Crackdown hits rogues

A CRACKDOWN on rogue traders and bogus callers targeting vulnerable resi-

targeting vulnerable resi-dents across Dudley has led to a 14 per cent fall in reported crimes in the past 12 months. Trading standards offi-cials said they were "reaping the rewards" of a campaign aimed at deterring would-be rogue traders. Police said they will continue to work alongside Dudley Council to continue the progress. Hotspots targeted, includ-ing Halesowen, have been the focus for crime preven-tion teams.

A GANG of thieves stole 112 tons of steel worth £81,000 during a raid that lasted 36 hours at a Kingswinford firm, a court heard. Three of those responsible for the bur-glary have received jail sentences totalling almost 10 years and a metal merchant to whom part of the haul was delivered has been locked up for two years. The crooks struck "within minutes" of Midland Steel Sections, on the Gibbons Industrial Estate, closing for the weekend and then took 36 hours to complete the theft, Wolverhampton Crown Court heard.

It appeared to be an "inside job" with no damage caused during the break in and the burglars knowing where keys were kept, it was said. They ignored less valuable metal and used the company's overhead crane as well as two of its lorries to remove the haul. Mr Darron Whitehead, prosecuting, con-cluded: "It started within minutes of the gates to the targeted premises being closed for the weekend." The two stolen trucks were used to make five trips loaded with the steel during the weekend of March 26 and 27 2011, the court

landlord went into the men's toilets he saw damage to his wall. It has left the pub facing a bill of more than £150 with Mr Etheridge claiming the takings from the machine would be no more than £30. A 38-year-old man has since been arrested and bailed pending enquiries.

A grant of 24,957 collars - £16,509 – has come in from the Rotary International Foundation in America, which normally supports third world humanitarian proj-ects. Further top-ups from district Rotari-

ans and their counterparts in the Cotes des ans and their counterparts in the Cotes des Legendes area of Brittany, France, have helped raise the total for the new safety playground for Pens Meadow School. Dudley Rotary president Graham Dean said: "We believe that this funding of a

Moments before the discovery, the mur-derers had callously told her that her son was "dead at the bottom of the alley" when she made a frantic call to his mobile phone to try to reach him. Surrounded by family and friends, Mrs Watson wept as jurger returned a guilty

Avid Wolves fan Mr Watson, who worked as a debt collector, was popular among the Sedgley community. His parents added: "He always acted as a peacemaker and would actively avoid trouble and do his best to calm situations down."

The victim had become separated from his girlfriend Kelly Handley after they had left Monty's Bar in the High Street. Town took pride in a grand central station by Stuart Williams

Walsall was adorned by a grand railway station. the heart of the town's transport system.

port system. The first railway line through Walsall - the Grand Junction Railway between Birmingham and Warrington - had opened in 1837, with a station at Bescot Bridge. In 1847 South Staffordshire Railway opened a temporary station in Bridgeman Place, linking with the Grand Junction line. The Wichnor Junction line to Dudley opened in 1849, connecting with Walsall. A magnificent new building, designed by Queen Mary's Grammar School 'old boy' Edward Adams, was built for the South Staffordshire Railway in Station

Adams, was ohnt for the South Staffordshire Railway in Station Street that year. The SSR opened the Cannock line in 1858, extending to Rugeley 1859. The London and North Western Railway took over the Cannock line in 1861, widening

Walsall Station to accommodate freight trains. The Wolverhampton Line was opened in 1872 by the Wolverhampton and Walsall Railway. By then the Midland Railway was negotiating for

Railway. By then the Midland Railway was negotiating for running rights to Walsall. Walsall Station was rebuilt in 1883 with a main entrance in Park Street and separate booking offices for the LNWR and Midland Rail-ways. The LNWR owned the station. The old station became used for parcels and administraused for parcels and administra-tion. In March 1916 a fire damaged the booking hall but due to the First World War the station could only be

patched up. The iron and glass canopy forming the Park Street entrance forming the Fark Street entrance was retained when an imposing new circular booking hall and con-course were built after the war. Adorned with Grecian-style pillars, leaded roof windows and oak-pan-elled walls, this beautiful building, opened in 1923 by the LNWR Dis trict Superintenden, Mr. J.F. Brad ford, is well remembered by older

ford, is well remembered by older local people. With the growth of car owner-ship, the station's importance declined. The 'Beeching Axe' in 1965 left passenger trains between Walsall and Birmingham only. Walsall and Birmingham only. Walsall Station was virtually defunct by 1977 when the service went hourly. In 1978 the old station was replaced with the Saddlers Centre, opened in 1980. The station became little more than a glorified halt with a tiny ticket office and concourse. In the late 20th century, however, rail passenger services underwent a national revival, including Walsall Station.

And a £90 million second line from Wednesbury to Dudley is also on a wish list drawn up by transport bosses, who want to split up the long-awaited link between Wednesbury and Brierley Hill. The Wolverhampton Metro loop is second on a list of the priorities drawn up by trans-port authority Centro. The Black Country has £27.6m for trans-port schemes coming from the Government

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

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

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

Tequired to do the talking. Jaguar says the F-Type is its first 'proper' sports car in 52 years, and as the name sug-gests, it has to follow in the footsteps of the E-Type. Massive shoes to fill, of course, but view one alongside the other and you can see lineage, not pastiche. The F-Type nods to its great-grandparent in the cut-off nose and high rear-deck, but it's a thoroughly modern design. It pulls the neat trick of looking sensational in a range of colours and the option of light or dark wheels gives extra scope for tailoring. Looks-wise, it's a solid-gold hit. And it's clever with it, being sculpted out of aluminium just like the bigger XJ saloon. That helps to keep the weight down while remaining as strong as a conventional steel structure, and ups the recyclability too. It's a convertible only, of course, but the wise decision to stick with a fabric roof means a 12-second raising or lowering routine and noun-sightly design compromises. It's a strict two-seater and the boto ismodest but you could the generous weekend's luggage in there


