YORK COUNTY, VIRGINIA, RECORDS

Deeds, Orders, Wills, etc. Book 1, p. 65. Deed 28 Sept., 1639. Wm. Banister sells John Haukins (this name also appears as 'John Hawkins' in this entry). "Fower Percells of Land with the Marsh and woods running Westward to a Creek that lyeth North and South to the Tinkers Sheeres by the little Presim'on Iseland."

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Book 2, p. 48. Order that Rice Maddoxe pay debt of 134 lb tobo due Wm Hawkins, this being the balance of a larger debt. (1645)

Book 2, p. 51. A Court "December the 20th 1645." Edward Grimes arrested at suit of Wm Hawkins "and no Accon as yett appering against him," Hawkins ordered to pay Grimes 40 lb tobo for charges and the case ref to next Court.

Book 2, p. 80. Mutilated. "x x confessed a judgment to Thomas Harrwood x x x Mathew Hawkins Junior for two thousand six x x x x." A Court "February the second Day" 1645/6.

Book 2, p. 134. Mathew Hawkins witnessed a Power of Attorney. 15 April, 1646.

Book 2, p. 182. A Court for York 20 Oct., 1646.

"It is ordered by consent of Wm Hawkins that the stocke of Catle this Day by him presented to the Court belonging to Argall Blackstone (sic) which were given him by his Grandfather shall be by him kept with all the female increase for the said orphant without any future charge for there keeping or the mentanaince and Educacon of the said Argall Blackston" (sic).

Book 2, p. 207. A Court for York 25 Jan. 1646/7.

Order that Mr Arthur Seawell and his wife and the feofes in trust for the estate of Thos Hawkins dec'd appear at next Court and give an a/c of the estate.

Book 2, p. 209. A com of admr on the est of Geo Hawkins dec'd to Dorcas Hawkins his widow. That the estate be appraised by Mr. Arthur Scwell, Tho Harwood, Richd Vauson and Jno Smithy.

Book 2, p. 210. That Geo Hawkins dec'd owed Capt Richd Townshend Esqr 700 lb tobo. Dorcas the relict and admr ordered to pay.

Book 2, p. 268. A Court for York 18th September 1647. (?) "Edward

Hughes who intermarried with the relict of George Hawkins Deo" submits an account of the estate and is cleared of it.

Book 2, p. 274. "Att a Quarter Court held at James Citty the 6th of March 1646" (1646/7)

Deed. 16 Jan 1642/3. John Chew sells, for a valuable consideration, to Robert Kinsey and Henry Lowdy the present Churchwardens of the parish of York, for the use of the parish as a glebe, 200 acres lying on W side of Wm Hawkins, it being part of 750 acres on the N. side of Chismans Creek as by patent dated 18 Feb 1638/9.

Book 2, p. 274. Indenture (Bill of Sale) 15 May 1647. Robt Todd and John Clarkson late Churchwardens of the parish of Yorke of the one part and Peeter Rigby of the other. That the parish possessed 200 acres on N side of Chismans Creek, and bounding on Wm Hawkins and W on the said Todd's land and N into the woods. Which land was lately bought of Mr John Chew for a glebe as by assignment made by Chew to Henry Lody and Robt Kinsey then Churchwardens for use of the parish 16 Jan 1642/3. This 200 acres part of 750 acres granted said Chew by Sir John Harvey, knt., late Governor, by patent dated 18 Feb -. Now Todd and Clarkson, by order of the Vestry 10 Nov 1645 to sell the glebe land, sell it to Peeter Rigby for 2000 lb tobo.

These York County records are from the abstracts made by Beverley Fleet, who has the following note in his "Virginia Colonial Abstracts," Vol. 26, p. 33. "This is most disheartening - for there comes a blank in the York County records from 6th December 1648 to 9th May 1652.

"Then we must return to Record Book No. 1 with it's skipping

dates. This record book (see Virginia Colonial Abstracts, Vol. 24, p. 2) is plainly a 17th or 18th century transcript of selected items taken from originals now lost. Thus it can hardly be taken as a final authority. Still it is all we have so we must make the best of a bad bargain."

Book 1, p. 254. Will of Wm Hawkins of the parish and County of York. Very sick and weak.

Dated 24 March 1654/5. Recorded 25 June 1655.

Right much religious preamble.

To be buried at descretion of wife Sarah Hawkins. Whole estate to her.

After her decease all to "my sonn in law Argoll Blackstone."

After wife's death Argoll Blackstone to give the Churchwardens of York parish 1500 lb tobo for "a Silver Flaggon bought with the produce."

"which Flaggon to be and remaine to and for the use of the Inhabitants of York Parrish in the Church belonging thereto att Sacraments and other necessarie times and occasions"

To John Wright son of Edward Wright a heifer.

COLONEL BENJAMIN HAWKINS

By Mrs. J. L. Walker, Waycross, Georgia

From "Revolutionary Reader: Reminiscences and Indian Legends," compiled by Sophie Lee Foster, State Regent, Daughters of The American Revolution of Georgia. 1913.

Colonel Hawkins, patriot soldier, United States senator and Indian agent, was born August 15, 1754, in the county of Butts, now Warren County, North Carolina. He was the son of Colonel Philemon and Delia Hawkins. He attended Princeton College until his senior year when the institution was closed on account of the Revolutionary War.

His knowledge of the French language led Washington to press him

into service as a member of his staff to act as interpreter with the French allies. He was one of the founders of the Society of Cincinnati in 1783.

He was a gallant Revolutionary soldier, having participated in several important engagements, among them the Battle of Monmouth. After North Carolina ratified the federal constitution, he was elected United States Senator from that state, taking his seat in 1790. At the close of his term in the senate he was appointed agent of the three great Indian tribes east of the Mississippi and entered upon his duties in the part of Georgia now known as Crawford County, but at that time called "The Agency Reserve."

This place became an important trading post and was selected by Colonel Hawkins as a convenient locality for the transaction of duties that devolved upon him. He infused progression, activity and thrift into the little village. Mills, workshops, and comfortable homes appeared on every side.

"Colonel Hawkins brought his own slaves from his old home in North Carolina, and under the right conceded to his office, he opened and cultivated a large plantation at the agency, making immense crops of corn and other provisions."

"While he lived his cattle brand was rigidly respected by the red men; although soon as his death, if reports be true, the Creeks, oblivious of former obligations, stole numbers of his cows and hogs."

To him does the state of Georgia owe a debt of special gratitude. He not only risked his life for the state of his adoption, but preserved the history of the Creek country, some of which is most valuable and interesting.

The French general, Moreau, who in exile was his guest for some time, was so much impressed with his character and labors, that he pronounced him one of the most remarkable men he had met in America.

Colonel Hawkins possessed great adaptability and through his beneficence he acquired the respect of the Indians. It is said he gained their love and bound them to him by "ties as loyal and touching as those of old feudal allegiance and devotion."

He was closely associated with Generals Floyd, Blackshear and John McIntosh, and Governors Troup, Mitchell and Early.

The Indians of Chohaw were closely allied to Colonel Hawkins. They frequently furnished him with valuable information in regard to the treachery of the British and the unfriendly Indians.

It has been conceded to some of our patriots that they were great in war. Benjamin Hawkins was not only great in war, but, like Washington, was great in peace. It was he who most strongly advocated terminating the War of 1812. He knew well how to approach the "children of the forest." The simple and diplomatic way in which he addressed the Indians is displayed in his quaint letter to the Ammic-cul-le, who lived at the Indian town of Chehaw:

"The time is come when we are to compel our enemies to be at peace, that we may be able to sit down and take care of our families and property without being disturbed by their threatening and plundering of us.

"General Blackshear is with you to protect and secure the friendly Indians on your river, and to aid in punishing the mischief-makers. Go you to him; see him; take him by the hand, and two of you must keep him. You must point out sixty of your young warriors, under two chiefs, to be with, and act under the orders of the general till you see me. He will supply them with provisions and some ammunition.

"You must be very particular about spies. You know all the friendly Indians, and all who are hostile. If any spies come about you of the hostiles, point them out to the general. And your warriors, acting with the general, must be as quick and particular as his white soldiers in the service of the United States.

"Tell you women and children not to be afraid, - that friends have come for their protection, and that I am at the head of the Creek warriors.

"I am your friend and the friend of your nation."

Colonel Hawkins was closely identified in the negotiation of the Treaty of Peace and Friendship with the Indians. His name, together with George Clymer and Andrew Pickens, was signed as commissioners on the part of the United States to the Treaty held at Coleraine, in Camden County, Georgia, March 18, 1797.

A treaty of limits between the United States and the Creek nation of Indians, was hold near Milledgeville, at Fort Wilkinson, on the part of the United States. The signers were Benjamin Hawkins and Andrew Pickens. This treaty was signed by forty chiefs and warriors. Treaty with the Creeks at the agency, near Flint River, on November 3, 1794, signed by Hopoie Micco and other Indians, also bor Hawkins' signature.

"In 1802 Colonel Hawkins recommended the establishing of a fort and trading post on the Old Ocmulgee Feilds." The right to establish such a post was obtained by the Fort Wilkinson treaty. Colonel Hawkins selected a site on an eminence near the river, where the city of Macon now stands. A tract of one hundred acres of land was sot apart

for the use of the post.

Fort Hawkins was built in 1806 and was garrisoned by troops from Fort Wilkinson early in the following year. The fort was named in honor of Benjamin Hawkins, one of the few honors bestowed upon him by the state he had so ably served. "This fort was considered one of the most formidable on the frontier. Two block houses, each twenty-eight feet square with two stories and a basement were built with heavy mortised logs. This place was provided with port holes for both cannon and musketry, and stood at the southeast and northwest corner of a strong stockade. During the war of 1812 the fort was a strong point for the mobilization of troops."

Colonel Hawkins died at the agency in Crawford County, June 6, 1816, and was "buried on a wooded bluff overlooking the Flint River." The little graveyard that served as a last resting place for those who lived around the agency has long since been abandoned. The unmarked grave of the patriot is there, sleeping unhonored amid the tangled vines and weeds.

pp. 248-250. Hon. Jameson F. Hawkins, deceased, was one of the most prominent citizens of Hannibal, and did, perhaps, more for her upbuilding than any other citizen. The esteem in which he was held by all was manifested when, as a mark of respect to his memory, the business houses of the city closed and many other testimonials of affection were tendered to the bereaved family on the occasion of his demise. In everything that promised to be beneficial to his community he was enthusiastically concerned, and many of the railroads which now center here and have added greatly to the financial well-being of Hannibal, were brought here through his unremitting efforts.

The father of J. F. Hawkins was Elijah, a native of Scott County, Ky., and son of Jameson Hawkins, who was born in Crawford County, Va., and moved to Kentucky after the Revolutionary War, settling in Scott County. He was a minister in the Baptist denomination. Elijah Hawkins was a farmer by occupation, and purchased a large tract of land in Ralls County, Mo., at an early day, but resided chiefly in Hannibal after coming to Missouri. He brought with him from his old Kentucky home a large number of slaves. September 11, 1814, he married Sophia Bradford, by whom he had eight children: Eleanor, now Mrs. Younger Pitts; Jameson F., whose name heads this sketch; Benjamin, who served as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Confederate Army, was for many years Sheriff of Marion County, and now a resident of Nashville, Tenn.; Elijah, who died in St. Louis County several years ago, and

was for many years a merchant in Hannibal; Catherine, who was married to James Marnell, a hardware merchant, formerly of Hannibal, but now of Nebraska City, Neb.; George William, who was a dealer in groceries and produce, and was a Lieutenant of a cavalry company in Price's army; Anna Laura, who was married to Dr. James Frazier, of Ralls County, since deceased; and Jefferson, who died young. Jameson Hawkins married Ruth Ann Threlkeld, October 4, 1776, who was a native of Culpeper County, Va. Her parents were John and Nancy (Johnson) Threlkeld, the former of whom was a member of Capt. Mercer's Company of the Third Virginia Regiment in the Revolutionary War. Mr. and Mrs. Hawkins were buried in Crown Hill Cemetery, Indianapolis, Ind. Jameson, grandfather of our subject, was a son of John Hawkins, who married Margaret Jameson in March, 1767. The parents of John were Philemon and Sarah (Smith) Hawkins. The former was a son of John and Mary Hawkins, who were of English ancestry. The death of John Hawkins occurred in 1742.

A native of Scott County, Ky., the Hon. Jameson F. Hawkins was born January 11, 1819. He received his higher education at Georgetown College, Kentucky, and in 1839 went to Hannibal with his parents. Here he opened a general store, and soon after started a sawmill and also established a ferry boat system. In 1849 he started with a company across the plains to California, where he remained until 1851, meeting with good success. Upon his return home he purchased some three hundred acres west of this city, and from that time until shortly before his death was engaged in the dairy business. When the Hannibal & St. Joseph Railroad was projected he interested himself greatly in the matter, and was sent by his fellow citizens to the State Legislature to obtain a charter and other privileges for the road. It was through his influence a law was passed to prevent the tapping of the road within forty miles of its eastern terminus. The City of Quincy, Ill., backed by the "Q" Railroad, managed to effect a repeal of the act by the Legislature during the war and the St. Joseph Railroad was tapped at Palmyra, Mo. Had the bill secured by Mr. Hawkins been maintained, Hannibal would have been the leading city in this part of the State. With a view to the ultimate good of the city, Mr. Hawkins succeeded in getting his neighbors to pay heavy taxes for railroad enterprises, which they did to a remarkable extent, the taxation amounting to as much as six per cent of the valuation of their property. At the same time, be it said to the credit of this worthy man, that he was never identified with any of the railroad corporations in any manner by which he could personally realize profits therefrom, his only object being the public good. He secured the right-of-way for nearly every one of the railroads which were laid through Hannibal. On Main, between Center and Bird Street, he erected a row of buildings which are now occupied by stores. In politics he was always to be found on the side of the Democracy.

In 1841 Mr. Hawkins married Sarah Ann, daughter of Asa and Ann R. (Thomson) Smith, and a native of Kentucky. Rodes Smith, the father of Asa Smith, was a Revolutionary soldier and was at the battle of York-

town, and witnessed the surrender of Lord Cornwallis. Many years afterward, when he was an old man, Richard Johnson, then Vice President of the United States, offered to secure for him a pension to which he was entitled. He refused, saying that pensions were not intended for persons who were able to take care of themselves. After serving for nine years in the Kentucky Legislature, he declined re-election. Ann Rodes Smith was the mother of Gen. Gustavus W. Smith, who commanded Company A. Engineer Corps, of which the late Gen. G. B. McClellan was Second Lieutenant, in the Mexican War. He was Commander of the Second Army Corps, C. C. A., of Northern Virginia, during the late war, and was subsequently commander of all the forces south of Lee's Army, and including those in North Carolina and Richmond, Va. In this capacity he was recognized by Jefferson Davis, in the absence of Gen. Lee, as his military adviser, his headquarters being at Richmond, Va. For several weeks Gen. Smith was Secretary of War pro tem of the Southern Confederacy, during the interval between Secretaries Randolph and Soden. At length he resigned from the army on account of differences between himself and Mr. Davis, and subsequently he was appointed Commander-in-Chief of the forces in Georgia by Gov. Brown, serving as such until the close of the war, and following up Sherman on his "march to the sea." He is now living in New York City.

Twelve children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Hawkins, and all of the number are yet living, and are as follows: Elijah; Thetis C., wife of the Hon. William H. Hatch, M. C., to whom has been born one child, Sallie Rodes; Anna W., Mrs. Francis L. Hewitt of Winfield, Mo.; William B., who is engaged in breeding fine horses and Jersey cattle near Lexington, Ky.; Jameson, a dairyman of this city; Jennie L.; Asa Smith, a life insurance agent at Seattle, Wash.; John Rodes, Superintendent of the Chester, Wabash and Western Railroad, at Chester, Ill.; Sallie A.; Mary E.; George T., who is a topographical engineer in the Government employ; and Laura F., a resident of Washington City.

Elijah Hawkins was born January 26, 1842, and spent his early life in this vicinity, where he received his education in the private schools. When nineteen years of age he enlisted in the Confederate army, his company being commanded by Benjamin Hawkins. He was mustered in as Second Sergeant and served to the end of the war, and was mustered out as Captain, having secured that rank as Aide-de-Camp to Gen. G. V. Smith. In 1865 he returned to Hannibal and later was employed by his father in a packing house in St. Louis for several years. Subsequently he engaged in the insurance business, first in St. Louis and subsequently in San Francisco, Cal., where he became manager of the Union Mutual Life Insurance Company of Maine for the Pacific States and Territories, comprising California, Washington, Oregon, Utah and Arizona. Acceding to a request made by his esteemed father, Mr. Hawkins returned to Hannibal upon the latter's death, to administer his estate, at which place he now resides.

January 5, 1885, Elijah Hawkins and Mrs. Isabel J. Coffin were

united in marriage. Mrs. Hawkins is a daughter of Joseph McAlpin, a native of Macon, Ga., and by her marriage has become the mother of two children; Sarah A., born June 1, 1887, and Joseph McAlpin, born February 11, 1889.

William H. Hatch served the Hannibal district in Congress for sixteen years, but was defeated in 1894, with many other Democrats, not only in his State, but throughout the United States. His long term in Congress is a clear proof that he served his constituency not only ably, but satisfactorily and well. His devoted wife, has many of the characteristics of her distinguished father, Jameson Hawkins. Possessed of good education and a bright, enquiring mind, she has been well fitted to share the honors of her husband, and has always made it a rule to attend the sessions of Congress with him. There, brought in contact with the representatives of the Government and other public officials, and the discussions of public measures of the day, she has become well-versed in political economy and civil questions, and their application to the best needs of our country. In this respect she is above the average Congressman. Yet she is essentially a domestic woman, and derives more pleasure when in her beautiful suburban home at Hannibal, surrounded with domestic cares and their attendant responsibilities, than when residing at the Capitol of the Nation.

Mary (Grundy) George, a widow; no further trace is known of him until he appears in 1810 in Barren Co., Ky. He is believed to have been in that part of Orange Co. which later became Culpeper or Madison Co. His children were Jehu Dyer Hawkins, Jr., m. Betsy O'Bannion, 1808, Barren Co.; William Wells Hawkins m. Azubah Scandland, lived in Woodford Co., Ky.; Henry George Hawkins m. Nancy James, 1811, Barren Co., Ky.; Sally G. m. her cousin, Smith Hawkins, 1813, Barren Co.; Mary m. S. S. Graham; Elizabeth m. Thomas Parker in Virginia. Parents of above John Hawkins, Sr., and wife, and of above Smith Hawkins wanted, also their relation to earlier Orange and Culpeper Co. Hawkins families.

(B) HAWKINS-DENTON. In 1846 there lived in Jackson Co., Tenn., Erastus Denton and wife, Susan, and William Hawkins and wife, Elizabeth. Parents wanted of each couple and contact with descendants having knowledge of the family.

(C) HAWKINS-GREEN. William Green, of Culpeper Co., Va., had a dau., Susan Smith Green, who m. Benjamin Hawkins and d. in Ky. in 1851. Mar. and pars. of this Benjamin Hawkins wanted, also his relationship to Hawkins in (A) and (B). (Mrs. Vivian T. Rousseau, Route 7, Glasgow, Ky.)

"He, Gregory Farmer Hawkins, married Sarah Cannon on January 5, 1815. They lived near Greenbrier, Virginia, but afterwards moved to Bath County, Kentucky, where their first eight children were born. They had eleven in all . . ." (Mrs. R. F. McCarron, 1101 Summer Ave., Hot Springs, Ark.)

HAWKINS FAMILY. This column carried an announcement, July 15, 1960, suggesting that all readers contribute information on the HAWKINS family so that we can study the data and see if each one can prove more ancestral lines. The response was very gratifying and we hope that more readers will send their Hawkins line. Perhaps in 1961 I shall find time to mimeograph all of it and make it available in bound form. In the meantime, most of it will appear in this column in the near future.

"Historical Southern Families," Vol. 2, by John B. Boddie, p. 12. Hinde Armistead married Hannah Chandler, dau. of John Chandler and she had been the widow of both Thomas Watts and of Anthony Simons. After the death of Hinde Armistead in 1722, she married Richard Hawkins, and, as her fifth husband, she m. in 1737 Charles Jenings.

Elizabeth City County. Deeds and Wills (1737-1749), p. 15. Will of Richard Hawkins, dated 12 June, 1737; prob. 21 Sept., 1737. Legatees: son, Anthony Hawkins, dau. Elizabeth Read, dau. Mary Hawkins, dau. Phebe Hawkins, wife, Hannah Hawkins. Executors: my loving friends Anthony Tucker, Thomas Read and wife, Hannah Hawkins. Wit.: John Hawkins, Anthony Tucker, Charles Jennings, Jr.

At a Court held for Elizabeth City County, 21 Sept., 1737, Anthony Tucker, Thomas Read and Charles Jennings, who married the relict of Richard Hawkins, dec'd., came into court and renounced the executorship of the will and John Hawkins, who is next of kin, refused to administer. .

Idem, p. 172. Indenture dated 17 Aug., 1743, in which Charles Jenings, Gent. of the County of Elizabeth City and Hannah, his wife, sell to John Armistead land in which the said Hannah hath her third and dower as being the widow formerly on one, Hind Armistead, dec'd.

Idem, p. 265. 30 Nov., 1749. Hannah Jenings, wife of Charles Jenings of Elizabeth City County, by and with the will and consent of her husband, for natural love and affection makes a deed of gift of 100 acres of land each to each of her daughters, namely, Mary Hawkins and Phoby Hawkins.

Idem, p. 131. June 22, 1738. The account current of the estate of Hind Chandler Armistead is returned to Charles Jenings, Admr., shows bill for schooling and bringing up Hind Armistead, the profits of estate of Hannah Armistead. Charles Jenings to retain one-third of the estate as his wife's dower.

Elizabeth City County Wills (1701-1904) Part I, p. 61. Will of Charles Jenings, dated 14 June, 1745, prov. 2 Aug., 1748, proves that Hannah, his wife, outlived him as she came into court and renounced all benefits and advantages that she might claim by the said last will and testament of Charles Jenings, dec'd., her late husband.

To summarize - It is evident that Hannah Chandler - Watts - Simons-Hawkins - Armistead - Jenings must have been not only a very remarkable woman but a very beautiful lady.

The following data on the Hawkins Family was contributed by M. S. Banks, 2853 Ontario Rd., N. W., Apt. 304, Washington 9, D. C.

John Hawkins, b. 24 July, 1756, presumably in Spotsylvania Co., Va.; d. 1833 in Hopkinsville, Christian Co., Ky. Served as Lieut. and Capt. in the Rev. Continental Line; m. 16 Jan., 1781, Rockingham Co., Va., Anna Gabriele Elizabeth Augusta St. Clair Jones, youngest dau. of Judge Gabriel Jones. Capt. Hawkins and wife were living in Caroline Co., Va., in 1784; they were in Ky. by 1788. In Ky. he was the first county clerk of Scott Co., where he lived until ca 1820 when he went to Hopkinsville, where he died in 1833. His wife died there on 20 Dec., 1824. He died intestate but appraisers for the estate were appointed 7 Oct., 1833. His known brother and sisters were: Martin Hawkins, m. 1799, Polly Shipp; Elizabeth died unmar.; Agnes m. 1799, Georgetown, Ky., Elijah Craig. There were possibly others both in Virginia and/or Kentucky.

Dr. H. C. Smith, 1440 Ardmore Ave., Glendale 2, Calif., sent considerable data from his files and from his book, "Darnall-Darnell and Allied Families," Vol. I, AND FROM THE FILES OF VOL. II, which has not been published. Thanks for the information which will appear in the Hawkins booklet but which is not appearing on this page as the dates do not cover information BEFORE 1850 - a rather strict policy of this column.

The following information was received from Mrs. R. F. McCarron, 1101 Summer Ave., Hot Springs, Ark.

Gregory Farmer Hawkins, b. 26 March, 1789; d. 15 Dec., 1859; m. 5 Jan., 1815, Sarah Cannon, b. 4 Feb., 1795; d. April, 1872, dau. of Newbold and Unicy (Bounds) Cannon. Tombstones in Wyaconda Cemetery in Lewis County, Missouri, near Canton, Mo. Sarah Cannon Hawkins' parents are buried in the same cemetery. According to their tombstones, Newbold Cannon was born 18 March, 1767 and died 8 Jan., 1850. Unicy Bounds Cannon was born in 1779 and died 23 Sept., 1831. Also, nearby, is this pair of stones: Newbould J. Cannon died Sept. 28, 1866, age 57 years, 3 months, 15 days, and Elizabeth A. wife of Newbould J. Cannon, died 17 September, 1870, age 59 years, 2 months, 28 days.

Gregory Farmer Hawkins' tombstone is quite large. On the front it is inscribed that he is the son of T. & M. Hawkins, formerly Mary Hargis. On the right-hand side of the stone: Mary Larue, daughter of G. F. and S. Hawkins, formerly Sarah Cannon, born on Feb. 22, 1824, died May 17, 1840. On the left-hand side of the stone the following is inscribed: Sarah Hawkins, daughter of Newbold and Unicy Cannon, formerly Unicy Bounds, was born in Ky. February 4, 1794. There is no death date on the stone.

Several of Gregory Farmer Hawkins' children are buried in this cemetery. His 4th child, Unicy Hawkins, b. 16 June, 1822; d. 28 Dec.,

1902; m. 25 Oct., 1838, John Henry Bayne, b. 8 May, 1812, Nelson Co., Ky.; d. 11 April, 1866.

According to information on file in the Lewis Co., Mo., Court House, Gregory Farmer Hawkins' estate was probated 27 Feb., 1860. Administrators were John W. Hawkins and Madison C. Hawkins, two of his sons. The children named were: Caroline J., wife of Roswell Durkee; Dr. Madison Cannon Hawkins; Felix A. Hawkins; Unicy Anne Hawkins, wife of John Henry Bayne; Roswell; Milton; Nancy Adaline; Irene Forco, wife of John L. Long; Lorinda Jane, wife of Marcus D. Bourne. There were 11 children. Mary Larue was dead, and, for some reason, Dr. John W. Hawkins was not named.

Sarah Hawkins Bayne, granddaughter of Gregory Farmer Hawkins, and a college professor, wrote the following lineage believed to be carefully proven although the documentation is not given: (Note - this is the same as the one given on page 29 of this book.)

The following Hawkins data were contributed by Tholma Murphy, 44 S. Dearborn St., Indianapolis, Ind.

Marcy Hawkins (1763-1844), dau. of Nathan and Catherine Hawkins, married in Madison Co., Ky., on March 8, 1790, James Barnett.

Nathan Hawkins died in Madison Co., Ky., in 1794.

In Jessamine Co., Ky., in 1808, the heirs of Elizabeth Hawkins of Culpeper Co., Va., were attempting to recover slaves. The heirs listed were John, Benjamin, James, Polly Hawkins Barnett, wife of John, Willis and Sally Hawkins.

The following information is from Mrs. Hale Houts, 230 West 61st St., Kansas City, Mo., who wishes to know the parents of Sarah Hawkins. Hardin Camp, b. in England prior to 1760; res. in No. Car., Ky., and in Mo. after 1812; m. 1779, Sarah Hawkins. Children: Josiah, Thomas, Hawkins, Joseph m. Nancy Schackelford, Sarah and Elizabeth Camp.

Miss Myra Firnhaber, 319 E. King St., Kingsville, Texas, writes that she is doing research on Robert Hawkins, d. 1761; dau. Mary Hawkins Durbin, b. 1720. Robert probably m. Ann Tribble (Treble).

A very kind reader contributed the following but the Hawkins data given here and the accompanying letter have become separated so that proper credit cannot be given.

This query was published in the July 17, 1936 issue of The Herald Post, Louisville, Ky. The answer appeared at a later date.

HAWKINS-BUTLER. John Hawkins died in Madison Co., Ky., 1810. His will does not name all children as some of them had received their

portions previously. Was this John Hawkins a son of John of Hanover Co., Va., whose dau., Milly, m. Percival Butler of Louisville? John Hawkins' wife's name and names of all children desired. Signed R. B. A.

ANSWER. I do not believe that John Hawkins of Madison is son of John who died in Hanover Co., Va. There were two Johns in Scott Co., Ky., very early, and one died there in 1806, naming large family, including son John. He is said to have been son of Philemon Hawkins who m. 1743, Susannah Smith, and Philemon was son of John and Mary of King William Co., Va. John, b. 1744, d. 1806, is said to have m. first Margaret Jameson, who d. 1770, and had Jameson Hawkins, b. 1766, Philemon, John, William, Peggy who m. 1790, Henry Cave, and others. Philemon's sister, Mary, m. Toliver Craig.

A land suit shows that the following were heirs of John Hawkins of Hanover Co., Va.: James Hawkins, d. in Logan Co., Ky., and left a large family whose ages are given in the suit; Martin Hawkins with wife, Margaret, living in Gallatin Co. in 1801, and referred to as Martin, Sr.; Milly Hawkins, Jane Hawkins, Fanny T. Hawkins, Edmund Hawkins who d. 1800, with sons Martin, Joseph and John and sons-in-law Robert Stewart, John P. Thomas and Thos. P. Irvine; Jane Hawkins m. John Todd, killed at Blue Licks; Milly Hawkins m. Percival Butler.

It appears that the son, John Hawkins, is the same John Hawkins who m., 1781, in Va., Anna Gabriella Jones, dau. of Chief Justice Jones, as he was in Scott Co., appearing in deeds as having a brother, Martin Hawkins, etc. If this John is the son of John and Mary, as it appears, he was in Scott Co. early, then went to western Ky., apparently Christian Co.

A Hawkins Bible owned by the family in Franklin Co. has the following dates: John Hawkins, b. 1718; d. 1778; m. 1744, Mary Langford. Children: Martin Hawkins, b. 1747; d. 1819; James Hawkins, b. 1750; Edmund Hawkins, b. 1754; Jane Hawkins, b. 1757; Mildred Hawkins, b. 1758; Elizabeth Hawkins; Mark Hawkins, b. 1763; Joseph Langford Hawkins, b. 1765; m. 27 Feb., 1801, Ann Parker Robinson.

The names are almost identical with those of John and Mary Hawkins, whose children are named in the suit in 1796, and yet there are some discrepancies. The son of Joseph Langford Hawkins, Dr. James Russell Hawkins, b. 1805, lived in Franklin Co., Ky., dying there in 1897, and it is his descendant who has the Bible. Joseph Hawkins, son of John named in the suit, was in Boone Co., Ky., in 1810. They may or may not be the same person. The duplicate names are most perplexing, especially when they do not exactly "click."

There was another John Hawkins, who lived in Jessamine Co., Ky., m. as a widower the widow Singleton, prior to 1815, when each had grown children. He d. 1823, and left a large family named in deeds. This John Hawkins may have been a son whose mother was Elizabeth

Bourne, dau. of Andrew Bourne of Culpeper Co., Va., according to Jessamine Co. deeds. This may also be the same John Hawkins who is named as husband of the daughter of _____ Withers, named in his will. If so, she was his first wife. This John Hawkins of Jessamine Co. is more apt to be of the Madison Co. branch. Signed H. M. S.

Query 5938 (A) (STILL FROM THE VIRGINIA GAZETTE) HAWLEY-HAWKINS. Amos Hawley m. _____ Hawkins, and settled in Preston Co., W. Va., ca 1790, according to Morton's "History of Preston County." They were associated with several other families, such as Pell, Halifax, Turner, et al, who came about the same time, on the enthusiasm engendered by George Washington's fine reports of the "Monongahela Glades" of Preston Co. Am seeking any data on Amos Hawley and his wife. An Andrew Hawley was said to have been "a near relative" of Amos, having, also, lived in Preston Co. Welcome correspondence on these. Amos had Margaret, Nancy, Elizabeth, John, Barton, Amos, Melinda and others. May have married twice. (Charles W. Hawley, 65 Woolsley Ave., Trumbull, Conn.)

A Philemon Hawkins (b. 1695, England) emigrated to America with wife, Eleanor (Howard); to Virginia in the neighborhood of Todd's Bridge, near relatives who had preceded him. (Such is the record of tradition familiar to descendants.) The Reg. Land Office, Richmond, Va., shows Philemon had land granted him in King William Co.: 2 patents in 1719 and 2 in 1725 in that part which is now King and Queen Co. Todd's Bridge was in King and Queen over the Matapony River. The probabilities are that John Hawkins of King William was the relative who had preceded the immigrant in 1714. Philemon d. 1725, and ca 1735, his widow and their children, Philemon, John and Anna, moved to No. Car. where many of their desc. now live.

John Hawkins of King William Co. had land grant 1731 and 16 Nov., 1742 (Spotsylvania Co., Va., Deed Book D) it appears that wife was Mary and children: (1) Joseph, d. 1769, m. Jane ____; (2) Philemon, will filed 1779, m. Sarah Smith; (3) Elizabeth, m. George Smith, bro. of Sarah; (4) Phoebe m. Charles Smith, bro. of Sarah; (5) your Mary, d. 1804, m. Taliaferro Craig.

These records from Gen. J. P. Hawkins' "Memoranda of Hawkins Family," pp. 70 and 72, seem to indicate that John was the earlier immigrant and that he moved from King William Co. to Spotsylvania Co. Was he a bro. of the Philemon who came in 1715? There are a great many Hawkins records in Crozier's "Spotsylvania County, Va., Records." . . .

I am trying to find anc. of a Nicholas Hawkins of St. George Parish, Spotsylvania Co., with wife Elizabeth (?), who d. 1754, leaving will. Children: (1) Nathan, b. ca 1720, m. Ann Hayden; (2) James, b. ca 1722; (3) Thomas; (4) Nicholas, b. ca 1726, m. 1st Elizabeth Long and 2nd ____, dau. of Francis Simpson; (5) Ann m. ____ Prichett; (6) Alexander, m. HAWKINS-CRAIG-FAULKNER FAMILY

John Hawkins, great-grandfather of Sarah Faulkner who m. Lt. Daniel Wilcoxson, (No. 10) died before 1740, leaving a will in Prince William Co., Va. Proof is found in deeds in Spotsylvania Co., Va., 1740-50, executed by his children, when carrying out the provisions of the will. His wife was Mary _____. The I. A. G. Compendium gives data, naming various members of the Hawkins family of the English Navy as ancestor. No proof has been found.

This compiler believes that John Hawkins is connected with the Hawkins families living in North Carolina before 1700 and gives the following as "a preliminary report" on the probable lineage.

Anne Willis of Ipswich, Mass., m. (1) Robert Rascoe of Roanoke, Va.; m. (2) James Blount, whose will dated, 9 July, 1685, was probated 17 July, 1685; m. (3) Seth Sowell ca 1689-90. Her daughter, Elizabeth Blount, m. (1) Thomas Hawkins, who d. 1696; m. (2) Nicholas Smith. Her son, John Hawkins, m. Mary Bateman. In 1703, John Hawkins relinquished his right as heir of Thomas Hawkins to Capt. Henderson Walker. In 1704, John Hawkins and wife, Mary, sold to George Slade, 150 acres, a plantation in South Lancaster, No. Car.

The John Hawkins, whose will dated, 8 Feb., 1716/7, prob. 10 April, 1717, left a bequest, among others, "to Thomas, son of Joyce Hartshorne." Our John Hawkins' dau. Mary named a daughter "Joyce." The most noted Hawkins in North Carolina in later years were Philemon, Sr., and Philemon, Jr. Our John Hawkins named a son, Philemon, and he lived in Spotsylvania Co., Va.

Several Faulconer (Falconer, Faulkner) families are recorded in North Carolina before 1703.

John Hawkins, wife Mary, who lived in Prince William Co., Va., had the following children who survived him:

1. Joseph Hawkins, m. Jane Nicholas and resided in Hanover Co., Va.; d. Spotsylvania Co., Va., 1769. His will names wife, Jane; sons, John and Joseph; daus., Lucy and Sarah. It was witnessed by his bro., Philemon Hawkins.

NORTH CAROLINA GUIDE

p. 350. Out from Middleburg, North Carolina, is Pleasant Hill, a two-and-one-half story clap-board house with gable roofs, dormers, and twin chimneys. The low wings on each side of the central section and some of the ornaments in the cornice, notably the Greek fret, are possibly additions of the 1850's when the house changed ownership. An inappropriate porch with rough stone columns was added in 1869.

Pleasant Hill was erected by Col. Philemon Hawkins, Jr. Hawkins' father fought alongside his father, Tryon's chief aid at Alamance, but father and son later became ardent patriots. The son was a colonel in the Provincial militia, member of Provincial Congresses, and of the 1789 convention that ratified the Federal Constitution. Pleasant Hill in 1777 was the birthplace of Colonel Hawkins' son, William Hawkins, Governor of North Carolina, 1811-1814, and Speaker of the House of Commons, 1810-1811.

DEPOSITION OF NATHAN HAWKINS

Madison County, Kentucky, Deed Book A, p. 82.

Deposition of Nathan Hawkins, aged 74, taken before George Adams and Joseph Kennedy, Justices of the Peace; was present about thirty-one or thirty-two years ago in Spottsylvania County, Virginia, when John Hawkins married Elizabeth Ellis, daughter of William Ellis, of Spottsylvania; William told John that for his marrying his daughter, he would buy and give him (John) two good negroes and he should have equal share with his other children at his death; after they were married two negro girls came to the door and Mr. Ellis informed John he might have his choice. Mrs. Ellis answered No, she would not part with either of the girls; she intended one for a milkmaid and the other for a washmaid, but that he might have Millie, a young girl. John, after some conversation, said it was very little odds which of the girls he had; although she was the smallest she might soon grow up. Upon which Mr. Ellis gave John Hawkins the girl, and about four days after Millie was moved to John Hawkins' and there remained until after the decease of said Hawkins. In the administration of his estate Millie was appraised in said estate and the relict had her thirds allotted to her; that her father, Mr. Ellis, wished Millie not to be included in the appraisal but the widow excepted against it and said Millie was John Hawkins' and should be in the appraisal and his children should not be wronged, and her father agreed to it.

Mr. Ellis was appointed Guardian and hired Millie with the other negroes for the benefit of the orphans. Some time after the widow married Robert Collins who brought suit against heirs of said Hawkins for said Millie but how it came out of Court this deponent knoweth not. The matter was submitted to arbitration of Joseph Brook, Edward Hardin and Thomas Colson, Justices of the Peace for Spottsylvania County, and the award was in favor of the orphans; but deponent further sayeth, Robert Collins said in his hearing he would give his bond to stand to the award, and further sayeth not. (Dated) July 24, 1790; Witnesses, George Adams and J. Kennedy; acknowledged and recorded 3 August, 1790.

I am especially interested in John Hawkins, of Spotsylvania Co., Va., St. Georges Parish. He was b. between 1731 and 1733 as he came of age between 1752 and '54. He was the son of Nicholas Hawkins, Sr., and Elizabeth Long. Elizabeth Long was the daughter of John Long (Essex and Spotsylvania) and Elizabeth, his wife, whose mark was a J.

In 1758 or '59 John Hawkins married Elizabeth Ellis, the dau. of William Ellis (Gloucester and Spotsylvania) and his wife, Elizabeth. This information on the marriage of John Hawkins and Elizabeth Ellis was hard to come by but by great good fortune record A-82 Madison Co., Ky., Court of July 24, 1790, is a deposition made by John's brother Nathan with regard to the marriage of John and Elizabeth and has to do with a suit in regard to a slave named Milly. It gives the name of Elizabeth Ellis Hawkins second husband, Robert Collins. It is an amusing and interesting paper and worth hunting up. (See p. 56)

The roster of John Hawkins' siblings is somewhat obscure due to a queer contradiction in some dates, but there was at least James, Nicholas, Jr., Nathan, Alexander, and Catheron Mcdonel and Ann Pritchett, all according to the will of Nicholas, Sr.

Of Nathan I have some additional data worth publishing, I think. He was born, according to his own statement, in 1716. He migrated to Madison Co., Ky., where he lived his life out. In a deed (but recorded 4 years after his death) his wife's name was Frances. His will was probated 4 Nov., 1794, Will Book A, p. 64, Madison Co., Ky. His children were Elizabeth (edw.), Lovel, Nicholas, Nancy (John) Schroeder, Nathan, who could be the man of that name from Mercer Co., Ky., whose revolutionary deposition is number 30457.

John Hawkins' wife, Elizabeth (now married to Robt. Collins), his three daughters and sons-in-law, and his wife's second husband are recorded signing paper. Spotsylvania Co. Deed Book K, Sept. 28:1784. He had died in 1764, leaving four daughters. One, Catherine, shortly disappears. The second, Elizabeth, married William Gosney (of whom more), the third, Ann, married Thomas Jones, and the fourth, Agatha, was the first wife of Benjamin Haley. All of this group moved to Kentucky from Frederick Co., Va., including the second husband of Elizabeth, Robt. Collins, but I do not have any record of Elizabeth Ellis Hawkins Collins after 1784.

William Gosney who married Elizabeth Hawkins, died in Bourbon Co., Ky. His property was divided in 1799. His two brothers-in-law and his wife's step-father served in the settlement of his estate. His property was divided among 9 children. John, the eldest, was of age, but the remaining eight were infants. His daughter, Salley Gosney, was born in Virginia in 1785. She married Asa Chapman in 1801, at the age of 16.

Asa Chapman was the son of Diana Durrett and George Chapman (Spotsylvania Co.) who had migrated to Kentucky in 1784. I am descended from their daughter, Hulda.

I have quite a bit more data on the siblings of many of these people, but I presume that on all these later people you wish only the direct line.

"I am interested in a Hawkins family, and in the event that you ever run into any records about Hawkins that might seem pertinent to this family, I would appreciate your help.

Joshua Hawkins, b. 1780, Maryland, had a brother (or uncle) Rev.

William Hawkins, b. in Md., 1766. Rev. William had a sister, Ruth Hawkins. These persons were living in the vicinity of present-day Fairmont, W. Va., by 1820, but may have been in Loudoun Co., Va., prior to this.

Joshua Hawkins m. (1) Cassa Tracy, sometime bef. 1808; m. (2) Sarah Sandy in 1830, Harrison Co., W. Va. By his 1st wife, he was the father of Elizabeth Hess, Mary Jackson, William, Jared, Idney Jackson, James and Levi (twins), Catherine, and John. By his 2nd wife he had Benjamin Franklin, Rebecca and Eliza Jane. All of these children, with the exception of Elizabeth Hess, moved on to Monroe Co., Ohio. Elizabeth and Jeremiah Hess, her husband, remained in Harrison Co., W. Va.

Rev. William Hawkins was married three times - once to Mary Amos. He was the father of 13 children, including names of Elizabeth, Mary, James, John, Joshua and Idney (which is rather an unusual name and I am inclined to believe that perhaps it might have been the name of the mother of Joshua and Rev. William, since it was used in both families). Rev. William Hawkins was also the father of a dau., probably by his first wife, named Cassandra Hawkins.

Rev. William Hawkins and most of his family remained in W. Va. - in the counties of Marion, Monongalia, and Harrison, and Rev. William d. in 1855. Joshua d. in Monroe Co., Ohio, in 1856."

in Nansemond Co., Va. (Or it may have been Giles Co., Tenn.) The court house records in Nansemond Co., Va., burned in 1866 so no will has been found.

The will of Capt. Upshaw, probated Feb. 16, 1807, mentions the following children: James Wayne Upshaw m. Nancy, dau. of Jeremiah Upshaw (his 1st cousin); Lewis Green Upshaw m. Alice, dau. of Jeremiah Upshaw (his 1st cousin); Mason Tazewell B. Upshaw m. _____ Jones; Maria Upshaw m. John Hawkins; Louisa Upshaw m. William Hawkins, 2nd Robt. Harvey; Martha Upshaw m. Francis Buckner; Arthur Martin Montgomery m. Martha B. Jones, 2nd Ann K. Crockett; Sarah Upshaw (1794-1889) m. Dr. W. A. Massie; Elizabeth J. Upshaw m. Thos. Harwood, Tenn.; Harriet Upshaw m. Wm. M. Hawkins.
