A BRIEF BIOGRAPHY OF OUR GRAND MASTER

M.W. Bro. William Thompson Anderson was born in Adjala Township in the County of Simcoe, and raised in the Township of Mono, in the County of Dufferin, where he attended public school. Upon graduation from Orangeville District High School, he went to work with the then Department of Lands and Forests, becoming involved in Municipal Assessment through the Provincial Land Tax Programme. Bro. Anderson then transferred to the Department of Municipal Affairs, Municipal Assessment Division, and enrolled in the Queen's University Extension School Municipal Assessment Accreditation Programme, leading to the designation M.I.M.A. (Member of the Institute of Municipal Assessors). When the province of Ontario assumed all responsibility for municipal assessment, he was transferred to Barrie as Valuation Manager, where he served until his retirement in 1990.

Bro. Anderson married Betty Bush, of Coldwater, in 1959, and they have two children; Craig, who lives in Barrie, in the employ of a video rental company, and Heather, who is serving in the Canadian Navy.

He has been a member of the choir and served on several committees of the Barrie Central United Church, including Chairman of Finance, Chairman of Stewards and Recording Secretary of the official Board. He is also a past Chairman of the Board of the United Church's Cedar Glen Conference Centre, at Bolton.

He is a past president of the Coldwater Junior Chamber of Commerce, a past president and life member of the Institute of Municipal Assessors of Ontario, past chairman of the Canadian Directors of Assessment, Advisory Committee, past chairman of the Canadian Chapter of the International Association of Assessing Officers.

Bro. Anderson became a member of Karnak Lodge No. 492, Coldwater, April 5, 1962, and served as Master in 1967. He is a charter member of Innisfil Lodge No. 737, in Stroud. He served as District Deputy Grand Master of Georgian District in 1987 – 1988, was elected to the Board of General Purposes of Grand Lodge in 1989, where he served on several committees, including Masonic Education, Condition of Masonry, Seminars and Workshops, Communications, Membership and Management, chairing the latter four committees. He was elected as Deputy Grand Master in July, 1995.

M.W. Bro. Anderson is a Past Thrice Puissant Grand Master of the Barrie Lodge of Perfection, Past Most Wise Sovereign, Spry Chapter Rose Croix, Past Commander-in-Chief, Barrie Consistory. In 1988, he was coroneted Honorary Inspector General 33°, Supreme Council for Canada in Vancouver, British Columbia, and is a member of the Royal Order of Scotland.

He is an Honorary Past First Principal of Signet Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Barrie, and is a Past Patron of Bayview Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. M.W. Bro. Anderson is also the Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of South Australia.

Grand Master's Address

To the Officers and Members of the Most Worshipful the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

My Brethren:

Two years ago you elevated me to the position of Grand Master of this great jurisdiction, and you have no idea the honour this office places on the shoulders of one so appointed. Regardless of where one travels, this Grand Lodge is held in high esteem and this is a result of the respect and integrity of those men who preceded me in the office of Grand Master of this Grand Jurisdiction.

I take this opportunity to welcome to the 142nd Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge the many Masons representing our sister jurisdictions throughout North America, and I hope they leave with pleasant memories that will last a lifetime.

To the Masons of Ontario, I thank you for taking the time to attend your Grand Lodge. Many of you have heard me repeat over and over that without you there would be no Grand Lodge and certainly no Grand Master. My brethren, it is you who choose your Grand Master.

One year ago I stated that my predecessors had been the originators of many great programmes, such as Mentor and Friend to Friend, and that your Grand Lodge was going to put these programmes fully to work. This year, under the leadership of the Deputy Grand Master, as chairman of the Board of General Purposes, it is our intention to launch the Brother to Brother and the Y.E.S. programmes. It is not our intention to programme the Masons of Ontario to death, but these two programmes fit into the scheme and make our other great programmes more workable. So, my brethren, these are not really two added programmes but rather an extension of those already in existence.

Necrology

John Alfred Irvine

On Saturday, July 20, 1996, Freemasonry lost a true servant. John Alfred Irvine's passing ended a lifetime of outstanding service to family, community, country and freemasonry. He had served as a member of parliament for London, Ontario, member and Deputy Mayor of the London city council, Grand Master and Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario, Honorary Thirty-third Degree member of the Supreme Council of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Canada, member of the Royal Order of Scotland, Past Potentate of Mocha Shrine Temple, London, and a life member of the Royal Arch Masons of Ontario.

M.W. Bro. Irvine possessed in rare balance the qualities that go to make up the really useful Masonic servant; integrity beyond reproach; unselfishness that allowed him to treat opportunities for service as synonymous with duties; ability to clearly evaluate a problem and the capacity to understand Masons and to assist them to put their Masonry on a high level.

Bro. Irvine was born on Wolfe Island, Ontario, on January 26, 1911. At the age

of thirteen, he left school to sail as a deck hand and later as an able bodied seaman on the Great Lakes and the Atlantic coastal waters. While not sailing, he acquired a high school education and later attended Queen's University until he entered the business field. In 1939, he volunteered for the Canadian Army and, in 1945, he was placed on the reserve list of officers with the rank of Captain. Bro. Irvine then continued his business career, where he operated his own appliance business until his retirement in 1961.

M.W. Bro. Irvine served Grand Lodge as Grand Senior Warden in 1955, as an elected member of the Board of General Purposes from 1958 to 1961, as Deputy Grand Master from 1961 to 1963, as Grand Master from 1963 to 1965 and as Grand Secretary from 1971 to 1979. Whether we remember him for his humour that quite often relaxed our tensions; whether we remember him for his differing ideas that challenged our thinking — however we remember him, our good memories balance the scales and we express, in real humility, our true gratitude to the late John Alfred Irvine for his many years of service and love.

Each of us can readily vouch for our brother's involvement in life. He was a man of pragmatic religious faith. He embraced the Christian philosophy of life: to do unto others as he wanted them to do unto him. He was a faithful supporter of his church.

We are deeply grateful to his children and grandchildren who so graciously shared their dad and grandfather with all of us. Especially, we are indebted to his gracious and devoted wife Winnifred, who so often shared her husband with us.

It truly mattered that John Alfred Irvine was here on this earth, in this place, during our time.

James E. Cope

The District Deputy Grand Master of Chatham District, R.W. Bro. James E. Cope, passed away March 16, 1997, following a lengthy struggle with his terminal illness. He is greatly missed by his family, friends and brethren who so loved and admired him.

Michael G. Brellisford

The Grand Senior Warden, R.W. Bro. Michael G. Brellisford was suddenly taken from our midst following a massive heart attack suffered September 12, 1996. Not only was his sudden demise a tremendous shock to all but Masonry lost one of its brightest young minds that could have been so valuable to the Craft in future years.

It was this group that originated the idea that our Grand Lodge make it possible for the members of this jurisdiction to contribute to the relief of victims of the horrible flood that the citizens of Manitoba living in the Red River Valley experienced in May of this year.

One could not possibly imagine how much your attention and care was appreciated by me at the several functions when either singly or in tandem these brethren catered to my every need.

Grand Chaplain

The Grand Chaplain, R.W. Bro. Jeffrey C. Davison has travelled extensively this year, as he exhibited outstanding service and leadership in his participation in many Divine Services and Masonic events. Thank you, most sincerely, Rev. Davison.

Grand Historian

Once more, I offer heartfelt thanks to our Grand Historian, R.W. Bro. Wallace McLeod, who at the present time is unable to be with us as he is sharing his expertise and researches with our brethren in Australia and, let me say this, that one glimpse at

Your Grand Master, accompanied by the Deputy Grand Master and Grand Secretary, attended the Conference of Grand Masters of North America, in Tulsa, Oklahoma, in February of this year, where our Deputy Grand Master presented an excellent paper on membership, giving the Grand Masters of North America an insight into our new Brother to Brother and Y.E.S. programmes.

Due to the excellent response from the membership to this great magazine, I recommend that this Grand Lodge continue to publish and distribute this magazine as a means of informing the brethren of the happenings throughout Ontario.

One Hundredth Anniversaries

During the year permission was given to the several lodges to wear gold braid as of the One Hundredth Anniversary date of their active existence, as follows: Westport Lodge No. 441, Westport, as of August 11, 1996; Powassan Lodge No 443, Powassan, as of May 28, 1997; and Granite Lodge No. 446, Fort Frances, as of July 27, 1997.

Recommendation

As the supply of the small Ritual of the Master Mason Degree (bearing the red cover) has become exhausted and changing technology makes it increasingly difficult and expensive to reprint, I recommend that following the raising of a Fellowcraft to the Master Masons Degree, that the candidate then be supplied with the complete Ritual covering the three Degrees, inasmuch as this Ritual contains absolutely nothing that the newly raised Master Mason would not be entitled to know.

Proxy

Over the past few years, as I have travelled throughout this province, the subject of proxy ballots kept cropping up. Unfortunately, it would seem the proper completion, submission and use of the proxy ballot is badly misunderstood. The suggestion of its need in today's mobile society also keeps surfacing. Therefore, I feel obliged to suggest that my successor give serious consideration to the appointment of an ad hoc committee to carefully review this concern.

Caution

Due to the ever increasing requirements to raise funds to satisfy the financial needs of the individual lodges, the tendency to turn to lotteries and games of chance becomes ever more appealing. Such fund raising activities are not sanctioned and have never received the approval of Grand Lodge. Please be extremely careful in your choice of fund raising and always seek the approval of Grand Lodge before any arrangements are put in place that might put your brethren and Grand Lodge in not only an embarrassing position but, possibly, also a libellous position.

It is also noted that some of our lodges enjoy a strong financial position and may have large investment portfolios. Any lodge finding itself in this position would do well to review their investment policy and, if necessary, give consideration to the employment of professional money managers. As assets grow so does the liability increase on the brethren responsible for securing the best yield possible in today's money market.

Grand Master's Banquet

Brethren, I am pleased to announce that our speaker at this evening's banquet is going to be R.W. Bro. Thomas Jackson, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, who, I am sure, will leave us a message that we will long remember.

Conclusion

Finally, my brethren, after approximately 140,000 km by car and heaven only knows how many air miles, I thank you, one more time, for the privilege of letting me serve you as the Grand Master of this — one of the best jurisdictions on the face of this earth. I sincerely hope that my message "Tell Them" will in some way get to the uninitiated and help bolster our ranks as we approach the next millennium, so we as Masons will have the strength to help our fellow man live in Brotherly Love until time shall be no more.

Auditors' Report

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

We have audited the statements of financial position of Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario as at April 30, 1997, and the statements of revenue and expenses and fund balances for the general and segregated funds for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

The organization derives net special programme fund revenue from address labels and calendars, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue, net earnings, assets and fund balances.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we might have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the special programme revenue referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the organization as at April 30, 1997 and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

REPORT OF THE GRAND TREASURER

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

We are pleased, again, this year, to report a favourable financial situation of your Grand Lodge. We managed within our budget in most categories of revenue and expense and are budgeted for a near break-even year ahead, after allowing for expenditures on several items that are in need of repair and/or replacement.

Our investment manager has given us solid returns on our securities portfolio with an actual return of 16.75% in the past one year and a three-year annualized return of 13.44%. We meet with our investment manager regularly during the year to review performance and discuss trends and expectations. The quality of the overall portfolio is sound and we have been entirely pleased with the relationship and dialogue we have with our investment manager, Cassels, Blaikie Investment Management Ltd.

It is a large responsibility to care for other people's money, especially so with amounts at these levels. Obviously, the level of anxiety rises in direct proportion to the amounts of money involved. There should never be any thought of bringing the investment management of our portfolio back "in-house." Indeed, it is the unanimous view of the Audit and Finance and Management Committees of Grand Lodge that all lodges or districts who have sizeable funds solicit professional advice and counsel. We would be pleased to hear from any group within our Masonic family who would seek advice and counsel in this respect.

The revenue and expense figures presented in this report are self-explanatory. They have been reviewed carefully by the Audit and Finance Committee with the auditor. The generous support of the brethren provided through the Label and Calendar Projects has enabled Grand Lodge to finance a variety of special programmes, the details of which are outlined in the report of the Special Programmes Fund.

We expect to be in a position to present a consolidated financial statement as of next year, but will continue to report in detail on the categories of the Special Programmes, the Memorial Fund and other special purpose funds.

You will see from the attached statements that the aggregate of the funds that are now managed are in the neighbourhood of \$5 million. So, our financial condition could be viewed as perfectly secure for the foreseeable future. It is our mandate, together with the Audit and Finance Committee and the Management Committee, to ensure this situation continues.

We, again, offer a word of appreciation for the exceptional care provided by the Grand Secretary and the Grand Lodge staff in looking after day-to-day receipts and disbursements. Also, a word of commendation to our investment managers at Cassels, Blaikie Investment Management Ltd.

To the brethren at large, a heartfelt thanks for the fine support that has been forthcoming behind the Label and Calendar Programmes. This, and the success of our investment programmes, has made a profound impact on the financial good health of Grand Lodge.

SEMIANNUAL RETURNS

Each year, without exception, it becomes necessary to speak to the tardiness and indifference displayed by several lodges in the submission of their Semi-annual Returns. Unfortunately, this year is no exception and the same holds true. At the fiscal year end, April 30, the annual audit began without all Semiannual Returns having been received and the required statistical information for some lodges unavailable for proper accounting purposes.

Once again, I appeal to the Masters to please make absolutely sure that your lodge's Semiannual Return is properly completed and returned to

Grand Lodge prior to the ninth day of July and January each year. Any delay in submission results in unnecessary delay in data input at your Grand Lodge Office and in the subsequent preparation of Master Mason certificates, which are anxiously awaited by all newly raised brethren.

Printing and Publications

Routine reprinting of many Grand Lodge publications has been ongoing during the past year. A reprint of the Constitution of Grand Lodge is scheduled to be undertaken immediately following this Grand Lodge communication and it will include all new amendments, rules and guidelines.

Revisions to the text of the *Masonic Manual*, *Meeting the Challenge*, *Beyond the Pillars* and *Towards the Square* are currently under way and these volumes are all scheduled for reprinting in the coming months.

Your attention is drawn to the recently printed volume entitled *Penetrating the Veil*, authored by M.W. Bro. D. C. Bradley, and distributed under the authority of "Masonic Holdings." This book is on display and available for purchase in the foyer at the Masonic Education Committee's display area.

Computerization

Last year, in reporting on computer system upgrades undertaken during the year in your Grand Lodge office, it was observed that computerization was an ongoing process. Little was it realized then how prophetic those words would become. Today, I report many more changes and software revisions having been made in order to prepare for computerized registration of the voting delegates at Grand Lodge. The programming is now complete; computerized registration has already taken place on a trial basis in two districts. The success of these trials was so positive that preparation for computerized registration during this Annual Communication for six more districts has been effected. Hopefully, ere another year goes by, preparations may be in place to allow all voting delegates to enjoy the speed and accuracy of computerized registration.

Genuine appreciation is extended to the many brethren who have given so freely of their time and effort in order that your Grand Lodge be kept on the cutting edge of technology.

Warrants

Unfortunately, it must be reported that we lost three lodges through amalgamation and one surrendered their charter. On November 13, 1996, East Gate Lodge No. 693, Scarborough, amalgamated with Imperial Lodge No. 543, Toronto. Baldoon Lodge No. 694, Wallaceburg, amalgamated on November 22, 1996, with Pnyx Lodge No. 312, also of Wallaceburg. Then, on December 17, 1996, Stanley Lodge No. 426, Toronto, amalgamated with Victoria Lodge No. 474, also situated in Toronto. Haileybury Lodge No. 485 held their last meeting on May 2, 1996, and surrendered their charter.

Conferences

In February of this year, it was, once again, my privilege to represent our jurisdiction at the Conference of Grand Secretaries in North America, held in Tulsa, Oklahoma. While workshops and seminars were most enjoyable and helpful, the greatest benefit seems to be generated in dialogue with one's counterparts from all over the free world. Dialogue serves many useful purposes, not the least of which would be gaining a better insight on how common concerns are being addressed by others. Most jurisdictions will address concerns in their unique way. Some are very successful, while other's efforts to resolve problems may meet with less success. Indeed, much may be learned in dialogue.

An added bonus, this year, was the opportunity, arranged by our Scottish Rite counterpart here in Ontario, to visit the world famous Scottish Rite Temple in Guthrie, Oklahoma. This remarkable building is steeped in history and tradition. It is not only the largest of its kind in North America but also exquisitely beautiful. Should anyone ever be in Oklahoma, a visit to this historic Masonic landmark is recommended.

March again afforded the opportunity to attend the Conference of Grand and District Grand Lodges of Canada, held annually in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Many interesting subjects were addressed and excellent participation and discussion was enjoyed by all.

Of special interest was a position paper presented by the District Grand Lodge of Newfoundland, E.C. The subject matter dealt with the current desire of the members of this District Grand Lodge – most of whom are second generation Canadians – to form the "Grand Lodge of Newfoundland." It would seem much progress has been made; however, it should be noted that their sister jurisdiction, the "District Grand Lodge of Newfoundland, S.C.," may not be of the same persuasion. As the paper was a position paper only, no debate ensued.

Visitations

During the year it has been my privilege to attend many Masonic functions, special events, dedications, etc. How satisfying it is to meet with the brethren as each goes about his Masonic obligations. My appreciation is extended to our Grand Master, whom I was privileged to represent this year at the Annual Communications in Quebec and Nova Scotia. How pleasant it was to return to the Grand Lodge of Quebec after an eighteen year absence, and to make my very first visit to the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia where, unknown to me, I was to receive the Erasmus James Philipps Medal. Thank you, Grand Master, for making these visits possible.

District Secretaries Meetings

In my report to Grand Lodge in July, 1989, the following was written and is repeated today, for it is even more germane in today's environment.

"Districts that do not have a forum for their secretaries to exchange thoughts and ideas with their counterparts are missing a golden opportunity

to assist those who perform such a great service to our Craft. Indeed, it becomes much easier to carefully emulate that which is praiseworthy in others if one is given a chance to enjoy the benefits of group discussion with his peers. Once again, I reiterate the willingness of your Grand Secretary and/or his assistant to participate in district instructional meetings for Secretaries.*

The Masonic Information Centre

The work of the Masonic Information Centre goes on unabated and it is my distinct privilege to provide a Canadian voice among those responsible for charting the course of the Centre's efforts. As you are aware many excellent fact sheets and booklets have been made available by the Centre. The Centre is rapidly developing as a source for current, factual information and is now being utilized by lodges, Grand Lodges and the press as a reliable source of accurate Masonic information.

How gratifying it is to see the legacy of our late Brother John Robinson being utilized in such a positive way!

The past few years I have spoken of change. This report's final few lines again deal with change. It can not be denied that change is all around us. A careful review of this report only strengthens the fact that change has become a way of life for all and each must not only deal with change on a daily basis but always strive to deal with change in a positive manner.

REPORTS OF THE DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS

The forty-six reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters were presented by the Grand Secretary, and, on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by the Grand Secretary, they were referred to the Board of General Purposes.

DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTER REPORTS – 1997

(Condensed excerpts extrapolated from the reports of the District Deputies)

Algoma (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Gary R. Bloomfield

The Masters have been vocal in their efforts to improve the state of Freemasonry. Our public profile was raised by support of the new Thunder Bay Plasma Collection Centre, the first in the world entirely dependent on volunteer donors. Freemasons won the "donation challenge" issued to other organizations with our 800 donations!

Algoma East (8 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Brian W. Duncan

Masonry in Algoma East is strong and stable. All lodges are active and advancing candidates in the three degrees.

Several events this year have also strengthened the craft: the centennial of Dymont Lodge No. 442; in June, Lorne Lodge No. 622 welcomed a team of present and past Grand Lodge Officers; the final event was the demonstration of the Computer Registration Programme re the registration and voting process at Grand Lodge. These events have all played an important part in strengthening the foundation upon which Masonry rests in Algoma East District.

Brant (14 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Gavin M. Angus

Masonry in Brant District is doing quite well. A Lodge of Instruction was held in Brantford. A regional workshop was also held. We have one lodge in the process of building a new Temple. The Masters', Past Masters' and Wardens' Association is a great help in the district.

Bruce (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. John F. Miller

1996 – 1997 was observed as the 80th Anniversary of Bruce District. There was a greater sense of cohesiveness and pride in being a Mason and sharing that enjoyment within the district theme of Fraternity – Family – Fellowship.

A calendar-style trestle board was distributed and received very favourable comments. A goal of 80 degrees in our 80th year was established. The opportunity for family involvement was nurtured through ten Ladies' Nights. A district Award of Merit was established to recognize nominees from each lodge who best personified the Ideal of a Freemason. Finally, a district project, entitled Hearing Aid Recycling Project (HARP), was initiated to assist persons in the Caribbean countries who have hearing difficulties.

Chatham (14 Lodges)

This has been a busy year in Chatham District, as we celebrated the 125th Anniversary of three lodges: Parthenon No. 267 in Chatham; Kent No. 274 in Blenheim; and Lorne No. 282 in Glencoe. Two Wallaceburg lodges (Baldoon No. 694 and Pnyx No. 312) amalgamated. The three Chatham lodges have recently moved to their newly-renovated site.

Masonry in the Chatham District is trying to be more visible to the public, and members are more eager to talk about what the Craft has to offer to prospective applicants. The district continues to support the Bruce B. Foster Foundation.

Eastern (19 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. D. Gordon Campbell

Many lodges are having new members to initiate, thanks to the Friend to Friend video. In most lodges there are a few very dedicated Masons who do an awful lot of work. I believe that if a special effort was made to involve other members to participate, it would help the lodge considerably and the dedicated members would appreciate the help.

Many lodges are struggling with the heavy financial cost of keeping their lodge buildings going. In this respect, Finch No. 557 and Chesterville No. 320 have had to vacate their buildings; Finch moving to the Farran-Ault Lodge Building at Ingleside, and Chesterville to the Henderson Lodge Building at Winchester.

Erie (9 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Paul H. Blair

The Grand Master promoted pride and gave inspiration to a group of young men from DeMolay this year in Hamilton, ranging in age from 11 to 21 years. This triggered renewed interest in the Order of DeMolay and a new chapter is being formed in Erie District with the help of the Windsor Chapter.

The co-operation within the Erie District and the Windsor District has been outstanding. This resulted in Masons working together on a project and having a common goal, to help the Essex County School Board establish a new programme in the schools called "The Ontario Masonic Model Student Assistance Program." Teams made up of teachers and others within the school system will go through an intensive training programme on "prevention, identification and intervention strategies," thus forming core teams in the schools. We are confident that this programme will help improve awareness, respond faster to those in need, enhance our existing programmes, to reach children of all ages and create a recognizable vehicle to make us visible in our communities.

Frontenac (19 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Edward W. Fuller

Each lodge was asked to select and support a project beneficial to their lodge. The funds from the sale of the licence frames, which were donated by Grand Lodge, were used to assist in these projects. Grand Lodge Publications, a new project, under W. Bro. Cliff Farber, proved very successful.

A cheque in the amount of \$6,284.41 was presented to Health Care 2000 and the Hotel Dieu Hospital Diabetes Centre, from the project sponsored by P.D.D.G.M.s R.W. Bro. Glen Baker and R.W. Bro. Gordon Rittwage.

Georgian North (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Winston W. J. Elliott

The country lodges, with only one body to sustain them, are continuing to struggle.

The question of how to assist widows and families on bereavement has arisen; perhaps this topic could be combined in the mandate of the Sick and Visiting Committee, after being provided with instruction on counselling.

Each Grand Lodge Communique is copied and sent to the Masters to distribute to their members; we hope this helps to keep the brethren well informed.

Georgian South (10 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. John E. Cooper

One lodge, in particular, is deeply involved in the community, and sponsors Scouting Groups, and helped finance an exchange student to Russia.

The Friend to Friend and Information Booth programmes are running well. The attitude of the Masons in the district is commendable, but declining membership is a concern. Programmes are in place to try to amend this situation.

*Grey (12 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Robert J. Leith*

All twelve lodges held Friend to Friend events and these programmes have been successful in attracting new candidates. All lodges participated in the scheduled interlodge visitation programme.

The district newsletter was well edited and produced by W. Bro. Wilde, and enjoyed by all.

*Hamilton A (14 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. T. Roy Binns*

Visitation by individuals and delegations are the lifeblood of Masonry and the brethren learn by observation and practice. Banquets at the Installations and Official Visits are usually scheduled prior to the opening of the lodge.

All of the lodges are using computers.

*Hamilton B (14 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Donald F. Wilson*

Visiting seems to me to be a stimulating part of Masonry. The overall feeling in the district is one of friendship and harmony. By keeping the meetings enjoyable, informative and reasonable in duration, we can keep our new members interested, and enable them to have a long and rewarding career in the Craft. I presented a maple leaf pin to the entered apprentices when I attended their initiation.

The Hamilton Masonic Districts Board of Relief continued their good works and held spring and fall Divine Services for all three districts. The annual Walk for Charity in support of the neo-natal clinic at McMaster will, again, be held in June. It was a privilege, on behalf of the Masonic Foundation, to present bursaries to two students at Mohawk College.

*Hamilton C (14 Lodges)**R.W. Bro David H. Pedler*

Participation in such events as the Mother's Day Telethon for Chedoke-McMaster Children's Hospital, the Masons' walk for charity for their neo-natal unit and the presentation of several bursaries on behalf of the Masonic Foundation, seem to be having a profound effect on the awareness of our fraternity within the community.

The brethren of Hamilton District "C" ran a project entitled "Give Jennilyne a Lift," in which each lodge was solicited to make a contribution to help this young girl who is disabled with spina bifida. Confined to a wheelchair, Jennilyne is solely dependent on her family to be transported in their van to and from her many activities. The lodges in Hamilton "C" committed themselves in raising sufficient funds to equip the van with an automatic chair lift.

*London East (14 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. George Brown*

We can reverse the trend of declining membership by making a more concentrated effort in attracting new members. I believe that it is time to do more to inform the public of what Masonry is all about. We have to "sell ourselves" more in the community by being more involved in community events, at fairs, shopping malls, etc. We have the literature and videos in Friend to Friend and Circle of Friends to tell our message to the uninitiated. Open Houses are good vehicles of information to the curious, as well as inviting more of the public to social activities such as lodge picnics, dances, golf tournaments, etc.

*London West (14 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. N. Lloyd Hopkins*

The condition of Masonry in the London West District is vibrant and, generally, the attitude is becoming more forward thinking. The fund raiser, without a doubt, was the major highlight of the year. The Masons of London West had an opportunity to present themselves in their community and to practice the virtue of charity by aiding the devastated citizens of the Red River Valley.

*Muskoka—Parry Sound (8 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. David F. Schumeler*

My thrust in the addresses that I have made has concentrated on three main topics: *How to make Masonry more conspicuous in the community; How to make Masonry more attractive to prospective candidates;* and, "*Clarity of the Heart*" is just as important within the lodge as it is outside of it. Topics for addresses at the official visits included: "*Why has Masonry continued to exist?*," "*How we became Ancient Free and Accepted or Speculative Masons,*" "*Jacob's Ladder,*" "*Do you bring anything with you?*," "*What Do Masons Do?*," "*Masonic Ritual,*" "*Charity in Masonry and Society*" and "*Once a Mason, Always a Mason.*"

*Niagara A (14 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Douglas G. Madill*

Masonry in Niagara "A" has enjoyed an exciting year. Mountain Lodge No. 221 built a Masonic Float, suitable for parades, with crests on it representing all fourteen lodges. Niagara Lodge No. 2 was the host for an informal reception for several Grand Lodge Officers from the Netherlands, including their Grand Master, M.W. Bro. Robert Schultink and his Deputy Grand Master, R.W. Bro. Bernard Sarphati. Seymour Lodge No. 277 celebrated its 125th Anniversary. Five of the lodges held an Open House in conjunction with a Friend to Friend night.

The Masters', Wardens' and Members' Association launched the first issue of the district newsletter, *Niagara A Grapevine*; produced a "Directory of Goods and Services" for widows of the lodges.

*Niagara B (12 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Ronald J. Muha*

Lodges which do the ritualistic work in comfort but with PRECISION and EXACTNESS have strong support from their membership. The lodges which are adapting to our changing times and society, by showing enthusiasm and humour, are putting the "fun" back into lodge activities. Their members look forward to lodge meetings and they show solid support for the Order. These are the lodges which are prospering while others remain dormant or slowly decline.

*Nipissing East (7 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Burton Parks*

If we are to survive into the next millennium, we must not only encourage new members, but also keep the members that we do have interested and involved. The lodges must get their noses to the grindstone and think up fresh ideas to get the bulk of our members, young and old, involved to the fullest of their potential.

*North Huron (12 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Alfred C. Sutton*

Four of our brethren attended the Computer Resources Workshop held in London, and the district has benefited from the information gained at that time. The project of the Licence Plate Holders, donated by the Grand Master, for sale to our lodge members was well received.

Our North Huron lodges hold successful Ladies' Nights, complete with banquet and entertainment, at Christmastime or throughout the year, either on their own or combined with another lodge.

*Ontario (15 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. David K. Tillcock*

The quality of Ritual Work in our area is to be admired, supported by the dedication of our Past Masters, who continue to strive for perfection.

Although our membership decreases, the dedication and enthusiasm of those who lead show that Masonry is a viable force in the future of Ontario District.

*Ottawa 1 (16 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. D. Gary Gossling*

Masonry is flourishing and progressing well in Ottawa District 1. The workshops on

Masonic Instruction are paying dividends. Our Travelling Gavel programme has increased visiting.

The Friend to Friend programme is working well and needs to be continued. We are looking forward to the implementation of the new Y.E.S. programme from the Masonic Education Committee. We will have the tools, we just need to use them.

Ottawa 2 (16 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. James Heffel

The spirit of brotherhood is present throughout the district. The Circle of Friends and the Friend to Friend videos and Open Houses have been real tools to assist lodges to obtain new members.

Three new initiatives were introduced this year: namely, the District "Travelling Gavel"; The Valley Craftsman Newsletter (three issues have been published); and the Friend to Friend video were placed in the Ottawa and Valley Libraries. All three initiatives were a resounding success. I attended the CODA Peer Programme and also presented three bursaries from the Masonic Foundation to worthy students at Algonquin College, Ottawa. I would suggest that any District Deputy Grand Master who has the opportunity ought to attend at least one CODA Peer Programme.

Peterborough (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Scott R. Drummond

The Masters are competent leaders and most lodge officers take their positions seriously. There is a lot of interaction between the Masters and between the lodges. Not only do they exchange visits, but share candidates and ideas, and eagerly assist with ritual. There are many young, enthusiastic officers starting through the chairs and the number of candidates make the future look bright. The brethren are proud of their lodges and have a great deal of respect for the Grand Lodge and its officers. Friendship and hospitality make it a pleasure to visit any lodge in the Peterborough District.

Prince Edward (17 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Peter Penner

The motto for this year was "Pride and Participation." It had a positive effect on all district activities and served to promote a greater dedication to the Craft, generated enthusiasm, enhanced leadership and created a more cohesive Masonic Family within the district.

The summonses have greatly improved, with eleven lodges now using computers, with the others in the process of changing over.

There are concerns and our numbers have been declining, but our enthusiasm is high and there is a great optimism that Masonry will grow and continue to thrive.

St. Lawrence (19 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. F. David Rice

The heritage of St. Lawrence District, like that of Masonry in general, represents a continuum of development which, if examined thoughtfully, will allow us to look into the future taking values from the past that will enhance the lives of our brethren, their families, the community and the world. Our past needs to be examined in the light of day, courageously developing an organization that is able to build upon its strengths and at the same time is able to discard that which has decayed.

It is evident to me that a gap existed between the elder brethren who were the ritual and protocol advisors and the newer brethren, in that the younger brethren became dependent upon the elder to perform the work and supply definitive answers to ritual and constitutional matters. This gap has been filled by experienced brethren, usually Past Masters, who have come forward to offer their wisdom. The young brethren still need to be encouraged to participate in the work and through this exposure become less dependant upon people who proclaim their expertise in Masonic knowledge.

*St. Thomas (11 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Ray J.S. Jobson*

The Friend to Friend programme is effective, and, if combined with some imaginative membership functions, we might attract suitable new members. Some ideas are, as follows: potential member breakfast; Open House at the lodge; more visible community involvement with parades, information booth at fairs etc.; sponsorship of sports programmes and fund raisers for community work. In this district, the Christmas float in the Santa Claus Parades has placed Masonry in the public eye, and has resulted in at least two new members.

*Sarnia (21 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Murray J. Earl*

A Friend to Friend video, followed by a lodge room Open House, resulted in at least six applications. Attendance at the Divine Service increased almost fourfold over the previous years to about 130 Masons and family members. Appointment of a District Piper for the first time this year, and having him lead processions at Official Visits, social functions and the Divine Service, has been favourably received.

Uniqueness and variety of programmes and quality work are surely the essential requirements for good attendance, visitation and healthy lodges. However, this can only happen if officers with imagination and good leadership qualities are appointed to the line.

*South Huron (15 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Bruce N. Whitmore*

This Masonic year our watchwords were Profile, Projection and Participation. As officers and brethren of the district, we made great strides on all three points.

Through "Operation Coathanger," the brethren aimed to gather 300 winter coats for kids in the three counties encompassed by South Huron. In fact, every lodge doubled their quota, so that the local Children's Aid Societies received over 600 coats for needy kids; as a result, there were ten pictures or stories in local newspapers, as well as coverage on radio and TV, which increased our visibility in the community.

This enthusiastic participation spilled over into exemplified degrees or new candidates, interlodge visits, a District Wardens' Night, a Masters' Night, increased blood donations, well-attended Official Visits, an inspiring Divine Service and the Grand Master's Reception and Ladies' Night as the grand finale. It was at that grand finale that the Masters presented to the Grand Master cheques totalling \$6,681 for the Manitoba Flood victims. Our image as a progressive organization, worthy of being joined, was further enhanced by the inception of a website on the Internet with links to Grand Lodge.

*Sudbury – Manitoulin (9 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Don H. Rousell*

Some of the highlights of the year in the Sudbury–Manitoulin District: lodges were encouraged to streamline the business portion of meetings in order to adjourn by approximately 10:00 p.m.; the successful visitation programme initiated in the previous year was continued, whereby Sudbury-based lodges drew names of lodges outside the city for intervisitation. Two well attended Divine Services were held. Our goal has been to promote Masonic harmony and goodwill throughout the district, which we hope we have achieved during our extensive visits.

*Temiskaming (9 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. John H. Carter*

Open Houses are held annually and the Friend to Friend video is shown. Temiskaming District has nine lodges in northeastern Ontario, and are suffering the same problems as other organizations in the area due to government cut backs and industry restructuring. Lodges have garage sales, sausage making bees and steak barbecues to raise funds for lodge maintenance.

*Toronto 1 (22 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. John A. Cook*

The District Ladies' Night was an excellent social evening and the food, music and gifts were well received by those who attended. The District Divine Service was held at St Jude's Anglican Church in Bramalea, an excellent service attended by almost 100 members and families.

The Wardens' and Masters' Associations meet on the first Saturday morning of each month, from September through to May, breakfast is served and meetings include talks on leadership, management, finances and "are you ready for the Master's chair."

*Toronto 2 (19 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Matthew McClelland*

The theme for the year has been Pride and Personal Responsibility in Daily Effort. Better communication with the public is required, to remove the veil of secrecy which exists, and better portray the good that Freemasonry does in the community.

*Toronto 3 (17 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. William G. Sanders*

The theme chosen for this year was "Pursuing the Grand Design." A district calendar now ensures that events are scheduled without overlap. Our newsletter, "The Tracing Board," has expanded to three issues. The district now has a website and several lodges are developing their own home page. A computer has been donated and a committee is examining our future requirements.

*Toronto 4 (17 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Kenneth E. Holmes*

Today's youth is our future. The support of local youth groups include sponsorship of hockey and baseball teams, as well as acting as advisors to Toronto Assembly No. 2, International Order of Rainbow for Girls and the H.B. Carr Chapter, Order of DeMolay.

The image of Masonry in the community has been enhanced by several fund raising activities. The proceeds, approximating \$6,200, were donated to various community projects, which included the Easter Seals "Wheelchairs for Kids," Sick Children's Hospital Cancer Unit, Variety Village, the Dillan Carr Fund, as well as providing monetary and moral assistance to a single parent with two children.

*Toronto 5 (15 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Robert J. Murdock*

There are many of us who are confident that we will be a viable organization into the 21st century. To effect this goal we are forcing some of our members and lodges to take a closer look at some of the mistakes we have all made in the past. Attention to the ritual, deportment in lodge while at work, communications and travelling were all areas stressed. Several lodges have started or resumed telephone committees. The benefits are immeasurable.

Four lodges have changed their location or meeting night and each is experiencing a resurgence.

*Toronto 6 (14 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Gerald Kileeg*

This has been a year of celebration for Toronto District 6, with three 75-year anniversaries. The District Divine Service, with excellent attendance, was a highlight. Each lodge took on a benevolent project within their community again this year and the results showed a great improvement.

*Toronto 7 (26 Lodges)**R.W. Bro. Bruce G. Edwards*

One objective this year was to encourage each Lodge to "Be the FUEL that keeps the light of Masonry burning bright." The word FUEL is a strong four letter word: F Fun U Unity E Education L Leadership. I believe that this message was well received and understood.

Our unique Senior Wardens' Association is the single most important reason that our district is strong and unified. The district charitable project was the Ontario Federation of Cerebral Palsy and our goal is to raise \$20,000 for the establishment of an International Resource Centre.

Presenting bursaries to qualifying students was a wonderful experience.

Victoria (14 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Gordon A. Monk

(Grand Registrar and Acting District Deputy Grand Master)

Two district meetings were held and the district agreed to attempt to raise \$15,000 for the Ross Memorial Hospital Foundation, in Lindsay, and hoped to present a cheque for this amount at the District Ladies' Night.

There is need for improvement, and strong leadership can solve some of the problem situations. There are too many lodge officers who do not realize the value of visiting or attending special workshops.

Waterloo (16 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. A. Douglas Arnold

The Mentor Programme is being used by most of the lodges, and, according to the candidates that I have spoken to, they find this programme very beneficial. There are some very dedicated Masters, lodge officers and brethren who are always in attendance at their own lodge meetings and at district functions. There is a nucleus of very dedicated and enthusiastic Masons throughout this district. However, this should be seen as a challenge to all Masons in the district to work on improving attendance and involvement in all lodge and district activities in the future.

Wellington (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. A. John Ellacott

In different locations in the district, information booths at local shopping malls, fall fairs, etc., and/or "Open House" at the lodge, appear to have created positive interest in attracting new members. The Friend to Friend programme has also been a definite asset in attracting new members. The lodges which held special events involving the members and their families, other than a dinner-dance format, were pleased with the successful results. This appears to indicate that a change in format is sometimes the answer in retaining member interest in lodge social events.

Western (10 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Jack F. Sykes

Masonry is strong in Western District, even though most lodges have similar problems. The present officers are dedicated Masons who are struggling to find solutions for the problems of their particular lodge. Visitations between lodges is a good way to promote fellowship.

Wilson North (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Ronald E. Routly

The lodges have recently demonstrated a renewed enthusiasm for the Craft, and for its continuance as an influential and esteemed presence in our community. I have attempted to create enthusiasm for the Craft among the members of this district by promoting Masonry's many strengths and benefits on each appropriate occasion. I have promoted the theory that a majority of our members must increase their efforts to make favourable impressions of themselves and the Craft in their communities, and with their friends, family and neighbours. This is, of necessity, in order to attract those young men who would benefit from Masonic instructions, and it is imperative to the long term survival of our fraternity.

Wilson South (12 Lodges)

New Masons were initiated steadily throughout the year. Our new members need to be introduced to the benefits of visitation, and increased visitation by the officers of all lodges at monthly meetings, district events and Masters', Past Masters' and Ward-

ens' Association meetings would greatly enhance interest within the district. I personally feel that the several lodges with dues set at less than \$60.00 are selling their lodges short financially.

Windsor (10 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Carl A. Olender

The attendance of the Masters at Official Visits and Installations was up from last year. The Masters tried very hard to work together for the good of the Craft. As a result, this reflected in their attendance. Many took part in district events and were on many committees to keep them active in the district and their lodge.

Windsor and Erie Districts started a new programme: Ontario Masonic Model Student Assistance Programme (S.A.P.). This is a programme to reach children in the lower grades and help stamp out drug abuse. Many thanks to the brethren of Windsor and Erie Districts for their help in getting this programme started. Many young lives could be saved by the programme.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. J. D. Jackson, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Jackson, it was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Your Committee on Fraternal Relations composed of all Past Grand Masters, the Deputy Grand Master and your Chairman, met in the Grand Valley Masonic Hall on Saturday, May 3, 1997. Once again your committee reviewed current jurisdictional concerns and now report as follows

ROMANIA. While noting a healing of the previously existing rift and the reunification of the two Grand Lodges, alleged concerns of political improprieties on the part of some members still persist. It was further noted that five small lodges have chosen not to join with the unified Grand Lodge of Romania. Your committee still recommends that no action be taken at this time on the pending request for recognition of this Grand Lodge.

YUGOSLAVIA. Once again your committee feels constrained to recommend that no action be taken on recognition of any Masonic Grand Lodge now operating in Yugoslavia.

MADAGASCAR. The Grand Lodge of Madagascar was consecrated by the Grand Lodge National Française March 6, 1996. Members of the five lodges of this new Grand Lodge are regular master masons and practice excellent Freemasonry. Our European advisors as well as the Commission on Information for the Conference of Grand Masters in North America advise this Grand Lodge to be worthy of support and recognition. Your committee is therefore pleased to recommend that our Grand Lodge extend formal recognition to the Grand Lodge of Madagascar.

RUSSIA. One year ago recognition was extended to the newly formed Grand Lodge of Russia. Considering the short time since the democratisation of Russia and the unhealthy existing conditions in that country, Regular Freemasonry is progressing slowly but surely. Based on reports received, development of Masonry in Russia appears to be favourable.

THE BALTICS. Several months ago the consecration of a new lodge in Riga, Latvia, was undertaken by the Grand Lodge A.F and A.M., within the United Grand Lodges of Germany, thus returning Freemasonry to that country. In Lithuania, the two lodges previously established in Vilnius are reported progressing slowly. In Estonia, we understand there are two existing lodges established by the Grand Lodge of Finland in Talin, and a third lodge is in the process of being established.

TROUBLE SPOTS. Your committee has reviewed current Masonic hot spots where regular Grand Lodges would seem to have been under attack from within their own membership and as a result, irregular Grand Lodges are springing up. Spain, Canary Islands, Andora, Portugal, Italy, Greece and India are but a few. Therefore, your committee recommends that any member of this Grand Lodge who may be planning a trip abroad, which could include Masonic visitation, seek proper and current Masonic information from his Grand Secretary's Office, ere embarking on his journey.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. W. T. Anderson, Chairman, and on motion of R.W. Bro. J. T. Cassie, seconded by R.W. Bro. Anderson, it was approved.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

This committee, after having reviewed the mandates and mission statements of the committees of the Board of General Purposes, needed to look to the needs and requirements of our members, as we approach the new millennium.

A subcommittee was established to survey the opinions and desires of our newer members, as these brethren will form a substantial portion of our leadership of the future.

Each District Deputy Grand Master was requested to supply the names of three Master Masons from his district, who were Master Masons ten years or less. These Master Masons were then invited to take part in a series of workshops across this jurisdiction.

The participants of the workshops were asked three questions:

1. Why did you join and what did you expect out of Masonry?
2. You're still a member, but why? What do you want out of Masonry?
3. What would you demand of Masonry in the future?

The answers to these questions were fully discussed and debated by the participants. The responses were all recorded, assembled and analyzed. A copy of the resulting analysis was mailed to each of the participants and to each of the District Deputy Grand Masters.

The results of the survey were presented to the Communications, Condition of Masonry, Public Relations, Masonic Education and Membership Committees. These committees each developed a business plan as to how the concerns indicated in the survey might be addressed. The proposed business plans and the survey were reviewed and discussed with the foregoing chairmen, the members of the Management Com-

mittee, the chairmen of Computer Resources and Long Range Planning. The results of these discussions were a source of information for the basis of a Continuing Five-Year Plan, to be formulated by the Long Range Planning Committee.

A proposal for the incorporation of a charitable organization for the relief of impoverished Masons was explored. This proposal was referred to the Masonic Foundation of Ontario to ascertain if the Foundation might be in a position to undertake such a programme.

The Masonic Foundation referred the matter to their auditors and then sought the advice of an eminently recognized tax lawyer in Ottawa. This advice and opinion was then referred to their legal counsel.

Upon review by the directors of the Masonic Foundation and the members of the Management Committee, it was evident that the creation of a second Foundation for the relief of impoverished Masons could be viewed with a jaundice eye by Revenue Canada.

The present Masonic Foundation is prepared to continue to respond within its ability to any request that the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario or its Benevolent Committee might forward for the relief of impoverished Masons.

Having the advantage of the foregoing information, the Management Committee agree that the establishment of another Foundation should not be pursued at this time.

The committee has been in discussion and consultation with the Membership Committee and have recommended the approval of the Brother to Brother Programme, to test product with focus groups commencing in May 1997, with the programme being launched in July 1997.

The Masonic Education Committee is being encouraged to proceed immediately with Phase 1, of the "Y.E.S." (You're Extra Special) Programme. The first phase is designed for new Masons, it being a further extension of the Mentor Programme.

It has become very evident that Masonry in Ontario must break out of the "SILO" mode of operations, where each committee and each body operates independently and in semi isolation. This committee's deliberations indicate that our committees and bodies need to be working together in a "HORIZONTAL" mode, to be more efficient and effective.

Brethren, it is my pleasure to report the findings and recommendations of this committee on behalf of M.W. Bro. D. I. Greenwood, Grand Master; M.W. Bro. R. E. Davies, Grand Secretary; R.W. Bro. J. T. Cassie, Vice-Chairman; R.W. Bros. H. N. Britton, W. E. Elgie, T. E. Lewis, R. J. McKibbin and T. Shand, who have served with devotion, kindness and tolerance.

To the Grand Master, M.W. Bro. D. I. Greenwood, we appreciate your warmth, comprehension and perception. Thank you.

To the Grand Secretary, M.W. Bro. R. E. Davies, we thank you for your ever present devotion to this Grand Lodge, your patience and forbearance.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY, MUSEUM and ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

On behalf of the Library, Museum and Archives Committee, consisting of R.W. Bros. R. Wands, J. Reid, G. Wilkes (Library vice-chairman), G. Jones (Museum vice-chairman), R. Lawrence, and the undersigned as chairman, it is my pleasure to submit this report regarding both the Library and the Museum.

It has been the focus of this year's committee to promote awareness of the library and the resources contained within it throughout this vast jurisdiction. We began our endeavour by purchasing new and updated materials for both the circulating and reference sections of the library. We then provided each District Deputy Grand Master in the Province of Ontario with a complete library information package, including Guidelines, Order Forms and a complete listing of all library and reference materials, with a request that each District Deputy use this information to promote Masonic Education on his lodge visits. Personal visits by committee members have also been made to various lodges to inform brethren of both the Library and the Museum. In keeping with the age of technology, this year's Library and Museum Committee have purchased a computer for cataloguing purposes, increased the use of the Fax machine for library requests and are presently in the process of having the complete list of library materials added to the Grand Lodge website on the Internet.

In the past ten months, the library has seen 110 visitors — including three District Deputy Grand Masters — pass through its doors, with 93 brethren borrowing some 230 books, and 17 video tapes. We are pleased to report that the "mail-out" service has reached an increased number of brethren, with 34 books and 11 video tapes mailed throughout the province.

Masonry is a journey through life. Life is and cannot be complete without a daily advancement in education. The library is one source for this education. Despite all of the above listed efforts of this committee, it is discouraging to have to report on the overall lack of use of such a great wealth of information. There are still several areas of this jurisdiction that are not aware of the existence of this library or its location. This library has been at its existing location since 1985, in the Grand Lodge Memorial Building, 363 King Street West, in Hamilton. A sincere thank you is extended to the following brethren who so greatly give of their time so that the light of Masonry continues to shine: R.W. Bros. A.G. Wolfe, R.W. Faulds, D.L. Jagger, D. Clouse, K.L. Schweitzer; V.W. Bro. C. Nicholson; W. Bros. H. Ogilvie, J. Mannisto, R. Todd, and Bro. D. Rowbottom.

The Museum and Archives surrounds the Library at the same location and the committee extends a sincere thanks to those brethren, lodges and widows who continually donate Masonic artifacts throughout the year in order that the brethren of the future may know and appreciate the Masonic past. In order to do this, we are, at the present time, creating a cataloguing programme in which to record the history and donor of each Masonic artifact. Anyone wishing to donate or lend Masonic artifacts may do so by contacting the chairman of this committee.

The Library, Museum and Archive Committee is dedicated to providing Masonic knowledge — Seek and You Shall Find!

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BENEVOLENCE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. P. J. Mullen, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Mullen, it was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

The Benevolence Committee is pleased to report that during the year ending April 30, 1997, there was disbursed, in the interest of benevolence, 40 grants and Christmas gratuities from the Memorial Fund, totalling \$64,294. In addition, \$11,000 was paid for services provided by our Grand Lodge staff, and \$6,245 was paid to the firm of Cassels Blaikie for investment management fees. Total expenditures were \$81,539. Income on investments was \$115,571. Hence, a surplus resulted of \$51,218, (that being the difference between income and expenses, plus donations to the Memorial Fund of \$17,186).

On April 14, 1997, your committee reviewed 10 applications. We anticipate our total grants of benevolence to be dispersed in 1997-1998 will be approximately \$75,000. The committee was somewhat surprised that only 10 applications had been received in time for our meeting. There were 18 outstanding renewals which we had not received.

The committee endorses the policy of the appointment of district and lodge Chairmen of Benevolence and recommends that the practice be continued. This system was introduced a number of years ago by M.W. Bro. Nancekivell when he was chairman of this committee. The intent was and is to have in each district a Chairman of Benevolence whose responsibility is to assist the lodges and the lodge Chairman of Benevolence in his district to properly complete applications for benevolence and to encourage benevolent activities in the lodges.

The assistance provided by these brethren is invaluable and must be commended. We express to them our deep appreciation for their help.

May I, as chairman, commend, very highly, the excellent work done by our Supervisor of Benevolence, R.W. Bro. Kenneth L. Whiting, the kindness and assistance of

our Grand Lodge staff, the support and guidance of our Grand Secretary and the dedication and commitment of each committee member to the benevolent work of Masonry.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

The Membership Committee is a special committee of Grand Lodge. Our Mission Statement says that we create, develop, recommend, implement, monitor, measure, and verify programmes focused on attracting and retaining new members, revitalizing present members, and renewing interest in inactive members to stabilize and encourage growth of the membership of the fraternity. The Membership Committee provides quality products and services to the Grand Master, districts, lodges, and potential Masons in the Province of Ontario.

Using teams headed up by group leaders, the focus for the committee this year was to support the delivery of the Friend to Friend and Mentor programmes, and to develop the Brother to Brother Solution. In addition, there were presentations at regional workshops relating to membership.

Brother to Brother Solution

Under the continuing direction of the Management Committee of Grand Lodge, the Membership Committee continues to develop this lodge-driven product and plan for its delivery. We are enthusiastic about Brother to Brother because its key element is to build on the foundation created by the Friend to Friend and Mentor programmes, by providing the material and guidance needed to retain, revitalize, and renew lodge members. We are encouraged that Brother to Brother can be a catalyst to address the majority of the concerns and suggestions expressed in the recent survey which heard from the neophyte Masons in our client group. The development and delivery of Brother to Brother, combined with Friend to Friend and Mentor programmes, should contribute significantly to accomplishing the goals set out in the five-year plan stemming from our Grand Lodge seminar in February this year.

R.W. Bro. Terry McLean heads up the Brother to Brother project, which is funded under the special programme budget. He is assisted by other committee members, as well as brethren who possess the necessary specialized skills needed to do the project. Brother to Brother is aimed at better lodge management, better and more diverse programmes in lodge, more participation by members, a better sense of belonging to the fraternity, more activities that include family and friends, and simply making all members feel that they belong and are an important part of the lodge. This will be lodge driven and achieved by utilizing material created for implementation in each

lodge by a respected brother, who will have been trained through the developed product.

The Friend to Friend and Mentor Programmes

For the first time, this year, one team is responsible for the support to districts and lodges for delivery of both the Friend to Friend and Mentor programmes. R.W. Bro. Jack Leitch is the group leader, who works with regional co-ordinators assigned specific districts throughout our jurisdiction. Guidelines for D.D.G.M.s, regional co-ordinators, district and lodge chairmen, and condensed reporting forms were distributed to facilitate delivery and reporting.

It's widely recognized that the Friend to Friend and Mentor programmes are useful in promoting Freemasonry in Ontario. There is still work to be done in communicating more effectively with brethren delivering these programmes to lodges. We need to underscore the importance Grand Lodge places on these programmes. Where Friend to Friend and Mentor have been in active use, we have reaped the benefits. It's also encouraging that brethren are prepared to invest time and effort promoting these programmes where they are not being used to their full potential. Reports on this year's activities will help focus attention on those areas needing assistance.

Regional Workshops

Membership participated in four workshops this past year in Peterborough, Brantford, Guelph, and Toronto. Our component of these workshops was entitled Focus 2000, which dealt with lodge management styles, coping with change, and revitalizing lodges. We look forward to further participation in regional workshops dealing with delivery of products developed by Membership to assist lodges.

It was a busy year for the committee. The efforts of all are appreciated, including group leaders, groups working on specific tasks to develop Brother to Brother, and regional co-ordinators who have worked with the Friend to Friend and Mentor programmes. Thanks to R.W. Bro. Jim Anderson for acting as secretary of the committee.

REPORT OF THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON LODGE FINANCES

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. R. G. Wands, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Wands, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

On behalf of the Advisory Committee on Lodge Finances, it is my pleasure to submit the following report.

The members of the Advisory Committee on Lodge Finances continue to make themselves available to assist lodges in financial difficulties and, indeed, during the year several lodges sought our assistance. We are still progressing in the preparation of the set of simplified accounting instructions.

We continue to take part in meetings of local groups, and from the response at such meetings, it would appear that we are getting our message across to some lodge members. If one lodge can improve its financial situation because of our presentations, it will have been worthwhile.

Our message is simply that there is no "free lunch" in Freemasonry. Unless a brother is in financial difficulties, each must pay his fair share in the cost of operating the lodge. For the brother in financial difficulties, a Benevolence Fund must be there to assist. Our recommendations include:

- The building operation must not be part of the lodge finances.
- Operate from a 5-year plan or budget.
- Separate the lodge finances into four separate funds:
 - Operating Fund
 - Investment Fund
 - Life Membership Fund
 - Benevolence Fund
- Seriously consider having only one level of dues.
- The dues, including those paid to the Operating Fund on behalf of life members from the Life Membership Fund, must be sufficient to cover the expenses of operating the lodge.
- Initiation fees should not be used to operate the lodge. They should be higher than the costs of initiation. After deducting the costs of initiation, the excess should be invested.
- An amount should be added to the dues for benevolence.
- If this programme requires an increase in dues, no brother should be suspended or allowed to demit for legitimate financial reasons. His dues, or part thereof, should be paid to the Operating Fund by the Benevolence Fund.

At group meetings and seminars, the reaction is almost predictable. There is usually one individual who is quick to challenge any suggestion that dues or initiation fees be increased. But, there are many more who get the message and speak out in favour of the programme. We have had many requests for the text of our presentation. Our message is not new, but we must continue to repeat it. We feel that we are getting our message to many of those who are attending group meetings and seminars. We must continue to attempt to get it to those who do not attend or who do not think that they require any financial advice.

I sincerely thank R.W. Bros. T.E. Lewis, T. Janes, J.A. McLean, J.G. Pell, D. Wood; V.W. Bro. T.P. Hansen; W. Bros. B.T. Pelman and D.D. Thornton for their time and interest in assisting the committee.

Committee Mandate

"To seek out and recommend all media and public relations opportunities and activities at Grand Lodge and District levels with a view to creating a better informed public on the aims and activities of the Masonic Order within our jurisdiction."

Masonic Information Booth

The Masonic Information Booth has been refurbished and is being well used across our jurisdiction. It is an excellent tool to highlight Masonic activities, create public visibility of who Masons are and what they do in the community. The Masonic Information Booth and Open House guidelines are available upon request. Reservations for its use should be planned six months prior to the event. A looped copy of the videotape "Circle of Friends" is included with the booth.

The Widow's Brooch and Pendant

Available in three distinct designs: (a) Brooch, \$25.00; (b) Pendant and chain, \$30.00; Combination Brooch/Pendant and Chain, \$35.00. It is crafted in sterling silver, gold plated and set with a .07pt cubic zirconia, packaged in a plush presentation box. Cost includes all taxes, lifetime warranty, postage and handling, together with the cost of accompanying portfolio describing the item and its meaning. Commissioned by Grand Lodge, they are of superior quality and have been most favourably received by three hundred and ninety-three Masonic widows throughout Ontario. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC EDUCATION

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. D. H. Mumby, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Mumby, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

I am pleased to present this report on behalf of the Masonic Education Committee and its members: M.W. Bro. David C. Bradley; R.W. Bros. T. Cober, R.W. Grant, J.R. Hanna, E. Peters, H. Street, M.H. Tosh; V.W. Bros. D. R. Fick, S.R. Lowe; W. Bro. L. Fitchett.

This was a year of transition. One where efforts were made to update and promote existing programmes, while at the same time develop a self contained, intensive, educational programme that will meet the requirements and demands of new Masons in particular and all Masons in general. I am pleased to report the following progress.

Publications

The three primary Grand Lodge publications, *Meeting the Challenge*, *Beyond the Pillars*, and *The Masonic Manual*, have been reviewed, revised to bring them into line with constitutional amendments and updated to reflect current realities. *Towards the Square* has also been reviewed and revised and will soon be published under the aegis of Grand Lodge. At the same time, all Grand Lodge Pamphlets have been reviewed and, where necessary, revised, in order to ensure they are consistent with one another, with the Constitution and with other Grand Lodge publications.

The Correspondence Course

This continues to be one of the more popular programmes sponsored by this Grand Lodge. Throughout the past year, 180 new candidates were enrolled in one or more segments of the course; 75 completed one of the four sections and 14 were admitted

Fellows of the College of Freemasonry. The Course administrators, V.W. Bro. S.R. Lowe and W. Bro. L. Fitchett, are to be commended for their continuing efforts in streamlining and improving the administrative and operational machinery attendant to this programme. Thanks are due also to the Course mentors who work closely with the students, monitoring progress and lending assistance.

Speechcraft Dynamics

This programme, which is run in conjunction with Toastmasters International, is designed to assist in the development of self confidence, promote self assurance and improve one's comfort zone when it comes to public speaking. Once again, R.W. Bro. Howard Tosh has been able to obtain and disseminate to all D.D.G.M.s a listing of all Toastmaster Chapter locations throughout Ontario. Some notable success stories have been evident. In Peterborough District, the brethren of Norwood Lodge set up a successful Speechcraft programme with nine Masons and two non-Masons enrolled. Not only did all who enrolled in this course derive personal benefit, but one of the non-Masons who participated made application to join the Fraternity. It was also encouraging to note the interest that has been shown in this programme by brethren in the northern districts.

New Programmes

In an effort to stimulate interest and increase awareness of the basic fundamentals of Freemasonry, the **Y.E.S.!!!** (You're Extra Special) Programme, is in the process of being developed. This programme will unfold in three phases. Phase 1, which is being targeted at new Masons, will deal with the fundamentals of Freemasonry and will consist of four major stages. The first stage will offer an explanation of the three degrees and will, in a simple, straightforward manner, describe what went on, why the ceremonies were conducted in the manner they were, and what it all means in terms of every day life. Stage 2 will relate to the symbolism of the three degrees as well as that of the lodge furnishings. Stage 3 will discuss Masonry within the community and will cover such aspects as Masonic Benevolence, the workings of the Masonic Foundation of Ontario, volunteerism, individual lodge and district projects and how the efforts of individual Masons have changed the face of contemporary society. The final stage will deal with the business and administrative functions of lodges and will cover such diverse areas as running a successful meeting, short term, long term and financial planning, the role and functions of Grand Lodge and the interrelationships between Grand Lodge, the districts and the individual lodges.

Phase 2 will deal with the historical development of Freemasonry, particularly within our own jurisdiction and will provide a more in depth examination of the philosophical aspects of Freemasonry. It is being designed for those who wish to look beyond the basic fundamentals in order to obtain deeper knowledge and greater understanding.

Phase 3 will provide a series of discussion papers on diverse subject matter which can be used as the basis for Masonic Education presentations within lodges.

District and Lodge Masonic Education chairmen will be responsible for implementing the **Y.E.S.!!!** programme. Phase 1 material should be ready for dissemination during the autumn of 1997, while Phases 2 and 3 should be completed by the spring of 1998.

Work is ongoing *vis-a-vis* the development of a suitable correspondence course for prospective D.D.G.M.s. It is anticipated the first module for such a course will be completed by late autumn of 1997.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND JURISPRUDENCE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. R. T. Runciman, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Runciman, it was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Your committee begs leave to report on two Notices of Motion which have been referred to it for consideration.

In his Address to the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge last year, and found on page 22 of the "Proceedings" [1996], M.W. Bro. Greenwood recommended the creation of the office of the Grand Piper and that the insignia of the office be the bagpipes on a circle.

Further in the Address, on page 24 of the "Proceedings" [1996], the Grand Master recommended that S-218 of the Book of Constitution be amended to require that a brother prove his proficiency in the Master Mason Degree in open lodge before he is eligible to become an officer of a lodge.

The Committee on the Grand Master's Address reported positively on these recommendations on page 104 of the "Proceedings" [1996]. To implement these two recommendations a Notice of Motion has been received to amend the relevant sections of the Book of Constitution and your committee finds that these proposed amendments are regular.

Lodge finances are always a concern and especially the funding of life memberships. A Notice of Motion has been received setting out formulae to establish a life membership fund and the procedures to withdraw money from the fund subject to the approval of the Grand Secretary. The formulae for the withdrawal of money from the fund are set out in regulations attached to the Notice of Motion and which may be amended from time to time by the Board of General Purposes. Thus, if the regulations require amendment, it will not be necessary to make a formal amendment to the Book of Constitution. This is analogous to the situation relating to regulations governing grants of benevolence as set out in S-430 of the Book of Constitution. Your committee finds that these proposed amendments are regular.

REPORT OF THE MASONIC FOUNDATION OF ONTARIO

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario, and Directors, Members and Friends of the Masonic Foundation of Ontario.

It is my privilege to present this report at the Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario, being held at the Royal York Hotel, Tuesday, July 15th, 1997. I am indebted to the Board Members and Committee Chairmen for their work throughout the year, in each case exceeding that implied in the following report summaries.

Introduction

In order to fulfil our Statement of Purpose we continue to monitor and review programmes the Foundation supports, respond appropriately to new needs and requests, while maintaining a sound financial position. As our only source of funds are the Masons of Ontario, it is essential that they be kept informed of the work and needs of the Foundation, and that the causes we support warrant The Masonic Foundation of Ontario being a Mason's "Charity of Choice."

To meet these objectives, meetings were held throughout Ontario with regional and district representatives, to update and to inform them of the work and functioning of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario.

Suggested information inserts were provided, for use in the lodge summons and while we continue our efforts to improve communications with Masons throughout the jurisdiction, it is not easily achieved, particularly in such a large organization. However, we do believe progress continues to be made.

Appreciation

A year ago, M.W. Bro. T. John Arthur retired as President of our Foundation, after twenty-one years of service. In appreciation of that service and in recognition of the wise counsel he willingly continues to share, the Board of Directors, at its first meeting, voted unanimously to reinstate him as Honorary Chairman.

A group of supporters whose individual names do not appear in this report, but on who the current and future success of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario will increasingly rely are our regional, district and lodge representatives. My sincere thanks for their efforts and I will again refer to the importance of their responsibilities later in this report.

Two very important means of communication are the Foundation Information Booth and our Publications. Our appreciation is extended to S.R. (Skip) Whiteley, responsible for the booth, and to Terry Shand, for the production of our publications.

The Foundation could not function effectively without informed and efficient staff, those who contact our office, receive prompt, courteous attention. I express publicly my appreciation to our Secretary, Melvyn J. Duke, and our assistant Mrs. Donna Harvey, for an efficient, responsive office operation and for the fine cooperation I have personally received.

While the Foundation is a body politic and corporate, separate from the Grand Lodge, we do know from whence we come. We continue to complement each other. The opportunity to speak briefly with the incoming District Deputy Grand Masters on Thursday morning is appreciated, as are our later meetings with the regional and district representatives, when the Grand Master and Custodian of the Work meet with the District Deputy Grand Masters.

Financial Matters

Thomas Lewis has just completed his first year as Treasurer. Our appreciation is extended for his time, talents and interest in the entire breadth of the work of our Foundation.

It is readily apparent, from the financial statements, that our work in the community is largely dependent on investment income, the largest source of revenue. Thus, it is essential that we maintain investment income without unduly risking our capital. In these uncertain economic times, with declining and fluctuating interest rates, your Board considered alternative investment strategies. It was resolved that the Investments Committee be restricted to "Investing in Government Guaranteed Bonds and Debt Securities of Principal Canadian Corporations rated by the Bond Rating Authorities

at no worse than Double B." I am particularly grateful to vice-president James T. Cassie, chairman, Investment Committee, for his wise counsel to the Board on these and other matters, and for liaising with Nesbitt Burns.

Yellow envelopes were distributed with the spring edition of the Ontario Mason Magazine and, again, after the lapse of one year, to every lodge for inclusion in the lodge summons, for which we extend our appreciation to the Lodge Secretaries. As a result, donations have shown a marked increase of revenue over 1996.

On a longer term basis, a Planned Giving Programme has been developed and briefly outlined in a brochure entitled "For The Cause of Good," a copy of which is made available to every Mason.

Bequests are an important source of revenue and the monies received build up our capital base. They are not funds that can be budgeted, subsequently, the \$138,000 received this year more than doubled receipts of last year. Members are encouraged to consider supporting the Foundation in this way. Details found in the brochure "For The Cause of Good," are available from your lodge representative or from the Masonic Foundation office.

Looking Ahead

The Masonic Foundation of Ontario is a vehicle through which Masons, in support of good causes in and for the people of Ontario, may see Freemasonry "For the Cause of Good" in their communities. Our good name must be maintained and enhanced.

For the Foundation to achieve its purpose all Masons need to be aware of its programmes, including those projects in the various districts. Therefore, we will continue to develop an active, dedicated and enthusiastic cadre of regional, district and lodge representatives to communicate, in both directions, between the lodge member and the Board of Directors. Our programmes and work are worthy and justify The Masonic Foundation of Ontario being a "Charity of Choice" of the Masons in Ontario.

Objectives

- An enthusiastic Foundation representative appointed in every lodge and listed in the summons.
- A copy of "For the Cause of Good" and a current Masonic Foundation Annual Report given to each new Entered Apprentice Mason.
- Every lodge summons to include a brief note of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario activities.
- One lodge meeting programme each year to focus on The Masonic Foundation of Ontario and its donor recipients.
- Bursary recipients listed by their home district.

Your support is sincerely appreciated. I trust this report provides a summary of the work of your Masonic Foundation. If you have any questions, comments and/or suggestions, either I or any of the officers and directors would be pleased to hear from you.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE CONDITION OF MASONRY

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. L. M. Fourney, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Fourney, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Thank you for the privilege of working with and presenting this report on the Condition of Masonry on behalf of the following dedicated committee members: R.W. Bros. A.A. Barker, J.H. Hough, R.A. Pringle, G.W. Rittwage and E.S. Rutter.

The duties and responsibilities of the Committee on the Condition of Masonry are set out in Section 136(d) of the Constitution of Grand Lodge as follows:

To review – the annual reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters and to make recommendations arising therefrom for the benefit of the Craft; and to study the condition or state of Masonry in general throughout the jurisdiction and to make recommendations for the benefit of the Craft.

The committee wishes to express their appreciation to all District Deputy Grand Masters for their efforts in providing the committee with the information on which this report is based.

OVERVIEW OF CONDITION OF MASONRY

Many District Deputy Grand Masters report that Masonry is strong and vibrant in their districts.

This committee is impressed with the large number of districts which have demonstrated their dedication to the tenets and principles of Freemasonry by the quantity and the dollar value of the district and lodge projects, to help the youth of the province and those who are less fortunate and in need of support through no fault of their own, which have been undertaken during the year.

Also on the positive side is the large number of lodges which report involvement in family and other social activities. We believe, for Masonry to survive and be meaningful, it must provide opportunities for the entire family to share in the social side of the Order.

Some lodges are reporting an increase in membership and many report membership as "steady." The negative side is that net membership continues to decline. The advanced age of members is a significant factor in the net decline of membership. We must remember that there was a tremendous surge of new members immediately following World War II. Unfortunately, those who were new members at that time, are now the ones we are losing to the Grand Lodge Above.

It is becoming increasingly difficult for individual lodges to financially support a building without some source of revenue in addition to the dues structure.

GENERAL COMMENTS ABOUT THE INFORMATION WHICH WAS PROVIDED TO THE COMMITTEE

- Unfortunately, the committee was not provided with information from all 646 lodges.
- 85% of the lodges provided some information.
- 80% of the lodges provided information on use of Mentor and Friend to Friend programmes.

- 75% of the lodges provided information on membership increase or decrease.
- 70% of the lodges provided information on their use of budgets.

Friend to Friend Programme

There is no doubt that the Friend to Friend programme is an excellent tool to spread Masonic information to the public and to prospective candidates. While the use of the Friend to Friend programme will not guarantee that a lodge will receive new applications, there is ample evidence that its use does improve the likelihood of receiving applications. One lodge reported receiving nine applications following a public showing.

80% of the 523 lodges for which information was available, reported using the programme in Open House sessions and shopping mall displays, as well as in lodges and with prospective candidates.

Mentor Programme

The Mentor Programme is being used with candidates and as Masonic Education to existing members; however, some lodges which were not using the programme apparently do not appreciate its value in education, since they give "no candidates" as a reason for not using it.

80% of the 523 lodges for which information was available reported using the programme.

Membership

75% of the lodges reported information on membership increase or decrease.

The 490 lodges for which information was available reported as follows: 14% reported increased membership; 44% reported steady membership; 42% reported decreased membership.

Finances

70% of the lodges reported information on their financial situation.

44% of the 457 lodges for which information was available reported using budgets. Some lodges which reported financial problems are not using a budget and/or have a low dues structure.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Reporting Forms

- (a) A revised set of recommended forms has been provided to Grand Lodge.
- (b) District Deputy Grand Master reporting forms be included with their annual reports.
- (c) These forms be dated and numbered, to ensure up-to-date forms are used.

2. District Deputy Grand Masters

Future D.D.G.M.s be expected to complete a course of study on:

- (a) Constitution of Grand Lodge, particularly those parts which have a bearing on their Powers and Duties.
- (b) The Masonic Foundation Statement of Purpose and its Programmes.
- (c) Meeting the Challenge and The Masonic Manual, particularly as these publications deal with Protocol, Communications and Public Speaking.
- (d) The Information Booklet for Prospective District Deputy Grand Masters.

3. Principle Lodge Officers

A suggested course of study be provided for future principle lodge officers to include:

- (a) Constitution of Grand Lodge items on membership, demits and suspensions and the Master, Powers and Duties.
- (b) The Masonic Memorial Service.

- (c) Those sections of "Meeting the Challenge" which deal with Duties of Lodge Officers, Protocol and Etiquette.
 - (d) Those sections of the "Masonic Manual" which deal with Communication and Public Speaking.
4. Lodge Financial Management
Lodges be urged to use a sound basis of financial management to ensure that they are able to plan and meet future needs.
 5. Friend to Friend and Mentor
The use of both of these programmes continue to be encouraged by District Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Lodge.
 6. Committee of Inquiry
Each lodge secretary be required to maintain a Committee of Inquiry Kit to be given to the committee chairman for his guidance in conducting the inquiry. The kit to contain:
 - (a) Sample questions to be used by the committee.
 - (b) Committee reporting form.
 - (c) The following booklets: Booklet "O," Masonic Charity, To A Mason's Family, The Masonic Foundation of Ontario.
 7. For the Cause of Good
Each newly initiated Mason be given a copy of this book.
 8. Welcome to a Mason's Lady
Each lodge be provided with a sample letter to be sent to the wife, or mother, of each newly initiated Entered Apprentice Mason. The letter to contain information on the following:
 - A brief welcome message.
 - Brief history of origin of Freemasonry, in the world, in Canada and in Ontario.
 - Membership qualifications.
 - Meetings.
 - The Masonic Foundation.
 - The District Association.
 - Benevolence.
 - Whom to contact for more information or help if needed.

REPORT OF THE DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by M.W. Bro. N. E. Byrne, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by M.W. Bro. Byrne, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M. of Canada, in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

I am pleased once more, as chairman of the Grand Lodge Discipline Committee, to present its report for the year ending July, 1997.

In accordance with Section 410.1(a), the Grand Secretary has issued Certificates of Severance to two brethren of our jurisdiction this last year. These certificates were

issued after investigation that no undue pressure or coercion had been placed on the brother requesting such a certificate. The practical effect of the granting of the Certificate of Severance is equal to the penalty of indefinite suspension but is still subject to the regular provisions of the Constitution with respect to restoration to Masonry.

In addition, two Reviewing Committees were convened in accordance with Section 412(a), and their reports were forwarded to the Grand Secretary. In both cases, the Reviewing Committee found no reasonable grounds to support the complaint, and the complaint, therefore, stands dismissed.

Another complaint was filed with the Master of a lodge, and he proceeded to appoint a Reviewing Committee pursuant to Section 412(a). Unfortunately, the complaint was laid against himself, the Master of the lodge. It would be quite improper, in those circumstances, for the Master to appoint a Reviewing Committee to consider a complaint against the very Master who appointed the committee in the first instance. There is a potential conflict apparent, and not only must justice be done but justice must also be seen to be done. Accordingly, at the request of the chairman of this committee, the Grand Master has directed the Master involved to turn the matter over to his District Deputy Grand Master, who will appoint the committee to review the complaint. The appointments made by the Master were revoked by the Grand Master's actions.

Your committee specifically warns all Masters to seek guidance and support whenever they receive a Masonic complaint. This support is readily available from the Grand Secretary's office. While the conflict may not be apparent to the Master involved, it is apparent to others. Please exercise caution in these matters and seek experienced assistance.

One of our lodges conducted a Masonic trial only partially complying with the Rules Respecting Trials set out in the Constitution of Grand Lodge. There is some question that the errant brother ever got notice of his Masonic trial. Every Mason, like every citizen of our country, is clearly entitled to "due process." A Masonic trial without notice to the accused brother is really not proper and can create untold problems. Your committee will be considering whether the actual Masonic trial conducted is legal and proper. If the committee rules it was not, the whole process may well have to start all over again, much to the embarrassment of the brethren, the lodge, and those who were grieved with conducting this Masonic trial.

Here again is another example of why each lodge and/or Master should seek experienced advice through their respective District Deputy Grand Masters to the Grand Secretary's office. The members of this committee are willing and able to assist with problems and/or questions in matters of this nature, and should be consulted before some improper step is taken, or some procedure is forgotten or overlooked. The Rules Respecting Masonic Trials are not always easy to understand but they, if followed, will ensure an errant brother is given every opportunity to defend his name when facing Masonic discipline.

Your committee, as required by Section 424.1(c), has reviewed the Trial Commission's report of the trial of a series of Masonic charges laid against a brother of this jurisdiction with respect to several serious and heinous crimes.

The evidence presented to this Trial Commission showed unbelievable brutality and a callous disregard for human life of two young females.

The trial was conducted in an absolutely competent, legal, and thorough manner, and in strict compliance with our Rules Respecting Masonic Trials. The brother was

not present although duly served with notice of the trial and was represented by a competent brother Mason.

Notwithstanding the shock and disgust, which members of your committee felt while reviewing the trial proceedings, and the accompanying transcript of court evidence, the committee confirms the finding of guilty, the penalty of indefinite suspension and accepts the Trial Commission's recommendation of expulsion of this brother from the Masonic Order.

Accordingly, your committee recommends expulsion by Grand Lodge from the Masonic Order of this brother.

Pursuant to Section 424.1(b), if this report is accepted by the Board of General Purposes and Grand Lodge, including a motion to expel the named brother, your committee will request the Grand Secretary to notify the errant brother accordingly to show cause why the order of expulsion should not be made final.

Masonic discipline is not a pleasant task, but, if Masonry is to maintain and uphold its good name in the eyes of the Craft and the public, we must ever be vigilant that Masonic infractions or public offenses, by Masons, are dealt with in a fair, just and proper manner, and in strict accordance with the law – the laws of the country and the laws of Masonry. Only by such vigilance will we as Masons be able to uphold the principles of our Craft that we all hold dear.

In closing, your committee records its sincere appreciation to all those brethren who, in one way or another, assisted in connection with the dealing of a Masonic offence.

Your committee thanks as well our Grand Secretary, M.W. Bro. R. E. Davies, and his staff, for the prompt and efficient attention to the many matters that are referred or directed to them with respect to Masonic offenses in such a timely and thorough manner, and for the many courtesies extended to your Committee on Discipline over the last year.

As chairman, I extend my sincere personal thanks to all the members of the committee, M.W. Bros. E. W. Nancekivell and D. C. Bradley; R.W. Bros. W. T. Anderson, S. H. Cohen, R. T. Runciman, E. Habermehl, R. J. Lemaich; and V.W. Bros. J. V. Lawer and R. S. Whitmore, for their concern, deliberations, wisdom and experience and, in some cases, professional expertise given gladly in the discharge of their duties as members of this committee.

REPORT OF THE COMPUTER RESOURCES COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. B. E. Bond, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Bond, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

The committee was formed after the Grand Lodge Communication in July, 1996. A letter, explaining the purpose of the committee, as well as detailing our mandate, was sent to each District Deputy Grand Master. The D.D.G.M. was asked to appoint a member of his district who was familiar with computers to act in the capacity of district representative for this committee and advise the committee's secretary of the appointee's name and address.

The sudden death of our secretary, R.W. Bro. Michael Brellisford, in the fall of 1996, and the resultant loss of some computer files containing the names of most of the district representatives which had been appointed, threw this committee into some disarray. A second request was made of the D.D.G.M.s to repeat any correspondence that they may have had with Mike, which was responded to in a most heartening fashion. W. Bro. Douglas Swann was recommended to the committee as a possible choice for secretary and after interview, was accepted, and has performed his work to the complete satisfaction of all.

For the Masonic year of 1996-1997, thirty-seven districts appointed a district representative. Two newsletters, detailing the activities of the committee and outlining any information received by us which we felt would be of value to the members of their districts, were sent to them during the winter and spring of 1997.

After the inauguration of the Grand Lodge internet Web Page at the Grand Lodge Communication in July, 1996, there have been over 17,000 visitors to the web site. This venue has proven to be very popular, due in no small part to the continuing efforts of R.W. Bro. William Thompson, who has devoted many hours to its maintenance and improvement. The items of interest include the Grand Master's itinerary, a message from the Grand Master and the Deputy Grand Master, listings of Masonic publications available from Grand Lodge, the Library, Museum and Archives Committee, listings of other Masonic Web Sites, etc.

The internet address of the site is: <http://www.hookup.net/~glcanada>.

As a result of the many requests received for information on the formation of a lodge or district Web Page, a set of guidelines, based on common sense, was produced for the general use of anyone requesting it. The main purpose of these guidelines is to present Masonry in its best light, as this is a highly public forum. It is requested that any lodge entry into the internet be done only with the knowledge and approval of the Master of the lodge, and in the case of a district Web Page, with the approval of the D.D.G.M. It is further requested that Grand Lodge be informed of the existence of such page.

In keeping with past practices, where we have made available such software as will assist the Secretary and the Treasurer, as well as the lodge in general, we undertook the project of developing standard forms and reports for use with Microsoft Works. Since copyright laws prohibit the copying and distribution of licensed software, we cannot provide these. However, since the retail cost of these programmes is under \$100

and includes all warranties and manuals, this should not prove too costly. We can, however, distribute the forms and reports which work with these programmes on a request basis. These include a database format, word processor forms for minutes, summonses, newsletter, etc. The work in preparation for use by Apple users is being done by R.W. Bro. Brian Todd.

One of the projects which this committee has embarked on this year is the identification of those books and texts, which, when translated into electronic form, would vastly aid our brethren who are blind or nearly blind. Bro. Warren Northcott of Peterborough was asked to assist in this, due to his expertise in the field of providing alternative information formats. The Library, Museum and Archives Committee is working with us to provide suitable subjects for conversion and we hope to have some of these available in the library over the next year.

The bulk of the work that the committee has undertaken this year is the preparation for Electronic Registration of voters at the Grand Lodge Communication in July. With the timely assistance of Bro. Kris Nickerson in the development of the software needed to properly apply the principles laid down in the Constitution, as regards to the identification of a voting member, the handling of the proxy and the storing of data in such form which will ease the collection of data for the Proceedings, was completed. It is proposed that a trial be made in July, 1997, with four districts to determine the feasibility of the system.

A series of seminars on the subjects of registration, computer use in the lodge and the internet, were held during the winter and spring of 1997 in Toronto West, Toronto East, Cornwall, Toronto North, London, North Bay, Sault Ste. Marie, Thunder Bay and Kenora. The attendance at these seminars was most heartening, as the bulk of the attendees were very interested in the subject matter. The question and answer sessions following the presentations indicated support for the concepts that we presented. I must thank W. Bro. David Dainard, a hastily conscripted member of this committee, for all his efforts in arranging the venue for these presentations and I extend my most sincere thanks to the Temple Boards of those buildings where the presentations were made.

REPORT OF THE LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. R. K. Campbell, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Campbell, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

It is my privilege to present the report of the Long Range Planning Committee on behalf of its members: R.W. Bros. Richard Allgood, Bill Burns, Ceel Latchoo, Walter Matyczuk and Garry Dowling, Secretary.

Membership statistics for our Grand Lodge indicate a decrease in each of the past thirty-five years. The future of Masonry, however, depends on the number of active members, not on the simple number of members. Available statistics indicate that membership decline is due primarily to resignations and suspensions, as the influx of new, affiliated and restored members equates fairly closely to the loss through death. Masonry must retain the interest of its members.

The future of Masonry is the future of its members; the Craft exists for them and can only be as strong as they are committed to make it. To be successful, Masonry must have a solid base. Any plan or initiative to strengthen Masonry must reflect the desires and input of its members. To get the opinion of the membership, ad hoc discussions have been held with individuals and small groups of members, including a series of symposiums held at five locations across the Grand Jurisdiction involving "Neophyte Masons," those with less than ten years membership. The purpose was to determine what attracted them to Masonry, what is required to retain their interest and what are their concerns. "Fellowship" was a key reason for joining; the Ritual was seen as providing a stabilizing influence and vigorously defended, but the need for greater explanation of the Ritual was identified; "Morality" is also a factor, with Masonry being viewed as a means of expressing personal moral values and to convey that philosophy to the general public through acts and example. Factors identified as necessary to retain their interest included: increased social functions, with greater family involvement; more promotion and public awareness of what Masonry is and stands for; well run, punctual meetings with a brevity of business; correct protocol and purity of the Ritual; more visiting; and an openness to change and compromise.

Initiatives have already been introduced to strengthen the Craft, such as the Friend to Friend and Mentor Programmes. To consolidate the gains that have been made and to build upon them, a plan is required that will get our Masonic House in order by ensuring financially stable and well-managed lodges; consolidate the current membership by improving the quality and variety of lodge meetings; enable members to become more knowledgeable about the meaning of the Ritual; encourage better exposure of what Masonry stands for and what it does; and create a good feeling of belonging that will make members public relations representatives of the Craft, who will attract potential members through their actions and deeds.

For Masonry to remain a viable entity into the next millennium, new members are required to fill the gap being left by the older members as they pass away and to revitalize the Craft with new ideas and enthusiasm. Where will Masonry find these new members?

They are all around us – our sons and grandsons, our younger neighbours, our fellow parishioners and colleagues at work. What must be resolved is how to attract them to Masonry; what specific role can Masonry play in their lives that will draw their interest and retain it? Let's look more closely at this group which must supply the membership of the Craft for the future.

The younger generation is comfortable motoring the Information Highway. This makes them both practitioners and victims of the high speed at which life in general and information in particular are moving. Gone is the "nine-to-five" job; specific hours of work have become meaningless as laptops, modems and cellular phones have shackled them to their vocation with an unbreakable umbilical cord that can demand their immediate attention 24-hours each and every day. Finding sufficient hours for distinct and separate diversions, such as membership in the Craft, is a major challenge, and one that will persevere only with a strong will to make it happen. The challenge facing the Craft is to provide this younger generation with such an incentive.

Masonry has much to offer this younger generation – the striving to make each man better through his Masonic associations and teachings; the camaraderie of sharing a fraternal feeling; and the stability of serving the moral and social needs of men for centuries. Masonry can, and must, fill a niche in the lives of these potential members, some void that is essential to their lives and which is now lacking, if that potential is to

be realized. To achieve this, however, it is necessary for Masonry to become more visible in the community – while Masonry must continue its policy of not soliciting members, greater effort must be made to arouse their curiosity about the Craft. For example, recent entry into the Internet is a marvellous means of reaching the younger generation. Masonry must stress the benefits of personal development that come from membership: enhanced personal confidence; improved organizational and planning skills; enriched management competence; and strengthened public presentation and speaking proficiencies.

In its report to Grand Lodge in July 1996, the Long Range Planning Committee stated that "a five-year plan must be instituted to stop the decline in membership." A concerted effort is required to retain our current members and be attractive to potential candidates. There is a need for better-managed and more interesting lodge meetings; better exposure of what Masonry stands for and what it does – how Masonry takes good men and makes them better; and assessing the changing times and how to attract today's younger generations. A long-term plan is required, one that would be implemented over the next several years across the Grand Jurisdiction, and continue as an on-going initiative. The objective of this plan is "Getting Masonry Right," by ensuring strength, stability and a foundation for growth. It must also address the needs expressed by the membership.

The committee recommends that a **Continuing Plan** be adopted immediately, with initial concentration placed on retaining active members of less than one year; developing an explanation for new members of the three Degrees and their symbolism; identifying the role of Masonry within the community; revitalizing Past Masters, officers and members; and developing training programmes for aspirants to the office of District Deputy Grand Master, and other elements key to the success of the plan, e.g. Lodge Management, Officer Training, Financial Stability and conducting an interesting lodge meeting. The goal of this Continuing Plan is to establish a firm network of vibrant, well-managed lodges to which good men will be attracted and want to actively associate themselves.

To be successful, this Continuing Plan must promote strong, financially stable lodges; an improved organizational structure at all levels; improved communications among Grand Lodge, districts and lodges; a closing of the gap between Grand Lodge and the individual lodges by creating a feeling of partnership to ensure the future of Freemasonry; improved visibility between the Craft and the community; leadership development at both the district and lodge level; and membership retention and revitalization.

Over the years, various Grand Lodge committees have undertaken the tasks assigned to them and have presented reports at the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, incorporating recommendations for consideration. In carrying out their functions, these committees have often worked in virtual isolation from the other committees. Such a "stove pipe" or "silo" approach does not lend itself to the proposed Continuing Plan. To be truly productive, the Grand Lodge committees must be fully aware of what is being undertaken by the other committees and participate in the development of the Continuing Plan by providing the special expertise they possess. Horizontal communication will be a contributing factor to the success of the proposed plan.

To be effective, the plan must have a clear sense of direction with reasonable, achievable goals, accountability for its implementation and a means of measuring success. It must also be accepted as workable and in the best interests of the

participants. The key is acceptance by the Master, officers and members of the individual lodges; they must be convinced that the plan is essential to the continued existence of Masonry. This will require meetings at the district level with explanations and open, two-way dialogue, where the interests of the lodges and brethren are fully considered. There is also a need to build upon the success of the symposiums held with Neophyte Masons by holding focus groups with other segments of the Craft; e.g. lodge officers, Past Masters, active Master Masons, inactive members, Past Grand Lodge Officers, recently demitted former members, etc.; continue to communicate the changes being undertaken directly to members through *the Ontario Mason*, along with highlighting what is happening in the lodges across the Grand Jurisdiction; and fully utilize the Internet as a communications vehicle, with both Masons and non-Masons.

As a fraternity, Masonry must also be cognizant of, and address, the needs of our elderly members. The committee, therefore, recommends adoption of the proposal contained in its 1996 report for the creation of an "Honourable (or Veteran) Member" category for those members whose physical or mental disabilities preclude them from ever returning to lodge, so that they may, with dignity, retain their membership without fear of suspension for nonpayment of dues, while alleviating their lodges of financial burden caused by dues forgone.

These, then, are the challenges facing the Craft and the recommendations proposed by the committee to address them.

All of which is respectfully and fraternally submitted by the committee for the betterment of the Craft.

REPORT OF THE COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. R. D. Summerville, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Summerville, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

It is my privilege and pleasure to present the report of the Communications Committee. Our team was comprised of R.W. Bros. Reade Spence (vice chairman), David Sheen (secretary), Rae Hutt, Robert South, Walter Matyczuk, John Nottingham; V.W. Bro. Lloyd Bittle.

Our mandate, as set out by Grand Lodge, was to review and improve the quality of communication instruments within the Craft as determined by Grand Lodge. The number one tool of communication is the lodge summons, which we see a vast improvement in the last few years. For any lodge requiring assistance, the committee has set out guidelines which are available for the asking.

Lodge newsletters are becoming more popular. Most are very interesting to their membership. Guidelines have been drafted for them. Some districts have news letters with and without advertising. The committee has also adopted guidelines for them.

As in past years, we are recognizing lodges and districts for what we the Communications Committee deem the best lodge summons, lodge newsletter and district newsletter. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AUDIT AND FINANCE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. T. E. Lewis, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Lewis, it was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

The duties and responsibilities of the Committee on Audit and Finance of Grand Lodge are set forth in the Book of Constitution in Subsection 136(a). Specifically, they charge the committee to perform the following duties:

To review the monthly financial statements of the Grand Secretary;

To review the annual reports of the Grand Treasurer, the Grand Secretary and the Auditor;

To consider the investments of the funds of Grand Lodge as recommended by the Grand Treasurer;

To recommend the amounts to be transferred annually from the General Account for benevolent purposes or appropriations to any foundation or trust which may be established by Grand Lodge for charitable purposes;

To recommend the approval of the charitable donations made on behalf of Grand Lodge by the Grand Master;

To review with the Grand Secretary the number of staff required for the Grand Lodge office, including a Supervisor of Benevolence, and salaries to be paid;

To prepare an estimate of the receipts and expenditures on account of the General Fund for the ensuing year, with a view to ensuring that the expenditures are essential and that the receipts are sufficient to cover them;

To recommend any changes in financial commitments of the lodges to Grand Lodge; and

To make a periodic survey of the insurance coverage of Grand Lodge.

Throughout the Masonic year, the Committee on Audit and Finance has endeavoured to address the foregoing duties and responsibilities and has generally provided ongoing assistance to Grand Lodge, the Grand Secretary and to the Grand Treasurer with respect to the financial operations and the financial position of Grand Lodge.

The Committee on Audit and Finance of Grand Lodge has reviewed and considered the reports of the Grand Treasurer, the Auditor's Report and the report of the Grand Secretary as referred to in this Annual Communication. These reports

fully and accurately record the information pertaining to:

- (a) The financial position of this Grand Lodge as at April 30, 1997, and the results of its operations for the year then ended.
- (b) Details of all revenues and expenses with respect to the general fund, the segregated funds and the special programme fund; together with particulars of all transactions and changes in capital accounts of Grand Lodge which have occurred during the year ended April 30, 1997.
- (c) The investment accounts of the above-mentioned funds and the summary of the financial position as at April 30, 1997.

The following comments with respect to certain matters covered by these reports are presented for your consideration.

1. The Annual Statement of the financial position of Grand Lodge reflects a total of the fund balances as at April 30, 1997, of \$4,344,426, compared to \$4,098,385 the previous year, summarized as follows:

The increase of \$246,041 in these funds speaks well for the overall management of our funds during the year.

2. The statement of revenue and expenses for the general fund reflects net earnings of \$105,350, which includes an amount of \$26,243 as a management fee from the special programme fund towards Grand Lodge expenses. The overall net earnings for the year can be largely attributed to the gain on sale of investments in the amount of \$111,727, which, by its nature, may or may not occur in subsequent years.
3. Grants for benevolent purposes for the year amounted to \$64,294, compared to \$79,670 the previous year. The report of the Chairman of Benevolence appears elsewhere in these proceedings. The Committee on Audit and Finance commends that committee on the way in which it has administered the funds for benevolent purposes within the bounds of funds available.

The Audit and Finance Committee received from the Management Committee the budgetary requirements of all Grand Lodge Committees for the ensuing year, which were carefully considered in preparing the annual budget for the year ended April 30, 1998, which amounted to \$16,900.

The budget for the general fund for the ensuing year is set out in the appendix to this report, which reflects anticipated revenues of \$641,500 and expenses of \$663,400, resulting in a budget deficit of \$21,900. As in prior years, a budget for the

special programme fund has been prepared, which is set out in the appendix attached to this report, which reflects budgeted expenses of \$142,200 from this fund. The operating budget and the special programme budget were prepared on a line by line examination based on the actual results of the previous year and giving consideration to the needs of Grand Lodge to facilitate desirable and meaningful programmes.

Again, we must congratulate the Masons of our Grand Jurisdiction for their generous support of the special programme fund, which has enabled your Grand Lodge to finance a number of programmes for the benefit of the brethren throughout Ontario.

As reported by the Grand Treasurer, the Committee on Audit and Finance meets with Cassels Blaikie & Co. on a quarterly basis to review our investment portfolio and we continue to be pleased with the results shown to date. Accordingly, we recommend their continuing engagement to manage our investment portfolio.

In accordance with Section 134(c) of the Constitution, your committee submits for consideration and approval, as set out below, an estimate of the revenues and expenses as they relate to the general fund for the year ended April 30, 1998. Your committee believes the budget of the general fund as set out in this report is realistic and provides for items which can be reasonably foreseen to meet the obligations, financial responsibilities and commitments of the general fund of Grand Lodge for the current fiscal year.

A special thanks to our Auditors, Doane Raymond Chartered Accountants, and, in particular, Mr. George Benton, C.A., for their overall assistance and interest in our financial success.

In conclusion, as chairman of the Audit and Finance Committee, I particularly want to express my thanks and appreciation to the Grand Treasurer, to the Grand Secretary and the Grand Lodge staff for their work and assistance to this committee. I also wish to express my appreciation to the members of this committee for their interest and involvement in the management of the financial affairs of this Grand Lodge.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS

This Report was presented by M.W. Bro. H. O. Polk, which received the unanimous endorsement of all present.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Brethren:

In a personal sense, I feel privileged to be permitted to report, on behalf of the Past Grand Masters of Grand Lodge, on the Grand Master's Address for approval at this Annual Communication.

Following the welcome to the invited guests and lodge representatives, the Grand Master expressed due respect to departed brethren, for which he is to be commended.

The committee is certain that every heart and soul of the members of Grand Lodge will sanction the fitting tribute to the Dean of our Past Grand Masters, the late M.W. Bro. John Alfred Irvine, whose passing signalled a sombre tone, included among the emotions the loss of a devoted friend and servant who so many had known and worked with.

Reference to the untimely deaths of the late R.W. Bros. James E. Cope and Michael Brellisford, Grand Lodge officers for the years 1996–1997, is worthy of special remembrance.

In the caption under "Appreciation," the committee endorses the shower of praise and thanks to the personnel who made possible the successful operation of Grand Lodge for the past year: the District Deputy Grand Masters; the Management Committee; the Management Group (with special mention of the group originating the idea that Grand Lodge make possible for members to contribute to the relief of victims of the devastating flood inflicted on residents of the province of Manitoba, among them numerous Freemasons and their families, this past spring); the Grand Secretary and his ever willing staff; the Grand and Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies; the Grand Senior and Junior Wardens; the Grand Chaplain; the Grand Historian; and the Deputy Grand Master, R.W. Bro. William T. Anderson, who worked so closely in tandem with the Grand Master throughout.

The Past Grand Masters accept, with thanks, the tribute extended to them, and join in expressing our thanks to him for the pleasant association of working together. M.W. Bro. Greenwood, you will be affectionately received in our numbers this Thursday.

The committee applauds the thanks expressed to the retiring members of the Board of General Purposes, R.W. Bros. C. John Woodburn, Frank G. Dunn and R. Cerwyn Davies, for their long time services.

The committee recognizes the attendance of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, and Grand Secretary, with certain details of the Conferences of Grand Masters of North America, and the Grand and District Grand Lodges of Canada held during the year, and recommend continued membership in both of them, as they provide an excellent source of inter-Grand Lodge communication, methods and knowledge.

The committee recommends for approval by Grand Lodge: the appointment of R.W. Bro. Samuel H. Cohen, V.W. Bro. John V. Lawer, and R.W. Bro. H. Neil Britton (to complete the term of R.W. Bro. Wallace McLeod, who has retired) to the Honorary Board of General Purposes, as provided in Section 131(e) of the Constitution; that the rank of Past Grand Senior Warden (Honorary) be conferred on

V.W. Bro. Melvyn J. Duke, St. John's Lodge No. 75, pursuant to Section 73; that Past Rank be conferred posthumously on Past District Deputy Grand Master (Chatham District), R.W. Bro. James E. Cope; Past Grand Senior Warden, R.W. Bro. Michael Brellisford; Past Master W. Bro. Ronald Gamble, Kerr Lodge No. 230; W. Bro. Larry Longley, Adoniram Lodge No. 573; W. Bro. Peter Edmonds, St. George's Lodge No. 15, by virtue of being taken from office by death and W. Bro. E. G. R. Godfrey, Henderson Lodge No. 388, unable to complete his term of office; the recipients of the William Mercer Wilson Medal named in the address; the appointments of Grand representatives (near) (to and from) Grand Lodges; the commendations of the named brethren in the address.

This committee applauds the congratulations expressed to members of Vaughan Lodge No. 54, and Corona Lodge No. 454 for providing new Masonic premises, dedicated during the year.

Consideration must be observed at all times to taxation implications, compliance with the Constitution, and image to the public. Let caution be the guide.

We congratulate the Grand Master on his choice of R.W. Bro. Thomas Jackson, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, a long-time friend of members of our Grand Lodge, as the speaker at the Wednesday evening banquet.

In concluding this report, the committee wants to pay a particular tribute to M.W. Bro. Greenwood.

As Grand Master, he has dedicated his abundant energies and devoted much effort in impressing his brethren to realize that in the midst of restless transition throughout the world, the eternal verities of our fraternity still prevail.

Throughout his years of service to Grand Lodge, right through to his work-laden itinerary for the past two years, it is obvious he adheres to the old adage "the Kingdom emulates from the King." Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

To the three (3) recipients of the William Mercer Wilson Medal granted during the year 1996-1997, named in the Grand Master's Address, the Committee extends sincere congratulations. The award is a means by which Grand Lodge can pay tribute to lodge members whose contributions enrich the lives of contemporaries in their respective lodges and communities.

Included with the adoption of this report by Grand Lodge, the committee requests that the appointment of M.W. Bro. Greenwood be approved, NUNC PRO TUNC, to July 21st, 1996, the date of the appointment.

A tribute to the memory of the late M.W. Bro. John Alfred Irvine, deceased, on behalf of this committee is hereby inscribed.

Within his fifty-one eventful years in Freemasonry, Bro. Irvine gave twenty years' service to the Awards Committee (William Mercer Wilson Medal), twelve as chairman – a remarkable record of service.

Throughout the years, Bro. Irvine maintained a visionary passion for the committee – that members be mindful of being custodians of a trust, empowered to guard the parameters of the regulations governing the award.

The committee, as presently composed, express gratitude for having served with our late brother and honour a legend who never lost the common touch, nor his personal conscience.

We mourn his loss. "May the Flight of Angels sing him to eternal rest."

The committee offers sincere thanks to the Grand Secretary, M.W. Bro. R. E. Davies and his staff for services so generously given throughout the years.

PRESENTATION OF NOTICES OF MOTION

1. Moved by M.W. Bro. Norman E. Byrne, seconded by R.W. Bro. Alex Watson, that the Constitution of Grand Lodge be amended as follows:
 - 1) That Section 11 be amended by adding thereto, after "The Very Worshipful the Grand Historian, "the line "The Very Worshipful the Grand Piper."
 - 2) That Section 12 be amended by adding after "Past Grand Historians" the two lines:

"The Grand Piper
Past Grand Pipers"
 - 3) That Section 396(b) be amended by adding the following subsection:

"(xi) Grand Piper
- the bagpipes"
 - 4) That Section 218 be repealed in its entirety and be replaced by the following:

"No brother shall be eligible to be an officer of a lodge unless he is a member in good standing and has proven his proficiency in the Master Mason Degree in open lodge."

2. Moved by R.W. Bro. R. G. Wands, seconded by R.W. Bro. T. E. Lewis, that the Constitution of Grand Lodge be amended as follows:

That Section 188 of the Book of Constitution be amended by replacing the current section with the following:

188 (a) The funds received by the lodge to acquire a life membership, together with any monies already held by the lodge on account of existing life memberships, shall be kept separate and apart from the general funds of the lodge in a trust fund.

(b) Life memberships shall be calculated and monies may be withdrawn from the Life Membership Trust Fund in accordance with formulae as set out in Regulations approved by the Board of General Purposes from time to time.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING
LIFE MEMBERSHIP TRUST FUNDS

1. The amount that must be set aside in the Life Membership Trust Fund shall be at least as great as that determined by multiplying the lodge dues by the age factor from the following table:

2. Regardless of how payments into the Life Membership Trust Fund were calculated, as of the first day of each fiscal year the fund shall be evaluated by extending the age-group factors in column A by the current number of life members in each age group and multiplying the total of those extended factors by the current lodge dues. Where the lodge does not have dues, this is the current annual cost per member of operating the lodge. If members receive a life membership at age 65, a similar calculation must also be made to include the factors from column B for such

members who will receive life membership.

- If the Life Membership Trust Fund equals or exceeds the amount of the evaluation calculated in (2), the current lodge dues of the existing life members shall be paid or transferred into the lodge's general funds.
- If the Life Membership Trust Fund is less than the amount of the evaluation calculated in (2), the interest earned by the fund in the prior fiscal year, up to the amount of the current lodge dues only, shall be paid or transferred into the lodge's general funds.
- Where the lodge has, for each life member, paid the fee prescribed for the commutation of dues per Section 185, lodge dues as referred to in regulations (1), (2), (3), (4), and (6) shall be reduced by the Grand Lodge fee referred to in Section 152(m).
- If, due to aging or a decreased number of life members, after an evaluation of the Life Membership Trust Fund using the factors of regulation (1), there is a surplus in the Life Membership Trust Fund, then the excess of the interest earnings over the lodge dues, plus up to 5% of the assets of the fund, up to the evaluation surplus, may be withdrawn to the general or other funds of the lodge. Before making such a withdrawal, the lodge must request approval from the Grand Secretary, forwarding with the request the evaluation which indicated that there was an excess and the calculations of the amount being withdrawn.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

This Report was presented by W. Bro. Nelson King on behalf of R.W. Bro. Wallace McLeod, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. R. J. McKibbin, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Once again, it is appropriate that the Grand Historian should express his gratitude to the Grand Master, for honouring him with this title. He expresses his regret at not being present at the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge this year; he is engaged on a lecture tour of the Research Lodges of Australia and New Zealand. In the circumstances, it might be appropriate to remind you of a Canadian who was forced to go to Australia nearly 160 years ago. The story is told briefly in the official history of Grand Lodge, *Whence Come We?*, on page 255. We might enlarge on it a little.

Elijah Crocker Woodman was born in Buxton, in southern Maine, in the northern United States, on September 22, 1797. In February of 1819, he married Apphia Elden, of Buxton, and they proceeded to have seven children. He was a farmer and lumberman by occupation. He was initiated into Masonry in Phoenix Lodge, No 24, Belfast, Maine, on September 20, 1820, two days before his twenty-third birthday. He was Passed to the Second Degree on December 18, and Raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on January 15, 1821. Soon after receiving his Third Degree he became Junior Deacon of the Lodge (1821-22), but there is no record that he progressed any further in office.

In 1830 he migrated to Upper Canada; whether he originally intended to pass on through and take up residence in the western U.S.A. is not clear. As things happened, he decided to stay in Canada. He settled on Otter Creek, near what is now Tillsonburg, and worked as a lumberman. He established a lumber mill there, and floated his timber down to Port Burwell, on Lake Erie, at the mouth of the creek, fifteen miles away. He brought his family to Canada in 1832, and that year their seventh child was born there, in Bayham Township.

These were not active days for Freemasonry in Upper Canada. The Provincial Grand Master, Simon McGillivray (c.1785-1840), was one of the finest Masons who ever lived; but for various personal reasons, he had not been able to visit his Province after 1825. Then there was the horrible Morgan affair in neighbouring New York in 1826. The Masons were accused of abducting and murdering William Morgan, who had threatened to publish the full texts of their rituals. This generated a lot of hostility, gave rise to the Anti-Masonic political party in the United States, and caused many lodges to close their doors. Inevitably, the effects of this disaster spilled over into Canada. Actually in May, 1837, the Provincial Grand Master had appointed a Deputy, John Auldjo (1805-1886), and sent him out to investigate the situation, and to get things running smoothly. On his return to England, Auldjo submitted a report which was very discouraging. He said that he had heard of only three lodges in the whole colony that were still active. Before he could take any remedial action, word reached him that his brother had died, and he was required to return to Europe without having any chance to revitalize things. At all events, there seems to have been no lodge that was active in Woodman's vicinity, so he was not able to maintain his Masonic connections.

After a couple of years, an economic depression overtook the colony. Even though

Elijah Woodman had thousands of feet of cut timber in his mill and at the out-port, he was unable to sell it, because people simply didn't have the money. In 1836 he went broke, and had to give up his mill. He moved to the village of London, thirty-five miles further west. We don't know how he managed to survive.

There was a Masonic Lodge in London, Mount Moriah, No 773 on the English Register, No 20 on the Provincial Register; it did hold two meetings early in 1836, before going into recess for nine years. Woodman's name does not appear in the minutes, but apparently he was a close friend of several of the members, if one may judge from the similarity of names. In September 1837, while he was in Detroit, Woodman was in contact with a Canadian named William Putnam, and in fact he delivered a message from Putnam's brother Joshua, who was still in London District. Joshua Putnam had served as Secretary of Mount Moriah Lodge in 1829, and William Putnam was its Master in 1834. Moreover, in August, 1838, Woodman wrote to his wife, naming two friends whom she should consult for advice if it became necessary for her to leave home; one was Mr Van Buskirk. H. Vanbuskirk had been Passed to the Second Degree in Mount Moriah Lodge on September 1, 1835. In 1843 Woodman's family was living in a house south of London that belonged to Mr Odell. Joshua S. Odell's home had been the meeting place of the Lodge in 1830, and he served as Tyler in 1836.

A year after Woodman's move to London, the violence broke out. On December 4, 1837, north of Toronto, there was one unsuccessful armed uprising against the government. A few days later, plans were laid for another one near London. But this one was anticipated by the Loyalists, and fifteen of the "Patriots" were captured. Fresh arrests soon followed, and many Reformers, even if they had played no part in the planned rebellion, found themselves imprisoned. There were of course Masons on the "Patriot" side. The actual leader of the abortive uprising was Dr Charles Duncombe, who had been the first Master of Mount Moriah Lodge, in 1820. And on December 8, 1837, the Reformers had met in Flanagan's Hotel, in London, to make a plan of action if they should be attacked by the Tory Orangemen, who were scheduled to meet on the following Monday. Fourteen men attended the meeting, of whom four were past officers of Mount Moriah Lodge: William Niles, John O'Neil, Joshua Putnam, and William Putnam.

After the Reformer prisoners had been placed in jail in London, Woodman visited them and tried to provide for some of their needs. On June 9, 1838, he too was arrested, on the charge of "furnishing prisoners with knives and files to enable them to break out of their cells." After about ten weeks he was released, but then four days later he was arrested again. "These rascally proceedings made me a rebel," he later wrote, and he decided to leave the province. Actually he went as far as Wisconsin, but came back to Detroit in the fall months of 1838, with the intention of moving his family into the United States.

Woodman was by no means the only Patriot who escaped across the border. Actually there were quite a number of them. And several times that year they invaded Canada with the assistance of American "Liberators." As one of the latter subsequently wrote, "I entered the Patriot service with the best of intentions, only wishing that our Canadian neighbors might, in the end, enjoy the same civil, religious, and political freedom, with which the citizens of the United States are blessed." In June of 1838 came the Short Hills Raid, an incursion across the Niagara River into Upper Canada. The colonel and commissary-general was Bro. Samuel Chandler (1790?-1866), of the settlement of St John in the Niagara District. He was the first of the raiders to be

captured.

The biggest fiasco of the whole dreary sequence was the invasion from Detroit, and the battle at Windsor – in which Elijah Woodman took part. On December 4, 1838, the Patriot army crossed the Detroit River and landed at Windsor. The commander was Major-General Lucius Verus Bierce (1801-1876) of Akron, Ohio. (He subsequently became Grand Master of Ohio, in 1853.) The Second-in-Command was Woodman's Masonic friend, Brigadier-General William Putnam (1793-1838), who was killed in the battle. Within 48 hours, Woodman himself was captured, and lodged in Sandwich jail. Other Masons in the ill-fated venture included two Americans, Chauncey Sheldon (born 1781/1782) of Utica, Michigan, and Samuel Snow (born 1800/1801) of Strongsville, Ohio.

On January 4, 1839, Woodman was transferred to London. On January 18, he and Chauncey Sheldon, the last two prisoners (and the two oldest, Woodman being 42 and Sheldon 57), were brought to trial; they were found guilty of violence against the state, and condemned to death. (Altogether, 43 of these prisoners were condemned to death, and at least five were actually hanged.) But the new Governor of Upper Canada, appointed in March of 1838, was Sir George Arthur, who had arrived from Van Diemen's Land, where he had been governor since May 1824. And so, on March 27, the punishment for 18 prisoners was changed from death to transportation. In fact, 58 prisoners from Lower Canada (now Quebec), and 92 from Upper Canada (now Ontario) were sent to the penal colonies of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land. These people included at least four Masons, Chauncey Sheldon, Samuel Snow, Elijah Woodman, and also Samuel Chandler, the prisoner from the Short Hills Raid.

From the notes that Woodman kept, we can trace the slow progress of his journey. On April 2, he left London for Toronto. At the end of May, he moved to Kingston. On September 23, he left Kingston for Quebec, and on his arrival, four days later, he was immediately transferred on board H.M.S. *Buffalo*, which ultimately held 144 prisoners. The ship at once set sail, and on November 12, it crossed the equator. On December 28, it doubled the Cape of Good Hope. And finally, on February 13, 1840, after a voyage of four and a half months, it landed at Hobart Town, in Van Diemen's Land.

For the next two years Elijah Woodman worked in "road gangs." We have descriptions of what was involved here. There were teams of four to six men; it was their job to pull a cart full of stones, weighing close to a ton, from the quarry to the work-site, a distance that might measure as much as two miles, over rough and unfinished roads. They were expected to draw at least twelve such loads a day. Woodman tells us that he worked like this successively at four different locations.

Finally, after two years of hard labour and satisfactory behaviour, on February 15, 1842, Woodman was given a measure of personal liberty, by being granted what is called a ticket of leave to work elsewhere. This allowed him to get a job on the estate of Hon. William Kermodé, of Mona Vale.

During his sojourn, there are occasional indications of his Masonic attitude, and sporadic mentions of his Masonic colleagues. In a fragment of a journal dated April 3, 1840, he expresses his worry about his family, and adds the words, "All I can do is to pray the Chief Architect to preserve, protect and direct them." In 1841, we are told, his fellow-Mason Chandler escaped from Hobart by sea, "assisted at various stages by fellow-Masons" whom he had approached. The others lingered on. Finally, early in 1844 Bros. Elijah Woodman, Chauncey Sheldon, and Samuel Snow addressed a joint petition to the Master, Wardens, and members of Tasmanian Operative Lodge, No 345

on the Irish Constitution, at Hobart, asking for help in finding work. In November of that year Sheldon and Snow were pardoned, and at once they sailed for home. On September 1, 1845, they got to Honolulu on board the whaling ship *Stieglitz*. After he reached home, Samuel Snow wrote a thirty-two page pamphlet on his adventures, called *The Exile's Return; or a Narrative of Samuel Snow, who was banished to Van Diemen's Land, for participating in the Patriot War, in Upper Canada, in 1838* (published at Cleveland, in 1846).

Woodman was less fortunate. His pardon did not come through until July 23, 1845. By that time his health was broken, and he could not arrange his passage home. He was ill and destitute. On July 8, 1845, he had "approached the Masonic lodge in Hobart, outlining his connection with the fraternity." Bro. John Shick began to bring him a weekly allowance of four shillings. On one occasion several brethren visited him, and, as he says, "They also examined me, to prove that I was a master mason which I did to their satisfaction." Then, on November 25, 1846, John Shick died. Another friend and supporter was Bro. Wallace, the proprietor of the Prince of Wales Inn. He and his wife provided many kindnesses to Woodman, and actually paid for his medical treatment.

Finally, on February 8, 1847, the Captain of the *Young Eagle*, a whaling ship, agreed to take Woodman home. When at last he was preparing to go on board, the members of the lodge set about collecting the warm clothing, the medicines, and the petty comforts he would need for the long voyage. Before departing Woodman wrote a brief note to his Masonic brethren. "I return you my sincere thanks for your charitable kindness toward me in making me comfortable on my passage home. I do not know how to express myself in terms suitable for the occasion. My feeble pen fails and my feelings are better felt than described.... I now leave you, praying God to protect our Institution and to overshadow the brethren with his tender care and protection."

It was on March 1, 1847, that he finally boarded the ship. One may well imagine that he was tempted to echo Samuel Snow's parting words,

Farewell, Van Dieman, ruin's gate,
With joy we leave thy shore:
And fondly hope our wretched fate
Will drive us there no more.

By now Woodman had several severe medical problems, including tuberculosis. His condition deteriorated, and on April 13, he was no longer able to write his diaries, but began to dictate them. By June 6 he was no longer able even to dictate. On June 13 he died, and two days later he was buried at sea. A few days later, the ship was wrecked; by some miracle, the notes he had written managed to survive.

Meanwhile, back in Canada, things had become somewhat better. As a result of the troubles of 1837-38, the British government had sent out a notable Mason, the Earl of Durham (1792-1840), as Governor of Canada in 1838; he had been initiated into Masonry in Granby Lodge, No 124, Durham, in 1814. On his return to England from Canada, he presented detailed recommendations as to how the problems should be dealt with. In effect, Lord Durham's Report, we are told, "set the pattern for granting responsible representative government" to the British colonies overseas.

Woodman's wife and some of his family continued to live in London. His eldest daughter married Elijah Leonard (1814-1891), a successful iron-founder of London, who went into politics, and eventually was called to the Senate of Canada.

So here, in Elijah Crocker Woodman, we have a man who felt a certain sympathy for those who protested against what they perceived to be oppressive government

excesses, who was driven to violence by the injustices inflicted on him because of this sympathy, who was sentenced to a punishment that seems to us excessive today, who was transported thousands of miles away from his family, who was forced to do physical labour that eventually destroyed his health, but who seems to have preserved his Masonic ideals, and was helped by the Masons in a far-off land. Once again, as so often, we find Masonic lessons in the lives of our predecessors.

References: This report relies heavily on a book entitled *An Exile from Canada to Van Diemen's Land*, written by Fred Landon (1880-1969), a Professor of History at the University of Western Ontario. He had the good fortune to find a collection of letters and journals written more than a century and a half ago. He arranged them in order, provided enough background to set them in perspective, and produced a fascinating story, that was published in 1960. The writer is also indebted to M.W. Bro. John E. Anagnostis, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Maine, for providing details about Woodman's Masonic career.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Once again, it is an honour and privilege to present the report or foreword to the reviews of the Annual Proceedings of our sister Grand Lodges received during the past year. Sincere thanks and gratitude must be extended to R.W. Bro. Frederic R. Branscombe for his careful selections and countless hours in preparing these reviews for the interest of the brethren, to appear in our Annual Proceedings.

In reading these reviews, the brethren will notice many familiar topics and programmes as well as new and thought-provoking items.

Benevolence. Some Grand Lodges have extended applications to non-Masons, included programmes for widows, and working in association with the Knights of Columbus and B'nai B'rith organizations.

Computer Utilization. The computerization of records has been adopted by many Grand Lodges; however, with some caution. The use of the **Internet** is rapidly increasing.

Membership. Declining membership has been addressed in many Grand Lodges with emphasis on positive action. The Grand Master of Saskatchewan stated: "The Lodges could do a great deal more to reduce the number of suspensions and demits by practising harmony, communicating more, and promoting more human feelings."

Masonic Renewal. Many Grand Lodges have increased their programmes concerning Public Awareness, Friend to Friend, and Drug and Alcohol Prevention to inform the membership and the general public who and what we are. This seems to be working.

Multiple Degree Ceremonies. Some Grand Lodges have experimented with initiating, passing, and raising of candidates in a single day, naming it a "One Day Festival" or "All the Way in A Day." This procedure has met with some success, but not without disadvantages. The Grand Master of Wyoming stated: "If masonry is to survive, we must continue to use this and other progressive methods of building membership." He also warned of some disadvantages and weaknesses.

Prince Hall. Many jurisdictions have recognized Prince Hall Masonry, while others have allowed full intervisitation.

Qualifications for Initiation. The Grand Lodge of Ireland rescinded the requirement of dispensation for a candidate who may be physically challenged – for in symbolic Masonry "it is his moral worth, not his physical integrity, that justifies his admission." The Grand Lodge of Virginia has lowered the age limit to 18 years for admission.

Religion and Masonry. Some Grand Lodges have decided to issue statements that Freemasonry is not a religion to clarify the attacks on the fraternity by uninformed accusations.

Youth Oriented Programmes. Many Grand Lodges have realized the importance of youth in society and have adopted programmes, including:

- 1) Support with money and volunteers of the three organizations DeMolay, Job's Daughters, Rainbow Girls.
- 2) Assistance in the wider community such as Boy Scouts.

- 3) Co-operating with public authorities and school systems in programmes to identify and treat children at risk of alcohol and drug abuse.

These are brief observations and this foreword is your invitation to read ALL the reviews. You will find them to be informative, thought-provoking, and worthy of reference for Masonic Education and addresses.

Sincere thanks are also extended to the office of the Grand Secretary and others who have made this report possible.

ALBERTA

Edmonton, Alberta, June, 1996

Prior to the formal opening of the 91st Annual Communication of Grand Lodge, M.W. Bro. Gordon Macaulay stated that his reasons for breaking with tradition in holding a Public Opening Ceremony were twofold. First, in keeping with the year's theme of *OUR FAMILY IN MASONRY*, he wished to give public recognition and support to the members and adult leaders of two Masonic youth organizations, namely the International Order of Job's Daughters and the International Order of DeMolay. "If we are to survive into the 21st century," he said, "we must promote our Family in Masonry." Secondly, in response to the frequent accusation that Masonry is a "secret society," he decided to use the publicity associated with the Communication of Grand Lodge to increase awareness in the community of the nature and the achievements of Freemasonry. The Grand Master said to those present who were not Masons, "When you walked in this morning many of you were not aware of the extensiveness of our Fraternal Family. This reception was intended to enlighten you." He expressed the hope that they would "take the opportunity to become more knowledgeable about each of our groups."

Also as a means to increase public awareness of Freemasonry, Grand Lodge adopted a Resolution giving its approval to a lodge "to proceed with raising funds from all the Masonic Family to purchase a float or floats, depending on funds raised; the float or floats to meet parade requirements of the Stampede and Klondike Parade Committees, and be available for use in those, and as many other parades in Alberta as possible. This float is to present the Masonic Family to the Public." It was reported that, in anticipation of Grand Lodge approval, the Masters', Wardens' and Deacons' Association of Calgary had already begun work on a float.

The Grand Librarian reported on the increased use of non-print materials, particularly audio and video tapes. One comment that he made in this regard is of particular interest to Ontario Masons. "Videos," he wrote, "are in constant demand for use at Open Houses or Friend to Friend Nights. The video recommended, at this time, is from the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario."

M.W. Bro. Macaulay gave an example of cordial Masonic relations between Provinces. He said that at the communication last year of the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario "R.W. Bro. Gary James, D.D.G.M. of Alpha District, greeted and congratulated his father on being invested as D.D.G.M. of Niagara District A." Later, on a visit to Perfection Lodge, No. 616, G.R.C., in St. Catharines, the Grand Master was made an Honorary Life Member, which was an honour that he received "with great gratitude and humility."

ARKANSAS

Little Rock, Arkansas, February, 1996

M.W. Bro. B. R. Jackson described to the members of Grand Lodge, at its 154th Annual Communication, the design of the Grand Master's Pin, indicating to them the instructive Masonic lessons contained in its symbolism. "The outer circle of gold," he pointed out, "represents the chain binding Masonry and our appendant bodies. The blue represents the heavens where we got our inspiration from the Supreme Architect of the Universe. The white outline of the state gives location where we live and work. The square and compasses and 'G' denote that it is Masonic. The three words around it — Educate, Motivate and Apply — go back many centuries to St. John the Baptist, for this was his mission as it is ours today. Let us never forget these words and this thought."

Grand Lodge gave its approval to a Recommendation from the Grand Master that "Masons be allowed to wear their white aprons in parades and special occasions. They are our badge and we are recognized by them. Therefore, it is practical that we should wear them."

In its report the Foreign Correspondence Committee recommended, and Grand Lodge approved, that the application of the Grand Lodge of Cuba for recognition be granted, notwithstanding a general sentiment in society against Cuba and all things Cuban. The decision of the Grand Lodge with respect to the recognition of the Grand Lodge of Cuba was taken entirely on the basis of the report by the committee that Cuban Masons "work in accordance with the ancient landmarks, rules, and usages of Freemasonry."

BRITISH COLUMBIA

Kelowna, British Columbia, June, 1996

In his Address, M.W. Bro. Clark M. Gilmour noted that during the previous year recognition had been given to the century and a quarter of Masonic service by the Grand Lodge of British Columbia. The opening celebrations for the anniversary year were in August, 1995, in Barkerville which was founded during the Cariboo Gold Rush of the mid nineteenth century. There was a Pacific National Exhibition parade, with a float having a Grand Lodge Cancer Car, together with the Grand Master and representatives of thirteen concordant and appendant bodies in their respective regalia. The featured speaker was M.W. Bro. William Rheubottom of the Prince Hall Freemasons of the State of Washington and Jurisdiction. The Grand Master observed that other events had occurred during the year, culminating in the 125th Annual Communication. Among the visitors who extended congratulations was M.W. Bro. Durward Greenwood of the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario.

The Grand Master spoke of successes in improving the image of the Craft. "Many districts," he noted, "held church parades with participation of wives and families which was most gratifying. Many community parades were attended in which our brethren participated in full regalia, having with them wherever possible one or two cancer cars in the lead of the process. The presence and involvement of our wives and families is not going unnoticed and consequently is improving our image at the community level."

Although M.W. Bro. Gilmour feels that the Cancer Car Project continues to be the major source of favourable recognition in the community, he told Grand Lodge, "We are all very proud of our new charity, 'We Can Help Programme,' and look forward to its continuance in future years. The 'We Can Help Programme' has been most successful and has provided the basic First Aid Course to approximately 23,000 Grade 4 students in this first year in British Columbia. This means that 23,000 certificates bearing the logos of the Concordant Bodies and citing the Masonic Family in British Columbia are being exposed to that many homes."

The Grand Historian reported that "theme nights continue to be the main method of drawing members with specific work experience or other interests." Themes were mostly related to a shared national ancestry (for example, Blighty Night, Garibaldi Night, Blarney Night and Burns Night) or were based on a common work background (for example, Telephone Night, Loggers' Night and Railway Night). The progress being made to raise funds "for the construction of the replica of a 1914 lodge hall in the Burnaby Historical Village" was reported by the Grand Historian, including a theatre night for that purpose sponsored by the Gavel Historical Society.

CALIFORNIA

San Francisco, California, October, 1995

In reporting to the 146th Annual Communication M.W. Bro. William Stovall stated that the most effective management training tool employed by Grand Lodge over the past six years to prepare future Worshipful Masters has been a programme of Wardens Retreats. What makes these training seminars exceptional, if not unique, is that the wives of the Junior and Senior Wardens are "invited to work together in sessions designed to help them become knowledgeable in helping their husbands and their lodges." Significantly, the programme is under the direction of a Past Grand Master, assisted by his wife, who was given equal recognition with her husband. M.W. Bro. Stovall emphasized that the programme is being successful in helping the leaders of both Grand Lodge and subordinate lodges "to work toward common goals, addressing common problems, while planning excellent ceremonies and well organized social events. I strongly encourage every lodge to sponsor its Wardens and their wives in both the Junior and the Senior Wardens Retreats."

Another successful venture reported by the Grand Master was the Masonic Model Student Assistance Training Programme. This undertaking, under the sponsorship of the California Masonic Foundation in partnership with the California public school system, has been described as providing training for public school teachers in the early identification of substance abuse and other dysfunctional behaviour in children and has helped those teachers to rescue school children before their lives were ruined by substance abuse, gang involvement and other devastating behaviours. M.W. Bro. Stovall stated that he had conceived the project "out of a pressing need recognized in our Public Schools, a need which was identified by our National Masonic Foundation for Children and which has been successfully addressed by some of our Brother Grand Lodges in this Country." He reported that during the year 258 educators, from 60 schools, have been trained and, according to preliminary reports, "there have been 673 at-risk children referred to our intervention teams with 418 children in actual treatment."

Grand Lodge amended its previous legislation which prohibited a member of a California lodge visiting a Prince Hall lodge whether in California or elsewhere. The revised rule permits a visit to a Prince Hall lodge in a state, province or territory where the Grand Lodge that is recognized by the Grand Lodge of California has granted concurrent jurisdiction and recognition to a Prince Hall Grand Lodge. In such a case a California Mason "may have Masonic communication with any person legally present even though such a person is not a member of a Masonic lodge chartered by or holding allegiance to a Grand Lodge recognized by the Grand Lodge of California."

CONNECTICUT

Cromwell, Connecticut, April, 1995

In addressing the 207th Annual Communication of Grand Lodge M.W. Bro. George Pangborn expressed confidence concerning the condition of the Craft. While declining membership remained a problem, he reported that the rate of decline appeared to be going down. "I am pleased," he said, "to see that many of our new Brothers are well under 40 years of age, which means that we have a bright future ahead." Conceding that lodge mergers were still occurring, and more could be expected, he commented, "But this is not all bad. Out of these mergers will come more active lodges who are participating in their community affairs. From this exposure will come quality applications for membership."

The Committee on Brotherhood-in-Action reported that during the past year it had assisted the Knights of Columbus in its Special Olympic Host Town Programme. It was the committee's view that the benefit to Masonry in co-operating with the Knights of Columbus in this project, though indirect, was very significant. "Let's face it," the chairman stated, "if Masons are seen, others may like what they observe, with a feeling of wanting to join. Actually, all the posters in the world cannot attract others as can be done by extending the Masonic spirit of giving time to help others in need." The committee reported that it continued "to work closely with the leaders of the B'nai B'rith, Prince Hall Masons and the Knights of Columbus" in several projects in addition to the Special Olympic Town Programme.

The Committee on Drug and Alcohol Abuse reported on its efforts to eliminate substance abuse among young people. It indicated that it had developed several programmes that are available to the local lodges for distribution in their communities. "We have developed," it continued, "the McGruff's Slide Card, a guide to drugs and alcohol for distribution to parents. This year we have book covers, 'Hugs, Not Drugs,' for distribution to students. . . Hundreds of book covers have been distributed to DeMolay and Rainbow, as well as several school systems and one Boy Scout Troop. Over a thousand McGruff Slide Cards have been distributed to school systems for mailing to parents by the school systems."

With respect to lodge programmes for widows, the Committee on Masonic Community Stewardship stated that 90% of Connecticut lodges have a Widows' Night and/or issue a Widows' Pin but only 26 lodges had an *ongoing* programme throughout the year. The committee concluded that "It is apparent, and no mere coincidence, that the vast majority that offer substantial widows' programmes are also the lodges that enjoy the reputation for being the most active."

ENGLAND

London, England, March, April, June, September, December, 1996

Speaking at the Communication in April following his Investiture as Grand Master, H.R.H. The Duke of Kent, referred to relations between the United Grand Lodge of England and other Grand Lodges. "There is at any one time," he said, "generally a range of detailed and patient diplomatic negotiations concerning a number of overseas Grand Lodges and lack of news should not therefore be mistaken for lack of activity. While there has been no obvious advance in our relations with 'Prince Hall' Grand Lodges, some progress is being made. I am glad to hear that the Grand Master and other brethren from the 'Prince Hall' Grand Lodge of Massachusetts will attend our next quarterly communication in June."

With reference to the present and future condition of Masonry, the Grand Master focused attention on how Masonry can defend itself against the frequent charge that it is a secret society. "I spoke last year about the need to be thoughtful about Freemasonry and how we can explain it and achieve the openness which I believe we all agree is desirable. As a move toward this, I welcome the Board's relaxation of its former guidelines, so that lodges are encouraged to entertain non-Masonic guests to dinner after their meetings, and I believe that it will do nothing but good. Good for us, in that the more we are seen by our families and friends — and others — in our own surroundings, the more easily they will be able to accept Freemasonry's proper place in society . . . I am sure that the more open we are (or can be) about our Freemasonry, the less excuse people who are not Masons will have to complain about what they see as secrecy."

As he prepared to close Grand Lodge the Duke of Kent said, "I would like on your

behalf to welcome the District Grand Masters and other distinguished brethren from overseas who are present with us today: From the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario, we have the Grand Master, M.W. Bro. Durward Greenwood, and his Grand Secretary, M.W. Bro. Robert E. Davies, P.G.M."

In its report to the September Quarterly Communication the Board of General Purposes indicated that Connecticut had been removed from the list of nine States and four Provinces which Masons of the English Constitution may not visit. The Chairman of the Board expressed the hope that soon all Prince Hall Grand Lodges in North America would be recognized. In reviewing the precautions to be taken before an unknown person is permitted to visit a lodge in England, the Chairman of the Board referred to a situation that is not widely known to Masons outside England: "There are Lodges of unrecognized constitutions meeting in England, and care must be taken that their members are not admitted to our meetings."

ILLINOIS

Springfield, Illinois, October, 1995

A novel way, which the Grand Master said he had borrowed from Texas, to raise funds for a charity directed to the needs of children was initiated by him and called *Pennies for Children*. "Last year," M.W. Bro. John Loudon reminded Grand Lodge, "I simply asked each lodge to place a container in their lodge in which brethren could deposit their pennies and pocket change in the hope that during the year it would grow and grow. I believe there is no question that has occurred." He announced that the scheme would be continued in the following year and that every effort would be made to meet or exceed the current year's total.

In previous years the task of raising funds for the Grand Lodge Drug and Alcohol Abuse Programme through the sale of Masonic Christmas cards had been contracted out to a private company, which of course kept a proportion of the contributions as its fee for services rendered. M.W. Bro. Loudon substituted Masonic lapel pins for Christmas cards and had one sent to every member with a request for a donation. Also, he had the administrative work in connection with the project handled by the Grand Lodge office staff, rather than by a professional fund raiser, "so that no portion of your donation would have to go elsewhere other than to pay for the cost of the pin and the mailing." He reported that the response was immediate: the net costs were exceeded within three or four days and \$243,000 contributed to the Substance Abuse Programme.

The Grand Master made a strong appeal for support for the three Masonic youth groups: the DeMolays, Jobs Daughters and the Rainbow Girls. "A primary need of our youth," he said, "continues to be capable and devoted leaders. Every Master Mason should consider taking part and assisting in some way with one of our youth groups."

Following the delivery and approval of his Annual Report to Grand Lodge, M.W. Bro. Loudon referred to his proposal to experiment with an event to be known as a Grand Master's Festival. He described it as "a meeting in which a petitioner who has been regularly elected to receive the degrees of a symbolic lodge can attend and receive all three degrees, Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason on the same day." It was his belief that the traditional method of advancing a member one degree at a time, with an obligatory interval between each degree, no longer met the needs of all applicants in today's society and that Masonry must adapt to changing conditions. He indicated that he had talked with other Grand Masters who had had excellent results with this method of conferring degrees. After some debate a majority of Grand Lodge authorized three experiments of this type during the ensuing year.

INDIANA

Indianapolis, Indiana, May, 1995

International Masonic friendship was reflected in the formal opening of the 178th Annual Communication of Grand Lodge when "M.W. Bro. C. Edwin Drew, Grand Master of Masons in Canada in the Province of Ontario, and the Grand Master of Masons in Indiana, Michael D. Brumback, took their places on the dais while the colour bearers displayed the Flag of the United States and the Flag of Canada side by side." Afterwards, members of Grand Lodge sang *Two Countries by the Sea*, and the colours of the two nations were posted.

Regarding the condition of the Craft, M.W. Bro. Brumback stated in his Annual Address that he could not over-emphasize the enthusiasm that he saw rebuilding in the fraternity. "You only need to look among the assembled leaders here today," he said, "to realize that Freemasonry is again attracting young men. For the last three years, the average age of our candidates, and subsequently our officers, is younger." As strategies for successful recruiting, the Grand Master urged every lodge to upgrade its social and fraternal activities and to make sure that it exudes an air of dignity and class.

As evidence that "Masonry in Indiana is strong and getting stronger," M.W. Bro. Brumback cited the following: "There are numerous healthy signs within our Craft. This year I granted a record number of permissions to hold outdoor degrees, visit other lodges to confer degrees, have floats in parades, or booths at fairs and festivals. These are all healthy signs that lodges are realizing that an active lodge is a prosperous lodge."

The requirements of the General Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Indiana with respect to dual membership were amended. The former stipulation read, "A Master Mason may hold membership in not more than two lodges in this Jurisdiction, or one lodge in this and one other Jurisdiction." It was changed to read, "A Master Mason may hold membership in one or more lodges in this Jurisdiction, or in other Jurisdictions."

IRELAND

Belfast, Northern Ireland; Ashford and Dublin, Republic of Ireland,

March, June, October, December, 1995

At the March Quarterly Communication Grand Lodge approved a motion, on the recommendation of the Board of General Purposes, amending the Grand Law governing the length of time between degrees. It was decided "to extend the minimum period between the conferral of Craft Degrees from four weeks to twelve weeks."

A recommendation from the Board of General Purposes concerning qualification for admission was approved at the October Quarterly Communication. The previous Grand Lodge Law relating to this matter was rescinded and the following was adopted in its place: "If a Candidate proposed for admission be in any manner maimed, lame or defective, he shall not, as heretofore, require a dispensation; for, in symbolic Masonry, it is his moral worth, not his physical integrity, that justifies his admission."

A highlight of the December Quarterly Communication was the election of the brethren who had been nominated by the Board of General Purposes as the Grand Officers for 1996. M.W. Bro. Darwin H. Templeton, C.B.E., was re-elected as the Grand Master.

Grand Lodge approved the recommendation of the Board of General Purposes that recognition be granted to the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. With this action by the Grand Lodge of Ireland, the recognition of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts became unanimous with the three "Home Grand Lodges."

Also at the December Quarterly Communication Grand Lodge approved the following Motion: "If upon the adoption of a resolution to return the warrant of a lodge to Grand Lodge or the suspension of any lodge or the cancellation of the warrant of any lodge, there remains after satisfaction of all the debts and liabilities of the lodge any property whatsoever the same shall not be distributed among or paid to the members of the lodge but shall be transferred or given to another lodge or paid to a Masonic Charity or Charities or otherwise as may be approved by Grand Lodge."

KANSAS

Salina, Kansas, March, 1996

M.W. Bro. Morris L. Fisher shared with his brethren his understanding of two fundamentals of a personal commitment to Freemasonry: a vision of its potential and a statement of its mission.

(i) **The VISION** *What Masonry is or should become.*

"Freemasonry is universally recognized as the preeminent organization that exemplifies leadership, charity, fellowship, and positive family values within the community, the state, the country and the world at large."

(ii) **The MISSION** *The reason for Masonry's existence.*

"The mission of Kansas Masonry is to provide for its members opportunities for personal growth through fellowship, education, service, leadership experience, and increased self-esteem through recognition and the opportunity to give something back to their community. The mission outside of the fraternity is to fulfil charitable needs, display positive family values and offer leadership to the community. By fulfilling this mission, the fraternity will grow and prosper as good men seek to join and remain associated with men of high principle and character, as taught by FreeMasonry."

The Bylaws of the Grand Lodge of Kansas were amended with respect to plural memberships. A member of a Kansas lodge has been permitted in the past to hold membership in more than one lodge in that jurisdiction, or in a lodge in Kansas and in a lodge or lodges in one or more jurisdictions with which the Grand Lodge had fraternal relations. However, a Kansas Mason has not been permitted to hold office in more than one lodge simultaneously. The previous legislation was amended by the deletion of the words "provided that he cannot hold offices in more than one lodge at the same time." "Many lodges within this Grand Jurisdiction," it was explained to Grand Lodge, "do not have sufficient officers and they are unable to recruit from their limited membership officers for their lodges. Changing these by-laws would allow some of the lodges to commingle their officers and once again fill the chairs."

The traditional requirement that there be seven Masons present for a lodge to be opened was relaxed in the case of small lodges. An amendment was passed that permits a lodge with fewer than forty members on its roll to open with as few as five Master Masons present, provided that they are members of the lodge entitled to vote.

MANITOBA

Winnipeg, Manitoba, June, 1996

In his annual Address to the 121st Annual Communication, M.W. Bro. Stephen F. Kane said that whenever possible he had urged every lodge to adopt a vision for its future. "In order to see where you are going," he continued, "you must look at where you are now. That is a frightening experience to any lodge that is not very active. But defining your current reality is the necessary first step. Some lodges have done so and

are now proceeding down the right path." He suggested to Masters and Wardens that the answers given by each lodge to the questions on the application for the Grand Master's Achievement Award would give a good indication of that lodge's current health.

The Grand Master reported that he had made a start on his plan to give the Grand Lodge of Manitoba a "home page on the World Wide Web," although it had not been possible to complete the project in the current year. "We have the technology," he stated, "and we should be using it to full advantage. In order to attract members we have to go to where they are, and they are on the Internet."

With reference to relations with the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Minnesota, M.W. Bro. Kane stated that the matter had not yet been resolved. He reported that in a recent conversation the Prince Hall Grand Master stated that they wanted full recognition, saying that it was his understanding that a formal letter had been sent to Manitoba requesting such recognition. M.W. Bro. Kane told Grand Lodge that he had assured the Prince Hall Grand Master that the letter had not been received, whereupon the Prince Hall Grand Master said that he would see that an official request for that status would be sent without delay. Since the letter had not been forthcoming, M.W. Bro. Kane commented that "until we receive a request there seems little need to make changes."

Among the distinguished visitors were M.W. Bro. David Bradley and M.W. Bro. Robert Davies of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario. The latter spoke briefly thanking the Grand Lodge of Manitoba for its hospitality and conveying greetings from M.W. Bro. Durward Greenwood, who sent his regrets that he was unable to be present.

The Grand Master informed Grand Lodge that he had granted a dispensation for a lodge to confer all three degrees in a one-day session. "Very strict rules and guidelines," he emphasized, "were laid down regarding the procedures to be followed." He pointed out that the candidates were permitted to wear their Master Mason aprons but could not receive their certificates until they had proved their proficiency in the three degrees in the usual way.

MASSACHUSETTS

Boston, Massachusetts, March, June, September, December, 1995

The Committee on Foreign Relations gave Grand Lodge official notification at the March Quarterly Communication that the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, which recently had been recognized as regular by the United Grand Lodge of England, had requested formal recognition. This was recommended by the committee and approved unanimously by Grand Lodge.

In his Annual Address M.W. Bro. David W. Lovering remarked on the historical significance of the recognition of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge. "It is interesting to note," he said, "that this is the third time that recognition has been requested by Prince Hall and the second time that a favourable vote has been taken. In 1947, this Grand Lodge voted to recognize the legitimacy of Prince Hall. This vote was rescinded in 1949 due to the withdrawal of recognition of our Grand Lodge by a number of other Grand Lodges. We were 48 years ahead of our time. In 1970, no vote was taken because of the position of the United Grand Lodge of England. There is much literature and many dissertations on this subject, and it is my hope that all of this is now behind us and we can now offer the hand of friendship to these Brothers."

The culmination of these events occurred at the June Quarterly Communication with the formal reception of M.W. Bro. Edgar McLean of the Prince Hall Grand

Lodge of Massachusetts, together with several of his officers. M.W. Bro. McLean responded to the welcome extended to him saying, "Let us as men and Masons experience and enjoy the reality and truth of that great scriptural statement familiar to Master Masons wherever dispersed over the face of the earth, 'BEHOLD HOW GOOD AND HOW PLEASANT IT IS FOR BRETHREN TO DWELL TOGETHER IN UNITY.'" He pointed out that in extending mutual recognition they were adhering to that Landmark of Masonry which proclaims that every Mason has the right of visitation. He stressed that recognition is desirable because it promotes fraternal growth, enables contact, enables interchange of thoughts and ideas between Grand Lodges and subordinate lodges and promotes friendship, brotherly love and affection.

M.W. Bro. Lovering reported to the December Quarterly Communication that permission had been granted to one lodge to raise forty-two candidates in a two day period in what were stipulated as "carefully controlled procedures." The Grand Master gave this assessment of the event: "While some things might change if we were to do this again, all in all the experiment was successful."

MINNESOTA

Bloomington, Minnesota, April, 1996

M.W. Bro. Jack A. Benson commented in his Address to the 143rd Annual Communication of Grand Lodge on the importance of the success of the current Leadership Programme. It was his belief that "the element of leadership in our lodges is all important, since without good proactive, excited leaders, we will not have anything to be excited about."

The appointment during the year of an Executive Director was reported on by the Grand Master. He said that he had benefited from the new position because "the Executive Director has helped me do many things that might not have been done otherwise." Although he felt improvements could be made in the concept, the Grand Master considered it "a great success thus far." The Grand Secretary wrote in his report of the advantages to him: "With the addition of the Executive Director to the office staff many of the former duties of the Grand Secretary have been transferred to his desk."

Resulting from the recognition by Grand Lodge, in 1991, of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge "as co-existing within the same territorial limits," it was necessary to amend the relevant clause in the Constitution. Grand Lodge approved a new clause, as follows: "This Grand Lodge has supreme and exclusive jurisdiction, as exercised, within its territorial limits, over all matters of Ancient Free and Accepted Masonry, and accepts the right of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of Minnesota as having supreme and exclusive jurisdiction over matters pertaining to that Grand Lodge."

Grand Lodge wrote a new Standing Resolution with respect to Freemasonry and Religion. The Motion gave these reasons: "Freemasonry has been accused of being a religion by various uninformed individuals or groups who would criticize the fraternity, and a simple statement explaining Freemasonry's stand on religion could be used to ward off uninformed accusations." The Resolution is based on the recommendations of the National Masonic Information Centre. These have been adopted by several Grand Lodges with a view to formulating a common position regarding the politically sensitive issue of religion. A few of the principal points made in this statement are that Masonry is not a religion nor a substitute for religion. Although it requires its members to hold a belief in a single God, it does not advocate any sectarian theology or practice the rituals of any sect. It does not permit the discussion of religion at its meetings. It

requires that there be at every formal Masonic meeting an open copy of "The Volume of the Sacred Law," which to Christians is the Bible and to men of other faiths is the book which to them is divinely inspired.

MONTANA

Havre, Montana, June, 1995

The Grand Master told the 129th Annual Communication how proud he was to have seen in his travels so many lodges in all parts of the State with established programmes to "make contact with their aged and ailing Brothers and Masonic widows, to work with the youth of their community and to contribute to local charities and participate in community activities." M.W. Bro. LeRoy Hagen stressed that there is no substitute for an energetic lodge programme "with good leadership taking an active part in the community, supporting schools and churches, youth programmes and local charities. Our candidates come from the community so we must let them know that we are here. My Brothers, if we are to receive the recognition we so desire, we must do something to deserve it. Let us continue to put Masonry to work."

A committee which had been given the mandate to rewrite the Statutes and Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Montana submitted its recommendations for a revised Constitution. One recommended change in the Constitution proposed that in some cases it is proper to recognize more than one Grand Lodge in a given state, province or other political entity. The new clause stipulated that if, in the same political area, two Grand Lodges are "established and work in harmony with each other, without conflict of jurisdiction, and in recognition of each other, recognition may be extended to each." Another recommended change in previous practice was: "Members of lodges in this Jurisdiction may sit with a person not recognized as a Mason by the Grand Lodge of Montana" in certain circumstances which were set forth in considerable detail.

One other revision of the Constitution is of note: "Should any matter of difference or contention arise between the Grand Lodge of Montana and any other Masonic Jurisdiction recognized by it, the Grand Lodge of Montana agrees to submit the matter to arbitration and will not resort to edicts of non-communication."

NEVADA

Henderson, Nevada, November, 1995

In his Address to the 131st Annual Communication, M.W. Bro. Clarence Shead reported two phenomena that several other Grand Masters have commented on in their annual reports. First, although there are fewer applications for admission than was the case in the years following World War II, the number of applicants is slowly but steadily increasing each year. Secondly, there seem to be differences in the nature of the applicants. "I noticed," said the Grand Master, "that a large majority of the new Brothers coming into lodges this year are younger than the last several years. (Maybe this is just that I am older!) The new Brothers seemed to be better informed as to what the Craft was all about, and a lot of them had studied Masonry before they had petitioned. It was very refreshing to talk to them about what they expected from their membership."

The importance of working with young people was recognized by the Grand Master in his Proclamation that March was DeMolay Month. The Proclamation required "the constituent lodges to participate with a DeMolay Chapter, if one is located in their area. If not, any youth organization may be substituted for DeMolay." Each lodge was instructed to report to the Grand Secretary its activities in this regard.

The same recognition of the importance of the youth of the community may be seen in another Proclamation by M.W. Bro. Shead. He proclaimed that a specified week in April was Public School Observance Week and required "the constituent lodges to observe the same, with programmes and activities of a public nature where possible, and report their activities to the office of the Grand Secretary."

The chairman of the DeMolay Committee reported that one chapter "is growing and having a lot of fun," whereas two others are languishing because of lack of support. Commenting on this condition the chairman observed, "There are a few dedicated Masons that help DeMolay. Most would rather throw money at them than give them a few hours of their time."

NEW BRUNSWICK

Saint John, New Brunswick, May, 1996

In making a recommendation regarding special recognition of a son of a Mason joining the Craft, the Board of General Purposes took a middle position. It proposed that being the son of a Mason be recognized by a medal, the so-called *Lewis Medal*, (given to him at no expense to the lodge or to Grand Lodge) but that no reduction be made in the age requirement of twenty-one years for initiation.

The Jurisprudence Committee reported that it approved wearing Masonic regalia at functions of DeMolay and Rainbow Girls. By way of limitation, however, it proposed that this should be "only on special occasions by permission of the Grand Master."

The members of the Order of DeMolay in Moncton, and the Masons working with them, were accorded a signal honour when the Canadian Supreme Council of the Order and the Canadian DeMolay Parliament chose that city for their Annual Meetings. In his report to Grand Lodge the liaison with DeMolay expressed a sentiment frequently found in such reports in other jurisdictions: "It is impossible for me to take the role of bystander or reporter. The more I become involved with DeMolay, the more I want to do. The enthusiasm of the boys is contagious."

Grand Lodge gave a further mark of its support for programmes with an orientation towards young people. It gave formal approval to the addition of a new section to the Constitution "stating this Grand Lodge recognized the principles and objectives of the Order of DeMolay and the International Order of Rainbow for Girls."

In his Report as Grand Master to the 129th Annual Communication, M.W. Bro. William Henry Balsler Jr indicated that almost all of his renewal objectives had been accomplished. "The vision of the Renewal Programme," he stated, "is to *Rekindle Masonry in New Brunswick*. With this vision in mind we have adopted the following mission statement: (1) Restore pride in Masonry; (2) Promote Masonry as a way of life; (3) Develop leadership."

Among the accomplishments during the past year which the Grand Historian commented on was the formation by the Grand Master of "Past Master groups, at the district level, to serve as back up workers for lodges in the district who may suddenly need an Officer or Lecturer to put on Degree work."

On the initiative of the Grand Secretary, Grand Lodge decided that each member will be issued with a Voting Card approximately 2" by 4". When a *counted vote* is being taken a member will stand and hold up the appropriate card to vote affirmatively or negatively.

NEW HAMPSHIRE

Manchester, New Hampshire, November, 1995, May, 1996

At the 207th Annual Communication in May, 1996, M.W. Bro. Douglas Robertson commended the Matching Fund Programme as a strong stimulus in the development

of local Masonic programmes. In this way "matching funds are available to those lodges that sponsor fund raising events for a given Community Project and are not to be matched with funds taken from the lodge's Treasury." Since the purpose of the programme is not only to give assistance to worthy community projects but also to increase public awareness of the involvement of Masons in the welfare community, the Grand Master suggested that "the presentation of these Matching Funds should be done at the lodge thereby affording the Mason and the non-Mason an opportunity to learn more about Masonry."

M.W. Bro. Robertson challenged Members of Grand Lodge to ask themselves what they had done recently to assist the youth of New Hampshire, who are the future leaders of the country. "Five dedicated men from your lodge," he said, "could make a big difference in improving the attitude of the young people in the Community. We all have to know that somebody cares and we can make the difference in their lives."

An amendment to the Grand Constitution, which had been proposed at the Semiannual Communication in the previous November, was approved by Grand Lodge. A paragraph was added to the section in which the secretary of each lodge was mandated to submit a monthly report (by the 15th day of the following month) of the degree work done by the lodge, together with other information required by Grand Lodge. The amendment authorized the Grand Secretary at his discretion to levy a fine of \$10.00 against a lodge in any month in which its monthly report is late.

The Grand Secretary reported that requests are received frequently for "verification of membership for deceased family members dating back, in many instances, to the 17th and 18th centuries." Genealogists involved in researching New Hampshire family histories will be interested in a project recently undertaken by the Grand Secretary. He indicated that, although it will take several years to complete, the Masonic record of everyone who ever belonged to a lodge in New Hampshire eventually will be added to the Grand Lodge computer database.

The Committee on Fraternal Correspondence recommended that the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts "be granted recognition for the purpose of visitation." The recommendation was approved unanimously by Grand Lodge.

NEW MEXICO

Albuquerque, New Mexico, March, 1996

The 119th Annual Communication was congratulated in a way that may have seemed unusual. "The Craft is in much better shape than some may realize or readily admit," M.W. Bro. Larry Packwood said "and it is because of two factors: you and mistakes. Actually, maybe I should say, 'you and your willingness to make some mistakes.' You made this Grand Lodge year different and by doing so, you made a difference in this Grand Lodge. It will never be the same." This resulted from a programme which the Grand Master stated was "our biggest, most dynamic, most successful and most productive effort" ALL THE WAY IN ONE DAY. He described it as one in which all candidates "have the EA and FC proficiencies waived and will only be required to give the MM proficiency to have all the rights and privileges of a Master Mason."

It was the Grand Master's hope that older Masons individually would take a personal interest in newly raised Master Masons and assist them to see "that there is more to Masonry than boring, repetitious, regular meetings . . . Don't do the same old things in the same old way. Continue your creative and imaginative ways to animate our gatherings and we'll all be the better for it."

Following the success of "All the Way in a Day," M.W. Bro. Packwood announced in his Address that later in the communication he would launch the greatest

programme ever considered by Grand Lodge, to be called YOUTH AT RISK, which would "stretch our imaginations, our pocket books, our physical, emotional and spiritual make ups like nothing else before it." Our young people need "models of Responsibility and Moral Values," he said, urging his brethren to have minds "full of the possibilities of a new and better tomorrow for the youth of our communities, who are facing a world that is more frightening and outright dangerous than anything" before, including the dangers of "drug abuse, alcohol abuse, physical abuse, gang membership and suicidal tendencies."

The Grand Master referred to the existing Grand Lodge Youth Identification Programme and congratulated a district that had been particularly active in it. According to a report in the local media, authorities in the Dallas area had been assisted in finding a missing youth by the Masonic Fingerprinting Programme.

The recommendation of the Foreign Correspondence Committee was approved that the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of New Mexico be granted full Masonic recognition, "including privileges of visitation and affiliation, and all other rights and privileges customarily incident to recognition."

NEW YORK

New York City, New York, May, 1996

In reply to a question whether only members of the clergy are eligible for appointment as Grand Chaplains, the judge advocate wrote: "When a Master appoints a *Lodge Chaplain* the members expect only that the Brother selected has the experience, temperament and sagacity essential for that lofty position," as sometimes a subordinate lodge does not have a clergyman in its membership. He observed that in the Section of the Constitution relevant to the appointment of *Grand Chaplains* "there is no requirement that a Grand Chaplain be ordained or other religious leader." If the Grand Lodge intended that only clergymen would be eligible it would have been so specified. The judge advocate's answer to the question, therefore, was "No," the Grand Chaplain need not be a clergyman.

A revised mission statement for the Grand Lodge Library recently was adopted, which was designed to reflect the ways in which the library had changed in recent years and also to shape it to meet the future needs of its patrons. The mission of the library, as set forth in the new statement, "is to collect, preserve, interpret and make available for education and research, to both members of the Fraternity and others, such materials as relate to the history, philosophy, culture, and organization of Freemasonry, in its social and historical context, with a special emphasis upon Freemasonry in the State of New York."

The New York Masonic Library is helping to form a consortium of Masonic Libraries in North America to facilitate the sharing of facilities and resources. At a recent meeting, Masonic librarians were in attendance from six of the United States, the District of Columbia and Ontario. In addition to meeting the needs of patrons within the fraternity, the expanded view of the role of a Grand Lodge Library, being developed by this consortium, includes being "a medium by which the greater public and the scholarly community are educated about Freemasonry." In this way, "the Library consciously counters the anti-Masonic forces which continue to prosper by distributing misinformation and duping the gullible." During the year it had served patrons from 28 scholarly institutions: 16 colleges and universities, including Harvard, Columbia and Yale; 7 museums, including the British Museum; and 5 historical societies and other local groups. The trustees reported that by using the Internet the library can post information to Masonic bulletin boards and send electronic press

releases and thus "has begun to serve the growing numbers of Masons who communicate electronically and who represent the future of the Fraternity." The Library's electronic address is livmalib@pipeline.com.

NEW ZEALAND

Hamilton, New Zealand, November, 1995

An assessment of the results of the first year of implementation of a Lodge Renewal Programme was a central feature of the agenda of the 106th Annual Communication. The programme, undertaken in 1994 to effect changes recommended in the report of a comprehensive professional study by Market Research Ltd. of conditions in the Craft in New Zealand, had been commissioned by Grand Lodge. The report identified a number of internal changes that required urgent attention and also the need "to reverse some of the negative thinking and apathetic attitudes" in the Craft.

M.W. Bro. Daniel Holmes addressed Grand Lodge upon his Installation for a second term. "The last twelve months," he said, "have for me been an amazing mixture of highs and lows; highs when I see first hand the gathering momentum of Lodge Renewal and a growing awareness about Freemasonry from the wider public."

The lows to which the Grand Master referred were caused by those who resisted all thought of change. He confessed that he had "been disappointed at times to hear the negatives, the reasons why this or that won't work. Equally disappointing are those who I see pursuing opposite or private agendas of their own." He recognized that it is inevitable that in every organization there are those who take a selfish and negative position and loudly proclaim at every opportunity "this is the way it has been done for fifty years" or "it's the way I've always enjoyed" or "there's no way I'm going to be part of such change."

It was the belief of M.W. Bro. Holmes that, though the actions of some may at times be counterproductive, the Craft is strong and united. He stated his confidence that "there is now a much wider recognition and acceptance of the changes that are necessary and there is already a substantial groundswell of positive action."

The chairman of the Board of Benevolence defended the policy of not spending all of the interest which was received from investments. He stressed the need to build up a reserve for the future. Although "the Fund of Benevolence was established by Masons for the benefit of aged Masons, their widows and families," the Fund has grown to the point where the Board now sponsors "some non-Masonic applications and also many district and lodge applications which have no Masonic connotation at all but still come within the policies of the Board." For nine years Grand Lodge has funded the chair of Geriatric Medicine at the University but the scope of the work of the department, which receives world recognition, has so increased that the time is approaching when Grand Lodge may no longer be able to be the sole sponsor of this work.

NORTH DAKOTA

Minot, North Dakota, June, 1995

The theme for the year chosen by M.W. Bro. Curtiss Mundahl was "Reach to the Stars with Quality Education, Membership and Fun." He expressed the hope that the Masons of North Dakota found it a challenge to learn, to enjoy and to work together. Regarding *Education*: Grand Lodge has continued to support the Educational Alternative Proficiency Programme. Various educational materials, pamphlets and videos have been purchased from sister Grand Jurisdictions and other sources and made available to lodges requesting them. *Membership*: lodges were encouraged to hold promotional events, such as an Open House, so as to make non-Masons better

informed concerning the Craft. *Quality Fun*: Emphasis was placed on fun as a significant element of Masonry, so that the brethren would enjoy lodge functions and be eager to attend.

Concerning the condition of Masonry the Grand Master observed that while many lodges were continuing the downward slide to fewer members, others were showing remarkable growth and signs of new vitality. In answer to the question, "Why are some lodges being successful, while others are not?" he gave his hearers an explanation. "Many lodges," he said, "are having more visibility within their communities by doing different projects and are trying some different programmes to stimulate more interest. Where lodges are involved and the Craft is enthused, the lodges are prospering."

The Committee for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children reported another successful year with the Masonic Model Student Assistance Programme. This was described as a programme "which brings together school, community, family and youth in a working partnership which offers assistance to students who may be currently experiencing problems, or those who may be at risk for problems." In short, it is "an identification and referral mechanism." The six elements of an effective programme are prevention, identification, assessment, intervention, treatment referrals and support/case management. "The role of Freemasonry," the report stated, "is to provide organizational assistance, arrangement of facilities, background support and financial support. Masonic financial assistance is used to provide meeting facilities, informational brochures," and accommodation for those participating in the programme. The aim of the programme is to develop a trained body of teachers and educational administrators competent to identify and able to arrange the provision of help for at-risk children. The funds for the North Dakota Masonic Model Student Assistance Programme comes from a grant from Grand Lodge and from pledges of support from individual lodges.

NOVA SCOTIA

Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, June, 1996

M.W. Bro. Gordon F. Conrad devoted a part of his annual Address to the 131st Annual Communication to react to suggestions occasionally made by those who, in his words, still pose questions pertaining to the ritual. "Our Ritual, my brethren," he said, "has always been very close to my heart. To me it is a work of art, and like all works of art it is valuable not merely for what it represents but what it suggests to the mind. This is true, whether the work of art be a poem, a painting or a piece of music. The material representation may be good, the technique beyond criticism but if no thought of feeling is suggested, we soon tire of them. So, too, our Ritual. It suggests to our minds great thoughts, in simple, homely words. To the humblest mind there is a lesson that it can understand; to the noblest of men, grander truths are clearly taught. Do not change it by a word even if some of the phrases are quaint and passing out of current use. Hold on to them and fix them in your memory. Let the Craftsmen hear them again and again and so ever after to influence their daily life and conduct."

The Grand Master announced that an exchange of Grand Representatives with the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ontario had been approved. "This is an important event," he observed, "as it marks the first exchange of Grand Representatives with any Prince Hall Grand Lodge in the long history of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia."

Although decreasing membership is of concern to all, M.W. Bro. Conrad asked whether the lodges were doing as much as they could to reduce the number of suspensions and demits. He suggested that every lodge appoint a committee to investigate each case individually to determine the reasons both for the nonpayment

of dues and for the request for a demit. If the number of suspensions and demits were reduced by two for each lodge, he pointed out, there no longer would be a decrease in the membership in Nova Scotia.

The Grand Master expressed his concern that some Masters were trying to solve the problem of membership reduction by excessive emphasis on recruitment of new members. "Depend upon it, when Masons are made indiscriminately," he warned, "sooner or later dissensions will appear which will be hard to heal. Let it not be a matter of congratulation as to the number of Masons made or the number of degrees conferred by a Master during his term in office. Rather, let him point with pride to the quality of the material he has brought for the building."

Marching in a public procession with regalia was authorized for a Remembrance Day Ceremony, a St. John's Day Service, presentation of a Freemasons' Scholarship or any other Masonic purpose.

OHIO

Toledo, Ohio, October, 1995

As the Grand Lodge Reviewing Officers routinely examine the inspection reports of the subordinate lodges they occasionally encounter an indication that a lodge had not complied fully with the Masonic Code or with a directive from the Grand Master. If the same irregularity is seen in two consecutive years, the matter is referred to the Grand Master for such action as may be deemed appropriate. In the current year five such cases were referred to him and, as he reported to the 186th Annual Communication, it became his unfortunate duty to place the offending lodges on probation. M.W. Bro. James Olmstead made it quite clear that the penalty for noncompliance with the Code was no idle threat, when he said "I sincerely hope that the officers of the lodges listed have taken prompt action to rectify these irregularities thereby avoiding the loss of their charters."

In introducing the question of recognition of Prince Hall Masonry, the Grand Master reviewed the steps which he had taken, along with the Deputy Grand Master and other officers of Grand Lodge, to establish contact with the Grand Master of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ohio, together with a number of his Grand Officers, with a view to establishing the position of each Grand Lodge. M.W. Bro. Olmstead reported that the Prince Hall Masons in Ohio "are not interested in becoming part of the Grand Lodge of Ohio. They are not interested in having anything to do with merger. They have 8,000 proud Masons in their Grand Lodge and they want to continue with their own Grand Lodge Jurisdiction. But, in view of the fact that their roots are the same as ours, their ritual is basically the same as ours, they merely are requesting that they be able to reach across the table and take the hand of a Mason in brotherly love."

The preliminary meetings produced mutually acceptable wording for a resolution that was signed by both Grand Masters and by both Deputy Grand Masters, with a joint undertaking that the resolution would be presented to both Grand Lodges for formal acceptance. M.W. Bro. Olmstead advised Grand Lodge that the Prince Hall Grand Lodge some two months previously had given formal approval to mutual recognition. The Fraternal Relations Committee, in its report, recommended "that the Grand Lodge of Ohio recognize The Prince Hall Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of Ohio, Inc. for visitation only in accordance with agreement" between the two Grand Masters. The approval of the committee's recommendation by Grand Lodge paved the way for a formal visit later in the communication by the Prince Hall Grand Master and a delegation of his officers.

OKLAHOMA

Guthrie, Oklahoma, November, 1995

M.W. Bro. James Onkst, in his Address to the 87th Annual Communication, presented an interesting study in contrasts. He spoke of the old and the new in Masonry: a traditional Masonic ceremony from years gone by and *avant-garde* visions of practices as yet unknown that may become commonplace in the Masonry of the future.

For the traditional: The Grand Master reported that he had convened the Grand Lodge officers "for the purpose of enacting the eighth landmark, the prerogative of the Grand Master to make a 'Mason at Sight.' I opened Grand Lodge on an Occasional Lodge and proceeded to confer the Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason degrees with all lectures, symbolisms and charges." The Grand Master stated that, as the candidate had been a "Mason in his Heart" long before he petitioned the Grand Lodge for membership, Oklahoma Masonry in his judgement is better off with him as a member.

For the avant-garde: M.W. Bro. Onkst stated, "One of the things that came from the Directional Planning Committee was establishing of new and innovative lodges. These lodges would be tried on an experimental basis in the large metropolitan areas. Mainly in the downtown business districts. They could meet during the day and attempt to attract the professional work force we so desperately need and have lost." Although a 'lodge for the 21st century' had not yet been established, the Grand Master expressed the sincere hope that it would happen in the near future. "Much planning and work still remains to be done," he continued, "but it can happen if we keep an open mind and try some new unconventional approaches. They are the kind of changes Masonry may need to make to compete and survive. Our virtues and principles will not be harmed. Meetings, methods of petitioning, recruitment, selection and streamlining degrees may change. All I ask is that you look at it with an open mind and give it a chance. It may be just what we need."

In speaking of the state of the Craft, M.W. Bro. Onkst added a note of warning concerning change: "We are the oldest, largest and most prestigious fraternity in the world. We should never change our values. We must change but let's not chip away at the foundation that has held us above the others and outlasted others." Saying that something can be so watered down that it loses its flavour, he concluded: "Masonry is a lot like that. Be careful of what you change."

OREGON

Portland, Oregon, June, 1995

"My principal goal as Grand Master," said M.W. Bro. John Harvey in his Address to the 145th Annual Communication, "was to find a solution to our problem with Idaho and I am sorry to report that I have failed to do so." He indicated that during the previous two years he had met with his opposite number in the Grand Lodge of Idaho on ten occasions. "We have been friends for years," said M.W. Bro. Harvey, "and we were able to discuss the subject objectively and without anger, but without results. Suggestions were made by me; however, they were not acceptable to him. He made a few suggestions also, but they proved unacceptable to me. Every problem has a solution, but this one has evaded me and those I have consulted with."

The conclusion of the matter, as M.W. Bro. Harvey put it to Grand Lodge, was: "It is a deplorable situation and a sad state when brethren can not associate. However, our Code is clear on that subject. It is evident to me that Idaho cannot rescind recognition of Prince Hall and in two years I have not been so foolish as to demand

that they do so. Therefore, it appears that we are locked into position by the dictates of our Code. We have reached a stalemate."

PENNSYLVANIA

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, June, December, 1995

The Pennsylvania Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children reported to the June Quarterly Communication concerning the training of Law Enforcement Officers to work in elementary schools instructing students to resist drugs, alcohol and peer pressure. The training programme takes eighty hours over a two week period and is conducted by the D.A.R.E. Training Centre of the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency. (D.A.R.E. is the acronym for Drug Abuse Resistance Education.) This programme is funded by the Masonic Foundation and operates very much like that provided by the Foundation for the training of educators in the Student Assistance Programme of the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

The continuing success in its third year of the Annual Masonic Walk and Run of 5k (3.1 miles) was described also by the Foundation. The purpose of this event is "to increase the awareness of drug and alcohol activities in the City of Philadelphia and to promote positive physical and mental health." The proceeds go to community anti-drug and alcohol organizations. The Foundation suggested that an incidental benefit of the event, from the point of view of Grand Lodge, was the opportunity which it provided to promote the Grand Master's Friend to Friend Programme by inviting friends, relatives and others to attend as spectators, thus making Freemasonry more visible in the community. The event is "a joint effort of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Philadelphia School District, Welcome America, the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge and the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania."

The Grand Master, R.W. Bro. George Hohenschildt, directed the December Quarterly Communication to give its consideration to a Statement on Freemasonry and Religion which had been developed by the Masonic Information Centre to express Freemasonry's position relative to religion. The Grand Master stated that the Information Centre had requested each Grand Lodge to adopt officially this position statement. It examined the relationship of Freemasonry and Religion under the following headings: (i) Basic Principles; (ii) The Supreme Being; (iii) Volume of the Sacred Law; (iv) The Oath of Freemasonry; (v) Freemasonry Compared with Religion and (vi) Freemasonry Supports Religion. Grand Lodge gave unanimous approval of the Statement on Freemasonry and Religion as written by the Masonic Information Centre.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Montague, Prince Edward Island, June, 1995

M.W. Bro. Malcolm Patterson told the 120th Annual Communication that he had had the privilege during his term of office to introduce two initiatives to Prince Edward Island Masonry, namely the Penny-a-Day Programme and the Friend-to-Friend Programme.

The Grand Master reminded Grand Lodge that the gradual decrease of revenues from dues and fees in recent years had reached the point where they no longer adequately funded the provision of information and services to the constituent lodges and not even the regular expenses of office supplies, printing and the like. The Penny-a-Day programme not only met these routine needs but also enabled Grand Lodge to

produce a text about Prince Edward Island Freemasonry. This was, in the Grand Master's judgement, something that "was and is a necessary tool to use for encouraging and providing information to prospective Candidates, men of quality who show interest in this wonderful fraternity of Freemasonry. The pamphlet made possible by the Penny-a-Day Programme contains a short overview of Masonic Degrees, information on what Freemasonry is, who Masons are, what they believe in and do, and the qualifications needed to become one."

Another of the Grand Master's initiatives was the Friend-to-Friend Programme, which was "designed to help lodges enlighten friends of Masons by providing more opportunities to get to know us better and to consider joining us." Its purpose is to display the fraternity and its philosophy to the members of the community in general and to potential candidates in particular. M.W. Bro. Patterson thanked the Grand Lodge officers who undertook to introduce the programme to the lodges. The success of this effort to rejuvenate Prince Edward Island Masonry with new members and resources, he told the officers and members of the constituent lodges, was in their hands. He warned them that the Friend-to-Friend Programme "will not, in itself, produce the desired results without their further support and dedicated energy."

The Grand Master referred to a new quarterly publication, to be known as the *ISLAND FREEMASON*, that he and the Deputy Grand Master had recently launched. He hoped that it would be an informative and educational newsletter. It will be "prepared entirely by volunteers at their own cost and made freely available to all lodges for reproduction and circulation to their members if they so wish."

QUEBEC

Montreal, Quebec, June, 1996

In relating outstanding events during the year the Grand Master, in his Address to the 126th Annual Communication, paid particular attention to the fraternal relations which he enjoyed with two Grand Masters from Sister Jurisdictions. The first of these was when he was invited by M.W. Bro. Brothers, Grand Master of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ontario and Jurisdiction, to accompany him on the occasion of his official visit to the Prince Hall lodges located in Montreal, which he found most enjoyable.

M.W. Bro. Clifford Forshaw indicated that he was pleased to receive, on the second occasion, the Grand Master and the Assistant Grand Master of the National Grand Lodge of France, together with visitors from lodges in France. The purpose of the visit was to preside over the twinning of two lodges on the register of the Grand Lodge of Quebec with two lodges on the register of the National Grand Lodge of France. "The twinning ceremony," M.W. Bro. Forshaw commented, "was a most interesting one and after brief remarks from Grand Master Charbonniaud and myself, we exchanged gifts as a memento of the occasion. Grand Master Charbonniaud proved to be a most interesting and well informed speaker."

Following the account of the twinning of two lodges in Quebec with two in France, M.W. Bro. Forshaw made a novel suggestion with respect to the twinning of lodges. "I would encourage lodges," he proposed, "to consider twinning distant lodges in this jurisdiction. This should encourage more frequent fraternal visits between lodges and thus strengthen the bond of brotherhood."

The Grand Secretary reported that he had represented Quebec at the organizational meeting of a Conference of Grand Lodges in Atlantic Canada in Saint John, New Brunswick, in September 1995. The members of the newly established Atlantic Conference are the Grand Lodges of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec, as well as the District Grand Lodges in Newfoundland. The Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario, the Grand Lodges of the Western Conference and the

Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ontario and Jurisdiction will be invited to send observers. The officers for 1995/1996 are: M.W. Bro. Balzer (NB), President; R.W. Bro. Leide (Que), Vice President; R.W. Bro. Andrews (NB), Secretary; and R.W. Bro. MacLean (PEI), Treasurer.

M.W. Bro. Durward Greenwood brought greetings from the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario. He expressed his pleasure in seeing "that the Grand Lodge of Quebec is in good hands and stressed a need to inform our youth so that they are aware of our existence and the principles we stand for."

SASKATCHEWAN

Regina, Saskatchewan, June, 1996

M.W. Bro. Robert Chapman concluded his Address to the 90th Annual Communication with two suggestions concerning (i) how to stem the downward trend in membership numbers and (ii) subsequently how to arrange now for improvements later. First, immediate action to reduce present losses: while lodges have no control over the loss of their members by death, they could do a great deal more to reduce the number of suspensions and demits by "practising harmony, communicating more, and promoting more human feeling."

Secondly, long range plans for future improvement: in the Grand Master's judgement the answer undoubtedly is increased support for youth activities, regardless of whether they are community groups such as sandlot baseball, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Guides and particularly Rainbow Girls, Job's Daughters and DeMolay with their Masonic affiliations. As he reminded his brethren: "We have had many Masons come from our youth organizations."

The Lodge Development and Renewal Committee recommended that "the Board of General Purposes approve, in principle, the staging of a province-wide degree day, in a central location, early in 1997." Although the committee recommended "a Masonic Field Day during which all three degrees would be conferred," it gave the following assessment of some of the problems that would have to be considered: "There will need to be strong guidelines approved before such a day could be implemented, covering such areas as ensuring candidate petition approval at lodge level; the need for each candidate to have his coach present at the conferral sessions; the need for each degree to be explained immediately following its conferment; the need for each of the new Masons to prove up in the Third Degree in their own lodges; and the need to continue instruction and involvement in lodge activities to ensure retention."

Another change was announced by M.W. Bro. Ronald Coulson, in his acceptance speech as Grand Master for the ensuing term. "One innovation you will see a year from now," he said, "is the open installation of your Grand Lodge officers. They will have their families in attendance to witness their proudest Masonic moments and one more corner of the veil of secrecy will be lifted."

Grand Lodge approved the following Resolution to amend the Constitution: "BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Grand Lodge of Saskatchewan A.F.&A.M. make provision in the Masonic funeral liturgy to allow for the Masonic rites to be performed at a funeral/memorial service where there is no body or ashes present."

SCOTLAND

Edinburgh, Scotland, February, May, August, November, 1995

At the August Quarterly Communication a recommendation of the Board of Benevolence was approved in principle by Grand Lodge that a National Prize Draw be organized. It was recognized that the draw must be registered with the correct

authority and, furthermore, that the support of the Provincial Grand Lodges would be essential. It was recommended and agreed that the Grand Secretary be named as the promoter and that his office undertake the administration of the project. The Board of Benevolence advised Grand Lodge at the November Quarterly Communication that an application for permission to organize the draw had been submitted to the Gaming Board for Great Britain. It was agreed that the actual draw would take place at an 'At Home' Day, at the Royal Scottish Masonic Home, in Dunblane.

At the Festival of St. Andrew, on November 29, 1995, the speaker at the dinner was M.W. Bro. Knutrud, Sovereign Grand Master of the Norwegian Order of Freemasons. His topic was the development of Masonry generally in Scandinavia and more particularly in Norway. During the 18th and 19th centuries, Norway was joined to Denmark and later to Sweden. In those years Masonry in Norway was greatly influenced by Swedish thinking, which in turn had been moulded largely by Scottish Masonic traditions. Since independence, and especially after the Second World War, Freemasonry has flourished in Norway and has been free to develop in its own way.

M.W. Bro. Knutrud gave an interesting description of Freemasonry in his country. "All Masonic activities in Norway," he explained, "are directed from the Norwegian Order – and it comprises 17,000 members out of Norway's two million men. The Order consists of St. John and St. Andrew Lodges – of Stewards and Provincial Lodges and the Grand Lodge of Norway. We do work in eleven degrees – all based on Christianity. The last decade has been a formidable success, with increasing activity. Most lodges have their weekly meetings from September to May. It is considered to be a lifelong school – to reach up to the tenth degree would take 20 – 25 years. The Sovereign Grand Master bears his collar of office openly in all degrees – so that everyone can see that it consists of nine Temple crosses and nine St. Andrew's crosses linked together. The St. Andrew's crosses are actually the cross of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle with its epigraph: 'Nemo me impune lacessit' – No one will challenge me unpunished."

Masons planning a visit to Edinburgh will applaud the Grand Secretary's announcement of the possibility of expanding the attractive and informative Museum and Library of Grand Lodge.

SOUTH AFRICA

Rynfield, Benoni, Republic of South Africa, September, 1995

The Deputy Grand Master, R.W. Bro. J. T. Bowen, presided over the 34th Annual Communication because M.W. Bro. R. S. Bauser was absent as a result of cardiac surgery. The Grand Master wrote in his annual report, which was read on his behalf, that the revised Constitution had been printed and distributed. He noted, too, that "the Rituals are in the process of being translated and should be available for distribution in English and Afrikaans by June, 1996. The committee recommended a change to the format and these Rituals will now be printed in loose-leaf form."

The effects of instability in a political jurisdiction on a Masonic jurisdiction operating within it can be seen in the decision of the Grand Lodge of South Africa to change the names of two of its districts. The Assistant Grand Master explained "the background to the decision to rename the Transvaal and Natal Divisions to that of: (1) Northern Division, and, (2) Eastern Division. This was in effect because the Transvaal province was no longer in existence and presently consists of four sections. The same applied to Natal as Natal had already been renamed KwaZulu Natal. It was imperative that our divisions should be renamed and not be subject to changes which may take place from time to time."

The Proceedings of this Annual Communication (which bear the title, "The

Minutes of the 34th Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge of South Africa") are recorded in both English and Afrikaans. With the record of the meeting of Grand Lodge are those, also, of the meetings of the four Provincial Grand Lodges (namely, the Southern Division, the Northern Division, the Central Division and the Eastern Division). In addition, an account of the meeting of the Supreme Grand Royal Arch Chapter of South Africa is included, together with reports from its First Grand Principal and from the Grand Superintendents of its central, southern and northern divisions.

SOUTH CAROLINA

Spartanburg, South Carolina, April, 1996

Some months before the 259th Annual Communication, M.W. Bro. Robert Pinkston had received a request, which he had refused, for permission to form a Past District Deputy Grand Masters' Association. "The current District Deputy," he said in explaining his refusal, "is the current Grand Master's representative within that district. He answers to, and reports to, and receives instructions from the Grand Master. Any situation that may come up in his district, where he might need some assistance, he should contact the Grand Master. I do not feel that one Grand Master should allow an Association of this nature to take place, as it could have some repercussion for the Grand Masters who follow him."

The Grand Lodge of South Carolina received during the year requests for recognition from several newly formed Grand Lodges, including Cuba. In reporting its recommendation that Cuba's request be granted, the Committee on Fraternal Relations gave a brief account of South Carolina's Masonic relations with Cuba. "Many years ago when Cuba was undergoing considerable political upheaval and the Grand Lodge officers escaped to the United States and established a Grand Lodge of Cuba in Exile in Florida, the Grand Lodge of South Carolina withdrew formal recognition. Since that time the Grand Lodge of Cuba has been reestablished in Havana and is recognized by many of the Grand Lodges in the United States as regular. On January 2, 1996, a letter was received from the Gran Loggia de Cuba requesting relations be reestablished with South Carolina. It is interesting to note that the Grand Lodge of South Carolina is the Mother Grand Lodge of Cuba having founded the Grand Lodge of Cuba on December 5, 1895."

The Committee on Fraternal Relations remarked on the growing number of Grand Lodges that recognize Prince Hall Masonry: fourteen in the United States and five in Canada, and also those of England and Ireland. The committee stated that Grand Lodge recognizes that travelling and visiting lodges in other regions is becoming more common with Masons. It has, therefore, taken the following action: "Any South Carolina Mason visiting in another Jurisdiction which is recognized as Regular by the Grand Lodge of South Carolina is governed as a Sojourning Mason by the Rules and Regulations of that Grand Lodge in which he is visiting."

"Outdoor meetings," according to the Report of the Masonic Education Committee, "seem to be in all corners of the state from spring to late fall." The committee commended lodges and districts which had outdoor meetings. Also, it praised those which had early morning meetings. The latter, the committee advocated, enabled brothers to attend who otherwise could not do so during the week.

SOUTH DAKOTA

Rapid City, South Dakota, June, 1995

In his annual report to Grand Lodge M.W. Bro. Glen Peterson spoke of the "outpouring of cooperation that allowed the One Day Festival to be completed. We

conferred the three Masonic degrees on 194 new brothers. This was brought to successful fruition only through literally hundreds of hours of planning, great effort and a truly coming together of untold persons (men and women) in a Masonic spirit." In the Recommendations, which he submitted to the 121st Annual Communication, the Grand Master included two that related to the "One Day Festival." One was: "Aggressively pursue Masonic Education, especially the One Day Festival" and the other was "Consider repeating one day degree conferrals, emphasizing that lodges NOT rely on this, thus losing proficiency."

M.W. Bro. Peterson reported that, with the concurrence in each case of the Grand Masters of Kansas and Minnesota, he had initiated contact with the Prince Hall Grand Lodges in those States to examine the question of mutual recognition. He thanked the members of the Committee on Fraternal Relations for their support and stated that the recognition of Prince Hall Masonry was a moral obligation in order "to alleviate old, outdated, un-Masonic prejudices. We are all children of the Great Architect!"

The Jurisprudence Committee raised a matter which, it warned, may give rise to legal difficulties. This relates "to the use of computers by individual members of Grand Lodge with secret work and other publications belonging to Grand Lodge which are placed on computer disks, permanent memory and otherwise within the computers of the individual members. All such materials belong to Grand Lodge. When a member of a committee or any such individual that has placed such information in his computer or on disks, the said disks should be delivered to the Grand Lodge and all such information should be purged from the individual computers. All copies of such materials in the hands of individuals should be destroyed."

With reference to the decision taken by Grand Lodge in 1994 concerning the employment of an Executive Director, the Jurisprudence Committee reported that it had advised the Trustees concerning the "implementation of the Executive Director's office and the moving of the Grand Treasurer-Secretary to a ceremonial and symbolic office." Opponents to the 1994 decisions to employ an Executive Director and to convert the Grand Treasurer-Secretary's role to a "ceremonial and symbolic" nature, proposed amendments to the Constitution that would reverse those decisions. These proposals were defeated, leaving intact the decisions regarding the employment of an Executive Director and the changed functions of the Grand Treasurer-Secretary.

TASMANIA

Launceston, Tasmania, February, 1996

M.W. Bro. P. G. Hodges told the 105th Annual Communication of his pleasure at having seen recently the formation of a College of Wardens in the northern area of Tasmania, similar to the one that has been active in the southern area for many years. The Grand Master foresaw benefits from the newly formed organization in the northern region for, as Junior and Senior Wardens can now start the formation of their Associations as soon as they go into office as Junior Warden, a much closer relationship with members and their ladies in both social and ceremonial functions will ensure greater rewards to all."

As he approached the end of his term in office, M.W. Bro. Hodges reminded the members of Grand Lodge of some of their achievements, working together as partners. These included, he said, "Constitutional changes, minimal ritual change, public relations, revision of the Collected Rulings, financial stability, investigation of tax liability, alteration to Grand Inspectors' requirements, improvements to Masonic buildings, introduction of a Masonic Widows' Association, advertising for membership campaign, and changes to the Board of Benevolence structuring."

TEXAS

Waco, Texas, December, 1995

In a formal Recommendation to Grand Lodge at its 160th Annual Communication M.W. Bro. Farris L. Benham proposed a solution to the difficulty sometimes experienced by a newly initiated brother who is unaware that "the often criticized penalties of the obligation are known to be symbolic and not to be taken literally." The cause of the problem, the Grand Master indicated, was that the candidate was not informed that the penalties are symbolic, not literal. He recognized that other Grand Jurisdictions had sought to remedy the situation, in some cases simply by adding the word "symbolic." It was his opinion, however, that something more explicit was needed, such as the words "suspension, reprimand or expulsion and may my conscience suffer the ancient penalty of . . ." being added at the proper place in the obligation. Such an addition, he suggested, "should eliminate further problems with religious organizations" and clarify a situation "where some oaths are to be taken literally and some are not." He recommended, therefore, that the Committee on Work be directed to bring to the next Annual Communication a proposal for a suitable change to the penalties in the obligations to correct the ambiguities in them. The committee endorsed the Grand Master's Recommendation and it was adopted by Grand Lodge.

The Report of the Committee on Purposes and Policies contained comments and recommendations concerning various Resolutions that had been introduced. One of these recognized that "On occasion, men are admitted into our Fraternity whose religious persuasion is based upon other than the Holy Bible, and if Freemasonry is to practice what it preaches that it is a 'universal brotherhood,' then it behooves us to become more universal with regard to certain practices which are contrary to those of universal brotherhood." The committee proposed the following amendment to the Constitution: "It is the policy of this Grand Lodge to permit a candidate whose religious persuasion is based upon other than the Holy Bible to be obligated upon the book of his chosen faith and same be situated upon the Altar in front of the Holy Bible during the conferral of either of the three Degrees of Masonry. In which event, all esoteric references to 'The Holy Bible' during the conferral of the Degree(s) and the lessons appropriate thereto shall be substituted with 'The Book of your (my) faith.'" The substitution of the phrase "Book of your (my) faith," as stipulated in the last sentence of the above amendment, would appear to have been necessitated by the use of the term "The Holy Bible" in the Ritual itself, rather than the more inclusive term, "Volume of the Sacred Law." In recommending the proposed amendment the committee stated, "We believe that toleration for the beliefs of others is one of the principles of Freemasonry." Grand Lodge adopted the amendment.

VERMONT

South Burlington, Vermont, June, 1995

The 201st Communication received from M.W. Bro. Roderick Maclay an optimistic report on the condition of the Craft. He said, for example, that membership losses had been reduced from 265 in the previous year to 184 in the current year and that initiations had increased from 151 to 221 in the same period. Public relations was another area in which the Grand Master saw improvement. He noted that "the word is getting out what Freemasonry is and who we are; always remember, we are judged by our actions.

The Fraternal Relations Committee reported that a request for recognition had been received from the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut. The position of Grand Lodge for several years had been that a Vermont Mason visiting in a state or

province where "a duly recognized sister grand jurisdiction allows Freemasons, otherwise irregular by our present standards, to be in attendance, then our Vermont Freemasons were allowed to join them at such meetings and have full fraternal intercourse with them." The Fraternal Relations Committee considered that the time had come for Masonry in Vermont "to advance an additional step." Consequently, it referred the Prince Hall application to the Jurisprudence Committee with a favourable recommendation for its acceptance.

The Jurisprudence Committee reported its agreement with the Fraternal Relations Committee. It submitted a resolution in which one of the clauses in the preamble stated: "WHEREAS, on September 29, 1784 a warrant was granted by the premier Grand Lodge of England to 15 men in Boston, Massachusetts (including Bro. Hall, whose first name was Prince) forming them into African Lodge No. 459 on the English Register. In 1827, having been refused acknowledgment by the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, African Lodge declared itself to be an independent Grand Lodge to be known as the African Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. The former 'African Lodge' was then or later disbanded. The style 'Prince Hall Grand Lodge' became current in the 1840s. Thereafter, Prince Hall Grand Lodges were formed in most of the states in America. Some of these lodges work overseas, especially in the Indies. All Prince Hall Grand Lodges are descended from what is now the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts." For this and other reasons given in the preamble, the resolution was adopted. By it Grand Lodge could grant the request for recognition of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut. In addition, the resolution authorized Grand Lodge "to grant the requests of such other Prince Hall Grand Lodges as may seek fraternal recognition from this Grand Lodge provided, however, that they have been recognized by the Grand Lodges of their respective states, provinces or countries with which we are in amity."

VICTORIA

East Melbourne, Victoria, March, June, September, December, 1995

In addressing Grand Lodge following his Installation as Grand Master at the March Quarterly Communication, M.W. Bro. Neville B. Smith said that for a considerable period of time he had been concerned about "the image that Freemasonry has in the community, in the Craft itself and in our families." To this end he had taken steps to obtain professional assistance in improving the view of the Craft by members of the community generally, but especially by women. Accordingly, he planned to give strong support to programmes aimed at strengthening local lodges by "giving them greater autonomy, and encouraging them to create greater interest in the lodge, greater entertainment, greater variety and stimulating better quality and improved standards."

The Grand Master urged the lodges "to improve their forward plans — to establish realistic targets for all areas of activity in the lodge, whether it concerns membership, attendance, lodge room activities, the south or social events. I also ask them to establish performance indicators to enable them to measure the targeted improvements. It will not be possible to attain improvement unless we plan it, and are able to monitor it."

Two unusual Masonic education activities were announced at the September Quarterly Communication. The first was an Organist's Seminar, conducted by the Grand Organist. Its purpose was to make better use of those lodge organists who are interested in playing at Installation Ceremonies. The second important event in Masonic Education was (in the Grand Master's words) a *TOTAL EDUCATION DAY*. The topics at this seminar, as announced by the committee organizing it, included Liaison, Mentors, Rhetoric, Almoners, Leadership Training, Ritual and Ceremonial.

M.W. Bro. Smith commended the members of the committee and expressed the hope that lodge officers would "take advantage of what is provided to assist you in improving your lodges."

At the December Quarterly Communication the Grand Master announced the formation of a Lodge of Transition. It will meet two needs. First, members who are 75 years of age or over with 40 or more years of Masonic service will be able to maintain their membership in the Craft on the payment of a nominal annual fee. Secondly, the Lodge of Transition will "care for members whose previous lodge has returned its Warrant, or amalgamated or joined with another lodge. These members will be able to join the Lodge of Transition for a limited time while they select another suitable lodge to join."

VIRGINIA

Richmond, Virginia, November, 1995

To assist a lodge to make its charitable activity more visible in the community, Grand Master's Decision #2 which was issued by M.W. Bro. Thomas May, allowed the square and compasses to be printed on T-shirts and programmes for a fund-raising softball tournament conducted by a subordinate lodge.

Also reported to the 217th Annual Communication was an Executive Order by M.W. Bro. May which "authorized the District Deputy Grand Masters to approve the change of meeting days, dates, and times by way of dispensations," without prior reference through the Grand Secretary to the Grand Master for approval.

Of a more fundamental nature was an Edict by the Grand Master allowing "any young man who had attained the age of eighteen (18) years the right to petition and receive the degrees of Freemasonry."

The Edict by M.W. Bro. May, which lowered the minimum age for admission to Masonry to eighteen years, was referred routinely to the Jurisprudence Committee for a recommendation for acceptance or rejection by Grand Lodge. The committee recommended approval of the Edict and gave the following statement of the reason for its decision: "In the United States of America today, a boy legally becomes a man at age eighteen. He may vote in all elections, local, state and national, he may serve his nation in the armed forces, he may own real property, he is entitled to stand on his own, and make decisions free of the mandates of his family and with these privileges come the responsibilities of good citizenship and he must stand accountable under the law for his actions. Therefore, we feel this law needs to be changed to permit a man of the age of eighteen to petition a Masonic lodge for the Degrees of Freemasonry." Grand Lodge approved the recommendation and voted to amend its Constitution accordingly.

WEST VIRGINIA

Clarksburg, West Virginia, October, 1995

M.W. Bro. Stephen Swank reported to the 131st Annual Communication that among his Rulings as Grand Master, was the following: "The Masonic Funeral Service should not be conducted when the ashes of the deceased Brother are to be scattered over an area, rather than deposited in a specific location. [Rationale: (1) Such a procedure would not conform to the words of our Funeral Service and (2) Masonically, the 'scattering of ashes' denotes a less than honourable disposition of the remains]."

In his annual report, M.W. Bro. Swank spoke of the similarities between the duties and responsibilities of a Grand Master and those of the Worshipful Master of a lodge. He wrote: "As our Fraternity, through the 4th Landmark, is governed by a Grand Master, whose responsibilities are awesome, who is answerable only to the Grand

Lodge, and whose powers are vast and virtually undefined, though not unlimited; so too, our lodges are presided over by a Master, whose responsibilities are equally awesome, who is answerable during his term of office only to the Grand Master, and whose powers and authority are commensurate with the responsibilities of his office. Like the Grand Master, he is bound by his obligation as Past Master, as well as his obligation at his installation. Like the Grand Master, his authority is further defined by the Laws of Masonry. Like the Grand Master, he is more concerned with his capacity to do good than his authority to correct evil."

The Grand Master stated that the Master's "primary objective must be the peace and harmony of the Craft, for when Peace and Harmony are absent, confusion fills the void, and the work can not proceed. The Master can influence the peace and harmony of his lodge by seeing that Order prevails in all aspects of the lodge, to include insuring that: all actions of the lodge conform with Masonic Law and the By-Laws of the lodge; lodge communications are conducted in an efficient, orderly and pleasant atmosphere; Degree Work is organized and conducted in a proficient manner; and lodge facilities are maintained in a clean and orderly condition which reflects the high regard of the Brethren for the lodge." These words of advice, given by M.W. Bro. Swank to assist his District Deputy Grand Masters in guiding Masters, are not limited in their application and usefulness to any one jurisdiction.

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence indicated which Grand Lodges in the United States and Canada either fully recognize Prince Hall Masons or permit their members to visit such lodges if visiting in a jurisdiction in amity with West Virginia that recognizes the Prince Hall Grand Lodge operating in that state or province. These concessions do not apply to West Virginian Masons.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Perth, South Perth, Western Australia, April, October, 1995

In welcoming members to the April Communication, M.W. Bro. H. W. Gayfer stated that it was an occasion of great historic significance. He was cognizant, the Grand Master said, "that the lay-out, dress, time and venue have not met with great enthusiasm from a few of our members, in fact with some very distinguished members of our fraternity total disagreement."

He explained that he was attempting to eliminate the feeling, which he had detected, of "them and us" between Grand Lodge and the general membership. He believed that, if this attitude became widespread, it would result in many members deciding not to attend Communications of Grand Lodge. "We now as a Grand Lodge have with us," he said, "in full right, entered apprentices and fellow craft Freemasons all with the same rights of speaking and voting as those of a more senior degree. I want them to feel at ease and not be intimidated by a show of resplendent regalia."

The Grand Master emphasized that the changes (namely, meeting in a hotel, a different hour of day, no requirement to wear a dinner suit, full rights to all Masons to attend and participate equally) were to be regarded as an experiment subject to review. He announced, also, "My title today when addressed will be Brother Chairman and all members will introduce themselves as Brother." He added that he was saddened that his actions and decisions had caused so much pain and concern. He believed, however, that good progress was being made with the Grand Lodge 'Plan for the Future' and that the deliberations of the Board of General Purposes in respect to its implementation were on course. In closing, he "asked for the members' views on the style and format of the meeting and, with only 6 members voting against, those present overwhelmingly endorsed the Grand Master's initiative."

In its Report to the October Communication, the Board of General Purposes expressed its confidence that the decline in membership had been halted and that a positive trend was developing. The Board was particularly pleased to report the success of the Southern Cross Lodge which, it pointed out, "provided a vehicle through which itinerate, remote and transferred Brethren, as well as others who find their lodge extinct, might receive the support of Freemasonry."

Following his re-election, M.W. Bro. Gayfer emphasized that the changes which he had introduced, though divisive, had been made because of the paramount necessity "to accommodate and project our aims and beliefs in a tangible, noticeable and acceptable manner, in the atmosphere of tomorrow and tomorrow's dictates, rather than those of yesterday, which modern day society has outlived."

WISCONSIN

Stevens Point, Wisconsin, June, 1996

The chaotic situation regarding fire and public liability insurance coverage by the constituent lodges was outlined by the Grand Master. Many lodges had reduced their coverage and some even had failed to renew their policies because of higher costs. M.W. Bro. Beecher Daniels reminded the 152nd Annual Communication that a package insurance policy had been purchased with a low premium based on the participation of all lodges. He had issued an Edict requiring all to become covered under this policy "effective on the expiration date or anniversary date, whichever comes first, of their present building liability and fire insurance policies."

Upon the recommendation of the Code Revision Committee, Grand Lodge amended the Masonic Code by deleting the requirement for the Grand Secretary, the Grand Treasurer and all Grand Lodge employees to retire on the first of the month following their 70th birthday.

The Fraternal Relations with Prince Hall Committee introduced its report as follows: "As we enter the second five-year period of recognition for visitation, the bonds of friendship between the committee members of the Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of Wisconsin and the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of Wisconsin, Inc., grow stronger. Inter-lodge visitation during the past Grand Lodge year has been the greatest since recognition. These visitations have been for stated meetings, degree conferrals and social activities. The committees of the two Grand Lodges have met once each of the two past years to discuss activities and problems of mutual interest. These discussions have been conducted in a frank, truthful and harmonious manner and all members have expressed the need to work together on any problems of mutual interest and/or concern that might arise."

The Drug and Alcohol Information Committee on Positive Youth Development gave grants to five programmes that met three criteria. They were: (1) The programme was oriented to youth; (2) It was drug and alcohol related or had a mental health component; (3) It was already well established with successful results. Four grants had been made to high schools and one to a university which had established three drug and alcohol free floors in residences. One of the high schools had a mentoring programme where "high school girls befriend middle school girls and act as older sister types that familiarize the younger girls with life in high school and act as positive role models." The aim of the committee is to help young people realize that there are those who care about them. In the words of the report, "When they hear that the Masons of Wisconsin care about the quality of their lives, hope replaces despair and hopelessness. They are encouraged to carry on."

WYOMING

Laramie, Wyoming, August, 1996

In his Address to the 122nd Annual Communication, M.W. Bro. William McGraw commented on the success of the Grand Master's Class, which was a "one day conferral of all three Symbolic Degrees." There were two of these occasions during the year. On the first, 39 applicants were made Apprentices, Fellow Craft and Master Masons in one day; the second produced 43 additional Master Masons. In assessing their success in making Masons in this way, M.W. Bro. McGraw stated that an advantage of the accelerated schedule in conferring Degrees was that it was possible to accommodate young professional men who were much too busy to be able to proceed in the traditional manner. "If Masonry is to survive," he indicated, "we must continue to use this and other progressive methods of building membership." On the other hand, he identified a disadvantage that could turn out to be a fatal weakness. He noted that it was only in "the lodges that properly follow up on these new Brothers" that they are found "to become as active in their lodges as those who take the traditional degree method."

The Grand Historian reviewed various community activities by which subordinate lodges sought to increase public awareness of Masonry. One of these was participation by the Grand Lodge in the ceremonial laying of the cornerstone of a public building. Also, he suggested an uncommon variation of this fairly common custom. It occasionally happens in a community that a prominent building is marked for demolition, which has a corner stone laid many years previously by the Grand Lodge. It was the Grand Historian's suggestion that "a ceremony to recover the cornerstone, and the time capsule placed in it, could be conducted by the Grand Lodge. Then the cornerstone and the contents of the time capsule could be forwarded to the local history museum for display."

The Fraternal Correspondence and Recognition Committee stated that it had reviewed the Annual Proceedings of forty-one Grand Lodges with which the Grand Lodge of Wyoming is in amity. It highlighted one outstanding item taken from these reviews. "We received notice from the Grand Lodge of Oregon," it reported, "that they have forgiven the Grand Lodge of Idaho for their invasion of the jurisdiction rights of Oregon and the two Grand Lodges are in fraternal recognition and correspondence. We heartily congratulate our fellow jurisdictions for their sitting down together and to come to a satisfactory solution."

To remove a difficulty in implementing the "Friend to Friend" Programme, the Wyoming Masonic Code was amended to change the prohibition against soliciting to one against IMPROPER solicitation, with "improper solicitation being defined as any form of coercion."

INTRODUCTION OF GUEST SPEAKER
BY M. W. BRO. ROBERT E. DAVIES

Grand Master, Distinguished Guests and Brethren.

Tonight, our Grand Master has afforded me the delightful opportunity of introducing to you a dear friend, a Brother and contemporary in the office of Grand Secretary. Thank you M. W. Bro. Greenwood.

Our distinguished guest was born and raised, in 1934, in McKeesport, Pennsylvania, where he received his early education. He went on to receive a Bachelor of Science degree in biology at Shippensburg University and a Master of Science degree in Zoology at Penn State where he continued on in doctoral work. It should be noted that his research talents were quickly recognized, as he was the recipient of a scholarship, seven research grants and is credited with the discovery of a new HOST PARASITE RELATIONSHIP.

In 1958, he was mid-Atlantic weight lifting champion, a member of the All American Team and was named outstanding Young Man of the Year.

From 1958 to 1974 he served in the educational field as chairman of the Science Department in the public school system and chairman of the Biology Department at Penn Hall Jr. College. It was during this period that he married his sweetheart, Linda, and set up housekeeping in their home in rural Pennsylvania, some thirty miles outside of Philadelphia. He is an ardent outdoors man and their rural setting allows him to enjoy his hobbies of hunting and fishing.

In 1974, he entered the world of business, as he accepted the sales manager's position with a major construction company.

Nineteen seventy-nine saw his talents as an educator, researcher and businessman recognized further, as he accepted the position of Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania.

During the past eighteen years, he has shared his many talents with Masons all over the free world. To list his Masonic accomplishments would be less than fair to our speaker for it would leave him little time to speak. Suffice it to say that he is a member and contributor in most of the appendant bodies, book reviewer for the Northern Light Magazine, holder of countless Masonic medals and awards and has recently been named one of the top twenty-five Freemasons in the last quarter century.

A few years ago our late P.G.M., M.W. Bro. W. L. Wright, while speaking in a similar capacity from this same lectern, described the Guest Speaker for that occasion as being an "all rounder."

The same can be said tonight about our most distinguished guest, for indeed he is an "all rounder" as he contributes to all worthwhile pursuits, locally, nationally and internationally.

Brethren, it gives me great pleasure to present R.W. Bro. Thomas William Jackson, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania.

WHAT ARE WE TRYING TO SAVE?

I recall a quotation I heard many years ago, "When you place your hand in a flowing stream, you touch the last that has gone before and the first that is yet to come." A man's relevant position in history and our position in Freemasonry is as that hand. We stand today as the hand in the flowing stream of Freemasonry, touching the last that has gone before and the first that is yet to come. There is a distinctive difference, however, between the hand in the water and us. The hand has no power to change the ultimate destiny of the flow of the water. But we, my brethren, have the capacity and the power to change the ultimate destiny of Freemasonry.

I want to make it totally clear that I speak to you today expressing my views and my opinions, and mine only. I speak for no Masonic body. I do speak, however, as one who has spent thirty-six very active years in Freemasonry, eighteen of them as a professional. I speak as one who has made some effort to study this Craft and has a great concern about its future.

Freemasonry has existed in some form probably at least since the 14th century – WE THINK. In its organized speculative form it has existed since 1717 – WE KNOW. Although we cannot be sure of what it was originally, WE THINK WE KNOW what it is now. But do we?

Freemasonry has been defined in many glowing terms by Freemasons for a long period of time and in less than glowing terms by its detractors for an equally long period of time. The definitions are there, and yet there are precious few who truly know what we are, and that includes us.

We look with regret at not being as significant in today's world as we were in yesterday's because our numbers are not as great. We evaluate ourselves in terms of quantity instead of quality and that is an unfortunate appraisal of the Craft for it has caused us also to lose sight of what we were. Our attempt to return to former influence may therefore be unachievable, for if we don't know what we are how can we hope to become what we were. One thing is certain, however, if we continue to change from what it was which made us great we reduce the chance to regain that greatness.

Think for a moment of how much time and money you have invested in this Craft. Now multiply that investment by tens of millions. The resultant figures are astronomical. Why have we done this? There has to be some stimulating factor which has caused the Craft to be carried for almost three hundred years. I would suggest that it was the constancy of its purpose.

We have for the last two decades been concentrating our best leadership ability on an issue which we acknowledge to be the greatest threat against what we perceive we are – the loss of our quantity.

We have probably changed Freemasonry more in the last twenty years than was done in the prior two hundred and fifty, and what have we accomplished? We certainly have not stopped the decline in numbers for which reason we made the changes. Perhaps the time has arrived for us to examine more closely what has been done and

what has been the result.

I propose that Freemasonry became as great as it did, and remained as great as it has, for three primary reasons. Reason No. 1: it was probably the first organization to accept, at least philosophically, men from all stations of life as equals. Reason No. 2: it attracted some of the greatest minds that ever lived. Reason No. 3: it remained selective on the quality of the man it would accept.

The deletion of any one of these reasons would have prevented the Craft from becoming what it did or remaining as it has, and I am convinced that the loss of any one will also destroy it, at least in the historic form for which it is known. It, therefore, behooves us to ask what are we trying to save?

Make no doubt about it, my brothers, Freemasonry is the greatest organization ever conceived by the mind of man. It has impacted the evolution of civil society beyond that of any organization outside of organized religion. The world is as it is today because Freemasonry lived.

Recognizing these facts, my brothers, we have inherited an awesome responsibility, one of more than just keeping the name Freemasonry alive. We must keep it viable, a force that can display to the world what is good and right in mankind, an enclave of toleration in an intolerant world. A unique organization in a world that needs that uniqueness, an organization known by the QUALITY of its membership. The world needs Freemasonry. There is nothing out there to replace us. We must make sure the world knows.

We are making many decisions today that seem to indicate a lack of intent in preserving the integrity of the Craft. We seem more intent on redefining and reshaping it in almost any manner to fit into what we perceive to be the interest of society.

We have attempted to become more family oriented, and yet the grange, a purely family-oriented fraternity, is rapidly fading from view. We have become more social in our operation, but the social clubs, such as the Elks and Moose, are struggling to operate. We have attempted to become more civically involved, while the community-oriented "fraternities" are declining more rapidly than are we.

Perhaps these characteristics must be considered by us, but why are we attempting to emulate organizations which are declining as least as rapidly as we are. If we are not succeeding by emulating, should we not be considering building upon our uniqueness? First, however, we must understand the cause of the decline.

We look at the loss of membership and interest and have the tendency to blame ourselves for what we deem to be a failure in our structure and our leadership. My brethren, I honestly do not believe that any difference in our structure or our leadership would have shown results much different than they do today.

The loss in membership can neither be blamed solely on inadequacy of leadership or failure of our system. Our purpose and precepts have carried us through changing societies for centuries. Why should it now be judged a failure because our numbers fluctuate even as they have fluctuated in the past.

Because society lowers its standards does not mean we must do the same. Indeed, we have an obligation to the future to lead the way to what is morally and ethically right, to be more than just average in society. In essence, to be what we have always been. We must continue to pull others up to meet with us, not climb down to meet with them.

I feel strongly that we are looking at a sociological phenomenon, one probably created by our attempt to make life easier for each succeeding generation and which must run its course before we find a redevelopment of interest in our way of life. We must realize that there is no immediate spontaneous solution to our decline in numbers. We must acknowledge that this is a problem not localized to either area or organization. It is time for us to recognize that our decrease in numbers is due to a sociological condition of the time and not to our inability to cope with change.

The pendulum will swing, my brothers; there will be a renewed interest in a quality organization based upon our philosophical principles. But will Freemasonry as a quality organization be there to accept those interested?

A few years ago the Dallas Morning News had an article written by historian A. C. Green regarding the Craft. In it he said: "There used to be a time when it meant something to be a Mason, it showed a level of class."

Historians are finally writing about Freemasonry, but they are writing about the quality of the organization not the quantity. Freemasonry for generations has been known by those outside of it for its constancy of purpose and as A. C. Green said, "a level of class." We the leaders of the present have made us as we are perceived by the public today. We are the internal variable. Freemasonry, my brothers, is more than a name. It is an ideal. So what are we trying to save – the name or the ideal?

We have evolved into the world's greatest charitable organization, but Freemasonry is not a charity. Its avowed purpose is to take good men and make them better. By making good men better, we improved the quality of the world, but of what value will be our charitable nature if we fail to survive to support the charity. We cannot continue to concentrate most of our efforts on raising money to give away. We cannot buy admiration and respect. We must focus greater effort on Freemasonry's survival as the world's premier organization. To be charitable is an admirable quality, but our charitable characteristic must be secondary to our primary purpose.

Freemasonry's goal has always been to start with the best we can find and improve that best. This goal, out of necessity, implies selectiveness. The selectiveness was based upon the quality of the man. Our Craft has been unique in that it has been able to take men from all walks of life socially, economically, culturally, etc., and provide an environment wherein the similarities of good are far more important than differences of type. I suspect the quality of the man is perhaps the major intangible force which, though unseen to the world outside the Craft, is what brings and holds us together.

It is a natural instinctive desire to associate with those of similar kind. This is why in nature we find flocks, herds, schools, etc., of animals, and it is no less true of man. This is why we have found in Freemasonry lodges of good men. Without quality men there can be no quality organization. Quality will attract quality, and quality will ensure survival, but we cannot hope to grow or even remain the same by lowering our standards.

We acknowledge that only ten percent of our members are active. That, of course, means that ninety percent are inactive. Yet they retain their membership. They pay their dues each year knowing full well that they will never participate in lodge activities. There is only one logical reason why they do that. They see a value to being able to say, "I am a Freemason." There is a perceived value by them to membership.

Take away the perceived value of association with a quality organization and we risk losing the ninety percent.

Freemasonry has had in its ranks men whose names are etched on the headstones of eternity – names to be not forgotten. What was the force which drew them in? I suggest it was an organization which embraced high ideals and principles, nurtured those ideals and principles, and stimulated aspirations to greatness. And thus we became great with them. One feeds upon the other. Great men make great organizations, and great organizations can make great men. Likewise, the loss of one must result in the loss of the other. Freemasonry must never resign itself to be less than it can be.

We must stop looking at long term planning in spans of five, ten, or twenty-five years. We must look in spans of fifty, one hundred or two hundred years. Our vision must be expanded. We are simply too important to the world to limit our vision. We as leaders must not only truly understand our past but see our potential for the future.

I am convinced that we are creating one of our greatest problems by making the Craft too easily obtainable and retainable.

During all the low points in Masonic history, and there have been some, there is no evidence that decisions were made which affected our basic precepts or reduced the quality of the Craft. Nor was it necessary to make major procedural changes in our methods of operation to recover from membership loss. We seem intent today in reducing all barriers for membership numbers regardless of cost, and the result is evident. We have required less, and less is what we have received.

When we evolved from a fraternity of the practitioner to the fraternity of the idealist, we forged the character that was idealistic. What is happening to that idealism, that noble philosophical precept of the Craft today, when we no longer believe that if we are great we do not have to ask others to join with us. Gotthold Lessing in the 1770's argued that "If we know a Freemason by his deeds, then he must leave his mark on the world." Is our mark not enough to encourage others, or do we not wish to leave a mark? John Robinson made the observation, "The problem with Freemasonry is that it does not practice Freemasonry anymore." And how can we when the vast majority of our members do not even know what to practice.

Where Freemasonry goes from here is up to us. Our hand is in the flowing water of the Craft. If we are trying to save a name, we may succeed. If we are trying to save an ideal, we are not succeeding. This Craft will not be measured in the future by its quantity no more than historians are measuring it today by that standard. It will be judged by its quality. If we cannot have both, then we must choose.

We are confronted today with monumental problems concerning our integrity as an institution. Many of the problems are originating outside the Craft but, regretfully, most originate from within. Those from within should be more readily solvable, but we as leaders must be willing to sacrifice our egos for the Craft. We must be willing to surrender personal ambition for the sake of the future of Freemasonry.

The quality of the Craft must not be permitted to continue to decline. We must recognize that the organization is much larger than the combination of all of its component parts.

We say we are a brotherhood of men under the fatherhood of God, a fraternity designed to make good men better. If this is what we are trying to save, we should

reexamine our approach.

If we make good men better, we succeed in the purpose of the Craft, and these better men will then continue to lead the world. If we fail, the whole world loses, and I personally don't want to be remembered as part of the generation of leaders who destroyed the Craft.

Give it some thought, my brothers. What are we trying to save?
