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

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



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DOPE

The same rank absurdity that's spewed from the mouths of politicians for the last three-quarters of a century to justify the illegality of cannabis has also served as bait for publishers to hawk pulp fiction. Stephen J. Gertz has edited Dope Menace: The



Sensational World of Drug Paperbacks 1900-1975 (Feral House, \$24.95), a fascinating collection of lurid covers such as Marijuana Murder, Reefer Girl, and Reefer Club, accompanied by illustrations of near-naked dames in the throes of "marijuana addiction" who fall prey to homosexuality and child orgies.

In northwestern China, the oldest stash ever discovered—789 grams of pot, estimated to be 2,700 years old—was found buried alongside what researchers believe are the remains of a 45-year-old shaman. A paper published in the *Journal of Experimental Botany* flatly states that the cannabis was "cultivated for psychoactive purposes" rather than fiber. Scientists who studied the pot said that it was still green but had no odor.

Archaeologists say that it was common practice to stock a tomb with cool stuff needed for one's afterlife. The burial site yielded a harp, bridles and archery equipment in addition to the pot. But 789 grams? That's only a pound and a half—which means that eternity is going to *feel* like an eternity.

FLAMES OF FUTILITY



California's joint state and federal anti-pot task force, known as CAMP (Campaign Against Marijuana Growing), claims to have burned more pot plants than ever before in 2008. Just over 2.9 million plants were destroyed, with an estimated worth of approximately \$11.6 billion (though only 143 people were arrested). The bulk of the seizures were made in the Central Valley and Northern California.

CAMP said that its haul would have been larger had it not been for the forest fires that raged throughout the region last summer. Cali-

fornians won't soon forget the conduct of CAMP and the DEA in June: As their homes and property burned, the Feds ignored the devastation and launched Operation Southern Sweep, a series of raids on outdoor gardens situated in Humboldt and Mendocino counties.


STONED JACKET

Anderson also stressed the need for a new, peaceful approach to solving world problems. She's just one of the millions of Americans hoping for change, especially on the marijuana front. In December, Americans discovered that Obama's plans are really just business as usual.

Change.gov, the official website of the Obama administration, asked the public to provide them with a list of the top public policy questions facing America. Visitors to the site were then asked to vote on which questions should be a priority for the new administration. More than 10,000 citizens cast votes on over 7,300 proposed questions. The top question for the new President: "Will you consider legalizing marijuana so that the government can regulate it, tax it, put age limits on it, and create millions of new jobs and create a billion-dollar industry right here in the US?"

The answer? "President-elect Obama is not in favor of the legalization of marijuana."

The new administration could not articulate even one legitimate reason why we should continue to criminalize victimless behavior that even the new President admits to have engaged in. In other words, America's 44th President, like most politicians, is more comfortable defining himself and tens of millions of otherwise law-abiding Americans as criminals, rather than publicly acknowledging the fact that marijuana is a safer drug than alcohol.

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


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
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SWISS MISS

In Switzerland, voters were recently faced with two drug-policy proposals. In November, a referendum allowing heroin addicts to obtain the drug by prescription was passed with overwhelming public support [68 percent!]—but by a similar margin [63 to 37 percent], those same democratic dice rolled against cannabis decriminalization.

Polls had predicted an easy win for the heroin referendum but a dead heat on the cannabis question. The ultimate bogeymen in

the debate seemed to be adventurous, open-minded internationalists—"drug tourists," as the Swiss government calls us. Swiss cannabis activists told reporters they were saddened that their fellow citizens had succumbed to such fearmongering. Green Party MP Jo Lang pointed out that as a result of the vote, 600,000 people would be criminalized for consuming a drug that is safer than alcohol.

In light of the vote, some counterintuitive thinking may be necessary. If the Swiss people actually believe that cannabis is dangerous and its users a public menace, then perhaps the next move should be to convince them that marijuana is as devastatingly addictive as heroin. That way, all you'll need is a prescription.—Brendan Hogan





THE CIA'S ITCHY TRIGGER FINGER


In April 2001, the plane of a US missionary family was shot down over northeastern Peru after being misidentified as a drug-trafficking aircraft by CIA anti-drug forces operating in the country. Veronica "Roni" Bowers and her infant daughter were both killed, and the pilot, Kevin Donaldson, was seriously injured. Bowers's husband Jim, 38, and son Cory, 7, were not harmed.

Almost immediately after the incident, CIA officials characterized it as an isolated aberration in an otherwise well-run program. Not quite, it now turns out: The joint US-Peruvian campaign to halt airborne drug smugglers has resulted in the downing of at least 10 other aircraft without proper warnings. A new report from CIA Inspector General John Helgerson states that the agency routinely disregarded "required intercept procedures," which led to an undisclosed number of private flights being shot down within two to three minutes after being sighted by Peruvian fighters.

The agency withheld details of its errors in order to avoid embarrassing the Bush administration—a practice tantamount to obstruction of justice, according to Representative Peter Hoekstra, the ranking Republican on the House Intelligence Committee, whose Michigan district includes the slain woman's hometown. "These are the most serious and substantial allegations of wrongdoing I've seen in my time on the committee," he declared.—Preston Peet

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




MARKET ANALYSIS

It appears reports of Kush's demise were greatly exaggerated. After a two-month drought, Kush regained the top spot in April as the month's most-submitted strain, narrowly beating out Diesel and Haze. Additionally, Kush eclipsed its year-to-date average price by a wide margin. The top five submitted strains (with average price) were Kush (\$469), Diesel (\$480), Haze (\$425), Purps (\$447) and Blueberry (\$503).

Index Watch: Oespite Kush's increase in average price, every index dropped from its previous month's average with the exception of the Schwag Index, which established a new 2009 high in April.

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THE 2008 CANNABIS CUP EXPO ROUNDUP. BY BOBBY BLACK

It was a cold and rainy Sunday morning in Amsterdam, but that didn't stop a horde of determined stoners fresh off the plane from lining up outside the PowerZone club to register for the 21st Annual Cannabis Cup.

The Expo opened at noon, and the HT staff got busy registering judges, while the nearly 40 vendors set up their elaborately constructed booths and began selling their products and promoting their shops. It was a mecca for marijuana merchandise: There were seed superstars like DNA, Dutch Passion, Serious, Soma, Sensi, Kiwi, Big Buddha, Paradise and Vancouver Seeds. There were grow-supply gurus like Atami, Delta 9 Labs, KJ Products, Trimpro and Mammoth Hydro. Then, of course, there were the coffeeshops. As always, Barney's Farm and Green House were among the largest exhibitors. Ed "Iceman" Borg was representin' for De Rokerij. If you hit up the Bushdocter booth at just the right time, you might snag yourself a free space cake, while at the booth of newcomers Boerenjongens, the judges were offered free chai tea and canal cruises all day long.

Other cool stuff at this year's Expo included the Bee Line hemp wicks from Fresh Headies, Snail's official Cannabis Cup rolling papers, Bubble Bag's hash-making kit, Tightpack's designer stash containers, Herborizer's glass vaporizer and Arjan's National Geographic-style Strain Hunters video. But the one item on the tip of everyone's tongue (quite literally) was the Pocket Alchemy cannabis-tincture spray at the DNA booth. Packed with THC goodness, these handy little bottles were like Binaca for the brain—offering a delicious peppermint-, honey/sage- or cinnamon-flavored pickme-up on the down-low.

One of the more popular attractions at the Expo was the revival of the old Trichome Challenge. The fellas from TH Seeds first invented the Challenge



over a decade ago (at their old digs as the CIA), and it was cool to see it make a comeback. Here's how it works: The challenger sits on a cushy throne and is handed a six-foot bong whose bowl is packed with the purest kif. He/she must then empty the bowl and the chamber, hold the hit in for 10 seconds, and then sit for a full minute without melting down. For those with less ambitious lungs, TH Seeds also offered the iSpliff—an iPhone app that lets you interactively "roll" and "smoke" a digital doob. Sure, HT may have invented the virtual joint a few years ago, but these guys have perfected it.

On the stage, Miss HT 2007 Sarah and I kicked off the opening ceremonies at 4:20 with the lighting of the Cup Menorah—seven colored candles corresponding to the Seven Lights of Cannabis, as envisioned by artist Alex





Devin the Dude formed his first rap group, the Odd Squad, in Texas in the early '90s along with his brother Dexter and producer "Blind Rob" Quest. Known for his sense of humor and his love of both buds and beer, Devin the Dude has collaborated with some of biggest names in hip-hop, including Snoop Dogg and Dr. Dre, whom he accompanied on the legendary "Up in Smoke" tour in 2000. He paid HIGH TIMES a visit upon the release of his latest album, *Landing Gear* (Razor & Tie), and was happy to find that we'd put a few cold ones on ice and rolled a couple spliffs in honor of his arrival. Interview by Chris Simunek

What are the ingredients of a good party? A good party? Lots of beer, you know what I'm sayin'? First and foremost. Plenty of weed. Close friends. And, of course, a lot of titties. Women—you know, ladies. A couple of hoes here and there. [cracks up laughing]

When was the first time you smoked weed? The first time I smoked weed, I was in the seventh grade. No-sixth grade. I smoked weed because I was playing sports and stuff in school, and I had a friend about a couple of years older than I was and he smoked. He was like, "Man, hit this." And I was like, "Man, that shit makes you slow. I'm going to be a basketball player, football, I'm gonna do all this shit, man. That shit gonna slow you down, you gonna be slow your whole life ..." [Devin imitates his friend smoking] "Slow, nigga? I can beat you running, nigga, right now!" I think my brother went down there like 50 yards and had his hands up, and I just knew I was going to tear his ass up. "Go!" [Dev swings his arms like he's running] I look behind and I'm

like, "This ain't shit." Next thing you know, this motherfucker shot past me, hauling ass. I'm like, "What the ...?" So as soon as we finished the race, we walked back down, he pulled out the joint, and I was like, "Lemme hit that?"

So do you think weed actually gives you superpowers?

No, I'm saying just because you smoke weed doesn't *lessen* your powers.

You grew up behind a radio station?

Yeah, we was living in front of a radio station, WRXB in St. Petersburg, FL. And they used to throw a lot of records away simply because they had a little scratch on them and they couldn't afford to have them live on the air. So any little minor scratch, they would throw them in the trash. I used to go out there, scoop them all up and bring them home. Some of the records I heard before, some I had no idea. Some of them was like, "What the fuck?" But it was all new.

What records?

Okay, Quincy Jones had some stuff, Ohio Players, Manhattans, Bar-Kays ... and there was a lot of names that I can't recall, because there was a lot of stuff that they threw away just because they didn't want to play it, I think.

So what was the "Up in Smoke" tour like?

Oh, man, that's what it was—up in smoke every day. There wasn't like a two-day period where there wasn't no weed; there was always weed. To the point that like, the first two weeks, man—during the rehearsals and going on—I wanted to party, smoke, chill, drink, because it was all there. But I had to find out quickly that it was a job, man, and your work ethics had to be up to par, because every day you have to have that same energy that you did the previous night. It's a whole new crowd, different people ... you have to be on point. You have to learn how to pace yourself and kind of do more smoking than drinking. [cracks up]

Who smokes more, Dre or Snoop? Uh, Snoop.

How about you or Snoop?

Uh, I would probably say Snoop. [laughter] But I'm right there on his ass, though. That's the big dog, man, it's pretty much obvious. A lot of smokers probably smoke more than I do—but I give everybody a real good race, I'm telling you.



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

An AC/DC concert is to white people what the Hajj is to Muslims—a pilgrimage you make at least once in your life when time and money allow. The formula that these guys have followed since their first record, High Voltage, up to the present day's Black Ice—steamroller rhythms strung together by spitting-cobra guitar leads and punctuated by fist-pumping Wagnerian choruses—has the power to awaken one's inner Viking with the sort of proficiency that could squeeze a tear out of Leni Riefenstahl's dead left

eye. There's nothing racist or exclusive about the event, mind you, but it's definitely a working-class-honky trip that appeals to Caucasians because, hell, you can't sing along to NASCAR.

AC/DC are the most consistent rock'n'roll band of all time. In 35 years, they've never written a ballad or a love song or any other kind of tune that doesn't start to rock within the first eight seconds of needle drop. Brian Johnson is still wearing that ridiculous pigeon-keeper's hat, and Angus Young is still quite comfortable in that moldy schoolboy outfit. I'm glad that not all bands have followed this mandate, but for AC/DC it seems to work.

They opened with a new tune, "Rock 'n' Roll Train," which I guess is a cool



train to be on because it's loaded with liquor and skanks. Behind them was a giant effigy of an old steam locomotive with devil horns growing out of what would have been its head, had it been a person. My one regret is that the set list was basically the same as when I saw them on the Razors Edge tour 18 years before, only the songs that were new then were replaced by songs that were new now.

Even so, "Highway to Hell" doesn't disappoint the way, say, "Sympathy for the Devil" does when the Stones roll it out now. Mick Jagger is a parody of what he once was, whereas AC/DC are still the same guys, only older. There's a difference. Yeah, Mick works out six hours a day, but who'd you rather have at your side in a bar fight? Jagger would be out the door before you could say "Lady Jane," while Brian Johnson would be

on the floor biting some asshole's ear off. At 61, he can still screech like a monkey in vivisection for two hours nonstop. Do an experiment—put on "Back in Black" and try singing along at the top of your lungs in that high register. I guarantee you'll be coughing your lungs out before you even hit the guitar solo.

White people have invented a lot of things—the telephone, the six-pack, the atom bomb—but I'd have to say that AC/DC is one of our noblest accomplishments. I don't know if I'll be in a rush to see them again anytime soon, but I like to know that they're there, same as I'm grateful for the knowledge that my first handgun is just a six-hour drive away in case this economy keeps going south and my inner John Dillinger starts feeling his oats.—Chris Simunek

Gutter Tactics (Ipecac)

A bunch of really claustrophobic noise scratches like a hair shirt

around just about every theoretically enlightened political rap dished out by Dälek. Straight outta Newark, this scary duo-MC Dälek on vocals and the Oktopus handling production—make deliberately uncomfortable ugly-beauty music simply as a matter of common sense, the gnarly times in which we all live calling for it, don't you know?

On their fourth album, Gutter Tactics, they soldier on with a sort of barbed-wire bitterness whose primary appeal (for the nerds who care) is the fact that -as already demonstrated on their previous album, Abandoned Language—they're probably better than anyone else at obliterating the final walls between "rock" or "hip-hop" and "serious" music. Taking their cues from the hectoring sermons of Public Enemy and the pummeling poetic prowess of Mobb Deep—as well as from the feedback/microtonal stew of Sonic Youth and a spate of classic Krautrock mind-melters like Faust-Dälek further melt the music down into miasmas of sonic sprawl obviously influenced by the "new music" discoveries of lannis Xenakis and the advanced jazz explorations of John Coltrane and Miles

The titles of tracks like "Blessed Are They Who Bash Your Children's Heads Against a Rock," "We Lost Sight," "Who Medgar Evers Was ... " and "A Collection of Miserable Thoughts Laced With Wit" are mere markers pointing the way toward the dissatisfactions that MC Dälek is dealing with-and the interesting thing is, while it may indeed be some of the heaviest shit going, of course you can't understand a word he says. Which is deliberate, which means it's kinda political. Doesn't it?—John Payne

ANDREW WICE

To the Last Drop (Bäuu Press) ***



That's the premise of To the Last Drop, a novel of "water, oppres-

sion, and rebellion" by New Mexico author Andrew Wice. After a previously untapped source of water is discovered in the deserts of New Mexico, ruthless corporate magnate U.S. Armstrong—a rabid rightwinger from Texas-mounts a concerted effort to steal it. Push comes to shove when a New Mexican pot smuggler plows his truck through a checkpoint set up by the Texas militia. Citing this among other pretexts, Armstrong orders the gung-ho militia across the border to engulf the unprepared New Mexican defense forces in a blitzkrieg attack.

To the Last Drop's protagonists include a disheveled biologist who becomes a rebel leader, a pretty coffeeshop owner who supports the underground, Diablos gang members who form motorcycle-riding citizen-cavalry squads, and a half-breed marijuana grower turned somewhat accidental revolutionary. All of these characters, formerly citizens of New Mexico, find themselves suddenly living in "New Texas" after the federal government recognizes and legitimizes the invasion. These unassuming people are subjected to a brutal occupation by the Texas State Guard, made up mainly of murderous thieves, rednecks and speed freaks, and decide to fight back, waging a dangerous and costly guerrilla campaign against the invaders.

Often funny, as well as easy to imagine in a not-too-distant (if slightly fantastical) future, To the Last Drop envisions just how quickly greed and thirst could spark another war between the states.—Preston Peet

Peace Love Weed 3D


Here's a slice of cool wax for the optimistic stoner: Peace Love

Weed 3D, the latest from multi-taskmaster producer/performer/writer Eliot Lipp. Weed 3D originated as drum-machine beats and synth noodling enhanced by samples and Lipp's studio alchemy. Setting Weed 3D apart from his previous endeavors is the inclusion of a live guitarist, a chap named simply "Guitar Ron," whom Lipp met in the subway near his New York studio. Guitar Ron adds an organic element to Weed 3D, elevating it further above generic electronica.

Album launcher "Yeah" gets the party started righteous with some catchy synth jabbing aided by Guitar Ron's jangling rhythms and tasteful picking. The next track, "Proceed," drops in a totally different direction—sublime keys before a laidback groove and

"Sentinel" recalls the stylings of genre innovator Simon Posford, more layered and polyrhythmic trance, before bowing to a fat disco beat that, at the appropriate 4:19 mark, morphs neatly into the shakeyour-bong-thing title track, here rendered as

"Sandcastle" proffers a synth line recalling Sly Stone's "Family Affair." "Lazer Cave" is more overtly experimental, spawning a pastiche of sounds and samples to engage the listener. (Some of Weed 3D's tracks tend to fade into the background, but not "Cave.") Album closer "Beamrider" is pure Lipp: dreamy psych-synth anchored by an old-school rap beat until the chest-poking percussion and more deliberate key-tinkling come to dominate the proceedings. Credit Lipp with formulating a futuristic gestalt that manages to tip its hat to the '70s and '80s in equal measure with his latest release. - Mark Miller







Back in the fall of 1990, there was a Bush in the White House and a war with Iraq. I'd just entered college and had started hosting a heavy metal show at the school's radio station. It was there, amongst the piles of promotional CDs, that I discovered an album entitled Last Decade Dead Century by a poetic protest band called Warrior

Soul. It was some of the most intelligent, outspoken rock music I'd ever heard. Led by charismatically caustic frontman Kory Clarke, the band released five brilliant albums in as many years, including Drugs, God and the New Republic and



I didn't hear the name Kory Clarke again until 2004, when my friends in the band Dirty Rig recruited him as their new singer. That March, the Rig played at my birthday party, and I met Kory for the first time. Turns out he was as big a pothead as I was, and we got along like gangbusters. Soon after, he was a guest on my radio show and even invited me into the recording studio with his new band, the Stoned (featuring former WS bassist Pete McLanahan).

Fast-forward to October 2008: Election Day is fast approaching, and I'm trying to organize a "Smoke the Vote" benefit concert to raise money for NORML, when I get wind that Warrior Soul are about to release a new album (*Chinese Democracy*) and embark on a big comeback tour. I called Kory, and within minutes I had both Warrior Soul and the Stoned signed up to play. With the addition of a few more bands and pot comic Rob Cantrell, the show was on.

For a cold Sunday night, the turnout at New York City's Don Hill's club was not too shabby. Cantrell got things started right with a hilarious half-hour of stoner standup.

"Recession? Fuck—I've been broke this whole time!" Cantrell complained. "But weed gets you through that. You don't give a

fuck if you got a little bit of weed, right? A couple of DVDs, a couch ... that's all I need."

The first band of the evening was Kill-code, who were fresh off the bus from the "Rock the Ink" Festival in Providence, RI—carrying in tow none other than stoner sexpot Mistress Juliya, who'd spent the past three days on tour with them.

Next up were the Stoned (featuring Clarke on drums). They prefaced their set with a few Three Stooges-style slapstick videos they'd produced, including one entitled "Weed-a-Pet" in which the band try to earn their rent by inventing a cannabis Chia Pet. They got the crowd riled with their cock rock anthems "Drunk Drivers From Space" and "Nobody Rides for Free."

Then came Brooklyn's own Black Water Rising (featuring former members of Boiler Room, Stereomud and Dust to Dust). Their first single, "Brother Go On," had been on Sirius Octane's Top 20 list for months, and their sociopolitical melodic

> metal proved a perfect fit for the show's theme.

Finally, it was time for the main event. I took the stage and auctioned off some HT DVDs, a Gravitron gravity bong and a killer glass water pipe (courtesy of

glassartplus.com) before introducing the night's headliners.

"Throughout the '90s, this band spoke out against the oppression and corruption of our government and their corporate masters, and embodied the spirit of art and activism," I declared. "Now, just when we need them most—with another Bush in the White House and another war in Iraq—they're back to remind us that we are the government ... and we rock and roll!"

Warrior Soul hit the stage like a speedbag, ripping out classics like "The Losers," "We Cry Out" and "Punk and Belligerent," as well as their new single, "The Fourth Reich." Granted, this was not the incarnation of the band I worshipped in my college days (Clarke is actually the only original member). Nevertheless, having Warrior Soul headline a gig that I put together was for me the culmination of a decade-long, angst-fueled dream. But alas, it was the end of another dream, for it was also on this night that I officially conceded my candidacy for president and publicly endorsed Barack Obama—giving him the highly coveted Bobby Black Bump.





Behind the Twinkie Defense

November marked the 30th anniversary of the assassination of San Francisco Mayor George Moscone—who, as majority leader of the state senate, passed a bill reducing the penalties for simple marijuana possession—and Supervisor Harvey Milk, the first openly gay man to be elected to public office in America. Although the killer, Dan White, a homophobic former policeman, had already confessed to the murders, he pleaded not guilty in court. I covered his trial for an alternative weekly, the Bay Guardian.

In a surprise move, White's defense team presented a biochemical explanation of his behavior, blaming it on the compulsive gobbling down of sugar-filled junk-food snacks. This was a purely accidental tactic: Dale Metcalf, a former member of Ken Kesey's Merry Pranksters who had become a lawyer, told me how he happened to be playing chess with Steven Scherr, an associate of Dan White's attorney, after having just read Orthomolecular Nutrition by Abram Hoffer. Metcalf questioned Scherr about White's diet and learned that, while under stress, he would consume plenty of candy bars and soft drinks. Metcalf then recommended the book to Scherr, suggesting the author as an expert witness. (In his book, Hoffer revealed a personal vendetta against doughnuts, and White had once eaten five doughnuts in a row!)

And so it came to pass, more or less. During the trial, a psychiatrist testified that on the night before the murders, White had been getting increasingly "depressed about the fact he would not be reappointed" as city supervisor, and "he just sat there in front of the TV set, bingeing on Twinkies." In my notebook, I scribbled the phrase "the Twinkie defense" and wrote about it in my next report. As the San Francisco Chronicle later reported: "During the trial, no one but well-known satirist Paul Krassner—who may have coined the phrase 'Twinkie defense'—played up that angle."

In court, White just sat there impassively, in a state of complete self-control bordering on catatonia, as he listened to an assembly line of psychiatrists tell the jury how out of control of his actions he'd been. One even testified that, "if not for the aggravating fact of junk food, the homicides might not have taken place."

In the wake of the Twinkie defense, a representative of the ITT-owned Continental Baking Company asserted that the notion that overdosing on the cream-filled goodies could lead to murderous behavior was "poppycock" and "crap"—apparently two of the artificial ingredients in Twinkies, along with sodium pyrophosphate and yellow dye—while another spokesperson for the company couldn't believe "that a rational jury paid serious attention to that issue."

Nevertheless, some jurors did. One remarked after the trial that "it sounded like Dan White had hypoglycemia."

Attorney Doug Schmidt's closing argument became almost an apologetic parody of his own defense presentation. He told the jury that White did not have to be "slobbering at the mouth" to be subject to diminished capacity. Nor, he said, was this simply a case of "eat a Twinkie and go crazy."



Each juror originally had to swear devotion to the criminal-justice system. Yet it was this very system that allowed for the shrewd Schmidt's transmutation of a double political execution into the mere White Sugar Murders.

On the 50th anniversary of the Twinkie's creation, inventor James Dewar said: "Some people say Twinkies are the quintessential junk food, but I believe in the things. I fed them to my four kids, and they feed them to my 15 grandchildren. Twinkies never hurt them." A year later, the world's largest Twinkie was unveiled in Boston. It was 10 feet long, 3 feet 6 inches high, 3 feet 8 inches wide, and weighed more than a ton.

In January 1984, Dan White was released from prison. He had served a little more than five years. The estimated shelf life of a Twinkie is seven years; that's two years longer than White spent behind bars. So when he was released, those Twinkies in his cupboard were still edible. But maybe, instead of eating them, he should have had them bronzed.

Almost two years later, in October 1985, White committed suicide by carbon-monoxide poisoning in his garage. He taped a note to the windshield of his car that read: "I'm sorry for all the pain and trouble I've caused."

I was in a position to accept his apology, since I had gotten caught in the post-verdict riot and was beaten by a couple of cops. My posture was affected, my gait became increasingly twisted, and ultimately, as a result, I now walk with the aid of a cane. At the airport, I have to put my cane on the conveyor belt along with my overnight bag and shoes, but then I'm handed an orange-colored wooden cane by security to go through the metal detector. You just never know what could be hidden inside a cane. *

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

Peter Tosh spoke and sang for all of us, and his entry into the annals of our history felt long overdue. Songs like "Legalize It," "Na Goa Jail (Fe Ganja No More)" and "What'cha Gonna Do?" clearly highlight the injustice of pot prohibition in a powerful and enduring way. As we contemplated the many jars filled with herb that we were about to partake in, my only regret was that Peter himself wasn't here to enjoy the fruits of his creative energies and labor. Luckily for all of us, his sons Andrew and David were able to bless the Cup with their presence and help us in judging the many weeds and hashes, as well as reminisce about the incredible legacy their dad left to our cause. We were also honored to be joined by reggae historian and Tosh friend Roger Steffens and his lovely wife Mary; getting a chance to speak to him over a spliff or two proved to be one of the many highlights of the Cup.

"Ras Rogah," as he's known by the many epic musical artists he's befriended and interviewed over the years, showed us never-beforeseen photos and videos and spoke eloquently about his many interactions with Peter Tosh, Bob Marley and other pot-celebrating reggae musicians. I asked him about the honor of dedicating this particular Cup to Peter, and he told me: "Nobody did more to advance the conscious use of marijuana—nor suffered the consequences more severely—than Peter Tosh. He blew smoke in the face of authority and wrote the anthem ['Legalize It'] that the entire world still sings." Years ago, Peter even told Roger that it was against his religion not to smoke herb.




One of the best new ways to ingest THC was via the bottled tinctures on display, with both THSeeds and DNA Genetics sharing their booths with product competitors to highlight their unique sensi sprays. These ingenious devices allow you to mist an alcohol extract directly onto your tongue for easy absorption and a very quick and effective impact. Both the M-Spray (made with MK-Ultra) and Pocket Alchemy (available in three different flavors) were hailed as quite an innovation for medical and recreational cannabis users alike.

On Monday night, it was time for the highly anticipated Green House Party at the Melkweg featuring Ky-Mani Marley. The son of Bob Marley and Jamaican table-tennis champion Anita Belnavis, Ky-Mani combines covers of his father's great tunes with rousing renditions of his own originals. One in particular—"Dear Dad," Ky-Mani's heartfelt and achingly personal tribute to his father, written at the tender age of 15—brought many in the audience to tears. On that touching note, Ky-Mani quickly shifted into party mode, puffing on a huge spliff of Green House's Super Lemon Haze and blasting out an excellent mashup of "Rebel Music" into "Three O'Clock Roadblock" into a "One Love" encore for the ages.

And woe betide any judge who missed the late-night post-Ky-Mani show next door at the Melkweg Old Haal, where the Cannabis Cup Band ripped through song after song, both covers and originals, with a glorious abandon. Singer Rocker T in particular seemed possessed with the spirit of the moment, kicking off one incredible tune after another until the sweat-soaked band and audience alike were left in a state of mingled exhaustion and exhilaration.









Coming in Hot!

Tuesday provided a well-earned respite, and the opportunity to walk around the Cup Expo at the PowerZone and check out the many sponsors and booths set up inside. It was fascinating to see the varied aspects of cannabis culture arrayed in one space, with seeds, nutrients, all-

in-one ganja grow boxes and glass water pipes all on display. Cannabis samples abounded, and most of the booths provided at least one way to get high.

The Delta 9 Labs guys, Ed and Harry, had set up an ingenious Vapo Tent, in which two Volcanos pumped away to provide a full-body vaporization experience. They were premiering their Brainstorm Haze x G-13, and having tried and chosen their Brainstorm Haze as one of the Top 10 Strains of 2008 (Dec. '08 HT), I was quite interested to see what the infusion of male G-13 pollen would produce. I was not disappointed.

Don and Aaron of DNA Genetics were still buzzing from the thrill of finding that three of the seven chosen coffeeshop strains had been grown from their beans. They told me about their new line of feminized seeds, which was bred especially for the burgeoning bud market in Spain, where growers these days won't buy seeds unless they're feminized.

Greenlife Seeds, out of western Canada, brought back the tradition of having live ganja plants on display in their booth. Paradise Seeds went one step further, revealing a couple of "selfed" plants from which they get their feminized seeds. These forced hermies are the lifeblood of the feminized-seed biz, but it's quite

rare to see them up close and personal. In past years, such beautiful plants would grace the booths of many seed vendors, and it was a welcome sight to find them back in their rightful place, front and center at the Cannabis Cup. Paradise Seeds also won second place in the Seed Company Sativa category for their De La Haze, proving that this company is truly here to stay.

Meanwhile, over at Soma's booth, judge after judge sampled some of the finest hash and best-cured cannabis to be found anywhere in Europe.

Soma's organically grown beans and buds continue to provide a benchmark for quality.

Downstairs, THSeeds unveiled their newest strains, the A-Train Wreckage and Rambo—a new Jamaican-based monster hybrid perfect for outdoor guerrilla gardeners. The boys had set up a throne for the Trichome Challenge, a videotaped bong-hit competition broadcast on their big-screen TV. And their Hemp Hoodlamb line has evolved from the original winter coats with fake fur trim into a whole array of products featuring hemp fabrics, eco-friendly inks and simple street-wise style.

Anyone who stopped by Bubbleman's booth was treated to a bubble-hash-making demonstration as well as extremely potent bong hits of full-melt hashish. The cured and freshly made ice-water-extracted trichomes packed quite a punch, with a spicy flavor and thick smoke that expands in the lungs to provide an instant buzz.

Great pot from the UK was well represented, too. Big Buddha smoked me out with a bunch of his latest "gear," including the G-Bomb, the Kali, Buddha Haze and Chiesel, all incredibly potent and tasty and available in feminized form.

Amsterdam Fights Coffeeshop Crackdown

Amsterdam Mayor Job Cohen is lobbying Holland's Justice Ministry to give the city an exemption from national rules that would prohibit coffee shops from operating within 250 meters of schools. The regulations would take effect by the end of 2011.

On November 21, 43 of Amsterdam's 228 cannabis-selling coffee shops received notices that they were in violation of the new ordinance.

Mayor Cohen argues that the Dutch federal government's directive is misguided. Along with city alderman, who have voted overwhelmingly to challenge the issue, the mayor believes that the cafes are already well regulated in regard to youth. Coffee shops are off limits to those under the age of 18; violators can lose their license.

More than a quarter of the country's cafes are in Amsterdam, where they are visited by around 25 percent of all tourists who visit the city.

Christian Democrat Justice Minister Ernest Hirsch Balin has hinted that he might be flexible on the school zone law.

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


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Ready for Judgment

With voting in effect all day Thursday (the final day of the Cup), the judges took their time filling out their ballots in the spacious lounge upstairs. I also took my time to partake in some of the incredible hashish entries. After the beautiful chunks were photographed, they were distributed among Cup staffers to be smoked and shared with attendees. Two of my personal favorites were the Triple Zero from Barney's (first-place winner of the Import Hash Cup) and the always-reliable Grey Crystal from the Grey Area (third-place winner for Neder or Dutch Hash).

The first-place overall Cannabis Cup for coffeeshops went to the Green House for their newest shop, Green House United, where the buds and hash are only rivaled by the meals, the drinks and the overall comfort level. The accompanying strain, Super Lemon Haze, was a superb sativa, wellgrown and with subtle tastes of citrus and pine.

Second place went to last year's winner, Barney's Breakfast Bar, one of the most consistently chronic shops around, with a wonderful variety of quality cannabis and hashish on the menu along

with some of the dam. Their Utopia Haze cut through the fog with a unique flavor and a euphoric "up" high that's perfect for roaming the streets

and canals of this old merchant city.

The third-place coffeeshop winner, Green Place, was a first-time entrant in the Cup, and it's a perfect spot for locals and tourists alike, with a super-friendly staff and great weed and hash. Considered a dark horse and an unlikely challenger to the powerhouse shops, Green Place won many judges over with their properly grown and wellcured cannabis. You can tell they take great pride in their product, and the location is hard to beat.

After the awards show at the PowerZone, everyone headed over to the Melkweg for a cathartic final concert featuring many of the artists who'd been performing all week. Each singer gave it his or her all, knowing that in all likelihood they wouldn't be gracing a stage together again anytime soon. Recognizing the intensity of the moment, several were flooded with joy and emotion that soon spilled into the crowd, creating an amazing irie vibe that carried us through the evening.

Heading back to the airport the next day, and all through our preparations to return to our supposedly "free" country, we couldn't help but feel a little melancholy. How much longer would the coffeeshop scene last in Amsterdam? How many more vears of tolerance are left? And how could we possibly choose to leave this incredible place?

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
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
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self, to forget which way is forward.

So I poked my head into the various rooms to see what we were dealing with. The thick, super-sweet aroma immediately reminded me that I was in Holland and that Super Silver Haze abounds.

I took a deep breath in as my mood transitioned to mellow, and then I returned to the trim room. I looked around the table for familiar faces, but realizing that I didn't actually know anyone there, I began to introduce myself.

Chunga's army was a very cool, old-school lot. There was Phil, who according to legend was the pioneer who first brought hydroponic growing to Holland some 25 years ago. Then there was Bert, the jolliest bloke of them all. The Queen's Croquet Field


Inside the growrooms, a team of fairies was working with gentle fervor, in rhythmic fashion.

Stroke after stroke, the branches went tumbling down into boxes. One of the fairies leaned over and handed me a box. "Off with their heads," she said with a wink.

I grabbed a pair of scissors and began lopping off the huge colas and placing them on drying racks along the walls. Soon these racks were taken away to the trimming table and replaced by fresh screens. I took a minute to survey the room and make some calculations in my head.

"We only have 200 plants here," said a voice. It was Chunga, reading my thoughts.

The garden was grown in glorious Dutch fashion, but with a slight twist: Large rockwool cubes were stacked on top of coco slabs, a departure from the all-rockwool or uniform-medium approach. It's very ingenious, and showed a certain level of consideration not only for organic farming, but for security and the environment as well,

because Chunga is able to reuse the coco slabs multiple times. Between crops, the coco fiber is treated with a small amount of lime to neutralize the pH and prevent possible root problems in the next round of plants due to pH fluctuations. Reusing the coco also means less-frequent trips to the dump and less pre- and post-processing of medium.

Additional security measures had been added as well, including industrial-strength carbon filters to cut down on the smell, and insulated fan boxes and soundproofing foam on the walls and windows to scale back noise. Contrary to popular belief in the US, growing marijuana for commercial production under artificial light is illegal in the Netherlands. (Small amounts cultivated outdoors for personal consumption are tolerated, but still iffy.) Unfortunately, for many growers, anything grown inside—especially a setup like Chunga's farm—requires just as much attention to security as it would in the United States. So Chunga takes extra precautions to protect his ladies.

The plants themselves were stunning. Chunga feeds them via spaghetti lines that are fed from larger tubes hooked up to a 50-gallon-drum reservoir. There, a nutrient solution is mixed once a week and then dispersed twice daily for a few minutes at a time, depending on what stage the gardens are in. Timers activate pumps within the barrel reservoir to automate the feeding system. The garden itself sits atop a raised platform that is slightly angled to aid in drainage. All waters drain to waste after being collected in a run-off gutter on the side of the table. The gutter funnels the water through the wall into a bathroom with a sewer connection. This helps keep the rooms fresh and prevents pools of stagnant water from collecting.

The sweetest part, however, was the strain being grown—and not just because of its flavor (though it was very sweet-tasting). Although Chunga has been at this location for well over a decade, he's only been growing

this Super Silver Haze for the past 10 years or so. Before finally settling on the Haze, Chunga tried his luck with various strains such as **Hindu Kush**, Super Skunk and Power Plant.

"The decision was easy," Chunga said regarding his choice of the **Super Silver Haze**. And how could it not be? This specific phenotype was selected in the days when Shantibaba was still breeding (on his own) in Holland, almost 12 years ago. Those genetics are supposedly linked to the same lineage that Neville, the Godfather of Dutch breeding, developed himself.

This puts Chunga in a very favorable position with his market competitors. The **Super Silver Haze**, which is reminiscent of the **Jack Herer** strains of North America, is a widespread strain, used by Dutch growers all over Holland. Many new hybrids have hints of Super Silver in both their taste and smell. But Chunga's variety is a true original, making it easy for him to move his kilos to any coffeeshop he wants.





Advice From a Caterpillar

It's always special to come back from a trip and realize that you've learned a lesson or two. And it's especially gratifying when those lessons help you grow beyond the garden.

Chunga is a man who thrives on being an outlaw. His spirit, although different from some, is really, in the end, a kindred one that we all share. I thought about this on the train back to Amsterdam. The trip, as usual, was very reflective for me.

Here, among the thousands of Cup-goers, you could find a whole range of people that you might expect at a cannabis convention. There were the small-time growers and hobbyists, the college students, the first-time smokers and the super-potheads. There were coffeeshop owners, seed breeders and seed-bank owners, commercial growers and large-format plantation operators ... and they were all here, in this country, in this town, at this venue, together at the same time and for the same reason. And yet I couldn't get my head around it—the one binding element that at the moment seemed to escape me, eluding my mind as I strived for that single revelation.

Then, suddenly, I remembered why I was here in the first place. Just like that, the very question that had started my day turned out to contain the answer. I remembered a conversation between a father and his confused son. I remembered him asking me the hard questions about life's priorities and about chasing money versus being happy. I remembered an uncle telling me that you had to live your life for yourself, and I remembered the day I took that first step, telling myself to never look back.

The truth is that we all have that moment buried somewhere deep inside. If you can dig deep enough to find it, you might just find that our answers are the same. If the person that you truly are is that inner person you believe in most, it's easy to understand why we do what we do. That is why we were all

here in Amsterdam: celebrating who we are and what we believe in, together.

"Yes, you. Who are you, to ride for free?" he continued in a jesting kind of tone. "Do you not have tickets then?"

As the windmills whizzed by outside, I noticed that their arms were motionless. They just stood there, majestic and beautiful, as if time were standing still. What a perfect day.


I felt so good I almost cried. I again felt the same passion that once sparked that fire in each of us, calling us to duty, calling us to the cause.







strains of success

Whether you were there in Amsterdam with us, or missed out this time around, behold... here are the world's best buds of 2008.

Utopia Haze

1st Place Sativa Cup, Breeder's Buds & 2nd Place Cannabis Cup, Coffeeshop Buds Barney's Farm

How do they do it? Barney's Farm, once again taking home prestigious first place in the Breeder's Cup, have finally gotten their first win in the *sativa* category. It's mind-baffling how many Cups Derry and Sissi consistently take home, let alone the fact that this was their first top finish in *sativas*.

The **Utopia Haze**, a ludicrously pure Brazilian strain, is a straight jungle variety with absolutely no genetic modifications. The master growers from Barney's have kept the line pure, only backcrossing selected plants with stronger genetics from the same line, resulting in the stabilization of the desired phenotypes. Apparently, the celebrity judging panel desired these phenos too!

Grown both indoors and out, the Brazilian genetics lend themselves to warm climates and do particularly well under the sun's natural light. The initial selection for this plant was massive, with the growers planting over 3,500 seeds in an outdoor plantation. With a sweet and spicy Haze flavor and super *sativa* high, the **Utopia** Haze was a top pick across the board at this year's Cannabis Cup.

De La Haze

2nd Place *Sativa* Cup, Breeder's Buds **Paradise Seeds**

The De La Haze is an extremely potent sativa variety that has a beautiful aroma containing hints of citrus and mango, but with that typical dominant Haze scent.

The high is a creeper, but stays clear in the head and adds a pleasant and suiting body effect after a short while that helps balance the stone. In general, its euphoric, uplifting high is not psychedelic or trippy.

For growers, the yields are large, and the plant finishes early for a sativa (approximately nine weeks indoors). For the fullest effects, let her flower an extra week, which will result in very fine, Hazy sativa flowers. These plants will become fat, since they grow multiple branches filled with clusters of buds. It is suggested that growers induce flowering early on in the vegetative stage before they get too big!


Kushadelic

Nico's 2009 Cup Pick

Soma Seeds

It was heartbreaking that this line didn't make the cut on all the judges' scorecards this year, but it missed placing in the *Indica* Cup by a very narrow margin. One of Soma Seeds' latest masterpieces, the **Ku**shadelic has a powerful stone and sharp bite in its taste.

This plant, a hybrid of **OG Kush** x **G-13** (male), produced dense nugs, looking slightly darkish like an old **Bubba Kush** might. This year, the entry was particularly well cured, a



rarity for many strains grown in Holland. The buds ground up nicely and burned perfectly when rolled. The taste was sour and chronic—a true connoisseur's flavor, reminiscent of the original Chem-D.

Perhaps the best part of the Kushadelic was its cut-through high. Perhaps one of the most potent stones of the Cup, this was one strain you had to be careful not to smoke at the wrong time or you'd be at risk of getting lost, losing your cell phone and sitting in the park for hours. But then again, what else would you expect from Soma?

Mount Cook

1st Place Indica Cup, Breeder's Buds

Kiwi Seeds

Mount Cook (or Aoraki, as it's known among the Maori) is the highest and most majestic mountain in New Zealand, and Kiwi Seeds has certainly produced a plant that lives up to the name! During judging sessions high up in the Temple, Mount Cook's jar never left the top shelf. It was repeatedly challenged, but its deep indica stone and Kushy flavor dwarfed the other contenders.

Mount Cook is an *indica* hybrid, with the mother coming from Afghani/Thai roots. She was selected out of hundreds of females in a Kiwi Seeds breeding program that was carried out in NZ in 1998. She was picked for her short flowering times, THC content and compact structure, as well as her fruity taste and aroma.

The resulting plant was finally brought back to Holland in clone form, and after much trial and error crossing her with various males, a suitable pollen donor was found. The chosen father came in the form of a **Northern Lights** x Hash **Pl**ant that had been used in a previous hybrid from Kiwi Seeds called **Milky Way**.

Mount Cook comes with all those familiar *indica* characteristics: lovely deep-green leaves; short, thick stems and branches; plus fat, pungent buds coated in snow-like crystals.

The smoke is heavy and stony, almost paralyzing. Although a little longer than some *indicas*, **Mount Coo**k has a reasonable flowering time and good yield, making her a great choice for indoor gardens.

Cheese

2nd Place *Indica* Cup, Breeder's Buds

Homegrown Fantaseeds

"Mouth-watering" is the only way to describe this year's Cheese rendition from Homegrown Fantaseeds. Of all the sweet tastes at this year's Cup, this strain was the clear winner on flavor. With strong hints of Blueberry and above-average potency, this *indica* was a clear challenger from the onset.

Afghani lineage provides this variety with its strength, which gives it a very sedating high with virtually no ceiling. Generally known to be a good yielder, this stocky plant is easily kept short for indoor gardens.

LSD

3rd Place *Indica* Cup, Breeder's Buds

Amnesia Seeds

Fast becoming a perennial contender, Amnesia did it again this year, absolutely knocking us out with their latest Sour rendition, the Lemon Sour Diesel (or LSD, as it was known around Amsterdam). This latest cut was comparable to last year's winning Top Dawg, though this version might be bigger on taste.

The LSD definitely took on a more citrus-like flavor, bolstering its already sour taste and adding a unique twist to what has always been a popular variety. Its cut-through Sour Diesel aroma resembles the true East Coast Diesel, known for its candy flavor and balanced high. However, its sourness probably comes from its grandparents, whose roots run deep to original Afghani genetics. Those genetics then produced the mighty Mazar, one of the direct parents of the LSD. The Mazar was crossed with another, older strain—an original Skunk variety that, if it's selected for, can also produce sourness rather than the sweetness that some newer Skunks are known for.

In the end, the final product carries the kind of powerful, stony high that one would expect from an award-winning *indica*. For those of you looking for a happy high and fresh flavor, this plant will make a great grow at home!

Super Lemon Haze

1st Place Cannabis Cup, Coffeeshop Buds

Green House

A phenomenon that is fast becoming a trend, the lemon flavor just can't be beat! And leave it to none other than Arjan, owner of the Green House chain of coffeeshops, to take it to the next level. Combining that super lemon flavor with his best Haze to create the Super Lemon Haze, Arjan once again has mastered his constituents' taste buds.

A subtle citrus aroma complements the fuller Haze smell that comes out of each nugget. The buds themselves are denser than your typical *sativa*, making yields on this plant surprisingly bigger than usual. The high associated with this smoke is uplifting and exciting: A good party-time bud, the buzz can carry you away and get you moving in the right direction.

As always, the Green House coffeeshops provided an excellent backdrop for this year's Cannabis Cup, and the final 4:20 party—which is held every year the day after closing ceremonies at the winning coffee house—was a class act. From the glass floors with koi fishponds underneath to the lavish wall paintings upstairs and great food and drink all around, the Green House never disappoints.

Canals line the streets out front, but the interior is lined with flat-panel plasma screens for football matches, and the back of the house opens up a bit with a loungey feel. Oddly enough, Mo, the shop's owner,

Let's just say all our lungs were torn up by the end of that trip. When it breaks down, though, my real favorite is any sort of Diesel: Sour Diesel, Cotton Candy Diesel, Diesel, Diesel-I love that shit. The strong aroma and taste you get? Nothing compares.

SHACK ATTACK

With all this talk about smoking and snowboarding, HIGH TIMES thought it only fitting that we put together our own team of riders and head out to hit the slopes in search of the ultimate stoner smoke shacks.

Big or small, smoke shacks are a part of every mountain's terrain and counterculture. They provide a common place for snowboarders and skiers to come together and take a break from the mountain weather, to puff down and relax before getting back to business. Also, some of the best nuggets we've ever been handed have come from a fellow smoker in some shack hidden on the side of a mountain resort.

This trip was no different. Stacked with a couple ounces of Bling and Chemdog and a badass crew of snowboarders, we went from shack to shack, resort to resort. We matched bowls, bongs and whatever else we could find to smoke out of with locals and fellow stoners, trying to get the scoop on these secret hemp havens.

You'll rarely just roll up on a smoke shack unless you wander out of bounds. Most of the folks that build these places create them for a core group of friends and spread the location by word of mouth, in order to keep them from getting torn down by the ski patrol or compromised by not-so-friendly authorities. So, with respect to the builders and stoners who enjoy these havens, we can only hope you'll be as lucky as us and find some kind locals to take you to a few of these amazing shacks, which can be found on ski slopes across the country.

The first time we went out, we were taken to a bunch of shacks that looked more like huts. These were built halfway into the ground and constructed using small trees and branches from the surrounding area. One of the huts had a log rail built into the roof that ran over the doorway of the shack, allowing some people to get ripped inside while others hit the rail just above their heads. After a proper "safety meeting," the team lined up to

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hit the narrow rail feature, which was tucked in between the tight trees.

On our second trip, we saw a few places that have to be considered among the crown jewels of smoke shacks. Actually, I don't know if calling them "smoke shacks" does them justice: People pay thousands of dollars for apartments that aren't anywhere near as well-built. Rumor has it that these masterpieces were created by a group of framing carpenters who decided to put up shacks so nicely designed that nobody would want to tear them down.

The shack that we were taken to was two stories tall and about 1,000 square feet inside. The multiple rooms had been decorated and tagged by various guests over the years: You could find scrawls from places as far-flung as Europe and Australia carved and painted onto the walls. In

one of the rooms, there was a speaker system with a cord that allowed you to plug in your iPod while chilling. After another proper "safety meeting," the crew got back to work trying to one-up each other with tricks they could pull off this epic smoke hut. The guys launched off the roof pulling method airs and 180s.

On the second day of the trip, we were taken to a structure that was built about 20 feet in the air between a few trees. It looked like something out of Ewok Village in Star Wars. In order to get into the shack, you had to climb up a bunch of two-by-fours that were nailed between two of the trees supporting the structure. Once you reached the top, you were treated to an amazing view that took in the entire valley. At first, we didn't think we'd be able to fit all our guys up there, so we broke up into two teams to take turns catching a buzz in that insane "ultimate smoke tower." Like the one the previous day, this shack was tagged up and decorated with old snowboards and skis to give it a feel and a vibe that I've never come across in all my years of snowboarding.

On the last day of our trip, we took it a little easy and decided to hit up the smoke shack that our tour guide had built with a couple of friends over the summer. He said that it had taken them about two weeks to build, with handsaws, nails and some good chronic. "I got jealous of all these other places, so we decided to make our own," he

told us. "Other than our local crew, you're the only peeps that we've brought to it. It may not be the biggest or baddest, but it's ours, and we rock the shit out of it."

If you're a stoner snowboarder or skier, smoke shacks are a part of your day on the slopes. There's always the "ganjola" and the lifts, but nothing compares to riding up to a proper smoke shack and sharing a phatty in comfort with some friends. So keep the smoke signals coming, and maybe one day you'll find our team rolling up to twist one with you!—BC

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KNKY AS KNKY CAN BE

The HIGH TIMES Interview with Kinky Friedman. By David Bienenstock

This could have been Kinky Friedman's year. Instead, three days after one of the most historic elections in the history of democracy, he's sitting on a patio chair outside a random hotel in Bethesda, MD, contemplatively smoking a cigar and talking politics with two reporters from HIGH TIMES. Meanwhile, Barack Obama has just electric-landslided his way into office on a wave of young and first-time voters—the exact crowd that Friedman, a former chess prodigy and songwriter turned best-selling author, tried to attract three years ago, when he earned 13 percent of the vote as an independent candidate in a three-way race for Texas governor.

It's been an unlikely journey every step of the way for the man affectionately known as "the Kinkster." A Jew raised in Texas, he found his first round of fame as the kind of cowboy singer who croons songs like "Asshole from El Paso," "They Don't Make Jews Like Jesus Anymore," "Get Your Biscuits in the Oven and Your Buns in the Bed," and "Ride 'Em Jewboy"—a personal tribute to the victims of the Holocaust. And while it may not sound like a winning (or even a welcome) act on paper, by letting both the rednecks and the city slickers in on the joke, Kinky and his band of Texas Jewboys rode all the way to gigs on Saturday Night Live and at the Grand Ole Opry—not to mention a slot on Bob Dylan's legendary 1976 "Rolling Thunder Revue" tour.

Then, in our September 1981 issue, HIGH TIMES published "My Scrotum Flew Tourist," and Kinky Friedman began a new, equally unlikely career as a writer of quirky detective novels, almost all of them featuring a familiar, homespun-out narrator named Kinky Friedman. A jokey, folksy and often drunk private investigator, Kinky Friedman—much like his real-life counterpart—eventually found his way into people's hearts, and soon the books (with titles like Armadillos and Old Lace, The Mile High Club, and Kill Two Birds and Get Stoned) began to build a cult readership that would grow to include fans as diverse as Bill Clinton and George W. Bush.

Both presidents invited Kinky to the White House for a visit, and both consider the foul-mouthed firebrand a personal friend. Not that either of them showed up to offer his personal endorsement when Kinky tried to add the job of Texas governor to an already impressively weird résumé. Maybe it had something to do with the fact that the Kinkster calls tequila "Mexican mouthwash," promoted his close friend Willie Nelson as the next head of Texas law enforcement, and got himself embroiled in scandal on the campaign trail after drinking a Guinness on a moving float while he was grand marshal of the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Dallas.

For the record, Mr. Friedman maintains that while he did drink the beer in question, he did not swallow. Either way, we began our interview by showing Kinky a copy of his 1981 masterpiece from the pages of HIGH TIMES.

Do you remember when you wrote that?

Yeah, this was my first published piece of prose. "My Scrotum Flew Tourist"—still one of my best, I'm afraid. I had only written songs before that. I haven't written a song in 25 years now, and don't plan on doing so, for some reason. But sometimes I still hear music in my head as I'm writing.

As part of your run for governor in 2006, you promised to legalize marijuana in Texas. Why did you do that, and what was the reaction from voters?

The reaction was mixed. But it's obviously a great idea: All law enforcement I've talked to agree with me that decriminalization is the way to go. The War on Drugs is not only a failure, but also a real waste of law-enforcement resources. We don't even have room for the pedophiles or the politicians in prison anymore, because we've got so many really minor cases of somebody busted for dope. The answer is putting money into education and treatment. Then you'd see a big difference.

You're close friends with America's most famous marijuana smoker, and a fellow Texan, Willie Nelson. Was he somebody you discussed this issue with before you came out in favor of legalization?

Sure. Willie has advocated changing the marijuana laws for a long time—not by sermonizing, but by living. He's a man that admits to being 75 years old, maybe older, and he plays music for a couple of hours—and then signs autographs for a couple more hours—every single night. You'd think he'd be forgetting all his lyrics and screwing up all the time and stumbling around, but that doesn't happen. I've asked Willie on numerous occasions about this—why he smokes dope, what's his main reason—and he says: "To keep down the rage." Which I think











is a very good answer.

Willie Nelson is living proof that you can lead not only a very successful life, but also a very inspiring life to millions and millions of people, all while so high you need a stepladder to scratch your ass. The last time I was with him, for some reason the dope had an effect that made me extremely happy for hours afterwards. If everyone in the world could feel that good and not cause any harm, there is no reason not to decriminalize marijuana.

You joined the Peace Corps after college. Do you sense that kind of service coming back into our society?

John F. Kennedy inspired millions of people—myself among them—to work for 11 cents an hour on the other side of the world, and to really enjoy it. In fact, many of us think it's the best work we've ever done. If Obama can get that going, he'll really have something. I also think that if a black man can be elected president, a Jew can certainly be elected governor of Texas. I think he's made it easier for me.

One of the things that Obama promised during the campaign is that he'll stop the federal government from interfering with the 13 states that have passed medical-marijuana laws. That's great—because the big problem I have with Democrats in general is that some of them believe that the government is worth a shit.

If medical marijuana is a states'rights issue, why do you think Republicans have been unwilling to
embrace it?
Because they're hypocrites.

Meanwhile, Obama has admitted to smoking marijuana in his youth, but it never really became an issue during the election. Do you think that shows that society's attitudes have

Yeah, I hope they have. Setting priorities is really important—not only for the president, but for the culture as a whole. And if your priority is to hound and pursue marijuana smokers, that's part of a larger trend that's turning our country into a condo association. We already have enough rules—we don't need *more* rules. The same people that were hall monitors when they were young, they grew up and now they're anti-pot people.

George W. Bush is a fan of your mystery novels and invited you to stay at the White House while he was president. How did a guy with such good taste end up shitting the bed so royally?

Bush had some good people around him—he really did. If he'd listened to Laura and his daddy and me, and Condi Rice and Colin Powell, he'd have a real legacy now. But instead, he listened to some bad angels. If you listened to people like Karl Rove and Dick Cheney every morning, your life would be a total disaster too.



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

Do you think pot has gotten stronger since the '70s?

Well, it seems to be stronger, or maybe I'm getting older and less resistant to it. I'm not a connoisseur—I just smoke whatever Willie's smoking. Of course, that's a very high standard. Friends of mine who are big dopers who I've introduced to Willie, several of them have just been absolutely blown away, to the point where they can hardly walk. But it didn't seem to affect me, except to make me really happy. And some of that might be just being with Willie, who is definitely the hillbilly Dalai Lama.

Where do you do most of your writing? I like to write in Texas and Hawaii. I find that even when I'm writing about New York, I do it better on my ranch in the Texas hill country than I do if I'm actually *in* New York. The further you move away from your subject, the more imagination you need to summon up in order to see it clearly.

Do you still enjoy performing as a musician?

Well, not like Willie does. Willie would like to play at your funeral very much; he'd play at your wedding, he'd play at your bar mitzvah—and he does not care which it is. Meanwhile, I'm very ambivalent about performing. There are a few moments where I obtain a Judy Garland-like relationship with the audience during a performance, and those I genuinely enjoy.

Do you think country music has lost its outlaw appeal?

Well, the pendulum has certainly swung the other way. And that's too bad. What Willie and Waylon [Jennings] were trying to do was just for an artist to be able to come up with his own ideas, and his own hours and his own people he wanted to surround himself with, instead of the record company doing all that for him. Today, it's a really fast business, and if you don't have a hit, you're done and nobody else wants you-which is just as well, because you probably weren't very good to begin with. Most of the country stars and the country stuff on the radio, you really have to listen to at gunpoint. What has happened to the cleverness in country music that Roger Miller, Shel Silverstein and Kris Kristofferson brought to it? I don't know, but that's gone, too.

At one point on the famous Nixon tapes recorded in the Oval Office, the

former president tells a high-level White House staffer: "You know, it's a funny thing, every one of the bastards that are out for legalizing marijuana is Jewish. What the Christ is the matter with the Jews?" As a Jew out for legalizing marijuana, care to respond?

That's a strange thing for Nixon to say, except for the fact that the Jews have always been ahead of their time. The Jews have always done interesting and adventurous things; they are artists of humanity. And an artist, as I've always defined it, is someone who's ahead of his time and behind on his rent.

Jews are also the Detective Colombos of the world: always on the outside looking in and observing what's really going on. Many of us have been *participant* observers, and that includes marijuana.

Will you run for governor of Texas again in 2010? And if so, will you continue to call for the legalization of marijuana?


Maybe—and yes. *

New Studies Find Cannabis Helps Prevent Alzheimer's Disease

It's becoming evident with each passing year that cannabis—a drug long blamed for various forms of dementia, including memory loss—is actually more of a solution to these problems than the cause. In studies recently released, it turns out that marijuana is actually able to help ward off Alzheimer's disease—a degenerative and terminal form of dementia that currently affects some 4.5 million Americans—as well as other forms of age-related memory loss.

Alzheimer's disease destroys brain cells, disrupting memory and cognitive capacity. At a November meeting of the Society of Neuroscience in Washington, DC, researchers from Ohio State University reported that THC (tetrahydrocannabinol) can reduce inflammation in the brain and even stimulate the formation of new brain cells. Around the same time, in an issue of the Journal of Biological Chemistry, neurologist David Teplow of the University of California, Los Angeles, reported that polyphenols—naturally occurring components of red wine-block the formation of proteins that create toxic plaques in the brain. In addition, these substances can reduce the toxicity of existing plaques, thereby reducing cognitive deterioration.

At Ohio State, researchers led by psychologist Gary Wenk are studying whether THC produces similarly protective effects. They found that after being administered a THC-like synthetic drug, elderly rats performed better on a memory test than a control group of nonmedicated rodents. In some of the



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rats, the drug apparently lowered inflammation in the hippocampus, the region of the brain responsible for short-term memory. It also seems to have stimulated the generation of new brain cells.

"When we're young, we reproduce neurons and our memory works fine," said Ohio State psychologist Yannick Marchalant, a coauthor of the report. "When we age, the process slows down, so we have a decrease in new cell formation in normal aging. You need those cells to come back and help form new memories, and we found that this THC-like agent can influence creation of those cells." These studies suggest that scientists are gaining a clearer understanding of the mechanics of memory deterioration and discovering some promising approaches to prevention. Based on this research, such approaches may include a new legal drug derived from marijuana that could be used to slow down the effects of Alzheimer's disease.

New Jersey Supports Citizens

Looking to become the 14th state in America to allow the medical use of marijuana to its ill or dying citizens, the New Jersey State Senate's Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee recently voted Bill S119 out of committee by a 6-1 margin. The bill will now move to the full senate for a vote, provided the senate president posts it on the agenda.

The New Jersey Compassionate Use Medical Marijuana Act would benefit patients suffering from a debilitating disease—defined as cancer, glaucoma, HIV and AIDSor chronic illnesses that cause "wasting syndrome, severe or chronic pain, seizures, and severe and persistent muscle spasms." Patients would need a written recommendation from their doctor, as well as a signoff by the state Department of Health and Senior Services, which would issue identification cards confirming their participation. These patients would be exempt from criminal prosecution by the state for possessing up to six plants and one ounce of usable marijuana, according to the bill.

The 14 states that have already enacted medical-marijuana laws are Alaska, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Rhode Island, Vermont and Washington. While the victory is only a small step forward in New Jersey, there are a number of other states currently battling for the rights of their sick constituents by working toward medical-marijuana laws, among them New York, Massachusetts and Minnesota.

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
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Ganja, Grunge and Gumbo

Louisiana meets the Pacific Northwest to stew over a revitalized classic.

This fast and easy ganja-gumbo recipe for two was provided courtesy of a farmer named Michael, who once strangled Kurt Cobain over a fifth of Jägermeister on a dark and riff-filled evening. It wasn't random: Nirvana's first Seattle gig was as the opener for Michael's band, Blood Circus, and both were on the Sub Pop label. They were, in effect, the Godfathers of Grunge. So after Cobain weaseled the majority of Michael's ridermandated bottle of Jäg one night while the latter was onstage, Michael finished the set and then choked him. It had to be done.

While he may have raged back at the dawn of the plaid-and-smack era, these days our guest chef is laid-back in an eco-epicurean, gritty-Zenrocker sort of way. After years of toiling and excelling in both the culinary and cultivation worlds, he's gearing up to move to Belize, where he plans to build environmentally sustainable affordable housing with Super Adobe construction methods, Cool.

Michael's from an island in Washington, so I initially had some misplaced regional doubts about the integrity of his gumbo-cooking method. We Louisianans invented the dish, and we're predominantly Catholic party animals—therefore, not many of us can get away with cooking for only two people. Big gatherings plus the ubiquitous progeny inevitably result in cauldron-like swamp pots of simmering goodness stirred with spoons the size of boat oars. So I was naturally suspicious of the whole concept of feeding only two. Must be a Pacific Northwest thing, I thought to myself; they must be so isolated, what with all that rain and salmon and angst over which fabulous strains to smoke

Furthermore, until now I've rarely seen anything fast or easy about making gumbo. It generally involves baiting up some crab traps with chicken necks, driving to the seafood joint



to buy fresh shrimp, and then waiting in trepidation for the inevitable battle with the angry crabs that have become entangled in their wire-mesh doom. It also requires laboriously conjuring up some roux, crossing my fingers, doing the gris-gris dance and hoping it'll all turn out okay, or at least consistent. Because where I live, everyone's a gumbo critic, and the bigger the pots, the more critics you attract. Plus, although there are dozens of ways to make gumbo, if someone tells you there are no hard and fast rules, they lie. LIE!

First, you have to make the roux. (If you don't, it's just soup.) Next, add the Holy Trinity: onions, bell peppers and celery in equal measures, diced. You can use okra, or you can use filé (pronounced fee-lay-powdered sassafras leaves), but you can't use both: Bad things will happen if you do. I don't know what bad things precisely, but it must be so, since nobody mixes okra and filé. Other than that, it's anybody's game—you can throw in beer, squirrels, leftover turkey, whatever. Most people just use some combination of chicken, sausage and seafood, though.

And Michael? You totally nailed this one. The next bottle of Jägermeister is on me. - Ashley

GANJA GUMBO FOR TWO

¼ cup green pepper, diced

¼ cup onion, diced

¼ cup celery, diced

1-3 grams ganja (depending on potency)

1 pinch each of dried oregano, thyme and rosemary

Caiun spices and cavenne to taste

1 tbsp minced garlic

4 cups chicken stock

½ cun nkra, sliced

1 chicken thigh, cooked and diced

1 Andouille sausage (approximately 5 oz)

1 small gumbo crab

(top shell, lungs and intestines removed)

4 large shrimp


5 oz fish, cubed in 1-inch pieces

2 tbsp oil (not olive)

2 tbsp flour

DIRECTIONS: Heat the soup pan with oil, but not too hot. Add flour, whisking constantly over low heat until it turns caramel brown with a nutty (not burnt) smell. Never stop stirring: If you stop stirring the roux, you will destroy the gumbo. Add peppers, onions, celery, garlic, ganja and spices with a touch of stock to sauté in the roux. Continue slowly adding stock to thin the mixture as needed. Add meat and seafood. Simmer on low heat for 25 minutes. Serve over rice. Stones 2.

Note: Personally, I'd rather combine the ganja with the oil before adding the flour, but this was still a righteous dish. *

Sure—lots of folks don't get high the first time they use cannabis. States with big immigrant populations passed such ordinances first. California's law appeared on the books in 1915, with Texas following suit in 1919. Perhaps because Mormon missionaries started bringing cannabis back from their trips to Mexico, Utah also prohibited the plant in 1915. Check out the late, great Charles Whitebread's book *The Marijuana Conviction* for more details.

FREEDOM FIGHTER

GUARDIAN ANGELA

Angela Goodhope makes news in Montana.

It's not every day that you meet someone whose very name perfectly embodies a unique quality found within that individual— but that's exactly the case with Montana's own "angel of good hope."

The aptly named Angela Goodhope has been working for cannabis-law reform in the state for over 10 years. In addition to organizing the Global Marijuana March several times in the past decade, she now serves as the field director for a statewide nonprofit that she co-founded, Citizens for Responsible Crime Policy (CRCP), and as the vice president of the Montana Hemp Council (MHC).

In 2006, Angela was a spokeswoman and signature-campaign manager for I-2, a controversial ballot measure that asked local officials to treat adult marijuana offenses as their lowest law enforcement priority. The initiative was approved in November 2006 by 56 percent of the voters in Missoula County, with some urban precincts reporting over 80 percent support.

Goodhope has been serving on the I-2 Community Oversight Committee ever since, pressuring local officials to heed the public's clearly stated intentions. Her leadership in cannabis-law reform in Montana has given us all reason to be hopeful. And she's just getting started.—ASP

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You've germinated seeds. You've budded huge monsters outdoors as well as in. You can tell the sex of a cannabis plant from across a crowded growroom, as well as whether it's sativa or indica. But the mere thought of cloning causes brain strain, giving you a tightness in your chest or that familiar sleepy feeling. Wake up! This is my own tried-and-true, personal-best method for taking clones from my favorite mother plants. Best of all, it's cheap and super-simple: Anyone with a healthy plant and a little desire can turn that one mother into literally thousands of duplicate cuttings that will have the exact same genetics and behavior as the original mom.

Cloning is the current word for what your grandmother used to call "taking cuttings"—and just like her, the process hasn't changed much over the years. Some wild plants can be rooted by sticking them into a glass of water or directly into moist soil; cannabis won't root using this method, but the cuttings will survive for weeks in a glass of water until you're ready to use them (just be sure to change the water from time to time).

From constant trial and error, I have found that pure water or even a mild hydroponic spray will keep the cutting so moist that rooting is actually delayed—i.e., too much of a good thing. Rockwool is designed to provide a roughly 50/50 water-to-air ratio if it's not overwatered, and experience has shown me that keeping rockwool on the dry side is advantageous to explosive rooting. The only problem here is that you're living on a razor's edge: Hydroponic plants will immediately wilt and sometimes die if the rockwool is allowed to dry out (or even get a touch too dry), but if you overwater it, fungus gnats, mold and green algae will have a field day devouring the nutrients in competition with your new clones—to say nothing of their tender new roots.




WHAT TO DO?

First, forget about expensive, finicky and non-recyclable rockwool altogether: It's itchy and bitchy when it comes to over- or underwatering. And forget those jiffy-style peat pucks as well, the ones that come compressed and swell up in water—they work fine as far as it goes, but only offer 1.5 to 2 inches of contact area for roots to form from the newly cut stem. Also, both rockwool and peat pucks need a tray-anddome setup, and those 10-by-20-inch plastic trays aren't very durable. Sure, if you're planning to grow for a little while and then quit, these minor expenses won't be enough to make or break you (and no, I didn't say "wake and bake"). But when you've been growing for a decade or more, you start to see areas where you can cut costs without cutting quality. And sometimes these cost-cutting and time-saving ideas will make for healthier, happier plants—more so, even, than the expensive ways.

Here's one of them. Get yourself some 20-ounce plastic beer cups. They're usually red, sometimes blue, and the staple ingredient of any successful keg party—plus they cost about five bucks for a few hundred, and they're the key ingredient in this super-simple cloning method.

Next, get yourself a bag or bale of Pro-Mix HP or any other peat-based soilless mix (like Sam's Club potting soil). This is all you'll need—except for a razor blade or sharp scissors to make the final cut, and your favorite liquid nutrients.

Most rooting hormones, from Superthrive to willow bark, contain NAA (naphthylacetic acid), a hormone that regulates plant growth, while indole butyric acid (IBA) is the leading hormone used to promote the formation of roots in plants. Dip'N Grow utilizes both, and I've been using it exclusively for



The final choice you have to make is whether or not to poke holes in the bottom of your cups. If you don't have a drill—or you just don't feel like it—then don't. Fuck it! I said this method was super-simple, didn't !?


First, fill your cups to the top with soilless mix. Then cut a long-stemmed clone from your mother plant. Take a whole lower branch—these are chronologically the oldest and will root the fastest. Trim off all the lower branches on a stem at least 6 inches long, but preferably 9 or more inches long. You can even use a 12-inch-long clone by simply bending the stem without breaking it, putting the loop into a cup and then filling the cup with soil. As long as you have a growing top and at least two fan leaves, the clone will prosper.

Once each cup is filled with soil and you've inserted your cutting, simply water it with 4 ounces of half-strength vegetative-growth food/water solution. Water each cup evenly and then place it a few inches beneath a fluorescent light.

In a week or two, the cuttings will have started to root. Fertilize the plants lightly; when they start to grow bigger, you can give them a full-strength fertilization before transplanting them into the next-size container. This method is great whether you have only one or two clones to maintain or want to do hundreds at a time. If you drill holes in your cups and put trays under them, you can also water from the bottom for even better root growth. With a minimum of 5 inches of stem touching moist soil, the little plant will just about continue growing while busting roots. Humidity domes aren't necessary here, either: The plant is still pulling moisture from the stem, so the leaves aren't trying to suck water from the air (thereby delaying proper root formation).







WHY IS THIS METHOD SO VERSATILE?

A rockwool tray has to be filled all at once, whereas my method will accommodate any number of plants. If you're cloning several varieties and growing them out in a kind of communal area, you'll find that different strains use nutrients and water at different rates, which means that some will spread their roots into the slower-growing strains' area—and by labeling the individual cuttings, you run the risk of damaging them. But with my method, the cups can be easily labeled, and as soon as the new clone outgrows its cup, you can transplant it readily into any desired substrate. You can even rinse the roots vigorously under water if you want to transplant it into a totally hydroponic system.

Look, I've tried every method out there, and even though one man's garbage is another man's gold, there's just nothing to be gained by constantly reinventing the wheel. From the start, I've tried to rely on only the easiest methods and most readily available supplies—exotic soils, nutrients and equipment only spell trouble in my line of work. You have to be flexible when you run out of rockwool on a Sunday night with a handful of healthy cuttings going to waste. There's no room for such mistakes, especially when each cutting provides the medicine to keep you healthy, happy, and able to share the fruits of your labors with others.

I like sharing, and I really like healthy clones. When they get over- or underwatered or there's a nutrient imbalance, I feel sick for my plants. By carefully watching and monitoring many different growing methods, I've evolved away from using harmful rockwool to peat pucks and back again, constantly searching for a primo cloning method that involves minimal stress on my plants. Try this one out for yourself and you'll see how easy it is. I guarantee it: If you do this once, you'll be hooked, and you will never fear the word "clone" again.

MEDICAL STRAINS

I just got my new Marijuana Horticulture bible. Wow! I've been doing this over 10 years, and I still learned a lot from your book. I've been looking for a list of flowering times for different strains, and I haven't found much out there. Also, do you know of a list of strains that are categorized by their medicinal uses (pain, seizures, nausea, etc.)? I'm growing medicinally, and this kind of resource would be invaluable.

Dear Bones,

The interesting thing about medicinal cannabis is that its real benefits appear to be found in the essential oils, or *terpenes*, produced by specific strains. These terpenes impart the specific aroma and taste that distinguish each cultivar.

Terpenes are different from cannabinoids. THC (tetrahydrocannibinol), the best-known cannabinoid and the mind-bending active ingredient in cannabis, is a stable molecule and consistent throughout a plant when it's properly grown. There are about 60 different cannabinoids besides THC found in marijuana.

Cannabis, which is the only plant that produces cannabinoids, also produces up to 200 different terpenes. These essential oils—complex molecules that are found in many other medicinal plants—also have therapeutic and aromatic properties. The specific number and ratio of cannabinoids and terpenes produced by cannabis are determined by the particular genetics of each strain, which must be grown in optimum conditions to achieve its full genetic potential.

Studies show that except for THC, the cannabinoids are not psychoactive by themselves. However, these cannabinoids do play a role in the way that THC affects us. If we change the mix of cannabinoids and terpenes, we can also alter the way those molecules—especially THC—will affect us. Unfortunately, we lack controlled scientific studies about the cannabinoid and terpene content of specific stabilized strains and their medicinal effects. To date, researchers have managed to compile such lists using only empirical observation and patient reports. Two such lists are available at greenpassion.org/f11/medicinal-strain-database-6781/ and rollitup.org/medical-marijuana/18304disease-specific-mmj-strain-list.html. Information on the only government-sanctioned cannabis-seed company in Canada, Finest Medicinal Seeds, can be found at finestmedicinalseeds.com. You should also check out treatingyourself.org for more current information.

SHORT PLANTS

I'd like to find out more about growing marijuana indoors, especially about keeping the plants at a very small size. I would also like to know how short the plants can be grown and how much labor is required to do this. I'm referring here to not letting the plant grow above 75 centimeters.

Dear Francis,

Thanks to modern technology and dedicated cannabis breeders around the world, you have options for meeting your goal that were not available a few years ago. Short plants that top out at 75 centimeters (30 inches) are easy to find and grow these days. A few strains that grow well as short plants are Biddy Early and Burmese from Magus Genetics; Mr. Nice, Afghani #1 and Silver Pearl from Sensi Seeds; and Euphoria and Orange Bud from Dutch Passion. In general, look for indica-dominant strains that grow less than 40 inches (1 meter). Induce flowering in the seedlings as soon as they show pre-flowers, after about eight weeks of growth. Some plants might be too tall at this point to induce flowering; in that case, take clones of the known females. Once they're rooted, transplant and grow them under 24 hours of light until they're 8 to 9 inches tall, then induce flowering with a 12/12-hour day/night light schedule. The plants will elongate















and continue their growth, but will finish flowering before they're 30 inches tall. In the Sea of Green (SOG) and Screen of Green (ScrOG) growing methods, clones are planted very close to one another, and flowering is likewise induced when they're 8 to 9 inches tall.

You can also lower the profile of your garden and move the light closer to the ceiling. To lower your garden's profile, set the pots on saucers on the floor. Fasten a metal (aluminum) heat shield to the ceiling above the light; this will allow you to move the light closer to the ceiling. If you're growing in a small space, you can also use compact fluorescent lamps [CFLs] to provide adequate light with little heat.

THIS IS A TEST

Jorge, I need your help! I've just taken a class at Oaksterdam, and we bought your books for the class and referred to them for our take-home final exam.

The question I'm wondering about went as follows:

Cannabis plant cuttings root best at:
a) 85°F and 65% humidity
b) 60°F and 65% humidity
c) 95°F and 75% humidity
d) 90°F and 50% humidity.
None of them appeared right to me, but the correct answer was supposedly a). What would you have put down?

Dear Caroline,

You know what happens when you ask three different growers the same question? You get at least *five* different answers. But that's the beauty of growing: Everyone does it differently.

You probably went on a tour of the cloning room at the medical dispensary where you took

the class. If it's the same room that I saw last year, the correct answer *is* a), because of the conditions in the room. To be honest, the room actually flipped me out a bit, but it continues to produce rooted clones in less than 10 days. I myself prefer to grow clones with higher humidity—90% to 95% the first few days, and after that it can decrease a bit. I also like to keep the temperature around 75°F to 80°F. When the soil or rooting medium is heated to 80°F and the room temperature is kept at 75°F, the rooting also happens quickly. But now that you're growing yourself, you have the chance to experiment and find out what works best for you!

PYTHIUM CONTROL

Would using a supersonic fogger (5 microns, I believe) in an enclosed water reservoir with the roots hanging above create too high a level of humidity inside the reservoir and lead to pythium? My garden has succumbed to pythium multiple times, and so far the only thing I haven't eliminated is the fogger.

Dear Kevin,

It looks like pythium is alive and well in your growroom! Pythium wilt (a.k.a. damping-off) also attacks seedlings and clones, rotting them at the soil line and impairing root development. It's caused by a combination of factors, including fungi already present in an unsterile rooting medium, overwatering and/or maintaining a soggy grow medium, and excessive humidity. You can usually avoid the disease by controlling soil moisture, though in your case this is impossible. Too much water is the biggest cause of damping-off.

The first thing you need to do is to wash every surface, nook, crevice and cranny in your grow-room with a 5% bleach solution. Spray all cracks



and borders with the solution to ensure that you've killed the disease. Also, you need to make sure that the room is completely pest-free, since pests can spread pythium.

Keep the germination temperatures between 70°F and 85°F (21°C to 29°C). Damping-off is also inhibited by bright light, so grow your seedlings under a high-intensity discharge (HID) light rather than fluorescent bulbs. Keep the fertilization to a minimum during the first couple weeks of growth. Germinate your seeds between clean, fresh paper towels and move them into soil once they're sprouted. Don't plant the seeds too deeply, and cover them with soil only to the depth of the seed. Use a fresh, sterile medium and clean pots to guard against harmful fungus in the soil.

You should always keep the nutrient solution below 68°F to discourage pythium and other problems. You can also run Pythoff (flairform.com.au/Products/pythoff.htm) in your solution to keep it clean. You can prevent pythium wilt biologically with applications of Polygangron (Pythium oligandrum) granules. Bak Pak or Intercept can be applied to the soil and water, while Deny or Dagger—forms of the bacterium Burkholderia cepacia—can be applied to the seeds. Epic, Kodiac, Quantum 4000, Rhizo-Plus, System 3 and Seranade also work to suppress many causes of damping-off. Chemical solutions include dusting the seeds with Captan—but avoid using benomyl fungicide soil drench, because it also kills beneficial organisms.

GROWING FAT BUDS

Thanks for answering my questions in the past, and especially for the info at the website you gave me. Now I have another one: Why do some buds *not* get big and fat? I hope you understand what I mean and can answer it.




Dear Kokos.

There are many reasons that buds don't get big and fat. Once you know that the genetics of your plant will produce big, fat buds, it's up to you, the grower, to make it happen. To be sure about the genetics, always grow F1 hybrid seeds, which can be found in any quality seed catalog and are the strongest and fastest-growing.

Culture, or how the plant is grown, is the other half of the equation. In general, the more ideal the growing conditions and the less stress a plant suffers, the healthier that plant will be, including producing bigger and fatter buds. So you have to set up a growroom with ideal conditions. The temperature should stay around 75°F during the day and 65°F to 70°F at night. The humidity level in the vegetative room should stay around 60%, and in the flowering room around 50%. A good vent fan in the growroom will keep fresh, CO₂-rich air in contact with the foliage.

Plenty of HID light with an efficient reflective hood will also be necessary; hang one 400- to 600-watt lamp per square meter (40 by 40 inches) of growroom floor space. You'll also need an efficient hydroponic or soil growing system. Stick to the same fertilizer brand for the entire crop and carefully follow the manufacturer's intructions. If you have any problems at all with the fertilizer









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schedule, contact the store where you bought it and ask the people there for help: Often, the solutions to poor growth have to do with local water conditions.

But always remember this general rule: If you keep the conditions in your growroom optimum and consistent, you'll grow healthy plants and harvest big, fat buds!

MAKING FEMINIZED PLANTS

I'm from Argentina and a newbie to growing cannabis. I've had two harvests so far: One was Paraguaya—the local compacted (not flowerstyle) marijuana—and the other was Super Skunk from Sensi Seeds. (My friend in Madrid sent me the seeds.) I bought your bible, and now I'm in the process of learning jeje. My question is this: Where can I find Stamen-It! hormone spray or a similar one to buy on the Internet? I want to try to develop some feminized seeds from an El Niño that a friend gave me.

Dear Pablo,

Feminized seeds have certainly swept the European market during the last three years: Now, more than 80% of all seed sold in Europe is feminized. These days, everybody is either making feminized seeds or wants to know how to make them!

You can chemically induce female plants to form male flowers with the application of products such as eliteXelite (or gibberellic acid, which is dangerous and quite unpopular) or silver thiosulfate solution (STS), from chemicals used in photography. But your best bet is Stamen-It!, which induces male flowers. You can purchase it via this email address: plantaegenomic@live.co.uk. Or you could go to cannabis.community.forums.ozstoners.com and search on the term "eliteXelite": There you'll find exact instructions on how to make STS, which is then applied to plants to induce sex reversal from female to male, and to create male pollen-bearing flowers on female plants. In general, preflowering female cannabis plants are sprayed with diluted STS and then induced to flower with the 12/12-hour day/night light schedule. Pollenbearing male flowers can be harvested in 35 to 40 $\,$ days with most strains.

If you don't want to use chemicals and have a degree of patience, you can also practice master grower and breeder Soma's "Rodelization" method. You will find the instructions at boards.cannabis.com/grow-faqs/34027-somas-version-making-feminized-seeds.html.

BEGINNER STRAINS

Hello, Jorge—supreme beginner here. I was just wondering what kind of *indica* strain would be perfect for a small soil operation in my closet? Also, about inhaling: Is it true that the longer you hold it in, the more potent the effect of the hit? And how about using a metal grinder on kind bud:



Does it destroy the resin beads when you grind the nug up?

Dear Kai,

Great indoor beginner strains include Nebula (from Paradise Seeds), Power Plant (Dutch Passion), Northern Lights (Sensi), Chocolope (DNA Genetics), Northern Flame (Secret Valley), Himalaya Gold (Green House), AK-47 (Serious) and Cheese (Homegrown Fantaseeds)—and there are many more!

Yes, the longer you hold a hit of marijuana smoke in your lungs, the more you absorb it. When you take a hit of very potent marijuana, it will expand in your lungs, and this is what makes many people cough. You may not realize it at first, but the longer you hold that cannabinoid-rich smoke in your lungs, the more it expands.

QUALITY OUTDOOR BUDS

What strains do you suggest to get the most flavor growing outdoors? I've noticed a major difference in taste with pot grown indoors versus out. How do I bridge the gap?

Dear P.,

Indoor crops are sheltered and protected from the harsh outdoor environment, which means that buds and their resin glands remain intact. Wind, rain and other environmental factors are the main things to consider when growing quality bud outdoors: The wind will beat the shit out of your buds, knock the balls off resin stalks and erode precious resin. Wind degradation of buds will definitely lower the quality and alter the in-



tensity of the high. The majority of mind-bending cannabinoids are located at the union of that little ball with the resin stalk (i.e., the trichome). When buds are jostled around and pounded by wind and rain, these fragile little balls fall off the stalk; this exposes the cannabinoids and terpenes (essential oils) to the air, which causes them to degrade. When they've degraded sufficiently, many of the terpenes will disperse into the air, decreasing the potency further. All of this adds up to a weaker overall high.

So if you're growing outdoors, plant in sheltered areas, or build a wind block if your plants are exposed. Remember, a permeable wind block made from the surrounding foliage creates an efficient barrier and is discreet enough for security. Extreme fluctuations in temperature will also inhibit growth and degrade resin: Temperatures below 50°F and above 85°F are not advisable, especially if they fluctuate more than 30 to 35 degrees in 24 hours.


Soil and alimentation (i.e., nourishment) are also very important to ensure that your plants achieve their full genetic potential. Make sure your planting holes are well alimented with plenty of slow-release organic fertilizers and composts along with native soil. Grow only organically.

If you live in a growing environment with a long season and very little wind (i.e., you can harvest in November), definitely choose a Hazebased plant. Utopia Haze (Barney's), Neville's Haze Mango (Mr. Nice), Super Silver Haze and Super Lemon Haze (Green House), Northern Lights #5 x Haze and Sweet Haze (DNA Genetics), Haze x Heaven (Owl's Production) and De la Haze (Paradise) are at the top of the list. Other than that, I suggest growing the strains you like to smoke, as long as they do well outdoors. A few of my favorite outdoor strains are Jack Herer (Sensi), Jorge's Diamonds #1 (Dutch Passion) and Shark Shock (Mr. Nice).

If you want to enjoy the fruits of your labor in less than three months, plant flavorful, feminized, auto-flowering strains like Skyryder and Criticalryder. These two strains are guaranteed to flower in less than 90 days. The most critical period for these plants is the first three weeks: If the plant becomes sick, it has no time to recover, since it will be harvested in another 40 to 45 days. So make sure to baby these tough little plants for the first three weeks, and you'll be paid back with an ounce or more (30-plus grams) of connoisseur-quality bud. **

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GARDEN CALENDAR

OUTDOORS

April kicks off the first frost-free growing season in much of America. Check with your local County Extension Agent to learn the last average day of frost, or you can hit this site: victoryseeds.com/frost/. You can move plants outdoors in many warmer climates now, but they should still be protected with a plastic greenhouse or covering.

Shop for seeds now and buy them before stocks run low. Look through your seed collection and select strong, dark, hard, well-formed seeds to germinate. Keep extra seeds for future planting in a cool, dark, dry place in an airtight container. You can still purchase seeds in retail shops in Canada, Holland, Spain, the UK and Italy (though Italian stores have been feeling some heat from the authorities lately). But there's nothing like a personal trip when purchasing a lot of seeds.

Start tilling new and old grow patches. Always be on the lookout for more new grow sites. Walk around with a folding shovel to sample soil and remove weeds. Tote a backpack full of peat moss or compressed coco bricks to amend heavy clay and sandy soils. Also add rock powders and slow-release organic fertilizers. You should prepare the soil a month or two before planting.

Plants need at least five hours of bright midday sunlight to yield a respectable crop. Grow sites must be secure and have good soil and a source of water. (Keep in mind that water weighs 8 pounds per gallon and is difficult to haul.)

Plant flowering clones outdoors or in a greenhouse and harvest a spring crop. Harden off plants by moving them outdoors or to the greenhouse for a few hours daily until they become accustomed to the harsher climate. Even though the days are progressively longer, plants that have been flowering a month indoors can finish flowering outdoors. Buds will grow bigger under natural sunlight.

Take clones and germinate seeds to plant outdoors for the summer season; they can be planted when they're 6 to 12 inches tall. Be sure to harden plants off by moving them outdoors into a greenhouse for a few hours daily. It will take them about a week to get used to their new conditions. Once they're hardened off, they can be transplanted to a remote garden.

The Wall-'o-Water keeps small



plants safe in temperatures below freezing; search for it on burpee.com and you'll find several reviews. You can start plants a month or two earlier when using a Wall-'o-Water.

Harvest spring crops! If you took the time to plant a crop two months ago, you'll be enjoying the fruits of your labor now.

INDOORS

Open the windows and air the place out! Temperate spring weather is here, so take advantage of all that fresh air. Spring cleaning is upon us now, and it's a great time to remove any rubbish or signs of cultivation in and around your grow area.

Outdoor weather will affect the atmosphere in your growroom: Gardens behind sun-baked outer walls and roofs experience hot days and cool nights. Make sure walls and ceilings are well insulated and vented. Excess humidity after the lights go out will be a common problem now.

Central heating systems get turned on less frequently these days. This could affect the humidity levels in your house and growroom. Watch them closely: Keep the humidity around 60% in the vegetative room and 50% in the flowering room.

Pests and diseases get around more easily as the temperature climbs outdoors. Be sure to change your clothes and shoes before entering your growroom after being outside. A little bit of hygiene now will prevent many problems from developing later.

Inspect foliage for pests and diseases. Look on leaf undersides for spider mites and their eggs; also check for discoloration and any other signs of trouble. A 10x to 30x handheld microscope really helps to identify populations of pests and diseases. Exterminate most pests (including spider

mites) with Whidmire's Exclude: It contains a natural, potent encapsulated pyrethrum. Apply it three times at five-day intervals.

Scrub out the hydroponic reservoir and fill with fresh new solution. Use graph paper or a calendar to chart nutrient pH, EC (ppm) and usage levels. Compare the results to previous months when the weather was colder. You may find that plants tend to use more water now. Adjust the solution accordingly.

Check the pH and EC (ppm) in both soil and hydroponic gardens regularly. Check the runoff water as well-if it has a pH much different than the input solution, or if the EC is the same or higher, then there are salts built up in the growing medium. This means the containers will need to be flushed to leach out the toxic buildup. Flush containers with three times the volume of a mild nutrient solution to the quantity of substrate. Taking this trouble now will save your plants many problems in the future, meaning that it's time well spent.

Neighbors become more active as the weather gets warmer, so it's a good time to review your security. Take a stroll outside around the perimeter of your growroom and pay special attention to the sounds of fans turning on and off, humming ballasts, light leaks, or any evidence of an indoor growroom in the garbage. What about fragrance: Is there the slightest trace of cannabis? Be sure to direct your air-conditioner runoff indoors.

Take clones two to three weeks before harvest. Germinate seeds about two months before harvest so they're ready to move into the flowering room.

Harvest!

Clean room thoroughly and move in the next crop of clones. ₩

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
