



If the shackles were off, thousands of companies would jump into the fray to serve the pot production and consumption sectors—and that means new jobs, new revenue and new economic growth.



STINKBUD REVIEW

The article by StinkBud in the June '09 issue is truly a piece of work. This unit cannot be built using the parts listed in the article and without basic construction skills. For example: 1) The fence posts needed to build the veg/bloom units aren't included in the parts list. 2) The cuts for the 1/2-inch pipe in the article are different from the cuts shown in the diagram. 3) The parts diagram box on page 52 lists eight 3/4inch T's—but if you don't buy 14, you won't get close to putting the unit together. 4)



The two drain holes on the bottom of each grow tube are not mentioned in the drawing. 5) The text on page 52 directs the builder to drill 10 holes, but the diagram next to the instructions shows 12 or 14 holes. 6) The layout is confusing: If the veg and bloom units are the same in their design, as they appear in the article, why have two separate sets of instructions? Also, the text should have come first, with photos; the technical drawings and "step-bystep" instructions should have come at the end.

In the end, I built this thing, but if I hadn't had basic shop skills, it wouldn't have come together. (Also, with better instructions, I could've built it in half the time.) But I do love the three-stage concept that StinkBud has developed.



Stop burning incense and open a window instead. Also, stuff a cardboard tube with Bounce dryer sheets and tape an X over the end. After taking a bong hit, blow the smoke through the tube; this will completely change the odor of the smoke. You should also run an air filter while you're smoking. If you still have problems, consider switching to a vaporizer—it will save you money.

Psychedelic and energetic with a hammer!

Another title for L.A. CONFIDENTIAL

Each year, the Firestick Clique near Buffalo, NY, proves to be one of the elite groups of growers in the East. In May, the Clique held its fourth annual Battle at the Bridge Cup, a competition that was explicitly founded to underscore the superiority of US weed over Canadian. The Messiah ("Seeds Indeed," HT July '09) made America's stoner nation proud. Purple Kush and Sour Diesel provided stiff competition, but of the nine judges, five named his specimen of LA Confidential as their favorite. This heavenly, super-sticky strain from DNA Genetics has already walked off with the top *indica* prize at the '08 Cannabis Cup, top strain at the '07 Kush Kup, and best *indica* at the '05 Breeders Cup. It also placed second for best *indica* at the '04 and '05 Cannabis Cups, and was named HIGH TIMES' "Strain of the Year" in 2006. LA Confidential is a great medicinal strain, especially for those seeking to relieve pain or eliminate insomnia. For the everyday user, the high can be described as psychedelic and energetic—with a hammer.

LEPP GETS 10 YEARS

In May, Eddie Lepp, the activist/grower who was busted in 2004 for cultivating 32,000 plants on his land in Lake County, CA, was sentenced to 10 years in prison. But US District Judge Marilyn Hall Patel seemed to disagree with the sentencing guidelines she was compelled to follow. "I think that amount of time is excessive, but it's not up to me," she told a San Francisco courtroom crowded with Lepp's supporters. The judge says she'll reconsider the sentence if Congress changes the federal law, which calls for a mandatory 10 years in prison for people cultivating at least 1,000 plants.

Lepp, 56, had been solicited by hundreds of patients to provide cannabis for medical use, which is legal under state law. He also claims to be a Rastafarian minister who was growing cannabis for sacramental use by the 2,500 members of his church. Lepp plans to appeal the sentence as "grossly disproportionate" to the crime he committed— i.e., growing a whole bunch of plants.



'I'm going to fly this kite in a thunderstorm!""

CANTRELL, COMEDY & CANNABIS

Originally hailing from Washington, DC, Cantrell began his standup career in San Francisco after college and later brought his act to New York. After just three years of performing, he auditioned for the first season of NBC's *Last Comic Standing* and became a Top 10 finalist. He's also developed a cannabis-smoking, cult-like following, which naturally led to a tour with *The Marijuana-logues*, in which he's booked through this fall. But Cantrell is a serious activist as well, regularly hosting NORML benefits. Spend five minutes with him and you'll realize that comedy, music *and* pot are all very important to him. Ping-pong, too—"I love ping-pong," he says. "It's the perfect low-impact sport for the almost-athletic stoner. But he cautions: "Careful with beer-pong—I got deep into beer-pong, then I started playing tequilatennis, which always ended with a lot of crying, cops and tight shorts."

Cantrell performed as the opening act for the late, great Mitch Hedberg on his last theater tour. He's also a contributor to HBO's *Flight of the Conchords* and is writing for Howard Stern's new TV project, out this fall on Howard TV. *Keep On the Grass*, his first comedy CD, is available this summer. *Visit robcantrell.com for details on the CD and tour dates.*



2009: A REAL *LEAP* YEAR

According to an ABC/*Washington Post* poll, support in the US for legalizing pot has never been stronger. Forty-six percent of Americans now favor legalizing small amounts of marijuana for personal use, more than double the number that existed 12 years ago. Fifty-two percent remain opposed, but that number's down from 75 percent in the late '90s and 78 percent in 1986.

In the past two decades, the poll reports, support for legalization has increased among Democrats by 29 points, and among independents by 27 points, to 49 and 53 percent, respectively. Even among Republicans, there was a 10point gain (although that made it just 28 percent in favor).

Not surprisingly, support for legalizing marijuana for personal use is nearly twice as high among young adults (57 percent of those under 30) as among seniors (30 percent), whereas middle-aged Americans are split about evenly. Nearly six in 10 liberals support the idea, while just 36 percent of conservatives agree. Politically, independent voters are the most in favor (53 to 44 percent), the Democrats divide 50–50, and the Republicans are most broadly opposed (28 to 69 percent).

The poll also found that support is highest of all among people who express no religious preference (70 percent), and lowest among white evangelical Protestants (24 percent).

WHY SOME STONERS HATE SPORTS

UNIVERSITY OF BULLSHIT

According to the online journal Substance Abuse, Treatment, Prevention and Policy, teens who smoke pot aren't trying to get high—instead,



they're trying to cope with physical and mental health problems.

Now we've heard everything. *Not* trying to get high? Well, grant money's gotta get spent.

But no one can say that Dr. Joan L. Bottorff of the University of British Columbia in Vancouver and her team didn't go the extra mile to complete this study. They interviewed a total of 20-yes, 20!-adolescents from Vancouver and two rural communities in BC. This enormous sampling of Canadian youth became the basis of an international news story. For the record, 12 of the adolescents interviewed said they smoked pot to ease anxiety and stress, nine said that it helped them sleep better, six said they smoked to relieve depression, five used pot for pain relief, and three said it improved their concentration. (The numbers add up to more than 20 because several subjects used pot for more than one reason.) The participants added that the legal drugs they'd been prescribed for these problems—antidepressants, Ritalin or sleeping pills—either didn't work or had unpleasant side effects. Also, they felt that adults and medical professionals seldom took their problems seriously.

Professor Bottorff was quick to distance herself from any suggestion that she or her research team approved of these findings. "We're certainly not advocating that youth resort to marijuana to deal with their health problems," she said. She then proceeded to smear cannabis, invoking the specious, oft-repeated claims that pot interferes with learning and memory, harms the lungs, and is capable of triggering psychotic symptoms and disorders in young people. Instead, Bottorff suggested that teens try "counseling, stress management, social-skills training, anger management, study skills, pain management and sleep hygiene."



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
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TV public-service ads are actually telling the truth: Pot is a dangerous drug-even fatal!

March 2009 Near the town of Liberal, OR, Clackamas County sheriff's deputies shoot and kill Hubert Henkel, 68, the boyfriend of Marjorie Crawford, 80, who is being served with an arrest warrant at her home for selling pot. Crawford is taken from the scene in an ambulance.

July 2008 A suspected marijuana grower in California dies in a shootout with Santa Clara County sheriff's deputies after they stumble upon a pot plot during a CAMP raid in the Santa Cruz Mountains. Three growers are present when the cops arrive; the deceased is identified only as a Hispanic male in his twenties.

October 2007 California game warden Joshua Brennan shoots and kills 39-year-old Bartyn Pitts, who is allegedly tending a pot garden in the Sierra Nevada foothills.

November 2006 Acting upon bogus info from a crack dealer, narcs gun down 92-year-old Kathryn Johnston during a no-knock raid. Three baggies of pot are planted on the body of Johnston, who actually fired back. Later, the cops confess to their misdeeds and get sentenced to a few years in prison.

March 2009 Derek Copp, a 20-year-old student and pot activist at Grand Valley State University in Michigan, is shot pointblank in his apartment by an Ottawa County sheriff's deputy serving a drug warrant. Copp survives the shooting, which damages his lung, liver and ribs. Investigators admit that Copp was unarmed, but file charges against him anyway for the "delivery or manufacture of marijuana." His case is still pending.

July 2008 Two Labrador retrievers owned by Cheye Calvo, the mayor of Berwyn Heights, MD, are shot to death by Prince George County sheriff's deputies after they raid his home looking for a 32pound package of pot sent to the Calvo household by a third party. One last thing: If you think that pot was less potent back in the '70s, think again. Medical-pot pioneer Dennis Peron was shot in the thigh by San Francisco police in a 1978 raid; a second, potentially fatal bullet narrowly missed by his head.

THROW UP, WASH UP, CALL THE PRESS

In April, an article on the Reuters international news service reported that heavy pot use has been associated with recurrent vomiting and compulsive bathing. The unusual story was based on a single case study published in the obscure World Journal of Gastroenterology, which reported that a 22-year-old male frequently suffered from severe vomiting (a.k.a. hyperemesis) after smoking weed.

Was the herb contaminated? Good question-nobody bothered to ask. The journal did report, however, that hot showers alleviated the subject's symptoms. A search of the scientific literature found a handful of similar cases, 22 in all-oddly enough, most of them people residing in South Australia. In each of the cases, the subject reported a cyclical pattern of vomiting after pot smoking; in several cases, they also reported engaging in compulsive bathing. Quitting pot appeared to alleviate most of the patients' symptoms. Hundreds of millions of people have smoked pot for thousands of years, but less than two dozen cases of "Cannabis Hyperemesis Syndrome" have ever been documented. It didn't matter to Reuters : "Given the high prevalence of chronic cannabis abuse worldwide ... clinicians need to be more attentive to the clinical features of this under-recognized condition."

If a handful of case studies proves the existence of a new clinical condition, perhaps we should recognize the equally under-recognized "Cannabis Commander-in-Chief Syndrome," in which one's pot use ultimately leads to becoming president of the United States. We can cite at least three cases off the top of our head.

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF YOUTH

Here's one more shoddy study, this time courtesy of the journal Accident Analysis & Prevention. Apparently, investigators at the University of Montreal's psychology department interviewed 83 men, ages 17 to 49, and "observed that dangerous driving behaviors are interrelated."

The investigators continued: "Individuals scoring high on impulsivity or sensation-seeking scales demonstrated an elevated risk of driving under the influence of cannabis To our knowledge, this is the first study to investi-





PRTIENT GETS 12 POUNDS BACK

When Richard Daleman, a registered medical-marijuana patient who uses pot to alleviate arthritic pain, was arrested in December and charged with possessing and cultivating marijuana with intent to sell, it seemed unlikely that he'd ever be reunited with his stash. But that's exactly what happened outside of California's Tulare County Courthouse in April.

Still, prosecutors dragged their feet and Daleman got sick of it. He told them he was going to come and get it. In the end, Daleman rolled all 12 pounds of marijuana out of the building. Of course, Daleman made sure to weigh his medicine. Despite the fact that "there were about three ounces missing," He acknowledged that "they maintained it pretty good." Now that the whole ordeal—including more than three months spent in jail—was finally over, a relieved Daleman, speaking from home, assured reporters: "I'm stoned now."

gate the association between driving under the influence of cannabis and a wide range of dangerous driving behaviors."

Well, not exactly. In 2007, investigators with the Public Health Program at Ontario's Lakeland University reviewed the drug and alcohol data pertaining to US drivers, ages 20 to 49, who had been involved in a fatal crash in the period from 1993 to 2003. The researchers separated these drivers into "cases" (people who had at least one potentially unsafe driving action recorded in relation to the crash) and "controls" (people who had no such driving action recorded). The investigators concluded that drivers who tested positive for cannabis had a slightly elevated risk of engaging in potentially unsafe actions compared to drug- or alcohol-free drivers. By contrast, however, researchers found that drivers with a blood-alcohol level of 0.05 percent—below the US legal limit for intoxication—were three times as likely to have engaged in unsafe driving activities prior to a fatal crash than individuals who'd tested positive for herb.

So why the apparent connection between pot use and risky driving behaviors? The most likely explanation: age. After all, young people between the ages of 16 and 25 are statistically most likely to use pot. This age group also possesses the least on-road driving experience and is statistically more prone to engage in high-risk driving behaviors than older drivers. In short, it's not so much driving under the influence of cannabis that poses the biggest traffic-safety risks; it's driving under the influence of youthful stupidity. Anyone can be on the cover!

Last year, Canadians were devastated after their top athletes failed miserably at the World Stoner Games. But this year, one **contestant** was on a mission to restore his nation's high honor.

"Never, never, never believe any war will be smooth and easy, or that anyone who embarks on the strange voyage can measure the tides and hurricanes he will encounter."

So said Winston Churchill in 1930, reflecting on England's disastrous participation in the Great Boer War (1899-1902), when a ragtag army of guerrilla fighters in southern Africa fought the British army to a standstill. It was the longest and most ruinously expensive of Britain's conflicts in the century before the two world wars, as well as the first indication that the mighty British Empire might be teetering on the brink of collapse.

Canada's despair was equal last year after the first-ever World Stoner Games in Toronto, and would have been way worse had the media actually covered the event. But in order to prevent a national panic, the Canadian press chose to cover up what was truly a national scandal. A pound each of Super Skunk and Jack Herer was reserved for WSG combat.

In a word, the performance of Canada's top stoner athletes might best have been described as "lackluster," "disappointing," "lame" or "really sucked"—even though that's two words.

But facts are facts. Although Americans were outnumbered 4 to 1, by the end of the Games' events, there were five contestants tied in total points—and only one of them was a Canadian. And when the finalists lit their joints in a five-way smoke-off to determine the grand-prize winner, it was an American who blazed to victory in a haze of glory, claiming the title of World's Top Stoner.

It was an unprecedented defeat, and one that few people managed to predict. Canadians who were aware of the loss were virtually devastated, literally disgusted, while figuratively shell-shocked.

Think about it: Hard-tokin' American stoners invade your homeland and outsmoke your homies. (Ugh, we don't even like the sound of that!) And worse, an American walks away with the world's

highest honor—on your very own turf, no less! Moreover, he gets to go to the Cannabis Cup, while you go ice fishing. And it's really, really cold on that lake.

Canadian stoners struggled to adjust to the shock. Theirs is a proud stoner nation—many studies have cited Canada as having the highest per capita number of tokers in the world, and the country's name actually means "cannabis": *Cana*- is the common root, while *-da* is a variant of *duh*, as in "Duh—you didn't know 'Canada' means 'cannabis'?" Google it. It's true.

Could Canada ever recover from this monumental failure? In May, it got its chance. This year's World Stoner Games fell on a Sunday, the day after the Toronto Freedom Rally, the annual pro-pot demonstration that draws 25,000 people. Many contestants attended the event as a final workout before competing in the World Stoner Games. Others did private workouts and prepared themselves mentally, putting on their game faces. Those game faces were generally vacant and slack-jawed, punctuated by slightly bloodshot eyes—but their owners were all business. At a downtown location known only to the stoner athletes, 75 competitors entered the cannabis equivalent of Thunderdome. Like the gladiators of ancient Rome, or the competitive bass fishermen on the Travel Channel, they came loaded for bear.

Canada's reputation was on the line, and a pothead named Matt from Peterborough, Ontario, chose to stand tall—which was pretty easy for Matt, since at six feet, nine inches, he towered over the field of stoners.

It turns out that Matt went into serious training after serving as an on-field assistant at the first Stoner Games. He had witnessed the shame of Canada personally and swore to restore his nation's honor by winning the grand prize: airfare and hotel accommodations at the Cannabis Cup in Amsterdam as a VIP judge. You can't get more patriotic than that.

about his unfair advantage: At six-foot-nine, wouldn't his lungs be better suited to utilizing a long bong? Vaporella, the head referee, invoked the littleknown "Head Up Your Ass" rule and allowed Matt's victory to stand. When he also took second place in Gram Guess, wherein athletes estimated the total number of grams in a container of pot, it was clear that his stoner proficiency was hardly one-dimensional.

In fact, Canadians swept all of the events, a stunning blow to the Americans talking trash. (We don't remember hearing any Americans talking trash, but if they were, they were probably pretty embarrassed.) Coloring was taken by a Canadian stoner athlete for her garden scene of marijuana butterflies and flowers cleverly designed with joints. Another Canadian won in the Joint Rolling competition for his multi-petaled homage to plants in general, which he colored with green crayons and used over a half-ounce of pot to fill. However, given that each competitor had received an eighth of Super Skunk or Jack Herer upon registration to use in the Joint Rolling round, the referees consulted: Had he violated the rules by overstuffing his jay?

duel. The World Stoner Games head referee gave each of the finalists a joint and commanded: "Stoner says 'inhale.' Stoner says 'exhale.' Stoner says 'inhale.' Stoner says 'exhale'"-thereby unhinging the competitors to the point where one finally lost her focus and inexplicably froze on a Stoner Says command. The spectators gasped, but this was mainly because they all happened to be inhaling on a joint at the same time. Weird, huh?

The winners in each event took home prizes, including robust buds of White Shark, seeds from the Ontario Seed Bank, Jorge Cervantes's famed cultivation DVDs and a variety of cool T-shirts. Stoner energy food was provided by the hemp goddess known as Puff Mama, a baker of exquisite high-end treats, who runs Clandestiny in Toronto, a slick, pot-themed boutique. Each competitor also received an official competitor's T-shirt, courtesy of Got Smurb? (say it fast), which are now selling on eBay for thousands of dollars. Don't freak-those are Canadian dollars, so you should be able to pick one up for under \$50 in real money.

Rolling, Coloring, Gram Guess and Stoner Says.

The Bonghitting event, as usual, had all the drama of a good Bruce Willis movie (and there aren't many). Contestants wrestled with bongs in lengths of one, two, three, four and five feet. Six-foot bongs were standing by for an additional round, which turned out to be unnecessary, as contestants were hard-pressed to clear the giraffe-like pieces in the five-foot round.

The refs decided to let the win stand. The Joint Rolling victor then disassembled his piece forthwith and absconded with the pot. It was never confirmed whether the winning entry actually was smokeable, but the joints were judged on an aesthetic basis, and he had clearly triumphed. But we do want that pot returned to us.

Stoner Says featured an exciting standoff between the two final stoner athletes capable of maintaining their attention span. It was a vicious

As the World Stoner Games came to a close and the competitors trudged off the pot field of play, Matt was approached by a roving video crew and asked what he was going to do after winning the title of Top Stoner Athlete.

He shouted back: "I'm going to Disney World!" After seven takes, he finally managed to get it right: Matt is in fact going to Amsterdam. 🖗






MARKET ANALYSIS

It was a three-way race for the title as the month's most submitted strain. In the end, Kush pulled away to take the top pot spot, but Purps and Haze both deserve honorable mentions. For those scoring at home, that makes *six* first-place finishes for Kush in '09 (including last month's tie), three for Purps, one for Northern Lights and zero thus far for Diesel. The top five submitted strains in September (with average price) were Kush (\$390), Purps (\$422), Haze (\$474), Diesel (\$450) and Trainwreck (\$375).

Index Watch: All indices rebounded slightly from their previous month's average. However, US and Kind still finished below their year-to-date averages, while the Mids and Schwag indices essentially held steady.

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A SPLIFF WHHLIF

Mr. Lif overcomes his obstacles to declare I Heard It Today. By Chris Parker

Life is ruled by momentum, from physics to success. It's hard enough to get the ball rolling, let alone steer things in the right direction when hard knocks drive you askew. After recovering from misfortune and missed opportunity, rapper Mr. Lif has righted his ship and attained a full head of steam on *I Heard It Today*. While others brag about their bitches and bling, Lif's latest pulls caps back to douse them with some political science on a rabble-rousing album more in keeping with punk's early mandate than today's (t)rap stars.

The album opens with the scathing "Welcome to the World," which objects to wealth being built "on the backs of the many so the few can advance." It's followed by "What About Us," arguably the first song to cite the bank bailout, noting the billions that the banksters received while the rest of us have got "no health care, and just enough change to ride the bus." It's a powerful retort in keeping with "Obama," Lif's pre-album release, which cast a skeptical look at all the post-election euphoria.

"There's a lot of people involved in the level of corruption we just witnessed, and for me to think it's just dissipated in the blink of an eye—or that one man has the power to stop these incredibly wealthy men who really control shit from reaching their financial goals, even under his watch—is just impossible," Lif says. "Perhaps I'm being cynical about it, but I can't just embrace the American government like nothing had gone wrong."

Lif's had his own misfortunes to reverse, after being sidelined for the last three years following a fiery bus crash on the eve of 2006's *Mo' Mega* tour. Aside from physical rehab for his injuries, there was a mental reckoning to be paid as well. It took him two years to recover his muse and start finishing songs again. His first tracks were about the accident itself, until Lif got swallowed up in the political spirit of the times. "It was just a burst of pure inspiration," he says, "and probably the purest thing I've felt since I was making *Enter the Colossus*," his breakthrough 2000 EP.

The accident wiped out the tour and money that Lif needed to survive. As he recovered, the bills mounted along with his fury, fueling the new album.

"[It was] just seeing the heartlessness of the bill collectors— who don't give a *fuck* about you—and just really having to humble my whole approach to life and get on some blue-collar shit," Lif recalls. "The whole thing brought out the beast in me. I'm ready to go toe to toe with whatever it's going to take to prove that I'm a necessary factor in this game."

To that end, Lif's taken matters into his own hands, leaving indie Def Jux to release the album on his own label, Bloodbot Tactical. He's keeping his attention focused this time, however, and plans to avoid side projects like 2004's *Black Dialogue* with the Perceptionists, featuring DJ Fakts One and Akrobatik. "I always wonder to myself, 'What if in '03, I hit the follow-up to [2002's] I Phantom—or even in '04?'" Lif says now. Lif went into I Heard It Today armed with a full sack of good herb that lasted him right through the recording and kept him properly inspired. A dedicated bong smoker, Lif still enjoys a blunt from time to time on the road, but has had to exercise some moderation to protect his voice. As a result, it's usually his homies who are holding when he's on tour—an unfortunate fact for some wrestlers he encountered several years ago in Arizona. "I'm just sitting in the van, waiting to go to sound check, and next thing I know, Booker T walks up to me—and he's like, 'Hey, dread, do you know where to get the weed?'" Lif laughs. "A couple minutes later, another guy—I'm not sure which cat it was, but this cat was huge, like superhuman—he comes up to me and asks me the same question. It was hilarious. If I was in business, I could have made a little cake and smoked a little something with the WWE." 🖊

the coathangers

"We're not punk," drummer Stephanie says straight off about her Atlanta-based band, the Coathangers. But in true punk fashion, she's told right back: Tough shit—for this article, your band is getting grouped with female punk bands. Guitarist Julia doesn't care; she says she's honored to be included in the pages of HIGH TIMES.

Indeed, the band's members candidly admit that pot fuels their creative drive. At least half the songs on the Coathangers' latest album, *Scramble* (Suicide Squeeze), were composed under the influence of Mary Jane; listening to tracks like "Toomerhead" or "Killdozer," it's pretty obvious. Or as Stephanie archly proclaims, "We've written songs totally stoned—pot lets you release inhibitions where you can feel the music, man."

The Coathangers are known for their fervent live shows, which they say are emblematic of the Atlanta party-rock scene, especially when compared to their more serious musical neighbors to the north in Athens, GA. And while their name isn't meant as an overt political statement, its allusion to a notorious method of self-induced abortion, coming from a band in the Deep South, is intended to show that "we do and say whatever we want," Stephanie assures me.

Cive

Hell Hath No Fury (Hell Cat) starts off fiercely enough, with the opening riff and cymbal crashing of "Alibis" and its great lyric ("Do a line—a line of alibis") announcing Civet's presence.

The most prototypically punk of the bands on display here, Civet's name derives from the SARS-spreading mammal found in Africa and Asia. Now that's punk—though lead singer Liza Graves said she came up with the moniker long before the SARS outbreak.

Civet is a great can't-get-'em-outta-your-head anthem band (cf. Graves's "Son of a Bitch,' or bassist Jacqui Valentine's ode to "Gin and Tonic"). However, Graves does see a conflict between punk and pot. "It's the punk-rock ethic," she says. "People want to rebel, and stoner guys don't seem a part of that plan." On the other hand, she allows: "My boyfriend smokes—I don't. I'm not into bong water, but I do like edible pot."

Winning the "It's a small punk world after all" category, aforementioned Coathangers drummer Stephanie almost auditioned for Civet back in the day, but decided the band was too damn fast for her and blew off the tryout. Which is pretty punk too.





erase errata

San Francisco has a storied tradition of strong weed and stronger women playing rock, and Erase Errata carries forth that legacy, producing innovative songs that have garnered their fair share of critical acclaim in the process. Percussion is central to Erase Errata's sound, which incorporates retro-surf and '50s rhythms in a cutting-edge gestalt.

On the band's latest album, Nightlife (Kill Rock Stars), tracks like "Hotel Suicide" demonstrate their dramatic power. The lyrics of "Tax Dollar"— "Murder, manslaughter, all funded by my tax dollar"—give voice to the resentment felt by many in the antiwar movement over their income taxes being used to perpetuate the US war machine. "Rider" is more of an exercise in personal paranoia—"Everybody has a gun, everybody has a knife"—while "Beacon" illuminates the polyrhythms proffered by drummer Bianca Sparta. "He Wants What's Mine" exhibits the haunting, poetical delivery of singer/guitarist Jenny Hoyston, who also produces the female-focused Fabulosa Fest held annually in Guerneville, CA.

The Metalux duo of M.V. Carbon and J. Graf are more punk in theory than in practice on Victim of Space (5 Rue Christine), an LP reminiscent of King Crimson's soundscaping ventures, but with an even stranger and more noticeably female sensibility. Avant-garde poetry cast over bizarre machine-like repetitions and droning audio exploitation is evident on songs like "Shipwreck" and lyrics like "I see the candy on your face ... no smoking in the lavatory." The ironic "Sunny Krakow" sounds, appropriately enough, just like a psychotically bad weekend in Poland.

Metalux is the kind of band that Yoko Ono would've started had she been born 30 years later as a Lennon fan, and not the woman who would steal him away from the Beatles.

It wouldn't be a proper she-punk article unless we included an unsigned band named simply Girl Band. On their eponymous self-produced album, they flash some seriously sharp riffing on songs like "Car Crash," though their sound could be heavier and fuller.

They also cover the Misfits' "London Dungeon," an ideal choice for a naughty femme band, while on their punky "tribute" to fellow Bay Area musician Sammy Hagar (called, um, "Sammy Hagar"), they tell the Red Rocker to "Kiss my ass." On "Dirty," lead singer Shelly Cardiff shows off her playful side: "I'm a dirty girl, that's for sure/I'm your mother's worst nightmare." Oh yeah, sing it slower, baby ...

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

Nothing Quiet on the Agnostic Front

For almost three decades, AF have been keeping New York hardcore on the map. By Chris Simunek

New York City was a riot in the '80s. A teenager could get a drink in a bar; you could buy dime bags of Skunk on the corner of Ninth Street and First Avenue; for five bucks you could see five bands at a CBGB's hardcore matinee; or, if you were really on a budget and looking for a cheap thrill, you could, for a mere 25 cents, stand in a booth on 42nd Street, stick your hand through an open slat and grope a real live titty.

Today, all that's gone, but there are a few parts of Old New York that have survived unscathed. You can still go to Wo Hop at four in the morning and eat greasy Chinese food, the Staten Island Ferry is still free and serves booze, and the they penned a song called "Public Assistance" that vented their spleen at the welfare state. They were working-class kids, and if they had an overriding message, it was *unity*: punks and skins, black and white—punk for all and all for punk.

"I had a lot of political fights," Vinnie says of those years, "good, bad or indifferent; win, lose or draw. And here I am at the same spot anyway. The world turns and you just stay the same."

Ultimately, AF is having the last laugh. Their 1984 album *Victim in Pain* is considered a classic, and their last release, 2007's *Warriors*, is pretty brutal as well. As you read this, they're touring the US, and in the fall they're heading down to bud people throw onstage in Amsterdam.

"We smoke in our private lives," Joe says. "We don't really talk about it in music per se but it's something that the music is created by. When I write, I'm definitely inspired by smoking.

"I have like ADD; I can't sit down for a minute," Mike adds. "I get stoned, I'll sit down and I'll play, so good things come out of it, ya know?"

I ask them what they think of the crusty punk scene and Mike growls, "I think they should wake up and get a job like everyone else in the world."

"Listen," Vinnie interjects. "Go get a grenade and throw it in a bank and I'll respect you. I don't want to promote anything like that. I'm just saying,

mighty Agnostic Front continue to produce bonecrushing slabs of New York hardcore.

"I live a few blocks away from here," Vinnie Stigma tells me as he arrives with three-fifths of the band at a loft in Soho. "When I was a kid, I used to junk cars on this block. Ride around all day in the car, rob everything I could out of it and set it on fire. It was all factories here then."

Vinnie's musical career started down the block in Little Italy, when in the early '70s he used to play the San Gennaro festival with his cover band, Black Angus. Around '82 or so, Vinnie—along with vocalist Roger Miret—formed Agnostic Front and almost immediately started pissing people off. It's hard to imagine what a politically correct bunch of fraidy cats the new breed of "hardcore" punks were back then. You'd think Sid Vicious died for nothing. The fact that AF were skinheads really bummed a lot of people out; when they started throwing a little heavy metal into their hardcore/Oi! sound, folks were further dismayed, and the gotcha moment for the pinko types came when

South America, where they're received like gods. "It's unbelievable!" Vinnie tells me. "They got to sneak us into the venues...police escorts."

And though Vinnie didn't invent New York hardcore, he's come to personify it. His new solo album, *New York Blood*, has to be the New Yorkest album to be released by a white person since the *Taxi Driver* soundtrack—imagine if Carmine Gallante had packed it in with the mob and gotten a gig singing for GBH.

When I ask him why Agnostic Front are still a viable hardcore band after almost 30 years, Vinnie says: "We really believe in it—we're really true, we're real musicians and we're family. Me and Roger, we're the transmission and the engine, and the newer guys are the tires. Sometimes we rotate the tires."

The tires in this case are Mike Gallo (bass), Pokey Mo (drums) and Joseph James (guitar). Mike and Joe are also AF's most outspoken pot smokers. Talk turns to the dirt-brown weed they get in South America and the fat sacks of kindyou talk the talk, you gotta walk the walk. They're fighting a war. You know what it's called? Boredom."

In the end, none of us could see the correlation between anarchy and not taking a shower.

AF now is almost like an umbrella organization to a host of punk-rock projects, including various solo bands, Stigma, Roger Miret and the Disasters, and Inhuman. Vinnie made a slasher movie you can buy on DVD called *New York Blood*, and he is still bringing punks together with the shop he and Jimmy Gestapo of Murphy's Law opened in 1998, New York Hardcore Tattoos.

"It's a place where kids could go," he says. "CB's is closed. At least you get something, New York hardcore or punk. People from all over the world come there, not even to get a tattoo—just to get a T-shirt.

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THE EXTRAORDINARY DOC HUMES

Doc Directed by Immy Humes (Doc Tank Inc.)

The question "Can one man change the world?" is posed in Immy Humes's astonishing documentary of her father, H.L. "Doc" Humes. The man not only wrote two acclaimed novels, but was also an omnivorous polymath, Socratic teacher, hipster legend and cannabis visionary. It was in Paris that Doc founded the influential literary journal *Paris Review*, before



moving back to New York and becoming an underground filmmaker, green architect (before the concept even existed), political activist and co-conspirator—along with folks like Terry Southern, Lord Buckley, Norman Mailer, Tim Leary and Allen Ginsberg—of the Big Apple literati.

Doc believed, sometimes with good reason, that the clandestine forces of darkness generally known as "they" were always after him. In postwar bohemian Paris, hashish was ubiquitous and legal, until—or so the American expat claimed—the US embassy complained to the French government and begat a clampdown. But Doc fought back: "I think we can establish that cannabis is a drug that can heal and liberate the human spirit."

After wig-flipping in 1965 London from an overindulgence in Learygifted acid, Humes went on a peripatetic quest that lasted until his death in 1992. From Rome to Ivy League America, Doc established a non-accredited tutorial for knowledge-hungry freaks. "Doc's rap was about connecting every element of the human experience into a unified vision, the end result being world peace," explains Docolyte and author Oliver Trager.

Decades before it was legally sanctioned, Doc also called cannabis "one of the most important medicines in the pharmacopoeia." He declared he could cure narcotics addiction through a combo of grass and massage, and he also wrote manifestos explaining the benefits of cannabis for a whole laundry list of conditions. Throughout his adventures, there were always clear indications of both manic depression and con-artistry, but at least Doc let his pathologies serve the cause of truth and justice. As one of his sons quipped at his memorial, "He was no ordinary asshole." And documents obtained by his daughter via Freedom of Information Act requests proved that the FBI was indeed keeping a watch on Doc from 1948 through 1978. In addition, one notable friend of the allegedly delusional paranoiac—writer Peter Matthiessen admits on camera that he was briefly on the CIA's payroll.

Ms. Humes is a clever, skillful filmmaker: She sets up seemingly unsolvable mysteries (the whereabouts of the sole copy of Doc's film *Don Peyote*, or the truth behind his paranoia) and then cracks them open slowly, carefully, so that when the answer is finally revealed, the viewer feels a real sense of catharsis. This is effective storytelling and a gift she clearly inherited, but also one that she honed on her own in the effort to understand her father. The end result is that her audience is inspired to aggressively practice world-changing themselves—which, after all, was Doc's intention all along.—**Michael Simmons** *For more info, go to dochumes.com.*

Years Old (Forcefield Records) * * *

Tournament tore out of the gate last year with the EP

Swordswallower, five Bl'ast-biting rippers that nodded vaguely to mathy '90s bands like Karp and Unwound as they stormed toward the pit—and, let me tell you, they made a fan out of me. I practically swallowed my eyeballs every time I saw this band live.

Years Old, their debut full-length on Richmond, VA's Forcefield Records, finds the Brooklyn guartet getting heavier and slower, but certainly no less destructive, as they veer toward a sound that might best be described as metallic post-punk. The complex, often brilliantly discordant guitar work is complemented by a thunderous rolling bass that occasionally surges up from the bottom to weave through the melody almost like a third guitar. The vocals are solidly in the vein of Louisville '80s legends Squirrelbait, an agonized, throat-shredding howl. For me, the more blistering tracks like "Big Box Opportunity," "Intake Controller" and especially "Snuff News"—hot with feedback squalls and driven screaming forward almost to its knees by the relentlessly propulsive rhythm section—are the real standouts here. But fans of more modern, Melvins-weaned bands like Tombs and crust monsters Kylesa will dig the lead-heavy atmospheric tracks like the instrumental "From the Mouths" and the deeply fucked-up "Ice Castles," which cascades like an aural translation of Man Ray's *Dust Breeding*. And now that this album has liquefied my eyeballs, they'll go down so much easier at the next live show.—Polly Watson

HEAVEN & HELL

The Devil You Know (Rhino)

When Black Sabbath reunited for concerts in the late '90s, there


was hope that a second glory era for the band would follow. But with Ozzy Osbourne off chasing hack TV celebrity, his former bandmates Tony Iommi (guitar) and Geezer Butler (bass) reincarnated the second version of Sabbath with the operatic Ronnie James Dio on vocals. Completing the quartet now dubbed Heaven & Hell is Sabbath's drummer from the early-'80s era, Vinny Appice.

H&H's inaugural studio release, The Devil You Know, begins with "Atom & Evil," a mid-tempo reminder that nuclear holocaust still lurks around the corner, though it's not the strongest selection for an album opener. "Bible Black" starts off acoustic before crunching out, with a melody recalling Dio's days with the '70s metal super-group Rainbow. Despite an ominous bass intro by Butler, "Double the Pain" detracts from the album's intensity, though "The Turn of the Screw" resumes the bend sinister. Alas, it seems that every disc with Dio on it is required to have a song with "rock & roll" in the title—and sure enough, there's "Rock & Roll Angel" here. "Eating the Cannibals" is the album's rawest track, with some fiery lommi soloing, while "Follow the Tears" intrigues with its Appice marchbeat intro and embittered Dio lyrics: "Come lie on a bed of nails and slumber ... my sunshine is wind, rain and thunder." "Neverwhere" is the speedy occult number that really should've led off the album, but H&H get it right with closer "Breaking into Heaven," unleashing a timeless lommi riff to carry Dio's neo-mythic tale of a crew of fallen angels plotting to storm the pearly gates.—Mark Miller



STANISLAV GROF, MD *LSD: Doorway to the Numinous* (Park Street Press)

The world's foremost expert on psychedelics and human psychology, Dr. Stanislav Grof has devoted his life to studying the effects

of LSD and entheogens on the mind. Now, more than 30 years after its original publication, this retitled edition of Grof's 1975 classic, *Realms of the Human Unconscious*, has been updated with a new preface recounting the history of these studies.

Pursuing the mysterious state known as the "LSD trip" to discover its biochemical causes and spiritual effects has long been Grof's specialty. He views LSD as an important tool for accessing the deepest recesses of the mind, helping patients identify the source of traumatic events and resolve their inner turmoil. The discoveries made during these therapeutic LSD sessions led Grof to develop transpersonal psychology, as well as the holotropic breathwork designed to navigate the perinatal domain, where memories of one's own birth and issues stemming from this first trauma can influence a person later in life. LSD: Doorway to the Numinous is peppered throughout with extensive passages detailing his patients' trips, and these accounts are fascinating for the neophyte and experienced psychonaut alike. Shamanism, near-death experiences, and the mystical (and various other) states of altered consciousness are also explored. With this book, Grof laid the groundwork for mapping the unconscious mind and understanding how to proceed with further therapeutic use. He accomplishes so much in this early book that it's an essential prerequisite for readers hoping to move on to his more recent efforts.—Elise McDonough

Twiddle are a jam-heavy, progressive-rock foursome out of Vermont that has poked its head above the Green Mountains and chiseled an impressive path through New England and beyond. Along the way, the band has scooped up a following that recently demonstrated its devotion by helping Twiddle win the HIGH TIMES cyber battle of the bands for September.

Twiddle's intricate compositions and high-energy, rapid-fire playing get fans stirring down to their sweaty soles, keeping pace with every blast, every roar, every ascension into sweet jam heaven.

Over the course of the band's four-year existence, singer/guitarist Mihali "Mickey" Savoulidis, keyboardist Ryan Dempsey, drummer Brook Jordan and bassist Zdenek Gubb have developed a tight-knit, brotherly relationship, which is key to their remarkable ability to read one another onstage and carry improvised jams into far-flung, melodious dimensions. Their music flows effortlessly, teasing and tantalizing the audience with tight, majestic hooks and tasty pockets of funk.

Manager Matthew Tuscano has had a front-row seat to Twiddle's evolution for several years now. "Seeing Twiddle grow into serious performers with the ability to stir up a crowd has been amazing," he says. "Night after night, it plays out on the faces of the audience: sheer pleasure."

MARIJUANA ON THE MARCH

Pot protesters in New York take their message to the United Nations.

On the first Saturday of each May, tens of thousands of people gather in over 300 cities to march and show their support for marijuana legalization. But what many may not know is that this global phenomenon had its origin right here in New York City.

Back in 1967, a small but vocal political party dedicated to activism, anarchy and countercultural ideals was formed—the Youth International Party (or "Yippies" for short). Adopting a red star with a green pot leaf as their official flag, these radical hippie tricksters staged smoke-ins, pied politicians and masterminded the launch of the Alternative Press Syndicate. Among those involved with the Yippies were activists Abbie Hoffman and Jerry Rubin, poet Allen Ginsberg, satirist (and fellow HT columnist) Paul Krassner, HIGH TIMES founder Tom Forçade, and a guerrilla journalist/publisher named Dana Beal. It was Beal who, in the mid-1970s, began organizing an annual pot protest in New York—which, years later, after the advent of the Internet, evolved into the Million Marijuana March we know today.

Back in the '80s, New York's pro-pot rally was a very different animal. I fondly remember hopping the subway into the West Village with my high-school chums to gather in Washington Square Park with thousands of fellow burners, where we'd all lay out on the grass, playing our boom-boxes or acoustic guitars, and smoke joints all day. Sure, there were cops there, but they just hovered around the perimeter, only arresting dealers and jackasses. Of course, that was before Rudy Giuliani took over as mayor and instituted his zero-tolerance fatwa on pot smokers. Since then, I'd stopped going to the rally for fear of being busted. But this year, with some light finally visible at the end of the legalization tunnel, I felt compelled to go back and show my support. It was a wet, dreary morning, and as I walked through Washington Square, I wondered whether the march might be called off due to rain. But as we gathered beside the park and things got underway, the sky cleared and the sun shone down its blessings upon our endeavors. With that, the crowd's numbers and spirits increased—despite being surrounded by cops. And there were a lot of cops: somewhere between 60 and 100 by our count, with buses, scooters, vans and SUV's (both marked and unmarked). With such overkill being devoted to watching over



a small, peaceful gathering of a few hundred potheads, one had to question whether the NYPD's true purpose here wasn't merely crowd control, but outright intimidation. To put it in perspective: that same day,

Toronto's Freedom Festival (see page 18) reportedly had only 32 officers on hand to deal with crowd of nearly *30,000* attendees.

But it wasn't even the uniformed officers we had to worry about—it was the dozen or so undercover cops mingling among us, poised to pounce. Each time some poor sap would discreetly try to fire up a jay, the narcs would swoop in, drag him off to the side and bust him. And each time, my compadre Danny Danko and I would make note of the narc and his cohorts and point them out to whoever was around us. Danny even went up to one who was holding a sign and asked to take his picture. When the guy pulled the sign up to cover his face, Danny said: "Thanks. Liust wanted a picture of a con

"Thanks ... I just wanted a picture of a cop holding a protest sign."

Beal took the stage around noon, introducing fellow Yippies David Peel and "Pieman" Aron Kay, as well as several other lifelong activists, who all spoke (and sang) to the crowd. Then, led by their grandstand on wheels—and accompanied by a sizeable police escort—we made our way along St. Marks to First Avenue, then north toward the United Nations building. All the way uptown, our chants and cheers were answered by the honking of car horns and the smiles and stares of people on the street. Meanwhile,


The caravan ended at a small square on East 47th Street called Dag Hammarskjöld Plaza, across from the UN. There, the rally continued until almost 7 p.m. with bands and more speakers, including famed medicalmarijuana patient Elvy Musika and NY NORML director Ruth Liebesman. Even here, the narcs continued to infiltrate and harass peaceful protestors, busting several more stoners. It was then that an incensed Danko had his moment at the mic.

"I have a message for all the police and prohibitionists," he declared. "Give up now! We have won, so you might as well save the effort. We'll accept your surrender, but not your apology."

Memories of Manson's Mass Murder

An eerie encounter with members of the infamous "family." By Paul Krassner

August marks the 40th anniversary of the Tate-LaBianca murders, the massacre orchestrated by Charles Manson. In the course of my research into these events, I actually received a letter from him—a few pages of gibberish about Christ and the Devil—but right in the middle, he wrote in tiny letters, "Call Squeaky," along with a phone number. That would be Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme, who is currently serving a life sentence for the attempted assassination of Gerald Ford, but who back then was acting as Manson's spokesperson. So I called, and we arranged to meet at her apartment in Los Angeles.

Squeaky and her roommates, Manson Family members Sandra Good

and Nancy Pitman (a.k.a. Brenda McCann), each had the scar of an "X" that they'd gouged and burned into their forehead as a visual reminder of their commitment to Charlie.

"We've crossed ourselves out of this entire system," Squeaky explained.

They all had short hair growing back now, after having completely shaved their heads. They continued to sit on the sidewalk near the Hall of Justice every day, like a coven of faithful nuns bearing witness to Manson's martyrdom.

On an impulse, I had brought a few tabs of acid with me, and we each ingested 300 micrograms of LSD. Then we smoked a couple of joints and listened to music. They sang along with the lyrics of "The Horse With No Name," which I had always assumed was about heroin: "In the desert, you can remember your name / 'Cause there ain't no one for to give you no pain."

"You're afraid of me, aren't you?" she said.

"Not really," I replied. "Should I be?" Sandy tried to reassure me: "She's *beautiful*, Paul. Just look into her eyes. Isn't she beautiful?"

Squeaky and I stared silently at each other a while—I recalled that Manson had written, "I never picked up anyone who had not already been discarded by society" and my eyes began to tear. There were tears in Squeaky's eyes, too. She asked me to try on Charlie's vest. It felt like a scary dream to participate in this Family ceremony. The corduroy vest was a solid inch thick with embroi-

dery—snakes and dragons and devilish designs, including human hair that had been woven into the multicolored patterns.

Sandy went to take her bath, but instead of getting into the tub *with* her—assuming the invitation included that—I sat, fully dressed, on the toilet as we talked, and tried not to ogle her pert nipples.

Charles Manson was never a hippie—his real "family" included con artists, pimps, drug dealers, thieves, muggers, rapists and murderers. He had known only power relationships in an army of control junkies. Manson was America's Frankenstein monster, a logical product of the prison system, racist, paranoid, violent—even if hippie astrologers thought his fate had been predetermined because he was a triple Scorpio. I eventually concluded that the brainwashed Manson Family actually served as a hit squad for a drug ring run by mobsters that Charlie had met while in prison. But as he wrote to me: "I've always ran poker games and whores and crime. I'm a crook. You make the reality in court and the press. I just ride and play the cards that were pushed on me to play. Mass killer, it's a job, what can I say." 🖗

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I was basking in the afterglow of the Moody Blues' "Om" when Sandy asked if I wanted to take a hot bath.

I felt ambivalent. An attorney once told me that he'd participated in a memorable threesome with Squeaky and Sandy, but I was also told by a reporter: "It certainly levels the high to worry about getting stabbed while fucking the Manson ladies in the bunkhouse at the Spahn Ranch—I've found that the only satisfactory position is sitting up, back to the wall, facing the door." Visions of the classic shower scene in *Psycho* flashed through my mind. The two sensed my hesitation, but it was Squeaky, not Sandy, who confronted me.

BURNING IN HAWAII

There's just something about it that touches your primal nature when you see the red-hot lava making its way down the side of the mountain and oozing into the ocean. More than 550 acres of land have been added to the Big Island of Hawaii since the lava started flowing in 1983. Land isn't the only thing that's been growing here, however: Thanks to the tropical rain showers and warm Hawaiian sun, the Big Island is also known as the Orchid Isle and the Palm Capital of the World. So it's no surprise that marijuana has been flourishing here for many years.

I first visited the Big Island in 1969. At that time, I was living on the North Shore of Oahu. I'd moved there from San Diego in '68 to ride the big waves, and I stayed in South Kona on a coffee plantation. Some musician friends of mine were renting a shack on the grounds, and they had some beautiful marijuana growing amidst the coffee plants. Almost all of the pot consumed in Hawaii back then was coming from south of the US border. It was an inspiration to see a cannabis plant growing for the first time, and it made a lasting impression on me.

It was around this time that growing your own in Hawaii really started to bust out. It's been said by many that before the police helicopters started flying, the economy on the Big Island prospered in large part due to marijuana growing. And even though the helicopters have taken out thousands of plants since then, there are still many cultivators who have adapted to the situation and continue to grow successfully. Indoors, medical and guerrilla growers are producing an abundance of beautiful buds. Many here have been growing for 30 years or more, breeding plants to suit their needs. These days, *indica* mixes seem to dominate, probably because they do well indoors and are easier to hide outside. Most growers here are able to get three or four harvests a year as well.

The Big Island grows a lot of pot because it's a *big* island. It's larger than all the other Hawaiian islands combined and has endless acres of forests, valleys, clean rivers and beautiful waterfalls. It truly is a pot grower's paradise. One indication that the Big Island grows more pot than any of the other islands (and maybe more than all the other islands combined) is the fact that, as of July 2008, there were 4,200 medical-marijuana licenses issued statewide—and a full 2,600 of them were on the Big Island. This means the Big Island has 13 percent of the state's population, but 63 percent of its medical-marijuana licenses. License holders are allowed to grow up to seven plants and possess up to three ounces of dried *pakaloko* (the Hawaiian term for pot). Think about it: That's at least 2,600 licensed growers on this one volcanic dot in the middle of the ocean! And who knows how many more thousands of *non*-licensed growers are here in Hawaii?

Let me now introduce you to a few of our finest in both categories.

Hawaiian *indica* grown by Green Thumb.

NATURE LOVER

Nature Lover is a guerrilla grower. He's been growing on the Big Island for over 30 years—and as you've probably heard, guerrilla growing isn't easy here. He's lucky to harvest 25% to 50% of what he plants. The reasons are threefold. The first is natural enemies like ants, slugs, wild pigs, other insects, and too much rain (or not enough rain). The second is rippers: Unfortunately, there are some low-consciousness humans around here who choose to rip off others by traversing the wilderness areas that are known for growing; they think nothing of taking whatever they can find and selling or smoking it. The third reason is Operation Green Harvest, the police helicopters that have been locating and eradicating plants for many years.



GREEN THUMB

Green Thumb got his medical-marijuana license seven years ago. The first thing he did was move to a location that was good for growing. He built a greenhouse using skim-milk-colored plastic, and guess what? It works great!

Two other family members have licenses designating him as their caregiver, allowing him to grow a total of 21 plants. And believe me when I say that he's having lots of fun—because being able to do what you love to do and enjoy the fruity smoke of your labors is the very definition of Big Island Big Fun.

Green Thumb has been breeding Northern Lights x Afghan for years, and he now has a very nice 3-foot plant that produces sweet-tasting organic buds from start to finish in 90 to100 days. All of the plants are grown from seed. He keeps the entire harvest for personal use, but makes money selling the many varieties of exotic fruits that he also grows on the property. He primarily fertilizes his plants with Natural Hawaiian Spirulina Powder, which is made on the Big Island. If you want to check out what's happening here, including the lava flows and the Spirulina facility, go to bigisland-bigisland.com. Nature Lover has been the victim of these multiple enemies on many different occasions. He likes to put his plants into the ground instead of pots because they require less watering that way. And because there's not a lot of soil to be found in volcanic rock—and what's there has thick roots from tropical growth—he has to work hard on his hands and knees, digging with a hand pick and bringing in his own soil.

Nature Lover has a partner who drops him off in a remote location and comes back at a designated time to pick him up. (A car sitting by itself out on some remote country road with no houses around is a signal to cops and rippers alike that there's a grow going on in the area.) He creeps through the bushes, sometimes crawling under thick ferns so as not to leave a trail. Once his plants are in the ground, he checks on them only about once a month, and he always plants in five or six different locations. Of that number, only one to three sites are likely to survive, but that's more than enough to keep Nature Lover, his partner and his friends very, very happy. LOCAL BOY

Grower #3 is a "local boy" (i.e., a Hawaiian born and raised on the Big Island). He's an indoor grower who puts his plants in soil-filled pots under lights. He's been growing for many years and has done very well with the famous AK-47 and Puna Blue, a Blueberry hybrid. This man is very knowledgeable and a constant source of information to those who know him. He's also mastered the art of cloning, and his setup has separate areas for cloning, vegetative growth, flowering and drying.

His soil mixture consists of one-half Sunshine potting mix, onequarter Fox Farm Happy Frog potting mix and one-quarter Perlite #3. He uses one 4-foot high-output fluorescent Tek light for clones and early vegetative growth and finishes them off under two 600watt high-pressure sodium (HPS) lights. Local Boy uses the extra perlite to give him good drainage, which allows him to feed his plants regularly. He prefers Fox Farm's Grow Big, Big Bloom and Tiger Bloom, as well as Humboldt County's Gravity, Bush Master and Purple Maxx. Needless to say, he's a very successful grower with a bright future on the Island.

Matthew Brittain, pot MATTHEW BRITTAIN Matthew Brittain, pot

The Big Island is also fortunate to have individuals who are working hard to support the rights of people who need medical cannabis. One such person is Matthew Brittain at medicalmarijuanaservices.com.

Matthew is a licensed clinical social worker who has been practicing psychotherapy in Hawaii since 1978. We've worked together in the past as crisisoutreach counselors: He's a good friend and an outstanding professional. In 2005, he began helping patients obtain their medical-marijuana certificates in Hawaii. Since that time, he and his medical team have helped to certify or recertify more than 800 patients.

Matthew considers himself a patriot in the fight against oppression—specifically, the oppression that medical-marijuana patients and their caregivers still experience—and he is devoted to helping ease the suffering of qualified medical patients. He has also expanded his practice to include the other Hawaiian islands. He doesn't have a dispensary; patients must grow their own medicine or find a caregiver to do it for them. Instead, Matthew's private health-care organization helps to educate people and facilitate their participation in the state's medicalmarijuana program. Way to go, Matthew! Dry White Widow on display with other fresh Hawaiian flowers.

WILD DOG

Wild Dog has a medical license and also grows for a friend with one, allowing him a total of 14 plants. He and his friend like variety, so they buy different strains of feminized seed from marijuanaseeds.nl. Using feminized seed makes it easier for them to stay within the number of plants allowed—for example, when two plants are harvested, two seeds are started. This means they never go over their legal limit, because they don't need to start five or six non-feminized seeds to get two female plants.

Wild Dog germinates his seeds in a wet paper towel and then puts them in 4-inch pots under 18 hours of light using a 2-foot fixture that holds four T5 grow lights. After three weeks with no nutrients, his babies are transplanted into 3.5gallon pots in the greenhouse. He uses Premier Pro-Mix HP (high-porosity) Mycorise potting soil for its good drainage, and he feeds the plants with Dyna-Gro Liquid Grow for the vegetative stage and Dyna-Gro Liquid Bloom for the flowering stage.

At any given time in his greenhouse, you will find two or three White Widow, Holland's Hope, Northern Lights, Blueberry, Medi Bud or NYC Diesel plants at various stages of growth. So Wild Dog can say to himself, "Hmm, let's see—what do I feel like vaporizing today?" Which is not a bad dilemma to have!

ISLAND POT POLITICS

Like almost everywhere else in the world, Hawaii is the scene of an ongoing battle between law enforcement and marijuana advocates. One giant step forward for growers was the ballot initiative passed by Big Island voters in the 2008 general election. By a healthy margin of 58% to 42%, voters said they wanted to make the cultivation and possession of marijuana intended for adult personal use the Big Island's lowest law-enforcement priority. They also stipulated that the County Council shouldn't accept federal money for the marijuana-eradication program known as Green Harvest. Since then, however, the police department and prosecutor's office have refused to act on the initiative, arguing that it can't overturn state and federal law, which still has to be enforced. Even so, the County Council has voted not to accept federal funding for Green Harvest, and the prospect is good that police helicopters will cease their eradication efforts when the current fiscal year ends on July 1, 2009. The people of the Big Island have made their voices heard, and they're saying: "Leave the growers and personal users of marijuana alone—they are not the criminals!" 🖗

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
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LIGHTING THE FUTURE, TODAY

New technology in bulbs, color spectrum and delivery systems lights the way to better growing.

Afraid? Don't be. Intrigued? Good. Read on to find out why these lamps are the best for your garden. What if we told you that there is a new lighting system that will cater to the varying needs of your plant's grow cycle, will penetrate the canopy of your garden with greater efficiency, and will run cooler than standard bulbs, allowing you to flood your plants with bud-building artificial sunlight? Welcome to Part III of our Advanced Lighting Series.

It's been a long time getting here, but the future is now and the next phase in lighting technology is here, shining brightly in our face.

Oftentimes, we look at our gardens and examine our plants and their environments. We look for solutions to temperature problems in the growroom or nutrient deficiencies in plants. Yet all too often we ignore the most important aspect of indoor cultivation—light. Plant growth and bud formation rely on photosynthesis as their primary catalyst. And photosynthesis starts with the sun.

When it comes to indoor cultivation, we've been using the same "sun" for over 30 years—ever since the advent of indoor growing. With today's technology and science, the time for reevaluating high-intensity discharge (HID) lighting is long overdue. We've moved forward with ballasts, developing better, more efficient electronic and digital ballasts. So what's next?

Bulbs!

However, there's a problem: it turns out that as the industry moves toward electronic and digital ballasts, the bulb manufacturers aren't moving in sync. There's an acknowledged lack of compatibility between bulbs and the new ballasts. One of the major HID-bulb manufacturers, Hortilux, has published a research article stating that they believed a communications gap between US bulb makers and Asian ballast producers was probably the biggest culprit in the mix-up.

One company's bulbs do work with electronic and digital ballasts: Sun Pulse, a small but growing lighting business. Led by founder-resident scientist Gerald Garrison, Sun Pulse aims to change the world of lighting.

His technology and the theories behind it are new, complex, and to us, persuasive.

FREQUENCIES AND SUNLIGHT

Aside from total compatibility with electronic and digital ballasts, Sun Pulse works to offer growers better options in other areas of cultivation as well. In this section, we're going to deal specifically with spectrum and photosynthesis.

If you've read the previous two parts to this series (available at hightimes.com/lightingpart1 and hightimes.com/lightingpart2), you already have a good understanding about light, spectrum and photosynthesis. And if not, that's okay—the basic principles are easy to understand.



The key to indoor cultivation, as it should be, is mimicking nature so as to stimulate the plant's natural biological mechanisms, only artificially and indoors. The next step is actually trying to outdo nature, pushing the plants past their natural limits to realize their fullest potential.

In order to get the most from the plant, we need to look at the process of photosynthesis, specifically in relation to the sun, so that we can better understand what the plant needs and what we are capable of giving it. The first and most important aspect of this process is light frequency, or spectrum.

Pick up any plant-science or photobiology textbook about photosynthetic processes in relation to light, and you will learn that exciting both of the plant's photosystems (I and II) and all of its light-harvesting complexes with proper broad-spectrum lighting is essential to achieving its full potential. Mono- or dual-chromatic lamps with narrow-bandwidth lighting may not excite proper NADPH and ATP conversion in plants. This could cause poor chloroplast development and low glucose production, resulting in less energy for your plants—and smaller yields for you.


MEASURING LIGHT

Besides spectrum, light energy is also a very important factor in supercharging a garden. The way we measure light has become skewed over the years. Light intensity has traditionally been measured in lumens or foot-candles, but this is really a unit of measurement for what the human eye can see, not what a plant can use. The importance of color spectrum is diminished greatly when light is measured in lumens, and so is the relevance of the light's energy. Solar Spectrum

PAR (photosynthetically active radiation) is a rating for light that corresponds to the main portion of the spectrum used by plants, representing wave frequencies that fall between 400 and 700 nanometers. The PAR watt is a unit of measurement that attempts to define the amount of photons (energy) that a light source emits. While this is a better unit of measurement for light, it is still only a value for a lamp's particular light at the bulb level, not the surface level of a leaf.

The amount of usable light at the leaf's surface depends both on the kind of light and the method of delivery. Photobiologists measure the light energy on a surface (also known as irradiance) in terms of watts per square meter. But the best and truest way to measure light for indoor cultivation is to hold a light meter directly on a leaf's surface to see exactly how much energy the plant is getting from the light source. This is important because photochemical reactions depend immensely on the number of photons reaching the surface of the leaves.

The technology behind the Sun Pulse systems utilizes four different types of bulbs to provide maximum irradiance by using a better mixed spectrum in artificial lighting. With six different wattages of bulbs (ranging from 150 to

1,000 watts), each bulb is available in one of four different Kelvin ratings. This is because light spectrum can also be measured by Kelvin temperature to express the color of a bulb. While PAR values measure the parts of light that a plant uses (photon energy), the Kelvin temperature of a bulb can be used to gauge that PAR rating by defining a bulb's spectrum.

The varying Kelvin temperatures of each bulb provide a different spectral wavelength or color frequency. By combining these bulbs in different types of lighting systems, growers can more closely replicate the sun's natural light for precise applications. Each stage of growth can be fine-tuned by using different bulb combinations to match the sun's light for different phases or seasons of the year.

THE WORLD'S FIRST TRUE DIGITAL BULBS

With any new technology comes a lot of questions. What exactly is meant by "Kelvin-rated bulbs"? How do they work? And how are they made?

For starters, we need to understand that a kelvin is a unit of measurement for temperature; however, it is not the same as a degree. The Kelvin scale is a thermodynamic (absolute) temperature scale in which absolute zero—the theoretical absence of all thermal energy—is 0 K. Each color within the visible (and invisible) spectrum has its own Kelvin temperature when separated. But when taken together, as in sunlight, the temperature is just over 5,700 K. Comparatively, the temperatures of most high-pressure sodium (HPS) bulbs range from 2,100 K to 2,700 K, while metal- halide (MH) bulbs range from 5,200 K to 5,400 K.

Sun Pulse bulbs are made in four different color spectrums: 3 K, 4 K, 6.4 K and 10 K. However, these numerals do not delineate an actual Kelvin rating (i.e., "3 K" doesn't mean that the bulb's temperature is actually 3 K or 3,000 K) in fact, the actual Kelvin temperatures are closely guarded by Sun Pulse as a trade secret. Instead, these numbers simply serve to define This bud developed very well on a lower branch of a Bubba Kush plant because it received good light.


> This three-arm spinner fits a smaller room and is fitted with a 3 K and two 6.4 K bulbs for vegging.



and differentiate between the bulbs and their respective spectrums.

The 3 K bulb is rich in reds and oranges, while the 4 K bulb has a fuller spectrum ideal for starts and finishes. The 6.4 K resembles daylight and is similar to MH bulbs, with more blue and green spectrum. Alone, this bulb can be used for vegetative phases. The 10 K bulb is the most unique, providing a lower-frequency, invisible spectrum that no other HID bulb creates. The 10 K has ultraviolet (UV) enrichment and appears bluish in color. When these bulbs are taken together in varying combinations, the result is an artificial light source that can much more closely approximate the sun's natural spectrum.

NEW DELIVERY SYSTEM, NEW THEORY-SPINNING LIGHT: MORE THAN MEETS THE EYE

We understand that deviations in the norm can freak people out. Well, stay with us. In addition to their radical approach to the lighting spectrum, Sun Pulse has designed a spinning delivery system that mimics the way sunlight is naturally applied to plants.

Lights spinning around at a pretty fast pace and casting various-colored hues around a growroom can make people feel like they're in a disco rather than a garden—and this might breed some skepticism as well. But we think we can safely say that there is something big brewing here.

The science, when applied to the garden, makes a lot of sense and pays off in multiple ways. First, the spinning arms deliver the various spectrums of the different bulbs at the exact same beat frequency that the sun's natural light delivers them to the surface of the Earth. Algorithms derived from the sun's frequency take into account light speed and distance, the weight of specific spinners and the varying spectrum frequencies of different bulbs, to ensure the correct number of revolutions per minute (rpm) for the various units: A three-arm spinner, for instance, is lighter than a six-arm spinner and thus needs to rotate at a different speed to deliver light at the same pulse rate. This creates a highly dynamic light source, just like the sun.

Perhaps the biggest advantage of a spinning delivery system is the amount of total coverage and deep penetration of light that gardens receive. Aside from the actual diameter of the arms, the light emitted from each arm is not only reflected downward but also cast outward, making the light's footprint much wider than is the case with a motionless lamp. And because the bulbs are in constant rotation, the light is able to find and penetrate every crack in the canopy cover, allowing it to reach the lower branches. Growers currently using these systems have indicated increases of yield due to the extra size packed onto the lower buds. Because Sun Pulse's delivery systems are constantly throwing light around, the room naturally has fewer dark spots, which aids in overcoming this problem. Still, some new improvements to the spinner systems would include small diodes on the top of the spinner arms to illuminate ceiling areas, keeping the "good light" going down toward the plants.

The spinning lamps actually have more advantages than just better light distribution: they also prevent heat buildup and, following the laws of thermodynamics, stay cooler because of their constant motion. Whereas a stationary lamp acts as a conductor for heat, creating pockets that build up and permeate a growroom, the Sun Pulse units actually run cool enough for humans to touch.

This means that multiple spinner units can be run over hundreds of plants in large-scale grow ops and require no air conditioning other than the standard air exchanges for the room itself.

Take that one step further and apply it to CO2. The infusion of carbon dioxide into growrooms came about years ago when growers were having problems cooling their rooms due to the heat byproduct of HID lamps.

MAD SCIENCE: Sun Pulse's Gerald Garrison

One profession missing from the grow industry is that of the true scientist. Sure, manufacturers around the world have engineers and lab technicians on their payrolls to construct and test their products, but the component of deep science has been lacking.

One man who does have the advanced knowledge required to keep us moving forward, how-



ever, is inventor and scientist Gerald Garrison, the brains behind Sun Pulse. A man who left the cultivation field after helping formulate prototypes of the late core-and-coil ballasts, Garrison jetted for greener pastures (both figuratively and literally), making a small fortune in car audio technology. After years spent pumping out the latest lines of equipment for major outlets such as Alpine and Kicker, Garrison returned to the world of horticulture and found that nothing had progressed. "I looked around at the outdated technology still in use, and I knew I had to help change that." Applying his advanced knowledge of the wave physics used in audio technology to the particle physics of light theory, Garrison slowly began to develop bulbs and lighting systems that were not only better for plants, but also worked perfectly well with the high-frequency electronic and digital ballasts currently on the market.

Garrison is, however, a scientist of many disciplines, and as such his skills are extremely useful in fields other than ganja growing. Garrison is currently a leading member of a United Nations task force on feeding the world. He works with team members around the planet to build sustainable-farming techniques for all areas of the globe and this is where we stoners catch a free ride. Building bio-domes in desolate areas to feed starving people, Garrison needed lighting systems that left a small carbon footprint while maximizing a crop's potential. The result was his patented line of digital lamps, rotating around and around in deserts all across the planet. ata within a plant's leaves close up, effectively shutting down photosynthesis. CO2 was a quick fix for this problem, as higher levels of CO2 will open the stomata and allow a growroom to run hotter.

Why would growers use lamps that get so hot that they cause photoinhibition and shut down the plants' vital processes? And the answer, as we now know, is simple: because there were no other choices.

Sun Pulse has thrown down the gauntlet, and all other lighting companies should consider themselves served. There's a brave new world out there for the cannabis grower will to take a chance on something new.

So where does this leave us? As usual, it's up to you to decide—but having more and newer options has never been a bad thing! *

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
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
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

PENN JILLETTE

INTERVIEW BY DAN SKYE

He's the towering, talking presence in the Penn & Teller show, a magic act that has been described as having "a psychotic twist." Penn & Teller have been performing for 30 years, including five years at the Rio in Las Vegas as the headliners at their very own Penn & Teller Theater. They've made countless TV appearances and have involved themselves in every aspect of the entertainment industry. *Penn & Teller: Bullshit!*—now in its fifth season—has received 11 Emmy nominations, including two in 2007, as well as the 2004 WGA Award for Outstanding Comedy/Variety Series. *Bullshit!* tackles the frauds and fakes behind such topics as alien abductions, feng shui and talking to the dead.

Remember the deep, booming voice of the pitchman that launched Comedy Central? That's Penn Jillette, a phenomenally creative and curious individual who boasts sterling credits as a writer, film producer, actor *and* musician (bass and double bass), in addition to being a now-legendary magician. Jillette speaks out on every issue that crosses his radar and clearly enjoys a good verbal joust, though it may be more apt to call him a flamethrower who will torch the foundations of each and every specious argument he encounters in countless magazine essays and videos.

Just before agreeing to this interview, Jillette saw a clip of Frank Zappa on YouTube in which he spoke about his own interview with HIGH TIMES. Zappa said it was the perfect place for him to address the subject of drugs, especially since he was so opposed to drug use himself (aside from caffeine and nicotine). A huge Zappa fan, Jillette thought he should consent for a similar reason, since he also eschews the use of drugs. Even so, that hasn't stopped him from becoming one of the most articulate American voices for legalization and freedom, in all its forms, speaking out today.

So, according to what we see on the Web, you

I hadn't done any recreational drugs. A good part of the conversation was them asking, "You mean you haven't smoked marijuana?" and me answering, "No, no, never marijuana." "Acid?" in my school, listened to the Velvet Underground and Zappa, all that kind of stuff. And although the Velvet Underground was, I guess you could say, pro-drug—or at least not anti-drug—Zappa was *always* anti-drug.

My mother and father never drank, but also never mentioned it. They never told me horror stories—it did not *exist*. I didn't know that people drank on New Year's Eve, even culturally, until I was in my teens. If Johnny Carson made an overt drinking or marijuana reference, which he often did with Doc Severinsen, my family was oblivious to it.

There's this campaign: "Talk to your kids about drugs." First of all, I don't think the government should be telling you what to say to your kids. Who the fuck are they? In the second place, in my particular experience, having no talk about drugs was quite helpful.

Being a huge fan of Lenny Bruce and Jimi Hendrix and that whole culture, I personalized drugs as a child and hated them because I'd never see Lenny Bruce. Lenny died in '66, so I was 11. I had memorized all of his recordings by the time I was 12, and I would never see him. In the simplistic worldview of a child, you could go two ways. You could say, "There's a hero of mine that did drugs—I should do them, too." Or you could also say, "There's a hero of mine that I'll never see *because of* drugs." I think all that meshes together.

hate the baby Jesus and think you're smarter than the Pope. What's that all about?

[Laughing] I don't think I said I was smarter than the Pope, did I? Was that a slip? I think I said I agreed with the Pope as far as this: If you're going to go with the Bible, then go with the Bible. But it's true, I'm not a—uh—Christian. I suppose by some, that's interpreted as hating the baby Jesus. I'm sure that there are baby Jesúses out there that I'd be very fond of.

So let's get right down to it: You actually never, ever smoked pot?

I remember being out for one dinner with Lou Reed, Iggy Pop and David Bowie, and they had seen our show in New York City—this was back in the '80s. Now I would like to think—maybe I'm flattering myself—that there's some stuff we do in our show that is remarkable. We shoot bullets at each other; we do things that appear to violate the laws of physics. And yet, Lou's major claim for me being an interesting person to be around was that "No, I've tried to do a blanket thing." "How about drinking?"

"No, I've tried to do a *blanket* thing. No!" I have touched regular cigarettes, because I use them in fire eating; I've never been a buy-apack smoker. I have had caffeine—very, very hard to avoid *that* in the real world. And I suppose if you count spaghetti sauces and so on, alcohol *has* touched my lips—certainly vanilla has some in it. But in terms of actually choosing to use a recreational drug? Never. It's so funny, because people act like that's an amazing thing, and I say it isn't. If anything, it's a *non*-action.

What was your motivation for engaging in this non-action?

I think graduating from a rural high school in 1973. When I was 15 and 16, I had the longest hair

Did you feel peer pressure?

That's the real advantage: I think if I had seen 18or 19-year-old responsible people smoking dope, I would have felt tremendous peer pressure.

You have often expressed amazement that pot use remains a criminal activity.

Every time I say this stuff, I always have to follow it instantly with the fact that I'm an atheist and the fact that I'm libertarian. I really believe passionately that everything should be completely legal. If you haven't got the freedom to put anything you FREALLY STRONG ODORS ARE A CONCERN FOR YOU, BREATHE BASY WITH ONA!

want in your body, you're not living in a free country. It's as simple as that. But I don't even know if I would suggest my position to my children. I think my position is an extreme, eccentric position.

But you must have the freedom to be someone who chooses *not* to do something. We forget that in terms of religion—many people forget that freedom of religion also has to mean freedom *from* religion. I love the fact that Fred Phelps [the Kansas minister who believes God is punishing America for tolerating homosexuals] can carry around signs preaching the craziest kind of religion, because that just reinforces *my* right to say there is no God.

There are some people who think freedom to use drugs means that everybody would be doing drugs. But if you told me you had absolute proof that, if all drugs were legal, more people would do them and it would do more damage to their lives—if you told me that, and I believed you, I would still want them to be legal. Freedom is more important than taking care of people. Plus, my chances of being hurt by someone on drugs are infinitely higher when drugs are illegal.


People who smoke marijuana aren't, in any way, shape or form, bad people—but they're put in a situation where they have to, by definition, become criminals.

How do you personally feel about smoking marijuana?

I don't know if smoking marijuana is good for you. [Laughing] I don't even know that *not* smoking dope is the right choice for me—I might have missed out on many insights, much pure, hedonistic pleasure and much camaraderie. So if you ask me, I can't even answer you what the fuck is best for me. Expanding that to what's best for my kids is very difficult. When I go on to what's best for 300 million people [laughing], I haven't got a fucking clue. So my whole view is, it's too complicated a question for government to figure out. Let's agree that we probably shouldn't rape people, probably shouldn't kill 'em, probably shouldn't steal shit. And after that? I don't know. If Lou Reed hadn't done heroin, would the music of the Velvet Underground have been that good? Would he have the steely clarity and skill that he has now if he hadn't gone through that period? Who the fuck am I to say drugs are bad when Charlie Parker played better than any

human being that's ever been alive, and was more fucked up? [Laughing] I mean, Louis Armstrong invented popular song in the United States of America, and many biographers believe that from the age of 14 until the day he died, there was not a day he wasn't stoned.

You can say the same thing for Willie Nelson. Think about the joy he brought to people. Take just Willie Nelson and Penn Jillette—okay, you tell me: Which one of these guys is living his life right? I bet if Willie was in the room, he'd agree with me. And I don't know.

Do you have disdain for pot smokers? There are certain pot-smoking qualities—stereotypical pot-smoking qualities—that I find very repulsive. But that's a very different thing. Saying the stereotype of pot smokers is something you don't like is a little like saying the stereotype of Jews is something you don't like. It's not true to begin with! So why would you jump in on it? I do not like to be around people who are stoned. I do not like to be around people who are drinking. But that's still a very extreme position. It's shocking to me that somehow our entire culture pretends at some level that marijuana use is an "outsider" thing. That offends me deeply. The president of the United States of America says that he smoked dope, and I believe he also admitted to using other drugs as well. The numbers are enormous, and yet in our culture there's still this characterization of pot smokers as being "outside." And I don't like it. Let's admit that pot smokers are the

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

majority, so I can go back to where I'm comfortable—which is being an outsider! [Laughing]

What was your stance in the last election?

As a libertarian, I didn't really have a dog in this fight. I'm as pro-freedom as you can possibly be; I always want to go in the direction of freedom. And really, since FDR—some would say right after *Washington*—the presidential powers have gotten bigger. We have wars that aren't declared, with presidents sending troops in. I was against Bush going into Iraq, and I'm against Obama sending 17,000 troops into Afghanistan. So I'm amazed, from my odd little point of view, that

liberals that I know attack Bush's policies and conservatives that I know attack Obama's policies—and they're so close! [Laughing] Bush grew the government more than any other president ever has, and Obama's going to continue that. They're in league with the idea that someone in power can take care of us. The humor of Penn & Teller is macabre, sometimes shocking. How did that develop?

My sense of humor—I don't know why I'm choosing to be *so* honest the sense of humor was always accidental with me. I was always drawn to ideas, always wanted to be a writer, always was fascinated by the underlying idea of everything in art. All I cared about is what the ideas are and what's supposed to happen.

Then it turned out that, whenever I did *this* stuff, I was just more comfortable.

Some have called Penn & Teller's magic revolutionary.

The idea was that magic had been so

deeply insulting— Jerry Seinfeld says, "All magic acts are 'Here's a quarter, now it's gone, you're a jerk, now it's back, you're an asshole, show's over.'" We wanted very much to say to people: "All that stuff you disliked about magic? We're trying to do something different."

You took a lot of flack in the early days for revealing the secrets of tricks.

A lot of that was manufactured. Many of the old-timers in magic always loved us, always understood us. Any guy who had done The Ed Sullivan Show understood us tremendously. Then there was the middle-aged group, who kind of didn't get it. But we did something that's very important—a guy would write something trashing us in a newsletter that went out to 2,000 people. Then we would give that newsletter to Letterman, and he'd read it in front of eight million people. Then we'd act like we were being persecuted. [Laughing] I mean, we had a much bigger forum. It was very playful in the magic community—and outside of the magic community, people kinda dug it. Salvador Dalí had a great quote that I will not get exactly right. He said something to the effect of-and I'm sure the wording is wrong on this—"Every artist should hate every other artist in order to develop their own style. But they should not be surprised when the audience doesn't." 🖊

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Let's talk about magic.

I started out as a juggler. And that is significant to me, because jugglers and magicians are always thrown together in lousy variety acts. Often, they're the same person—yet, conceptually, they couldn't be further away.

Jugglers, by definition, are doing what they claim to be doing; a magician, by definition, is not. Teller had the idea that, instead of dealing with magic as "We don't really know what could be possible" or "Here's a fantasy I have," you could deal with magic by talking about the idea of *trickery*. Forgive me for being so pretentious, but the subject becomes epistemological: You can discuss magic in discussing how we ascertain what is true.

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

It started with a favor to some friends—I had a truck; they had a teetering pile of random used furnishings they couldn't possibly need, much less transport, but had purchased nonetheless. When I arrived at the nonprofit thrift store they had just decimated, I found an adorable little designer purse that I snagged for a buck. Inside

the purse was a \$10 bill. My initial flush of excitement was tempered with a twinge of culturally Catholic guilt, so I immediately spent the cash on a new food dehydrator that some newlywed couple had apparently *not* put on their gift registry.

Of course, one person's wedding trash is another person's passport to lightweight, nonperishable food supplies for road-tripping/extended camping/hurricane season. For the record, I'm ridiculously excited about cramming brittle, lifeless kiwi slices into my emergency supply box/backpack/glove box/adorable little designer purse. Ever since attorney Don Wirtshafter, formerly of the Ohio Hempery, turned me onto his Volcano vaporizer *and* homemade dried fruit years ago in Mexico (back when he was threatening to canoe with me in the Amazon Basin), I've toyed with the idea of drying fruit at home.

For the record, Don is much better at this mummification-of-food thing than I am. I guess he needs to be, since he's a fearless explorer of such remote and savage terrain. But I'll master the process eventually, and then it'll be war. I've been daydreaming about toting 50 pounds of random dried fruit to the Rainbow Gathering and calling Wirtshafter out—it would be the Phat Kids East Kitchen vs. Whatever Forest Kitchen Don Calls Home. Yes sir, we'd have us a true hippie standoff,



our fingers twitching in anticipation, hovering mere inches from bottles of exotic juices and piles of strawberry chips, poised to rehydrate the withered masses. Then we'll see who makes the better pancake in the woods.

Of course, I'll need to kidnap the HIGH TIMES tepee before any of this happens. You hear me, Steve Hager? I know you're my boss and all that, but Jiva the Queen of the Rainbow Gypsy Tribe says that tepee belongs at the Rainbow Gathering, with or without you. 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1/2 tsp almond or vanilla extract





Smoke & Your Health

Everyone has his or her own preferred method of smoking. Some folks like glass, whether it's pipes, bubblers, bongs or chillums. Others like joints or blunts. Still others have dropped all the traditional modes of smoking and taken up the vaporizer as their method of choice.

But from a health standpoint, the matter of cannabis ingestion takes a bit of a turn. For starters, a truly healthy alternative for taking medication is the way our grandparents did it 50 years ago. That's right, oral ingestion—over the lips, down the throat and into the belly, just like Grandpa's shot of whiskey. But while eating pot foods may be the healthiest choice, there are other considerations to take into account.

Just as smoking pot affects each individual differently, eating cannabis can have more drastic effects from one person to another. Thanks to variations in individual metabolism, everyone digests food differently, at different speeds and with different absorption rates. These factors, in turn, can make a big difference in the effects that pot food has on a person. We don't mean this as a deterrent for those wishing to try a pot brownie or candy bar. Rather, it's merely a cautionary note to go slow with pot food at first. While some people have the same or a similar reaction eating pot as they do smoking a joint, others may experience much more or much less of a high. While some people experience little effect from pot food, others could experience much more intense effects, including trippy hallucinations, extreme fatigue or even an upset stomach.



MEDICINAL STRAIN OF THE MONTH SUPER SKUNK -

A derivative of perhaps one of the world's most popular strains is now one of the world's most potent medicines. Super Skunk, aptly named for its super indica properties, is the genius child of a Skunk #1 backcrossed with its original heritage—a pure Afghani. This makes the Super Skunk virtually 100% indica.

Although different varieties exist around the world, in North America two types dominate the market—a sweeter version and a really skunky sour version. The latter is usually associated with the raw, more potent phenotype. Because it grows so well organically, its popularity is heightened in the United States, where many medical dispensaries choose to carry organically grown Super Skunk. Patients like the Super Skunk for its relaxing gualities and mellow stone. It tends to stimulate appetite and induce giggles (very stereotypical cannabis). In the US, numerous hybrids of this strain also exist, some of which have been crossed with sativas to produce a more balanced and focused high.

been around for quite some time, the actual device has only been perfected relatively recently.

Patients may have noticed Volcano vaporizers in medical clinics and smoke shops around the country and even overseas. It's the most popular vaporizer on the market—but also the most expensive. Vaporizers, in general, are one of the safest and healthiest means for ingesting cannabis available today. The Volcano unit is a well-engineered and wellmanufactured tool that heats cannabis to varying degrees short of actual combustion, so that only the resin glands on the outer part of the buds are evaporated into an inhalable vapor.

This is a healthier alternative than burning entire buds, because a patient's lungs don't get anywhere near as much tar or resin as they do from burned vegetative matter. However, therein lies a small snag to the process: Because vaporizers volatilize cannabis by blowing heated air over the buds, only the trichomes on the surface are evaporated and consumed by patients.

We know that cannabis possesses over 50 active cannabinoids (actually, it's closer to 60), all of which influence the high or stone of a given strain. On top of that, there are other components in cannabis, known as terpenes, which are locked away within the plant's essential oils and resins. Terpenes, which are found in many plants besides cannabis, are a major component of the resin and affect the way that certain strains smell and taste. They can also affect the high of each strain. Not all terpenes—or even the major cannabinoids, for that matter-reside on the most superficial or external levels of marijuana buds. So when cannabis is vaporized, especially at lower temperatures (which is the healthier choice), not all of the ingredients that go into producing a specific plant's high will be present in the vapor. Thus, the debate goes on as to whether or not vaporizers can deliver the true high of a strain or the full medicinal effects desired by patients. One thing is certain, though: Cannabis vapor is still a healthier alternative to pure smoke any day of the week. 🖗

Medical growers tend to favor the strain because it does well outdoors and grows with vigor. Ambitious growers can still find remnants of the original Skunk #1 phenotype in parts of California, where the strain was heavily developed (and inbred) in the olden days of breeding.

Patients making purchases at medical dispensaries should speak with the shop's personnel about the dosages, potency and effects from the various edibles available. Most dispensaries know their cannabis chefs well and can talk to patients on a variety of topics involving the preparation and consumption of pot foods.

The Debate Over Vape

One of the latest products in a long line of smoking paraphernalia is the vaporizer. And while the technique of vaporization has

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

Ask Dr. Mitch

Dr. Mitch, Are hemp seeds low-carb? Fred Atkins

Hi Fred,

Shelled hemp seeds are roughly 12 percent carbohydrates, which comes to about six grams in a 50-gram serving. If you're on a lowcarb diet, you should know that about half of these carbs are from fiber and won't alter your blood sugar. The seeds are also a great source of vitamin E and trace minerals like manganese.

What's the best way to store your stash? *W. Beaver*

Hi W.,

The key to storing anything perishable is to keep it dry, dark, cool and free from air. The best results in published work I've seen found that THC levels dropped by only 7 percent after nearly a year in a dark, dry fridge set at a chilly 41°F (5°C). But at a much balmier 68°F (20°C), the THC level dropped twice as fast—and exposure to light *tripled* the loss.

You mention cannabidiol sometimes. What is it really?

Ralph Malph

Hi Ralph,

Cannabidiol is a cannabinoid like THC, meaning that it's a molecule produced by the cannabis plant. It doesn't really have any intoxicating effects, though it can be a bit sedating. It does have amazing potential as a medicine, however: It shows promise in the treatment of seizures, brain injuries, psychosis, anxiety and cancer. Yet despite evidence, cannabis is still listed as a Schedule I drug, meaning that it's considered dangerous and has no approved medical



We laughed two years ago when Miss Teen South Carolina tried to explain why 20 percent of Americans can't find the US on a world map. And we cringed this year when Miss California shared her views on gay marriage. But now, finally, there's a beauty-pageant winner whose speeches we can all be proud of—Miss New Jersey 2006, Georgine DiMaria.

Ms. DiMaria officially came out of the cannabis closet at the NORML NJ—PhillyNORML 420 Freedom Forum, held on April 20, 2009, at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia. As the emcee of the event, Georgi revealed that she's been using marijuana medicinally to treat the symptoms of chronic asthma. Her speech can be heard on the April 23 episode of the NORML Daily Audio Stash.

Georgi has been living with asthma since childhood, when her attacks were so severe that she had to be home-schooled. As an adult, she's found medical marijuana extremely helpful, but had previously kept her use secret, especially while in the high-profile spotlight of the Miss America pageant.

Currently, Georgi is working with her brother Fred, an attorney, and NORML New Jersey (www.normlnj.org) to win passage of a medical-marijuana bill in that state. She has also served as a spokesperson for the American Lung Association, and emphasizes that she doesn't condone smoking instead pointing out that edible and vaporized preparations of cannabis help medicinal users avoid all the harmful effects of smoking.

As of press time, New Jersey's medical-marijuana bill had cleared its first major hurdle when it was passed in the State Senate. If the bill passes in the Assembly as well, the governor has already indicated that he'll sign it into law, making New Jersey the nation's 14th medical-marijuana state.

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The glass pipes of the artist known as Ghost scare the shit out of tokers. Marijuana becomes a macabre experience when you toke on Frankensteins and skulls.

What's the proper stoner etiquette when someone passes you a pipe that is so hideous, so grotesque, that using it to get high actually seems more repellent than staying straight? What do you do when the pipe you're expected to smoke from causes you to recoil—in others words, when it actually makes you scaredyfraid? And we're not



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talking here about some grimy, crud-caked bong that hasn't been cleaned since the Clinton administration, but rather nightmarish pieces that will influence the effect of every toke you take.

Currently, there exists a genre of smokeware available for those who prefer a dollop of horror when getting high. At a recent "tobacco accessories" convention, stoner art lovers flocked to one particular booth showcasing an absolutely alarming array of gruesome glass: Frankensteins, weird skulls, exposed brains sliced by scythes and, scariest of all, a zombie Hitler.

But do these ghoulish pipes actually sell?

According to Ghost, the glass artist primarily responsible for this freak show, the answer is a resounding yes. "Despite the recession," he says, "I'm having my best year ever."

He's been working behind the torch for nearly six years now and has developed into one of the industry's premier glassblowers. "I've always been into art of any kind, and it's been great to be able to do this," he says. "I'm buying a house. My family and I are comfortable but most important, I'm happy!" JONSTER PIPES

Top artist Banjo exhibited this headhunter at the "Suck On It" pipe art show in Chicago. It's actually a sherlock. The headdress is the bowl and the left arm is the stem.

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You'd never guess that looking at his pipes, however. "I guess I just have a different perspective on life," Ghost explains. "People see a butterfly and say, 'Wow, that's a beautiful creature!' But have you ever seen a butterfly up close? It's the creepiest-looking fuckin' bug ever! I can look at simple things and see something dark. I guess I'm just messed up in the head." He adds with a laugh: "I can take simple objects, look deep inside them and find the darkness."

He cites top artists like Clinton and Banjo (whose pot-leaf bong graced the March '08 cover) as inspiration. But Bear Claw, whose work has often appeared in HIGH TIMES, transported Ghost to the next level. "Bear Claw's work really floored me—crazy little creatures! That's when I saw the potential of glass art and where I could go with it, not just be a production guy. I saw the true *art form*."

Glassblowing is perhaps closest to animation, wherein the creator's most soaring and disturbing visual flights of fancy can be made real. But animation exists only on projected film or video; glass art is tangible—and, for our purposes, smokeable.

> Ghost's first attempt at a Frankenstein was ambitious. He tried to create his birth with electrodes surrounding the head. Ghost uses glass powder in most of his pieces. The eyes are pre-made millefioris; a tungsten pick was used for facial features.

Star glassblower Clinton created this blue dragon sherlock. It boasts amazing functionality when it's upright, and weighs over 4 lbs.

From Ghost's "Godfathers of Horror," these 18 mm. tube slides are just smalller than your fist. Ghost made them big in order to allow for necessary detail in facial features.

However, the functionality of these pipes seems to be purely theoretical. For one thing, they invariably cost a fortune—and shattering one, we guarantee, will be an emotional experience. For another, if you do actually manage to smoke from one, you'll find cleaning it next to impossible.

Even so, the demand for high-end, often outlandish smokeware has only increased in recent years, and many art shows now feature exhibitions by the top glass-pipe artists. As far as gifts for stoners go, there is perhaps no better item extant. But does a brain being cleavered in two, with two bulging eyes gaping in terror, really show a fellow toker how much you care?

"I don't know," says Ghost. "Maybe pipes like these are just a good way to get revenge."—Dan Skye

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Ghost's voodoo doll was created using glass powder to achieve a seamless finish. A hidden bowl piece is diguised by the skull resting on the hand.

"The Scorpiad" is a 16" tall diffused bubbler. Ghost used a faux wood effect on the horns surrounding the piece using a tungsten pick and glass powders, and finished it off with a light sandblasting.

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THE WAR ON SCOTT WALT

Scott Walt is not a murderer or rapist or even a dealer of harmful drugs, yet he's been in federal prison for over 15 years. His crime? He sold a plant that grows wild out of God's green earth.

Sometime around October 3, 1994, Scott Walt went surfing in the Pacific Ocean, as he did nearly every day—a luxury afforded him by his life as both a carpenter's foreman for a large government contractor and a marijuana dealer.

The waves had been his passion since he was nine years old, growing up in Encinitas, CA, and he felt lucky that he was able to spend as much time on the beach as he did. It would be hard to argue that, up to that point, Scott's life had been anything but a success. Eight years before, he'd married Dawn, a beautiful blonde California girl, and they now had two children who were just starting school. The family went to Club Med twice a year. Scott had bought a house on a lake stocked with bluegill, catfish, bass and perch; his wife drove a Lincoln Continental, though Scott, a nature lover, preferred his Ford F-350 four-by-four.

So there was nothing particularly extraordinary about that trip to the beach one day in early October 15 years ago, other than the fact that Scott hasn't surfed or even seen a beach since then.





That night, Thode called Scott and asked to borrow \$1,200 so he could go to Minnesota to make a delivery. The next morning, Scott went to visit him. While they were in Thode's garage, Scott noticed undercover cops across the street. Sensing a setup, but knowing that he had no weed on him, either in his truck or at home, Scott figured he was in the clear and turned to leave. Thode asked him how much he should charge on his next delivery. Shrugging him off, Scott said, "I don't know—800 or 850," then The Feds tore through his

got in his truck and split. Two sheriff's cars rolled up on him at a stoplight, and that was the end. They put Scott in a car, drove into an alley and handed him over to the Feds. In an attempt to flip Scott, one of the agents told him: "OJ has a better chance of getting off." Scott kept his mouth shut, but the agent's comment proved prophetic. house, but found nothing in the way of drugs, scales or paraphernaliaonly \$7,500 that came from the Mary Kay Cosmetics business that his wife ran from their home. The agents told Dawn that Scott would be out on bail in a few days. He hasn't been home since.

He's been incarcerated for 15 years and is only two-thirds of the way through his sentenceall on the testimony of one man who was caught with 57 pounds of weed in his hands.

a number of buyers. There was something about the limelight that appealed to this Vietnam vet, who envisioned himself the Scarface of sinsemilla. They put him up in a hotel room and, one by one, Thode lured low-level marijuana dealers to their doom. Before testifying against Scott, he participated in "practice" trial against a kid who'd had the misfortune of carrying a 9mm handgun when he was arrested. Thode must have done pretty well, because the kid got 17 years. Then it was back to California for the main event. Claiming that Scott Walt "ran a drug empire from behind iron gates to shield himself from law enforcement," the US Attorney put Thode on the stand, where he proceeded to spin tales that lessened his own participation and increased Scott's culpability. On the testimony of one man, and with no surveillance evidence, no wiretaps, no marijuana found in his possession at any time—only a few pieces of scrap paper found in Thode's home with numbers written on them—Scott Walt was convicted of being the kingpin of a far-reaching conspiracy to traffic marijuana from the West Coast through Minnesota to parts east. A first, the Feds seized Scott's house, because Thode had testified that he once saw 500 pounds there (a jury eventually gave it back). They also took his truck, because Thode recalled seeing 100 pounds in it, too. Scott's assets were frozen, damning him to a court-appointed attorney. Aside from the arresting officers, Thode was the government's only witness.

At the end of the trial—after stating that he was hamstrung by mandatory-minimum laws that forced him to hand down a sentence far greater than that given to most murderers—the judge reluctantly sentenced Scott Walt to 24 years and four months in jail. (The Feds had been asking for 30, because the kid in Minnesota was found with a gun.) As for Thode, he did one year in FCC Lompoc, a minimum-security prison camp 175 miles northwest of Los Angeles, and is now quite possibly living in a basement apartment near you.

After a few years, Scott's wife Dawn divorced him; he's had to watch his two children, now 18 and 20, grow up on visiting days. He's been incarcerated for 15 years and is only two-thirds of the way through his sentence—all on the testimony of one man who was caught with 57 pounds of weed in his hands.

Scott Walt is down but not out. He's one of the most positivethinking individuals you could ever meet. When asked recently about his feelings toward Jurgen Hans Thode, he said: "The universe has a funny way of balancing those things out. I have spent far too many years dealing with this existence to hold any deep regrets for Mr. Thode. I amuse myself (and others) with the proposition that my crime is the lack of character judgment, and my sentence is based on that error." Scott is currently engaged to Sabina, a woman who understands his situation and will wait for him to get out. With Sabina's help, and in conjunction with his former wife Dawn, he's been raising his kids as best he can from behind prison walls. In his spare time, he paints pictures from memory of the Pacific Ocean, whose waves it was once his passion to conquer. 🖗

Around the same time that Scott was enjoying the ocean for the very last time, Jurgen Hans Thode, a courier within the marijuana business that Scott was connected to, was selling him out to the Feds. Thode, a Vietnam vet, lived in a world of illusion. Though little more than a mule, he fancied himself the Tony Montana of marijuana—the problem was, he lacked heart and street sense. When Thode went to pick up 57 pounds from a group of Mexicans, he had no idea the Feds were on to him. He flipped the moment he was caught. Then they took him back to his house and plotted the ruination of Scott Walt's life.

While Scott was sitting in a federal lockup in San Diego, the Feds took Thode to Minnesota to set up

GOOD TASTE

What can I do during the growing process to make my marijuana taste better? Also, what steps should I take to make it fluffier and less dense? Can I start growing in a 5-gallon container and then keep the plant in there five months?

the pots every month with two to three times as much water as the volume of growing medium.

Also, do grow organically: use organic soil, organic fertilizers, and organic measures for pest and disease control. (But remember that organic fertilizers can also be over-applied and build up in the soil.) Keep the temperatures in the range of 70°F to 75°F, and the humidity levels at about 50% both day and night. (The temperatures can fluctuate a few degrees up or down, but in general, the less the fluctuation, the better. At night, the temperature can dip as low as 60°F and cause little stress to plants.) I'm not really sure why you want fluffy, "less dense" buds. Fluffy or airy buds do not mean that the plants will taste better; in fact, in most cases, fluffy buds are a sign of heat stress and poor horticultural practices—not a recipe for great-tasting buds. Roots from plants that are started or transplanted directly into 5-gallon containers tend to grow to the perimeter of the container and encircle it. This means they don't penetrate much of the interior soil; instead, a layer of roots forms on the inside perimeter of the container—and, as the container warms and cools, the roots suffer heat and moisture stress. This is one reason why, the longer a plant grows indoors, the more time there is for problems to crop up.

INDUCED SEX REVERSAL

In the past you've mentioned a product called Stamen-it!, but many people seem to be having trouble finding it, including myself. Any suggestions?

Dear Tek-One,

This is one sexy product! At all *seven* of the European cannabis fairs I attend every year, at least one person asks me about Stamen-it! I've answered this question before in my column, but since I continue to receive queries about it, I'll answer it again. Only one company produces Stamen-it!, and they have changed their address since the last time I mentioned them. I've added this information to my website, marijuanagrowing.com, so that people around the world can have an easier time finding it. Stamen-it! is used to chemically induce female plants to form male flowers. This kind of sex reversal can also be induced with an application of gibberellic acid—which is dangerous and difficult to use—or of silver thiosulfate solution (STS), which is made from the chemicals used in photography. In the latter case, pre-flowering female cannabis plants are sprayed with a diluted STS and induced to flower with a 12/12-hour day/night light schedule. Pollen-bearing male flowers can be harvested in 35 to 40 days on most strains.

Dear Canary,

Strong, sweet, great-tasting marijuana buds are the Holy Grail sought by every grower. After all, French chefs prefer properly grown organic vegetables not because they're organic, but because they taste best. The same is true with marijuana.

The most important thing you can do to make your weed taste better is to keep your plants strong and healthy their entire life, and don't let them suffer stress. For example, an excess of water (or a lack of it) will create stress in plants. Stress can also be caused by an overabundance of fertilizer in the soil: When some elements are too plentiful, they "lock out" other nutrients, preventing them from being taken in by the plant; this also impairs fluid flow within the cells of your plant. Sodium is the biggest culprit here, so use clean water with a low content in sodium and other dissolved solids. Do not let excess fertilizer salts accumulate in the soil. The best way to guard against excess nutrient buildup is to flush

If you're interested in finding out more about STS, just Google the words "silver thiosulfate solution marijuana" and you'll find several websites with instructions on making and using it. But for most people, the best bet is simply to use Stamenit!, which also induces male flowers. You can order it by contacting plantaegenomic@live.co.uk.

However, if you want to avoid using chemicals altogether and have a measure of patience, you can also practice the "Rodelization" method for inducing sex reversal, which was developed by the master grower and breeder Soma. I am HIV-positive and would like to grow the medicine I need, preferably in an indoor growroom. I live in Kentucky. Should I move to another state to grow legally?

Dear Casey,

I wish you a long life and hope your condition progresses slowly. Growing can be a bit of work if you're frail. Normally, growing indoors is quite simple—however, Kentucky is not a marijuanafriendly state. Of the current 14 medical-marijuana states (Alaska, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Montana, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, Rhode Island, Vermont and Washington), California is the probably the most tolerant towards medical marijuana. There are many growers and patients in California, and much of Northern California is rural, so it may remind you of Kentucky. As a first step, Google the words "medical marijuana California" and you will find many sites to help you with your decision. Also check into the forums on these sites: You can meet helpful people there who can give you a well-informed and realistic local perspective on your potential new home. These sites and forums are also filled with useful information to help you plan your future garden.

TOO MUCH LIGHT

I just made a nice growroom, 7 by 7 feet. I have three clones that I'm planning to grow there. My buddy suggests that I use two 1,000-watt bulbs for vegging on an 18/6-hour day/night light schedule and three 1,000-watt bulbs for flowering on a 12/12-hour light schedule. I'll be using Hortilux bulbs with Lumatek ballasts. The room is covered in reflective material. The electric rates in my area are pretty high (22 cents a kilowatt), and my current electric bill is approximately \$100 a month. My projected electric bill following the above schedule, with AC, exhaust fans and so forth added, will be approximately \$450 a month. Would it be practicable to go with one less bulb for vegging and flowering to keep my electric bill bearable and still have a decent harvest?

Dear Twinkle Toes,

Cut down on expenses and potential problems by using only the amount of light you need. Extra light that shines on the floor or wall is simply wasted. Remember that the plants are small now and must grow a lot to fill the room. It will take many months to fill the entire floor space of the room with three clones. Employ fewer watts to lower your electrical consumption and heat output. Huddle the clones together under a compact fluorescent lamp (CFL) until they're about 1 foot tall, which usually takes three to four weeks. You can purchase a 65-watt CFL for less than \$40 at Home Depot or some other home-improvement store. A single 65-watt CFL will illuminate up to 18 square inches. This works out as follows: 65 x 18 = 1,170, or 1.17 kilowatt hours (KwH). At the rate you're paying, this amounts to less than \$0.30 a day, and would add about \$9 to your electric bill (\$0.30 x 30 days = \$9). Even if you need two 65-watt CFLs, the amount added to your electric bill would be less than \$20 in the first month.

My other advice is to keep your crop 100% organic—use organic soil, organic fertilizer, and organic disease and pest controls. If you want the clones to grow more than 1 foot tall before you induce flowering, they will need more intense light. Add another CFL or a small metal halide (MH) lamp, either 250 or 400 watts. Either lamp will suffice to grow the plants to 2 feet tall. The cost to run a 400-watt lamp for a month at \$0.22 per KwH is less than \$16 per month (0.4 x 18 hours = 72 KwH x \$0.22 = \$15.84 for 30 days).

Next, replace the 400-watt MH lamp with a single 600-watt high-pressure sodium (HPS) lamp with an efficient reflective hood. Note that a 600watt lamp can be placed closer to the plants and illuminate them with almost the same intensity as a 1,000-watt lamp. Induce flowering with a 12/12hour light schedule. Plants will show signs of flowering in less than two weeks; the first signs will be an elongation between the branches and the appearance of small white "hairs" or pistils. The stems will keep elongating and flowers will continue to form for the next several weeks. Most cannabis strains finish flowering in eight to nine weeks. The cost of running a 600-watt lamp for 12 hours at \$0.22 per KwH is \$1.584 a day, or \$47.52 a month. Adding everything up, we get:

1 65-watt CFL 30 days = \$9.00

1 400-watt MH 30 days = \$15.84

1 600-watt HPS 60 days = \$95.04

Total = \$119.88 in added electrical costs, spread over the course of four months.

And if it turns out that your plants need more light in the flowering stage, you can simply add the 400-watt lamp.


APHIDS

I'm growing outdoor plants, and I was wondering how can I fight aphids and keep them from getting on my plants?

Dear E.M.,

Aphids are not one of the major pests that attack cannabis plants, either indoors or out. The first step to effective pest control is to identify the perpetrator. Aphids, or plant lice, are about the size of a pinhead and are easy to spot with the naked eye (though you can also use a 10x magnifying glass for better identification). You'll find aphids in all climates where cannabis grows; they're usually grayish to black, but can also be green or even pink. Most aphids have no wings, but those that do have wings that are about four times the size of their body. Look for them on leaf undersides, especially on the new growth of weak or stressed plants. Aphids are usually found in groups, and give birth to mainly female larvae without mating. A healthy aphid can push out up to a hundred live larvae daily. The main signs of aphid infestation are slow growth, yellow and wilting leaves, and a sticky honeydew that will attract ants, who feed on it.




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Fortunately, insecticidal soap and pyrethrumbased sprays are very effective against aphids. Apply these two or three times at five- to 10-day intervals and your aphid problem should be easily solved.

MORTGAGE BROKER TO MEDICAL GROWER

I want to tell you how much you've been helping my family and me. I live in Michigan, a state that just legalized medical marijuana. I started my own growroom last October. That same month, I shut the doors of my mortgage company and let more than a dozen employees go. This was one of the worst days in my life—I don't fail often, and when I do, it hurts. Even

These days, we have a new administration and a new Drug Czar who are not using cannabis as a political football. HOT-WEATHER STRAINS

I'm a first-time grower in Central Florida. I want to start out with six plants. What strain would you recommend? I'll be growing outdoors and indoors on about 10 acres of land in the middle of nowhere. I wish to grow something easy and worthwhile. I'd like to keep my plants indoors at night and outdoors during the day. The temperature around here gets to be about 90°F during the day and 60°F to 70°F at night.

Dear D.W.,

Cannabis growth slows to a crawl once the temperature hits 85°F. If you're growing outdoors, find a place with a natural breezeway to keep the temperature a little bit cooler so that your plants will continue growing at a normal clip. Planting in a location with filtered sunlight will also keep them a little cooler. One of the main problems in the tropical and subtropical South is that nighttime temperatures can get so high that plant growth is impaired. Again, a natural breezeway will help overcome this problem if you're growing outdoors. Keep an air-circulation fan going all the time when plants are indoors to keep them cool—but avoid blowing air directly on the plants

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or they will dry out quickly and use too much water, causing stress. Plants in your climate grow best during the off-season, when temperatures are a bit cooler.

There are many strains that grow well in hot weather. Chocolate Chunk and SAGE from TH Seeds and Thaitanic from Flying Dutchmen are the first ones that come to mind. You can also check with local growers in your area to see if they have any suggestions.

AWFUL TRANSPLANTS

I had beautiful seedlings that were 4 to 5 inches tall, with two branch nodes and two healthy-looking leaves. For the next stage, I transplanted them from Dixie cups into pots. What a mistake! They were under fluorescents, and I put them under a 400-watt light. Now they're looking awful. Will they recover?

Dear FleetwoodMac,

It sounds like the little seedlings are suffering from several kinds of shock, including transplant shock and excessive heat and light. Fluorescents emit much less intense light than a 400-watt MH lamp does. Too much light will heat leaf exteriors and, more importantly, their interiors. This causes the plants' internal chemistry to speed up, which in turn requires them to consume much more water. Also, upon transplanting, the roots were probably jostled around a bit and damaged, so they're not able to supply enough water to keep the plants healthy.

Keep in mind that transplanting is one of the most traumatic events that a plant can suffer. Once transplanted, the roots need time to settle in and get used to the new soil. Roots have thousands of microscopic hairs that are torn away during transplanting. These root hairs often must be regrown, and the plants need time to accustom themselves to their new environment.

The next time you transplant, disturb the rootball as little as possible. Give your plants plenty of water and use a transplanting aide that contains vitamin B1 to help ease the shock. Give them a few days of fluorescent light and cool temperatures, from 65°F to 70°F, until the leaves perk up and the plants start growing again. My guess is that your seedlings will recover, but slowly, and they'll be so weak that pests and diseases could easily become a problem. I would plant more seeds and make sure to transplant according to the guidelines above to ensure strong plants in the future. *

SEPTEMBER 2009

OUTDOORS

Temperatures have reached abnormal highs and lows in September over the last few years. Global warming is the reason. Growers can benefit from the new highs in some climates by taking harvests later in the season, although northern climates (and some southern climates too) may receive more rain. If this is the case in your area, don't forget to use plastic to keep the moisture from wetting your beautiful buds—this will help stave off botrytis (bud rot) as well. Warm-weather gardens should be shaded if temperatures ascend beyond 85°F in the daytime or at night.

Always be sure to keep your plants well watered until a few days before harvest, especially if September is dry in your area. Withholding water reduces yields.

Stop fertilizing a week or two before harvest so plants don't retain residual nutrient salts. Continue fertilizing with a flowering formula that has less nitrogen and more phosphorus and potassium if you plan to harvest next month.

Use mulch to slow the rate of moisture escaping the soil. Mulch will also attract moisture when the air temperature drops, forming dew in the morning. Keep adding more layers of mulch as the lower layers decay. Anything can be used for mulch—paper, biodegradable plastic, nearby native foliage, etc.—as long as it covers the soil. Pull the mulch back from plant stems a few inches to discourage mice and voles from chewing on them.



Here's a shot of an auto-flowering, feminized AK-47 x Lowryder #2 about 30 days from seed. This plant produced almost 2 ounces of dried bud!

Early *indica*-dominant strains are ready to harvest in mid- to late September. Check the buds for peak ripeness: It's worth being patient now in order to harvest your buds when they're completely ripe. But if your plants are a few days from harvest and a big rainstorm is moving in, it's best to harvest before the storm arrives.

Plenty of hunters are out and about in the country now, and many others start scouting the terrain before hunting season starts. Bow and black-powder rifle seasons generally begin before the main hunting season. Be sure to always have a reason to be out walking around in the forest or country now, just in case you cross paths with an inquisitive game warden.

Hot weather is still common outdoors in most of the Northern Hemisphere. But don't let the hot days fool you—nighttime temperatures are often much cooler, and the nights are also longer. Humidity increases quickly when the temperature drops. Counter humidity buildup by turning your lights on at night and off during the daytime. Good ventilation is still necessary as well: Keep the vent fan cranked up as needed and monitor humidity levels daily.

Pesky molds and insects, especially spider mites, can be a big problem this month. They'll be seeking shelter indoors to get out of the inhospitable weather outside. The warm, inviting growroom climate is just what they're looking for, so keeping your growroom clean is the best way to make pests and diseases stay outdoors, where they cause no harm to your garden. Make sure your plants are healthy and free of wounds so that diseases and pests don't have easy entry.

Nutrient and water consumption could change somewhat this month. When outdoor weather cools, plants tend to use less water and more fertilizer. Check the pH and EC (ppm) of the nutrient solution regularly to ensure that it stays in the proper proportions.

Double-check ballasts and fans for noise and excessive heat. Remove the protective shroud on circulation fans to lessen the air resistance and prolong the life of the fan motor. This will also help keep it from overheating, which in turns helps to avert fires! Also, the fan should have plastic blades.

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Pests and diseases can really take a toll on slow-growing flowering plants late in the season. Mother Nature sends signals that the plants are at the end of their life cycle, and therefore at their weakest point. This means that pests and diseases will be making a final push to eat more, suck more plant sap and lay more eggs. Ask the workers at your local nursery or check with the county extension service for localized pest and disease problems. Corn earworms and molds—especially bud mold—are some of the worst problems that a grower can encounter now.

INDOORS

Hit hightimes.com and look through your collection of HIGH TIMES magazines to find the best grow information. Check out different cannabis forums on the Internet as well as videos posted on YouTube for all the current grow information.


Students head back to school this month after the long summer vacation. Autumn returns most of Middle America to its regular schedule. This means that it's time to crank up the garden lights if you've taken the summer off. Check the bulbs in your lamps for expiration dates and brilliance. Clean old bulbs and reflectors and replace any faint or outdated bulbs. Clean and disinfect any grow equipment that has been sitting idle. The ideal temperature for your growroom is 75°F during the day and 65°F to 70°F at night. Do your best to keep the room in this range to harvest heavy; plants suffer stress when the temperatures fluctuate much beyond this range. Check the temperature with a thermometer regularly, and keep the humidity at about 50%.

Take clones for your next crop. Grow clones for two to three weeks, at least until they have a strong, healthy root system.

Clean up your growroom and keep it that way! 🖗

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
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
