TRADERS and loyal shop-pers have spoken of their sadness as they bid farewell to a market in Brierley Hill which has closed its gates for the final time. Manager Shane Birch-Bastock has locked the gates for good at Concord Market, which has been a fivture on

which has been a fixture on High Street for more than 40

which has been a fixture on High Street for more than 40 years. Glasses of bubbly and thoughts drifting to the market's heyday made for an emotional send off as the last remaining traders packed up on Saturday. And the final day of trading also brought a plea from managers and stall-holders to customers to use local shops and markets or face losing them forever. Mr Birch-Bastock, who is chairman of Brierley Hill Traders' Association, said: "It is a really sad day to think it is coming to an end. Jez Thorpe and his wife Caireen packed up their Fresh Harvest Fruit and Veg store but are planning to stay in the town, moving into the old Potters Bakery, Mill Street.

into the old Potters Bakery, Mill Street. Mr Thorpe, 47, said: "We still think Brierley Hill is a good town and has a good high street so we wanted to

Manhunt as robber strikes five times

A MANHUNT has been launched for a thief sus-pected of five robberies in Halesowen including the snatching of a handbag from a woman as she walked through a graveyard. Police believe all the rob-beries were committed by the same personfollowing descriptions by the victims. A 50-year-old woman had her handbag snatched as she walked across the church-

walked across the church-yard of St John the Baptist Church, off Halesowen High Street, in the latest attack.

Church, off Halesowen High Street, in the latest attack. Officers said the offender was seen jumping into a black car, possibly a Ford Focus, shortly after the attack at 8.30pm on June 16. They said a similar robbery happened four weeks earlier, in Windsor Road and on 18 May, a man was spotted rummaging through the bags of a car at the car park of Tesco Express, Stourbridge Road. Police are linking those crimes to two robberies on March 2 in Oak Tree Cres-centand Hagley Road West. Victims described the man as black, 5ft 8in to 6ft, stocky and in his early 20s. At least twice he was wearing a grey hoodie with a black shiny jacket over the top. Anyone with information is asked to call police on 101 or Crimestoppers anony-

A COWBOY builder who pocketed £15,000 laying shoddy drives is behind bars - thanks to an eagleeyed reader from Dudley.

Eyed reader from Dudiey. Patrick Dunne tricked five householders into paying for driveways that their cars sank into within days of work being fin-ished. The father-of-11 has now started a 15-month prison sentence. His fraudulent operation was foiled after Walter Poole, a 66-year-old retired coach driver from Dudley, spotted a picture in the *Chronicle's* sister paper, the *Express & Star*, which led to Dunne's arrest. It showed Stacy Handley and was pub-

which led to Dunne's arrest. It showed Stacy Handley and was pub-lished alongside a story about him being jailed for 18 months for pocketing up to £57,000 by laying unsafe drives throughout the Black Country while working for a firm called JJ Callaghan. Mr Poole had been ripped off by the firm almost two years earlier, but had not reported the incident, assuming nothing could be done.

could be done. He had needed a new drive with a smooth surface after a bad fall left him with diffi-culty walking, but wanted to wait until he received compensation for his injuries. After falling victim to Dunne's threaten-ing con he found himself £5,000 out of pocket.

Charming

Charming Mr Poole, of Clarence Road, said: "He became menacing and warned he would dig a hole in the front garden unless I came up with the cash. I had to borrow £2,000 from a friend to get him off my back. He was a real Jekyll and Hyde character – charming one minute and very aggressive the next." When Mr Poole saw the picture and recog-nised Handley, he contacted Trading Stan-dards officials in Dudley, who had worked on the JJ Callaghan case with colleagues from Wolverhampton. Those officials believed Handley had a key accomplice in his scam, but had been unable to identify him. Mr Poole provided CCTV footage with sound, showing Handley and another man from JJ Callaghan, who spoke as though he owned the firm, working at his home. A trading standards officer watched the

A trading standards officer watched the tape days before working on a joint opera-tion with police, which involved stopping

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Patrick Dunne at the police check in Halesowen

Partick Dunne at the police check in Hales and checking vehicles on Cakemore Road, Halesowen. One of the vehicles stopped was a van carrying the livery of a paving firm – not JJ Callaghan. The Trading Standards officer immedi-ately recognised the driver as the man from the CCTV footage. It was Patrick Dunne. The 44-year-old said he was a sub-con-tractor working for many firms but denied running any of them. He was arrested by police in connection with an unrelated offence that was not proceeded with. But after eight victims of his shoddy

But after eight victims of his shoddy drives racket picked him out in a video iden-tity parade, police raided and searched his home in Stafford Road, Coven, on May 9, 2011

2011. Meanwhile, Handley had been released on licence from prison and was being moni-tored by probation officers. He told them he was now working with Dunne in a firm called P and S Paving. The initials stood for Patrick and Stacy, confirming that the pair worked dicealy together. worked closely together.

Coincidently, the same Trading Stan-dards officer who had seen Mr Poole's CCTV footage was again on hand when Dunne y

Walter and Angela Poole - victims of Dunne pulled over in another routine operation stopping vehicles on Cakemore Road, Hale-sowen on November 25, 2011. This time the van was branded P and S Paving, which Dunne said stood for Patrick and Scott, Scott being a relative of his.

Moments after he had driven away, another van was stopped at the same check point. It was being driven by Scott, who con-firmed that P and S actually stood for

Charged As Scott spoke to the Trading Standards officer his mobile phone rang. Dunne was warning him not to drive along that road because vans were being stopped. The official took the call and told him: "You're too late." Dunne was charged last summer and has now admitted 21 offences connected with JJ Callaghan, including being involved in a business that was carried on to defraud cus-tomers between February 1, 2009, and December 10, 2010.

December 10, 2010. He also pleaded guilty to 12 fraud offences and eight of engaging in a misleading com-

mercial practice. He had laid shoddy drives in Dudley, Halesowen and Wolverhampton. Mr Mark Jackson, prosecuting, told Wolverhampton Crown Court that when one disgruntled customer finally found a working phone number for Dunne her com-binering the state of the other method with the state of the state o plaint was greeted with laughter.

planti was greeted with laugnet? She heard Dunne say, 'This stupid person thinks I am going to repair their drive', before he hung up, it was claimed. Mr Jackson said: "He ran a fraudulent business and conned and duped his cus-tomers in almost every aspect of his dealings with thom with them. "He lied about his name, his business address, that works were guaranteed, that his business offered the best in customer care, when payments for work would be requested and what work would be carried out. He failed over and over again to provide customers with information about their right to cancel their contract and the quality of his work was appalling." with them.

was a pre-planned operation and there is no doubt your customers felt threatened and intimidated."

Campus building will look. The new engineering and manufacturing complex is the third stage of the new £30 million Learning Quarter in Dudley. Dudley Advance, in Priory Road, will give students specialised manufacturing skills. Bosses say the £6m centre will support the local and national engineering, technology and manufacturing sectors. College principal Lowell Williams said facilities were crucial to training the next generation of engineers in the Black Country. And new artist impressions of Dudley Advance were released, showing how it will look when it is opened in September 2014. Metal features on the outside of the two other new campus buildings, Dudley Evolve and Dudley Sixth, have been continued on the new building. The cube-like structure has been designed to look like it is encased by machined steel, covered in zinc-type cladding. Designers say this represents the indus-trial heritage of the area and creates an attractive building.

Mr Williams said Dudley Advance was an exciting and distinctive project. He said: "There has been a great deal of interest shown in the development by the Black Country Local Enterprise Partner-ship and the Higher Education Funding Council for England

BLACK COUNTRY born-and-bred Stan Bastock rose from a humble background to become a millionaire not just once, but three times over.

THE head cashier of a solicitors firm who stole £165,000 from the company handed herself in because she was 'overwhelmed' by what she had done, a court heard. Judge John Warner said Pauline Sutcliffe had 'breached the trust' of her bosses and the clients of Stables and Co Solicitors. He jailed her for 14 months last week. The business, which had practices in Rowley Raris, Halseowen and Stourbridge closed in

In the world of the market trader he was the original 'Del Boy'. But unlike the comedy TV character in Only Fools and Horses, Mr Bastock had a life of wealth and

Horses, Mr Bastock had a lite of weath and fame by the age of 30. Owning three thriving markets in Brier-ley Hill and Sedgley – all named after the air-liner Concord – he was tasting the high life. But now, nine years after he died aged 75 in 2004, the market empire he built up has follow aww Only the market in Sedgley, set

The fallen away. Only the market in Sedgley, set up in 1976, remains. The first two markets he launched with his wife Sheila have gone. The 'bottom centre' Concord Market in High Street opened in the early 1960s, but was shut in 2006.

2006. The 'top centre' Concord Market which opened in 1983, a few doors down from the first market, is closing because of a dwin-dling number of traders. "My step-father would have closed the Concord market in Brierley Hill years ago," admits Shane Bastock-Birch, Mr Bastock's stepson, managing director of Pentax Devel-opments. opments.

Decision

The Brierley Hill-based firm, also set up by Mr Bastock, managed the Concord markets as well as 30 offices and commercial properties in the town. "My father was decisive. If he saw some-thing was losing money he would have made the hard decision," says Mr Birch-Bastock. "Although the market was losing money and traders, I found it difficult to nail down the desure heceuse Licens ensure of the

the closure because I know so many of the market holders, many of whom were here from the start." Mr Birch-Bastock said his step-father

quickly spotted a potential for operating a market through his early years of running a

market through ins early years of running a fishmongers with his parents in various markets in the Black Country. After running two shops in Brierley Hill he made the move to open the 'bottom centre' Concord Market in the High Street in the early 1960s, attracting 25 traders immediately.

The town picked up a reputation for market deals and people would travel from across the Midlands. Business thrived and





Mr Bastock was soon buying up more properties in the town including the old Odeon cinema before snapping up his next market, this time in Sedgley in 1976, attracting 27

traders. Six years later, he turned his attention back to Brierley Hill to open a second market, just a few doors down from his first, in the High Street, nick-naming it the 'top centre'. The market started out as outdoor, but following a freezing first winter MT Bastock splashed out £1 million to build an archwar and two front offices traders.

Bastock spiashed out £1 minion to build an archway and two front offices. "The markets were packed, full of noisy stall holders and shoppers looking for a bargain. It was quite an atmosphere to grow up in and I was expected to get involved,"

says Mr Birch-Bastock. "My step-father said says Mr Birch-Bastock. "My step-father said 'you must learn the market trade to grow up' and told me to run by own hardware store - he was right, it was a great start into the business world." But from the 1980s trade began to fall as people's shopping habits began to change with the rise of department stores and supermarkets. Merry Hill shopping centre opened in 1985 and is continually developed. **Batirement**

Mr Bastock passed Pentax Developments on to his stepson, and step-daughters Kim and Julie, as he neared retirement. In 2006, Mr Birch-Bastock oversaw the chorum of the 'ton control'

Stallholder Jez Thorpe, from Fresh Harvest Fruit & Veg accommodate three markets. There was not the demand

Accommodate three markets. There was not the demand." Now, the 'bottom centre' is closing, leaving just the Old Market. Mr Birch-Bastock said the Concord Market in Sedgley was still performing well. He said: "We've only a few spaces in Sedgley. Sedgley has proved to be more suitable for a market in this modern day. Maybe it's down to how much people have to spend or shop-ping centres nearby. All I can say is that Sedgley is doing very well." Looking back over the business's history, Mr Birch-Bastock said: "Of course it saddens me to see the closure of the markets, but I'm also proud of what my family has done."

The city's university is 21 years old but its history goes back much further, as **TOM MASON** finds out

THE University of Wolverhampton has taken a look back at its history over almost 200 years as part of the celebrations that led to it being granted university status 21 years ago.

sity status 21 years ago. Former and current students and lec-tures gathered at the City Campus' state-of-the-art Learning Centre, off Wulfruna Street, to mark the transition from a polytechnic. Since first being established as the Wolverhampton Mechanics and Institute and Library in 1827, the school has gone through hundreds of changes and expan-sions and seen more than 200,000 under-graduates come through its doors.

through nundreas of changes and expan-sions and seen more than 200,000 under-graduates come through its doors. The first big change came at the begin-ning of the 20th century when it took over the running of Dudley Teacher Training College and the Municipal School of Arts and Crafts. It would then evolve into Wolverhamp-ton and Staffordshire Technical College, where it would work closely with local industry to keep itself at the forefront of the latest technologies. On June 17. 1992 it became the Uni-versity of Wolverhampton, shedding of its doors to a more diverse range of subjects. One person who saw it during some of its changes was 84-year-old Sheila Holgate-Wright, the university's oldest surviving graduate, who in 1944, aged 19

surviving graduate, who in 1944, aged 15 arrived at the technical college to study science

science. She needed a job, preferably one in a laboratory, but to get there she decided to study physics, chemistry and mathemat-ics at what was then the technical college. "It's completely changed since I was here, none of these newer buildings

Deaths on road fall to a record low

THE number of people killed on the roads fell to a record low last year. There were 1,754 deaths on British roads in 2012 – an eight per cent dip on the 2011 2012 – an eight per cent dip on the 2011 figure, the Office for National Statistics

THE the remains of the world's last Dornier DO17 bomber have been raised from the bottom of the English Channel and are now at the RAF Museum at Cosford awaiting work.

The museum already had in its possession the aircraft which prob-ably shot it down during the Battle of Britain, or at least a replica of that aircraft, a Wolverhampton-built Boulton Paul Defiant.

On May 26, 1940, at around 11.45 am, No. 264 Squadron, the first Defiant unit, were scrambled from RAF Hornchurch to meet a large German raid approaching London

There were about 40 Heinkel bombers, and a dozen Dorniers,

escorted by about 80 Messer-schmidt Bf.109 fighters. As the Defiants attacked the Dorniers, their gunners opening fire with their powered turrets, the German fighters swooped in to attack. model of a Defiant, it chose to paint it as L7005, the top-scoring Defiant, with 12.5 victories credited to the

attack. Six of the Dorniers were claimed to have been shot down, though no-one knows which Defiant shot down the Dornier discovered in the sand banks off Herne Bay, Kent.



Former ecstasy dealer tells of life in US prison

TO any onlooker it seemed Shaun Attwood had the world at his feet.

Raised in small Cheshire town, he was the first in his family to go to uni-versity and graduated with a business dograe

versity and graduated with a business degree. He took his degree to Phoenix in America at the age of 22 and worked his way up to become a stockbroker and millionaire.

But, unbeknown to his family, when night-time came, he was a regular at the local rave scene where he dealt

the local rave scene where he dealt excstay. In 2002 he was arrested and soon found himself sentenced to nine and a half years in Arizona's toughest prisons where he shared his bed with ockroaches and his cell with some of the crime world's scariest criminals. Recently he was speaking to dozens of senior students at Halesowen's Windsor High School and Sixth Form to warn them against the lifestyle that saw him jailed. Arrestord

Arrested

He said: "The drugs lifestyle is so glamorised on TV and in movies but

glamorised on TV and in movies but they don't show you what happens when people get busted. "There's a reason you don't see any older drug users around: they're either dead or they're in prison." After Mr Attwood got arrested , he spent 26 months on remand at the notorious Maricopa County Jail in the desert near Phoenix. He soon realised how fragile life was and how much control the gangs had over the prison.

and now much control the gauge had over the prison. While in jail, Mr Attwood, now aged 44, started a blog called Jon's Jail Journal, which he wrote and secretly passed to his aunt during her weekly passe visits.

She would then type it up and post it,



enabling him to shine a light on the conditions faced by prisoners. He said: "I spent my day writing and it was like a bridge to the outside world." In time fellow prisoners came to him to tell their stories. After soring almost six years of his

After serving almost six years of his sentence, he was released in 2007 and

spent a year living with his parents and learning to live life in the outside world again, unable to get a job because of his past. He is banned from America and

many other countries and has to live with the knowledge that he caused his parents so much pain, with his mother, a teacher, having a nervous breakdown while he was in prison. Now he does more than 100 talks a

year warning youngsters about the side to drugs that movies don't show them

them. He said: "I take responsibility for breaking the laws. The least I can do is make amends sharing my story."



t's half a century since they first struck, but the names Ian Brady and Myra Hindley still send a shiver down the spine.

Perhaps they always will. After all, their crimes shook the nation, and reading about them now, all these decades later, is still chilling. Brady and Hindley were lovers when they carried out the notorio

Moors Murders between July 1963 and October 1965, during which tir they killed five children ranging in age from 10 to 17; at least four of their victims were also sexually assaulted.

The murders were described to be The murders were described to a result of a "concatenation of circumstance" by Malcolm MacCultoch, professor of forensic psychiatry at Cardiff University, wh described the killers as 'a young woman with a tough personality, taught to hand out and receive violence from an early age" and a "sexually sadistic psychopath".





FUEL prices and taxes make economy the driving force for a majority of today's motorists, and the race is on among car makers to win friends by

makers to win friends by cutting running costs. Now Honda has taken a lead with a new engine which is so thrifty it even puts hybrids in the shade. It has a healthy 118bhp of power yet it is capable of averaging almost 80mpg with a CO2 emissions level below the magic 100g/km, which means zero road tax and a much-reduced bill for company car drivers. drivers. The new 1.6 litre turbo diesel is

The new 1.6 litre turbo diesel is currently only available in the Civic, but it will be an option in the CR-V 4x4 by the end of the year. It has already won the 'green' award at this year's Tow Car of the Year awards and was officially rated as the most fuel efficient model in the competition. The British-built Civic, with prices from £19,400, is also giving Honda a welcome boost in the highly competitive fleet car market. The Civic will be familiar to most with its angular (and still futuristic)

shape as a five-seater family hatch-back. The existing diesel in the range is a 2.2 turbo, much acclaimed for its performance – it was origi-nally designed by the same man responsible for Honda's F1 engines. The new 1.6 i-DTEC can't quite achieve its bigger brother's sheer grunt, but with 118bhp on tap it still does the 0 to 62mph dash in just over ten seconds.

An d it does win hands down in economy terms – 78.5mpg average and over 85mpg on a longer run – and that tax-busting 94g/km of CO2

Refinement

Like its bigger brother, the 1.6's performance is marked out by its refinement: it is vibration-free even

retinement: it is vibration-free even from cold and is barely audible even at higher cruising speeds. This is partly due to the impres-sive build quality but also because the engine just never seems to work very hard. Like most diesels it runs very hard. Like most diesels it runs out of steam at around 4,000rpm but all of its impressive 300Nm of torque is available from just 2,000rpm. In other words, you get all that pulling power and performance with very little fuss, even though six well-spaced gear ratios mean you

can push a bit more enthusiastically if you want it. The Civic's ride is smooth, adding to the feeling of refinement, with a suspension system which soaks up B-road bumps while preventing roll


B-road bumps while preventing roll or wallow through quicker corners. Aerodynamic tweaks to the latest Civic range, principally designed to aid fuel economy, and new door seals have also reduced wind noise. There are four different trim levels all coming with LED daytime running lights, alloy wheels, stop-start, air-conditioning and an MP3 compatible stereo fitted as stan-dard. The latest Civic retains the hi-tech, futuristic interior but with


