter side by a bay Horse, on the sinister by a Bear proper, each collered, nowed Pearl. Motto. Vincit Amas Parisa.

Spencer, just mention d; was Blazon'd abruptly only so for Want of Room.

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The Royal Arms.



GEORGE, by the Grace of God, King of Great-Britain, France and Ireland, &c. Defender of the Faith, our only Rightful and Ever-Glorious Sovereign, bears for his Royal Enfigns Armorial, Quarterly, viz. 1st. Mars, three Lions passant guardant in Pale Sol, for the Arms of England, Impal'd with Scotland, i. e. Sol, a Lion rampant within a double Tressure counterflory Mars. 2d. Jupiter, three Fleurs de Lis Sol, for the Arms of France. 3d. Jupiter, an Irish Harp Sol.

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Sol, stringed Luna, for Ireland. 4th. Seme party per Pale, and per Chevron enarche, in the 1st Mars, two Lions passant guardant Sol, for Brunswick. In the 2d Partition Sol, femy of Hearts Mars, and a Lion rampant Tupiter, armed and langued of the First, for Luneburg. The base is Mars, a Horse current Luna, over these last on an Inescocheon, Constantine's Crown. All within the Garter. Above the whole a Helmet suitable to his Majesty's Royal Jurisdiction, upon the same a rich Mantle of Cloth of Gold, doubled Ermine, adorn'd with an Imperial Crown, and furmounted by a Lion paffant guardant, crowned with the like: Supported by a Lion rampant guardant Sol, crowned as the former, and an Unicorn Luna gorg'd with a Crown with a Chain thereto affix'd, passing between his fore-legs, and reflex'd over his Back Sol. Both standing on an Escrole, from the midst of which issues, the 2 Royal Badges of his Majesties chief Dominions, viz. a Rose for England, and a Thistle for Scotland. And in the said Escrole this Motto, Dieu et Mon Droit.

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HERALDRY.

Aving in the Preface hereto accounted for that Deficiency which there feems to be in the Alphabetical following of Names, and in the Precedent Rules, having given such General Instructions as I thought needful; the Examples following shall furnish out such Particular Observations, as will be farther useful.



Abbehall of Gloucestershire; The Field is Or, a Fesse Gules. The Name of this Ordinary comes from a Word which in French signifies the Loins of a Man; 'tis taken in Heraldry for Cingulum Honoris, a Belt of Honour.



Abbington of Dowdeswel in Gloucestershire; He beareth Argent, on a Bend Gules, three Eaglets displaid, Or. Crest. A dexter Arm proper, girded about the Elbow with a Scarff Argent, holding a Halberd Sable, the Head and Pick at the End Or.

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Abrahall of Herefordshire; The Field is Azure, three Hedghogs Or. The bearing of a Hedghog, fignifies a provident Man, who watchfully lays Wait for, and Hold on, every Opportunity to advance himself.



Addison, (now a Member of Parliament for Malmsbury); The Field is Ermine, on a Bend Gules, three Annulets Or, a Chief Azure, charg'd with as many Leopard's Heads of the third. In this and the like Places, the Words, Charged with, and of the Third, are used to a-

void repeating of the Words, On and Or, which Repetition you have been directed always to shun.



Ainge of London; He beareth Azure, a Chevron Ermine, between three Cross Pattees Argent. These Crosses are very properly called Pattees, because their Ends are Patula, broad and open.



Akelont of Gloucestershire; The Field is Argent, on a Bend cotifed (or, on a Bend between two Cotifes) Gules, three Martlets Or. These are called Cotifes or Costs, from the Latin Word Costa, a Rib, because they are plac'd on each Side the Ordinary.



Aldam; Azure, one Ray of the Sun, issuing out of the dexter Corner of the Escocheon, proper. There is no need to mention the three Lines on each side the Ray, because there are no such in Nature, but the Lustre of the Sun, being too strong for our Eyes, causes us to

imagine fuch things to be about it.

Aldridge,



Aldridge, (Capt.) He beareth Gules, on a Chevron between three Eagle's Heads eraz'd Argent, as many Lozenges of the first. The Term eraz'd comes from the Latin Word erado, to rent off, or the French arrasher, which signifies the same.



Allen of Essex; He beareth Sable, a Cross Potent Or. It may also be blazoned, a Cross Crowche, from the Resemblance each Extremity bears to the Head of a Crowch (or Crutch) which Chaucer calls a Potent.



Allen of London; The Field is Party per Fesse Gules and Sable, a Chevron rompe between three Griffin's Heads erazed Ermine. The Term Rompe, is deriv'd from the French Rompu, or the Latin Rumpus, which both signify, Broken.



Allesbury or Aylesbury; He beareth Azure, a Cross Argent. Here you need not mention the Plainness of the Cross, nor must you when any other Ordinary is so born.



Amades of Plymouth; The Field is Azure, a Chevron Ermine between 3 Oaken Slips, acorn'd proper.

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Ambesace; He beareth Or, three Dice Sable, each charg'd with an Ace Argent.



Anderson of Scotland; He beareth Azure, a Lion rampant Argent, and in Chief three Mullets of the same. A Lion rampant must be esteem'd in Scottish Heraldry, to be a very noble bearing, because it participates of the Armorial Ensigns of that Kingdom.



Andrews of Buckinghamshire; The Field is Gules, a Saltire Or, surmounted of another Vert. The Saltire in old Time was of the Height of a Man, and being driven full of Pins, used to scale the Walls of Towns, which then were very low.



Andrews of Harsfield in Gloucestershire; He beareth Argent, on a Bend cotised Sable, three Mullets of the first. Leigh saith, That Coat-Armour whose Field is Argent, and the Charge Sable, is the most sair kind of Bearing.




The Rt. Hon. Arthur Annesley, E. of Anglesea, bears; Paly of six, Pearl and Saphire, a Bend Ruby. The Bend seems to have its Name of the French Word Bender, to stretch forth. Some Armorists say it represents a Scaling-Ladder.

Anteshye; Party per Pale, Or and Argent, a Bend wavy Gules. The Term Wavy, or Unde, is used, because of the Resemblance this sort of Line has to the boisterous Waves of the Sea.



Appleton of Essex; He beareth Argent, a Fesse engrail'd Sable, between three Apples, leaved proper.



Areskine of Scotland; The Field is Argent, on a Pale Sable, a Cross Patte-Fitche of the first. Guillim in blazoning the same Charge, says, A Cross Pattee on 3 parts, and Fitched in the fourth. The Reader in all such Cases, where a Coat can be differently blazowhich Form he please.

The Method to which I confin'd my self, e're I began this Book, wou'd have occasion'd a considerable Blank in this Page, to avoid which I have transcribed out of The Accidence of Armory, the Nine Badges of Geratting.

The first are Crosses, simple and fitched, whereof 4 are most ancient, viz. Plain Crosses, Crosses flory, Cross

Crossets, and Crosses Patonce.

2. The second Badge are Fleurs de Lis.

3. The third are Roselets, that is to say single Roses, that have but five Leaves a Piece.

4. The fourth is Quaterfoils, or Primrofes. 5. The fifth Cinkfoils, both pierced and mhole.

6. The fixth Diacles or Scopperelles. By which I believe he means Escallops.

7. The seventh Chaplets, or Wreaths (formerly) of Fearl, now for the most Part made of Herbs or Flowers.

8. The eighth Sort are Mullets of five Points, whether

mhole or pierced.

o. The ninth and last are Crescents.

Now let the Reader observe, that is a gerated Coat, in which any of these Badges are born, under the Number of eleven; he must also remember, that the the Fields of divers Coat Armours are geratted with other Things, yet the nine above (as most ancient) must be accounted to be most honourable.




