Biography M.W. Bro. Robert J. McKibbon Grand Master

Masonry, like stained glass windows, lets your inner light shine, so "Live Better Masonically!"

Our Grand Master was born and educated in Windsor, Ontario. He is an electronic technologist and journeyman electrician, now retired from the faculty of Fanshawe College where he served as a professor in the electrical/electronic department.

In 1961, he married Marjorie Milsom of Windsor. Their marriage is blessed with a son, Douglas, a psychologist, in Edmonton, Alberta, and his wife Ann-Marie; and a daughter, Heather, an elementary teacher on leave with the Toronto District Board, raising, with her husband Brian, three grandsons, Cole, Evan and Luke, in Ajax, ON.

In 1969, Bro. McKibbon was initiated into King Solomon's Lodge No. 378, and served as their centennial Master in 1979. He was elected District Deputy Grand Master (1983–84) for the London West District. In 1989, he was appointed, then elected in 1991, to the Grand Lodge Board of General Purposes, serving on the committees of Education, Blood Donors, Condition of Masonry, Management and Seminars and Workshops. In July, 1997, he was elected Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

McKibbon is an involved member of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, having served the London Lodge of Perfection and Rose Croix Chapter as production/property committee chairman and trustee from 1977 to 1987. He is presently chairman of the Board of Trustees.

It is with much pleasure that I join with the Masons of Ontario in extending a hand of friendship and welcome to our special guests from across Canada, the United States and Europe. A Think Tank Seminar held this past January, with many of the members of the Board of General Purposes in attendance, was very rewarding as our Grand Lodge programmes were reviewed and assessed for continuing functional ability and for prioritization within our five year operational plan.

GRAND LODGES VISITED

Fraternal visitations with Sister Grand Lodges are most beneficial for fostering the exchange of mutual concerns and solutions. We have had the good fortune to visit with several Grand Lodges across Canada, the United States of America and the Grande Loge Nationale Francaise this past year. The summary of those visits are registered in the Appendix.

DISCIPLINE

The matter of using electronic summonses is coming to the fore as lodges advance with modern technology. I must, emphatically, inform all Masters and Secretaries that the producing and distribution of summonses is clearly defined in Section 270 of our Constitution. This section must be adhered to until such time as the security of electronic distribution warrants the consideration of a constitutional amendment.

On several occasions, this past year, I have observed where overzealous Masons have chosen to disregard long established principles and traditions. I trust similar breaches in Masonic conduct will not recur in the future, which may necessitate disqualification of capable and well meaning brethren in their quest for future fraternal service.

CONFERENCES

It was an honour to be invited to attend, as an observer, the Western Conference of Canadian Grand Lodges in September this past year in Canmore, Alberta. The Grand Lodges of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba hold this conference annually, to allow for the sharing and discussion of mutual concerns. The Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held this past February in Waikiki, Hawaii, and attended by your Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, R.W. Bro. Robert J. McKibbon, worked diligently as a member of the Commission on Information for Recognition, while your Grand Master served as a member of the Time and Place Committee, as well as having the honour of reporting to this conference the activities of the Conference of Canadian Grand and District Grand Lodges.

Turner and his wife Geraldine, for the warm and kind hospitality that they extended to us on the occasion of the Grand Chapter's One Hundred and Forty-first Annual Convocation, this past April. A. A. O. N. M. S.

My wife Betty and I had a delightful experience as guests of Rameses Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. on the occasion of their 1999 Spring Ceremonial. The fellowship, courtesies and respect for the office of Grand Master were greatly appreciated. It was most gratifying to be included in the public ceremonies, the parade and the formal reception of this festive occasion.

AD HOC COMMITTEES

The ad hoc committee that was set to address the question of proxy voting contacted each of our forty-six District Deputy Grand Masters, requesting input from their district as to the pros and cons of proxy voting at Grand Lodge sessions for Grand Lodge officers. A response was forthcoming from forty-five of the fortysix districts. There was an overwhelming desire to continue the practice of using the proxy system for voting purposes. It was noted however that a clearer understanding of the procedures was required by the officers and proxy holders of each lodge. A carefully worded explanation was forwarded from the Grand Secretary's office to all Lodge Secretaries throughout the jurisdiction for the information of all concerned. I might caution that careful deployment of the proxy must be observed to protect its continued existence.

The ad hoc committee examining the condition of Masonry in the seven Toronto Districts has completed a comprehensive study. They now have been asked to work with and through the District Deputy Grand Masters of those districts to further explore methods and means for assisting lodges within the districts to attain and maintain their optimum potential.

The results of the Seven Toronto Districts ad hoc committee prompted the appointment of ad hoc committees to study the condition of Masonry in Hamilton, London and Ottawa. These three ad hoc committees have submitted their initial reports and are now poised to proceed with phase two of the study.

M.W. Bro. Durward I. Greenwood has been studying the matter of Masons initiated five years or longer who have not attained their Master Masons Degree. A software programme was devised to ascertain from our Grand Lodge records the initiates of five years or longer who had not attain the rank of Master Mason and in which lodge they held membership. The records revealed 1,268 members that fitted this grouping. A letter of verification was forwarded to all of the identified lodges confirming the records and within a relatively short period this classification was reduced to 900 members. A second letter is being prepared to be sent to the prior mentioned lodges offering assistance in overcoming some of the adherent problems. It is apparent that this situation deserves constant scrutiny.

CONCLUSION

We must always be on guard against being overzealous in our own personal convictions and constantly adhere to the principles of our beloved Craft by promoting brotherly love, peace and harmony within our ranks. A thriving fraternity is dependent upon committed volunteer support and dedication. That support and dedication must be focused to be effective and successful in society today. This Grand Lodge is focused on positive action through a continuous five year plan of action. This plan is reviewed and updated annually to stay abreast with the needs and requirements of this jurisdiction, by the leadership team of our Board of General Purposes. The evolvement of team leadership is equivalent to a long distance relay face, where the baton is carried at full speed by the leader. As the leader approaches the conclusion of his segment of the marathon his successor accepts the baton as he accelerates to full flight to move on into his segment of leadership. To be successful, the transition has to be executed at full speed, with no sudden change of direction. This Grand Lodge has that most capable marathon leadership team in place to propel us into the next millennium in full stride.

It has been a great honour to serve this Grand Lodge as your Grand Master, and I am most humbly thankful to the Masons of Ontario for their confidence. I owe a debt of gratitude to all, having given their untiring support and devotion this past number of years as we have laboured in the quarries of our Grand Jurisdiction. Thank you. April 30, 1999

Purpose of the organization 1.

The Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario is a not for profit organization which serves as the central administrative body for Masonic Lodges in the Provinces of Ontario.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

Fund accounting

The Grand Lodge A.F. and A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions.

The General Fund reports the organization's administrative activities.

Revenues and expenses related to programme activities are reported only in The Programme Fund.

Revenues and expenses related to the 150th Anniversary Fund, Special Retirement Fund, Commutation Fund and Memorial Fund are consolidated and reported in the Segregated Fund.

Investments

Investments are recorded at cost. Discounts and premiums on the acquisition of bonds are not amortized, but are maintained at cost with the final gain or loss recorded on disposition.

Capital assets

Equipment purchases are recorded as current expenses in the appropriate fund.

Revenue recognition

Restricted contributions related to general operations are recognized as revenue of the General Fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. All other restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriate restricted fund.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the General Fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

7. Related entitles

The Board of Directors of both The Masonic Foundation of Ontario and Masonic Holdings consists of members of the Board of General Purposes of The Grand Lodge A.F. and A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

The object of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario is to receive, maintain, manage, control and use donations exclusively for charitable purposes within Ontario. The Foundation is permitted to use its donations for the relief of poverty, the advancement of education and the advancement of other purposes beneficial to the community. The Foundation is committed to funding bursaries, hearing research, drug and substance abuse education in the school systems and other specific and community projects which fall within its guidelines.

Masonic Holdings is a not for profit corporation formed in 1957 to acquire and operate adequate premises for the administrative personnel and staff of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

8. Uncertainty due to the Year 2000 Issue

The Year 2000 Issue arises because many computerized systems use two digits rather than four to identify a year. Date-sensitive systems may recognize the year 2000 as 1900 or some other date, resulting in errors when information using year 2000 dates is processed. In addition, similar problems may arise in some systems which use certain dates in 1999 to represent something other than a date. The effects of the Year 2000 Issue may be experienced before, on, or after January 1, 2000, and, if not addressed, the impact on operations and financial reporting may range from minor errors to significant systems failure which could affect an organization's ability to conduct normal business operations. It is not possible to be certain that all aspects of the Year 2000 Issue affecting the organization, including those related to the efforts of members, suppliers, or other third parties, will be fully resolved.

REPORT OF THE GRAND TREASURER

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

A good-news report is always easy to prepare and a pleasure to deliver. We are pleased again this year to be the bearer of another good-news report concerning the financial and investment aspects of this Grand Lodge.

The details of the revenue and expense aspects of this past fiscal year, plus the budget plan for the expected receipts and expenditures for the year ahead, are contained in the report of the Audit and Finance Committee and are outlined further in the Preliminary Proceedings for your perusal and information. You will see that all aspects of the financial management of the past year and of the budget for the year ahead depict a healthy continuing financial situation. The prudent management and administration of affairs by the Grand Secretary and his key staff are the primary contributors to the sound budgetary management which continues to prevail.

The consolidated investment portfolio of Grand Lodge represents our principal tangible asset and we continue to be well pleased with the investment decisions taken by our professional managers at Scotia Cassels Investment Council Ltd. Grand Lodge has approved the broad investment strategies as recommended by the Audit and Finance Committee and Scotia Cassels has executed within these policies and strategies to our entire satisfaction. We monitor the investment performance regularly and meet with our Manager at Scotia Cassels to review trends, performance and developing opportunities, at least three times in each fiscal year. The aggregate of our several investments as of our April 30th year end had a book value of \$4.4 million but a market value at that date in excess of \$5.2 million. Our financial returns during the past three years have averaged 14% per annum, a quite satisfactory return given the financial market environments of that period.

We continue to encourage any of our Masonic family with meaningful investment responsibilities to enquire into the merit of engaging professional management. This professional management for Grand Lodge has been a very important event and contributor to our present financial good health. We would welcome any enquiry from Masonic groups who wish to explore alternatives to their present investment strategy.

We wish to thank the masons of Ontario who have continued to support the calendar and address label programmes. The funds so generated have assisted Grand Lodge to pursue the variety of Masonic endeavours as detailed in the Preliminary Proceedings.

A word to incumbent Lodge Masters and Secretaries on the subject of your local finances. While there is no present expectation of any increase in Grand Lodge assessments, we see this as an opportune period in which to ensure your schedule of lodge fees, especially the annual membership fee, are reviewed and increased as necessary to ensure the ongoing financial viability of your individual lodges.

In conclusion, I must extend words of appreciation to several for the assistance and support that we have received during our tenure as the Grand Treasurer of this wonderful organization. The Grand Secretary, the Grand Master, the President of the Management Committee, the Chairman of the Audit and Finance Committee and of the many Grand Lodge Committees who have managed their responsibilities within the approved budget constraints. Also a word of appreciation to Arthur Skeat and Ann Strebel of Scotia Cassels Investment Council Ltd. for the care and attention they provide this office and the Audit and Finance Committee in the careful management of our fiscal resources.

Obviously we feel this has been a good-news report. We have a sound financial position and every reason to expect continuing good health in the business matters of this Grand Lodge in the years ahead.

Semi Annual Returns

At the fiscal year end April 30, the annual audit once again began without all Semiannual Returns having been received and the required statistical information for some lodges unavailable for proper accounting purposes. Again, I appeal to the Worshipful Masters to please make absolutely sure that your lodge's Semiannual Return is properly completed and returned to Grand Lodge prior to the ninth day of July and January each year. Any delay in submission results in unnecessary delay in data input at your Grand Lodge office and in the subsequent preparation of Master Mason certificates which are anxiously awaited by all newly raised brethren. Much is to be said for the Secretary of a lodge. He is the brother that strives to advise his Worshipful Master with good counsel, keep the books of the lodge in orderly fashion, collect the necessary funds when due, report monthly on the activities of the lodge in a timely fashion and a myriad of other incidentals too numerous to mention. Much of his work is behind the scene and not easily appreciated. The majority of our secretaries do a first class job and we hasten to salute their excellence. Special thanks go out to the secretaries who accurately complete forms and return them on time.

Printing and Publications

The directory of information pertinent to each of the 641 lodges in our jurisdiction and named the *Ontario Directory* was an instant hit last year. This new directory contains information current as of June 1, 1998, and will again be published this fall. In response to many requests the 1999 Directory will contain information available as of August 1, 1999. Orders may be placed for fall delivery at your Grand Lodge book display in the foyer during this Annual Communication or from your Grand Lodge Office. Routine reprinting of many Grand Lodge publications has been ongoing during the past year. A reprint of the Constitution of Grand Lodge is again scheduled to be undertaken immediately following this Grand Lodge Communication and it will include any amendments, rules or guidelines that may be adopted at this Annual Communication. Updated versions of the larger "Book of the Work" and the revised "Memorial Services" are also scheduled for reprinting as soon as possible.

Computerization

Computerization is an ever changing process. Once again our genuine appreciation is extended to the many brethren who have given so freely of their time and effort in order that your Grand Lodge may better serve you. To the several volunteers who assist in keeping our computers functioning so well and assist in providing advice when decisions are to be made, we extend our heartfelt thanks.

Warrants

Again, it must be reported that several lodges have initiated amalgamation proceedings.

On a happier note, we report the surrender of the Charter of Victory Lodge No. 547. The Charter has since been resurrected by a group of former members and other interested Masons in the Toronto area. The lodge now meets regularly as a Daylight Lodge in the York Temple facilities and it is recommended herewith that the former number "547"be retained by Victory Lodge.

Conferences

In February of this year it was once again my privilege to represent our jurisdiction at the "Conference of Grand Secretaries in North America," held in Honolulu, Hawaii. The Conference provided many interesting and useful

seminars, dealing with topics such as: the Global Masonic Village, Recognition of Regular Masonic Lodges, one-day classes and Prince Hall Masonry; all of which were most enjoyable and helpful. The opportunity to dialogue with one's counterparts from all over the free world is always an added bonus. This year we were given the opportunity to discuss Masonic matters of a common concern with the newly installed Grand Secretary of the United Grand Lodge of England, R.W. Bro. James Daniels.

March again afforded the opportunity to attend the "Conference of Grand and District Grand Lodges of Canada" held annually in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Many interesting subjects were addressed and excellent participation and discussion was enjoyed by all. Topics for discussion included: Educational Programmes, Charities, Millennium Projects, and many other items of interest to all jurisdictions. An added highlight this year was the attendance of M.W. Bro. Richard Fletcher, who delivered the key note address, which proved most thought-provoking for all.

Our own Deputy Grand Master was elected President of the Conference and will preside at the next Conference in the year 2000. Congratulations R.W. Bro. McKibbon.

Visitations

During the year it has been my privilege to attend many Masonic functions, special events, dedications, etc. How satisfying it is to meet with the brethren as each goes about his Masonic obligations.

The Masonic Information Center

The work of the Masonic Information Center continues. As you are aware many excellent fact sheets and booklets have been made available by the Center. "Get a Life" has received instant acclaim and is now being widely used in response to Masonry's detractors. The Center has developed as a source for current, factual information, which is now being utilized by Lodges, Grand Lodges and the Press as a reliable source of accurate Masonic information. The latest pamphlet to be produced is entitled "Who are the MASONS." It contains Canadian content and is now available through your Grand Lodge office.

We trust the Center may long continue to serve our Craft as intended, by the one who made it's establishment possible, the late Bro. John Robinson.

Closing

The past few years, I have spoken of change. Again I continue to speak of change. A major change occurred during the year in the composition of our office staff as R.W. Bro. Kenneth L. Whiting retired after serving Grand Lodge so capably over the past decade. Ken has been a very valued, dedicated and capable member of the Grand Lodge office staff and we all join in wishing him good health, happiness and enjoyment as he settles in to his less stressful life style.

I now report that Mrs. Dorothy Chalmers, a long serving employee of Grand Lodge, was appointed Office Manager and assistant to the Grand Secretary and has now taken over most of the duties formerly handled by Mr Ken Whiting. Mrs. Rose Blandin has also recently joined your office staff.

To the entire staff I offer a most sincere thank you for their zeal and dedication as they strive to serve you, the Masons of this province.

To you, the membership, thank you for your continued support as we prepare together to enter the new millennium.

To the retiring Grand Master and the Deputy Grand Master I offer my deep appreciation for the time and care you have given, not only to your own offices but also to that of the Grand Secretary. Congratulations on your most successful terms as Grand Master and Deputy Grand Master.

REPORTS OF THE DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS

The forty-six reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters were presented by the Grand Secretary, and, on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by the Grand Secretary, they were referred to the Board of General Purposes.

DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTER REPORTS - 1998/1999

(Condensed excerpts extrapolated from the reports of the District Deputies)

Algoma (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. Michael M. Latoski

The Mentors Programme, combined with other programmes available to the lodges, such as . . . Friend to Friend and . . . Brother to Brother . . . are equipped with a comprehensive kit that will, over time, see our membership strengthen and grow. Terrace Bay Lodge No. 662 may be providing the first indication of this, as their membership has grown by 11 members this year.

The Computer Resources Committee has provided a great and invaluable programme to all of the lodges that have chosen to incorporate it for use in their lodges. This programme reduces mailing time, using e-mail to correspond with Grand Lodge and other lodges, always observing the proper protocol in our everyday correspondence.

The Blood Donors programme is a must to bring Masonry into the eye of the general public . . . This year we had an increase in donations of 48% from 1,683 to 2,301 units, bringing us, as Masons, into the public eye in a very good light.

Algoma East (8 Lodges)

I must thank those brethren who chaired district committees, and those who worked so hard to make our District Divine Service and the Reception for the Grand Master the successes that they were.

R.W. Bro. Kenneth J. McCracken

I was both pleased and satisfied with the quality of the ritual work in the lodges. The Worshipful Masters and the officers were dedicated to doing the work properly, they practiced and the candidates were well prepared.

Generally there seems to be harmony among the brethren, but, then, we only get to see those who attend lodge, and attendance, I am sorry to say, is not good. All of the lodges are in good financial condition, with reasonable dues structures, fund raising projects and ownership of their buildings. Membership is stable and with the aid of Grand Lodge programmes such as the *Friend to Friend* and *Brother to Brother*, a willingness to use these tools and the desire to succeed, I feel that Masonry in this district can fare quite well. Grand Lodge is doing its part, now it is up to the individual lodges to do theirs. We know what needs to be done – we know how to do it. The challenge is there, the question is, can we meet it?

Brant (14 Lodges)

Apart from one lodge, Masonry in Brant District is alive and well. All lodges visited showed a capability of performing the work well. In some lodges the membership is increasing and in others it is staying steady. There are few lodges that do not have Past Masters sitting in the chairs, but this should decline as new members are raised to the third degree.

Protocol was observed on all of the Official Visits. Unfortunately, one lodge in Brant District is running into problems in getting officers . . . This lodge is financially sound and with a membership of enough members to easily fill all of the chairs . . . For some reason the members show a reluctance to do so. The Worshipful Master has worked long and hard to turn this situation around, without any positive results; further help may benefit this lodge.

The Masters', Past Masters' and Wardens' Association is very active in the district and their meetings are always well attended.

Bruce (12 Lodges)

Visitation has remained steady throughout this year with 851 brethren attending twelve Official Visits, an average of 71 per meeting. There continues to be strong interlodge visitation as well as fraternal visitation throughout the district. The larger lodges of the district have continued to carry on the tradition of the district by assisting the smaller lodges in any way that they can, be that degree work or administrative help and guidance.

There is a wide variety of activities happening both at the lodge and district level. The Masters', Past Masters' and Wardens' Association is very active within the district.

The level of work within Bruce District is good. We witnessed the openings and closings in the three degrees in each of the lodges, and on fraternal visits witnessed a number of degrees. The enthusiasm shown by the members who were doing the degree work was exceptional. All lodges in the district are financially stable at this point. The concern expressed in last year's report of the potential impact of the downsizing at the Bruce Nuclear Power Development has not had a significant effect as yet on the surrounding lodges. But the potential for loss in the lodges as families move out of the area of Port Elgin and Southampton may yet be felt. This will also have an effect on all of Bruce District.

Chatham (14 Lodges)

Our district benevolence project Bears for Kids was a major success. Our committee

undertook, with another community group – The Bell Pioneers – to place teddy bears in all cruisers and hospitals within our district, to be given to traumatized children who were the victims or observers of car accidents, parental abuse, personal injuries, sexual assault, etc. The project was supported by all of our lodges and generated a great deal of favourable publicity. The value of this project was clearly seen when a number of these bears were given out to children who were involved in the recent tragic train derailment in Thamesville, Ontario. As one police officer remarked: "nothing can calm an upset child like a teddy bear."

The District Divine Service was held at Holy Trinity Anglican Church on a Sunday evening. It proved most worthwhile with an increased number of Masons in attendance. The Lodge of Instruction was held at the beginning of the Masonic year and the results were immediately seen throughout the district in improved ritual work and protocol.

We were pleased to host a reception for the Grand Master, and the message from M.W. Bro. William T. Anderson was well received by the brethren present.

Eastern (19 Lodges)

The brethren in this district are quite proficient at the Work. Protocol, both in the lodge rooms and at banquet hours, is excellent. The Mentor and Friend to Friend programmes are being used. Overall, lodge membership is steady, but Past Masters do fill a considerable number of chairs in several lodges. Most lodges are financially sound. Exceptions are lodges where membership is declining because young men leave the area to find work in larger centres or they commute several hours to work each day and don't have time to commit to lodge. The brethren of the district have an excellent attitude regarding Masonry. They work hard to be a positive force in their communities. In general, Masonry in Eastern District is healthy.

Erie (9 Lodges)

In addition to a successful reception for the Grand Master, a Lodge of Instruction, a Brother to Brother seminar, and the regular Official Visits, there have been some other important events in Erie District this year. There were two significant milestones: Pelee Lodge No. 627 celebrates its 75th anniversary and Thistle Lodge No. 34 celebrates its 150th anniversary; to mark this occasion a member's wife made uniforms as worn by the soldiers of the 34th Regiment stationed at Amherstburg 150 years ago.

All of the Official Visits and Installations were well attended. All of the messages received from the Grand Master were read at the various lodges. The highlight of the year was the Official Visit to Pelee Lodge No. 627, with a ferry ride to Pelee Island and a fish dinner. A Junior Warden's chair was presented to Pelee Lodge by Bro. Gary Adams and Bro. Robert Adams, in memory of Bro. Bob Adams – brother of Gary and father of Robert, all members of Leamington Lodge No. 290.

The Divine Service held at St. Andrew's Church, Comber, had an excellent attendance; the Oriental Shrine Band lead the parade; the Church was full, and a luncheon was served after the service.

Erie and Windsor Districts will support the Masonic Model of the Students Assistance Program to provide another training seminar this August. The programme is used in the local schools and is designed to make an early identification of children with problems.

Frontenac (19 Lodges)

Masonry in Frontenac District has maintained the same level of enthusiasm over the

last five years, mainly because of the efforts of a progressively aging and dedicated membership. In some lodges the senior members have held the strings that bind them together, while in others the new officers and members have assumed a greater degree of responsibility.

The Masons of Frontenac District, in association with concordant bodies and the Order of the Eastern Star, hosted the Masonic Display tent at the International Plowing Match. M.W. Bro. William T. Anderson, Grand Master, and other dignitaries were received, followed by a "Family Feast" at the Kingston Shrine Club on September 15, 1998. Other district events included: a Divine Service, a reception for R.W. Bro. Robert McKibbon, a Lodge of Instruction and the Frontenac District project for the Masonic Foundation of Ontario.

A District Pin was designed, which is now available.

Georgian North (12 Lodges)

Georgian North District remains strong and dedicated. Most of the twelve lodges are in a healthy to growing position. The turn around that we as Masons have been looking for is gradually taking place. We were always received with warmth and dignity. The few lodges that are less than healthy took the positive suggestions with enthusiasm, and in one case made a surprisingly good attempt to showing recovery.

The chairmen of the various committees were a group of outstanding Masons, who did their jobs with enthusiastic dedication and traveled extensively throughout the year. All of the lodge buildings are in excellent shape and the individual lodges are looking after repairs and renovations with dedication.

The Divine Service, held at St. James Anglican Church in Orillia, was a huge success, with over 200 in attendance. Many of the congregation approached me personally, expressing their delight at having the Masons at the best service they had experienced in years.

Georgian District North is strong, vibrant and dedicated. The members are practicing the principles of Freemasonry, which results in a natural, healthy spin-off.

Georgian South (10 Lodges)

While there are some weak lodges in Georgian South, the district as a whole is very strong and, in my opinion, has a very positive future going in to the new millennium. The Aims and Objectives for the year were: 1. To generate harmony within the lodge. 2. To generate harmony throughout the district. 3. To promote the Brother to Brother programme. 4. To encourage lodges to open Masonic Windows in their community. 5. To initiate a feasibility study on forming chapters of De Molay and Job's Daughters. 6. To continue to host the "All Candidates Dinner."

Grey (12 Lodges)

The brethren in Grey District are getting everything out of Masonry, because of the way in which they travel throughout the district as well as visiting other districts.

The Brother to Brother programme seems to be slow in getting started, but will no doubt help restore interest in some who seem to have drifted away. One of the things which impressed me most was the co-operation received from the Grand Lodge Benevolence Committee when a brother in the district had some misfortune. When the system works it not only helps the brethren see the Charity of Masonry, but also shows to others some of the things which Masonry is doing.

Some of the lodges are starting to attract candidates after a long quiet period and,

hopefully, our numbers will increase enough that in a few years we will have no lodges with Past Masters in the chairs. Masonry in Grey District is strong and seems to be growing with a new vigor.

Hamilton A (14 Lodges) All of the lodges have some form of Masonic Education and instruction, but unfortunately, they do not follow the programme suggested by Grand Lodge. Most have candidates who are joining. The lodge officers are dedicated Masons and the floor work and protocol, in most cases, is very good. Finances are in control and I foresee no trouble in the near future.

In the fourteen lodges there are seventeen Past Masters in line officer chairs, of this number two lodges each have three.

Hamilton B (14 Lodges)

The 14 lodges in Hamilton B are reasonably active, financially sound and the prospects for the future look encouraging. The ritual was done well on the Official Visits as well as at the Installations and on a number of other fraternal visits. There are an increasing number of Master Masons in the line of office, and it is most rewarding to see their progress as they gain experience in their offices.

The spring District Divine Service was held at the Beth Jacob Synagogue in April, a first for Hamilton. It was well attended with 400 Masons, wives and friends being present. The Rabbi presented an inspiring message, "Ritual and Ethics," a most fitting and interesting topic for Masonry and its teachings.

Masonry in Hamilton B is moving forward thanks to the efforts of a number of Masons throughout the district . . . Let us continue to enjoy Masonry and support its growth into the next millennium.

Hamilton C (15 Lodges)

Masonry in Hamilton District C is stable in most lodges. They are extremely vibrant and participate in the activities of the district. It is refreshing to see the large number of initiations on the evening of the Official Visits, where it is usually customary to see the F.C. degree. Being resigned to the fact of declining memberships, lodges were encouraged to work with their new candidates by nurturing them into good, solid Masons. They were asked not to rush these candidates.

Hamilton District C made its debut on the internet with a new web site in September 1998. I had the privilege of presenting bursaries to a couple of students at Mohawk College on behalf of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario. The charitable fundraising project that was begun last year, came to fruition, as the funds for a cabin to be built at Camp Trillium in Waterford were turned over to the Charity during the year. The brethren not only met their target, but surpassed it quite handsomely. The spring Divine Service was held at the Beth Jacob Synagogue; the uniqueness of this event caused the attendance to increase dramatically, which proves that any Worshipful Master or lodge who also "Dares to be Different" can positively influence the attendance at their own regular communications.

London East (14 Lodges)

This year as District Deputy Grand Master confirmed what I had sensed for the last several years - that Masonry is alive and well here in London East. As has been the history of Masonry at any point in time, some lodges are doing better than others are,

but on the whole Masonry in this district is strong. The leadership provided by the present and past Grand Lodge Officers, the Masters and Past Masters is helping to position London East for the future.

The London East lodges have recognized the problems confronting Masonry due to the trends and demands of to-day's society. Many lodges have launched initiatives on their own and, with the help of Grand Lodge, to become more pro-active and visible in the community.

More and more lodge events include our ladies and our families. Meetings are better planned, with something of interest each month. Members who have not been to lodge in some time are being contacted regularly and encouraged to come back out to lodge. The *Brother to Brother* programme has been enthusiastically embraced. With the wealth of ideas contained in this programme, I am sure that we can look forward to a stronger fraternity.

Working with London West District, we have relaunched a Masonic calendar, covering what is happening in the two districts; a family picnic has been arranged for June, and a medical outreach programme formed to ensure that brethren from outside our districts will be visited while in a London hospital.

In order to solve any problem you have to recognize the issues and then understand them. I believe that London East District has started down the road to solving some of the problems facing Masonry in to-day's society.

London West (14 Lodges)

A number of very positive activities and programmes have been planned, implemented and/or completed this year, which should prove most beneficial to the Craft in general, and to the London West and surrounding districts in particular.

This year we were successful in launching the "London Masonic Medical Outreach Program" to 14 districts surrounding London in the 519 area code. This is a three year pilot project which will provide hospital visitation to Masonic brethren from areas outside London, who are sent to any of our London Hospitals for medical treatment. It was established as a combined project of both London East and London West Districts. It is anticipated that the territories will be expanded in the future to include all of the 46 districts in Ontario.

A number of benevolent causes were also gratified this past year, possibly the most significant being the presentation of a new motorized wheelchair to a cerebral palsy patient at London's Parkwood Hospital. As well, we enjoyed the pleasure of presenting numerous bursaries to worthy students at the University of Western Ontario and at Fanshawe College, as part of the ongoing programmes of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario.

Again, following a successful introduction last year, the London East and West Districts will hold their second annual "Shunpiker's Tour" ... Also this year, the first of what we hope will become an annual event, a combined London East and West Family Picnic will be held in late June.

Muskoka – Parry Sound (8 Lodges)

Masonry in Muskoka-Parry Sound District continues to thrive in a healthy, happy atmosphere. We do have a major concern with one lodge, to which I have referred in my report.

The Grand Lodge Officers have been very visible and helpful in the district this year and I am grateful for their support. We were honoured to have two recipients of

the William Mercer Wilson medal, Bro. Bob Esch and Bro. Jim Millest, in attendance on many occasions. The lodges have assisted one another by loaning candidates for degree work, so that all officers in the district had the opportunity to perform their duties with new members advancing in Masonry. The "Traveling Gavel" continues to promote visitation and is an important part of district tradition.

The regional meeting at the beginning of the year, in Huntsville, was a fine opportunity to meet some fellow District Deputies, and a great introductory session to our new responsibilities. Meeting our Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master and Grand Secretary in a very informal atmosphere banished the spectre of intimidation that is, unfortunately, an ever present feeling in those who have only known them through their office.

Niagara A (14 Lodges) The district is continuing to grow and be strong. During my travels I found the brethren to be friendly and most helpful. We have established a good relationship with Niagara District B. We have had many occasions to visit each other's lodges and attend social functions.

It was noticed that not all lodges observe the proper protocol during the lodge meetings and/or at the banquet hour. The various lodges should be reminded to uphold these basic traditions as they are the basis of what Masonry is all about. The lodges all send out excellent summonses to their members. All of the lodge buildings are in good condition and each lodge sponsors social events through the year, so that the families and friends can get to know each other. One of the main highlights being the Annual Ladies' Nights.

I feel that Masonry is a great charitable organization that does not get the recognition that it deserves. We should let the community know of the various charities that we support, and the work that we do in the community. This year the members of the district, through the Masonic Foundation, presented a cheque to our local hospital. This was acknowledged through the regular newsletter sent out by the hospital to the residents of the Niagara region. We should encourage more of this type of advertising. To encourage new members we need to be more visible. In addition to producing the lodge summons on the computer some lodges have also established a website.

Niagara B (11 Lodges)

Niagara B has been very active in visitations, both within the district and without, as many of the lodges have sister lodges in the U.S.A. The work of the lodges is, on the whole, good, although there are some lodges who need help. The problem is arising because some new Master Masons are being pushed to take chairs for which they are not qualified, and by the failure of some members to turn up for practices. Due to small turnouts the Worshipful Master has little or no choice in filling the chairs. As a result the work of the lodge suffers tremendously.

On the negative side, I was distressed to have to attend so many Masonic Memorial Services, and at the poor attendance at the District Divine Service – fifteen Masons in a district of almost twelve hundred is most discouraging. I am recommending that my successor hold a service, but if there is no increase in numbers this situation will need to be addressed.

Nipissing East (7 Lodges)

Nipissing East District consists of seven lodges, from east to west a distance of 87 km, and from north to south a distance of 227 km. The overall attitude of the district is quite positive. Visitation among the lodges is good and the northern section also visit lodges in Temiskaming District, while the southern section visit with the brethren in the Muskoka – Parry Sound and Sudbury – Manitoulin Districts.

Due to the small membership in a couple of the lodges, some of the officers' chairs are filled by Past Masters, but the mood of the brethren is positive. However, the attendance seems to be dropping off slightly. It is hoped that *Brother to Brother* will bring back the members. We had two cases of Masonic Benevolence; and six bursaries were presented from the Masonic Foundation, five to Haileybury Campus and one to North Bay Campus. *Friend to Friend* is active in all of the lodges and the *Mentors Program* is being used in five lodges.

A history of the district is presently being compiled by W. Bro. McConkey.

North Huron (12 Lodges)

Many positive events have occurred during the past year in North Huron District. Grand Lodge presented two outstanding workshops, the Lodge of Instruction and the *Brother to Brother* programme.

In October, 1998, Northern Light Lodge No. 93 marked their 140th anniversary and in April, 1999, Blair Lodge No. 314 followed with their 125th anniversary. Both occasions were honoured by the presence of the Deputy Grand Master.

The district Long Range Planning and Membership Committee held two successful workshops to increase the focus on reviving our membership towards their Masonic beliefs. Most lodges held very successful Ladies' Nights. Blood donor clinics were highlighted with encouragement to give the gift of life. Memorial Services and Remembrance Services were encouraged and well attended.

This year's theme was communicated regularly, "helping others in need and charity does not always take a monetary form." Overall Masonic beliefs are strong, with many Past Masters as our resources. The negative point is that one-half of the lodges are not visiting, this is very visible at special events. Hopefully the *Brother to Brother* programme will have a positive effect on this in the future. Many districts have unique fundamentals, but a district's CHARACTER is built on it's ABILITY TO VISIT.

Ontario (15 Lodges)

Over the past year I have been constantly invigorated, pleased and even surprised by the good attendance, degree work, the mix of mature and younger brethren along with their enthusiasm for Freemasonry.

There was one lodge, Colborne No. 91, which last year appeared to be less than ideal, they have turned the corner very dramatically since then. I have commended the Worshipful Master, W. Bro. Haines, and the officers for doing such a great job. One other lodge seems to be experiencing attendance problems, but, on the whole, I must say that ongoing participation through visiting and being active on lodge and district committees of the Past Masters and Grand Lodge Officers is a fine example to all Masons, in particular the new officers and new members.

Lebanon Lodge No. 139 will be donating two seeing-eye dogs to the community; in addition, they have donated over two thousand dollars to the district charity.

Ottawa 1 (16 Lodges)

The Craft . . . is alive and well in this district. Some of the lodges that just a few short years ago appeared to be in serious trouble, have turned the corner and are leading the way in activities, membership and community involvement. Newer members are contributing to the work in the lodge room and are accepting the challenge of holding office.

The ritual work in most cases is good. Some improvement is necessary in individual lodges and a commitment by their officers to attend Lodges of Instruction would be a definite benefit. Those that appear to be the weakest in terms of ritual, protocol and attendance also represent the poorest participation at district and G.L. functions.

The Brother to Brother programme has a 100% participation rate for training of lodge facilitators. If the lodges make full use of this excellent resource, I am sure that in the next few years we will see a marked decline in suspensions and demits. District activities included a District Divine Service at Hawthorne United Church, at which the District Deputies and District Chaplains of both Ottawa Districts participated, A Remembrance Service was held at Perley/Rideau Veterans Health Centre on November 11th and a Lodge of Instruction on protocol was hosted by Doric Lodge No. 58, and on that occasion I had the privilege of presenting a 70 year pin.

Members of this district have shown their benevolence this year by assisting a member of Acacia Lodge No. 561, victim of a serious medical condition; and helping the 17 year old granddaughter of a member of Civil Service Lodge No. 148, who became a paraplegic when the car in which she was a passenger was hit head on by an impaired driver.

Ottawa 2 (16 Lodges)

Masonry continues to thrive in the Ottawa valley. In contrast to the general trend evidenced in the Grand Jurisdiction, a number of our lodges have exhibited real growth during the past year, thanks to the dedication and leadership shown. Younger brethren are being attracted into our fraternity.

Aside from the regular menu of Official Visits, Ladies' Nights, the Travelling Gavel, Past Masters' Nights, Divine Services and Open Houses, Ottawa District 2 is excited by the unqualified success of a number of new intiatives undertaken during the past year: 1. We have decisively moved into the information technology age with a District Web page, which should continue to grow in scope, size and usefulness. 2. All 16 lodge facilitators have been fully trained in the Brother to Brother programme, and are now honing their individual skills towards lodge-driven applications and solutions, using the excellent tool-kit. 3. The Valley Craftsman was published four times this year as a 'hard-copy' method-of information exchange, and all past and future issues will be incorporated as regular features on the Web. 4. We were thrilled to present six bursaries from the Masonic Foundation of Ontario to worthy students at Ottawa University and Algonquin College.

Despite the continuing ravaging impact of an aging and declining membership, and financial difficulties for a number of lodges, the brethren of Ottawa District 2 approach the dawning of the new millennium with confidence, enthusiasm and commitment.

Peterborough (12 Lodges)

The theme this year was "A Plan to Build." Each address given to a lodge Official Visit or function was related to constructing a building, and how a plan for our life and actions will enhance our enjoyment of our success based on a plan of action. Change

is inevitable and one of the things we must do, as an organization, is to prepare for the future... this can only be accomplished with a plan created from the lodge member level, and strenuously supported and encouraged by the Grand Master and G.L.

Prince Edward (17 Lodges)

Prince Edward District has had a successful year, with most of its planned projects completed and a good increase in attendance at the district functions and Official Visitations. The various district committees have had their meetings well advertised in the District Communique ... published on a bi-monthly basis ... advertising has been one key to the increase in attendance and awareness. The Prince Edward Communique was first published this year.

Our district project – Camp Trillium – exceeded its goal (10,000); 11,000 has been raised to date. Most of the funds came from publicly raised money, projects such as: piano recitals, dances, dinners, pancake breakfasts, work projects, card parties and various other projects. The District Divine Service, through the use of envelopes, helped to raise a goodly portion of these funds.

The only negative concern in our district is the decline in total membership. The *Friend to Friend* and *Brother to Brother* programmes have not helped as well as expected. More work and more involvement is required by all of the Masons in our district. As H. Jackson Brown Jr. stated: "Life doesn't require that we be the best – only that we try our best."

St. Lawrence (19 Lodges)

St. Lawrence District is composed of 19 lodges stretching from Kemptville and Prescott in the east to Perth and Lyn in the west, and from the St. Lawrence River to Lanark in the north. The lodges can be divided into three groups, for convenience called A, B and C.

A group contains 7 lodges; these are the larger ones with memberships of 90 to 225. Generally, they are in good shape financially and have a membership that is either growing slightly or static. A characteristic which they have in common is that they are actively involved in community endeavors and have high profiles. They are distributed throughout the district and are not concentrated in one area.

B group contains 5 lodges with a membership of 59 to 90. They are financially sound to marginal and have a membership that is static or growing slowly. They do participate in their local communities and sometimes assist in local projects. In some ways, considering the size of their towns, they have a greater local presence than many of the larger lodges, and they symbolize Masonry in their community.

C group is composed of 7 lodges with membership of 35 to 59. Financially most of them are close to the edge, two are having difficulties that could force their closing in the future. The membership is not growing and in two or three cases is declining. They are located in small rural communities which they service to the limit of their ability and resources. It may become necessary for some of these to amalgamate in the future. These are the lodges that are the weakest in Masonic work, ritual and knowledge.

St. Thomas (11 Lodges)

 \dots Masonry is alive, vibrant and on the verge of making a resurgence. Yes, there are problems within the district – and surely without. But in most cases the problems will be resolved and disappear.

Two lodges in this district, that five years ago were on the brink of collapse, are now busily at work making new Masons and are in a most favourable situation. I think that we should have more lodges. Smaller lodges, where everyone knows everyone else are seeming to flourish, with half of their members out to each meeting. Masonry will survive. Masonry will flourish. But it will take some hard work to ensure that our Order reacquires its position of yesteryear.

Sarnia (21 Lodges)

In the past year we have stressed the importance of the contents of the Book of Constitution, with this thought in mind – that *Knowledge* will help in all that we do. This type of education appears to have improved the work performed in the lodges, as far as ritual and the rules of order are concerned. The lodges are working more closely to the Book of the Work. Brothers have been telling other brothers, who have not been attending, of the changes and improvements – these brothers have been attending lodge to find out for themselves; even to the point of attending other lodges to compare. Attendance at Official Visits has been excellent. One lodge in particular had more in attendance than the lodge could comfortably hold. Brothers were attending and standing in the anteroom. There were twenty-eight members visiting from one lodge alone, with a total of one hundred and two in attendance.

The Masonic Benevolent Boot, which travels with the District Deputy, has collected over \$1,000 this year for the District Benevolent Fund. The Past Masters', Masters' and Wardens' degree team conferred a number of degrees during the year. The district Lodge of Instruction was held in Petrolia with very good results, with many members in attendance. Instruction was given on the floor work in the three degrees as well as the procedure at a Masonic Memorial Service.

The District Ladies' Night had 204 in attendance, including Grand Lodge Officers from other districts. The evening was a success, even with the very poor weather. The "Pie Olympics" was a sight to behold – the pie table cleared in 68 seconds.

... a few country lodges are having a bit of a struggle (not with finances) as their buildings are getting old and the long staircases are proving a problem for the older members. In general, we have had a considerable increase in membership, as most lodges have new candidates, and are either initiating or doing degree work at each meeting. I believe that in the next year or two we will be seeing a number of country lodges joining together in one Masonic Temple, similar to that in Sarnia. It appears that there are two lodges in the process of becoming one.

South Huron (15 Lodges)

Masonry for the most part is alive and well in South Huron District. There are however, some that are having a bad spell. I feel that the display which is going to be at the International Plowing Match is one of the ways to help to educate the public about our fraternity.

Many of the lodges have family days, pot luck dinners, etc. for the widows and new members to make new as well as to renew old friendships. This will never hurt Masonry, in my personal opinion.

Sudbury – Manitoulin (9 Lodges)

I have been extremely impressed by the commitment and dedication of the Worshipful Masters of the district. The workings of Masonry, within and without the lodge room, have been well organized and presented with due regard to all protocols. The officers

and brethren participating in the degree work are well prepared, and candidates advancing have been well schooled and mentored.

Several of the lodges are facing challenges regarding line officers. This is due in some cases to brethren relocating for reasons which are job related, and in other instances to brethren not wishing to advance. The lodges of the district are dealing well and ably with finance, facility and administrative issues, and those related to matters such as the collection of dues and the submission of returns to Grand Lodge. Our lodges continue to be troubled by low attendance at regular meetings. As was documented in the report of my predecessor, R.W. Bro. Ronald Eveson, declining attendance has been a problem for some time. Our lodges, to their credit, are meeting this situation "head on," and are very much focused on initiatives to improve attendance; by working to conduct meetings more efficiently, to arrange interesting programmes and by providing transportation for brethren unable to get to meetings.

We continue to profit from initiatives such as the District Tracing Board and the District Web Page (linked to the Grand Lodge Web Page). Friendship Lodge continues to publish the award winning newsletter *The Cable Tow* and has maintained its involvement in Sudbury's Good Roads Programme. Many lodges have either established or are maintaining the tradition of setting aside a meeting for the purpose of conducting a Memorial Service. Most of the lodges have maintained the tradition of Past Masters' Nights and Step-up Nights.

Temiskaming (9 Lodges)

Although there has been a membership reduction because of deaths, drastic employment cutbacks throughout the district and more early retirees leaving for points south, it now seems to be waning. Several of the lodges are now using the *Friend to Friend* programme annually, which is resulting in applications each year and seems to be the most productive membership builder in this area. The programme seems to be spreading more each year. All of the lodges are quite keen on the new, to us, Brother to Brother programme, and each has recruited facilitators and alternates to take the training, and seem eager to try it out.

Some lodges are using yard sales and sausage sales to supplement their finances and create fraternal get togethers and fun. Special social gatherings, including families and guests, have been held, and a special recognition night was held for a long time hard working brother, who was roasted and toasted to everyone's delight. There are a lot of dedicated Masons in this district, and if these ideas and a few new ones continue, with a little hard work and perseverance, the steady decline in our membership should be able to be reversed and the fraternity will again flourish.

Toronto 1 (22 Lodges)

The theme for this year: LET'S ALL CULTIVATE FRIENDSHIP - THE DRIVING FORCE FOR OUR FUTURE! The highlight of the year was the second annual walk-a-thon, held in Port Credit. Our goal was to raise \$10,000 for the CODA and PAD anti-drug programmes, under the guidance of the Masonic Foundation of Ontario. Although it was raining, the turnout was great; the food and beverages much appreciated; the corporate donated prizes unexpected and donations above target. A big THANK YOU to local businesses for their sponsorship and donations; the Special Events Committee for professionally organizing this event and all Masons, families and friends for their generosity in "Caring and Sharing."

The district had the honour of presenting a bursary cheque of \$800 to a student

at Humber College on behalf of the Masonic Foundation of Ontario. At the district meeting in April, one graduate of the Grand Lodge Correspondence Course and five of the seven graduates of the Speechcraft Course were presented with their certificates. The Lodge of Instruction, in November, was hosted by Toronto District 2, with 135 brethren in attendance – it was a morning well spent.

The Membership Committee presented, in January, "An Explanation of the First Degree," which was well received by the large group of brethren in attendance. In March the Education Committee arranged a Masonic Trivia Contest, based on the TV show "Reach for the Top," attended by 95 Masons representing 24 lodges from within and without the district. Since the event was a great success, Toronto District 1 welcomes challenges from other districts within this format.

The *Blue Print* (District Newsletter) increased its two issues from four to eight pages, with greater advertising and editorial content. The newsletter, which is now virtually self supporting, has been judged by Grand Lodge as "The Best Newsletter of the Year."

Masonry in General: It was great to see lodges making their meetings interesting, informative and enjoyable. This will definitely help to maintain and even increase attendance.

Toronto 2 (19 Lodges)

The Masters' Association presented the Masonic play "A Rose Upon the Altar" several times during the year at different lodges . . . very well received.

The Care and Contact Committee attended to the needs of those in distress or bereavement, while the District Project raised funds on behalf of the Ontario Fibromyalgia Association. Many lodges held very successful social events, and the District Golf Tournament appears to be a success.

In November, we hosted a Grand Lodge of Instruction which was most successful. Our Wardens' Association were active in performing degrees in various lodges. The Computer Resource Committee held a very successful workshop for Lodge Secretaries on various computer programmes, in conjunction with Grand Lodge. The Public Relations Committee continued in assisting in Mall Booths and Open House activities. Our District Divine Service, in May, was very well attended, with R.W. Bro. Cerwyn Davies delivering the sermon.

The Installations and the Official Visits were very well attended, and the degree work was well done.

Toronto 3 (17 Lodges)

The theme promoted this year was "Talking Proud," reminding our members to have fun as they relay positive messages about our beloved Craft and the many fine members within it. The state of Masonry in Toronto District 3 remains, in most circumstances, in good condition, and provides a positive venue for the brethren to practice and maintain good moral values in dealing with their fellow man. Most lodges have a core group of members, usually the senior officers plus one or two Past Masters, that interact with each other, and those from other lodges to learn from each other and hopefully grow. However, we have a couple of lodges that continue to look inward for all their support, and therefore are struggling.

A District Steering Committee has received formal recognition. Guidelines willhelp set the parameters for the activities and direction of the district, its committees and the District Deputy, to provide continuity from one year to the next. The Wardens' groups,

established formally in the Junior Warden's year, provide a strong support group for both the Mason and his family. We must strive to get the struggling lodges to participate in these groups.

Our Education Committee developed an exciting competition of Masonic Baseball, with lodges visiting one another in this round robin tournament. Not only did it promote friendly competition on evenings when no degree work was available, but it offered some interesting and thought provoking discussions on some of the questions. Overall, I feel that this district will continue to offer friendship and support for one another as we travel toward the next millennium.

Toronto 4 (17 Lodges)

The theme this past year has been to "Set the Members of the Craft to Work." The response by the lodges, officers and members of the district has been most gratifying. The impact of a continual decline of members in the district, through attrition, suspension and demits, as well, the ever increasing age of the members attending each lodge, have had a profound negative effect on the financial and membership resources, available for implementation by the lodges. The lodges recognize the necessity of balancing their respective budgets, using the equation of: lodge expenses divided by lodge membership equals yearly dues; however, this formula is not always easily implemented, particularly in view of the member aging factor. Senior members, although recognizing the need for the increase in dues, because of fixed incomes, have the obvious difficulty in supporting this principle.

The lack of membership resources impacts on the ability of the Worshipful Masters to have at their disposal a pool of ritualists, proficient in the Work and mechanics of the degrees, to assist in the conferring of the degrees. Another reality is that of Masonic immaturity, evidenced, as a result of the necessity of parachuting/jumping officers into the senior chairs of the lodge in order to accommodate vacancy needs. The practice is also having a profoundly negative effect on the ability of the lodges to cope with the lack of the needed expertise necessary for healthy leadership ...

The District Charitable Project, the children of "About Face" has had a wonderful effect for the cohesiveness of the lodges in the district, bringing them closer together than ever before. The implementation of "Welcome New Masons Day" in May, was an outstanding success.

Toronto 5 (15 Lodges)

The theme for this year was: "remembering where we come from and what our Masonry means to us." (Pride in our Past and Faith in our Future.) Toronto District 5 has had a very challenging and rewarding year. Challenging, because each lodge in its own way has taken a look at its past and set goals for the future.

Most encouraging is the energy and enthusiasm the brethren are showing as we prepare to enter the new century ... Open Houses, Mall Displays and increased visitation has helped to strengthen the bonds that hold us together. In this day of hustle and bustle, it is nice to know that there is a place where one can go and leave the cares of the world behind, recharge your soul, and meet one another in an environment of peace and harmony.

Toronto 6 (14 Lodges)

There are three words which ... best reflect the members of Toronto District 6 ... enthusiastic, dedicated and devoted. There seems to be a renewed kindling of the

Masonic spirit this year, which is related to the Masters' and Wardens' Association working together through their social programmes. This was evident in the number of Masters and Wardens in attendance at the Official Visits, showing support for their fellow brethren . . . also very rewarding to see a high number of Master Masons who also attended . . . Unfortunately some lodges in the district are struggling, but hopefully through the *Mentors, Friend to Friend* and the *Brother to Brother* programmes, these lodges will grow stronger . . . The district chairmen worked hard this year. As a result the members of the district gained in knowledge through such media as Masonic Education evenings, District Newsletters and Educational Bulletins which were mailed with their lodge summons.

Again this year each lodge supported a benevolent project within their community, and the brethren's pride and enthusiasm in their selected charities resulted in approximately \$17,000 being raised. . . . the overall condition of Freemasonry in Toronto District 6 is growing stronger, and with improved lodge communications, support and interaction with the other lodges in the district, the future looks very good as we step forth into the 21st century.

Toronto 7 (25 Lodges)

This year... our theme was "Fulfilling a Commitment," and brethren everywhere were reminded of the need to live to this theme and its message. The support of all brethren throughout the district was most encouraging, and the many who made their contribution of time and talent demonstrated their attachment to the Craft and its principles.

Within our district, our rather unique Senior Wardens' Association, with the Immediate Past District Deputy and District Secretary as mentors, forms a core of Masons dedicated to the pleasures of the warmth of fraternal association. Equally it also offers the group the opportunity of perfecting and understanding the ritual, and the mechanics of the work, as they travel throughout the district, either conferring degrees or participating in Masonic Education nights.

The Worshipful Masters, the brethren who we expect to lead and direct the lodge in their year in the East, were also involved in attending informal meetings, at which timely discussions and exchanges of ideas took place, dealing with such topics as Planning, Protocol, Banquet Hour and fine tuning the role of Master.

The support of the brethren for our District Project – Prevent, Prepare and Promote – of the Epilepsy Association of Metro Toronto, was outstanding. Over 10,000 has been raised to date and hopefully the total will exceed 16,000.

In July of 1998, our Grand Master expressed the need for all Masons to pay due attention to our shut-ins and the widows of our departed brethren. To this end the district held an afternoon social for our widows at Thornhill Temple. They were welcomed and an afternoon of refreshments and entertainment was provided. The deep feeling for this event was evident from the beginning, and the support of all of our lodges was very much appreciated in paying our respects to this wonderful group of ladies.

Victoria (14 Lodges)

Every lodge in the district initiated at least one candidate this year - some - more. A good sign of course, while at the same time, like most districts, our total membership declines; but new, young members will provide interest and stability as the membership ages.

At the Official Visits most lodges did Masonic Education, to try and make the members more knowledgeable about the Craft, to create interest and to see if shorter meetings would increase attendance. The talks by the District Deputy were held to less than seven minutes, and subject matter was kept primarily to human interest about Masons; who they were, and what they had done. From the considerable overall increase in attendance, these ideas seem to have been successful.

Over half of the lodges in the district are taking the necessary steps to increase revenue, and at the same time are making physical improvements to their buildings inside and out.

The Masters and Officers of a few lodges do not seem to visit in the district, but are active in their own lodge. The core of regular visitors seem to enjoy a warm friendly relationship, young and old.

Fortunately, we have had no lodges in the district broken into in this year. Two lodges have installed security systems, and all but two of the other lodges have either marked all of their furnishings, or taken a video or still photographs of the interior.

A stable and dedicated future with reduced membership appears to be ahead for Victoria District.

Waterloo (16 Lodges)

The mission this year . . . has been to regenerate some enthusiasm and fun into the lodges, with the accent on a positive attitude and outlook. The Masters' and Wardens' Association has been reorganized and has taken an active part in the operation of the district, as a body representing all of the lodges in the district. The Association, in it's new form, has made great strides in bringing the district together.

The district chairmen have formed working committees and met regularly to discuss the various problems in the district, and to formulate realistic solutions. The inter-lodge visitation programme has been reorganized, where a lodge is designated to accompany the District Deputy on the Official Visit. The new format has turned a poorly supported programme into a semi-contest. Attendance has been excellent. A casual practice session has been organized. The Preston – New Hope Temple has been made available Saturdays for the practice of any work or general discussion.

To sum up the year in Waterloo District, I believe that the level of involvement and participation of the overall membership has been increased. Many problems have been worked out, and the future looks promising.

Wellington (12 Lodges)

Wellington District has experienced a busy, exciting year in a variety of areas. The International Plowing Match Committee is meeting regularly to prepare for the year 2000.

The Blood Donors programme was very successful, realizing 2,080 donations. We participated in the Masonic Education forums, first at the regional Lodge of Instruction in Cambridge, and at our own Masonic Education evening in February, hosted by Mercer Lodge.

A new project this year was coats - coats - coats, which realized over 5,000 coats, plus various articles such as headbands, to comfort those less fortunate. So successful that we provided comfort in Wellington and Bruce counties, Halton region, City of Toronto and in Bosnia.

Conestogo Lodge celebrated its 125th anniversary, which concluded with the reception for the Grand Master, with over 300 in attendance. The District Divine

Service was held in Drayton United Church in June. The Eighteenth Century Degree Team, after 21 years, has made the 100th presentation. Wellington District also effected two new social activities, a District Golf Tournament, and a joint Ladies' Night with Waterloo District, for dinner/theatre at Drayton Festival Theater.

During the year we initiated 37 new Masons in the district, which was of course a highlight of this Masonic year.

Western (10 Lodges)

My many visits throughout the district have given me a good overview of the condition of Masonry in Western District. In most cases the problem appears to be membership and attendance. Morale appears to be good. Although membership is not down in all of the lodges, the problem is certainly one of concern. There are fewer candidates, so on many occasions the lodge meeting consisted of business only. Without degree work meetings become boring, causing a decline in attendance.

During the Official Visits I stressed the need for education and inter-lodge visits, which would perhaps improve attendance, creating stronger district fellowship. Without new membership, Past Masters assume the offices of the lodge, and the new officers advance too quickly, lacking experience when they reach the principal chairs. During my visits I expressed the value of the *Mentors* Program and promoted the *Brother to Brother* programme, which was introduced in Kenora in April, 1999; the attendance at the Workshop was good and the presentation was well received.

I constantly expressed my concerns that we must renew interest to increase growth, and the *Brother to Brother* programme could be the tool to make it happen. Although the numbers show a decrease in membership, the cost of operating continues to increase, causing financial difficulties for some of the lodges in the district. Raising dues is a band-aid cure for the problem, and it must be cured through increased membership and efficient financial planning. Revenue by other means must be established. A few of the lodges have actually shown an increase in their membership, and I am pleased to report that a good number of them are younger men. Although Past Masters are the backbone of the lodge, youth represents the future.

In summation, I believe that communication and visitation to be the best method of improving Masonry in the district. Communication is the best method of raising awareness of district activities, and visitation increases attendance and improves the fellowship and personal bond of brotherhood.

Wilson North (12 Lodges)

The use of the *Friend to Friend* programme continues to grow in the district, increasing the number of applicants for the lodges, and promoting the fraternity. The *Brother to Brother* programme has arrived in Wilson North, and every lodge has a facilitator. Many of the lodges are now experiencing new interest in Masonry.

The many social events, (Family B.B.Q.s, Ladies' Nights, etc.) are keeping everyone involved. The District Divine Service was well attended by over 100 brethren, family and friends. The lodges of the district are well managed by strong, committed Masters and Officers.

The buildings and lodge rooms are well maintained and make a positive image for Masonry in the communities. The officers of the lodges were strong supporters of the Official Visits, and the ritual and the mechanics of the work were very well done.

The new Oak Branch Lodge No. 261 "Masonic Centre" in Innerkip opened for the April meetings. The brethren of Oak Branch and Blenheim Lodges are proud hosts

to all visitors at their new Masonic home.

The District Masonic Foundation Project - Camp Trillium - Rainbow Lake - was successfully completed, surpassing our financial goal with total donations of \$1,524.55. Blood donations increased by over 40% in 1998-99. Masonic Education was a highlight of every Official Visit, with all of the district committee reports well received. The Mentor Program is gradually receiving acceptance in the district, but must be continuously promoted and monitored to be effective.

The Masters', Past Masters' and Wardens' Association continues to promote interlodge and district visitation, and is as well an excellent resource in conducting Masonic Education Workshops in the districts of Wilson North and Wilson South.

Wilson South (12 Lodges)

R.W. Bro. L. Wayne Williams The combined District Choirs of Wilson North and Wilson South, under the able leadership of W. Bro. Willard Challard, provided inspirational music at the District Divine Service, and are thanked for their efforts.

The brethren of Wilson South should look within themselves for the answer to the problems facing lodges today; declining membership, lack of involvement in lodge activities and a general apathy towards the Craft. If our members give off a positive attitude, take our newer members with them as they travel about the district, then the whole Craft is the winner. Several lodges this year seized the theme of getting younger members involved, and it has started to increase the numbers attending the meetings. The lodge rooms about the district reflect the pride of all of our members in their buildings, and they should be commended for keeping them in such fine condition.

Financially, all of the lodges have cleaned up some very serious dues arrears problems. The brethren are to be commended for their continued involvement in the Camp Trillium - Rainbow Lake Project, as well as other district projects such as Operation Coathanger.

Windsor (10 Lodges)

On December 6, 1998, the Ontario Masonic Student Assistance Programme held its kick-off for fund raising at the Masonic Temple on Ouellette Avenue. The lodge rooms were open to the public, with regalia and many Masonic artifacts on display. The highlight of the evening was the speech given by The Honourable Herb Gray, Deputy Premier of Canada.

In keeping with our district's tradition of maintaining our Masonic history, the unveiling of the seventh Windsor District Masonic Heritage Marker was a significant event - the largest ongoing project in the district. The "Windsor and Erie Districts Masonic Memorial" is doing well, as is the Windsor Museum of Freemasonry, which is continuing to grow, thanks to many donations from Masons in our district.

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Once again it is a privilege to report on behalf of the dedicated brethren who serve as members of your Management Committee: M.W. Bro William T. Anderson, Grand Master; M.W. Bro. Robert E. Davies, Grand Secretary; R.W. Bros. J. T. Cassie (Vice-Chairman), H. N. Britton, W. E. Elgie, T. E. Lewis, D. H. Mumby, and T. Shand. This past Masonic year our Management Committee met seven times as well as with the Management Group in the fall and spring. This committee has considered many issues and for your information and consideration the following are presented.

Millennium Project

Recognizing the opportunity to promote "The Cause for Good" this committee has recommended to the Grand Master that in conjunction with and supportive of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario, a Millennium Charitable Project of vast significance be adopted with a focus on hearing, building upon the success of project H.E.L.P. (Hearing for Every Living Person).

Think Tank and Five Year Plan

A think tank symposium was held at the Cedar Glen Conference Centre, January 29 - 30, 1999, under the excellent facilitation of R.W. Bro. Terry McLean. The five year plan was reviewed and revitalized and is now updated by the chair of Long Range Planning, R.W. Bro. Ronald K. Campbell, to the year 2004.

Name Change

The composition and duties of the Management Group were reviewed and recommendations for an amendment to the Constitution were forwarded to the Committee on Constitution and Jurisprudence, that the name Management Group be changed to The Advisory Group and be composed of the Grand Master ex-officio, the Deputy Grand Master, the Grand Secretary, the Grand Treasurer, the Past Grand Masters and the thirty-five elected and appointed members of the Board of General Purposes. This recommendation will be placed before the Board of General Purposes and at the 144th Annual Communication in the form of a Notice of Motion by R.W. Bro. Neil Britton.

AD HOC COMMITTEES

Immediate Past District Deputy Feedback Session

On March 13, 1999, the Grand Master, M.W. Bro. William T. Anderson, the Custodian of the Work, M.W. Bro. C. Edwin Drew, R.W. Bro. Leonard M. Fourney, Condition of Masonry Chairman, and I met with the Immediate Past District Deputy Grand Masters in Hamilton. The meeting provided an opportunity to acknowledge their 1998 reports and recommendations. It also contributed further material for future consideration. The supportive response to this meeting suggests similar meetings in the future will prove beneficial to the Craft.

Proxy

You will recall at the One Hundred and Forty-third Annual Communication a motion to remove the proxy was withdrawn after considerable opposition was expressed by the Grand Lodge membership. This was certainly a fine example of the democratic process in action. The Grand Master at that time directed that the ad hoc committee readdress the situation and report. The report was forthwith delivered to the Grand Master and we concur that the proxy shall be maintained and that special educational instruction shall be provided with the proxy form dissemination by the Grand Lodge office, in an attempt to prohibit proxy abuse.

Preparation for the Office of D.D.G.M.

Last year the need to have a more informed District Deputy Grand Master was addressed by a committee of vast Masonic experience under the chairmanship of R.W. Bro. Neil Britton, in the persons of R.W. Bros. Dowling, Elgie, Fourney, Mumby and Shand, who established a programme syllabus for D.D.G.M. preparation, consisting of:

- a) District D.D.G.M. Awareness Presentation
- b) D.D.G.M. three part Correspondence Course
- c) One day Regional Seminar for Prospective Candidates
- d) One day meeting with the Grand Master, Grand Secretary, Custodian of the Work and Deputy Grand Master with the newly confirmed District Deputy Grand Masters.

This programme was presented, as previously outlined, and the feedback from the participants has been truly positive. The committee is reviewing the responses provided and will offer the new and improved preparation course for the office of D.D.G.M. in the new Masonic year. We are indebted to each of these brethren for their untiring efforts.

Annual Communications

Last year M.W. Bro. Norman E. Byrne agreed to chair an ad hoc committee consisting of M.W. Bro. Robert E. Davies; R.W. Bros. Alex Watson, Ken Schweitzer, Robert Wands, Tom Lewis; W. Bro. David Cameron and Bro. Kris Nickerson, to review our annual communications. Their purpose is to review all aspects of our annual communication including but not limited to costs, funding, format, location, time (month, day, hours), voting and sessions and yet meet the needs of the future membership, maintaining quality and still be financially responsible. I am certain every brother appreciates the complexity of this vast task and we thank those brethren for their continued long term commitment.

M.W. Bro. Byrne has indicated that the results of their deliberations should be forthcoming soon for the consideration of the Management Committee and the Board of General Purposes.

Committee Support

The Standing and Special Committees of this Grand Lodge are dedicated participaction committees and it is a pleasure to work with such devoted brethren. This past year we have received many proposals, recommendations, scripts and budgets. In most cases we have been able to support their efforts and where we differed it is recognized that all were working in the best interests of our fraternity in view. Since each committee shall be making a report to the Board of General Purposes and to Grand Lodge we shall not repeat their information. However, I would like to thank each member and particularly the chairmen who have worked so diligently for our Craft.

Our Grand Master is of course the pilot who guides our Gentle Craft of brethren safely and securely to new heights and destinations. To each and every member of the crew who have contributed to Flight 98 – 99, a sincere thank you for all your work, energy and talent so generously provided.

This report is presented at this time on behalf of the committee, comprising R.W. Bros. Vic Cormack, Charles Crow, Brian Duncan Sr., Ed Dyer, Ralph Morgan, Robert South and Kevin Wilson.

The period covered in this report, August, 1998, to July, 1999, has once again been a very busy one for the lodge buildings within the province of Ontario.

Dedication

Martintown Lodge No. 596, in Martintown, was dedicated on April 9, 1999.

There have been several other lodge celebrations during the year. These include the unveiling of the Cornerstone at Gore Bay Lodge No. 472 on May 6, 1999, and the Official Opening of the rebuilt North Bay Temple on May 12, 1999.

There is a tremendous amount of activity currently ongoing. The following lodges are either under construction or are completed and awaiting dedication.

St. John's Lodge No. 82 in Paris. They are occupying their building and awaiting a dedication date in 2000.

Bernard Lodge No. 225 in Listowel has a building project that is currently still ongoing.

Oak Branch Lodge No. 261 in Innerkip. Their brand new building is completed

and as of April 8, 1999, they have moved into their premises and are awaiting a dedication date. Blenheim Lodge No. 108 is also occupying this beautiful new building.

There are also several other lodges that are actively seeking new, improved lodge buildings and have been furnished information from the committee for those purposes. These lodges are recognizing that we need to prepare for the future by making our lodges more accessible to those of our members who have difficulties handling stairs and other impediments.

The members of the committee have been actively promoting the committee and its aims. We encourage all lodge buildings within the province, who have not already done so, to consider incorporating. This is very important in this increasingly litigation-driven society, especially to those lodge buildings that host events that are open to the public.

Best Looking Lodge Building Competition

On April 20, 1998, a letter was sent to all 46 District Deputy Grand Masters within the province. All of the D.D.G.M.s were advised that a competition was being held to determine the best looking lodge building in the province. The D.D.G.M.s were asked to advise all of the lodges within their districts about the competition. The letter stated:

"This contest is open to every building, regardless of age or size. The goal is to make our outside appearances more appealing. Buildings will be judged by the appearance of the exterior with special emphasis placed on what the public sees. (e.g. clean, well kept up buildings with trimmed lawns, shrubs, trees, flowers, etc.)."

The committee would like to thank and commend all of those lodges that participated in the competition. It was very pleasing to see the amount of pride exhibited by a large number of lodges in their appearance. The lodges that entered the contest spanned the entire length and width of the province. Each member of the committee was supplied with colour copies of all of the submitted pictures and they then submitted their list of the top three lodge buildings. The results were then tabulated to determine the winners.

The committee is proud to announce that out of the 420 lodge buildings within the province, the following were judged to be the top three:

1st Place – Muskoka Lodge No. 360, Bracebridge

2nd Place – Tottenham Lodge No. 467, Tottenham

3rd Place - East Toronto Masonic Temple

On April 6, 1999, M.W. Bro. Wm. T. Anderson, Grand Master, attended the regular meeting of Muskoka Lodge No. 360, in Bracebridge, and presented them with their plaque and the committee was very pleased and honoured to be able to present the other two plaques.

Once again your committee reviewed current correspondence and jurisdictional concerns and now report as follows.

Your committee did an indepth review of Freemasonry in the countries of Bulgaria, Romania, Italy, India, Greece, Spain, Portugal and the State of Estado do Ceara in Brazil.

While it was noted that considerable Masonic progress was made in the jurisdictions of Bulgaria, Romania and Estado do Ceara, all concurred that requests for recognition from these three areas of the world be tabled and set aside for further review.

Noting the Masonic divisiveness still existing in the jurisdictions of Italy, India, Greece, Spain and Portugal, your committee again recommends that any brethren contemplating Masonic visitation to these areas of the world should contact the Grand Lodge office for updated information prior to departure.

Information concerning a legal name change on the part of the Regular Grand Lodge of Portugal having been received, the committee concurs and recommends that the records of Grand Lodge be amended to reflect this change in the name of the recognized Grand Lodge in Portugal, which now reads - Grande Loja Legal De Portugal/GLRP - Grande Loja Regular de Portugal.

REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. A. Paul Stephen, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Stephen, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Your Membership Committee develops and implements programmes to attract new members and retain current members. These are designed to stabilize and encourage growth of membership in our Grand Jurisdiction. The primary aim of our committee is to provide programmes and services to assist in the successful operation of the individual lodges.

The major thrust of the committee this past year was to provide training for the Brother to Brother programme in our jurisdiction. This has been accomplished with a well co-ordinated and concentrated effort on the part of many dedicated brethren. Also we have provided support for lodges using Friend to Friend, and Mentor programmes. Feedback tells us use of these programmes does benefit lodges.

Brother to Brother

Again, R.W. Bro. Terry McLean has very ably lead the group implementing Brother to Brother. Since inception, we have introduced Brother to Brother in thirty-nine districts. Its planned the seven remaining districts will be provided with training by November this year.

In implementing Brother to Brother lodges are requested to name a facilitator to attend a training workshop to be held in the area. At the workshop, the facilitator is trained in the use of the "tool kit," the name for the Brother to Brother text. He is then in the position to introduce Brother to Brother to the lodge in conjunction with the Worshipful Master. This would include, for example, encouraging the lodge brethren to identify and realise their potential and help build a shared common focus for the lodge. Brother to Brother is aimed at better lodge management, better and more diverse programmes in lodge, more participation by members, and more activities that include family and friends. It endeavours to identify pleasure and enjoyment as one of the aims of Masonry.

There has been an overall participation rate of over 70% of lodges in the training workshops so far. To put Brother to Brother in as many lodges as possible, we are planning additional training workshops to offer training to facilitators who may not have been available when the programme was first introduced in their area. Also, V.W. Bro. Don Banks is publishing "Facilifacts," a newsletter which is aimed at communicating success stories, information and events that have worked for other lodge facilitators.

Friend to Friend and Mentor Programmes

R.W. Bro. Ted Habermehl has provided good support in conjunction with regional co-ordinators, for delivery of these programmes. Assistance has been provided promptly on an individual basis when requested. Committee wants to be the vehicle through which good ideas and success stories are shared for the benefit of lodges.

Other Initiatives

Text for an information cassette on Freemasonry, and a video to assist with delivery of the Mentor programme, are under review. Cost estimates to produce these items have been prepared and reflect savings realised because brethren who have related skills and contacts in the media industry are willing to contribute their time and talents.

In summary, the Membership Committee has had another busy year but I feel a rewarding one. We recognise and appreciate the co-operation and work of all brethren who support and assist in the delivery of our programmes. A special thanks to R.W. Bro. Jim Anderson, Secretary, and R.W. Bro. Terry McLean, Vice Chairman, for their continuing support and advice.

It is my pleasure to present this report on behalf of the Demonstration Co-ordinator Committee.

Committee Mandate

"To co-ordinate use of the Masonic Information Booths and Masonic Float throughout Ontario. To provide Masonic publications and paraphernalia for use and purchase by the membership."

Masonic Information Booth. The Masonic Information booth has been used at open houses, indoor shopping malls, community centres, fall fairs and the International Plowing Match. It exhibits Masonic activities and creates improved "Public Visibility."

The Widow's Brooch and Pendant. The superior quality of the Grand Lodge approved package has been received by some 555 Masonic widows and is endorsed by our membership.

International Plowing Match. Held at Sunbury, Ontario, with 80,000 persons attending the five-day event and some 2,500 visitors to the Masonic marquee. We congratulate the Plowing Match Committee – co-chaired by W. Bros. Reginald Shier and Reginald Watson – on a fine job.

The 1999 Plowing Match will be held September 21 - 25, 1999, (2 kms north of Dashwood, Ontario) and hosted by the North and South Huron Districts. An informal reception for the Grand Master is planned for Wednesday, September 22, 1999, at the Dashwood Community Centre, 5:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M.

Other Activities. Requests for committee assistance have expanded to fall fairs and Santa Claus parades, creating new ways to improve "Masonic Visibility" to the public.

An exhibit and information display has been set up at Grand Master Receptions, featuring: Masonic publications, videotapes, widows' brooches, district newsletters, magazines and hand-out materials and paraphernalia.

REPORT OF THE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON LODGE FINANCES

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

On behalf of the Advisory Committee on Lodge Finances, it is my pleasure to submit the following report.

As we have reported over the past few years, the members of the committee continue to make themselves available to speak to lodges and group meetings, offering recommendations to improve lodge finances and to assist lodges in financial difficulties. We trust that the advice we offered this year has been of assistance.

Our recommendations are an expansion of those described in Chapter 7 of *The Masonic Manual*, and can be implemented by any lodge, whether operating from records maintained by a professional accountant, or from simple records based on cash transactions.

Last year, we reported that this committee had presented to the Management Committee, for approval, a paper describing a simple method of recording the finances of a lodge. While the paper does include a description of simple financial recording, it also includes detailed explanations of the recommendations mentioned above. The paper was approved and has been available, from the Grand Secretary's office, to lodges and interested brethren. We have been pleased to receive favourable comments on the paper.

In 1997, this committee was instrumental in an amendment being made to the Book of Constitution regarding life memberships. We strongly recommend that all lodges compare their existing life membership programmes with the current instructions in the Book of Constitution.

The committee is presently attempting to prepare a set of simple instructions for Auditors.

I sincerely thank R.W. Bros. T. E. Lewis, T. Janes, J. A. McLean, J. G. Pell, D. Wood, and W. Bro. D. D. Thornton for their time and interest in assisting the committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC RELATIONS

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

I am pleased to present this report on behalf of the Public Relations Committee members.

Media Guidelines

The need to obtain greater publicity at a local and district level, to give the public a better insight into the activities of the Masonic Lodge and also to attempt to attract new members was recognized by the Public Relations Committee. To facilitate access to the media, i.e. local newspapers, radio and TV, a set of guidelines, for use by the lodges or District Publicity Chairman, has been developed and presented to the Management Committee for approval.

Open House Guidelines

The Open House Guidelines were reviewed by the committee. It is the opinion that the present guidelines were quite adequate. Holding an Open House is an ideal method of acquainting the general public with Freemasonry, stimulating interest in the Craft, and we need to encourage more lodges to participate in this Public Relations tool.

Information Folder

An information folder has been developed and submitted to the Management Committee for approval. This folder contains a sample of all the information pamphlets available from Grand Lodge, a price list of all pamphlets, books, a camera ready information advertisement that can be placed in a local newspaper, as well as general Masonic information. It is recommended that these be given to the D.D.G.M. at installation; he then would ask the District Librarian to display this material at Official Visits, leave a price list with the Lodge Secretary and encourage ordering a quantity for the benefit of the brethren. Well informed members can disple the myths that circulate about Freemasonry.

Pamphlets

A list of the information pamphlets available from Grand Lodge (which can be ordered through the Lodge Secretary) has been published in the Ontario Mason.

Media Relations Co-ordinator

A list of names of resource brethren, who have expertise in various areas of Freemasonry, has been submitted to the Deputy Grand Master for consideration. It is the opinion of the committee that the journalist skills of these brethren could, in concert with the Grand Master and Grand Secretary, expedite and facilitate responses to our detractors in the media. They could also be utilized to develop material suitable for media publication when required.

Masonic Logo appearing with a Death Notice of a Mason

Several requests have been received regarding the availability of the Masonic Logo to appear with a death notice of a Mason. The Ontario Funeral Service Association, in their newsletter, are advising their membership of the availability so that any family wishing this identification can be accommodated. Newspapers may make an additional charge for this service.

Operation Coat Hanger

Guidelines for this project have been submitted for consideration. This can be a local lodge or a district project. It is a recycling programme of good used clothing for needy kids. It requires a time element and it certainly is an excellent public relations builder for any lodge or district that has involved themselves in this project.

Future Projects

The Public Relations Committee is considering developing Guidelines on Suggestions in Helping the III and the Bereaved Masonic Family. We are considering the development of a three-ring reference binder which would contain Guidelines and Public Relations Assistance for Masonic Lodges.

I am pleased to present this report on behalf of the Masonic Education Committee and its members: M.W. Bro. D. C. Bradley; R.W. Bros. W. H. Hightower, D. H. Mumby, G. E. Postill, B. N. Whitmore; V.W. Bros. D. Fick, S. R. Lowe; W. Bros. L. Fitchett, J. H. Parker.

Nineteen ninety-eight began a year of development for this committee and 1999 was a year of continuing development. Committee members were pleased to be able to bring continuity to work already in process, and they approached the task of moving those objectives to completion with renewed energy and enthusiasm.

The primary focus of 1999 was the continuation of the assembly of Phase I of the *Y.E.S.!!!* (You're Extra Special) programme. The four sections – Explanation of the Three Degrees, Masonic Symbolism, Masonry in the Community and the Administration of Grand Lodge – are designed specifically to enhance the Masonic Education of newer brethren. All members of the committee have been actively involved in the extensive review and editing of this material. The committee goal for completion and approval of the Phase I material is July, 1999. Planning for the distribution and roll out will follow.

The second major initiative for the committee was the continuation of the assembly of material for the "*Program Resource Kit.*" This initiative is designed to produce a 'binder' of information available to the Worshipful Master and the lodge for use in

enhancing lodge meetings and in providing new or innovative ideas through the sharing of material submitted by brethren from across the jurisdiction. The Resource Kit will contain examples of both short and long educational pieces, ideas for games and skits, project ideas and many other topics. As new material is submitted, the Resource Kit will be expanded. Compilation and editing of this material is proceeding with plans to have version one of the Program Resource Kit completed by the fall of 1999.

In November, using the resources of the Grand Lodge Communications Committee, the Education Committee distributed an update of its activities to all D.D.G.M.s and enclosed a request for articles for the Resource Kit.

CONTINUING PROGRAMMES

The College of Freemasonry Correspondence Course

This year saw 56 new entrants into this four part course with 34 brethren continuing their progress. Forty-eight individual sections were completed and 12 brethren were admitted Fellows of the College of Freemasonry.

The District Deputy Grand Masters

This year saw the first full year of administration of this three part course for prospective D.D.G.M.s. In conjunction with the Ad-Hoc Committee on the Preparation for the Office of D.D.G.M., successful promotion of the course resulted in applications for a total of 223 individual sections. Nineteen brethren have completed the entire programme and earned their certificate.

Under the expert guidance of V.W. Bro. Lowe and W. Bro. Fitchett, the increased workload has been successfully managed. To these two brethren and to all the mentors, the committee extends its sincere thanks for their dedication, advice and assistance.

Grand Lodge Book Sales

Once again, under the supervision of V.W. Bro. Don Fick, the committee was able to support the sale of Grand Lodge publications during the annual communication. Revenues of just under \$9,000 were realized. The committee extends thanks to V.W. Bro. Fick and all the brethren who assisted him during that hectic time.

The Newsletter

Every effort is being made to reactivate this publication, and at the time of this report the next edition is headed to the printer. The patience and understanding of existing subscribers is much appreciated and this committee continues to focus on ensuring that the Newsletter gets back on track.

In summary, the committee has worked extremely hard in much 'behind the scenes' activity this year and we trust that the fruits of these labours will be evident as the deliverables are made available for use by the brethren in the upcoming year.

Overview. At the beginning of our Masonic year, it appeared that the Red Cross would continue to be responsible for the management and the collection of blood in the Province of Ontario. However, the Canadian Blood Services (CBS) is now the official blood service agency. We had several meetings with the CBS Executive Officers. They were advised that Masons will continue to promote and encourage their members, their families and friends to give the gift of life, when able to do so. Also, we will assist and improve the awareness of the need and use of blood and it's by-products, and give the CBS the same strong support as we did in the past with the Red Cross. We had two goals to accomplish this year:

· How can our committee better recognize those who gave the Gift of Life?

· How can our committee improve relationships with other agencies?

"Would you give if it were in your power?" This question has been posed to every Mason, and each has responded in the affirmative. Also, remember, "No matter how small the amount, it will be thankfully received and faithfully applied." What better way to make you feel good, achieve your commitment to help and not have to reach for your wallet than to "give the gift of life" – a donation of blood! No amount of money can purchase or replace the source of this fluid, which is so essential for the success of the new medical procedures that astound us on a daily basis.

Next year, you will notice that each District Blood Donor Chairman will be wearing a red puff. It is important that we recognize them for what they are doing and what they have done. The red symbol may promote others to give the gift of life.

We have placed particular emphasis on individual lodge support of the Blood Donor programme. Ontario Masons usually make or sponsor nearly 15,000 blood donations annually. We expected a slight decrease in our reported blood donations this year during the transitional period from the Canadian Red Cross to the Canadian Blood Services. Surprisingly, notwithstanding the controversy surrounding tainted blood and the Krever Inquiry, we overcame the tendency towards cynicism and donated a greater amount of blood than ever before. This year we donated or sponsored a total of 21,564 blood donations, an increase of 33.5 percent. Congratulations to everyone.

April 20, 1999, you were recognized by the CBS Executive Board of Directors for the outstanding service you have given to the communities in which we live. A special presentation was made to our Grand Lodge and it was my honour and pleasure to accept this award on your behalf. Why did we receive this award?
Because you took the time and effort to give the gift of life!

- · Because the need will always be there!

REPORT OF THE MASONIC FOUNDATION OF ONTARIO

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Once again it was my privilege yesterday, July 19, 1999, on behalf of the Board of Directors, to report to the Thirty-sixth Annual Meeting of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario, held at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, Ontario.

Before continuing with this report, I wish to introduce my successor as President, R.W. Bro. Ronald K. Campbell.

I would refer you to the Masonic Foundation's 1999 Annual Report available in the hall outside and encourage you to familiarize yourself with its contents. Also, please make it available to your family and friends. Your Masonic Foundation is an instrument "FOR THE CAUSE OF GOOD" throughout this province of which you can be proud.

Time does not permit me to cover all our activities of the past year. I shall content myself by referring to a very significant event that recognized the Masonic Foundation's past support and another that will carry us into the new millennium.

The Hospital for Sick Children

In 1978-79 a financial campaign in support of Project H.E.L.P. - Help for Every Living Person – was carried out. Far exceeding its objective by raising in excess of \$560,000, it has enabled the Masons of our jurisdiction to make donations annually in support of hearing research at The Hospital for Sick Children that now exceed \$1,000,000 in total and we propose in this budget to continue. As has been reported each year the results of the research have yielded great benefits to the hard of hearing. In recognition of the Foundation's support The Hospital for Sick Children invited representatives of Grand Lodge and the Foundation to a recognition reception and tour of its Auditory Science Laboratory. At that time we received a framed Certificate of Appreciation which is on display in our office. Also, a plaque stating "In recognition of the outstanding generosity of The Masonic Foundation of Ontario for Hearing Research at The Hospital for Sick Children" was unveiled and is now mounted at the entrance to the Auditory Science Laboratory. Each of us present were filled with pride, as I am sure all Masons are, in the accomplishments that your support of our Foundation has made possible "FOR THE CAUSE OF GOOD."

The Millennium Project, HELP-2-HEAR

For the past few years, many within the Masonic Foundation have been thinking the time has come to move to a new plateau in our service to the community. With the approach of the new millennium, members of Grand Lodge and the Masonic Foundation began talking of a new project. During our meetings with the Masonic Foundation District Representatives last July, we met children who had benefitted from our support of VOICE. Some of these children also had cochlear implants, made possible from the research support for which we had been recognized by the Hospital for Sick Children. We began to see that the circle was closing and asked ourselves how others might benefit.

If a new project was to be undertaken, funding would be needed. A successful fund raising campaign would require the united efforts of all Masons under the umbrella of the Grand Lodge and the Masonic Foundation. This we found readily forthcoming from our Grand Master, M.W. Bro. William T. Anderson and our Deputy Grand Master, R.W. Bro. Robert J. McKibbon.

As I have stated before, while we are distinct bodies respecting the role of each, we in the Foundation know "from whence we come." This year The Masonic Foundation of Ontario, with the full support of The Grand Master of The Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario, M.W. Bro. William T. Anderson, decided to undertake a Millennium Project.

To emphasize that this project, a continuation of Project H.E.L.P., is a project of all our members, an announcement of its proposed launching at this communication of Grand Lodge was sent to every lodge, signed by the Grand Master and the President as a mark of solidarity.

Accordingly, it is my privilege to formally and publicly announce the HELP-2-Hear programme as a "Millennium Project."

The Help-2-Hear programme will have a two year window. The objective of the campaign will be to establish a \$2,000,000 capital fund over the next two years that will provide the necessary funding required to continue to the next plateau: the early detection of hearing loss in neonates and infants, and guide them through an appropriate treatment strategy.

Such funding will provide the financial assistance to develop a universal Neonatal Hearing Screening system, within the Province of Ontario which will allow the early detection of hearing loss. The challenge will be to provide hearing impaired children the earliest opportunity to develop their communication abilities, have normal educational and career prospects, and most importantly, improve their quality of life. Research has indicated the earlier that detection is carried out, the more benefits are achieved.

A campaign of this magnitude calls for a proven leader and many dedicated people. As you are aware our Past Grand Master, M.W. Bro. C. Edwin Drew, is such a leader and he has already recruited his core campaign team and commenced the planning. M.W. Bro. Drew, Thanks!

It is appropriate that the goal of this largest project in the history of the Foundation will be to develop a way to make the unforeseen fruits of Project H.E.L.P. available to children throughout Ontario. Exciting times - building on the foundations of brethren past in the as yet uncharted new millennium FOR THE CAUSE OF GOOD!

REPORT OF THE DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by V.W. Bro. R. S. Whitmore, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by V.W. Bro. Whitmore, it was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A.F. & A.M. of Canada, in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Having completed my first year as your chairman of the Grand Lodge Discipline Committee, I am pleased to present its report for the year ending July, 1999.

In accordance with the provisions of our Grand Lodge Constitution, the Grand Secretary has issued Certificates of Severance to three brethren within our jurisdiction during the past year. In each case, the brother requested that a Certificate of Severance be issued and, after proper investigation, Certificates were issued thereby sparing both the brother himself and Masonry the unpleasantness of a Masonic trial.

During the year, three complaints were dismissed at the Reviewing Committee stage on the basis that there were no reasonable grounds to support the complaint. This points out the important safeguard built into our discipline process whereby a complaint must be investigated by a properly appointed Reviewing Committee in a setting of privacy and neutrality. Only in this way can a complaint, which is found clearly to be without merit, be disposed of quickly and without causing the impugned brother embarrassment and needless grief.

Your committee has been very concerned with the technical difficulties experienced by some lodges, where an accused brother has elected, under Section 414(b), to be tried by his lodge. This became especially evident this year when a lodge embarked on a trial by lodge of one of its members. The members of that lodge found the matter to be very divisive of the brethren and the whole process appeared to move very slowly since the members of the lodge itself were unable to provide the leadership and the expertise necessary to bring the matter to a completion. Happily, this matter ultimately was resolved without the necessity of completing the trial and the brethren in question were able to exercise their Masonic principles towards each other and the charges were withdrawn. Such a resolution only came as the result of the strong leadership provided by a very capable member of this committee who was appointed by the Grand Master to preside over the trial. I take this opportunity to thank him publicly for the great service he provided to Masonry in general and in particular to the brethren and the lodge in question.

This unhappy incident points out that the processing of Masonic charges in accordance with those Sections of our Grand Lodge Constitution (Sections 409 through 427) requires careful attention, and legal expertise and assistance. Since this often is not available within a lodge, it places the Worshipful Master, who is charged with conducting the trial, in a very difficult, and, in some cases, stressful situation. Most Worshipful Masters and their Lodge Secretaries, when faced with this problem, seek the assistance of the Grand Secretary and the chairman and members of the Discipline Committee. The time thus spent by the Grand Secretary and committee members is inordinate, but is all necessary and is given freely.

In today's "litigious" society, more and more of our brethren are resorting to "legal" challenges to the trial procedure (most under Section 421).

The many rules respecting the trial, the evidence, the hearing, the judgment, the sentence (if any) and the service of documents are all necessary according to the laws

of our country to ensure that the accused is afforded every reasonable opportunity to defend himself. The various rules and sections with respect to trials are, of necessity, of a legalistic nature and, while they may be understood by a brother experienced in the law, they are a frequent source of irregularity by brethren not so versed or experienced, even though they may be well intentioned.

All in all, the experience of the Discipline Committee shows that Masonic Trials conducted by a Trial Commission in accordance with our Rules Respecting Trials, are much easier to conduct to completion without mishap and uncertainty.

Some are of the opinion that the venue of a Masonic Lodge, where fellowship and fraternity should prevail, is not the proper setting to conduct a Masonic Trial. At the best of times, this procedure becomes disruptive to the lodge proper and the brethren. Accordingly, based on the Discipline Committee's experience, deliberation is being given to the abolition of trials by lodge or Trial Commission on a local lodge level, to be replaced by a permanent Grand Lodge Trial Commission, which would be manned by brethren well versed in matters of the law, with the hoped-for result that justice would be easier obtained for all, but always in accordance with the Rules Respecting Masonic Trials and the laws of our country.

The make-up of the permanent Trial Commission could call upon a supply of brethren knowledgeable in the law and well experienced in these matters, who would be located all over the jurisdiction, so that Trial Commissions could be conducted over the entire jurisdiction without great inconvenience to anyone. Several other Grand Lodges have adopted this procedure and it seems to have met with success.

More deliberation and investigation is currently being undertaken and, in due time, a presentation will be made to Grand Lodge, with a view to amending our Constitution to adopt these suggestions.

As indicated above, this completes my first year as chairman of this committee and I cannot allow this opportunity to pass without thanking my predecessor, M.W. Bro. Norman E. Byrne, for the kindness, patience, professional expertise and cheerful help and encouragement which he constantly has provided to me and continues to give to our beloved Craft as a very active member of our committee.

During the year, I also have found the guidance, wisdom and generous assistance provided to me by our Grand Master, M.W. Bro. W. T. Anderson, our Grand Secretary, M.W. Bro. R. E. Davies, his staff, all other members of the committee, namely, M.W. Bros. E. W. Nancekivell and D.C. Bradley; R.W. Bros. R. J. McKibbon, S. H. Cohen, R. T. Runciman, E. R. Habermehl, R. J. Lemaich; and V.W. Bros. J. V. Lawer, J. W. Lidstone and K. E. Quinn to have been invaluable and I extend my sincere personal thanks to each of them.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE CONDITION OF MASONRY

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. L. M. Fourney, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Fourney, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Thank you for the honour and privilege of chairing the Committee on the Condition of Masonry. It is my pleasure to present this report on behalf of the following dedicated committee members: R.W. Bros. P. A. James, R. G. Lancaster, C. R. McKee, P. Penner, R. A. Pringle, E. S. Rutter and V.W. Bro. T. P. Hansen.

The duties and responsibilities of the Committee on the Condition of Masonry are set out in Section 136 (c) of the Constitution of Grand Lodge as follows:

"To review the annual reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters and to make recommendations arising therefrom for the benefit of the Craft; and to study the condition or state of Masonry in general throughout the jurisdiction and to make recommendations for the benefit of the Craft."

The Committee wishes to express their appreciation to all District Deputy Grand Masters for their efforts in providing the committee with the information on which this report is based.

OVERVIEW OF CONDITION OF MASONRY

Many District Deputy Grand Masters report that Masonry continues to be strong and vibrant in their districts.

Once again, this year, many lodges and districts have demonstrated their commitment to the tenets and principles of Freemasonry by holding numerous charitable projects in their jurisdictions to assist those who are less fortunate and in need of support through no fault of their own.

Also on the positive side, many lodges continue to report involvement in family and other social activities. We believe, for Masonry to survive and be meaningful, it must provide opportunities for the entire family to share in the social side of the Order.

Our thanks and congratulations are extended to the District Deputy Grand Masters from the forty-three districts, representing 93% of the lodges who supplied this committee with detailed information about the condition of Masonry in their respective districts and the various activities of the lodges therein.

Membership: 60% of the lodges reported membership as steady or increasing.

Friend to Friend Programme: We are pleased to report that 92% of the reporting lodges are making good use of this programme. It is apparent that it continues to be recognized as an excellent tool to provide information to the public and to inform potential candidates about Freemasonry. There is no doubt that the use of this programme enhances the possibility of a lodge receiving membership applications.

Mentor Programme: 83% of the reporting lodges are using this programme. However, there are a number of requests to have the programme produced on video tape, similar to the "Friend to Friend" programme.

Lodge Finances: 91% of the reporting lodges list their financial condition as "stable." Half of the reporting lodges are using budgets to manage their financial affairs.

Past Masters in Progressive Chairs: One indication of the viability of a lodge is considered to be the number of progressive chairs filled by Past Masters. For the purpose of this report, progressive chairs have been defined as being those of the Master, Wardens, Deacons, Stewards and the Inner Guard, eight in all. The results are as follows:

Considering that there may be many reasons why one progressive chair will be filled by a Past Master, we consider it is encouraging that 330 lodges, or 60% of the reporting lodges have no more than one Past Master in progressive chairs.

Annual Dues: Annual dues vary widely across our Grand Jurisdiction. Not surprisingly, dues tend to be higher in metropolitan areas than in rural centres, no doubt due to generally higher costs in the larger centres. Some lodges, with dues in the twenty-five to forty dollar range, have alternative sources of revenue and have not kept their dues structure up to date with inflation. There seems to be a feeling among members in lodges with a low dues structure that raising dues will drive members away. However, a more realistic dues structure may allow the lodge to take its rightful place in the community by helping the less fortunate or improving the lodge facilities which in turn could attract or retain members.

Buildings: 99% of the lodges report their buildings to be in good or fair condition. However, in today's economy it is becoming increasingly difficult to maintain a building for the use of only one lodge. Where this is a factor, it is suggested that lodges and districts should explore the possibility of sharing a building. There are a number of locations where there are lodges ten to fifteen miles apart. When many of these lodges received their Charter transportation was by horse and buggy and separate lodge buildings every ten or fifteen miles made sense from a transportation point of view. This is no longer so.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Reporting Forms

A complete set of Reporting Forms, numbered 1 through 4 and dated 7/1999 has been developed for the use of the District Deputy Grand Masters and are submitted with this report for approval. This latest revision in the Reporting Forms is the result of continuing efforts to minimize the work of Lodge Officers in providing this committee with information while retaining essential information so the committee may fill its mandate by reporting to Grand Lodge about the condition of Masonry in our Grand Jurisdiction.

It is recommended that these Forms be adopted.

- 2. It has been the practice for D.D.G.M.s to submit these forms to the lodge immediately before his Official Visit. Since some Official Visits occur near the end of the Masonic year, this leaves little or no time for action to be taken where needed on problems identified in the forms.
 - (a) Therefore, it is recommended that forms be submitted to lodges early in October with instructions that they be returned to the D.D.G.M. no later than mid-November.

- (b) District Deputy Grand Masters be instructed to ensure that the lodges answer all questions on the two forms which lodges are to complete.
- (c) District Deputy Grand Masters be instructed to include all seven forms with their Annual reports.
- 3. Master-elect

In some districts, the examination of the Master-elect is done thoroughly while in others, the examination only consists of opening and closing the lodge.

It is recommended that a guideline for the examination of the Master-elect be developed and distributed to all lodges. Such guideline to be based, at least in part, on Part II of the Constitution and sections on protocol contained in "Meeting the Challenge" and "The Masonic Manual."

4. Principal Lodge Officers

A suggested course of study be provided to all lodges for future principal lodge officers to include:

- (a) Constitution of Grand Lodge items on Membership, Demits and Suspensions and the Worshipful Master, Powers and Duties.
- (b) The Masonic Memorial Service.
- (c) Those sections of "Meeting the Challenge" which deal with Duties of Lodge Officers, Protocol and Etiquette.
- (d) Those sections of the "Masonic Manual" which deal with Communication and Public Speaking.

5. Friend to Friend and Mentor Programmes The use of both of these programmes continue to be encouraged by District Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Lodge.

6. Committee of Inquiry

The Committee of Inquiry may be the first opportunity for a candidate and his family to have a comprehensive view of Freemasonry and what membership may require from him and/or offer to him and his family.

Therefore, it is recommended that a Committee of Inquiry Kit be developed and provided to all lodges and that Lodge Secretaries be required to maintain the "Kit" and give it to the committee chairman for his guidance in conducting the inquiry. The kit to include:

- (a) Sample questions to be used by the committee.
- (b) Committee reporting form.
- (c) The following booklets: Booklet No. O, Masonic Charity, To A Mason's Family, and The Masonic Foundation of Ontario.
- 7. For the Cause of Good

Once again, we stress that each newly initiated Mason should be given a copy of this book.

8. Welcome to a Mason's Lady

Each lodge be provided with a sample letter to be sent to the wife or mother of each newly initiated Entered Apprentice Mason. The letter to contain information on the following:

- A brief welcome message.
- Brief history of origin of Freemasonry, in the world, in Canada and in Ontario.
- Membership qualifications.

- Meetings.
- The Masonic Foundation.
- The District Association.
- Benevolence.
- Whom to contact for more information or help, if needed.

REPORT OF THE COMPUTER RESOURCES COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. B. E. Bond, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Bond, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

In July, 1998, a letter was sent to each D.D.G.M. explaining the mandate of this committee and requesting, if possible, that he appoint a District Representative to this committee. If a representative was appointed, to forward his name and contact address to the secretary. Included was a computer disk, containing the database and summons applications developed for use by any interested lodge. This was accompanied by a letter to the representative explaining his duties. Thirty-six of the districts responded with an appointment.

DATABASE

The DOS-based PC-FILE database programme is still in use by a number of lodges, but there is a trend to convert to the Windows based Microsoft Works format, as well to conversion to the more powerful ACCESS database. A database application for the MS-WORKS programme has previously been distributed, which has proven to work well, and requests are being received for an ACCESS application and report formats. This is being worked on now and will be available later in 1999.

SUMMONS

As more and more lodges are generating their summonses on the computer, a summons format for MS-WORKS, with complete instructions on setup was included with the disk given to the D.D.G.M.s in Juiy, 1998. This allows complete control of the content of the summons and facilitates easy and early modification to the officer lineup in the event of unexpected change, such as address or phone number. Other formats, for Wordperfect and MS-Word are being completed and will be made available as soon as possible.

WEB-PAGE (www.grandlodge.on.ca)

The Grand Lodge web-page has hosted more than 71,000 visitors since its inception. Contact with members has been enhanced through the use of e-mail (office@grandlodge.on.ca). The highlights are the Grand Master's message, the Guest Book, the lodge directory and the e-mail address book. The secret of the success of this medium is simplicity and maintenance, all of which are amply addressed by R.W. Bro. Bill Thompson, our Web-Master.

LODGE FINANCIAL PROGRAMME

R.W. Bro. Robert Wands, of the Grand Lodge Finance Committee, has developed a lodge financial package, based on LOTUS 123. This was given to this committee for

inclusion in the standard computer application packages that we distribute. This was examined and converted by W. Bro. Donald Reekie into a compatible format for Quicken and MS-Money for which purpose he has produced detailed set-up instructions. The programme, whether Lotus, Quicken, or MS-Money addresses the concerns of life membership, regular dues, prepaid dues, expenses, investments, etc. and will produce standard reporting formats. This is available now and will be distributed during the new Masonic year.

EDUCATION ACTIVITIES

For the Masonic year of 1998-1999, a decision was made not to hold formal seminars in the jurisdiction, but to request of the D.D.G.M.s that they, through their District Education Chairman, make use of our committee members as guest speakers, one night per district. A list of computer-related subjects as well as a schedule designed to spread the activities over the Masonic year were included. As a result of the low response to this, regular seminars are suggested for the upcoming year.

ELECTRONIC REGISTRATION

July, 1998, saw the first full use of the Electronic Registration process. On the Tuesday evening, over 900 voters were registered, with the balance of registration being completed by 3:00 P.M. on the following Wednesday. The programme operated flaw-lessly, even when one computer failed and the backup server went down. No data was lost and the reports for the district rooms were printed immediately following the close of registration. Bro. Kris Nickerson has created a masterpiece in this programme and is to be congratulated for his perseverance and patience.

ALTERNATIVE TECHNOLOGIES

Bro. Warren Northcott has been researching the copyright laws as they are applied to text conversion for sight impaired and blind persons. The aim is to equip our Grand Lodge Library with converted text, whether in computer disk format or CD-Rom, for the use of those members who require this technology. The creation of Braille Books of the Work has been approved and is being undertaken by Bro. Northcott. These will be distributed by Grand Lodge on an individual basis.

The meetings of this committee for 1998 and 1999 were held in various parts of the province to allow the closest District Representatives to attend and participate in discussion. All those who could not attend were asked to submit any item which they wished to bring before committee to me and I would present it on their behalf. This seemed to be well received and our meetings were productive. As well, the minutes of these meetings were sent to all the District Representatives and the regular members. This format seems to have the best method for involvement and I hope to continue it into the future.

REPORT OF THE LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. R. K. Campbell, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Campbell, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

It is my privilege to present the report of the Long Range Planning Committee on behalf of its members: R.W. Bros. Erich Bessler, Bill Burns, Tom Hogeboom, Walter Matyczuk and Al Morrow, Secretary.

Similar to other Grand Jurisdictions, Masonry in Ontario enjoyed extensive growth following the Second World War and throughout the fifties. Since then, our total numbers have steadily declined. It is obvious that our total membership will continue to decrease over the next decade as the large influx of members during that era passes on.

The aging of the current membership and the need to attract younger men must be addressed. Figures from Statistics Canada's "Population by sex and age - 1998" show that for males 20 and over 43.2% are between the ages of 20 and 39, and only 9.6% are 70 or older. Demographics for our lodge memberships indicate the reverse trend: many of our members are over 70 and a much lower percentage are under 40. Many of an interim generation have by-passed Masonry. Often we hear: "My grandfather was a Mason"; the Craft must now attract these "grandsons." Society in general has changed during that generation, from followers to individualists. The younger generations are not "joiners" per se. This is not necessarily a bad thing for the Craft, because a conscious decision to join would be a long term commitment. To attract them, however, these younger men must see a personal benefit from belonging to an organization such as Masonry, and the Craft has much to offer - but it must be promoted. The committee recommends that a new brochure be developed for those showing an interest in the Craft, stressing "What's in it for me?" - namely the benefits of social intercourse and personal development that come from membership, including enhanced confidence, improved organizational skills, enriched managerial capabilities and strengthened public speaking proficiencies. Their decision to join will augur well for the future of the Craft; they will be active members who, though smaller in total numbers, will contribute more to the future of Masonry than the multitude of passive members of the past. Active members are what Masonry must count upon to carry it into its third century. It is imperative, therefore, that lodges not only attract, but also retain, such members. Our future strength will come from the active participation of these new members.

We must plan a course of action to ensure the perpetuation of our Craft; and we are. The Five-Year Continuing Plan introduced two years ago is our road map. The major components of the plan, such as the Friend to Friend, Mentor and Brother to Brother Programmes, are being implemented and used. Year 2 saw the expansion of the Brother to Brother Programme with the training of Lodge Facilitators in a further 27 Districts, implementation of a correspondence course for potential D.D.G.M. candidates and completion of the development of the "Y.E.S.!!! (You're Extra Special)" Programme. The Five-Year Plan promotes goal congruence among the Grand Lodge committees to focus on a common objective, namely, the perpetuation of the Craft. It is an active document; it must be regularly reviewed and assessed, and revised as required to ensure that it is a current, effective planning tool. A symposium held on January 29 - 30, 1999, reviewed progress to date and recommended additional thrusts to be addressed over the next five years.

The committee recommends that the third year of the Five-Year Continuing Plan, as revised, be implemented by: updating the plan and distributing copies to all lodges; introducing the Brother to Brother Programme in the remaining 13 districts by December 31, 1999; developing a basis for measuring results and initiating data collection for an information base; implementing a unified public relations plan to maximize use of information technology and coordinate all communications thrusts; establishing an inventory of special resource skills available among lodge members for use on Grand Lodge committees to enhance regional representation and ensure a

"local flavour"; encouraging Grand Lodge Officers to promote the merits of the components of the Five-Year Plan in their districts and to solicit the full support of each Master and his management team; rationalizing and formulating the role of the "District" in the Masonic structure; and introducing those components of the YES! Programme that complement the other programmes. In addition, the results of studies on the Condition of Masonry in several areas and focus group dialogue with specific groups of members must be analyzed, and the lessons learned incorporated into the Plan to identify and promote factors which contribute to success.

Increased awareness by the members of the role and operations of Grand Lodge and its committees must be promoted. This can be enhanced through the development of major supplementary initiatives, such as special projects to mark the start of the new millennium and the sesquicentennial of Grand Lodge in 2005. Initially, Grand Lodge, with the cooperation of, and in conjunction with, the Masonic Foundation, will initiate a major project to help the Masons of Ontario celebrate the new millennium in a manner that will benefit our communities and bring a sense of pride of accomplishment to the membership.

To achieve the goals of membership retention, revitalization and renewal, hard targets must be established and strongly promoted, such as a reduction in the total number of resignations and suspensions. For example, using Grand Lodge membership figures as at December 31, 1998, and announced in the Grand Secretary's Report at Grand Lodge in July, 1999, as the base, the first target, reflecting the gradual phasing-in of the components of the Five-Year Continuing Plan, should be a 5% reduction between that figure and the total for these two categories as at December 31, 2000, as per the Grand Secretary's Report of July, 2001, and an annual 10% reduction over the following five years. Each lodge must be encouraged to meet or beat this target; in so doing, the overall retention goal of the plan will be attained. A major contributor to achieving these targets will be full implementation of the Brother to Brother Programme, which promotes more interesting lodge and social programmes that will capture and hold the member's interest.

When membership in our Grand Jurisdiction reached it zenith in 1961, the total was approximately twice the current figure. Masonry in Ontario is currently served by 641 lodges located in some 345 cities, towns and villages; these figures have changed very little over the years, notwithstanding the 50% drop in membership and the vastly improved means of commuting. Our Masonic infrastructure may well be designed for a by-gone era. The rationalization of lodge operations, such as the consolidation of weaker lodges into viable lodges, either by amalgamating them where there is a sufficient nucleus of interested members in each to form a strong lodge, or by integrating them into an existing strong lodge, the consolidation of lodges from neighbouring communities into one conveniently located building to reduce operating costs and optimize use of costly facilities, and adequate dues structures, must be encouraged to ensure the emergence of strong lodges in financially stable accommodation. To ease individual concerns when lodge consolidation is undertaken, a special category should be developed for those lodges which will no longer be using their Charters, whereby they enter a state of "suspended operation," rather than "darkness." Under such a scheme, members would have the option of petitioning the Grand Master at a future date for a reinstatement of the lodge under its original name and register number, should interest and growth warrant such action.

Masonry is diverse. It has attracted as members doctors, lawyers and Indian Chiefs; kings, princes, presidents and astronauts, as well as representatives of virtually all other

professions and trades. It has followers of virtually every faith that acknowledges a belief in a Supreme Being. This diversity has enabled Masonry to spread over the whole of the world's habitable surface, uninhibited by the artificial barriers of race, colour, or creed. Our Grand Lodge currently recognizes some 146 other autonomous Grand Lodges as diverse ethnically as they are geographically. Canada itself has become just as diverse an ethnic mosaic. The face of Canada, both figuratively and literally, has changed since the early 1960s. The earliest immigrants were British and Western Europeans, but since 1960, the majority have come from Africa, the Caribbean and Asia. These changes in the immigration pattern have significantly and permanently changed the predominantly Caucasian character of Canada, Visible minorities now comprise 15.8% of the population of Ontario. Many of these new Canadians come here from countries that have Grand Lodges in amity with our own: some of them may have been active Masons in their former homeland. While Masonry in Ontario has benefited from representatives of these various minority groups, the onus is on the Craft to entice those who were members before emigrating to become active again and to attract and welcome qualified candidates from these groups into the Order. Diversity of culture is Masonry's fabric; equality of members is its strength. To grow even stronger, the Craft must strive to better reflect the mosaic of the new Canada in its membership.

These are the recommendations proposed by the committee to address those matters which could affect the future of Freemasonry and to perpetuate the Five-Year Continuing Plan. All of which is respectfully and fraternally submitted by the Committee for the betterment of the Craft.

REPORT OF THE COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

It is my privilege and pleasure to present the report of the Communications Committee. This year our team consisted of R.W. Bros. Barry Gyton (vice chairman), Reade K. Spence (secretary), Leslie J. Pengelly, Douglas G. Madill, Robert F. Manz, M. Lee Shea, Lorne B. Weaver, and V.W. Bros. Lloyd Bittle and Robert W. Bailey.

This year, the committee continued to be actively involved in continuing to improve the quality of communications within our Craft. This was accomplished in several ways. They are as follows: The Lodge Summons; The Lodge Newsletters; The District Newsletters; The Masonic Event Calendar; The D.D.G.M. Communique; Assisting committee chairmen and other Grand Lodge officers in communicating information to the brethren throughout the jurisdiction. Lodge Summons. The number one tool of communication continues to be the lodge summons. The word "communicate" as described by Webster's Dictionary is a process by which information is exchanged between individuals through a common system. This year, the Communications Committee looked for several ways we, the brethren, could improve communications not only at the lodge level, but throughout our jurisdiction. Several ideas/thoughts/comments are:

- Lodges need to be encouraged to have and use telephone committees.
- District Web Sites on Grand Lodge's Web Site are not being used fully to their potential.
- A 1-800 number at the G.L. office for information use only. (i.e. press #1 for committee's and chairmen's names, another number for further committee information, another for Grand Lodge officers listings, and another for information how to access the Grand Lodge web site and e-mail address.)
- In the first issue of the Communique in September, list the various Grand Lodge chairmen and the committee for which they are responsible.
- In the fall issues of the Ontario Mason have a page with the photo and names of the Grand Lodge officers (i.e. Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Board of General Purposes members, and the D.D. G.M.s)

The Benevolence Committee is pleased to report that on your behalf there was disbursed, in the interest of Benevolence, thirty-five grants from the Memorial Fund, totalling \$79,850. In addition, \$11,000 was paid for services provided by our Grand Lodge staff and \$5,852 was paid to the firm of Scotia Cassels for investment management fees. Total expenditures were \$96,702. Income on investments was \$120,366, and donations received amounted to \$13,695. Therefore, total income realized was \$134,061; hence, a surplus resulted of \$37,359.

Your Benevolence Committee extends our sincere appreciation to Mrs. Ilene Elder of the Grand Lodge staff for her efforts on behalf of this committee. We also express our gratitude to the many lodge and district benevolence chairmen for their diligence in monitoring the requirements for assistance in their respective areas of the province.

In an effort to expand and enhance our assistance to those members and their families in need, we anticipate the restructuring of the role this committee provides to our brethren. We foresee the development of a more proactive Benevolence Committee that will be visible at the lodge and district levels.

Each and every one of us must endeavour to be more vigilant to the needs of our fellow brethren who may through pride and character be hesitant to seek our assistance.

Your Benevolence Committee responds to one of the greatest characteristic strengths of our Fraternity – that of charity. We urge you to be cognizant of the needs of your brethren and to make those needs known to your lodge benevolence chairman. Together we can provide assistance to those members and their families requiring our services.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AUDIT AND FINANCE

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. T. E. Lewis, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. Lewis, it was adopted.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

The duties and responsibilities of the Committee on Audit and Finance of Grand Lodge are set forth in the Book of Constitution in subsection 136(a) and the committee now reports to Grand Lodge on the discharge of these several duties and responsibilities.

ACTIVITIES

The Committee on Audit and Finance reviews the monthly financial statements as prepared by the staff at the Grand Lodge office and compares the results of operations and financial position to budget. The results of operations and financial position compare favourably to the budget adopted for fiscal 1999.

The committee has reviewed and considered the Annual Reports of the Grand Secretary, the Grand Treasurer and the Auditors as referred to in this Annual Communication. These reports were found to be most informative and are complete in all material respects. Accordingly, the committee recommends their adoption.

As indicated in the Treasurer's Report, the committee continues to meet on a regular basis with our portfolio managers Scotia Cassels Investment Council Limited to not only monitor the activities of the portfolio, but to review the overall investment strategy. We are pleased to report that our investment portfolio has continued to perform extremely well with a total portfolio under administration of approximately \$5.2 million at market value. Again, we recommend their continuing engagement to manage our investment portfolio.

We have also reviewed the charitable donations made on behalf of our Grand Lodge by the Grand Master and, as such, we recommend the approval of the same.

The committee has reviewed our computer and technology requirements for the ensuing year particularly in light of the concerns regarding the year 2000 [Y2K]. We are pleased to report that your Grand Lodge office computers, software and the like are in compliance and ready to embark on the next millennium. Likewise, we have been assured by our portfolio managers Scotia Cassels Investment Council Limited that their firm likewise is in total compliance.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The audited financial statements of our Grand Lodge for the year ended April 30, 1999, were reviewed and discussed in detail with our auditors, Grant Thornton. These audited financial statements can be found elsewhere in the Annual Proceedings. As chairman of the Audit and Finance Committee, I am pleased to report that your Grand Lodge experienced a most successful year with respect to the operations and is financially strong and from a financial position is strategically positioned to embark on the next millennium. We congratulate the Grand Treasurer, the Grand Secretary, the Grand Master, the Chairman of the Management Committee and the committee members of the various Grand Lodge committees for the efficient manner in which they have managed the financial resources of our Grand Lodge. Accordingly, the

committee recommends that the audited financial statements for the year ended April 30, 1999, be adopted as submitted.

A special thanks to our Auditors Grant Thornton, Chartered Accountants, and in particular, Mr. George Benton, C.A., for their overall assistance and interest during the year.

BUDGET 1999-2000

The Audit and Finance Committee received from the Management Committee the budgetary requirements of all the Grand Lodge committees for the ensuing year, which were carefully considered in preparing the annual budget for our Grand Lodge for the year ended April 30, 2000. These amounts aggregated \$13,700, together with allocations made from the Special Programme Fund.

The budget for the General Fund for the ensuing year is set out in the appendix to this report, which reflects anticipated revenues of \$656,000 and expenses of \$672,400, resulting in a budget deficit of \$16,400. However, given that included in the operational expenses is an annual amount of \$10,000, which is merely a transfer to the 150th Anniversary Fund, we are in fact budgeting for an operational deficit of \$6,400. As in prior years, a budget for the Special Programme Fund has been prepared, which is set out in the appendix attached to this report and reflects budgeted expenses of \$129,600.

The operational budget and Special Programme Budgets were prepared on a line by line examination based on the actual results of the previous year and giving considerations to the needs of Grand Lodge to facilitate desirable and meaningful programmes.

In accordance with Section 134(c) of the Book of Constitution, your committee submits for consideration and approval, as set out below, an estimate of the revenues and expenses as they relate to the general fund for the year ended April 30, 2000. Your committee believes that the budget set out in this report is realistic and provides for items which can be reasonably foreseen to meet the obligations, financial responsibilities and commitments of the General Fund of Grand Lodge for the current fiscal year.

GENERAL

In conclusion, as Chairman of the Audit and Finance Committee, I particularly want to express my thanks and appreciation to the Grand Treasurer, R.W. Bro. T. R. Davies, the Grand Secretary, M.W. Bro. R. E. Davies and the Grand Lodge staff for their guidance, outstanding contributions and assistance to this committee.

I also wish to express my appreciation to the members of this committee for their interest and involvement in the management of the financial affairs of this Grand Lodge, in the persons of - M.W. Bro. Wm. T. Anderson, M.W. Bro. Durward I. Greenwood, R.W. Bro. R. J. McKibbon, R.W. Bro. J. T. Cassie, and R.W. Bro. R. G. Wands.

REPORT OF THE GRAND HISTORIAN

This Report was presented by R.W. Bro. Wallace McLeod, Chairman, and on motion of the Deputy Grand Master, seconded by R.W. Bro. McLeod, it was received.

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

Once again, it is appropriate that the Grand Historian should express his gratitude to the Grand Master, for honouring him with this title. According to the book of *Constitution*, one of the duties assigned to this office is to record matters that are connected with the history of Grand Lodge.

The Craft clearly has a number of different functions. It confers degrees. It conciliates friendship. It induces the habit of virtue. It ministers to the relief of want and sorrow. It encourages its members to make a daily advancement in Masonic knowledge.

I shall talk briefly about the last of these objectives, Masonic education, as it is available to the Brethren of this jurisdiction. In the course of my remarks, I propose to pay tribute to a number of educators of the past and present, and mention some of the most important educational publications.

Grand Lodge's Committee on Masonic Education. Each Grand Lodge is of course autonomous, and many of them have educational committees and endeavours. Our official history, *Whence Come We?*, in Chapter 15 gives a brief history of Masonic Education in Ontario up to the year 1980. We could add many details about programmes that have been carried out since then, but let us begin by listing the successive Chairmen of the Committee, many of whom have done superb jobs, and over half of whom have had their services recognized by ultimately being elected Grand Master: William J. Dunlop (Chairman, 1931-1935); John A. Dobbie (1935-1937); Walter H. Gregory (1937-1939); Charles W. Robb (1939-1942); Nelson C. Hart (1942-1949); Harry L. Martyn (1949-1955); Bruce B. Foster (1955-1960); William K. Bailey (1960-1969); N. Richard Richards (1969-1977); Wallace E. McLeod (1977-1981); William R. Pellow (1981-1985); Norman E. Byrne (1985-1987); James A. Hughes (1987-1992); Robert A. Barnett (1992-1996); Donald H. Mumby (1996-1998); and D. Garry Dowling (since 1998). Over the years there have been many useful projects; we might mention in particular two that have kept on working for a considerable time. The very successful Correspondence Course was founded in 1979 as "The Study Group," under the direction of V.W. Bro. Ernest J. Brown. And the *Newsletter*, of which the first editor, in 1980, was R.W. Bro. David C. Bradley, continued to distribute valuable information for fifteen years.

Research Bodies in England. But as well as Grand Lodge Committees, there are other Masonic research bodies that are not directly administered by Grand Lodges, but which can provide educational opportunities for our members. They are of two types: regularly warranted research lodges, and independent research societies.

Perhaps the earliest organization devoted to Masonic research was the Masonic Archaeological Institute, in London. The records are casual and sporadic, but evidently it was operating by June 1871, and its members included Charles Warren (1840-1927), who later, as Chief Commissioner of Police, would lead the investigations into the murders committed by Jack the Ripper in 1888. The Institute ceased to operate in 1873.

It seems that Ouatuor Coronati Lodge, No 2076, London, is the oldest research lodge that is still active. Its warrant is dated November 28, 1884, and its Transactions have been published every year since then. The charter members included the great Sir Charles Warren, whom we just mentioned. The membership is limited to forty at any one time, a number that has never been reached in 115 years. In fact, from the time of its foundation up to 1997, it has had only 179 members. They have included such great scholars as Robert Freke Gould (who lived 1836-1915), the founder of the "authentic" school of Masonic research; Bernard Jones (1879-1965), the author of the indispensable Freemason's Guide and Compendium (1950); Douglas Knoop (1883-1948), who collaborated with G. P. Jones and Douglas Hamer to put together The Early Masonic Catechisms (1953); Herbert Poole (1885-1951), who produced the revised edition of Gould's History of Freemasonry (1951); Fred L. Pick (1898-1966), the co-author (with G. Norman Knight) of The Pocket History of Freemasonry (1953); Harry Carr (1900-1983), who visited Canada a number of times on lecture tours, and who wrote The Freemason at Work (1976). And the current members include such scholars as John M. Hamill and Robert A. Gilbert, the editors of the magnificent volume, Freemasonry: A Celebration of the Craft (1992).

As well, a few Canadians have been admitted as full members of the lodge, including our own John Ross Robertson (1841-1918), the author of *History of Freemasonry in Canada* (1900); Robert J. Meekren (1876-1963), the editor of *The Builder* magazine of the National Masonic Research Society of Iowa from 1925 to 1930; A. J. B. Milborne (1888-1976), who wrote *Freemasonry in the Province of Quebec* (1960); and Gerard Brett (1915-1968), Director of the Royal Ontario Museum, 1947-1955. (But of course any Mason can join the Correspondence Circle of Quatuor Coronati Lodge; the address is The Secretary, Q.C.C.C. Ltd., 60 Great Queen Street, London WC2B 5BA, England.) Since 1924, the lodge has sponsored the Prestonian Lectures, the only lectures that are given with the authority of the United Grand Lodge of England. These have been collected and published in four volumes so far. And every year since 1971 the lodge has offered the Norman B. Spencer Prize for the best essay submitted by a new scholar. Following the example of Quatuor Coronati, other research lodges were founded in Britain.

And more recently, late last year, the Canonbury Masonic Research Centre was established in London, "to provide support and to encourage research into the full spectrum of academic inquiry into Freemasonry." The Trustees include the Assistant Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England (Marquess of Northampton), and the Grand Secretary (James Daniel). The Centre has a website at http://www.canonbury.ac.uk/.

The Antipodes. With regard to research lodges in Australia and New Zealand, one should consult Tony Pope's paper, "On Australasian Lodges of Research," in *Masonic Challenges: The Transactions of the (Melbourne) Lodge of Research, No. 218*, for 1991. The first real research lodge down under, St Alban, No 38, in Adelaide, South Australia, was founded in December, 1889. It continues to thrive, but has not acted as a research lodge for fifty years. The oldest such body that has functioned continuously in that capacity is the Lodge of Research, No 218, in Melbourne, Victoria, which was formed in 1911. In New Zealand apparently the oldest one is the Masters and Past Masters Lodge, No 130, in Christchurch, which was warranted in 1902. There are over twenty research lodges in Australia and New Zealand that are still active. And that, to an outsider, seems like a very creditable number.

United States of America. North America was apparently much slower to recognize the value of such organizations. Actually, the earliest one here seems to be the National Masonic Research Society, which was founded in Iowa in 1915; it published the superb magazine *The Builder* from 1915 to 1930.

The first actual research lodge in North America was apparently the North Carolina Lodge of Research, which was founded in 1931. It published a splendid set of transactions, called *Nocalore*, but ceased working in 1954. In its wake, a number of others were founded, one of the earliest being the American Lodge of Research in New York, likewise dating from 1931. This lodge confers the honorary title of Fellow upon notable Masonic scholars, and one of those so recognized was the famous Finnish composer, Jean Sibelius (1865-1957), who wrote the beautiful Masonic Ritual Music (Opus 113).

There are of course many other research groups. Actually, according to the latest revision of *Coil's Masonic Encyclopedia* (1996), in 1990 there were nearly fifty active research lodges in the United States. Many of them welcome subscribers from other jurisdictions, publish their transactions, and make books available to their members.

Canada. Our country has not had very many such organizations. In 1915 a Lodge of Research was founded in Nova Scotia, with Reginald V. Harris as its leader and secretary; he later served as Grand Master (1932-1935) and then Grand Secretary (1945-1958) of his Grand Lodge, and was given the honorary rank of Past Grand Master in our jurisdiction (1938). He was co-author (with Ronald S. Longley) of *A Short History of Freemasonry in Nova Scotia* (1966). His research lodge kept working for at least ten years. The oldest surviving body of this sort is the Toronto Society for Masonic Research, which was founded in 1921, and which is still going strong, though with a fairly low profile.

The Canadian Masonic Research Association held its first meeting on May 9, 1950. Over the next quarter century, its members presented 116 papers, the last one being in May of 1976. (In 1986 these were collected and reprinted, in three volumes, by the Heritage Lodge, under the direction of R.W. Bro. C. E. Balfour LeGresley.) The Association included a number of notable Freemasons. We might mention Joseph R. Smallwood (1900-1991), who in 1949 was the Father of Confederation for Newfoundland. But as well there were a number of serious research scholars who belonged. The ones who delivered the greatest number of papers were Reginald V. Harris (who lived 1881-1968), the historian of Nova Scotia; A. J. B. Milborne, the

historian of Quebec, whom we mentioned above as a full member of Quatuor Coronati; and our own two brethren, John E. Taylor (1901-1984), recipient of the William Mercer Wilson Medal in 1977; and J. Lawrence Runnalls (1901-1994), who in 1975 was made an Honorary Past Grand Senior Warden for his work as editor of the *Grand Lodge Bulletin*, 1964-1975.

Very soon after the demise of the Canadian Masonic Research Association, the first research lodge in Ontario was formed. The Heritage Lodge, No. 730, was instituted on September 21, 1977, with V.W. Bro. (as he was then) Jacob Pos as the Master, and has been doing productive work ever since. Its main activity has been in the presentation of research papers at its regular meetings; more than eighty of these have appeared in the Annual *Proceedings* over the years. But as well it has engaged in a number of cognate projects: restoring the old Lodge Building in Black Creek Pioneer Village, near Toronto, and organizing a team of Masonic volunteers to serve as guides and interpreters; holding the annual Heritage Lodge Banquet; assisting in the restoration of noteworthy old Masonic gravestones (such as the William Mercer Wilson Monument at Simcoe, and "The Unknown Brother" at Jordan Station); and many others. Altogether, a record to be proud of! On the Internet, the Heritage Lodge has an excellent website at http://www.grandlodge.on.ca/heritage.htm.

There are not many other research lodges in our country. One that seems to be flourishing is Fiat Lux Lodge of Research, No 1980, in Calgary, Alberta, which every year publishes its transactions, under the title of *Vox Lucis*. The lodge Secretary is R.W. Bro. Thomas G. Hargreaves, a well known collector of Masonic artifacts, who in 1992 founded *The Masonicalia Magazine*, to report on such memorabilia.

Philalethes Society. But of the various research bodies in the United States, the oldest one that is still working is the Philalethes Society. Its history was outlined in *Seekers of Truth* (1988), a book written by Allen E. Roberts to mark its sixtieth anniversary.

The Society was founded on October 1, 1928, by six men, in order to keep free thinkers in Masonry from being muzzled by those "dressed in a little brief authority." It is explicitly intended "for Masons who seek light or have light to impart." The name is a Greek word that means "Lover of Truth."

Over the years the Society increased its profile. In 1931 it decided to recognize certain Brethren by naming them Fellows of the Philalethes Society; the number of Fellows was set at forty. Over the years a total of 187 brethren have been honoured with this title. They include such people as Rudyard Kipling (who lived 1865-1936), who wrote a number of Masonic stories and poems; Carl H. Claudy (1879-1957), the author of *The Master's Book* (1935); Henry Wilson Coil (1885-1974), who compiled *Coil's Masonic Encyclopedia* (1961; revised 1996); Alphonse Cerza (1905-1987), who wrote *Anti-Masonry* (1962); Dwight L. Smith (1909-1993), the author of *Whither are we Traveling?* (1962); Allen E. Roberts (1917-1997), who was probably "the most prolific author, perhaps in all of Masonic history," and whose books include *Key to Freemasonry's Growth* (1969); John J. Robinson (1925-1993), who wrote *A Pilgrim's Path* (1993); and Jerry Marsengill (1930-1991), the superb editor of several major Masonic magazines.

As well, a few Canadians have been honoured as Fellows of the Philalethes Society. They include Robert J. Meekren and Reginald V. Harris, whom we have already mentioned; Nathaniel W.J. Haydon (1871-1950), the first Librarian of our Grand Lodge Library, 1934-1949; and Charles E. Holmes (1880-1959), who became the first editor of the Montreal magazine, *Masonic Light*, in September, 1947.

The *Philalethes* magazine began publication in March of 1946. The first fifty years of the magazine are now available on a CD-ROM, which is very useful for purposes of research or reading. In February, 1956, the Society began to help sponsor a Workshop, as part of the meetings of the Allied Masonic Bodies in Washington. And that same year the first Certificate of Literature was awarded, for the best article published in the magazine. In 1980 the Society began to hold an "Annual Assembly and Feast" (a memorable phrase borrowed from Anderson's *Constitutions* of 1738). In 1981, for the first time, a Philalethes Lecturer was named, to present a talk at the Assembly and Feast. Since 1986 the Society has held a Semi-Annual meeting every year, in different cities. The Society has about forty-five local chapters, located in a number of countries. In 1992, to keep abreast of electronic communication, a dispensation was issued to Cornerstone Computer Chapter of the Philalethes Society, and the Chapter was granted a Charter in February, 1993. And the Society's website (now located at the address http://freemasonry.org/psoc/)was opened at the end of June, 1995, and has been very successful.

There are at present three local chapters in Canada: John Ross Robertson Chapter, in Toronto; Lux Quaro Chapter, in London; and Dr George T. Kennedy Chapter, in St Thomas. As we noted above, the Society holds Semi-Annual Meetings in different cities. One took place in Toronto, on 23 September 1989, efficiently organized by R.W. Bro. John M. Boersma. There will be another next year, and plans are going ahead quickly. Arrangements have been made for it to be held in the Royal York Hotel, in Toronto, with special discount rates for accommodation, on the weekend of September 28–October 1, 2000. A number of notable speakers have been invited to make presentations at the various sessions. If you want to find out more, you can consult the website for "Toronto 2000," http://freemasonry.org/psoc/toronto.htm.

That's probably enough for now on the background, personnel, activities, and publications of Masonic research groups.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A.M. of Canada in the Province of Ontario.

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren:

It is again my privilege, on behalf of this committee, to present the report or foreword to the Reviews of the Annual Proceedings of our sister Grand Lodges received during the past year. Once again, sincere thanks and gratitude must be extended to R.W. Bro. Frederic R. Branscombe for his careful selection of items and countless hours of preparation of these reviews for the interest of the brethren. These reviews are intended to inform the membership of the conditions and activities throughout the Masonic World.

Those brethren proposing or responding to Masonic toasts, active in Masonic education, welcoming visitors, delivering Masonic addresses, and so forth will find these reviews a useful source for topics, quotations, and information.

An example of building for the **future in Masonry** is in the **youth** of our society. Bro. T. J. Henwood, Executive Officer for the DeMolay, Arkansas, stated: "The Perfect Ashlars of the temple of tomorrow are hewn and squared in the quarries of DeMolay today." The Grand Worthy Advisor of the Order of the Rainbow for Girls in Illinois stated: "Our three youth organizations, along with you (Grand Lodge of Illinois) as our sponsoring body, really do make up a family. And, just as any family, we are dependent on each other. No member of our family can stand alone."

Many Grand Lodges reported having stimulated increased lodge activity related to Masonic Renewal programmes. The Grand Lodge of Montana made available to all its lodges and held workshops on such topics as 101 plus ways to Increase Attendance. They lived by the slogan: "If you think you can, you can! If you think you can't, you'reright!" The Grand Master of Saskatchewan, M.W. Bro. Richard Brown, concentrated his efforts on the three R's – Recognize, Represent, Remind. He stated: "For me, what is most important in Freemasonry, is what happens in my own lodge. Unless each of us remembers to focus on our own lodge, Masonic Renewal will be for naught. Remember that – "IFIT IS TO BE: IT IS UP TO ME."

As we live in an age where changes in society have been more frequent than at any other time in history, many Grand Lodges have experimented with new ideas and proposals such as masons-at-large, emeritus members, audio/video tapes for the visually impaired, business conducted in all degrees, and the ritual printed in other languages.

Fraternal Relations between Grand Lodges have met with some change. Many jurisdictions have recognized Prince Hall Masonry. The Right Honourable, The Lord Burton, Most Worshipful Grand Master Mason of the Grand Lodge of Scotland, in speaking concerning his observations of the new Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador stated: "It is particularly gratifying to me to know that the vast majority of our Scottish Lodges are happy to remain within our Constitution."

Some caution, dialogue and patience must be observed as to the implementation of change. However, M.W. Bro. Richard Swisher, Grand Master, West Virginia, stated: "My brethren, to resist change for the express and only reason that it would be a change, is not a virtue that one should be proud to proclaim."

Many Grand Lodges have realized and proclaimed the need for Community Visibility and Public Awareness of Freemasonry throughout the whole of society. The need to help children in drug addiction, bursaries and scholarships, assistance programmes, learning disabilities, teacher training for at-risk children, the Big Brothers and Big Sisters, have been undertaken by many jurisdictions. The Public Relations Committee of the Grand Lodge of Minnesota stressed the need for increased efforts to make Masonry known to the community." Our internal and external communications, it stated, "cannot be curtailed without causing damage. We must recognize this fact and face this reality to the best of our ability."

Attacks on our fraternity by religious and other persons are still evident throughout some jurisdictions. The Church-Lodge Relations Committee of the Grand Lodge of Kansas noted that attacks on Masonry often are "based on insufficient knowledge, ignorance, bias or just plain lies." It suggested that the best defence is not argument but visible participation in charities in the community.

The Committee on Fraternal Reviews of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba reminded its Grand Lodge of the obligation to be aware of current conditions in other jurisdictions throughout the world. "A careful study of the Proceedings of other Grand Lodges," the committee emphasized, "can and should be an interesting and educational experience. From it we can discover how other Grand Lodges deal with the every day routines and it will certainly help us in coping with ours."

The above are but brief observations and topics contained in these reviews. Read and use these reviews to their fullest. They are time consuming to produce, but time saving for resource.

Sincere thanks are also extended to the office of the Grand Secretary and others who have made this report possible.

#### ALBERTA

## 93rd Annual Communication Calgary, Alberta, June, 1998

The Jurisprudence Committee reported that demits were being given to members who had been charged with a Masonic or criminal offence. As the purpose of a demit is to enable re-entry, it was proposed to revise the Regulations to prohibit a demit to a member when a Masonic or criminal charge is pending. The growing loss of members when a lodge surrenders its charter or amalgamates was also noted by the committee, which stated that it is considering the concept of *MASONS-AT-LARGE*, as a means of reducing such losses. The Jurisprudence Committee reported that it had "denied a lodge bylaw change seeking that only half the initiation fee accompany the application," because this is contrary to Grand Lodge regulations.

In his Annual Address, M.W. Bro. Hugh Young sounded a note of caution with reference to the social programme of a lodge. "I recognize," he said, "that there is an important part of our organization with our wives, family and friends, but we should remember that Freemasonry is a fraternal organization for men and that attention must be paid to that aspect as well."

M.W. Bro Young reported, with pleasure, that the World Wide Web Page of Grand Lodge on the internet, started under his authority, had received 869 hits in a short period of time. He recommended that "it be continued as an important exposure of the fraternity and as an information source for Masons and non-Masons alike."

He reported that two new lodges had been formed but he felt that more control should be exercised. Grand Lodge should identify areas where a lodge should be formed and then work as a catalyst to make it happen. "While this is a departure from established policies," he said, "I believe that such an effort must be made."

M.W. Bro. Young told of a recent Masonic visit to Scotland and said that it had reinforced his belief that "our Ritualistic offerings are too restrictive. Each Lodge in Scotland practices their ritual in a fashion that is often different from the next Lodge and thus bring a variety into the Lodge which enhances the desire to visit. However, I emphasize that each ritual was truly Masonic in all respects and taught the same lessons which are taught in Alberta. The ritual is the method by which we teach Freemasonry. It is not an end unto itself. By limiting the rituals to two and attempting to enforce strict obedience to each point within them, the ritual becomes more important than the lesson it teaches. I strongly recommend the use of other rituals be encouraged in this Jurisdiction."

## ARKANSAS

## 156th Annual Communication Little Rock, Arkansas, February, 1998

M.W. Bro. Marty Byers thanked the members of Grand Lodge for the unfailing support which they had given to him during his year as Grand Master. He thanked them also for, as he put it, "exhibiting to me what Masonry really is: friendship, morality and friendship."

The Grand Master, in his official Recommendations, proposed that any member of a lodge in Arkansas, who is charged in any court of competent jurisdiction in the United States with the commission of a felony and who is convicted or pleads guilty, be expelled forthwith. He further recommended that any member of a lodge in Arkansas may be expelled without Masonic trial, if on becoming aware of charges against him either of un-Masonic conduct or of a criminal act, he completes and delivers to the Grand Master "the form 'Waiver of Masonic Trial – Consent to Expulsion' (provided by the Grand Secretary) or a like or similar form satisfactory in form and content to the Grand Master, wherein and thereby requesting Expulsion to avoid and waive all rights to a Masonic Trial. When this form ('Waiver of Masonic Trial – Consent to Expulsion') is used in order for the Brother to avoid Masonic Trial, the Expulsion shall stand for life with no right of appeal or request of modification." Bro. T. J. Henwood, Executive Officer for DeMolay, gave an encouraging report

Bro. T. J. Henwood, Executive Officer for DeMolay, gave an encouraging report on DeMolay in Arkansas. "During the past year," he said, "not one, not two, but three DeMolay Chapters have taken shape in our jurisdiction." He added that, in addition to the development of new chapters, the programmes for young men are being expanded. Arkansas State Council, for example, was sponsoring a retreat to help young men develop leadership and management skills. Bro. Henwood admitted that hard work and dedication are needed to make a programme for young people successful but he thanked God that the Masons of Arkansas were equal to the task. He concluded with a quotation that is accurate in a great many jurisdictions:

"The Perfect Ashlars of the temple of tomorrow are hewn

and squared in the quarries of DeMolay today."

The committee that administers the Grand Lodge charities reported that the official charity programme for the year had been the Sheltered Workshops of Arkansas. These workshops provide "training and employment to our adult citizens who are mentally and physically handicapped." Grand Lodge contributes funding to improve programmes in twenty such workshops throughout the State. The committee indicated that, as the response of the brethren had been most generous, the Grand Lodge Charity Programme had about \$19,000 in a special fund for that purpose.

## DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

187th Annual Communication Washington, District of Columbia, May, December, 1997

M.W. Bro. Robert Drechsler selected the Chelsea School for Children With Learning Disabilities as a particular object of Grand Lodge benevolence. He had initiated the project with a personal contribution and he was gratified that his example had been followed so generously by others. The proceeds of the campaign are being used in support of the school's building project.

With respect to the International Weekend in June, the Grand Master said, "Our Jurisdiction makes a special effort to accommodate Masonic visitors to our Nation's Capital and to direct them to lodges where the language and/or the ritual used is similar to that in their native Grand Jurisdiction. Each year we hold a weekend to celebrate our diversity." At the official International Meeting the opening and closing were done in the following languages, in addition to English: Armenian, French, German, Persian and Spanish. The banquet featured food native to each country represented. As part of the celebration of diversity the Entered Apprentice Degree was worked in French and the Master Mason Degree in Armenian. The climax of the celebration was the annual Masonic Day of Thanksgiving, on Sunday, June 8, at the Universalist National Memorial Church. The service was ecumenical and included readings from both the Bible and the Koran.

In his formal Recommendations to the Annual Communication in December, M.W. Bro. Drechsler wrote, "I recommend that continued emphasis be placed on the development of Lodge systems of communications, including the use of personal computers and the internet system. This year we have used the internet effectively in the Grand Lodge, and I have been informed that we have received a number of petitions because someone reviewed the information we have placed on our web site."

With regard to the formation of voting blocs within Grand Lodge to influence policy making decisions, M.W. Bro. Drechsler issued the following Grand Master's Edict: "Vigorous discussion among Masons of Masonic issues is to be encouraged and supported. However, I believe that any attempt to solicit the voting members of Grand Lodge for organizing voter blocs or for the politicizing of policy making is undesirable. Unchecked such action could be injurious to the Craft and lead to the disruption of fraternal peace and harmony. Clearly the formation of special interest or pressure groups, on either a temporary or long-term basis, is not in harmony with the customs and traditions of Masonry. I therefore now deem it essential to issue this edict whereby campaigns to organize voting blocs, either in support or in opposition to pending items of Grand Lodge business is prohibited."

#### **ENGLAND**

#### London, England, March, April, June, September, December, 1998

The Board of General Purposes reported at the March Quarterly Communication that the Prince Hall Grand Lodges of Illinois, Minnesota, Nebraska and New Mexico "have shown that they are descendants of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ohio, which was granted recognition at the Quarterly Communication of Grand Lodge held on 11 June 1997. Having all shown that they are descendants of a duly recognized Grand Lodge and they conform to the Principles of Grand Lodge recognition a resolution that these four Grand Lodges be recognized will be moved accordingly." A motion recognizing Illinois, Minnesota. Nebraska and New Mexico was adopted by Grand Lodge, and the Board of General Purposes advised that the four Grand Lodges were removed from the list of Grand Lodges which members of lodges of the English Constitution should not visit. At the September Quarterly Communication it was announced that the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Indiana had established its descent from the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ohio and therefore could be recognized. Accordingly, the Board of General Purposes advised that the "Grand Lodges which our Brethren should not visit are Kansas, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec."

M.W. Bro. the Rt. Hon. Lord Farnham, Pro Grand Master, requested R.W. Bro. G. Purser, Chairman of the Board of General Purposes, to report on a recent hearing before the Home Affairs Committee and also on the Home Secretary's proposal to compel all Masons in the justice system to disclose their membership.

Bro. Purser stressed the need to remember that English Freemasons are at liberty to disclose their membership, provided that it is not for the purpose of personal advantage. Indeed, they are encouraged to be open about their membership. Because it is the right of each individual to decide disclosure for himself, Masonic authorities have not disclosed names, except when required by a court or similar authority. The Home Affairs Committee has that authority and refusal to comply is without doubt Contempt of Parliament. In the light of advice which it had received, the Board of General Purposes decided that the information must be given. The Home Secretary has stated his intention "to establish a register of those in certain walks of life who are Masons. It appears that it is only Masons that are being singled out and that the Government is minded to act in an oppressive manner without valid reason." Bro. Purser warned: "In the fight against the Home Secretary's proposals Masonic leadership will have a major part to play but members of the Craft must not underestimate what can be done by individuals. It is a challenge we will face together."

A highlight of the Annual Investiture in April was the Proclamation of M.W. Bro. H.R.H. the Duke of Kent as Grand Master.

#### IDAHO

## 130th Annual Communication Twin Falls, Idaho, September, 1997

"In my travels over the past few years," M.W. Bro. David Olely wrote in his Annual Report concerning the State of the Art in Idaho, "I have noticed more lodges beginning to get more petitions for degrees, and affiliations. This is a hopeful sign that lodges are becoming more active, in letting their communities know they exist, by getting involved in activities that give them exposure to the public. The effort we have expended to get membership to loosen up, so to speak, and let people know what Freemasonry stands for and what it's about is beginning to bear fruit." He asked members to redouble efforts to make Masonry known but to give more information to those who ask about Freemasonry. "Those who petition for further light, "he cautioned, "need to be given proper explanations of what they are about to enter upon."

He commended the Grand Chaplain for sending letters of condolence to the widows and families of departed brethren. It was his recommendation that the practice be continued and that Grand Lodge pay for the necessary stationery and postage.

The Grand Secretary spoke of the success of the in-service training seminars for Lodge Secretaries held each spring. He reported that those in attendance found them both productive and educational. He commented that "The Secretaries who are unable to find the time to attend are usually the ones with the most questions during the rest of the year."The Grand Secretary encouraged all Lodge Secretaries to take advantage of these seminars and also invited Masters and District Deputies but stressed that sessions were intended primarily for Secretaries.

The Grand Secretary announced that Grand Lodge was on the internet and that its Home Page is at "home.rmci.net/masonsid" and its e-mail address is "masonsid@rm-ci.net."

The Candidate Proficiency Review Committee reported that it was continuing to investigate the development of an alternate form of proficiency for the three degrees of Masonry in Idaho. The goal "was not to decrease the amount of work or time required to become proficient in a degree, but rather to see if improvement could be made whereby new members were better educated and informed about each degree and Masonry in general." The committee stated a preference for the practice in other jurisdictions where memory work is combined with study of a booklet and the candidate is required to pass a written examination on the educational material in addition to some memory work. The committee suggested that this "would increase the amount of Masonic Education presented to a candidate but would decrease the amount of memory work required."

#### ILLINOIS

## 158th Annual Communication Springfield, Illinois, October, 1997

The Grand Master, in his Annual Report, examined the question of formal recognition of Prince Hall Masonry. He stated that he had been in personal contact on many occasions with Prince Hall Masons. For example, the Deputy Grand Master and he had been invited to a Prince Hall Leadership Conference and banquet. Also, they had attended, with their wives, several social events during the year. M.W. Bro. Benny Grisham stated that a direct line of communication with the leaders of Prince Hall Masons in Illinois had been established and he was making an effort to establish "an open fraternal relationship with them." Commenting that twenty-five Grand Lodges in the United States had given official recognition to Prince Hall Masonry, the Grand Master made the following Recommendation to Grand Lodge: "As men, Masons and as citizens of this great State of Illinois, it is time for us to follow the lead of Abraham Lincoln. It's time for us as Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Illinois to recognize 8,000 Prince Hall Masons as Brother Masons." It was duly moved, seconded and approved that Grand Lodge "grant recognition to the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge, F. & A.M. of the State of Illinois. "The problem of <u>exclusive jurisdiction</u>, which is a barrier to Prince Hall recognition in some Grand Lodges, was solved by an amendment to the Constitution of Grand Lodge. The definition of "clandestine" was amended by the addition of the phrase, "or recognized by" [underlined hereunder], so that it would read, "Any organization, association or person professing to have any authority, powers or privileges in Ancient Craft Masonry, with-in the State of Illinois, not derived from, <u>or recognized by</u>, this Grand Lodge, are declared to be clandestine and all intercourse with or recognition of them, or any of them, is prohibited."

Among the Grand Lodges for which reports were given by the Committee on Correspondence was the Province of Ontario, (*sic*). Details were given of the work in 1996 of the Committee on Seminars and Workshops, the Committee on Masonic Education and the Blood Donor Committee.

In the public Opening Session, the Order of the Rainbow for Girls, Order of Job's Daughters and the Order of DeMolay were given recognition and cheques. The Grand Worthy Advisor of the Order of the Rainbow for Girls, in Illinois, said in response, "Our three youth organizations, along with you as our sponsoring body, really do make up a family. And just as any family, we are dependent on each other. Without you the youth organizations would not survive and without the youth, your future would be lost. No member of our family can stand alone."

## **INDIANA**

### 181st Annual Communication Indianapolis, Indiana, May, 1998

In his Annual Address, M.W. Bro. Douglas Fegenbush expressed his pride in the accomplishments of Indiana Masons and also his desire to instil in them not only a like pride but also a will to exploit opportunities for even greater successes in the future. "Brethren," said the Grand Master, "we are alive and well. The period of mourning, if it ever was needed, is over. We are embarking on a new era of confidence because we know that Masonry is good. We are going to start making an impact in our communities so that they will see our good works and want to join with us."

M.W. Bro. Fegenbush indicated that an important factor in the success achieved during the year was the increased emphasis placed on unity within the Craft. "Since the family of Masonry is large and multi-branched," he said, "we are enlisting the support of all bodies to move the Fraternity forward. By redirecting our efforts toward inclusion rather than exclusion, we are seeing an excitement that is going to move us forward with renewed vigor." He suggested that another reason for their success was the public's increased awareness of Masonry because more lodges had requested permission to appear in parades, fairs and other civic events.

The Grand Master noted that he had written to each newly raised Master Mason and his wife and had sent birthday greetings to each Worshipful Master. He considered that the expressions of thanks which he had received showed that "nothing can substitute for personal contact with our brethren. This is especially true of new members, who need to be made to feel at home with us."

The Prince Hall Recognition Committee (appointed in 1996) reported that it received from the Prince Hall Grand Lodge affirmations regarding the requirements stipulated in the Indiana Blue Book of Masonic Law respecting recognition, as follows: (A) Regularity of Origin: It is recognized by the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ohio, which is recognized by the Grand Lodges of England and of Ohio; (B) A belief in the G.A.O.T.U. to be a requirement for membership: Affirmed; (C) Obligations to be taken on and in full view of an open V.S.L.: Affirmed; (D) Initiates to be exclusively men: Affirmed; (E) It is sovereign over Lodges under its control: Affirmed; (F) The three Great Lights of Freemasonry always open when a Lodge or Grand Lodge is at work: Affirmed; (G) Discussions of religion and politics within the Lodge are strictly prohibited: Affirmed; (H) The principles of the Ancient Landmarks, customs and usages of the Craft to be strictly observed: Affirmed. Because recognition of a Grand Lodge within Indiana is not prohibited by the Indiana Blue Book of Masonic Law and because all eight standards of recognition are met, the committee unanimously recommended the full recognition of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Indiana, which Grand Lodge approved.

#### IRELAND

## Holywood, Northern Ireland; Collooney and Dublin, Republic of Ireland March, June, October, December, 1997

At the October Quarterly Communication a category of membership, to be known as **Emeritus Member**, was created by the unanimous vote of Grand Lodge: "Where a Brother may have rendered signal service to his Lodge, or there are special personal circumstances to justify it, a Lodge may elect a Brother, being a subscribing member of the Lodge, to the dignity of Emeritus Member. Such Emeritus Member shall not be liable to pay annual dues to his Lodge, but the Lodge will be responsible for paying his Grand Lodge dues and Provincial Grand Lodge dues, if any, annually on his behalf. ..... He shall retain full rights as therefore, to hold Office, to propose motions and vote on any question before the Lodge."

M.W. Bro. Darwin Templeton, C.B.E., in his Grand Master's Speech on St. John's Day (December 27) in Dublin, spoke of his hopes for the new Masonic Year of 1998. He challenged his brethren to take Irish Freemasonry "forward towards the Millennium modern in outlook, competent in ritual and administration and duly respected worldwide for its openness, moral principles, charity and the integrity of its members."

Also at the St. John's Day Communication, the Chairman of the Grand Master's Charity Festival announced that funds raised during the year exceeded 500,000 pounds. The needs of the two societies (in the Northern and in the Southern parts of Ireland) which catered to those suffering from Alzheimer's Disease were given particular attention. "We hold Festivals of Charity," the chairman explained, "because Freemasonry is a caring organization, caring not only for our Brethren and their dependents but also prepared to reach out and demonstrate that we are responsible citizens and care for other folk too." Because it was important that "Carers should be prepared for their difficult role in looking after a relative with Alzheimer's Disease," a two year programme of six week courses for successive groups of Carers is being funded throughout Northern Ireland. Also, the Alzheimer Society in Dublin is being provided with seven ambulances equipped with wheelchair lifts, to transport Alzheimer patients to and from their Day Care Centres. These ambulances are stationed throughout the Republic, each clearly marked on three sides, *DONATED BY THE FREEMASONS OF IRELAND*.

#### **KANSAS**

## 142nd Annual Communication Salina, Kansas, March, 1998

M.W. Bro. Jeffrey Sowder stated in his Annual Address that the highlight of his year as Grand Master had been the opening of relations with the Grand Lodge of Prince Hall Masons. He spoke of the feeling of brotherhood and fellowship as the two Grand Masters developed a Compact concerning mutual recognition. The Grand Master reported that he had sent the Compact to every lodge to consider its acceptance and he urged Grand Lodge to approve it.

The Report of the Committee on Foreign Relations included the text of the proposed Compact between the two Grand Lodges. The Preamble of the Compact stated that its purpose was "to establish and implement full and complete Masonic recognition, to provide for successful coexistence, to insure a continuing harmonious relationship, to promote Masonry in general; having a mutual regard for the right of each Grand Lodge to retain its absolute and supreme sovereignty regarding legislative, executive and judicial power over its own lodges, members, rituals and activities; having the legitimate right of each to continue to exist and operate within the geographical bounds of the State of Kansas." Besides mutual recognition and agreement to the continuance of the status quo in the government and administration of each, the Compact granted to the members of each Grand Lodge "all the rights of a Master Mason, and of fraternal relations and association granted to any other Grand Jurisdiction with which it presently has fraternal relations." So as to facilitate the implementation of mutual recognition, the Compact provided for the establishment of a JOINT MASONIC FRATERNAL RELATIONS COMMISSION, composed of four members from each Grand Lodge and with joint chairmen who would preside on alternate years. It was stipulated: (i) communication regarding the Relations Commission would be "between the respective Chairman and his own Grand Master or between the Grand Masters themselves"; and (ii) the Commission "will consider and make recommendations to each Grand Lodge through its respective Grand Master, concerning issues, conflicts, disputes or questions." The Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, for the Fraternal Relations Committee, moved the adoption of the Compact, which was approved by Grand Lodge.

The Grand Master had issued a *blanket dispensation* allowing lodges to open and conduct business in all three degrees. Although voting privileges of all but Master Masons were limited, it gave all members a voice in the conduct of the business of the lodge.

The Church-Lodge Relations Committee noted that attacks on Masonry often are "based on insufficient knowledge, ignorance, bias or just plain lies." It suggested that the best defence is not argument but visible participation in charities in the community.

#### MANITOBA

## 123rd Annual Communication Winnipeg, Manitoba, June, 1998

Among those whom M.W. Bro. Rae Haldane-Wilsone welcomed to Grand Lodge were Master Masons not officers of lodges. He asked them to stand, saying that they were the leaders of tomorrow. "If any of you wish to have your concerns heard," he told them, "you will be recognized and appropriately listened to."

The Committee on Fraternal Reviews reminded Grand Lodge of its obligation to be aware of current conditions in other jurisdictions throughout the world. "A careful study of the Proceedings of other Grand Lodges," the committee emphasized, "can and should be an interesting and educational experience. From it we can discover how other Grand Lodges deal with the every day routines and it will certainly help us in coping with ours."

M.W. Bro. Robert Davies brought greetings from M.W. Bro. W. T. Anderson, who was unable to attend as he was representing the Grand Lodge of Canada in Ontario at the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

The Editorial and Library Committee reported a successful year in lending books, as well as video tapes. With reference to the safeguarding of archival material, the committee informed Grand Lodge of the work being done by a volunteer worker, who has attended Archive Workshops to improve his skills in this regard and who has reassessed the collection to comply with the new standards required under the rules for archival description, with the result that "the Grand Lodge of Manitoba has the only Canadian Masonic Archives listed in the Canadian Council of Archives." Although the committee was proud of these successes, it voiced its concern that "within the Constitution there is no reference to the Archives, no reference to the transfer of records, and no record of management policy." The committee observed that, although "Lodges are informed to store Lodge minutes and historical data for eventual storage in the Archives," the subordinate lodges and Grand Lodge itself fail to do so consistently. There seemed to be an implied warning that, notwithstanding enlightened legislation requiring the protection of archival material, lack of consistent attention to safe storage is resulting in the loss of Lodge and Grand Lodge records of potentially critical importance to future Masonic historians trying to record the events of today.

The 125th Anniversary Committee was reported to have in hand a project designed to produce audio tapes of music suitable for use during degree work. Lodge requests for such tapes have indicated that there is a need for them, particularly by lodges that do not have the services of an organist or pianist.

#### MASSACHUSETTS

#### Boston, Massachusetts, March, June, September, December, 1997

In the decision by Grand Lodge to provide townhouse condominiums designed for independent living, there was recognition that some older people wish to retain an independent life style. The Grand Master, in his Address at the March Quarterly Communication, explained that these were available to those who preferred the independence of townhouses to conventional accommodation.

The Grand Master urged lodges to become active in the Child Identification Programme (CHIP), in which lodges and districts have made video tapes of children at malls, fairs and the like. The tapes are given to the parents for use as identification in case of need. Local government services, including police and schools, have been enthusiastic in their support of the programme and in their thanks to the Craft. The Grand Master stated, "We know that Freemasonry is the greatest fraternal group in the world. It's not enough that we know." Every Mason must publicize Masonic charity.

A direct approach was used to raise financial support for Rainbow and DeMolay of Massachusetts. Lodges were requested to enclose with their dues bills a request for a donation. While the returns were not completely in at the time of the December Quarterly Communication, receipts were in the \$15,000 range.

The Librarian of the Samuel Crocker Lawrence Library stated that its primary task is to serve "the educational needs of all Massachusetts Freemasons while continuing to flourish and develop as a national Masonic research facility." The Librarian suggested that interest in Freemasonry is increasing, based on the number of reference questions answered by the Library staff: 2,690 questions in 1997 and 2,241 in 1996, compared with 1,022 in 1993 (the first year when statistics were kept). E-mail accounted for 11% of reference enquiries: they came from 35 countries and 41 States of the United States. Although Masons ask questions about all aspects of Freemasonry, most queries focus on individual lodge histories, on general Masonic history and on biographies of famous Freemasons. "Non-Masons," the Librarian reported, "tend to enquire about Freemasonry because of general interest, misconceptions about Freemasonry, genealogical pursuits or school projects." In 1997, about 11% of the total reference contacts were non-Masonic. For any members of Grand Lodge who harboured doubts concerning the wisdom of Grand Lodge financing a research facility used to such a degree by students and other non-Masons, the Librarian had a convincing argument, supported by a significant statistic. She said, "We believe that this kind of activity enhances awareness about Masonry among the general public. Indeed, we received inquiries about becoming a Freemason from 143 people this year."

## MEXICO (YORK GRAND LODGE)

136th Annual Communication Mexico City, Mexico, March, 1998

M.W. Bro. Carlos Marban communicated both good and bad news in his Annual Address. The encouraging news was that they had been accepted into the Southwestern Conference of Grand Masters of the United States which, he said, "will certainly enhance our international presence." In this connection, M.W. Bro. Marban spoke of his attendance at the Conference of Grand Masters in North America in Philadelphia. He reported on Masonic participation in the United States in the fight against drug addiction by children and was impressed by the experiences of "an educator with problem children, perhaps more accurately children with problem parents."

Less encouraging was the Report on the Condition of Masonry on the national level. The Grand Master spoke of an organization that was called the Council of Masonic Rites for the United Mexican States composed of "a number of irregular and/or clandestine, and/or spurious bodies, apparently headed by the *Rito Nacional Mexicano.*" He added, "This should not concern us too much, since we have never recognized any of them anyway." The danger, he felt, is that "In addition to the presence of irregular bodies in the organization, its openly political nature is evidenced by the proclamation they have issued." M.W. Bro. Marban did not question their right to hold whatever political beliefs they wished, "but we do object to their being presented as what would appear to the profane world as the official political position of Freemasonry."

M.W. Bro. Terrance O'Rourke, following his Installation as the Grand Master for the following year, stated that his top priority would be to increase membership in both Spanish and English speaking lodges. "One idea that comes to mind and I would like to look into," he said in his Acceptance Speech, "is establishing blue lodges under our jurisdiction in San Miguel de Allende, in the State of Guanajuato, and in Puerto Vallarta, in the State of Jalisco. These are two areas where there is a growing colony of retired American and Canadian citizens, many who are Masons and would love to attend lodge if there were an English speaking blue lodge in their area." There was agreement with the concept of, in the words of a Past Grand Master, "offering our snowbirds and emigres a Masonic home-away-from-home." The Grand Secretary reported that currently the number of Lodges working in Spanish is 5; in English, 7; and in German, 1. It was suggested that a Mason visiting Mexico from out of the country could obtain from the Grand Secretary the name, address and meeting times of any lodge, as well as the names, addresses and telephone numbers of the Master and Secretary.

#### **MICHIGAN**

## 172nd Annual Communication Grand Rapids, Michigan, May, 1998

As a means of providing assistance to lodges, a *Grand Master's Representatives* programme was implemented on an experimental basis. Nine representatives were appointed for a three year term as of January, 1998, and each was assigned six lodges in his area with which to work. They were given a preliminary training session that was designed to define their responsibilities and included training in skills that they will need. The operation is being administered by a Past Grand Master and monitored at quarterly meetings with the Grand Master. Following the three year experiment, a decision will be made on its extension to include all lodges in the jurisdiction.

The Grand Master, in his Annual Address, reported that the four ONE-DAY CLASSES which had been held during the year in different areas of the State had been a "tremendous success," with a total of 318 Master Masons raised in the four classes. With regard to measuring success in this method of recruiting, he gave three tests: (a) how many of these initiates become active in their Lodges; (b) how many eventually become officers; (c) how many encourage their friends to become Masons. However, M.W. Bro. Robert Stevens had other criteria for consideration. "The real measures of success," he suggested, "lie with the Lodges in which these new Master Masons have been raised." If those lodges do not have programmes of interest to the new members or if they do not make a conscious effort to integrate them into the lodge, "the chances of long term or even short term success are certainly significantly reduced," the Grand Master predicted.

In his Address, M.W. Bro. Stevens spoke also of the creation of a Strategic Plan for Grand Lodge. He considered it to be the largest single undertaking of the year and described the steps which he took in initiating the development of the plan. In order that the Plan be seen as something for the benefit of the whole membership, not merely for Grand Lodge Officers, he selected a *grass-roots* committee of members "with various backgrounds, of various ages, not only in age itself but also in the number of years in the Fraternity." He attended their first meeting and assured them that no restrictions were put on them and that there were to be no "sacred cows." In urging Grand Lodge to approve the Plan, he reminded the members that "The only thing in today's society that is constant is change. If our Fraternity is going to survive in a changing society, then this Fraternity is going to have to make some changes in the way we operate." The motion placed before Grand Lodge to approve the Plan described it as one "with respect to intent, philosophy and approach." In congratulating Grand Lodge after the Plan had been adopted, the Grand Master described it as a "road map" for the future of the Grand Lodge.

#### **MINNESOTA**

## 145th Annual Communication St. Cloud, Minnesota, March, 1998

The Grand Master reported that there was new life and enthusiasm in the Masons of Minnesota, which prompted him to thank them for their response to his challenge of the previous year: "Don't try to do it, just <u>do</u> it"! Most of the lodges which he had visited had been successful in attracting new candidates but to the successful and the unsuccessful alike M.W. Bro. J. Christianson spoke in plain terms: "I hope that each one of you realizes that your Grand Lodge leaders are asking, no, sometimes even stronger words, DEMANDING that you and your Lodge be accountable for your efforts or lack of efforts." He congratulated those who had succeeded on their first effort and

to those who had not been successful he said, "Congratulations to you also, because we can learn by trying."

Opposition to the concept of "one day classes" was reflected in a motion to prohibit the Grand Master from approving these in the future. The motion did not come to a vote as the Jurisprudence Committee advised that it was unacceptable because "it infringes on the inherent power of the Grand Master granted him under the Constitution."

A report was received from the Coordinator of the Masonic Light Award Programme. This Grand Lodge initiative is designed "to encourage Brethren to learn more about Masonry, to read Masonic books and give reports in Lodge, to attend Lodge and Grand Lodge activities and to counsel new members." Participants are encouraged to propose alternatives to the officially suggested study areas. Because the programme is intended to be an <u>immediate</u> encouragement to members, recognition is granted as each component is completed and not postponed until its completion. Recognition takes the form of a pin for all who enrol, a certificate for the first completed competency, with stickers added to it for each additional competency completed. Upon completion of the entire programme, an engraved medal is presented by the Grand Master.

The Public Relations Committee suggested the following: 1. Give two Masonic bumper stickers free to every Minnesota Mason; 2. Produce a brochure with biographies of Masons who are national figures, as well as well known Minnesota Masons; 3. Create items for sale which would increase public awareness of Masonry, such as caps, shirts, jackets and the like.

The committee stressed the need for increased efforts to make Masonry known to the community. "Our internal and external communications," it stated, "cannot be curtailed without causing damage. We must recognize this fact and face this reality to the best of our ability."

#### MONTANA

## 132nd Annual Communication Glasgow, Montana, June, 1998

Although he was proud of the work being done *within* the lodge rooms, M.W. Bro. Kent Bell expressed his concern that the future of Masonry in Montana will depend in large measure on how much more work is done *outside* those lodge rooms. It was his belief that "Somehow we have to convince the mind of modern day man that the Masonic lessons learned are the best way to live one's life." This put Masonry, he indicated, in competition with the attractions of entertainment and other such pleasures for "man's most precious commodity," namely his time. Accordingly, there was an increased need for Masons not only to be active in promoting good causes in the community but to be seen to be active. As an example, he pointed out that the Masonic scholarship programme had increased but, equally important, "its visibility has grown" also.

The Masonic Renewal Committee reported that it was having success in stimulating increased lodge activity related to Masonic Renewal. To assist in local programmes, the committee has made available through the Grand Secretary's office the following books: (1) 101 Plus Ways to Increase Attendance; (2) 150 Ways to Involve the School and Community; and (3) A Guide to Masonic Leadership. The committee reported that it had divided Montana into regions, with a committee member being the director in each region. They scheduled workshops in their areas "to aid Lodges in making Renewal happen in all of Montana and getting Masons involved everywhere." In

summary, the committee stated, "The greatest thing we feel we accomplished was getting all the Masonic bodies in Montana working together for one goal: building for the future by using the past. We lived by the slogan this year:

If you think you can, you can! If you think you can't, you're right!"

#### **NEVADA**

## 133rd Annual Communication Las Vegas, Nevada, November, 1997

In speaking of the state of the Craft in Nevada, M.W. Bro. John Clifton informally classified the lodges in three categories, based on a consideration of their activities both while at labour and while at refreshment. First, there are lodges that are "vibrant, not only with degree work, but with community projects and a variety of fun activities that involve the entire family." Secondly, there are those where attendance is minimal, where too many Past Masters are being recycled and where few degrees are conferred. However, the Grand Master did have one word of praise for these lodges: "They refuse to lie down and die." Thirdly, there "might be those Lodges that are so busy conferring degrees that they have little time for anything else. While that may be good for membership, is it truly Masonry?"

The Grand Master observed that an examination of their relative financial resources revealed the same wide range of conditions in the subordinate lodges. Some were extremely wealthy and others were having difficulty in remaining solvent. In his view, however, possession of wealth does not necessarily result in meaningful Masonic activity.

Although there are several criteria that may be appropriately used in assessing a lodge, M.W. Bro. Clifton had absolutely no doubt concerning which was the one criterion that provides the most reliable standard of measurement of the health and effectiveness of any lodge. "While there are a multitude of factors that mould the character of a lodge," he said, "the key, I believe, can be summed up in three words: leadership, leadership, leadership. We need enthusiastic, energetic, effervescent leadership to steer us toward the new millennium."

The Grand Master made two formal Recommendations, designed to keep Masonry in Nevada in harmony with a changing society that is becoming increasingly pluralistic:

"(1) That in addition to the Christian Bible, all Lodges obtain copies of the Veda, Koran and other 'bibles' of the world's major religions, thus enabling our candidates to take their obligations on the book they deem most holy.

"(2) That all references to the 'Holy Bible' in our ritual be changed to read VSL or 'Volume of the Sacred Law.'"

#### **NEW BRUNSWICK**

## 131st Annual Communication Saint John, New Brunswick, May, 1998

The Board of General Purposes reported on the "One-Day Class," which had been held in 1997. This event was considered to have been quite successful, with the cost below budget. The board indicated that it had approved the sale of return address labels bearing the Masonic Square and Compasses, with the proceeds to go to the Masonic Charities and Housing Corporation. The suggestion was made that the labels should not be used for business purposes.

In his Address, M.W. Bro. Osborne Nason spoke of the reasons for attending

Grand Lodge. "We gather here," he said, "because of our sincere attachment to the principles of our fraternity and our concern for its welfare and its progress in the future."

The Jurisprudence Committee advised that it had reviewed the Grand Lodge regulations regarding the use of the internet. It suggested that a letter be sent to all lodges in the jurisdiction advising that "the Masonic use of the Internet is governed by the Constitutions and General Regulations of the Grand Lodge" and requesting all brethren to review the appropriate sections of the Constitution. "All Internet inquiries regarding Masonic activity in this Jurisdiction," the committee pointed out, "shall be directed to the Grand Secretary."

The Grand Lodge Representative to the Order of DeMolay for Boys stated that the Order was in much better shape than had been the case a few months earlier. The Executive Officer had been able to recruit new Advisors and the boys had recruited new members to replace those who had gone to further their education elsewhere. The representative stated succinctly the difficulty facing DeMolay: "The leaders of Grand Lodge are busy doing Grand Lodge stuff, the Masters of Lodges are busy doing Lodge stuff, everyone is busy doing his own stuff." The Senior Wardens are the one's best able to help, he suggested, and to them he said, "The chance to make a difference is what I offer each of the Wardens today."

The Library Committee, reporting that several lodges had asked for books for their libraries, stated that money is available from a Grand Lodge Trust Fund "to acquire Masonic Educational material and Lodges are encouraged to make use of this funding."

The Grand Historian recorded that Grand Lodge again was the financial sponsor of *Camp Goodtime*. This camp, which is for children suffering from cancer, is operated by the Canadian Cancer Society. In 1997, sixty children had vacation opportunities which they would not have enjoyed, were it not for the generosity of the Masons of New Brunswick.

### **NEW HAMPSHIRE**

## 139th Semiannual and 209th Annual Communication Manchester, New Hampshire, November, 1997, May, 1998

The Masonic Educational Committee gave an enthusiastic endorsement at the Semiannual Communication of the *FRIEND TO FRIEND* video produced by the Masonic Renewal Committee of North America. The tape was rated very highly by the committee as educational material, because it "defines in the simplest and most articulate manner who Masons are, what Masons believe and what Masons do." The committee made the tape available to lodges and to individuals, both by loan and by purchase, and reported that it was being widely used in Friendship and Enlightenment programmes.

Addressing the Annual Communication, M.W. Bro. Arnold Ashley spoke of the value of meetings, such as the Northeast Conference of Grand Masters and the Conference of Grand Masters in North America, as times when "a variety of topics were discussed and many new ideas brought forth which were both timely and pertinent to the problems facing our Lodges and Masonry in general today."

Another source of new ideas, to which the Grand Master referred, was the Commission on Masonic Preservation, Advancement, Structure, Symbolism, Education and Strength, which had been established previously by Grand Lodge. "The Statement of Purpose for this Commission," M.W. Bro. Ashley reminded his hearers, "is as follows: The Commission is directed to examine facets of Freemasonry in this

Jurisdiction and, while retaining our integrity to the ancient landmarks of the Craft as recognized by the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire, to explore, devise and recommend changes and procedures for the purpose of revitalizing our present Brethren, encouraging nonmembers to petition for membership, and placing New Hampshire Freemasonry in a forward thinking, pro-active position for the 21st Century." The Grand Master stated that he looked forward to the receipt of this committee's report.

The Committee on Fraternal Correspondence indicated that a problem had arisen in the recognition of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. This had been approved by Grand Lodge at the Semiannual Communication with the stipulation that, though the Prince Hall Triple-8-Travellers Lodge could continue meeting in Portsmouth, no other Prince Hall Lodge would be chartered in New Hampshire. The committee reported that this stipulation in the New Hampshire offer of recognition was unacceptable. It was the committee's recommendation that, because there was no Prince Hall Grand Lodge in New Hampshire, the Massachusetts Prince Hall Grand Lodge be permitted to charter additional lodges in New Hampshire, on the agreement that in the case of each additional Prince Hall Lodge to be chartered in New Hampshire advance notification be sent by the Prince Hall Grand Lodge to the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire.

### **NEW MEXICO**

### 121st Annual Communication Clovis, New Mexico, March, 1998

M.W. Bro. Leslie Morrow introduced his remarks on the state of the Craft with an apparent contradiction: "I find the state of the Craft in New Mexico is at the same time very good, as well as not so very good." A study of membership statistics for 1995 and 1997 reveals two facts: a reduction in total membership and an increase in the proportion of members aged 65 years and older. He stated that he was not one of those who are "disheartened by an aging membership in our organization. Rather, I find it a strength or advantage that we offer, for where else will you find a meeting of equals, on the level, with 19 year olds next to 80 year olds, one offering the wisdom of age, the other the exuberance of youth?"

The Grand Master spoke of his conviction that the Craft as a whole would benefit if thinkers and would-be innovators in lodges had greater freedom to test their ideas in actual practice. He reported that to this end he had instituted a programme which encouraged lodges to seek solutions to problems or undertake new courses of action and to put those ideas to work in actual trials. "This was intended," he explained, "to GIVE-A-GO to concepts that would require By-Law changes to be legal (concepts that the Grand Master, as well as the Lodges were convinced had potential good effects, and that a trial would help prove)." M.W. Bro. Morrow related that one lodge piloted such a programme related to ritual that proved so successful that it culminated in a Grand Master's Recommendation that would be brought before Grand Lodge in due course. In another instance local experimentation resulted in the elimination of another Recommendation which the Grand Master had intended to bring to Grand Lodge.

A committee, formed to study the problems of small lodges and the possibility of having Masonic Clubs in New Mexico, is considering the proposition that the solution lies in Masonic Renewal, so that small lodges might capture the excitement found in some of the larger and more fortunate lodges.

In closing his Address, M.W. Bro. Morrow identified those characteristics of Grand Lodge that made him so proud to have served it as Grand Master. It was, he said, "A Grand Jurisdiction which takes pride in **Being Colour Blind**; one that is rock solid in **Things of Intrinsic Worth**; a member Jurisdiction of a Fraternity that means so many different things to so many different people and yet is **Deeper than all those Meanings**; a Fraternity moving into the future, on the shoulders of men ready to say, **Whatever You Need Me To Do, I'll Do It.** I leave you now with this admonition: What we say is important, but <u>how</u> we say it is doubly important. Masonry is civil. Let us conduct ourselves accordingly."

## **NEW YORK**

### 216th Annual Communication New York City, New York, May, 1997

In his report the Chairman of the Committee on Unity noted that the committee had been established in 1988 "to open a dialogue with Prince Hall Grand Lodge and to explore the possibility of relations between the two organizations, with the hope of unity someday." Although there have been many frustrations in establishing dialogue, he was hopeful for more success now that the Prince Hall Grand Lodge had elected a new Grand Master, who has written formally requesting recognition. The chairman said, "the Committee remains available for any directions by the Grand Master."

The Annual Address of M.W. Bro. Earle Hino Jr. gave a definitive statement of his position relative to recognition of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge. "The Grand Lodge of New York," he stated, "is the only Regular Grand Lodge recognized in the State of New York, and has been the sole Supreme Masonic Authority since 1781. At the present time, we do not plan to relinquish, or share, our sovereignty with any Grand Lodge. We do, however, have before us a request for recognition from the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of New York. Due to the complexities involved in our investigation of the many irregular Grand Lodges in the State of New York - such as, Ezekial, Hiram, Solomon, Enoch, Alpha, International, and countless others who claim their legitimacy and heritage from Prince Hall Grand Lodge of New York, the National Grand Lodge of Prince Hall, African Lodge No. 459, or Prince Hall himself - all consideration of requests for recognition will be deferred until such time as we are satisfied with the results of our enquiries. Therefore, the Grand Lodge of New York would object most strenuously to any Regular Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons granting recognition to a Grand Lodge within the Jurisdiction, confines and territories of the Grand Lodge of New York.'

The Committee on Youth reported that the Totton Essay Contest had over 100 entries. This year's title was *What is Success?* and the first prize was \$1,500, with several other cash prizes, which were made possible by a grant from the Fifth Manhattan District.

The Livingston Masonic Library of Grand Lodge reported steady increase of loan requests and of research enquiries. The Library's patrons "range from world-renowned scholars writing interpretive histories to new candidates seeking enlightenment about symbolism, and from genealogists looking for their ancestors to District Deputies searching for inspiration in the preparation of an upcoming speech." The Library sees itself not as a collection of books but as a centre of Masonic information and inspiration.

## NEW ZEALAND

## 108th Annual Communication New Plymouth, New Zealand, November, 1997

A proposal to create a distinctive lapel button for presentation to those who had been members of the Craft for fifty years generated considerable debate. Against the idea was a Provincial Grand Master who feared there were already too many buttons and pins: "We have had from Grand Lodge a logo that is very distinctive, the square and compasses. We now have a second logo that is very distinctive, the Forget-Me-Not. I believe that unless we are very careful, we could have a lapel full of badges; we are going to look like the Boy Scouts before we're finished." Among those who supported the proposal was a Past Master who pointed out that those who had served an organization for half a century deserve recognition. A good way to do this, he suggested, was (1) to acknowledge their contribution and (2) to promote Freemasonry in the public arena, by having distinguished men of esteem and good standing in the community wearing a miniature in their lapel.

A Past Grand Lodge Officer expressed fear for the future of Masonry and concern that there had been no discussion of declining membership, which he regarded as the major problem facing the Craft. He said that too many lodges had grown tired and apathetic. He believed that "with our aging membership, this downward slide is going to increase faster than a grandmother can open her purse to show photos of her grandchildren. A radical review must be carried out throughout New Zealand, not just from Grand Lodge but by all Brethren." There were steps that could be undertaken, he felt, by individual lodges, even by individual members: He concluded his remarks with, "Here are a few suggestions:

- 1. "An attempt to make Masonry appealing to the 30 to 35 age group,
- 2. "Encourage sons of Masons to join,
- 3. "Review the ritual, perhaps even to shorten it, so that with the degree work there is still time for a lecture of general interest in the refectory,
- 4. "Involvement of ladies more in the Lodge,
- 5. "Also a greater involvement of families,
- 6. "An extension of the benevolence activities to show the public that we exist. To this end, the Board could look at applying as close as practical the funds received each year."

The Grand Master, M.W. Bro. Charles Hammond, in adjourning Grand Lodge prior to the Installation of his successor, identified the elements that he considered had contributed to a successful Communication. "I think we've had an excellent Business Session," he said, "the debate has been keen, the debate has been educated and I think that the Brethren have voted according to what they think fit and this is what democracy is all about."

### NORTH DAKOTA

## 108th Annual Communication Minot, North Dakota, June, 1997

The Grand Historian gave a brief account of the formation of a Grand Lodge in the Dakota Territory in 1875 and the difficulties which arose from the fact that some of its lodges had charters from the Grand Lodge of Minnesota while others had been chartered by the Grand Lodge of Iowa. The differences in the traditions of these lodges were accentuated with the formation in 1889 of separate Grand Lodges for North and South Dakota. It was important, he maintained, for every North Dakota Mason to know the story of his own lodge and its achievements, not merely as a memorial of the past but as a source of pride and a driving force for the present and future. In the past, Freemasonry has shrugged off scandalous attacks which have been motivated by ignorance and malice. Masons can no longer afford to do this. They must tell the public the story of Masonry's good works in the past but for them to be able to tell that story they themselves must know it. In other words, in each lodge the story of its past and its achievements must be available for the members to read so that they

can answer the detractors of Masonry. The Grand Historian strongly recommended, therefore, that "copies of the local Lodge history should be presented to the Worshipful Master of each Lodge every year and made required reading for all new initiates."

In his Annual Report, M.W. Bro. Bruce Christianson reminded the members of Grand Lodge that a year previously he had challenged each of them to be a leader in establishing his lodge as a Total Quality Lodge. "Embodied in a total quality lodge," he explained, "are fellowship, family and community involvement, leadership opportunities, ritual work and good finances." He stated that some of the principal reasons why men joined the Fraternity and the percentage of applicants in each case who identified it as the main reason are: formation of new friendships (94%), opportunities for community service (90%), new forms of family involvement (84%) and expanded leadership opportunities (75%). M.W. Bro. Christianson concluded his remarks on the strengthening of lodges by saying, "I restate my challenge to you to be the leader in the team to achieve a full quality lodge."

Notice was given of the fifth annual meeting of the International Peace Garden Lodge. The chairman of the committee stated, "The purpose of the International Peace Garden Lodge is to promote and enhance the Fraternal relations among Freemasons and to assist in the expansion and maintenance of the Masonic related facilities at the International Peace Garden." The fee for joining the lodge by affiliation is \$50.00 and this is a life membership, provided that membership is maintained in a regular Masonic lodge. There are at present 332 United States members and 266 Canadian members.

## **NOVA SCOTIA**

## 133rd Annual Communication Truro, Nova Scotia, June, 1998

M.W. Bro. Lawrin Armstrong directed the attention of visitors from other jurisdictions to some notable first's in Nova Scotian Masonic history. For example, in 1738 the first lodge on Canadian soil was formed in Annapolis Royal, the first overseas Provincial Grand Lodge was founded in Halifax and, in 1750, St. Andrew's No. 1 was the first lodge chartered by the Grand Lodge of Scotland in the Empire outside Scotland. M. W. Bro. William Anderson thanked the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia for its hospitality on behalf of himself and of the Grand Masters of the Grand Lodges of New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Maine, Rhode Island, Vermont and the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ontario and Jurisdiction.

Regarding the decline in membership, M.W. Bro. Armstrong observed that Freemasonry, since its inception, has always had periods of growth and decline. He quoted something that he had read recently: "Our membership declines are not properly described as a 'problem' – they are a statistical inevitability resulting from the post World War II surge: it is our reactions to the declines that are the problem. We should not panic, not change Freemasonry, but we should strengthen our resolve to do everything in the future that made us successful in the past."

The Grand Master stated that formal training for Lodge Secretaries was a serious need and he endorsed the plan being considered by the Masonic Secretaries Association to hold regional workshops.

The Chairman of the Public Relations Committee reported that copies of the video, *Friend to Friend*, had been distributed to all districts, with the hope that they will help lodges to have *Friend to Friend* nights. "In dealing with Public Relations," the chairman pointed out, "it is impossible to set goals other than to ensure that the 'Public' become aware of our Fraternity and the good work that we do for the benefit of mankind. Of course we would hope that the more that the 'Public' are aware of us,

then the more interest will be shown by men desiring to assist us in our endeavours and become members of our great fraternity."

In his report, the Grand Lecturer remarked on the Grand Master's "concern about the decline in the quality of degree work within our lodges and the growing tendency to utilize abbreviated short form opening and closing procedures when there was no justification to do so. I concur with these observations and would urge those in positions of authority to stem the tide of erosion of our ritual work. We have something to be proud of and, furthermore, who would deny the sense of accomplishment and satisfaction derived from the knowledge that the work was done well?"

### ОШО

### 188th Annual Communication Cleveland, Ohio, October, 1997

Among the Recommendations which M.W. Bro. Thomas Galyen made in his Annual Address was one concerning the Masonic Model. He said that this new programme of involvement in the Public School System to train educators to work with at-risk youngsters is an excellent humanitarian endeavour and warrants support. Another reason for Masonic support of this programme, in his view, is that it is a good way to show the community that Masons are involved and care about today's youth. Also with the needs of youth in mind, he said "I feel the most important recommendation that I can make is that we, as Masons, continue to support our Masonic youth groups – DeMolay, Jobs Daughters and Rainbow." He meant contributing time for personal advice and participation, not merely money.

The Report of the State of the Art Committee was direct and to the point in its recommendations concerning what needed to be done to effect an improvement in the condition of Freemasonry. Put in simple terms: "Masons must change a lot – and a little." The committee gave this prescription for improvement: "The basic precepts need not change. The ritual need not change. But every other aspect of our Fraternity must be considered for review. Lodges that are inactive will need to become active. Lodges without able leaders will need to find or train able men. Lodges who waste time will have to save time. Lodges that exclude the family will have to include the family. Lodges that count on the ritual to the exclusion of all else, will need to include all else, AND still count upon ritual. Tools are available that address each of these issues. What is not supplied, is the *FIRE-IN-THE-BELLY* attitude required to pick up these tools and put our house back in the same level of preeminence we formerly occupied."

The Masonic Renewal Committee made recommendations on how the problem of membership might be addressed. Though the work must be done by individual Masons, they need co-ordinated support based on assumptions such as the following:

- Lodges, Districts and Sections are different from one another,
- What may work in one situation or area, may not work in another,
- What is successful now may not work three or five years from now,
- We are working with a moving target: tactics may need to evolve,
- Not all Lodges will care to participate in this effort,
- Not all Lodges may be financially able to support the programme,
- The tools supplied can be modified as necessary for local needs,
- The Officers of Grand Lodge do not have sufficient time to devote to the administration of such a programme,
- The programme requires continuity, with leadership remaining in place for a three to five year period,
- The programme receive visible and vocal support from Grand Lodge.

#### OREGON

## 147th Annual Communication Springfield, Oregon, June, 1997

M.W. Bro. Vern Wertz acknowledged in his Annual Address that the condition of the Craft was less than healthy, as a result of fewer and older members. Another concern of the Grand Master's, (though "not yet a life and death issue") was the quality of the ritual in some lodges. It may become critical, however, as lodges receive new members, for they will recognize sloppy work and this will create doubts in their minds as to the pride Masons have for their own organization. He reminded Grand Lodge that the Grand Lecturer is eager "to assist lodges in bringing excellence back to our Ritual. Since the Ritual is the principal teaching tool of Masonry, it is obvious why it must be done well."

Also regarding Ritual, the Masonic Instruction Committee reported that it had held several successful Schools of Instruction during the year. These were concerned, principally, with protocol and floor work. Noting that some members are now saying they must find time to learn the Ritual, the committee chairman remarked, "Brethren, you will never find the time; you must *make* the time. It is fun and something that we must do." He pointed out that one reason that it must be done is that the *FRIEND TO FRIEND* programme is resulting in an increased number of petitions for admission.

The Public Schools Committee related some of the innovative ways in which Oregon lodges are doing their "share to support our public schools during this time of dwindling public support." The most common form of support is giving scholarships to students. One lodge sponsors two nursing scholarships and another is giving \$11,000 in scholarships this year. For the past 36 years one lodge has sponsored a banquet to recognize honour students. Some lodges did volunteer work in local schools: one did typing and also sold \$2,600 worth of tickets at a county fair to support the Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) programme and another did 90 hours of volunteer work in the school, as well as inviting children from a language disorder clinic to its lodge picnic and also giving \$300 to the clinic's Christmas party. According to the committee, "We all prosper when we share our successes with others." It saw, too, the public relations benefit when "many newspaper articles are submitted to newspapers advertising our good works for schools."

The Committee on Recognition of Other Grand Lodges recommended that Grand Lodge "extend recognition to the Prince Hall Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of Oregon Inc. and invite them to share with us our traditional exclusive jurisdiction." Grand Lodge adopted the report of the committee, including its recommendation for the recognition the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Oregon, and authorized the necessary amendments in Grand Lodge statutes and regulations.

## PENNSYLVANIA

# West Reading, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania June, December, 1997

On the recommendation of the Committee on Fraternal Recognition, it was decided at the June Quarterly Communication "That the R.W. Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania grant Fraternal Recognition to the M.W. Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania for the purpose of intervisitation only." This recognition was contingent on the Prince Hall Grand Lodge passing a corresponding motion and also on recognition of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania being recognized by the United Grand Lodge of England. The Student Assistance Programme, under joint auspices of the State Department of Education and the Association of Student Assistance Professionals, is funded by the Pennsylvania Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children. The Foundation reported that "during the 1995-96 school year 59,193 students were seen by 1,203 SAP teams. A total of 20,112 students were referred for drug and alcohol violations. Of these students, 73% had no further violations since SAP intervention."

The *Ahiman Rezon* was amended at the Quarterly Communication in December to permit either the proposer or seconder of an application for membership to be a member of another lodge.

At the Annual Grand Communication on December 27, 1997, 43 Distinguished Guests and Visitors were present. R.W. Bro. Edward Weisser, Grand Master, received the guests with the customary honours and called on M.W. Bro. William Anderson, who extended the appreciation of the guests to the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania for the many courtesies they had received.

In his Final Address, R.W. Bro. Weisser challenged his brethren to accept personal responsibility for Masonry. "It is apparent to me," he said to them, "that we as Masons must become more concerned with our Brethren and make every man know that their Brother cares about them. Many times we have been willing to criticize a Brother for not paying dues or for dropping his membership, and we have no idea why they have done this. We have not been concerned enough to call them or visit and let them know that they are missed and they may need our help." Pointing out that there are many children in every community who need help, the Grand Master urged his listeners to help in the Big Brother and Big Sister programmes. He reminded them that they "the citizens who affirm high moral character are the ones who should be influencing the youth of our Commonwealth. A Mason can give guidance to a young man who questions why his mother didn't want him. There are many children who just need our help so that they can have someone to count on and give them encouragement. Have you become involved?"

### PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

# 123rd Annual Communication Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, June, 1998

The theme which M.W. Bro. Forrest Dumville chose for the year was *BUILDING A VISIBLE BRIDGE TO THE MASONIC FUTURE*, which was quite appropriate considering that Prince Edward Island recently had been joined to the New Brunswick mainland by a very visible bridge.

The Grand Master outlined nine "encouragements," or suggested courses of action, intended to help lodges lift their spirits by corporate participation in achieving lodge goals and also to increase Masonic recognition in the community. Typical of these was an "encouragement" that each lodge make three or four visitations during the year to seniors and/or health care facilities. The Grand Master expressed the wish that the lodge visit as a body in full regalia and, also, that visits be made to all tenants who request visits and not to Masonic brethren only.

M.W. Bro. Dumville spoke of his continued interest in an effective Public Relations programme. He stressed his belief in the effectiveness of independent focus groups to develop a strategy for long range planning. The groups that should be targeted, in his view, were new Masons, nonactive Masons and non-Masons. The following methods of communicating information about Freemasonry to the general public should continue to be used:

- 1. Giving Worshipful Masters business cards with key points about Freemasonry printed on the back of the cards,
- 2. Creating and broadcasting 30 second advertisements for radio and television,
- 3. Release of pertinent information to all news agencies,
- 4. Publicize the appearance of the Grand Master on all news media programmes.

The Grand Master thanked the Masons of Prince Edward Island for the benefits resulting from improved public relations. "All had the courage and wisdom," he said, "to shine our light outwardly, a little more brightly this year. We have not betrayed our means of recognition, nor have we compromised our work or our ideals. They have remained intact, and we should always remain on guard that they continue to do so. What we have done, is to serve notice that we are not content to remain an invisible organization that has much to offer the world, and may all hear our footsteps coming as we venture forward together."

The Report of the Committee on the Condition of the Order suggested that improved membership figures might be possible: "Several Lodges in our Jurisdiction welcomed new members with ages well below past averages and in numbers which may indicate a turning point after the declines since the surge of the 1950's."

# **QUEBEC**

# 128th Annual Communication Montreal, Province of Quebec, June, 1998

Speaking of the fraternal relations between Grand Lodge and the concordant and related bodies, M.W. Bro. Maurice Kershaw stated "We continue to meet several times each year, and we can remain a healthy and vibrant fraternity only if we continue to work together in true Masonic Brotherhood." Attending these conferences were officers of Grand Lodge, Grand Chapter, Sovereign Great Priory, the Scottish Rite and Karnak (Shrine) Temple while the topics included "membership, masonic renewal, the Shrine policy of recruiting and accepting candidates directly from the Craft lodges," among others.

The Committee on the State of Masonry reported its alarm "at the number of lodges which operate at a deficit and are using their reserve funds for the daily operation of the lodges. All lodges are going to have to increase their revenue." On the bright side, however, the majority of the lodges operated with excellence and harmony. The committee observed a trend in some lodges to be more community minded by having a presence at local fairs, highland games and social celebrations. Lodges are inviting wives and families to be present at the presentation of an award to a brother or of a commemorative pin to the widow of a brother.

The decision of the United Grand Lodge of England to recognize four more Prince Hall Grand Lodges was helpful but, in the view of the Committee of Fraternal Relations, the problem will remain until the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Ontario and Jurisdiction is recognized because members of lodges in Canada under the United Grand Lodge of England (including those in Montreal) are forbidden to attend any lodge where a Prince Hall member is present, which could be any lodge in Quebec.

Work is nearly completed, the Committee on Rites and Ceremonies indicated in its Report, on the translation into French of the Ritual for the First, Second and Third Degrees, as well as that for Lodge Installations. Although the committee is working on a translation of the ceremonies connected with the Annual Grand Lodge Communication, this document is not yet ready for publication.

In bringing greetings from those visiting from other Jurisdictions, M.W. Bro. William Anderson commented on the fact that "the Grand Lodge of Canada was Number 1, having preexisted in Quebec. At the parting of the ways, Ontario was involved in prohibition which the wise brethren of Quebec found intolerable – Ontario is finally starting to smarten up. Visiting is a privilege and an opportunity to share. Masonry is a great light but we must bring it gently from under the bushel and not expose it to the hurricanes of wrath."

### SASKATCHEWAN

### 92nd Annual Communication Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, June, 1998

In his Annual Address, M.W. Bro. Richard Brown reminded Grand Lodge of the priorities by which he promised to be guided as Grand Master. He said at that time, "I know that the responsibilities of a Grand Master are many. However, I have chosen three on which to concentrate my efforts. I have dubbed them the *Three R's* of a Grand Master: *RECOGNIZE, REPRESENT, REMIND.*" A year later, though still convinced of the importance of those Three R's, he closed his Address with this thought: "For me, what is most important in Freemasonry is what happens in my own lodge. Unless each of us remembers to focus on our own lodge, Masonic Renewal willbe for naught. Remember that IF IT IS TO BE: IT IS UP TO ME."

M.W. Bro. Brown reported on his attendance at the third meeting of the World Conference of Grand Masters in New York, in May 1998. Previous conferences had been held in Mexico and Portugal. Grand Lodges from every continent were represented. Those from Canada were the Grand Jurisdictions of British Columbia, Canada in the Province of Ontario, Quebec and Saskatchewan. An Executive Committee of six Grand Masters (one from each continent) and six Grand Secretaries was established. One topic for discussion at the next Conference (in November, 1999) will be "whether an international focus, such as education or youth, should be established." The Grand Master said that meeting with Grand Masters from across the globe made him "truly aware of the universality of the Craft."

The Chairman of the Lodge Development and Renewal Committee commented on an aspect of the Condition of Masonry in Saskatchewan that caused him considerable worry. He was concerned that many lodges were paying no heed to the need to protect their archives for the information of generations of Masons coming after them. "Again it must be reported," Grand Lodge was warned, "that far too many of our lodges do not have the historical records of their individual lodges up to date. A concerted effort must be made to bring these valuable records up to date." On the other hand, in the committee's report on present conditions and future prospects of the lodges, the chairman recorded his pleasure at the level of activity in them. These included activities in the community, such as youth programmes and bursaries, adopt a highway programmes, meals on wheels and blood donor clinics. Within the lodges, too, there was evidence of a wider range of permissible activities. For example, ladies' nights, family functions and friendship nights were becoming more frequent. As the committee stated in its report, "All of these give our fraternity visibility; and, I might add, POSITIVE VISIBILITY. Positive Results Require Positive Actions.

### SCOTLAND

# Edinburgh, Scotland, February, May, August, November, 1997

The Right Honourable The Lord Burton, Most Worshipful Grand Master Mason, spoke at the February Quarterly Communication of the status of the Dunblane Tragedy Fund. He reported that the local lodge had given careful consideration to the most appropriate way to commemorate those killed in the tragedy at the Dunblane school. "The Brethren of our Lodge at Dunblane," the Grand Master stated, "have decided that the time is now right to put into action the several projects which they have in mind. In this connection, the commissioning of a piece of music for <u>Dunblane</u><u>High School</u> has been progressed and this particular project is moving along satisfactorily. Agreement has, also, been reached with most of the churches within the Dunblane area for the installation of stained glass windows of commemoration." It was noted that one local church was prevented by the terms of its lease from having a memorial window installed but it was erecting a commemorative shrine within the church instead of the window.

In his Address to Grand Lodge at the Annual Communication in November, following his Installation for another term as Grand Master Mason, Lord Burton reviewed the highlights of the previous year. Among these, was his recent visit to the District Grand Lodge of Newfoundland. He gave a full report of the events which had occurred there recently, "We found our Brethren," he said, "very despondent. Some of the English Brethren had decided to set up a Grand Lodge of Newfoundland but of course the vast majority of our boys wanted to stay with us. Our Brethren were submitted to strong pressure and when we arrived we found morale low. Now, however, it seems that the Scottish Constitution has lost very little, if anything. The three weakest Lodges decided to leave us but several of the Brethren of these Lodges have transferred to some of our other Lodges which has strengthened them and I gather that some of the English Masons may indeed decide to join our Lodges so that in the end we may come out stronger than ever." He expressed the hope that the cooperation that had long existed between Lodges of the English and Scottish Constitutions would continue between the new Grand Lodge and the lodges of the Scottish Constitution. In closing, his observations on the new Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador, the Grand Master Mason said, "It is particularly gratifying to me to know that the vast majority of our Scottish Lodges are happy to remain within our Constitution."

The good will to which Lord Burton had referred was seen in the decision that, after the lodges which had transferred to the Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador were deleted from the roll of Grand Lodge, "the Charters issued to them by the Grand Lodge of Scotland, as requested, be returned to them as memorials of their former connection with the Scottish Craft."

### SOUTH CAROLINA

## 261st Annual Communication Rock Hill, South Carolina, April, 1998

In speaking of the state of the Craft in his Annual Address, M.W. Bro. Samuel Tennyson confessed that he was unable to understand why any one would choose voluntarily to drop out of Masonry. Nevertheless, in the past year 1,397 men left Masonry because of nonpayment of dues. The Grand Master admonished every Master and Warden to make certain, as a corrective measure, that no member is erased "until a brother has LOOKED HIM IN THE EYE and determined that he no longer wants to be a member of our great Fraternity."

On the other hand, the Grand Master pointed out that 84 South Carolina lodges had ZERO NPDs and 68 lodges had gains in membership. "The ones with gains that I'm familiar with personally," he observed, "make a habit of visiting other Lodges, holding special meetings such as outdoor degrees, breakfast degrees and ladies night banquets. Think About It!!"

The Grand Master raised the question whether in the Code of Grand Lodge "the portion of that section dealing with Physical Qualifications could or should be updated

regarding physical handicaps." He recommended that the matter be referred to the Jurisprudence Committee for study, which was done.

Another of his Recommendations was that the Work and Ceremonies Committee consider whether there could or should be Grand Lodge ceremonies relative to removing and opening cornerstones to review the contents. The committee reported in due course that it found merit in the proposal and submitted drafts of Ceremonies to be used in the removing and opening of a cornerstone, if and when requested.

## SOUTH DAKOTA

## 123rd Annual Communication Yankton, South Dakota, June, 1997

M.W. Bro. Charles Bryan made a point of stating that in his Address to Grand Lodge he was speaking to "all Masons in South Dakota, whether present or not." In recounting his visits to neighbouring jurisdictions, he remarked on the growing practice of conferring all three degrees in a single day as a way of solving the problem of reduced membership. "The critics to the One-Day," he said, "are numerous and verbal and in some cases have legitimate arguments. The one thing that I don't hear is a better idea. Doing nothing as we have done for years is not a solution. Better education for our new members is no more important for 'One-Dayers' than it is for those raised by our standard methods." He suggested that both methods, the traditional and the new, should be monitored closely by each Master.

A presentation was made on behalf of the National Masonic Foundation for Children by its President, M.W. Bro. Baugher, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Michigan. His Foundation adopted the Masonic Model for Student Assistance as a means of addressing the drug problem with children. He cited four areas where work needed to be done: (1) awareness, (2) treatment, (3) enforcement and (4) prevention. They chose prevention "because it was here we thought we could do the most good working with children." He reported that they had developed a Masonic Model Student Assistance Training Programme, which trains school teachers and administrators how to identify children who are in pain and then deal with it head on to start the healing. The only hope for these children, the Foundation believed, is to get help to them while they are "young enough to understand that there is a better way of life than that to which they have been exposed. The Masonic Model trains teachers and staff to identify and intervene in the life of a child who is headed for trouble." The programme gives Freemasons, he stated, the chance to pass on to these children "the lessons we are taught to practice in our daily lives: moral values, love of our fellow man, truth, integrity, kindness and common courtesy."

An innovative way initiated by Grand Lodge to increase local interest in membership growth was the *PLUS ONE AWARDS*. These awards are given to lodges that have a net increase in membership during a year and have initiated at least one new member. The programme places emphasis, also, on the reduction (even the elimination) of demits and suspensions. M.W. Bro. Bryan congratulated forty-nine lodges, which ranged from one to seventeen new members during the previous Masonic year, as he presented *PLUS ONE AWARDS* to them.

## **TASMANIA**

### 107th Annual Communication

# Kingston, Launceston, Tasmania, August, 1997, February, 1998

M.W. Bro. Edward Graver, in his Address to the Half-Yearly Communication, remarked that he had long been a strong believer in the importance of the community

being well informed concerning the nature and activities of Freemasonry. He expressed his gratification that the Craft is becoming better known in many communities, as evidenced by the fact that organizations such as Rotary Clubs, Apex Clubs and Probus Clubs frequently invite Masons to speak to them about the Fraternity. Besides congratulations, he offered this word of caution: "Occasions such as these present a great opportunity for us to tell our story but it is important that the story be well told. Brethren, anybody who receives a request to deliver such an address should make sure that he is up to the task. If he is unsure, it would be wise for him to enlist the services of an expert brother." The Grand Master emphasized that it is most important that the maximum benefit be obtained from every public relations opportunity of this nature.

The Masonic Centenary Medical Research Foundation reported to the Annual Communication that, since its inception, the Foundation had awarded grants of \$277,900 for medical research in Tasmania. It announced a grant of \$12,900 for a case control study of prostate cancer in Tasmanian men under sixty-five years of age. The object of the project is to investigate the reason for the 300% increase in the incidence of the disease during the previous five years, with a significant increase of the death rate in the same period. The study will concentrate on preventable causes of prostate cancer, such as diet, environmental exposures, level of physical activity, smoking history and alcohol consumption.

The President of the Board of General Purposes moved that the residence requirements for membership in a lodge in Tasmania be enlarged from being an Australian citizen to being a resident of the British Commonwealth of Nations for a period of two years.

M.W. Bro. Graver announced a long range planning conference which he intended to convene later in the year. "I am particularly anxious," he stated, "to gain input from our younger and newer members as it is in their hands that our future lies. To this end I will be asking lodges to nominate at least one master mason to attend the conference to ensure that their views are interspersed with those of more senior and experienced Freemasons."

## TEXAS

## 162nd Annual Communication Waco, Texas, December, 1997

In acknowledging the "spirit of teamwork," which he found in every lodge which he visited throughout the jurisdiction, M.W. Bro. Joseph Regian spoke in his report of his confidence in the future of Freemasonry in Texas. "Those among us who continue to pursue the course of negativism, bigotry and malaise," he said, "willnot prevail and the synergy that has developed will not fade away." The time will come, he predicted, when "we can work together to move this Fraternity back to the level of prominence and respect that it had when our fathers and grandfathers left it to us." The Grand Master reported that additional problems had arisen recently and it was clear, therefore, that "opportunities and challenges have not diminished, rather they have continued uninterrupted."

M.W. Bro. Regian stressed the need to increase public awareness and understanding of Freemasonry. He advocated wearing a Square and Compasses and, also, taking Masonry out into the community whenever possible. During the year he had told Masonry's story to elected officials in city halls of small towns all the way up to the State Capitol. There were public relations opportunities, also, in cornerstone ceremonies, in public installations and in appearances before service clubs and Chambers of Commerce. He commented, too, on the contributions to the understanding of Masonry by the public being made by programmes such as *BETWEEN FRIENDS* and *THE GIFT OF LIFE*. In the latter, recipients of blood became aware of Masonry and donors who, "would otherwise have remained at a perpetual distance, have come to know us and understand the things we stand for." In the *TOGETHER AGAINST DRUG ABUSE* programme, a growing number of youngsters are being helped and partnerships are forming with teachers, school administrators, business, law enforcement officials and parents. The Grand Master suggested that being seen helping the helpless is how Masonry can best combat bigotry.

M.W. Bro. Regian spoke of the sovereignty of Grand Lodge, saying that it was the unanimous opinion of the Trustees of the Grand Lodge that there can be only one Grand Jurisdiction in the State of Texas. Based on its belief in its sovereignty, the Grand Lodge of Texas regards any body in Texas claiming to be Masonic and not holding a Charter issued by the Grand Lodge of Texas to be clandestine, or irregular. The position of Grand Lodge, therefore, is that it "cannot and will not offer recognition, nor tolerate visitation by such bodies and/or their members." However, it was pointed out that at a non-tiled meeting, all can attend (Masons or non-Masons, men or women). The Grand Lodge with other important issues of the day, he felt it advisable to give the position of the Grand Lodge on Masonic recognition and visitation.

### VICTORIA

### East Melbourne, Victoria March, June, September, December, 1997

M.W. Bro. Neville Smith, spoke at the March Quarterly Communication of the attributes that a Grand Lodge must possess for it to be fully successful. The first in his list of required characteristics is unity. "Strength," he stated, "comes from unity, rather than just a number of autonomous groups abiding by common principles." It is important for a Grand Lodge, in order to achieve its full potential, to be a cohesive group and have an effective unified organization. Another requirement, in his judgement, is that a Grand Lodge must maintain high standards: standards of morality, standards of truth and honesty, standards of how its members conduct themselves, their lodges and their ceremonies.

Following his Installation, M.W. Bro. Rev. Walter Rolley commented on the coincidence that in the six Grand Jurisdictions in Australia there are three Grand Masters who are members of the Clergy.

A proposal to produce audio and video tapes to assist visually impaired brethren was approved in principle at the June Quarterly Communication, pending appropriate examination of the material.

The Board of General Purposes stated in its Report to the June Quarterly Communication that it had discussed "ways in which the profile of Freemasonry could be raised and it reached agreement whereby the words 'Freemasonry Victoria' and 'Freemasonry' should be used more generally." In this connection, the Board made the following statement in its Report to the December Quarterly Communication: "Members will no doubt appreciate that the United Grand Lodge will in future be known informally as 'Freemasonry Victoria.' This will provide a more identifiable profile within the community. In keeping with this view, the Grand Lodge Choir will henceforth be known as 'The Victorian Freemasons Choir.'"

#### VIRGINIA

### 219th Annual Communication Richmond, Virginia, November, 1997

Though satisfied with the condition of the lodges in general, M.W. Bro. Alan Adkins stated in his Report on the state of the Craft that in some areas Freemasonry was in need of strengthening. "These areas," he stated, "need good strong leaders with effective communications skills. In a narrow sense, these skills involve reading, writing, listening and speaking. In a larger sense, it involves attitudes, feelings, environment and relationships. We must make sure that we are communicating the right message in all our actions with those in whom we come in contact."

Among the Grand Master's Recommendations there were three of general interest: (1) Assign the responsibility to the Finance Committee of evaluating appropriate and timely financial information for the delegates at the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge; (2) Review all award programmes of Grand Lodge, to make sure the guidelines are appropriate and meet the needs of the Lodges; (3) Study the Grand Representative system to assess its viability.

The Committee on History reminded Grand Lodge that one of its principal responsibilities is "to incorporate items of the Grand Lodge activities, which are considered to be of historical interest, to the annual report." Another concern of the History Committee is the recording and safeguarding the histories of individual lodges. It listed the names of the seven lodges which had submitted their histories to the Grand Lodge Library in 1997. The History Committee, in its words, "continues to urge subordinate lodges to submit histories, either in brief format or regular full detail form, to the Allen E. Roberts Masonic Library of the Grand Lodge of Virginia." The committee reported that the final legal steps were being taken "to convey the oldest Masonic building in America, Mason's Hall, located at 1807 East Franklin Street, Richmond" from Richmond Randolph Lodge to the Grand Lodge Library. The committee noted, also, that publication was expected soon of *The History of Freemasonry in Virginia*, by Richard A. Rutyna and Peter C. Stewart (publisher: University Press of America, Lanham, Maryland).

M.W. Bro. Adkins described Brotherly Love in these lines:

WHAT IS A SMILE? A smile costs nothing, but creates much. It happens in a flash, but the memory of it lasts forever. It cannot be begged, borrowed or stolen, But it is of no earthly good to anyone until it is given away. So, if in your hurry you meet someone who is too weary to smile, Leave one of yours, For no one needs a smile so much as he who has none to give.

### WEST VIRGINIA

133rd Annual Communication Charleston, West Virginia, October, 1997

In an age in which society has been subjected to changes that have been more fundamental and more frequent than in any comparable period of time in history, M.W. Bro. Richard Swisher made some timely remarks on the question of Masonic change. "While I am satisfied," he commented in his Report as Grand Master, "that we have maintained the *status quo* without serious harm to the Fraternity, I would wish to have been more innovative and to have brought about some long overdue changes to this august body. However, we find that there still exists a diversity of opinion

among the Brethren on a number of basic questions." He decided, therefore, that additional time was needed to allow for adequate consideration of the issues involved. He stated, however, that he was confident that, with time, patience and perseverance, the shackles to the past would be loosened and that eventually it would be possible to make certain potentially beneficial changes. Meanwhile, he offered this thought-provoking observation: "MyBrethren, to resist *CHANGE* for the express and only reason that it would be a *CHANGE* is not a virtue that one should be proud to proclaim."

M.W. Bro. Swisher referred to his visit the previous July to Toronto where he had been asked to address a few remarks to the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario. He mentioned that he had particularly enjoyed attending a performance of the *Phantom of the Opera*. M.W. Bro. William Anderson was invited to speak and he remembered the pleasure that M.W. Bro. Swisher's visit had given. On behalf of his fellow guests and himself, he expressed thanks for the courtesy and generosity with which they had been received.

M.W. Bro. Anderson's remarks were well suited to the consideration of the prevalence of change in society. He pointed out the advantages that Freemasons have in such social turbulence. "We should celebrate," he observed, "in the fact that we have the opportunity to relate to such a firm, solid and deep foundation as our Fraternity supports us. We are in a situation today where 80% of the population does not know anything about Freemasonry, and that 80% of our citizenship are at a loss to know how to cope with, not the winds of change, but the hurricane of change in our society, and they are being quickly engulfed in the quicksand of change."

## WESTERN AUSTRALIA

### Midland, Perth, Western Australia, April, October, 1997

In his Address, at the April Communication, the Grand Master, M.W. Bro. The Ven. Archdeacon Stanley Threlfall, announced that in November he had brought together four experienced brethren "to prepare and publish a Mentor's Handbook for the instruction and education of candidates for Freemasonry." With their assistance, a programme based on that Handbook was developed and presented at lodge meetings in nine localities throughout Western Australia. "While proposers and seconders of candidates would normally accept the responsibility of caring for their nominees," the Grand Master observed, "this does not always take place. Many proposers and seconders are not regular attendees at Lodge meetings and some may not feel best qualified to fill the role of mentor." The programme envisages that in such cases the lodge would appoint a mentor to assist the candidate until he becomes a proficient Master Mason.

It was announced that a formal Statement had been signed by the Grand Master and the First Grand Principal, among others, following a recommendation of the Australasian Grand Masters that all newly raised Master Masons should become well grounded in Craft Masonry before they applied to join other Orders. Under the title, <u>BE IT KNOWN BY ALL FREEMASONS</u>, the Declaration stated: "It is our opinion, fervent desire and recommendation that, in all but exceptional cases, newly admitted Brethren in our Jurisdiction, be not approached or recommended for advancement to Royal Arch Masonry and other Fraternal Orders, until consolidation of their initial membership of two years has been achieved. This, we believe, will be for the betterment of the Craft and Freemasonry in general."

In his Address at the October Communication the Grand Master remarked on the increase in the number of Masonic Widows' Associations which drew attention to the welfare of widows in lodge programmes throughout the year. He suggested that lodges offering a substantial widows' programme are seen as active and progressive.

Also at the October Communication, M.W. Bro. Threlfall stated that three rural lodges had ceased to operate during the year. He reminded Grand Lodge of a proposal made some years ago by a Past Grand Master, who spoke of "the great problems being encountered by a number of country Lodges due to declining population in many rural areas. In a number of these lodges the work of the Lodge is being maintained by a small core group of Brethren who experience frustration and disappointment and often feel much isolated. These country Lodges would be greatly encouraged and helped if a city Lodge were to enter into a 'twinning' arrangement with a country Lodge. This could lead to the exchange of visits and to advice, encouragement and practical help being given to the country Lodge." The Grand Master asked that Metropolitan Lodges consider this idea.

#### WISCONSIN

### 154th Annual Communication Maddison, Wisconsin, June, 1998

Referring to the state of the Craft, M.W. Bro. Bruce Sim said in his Annual Report that he was satisfied with the enthusiasm and dedication that had been shown during the year. "Our Fraternity in Wisconsin,"he stated, "ison its way to opening new doors, stretching to the outer limits and creating new paradigms for the future of Masonry." He was proud to be able to report that all of the major programmes on which Grand Lodge had focused had been addressed and were in progress.

One of these programmes was increased community involvement. The KID ID PROGRAM was successful beyond expectations: 240,000 Kits were distributed in small as well as large communities across the State. The main achievement of this enterprise was 240,000 children who have the protection of quicker identification and recovery if they are missing. A secondary accomplishment was that there are 240,000 families that have a more accurate and sympathetic understanding of the nature and purpose of Masonry.

Another accomplishment of the past year was that the Grand Master's Council was re-established. This council consists of Masons from all parts of the State who are influential in politics, business and community activities and are recognized as dedicated leaders. It was felt that, though they need not be Masonic office holders, their insight and counsel will help Grand Lodge in its approach to today's society.

A long range programme of Grand Lodge is the return of Masonry to communities where there once was a lodge that has ceased to operate. So far this project has not yet passed the point of investigating and planning but there are encouraging indications that in at least one community a lodge may soon be rechartered.

The Grand Master reported that there had been two Man-to-Mason classes (or All The Way in a Day) which were partly responsible for 305 initiations (the largest number since the 1960's). Consequently, many newly made Masons brought others into the Fraternity. On the other hand, greater attention is being given to the reasons for suspensions and demits. An Exit Interview Form has been developed to help in determining the reasons for such departures.

The Grand Master concluded his remarks with this quotation from the late Bro. Norman Vincent Peale: "Think excitement, talk excitement, act out excitement and you are bound to become an excited person. Life will take on a new zest, deeper interest and greater meaning." M.W. Bro. Sim urged his brethren to become excited about Freemasonry, saying "It is what the world needs!"

# ADDRESS BY Alan L. Goldbloom, MD, FRCPC Vice President, Academic and Clinical Development The Hospital for Sick Children Toronto, Ontario at the GRAND MASTER'S BANQUET July 21, 1999

INTRODUCTION OF GUEST SPEAKER BY M.W. BRO. WILLIAM T. ANDERSON

Distinguished Guests and Brethren.

It is with much pleasure that I introduce to you this evening our eminent speaker. He is a graduate in medicine from McMaster University, taking his paediatric residency training at Children's Hospital in Boston and at the Hospital For Sick Children in Toronto, following which he had a consulting paediatric practice in Halifax, Nova Scotia. In 1983 he joined the full time faculty at Dalhousie University as Director of Post Graduate Education in Paediatrics. From 1987 to 1991, he was director of Medical Education and Associate Professor of Paediatrics at the University of Toronto. During this time he played an active role in residency training issues at a national level and served as Chairman of the Examining Board in Paediatrics for the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada. In 1991 he was appointed Associate Chairman and Director of Clinical Services in the Department of Paediatrics at the University of Toronto and an Associate Paediatrician and Chief at the Hospital For Sick Children. He joined the Executive Management team of that Hospital, becoming Vice-President, Patient Programmes. During his four years in that role, he carried the executive responsibilities for the clinical operations of that Institution.

Dr. Goldbloom has, since April 1, 1997, been Vice-President Academic and Clinical Development and in this role his activities range from development of new initiatives and partnerships to external relations to academic enterprise. A particular focus has been on the development of new models of health care delivery for children, maximizing the use of information technology. Most recently he has chaired the Child Health Network Steering Committee. A group which is developing a network of Child Health Care organizations that will work together to provide more accessible and coordinated care for children in Ontario.

Please welcome this outstanding pioneer of medical care for children, Dr. Alan L. Goldbloom, MD, FRCPC – Dr. Goldbloom.

I feel privileged for three reasons to have been invited to speak with you this evening. First, it is indeed an honour to speak before a group of individuals who have done so much for their fellow man; second, it is always a privilege to speak on behalf of an institution to which I feel great loyalty, and for which I have great affection — The Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto; third, and perhaps most important, I always feel privileged to be able to speak on behalf of children everywhere.

# The Accomplishments of the Past

Over the past 15 years the Masons of Ontario have been committed to issues of hearing health care. You have supported important auditory research led by Dr. Robert Harrison and his colleagues at The Hospital for Sick Children, and you have supported the rehabilitation of the hearing impaired.

Most adults are familiar with hearing problems. As I look out at this audience, it would be a safe bet to predict that quite a few of you have experienced some hearing loss, particularly as you get older. And I know I'm going out on a limb here, but I will guess that there are a few people in the room, besides myself, who are now over age 50. Some of you are probably wearing hearing aids. And you are the lucky ones, because you had the opportunity to switch the hearing aid off as soon as you saw me approach the microphone. At least that's what the smart ones are probably doing. But there are also some of you who have lost hearing but don't know it, or refuse to admit it. Your family and friends just get used to the fact that they have to repeat things for you.

Whether or not you are taking care of your own hearing problems, I am here to tell you that you have had an enormous impact on children with significant hearing loss. The Masons helped initiate the cochlear implant programme, and you actually paid for the first devices implanted. That was 15 years ago. In the first year, we only did 2 or 3 of these delicate operations, in which an electronic device is implanted right into the body's hearing apparatus. Last year, we implanted 40 such devices. That means that approximately 140 children have been provided with the gift of hearing. The Government of Ontario subsequently provided some additional funding for this, but not enough to meet the demand. We have continued to lobby hard, and during the interval have diverted hospital funds from other areas in order to provide treatment to those children in need. Timing is everything for these children, because the earlier it is done, the more likely that it will help that child to communicate.

I am delighted to report to you, that after several years of lobbying and presenting our case, the Government of Ontario has followed the lead of the Masons and provided us with a significant increase in government funding to help us meet the unmet needs of children requiring cochlear implants.

Let's think of this for a moment in business terms. Let's think about "return on investment." Fifteen years ago, many of the people in this room helped raise money for what they might have called a "donation." I don't call it that. I'm going to call it an investment, because then we can talk about growth and about dividends.

Has your investment grown? Of course it has. What started as a pilot project has developed into the largest cochlear implant program in the country, and one of the leaders in North America. By setting an example and providing the seed money, you have triggered others, especially the government, to increase its overall funding of this endeavour, and to recognize it as a legitimate health cost – not something that should rely on donations.

Have there been dividends? Well, none of you has received a dividend cheque, and don't be expecting one in tomorrow's mail. But your vision and support have helped to provide the gift of hearing to a very large number of children. And I can assure you, as I look out on this audience of grown men, that if any of you had witnessed the look of amazement - and sometimes fear - on the face of a child hearing sounds for the first time, or if you had seen the tears well up in the eyes of the parents of that child, you yourselves would have been overcome with emotion. And I put it to you that that dividend alone would have more meaning, more impact, more satisfaction, and last longer than any financial payout could ever do. The Masons should feel justly proud of what has been accomplished.

# The Future - The Millennium Project. "Help-2-Hear"

But enough dwelling on the past. It is time once again to look to the future, so let's talk for a few minutes about the Millennium Project which the Masons of Ontario have taken on. It is called "Help 2 Hear." And it is about screening newborn babies for hearing loss in Ontario. You have set for yourselves an ambitious \$2 million target, and with this campaign I believe the Masons will once again have a significant impact on the lives of countless children, now and in the future.

How would you know if a newborn baby is deaf, or even partly deaf? Think about it for a moment. We don't expect newborns to be able to talk, so that won't be a clue. In fact, we just expect them to cry when they are hungry or wet, to sleep a lot, to smile at faces when they get to about 4-6 weeks, and to babble and gurgle and laugh.

Deaf babies do all that. They will also learn to crawl, sit up, and stand at the same time other babies do. Therein lies the problem. Parents may not even notice evidence of a hearing loss until they notice that the baby isn't repeating sounds or words, and they would certainly be unlikely to notice an incomplete hearing loss.

And yet, from the moment of birth onward, every sound that enters a baby's ear becomes part of that baby's preparation for speech. Every sound they do not hear is, in fact, an irreplaceable loss, because you cannot turn the clock back.

Therefore, the earlier we can detect a baby's hearing loss, the better. There was a time when it was pretty difficult to do hearing tests on young babies. That is no longer true. NO BABY IS TOO YOUNG TO HAVE HIS OR HER HEARING TESTED.

We know that 1 in every 100 newborns will have some hearing loss. Your Millennium Project, Help 2 Hear, will allow the establishment of model screening programs that will test all newborn babies. You will be kick-starting an initiative that will begin with pilot programs in a few centres, but which should ultimately be expanded, and funded, to cover all of Ontario.

Our goal is to ensure that the same standard of testing will apply to every baby born in this province, whether that infant is in a small Northern Ontario town or in downtown Toronto. I know that those of you gathered in this room represent every region of this large province, and I want you to understand that this project will have as much relevance for the children in your own community as it will in the centres where the project is being coordinated.

We will be developing new devices to help us with this work, setting new standards for screening programs, training people to do the testing, and evaluating the impact of what we do. By taking the lead, and by setting an example, we will not only be providing immediate help for a number of children, we will also have an impact on how these services are delivered and paid for in the future. So once again the Masons will be the spark plug, the catalyst for a project that will pay dividends to thousands of children. And remember, for each child you help, that dividend pays out for every single day of that child's life.

This is an Ontario project. While it will, for practical purposes, be coordinated through The Hospital for Sick Children, its target will be the children of Ontario. Our goal is to reach them all.

# The Ongoing Need to Support Research

Finally, I want to say a word about why your help, and the help of others, is so desperately needed in Canada. Why do we need to turn to benevolent, hard-working members of the community to make something so important happen? After all, we are one of the wealthiest nations in the world, have one of the highest standards of living, and, whatever our complaints, most of us would not choose to live anywhere else.

Nevertheless, Canada has fallen short in the area of research funding. Of the leading countries in the world, the G7, Canada has the lowest per capita funding of medical research. Also, on a per capita basis, for every dollar that Canada spends on research, the United States spends between \$6 and \$7 dollars. Yet we are in direct competition with the United States for the best scientists.

At The Hospital for Sick Children, we are continuously being raided by the top medical research centres in the world, seeking our talented staff. And of course it's the best scientists who are in the greatest demand. One of the carrots that allows us to keep them in Canada, and at The Hospital for Sick Children, is in fact the research environment we can provide.

It may surprise you to learn that its not the salary, although we need to be competitive there too. What really keeps them here is our ability to provide them with the support necessary to help them succeed. And the only way we have been able to do that is by building a Foundation with one of the largest endowments in the country - all of it raised through philan-thropy.

When you raise money for research, or when you donate your own money to research, you are investing in your children and your grandchildren and your great-grandchildren. Research is sometimes a tough sell. It is often much easier to raise money for someone who is suffering now and needs

treatment now, and certainly we must never abandon those needs. So let me give you an example that may drive the point home.

Many of you may remember the last major polio epidemic of the early 1950s. Many children were left paralyzed, and their lives were saved by the invention of iron lungs, which allowed them to continue breathing. It would have been easy to justify devoting larger amounts of money to developing better iron lungs, better breathing machines, and so on, because they really were life-savers.

But along the way, someone decided to put some of that money toward some research with animals in a lab, where scientists were working on a vaccine for polio. Those initial experiments probably seemed pretty far-fetched, and were done on mice, and didn't seem to be helping children too much. But what came out of them was a vaccine which made polio in Canada almost extinct, and certainly put the iron lung manufacturers out of business.

I am going to close this evening by sharing with you a thought about giving. You are all givers, whether you are working to raise the money or whether you are giving your own. An acquaintance of mine was being canvassed by some friends to make a major donation to a particularly important and very worthwhile cause. He wondered out loud about how much he should give. One of his friends said the cause was so important that he should "give till it hurts." The other friend stopped and said, "No. You should give until it feels good."

The Masons of Ontario have every right to feel good about what they have done, and about what they propose to do.

On behalf of the children who benefit from your work, and on behalf of my colleagues at The Hospital for Sick Children, I salute you for your work and contributions, and I thank you for your kind attention this evening.
