### PREFACE.

After a good deal of toil and labor we now present the Public with a Business Directory of our two cities—Pittsburgh and Allegheny, and all the boroughs and towns immediately around them; also, McKeesport and Elizabethtown, two towns lying a short distance up the Monongahela river, which, by their industry and enterprise, are becoming very important aids to our general business and prosperity. Our arrangement of the work we hope will prove satisfactory and afford at once a clear and brief view of each branch of trade and business, and all the various classes of society under

their proper head.

Pittsburgh, it will be seen, has grown from a small frontier military post to a very important city of the second class in the United States. Since our early removal to it in 1801-2, when it was familiarly known in the East, and called "the Backwoods, or Fort Pitt." It has gradually improved and advanced from being a frontier town, fortified and garrisoned by the French, British and American governments to protect the people from the savage butcheries of the Indians, to a great and central, manufacturing and commercial city, having business almost literally with all the world; and we, in the course of the work (which we have considerably enlarged over our original calculation) will strive to give a clear, practical view of our various branches of trade and commerce and the vast amount of our manufactures and business generally. historian of Pittsburgh and neighborhood, we give a view of the very large steam boat business of Elizabethtown, for in that town and Freedom a very large number of all the steam boats that have been run on the western rivers were built; they are thence brought to our city, and our steam engine manufacturers and other mechanics finish them complete, and prepare them for their final destination and business on the Ohio, Mississippi, and Missouri rivers and their numerous tributa-The lumber trade of the Allegheny river is also a very important branch of our business, and extending far up into the great flourishing state of New York, and with the iron trade and general business up the Allegheny to Franklin, and up French creek to Meadville, &c. make the trade of the Allegheny very important to our city.

The coal trade of Pittsburgh has become very important, and is rapidly improving, and now our neighboring town of McKeesport has become, as will be seen on reference a very successful contributor to this' important trade. The land and hills around our city and along the Monongahela, abound with the very best and richest veins of coal, and we are now able to supply our cities and neighborhood, and our numerous manufactories and steamboats, and to furnish most of the towns and cities from Pittsburgh to Cincinnati, Louisville and New Orleans, with whom and also with St. Louis, and Nashville, and all the intermediate towns we are in daily and constant intercourse by the wonderful facilities afforded by our rivers and steam boats; and taking into view the additional facilities afforded by our canal and railroad, and being placed at the head of the "La Belle Riviere,"-the beautiful Ohio, and at the western end of the Pennsylvania canal and railroad, by which we are in daily intercourse with our great eastern cities, Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore, through which channels we send large quantities of tobacco, hemp, cotton, wool, feathers, bacon, pork, furs and skins, and the rich and wonderful productions of the west and western states, towns and cities, which arriving at our wharf, then pass through our city on drays to the canal boats; thence. by the canal and railroad, they are speedily transported over the mountains to the eastern cities, where they meet a ready market, and are often shipped to European cities; to Russia and China, and distant parts of the globe; and the canal boats return generally fully laden with the tea and silk of China; the rich manufactures of Russia, France, England and Ireland or Scotland or the Isles of the Sea; and the domestic manufactures of New England and the eastern cities, to Pittsburgh, whence they are again taken from the canal boats on drays to our warehouses or steam boats, and sent at very low freights and charges, and with little or no delays, to all the western towns and cities, and into all the regions of the west and south:

The important Monongahela improvements open an active steam boat navigation to the important National Turnpike Road at Brownsville, where a great many western productions and Pittsburgh manufactures are taken from our city and reloaded to Uniontown, Cumberland, Washington city, Baltimore, &c. and return laden with groceries and foreign and domestic goods.

Also, by this river, a good deal of window glass and glassware, iron and nails, flour, and all kinds of country produce is brought down, and goods and Pittsburgh manufactures sent back in boats to McKeesport, Elizabethtown, Monongahela city, Brownsville, New Geneva, Morgantown and Clarksburgh, &c. The city of Pittsburgh contributes not only to the commercial and manufacturing greatness of our country, but now promises to bring her productive and unwearying industry to the glory and defence of our Republic—for the iron steam ships that have been, and are now building here for the navy by our enterprising citizens, may hover like guardian angels around our shores in times of danger, or under the reign of peace protect our commerce in the more distant seas; or in time of war, carry the glory of our country in thunder round the world.

Having considerably enlarged our work over our original plan, we give in their proper place all our United States and State Head of Departments; our several courts, judges; attornies at law, and public officers; the police of our cities, aldermen, and all the magistrates of our county and several townships; our Moral and Literary Societies; our Theological

Seminaries, Colleges and Public Schools.

It is with extreme pleasure that we survey the religious and moral condition of our cities and neighborhood, for there are few cities in the world that possess the same opportunities of obtaining a good moral and religious education. We furnish lists and chapters with the names of all our churches, denominations, clergymen, and Sabbath schools, Bible and Missionary, the Ladies' and Gentlemen's, and Benevolent Societies, &c. Finally, this is our fourth volume or Directory of our two cities and neighborhood, and gentlemen who are in possession of, or can refer to our last or two first volumes with the present, can acquire a vast deal of useful information, their rise and progress, and also of many towns and cities in the west, connected with us by the ties of trade and business. and we close with our best wishes and respects to our friends and patrons, and the public generally. We hope this work will prove very useful to many who wish to send useful information about our city and our business generally, to all parts of the United States, and to their friends in Europe, for we rejoice to live in a city and neighborhood where, within a circle of about fifteen miles we have, as will be seen in this work, upwards of 100 churches, 100 Sabbath schools, 125 clergymen; and 100 attornies at law, with a large, moral, industrious, and very useful class of cit zens.

#### TO THE READER.

We present to the citizens of Pittsburgh, Allegheny, and the towns around, and public generally, a brief Business Directory of the various merchants, manufacturers, mechanics, branches of trade and business in the two cities; we also give our banks and insurance offices, United States, State and city officers, our courts, judges, attornies at law and magistrates; our several literary, moral, religious, and benevolent societies; colleges, schools, churches, ministers, Sabbath schools, &c. &c. &c.

Then succeeds the city of Allegheny and neighborhood, in which we have strove to be more particular than in our last; we then give Manchester, Stewartstown, Sharpsburgh, Lawrenceville and the United States Arsenal, East Liberty, Wilkinsburgh, Oakland, Minersville, Temperanceville, Birmingham and the west side of the Monongahela river, Herriotsville, Noblestown, McKeesport, and Elizabethtown, and a brief notice of Freedom, Economy, Beaver, Fallston, New

Brighton, &c.

The Arsenal has been much improved within the last few years, by the erection of New Storehouses, the introduction of improved machinery; and, by the means of a little Gas-works, the interior or square of the establishment is beautifully lighted up at night.

### ELIZABETHTOWN.

Elizabethtown, on the slackwater, Monongahela river, 14 miles by land from Pittsburgh, having long since become justly celebrated for building steam boats and other river craft, it is deemed unnecessary to give a minute description of this flourishing borough, its location, resources to the river men from the city of Pittsburgh to the Gulf of Mexico (mouth of the Mississippi) including its many tributaries as far as navigable for steam boats, can well avouch. In 1797 the shipbuilding was commenced at this place. From that time up to 1826, a considerable trade was done in building barges, keel boats, and other craft. From the latter period to the present time, it is presumed Elizabeth has built a larger number of valuable steam vessels than any other place in the U.S. according to its population.

The annexed data will ena'le persons unacquainted with

the facts to judge.

### M'KEESPORT.

The Borough of McKeesport is situated at the confluence of the Youghiogheny and Monengahela rivers, about 12 miles above Pittsburgh; there the former river falls at right angles into the latter, and forms on the eastern side a beautiful bottom, on which the town is built. It is surrounded on all sides by bold and lofty hills, which are the repository of its wealth. The coal trade of this place has become of immense import-

ance to the trade and manufactures of Pittsburgh and the Mississippi Valley. There is exported by our industrious citizens, above two millions of bushels annually. In consequence of the great number of miners and boatmen engaged in this trade, there is a great consumption of goods and produce, to supply which our merchants bring their goods direct from New York, Philadelphia and New Orleans. There are tew places that offer equal facilities for manufacturing, owing to the location, proximity of the materials and means of transportation. The safe and fast running steam hoat Etna, Capt. Hendrickson, built here and manned by the enterprising and obliging owners, plies daily to Pittsburgh, leaving in the morning and returning in the afternoon. There are here 3 churches, 2 Sabbath Schools and a temperance society, numbering about 500 members.

### ECONOMY, BEAVER COUNTY

A post town, settled by Germans, called the Harmonie Society, 18 miles from Pittsburgh, on the Ohio river in Beaver county, containing near 1000 brick and frame houses, is laid out at right angles on a beautiful plain 80 feet above low water mark. Their tract of land, near 3000 acres, one half cleared and under high cultivaton, is partly in Allegheny and partly in Beaver county. Population between 4 and 500, a portion of which are engaged in farming, while others follow various mechanical branches and the manufacture of wool, cotton and silk.

The property is held in common, as general and indivisible stock; no distinction is made between the rich and the poor. The leading principles of this institution are derived from the precepts of the primitive church, recorded in the 2nd and 4th chapters of the Acts of the Apostles. They freely assert, that without the practical exercise of the doctrine of Jesus Christ, our Saviour, and his followers they could not prosper

as a society.

George Rapp, its founder and leader, now 87 years of age, is in fine health and vigor, retaining his faculties in a higher degree of preservation than is usual at such an advanced age. They began their social operations in 1805 in Harmonie, Butler county, Pa., where they remained ten years. Being desirous of a milder climate, they sold out their extensive possessions and settled on the Wabash river, in Posey county, Indiana, where they made still greater improvements. Here they purchased 30,000 acres of land from the government. After remaining here ten years, they resolved, unanimously, to return to Pennsylvania, which they effected in the years 1324 and 25 and settled their present location, which is said to

be the best of the three in many respects. Their woollen factory produces broad cloths, satinets. flannels and blankets of superior quality. The products of the cotton mill is brown

sheetings and cotton yarn.

They pay great attention to raising and manufacturing of silk: in 1843 the quantity of cocoons produced were 5111 lbs. which being reeled, the silk was manufactured into goods of various descriptions. Having commenced this business on a small scale 15 years ago, without any experience or proper machinery, they met with numerous difficulties. During the non-protective system, the income was very scant, and required true patriotic and economical principles, with an eye to the good at large, more than for immediate profit and gain in dollars and cents, to overcome the obstacles which offered.

Encouraged, however, for several years past by a liberal bounty, paid by the state of Pennsylvania to every producer of cocoons and reeled silk within its limits, they have spared neither trouble nor expense to import and introduce the latest and best English and French machinery, as well as to obtain first-rate mechanics to receive instructions from, to make silk goods in the latest and best manner, such as various kinds of handkerchiefs, plain and figured, dress silk, plain and figured satin vestings, Florentine, plain and figured silk velvet, &c. &c. One of the last improved looms is in operation, producing seven pieces of figured satin ribbon at once.

A small steam engine is now attached to the cocoonery, by which reels and other machinery are propelled, and a proper

ventilation and temperature in the coonery effected.

Having found a mode by which eggs can be preserved all summer, successive crops or sets of worms can be reared in periods of about four days of each other, the 30th set is now on the way for this season (Sept. 10). The foliage of the white mulberry serves best in May, June and July, that of the morus multicaulis during August and September; the Canton mulberry is found to be the best of all. The silk produced at Economy is pronounced by judges to be fully equal in quality to the best Piedmontese. Upon the whole, the silk etab lishment at Economy may well serve as as a model, and any instructions to young silk growers are cheerfully given without charge.

The products of those manufactories and mechanical branches, after the Society is supplied, are deposited in a warehouse or store, where sales are made either by wholesale or retail; a considerable business is done with the neighbor-

ing country people.

In the lower story of a brick building, 120 by 60 feet is contained a large and extensive museum of natural curiosities, with one of the finest collections of minerals in the United

States, and a large number of prints and paintings.

The second story of the building above mentioned, is one room called the Social Hall, in which the whole Society on certain occasions dine together in celebration of their yearly harvest home, the anniversary of their Society, as well as

other days of importance to them.

They have also erected a large brick church, finished in a neat but plain manner. They meet twice on Sunday and once on an evening during the week. Visitors all agree, that no where so much good order, silence and attention can be found during service as among these people. Mr. Rapp delivers the discourse in the German language, which is generally spoken among them, although many of the members are well acquainted with the English language. The tower or steeple is furnished with two bells and a town clock. They have a large and commodious school house for the education of their children.

A fine and numerous band of music occasionally entertain

the Society with a Concert.

They have an apothecary shop and a physician of their own; a large and well arranged hotel for the accommodation of travellers, is kept by the Society, as well as a post office. Their horned cattle, horses, sheep, hogs, &c. all of good stock and well taken care of, and stabled in the winter, are the best we have seen in the western country.

In agriculture they are not surpassed by any; their fields, meadows, orchards, vineyards, nurseries of mulberry and fruit trees are the best the country affords, and many travellers from all parts take pleasure to stop and see this interest-

ing place.

Some peculiarities in their internal arrangements and mode of living seem to us strange and singular; yet having chosen the United States for their residence, and complying with all civil duties required by law, no one will pretend to question their free and undeniable privilege to select such a mode of living as in their opinion will best promote happiness here and hereafter.

Their habits of industry, morality and strict adherence to sound religious principles, leading to unanimity and peace, speak volumes in their favor. They clearly demonstrate to the world how much vice and misery can be eradicated in the human family, and what degree of happiness may be attained by the combined action of heart and hand.

We say, it cannot be a bad tree which bears good fruit.

# STATISTICAL REMARKS.

The total revenue of the city, for the year 1843, was \$114, 900.09. The valuation of property belonging to the city is \$569.800. The debt due by the city is in total \$691.772.75. Of this amount \$158.272 is funded, generally, I believe, 6 per cent stock, and running up to 1868, on the 1st July in which year the last loan is payable. The finances of Pittsburgh are in a very healthy condition. The pounds of Hay weighed and censumed in the city. 2,540,000 The number of feet of boards and plank measured 5,901.611—all the lumber measured here is piled up in the city. 5,913 parrels of Whiskey, 6,903 barrels of Molasses, 643 barrels of Linseed Oil, and 101 barrels of stock were guaged in the city during the year. The following will give an idea of the shipping commerce—the number of

flats and boats (Mississippi broadhorns) arrived at the Monongahela wharf, for the year, 181, tons 2,140; keel and canal boats 401, tons 11,535; steamboats that have arrived oftener than once a week 1.070, tons 72,184; steamboats running to cities below, as far as New Orleans, 697, tons 93,133—total boats 2,349-total tons 178,992. We now have in operation two water works for supplying the city. The cost of the o'd works, built in 1828, including pipes laid, was \$222,000; cost of the new, excluding pipes, \$241,000, and these are much the largest. The capacity of the basins of the old is 1,000,000 gallons; of the basins of the new, 5,756,704. The engines of the old force 1,344 gallons per minute through a 15-inch pipe, into the basins, 116 feet above the river; the new, 4,320,000 every 24 hours through 20-inch pipes into basins probably 150 feet above the river. It is contemplated to supply the city of Allegheny with water from the new basins, by laying a main pipe across under the Allegheny river. The number of barrels of No. 1 salt inspected during the year is 25,389; or in all, of Nos. 1, 2 and 3, 28,610, containing 5 bushels each of 50 pounds, or total bushels 1,430,500. During the past season No. 1 has averaged 22 cents a bushel; which is somewhat higher than during past seasons.

The funded debt of this city is \$692,707,37, of which \$161, 934,61, including city certificates of debt, or shinplasters, is the floating debt—the balance is funded, payable as follows—
