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






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NEW YORK STATE OF KINI

With nearly 20 million residents, New York is the third-biggest state in the nation, just after California and Texas. So it's heartening to hear that a significant majority of New Yorkers support legal medical marijuana—despite the fact that no med-pot bills made it out of the State Legislature this year. According to a poll released by the Cornell University Survey Research Institute, medical marijuana has majority support across every single age group, including 65 percent or higher among everyone except those over 65.

BAMBOOZLED

Even high art has gotten, well, high ... in more ways than one! Artists (and twin brothers) Doug and Mike Starn have built a bonanza of bamboo atop the Metropolitan Museum of Art in Manhattan. The installation, dubbed Big Bambú, is a continuous work in progress that, at its highest point, will measure 50 feet above the Met's already impressive rooftop garden. Boasting over 7,000 poles, Big Bambú is a constantly changing structure that resembles either a giant bird's nest or cresting wave, complete with 25- to-40-foot elevated pathways that can be traversed only via a guided tour.

Mike and Doug got their inspiration for the installation's name back in their high-school days in the '70s, when their long hair and identical-twin status earned them the moniker "Cheech & Chong." As they were planning and building their massive bamboo structure, they nicknamed it "Big Bambú" after the famous C&C album, and the name stuck.

GLASSHOLE OF THE YEAR

On July 1, Florida's anti-bong law went into effect prohibiting the sale of most paraphernalia in stores. This pretty much put headshops out of business. The grandstanding politician responsible for the measure was Democrat Rep. Darryl Rouson who assumes he can speak for the entire state: "Florida has a conscience and an awareness that marijuana and the smoking and ingesting of it is not healthy for an individual, nor is it healthy for public safety and the order in society."

Uh-huh. That must be why Florida is the #2 state in America for indoor growing. Rouson also said "I've been fighting the pipe industry for the longest time, because it is all a part of the drug trade and the criminal enterprise that we know exists and destroys neighborhoods, families and order in our society." Our response: "Politicians like Rouson are part of a charade and the shameless enterprise that we know exists and destroys truth, justice, and sows disorder in our society."

KICKING COCAINE

In Bogotá, Colombia, just before the conclusion of the World Cup, police seized a box at the airport packed with soccer jerseys—and what appeared to be the World Cup trophy itself! But the cops noticed that the Cup's gold paint looked a little shabby, so they chipped off a sample and sent it to the lab. Red card!




The trophy turned out to be 24 pounds of cocaine. The real World Cup is 18-carat solid gold, but weighs only 13.6 pounds. Lab tests confirmed that the coke had to have been mixed with acetone or petrol to make it into a paste that could then be molded into the *fútbol* fake.

Recent changes to Colorado law have made the cultivation of up to six cannabis plants or the possession of two ounces or less of marijuana a misdemeanor only. Thus has a paradise been created for stoner skiers and riders—unless you work for Vail Resorts or one of its many ski areas, including Keystone, Beaver Creek, Breckenridge, Heavenly and (of course) Vail.

The company has long enjoyed the economic benefits of Colorado's thriving cannabis scene, and management has routinely turned a blind eye to the "smoke shacks" scattered across Vail Resorts' ski areas. (Smoke shacks are illegally built structures used for toking up on the slopes.) However, Vail employees aren't so lucky: A failed piss test can result in insurance cuts, suspension or termination—even if a worker is a legal medical-marijuana patient in the state. However, no such penalties exist for Vail employees who pop pills or get sloppy drunk every night.

Even so, it's hardly an industry secret that vacationing skiers and snowboarders are avid pot smokers. Breckenridge in particular seems to be profiting handsomely by recognizing the preferences of its residents and clientele: It's home to the busiest ski area on the planet, posting skier numbers and profits like no other. Breckenridge also boasts no less than nine medical-marijuana dispensaries—and, last fall, its residents voted to decriminalize marijuana, allowing adult possession of up to two ounces.—Al Fisher



MARIJUANA: THE SMART DRUG

Dr. Gary Wenk, Ph.D., is a professor of psychology, neuroscience, molecular virology, immunology and medical genetics at Ohio State University. We're gonna go out on a limb here and assume that Wenk is a really smart dude. In the July issue of *Psychology Today*, he published an article discussing his latest research. His conclusion: Pot stimulates the brain's cannabinoid receptors, which in turn may mitigate the consequences of stroke, chronic pain and neuro-inflammation.

As Wenk wrote: "Research in my laboratory has demonstrated that stimulating the brain's marijuana receptors may offer protection by reducing brain inflammation and by restoring neurogenesis. Thus, later in life, marijuana might actually help your brain, rather than harm it. It takes very little marijuana to produce benefits in the older brain; my colleague in France, Dr. Yannick Marchalant, coined the motto 'a puff is enough' because it appears as though only a single puff each day is necessary to produce significant benefit."

GOD, THC AND THE DEA

Pride, envy, gluttony, lust, anger, greed, sloth ... we're not sure which of the Seven Deadly Sins smoking pot falls under, but evidently the DEA is convinced that God hates THC—something that Hawaii's THC Ministry recently discovered.

As its name suggests, the THC Ministry engages in the sacramental use of cannabis. Its website states that membership helps to protect from "arrest, prosecution and/or conviction on marijuana charges—wherever you live." The ministry also states that a sincere practitioner can mount a legitimate religious-use defense.

That premise will now be tested. Last March, DEA and IRS agents raided THC's offices as well as the home of Roger Christie, the ministry's leader. But it wasn't until July that Christie and 13 others were formally charged; they now face federal marijuana manufacturing, possession and distribution charges. Christie sees things differently: "We provide cannabis sacraments, and we're happy to do so. It's a sacred thing to us. We're standing for religious freedom, using cannabis in private, at home or church. And it's a blessed, beautiful thing."


But according to the Feds, religious freedom doesn't include pot-enhanced prayer. Florence Nakakuni, the US Attorney for Hawaii, maintains that the THC Ministry went through over half a pound of marijuana a day and served up to 70 customers daily.

CAPITAL IDEA

This past summer, medical marijuana got the okay in Washington, DC. The Democrat-controlled Congress declined to overrule a DC Council bill that now permits the nation's capital to establish as many as eight dispensaries where patients can purchase their medicine. The law will allow patients with cancer, glaucoma, HIV/AIDS and other chronic ailments to possess up to four ounces of cannabis. However, patients can't grow their own; only licensed companies will be permitted that luxury. Still, it's unlikely that patients who need medicine will be able to access it until 2011. Health Department officials must draft regulations. Then the rules will have to undergo public comment and a review period. If the bureaucracy moves speedily, it will still take months.







THE \$38 OUNCE

Legal pot may bring about a drastic reduction in marijuana prices.

In yet another sign that full-scale cannabis legalization is approaching, the RAND Corporation, a well-known American think tank, released a sixmonth study in July that predicted a drastic reduction in pot prices in the event of legalization.

The study projects that if marijuana becomes legal in California this November with the passage of Proposition 19, the cost of pot in the competitive retail market could plunge a whopping 80 percent—to as low as \$38 an ounce, or \$1.50 per joint. Regular cannabis users in California may have reason to rejoice; they typically spend \$300 to \$500 a month on pot, even if it's purchased at medical-marijuana dispensaries, where the prices persist in reflecting the black market.

Interestingly, though it's repeatedly described in the mainstream media as "nonpartisan," the Santa Monica, CA-based RAND Corporation was founded in 1946 by the Douglas Aircraft Company (later McDonnell Douglas, a charter member of the military-industrial complex) and has been instrumental in creating US military and national-security policy since the 1950s—policies that most cannabis activists would generally oppose. So its conclusions on topics like marijuana legalization should be viewed with a discerning eye.

Formally titled "Assessing How Marijuana Legalization in California Could Influence Marijuana Consumption and Public Budgets," the RAND report sought to construct a model based on estimates of current consumption, current and future prices and taxes levied, along with non-price issues (such as a reduction in the social stigma of smoking pot). Media reports have generally focused on the study's finding that the annual tax revenue from legalized pot could vary greatly depending on retail prices, with the totals

either much higher or much lower than the \$1.4 billion projected by the State Board of Equalization in 2009. But even if the tax revenues are less than a billion, who cares? California is so desperately in need of money that any funds generated from legalized pot would certainly be welcomed (as though legalization wouldn't be worth it if it produces "only" \$750 million a year).


The RAND report also suggests that legalization will inevitably increase consumption once the fear of being arrested and/or losing one's job lessens, and warns of a new "black market" in pot if the \$50-per-ounce tax proposed in State Senator Tom Ammiano's Assembly Bill 2254 is formally adopted. (Ammiano has delayed action on his bill until after the Prop. 19 vote.) But here again, is this a case of RAND emphasizing the negative? With marijuana so cheap, even at \$100 an ounce (with special taxes and the regular sales tax figured in), how many people would risk breaking the law just to save \$50? While some obviously will, the widespread availability of cheap, legal pot as well as the option of growing your own makes the threat of a new intrastate black market somewhat improbable.

However, two realistic effects of legalization in California are addressed by the study. The first is a potentially dramatic upsurge in Amsterdam-style tourism to the Golden State. The second is the notion that out-of-state residents could buy legal weed in California, then sell it at black-market rates in other states. But even here, this phenomenon could actually hasten the welcome spread of legalization, especially in neighboring West Coast states such as Oregon and Washington, which have generally been more tolerant of marijuana than the rest of the nation.—Mark Miller

They found pot and other substances on the bus, but no arrests were made; instead, citations were issued and the bus continued on its way. The evidence has been forwarded to the county prosecutor to figure out what action should be taken.

We don't resent Bret's easy treatment, but we'll bet most tokers in the Hoosier State are nowhere near as lucky.




FINALLY FAMOUS FOR SOMETHING

VICTORY FOR VETS

In "The Thin Green Line" (June '10 HT), we detailed how veterans were being kicked out of pain-management programs by the Veterans Administration for using medical marijuana, and how the group Veterans for Medical Marijuana Access was lobbying to change this policy. On July 24, the VA released a new directive stating that veterans will now be allowed to use medical marijuana in states where it is legal without fear of being cut off from their other pain medications. While VA doctors are still prohibited from recommending medical marijuana as a treatment, this is undeniably a huge milestone: the first time a federal agency has recognized the medicinal value of cannabis.

Stoned & the city

The mainstream press is constantly rating the best and worst cities in the US, so we decided to add to the noise. Here's a HIGH TIMES look at the good, the bad and the ugly of *herb*-an America. By Mark Miller

THE GOOD

SAN FRANCISCO, CA-A stellar city for stoners, boasting a rich marijuana history, top NorCal strains, progressive government attitudes and lowest-priority police enforcement.

BOULDER, CO-Famously lax toward personal cannabis consumption, and pot quality here is consistently solid. Bonus points for the thin Rocky Mountain air, which amps your buzz.

MAOISON, WI-Legendary college party town. High-grade bud and lots of open toking, especially when disc golfing breaks out. Tales abound of arrestees with dozens of plants avoiding jail time.

LOUISVILLE, KY-Grass is Kentucky's No. 1 cash crop. Cops tend to be more lax in the bigger cities. Pot's an important source of revenue in this low-income state. Schwag hasn't been seen in over 10 years.

PORTLANO, ME-Both Portlands are great, but Portland, ME, hasn't gotten the cred it deserves. Excellent weed here, plus more casual law enforcement than many other cities on the uptight East Coast.

ANN ARBOR, MI-Another great Midwestern college town and the site of the annual springtime Hash Bash. Recreational possession incurs a small fine here. A welcome oasis in the otherwise schwaggy and herb-unfriendly Wolverine State.

BOSTON, MA-Even though the decrim laws are great (just \$100 for an ounce, possible probation for more), Beantown barely makes the cut in this category. Why? The prices are outrageous! How can bud be so much cheaper in nearby Canada?

HONORABLE MENTION: HAWAII COUNTY, HI—As of 2008, anyone over 21 can privately cultivate and possess up to 24 plants or 24 ounces. And it's actually illegal here for the county government to receive marijuana-eradication funds!

THE BAD

CHICAGO, IL—The Windy City may be a major hub for illegal drugs, but there are way too many dry spells, and the cops are still intolerant toward tokers.

NEW YORK CITY, NY-No surprise: The prices here are the highest in America. A quarter of kind bud costs a solid \$150; eighths are as high as \$90! Plus, expect a legal hassle for public smoking.

PHILAOELPHIA, PA-The OA's office has decided to stop incarcerating those busted with 30 grams or less. But the cops say they'll keep arresting pot smokers as usual. Weed still too pricey at \$65 an eighth.

WASHINGTON, OC-Finding a connection in OC is like cracking a CIA code: Stoners are ultra-secretive about revealing their source due to jeopardizing future govern-

ment-related careers. Police are generally pretty tolerant, but prices are steep.

LOS ANGELES, CA—Nearly everyone tokes, but LA still needs a makeover in terms of its med-pot policies and prices to match the Bay Area. Still, SoCal bud rocks!

THE UGLY

LITTLE ROCK, AR-Maybe *the* single worst city for pot-mostly low-grade Mexi. *Yuck*. (Now we know why Clinton didn't inhale.) *Any* possession could mean the slammer.

OKLAHOMA CITY, OK-Too much schwag in the Sooner State, and you'll lose your driver's license after a pot bust ... even if you're on foot!

ST. LOUIS, MO-Stone Age drug laws: a possible year in jail for possession? (Though simple possession usually gets you drug court.) Also, frequent dry-spell blues.

OALLAS, TX-A scarcity of good bud and an aggressive, militaristic police force make regular pot smoking a challenge.

LAS VEGAS, NV-Good bud is available, but possession of over an ounce is dangerous: a felony charge with fines and possible jail. Under an ounce gets harsh treatment, too-especially for multiple arrests.

PHOENIX, AZ-Too much Mexi bud and police enforcement. Simple possession can result in jail or drug class.

INOIANAPOLIS-General intolerance and shitty weed. More than 30 grams may get you six months and a \$10,000 fine. Hoosiers depend on the college towns for good bud.

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AN INDUSTRY ON THE RISE

Over two days in San Francisco, the HIGH TIMES Medical Cannabis Cup Expo showcased the burgeoning cannabis industry. By Danny Danko

On June 18 and 19, the City by the Bay hosted the inaugural HIGH TIMES Medical Cannabis Cup Expo. There was a bit of Field of Dreams to the scene: If you build it, they will come!

And guess what? They did!

Thousands walked among the booths stocked with live pot plants and clones, dispensary displays of buds and concentrates, as well as every manner of product for consuming cannabis in every possible form.

In the Prop. 215 area, where the cannabis community medicated throughout the weekend, cannabis fans networked under the sunny San Francisco skies. Tinctures, vaporizers and even a couple of impromptu outdoor "hash bars" had the crowds buzzing, while celebrity chef Chris Bliss kept tokers fueled with his exquisite cuisine.

The state-of-the-art growing and harvesting equipment on display included growboxes from BC Northern Lights, stackable Spinners from Hydroplex, LED lighting from Haight Solid State,

Stealth Grow LED, and Hydro-Gro LLC, plus a variety of heavy-duty trimmers from Trimpro. Post-harvest Boldt Bags were snapped up by buyers eager to convert their leftover trimmings into hash.

California's most respected medical-marijuana providers, Harborside Health Center of Oakland and the Berkeley Patients Group, showed off their prescreened and tested cannabis varieties. The two organizations have been a force for enlightenment on their respective local scenes, improving their communities through outreach and engagement.

The locals from Medithrive ran a "Name That Strain" game, giving away free eighths every hour, while the C420 dispensary offered patients a chance to spin the roulette wheel to win clones, brownies and other fine California medicine.

Other area stalwarts like the Vapor Room Cooperative, NorCal Herbal Relief Center and Green Door wowed the hometown crowd with high-quality merchandise, while the Angel's Care dispensary showcased its delicious coconut-cannabis drink.

Greenway Compassionate Relief from Santa Cruz promoted clones, tinctures and edibles, while Steep Hill Labs from Oakland used the expo as a platform to emphasize the benefits of testing for THC, CBD and CBN levels, as well as any pesticide residue or powdery mildew present on medical marijuana.

To enter the outdoor Prop. 215 area, proper paperwork was required, and attendees had to be genuine med-pot patients. Not to worry, though—doctors from Be Legally Green were on hand to assess the status of potential patients and provide temporary medical recommendations to those who qualified.

Hundreds took advantage of this teeming yet convivial toking territory, where every booth provided smoking options and giant quarter-pound joints magically appeared at 4:20 p.m. Attendees managed to leave far more stoned than when they came, especially after trying the Essential VAAAPP from Essential Herbal Technologies, who have created a water-pipe attachment called the Vape₂0 that elevates the bubble-hash or budder experience



to cosmic levels. Also delightful was the Herb Iron, a ceramic heating element that warms up hash to the perfect temperature for clean consumption. Super-clean hits were also produced by the Zephyr Iron Vaporizer, a digital vape featuring a similar heating-element technology, while the Labworx Skillet not only heats up hash, but swivels as well—just one more innovative way to consume hashish or other concentrated cannabis products.

Incredibowl Industries showcased their popular line of shotgun-style pipes that boast an excellent delivery system. The crowds also loved the new, mini Incredibowls from these two-time HT Cannabis Cup Product Award winners. The stealthy Allin1E one-hitters were a big hit as well; they have everything you need to toke on the run, supplying a lighter, poker and grinder all in one tiny storage case. And, of course, attendees flocked to the classic Glass Slider, which allows tokers to eliminate ash as the pot burns, so every hit stays as fresh as the first.

The outdoor area also featured top cultivation stars like Subcool and MzJill of TGA/Subcool Seeds, who offered this reporter samples of their Third Dimension, Vortex and Chernobyl strains, as well a taste of their glycerin-based purple tincture made from violet-colored nugs.

Swerve, who oversees the Cali Connection seed company, was proud to render many a judge stoned to the bone. His specialty comprises the Kushy strains like Tahoe, Larry and SFV, all fresh versions of the Connection's famous Kush.

BC Bud Depot displayed mouthwatering shots of their classic Purps as well as the Black, a new, darker strain from the Vancouver area. Sacred Plant Medicine of Washington State was on hand with unique, potent pot from the Pacific Northwest as well as an all-day DJ booth. Stoney Girl Gardens out of Oregon proudly posed with their 35-day-flowering, organic Cripit strain.

Best of all, many of the dispensaries were able to sell rooted clones and mother plants

openly to their prospective growers.

We couldn't agree more!

But if you've got buds, you gotta store 'em! At the forefront of the storage pack is Canna Fresh, provider of high-quality jars for patients and larger, customized glass containers for medicalmarijuana dispensaries, all designed to keep their products at maximum freshness.

For cannabis sticklers, stackable Kindstacks are an excellent way to separate and store three or more strains, providing both purity and portability. All expo attendees were also judges and voted on the best products, booths and glassware they encountered over the course of this cannabis weekend. Judgement Day has never been sweeter. *




MARKET ANALYSIS



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Chris Palko's a statistical anomaly, a living, breathing exception to the rule. His life makes 50 Cent seem like a candy striper. Most people with his backstory are ticketed for a lifetime of institutional meals before their body is finally discovered stinking up some squalid tenement or condemned building. Yet, somehow, Palko survived a youth that was more like a cautionary afterschool special from hell. Now in his thirties, he's managed to outrun his demons and establish himself as one of the most intriguing, adventurous figures in underground rap.

He's taken a circuitous route, but Palko—who goes by the moniker Cage onstage—has slowly transformed his experiences into something positive. He's gone from a sometime rapper and full-time addict squandering his talent, to a gruesomely imaginative hardcore New York hip-hop legend spewing dark tales to "angry young womanizers in ball caps," to an artist who still traffics in harrowing tales but—inspired by his friend and collaborator's untimely death—squeezes the silver lining out of his overcast backdrops. And someday, perhaps soon, his story will be made into a film starring his buddy Shia LeBeouf.

"I've done nothing but piss away every opportunity ever given to me. These are all things you can't get back, but you can use them to make you stronger and learn from them," Palko says from his New York City apartment. "You have to exploit these things people have taken from you—especially the things you have taken from yourself."

Palko was born in Germany to an American serviceman by the name of

Bill Murray, but his experience was nothing like *Stripes*. Murray was dishonorably discharged for selling and abusing heroin; he'd enlist his son to tie him off while he shot up. Palko was eight when he last saw his father, who at that point was involved in an armed standoff with state troopers after threatening his family with a shotgun. Palko's mom remarried, but his new stepfather beat him, which encouraged him to spend most of his childhood on the streets, running wild, doing and selling drugs, getting into fights and trouble with the law.

"When I was 16 years old, I was selling crack, and I was a buck-fifty in people's faces with box-cutters," Palko recalls matter-of-factly.

When he was kicked out of school, his parents sent him overseas to live with an uncle who served on a military base in Germany. Palko's uncle beat him as well and sent him back to the US after a year. When further run-ins with the law threatened real jail time, his mother convinced a judge that Palko was mentally unstable, and a two-week evaluation at Stony Lodge Psychiatric Hospital turned into an 18-month stay.

As Palko sings on "Dr. Strong," one of the songs about the experience from his album *Depart From Me*: "You dropped me off and left me here and started your vacation / I was just in your house going to school looking for validation / Pissed you off, now I'm in the hospital eating medication ... / The drugs they're making me take are making me want to kill myself / And if I try and refuse meds then they force it in me."

While institutionalized, Palko became a test subject for the then-new and



gle "Agent Orange," whose mix of Clockwork Orange references, gangsta violence and gore worthy of Michael Myers made it a minor underground sensation. He released a couple more singles, but his career didn't gain momentum until he joined Mr. Eon and DJ Mighty Mi to form Smut Peddlers. Their 2001 release, Porn Again, hit the Billboard charts, and the single "That Smut" made it into the rap chart's Top 10. Palko would release his debut solo album, Movies

untested drug Prozac, which aggravated his bipolar disorder and made him suicidal. (He attempted to hang himself with his shoelaces, then tried to overdose on lithium.) He was subsequently placed on suicide watch and restrained more than 20 times for periods as long as 13 hours in a straitjacket or 10-point bed restraints. Isolated and embattled, he embraced the only freedom he had: retreating into his own head, cultivating his imagination and the twisting, twisted lyrical style that would become his signature.

When he was finally released in '93 at age 18, he turned his attention to hip-hop, made a demo, and secured a manager who introduced him to 3rd Bass's Pete Nice, who featured Palko on a track off his solo debut, *Dust to Dust*, and signed him to his Columbia Records imprint, Hoppoh. But Palko was too fucked up on drugs to take advantage and never released anything. "I was so heavily into pills, I was a walking rattlesnake," he says now. "Anywhere I was walking, you'd hear 'chk-chk-chk.""

His proper debut wouldn't come for another three years—when, in 1997, he released the sin-

for the Blind, the next year on Eastern Conference Records, which was distributed by HIGH TIMES Records. ("My record was the first one on HIGH TIMES," Palko reminisces fondly. "It was cool—I went to the Cannabis Cup and got really stoned.")

With 2005's follow-up, Hell's Winter, Palko changed things up. Gone were the misogynistic and gratuitously violent imagery. He was still angry and graphic, but it was more about emotional torture than maniacal, insensate boasting.

"I used to write about sexual exploits, drug fantasies, weapons, and just fucking anyone over and being very proud of it. It was like a character, and it just felt like it was crazy for the sake of being crazy," he says. "You want to poke it with a different stick and hope you bleed differently each time. It's always going to bleed fucked-up; the desire to be overly descriptive and graphic is always going to be there."

He also finally got off hard drugs. (To this day, he remains a big fan of pot.) "I stopped doing drugs because drugs were done with me," Palko says. "It was like: 'Hello, drugs!' 'What, dude? We

don't have anything for you. What do you want? You sucked all the fun out of us."

More changes were in store for last year's *Depart From Me*. Palko and his sidekick, Camu Tao, had already transformed their live show: Bored with the typical hip-hop style of stalking the stage and calling out to the crowd, they'd begun to mimic the punk artists that Palko loved growing up, like Henry Rollins and Iggy Pop, seeking to make the show more visceral. For the album, he wanted to bring that same energy by limiting the use of samples and employing more live instrumentation. But then tragedy struck when Camu Tao was diagnosed with cancer.

"When he got sick, it took me out of the game, because nothing else mattered to me," Palko reflects. "I couldn't make these songs and use my collaborator. I couldn't bring in these songs and go, 'I know you're dying—listen to my songs about wanting to die.' I didn't know what to do, so I started making songs that were a little happier.

"After he passed away, my entire world fell apart. I'd never been so wounded in my life. I'd been through so much and felt like, as a little kid, I could take anything—and then the grown man is just broken."

Compounding matters, he split up with his longtime girlfriend and ended up sleeping on an air mattress at the house of his friend, former Hatebreed guitarist Sean Martin. Martin lent him a hand creatively as well, helping Palko create an album meant "to define me and take me to the next level." Depart From Me is loaded with hooks, live instruments and a slightly more upbeat attitude, producing music that's more rock than hiphop, yet not quite either.

His friendship with actor Shia LeBeouf bloomed during this time and helped Palko through his pain. LeBeouf directed the video for Depart From Me's "I Never Knew You," which was paid for out of their own pockets after Palko's label, Def Jux, decided to stop releasing music. For the last year, he and LeBeouf have been auditioning screenwriters for a movie based on Palko's life and may have finally settled on a script. Shooting will depend on getting backers and on LeBeouf's schedule, but Lionsgate Studios is already interested.


Lately, Palko's taken some meetings with major and indie labels, but he's in no hurry to sign. And though he's without a label, Palko continues to record. He's made material with Martin and with UK producer Synhony. He's also talked with Kanye West protégé Kid Cudi about doing some tracks. He has no idea what will become of the music, but he can't stop writing. And it's not just music: He's begun a book on his experience at Stony Lodge and another on his exploits as an angel-dust addict. He's had a crazy life, and sometimes the only way to keep his sanity is to keep working.

"I'm just all over the place. I take it all with a grain of shit and try to keep going despite the fraudulence I'm surrounded by," he says. "It's a lot easier to come across as original when 99 percent of my peers are fighting to see who can do the best writing the same three songs." **

MEET JESSE VENTUR

Jesse Ventura has led one of the more colorful lives in American political history. A former Navy Seal who became a professional wrestler and then an actor, Ventura stunned America when he was elected governor of Minnesota in 1998 as an independent candidate. During his time as governor, Ventura was pro-hemp and promedical marijuana. Last year, he created Conspiracy Theory with Jesse Ventura, the first successful cable-TV show on political conspiracies. He also co-authored the book American Conspiracies with longtime HIGH TIMES writer Dick Russell, whose The Man Who Knew Too Much remains the best single volume ever written on the JFK assassination.

How did you win that election? The Democrats made a big mistake and said they would not debate unless I was included. I go on a simple premise with Democrats and Republicans: If I can debate them, I can beat them ... because they have so much baggage, and I have no baggage. And the way to have no baggage is to admit to everything beforehand. Sure, I've smoked pot—I grew up in the '60s. If you didn't smoke pot in the '60s, you either didn't grow up then or you're a damned liar.



What would you like to say to New Yorkers about 9/11?

We need a new investigation with subpoena power that won't be fraudulently led by the government. How can you truly do an investigation of yourself? Christie Todd Whitman was head of the EPA. The initial report from the EPA was that you still had great danger down there with all the toxins in the air. Yet it went to the White House, and the White House had her change

the report: "Everybody go back to work!" How many people who worked there have now died from inhaling what was there?

DOL'S GOLD SI

This Los Angeles musical collective rocks with African music, Israeli melodies, and cannabis from around the world. By Danny Danko



The first thing the members of Fool's Gold want you to know is that their influences are far more than just Congolese, Ethiopian and Malian. "I don't consider us strictly 'world music,'" says founding member and vocalist/bassist Luke Top. "We're just being honest with ourselves: We're into hip-hop, Motown, pop, new wave—all kinds of music that colors our aural landscape and

provides some form of escape.

"We're hoping to achieve that elusive, hypnotic trance where you lose yourself onstage," Top continues, though he admits that "it doesn't always happen. The sense of time changes and you enter musical time, where the spectrum of moods is shared."

Live, Fool's Gold saturates their audience with mesmerizing sounds played on a variety of handmade instruments. Their percussion includes goat-toe rattles, shell gourds and many other unique drums, and the vocalists chant their verses and choruses as though possessed by a contagious musical spirit. Entranced crowds up front typically tend to enhance their aural and dancing experience with a spliff or two.

Keyboard player Amir Kenan can relate: "We love to smell it wafting up from the crowd! I grew up going to reggae concerts with my dad, so the memories wash over me. It's how I know the audience is into our stuff—like a salute. Very different from an alcohol-crowd vibe."

Percussionist Salvador Placencia agrees. "I

use marijuana as a type of key to unlock certain spaces," he says.

On the perks of traveling and performing, drummer Orpheo McCord tells me: "Vancouver is very herb-friendly, but Northern Cali is always the best. In Vancouver, our sound guy hooked us up within minutes of arrival. We love when fans and friends share the love and the buds!" *

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Over the past few years, Willie Nelson has been expanding his already diverse musical palette to include jazz–and he took legendary trumpeter Wynton Marsalis along for the ride.

Not enough people know that the world's most venerated stoner, country-music star Willie Nelson, has made some epic excursions into the upper echelons of jazz in recent years. In an inspired and instantly memorable collaboration, Willie teamed up with jazz-trumpet heavyweight champion Wynton Marsalis. Not since the legendary Louis Armstrong and Jimmie Rodgers, "the Father of Country Music," hit the recording studios together back in 1930 has there been such an historic match-up between jazz horn and country warble.

Willie took time from his current tour with Asleep at the Wheel to tell HIGH TIMES more about these amazing sessions, which have been captured on CD and two DVDs.

"I heard that music forever, so it wasn't a big stretch for me to say, 'Hey, Wynton, let's jam,'" he explained. After all, Nelson's musical heritage is a rich tapestry: "I grew up in the cotton fields in Texas, where I heard the Mexicans singing all kinds of great Mexican songs and I heard the blacks singing all kinds of great black songs—blues, gospel. And there were also a lot of Czechoslovakians down in that area, many of them farmers, so I learned a lot of polkas, waltzes—all that great dance music that the Bohemians play."

And though he's always been "Country Willie," Nelson's life has been bathed in jazz from its roots to its flowers. "I like to think that we're all kind of

half-assed jazz musicians," he said with a chuckle. "My sister Bobby listened to all the great musicians, and I've been a Django Reinhardt fan for many years—so it's kind of hard not to have that jazz flair in nearly everything we do." As for the seemingly unusual pairing of the down-home, unpretentious Nelson with the urbane, sartorially elegant Marsalis, Willie laughed: "The press liked it a lot, because they could say, 'Well, here's this old country-boy farmer out there playing with this jazz musician from New York.' So it looks good in print, but it was a lot of fun and really easy to do."

And both the fun and the ease are abundantly clear on these highly entertaining DVDs. The first, Willie Nelson & Wynton Marsalis: Live from New York City, is a lovingly produced near-documentary of the two days of rehearsals and performances at the posh venue Jazz at Lincoln Center by this group of astounding musicians. Nelson and Marsalis have a marvelous time interacting, playing and singing together, and their shared love is more heartwarming than a batch of fresh-baked Diesel brownies. At one point during the filming, Marsalis shakes his head and puts it plain about Nelson: "He's real, man, and that's rare. You've gotta get as close to that as you can nowadays. It's important for your own mental being."

Nicely put—and if your own mental being needs to enjoy the pure musical extraction from this first major summit, Willie Nelson and Wynton Marsalis: Two Men with the Blues is available on CD from Blue Note Records. Though the pricey NYC jazz club isn't exactly known as a haven for stoners, HIGH TIMES asked Nelson if marijuana played any sort of role in these collaborations. "Well," he answered with a playful drawl, "I did send them all a vaporizer after we were done."

Did he get a response?

"Nobody sent one back."

Hey, clearly they still wanted to hang out! The second DVD, released in October of last year, is pure musical bliss. Telling a linear tale from stage entrance to stage exit, Willie Nelson & Wynton Marsalis Play the Music of Ray Charles delivers just that: From foot-tapping classics like "Hit the Road Jack" and "Hallelujah I Love Her So" to a sweet rendition of "Unchain My Heart," Willie and Wynton (with a special guest appearance by Norah Jones) bring all the life and light of Ray Charles's superb music to the floor. And while the first DVD has the benefit of fascinating behind-the-scenes footage, the second has the added luxury of the charisma between Nelson and Jones. As Nelson observes: "Norah and I are old friends-she even has a band called the Little Willies."

Finally, the performances here are mind-blowingly great, with saxophone, piano, harmonica, bass and drums adding layers of musical nirvana to enhance any state of mind. As Nelson pointed out during our interview: "The music itself is a high. The audience gets a high from the music, the entertainer gets a high from the music and the audience So, with or without drugs, music gets you *very* high."

You can catch more of Nelson and hear his own favorite picks at Willie's Place on both XM and Sirius satellite radio (Nelson dubs satellite radio a "godsend" for travelers), but the musical collaboration captured on these discs will make them timeless classics: a teaming of legends who share the utmost respect and admiration for each other—and have one hell of a good time getting down. These three discs are something super-special for your shelves, to light up choice nights and pass around to your most musically diverse buds. **

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THE LIFE IN GRE

La Vie en Verte

(For Ai Productions)

Directed by Charlie Hall and Bevin Bell-Hall

At the world premiere of La Vie en Verte at the Santa Cruz Film Festival, locals packed the theater to support the well-respected medical-marijuana collective known as WAMM (Wo/Men's Alliance for Medical Marijuana), including dozens of the group's members. Filmed over four years by husband-andwife team Charlie Hall and Bevin Bell-Hall, the documentary crafts a sensitive portrait of the medical-marijuana patients and activists who embody the collective spirit of WAMM. Rewarding their efforts, festival attendees voted La Vie en Verte winner of the Audience Award for Best Documentary Feature.

The film follows WAMM co-founders Mike and Valerie Corral, who share their hopes and fears through illness, several arrests and a DEA raid. The subsequent court case and seizure of all the collective's medicine finds WAMM members at their darkest hour. Through extensive interviews with several patients, viewers can empathize with the need of sick and dying people to use this healing plant. Indeed, the title La Vie en Verte ("The Life in Green") refers to "seeing life through green lenses" and understanding the experience of another human being.

While suffering from the ovarian cancer that would ultimately cause her death, a collective member named Lucy talks with the film-



makers about how medical marijuana and WAMM aided her when she needed it most. Breast-cancer survivor Dianne allows the camera to follow her through a life-affirming transformation, while HIV/AIDS patient Jeremy continues to survive a struggle that has lasted 20 years.

When the DEA arrived at WAMM's garden early on the morning of September 5, 2002, they brought chainsaws to remove more than 100 plants, and guns to subdue the peaceful activists, including Mike, Valerie and Suzanne, a paralyzed patient. Security-camera footage captures the senseless destruction of a lifesaving garden. Both Mike and Valerie recount their brutal treatment by the DEA and how, immediately after their arrest, WAMM mem-

bers sprang into action, blocking the steep road up to their garden and preventing the agents from leaving the property. Local media watched as frail patients, some in wheelchairs, refused to let the DEA pass until Valerie and Mike's release was negotiated.

The ongoing federal-court case initiated by this raid was finally settled in early 2010, which means this film has a happy ending! WAMM continues to operate today in Santa Cruz, and they're accepting new members. Rapper, producer and Def Jux label founder El-P has a little story he wants to tell you. Make that a pretty damn scary one, too. As a solo artist and frontman for the hip-hop group Company Flow and the producer for Cannibal Ox, Cage, Mr. Lif, Aesop Rock, NIN, Beck and the Mars Volta (among many others), the man's famous for getting a sound that makes you want to smash things. But his new allinstrumental album, Weareallgoingtoburninhellmegamixxx3, is far, far grander than a mere mixtape of wicked sounds: It's crafted like a really engrossing movie, and each track tells a part of the tale.


The follow-up to his past two mixes of the same name previously released at live shows, this set is another supa-threatening sonic cityscape engorged with ominous bass lines, bruising drum thumps, and approximately one million unhinged and unidentifiable sounds, ladled over tracks with such suitably agitated titles as "Drunk With a Loaded Pistol," "Jump Fence, Run, Live" and "Whores: The Movie." The idea was to make something that played like that old-school idea of an LP record album-something to become immersed in and follow through from beginning to end. An authentically '70s-drenched aura beams down Kodachrome gritty via thrumming snakes of vintage analog synths, cheesy old drum machines, and the buzzes and dings of an especially grim videogame parlor; when El-P chops it all up and creates transitions between and throughout the songs, you're not sure exactly what you're hearing, but it's definitely something serious.—John Payne

Unfortunately, that's because they are earlier efforts. All three appeared on the band's eponymous debut EP and follow-up full-length, Closing In (both 2005). "The Undertaker ..., originally a six-minute-plus destroyer, is here split, Van Halen "Eruption" style, into two tracks, with the blistering Maiden-esque solo opener now standing alone as "Through Chemtrails." If I were going to rate this album solely on the strength of these songs, it would get a kilo of sticky bud. But the newer tracks lack inspiration and tuneful riffage, and for some reason, weak, jerky choruses abound. The first time I heard "Someone Else's Nightmare" live, I thought the chorus was a joke.

I'd say buy this for the three gems mentioned and a few glittering shards throughout. I am the last person to wish for metal's demise, but when it inevitably occurs, at least maybe these guys will rise again. - Polly Watson

The '80s didn't completely

suck-not at first. The underground-music scene was pretty happening back when you actually had to get up off your ass and find it. Coming across this stuff wasn't easy: 'Zines like Touch and Go, Flipside, Maximum Rock-'n'Roll and dozens of others spread the "loud fast rules" gospel of hardcore punk in a world where most people thought of Devo when they heard the P-word. And considering the kind of obsessive-compulsive mind that it took to actually paste up and Xerox one of these rags, you pretty much knew, whenever you came by one, that you were reading the words of a true believer.

Now add to that mix two guys from Lansing, MI, who could hate and cuss better than Mel Gibson chugging Pabst at a bar mitzvah, and you get Touch and Go. Tesco Vee (frontman for the late, almost great Meatmen) and partner Dave Stimson manage to reference human bodily functions every fourth or fifth sentence throughout this massive collection, and while that might not sound like too good a thing, you have to believe me when I say it is: "SEXISM SUCKS (but it sure makes my spud go turgid)" is a pretty typical headline. Reading this 30 years later, you realize these guys had some good taste—at least in music. And unlike other publications, this one would be proud to take up real estate on your bathroom floor.—Chris Simunek





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LEGAL POT: A WIXED BAG FOR WANY

Prop 19 could spell the end of big money times in the Emerald Triangle.

'Once the snout of the government gets under the tent-flap door, its sniffer twitches for a multitude of reasons.'

So I asked two anti-prohibition writers for their reactions to this dilemma.

Retired Judge Jim Gray, author of Why Our Drug Laws Have Failed and What We Can Do About It: A Judicial Indictment of the War on Drugs, responded as follows: "With regard to the Humboldt County folks, they raise an obvious point: Why should they vote in favor of government strictly regulating and controlling marijuana when that would deprive many people up there of their source of revenue? It makes perfect economic sense for them to oppose the initiative. Maybe I would, too.

"In fact, when the proposition to treat marijuana like alcohol for adults comes up for a vote this November, we should expect the Mexican drug cartels to be spending literally tens of millions of dollars to safeguard their hundreds of millions in annual profits from the illegal sale of marijuana for the same reasons. Wouldn't you do the same?"

Bill Bradd, the author of From the Emerald Triangle: Notes of a Renegade Farmer in the Far Hills (\$16 from Ten Mile River Press, PO Box 1840, Fort Bragg, CA 95437), had this to say: "From the perspective of a local in the Emerald Triangle, to legalize pot or not is a quandary. It seems that some of the big, glossy magazines of the industry, like Nug, are advocating strongly for legalization. But up here, people smell the wind for danger: Word's out that there's a forest fire in the hills.

"It seems to be the intrinsic nature of industries to change—and now, with legalization almost upon us, the cannabis industry has reached the same threshold. But this is not the first time that change has come to our industry. Not too long ago, we passed Prop. 215, and the legalization door was ajar. Us back-hills people were not happy about that, any more

than the moonshiners of old were happy when Prohibition ended.

"Soon, the oldtime wildcat growers out in the hills—those guys trying to get lucky powered by supreme effortwere ousted with the arrival of fullbore indoor growing. They overwhelmed us. Who knew? I was watching for cops and helicopters, the Terror From

Above. Our outdoor price dropped dramatically, indoor price rose. Good on ya. But us hill guys, our product had lost its cachet. Smokers wanted variance, boutique product, and our wonderful organic hill-weed had trouble selling. For us, it was a case of adapt or move to Costa Rica.

"A new language was invented. Community activists were out with petitions advocating legalization. Well-meaning,' I said to my neighbor. It's a little late now for hysteria—I see 'pot' on people's grocery lists, right after 'bread' and 'milk.' I think smokers will vote their pocketbooks. Plus the home gardener is being schooled by outfits every weekend.


"Eventually, the do-it-yourself gardener will get it right, take himself and his neighbors right out of the customer pool. I don't see big Sacramento interests or tobacco companies crushing us, contrary to rumor—it'll be the home gardener with some plants to sell on his patio. I think the big-money times are over; adapting into the byproduct market is how some will hang on. As for 'boutique,' I'll be curious to see how that fares. And for the taxation issue: Once the snout of government gets under the tent-flap door, its sniffer twitches for a multitude of reasons.

"Change has always ground small towns to dust—be they timber towns on the Upper Peninsula or fishing villages, they come and go. Permanence was one of the limbs we lost when we disengaged from our tails. The river takes a different bend suddenly, and you're left high and dry. Progress is like the wind: It sweeps all before it. The sky is paler. I heard there was a forest fire." ¥

Normally around this time of year, I'd be gearing up for the usual round of Halloween shows by Brooklyn goth-metal group Type O Negative. Sadly, that tradition came to an abrupt end with the passing this spring of the band's bassist, vocalist and driving force, Peter Steele. The six-foot-seven übermensch with the deep voice and dark sense of humor formed the band in 1989 after splitting up his former group,

tegendary hardcore band Carnivore. Despite their notorious association with the color green, Type O were never really into weed; nonetheless, I'm paying tribute to Steele this month because ... well, because I knew him.

I grew up with Type O Negative. As a young metathead in Brooklyn, Type O were my band. They hung out with people I knew, sang about places I'd been. I was at their very first performance (as Repulsion) at L'Amour in 1990, and thereafter prided myself on never missing a single show. I collected every press clip and article, got them to sign a Slow Deep and Hard poster, and even fought for 20 minutes in the moshpit at a Carnivoro reunion show to hold onto Steete's homemade spiked "armor" that he'd thrown out into the crowd—a prize I cherish to this day.

Eventualty, guitarist Kenny Hickey and I became good friends, and thanks to an odd twist of fate, I ended up renting out his mom's basement for about three years. During this time, I was fortunate enough to be invited into the band's inner circle. Keyboardist Josh Silver (the only pothead in the band at the time! was the first musical artist I ever interviewed for HIGH TIMES. I visited his home studio during the mixing of Bloody Kisses and was among the first people to hear the demos. I spent three days on the road with the band during Ozzfest 1996 and

roadied for Kenny once up in Connecticut. I hung out with them in Ace London Studios during their rehearsals for *World Coming Down*. I even spent Christmas with Kenny's family and attended Josh's wedding.

But despite all this, Peter was the one guy in the band I never really developed a friendship with. Was it because he had to lean so far

> down to talk to me? Or because I didn't have tits? Or because, deep down, he never really took off that armor? I quess l'Il never know. What I do know is that he was a musical genius, In both of his bands, Steele pushed the boundaries of "decency" and humor. In the early days, his lyrics were often offensive for the sake of being offensive-filled with tongue-in-cheek violence and anger and taken to the absurd. His sardonic satire eventually evolved into an

almost romantic nihilism. With songs like "Everything Dies," "Dead Again" and "Life Is Killing Me," Steele seemed obsessed with death—particularly his own. Over the years, he'd predicted, faked and even attempted his own demise. But it wasn't until this spring that the Grim Reaper finally caught up with him.

It's been suggested to me that the passing of a person so obsessed with death can hardly be viewed as "tragic"—but really, it's the very epitome of tragedy in the classical sense of the word. Like so many tormented artists before him, he was metancholic, misanthropic and misunderstood, and in constant combat with the forces of alienation, alcoholism and addiction.

After several stints in rehab, Steele was supposedly doing better. The last time I saw him perform, he seemed to have grown a bit fat and sloppy, like some Etvis Frankenstein. But personally, I'll always remember him as that protetarian provocateur onstage at the Limelight, the not-so-jolly green giant who took a handsaw to his bass strings at the Cabaret club, the almost Shakespearean antihero who wore his "inner conflict" on his sleeve.

Peter Steele was one of the most unique people I've ever known, and for me and so many of his fans, his passing feels "like a death in the family."

Since 2005, the trio has played well over 200 shows. Onstage, each band member works double and sometimes triple duty, playing their instruments while also controlling the live dub effects, thereby transforming every concert into an ear-gasmic experience.

In the summer of 2009, the trio turned quartet when they added melodica and keyboard specialist Jimmy as the final piece to their puzzle. Since then, the Curtains have expanded their act into a full-scale jam and psychedelic party!

Each band member brings influences from a wide variety of artists, including Ween, King Tubby, Bad Brains and the Grateful Dead. The result is a mixture of authentic dub, improvisation and psychedetic reggae sprinkled with some gritty punk rock.






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
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


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ew legislation, government deadlines, regulatory guidelines, contracts, partnerships, corporations: This isn't the United Auto Workers or the Teamsters we're talking

about—this is Colorado's cannabis industry! Suddenly last summer in the Rocky Mountain State, the weed world was yanked into a real world of regulation and government oversight. But for many Colorado cannabusinesses, the new legislation signed into law by Governor Bill Ritter in June was a death knell. Of the approximately 1,100 dispensaries operating at that time, half are expected to close.

Some members of the cannabis community grudgingly admit that perhaps it was time to rein in the industry. In 2000, voters passed an actual amendment to the state constitution (Amendment 20) that allowed the use of medical marijuana by registered patients. Additionally, the law offered residents who'd been busted and had failed to join the state registry the option of mounting an "affirmative defense of medical necessity."

Pot lovers rejoiced, but it took nearly a decade for the medical-marijuana industry to establish it-

self in the state. The Bush administration's constant pressure on California dispensaries made prospective Colorado cannabis entrepreneurs wary of exercising their own rights under state law. That all changed when US Attorney General Eric Holder announced early in 2009 that medicalmarijuana businesses operating in compliance with state law wouldn't be hassled by the Feds.

At that point, the floodgates opened. Since Holder's statement, thousands of residents have lined up to get registered, and hundreds of dispensaries have opened their doors to serve them. (The volume of new patients is so high that the Colorado Department of Health currently states on its website that it will no longer review applications, issue receipts, or accept and answer questions at the walk-up window.) But while everyone cherishes a utopian ideal for cannabis—one that entails full access to healthy medicine at a reasonable price—the unbridled pursuit of the quick buck did, in fact, taint the public's perception of the new industry. Areas like the "Green Mile," situated along South Broadway in Denver-where over 20 dispensaries opened in a matter of months-made many people anxious, despite the fact that the majority of these places are secure, well-run establishments.

It may be heresy to say it, but maybe—just maybe—the industry was moving too fast. Years of Drug War rhetoric continue to prejudice otherwise intelligent people, and perhaps the avalanche of dispensaries simply outdistanced





people's comfort zones. More significantly, many cannabis professionals were dismayed by the quality of the bud that was being marketed—overpriced, overhyped med-pot that lacked any notation, let alone assurance, of quality or safety.

Politicians were eager to put controls in place—and in June, they did just that. Governor Ritter announced that the new cannabis laws would "strike a delicate balance between protecting public safety and respecting the will of the voters." But the new laws have impacted the dispensary scene considerably. Suddenly, dispensaries were bound by so-called "70/30 legislation," which requires them to grow a minimum of 70 percent of their products. Likewise, growers are now required by law to sell 70 percent of their crops through one dispensary.

Medical growers and dispensaries rushed to link up and form partnerships, corporations, and whatever other legal arrangements they could make to stay in business—especially since, as of September 1, all dispensaries, growers and makers of cannabis-infused products have to be registered

and licensed on both the state and local levels.

Frank Quattrone, who runs the Pure Medical Dispensary in Denver, says: "I feel bad about those people who invested thousands of dollars in their grow op or dispensary—but what the state didn't want was for the cannabis to be grown in the basement of a residential home and have growers going from dispensary to dispensary, door to door." As a result of the new laws, the directors of Pure forged an alliance with their top grower, who runs a massive operation in the Denver suburbs and whose crops are always top-notch.

"If you have 3,000 people in the state growing 50 plants in their basements, how do you maintain any quality control?" Quattrone asks. "I'm not just talking about potency; I'm talking about mold, fungus and heavy-metal content—standards that any consumer product should abide by. We are exiting the Wild West days and entering into a new era of business."

As well as a new era of bureaucratic bullshit. Many observers believe that in the state's rush to set up a system of regulation, the needs of the patient have gotten lost in the shuffle. The revenue being raked in by cannabusinesses seemed to be of more concern than the integrity of the law, which guarantees access for Coloradoans in need. The new law imposes a statewide moratorium on new dispensaries and allows cities and counties to ban them altogether—which will make it that much harder for many patients to acquire their medicine.

The law establishes new guidelines for patients as well: Now, rather than going for a simple medical consultation, they'll be required to get a full physical examination and form a continuing relationship with their recommending physician. This will increase the financial hardship on low-income patients—and considering the fact that over-the-counter medica-

UNDER THE MICROSCOPE

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Full Spectrum is an independent botanical-testing lab that provides quantification, certification and product-safety testing for the medical-cannabis industry. Based in Denver, the lab's headquarters are located in what was once a community-outreach center. After a complete renovation, the building is now a sparkling testing facility with an isolated ventilation system to ensure the precision of its work, which includes analyzing samples for the presence of mold and fungus, heavy metals, and pesticides. A growing number of dispensaries use Full Spectrum to test all of their strains, edibles and plant extracts. For large dispensaries like Denver's Patients Choice, this could comprise up to 80 samples per month.


Robert Winnicki is the director of Full Spectrum. He cites Steep Hill Laboratories, based in Oakland, CA, as the pioneer of the cannabis-testing industry. While Steep Hills initially relied on gas chromatography (GC) to measure THC levels, these days both labs use high-performance-liquid chromatography (HPLC) to get more accurate results. "The real problem with GC testing is that the number you get is anywhere between 20 and 40 percent low," Robert explains. "So if you get a figure of 10 percent, the number is actually 12 or







One of the most patient-oriented dispensaries in the state is the aptly named Patients Choice, the first dispensary to open on the "Green Mile." Its facility is airy and convivial, while its staff works hard to keep the patient base of 4,000 people satisfied. Patients Choice offers grow classes, acupuncture, nutrition info, massage and one-to-one consultations with expert gardeners. The owners admit: "Now that we're getting regulated—and it's kind of nice to have a true free market, because it keeps you sharp—you've got to have your prices right. You've got to be on point, because why would they come here if they've got 1,500 places to go to?"

But not everyone in the state has the luxury of choice—certainly not those who live in tiny Alma, located in the mountains of central Colorado. Sparse populations eliminate the need for multiple dispensaries, but caring for patients is no less important. The dispensaries that do operate here

are neighborly establishments; everybody knows everybody in the mountains, and neighbors want to help neighbors. The result is some of the finest medicine available in the state. The proprietors of High Country Healing in Alma are on a first-name basis with all of their patients and offer over 100 different genetic varieties of cannabis. It's also the headquarters of Americamm.org, a nonprofit organization for seriously ill patients that assists them with rent, living expenses and whatever else they need.

In the end, a number of legal issues have been created with the passage of these new medpot restrictions. Lawmakers and the courts will eventually have to address the problems involving zoning laws, licensing fees, confidentiality requirements, advertising limits, search-and-seizure laws, workplace consumption, property rights, public safety, and controls over cannabis food products and the operation of grow houses.

Will the free market triumph under the weight of all these new regulations? Probably, but it will be harder. Most business owners who have committed themselves to compliance hope that the age-old business precepts of quality and service will lead to prosperity and longevity. But it's also obvious that compassion for patients will figure as a major component in the success of medical-marijuana dispensaries. It remains the one standard of cannabis commerce that can't be legislated. *





13 percent. It's like weighing a piece of paper on a scale, lighting it, and trying to get an accurate reading as it's burning—the sample changes as you measure it. The HPLC doesn't work like that; instead of vaporizing the sample and running it through the detector, the cannabinoids never leave the liquid state. Instead of just reporting the THC number, we're able to show the acid variance and the neutral variance of the cannabinoid. We provide data on how much inactive THC is in it, and how much active THC."

Full Spectrum has also been responsible for debunking the THC myths that growers have cultivated around their strains. "Plants cannot contain more than 25 to 26 percent THC levels—it is physically impossible," Robert states flatly. "First of all, the plant is not 25 percent tricomes; even if the tricomes were 100 percent THC, the raw plant itself is not 25 percent tricomes. Think of it like this: 70 percent of you is water, correct? It's the same thing for a plant. After you take out the chlorophyll, the cell walls and everything else that is not THC, all you really have left is 25 percent. But if your business is based solely on numbers, maybe you inflate THC levels. If your first crop is 22 percent and you claim your medicine is the best, and somebody claims 23 down the street, you might report 24 next week. It becomes a vicious cycle."

Dealing with outrageous claims is part of Full Spectrum's daily work. "When people find out that their '30 percent' strain is actually a 12, it's a heartbreak. There are edibles in town with claims of huge concentrations of THC," Robert says. "We tested one sample—it had 1 milligram of THC. That's breaking the law! It's ripping sick people off!"

Full Spectrum tests for mercury, lead and cadmium as well. "Some of the nutrients out there have what I would consider dangerous levels of the heavy metals," Robert confides. "What a lot of people don't realize is that hemp and cannabis are actually very good at taking up



heavy metals. It's actually used as a bioremediation product in some parts of the world—if a ground field is contaminated by mercury, planting lots and lots of hemp will, over time, pull the heavy metals out of the soil. But if you're growing cannabis with a heavy-metal-contaminated solution, or if you don't flush well, the result will be a product that has been potentially contaminated with high levels of mercury, cadmium or lead."

Betty Aldworth, the vice president of Full Spectrum, adds this cautionary tale: "In our early days, one of our other representatives went to a wellness center to pick up some samples from the manager. About 45 minutes later, he got a call: 'You have to bring those back—the grower came in and doesn't want those tested.' Because he knew that he doesn't flush his crops enough. He knew pesticides would be present. There are people who don't want testing because they know their products can't make the cut."

Full Spectrum is also at the forefront of technology that will allow samples to be tested for their genetic origins. In other words, if you think you're buying an OG Kush, you'll have some guarantee that you actually are.

For all these reasons, the prestige of Full Spectrum Labs can only grow. After all, who doesn't want the very best pot—medicinal or otherwise?

"Some people like us, some people don't,"
Robert says. "Everyone who works here holds a
bachelor's of science or higher in some sciencerelated field. Everyone here has been doing
chemistry for years. We follow the same procedures that forensic scientists follow—the exact
same procedures."

He also points out one final upside to testing cannabis stringently: "Dispensaries can use the data we provide as a two-pronged marketing tool," Robert says. "Number one, they can say: 'We have clean, safe, reliable medicine.' Or they can claim: 'We've got the bomb!" —DS Visit fullspectrumlaboratories.com.

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

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




What Is 'Organic'?

All organic products are not created equal. "Organic-based" and "100% organic" are two totally different things: "Organic-based" means that the products contain chemicals and ingredients that are not considered fully organic and therefore should not be used if you want a 100% organic harvest. On the other hand, "100% organic" means just that: The company has either gone through organic certification for their product, or it was made without pesticides, synthetic fertilizers, sewage sludge, genetically modified organisms or ionizing radiation.

Make sure that all your nutrients and soil mixes are 100% organic by reading the label carefully. If you have any questions about a product, ask the manufacturer or store employee about it. If need be, simply tell them you're growing indoor organic tomatoes, as their needs are somewhat similar to cannabis plants.

Fully organic liquid nutrients will be thicker than their synthetic counterparts and will sometimes look and smell exactly like what they're made from: poo. But don't be worried—these products are a natural and mild food that your plants can easily absorb. Some of their awesome ingredients include earthworm castings, bird and bat guano, Norwegian sea kelp, composted peat moss and sphagnum peat moss, just to name a few. FoxFarm Ocean Forest Soil Mix contains ingredients like fish and crab meal that are also great food for your plants.





Buy or Mix?

FoxFarm and Earth Juice are two excellent companies offering 100% organic soil mixes and nutrients that are both simple to use and mild for your plants. Buying a pre-mixed, high-quality product like these is more expensive, but it's also more efficient than making your own mix, for several reasons.

A high-quality grow medium such as FoxFarm's Happy Frog Potting Soil will start off your seedlings perfectly and

won't need any added nutrients for up to two to four weeks from germination; simply add plain water in lieu of feeding. For this grow, FoxFarm's Happy Frog Potting Soil and Original Planting Mix were used in conjunction with Earth Juice Grow and Bloom nutrient products to produce top-quality, medicinal-grade buds. There were no additives or stimulants involved, and no pesticides or inorganic fertilizers were introduced to these plants.


Less Is More

Keep in mind when feeding your plants to always use *less* than the label says. The company's information on dosage isn't always plant-specific or precise (they want to sell more nutrients, of course), and feeding less is always better than feeding too much. Also, use diluted or half-doses of all fertilizers before you know what they can do.

Always oxygenate and/or distill water in an open container for at least 24 hours before adding any organic matter in order to dechlorinate the water and prevent damage to your roots (as well as the mycorrhizae, the biological "microherd" in your soil). The chlorine will dissipate into the air, leaving your water cleaner and ready to use.






















Clean House

Before starting a grow, make sure the room is fully cleaned and sterilized with mild household cleaners. Take all of your existing plants out of the room and place them in a separate clean, safe room, then stop the ventilation in your growroom. Sweep and vacuum the entire area and wipe down the floors, walls and ceiling with a mild soap mix.

After the room is clean, put your plants back in and resume ventilation. Never let pets or people into your growroom, and also make it a habit to shower and change clothes before going into the room if you were recently outdoors. If you have houseplants, be sure they're never kept in the same room as your grow and wash your hands after coming into contact with them.

Be sure to always inspect leaves and their undersides every week for pests; this way, if they do happen to intrude, you'll be ready for them with natural pest remedies. There are plenty of ways to eradicate pests naturally without having to use chemical insecticides. One good way is to use a spray application of neem oil and water weekly until the mites are gone, or else a mixture of two tablespoons of hot-pepper sauce with a few drops of Ivory soap in a quart of water (also applied weekly). Or you can find 100% natural sprays with ingredients like pyrethrum that will also work well for pests.

For soft-bodied insects like thrips, you can use a product called Monterey Garden Insect Spray, which is listed with OMRI (the Organic Materials Review Institute) and includes the 100% natural ingredient Spinosad, a relatively new insecticide that was discovered from soil in an abandoned rum distillery in 1982. The pest dies within one to two days after ingesting its active ingredient, which is safely broken down by light and soil microbes into carbon, hydrogen, oxygen and nitrogen. Spinosad controls not only thrips, but also caterpillars, beetles, leaf miners and more.




Organics and pH

With organic growing, pH isn't an issue as long as you're using the correct organic mixes, since most contain a very high amount of humus (humates), which works to buffer the pH of the grow medium and nutrients. Humate materials are substances formed from the biological and chemical breakdown of animal and plant life over an extremely long period of time (usually millions of years). Humates do a lot more than simply buffer pH; they also reduce germination time, expand root growth, increase oxygen in the soil, increase water retention, bond pesticides and heavy metals, and transport microelements for absorption.

Pay Attention to Your 'Microherd'

The mycorrhizae in your soil play a big part in the success of organic growing, and by using mild nutrient mixes and plain, dechlorinated water, you can keep your microherd alive and well, ensuring that your plants' water and nutrient uptake are at their highest—which in turn will mean overall improved plant growth and yields thanks to a healthy, living grow medium.

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Myco = Fungus, Rhiza = Root

Mycorrhizae work via the symbiotic association between a beneficial fungus and a plant's roots, meaning the fungus and its plant host survive by mutually benefiting each other. Mycorrhizae naturally form a friendly relationship with the roots of most plant species found on our planet; they're a very important part of soil life and soil chemistry, increasing the surface area of a plant's roots anywhere from 10 to 100 times and significantly improving its health.

This beneficial microherd literally grows on the plant's roots, receiving a constant supply of carbohydrates like glucose and sucrose made by the plant. In return, the plant receives the benefit of the fungi's ability to absorb water and break down mineral nutrients. Mycorrhizae increase the plant's ability to resist diseases and pests as well as drought. Plants grown in sterilized soils containing no mycorrhizae often experience poor growth and lower yields.



Growing connoisseurquality buds organically is simply a matter of making a few different choices to create an environment for your plants to thrive in, even in a small closet.

There are some 100% organic soil mixes that contain beneficial microbes, such as the FoxFarm Happy Frog Potting Soil and Original Planting Mix used here. Another option is watering the soil with mycorrhizal powder before planting or adding granules when mixing the soil. Any of these options are an excellent way to start your microherd.

Carbo Boost

Using blackstrap molasses in the last four to six weeks of flowering is an excellent way to increase your plants' nutrient uptake, thereby boosting their growth and potential yields. Blackstrap molasses is a significant source of carbohydrates, magnesium, potassium, calcium and iron, all of which act as a superfood to the beneficial microbes in your mix, thereby supercharging plant growth and increasing resin production.

Use blackstrap molasses at the rate of 1 teaspoon per gallon with every other watering and be sure it's mixed thoroughly before use. Also make sure that you specifically use blackstrap molasses, which contains the essential amounts of beneficial nutrients and minerals (using regular molasses is not recommended because of its poor mineral content). Also be sure to choose "unsulphured" molasses so that you don't damage either the plants' roots or the microherd. Blackstrap molasses also works as a chelating agent, binding nutrients and making them highly accessible to your plants.

Tips for Organic Success

Use only fully organic nutrients and soils to keep your plants pure and natural.

Use at least a 10% perlite in your mix to keep it less dense and improve drainage.

Anytime you water your plants, make sure the water has been sitting out for at least 24 hours prior to use, or has been oxygenated with an air pump and air stone for at least 24 hours, to prevent the chlorine found in tap water from damaging roots and beneficial microbes.

Use diluted and half-doses of organic nutrients, and feed every other watering to make sure that overfertilization isn't an issue.

Conclusion

Growing connoisseur-quality buds organically is simply a matter of making a few different choices to create an environment for your plants to thrive in, even indoors or within a small closet. Keeping your plants purely organic will let you reap the maximum benefits from them, and it's also healthier for you—just like organic foods. Give your plants the things they'd get from nature and they will give you something very special in return! **

Sure, it's a bit of a shameless plug for our annual event, but there are some definite perks to getting that scoop. (I mean, who doesn't want to know who's entering what new strains each year?) Still, this year, rather than write up a multi-part Cup series, we decided that we'd also add a feature about the grow scene in Amsterdam, as it's been a while since we covered cultivation in the Holy Land. 52 HIGHTIMES





AT FIRST GLANCE

There are a lot of words that come to mind when thinking about cannabis cultivation in Amsterdam: *stealthy, simple* and "*sea of green*" (SOG) are a few key notions. Amsterdam is a medium-to-large-sized city, and even with all its beautiful canals and oldworld charm, it's still an urban center. Even on the fringes of the city, where flower fields, dairy farms and windmills prevail, growing marijuana isn't done out in the open, as many think. This means that space is a consideration just as it is here, and keeping grow operations hidden is very important.

While the consequences for getting caught are still less than in most areas of the US, that balance is slowly shifting, and growers in Holland know that they will—at the very least—lose their entire setup if they are detected. Thus, many growrooms look very similar to those found in cities in America and across the world. The Dutch have perfected the indoor techniques that are commonly found throughout Europe and North America.

One can get a good sense of a grower's aptitude simply by inspecting his grow medium. Certain mediums require advanced knowledge and loads of experience to work with. Rockwool is at the top on the list when it comes to finicky mediums, but it's the top pick for most growers in Amsterdam. This is due to the fact that the Dutch prefer to use the SOG technique, which almost goes hand in hand with hydroponic setups. A newer advance in this technique adds netting or wide-holed screening to upgrade to a so-called "screen of green" (ScrOG). Here, the netting helps to separate the branches for smarter light usage and better penetration. The netting also adds additional support to burgeoning colas during flowering.

The netting has another added benefit: Tight spaces and small rooms that utilize a packed SOG technique often become very difficult for growers to navigate. Getting into these gardens to stake up plants as they continue through their flowering cycle may become nearly impossible. Having the netting up and in place from the start of flowering onward prevents headaches as well as the need to remove plants to get better access to the garden, and it also prevents the tragedy of crushing one's precious plants.

TECHNOLOGY

Aside from new genetics, the latest boom in cultivation in Amsterdam comes from technological advancements within the industry. While this is really a facet of cannabis cultivation that has touched growers across the globe, it's particularly interesting to see in Amsterdam, which has always been at the forefront when it comes to cutting-edge grow-room technology.

What's most interesting to see in Amsterdam is how the growers here maintain the philosophy of keeping things simple, which in the end really negates a lot of the new products and technology we see on the market these days. For instance, when it comes to lighting, you won't see any experimental LEDs or row after row of air-cooled lamps. In fact, in some regards Dutch growers seem to be ahead of the curve and able to weed out the gimmicky theory by relying on their tried-and-true common sense.

Here in North America, we commonly air-cool lamps because that's what we are told to do. Reflector hoods come standard with flanges ready to be connected to each other via ducting and cooled by inline fans that blow or suck heat byproduct out of the grow-room. However, when daisy-chaining multiple lamps and putting them all on one or two air-cooling circuits, growers are really pushing heat toward one spot: the lamp at the end of the line, which collects all the other lamps' heat before exhausting it away. The lamps at the end of these air-cooled chains end up either burning out completely or running at two-thirds or half strength before the completion of the first crop, causing growers to either have to replace bulbs much more frequently or suffer weaker yields from the plants near the edges of their gardens.

Another advanced component of marijuana growing in Amsterdam involves atmospheric control and the technologies deployed to aid growers in this area. Fine-tuning everything from temperature to humidity to carbon dioxide (CO₂) levels can mean the difference between a mediocre crop and top-quality buds. These days, there's a large selection of controllers, timers and other gadgets designed for these exact purposes. Some of them act as master controllers and allow growers to precisely monitor all levels of the growroom atmosphere, while other controllers are specialized, tailored to a specific growroom condition. Most of these products can be found in grow shops or online and at fair market prices—however, be sure to read reviews and feedback before purchasing this type of equipment, as some manufacturers are known to produce inferior products.

Some of the most common atmospheric controllers in use in Amsterdam (and pretty much anywhere else you find a well-run growroom) include products from Custom Automated Products (CAP), Autogrow Systems, Sentinel Control Systems and Plug 'N' Grow. Each company has variations on the same theme, offering digital or knob controls and varying compatibilities and connection capabilities.

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The Dutch Ministry of Cannabis

To talk about growing cannabis in Amsterdam without discussing Holland's liberal attitude toward the practice—or the fact that the Dutch government sanctions and even participates in it—would be an injustice. In fact, HIGH TIMES was lucky enough to be asked on a tour of Hol-

land's government-licensed medical-marijuana factory, situated just a few hours southeast of Amsterdam.

Bedrocan, the Dutch government's medical-marijuana laboratory, is an impressive warehouse-sized space that has been in operation for over 30 years. The facility is of intelligent design and immaculately kept, as the growers here practice sterile methods throughout. With so much experience, the entire facility can be turnkey-operated, meaning that everything is automated to the point that a substitute employee can walk in and follow the laminated directions on the wall of each room to keep everything running (and growing) smoothly without ever having been there before. This is bureaucratic growing for sure.

The charge of Bedrocan is to supply all of the medically licensed patients of the Netherlands with their medicine. This equates to roughly 300 kilos a year, according to its contract with the Dutch government. While this may not seem like a large quantity, when one considers both the size of the country and the fact that patients can still get their medicine from one of thousands of regular coffeeshops throughout the country, those numbers become more understandable. The medicine that Bedrocan produces, however, cannot be bought in any coffeeshop and must be picked up directly at pharmacies by registered patients.

The bud that Bedrocan grows is an old-school Super Silver Haze that the growers here refer to as the Original Jack Herer. These genetics came from Nevil himself and were originally known as the A-5 Haze. Still, Bedrocan, keeping up with the times, is trying out some new genetics and searching for lines that possess high levels of cannabidiol (CBD), a cannabinoid that has been shown to possess excellent medicinal properties in clinical tests. Bedrocan has all of its cannabis sent out to other high-tech labs where it can be tested to get a total breakdown of all cannabinoid levels. On

HYDROPONICS

Indoor growing is particularly suited to the use of hydroponics. For those unfamiliar with the concept, hydroponics has become a general term for growing in any soilless medium in which the root systems are regularly inundated with nutrient solution. However, today there are lots of artificial soils, or soilless mixes, that are peat- or sphagnum-based and very popular among hydro growers.

While there are a plethora of hydroponic grow mediums—clay aggregates, coco fiber and lava rock, just to name a few—the most commonly used hydroponic medium in Amsterdam is still rockwool. And the Dutch—most of whom are advanced growers—have become masters at using this fibrous material. Synthetically produced and spun out of fibers from natural minerals such as stone, the medium is

usually used in trays for germinating seeds or starting clones.

The first and perhaps most important rule when using rockwool is never to use it in a system that has catch saucers beneath the pots or plant beds. The idea here is not to let rockwool mediums reabsorb the sitting water that has already passed through the grow medium. Allowing rockwool to reabsorb nutrient solution can raise the pH of the medium two to three points in just a matter of a few short days. A pH of 5.5 to 6.0 is ideal when using rockwool, and it's important that growers measure the pH of the rockwool runoff as well as the ppm (parts per million) every day. Even the slightest fluctuations can severely affect plant health and yields and lead to even worse consequences.

Because of rockwool's sterile and porous nature as well as its neutral pH lev-



a thick, wool-like material that is fairly porous and excellent at retaining moisture.

However, rockwool isn't always the best match for the beginner grower, as it has certain nuances that require close attention. While rockwool, or mineral wools, are often chosen for their ability to hold water for longer periods of time and release $\rm H_2O$ molecules to roots much more easily than do soil particles, rockwool can still cause large fluctuations in pH levels and may also lend itself more to nutrient lock-up than would better-buffering materials such as artificial soils.

Rockwool comes in a variety of forms. There is bulk rockwool, which can come as small, crouton-shaped pellets, and there is free-form spun wool that is dense and fibrous. These forms can be used to fill pots, but they can also get severely matted down under the stress of water weight. Then there are rockwool cubes, blocks and slabs: These can grow and support plants directly and are used in a wide array of hydroponic systems, as they maintain their form and integrity fairly well. Lastly, there are rockwool plugs,

els at the time of manufacturing, it doesn't offer the same level of buffering against nutrients that heavier mediums (like an artificial soil) do. Buffering helps prevent plants from getting nutrient burn by creating layers of particles between sensitive root tips and the incoming nutrient solution, allowing root systems to absorb their foods slowly from the medium as the plants need them.

Another concern that needs to be navigated is the buildup of salts from nutrients within the rockwool. Dutch growers have learned that less is more when it comes to nutrient solutions, and they are very careful not to overfeed their gardens. Regularly flushing gardens, or feeding them only with fresh water, is a necessary part of working with rockwool gardens, as is changing out the water in the reservoirs twice a week. At least once a week, growers should flush their gardens to prevent salt buildup that will in turn cause nutrient lock-up at the root level. This happens as minerals from the nutrients clump together, which end up changing the different electrical charges (on the molecular level) that are necessary for the uptake of nutrients by the roots.

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


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


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
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


top of that, these labs also test to make sure that no molds or contaminants exist in the medicine, and Bedrocan uses various forms of radiation to treat and sterilize the buds before the packaging phase.

Ironically enough, some of the cultivation methods deployed at Bedrocan fly in the face of today's best cultivation theory. However, with decades of recorded data, Bedrocan is confident that its methods are optimal for achieving its given task. Perhaps the biggest oddity came inside the flowering rooms, where lamps were affixed to the ceiling and remain stationary—30 feet above the garden canopy. Another interesting facet of the growing here is that none of the plants are topped or super-cropped, instead growing straight up to single-top colas. The plants are grown out of small (1-gallon) containers filled with spun rockwool. But the plants grow so tall that the container pots must be attached to the concrete floors and the plants staked to large poles to help support them. The containers are lifted off the floors with mats to keep the root systems from getting too cold during the winter months. All in all, the flowering rooms are a bit startling at first glance, but it's hard to argue with their rate of success.

Still, for all the misgivings one may have about Bedrocan's cultivation techniques, there were quite a few impressive facets to the work it does. The factory itself, nestled among endless miles of farms, looks more like a warehouse from the outside than a laboratory. Once inside the facility, it is quickly apparent that this place is one big machine, turning out buds on a consistent schedule without ever missing a beat. The interior is divided into offices, vegetative rooms, flowering rooms, trimming areas and drying rooms. Before entering any of the grow areas, you must be outfitted with sterile lab garments, including booties placed over your shoes. Inside the main cultivation area, huge HVAC systems line the walls, along with control boxes that monitor and precisely adjust all of the atmospheric conditions, everything from humidity to temperature.

Four main rooms comprise the grow-



rooms—one vegetative and three flowering rooms. The rooms are staggered so that one is just starting to bloom while another is ready to harvest, and everything runs on a well-planned schedule. Outside the flowering rooms, huge vats sit filled with purified water waiting to be mixed with nutrients, then tested by meters (pH, ppm and EC), and finally distributed to the thirsty plants inside via pumps and spaghetti lines. Each room is also fitted with controllable vent fans and larger watering hoses (more likely to be used for cleaning than feeding).

When the plants are harvested, the wives and daughters of the local farmers are hired to come in and trim. Every element of this process is stringently controlled, with employees entering through a clean room and being passed their work through windows in the wall. The women trim the buds by hand (no scissors or trim equipment is used), and once the buds are perfectly manicured, they're passed through another window where a Bedrocan official takes the inventory, logs it in and then stores it in a walk-in vault. As you can see, these guys really don't mess around.

But the most impressive part? Well, that's easy: the bud itself. For all of the time invested, the system certainly pays off, because the herb lives up to its claim—it's medicinal and makes people feel much better. If there's one thing the Dutch can do, it's grow good marijuana. **

GENETICS

Amsterdam has always been known as the global crossroads of the genetics trade. How could it not be? With decades of liberal-minded marijuana laws attracting growers, breeders, importers and connoisseurs of all sorts from every corner of the world, Amsterdam is a hub of seed proliferation. On top of that, the godfather of all cannabis breeders, the man known simply as Nevil, started one of the first-ever seed companies (the Seed Bank) using a Dutch government grant aimed at providing medical cannabis to patients with various ailments.

In recent years, Amsterdam has had a somewhat controversial reputation when it comes to genetics. Since the city is home to scores of seed companies, the competition to develop new varieties here is fierce. Besides tons of allegations regarding the theft and sale of other companies' seeds, there are ethical questions about hybridizing strains in order to create seeds for genetics that are clone-only (meaning no males exist to pollinate a female and make pure seeds of that strain). An extension of this problem ties into the debate over feminized seeds as well. Multiple processes exist both to create feminized seeds and to "self" a plant (i.e., to turn a female into a hermaphrodite when no male exists in order to create pure or non-hybridized seeds of that strain). However, these processes are controversial in and of themselves, as they often require unnatural procedures and sometimes the use of unhealthy chemicals. On top of that, many argue that such processes dilute gene pools, while hybridization projects for the sake of making and selling seeds mutate genetics that were once prized lines.

Today, the seed trade in Amsterdam has been revitalized, in a way, by the influx of new genetics brought to Holland by immigrant growers seeking to capitalize on the world-famous weed game of Amsterdam. Unfortunately, this influx has also coincided with a conservative political movement in Amsterdam that has produced a backlash against the cannabis industry, curtailing what was once a lucrative business just a few short years ago. Still, new strains are popping up all over Amsterdam at an alarming rate, causing many to speculate about their origins and validity. Big seed companies claim to be combing the planet in search of lost landrace genetics, while smaller, new-to-the-scene growers claim to be bringing the best strains from their homelands.

On the positive side, the new genetics in Amsterdam are, in fact, of high quality. Savvy growers have been able to create excellent genetic preserves, creating an opportunity to mix old-school Amsterdam gems with newer varieties from all over the world. The fact that a lot of Amsterdam growing is urban and done indoors means that many growers use hydroponic setups and mediums that are best suited for clones rather than seeds. While, on the surface, this may seem detrimental to seed production, it creates the need for preserves and nurseries that keep mother plants in abundance for cloning purposes. This opens the door for growers who would otherwise never think about breeding to tinker around and start creating new crosses of their own. The outcome is that Amsterdam is still—at least for the time being—the place to go for seeds and diverse genetics. *



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Legend has it that ever since all-American homegrown marijuana first started taking root in Northern California over 40 years ago, the region's most highly skilled cannabis cultivators and breeders have emerged from their gardens once a year in order to compete in underground harvest contests and determine who really grows the best bud around. Since 1987, we've been exporting this tradition to the one place on Earth pot-friendly enough to host the HIGH TIMES Cannabis Cup in all its ganja glory, annually pitting Amsterdam's finest coffeeshops against one another as part of a now-global phenomenon that attracts stoners of every nation to the city of their nice dreams for the world's premier pot party.

That unparalleled event will always remain the Acapulco Gold standard of marijuana competitions—including the 23rd annual incarnation of the HIGH TIMES Cannabis Cup taking place this November. But given all the freedom enjoyed these days by California's legal medical-cannabis patients—let alone the plethora of choices they face when selecting their medicine from statesanctioned dispensaries and collectives—we finally decided that the time was ripe to return the concept to its home turf.

Focusing on the needs of California's estimated 150,000 med-pot patients, the First Annual HIGH TIMES Medical Cannabis Cup in San Francisco featured a two-day cannabis and hemp expothat included cultivation seminars with HIGH TIMES editors Jorge Cervantes, Danny Danko and Nico Escondido; activism and legal sessions with leaders of the medical-marijuana movement and





After receiving their samples a week in advance of the Cup—all carefully coded as part of our blind tasting process—the judges were asked to meet at Dennis Peron's "Bud and Breakfast" (also known as the Castro Castle) the day before the expo began, and to bring with them a short list of their favorite entries for careful consideration by the full panel. At precisely 4:20 p.m., this illustrious group finally assembled at perhaps the greenest spot in all of San Francisco.

One of the co-authors of California's ground-breaking voter initiative, Proposition 215— which, upon its passage in 1996, created the first statewide protections for medical-marijuana patients in the country—Dennis Peron has remained a consistent voice in the marijuana movement ever since, and his cannabis-friendly abode served as the ideal setting for our official judges' dinner. And so, after many long days and nights of rigorous, independent testing, our two sets of experts finally met each other face to face to share hors d'oeuvres, light refreshments and their highly informed opinions on nearly 100 distinct varieties of cannabis medicine.

Fortunately, no single person had to judge it all. WAMM executive director Valerie Corral evaluated the *sativas*, cannabis-breeding legend

DJ Short handled the *indicas*, certified marijuana experts Chris Conrad and Mikki Norris examined the concentrates, and Chef Mike, the resident medical-marijuana chef on the *Cannabis Planet* TV show, put his well-seasoned pot palate to work on the marijuana-infused edibles.

As these judges paired off with their HIGH TIMES counterparts, literally comparing notes while debating the relative merits of each entry under consideration, Cervantes took his job as head judge extremely seriously, moving from concentrates to sativas to indicas and occasionally offering his own thoughts, while consistently helping each group move closer to consensus. Ultimately, the edibles judges (including HIGH TIMES managing editor Natasha Lewin) would unanimously agree on the biscotti from Greenway Compassionate Relief as their clear winner, and the concentrates would be decided in favor of Ingrid from the Leonard Moore Cooperative. Meanwhile, the sativa and indica judges (dealing with 34 and 42 total entries, respectively) opted for presenting

Jorge with a Top 5 list and letting him sort out the rest at his leisure over the next two days.

And so, while Jorge sequestered himself in HIGH TIMES' temporary headquarters with the 10 best strains in the state, the show went on at an expo center called Terra on the outskirts of town. With more than 100 vendors and informational booths, a nonstop lineup of panels and seminars, plus a large outdoor area dedicated to Prop. 215-compliant patients, the HIGH TIMES Medical Cannabis Cup drew huge crowds and attracted a veritable Who's Who of the medical-marijuana movement, including Steve DeAngelo from the Harborside Health Center; Debby Goldsberry from the Berkeley Patients Group; Keith Stroup, Paul Armentano and "Radical Russ" from NORML; federal medical-marijuana patient Irv Rosenfeld; Prop. 215 co-author William Panzer; medical-cannabis pioneer Dr. Frank Lucido; legendary ex-smuggler Robert "Black Tuna" Platshorn; the newly installed head of Students for Sensible Drug Policy, Aaron Houston; and representatives from both Americans for Safe Access and the upcoming California legalization initiative (see page 76).

By Sunday night, when the smoke had (largely) cleared, a standing-room-only crowd assembled to witness the presentation of the first-ever Medical Cannabis Cups. With all of the expert judges on hand to announce their final decisions, tensions ran

high as months of preparation, a week of careful testing and two days of Medical

Cannabis Cup history all finally came to a head. But before handing out the Cups, we paused to present a very special Lifetime Achievement Award to Dr. Lester Grinspoon for his long and highly distinguished career as a physician, professor, author, advocate and activist.

Although Dr. Grinspoon unfortunately couldn't attend for health reasons, the 82-year-old elder statesman of this stillemerging movement addressed the crowd via a taped acceptance speech. In it, Dr. Grinspoon marveled at the progress that California has made in leading the country toward the evergreater acceptance of medical marijuana and shared his hope that he would see outright legalization happening in his

own lifetime. And, after spending the weekend at a public celebration of this once brutally repressed plant—held not in Amsterdam, but in our own country—everyone present had to agree that anything seemed possible, in the best possible way.

True OG

Indica Cup

1st Place: Cali Gold (Mr. Natural Inc.)


THC: 1B.39% / CBO: 0.43% / CBN; 0.BB% This all-organic, naturally grown superhybrid took home first place in the very first HT Indica Cup on US soil, and deservedly so. A cross of OG Kush and Colombian Gold, Cali Gold carries the exceptional flavor and beautiful aroma of the OG, receiving a near-perfect score in these categories from the judges. The burn was above average and, under the loupe, Cali Gold exhibited nice trichome production and also scored high in the newly coined ROO category, a method of evaluation based on the ring of oil (hence, "ROO") that forms near the lit end of joints made from high-potency cannabis. Cali Gold's high ROO rating was later verified by the stunning lab reports that revealed it to be 18.4 percent THC!



THC: 15.19% / CBO: 0.31% / CBN: 0.65% Strongly reminiscent of the Chemdog line (perhaps an OG #1B), the True OG was an immediate Top 10 selection in the first round of sampling (out of some 40 indicas). Her hard, dense, well-cured nugs stood out, as did the pungent nose. Both her bouquet and taste earned bonus points with the judges, who frequently commented on this bud's ability to keep great flavor right through the end of the smoke. Lab results confirmed above-average potency and good medicinal value with 0.31 percent CBO. Grown indoors and hydroponically, the True OG responded as most OG varieties do in strong grow and nutrient programswith their true potential fully unlocked!

3rd Place: Bubba Kush (Tehema Herbal Collective Inc.)

THC: 13.55% / CBO: 0.25% / CBN: 0.24% Indica judge and legendary breeder OJ Short had this entry high on his list of favorites, and with good reason. Receiving excellent marks across the board, this Bubba Kush was very well grown, producing airy yet dense nuggets that had a piney, sage-like nose. When ground up, the bud produced an even more floral aroma as well as loads of powdery kiefundoubtedly a byproduct of the high resin content, which was clearly visible to the naked eye (and under the scope). But the crowning achievement of this bud was its impeccable cure, which not only created a perfect burn and smoke but a beautiful stone as well.





Durban Poison



Sativa Cup

1st Place: Vortex

(Green Bicycles)

THC: 1B.19% / CBO: 0.47% / CBN: 0.93% This extraordinarily grown version of the TGA/Subcool Seeds strain, cultivated from seed by Green Bicycles, was "Clean Green Certified," meaning it was grown in compliance with the USOA's Organic Certification Program and other international guidelines for sustainable farming.

Obviously, the growers of this fine herb knew what they were doing, as our judges' notes indicate that it was well flushed and cured, burning to a clean white ash. Further proof that the cure was dead-on came in the form of the super-high CBN count, which can indicate the bud's age and shows that an herb wasn't rushed through the curing process. CBN is also an important medicinal cannabinoid.

A hybrid project geared specifically for the medical user created this strain, with its lineage coming by way of an Apollo 13 x Space Queen. As HIGH TIMES senior cultivation editor and sativa judge Danny Oanko noted: "This is a true sativa in every way-tastes like Amsterdam, with a clear, bell-like high." And let's not forget her sweet flavor as well!

2nd Place: Candy Jack (Green Ooor San Francisco)

THC: 15.9B% / CBO: 0.29% / CBN: 0.BB% A tasty and pungent version of the Jack Herer line (a.k.a. Super Silver Haze), it's no wonder that this bud placed second in the Sativa Cup. Flavorful and with that signature sweet smell that gets the mouth watering, this Candy Jack burned very well and carried a mellow smoke with a strong high. Judges noted the quality of the entry buds: large and well-manicured colas, dense with light green leaves and lots of red hairs. HIGH TIMES staffers found this entry reminiscent of the Super Silver Haze/Jack Herer strain that was a two-time Cup champion in Amsterdam in the late '90s-only this version was a cut above!

3rd Place: Durban Poison (Purple Lotus Patient Center)

THC: 17.06% / CBO: 0.36% / CBN: 0.89% It was nice to see a Durban place in the Sativa Cup, as she is generally regarded as one of the few pure landrace sativas left on Earth. This variety, entered as Ourban Poison (with a possible tinge of indica in her from earlier crossings), was still one of the most sativa-dominant herbs out of over 30 sativa entries. With a sweet and spicy flavor and a high that sent the heart racing, she exhibited strong influence over the judges, all of whom had her on their Top 5 lists. This version of Ourban Poison also burned extremely well and had a very nice cure. With cannabinoid levels this high, it was no surprise that she turned out a winner.











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If growing great cannabis is a science, then making great concentrates is an art, and it was a pleasure exploring all 16 works of art entered into the concentrate category of the HIGH TIMES Medical Cannabis Cup.

For our judging sessions, we primarily smoked with a red-hot hookah coal and a glass pipe. Small samples of the concentrate were dropped onto the hot coal and inhaled, a method that proved excellent for judging because you could clearly see how a sample burned and what it left behind after it was spent. 1st Place: Ingrid

(Leonard Moore Cooperative) THC: 45.45% / CBD: 0.89% / CBN: 1.66%

This concentrate was presented as an un-

pressed powder that was soft between the fingers and easily worked into a pliable ball. The hash was a pleasure to smoke, with a floral flavor and a great expansion sensation once it hit the lungs. This sample quickly boiled away and left nothing behind on the coal-a great sign for medical patients seeking the purest concentrate possible.

2nd Place: Herojuana

(Phillips Rx)

THC: 54.65% / CBD: 1.32% / CBN: 2.24%

This sample looked like a piece of caramel. When held up to the sun, light would pass through it like a piece of amber. When squeezed between the fingers, it would crumble into fragrant powder. And with a whopping THC/CBD content, it was powerful medicine as well.

3rd Place: Granddaddy Purple Wax

(7 Stars Holistic Healing Center)

THC: 59.98% / CBD: 2.35% / CBN: 1.26%

At room temperature, this concentrate was nearly impossible to handle, so we kept it in the freezer between sessions. The sticky brown mass exploded into a puff of white smoke upon hitting the coal, followed by a complete burn with nothing left behind at all. And at nearly 60 percent THC, a little certainly went a long way!



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

LAB-TESTED

Oakland's Steep Hill Laboratories tested every HIGH TIMES Medical Cannabis Cup entry for potency as part of its ongoing mission to help the medical-marijuana industry's own efforts to regulate the safety and efficacy of its offerings.

Since opening its doors in 2008, Steep Hill Laboratories has scientifically tested more than 12,000 distinct cannabis samples in order to determine their exact per-

centage of THC, CBD and CBN (the best-known cannabinoids), while simultaneously ensuring that each new batch of medical marijuana is free of mold, pesticides and other potentially dangerous contaminants. Already working with over 50 different medical-marijuana providers across the





state of California, this dedicated lab is devoted to taking a leading role in the effort to ensure a safe supply of medicinal-grade cannabis to patients, while offering legally operating dispensaries and collectives a way to self-regulate the quality (and potency) of their products in an industry still largely free of oversight when it comes to cultivation practices.

To this end, Steep Hill employs both a gas-chromatography (GS) machine and a high-performance-liquid chromatography (HPLC) machine to separate each cannabis sample into its various compounds, followed by a mass spectrometer to test for potency. Dispensaries and collectives must provide the lab with a two-gram sample for testing and are notified immediately if a new batch registers unsafe levels of contaminants, so they can remove it from the supply line before it reaches patients. Participating providers also receive information on potency quickly enough that Oakland's Harborside Health Center—a leading dispensary with branches in both Oakland and San Jose—can label all its medicinal offerings with exact information on THC and CBD levels at the point of purchase.


Cannabis, of course, is a complicated plant with a myriad of active compounds that affect the human body and mind in complex ways we're only beginning to understand—so at this point, mere scientific data can't be expected to replace the (admittedly subjective) experience of actual humans, like our official expert judges. Still, access to ac-

curate information on THC and CBD levels offers medical patients an excellent baseline when selecting strains that will work best for their particular ailments. According to Steep Hill, entries at the Medical Cannabis Cup averaged 15 to 16 percent THC, whereas the buds that the lab normally tests average from 10 to 12 percent. And while the winners all had high potency, they didn't necessarily have

the highest levels, although the Cup winners in both the *indica* and *sativa* categories (Cali Gold and Vortex, respectively) tested above 18 percent THC, while the Cup-winning concentrate clocked in at a whopping 45.5 percent.



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California's cannabis revolution is on the ballot this November, but are voters really ready to legalize it?

ichard Lee reaches out to tighten By David Bienenstock

the cap on a small spray bottle of light brown liquid as he rolls through one of his thriving nurseries. These days, he may be the most high-profile marijuana entrepreneur in America, but not even the smallest detail of life in Oaksterdam escapes his attention. Of course, Lee's not only the mythical town's unofficial mayor; he's the founding father of a nine-block stretch of Broadway in Oakland that's now known to pot smokers worldwide as the home of his cannabusinesses, including the three-story, 30,000square-foot main campus of Oaksterdam University, two coffeeshops, a medical-marijuana dispensary, a gift shop, a student union and his political headquarters—all of which have helped transform the area from a scene of urban blight into a "green oasis" of commercial viability and community support.

A medical-marijuana user since 1990—when he slipped on a catwalk and broke his back while working as a lighting technician for Aerosmith—Lee now wants to take the fight for cannabis freedom to its logical conclusion: total legalization for all adults. And he's put at least \$1.4 million of his own money where his mouth is, spearheading and financing Proposition 19, the Regulate, Control and Tax Cannabis Act of 2010, which will appear on this November's statewide ballot alongside the candidates for governor and attorney general.

To win, Lee will have to raise a lot more cash, coordinate the kind of grassroots movement required to get out the vote, and—perhaps most importantly—identify precisely the right messaging required to convince the electorate that it's time to make history. He expected (and received) early opposition to this effort from the usual suspects with their typically self-serving objections, including the California Police Chiefs Association, which benefits financially from marijuana-related casework and asset seizures. But the pot impresario admits to being a bit blindsided by some longtime marijuana activists—and even growers—who've openly urged others to vote no on the initiative.

Chief among them is Dennis Peron, who cofounded the first medical-marijuana "buyers' club" in the US and later co-authored Proposition 215, which made California the first state to legalize medical marijuana in 1996. Once an esteemed member of the Oaksterdam University faculty, Peron left the organization and even began picketing Lee's Blue Sky coffeeshop every week in protest of the initiative, as well as any other plan that would give the government undue control over marijuana.

In a September 2009 statement entitled "Why I Oppose the 'Tax & Regulate' Marijuana Initiative," Peron pointed to three "fatal flaws" in the language of the statute, calling the one-ounce limit too small (likening it to being able to have only one or two bottles of wine at a given time); condeming large excise taxes on marijuana as an "unfair" way to maintain its status as "the most expensive, blatantly overpriced product on the market"; and sounding an alarm over the inclusion of harsh new penalties for supplying marijuana to minors—even to someone over 18 but under 21.

In the initiative's own words: "Every person 21 years of age or over who knowingly furnishes, administers or gives, or offers to furnish, administer or give, any marijuana to a person aged 18 years or older, but younger than 21 years of age, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of up to six months and be fined up to \$1,000 for each offense."

Lee counters that the offending language is meant to make the initiative palatable to a skeptical public, that the penalties for pot would be the same as for alcohol, and that extending legalization to 18-year-olds loses too many votes. He calls the public feud with Peron a serious bummer. "He's one of my heroes, who I modeled a lot of my activism off of, but to hear him say, 'I don't want to pay any taxes on marijuana—it should be peace and love and free





buds for everybody' ... that's not realistic.'

What is realistic, according to Lee, is a legalization plan that offers "local control" over implementation. Which means the taxand-regulate initiative allows local communities to permit commercial cultivation and sales and reap the related tax benefits, but doesn't mandate that they do so. In fact, so long as federal law continues to outlaw marijuana in all its forms. Lee believes that any initiative requiring state and local authorities to defy the Feds will be dead on arrival. All of which means that while every adult 21 years of age or older in California would have the right to possess up to an ounce of cannabis, and also cultivate up to 25 square feet per private residence for personal use anywhere in the state, the initiative still leaves the door open for "dry counties" much like those that currently exist for alcohol, where all sales would be banned.

In the meantime, it's an open question exactly how the Justice Department and the DEA



would respond to recreational legalization in the world's eighth-largest economy. Will they maintain the "states' rights" approach they've mostly adopted toward medical marijuana, or open the door to a new era of raids, arrests and open civil disobedience like the one that followed the passage of Prop. 215?

"We'll just have to wait and see what happens with the Feds," Lee admits, "but I can't imagine Obama has the time and political capital to waste on this."

The good news is that local control not only allows the most conservative communities to drag their feet; it also empowers the most far-sighted and opportunistic to lead the way. And it's no coincidence that Oakland seems poised to do just that. The city fathers got their first real taste of the action in 2009, when the Lee-backed Ballot Measure F passed with 80 percent support, creating a special business-tax rate of 1.8 percent for medical-marijuana sales—a first-of-its kind revenue stream that the mayor of Oaksterdam credits with greatly increasing the local government's interest in promoting the industry.

At best, electoral victory in November will ignite a "race to the top," where pot-progressive communities across California compete and innovate in order to attract the green jobs and tax dollars that will inevitably result from moving marijuana out of the black market. But if American history—recent or otherwise—teaches us anything, it's that it's not all



smiles and sunshine when the invisible hand of the market gets unleashed and starts reaching into your pocket.

The Oakland City Council, which now unanimously supports legalization, has lately been investigating licensed cannabis cultivation as a means of closing the city's \$42 million budget shortfall, including a plan to authorize just four industrial-scale indoor facilities, one of which would reportedly be up to 100,000 square feet in size and capable of harvesting and processing 58 pounds per day—every day. Numbers like that indicate Oakland's clear interest in growing cannabis for far more than local consumption.

While the Oaksterdam Empire hopes to secure one of those lucrative cultivation licenses for its own use, Lee nonetheless favors a plan that would allow more and smaller growers to make a living. Meanwhile, after a vote, over 100 employees of Oaksterdam University and related businesses (including Lee) recently joined the United Food and Commercial Workers union, a practice that would presumably extend to Oaksterdam's future cultivation plans. Still, the "head honcho" fears that communities already hesitant to regulate marijuana may prefer to deal with a handful of large, established entities rather than trying to sensibly oversee what exists now: an unaffiliated, unregulated hodgepodge of many smaller, difficult-to-quantify growers.

"I hate that trend," Lee says with obvious sincerity. "That's what we're seeing in Oakland, and while I don't mind there being a big facility, it's the idea of having *only* two or three big ones that I don't like."

Ultimately, if marijuana goes the way of American-style free-market capitalism, larger and larger fish—taking advantage of economies of scale and political clout never before seen—will keep gobbling up bigger and bigger pieces of the pot pie, until the cannabis industry from seed to stash looks just like every other segment of an agricultural system dominated by large, powerful business interests. And even if the existing federal ban on marijuana—which is extremely unlikely to be lifted in the near future—keeps multinational corporations like Phillip Morris and Monsanto out of the pot fields for the time being,

anyone who's paying attention already sees that the "American family farmers" in need of Willie Nelson's support may soon include those who grow his favorite green herb.

"If it goes totally legal, the mom-and-pop growers are going to be a thing of the past," says Dale Gieringer, a co-author of Prop. 215 and the state coordinator of California NORML since 1987, who now supports Prop 19 despite initial reservations. "The price will go way down, and it ought to go way down—but it will take awhile."

Gieringer credits the export market for California cannabis across state lines as the main thing propping up pot prices as medical-marijuana laws continue to make cultivation less risky, thereby removing at least part of what consumers have come to know as the "prohibition tax." Still, since the legalization of medical marijuana, indoor prices in California have slid noticeably. while top-quality outdoor now sells for under \$2,000 per pound wholesale—less than half of what the same crop would have commanded 15 years ago. According to Richard Lee, if the initiative passes, retail prices should eventually reach \$100 per ounce, including all taxes.


So where does that leave the legendary growers of Northern California's famed Emerald Triangle? In a word: panicked.


Up in Humboldt County, local musician, activist and KMUD radio host Anna Hamilton read the writing on the wall and decided to get proactive. Her first foray into pot politics came about five years ago, when she used her radio show to help spark a public debate about the rash of diesel spills caused by unsafe, illegal, indoor grow ops powered by generators in the remote hills. Initially, Hamil-

ton felt considerable fear about going public with a complaint about marijuana growing—a major taboo among those living behind "the Redwood Curtain"—but once the topic was broached, the locals began to talk among themselves about solutions. The result was a dramatic reduction in diesel spills, without any new laws or regulatory oversight other than an altered sense of what was acceptable behavior in the community.

KMUD first won the enduring affection of local growers via participation in the Civil Liberties Monitoring Project, which was formed in 1983 (the same year as the federal government's Campaign Against Marijuana Planting) to curtail civilrights abuses in the Emerald Triangle, most famously by announcing the arrival and likely destination of anti-marijuana helicopters over the airwaves. To Hamilton, those earliest incursions by heavily armed Vietnam vets and CAMP fanatics—flying their choppers low enough over the land to literally scare livestock to death—will always represent the truest and most brutal face of the War on Marijuana.


Now she sees a far more existential threat on the horizon, one with the potential to sink not only the "big-time growers," but also the lower middle class and working poor who tend smaller gardens just to get by—not to mention all of the unrelated businesses and individuals that have come to rely on marijuana money in a little corner of the world where cannabis production represents the No. 1 economic activity. If legalization pulls that rug out from under Humboldt County—particularly in this economy—pretty soon property values could tank, schools and hospitals could lose their funding, and

the whole fabric of society could start to unravel.

When confronting these harsh realities as an individual commercial farmer, the only logical response is to plant twice as much of any crop to help make up for the drop in prices. Based on local gossip, as well as the sheer number of trucks that have been spotted hauling 24-pallet loads of soil along Highway 101, it looks like many local growers have indeed decided to "double down," adopting a strategy that, unfortunately, when writ large, will only serve (in Hamilton's own words) to "drive the price into the toilet."

And so she realized that the cannabis cultivators of Northern California must either grow together or fall apart. Following months of speaking with friends, colleagues, neighbors and strangers—not to mention repeatedly cold-calling every government worker listed in the blue section of the phone book—Hamilton organized a public forum last March called "What's After Pot?" that brought together elected officials, business leaders, cannabis growers, medical-marijuana patients and providers, local law enforcement and other interested parties for a no-holds-barred discussion about how Humboldt County might not only survive legalization, but learn to thrive because of it.

Close to 200 people showed up for a truly historic evening that garnered considerable national press coverage but, more importantly, started the locals talking again about their own mutual best interests. The crystallizing moment came when Tony Smithers, the executive director of the Humboldt County Convention and Visitors Bureau, acknowledged that he fully intends to promote the region as a Mecca for marijuana tourists just as soon as the law allows.

"It was a shock," Hamilton admits. "Everybody went from hush-hush to 'Well, let's just paint the whole thing purple!"

Soon, ideas long considered pot-fueled "pipe dreams" began to look more and more like the most sensible way to move forward. Noting that their neighbors in Napa Valley produce only four percent of California's wine but maintain a world-wide reputation and a thriving, vineyard-based tourism industry, those who have grown accustomed to hiding out and laying low actually started debating the relative merits of branding their bud, forming growers' collectives, and creating the kind of progressive cultivation regulations that would protect the small-scale, outdoor, organic family farms that made Humboldt-grown grass famous in the first place.

Perhaps the greatest promise lies in plans to offer attractions like a marijuana museum and education center, "bud and breakfasts," farmers' markets, guided tours of the fields at pot-growing "dude ranches," high-end cannabis-friendly healing centers and yoga retreats, and other as-yet-unimagined businesses catering to the kind of travelers who will come to sample the legendary local produce, then stay for the redwoods, beaches, restaurants, fishing, hiking, bird-watching and lively cultural scene.

In an ironic twist, marijuana tourism could bring back the far mellower vibe that pervaded the Emerald Triangle when the back-to-the-landers first arrived from San Francisco in the late '60s as flower-power refugees and started growing pot up in the hills for their own heads, and to subsidize their homesteads. Before the government's paramilitary raids terrorized an entire generation of local youth, and before the modernday gold rush that prohibition spawned brought in an era of big money, energy-intensive indoor "gardens" and unfriendly neighbors, this really was a kind of pot paradise—and maybe, just maybe, it could be again.

As for the initiative, Hamilton calls it "the most reasonable thing" she's ever read, despite reservations about the new sentencing guidelines for minors. Still, while she wishes legalization were just a couple of years off so her community would have more time to prepare, "it's a good thing someone like Richard Lee is doing this, because it could be a whole lot worse."

So how do you vote when the issue at stake pits your own (and your neighbors') economic interests against the continuing human misery that is the status quo?

"Growers who are against legalization are harvesting bad karma," Richard Lee says flatly. "When somebody else gets busted, that's the subsidy that keeps prices high—that and the violence down in Mexico."

Anna Hamilton recommends that the truly torn admit they have a conflict of interest and recuse themselves from the decision by declining to vote on Prop. 19 entirely. But don't skip the races at the top of the ticket, as you'll have the chance to vote against Los Angeles District Attorney Steve Cooley, the Republican candidate for attorney general, who is running on a platform that includes banning all sales of medical marijuana anywhere in the state.

So while it's tempting to think that the amazing recent gains in common sense when it comes to marijuana—at least in California—are part of an inevitable march toward rationality, compassion and (ultimately) freedom, the very existence of Steve Cooley reminds us that reactionary forces will never give up their inexplicable hatred and intractable misunderstanding of this most beneficial plant.

In 1972, when the baby boomers first came of age and *everybody* smoked pot, a ballot initiative—unrelated to the current one, but also called Prop. 19—proposed a statute ensuring that "no person eighteen years or older shall be punished criminally or denied any right or privilege because of his planting, cultivating, harvesting, drying, processing, otherwise preparing, transporting, possessing or using marijuana."

Only 35 percent of Californians voted yes.

A lot has changed in the last 40 years, but certainly not everything. In a sane world, the challenge facing the professional political consultants working to pass Prop. 19 would be laughably easy, literally the stuff of farce. After all, in a society that not only allows legal alcohol and tobacco but cheers for a Jack Daniels-sponsored NASCAR team and sells candy cigarettes to children, convincing voters that maybe it's time to stop arresting their fellow citizens for growing a harmless plant—especially when we're all going broke—should be a pretty easy sell.

The latest opinion polls estimate public support at around 50 percent, with just a few months to go before Election Day. But the only poll that really matters takes place on November 2. THE HIGH TIMES INTERVIEW WITH GARY JOHNSON. BY DAVID BIENENSTOCK

When Gary Johnson first proposed legalizing marijuana in 1999, shortly after winning his second term as governor of New Mexico, he recognized in advance that taking such a principled and common-sense stand would result in his total marginalization from mainstream national politics, at least in the short term.

More than a decade later, he's decided not only that the moment's right to return to the political arena, but that this time around, the very same issue just might prove a winner. After all, the latest polling shows that well over 40 percent of American voters support marijuana legalization, with the needle still moving in the right direction, and yet no national politician has ever really tried to ride that green wave into high office. Until now.

With all due respect—and a great deal of respect is due—to Representatives Barney Frank, Ron Paul and Dennis Kucinich, their unequivocal support of marijuana-law reform didn't get them elected and doesn't keep them in office. And while there's certainly a lot more to Gary Johnson, both as a person and a politician, than this one issue, it is the thing he's best known for, as well as the single issue capable of—forgive the pun—igniting his nascent 2012 presidential campaign, taking him from principled fringe candidate to potential dark horse.

"I choose not to smoke marijuana, but you know what I thought when I smoked it the first time? The government lied," Johnson told Comedy Central's Stephen Colbert during a recent appearance clearly aimed at raising his name recognition among *The Colbert Report*'s politically-minded stoner demographic. "I just think the government should tell the truth."

A consistent, reasonable voice in support of small government, low taxes and personal liberty, Johnson seems to match the national mood. Still, most political pundits would put his chances of reaching the White House on a "Legalize it!" platform somewhere between slim and none. Then again, it wouldn't be the first time that Johnson came out of nowhere to disprove the "experts" and win an election.

Johnson was a political unknown when he ran for governor the first time in 1994, promising to bring a "common-sense business approach to politics." Prior to seeking office, he had founded and operated his own business—which eventually employed over a thousand people—while pursuing passions that included ski racing, competing in triathlons and smoking marijuana a couple of times a week.

Johnson won't get "pinned down" on exactly when he quit smoking herb, but he was certainly a personal and professional success long before he ever stopped puffing. In fact, there's been some speculation that Big J Construction was named in honor of one of its owner's favorite pastimes, although he denies the rumor.

Regardless, while Johnson may have refrained from using the L-word until after New Mexico's term-limits law made him a lame-duck governor, he hasn't looked back—or backed down—since then. Even when discussing his own cannabis use, he never apologizes or feigns a tale of sin and redemption. Instead, his version of "hitting rock bottom" involves logging a slightly slower time on a practice run after smoking a joint on the chairlift while training as a competitive skier.

As a member of the board of directors of Students for Sensible Drug Policy, Johnson continues to lend his name and reputation to an emerging student revolution in opposition to the War on Drugs. And while winning the Republican nomination in 2012—never mind the presidency—remains an incredible long shot, simply having his voice as part of the national conversation may help pull the rug out from under marijuana prohibition once and for all.

For a preview of how Johnson would approach the issue during a televised debate with his Republican primary opponents, witness this exchange from a recent appearance with Sean Hannity on Fox News:

JOHNSON: I find it funny that Republicans would talk about the fact that this country stands for freedom, this country stands for liberty and the personal responsibility that goes along with that, but not when it comes to marijuana. And, Sean, if the government made drinking beer illegal tomorrow, would you continue to drink beer or would you stop drinking beer?

HANNITY: I always obey the law

JOHNSON: But you would work to change that law HANNITY: I drink—I'm a lightweight, I don't drink a lot. But you can drink alcohol, a beer, two beers, a glass of wine, two glasses of wine, and you're not impaired. If you smoke marijuana, you are impaired. JOHNSON: I would disagree. In my experience, I would disagree. Denver voted to decriminalize the use of marijuana on a campaign based on marijuana being safer than alcohol, so I guess that got put to the test with a campaign. And as you're aware, Massachusetts voted to decriminalize marijuana this last general election 65-35. And to my knowledge, no incidents. Nothing.

Returning his pro-legalization message to a decidedly more receptive media outlet, Johnson was kind enough to sit down at the HIGH TIMES booth during the THC Expose in Los Angeles for an interview just weeks before he officially declared his candidacy for president.

When did you first personally conclude that the legalization of marijuana is a good idea? It would have been back in 1999. I wanted to take a hard look at the War on Drugs, and as part of that, I wanted to examine legalization as a potential alternative to what we were doing. Before that, I had no idea of the compelling argument that existed.



So you went into this with an open mind?

I really did. But I had to start with the perception that the government was putting out—that Holland had such terrible drug use and abuse, and that their crime was through the roof. So I wondered: How is that explainable, and should we really legalize if this is their experience? And I came to find out that what the government was saying about Holland was a lie.

And to whom would you attribute that lie?

[Former Clinton administration Drug Czar] Barry McCaffrey, for example—he used the argument that Holland was a terrible place. And you know that is not the case. So I did engage in that argument with a lot of the drug-enforcement people that initially came out to bash me.

Do you think that was a misconception the government truly believed, or were they disseminating what they knew to be false statements?

Well, it seems to me that the head of the Office of National Drug Control Policy ought to know better. I can't say what their motives were—all I can say is what was actually coming out of their mouths.

Is this something that you feel your fellow Republicans should embrace as a personal-liberty issue or a small-government issue?

Yes. And on top of that, it's a pocketbook issue—90 percent of the drug problem is prohibition-related, and yet half of what we're spending on the courts and prisons is drug-related. We're arresting 1.8 million people a year, and what are we getting for it? What is the result? There is no decrease in use. It's just really insane. And I think a lot of the people opposed to legalizing marijuana are opposed to it because they simply haven't tried it.

How about you—still smoking?

I choose not to, and I haven't had a drink of alcohol in 23 years. But I will just echo what everybody reading this already knows, which is that marijuana is safer than alcohol.

And is it safe to say that you're a supporter of the tax-and-regulate voter initiative in California? Yeah, I support the movement and have for a long time. The idea of taxing and regulating will make California a better place and a good example for the rest of the nation.

What dangers do you see in legalization? What could go wrong?

Government overregulation of what should be the absolute right to put into our bodies whatever we want, as long as it isn't going to cause harm to anybody else.

Arnold Schwarzenegger can't run again, so if the legalization initiative does pass in November, a new governor will have to figure out how to deal with it. As a former governor, what advice would you offer?

When I was still in office, I would often be criticized by people claiming that, "if we legalize marijuana like Governor Johnson wants to, New Mexico will become a Mecca for pot smokers." And I would always joke and say, "You mean millions of doctors, lawyers, business owners, entrepreneurs, authors and musicians are going to move to New Mexico because of legalization? Gee, that's going to be really terrible!" And I think it could actually have that kind of impact on the state of California.

What protections would you like to see in place for people who are existing growers of marijuana? Do you think it's important to protect their jobs and their livelihoods as we move toward legalization?

No, I don't—I'm a free-market guy, so legalize it and let the markets prevail. Those that have been growing it will have a head start, and it certainly would be tough to play catch-up in a market that individuals have a lot of expertise in.

How would you rate the Obama administration in dealing with this issue and the War on Drugs in general?

The dialogue seems to be a little bit better—but on the other hand, maybe the rhetoric isn't matching up to the actions.

As the former governor of a border state, what effect do you think legalization would have on the Mexican drug cartels, particularly the violence

along the borders and in those communities?

I realize that you're serving me up a gigantic softball, but the Mexican drug cartels make 70 percent of their profits off of marijuana. Legalize pot and you're going to do away with a lot of prohibition-related border violence. Basically, these are business disputes played out with guns rather than in the courts.

Do you think citizens who still support the prohibition of marijuana are willing to suffer these secondary costs, or are they unaware of the real price of this policy?

I really think that you can attribute all of this to unawareness—I don't want to say "lack of education" so much as just listening to government dogma for the last 50 years. It has a way of actually having an impact on the way people think.

How often do you meet prominent people who say, "I agree with you 100 percent about legalizing pot, but I can't say anything"? Is that still a common phenomenon?

Yeah, it is—not so much prominent individuals as politicians, then and now. That's the comment I get from politicians to this very day.

Do you think that when public opinion changes enough, they will move with those prevailing winds?

Of course.

Well, I ask that because there's a well-established and powerful status quo that benefits from the prohibition of marijuana and wants it to continue, despite the costs.

I am going to argue that, in this next election, the

sentiment is to vote them out—Republicans, Democrats, whatever. Which means that when marijuana legalization reaches the tipping point, which I think it's actually close to doing, the politicians that have opposed it are not going to be in office. **





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
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
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





In Cali, Time to Be Responsible



Jack Herer

Our medicinal strain of the month is not only a testament to a great man, but also to a great plant. Just as the man embodied the passion and right-mindedness of our movement, so does this exceptional herb, which provides excellent yields, sweet taste and high medical value to patients across the globe.

Jack Herer, an offshoot of the original Super Silver Haze, is a more balanced hybrid consisting of pure Haze and Northern Lights #5, with the male plant coming from the Haze side. The difference between Jack and the SSH is that the latter also has some Skunk in her and may have the parentage in reverse. The SSH took home back-to-back HIGH TIMES Cannabis Cups in '98 and '99, which tells you that Jack isn't far from championship status itself.

Balanced hybrids (around 50/50 on the sativa/indica scale) often have uplifting highs, which make them suitable for medicinal use by people with insomnia and certain mood and attention-deficit disorders. Jack Herer is also a big yielder—perfect for patients who need to grow their own medicine. Very popular for indoor grows in Canada, Jack Herer seeds can also be found in Amsterdam via Sensi Seeds.

at you and use it against all of us. Also, what will happen to the 12 states with medical legislation pending—and all of their patients? We need you, California, to stand up now and take responsibility and finish what you started. And we, the

rest of the country, promise to continue buying your pot!

Arizona Rising

This November, Arizona voters will decide whether to legalize medical marijuana and allow doctors to pre-

scribe it to patients with severe ailments. If the bill passes, the state hopes to regulate the drug itself.

"The bill is for a select, limited group of patients that have a certain class of illnesses that can be effectively treated by marijuana, and we want to make sure they have access to the medication that they need without being afraid of being arrested," said a spokesman for the Arizona Marijuana Policy Project.

Proposition 203 lists people with cancer, glaucoma, HIV/AIDS, hepatitis C, ALS, Crohn's disease and Alzheimer's as prime candidates for medical marijuana—but it leaves the door open to a number of additional symptoms, from nausea to severe pain, as well. Also, patients who don't live within 25 miles of a dispensary will be able to grow their own medicine—a smart addition to the plan.

Said an advocate campaigning against Prop. 203: "It's really not about medical marijuana—it's about decriminalization and tying up the hands of the police, the prosecutors and the courts." Um, yeah ... that is what it's about. It's a plant, it's medical, and it should be legal!

'Nice Try' Award for Michigan

While retroactivity in applying new laws is often left to the discretion of judges, it usually doesn't work out in favor of defendants. This is something to keep in mind for those living (and thinking about growing) in states that have pending medical-marijuana legislation: Don't get started just yet.

The Michigan Appeals Court recently ruled that the state's medical-marijuana law can't be used retroactively to spare people from conviction on drug charges. This was a reversal of an earlier decision by a Tuscola County judge, who had dismissed charges against a man caught with nine plants and drug paraphernalia. Keith Campbell says he was using marijuana for medicinal purposes. Unfortunately, the bust occurred in 2007, a year before the medical-marijuana law took effect.


The Appeals Court noted that there are affirmative defenses for pot possession if the drug is used to ease an illness. But the court also ruled that there's nothing in the Michigan law that allows it to be applied retroactively. *

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
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COUNTDOWN TO LEGALIZATION

If we continue to escalate our efforts—no matter how hard it's been or how tired we're getting—marijuana could be legal in America's most populous state next month, and it will have been students who played a pivotal role in getting it done.

Ask Dr. Mitch

Dr. Mitch,
A shrink wants to put a
magnet on my head to treat
the depression that he thinks
makes me turn to the plant. Would
a giant magnet fry my brain or give
me a seizure or something?

Hi W.,

Transcranial magnetic stimulation involves 45 minutes a day of sitting with a fancy electric coil on your head. The current is supposed to get neurotransmitters to squirt nicely and lift your mood. A few folks got seizures while scientists were figuring out the gizmo, but these are rare now. The magnet does give some people a wicked headache; it's really only approved for those who haven't responded to other treatments. If you're not depressed now and not running into problems with your current treatment, I'm not sure why you'd bother.

I think that vaporized herb is different from smoked because cannabinol doesn't get into the vapor. Does this make sense?

Hi Tiberius,

THC vaporizes at around 390° Fahrenheit. Cannabinol (CBN) vaporizes at around 415°F. A lot of vaporizers only heat up to about 410°F, so it's possible they're not cranking out the CBN. Nevertheless, CBN doesn't create subjective effects on its own and seems to enhance THC's effects only slightly, so it shouldn't make a huge difference. As good as the plant is, most folks won't miss the CBN.

I'm using hypnosis for creativity and wondered if marijuana might help me get into a trance.

Green Machine

Hi Green,

A study back in the 1970s showed that the plant can increase suggestibility, so the potential is there. But the research on hypnosis and creativity is mixed, with some studies supporting a connection and others not—which means it probably works for some folks, but not others. For example, author Andrew M. Greeley swears by it, though I doubt he uses cannabis.

PREEDOM PIGHTER

ANNE OF GREEN JERSEY

The Garden State's Anne Davis takes on the governor. By Russ Bellville

If the end of Prohibition in the 1930s has any lesson for marijuana-law reformers, it's that women—particularly mothers—must play a vital role in moving public opinion whenever policy meets perceived morality.

This month's Freedom Fighter, Anne Davis of New Jersey, exemplifies the legacy of 20th-century female reformers like Pauline Sabin. Davis is also a single mom and a practicing family-law attorney, so she has seen firsthand the devastation that can happen in a courtroom due to a parent's use of marijuana.

"Marijuana use comes up in custody cases all the time, and it is inherently unfair," she says. "A positive test in New Jersey will definitely result in supervised parenting time with limited visits and no overnights, regardless of how wonderful a parent may be. It's a damn shame."

Davis was appalled that families no different than her own were terrorized, not by the use of marijuana, but by our legal system's reaction to it. In 2008, she made the leap from bystander to activist by attending the NORML Aspen Legal Seminar and the NORML Conference in Berkeley. "As a registered Republican, I wasn't sure that marijuana-law reform, with its connotations of 'anti-establishment' and liberalism, would be welcoming to me," she notes. "I found just the opposite—that marijuana-law reform is truly a conservative message of personal responsibility, limited government and states' rights."

Davis was instrumental in the formation of NORML New Jersey and was recently elected executive director. She also helped lobby for passage of New Jersey's med-pot law and is currently challenging the new administration of Governor Chris Christie—a fellow Republican—to stop delaying its implementation.

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MORMLIZER



This November, voters in California—the world's eighth-largest economy, and the place where one in eight Americans resides—will have an opportunity to become the first state in the US to legalize the possession, cultivation and sale of cannabis for non-medical consumers by voting in the affirmative for Proposition 19, the ballot initiative formally known as the Regulate, Control and Tax Cannabis Act of 2010.

Some opponents have tried to claim that passage of this initiative will negatively affect employment law, workplace safety and DWI enforcement, as well as lead to "drug cartels" buying up land in California to set up huge domestic grow ops. But the truth is that Proposition 19 in no way undermines the federal drug-free workplace rules, just as the state's 14-year experience with legalized medical marijuana has never even threatened to do so.

Further, it in no way limits the ability of employers to sanction or fire employees who show up for work under the influence of pot. Just as a private or public employer today may dismiss workers for being under the influence of (legal) alcohol, employers in the future will continue to be able to fire employees who arrive at work impaired by marijuana.

Similarly, Prop. 19 explicitly states that it will not amend or undermine existing state law criminalizing motorists who operate a vehicle while impaired. Driving under the influence of marijuana is already illegal in California, and these offenses are vigorously prosecuted. This fact will not change under the initiative.

Finally, the notion that Prop. 19 would allow "drug cartels" to buy up thousands of acres of California farmland and launch large-scale grow operations is frankly absurd. The proposal limits adult cultivation to personal use only, within the confines of a five-by-five-foot area per land parcel. Larger grow ops would continue to be illegal under the law unless they were commercially licensed by local governments, in a manner similar to the way that the commercial production of

alcohol is already licensed and regulated.

Fear-mongering rhetoric aside, here's what Prop. 19 would do: In the short term, it would end the practice of arresting and prosecuting adults in California for the private use of a substance that is objectively less harmful—both to the user and to society—than alcohol. By doing so, this initiative will unburden the courts, save millions in taxpayer dollars, and allow law enforcement to reallocate their resources to focus on targeting more serious crimes.

The broader, longer-term effect of this initiative will be to allow communities to explore policies designed to take the commercial cultivation and distribution of marijuana out of the hands of criminal entrepreneurs and put it into the hands of licensed, regulated businesspeople—creating new jobs and new sources of revenue in the process.

Finally, as a society, we don't tax and regulate alcohol because it's innocuous: We do so because we recognize that the substance temporarily alters mood and behavior and thus should be regulated accordingly. There's no reason why this same principle ought not to apply to cannabis. California placed criminal prohibitions on the possession and use of marijuana in 1913. Nearly 100 years later, it's apparent that cannabis is here to stay. So let's begin to address this reality and regulate the plant's production, distribution and use accordingly.

Proposition 19 is a welcome first step in this direction.

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The Vegetative Stage

After the pre-veg phase, in which newly rooted clones or young seedlings are conditioned for more intensive growing conditions, the crop is ready to enter the vegetative-growth stage. Here, the goal is to develop a large root system and enough potential budding sites on each plant to fill the space allotted once the buds start flowering, while avoiding overfilling the space due to excessive plant heights and branching.

It takes research (and occasionally some trial and error) to accurately determine the best planting densities and times for vegetative

growth to produce optimal results in any particular strain. It's important to note that *indica*-dominant strains may grow very little once flowering is initiated, while *sativa*-dominant strains may triple or even quadruple in size before finishing. Thus, the length of time spent in the vegetative-growth stage needs to be adjusted accordingly for each plant.

In this particular garden, the plants experienced a five-week vegetative-growth period before the flowering stage was induced. During this time, each of these NYC Sour Diesel plants received plenty of space for both branch and root development. Just to highlight how important a large, healthy root system is for big yields of high-quality buds later on, it should be noted that the plants were grown in approximately 72 liters of peat-based soilless mix apiece.

The soilless mix is maintained with high levels of microbial life and bioactivity to help further stimulate the root systems and fill the large volume of growing medium provided to each plant. Beneficial inoculants are added with the nutrients to populate the growth medium and the root zones with fungi and bacteria such as *Trichoderma*, *Pseudomonas*, *Azotobacter* and mycorrhizae. The root systems are kept elevated off the cold floors, and the containers are placed on wheels so that each of the trashcans filled with soilless mix can be maneuvered easily through the growroom to help maximize light coverage for each plant.

Warm It Up

Slightly warmer temperatures help to increase the metabolic rate of activity in both the soil and plants. During vegetative growth, supplementing CO₂ levels to approximately 1,000 ppm (parts per million) and maintaining even temperatures of 85°F during the daytime and 80°F at night proves to be optimal. The populations of beneficial microbes supplied via nutrient additives help to keep each plant's root system healthy while functioning at the higher metabolic rates stimulated by the warmer vegetative-stage temperatures. By keeping the DIF (i.e., the temperature differential between day and night or light and dark) closer at this stage, the plants tend to produce tighter branching patterns, building an efficient framework for supporting large yields of dense, sticky buds.

Humidity

In the early-veg stage, some growers prefer to keep their humidity levels slightly higher (for example, 65%) to give the plants an opportunity to set down some roots after transplanting. If the air is too dry, tender young plants will have to work hard to keep up with the water loss through their leaves, and this creates stresses that can reduce cropping potential and invite other prob-

lems. This is a great time to introduce predator insects like *Phytoseiulus persimilis* (which eat spider mites), because they tend to do better at higher humidity levels. Also, because the plants are smaller at this point, fewer predator insects can provide more effective coverage faster. The humidity levels are then gradually lowered as the veg stage progresses.









Transition

The first one to two weeks of flowering are often referred to as the "transitional growth" phase. During this time, nitrogen levels are decreased slightly while the levels of phosphorous and potassium are increased. Temperatures should be reduced to 80°F when the lights are on and 75°F when they're off. Notice that the DIF is still narrow here; this helps to create tighter internodes at the onset of flowering, reducing the spaces between individual budding sites and producing more buds for harvest. CO₂ levels are typically maintained at 1,000 to 1,200 ppm during this time, with a straindependent relative humidity of 40% to 55%.

flowering, and carbohydrates help to supply both the plants and beneficial soil life with an abundant source of energy when growth and development are occurring at a higher rate due to the growing environment provided.

For the ripening period—which typically consists of the last two to four weeks before harvest—medicinal growers shift gears with their environment and crop feedings to promote maximum bud swell and resin production as well as a smooth, clean taste in the harvested buds. Environmental manipulation can even bring out the best colorations in certain types of genetics (for example, beautiful purples and reds).

bon dioxide inhibits the plant's production of ethylene, a naturally occurring hormone that assists in the ripening process.

Light intensity can also be reduced at this time, since growers are more concerned with dissipating their plants' chlorophyll content rather than building it up to achieve better-quality medicine.

Harvesting

Only after the grower is sure that the plants and growing medium have been adequately flushed of excess nutrients does the decision of when to harvest come into play. Well-flushed plants will usually show yellowing in the older fan leaves, signifying that excess nutrients have been transferred and used up by the ripening colas. With a magnifying glass or handheld microscope, the grower can inspect the swelling resin glands for signs of peak maturity.

A higher percentage of clear-looking glands indicates that the resins have not yet reached their full potency. This is desirable for some patients, since slightly less mature resin glands often have a more "heady" effect (as opposed to either a sedative effect or body stone) because the ratios of THC to CBD (cannabidiol) and CBN (cannabinol) are wider.

When the resin glands have gone from clear to milky white and opaque, the resin is at peak maturity. For most patients, this proves to be the ideal time to harvest, since there's now a good



balance between the THC and CBD/CBN levels, providing a more equal head-tobody effect. On the other hand, those patients looking for a body stone may want to wait until some of the resin glands

have turned from milky white to amber: At this point, some of the THC is beginning to degrade and convert back into precursors like CBD and CBN. Growers who wait longer during the ripening phase may have slightly heavier harvests, but they are also much more likely to get a sleepier effect from their medicine.

Finally, some growers have noticed a higher rate of resin production when the plants are kept in total darkness for 24 to 48 hours prior to harvest. Some studies suggest that resin production in the cannabis plant peaks just before the sun comes up (or the lights are turned on), so the extra darkness may promote a final burst of resin secretion.

There are many different strains of cannabis that appear highly suited for treating various ailments, with each strain possessing its own unique resin profile. Growers can use carefully controlled environments and nutrient programs to bring out the best in a chosen strain and, in some instances, even enhance what it has to offer—resulting in cannabis that is potentially more effective for each patient's unique needs. **



Flowering Time

At peak flowering (i.e., the middle of the flowering cycle), nutrient strengths and concentrations are at their highest, often averaging 1,500 ppm (approximately 2.0 EC) to stimulate and supply the intense structural development of the buds that occurs now. When using soil or soilless mixes, growers often follow a "feed, feed, water" regimen to help reduce the accumulation of nutrient residues that may occur in their medium. Growers who like to feed heavy will do a light flush of the containers or beds once every one to two weeks during flowering. A flush mix of humic acids and digestive enzymes proves to be ideal for this purpose, since it helps to reduce

excess nutrients in the growth medium that can create nutrient imbalances or lockouts.

Humidity and temperature levels are maintained at their set points, with no changes until the late budding/ripening phase of the reproductive cycle. CO₂ levels should be further elevated at peak

Meters, sensors and controllers are essential to maintaining constantly optimum atmosphere.



The Big Flush

For the final weeks before harvest, no base nutrients are applied. This helps to flush the plants and growing medium of any excess nutrients that may contribute to poor-tasting, hard-to-burn buds. A variety of rinsing agents can be used to help facilitate this process, although many growers (especially those reusing their medium, whether soil or soilless mix) prefer to flush with humic acids and digestive enzymes. In fact, growers who have doubled up on the rate of digestive enzymes mixed into the reservoir for flushing report marked improvements in both the quality of their crop and the suitability of their growing medium for reuse.

When significantly increasing the DIF between daytime and nighttime temperatures, growers should pay close attention to any rise in humidity levels during the dark cycle. Dehumidifiers help to keep the relative humidity (RH) from rising above 55% when the lights are off, which is necessary because excess humidity encourages bud rot and other plant diseases in the dense, heavy clusters of ripening cannabis.

COS

It's important that $\rm CO_2$ levels are lowered to ambient levels during the ripening phase (for example, 450 to 650 ppm). If $\rm CO_2$ levels remain higher at this stage, the buds may get bigger, but they'll lack the density and intense flavors and colors that growers typically desire. This is because car-



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

Restrain me in the cursed thoughts that Nature gives way to in repose.—Macbeth

This recipe came to me in a dream. I was late for my deadline, as usual—discarding ideas as if they were last decade's tattered heels and just praying that the muse might plant a lede or at least a crappy sentence fragment in my subconscious with which I could spark a sudden conflagration of profundity. Calliope came through; I dreamed that my ex taught me a recipe for white beans.

I try not to think about the fucking guy—it's a dangerous pastime. Hell, I'm still flossing bits of my heart from between my teeth after that torrid saga, and I haven't seen him since I hooked up with my beautiful husband eight years ago. But the guy did inspire me to write prolifically way back when, and sometimes he still haunts me when I least expect it. He was, in effect, my muse incarnate.

He was a California boy—a commercial diver who came to New Orleans to work in the oil fields of the Gulf. He'd been raised on a sailboat and is still the only person that I've ever met who was deported from Australia. He had a scar on his palm from a knife fight in Western Samoa, and his eyes shone brighter than all the constellations in a peyote sky. I knew I loved him before we even brushed hands. He turned me onto Hunter S. Thompson, and I read him Baudelaire's poems in French, and we'd kick back smoking the dankest grass and drinking the best wine under flickering candlelight and jasmine-scented breezes.

For just one fleeting spring, things were perfect. Then came the drugs—hard drugs—and darkness descended. "Everything in moderation," my father used to say, but my muse opted for a complete derangement of the senses instead. We shattered, I shattered, and he was lost for too many painful years. The curtains closed and I exited down the aisle on the nuptial arm of another.



My muse finally emerged from his self-inflicted decade of fog not long ago, and eventually found me—not that I'm hard to find. For the sanctity of my happy marriage, I've kept him at a distance, but the dream nagged at me—primarily because the recipe sounded as if it could actually work. So against my better judgment, I messaged him.

"You wouldn't happen to have a white-bean recipe, would you?"

"As a matter of fact, I do," he replied.

Weird. I didn't bother getting the information from him; I just chalked the whole thing up to good old-fashioned quantum entanglement and rolled with it. Fresh sage, bacon and a hint of real maple syrup give this simple, hearty dish just enough complexity to lift it above the ordinary. It has its roots in Tuscan cuisine—the cannellini bean is so commonly consumed there that Tuscans are sometimes referred to as il mangia fagioli, or "the bean eaters."

For hundreds of years, a similar dish called cannellini al fiasco was made in empty wine bottles set into the dying embers of the family hearth—and to this day, Tuscans reportedly scorn the idea of cooking these beans in metal pots, swearing that it affects the taste.

So grab your crockpot and let's do this thing! *

GANJA FAGIOLI

¼ ounce ganja shake, finely cleaned
11b dry white beans
12 oz thick-cut bacon, cut into 2" squares.
7 fresh sage leaves, sliced chiffonade style (place
the leaves atop one another in a stack, then cut them
into thin strips perpendicular to the stem-it's easy,
looks great and gives maximum flavor)

2 ¾ cups water

2 tsp sea salt

2 tsp coarse black pepper

2 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil

2 tbsp real maple syrup

1 tsp balsamic vinegar

Cover and soak the beans for three hours before cooking, changing the water once. Drain completely. Place in crockpot and cover with 2 % cups of water. Add sage, salt and pepper. Cover and turn on low.

In a heavy skillet, fry the bacon over low heat. When it's close to being done, add the olive oil and ganja and mix well. Add the maple syrup and balsamic vinegar. Continue to stir. When the consistency starts to look a little sticky, remove from heat and add the entire mixture into the crockpot. Cook for five to six hours or until the beans are soft with a touch of firmness. (Watch the beans carefully after the first three hours, as crockpots can vary in their heat output.)

Serve with a baguette or bruschetta. Stones seven.

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CLONING FOR DOLLARS?

A few years ago, I read a story in HIGH TIMES about a guy who sold clones for a living. Now that doing something like this legally is a reality in my state, I'd like to know how someone could root enough cuttings and keep enough mother plants alive to keep clones in stock at all times?

Dear Rep,

I'm not sure what state you're in where it's legal to sell clones. Even in California, I would avoid getting into something without knowing the full consequences, especially since most places I know consider distribution of live, rooted cannabis cuttings to be illegal.

I wrote the article you're referring to:
"Cloning for Dollars" (April '06 HT), about Mr.
Mom, a city dweller who couldn't afford to have
the odors of flowering plants wafting through his
apartment building. Instead, he kept a stable of
mother plants under a 250-watt metal-halide
(MH) lamp and used a simple rack system of fluorescent lighting over a couple of EZ Clone machines in order to produce hundreds of clones to
distribute to trusted grower friends in the area.

The key to successful cloning, no matter the medium, is the proper monitoring of moisture and temperature. Cuttings trying to root need

high humidity and warm temperatures in order to stay alive through the grueling rooting process.

Use a clean, sharp blade and cut at least a 2or 3-inch section of the plant diagonally right below an internode (the place where the leaf joins the stem of the plant). Cut off any leaves within a half-inch of the cut end and then dip it into your chosen rooting hormone.

Whether you're using rockwool, soilless mix or some other rooting system, immediately insert the cut end at least a half-inch into the pre-moistened medium and place it under a clear dome beneath your fluorescent lights. In cold areas, trays should be warmed from below with a heating mat.

Hydroponic growers, take note: If you're using an aeroponic-mist cloning system such as the EZ Clone, GroClone or Replicator, it can be very helpful to run your sprayers on a cycle timer at one minute on/three minutes off in order to avoid drowning your cut ends with too much water. If you seem to always have mushy stems that rot and disintegrate, try this solution and you'll see roots developing within five to nine days.

NO BUDS

I need some help, please! I planted seeds in my backyard in March (I'm in North Carolina), and it's

now early July and I haven't seen any buds at all yet. I've got big plants with plenty of leaves and branches, but no flowers of any sort. What am I doing wrong?

Dear Paul,

Everything is fine! Plants in your region won't naturally begin flowering outdoors until late July to early August. They should start showing signs of flowering very soon and promptly begin the transition from vegetation to blooming. If they don't, then perhaps you have too much light shining on them during the nighttime; plants won't flower without a full, uninterrupted dark cycle.

Barring any light problems, within short order the buds will begin forming on your plants, so keep in mind that their nutritional needs will change as well. Shift from a nutrient regimen that's heavy in nitrogen (N) to one with more phosphorus (P) and potassium (K). Avoid foliar feeding once the buds are clearly forming and visible.

Depending on the strain you're growing, they should be done sometime between September and December (but always harvest prior to any frosts). Luckily for you, you planted early, so your plants have had plenty of time to form branches to hold their heavy colas.



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
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SPIDER MITES DURING FLOWERING

I'm growing my first indoor crop, and I think I have spider mites. In fact, I know I do—first I found little white dots on the tops of the leaves, then the whole leaf started to turn yellow and die! I looked underneath one leaf and saw a bunch of little black dots running around. My flowers are starting to develop webs all over them! I'm at my wits' end. What can I do?

Bugging Out in Boise

Dear BOB,

Your problem has gotten worse than it ever should have due to your inaction early on. Mites must be dealt with immediately upon discovery with an aggressive program of pest control. They multiply so quickly that you'll find a many-pronged approach most effective in beating back these costly and annoying pests. With a lifespan as short as seven to 10 days, it's not long before you'll have generations of mites setting up shop and sucking the lifeblood out of your precious plants.

Always check the undersides of fan leaves as a daily precaution—and don't neglect that one plant in the back corner of the room that might be extra-tough to reach. Infestations usually begin in unnoticed places, so be sure to make the effort to check all your plants often as well as all of their surroundings—especially the surface of the growing medium.

During the vegetative stage or the beginning of flowering, if you see the early signs of spider mites—yellow or white dots on the leaf tops and tiny black moving dots underneath—immediately begin your war on these pesky pests. Use a

neem-oil-based spray and mist your plants liberally on the tops and bottoms of their leaves as well as the stalks and soil surface.

If your plants are still young and manageable enough, it's a great idea to give them a full dunking in a diluted neem-oil bath. Other useful homemade organic spray mixes include hot peppers, orange oil and crushed garlic bulbs. Type "organic pest control" into a search engine to find various recipes online. Check the labels on any store-bought sprays for ingredients and additives that can be harmful to edible plants.

If you're more than a couple of weeks into the flowering stage, you need to be more cautious about rampant spraying to avoid causing damage or molds to the forming buds. You can carefully spray the fan leaves to get rid of many of your new colonists, but you should probably employ some kind of beneficial insects such as ladybugs or predatory mites. Both can be ordered online or purchased at indoor grow-supply shops.

BOX OF GROW

I'm about to order a Super Locker Stealth Growbox from dealzer.com from an ad I saw in HIGH TIMES, and I was just wondering what you thought of this product.

Chronic Dope Smoke

Dear CDS,

The product you're referring to is a growbox designed to look like a storage locker. Two separate chambers allow you to grow clones and flowering plants within the same unit. It's a nice, affordable and stealthy growbox that will pro-

duce plenty of pot under the right circumstances.

Since tightly enclosed growing spaces heat up quickly, put an emphasis on ventilation from the box and cooling the area in which it's housed with an air conditioner. Also keep in mind that plants will continue to grow after flowering is induced and act accordingly, allowing plenty of space for them to fill out. Producing pot in a growbox can be fun and rewarding—as long as you adhere to the instructions and unique requirements of microfarming.

CLEAR, WHITE OR AMBER?

I've been growing for just over four months, and I just harvested my first crop. I think it turned out pretty good, but I'm not sure I chose the right time to harvest, because this weed makes me and all my amigos sleepy. I'm aware that I should be looking at the color of the trichomes in order to decide when to harvest, and I've seen beautiful pictures of clear, milky or amber-colored trichromes in HIGH TIMES' macro photographs.

My question is: With this next crop almost done, when I'm looking at plants through my 30x loupe, how obvious is this color change going to be to me? I'm near the end of the seventh week of flowering: I see pretty, mushroom-shaped trichomes, and I think they're all still clear. All the hairs have turned red, and my Kush plant has turned purple. I know these things are related, but the trichomes are my ultimate tell. Thanks!

Kind Kevin

Dear Kevin,

You're referring to the color within the glandular trichomes, the tiny "crystals" on the buds best visible under magnification. They resemble tiny glass mushrooms with a stalk and head on top. The proper time to harvest your cannabis is when the trichome heads have just turned from clear to cloudy or milky, but before too many have turned amber. The color change will be obvious as long as you're looking at the center of the gland head perched atop the stalk. Perhaps you could upgrade to a 100x scope in order to get a closer look.

Some people enjoy the more lethargic stone that comes from pot harvested a week or two late, but most cannabis connoisseurs prefer milky trichomes at full maturity and ripeness, before any degradation of the essential oils within. However, medicinal patients looking for a heavier effect may benefit from a later harvest in order to emphasize certain pain-relieving qualities.

STRAIN MIX-UP

I have a problem—I'm 55 years old, and my wife and I both have our medical cards. I've been growing weed for a long time, but I haven't done it indoors until our recent move to Oregon. A friend helped me set up and started me out with the best and strongest weed I've ever had—and trust me, it's good! He got the strain from some old man from around here who's been growing it for over 20 years. We don't know the original name, but we call it OCC for "Oregon Coast Cannabis."

Anyway, I got some really good *indica* seeds and grew six of them side by side next to six of the OCC plants. Then my buddy who gave me the OCC came over to see the plants, and he said that the OCC plants had changed in looks and odor somehow. I











told him he was full of shit, because you can plant an apple tree and a pear tree side by side and it won't turn them both into apple-pear trees, right? But then he brought some of his OCC over and, sure enough, it looked and smelled different than mine. Is this possible—and, if so, how can I prevent it from happening again?

Hot Rod

Dear HR,

The same strain grown by two different farmers can turn out very different indeed. Even though the plants are genetically identical, the environmental factors are of utmost importance to the final product. I suggest you look into the growing conditions for the OCC plants and whether they came from a healthy mother plant. Sometimes, clones from stressed-out moms produce plants that lack vigor. Often, cuttings that lag during the rooting period will have trouble keeping up with other plants throughout the growing cycle.

Rest assured that your plants can't take on the characteristics of nearby plants without your first crossing a male or hermaphrodite with a female and producing seeds. Also, this couldn't happen within the course of one harvest season—and only if the plants came up from the ground the next year could they possibly exhibit each other's traits.

Get yourself some fresh, healthy cuttings of the OCC and grow them out again. Chances are you just had a bad run. While you're at it, do some research on breeding and try to isolate and stabilize the traits that you like and pass them on to the next generation better than they were passed on to you.

CARRY THAT WEIGHT

I'm a newbie who's trying to grow two pounds of bud every month or so. What type of setup do I need for this, and what's the best one to buy?

Dear Jay Tee,

Whoa there, buddy! As a self-described "newbie," you need to slow down and be realistic about the sacred project you are about to embark on. Instead of approaching it with weight and profit in mind as your goal and motivation, remind yourself that you are partaking in a noble and difficult pursuit akin to modern-day alchemy.

Cultivating cannabis isn't as easy as purchas-

ing the perfect system and firing up a grow light. You must start with a proper understanding of plant science, including germination, propagation, photosynthesis and nutrition. Get a grow book (Jorge Cervantes's are my favorites) and familiarize yourself with the various stages of growth.

Also, be prepared to fail. This is a tough one for some newbies to accept, but all farmers— even the so-called experts—have lost a garden or two (or more). Learning to grow is a process of trial and error, and you must allow for setbacks in your plans in order to learn from your mistakes and be able to properly deal with them.

Eventually, after getting a few harvests under your belt, you'll be able to create a perpetual-harvest system by which you'll yield your desired amount of cannabis. But always remember that there's no one perfect way to grow great pot, so keep your mind open to new techniques and possibilities.

'KIEFING' BUDS

I've been around some smelly stuff before, and the look and feel were good but the kick wasn't always there. Someone told me about people siphoning off the THC before they sell it to you. Is this real or an old wives' tale?

The shocking thing is that I've heard of the practice you're referring to—some call it "kiefing" the buds, although that's a bit of a misnomer. Needless to say, it's unethical and despicable to sift the resin from buds before passing them along to someone else. That may not be the case with your buds, as some strains simply smell and look great without delivering much of a high.

On a side note, it's truly sad that because of cannabis prohibition, I have to keep answering questions about adulterated pot and those who would take advantage of patients and consumers by extracting the trichomes first for their own selfish benefit. In the absence of a black market, all of these desecrations to our sacrament and medicine will disappear. It's all the more imperative to take the market out of the hands of thieves once and for all and to grow our own cannabis to share with those in need.


GROWING UPSIDE DOWN
