
The name here has been transcribed in various ways. Above we saw that whoever made the Index apparently transcribed it as Faas. In other places it has been transcribed as Froas and Troas (for example in *Early Wills and Administrations of Northumberland County*, *Pennsylvania*, 1950, by Dr. Charles A. Fisher; relevant page obtained from Marilyn Riehl). Here I take it to be Foas. My attempt at a transcription follows.

Be it Remembered (Henry Foas dec^d)

That on the 20th day of April AD 1812 Letters of Administration in due and Common form of law were granted unto George Hepler of all and singular the goods and Chattels, Rights and Credits which were of Henry Foas late of Bloom Township dec^d (the Widow having Renounced) who has put in sureties Laurence Ruch and James Smith in \$2000. Witness my hand John L. Finney Regr.

Administration Bond, 20 Apr 1812

I requested the probate file for Henry Faas from the Northumberland County Register & Recorder's Office and received copies of two supporting documents in addition to the page from the will book. First is a statement by Henry's widow, which is very important because it identifies his wife as Elizabeth, daughter of George Hepler. Following that is George Hepler's bond. Note that here they are using the spelling Foass for Henry's last name.



My attempt at transcription:

And if it shall hereafter appear, that any last will and testament was made by the said deceased, and the executor or executors therein named do exhibit the same into the said Register's Office, making request to have it allowed and proved accordingly: And if then the above bounden George Hepler being thereunto required, do render and deliver the said letters of administration (approbation of such testament being first had and made in the said Register's Office) then this obligation to be void and of no effect, or else to remain in full force and virtue.



Inventory Report, 24 Apr 1812

The clerk at the Register & Recorder's Office told me that she could not find the inventory and other reports. As far as she could tell, the book was missing. However, I was able to get a copy of the inventory, vendue, and accounts from Marilyn Riehl. It's not totally clear, but she might have obtained them from Family History Library microfilm. Some small bits are missing from the copies, and some parts are difficult to read. Let's start with the introduction to the inventory:



Witness my hand & seal this 24th day of April [rest is cut off, but looks like it might be Anno Domini 1812]

The most interesting thing here is another spelling of Henry's last name: Fahs. The inventory is shown in three pieces below.





Next is the report of the auction. It is three legal-size pages, which I had to break into pieces to fit in my scanner. Since there is space left on the pages between pieces, I am going to go ahead and start the transcription to fill the space. Notes about whether items were paid, and the Xs, whose meaning is not known, are left out of the transcription. Henry's last name appears to be spelled Foase here.



About George Hepler's signature – the one above is pretty faint, but the one on the administrator's bond is better:




It is in a type of old German script. I'm pretty sure the last name is Häbler. This would have basically the same pronunciation as Hepler in German. Note, though, that in German the first "e" (or the "ä") would have a long-a sound, and not a short-e sound as we would say it. It's harder to figure out the first name. I think it might be Gorg. The German version of George is Georg, but maybe this was some sort of variant.


Now I want to backtrack and discuss Elizabeth Hepler Faus's signature from her statement:



She was also signing in the old German style. I believe it says Elisabeth Fahs. Of particular note is the letter that looks like a modern-day script "f", with a loop above the line and another loop below the line (in both the first and last names). In the old German style, this is an "h". Aside from those two signatures, I think the rest of the writing in the documents is in the English/American style. Thus, when you see this:



I believe that is Henry Foass. The end of the last name looks a lot like the "hs" in the German style, but I think it is in the English style, where it is a double-s. That sort of double-s occurs in many places in these documents, for example here:



This is obviously "Witness my hand", with the same sort of double-s at the end of "Witness".
