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PREFACE

THE *Greek Exercise Book*, the first part of which is here submitted to the public, is a complement to the *Short Grammar*. It contains material for Translation and Reading.

The *Narratives* introduced among the Exercises, and especially those forming the Appendix, will relieve the monotony and strain of the daily drill and facilitate the subsequent Reading of Authors.

The *Vocabulary* has been carefully selected by Professor Kaegi. His aim has been to introduce none but such words into the Exercises as are *most frequently met with* in Classical School Authors. Teachers should therefore insist upon the study of the vocables here given; those contained in foot-notes need not be memorized, their only purpose being to aid in framing particular sentences.

The *study of grammar* is, of course, to be regulated according to the Lessons of the Exercise Book. The *amount* of grammar to be practiced in each Lesson should likewise be thoroughly learnt. Daily experience in the class-room teaches that a thorough foundation in the elementary rules of both Etymology and Syntax is an indispensable requisite for a profitable and enjoyable Reading of the Authors. As the Prince of Orators has it: Τὰ κάτωθεν ἰσχυρότατ' εἶναι δεῖ.

The present work furnishes *abundant* material for *Translation*. Teachers who wish to proceed more rapidly will have no difficulty in making their own selection. If from five to six hours a week be devoted to the study of Greek, the first 76 Lessons of Part I ought, under favorable circumstances, to constitute the task of the first year.

The Lessons are not intended as home tasks, but to be translated in school and repeated at home.

Owing to the richness in synonyms of the English language, it was impossible without unduly swelling the Vocabulary to give all the shades of meaning which an idiomatic translation might seem to require. Consequently, the Greek equivalents of choicer words or more select phrases have been either given in foot-notes or indicated in the English *Index*.

It is especially in the first year of the study of Greek that teachers should act upon the well-known maxim: *Σπεῦδε βραδέως*, *nam sat celeriter fit quidquid fit satis bene*.

Suggestions towards an improvement of the book will not only be gratefully accepted, but are kindly solicited from teachers who will use the book in the class-room.

86. Macedonia under Philip.

Ἡ Μακεδονία πρὸ Φιλίππου τοῦ βασιλέως μικρὰ ἦν καὶ φαύλη.¹ Φίλιππος δὲ ὁ Ἀμύντου πλούτων καὶ δύναμιν ἐκέκτητο, ὄσσην οὐδεὶς τῶν Ἑλλήνων. Εὐθύς δ' ἄρξας² ἐνίκησε μὲν τοὺς οἴκοι³ ἀντιστασιώτας,⁴ μετ' ὀλίγον δὲ χρόνον δειναῖς μάχαις καταστρεψάμενος τοὺς Παίονας⁵ καὶ τοὺς Ἰλλυριοὺς⁵ ἐστράτευσεν ἐπ' Ἀμφίπολιν, τὴν Ἀθηναίων ἀποικίαν τὴν ἐπὶ Στρυμόνι, καὶ βίᾳ λαμβάνει τὴν πόλιν. Ὑστερον δὲ Πύδναν καὶ Ποτεΐδαιαν τὰς πόλεις ἐκπολιορκήσας Φιλίππου τὴν πόλιν, ἣ πρότερον ὄνομα ἦν Κρηνίδες,⁶ ἠύξανεν, ἀποικίζων ἐκεῖ πλήθος ἀποίκων, καὶ τὰ ἐν τῇ χώρᾳ μέταλλα¹⁰ μείζω ἐποίησεν, ὥστε πρόσοδον ἔφερεν αὐτῷ πλέον ἢ τάλαντα χίλια κατ' ἔτος.⁷

Ὀλίγοις δ' ἔτεσιν ὕστερον οἱ τε Θετταλοὶ καὶ οἱ Λοκροὶ καὶ οἱ Θηβαῖοι ἐπολέμησαν πρὸς τοὺς Φωκέας. Νικησάντων δὲ τῶν Φωκέων Φίλιππος τοῖς Θετταλοῖς αἰτήσασιν ἐβοήθησεν. Καὶ δις μὲν¹⁵ ἠττήθη καὶ αὐτὸς⁸ ὑπὸ τῶν Φωκέων, τῇ δὲ τρίτῃ μάχῃ ἐνίκησε σὺν τοῖς Θετταλοῖς.

Ἐπειτα δ' ἐπ' Ὀλυνθον ἐστράτευσε Φίλιππος, πόλιν Ἑλληνίδα ἐν τῇ Χαλκιδικῇ μεγάλην καὶ εὐδαίμονα, μετὰ πολλῆς δυνάμειος, καὶ μάχῃ νικήσας τοὺς Ὀλυνθίους συνέκλεισεν εἰς πολιορκίαν.²⁰ Οἱ δ' Ὀλυνθιοὶ, πρέσβεις πέμψαντες εἰς Ἀθήνας περὶ βοηθείας, ἐν μακρᾷ πολιορκίᾳ πολλοὺς τῶν Μακεδόνων ἀπέκτεινον· τὸ δὲ τελευταῖον,⁹ φθειρών χρήμασι τοὺς Ὀλυνθίων προστάτας, ἐκ προδοσίας ἐκράτησεν ὁ βασιλεὺς τῆς πόλεως· καὶ τὴν μὲν πόλιν κατασκάπτει, τοὺς δ' ἐνοίκους ἀνδραποδίζει· οἱ δ' Ἀθηναῖοι ὀψίζοντες¹⁰²⁵ τῇ βοηθείᾳ οὐδὲν ὠφέλησαν.

Τοῖς δ' ὕστερον ἔτεσιν Φίλιππος τὸν αὐτὸν τρόπον¹¹ πολλὰς ἐλάμβανε πόλεις καὶ πολὺ κρείττων ἐγίνετο, ὥστε καὶ τοῖς Ἀθηναίοις καὶ τοῖς ἄλλοις Ἑλλήσι πολὺς φόβος ἐνέπιπτεν. Ἐπεὶ δὲ ἀπροσδοκῆτως¹² τῆς Ἑλατείας ἐκράτησεν, εὐθύς οἱ Ἀθηναῖοι³⁰ πρέσβεις εἰς Θήβας ἔπεμψαν τὰς πρότερον πολεμίας οὔσας περὶ

συμμαχίας, καὶ ἔπεισε Δημοσθένης ὁ ῥήτωρ τοὺς Βοιωτοὺς συμμαχίαν ποιήσασθαι ὑπὲρ τῆς κοινῆς τῶν Ἑλλήνων ἐλευθερίας. Αὐτίκα δ' ὁ δῆμος τῶν Ἀθηναίων πανδημεὶ¹ ἔστράτευσε, καὶ κατὰ σπουδὴν πορευθέντες ἦκον εἰς Χαιρώνειαν τῆς Βοιωτίας, οὐδ'² κωμῆ³ 5 στρατοπεδευσάμενοι μετὰ τῶν Βοιωτῶν ἔμενον τὴν τῶν πολεμίων ἔφοδον.

Ὀλίγας δὲ μεθ' ἡμέρας Φίλιππος, ἄλλως⁴ πειραθεὶς τὴν τῶν Ἑλλήνων συμμαχίαν διαλύσασθαι, ἦκεν ἔχων πεζοὺς μὲν πλείους τῶν⁵ τρισμυρίων, ἰππέας δὲ οὐκ ἐλάττους τῶν⁵ δισχιλίων. Καὶ 10 γίνεταί δὴ καρτερὰ ἡ μάχη ἐπὶ πολὺν χρόνον, ἀμφοτέρων ἀνδρείοτατα μαχομένων καὶ πολλῶν παρ' ἀμφοτέροις πιπτόντων· ἐφάμιλλοι⁶ μὲν γὰρ ἦσαν ἀνδρεία καὶ προθυμία, τῷ δὲ πλήθει καὶ τῇ τῶν πολεμικῶν ἔργων ἐμπειρίᾳ ὑπερέβαλλεν ὁ βασιλεὺς. Ἐνίκησαν δὲ, ἐπεὶ Φίλιππος τῇ φάλαγγι τοὺς Ἀθηναίους ἐτρέψατο 15 καὶ Ἀλέξανδρος ἔχων τοὺς ἰππέας τὸν ἱερὸν λόχον τῶν Θηβαίων ἐφυγάδευσεν, οἱ Μακεδόνες· καὶ ἐτελεύτησαν μὲν ἐν τῇ μάχῃ τῶν Ἀθηναίων πλείους τῶν⁵ χιλίων, ἐζωγρήθησαν δὲ οὐκ ἐλάττους τῶν⁵ δισχιλίων· ὁμοίως δὲ καὶ πολλοὶ τῶν Βοιωτῶν οἱ μὲν ἐφονεύθησαν, οἱ δ' ἐζωγρήθησαν. Μετὰ δὲ τὴν μάχην ὁ Φίλιππος 20 τρόπαιον ἰδρύσας ἐπινίκια⁷ τοῖς θεοῖς ἔθυσσε καὶ τοὺς ἀριστεύσαντας⁸ κατὰ τὴν ἀξίαν⁹ ἐτίμησεν.

Μετὰ δὲ ταῦτα τοῖς Ἑλλησιν ἀδύνατον ἦν εἰς αἰὲ τὴν ἐλευθερίαν ἀνακτήσασθαι.¹⁰ Φίλιππος δὲ τοὺς τε Ἀθηναίους καὶ τοὺς ἄλλους Ἑλληνας πλὴν Λακεδαιμονίων ἔπεισε, συμμαχίαν αὐτῷ 25 ποιήσασθαι εἰς τὸν πόλεμον τὸν πρὸς τοὺς Πέρσας. Μέλλον δὲ ἦδη στρατεῦσθαι εἰς τὴν Ἀσίαν, ἐπὶ¹¹ Πυθοδήμου ἄρχοντος Ἀθήνησιν,¹² ἐν τοῖς Κλεοπάτρας τῆς θυγατρὸς γάμοις¹³ λαμπρότατα ποιηθείσιν ἐφονεύθη ὑπὸ Πανσαίου, βασιλεύσας τῶν Μακεδόνων ἔτη εἴκοσι καὶ τρία.

Τοῦτον τὸν τρόπον³ οὕτως ἐχειρώσατο⁴ αὐτούς, ὥστε ἐθαύμαζον αὐτόν, καὶ τὴν λεγομένην Φιλίππου δεινότητα⁵ οὐδὲν ἠγούντο πρὸς⁶ τὴν τοῦ παιδὸς ἀγχίνουαν.⁷

Ἐκείνων δὲ λεξάντων· Ταῦτα πάντα, ὦ Ἀλέξανδρε, σοὶ κτᾶται ὁ Φίλιππος· Τί, ἔφη, τοῦτό μοι ἔσται⁹ ἀγαθόν, εἰ βασιλεύσω μὲν πολλῶν, πράξω δὲ μηδέν;

Παραδεχόμενος οὖν τὴν βασιλείαν ἀμφὶ τὰ εἴκοσιν ἔτη ἦν²⁰ Ἀλέξανδρος. Καὶ πρῶτον μὲν εἰς τὴν Ἑλλάδα ἐπορεύθη ὡς αἰτήσων¹⁰ παρὰ τῶν Ἑλλήνων τὴν ἡγεμονίαν τῆς ἐπὶ τοὺς Πέρσας στρατείας· λαμβάνει δὲ παρ' ἐκάστων πλὴν Λακεδαιμονίων, οἳ ἀποκρίνονται, πάτριον¹¹ εἶναι αὐτοῖς, μὴ¹² ἀκολουθεῖν ἄλλοις, ἀλλ' αὐτούς¹⁸ ἄλλων ἡγεῖσθαι. Μετὰ δὲ ταῦτα ἀναχωρήσας εἰς τὴν Μακεδονίαν τὸν χειμῶνα ἐν μεγάλῃ παρασκευῇ ἦν τοῦ εἰς τὴν Ἀσίαν στόλου.

Καὶ ἀπέχοντος αὐτοῦ ὅσον ἐβδομήκοντα σταδίους Σάρδεων ἦκον Μιθρίνης τε ὁ φρούραρχος τῆς ἀκροπόλεως καὶ 5 Σαρδιανῶν οἱ δυνατώτατοι, καὶ ἐνεχείρισαν οἱ μὲν τὴν πόλιν, ὁ δὲ Μιθρίνης τὴν ἄκραν καὶ τὰ χρήματα. Καταλιπὼν δὲ ἐν Σάρδεσι Πανσανίαν ἔχοντα φρουρὰν ἱκανὴν αὐτὸς ἐπορεύετο εἰς Ἐφεσον.

Accordingly, on hearing of Darius' entrance into Cilicia, Alexander returned by the same narrow pass northward as far as Issus, and had, in consequence, his army drawn up in the battle south of that of Darius.

1. **Attributive** phrases are placed between article and noun, or after the noun with the article repeated. Gr. 120.

οἱ τοῦ βίου πόνοι = οἱ πόνοι οἱ τοῦ βίου.

2. A **neuter plural** subject takes the verb in the singular. Gr. 114, 1.

τὰ δῶρα καλὰ ἦν . . . were . . .

3. **Predicate** nouns and adjectives go without the article. Gr. 119, 1.

τὸν θάνατον λέγουσιν ἰατρὸν τῶν πόνων. [Gr. 166, 2.

4. After **passive** verbs, ὑπό w. gen. (= *ab* w. abl.) denotes the agent.

ἀρχεσθε ὑπὸ τῶν ξένων.

5. The **article** may have the force of a possessive pronoun. Gr. 117, 1.

στέργετε τοὺς φίλους *love your friends.* ἡ πατρίς *one's country.*

6. The **neuter** (singular as well as plural) of an **adjective** may be used as a noun and, in consequence, is often rendered by an (abstract) noun or a phrase. Gr. 124.

τὸ δίκαιον *justice*, τὰ ἀναγκαῖα *what is (was, etc.) necessary*, (τὰ) μικρά *little things.*

7. The **instrumental dative**, like the ablative in Latin, answers the question *by (with, through, by means of) what?* Gr. 159.

ἐν Σπάρτῃ βοή κρῖνουσιν — βλάβαις οἱ ἀνόητοι παιδεύονται.

8. **Possessive** pronouns require the article. Gr. 64; 126.

ὁ ἐμὸς φίλος *my friend* — ὁ ἡμέτερος πατήρ.

9. Learn the following **prepositions**. Gr. 162. 163.

ἀνευ w. gen. *without*: ἀνευ πόνων.

ἀπό w. gen. *away from*: ἀπὸ τοῦ ποταμοῦ.

down from: ἀπὸ τοῦ ἵππου.

διά w. gen. *through(out), across*: διὰ τοῦ πεδίου.

ὑπέρ w. gen. *for (the sake), in defence (behalf) of*: ὑπὲρ τῆς ἐλευθερίας.

12. A **participle** without the article is often equivalent in English to a clause with *while, as, when, if, because, although* etc. However, it may often be rendered by a participle as well. Gr. 203, 3.

13. The **genitive absolute** in Greek corresponds to the ablative absolute in Latin or the nominative absolute in English. Hence Κύρου βασιλεύοντος = *Cyru regnante, Cyrus being king, while (as, when, if, because, although etc.) Cyrus is (was etc.) king, in the reign of Cyrus.* Gr. 203, 2.

14. Ὁ παιδεύων (*he*) *who educates*.

15. *Than* after a comparative is rendered by ἤ (= *quam*).
16. As in Latin the ablative, so in Greek the **genitive of comparison** may be used instead of ἤ with the nominative or accusative. Gr. 148.

Note in particular that the **imperative** (Gr. 169, 3) of the *aorist*: expresses one *single* instance of a command;
present: either one *single* command — which is then viewed in its continuance — or a command to be obeyed *continually* or, at least, *repeatedly*;
 hence also *general rules* and *maxims of life*.

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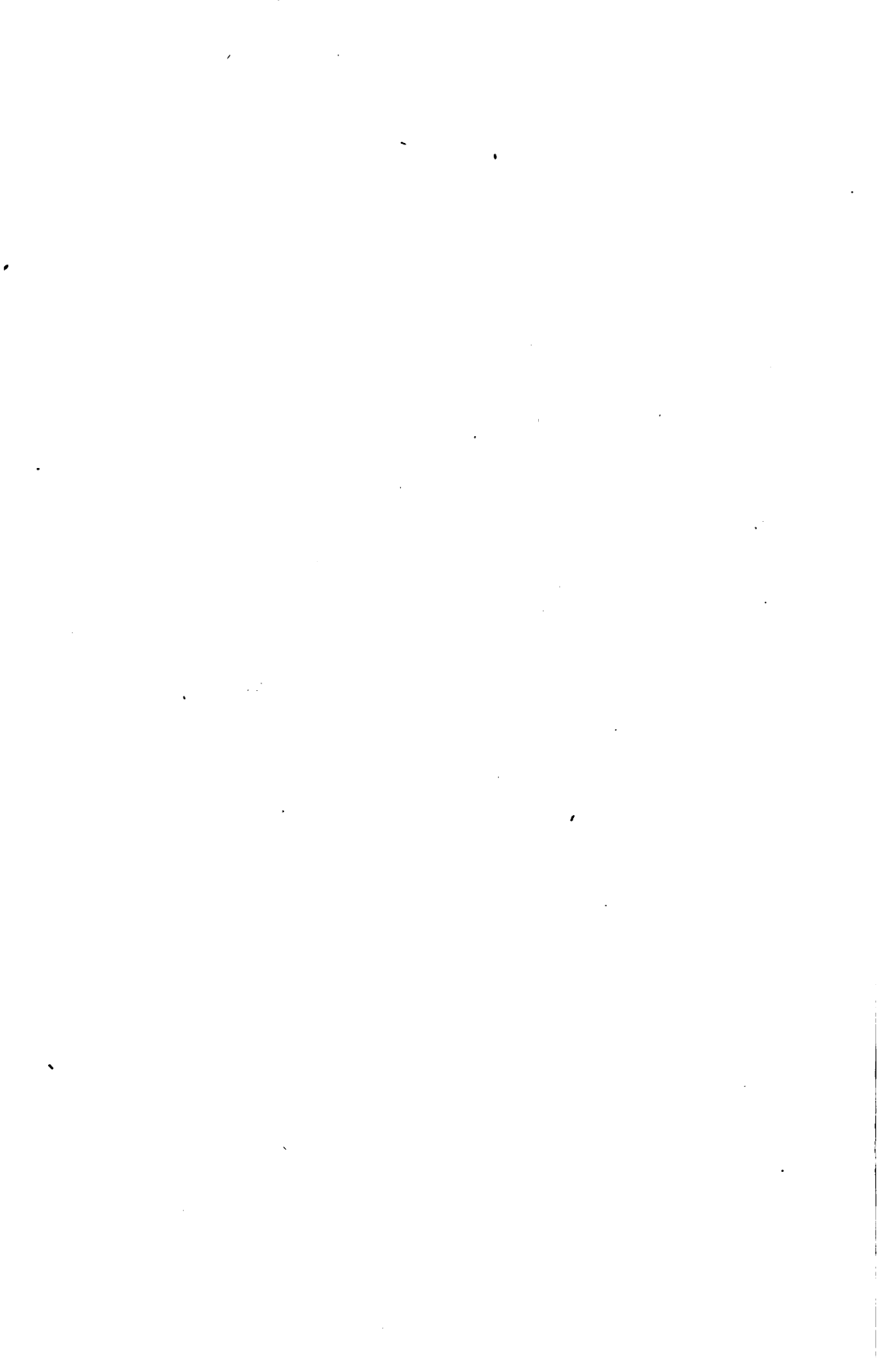
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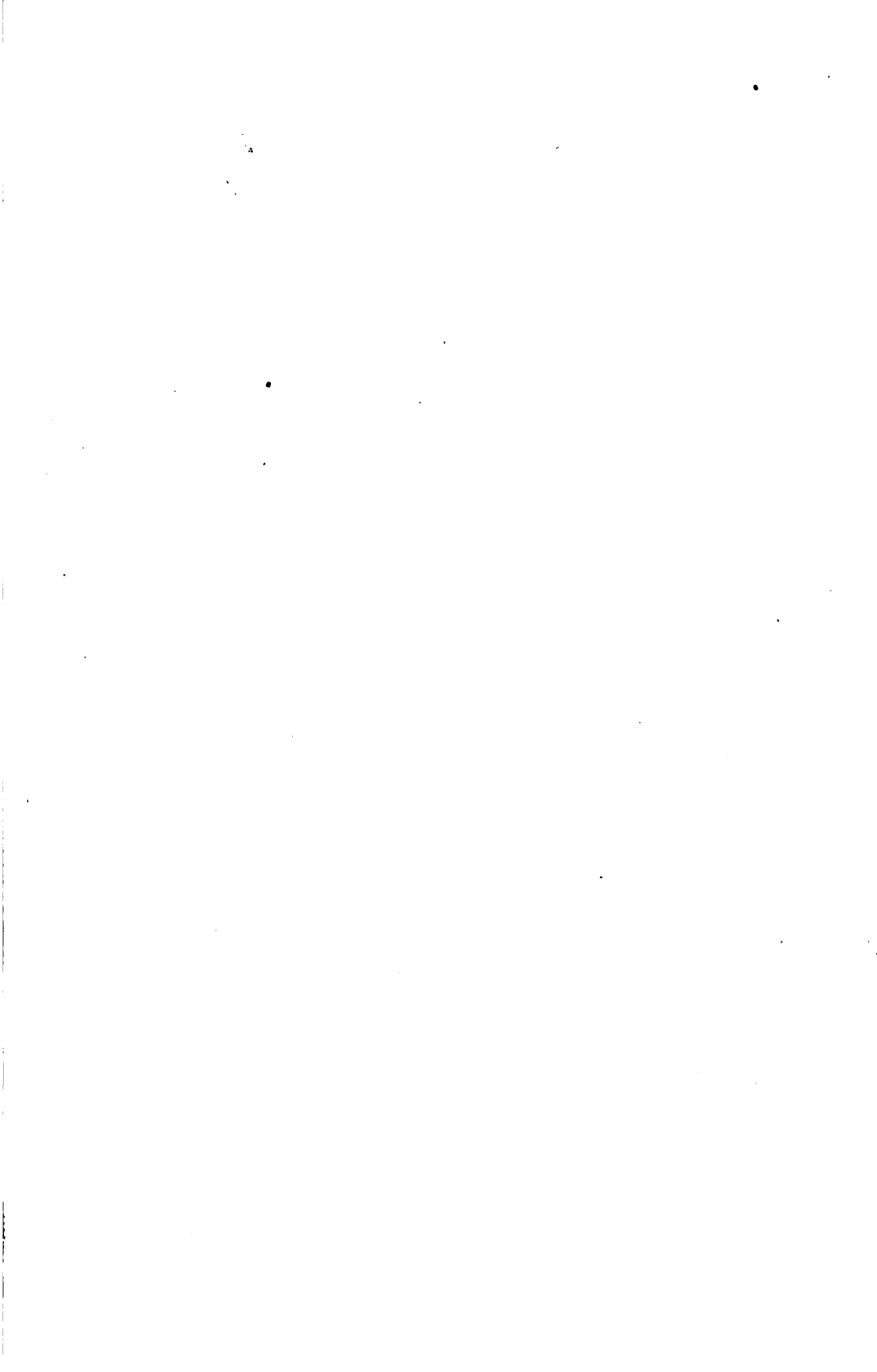
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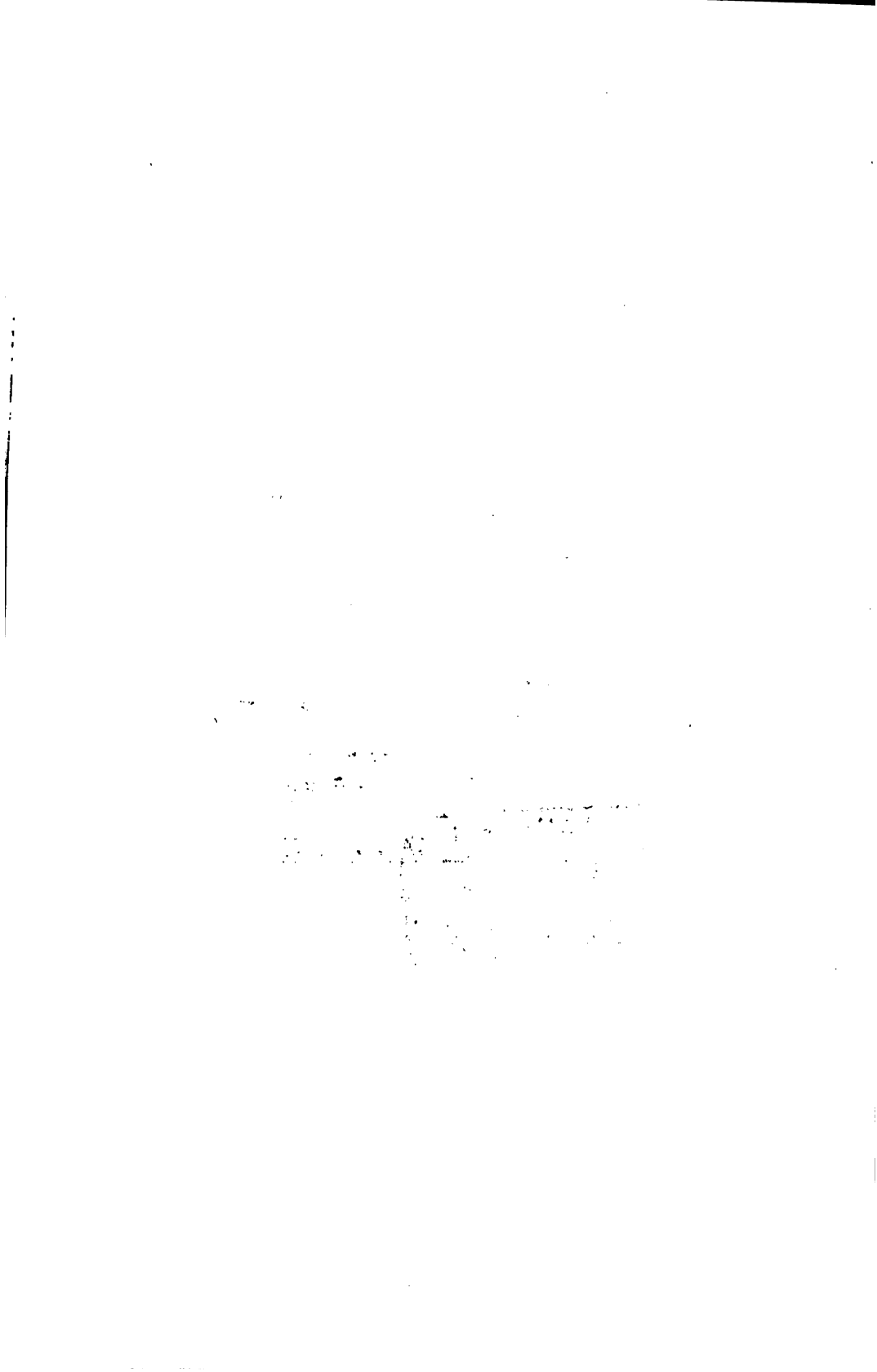
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
