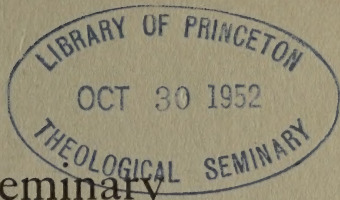

MATRICULATION

Entering students who have presented satisfactory credentials are matriculated by subscribing to the following declaration required by the Plan of the Seminary:

“Deeply impressed with a sense of the importance of improving in knowledge, prudence and piety, in my preparation for the Gospel ministry, I solemnly promise, in a reliance on divine grace, that I will faithfully and diligently attend on all the instructions of this Seminary, and that I will conscientiously and diligently observe all the rules and regulations specified in the Plan for its instruction and government, so far as the same relates to the students; and that I will obey all the lawful requisitions, and readily yield to all the wholesome admonitions of the Professors and Trustees of the Seminary while I shall continue a member of it.”

RULES OF ATTENDANCE

The attention of students is called to their pledge taken at matriculation: “I solemnly promise, in reliance on divine grace, that I will faithfully and diligently attend on all the instructions of this Seminary.”

This pledge obligates students to regular attendance upon all the exercises of this Seminary.

Should a student for any reason be absent from a course 15% or more of the classroom periods he shall not be permitted to continue the course, or to take the final examination, except by permission of the Faculty. If a student has cut more than 15% he must petition the Faculty for reinstatement in the class by writing a letter to the Dean, who is Secretary of the Faculty.

This rule does not apply to students who attained a first group average during the preceding three terms.

Absences immediately preceding or following a vacation period are counted as double.

The rules governing attendance are the same for elective courses as for other courses.

EXAMINATIONS

Examinations for those conditioned in or absent from the regular examinations are held on the second Saturday of the succeeding term.

In the case of courses which are prerequisite for those which are given in the subsequent term the examinations shall be held some time during the first two weeks of the new term, the student meantime being enrolled provisionally until he has satisfactorily completed the requirements for the prerequisite course.

Students desiring to have an examination postponed, should present a written request to the Dean, indicating the reasons for postponement.

GRADING SYSTEM

The group-standing in a course is indicated as follows: 1—excellent; 2—good; 3—average; 4—passing; 5—conditioned, whether because of failure or an unexcused absence from the final examination; 6—failed.

The group-standing for the term is obtained by multiplying the hours per week by its group number, in the case of each subject, and dividing the sum of the products by the sum of the hours per week.

The limit for the First Group is 1.50; Second Group 2.30; Third Group 3.30; Fourth Group 4.30.

INCOMPLETE COURSES

Any student whose work is incomplete in any course at the time of the final examination in that course shall receive the grade of 5. A student is permitted to petition the Faculty for an extension of time for the writing of a required paper, but the grade in the course will be 5 unless special action is taken. Such a petition should be presented to the Dean. If a student having been marked 5 in this manner should complete the work for the course within two weeks after the following term begins, he shall receive the grade of 4.

A student is not permitted to drop a course after mid-term without permission of the Faculty.

FELLOWSHIPS

Regulations governing the granting of Fellowships and Prizes are stated in the catalogue. A student receives three hours credit for a Fellowship thesis.

TRANSCRIPTS

A student or alumnus may request that a transcript of his record be sent to a given address. There is no fee for the first transcript but a charge of one dollar is made for additional transcripts.

ADVISERS

The members of the Faculty desire to make the acquaintance of new students and to be of help to them in every way possible. A Faculty Adviser, therefore, will be assigned to each new student. A student should, of course, feel perfectly free to consult with any other member of the Faculty at any time.

AUTOMOBILES

Students who own cars have the privilege of parking them on the special parking spaces provided for the purpose. On no account must cars be parked on campus roads. After due notice has been given regarding the date upon which this regulation goes into force each year, appropriate measures will be taken to ensure its observance.

CHAPEL

Members of the Seminary family meet for corporate worship in Miller Chapel on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings from 9:00 to 9:20 o'clock. The service is led by Professors, Seniors and Graduate Students, and from time to time by special guests.

FIELD WORK

Field Work is Christian service with churches or other organizations and is the laboratory or clinical work of the Seminary course. Students are urged not to undertake outside duties during the first term of the Seminary course, with the exception of singing in the Seminary Choir or service with one of the Gospel Teams. It is necessary to know a student's qualifications and academic standing before the field work undertaken may be properly correlated with the Seminary course. If a student must assume a pastorate during his Junior or Middle year he is required to take four years for the Seminary course.

Four points of supervised field work credit are required for graduation. This means work during four terms of the Seminary course. Two points are given for full-time summer service under the Board of National Missions, or work supervised and reported in a similar way. A year of Internship with such supervision may count for the full four points required.

The objects of Field Work are first of all service to the church and the kingdom of Christ; secondly, experience in Christian service and education through learning by doing, and in the third place financial help as it may be needed. At the time of matriculation each student should fill out a blank which will be a permanent record of field service. Students should enter their field work on this blank each term. The Field Department also has charge of the Church Participation which is required of students who receive service loans through the Board of Christian Education.

THE LIBRARY

The library now contains 233,140 books and periodicals. It is one of the outstanding libraries of the world for the purpose of theological study.

Hours. The library buildings are open Monday through

Friday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. and from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m.; and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The *Reserve Library*, in the Gothic building across Mercer Street from Alexander Hall, was erected in 1843 as a gift of Mr. James Lenox. It contains the books placed on reserve for the courses of the Seminary (in the alcove to the right of the entrance), a select collection of the best commentaries and of a few important reference books (in the alcove to the left of the entrance) and the bound and unbound periodicals. In this building are also shelved the following classes of books of the circulating collection: philosophy, psychology, anthropology, economics, sociology, political science, education, art, science, languages and literature. The catalogue in this building is an author list for books in the Reserve Library building. For a complete record of the books in both library buildings it is necessary to go to the Circulating Library.

The *Circulating Library*, in the red brick structure beyond the Reserve Library, is the main building of the library. Here are the card catalogue listing all the books in both buildings, the large reference collection, and the greatest part of the book collections of the Seminary. In this building the student will find most of the books needed for classes with the exception of the reserve books. The card catalogue and the reference collection will answer most of the students' questions, and the trained library staff and the librarian will be glad to give assistance in the use of the library.

The classification of the library for nonreligious books is being changed to that of the Library of Congress. For theological books the library retains a simple classification which is easy for students to use. The classification schedules for religious literature may be consulted at the library desks.

There is also a Reading Room in the Education Building.

BORROWING BOOKS

Books may be borrowed by filling in the borrower slip and by presenting the slip and the book at the desk for checking.

Most books circulate for a period of two weeks, and may be renewed for two additional periods if there are no other requests for the book. Bound periodicals may be borrowed for two weeks and may not be renewed. Unbound periodicals (with the exception of the latest issue) may be borrowed for only one week, and may not be renewed. Books on the reserve shelf may be borrowed when the library closes and are to be returned when the building reopens.

FINES

Fines are charged at the rate of two cents a day for overdue books from the general collection. Reserve books, due at 9:00 a.m., are charged for at the rate of twenty-five cents for the first two-hour period overdue and fifteen cents for each additional two-hour period.

Students are invited to help in protecting the books from being defaced and from becoming marred by writing and underlining.

THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

Students of the Seminary have the free use of the Library of Princeton University after signing a registration card at the circulation desk. Students may fill out a call slip for the book desired and ask an attendant to send a page for it or they may go directly to the stacks for it. The time limit and other information may be found in the *Handbook of the Princeton University Library*, which can be obtained at the Circulation Desk.

MAIL

All mail will be delivered to the Treasurer's Office until the temporary directory is complete. Be sure to have mail addressed to room number, in care of Princeton Seminary. This is important, particularly in the case of Brown Hall, as there is also a Brown Hall in Princeton University.

MEDICAL CARE

By arrangement with Princeton University our men students have the same medical care as University students. In case of illness report immediately to the University Infirmary, or if unable to leave your room, ask a friend to notify the Treasurer's office and transportation will be provided. Dispensary hours are posted on Seminary bulletin boards.

Women students, if taken ill, should call Dr. W. G. Rainey, 34 Bayard Lane; Telephone 1335.

All students should notify the office of the President or the Dean in the case of illness.

The physicians at the Infirmary will give advice in reference to dentists, oculists, etc., when requested.

ROOMS AND MEALS

A student whose bedding has not arrived in time to be used the first night or two may borrow a set at the Treasurer's Office for twenty-five cents plus a deposit of \$5.00. Such borrowed bedding must be returned to the same office not later than October 10th, when the deposit will be refunded.

The first regular meal for all students will be served in the dining-room of the Campus Center on Monday, September 29, at 6:15 p.m.

The drawing for the choice of rooms will take place on Monday, September 29th, at 3:00 p.m., in Room 5, Stuart Hall. Before the drawing students may inspect the vacant rooms. A list of these vacant rooms will be posted on the bulletin board of each dormitory on Monday morning.

SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

Applications for scholarships by students whose personal financial resources are insufficient for Seminary expenses should be filed in the Treasurer's Office not later than Saturday, October 3rd. Notice will be posted soon thereafter regarding personal interviews. Even though aid has been promised, application should be made. Presbyterians (U.S.A.) should apply to the Board of Christian Education *before applying to the Seminary*. If the loan from the Board is insufficient, application may be made to the Seminary for a supplementary grant.

KOINONIA

Koinonia is a society composed of students who are working towards the degree of Doctor of Theology. Meetings are held from time to time during the academic year, at which diverse themes of theological interest are discussed.

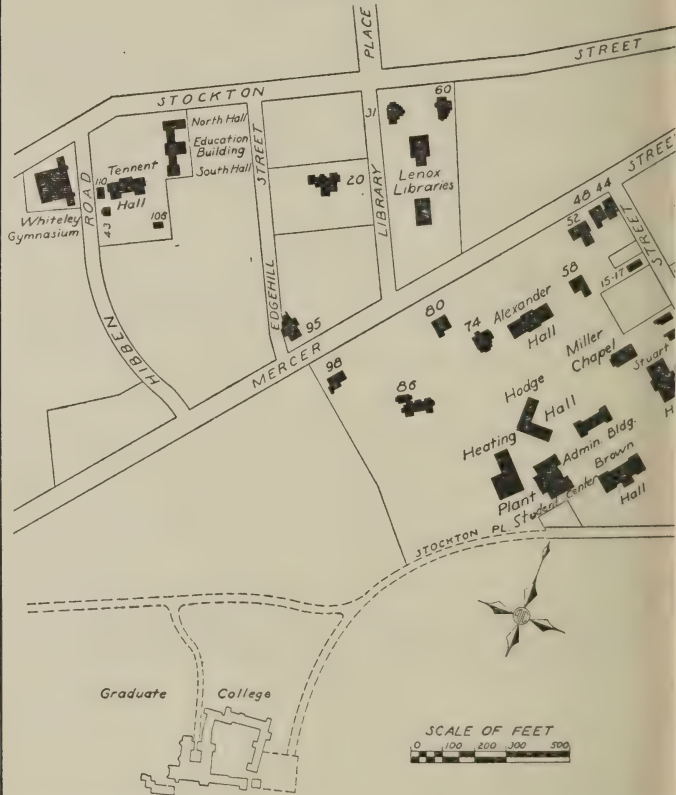
SEMINARY CHOIR

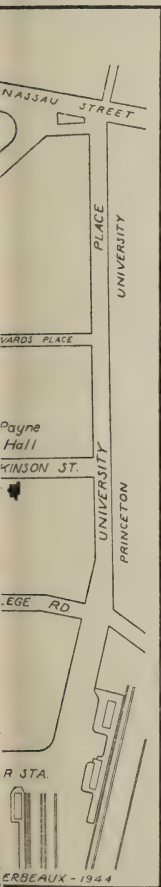

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CONSTITUTION
of the
STUDENT ASSOCIATION OF
PRINCETON SEMINARY

Adopted October 31, 1940

Revised March 30, 1949

ARTICLE I

NAME—The name of this society is "The Student Association" of Princeton Theological Seminary.

ARTICLE II

OBJECTS—

1. To develop the spiritual, intellectual, physical and social life of the students of the Seminary through a unified program of campus activities.
2. To promote mutual acquaintance and Christian fellowship among the students in the highest and best interests of the entire student body.
3. To deepen harmonious relations with the Faculty and Administration by means of cooperation in the Seminary program and the proper presentation of student problems and opinions to Seminary authorities.
4. To provide opportunities for the practical expression of the Christian religion in social service in Princeton and vicinity.
5. To foster sympathetic understanding between the student bodies of the Seminary and Princeton University.
6. To bind the Student Association more closely to the work of student Christian movements in this country and around the world.
7. To stimulate interest in and support of the missionary and ecumenical aspects of the Church of Christ.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP—Every regularly enrolled student shall be considered a member of the Association.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS—The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer.

ARTICLE V

COUNCIL—The executive functions of the Association shall be vested in a Student Council which shall consist of:
The duly elected officers of the Association;
The President of each class and of the graduate students;
A representative of each dormitory and of the off-campus students;
The Chairmen of the standing committees; and
The Chairmen of the Interest Groups.
The President of the Association shall be President of the Council.

ARTICLE VI

COMMITTEES—

I. There shall be the following committees:

Athletic Committee—The committee shall have general oversight of all the athletic activities of the Seminary.

Interseminary Committee—This committee shall represent the Seminary in the Interseminary Movement, and represent the Interseminary Movement to the student body. The Chairman of this committee shall be designated as the official Interseminary representative.

Publicity Committee—This committee shall provide information concerning coming events of campus life.

Religious Activities Committee—This committee shall arrange for and promote religious activities of the student body.

- Social Committee*—This committee shall promote the social interests and activities of the Seminary.
2. The Chairman of these committees shall be selected by the President, it being understood that at least two shall not be seniors during the year in which they serve.
 3. Each committee shall consist of as many members as are deemed necessary, to be appointed from the student body by the Chairman in consultation with the President. A faculty member may be invited to act as an advisory member of a committee.
 4. The President of the Association is empowered to appoint a temporary committee when such action appears expedient to the Council.

ARTICLE VII

INTERESTS GROUPS—

1. There shall be the following Interests Groups:
 - Evangelistic Fellowship*—This Interest Group shall have as its objective the sending out of Gospel Teams in evangelistic work to churches, Christian conferences, rescue missions, and similar organizations.
 - Missions Prayer Fellowship*—This Interest Group shall consist of students who meet weekly to pray for the outreach of the Church; and, through retreats, special meetings, and visiting speakers, to examine together the challenge of various fields of missionary service.
 - Social Education and Action*—This Interest Group shall consist of students who meet to study and consider contemporary social problems in their relation to the Church and to the Christian Gospel, and to seek to arouse and direct social concern on the Seminary campus.
 - Theological Society*—This Interest Group shall seek to promote a theological understanding of the Christian faith among the students by forums, panels, de-

bates and discussions, mainly through the efforts and contributions of its own members.

ARTICLE VIII

THE PRINCETON SEMINARIAN

1. THE PRINCETON SEMINARIAN shall be the student journal of Princeton Theological Seminary, published monthly from October through May except January of each academic year by the Student Council of the Seminary.

2. The Editorial Board, consisting of three persons chosen by the President of the Student Council from the membership of the Council, shall supervise THE SEMINARIAN, subject to: a) such conditions as may be laid down by the Student Council; b) the immediate oversight of the President of the Council.

3. The Editor for each academic year shall be appointed in March of the preceding year as follows: a) The Editorial Board shall announce its intention of receiving from any member of the Junior or Middler classes a written statement of his candidacy together with a list of his qualifications. This announcement shall be made public at least one (1) week previous to the nomination by the Board. b) When it shall have received and studied all applications, the Board shall interview separately each candidate. c) The decision of the Board shall be unanimous. d) The Board shall present its nomination to the Student Council at its next meeting for confirmation.

4. The newly appointed Editor shall assume his duties immediately following the publication of the May issue of THE SEMINARIAN.

ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS AND REVISION—

Amendments to this Constitution, or its revision, shall be proposed through the Student Council, either upon majority vote of the Council, or by signed petition to the Council of fifty members of the Association or one-sixth of the members of the Association, whichever number shall be smaller. Amendments so proposed by petition shall be presented to the Association for action as soon as possible.

Proposed amendments shall be posted in a conspicuous place at least one week before balloting. Under the auspices of the Student Council there shall be a public meeting for discussion of proposed amendments two days before the day of balloting.

Ratification of proposed amendments shall require two-thirds of the secret ballots polled during a specified day of balloting.

ARTICLE X

ADOPTION OF THE CONSTITUTION—

This Constitution shall be considered in force when adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members present at a regularly called meeting of the Student Association.

BY-LAWS

I. *Rules*

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order (Revised) shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws or the special rules of order of this organization.

II. *Meetings*

1. There shall be at least two general meetings of the Association during the year: the annual fall meeting the first

Thursday in October, at which the organization and the purposes of the Association shall be explained, and the annual spring meeting the second Thursday in March, at which the election of officers shall take place.

2. A special meeting of the Association shall be called by the President at his discretion, or upon the request of a majority of the Student Council, or upon petition by one-fourth of the student body. One week's notice of such a meeting must be given.

3. A quorum for all meetings convened in accordance with paragraphs one and two of this Article shall be one-fourth of the members of the Association.

4. The Student Council shall hold regular meetings on a specified day during the week preceding the monthly meetings of the Faculty, and special meetings at the discretion of the President or at the request of the Council. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the members of the Council.

5. Class meetings shall be called at the discretion of the Class President, or upon a petition by one-fourth of the members of the class. The President shall give at least one day's notice to the class members and a quorum shall consist of one-half of the members of the class.

III. *Elections*

1. The officers of the Association shall be elected during the week of the annual spring meeting of the student body in accordance with the following procedure:

- a. The Student Council, at a meeting at least three days before the date of the annual spring meeting, shall nominate two men for each of the offices of President, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- b. The nominations of the Council shall be made public one day previous to the date of the annual spring meeting.
- c. Further nominations for President, Secretary, and Treasurer may be made from the floor at the annual spring meeting.

- d. The voting shall be by secret ballot at a designated poll, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary for election. Should the first ballot fail to produce a majority vote, a second ballot shall be taken on the two highest candidates.
 - e. The candidate receiving the second highest vote on the last ballot for the office of President shall be named Vice-President of the Association.
2. a. The Senior, Middler, and Junior Classes shall elect a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. The Graduate Students shall elect a president.
 - b. Class officers of the succeeding Senior and Middler Classes shall be elected at class meetings called by the President of the respective classes as soon after the spring meeting of the Association as is considered expedient.
 - c. Class officers of the Junior Class and the President of the Graduate Students shall be elected at meetings called by the President of the Association during the third week of the school year.
 - d. Nominations for class officers shall be made from the floor. The voting shall be by ballot, and a majority of those present shall be necessary for election. Should the first ballot fail to produce a majority vote, a second ballot shall be taken on the two highest candidates.

IV. *Duties of the Officers*

The duties of the officers of the Association shall be those ordinarily associated with the several offices.

V. *Duties of the Council*

It shall be the duty of the Council:

1. To serve as the executive body promoting the objects of the Association.
2. To transact any business referred to it by the student body.

3. To mediate, as the proper channel of student expression, between the student body and the Faculty-Administration.
4. To prepare the docket for Association meetings.
5. To serve as a committee on nominations for Association officers.
6. To present an annual report of its program to the student body and the Faculty.

VI. *Dues*

The Student Association Dues shall be four dollars (\$4.00) per year to be pro-rated and collected by the Seminary Treasurer's Office.

VII. *Records*

All business procedure of more than temporary value shall be so included in the Secretary's records that they shall be a permanent possession of the Association. These, in addition to the Treasurer's books, shall be deposited in the Office of the Seminary Treasurer during the summer vacation period. All books of records, when filled, shall be deposited in the Library.

VIII. *Amendments and Revision*

Amendments to the By-Laws, or its revision, shall be made in accordance with Article VIII of the Constitution.
