EARLY BLOOD TURNIP BEET.

Beet.

Select a deep, rich, sandy loam, and manure with well decomposed compost. Sow in drills, fourteen to sixteen inches apart, and cover one inch deep. When the young plants appear, thin to four or five inches apart. For early use, sow as soon as the ground can be worked in the spring; for autumn use, about the middle of May; and for winter use, from 10th to 20th June, according to variety; the LONG varieties requiring more time to mature than the ROUND EARLY kinds. The Mangold Wurzles are grown for stock, and as they grow larger require more room. They should be sown in drills two and a half feet apart, and the plants thinned to twelve or fifteen inches in the row. One ounce of seed will sow about one hundred feet of row.

Advance Pea and Fertilizer Drill.




While it is not claimed that the Distributor represented above is of entirely new construction, yet it is sufficiently new to claim for it the name of "Advance."

The distributing disc being of Wrought Iron and galvanized can neither break nor rust, thus entirely obviating the faults of glass and iron.

The agutator is also new, being of steel, in the form of two knife-shaped arms sweeping around under the mass of fertilizer and throwing it upon the revolving disc below. A shut-off has lately been added whereby the waste of fertilizer is stopped when turning at ends of rows. The wheel is of wrought iron, strong but light, reducing the weight from the ordinary cast wheel about eight pounds, an item which the operator will heartily appreciate. As shown in cut, loops are bolted to frame for the purpose of attaching a horse. We cannot too strongly recommend this Drill to pea growers, as being one of the very best tools for sowing peas. 
