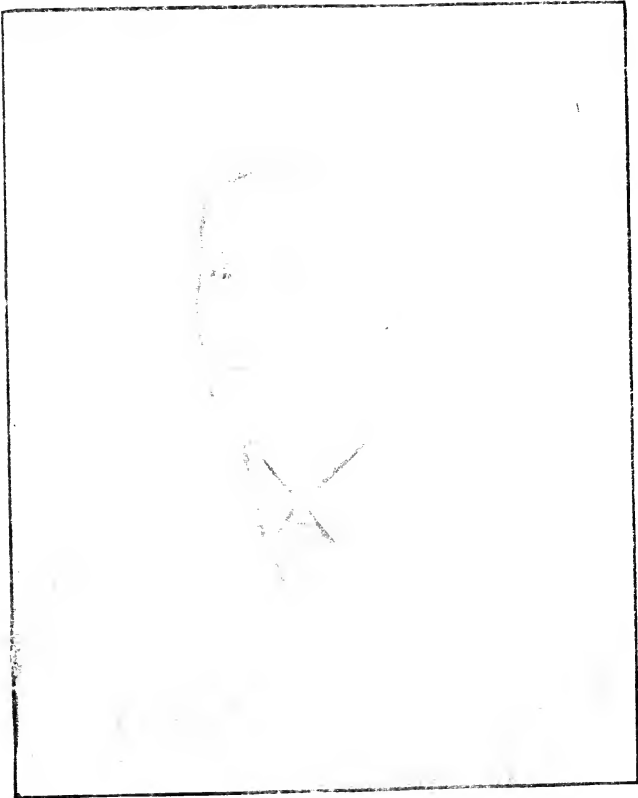

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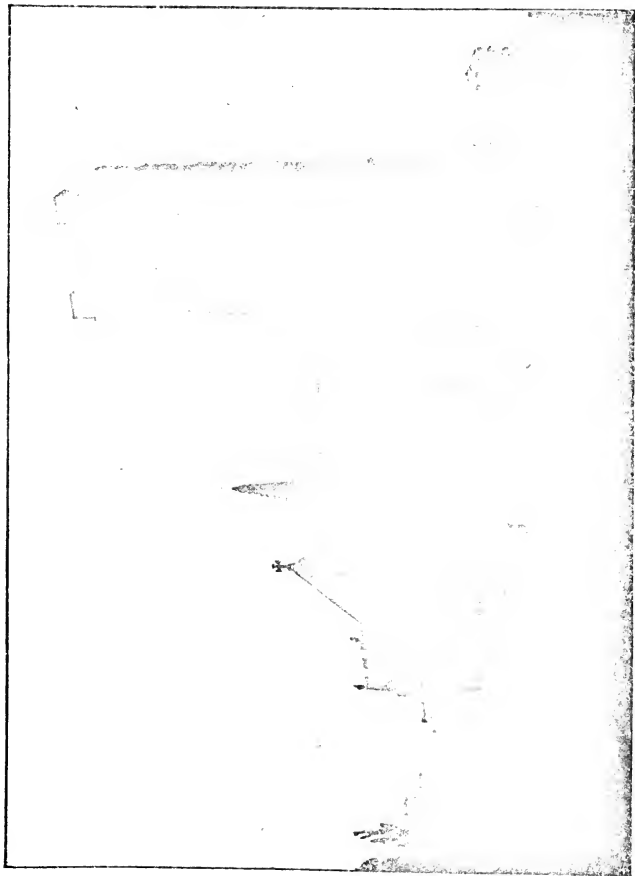

THE NAME AND ITS ORIGIN

AS FOUND IN ANCIENT HISTORY AND MYTHOLOGY

This name, in its many variations, is often met with in ancient history long before surnames were in use, and its possible derivation and meaning may be of interest to some of those who bear it in its more modern form.

It is found written Aman, Amann, Amon, Ammon. Haman, Hamant, Hamont, Hammon, Hammons, Hamond, Hamonde, Hayman, Haymond, and later almost universally as Hammond, although there are still some Amans of French or Norman descent and a few Hamants, Hammons and Haymans of English and Irish origin.

It appears among the very earliest surnames found in England, where it was introduced as a family cognomen at the time of the Conquest by some officers of the invading army.

“Ammon or Hammon—A name given to Jupiter, worshiped in Libya. When Bacchus was conquering Africa, he is said to have come with his army to a spot called, from the vast quantity of sand lying around, by the name of Hamnodes. Here his forces were in great danger of perishing from want of water, when a ram appeared on a sudden and guided them to a verdant spot, or oasis, in the midst of the desert. When they reached this place the ram disappeared and they found an abundant supply of water. Bacchus there-

fore, out of gratitude, erected on the spot a temple to Jupiter, giving him at the same time the surname Ammon, or Hammon, from the Greek *ammon* in allusion to the circumstances connected with his appearance, and the statue of the deity had the head and horns of a ram. The oasis referred to is the Oasis of Ammon, and the fountain is the famous Fons Solis.

The temple of Ammon, like that of Delphi, was famous for its treasures, the varied offerings of the pious. Plutarch says that the name of Ammon is the Egyptian name for Jupiter. This god was particularly worshipped at Thebes, called in the sacred books Hammono, "the possession of Hammon," and in the Septuagint (Ezek. C. 21), the City of Ammon. Jablonski derives the word Ammon from *Am-oein*—shining. According, however, to Champollion the younger, the term in question (*Amon*), denoted in the Egyptian language "secret, concealed," or "he who reveals his secret powers." The Greek etymology of the name Ammon is fanciful and visionary, and only affords another proof of the constant habit in which that nation indulged, of referring so many things to themselves with which they had not, in truth, the slightest connection.*

Many other significations are found for the name in ancient history: *Amon*—faithful, true; *Haman*—noise, turmoil. *Hamon-Gog*—the multitude of Gog, &c.

At a later date we find the Roman General, who was among the invaders of Britain and from whom the Port of Southampton derives its name. His feat of valor adds no particular lustre to the name, however.

In the settlement of the estate of Thomas Button, Bishop of Exeter, in the year 1310, is mentioned a lot of "*loculiponchi* and *Hamonds*," six in number, which were sold. The word is used here in its Saxon, meaning "something which protects and keeps safe."†

The name Hammond as a family name appears in England from the date of the Conquest (1066). It is found with

a large variation of spelling, often exhibiting three or more different forms in the same document. The name appears to have been generally spelled Hamond or Hamonde prior to 1700, but is often found written Hamon, Hamont or Hamant in the text of a document, when the signature is Hamond or Hamonde. The same individual does not seem to have always spelled his name in the same fashion, and it is not until some years after the emigration to America that we find anything like uniformity of spelling, even in the same family. After the emigration the large majority of the families of the name adopted the uniform spelling of Hammond, but there are a few who still adhere to the names Hamant, Hamond and Hammon.

“Hammond. Among the many of his own kin who accompanied the Duke of Normandy on his invasion of England were two brothers, sons or grandsons of Hamon Dentatus: Robert Fitz-Hamon, the renowned conqueror of Glamorganshire, and Haimon, called “Dapifer,” from his having received the office of Lord Steward for the King. The latter died issueless, and the former left four daughters only, three of whom devoted themselves to conventual lives, and the fourth, Mabel, married Robert Fitzroy, Earl of Gloucester. Hamon Dentatus appears to have had at least two other sons, Richard, of Granville, and Corbeil, ancestor of the Granville family, illustrious in the ranks of the peers and landed proprietors; and Creuquer, as he is styled in the Battle Abbey Roll, who inherited the Barony of Chatham from Robert Fitz-Hamon and many of the Kentish estates of Hamon Dapifer. Creuquer, or Crevecoeur, had his manors erected into a lordship, called by way of distinction, “Baronia-de-Creviquer,” and from Chatham being its head, his descendants generally wrote themselves “Domini de Cetham.” We find these honors in the reign of Richard I. in possession of Haimon de Crevequer, who died in 1203, leaving Robert Haimon his heir. Haimon joined the confederacy of the Barons under Simon de Montfort against Henry III, and was among those who in consequence lost their estates. From him lineally descended

Ralph Heyman, or Hayman, of Selinge, County Kent, ancestor of the Heymans of Somersfield, extinct Baronets, and Roger Hayman, who, to avoid religious persecution in Queen Mary's reign, fled into Devonshire, where he established a line represented now both in Somersetshire and in Ireland. The present chief of the Irish portion of the family is Matthew Hayman, Esq., of South Abbey, Goughal, a magistrate of Cork.*

"Grenville, Richard, surnamed de Greuville, from one of his lordships, was a younger brother of the renowned conqueror of Glamorganshire, Robert Fitz-Hamon, and derived in direct descent from Rollo the Dane.

"Accompanying his royal kinsmen to England, he fought at Hastings and participated in the spoils of victory. He inherited also the Norman honors of his house, and was Earl of Corbeil and Baron of Thorigny and Granville.†

In the annals of the Conquest no name is more frequently met with than Hamon. The sons of the renowned Norman Lord, Hamon Dentatus, who rebelled against William and overthrew King Henry at Vales-dunes. It may not be out of place to quote briefly from some of the accounts of this, our illustrious Norman ancestor. "In the same company was Hamon, Lord of Thorigny, Lord, too, of the Steep of Croillie, where a vast fabric of later times has displaced his ancient 'donjon,' and where the adjoining church bears witness to the splendors and bounty of the generation immediately following his own.² Some personal peculiarity entitled him to bear, in the language of our Latin chroniclers, one of the most glorious cognomenia of old Rome, and Hamon *Dentatus* became the forefather of men famous in British as well as in Norman history.³ One royal chronicler in his zeal speaks of

the rebel by the strange name of Antichrist; * but as in the case of Thurstan of Falaise, the stain was wiped out in the next generation. His son, Robert Fitz-Hamon, was destined to set the seal to the work of Offa and of Harold, to press down the yoke forever upon the Southern Cymry, and to surround his princely fortress of Cardiff with the lowlier castles of his twelve homagers of the land of Morgannog."

"The expression is very strange, but it is so taken by M. Le Comte (See Appendix O.), and I see not what else it can mean."*

Many pages of Freeman's History of the Norman Conquest are devoted to the exploits of Hamon.

Robert Fitz-Hamon seems to have taken a very active part in proclaiming William King, and the large estates given him were but a fitting reward from his sovereign. In describing the battle which decided the conquest Freeman says, "William now sprang on his horse's back, and now ready for battle, he paused for a moment at the head of his host. His gallant equipment and bearing called forth the admiration of all around him, and a spokesman for their thoughts was found in Hamon, the Viscount of the distant Thowars. He spoke, no doubt, the words of all when he said that never had such a knight been seen under heaven, and that the noble Count would become a noble King."†

In speaking of the Council which proclaimed William King, he says: "The military council was strongly in favor of William's acceptance of the crown, but the decisive answer was given, not by any of William's native subjects, but by one

of the most eminent of the foreign volunteers, Hamon, Viscount of Thowars, a man, we are told, as ready of speech as he was valient in fight, had on the height of Telham, been the first to hail the Duke as a future King."‡

Green's Conquest of England also devotes much space to the Hamons. Katherine S. Macquoid, in her "Through Normandy," p. 407, describes the ancient fortress or castle of Hamon in Creully, which is still in existence. She also gives a very entertaining account of the early Lord and his sons.

The name is also found in the far north. In the "Story of the Volsungs," edited by H. H. Sparling, which is translated from the Icelandic, is mentioned in the mythology of the north; "*Hamund*," son of Sigmund, son of Volsung, son of Resis, son of Sigi, son of Odin or Wodin.

HAMMONDS IN ENGLAND.

The tracing of early family history and geneology in England is attended with many serious difficulties, owing chiefly to the vandalism of our Puritan ancestors, who in their misguided zeal for the cause of Protestantism destroyed churches, burned records, and sent whole ship loads of valuable papers and documents to the Netherlands to be used in paper making. The few remnants which escaped their fury are mostly collected in the British Museum, and while the amount deposited there seems large to the casual observer, it is but a tithe of what existed throughout England prior to the time of Queen Elizabeth. It is when the family historian and geneologist attempts to follow the line of his ancestry back beyond this period that he begins to realize the great dearth of records, unless his ancestors have been numbered among the nobility, when some records of them may be found in the Herald's College. Even if such be the case, he may still find great difficulty in making all of the connections, and finally be obliged to give up the attempt, or frame a record from patchwork, supported by small items of circumstantial evi-

dence, and such records of wills, administrations and court records as may be found. The oldest parish registers, with few exceptions, now in existence, do not date back beyond the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and but few of the records to be found in any of the parishes or manors of England are of an earlier date. Comparatively little worthy of attention prior to this time is found outside of the British Museum. With this situation confronting the would-be family historian and genealogist, he must needs gather from the fragments such stray items as he can find, and arrange them in as orderly a manner as possible for those who shall come after him. But a disconnected and fragmentary record of the Hammonds can be found from the time of the Conquest down to the time of Henry VIII. There were a few notables in the family who have left some trace behind them, but it would be the work of an ordinary lifetime to collect and arrange the little that remains. The earliest known seat of the family seems to have been in the County of Norfolk, and from there they seem to have spread over Suffolk, Essex, Yorkshire and other counties. Hamon de Cleme was lord of a manor in Norfolk, which was invaded by a band of men, who seized the corn and threshed it, and cut down timber and carried it away in the year 1270.*

The earliest record of the name of Hammond which is known to exist in Suffolk is the following indenture given on p. 296 of the History of Long Melford, by the late Sir Wm. Parker, Bart.

“4. Ed. III.

“We, Alexander le Turner, of Melford, and Johane, his wife, have granted to Adam Grenleve all rights and possession of half an acre of arable (land) in Melford, lying between the land of John Cole and Adam Scoyle, one head abutting on land of John de Melford, and the other on the “way” leading to the house of John Hog, and the aforesaid half acre of arable lies between pasture formerly of John Fairhead and the land of the Rector of Melford.”

For the next three centuries the Hammonds continued to increase and spread all over this section of Suffolkshire, until there were many hundreds of the name living within a radius of ten miles around Melford.

Thomas Hammond was Lord of the Manor of Cresseners, County Suffolk, from 1561 to 1586. His wife was Anne, daughter of John Cawston, Esq., of Hawkedon. (In his will Feb. 8, 1560, he spells the name Caustone.) He died in 1586, and was succeeded by his son, Thomas Hammond.

He was the Thomas Hamonde who was witness to the will of Christopher Browne, of Hawkedon, in 1568. (Boad's Hist. Watertown, p. x 120.)

John Hammond, of Ubbeston, County Suffolk, was Lord of the Manors of Nevills in Ellingham, and of Dunston, County Norfolk, and also owner of the manors of Ubbeston and Walpole, County Suffolk, from 1541 to 1588. He was succeeded by his son, John Hammond.

John Hammond, L. L. D., of Bury St. Edmunds, died in 1590. His wife was Agnes Nowell, sister of Alexander Nowell, Dean of St. Paul's. His widow married Arthur Jenney, Esq., and his eldest son and heir married Ursula Jenney, daughter of Arthur Jenney, Esq., by his first wife. This son, William Hammond, "died a soldier beyond the seas in 1622."

Thomas Hammond, L. L. D., of Bury St. Edmunds, brother of Dr. John Hammond, married Anne Ward, daughter of Edward Ward, Esq., of Mendham, County Suffolk. He was under collector of tithes and subsidies. He died March 11, 1599, leaving an only son, Thomas Hammond, aged 7 years at the time of his father's death. This son entered Cambridge University, but seems to have left without taking a degree. He is mentioned as Esquire in his grandfather

Ward's will in 1632. From his uncle, Sir William Ward, are descended the Wards, Earls Dudley. Another brother of Dr. John Hammond's was Henry Hammond, a wealthy clothier of Bury St. Edmunds. Still another brother was Edward Hammond, of All Hallows on the Wall, London, who with his brother Thomas purchased St. Paul's Hospital, Canterbury, in 1597. He died in London in 1630. Still another brother was Matthew Hammond, the ancestor of the Hammonds of Ufford, County Suffolk. Thomas Hammond, of Wetherden, County Suffolk, who died in 1601, had two daughters, Diana, who married John Deynes, Esq., chief constable of Coddenhams, County Suffolk, and Susanna, who married John Winterflood, Esq., of Alveley Hall, Assington, County Suffolk. His only son, Thomas Hammond, died unmarried.

The Hammonds of Lawshall were nearly all agriculturists, some of them, however, quite wealthy for the period in which they lived. Some appear to have been landed gentry, but nearly all of these left a family of younger sons, who held lands as tenants under the Lord of the Manor. Of this family was Major General Sir Thomas Hammond, Lord of the Manor of Whepstead, County Suffolk, who died leaving a widow and one daughter, both of whom died soon after.

"The manor of Whepstead was held by Bury Abbey, by gift of Theodred, Bishop of London, and was granted to Sir William Drury in the 31st year of Henry VIII. It afterward passed through various families to the late Major General Hammond, who repaired and modernized Plumpton Hall, a large mansion, which is now occupied by a farmer, and has been recently sold by the trustees of the late Sir Thomas Hammond." It is now owned by Wm. Robert Beven, Esq., a London banker.

Sir Andrew Snape Hammond, of the ship *Roebuck*, who was active in the war against the colonies in the Revolution, and mention of whom is often found in American Archives, was of the Suffolk branch of the Hammond family.

"Hammond of Holley Grove, Berks, Dec. 10. 1783. Sir Andrew Snape Hammond created a Baronet.

"His father, Samuel Hamond of Blackheath, in Kent, died 1715; married ——— Meadows, had son Robert, who died 1775, aged 70 years. He married Susannah, daughter of Robert Snape, and had three daughters."

"Arms—Argent, a chevron sable, charged with two escallops; argent, between two pellets, each charged with a martlet; argent in chief and a rose, a wreath of oak leaves all over, within a bordure engrailed vert. Crest—Out of a naval crown, an eagle's head and neck, sable."

DR. JOHN HAMMOND.

Perhaps the most noted English family, with the possible exception of the family at St. Albans, County Kent, is that of Dr. John Hammond, court physician to King James I. and Henry, Prince of Wales, Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge. He was eminent in his profession, and was the ancestor of many men eminent in English history. His eldest son, John Hammond, the author of "Leah and Rachel," published in London in 1656, came to Virginia in 1634, remaining there nineteen years, then removed to Maryland, where he remained two years before his return to England. His work, "Leah and Rachel, the Fruitful Sisters," was a description of the colonies of Maryland and Virginia. Another son of Dr. John Hammond was Major General Thomas Hammond, of Cromwell's army, the father of Col. Robert Hammond, Governor of the Isle of Wight, to whom King Charles I. surrendered.

Col. Robert Hammond was one of Cromwell's most trusted officers, and after Cromwell had secured control of the government, he appointed him Governor of the Isle of Wight, and he took up his residence at Carrisbrook Castle, where the King went with his attendants to surrender to him, probably having decided upon that course owing to the fact that Col. Robert Hammond was a nephew of his favorite chaplain, Rev. Henry Hammond, D. D.

A collection of letters between Col. Hammond and the

Committee of Lords, &c., published in London in 1764, and which contains some characteristic letters from Cromwell to Col. Hammond, is full of interest.

Another son of Dr. John Hammond was Rev. Henry Hammond, D. D., one of the most noted English divines, born Aug. 18, 1605. At the age of 13 years he was sent to Cambridge, where he was educated at Eton and Oxford, and became a Fellow of the University in 1625. His father died about 1616, and left him without the advantage of his advice and great influence, but by great perseverance and by means of his great natural talent, he rose rapidly and soon secured Court favor. In 1633 he was presented with the Rectory of Penhurst, in Kent, and in 1643 became Arch-deacon of Chichester. He soon became the favorite Court chaplain of King Charles I, who proclaimed him the most natural orator he had ever heard. He followed the King to the Isle of Wight and remained with him during his confinement in Carrisbrook Castle. In 1648 he retired to Westwood, the country seat of Sir John Packwood, where he spent the remainder of his life in literary labor. His most celebrated work was "Annotations and Paraphrasis on the New Testament," published in 1653; another work was "Whole Duty of Man." His collected works were published in four volumes, and a volume of his sermons was published some years later. He died in 1660, and was buried in the Church at Hampton, where Humphrey, Bishop of Sarum, caused to be erected a fine monument of white marble bearing the name, "Henricus Hammondus," and a long inscription in Latin. He was noted for his piety, great charity and liberality. He never married.

Rev. Mark Noble, the eminent English author, says in one of his works: "This ancient and knightly family were greatly divided in their religious and political opinions."

In England there were "Cavaliers" and "Round Heads," Catholics and dissenters. Many of the "Cavaliers" came to Virginia and Maryland, while the Hammonds of New Eng-

land, so far as is known, all derive from Puritan or "Round Head" ancestry.

Probably the most noted and widely known family bearing the name in England has been that of St. Albans Court, Nonington, Co. Kent. So far as is known but one of this family has ever made his home in America. This was Edward Hammond, who came to Virginia in 1635 and introduced the culture of silk worms. Some of his letters are still extant with the family at St. Albans Court.

This family, which was probably of Suffolk, or Norfolk origin, traces its ancestry back to John Hamon, a tenant to the Abbot of St. Albans temp. under Henry VIII, who begun the purchase of the Manor of St. Albans.

His son, Sir Thomas Hammond, completed the purchase in 1551. Sir Thomas, knighted in 1548, married Katherine, daughter of John Skelly, Esq., of Patersham, in Sussex, and had six sons and two daughters.

The eldest son, Sir William Hammond, knighted in 1608, married Elizabeth, daughter of Anthony Anchor, Esq., of Bishopsbourne, by Margaret, his wife, daughter of Edward Sandys, Archbishop of York. He had three sons and five daughters. His sons were Anthony, Edward and William.

Sir William died in 1615 and was succeeded by his son, Anthony Hammond, Esq., of St. Albans Court, who married Anne, daughter of Sir Dudley Diggs, of Chilham Castle, Master of the Rolls under King Charles I.

He had four sons and some daughters. His sons were first—William, his successor; second, Dudley; three—Anthony Hammond, of Somersham Place, Member of Parliament and Commissioner of the Navy during the reign of Queen Anne, and known as *Silver Tongued Hammond*. He married Jane, daughter of Sir Walter Claryes, Bart., and had issue, first—Thomas Hammond, Esq., of Somersham Place, who married Elizabeth Adams, and died in 1758. Second—James Hammond, the elegaic poet, M. P. from Truro, born in 1710, died in 1742. Third—Edward Hammond, of the Royal Navy, who died at sea.

William Hammond, Esq., eldest son of Anthony Hammond, Esq., who succeeded him at St. Albans Court, was born in July, 1752; married in December, 1785, Elizabeth, eldest daughter and co-heiress of Osmond Beauvier, D. D., of Canterbury. He was succeeded by his son, William Osmond Hammond, Esq., born in April, 1790; married in July, 1815, Mary Graham, eldest daughter of Sir Henry Oxendon, Bart., of Broome Park, by whom he had three sons and three daughters. He was J. P. and D. L. and High Sheriff in 1846.

William Osmond Hammond, Esq., was succeeded by his eldest son, William Oxendon Hammond, Esq., the present occupant of St. Albans Court.

The Arms were issued to Sir Thomas Hammond in 1548, by Barker, Garter King at Arms, under King Edward VI, and are as follows :

“ Argent, on a chevron sable, between three pellets, each charged with a martlet of the field, as many escallops, or, within a bordure engrailed, vert.

Crest—A hawk's head, collared gules, rays issuing, or. The motto is, “ Pro Rege et Patria.” (For King and Country.)

This Coat of Arms, with the exception of the Crest, is very similar to the arms of the Hammonds of Suffolk and Norfolk, and may be taken to indicate a close family connection with those families.

This is the Coat of Arms used by some of the Hammonds in America, but it is not that to which, if any, many of them can lay any claim whatever by right of descent.

A Coat of Arms and Crest exhibited by an American citizen, descended from Revolutionary ancestry, is at best but a harmless diversion attended with more or less bad taste, but the Arms, if any, to which the families mentioned in the following pages can lay any shadow of a claim are either the very ancient ones described below, or those of some one of the Suffolk families of more recent date.

These ancient Arms are the earliest recorded to the name in the Herald's College.

The shield is Norman, or heart shaped. Argent, a cheve-

ron sable, charged with three escallops, argent ; between three pellets, sable, charged with a martlet, argent, within a bordure engrailed. Gu.

Crest—On a helmet and wreath of three colors, a lions head, erased. Gu.

The motto is "Tentanda Via Est," meaning, *A way must be tried.*

The Arms of Hammond of counties Suffolk and Norfolk, as furnished by H. G. Somerby, Esq., in 1852, are as follows :

"Or, on a cheveron sable, three Cornish claughs, argent.

"Crest—An elephants head, argent, ducally gorged and eared. Or."

Copies and abstracts have been secured of about two hundred early Hammond wills in Suffolk and Norfolk, many of which are extremely interesting, but space has not allowed of the admission of but few of these in this work. Court and other early records of Suffolk have been thoroughly searched for Hammond evidences, which must be excluded for the same reason.

The Parish Registers of Lavenham and surrounding parishes have also had careful attention and the gleanings from a few of these are given below. In most cases these records have been examined for many years after our ancestors had settled on American soil, and some of these are very interesting in showing families and descendants of those who remained in England. The similarity of family names in the few generations after the emigration will also be noticed, particularly so in the family at Great Walsingham, not over two miles south of Lavenham.

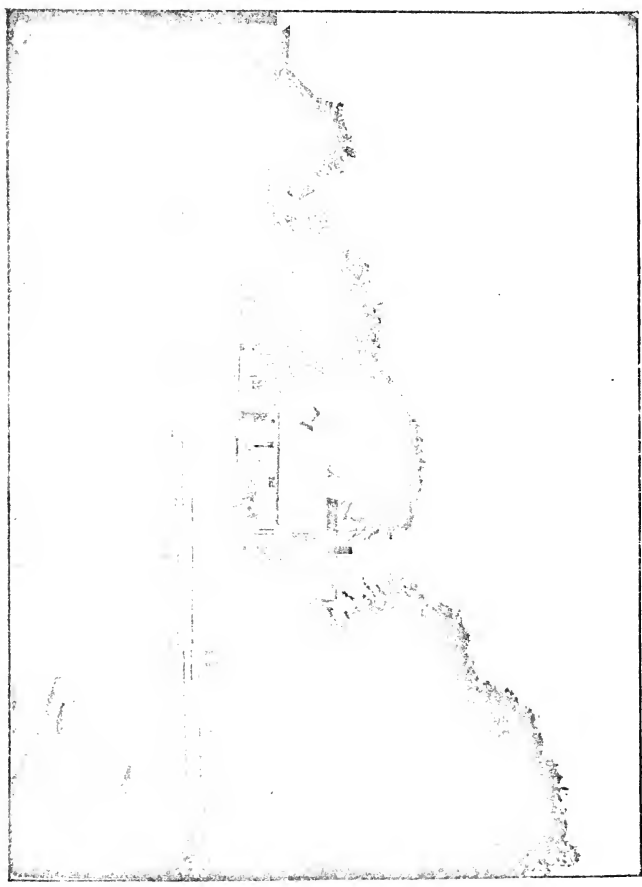

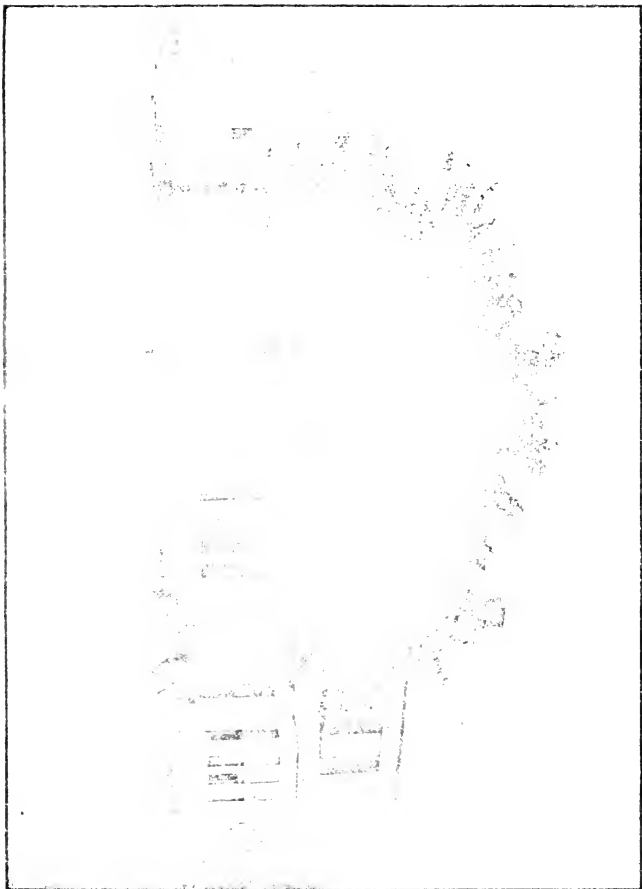



If Peter die said £120 to go to children of my brothers, John and William Hamond.

To Rhoda, daughter of Peter, £100, but if Peter have other children Rhoda to have £50, and the other children £50.

To sister, Sarah, wife of Samuel Jordon, all these lands in Lawshall which I lately bought of John Corder.

To brother, William Hamond, copyholds in Lawshall, of

the Manor of Stanningfield Hall, late Francis Wright's and the sum of 50.

Sister, Anne, £30.

To my brother-in-law, John Hamond, of Melford, £60.

To aforesaid nephew, Philip Hamond, £100, to be paid him in one year after the decease of Alice, the late wife of my deceased Brother, Francis Hamond.

To my two brothers, John and Philip Hamond, all those lands in Lawshall which I late purchased of one Robert Hamond, of Barker's, in Lawshall, for £100, but if said Robert pay to John and Philip the £100, the land to revert to him.

I make said John and Philip my executors.

(I) JOHN HAMMOND, OF MELFORD.

The earliest ancestor with whom it has been possible to connect William Hammond, of Watertown, Mass., and his cousin, Thomas Hammond, of Hingham and Newton, is John Hamonde, of Melford, who was undoubtedly of the Lawshall family of Hammonds, although his parentage cannot be definitely proven. There is little doubt that he was John Hamonde, "the fuller" and cloth manufacturer, who is mentioned in the Melford records and who was named as executor in the will of John Hamond, the elder, of Melford, dated Aug. 4, 1517; proved April 22, 1528. He may have been the son of this John, although he is not mentioned as a son in the will. If this could be proven he could be connected with the family in Lawshall and the record could be carried back to 1400. In any event he was undoubtedly a near relative and

without doubt a descendant of the John Hamond, of Lawshall, whose will was proved Dec. 19, 1440, and who was born before 1400. The will of John Hamond, the elder, is on record at Bury St. Edmunds, (Brydon, Folio 278) and is as follows :

WILL OF JOHN HAMOND.

In the name of God : Amen.

The iijth day of August in ye yeare of our Lorde God MCCCCXVII. I John Hamonde, ye elder, of Melford, in ye diocese of Norwich, hole of mynd & in good remembrance, make my testament and last wyll in the man' of waye followynge. fyrst I bequeathe my soule to Almighty God & to our Ladye Saynt Marye & to all the holye companye of heaven & my body to be buryed wthin ye Saynte Marye, of Melford.

It^m. I bequeathe to ye high aulter for tythes & offerynges forgotyne XII^d.

It^m. I bequeathe to Johanna my wyfe ye howse y^t I dwell in wth all ye purtenance longyng to ye same ; she to have it for her lyffe.

It^m. I wyll yt after ye desayse of ye forsayd Johanna, my wyfe, yt ye sayd house wth ye purtenance be souled and of ye money there of comyng I bequeathe to Johanna, my dowter, £X of ye saile of ye howse ; and all ye residue of ye money more over cominge of ye sayed house wth ye purtenance I wyll it be dysposed in dedes of almone for my soule, & my frendes soules, after ye dysposicion of my executors.

It^m. I bequeathe to Maryone King, my dowter, of ye sayle of ye sayde house £X.

It^m. I bequeathe to Johanna, my dowter, 1 longe huche.

It^m. I wyll yt my buryall sevynt days & XXX days be at ye dysposicion of my Exec.

It^m. I geve & bequeathe to Johne, my wyfe, all stufte of housold wth all ye residue of my goodes & articles moveable and unmoveable not afore bequeathed so yt she see my dettes be payed.

It^m. I ordayne & make myne executors, Johne my wyfe and John Hamond, the fuller.

It^m. I bequeathe to ye sayed John Hamond, my executor, for his labour £IIII.

Proved at Sudbury 22 April, 1528.

WILL OF JOHNE HAMOND.

The will of widow Johne Hamond, of Melford, (Coleman, Folio 19) dated Sept. 22, 1542 ; proved Oct. 16, 1642, names John Hamond, the fuller, and William King, as her attorneys.

There appears to be little else known about him except

the mention of his "house in Melford" in the will of his son, John Hamonde, of Lavenham, which follows.

So far as known he had but the one son, but there appear to have been others of the name in Melford, who may have been his sons.

(II) JOHN HAMMOND, OF LAVENHAM.

John Hamonde, the clothier, of Lavenham, County of Suffolk, England, born about 1500, son of John Hamonde, of Melford, appears to have been the first of the name to live in Lavenham. He undoubtedly settled there in connection with the cloth industry, of which Lavenham was at that time the center. So many of the early families of Watertown and vicinity came from Lavenham and the surrounding country, and as many of them were connected by ties of marriage with the Hammonds, either before the emigration to America or after the settlement here, it is deemed advisable to give a brief sketch of the town and its history in this connection. As seen to-day it is a very interesting old town, with quaint old streets with houses on both sides having overhanging gables. The ancient Market Cross, the curious structure known to-day as the "Old Workhouse," the ancient parish church which has been pronounced the most excellent example of late perpendicular work to be found in all England; all of these, together with the delightful location and naturally picturesque scenery, go to make up a picture not easily equalled in all East Anglia. The beautiful old church stands in a commanding situation, well calculated to show its massive tower at its very best. The great square tower is over 140 feet in height, and looks as if it had never been completed, for the twenty-four coats of arms of Thomas Spring, "the rich clothier of Lavenham," who was one of its builders, reach exactly to the top of the tower, suggesting that a few feet more, at least, were meant to be added. The tradition is

that the architect was killed by falling from this tower when it had reached its present height, and that this was considered a warning from on high to discontinue the work upon it. The principal part of the church, as it stands to-day, was built by the DeVeres, Earls of Oxford, who had a mansion not far away, and a park which took up more than half of the Parish, and by Thomas Spring, between the years 1480 and 1525. The vestry and the east end of the chancel are parts of an earlier church. The interior dimensions of the church are 68x156 feet. The arms of the DeVeres, who bore on their shields a star, are to be seen in many places. Over the south porch are six shields, which represent the connection of the DeVeres with the Howards and other great families. The carving and sculpture are fine and the arms look as fresh as if they were just fashioned by the carver's chisel. The interior carvings and decorations are beautiful, and the church is well considered one of the finest old churches in all England.

Of the ancient town itself, it is well known how the great and wise King Edward III. impressed with the fact that England was sending her wool to Flanders to be made into cloth, induced the Flemings to come to England and settle and thus encouraged the manufacture of cloth at home. Lavenham was one of the towns in which they first settled and it became the center of the cloth trade. The town became rich with giant strides, and the "clothiers," as the cloth manufacturers were called, became proud and opulent, some of their sons and grandsons becoming country gentry, and Lords of the Manor were raised to knighthood, while others took orders in the church or became men of letters. Notable among these were the Springs and Copingers, of Lavenham, both of which families were early represented in New England. John Hammond must have been still a young man at the time of his death, as his children appear to have been quite young and his widow survived him 26 years, but the exact period of his birth cannot be learned.

The dates of birth of his children cannot be found, but

William was probably the eldest son, although there is no positive evidence to prove that he was the eldest child. He is mentioned first in his father's will, and is named with his mother as executor of the will, which would indicate that he was older than his brother, Thomas; but to Thomas is left the house in Melford, while William appears to have received only £5.

The fact that William was named with his father in the deed of trust, given below, would seem to establish the fact of his being the eldest son.

The following abstract of John's will was furnished by Major Henry C. Malden, a brother-in-law of Rev. Canon Thomas Scott, Rector of Lavenham, in 1897, and is dated Dec. 22, 1550:

"I John Hammond, of Lavenham, Clothier, &c."

Item, I give and bequeathe to Agnes my wyff £50.

Item, I give and bequeathe to Will^m Hamond my sonne £5, to be paide hym at the age of 21 yeres.

Item, I give and bequeathe to Elizabeth, Margaret and Johane, my daughters, to every one of them £6. 8s. 4d, to be paide them at the age of 21 yeres.

Item, I give and bequeathe to Thomas Hamond, my sonne my house in Melford, late John Hamonde my fiathers, holdyn by coype of Courte Rolle now of my Lady Mary's grace, to enter at the age of 21 yeres.

Item, I give and bequeathe to my said sonne Thomas £4.

I appoynt my wyfe Agnes and my sonne Will^m executors of this my last Will. Proved at Lambeth, June 5, 1551.

The following is a copy of the deed of trust mentioned above, dated July 25, 1548, in which one William Page of Brandeston, near Lavenham, conveys a copse and meadow to twenty-five trustees for the good of the poor of Lavenham forever.

(III) THOMAS HAMMOND.

Thomas Hammond, of Lavenham, son of John and Agnes (—) Hamonde, was probably born about 1545. The earliest existing records in Lavenham date from about 1560 and no record of his birth can be found. He was evidently an agriculturalist and the possessor of some lands in the parish. He gave up the house left him by his father in Melford and remained in Lavenham, while his brother William appears to have gone to Melford, where he reared a family of eight children, of whom Thomas came to America and settled in Hingham, removing to Cambridge Village (now Newton) a few years later.

The Court Rolls of the Maner of Melford contain a few references to these brothers, among which are the following:

1577. "At a Court Barow, held 19th Elizabeth, Thomas Hamonde surrenders a house and lands in Hall St."

1587. "At a Court Barow, held 29th Elizabeth, J. Cliters and Will^m Hamonde were chosen Supervisors for the following year and took the oaths."

Both the Hammonds and Warrens lived on Hall St., in Melford, and there was considerable intimacy between the families prior to the emigration to America. This intimacy appears to have continued for many years after the emigration. Thomas Hammond married in Lavenham, May 14, 1573, Rose Trippe, whose parentage has not been ascertained. She had a brother, William Trippe, who was a witness to Thomas Hammond's will in 1589. Thomas died November 24, 1589, while still a young man, leaving his widow Rose and a family of small children.

She married again April 30, 1590, Robert Stuard, (Stewart) of Lavenham, and continued in possession of the estate left by Thomas Hammond until 1647 or after. In the Parish Register, of Lavenham, there is recorded the birth of a daughter Anne, but no daughter Susan, while his will mentions his daughter Susann. It is evident that the name should be Susanna, as this name occurs frequently in later generations in America.

Item, I give unto Rose my saide wief, my fielde called Great Lyverdowne wth a convenient waie to the same thurrowe my lane that lieth betwene the land of John Woode the elder and Rob^t Daniell and throughte my fielde called Little Liverdon for her drifte and carriage duringe the terme of her naturall lief. And after the decease of my saide wief I will the said fielde and the said waie for dryvinge and carryinge to remaine unto Will^m Hamonde my sonne his heires and assignes forever.

Item, I give unto Rose my wief, my fielde called Little Lyverdon wth the lane thereunto now leaddinge wth all and singular the app^tnes duringe the terme of her naturall lief, and after her decease I will that the

saide field called Little Liverdon and the said lane shall remayne unto Elizabeth Hammond my daughter, and to the heires of her bodye lawfully begotten, and if the saide Elizabeth shall dep'te owte of this lief before Rose my wief wth our ys-sue of her bodie lawfully begotten, that then I will the saide lane to remayne unto Will^m, my sonne, his heires and assignes forever. But if it fortune the saide Elizabeth my daughter to overlive Rose my said wief, that then I will the said feyld called Little Liverdon and the said lane wth there apptance shall remayne unto the saide Elizabeth her heires and assignes forever.

Item, I give unto Rose my daughter, fortie shillings of lawfull monie of Englande, to be paide unto her at her age of xxjth years.

Item, I give unto Martha Hamonde, my daughter, fortie shillings of lawfull monie of Englande to be paide unto her at her age of xxjth years.

Item, I give unto Marie Hamonde my daughter, fortie shillings of lawfull monie of Englande to be paide unto her at her age of xxjth years.

Item, I give unto Susann Hamonde my daughter, fortie shillings of lawfull monie of Englande to paide unto her at her age of xxjth yeres.

Item, I give unto Margaret Jollye, my sister, a fetther bedd and a Shippe Cheste.

The residue of all my goods, corne, cattells, monie, moveables, plate, household stuff and what-soever my debts beinge payde and this my laste Will and testamente p'formed and fulfilled, I give unto Rose my wief, whom I make and ordayne to be sole Executrix of this my last Will and Testamente.

HAMMOND GENEALOGY.

PART I.

(1) WILLIAM HAMMOND,

OF WATERTOWN, MASS.

William Hammond, the emigrant ancestor of this branch of the family in America, was born in Lavenham, County of Suffolk, England, where he was baptized October 30, 1575. He was the only surviving son of Thomas and Rose (Frippe) Hammond, his younger brother, Thomas, having died in infancy. He was left an orphan by the death of his father in 1589 and very little can be learned about his early life. He married there June 9, 1605, Elizabeth Paine, and their children were all born in Lavenham. It is uncertain just when he came to America, as no record has been found, but there are records in Boston of a William Hammond, as early as 1632, and this may have been the same man. This, however, is very uncertain, as it may have been the William Hammond who settled in Lynn, in 1636, and who is supposed to have been the eldest son of William of Watertown, born in Lavenham in 1607. The first positive records of this William Hammond are to be found in Scituate, Mass., prior to 1636, the name being found there as "Hamans." Deane's History of Scituate, p. 277, says "he soon deceased or removed" from there and it was undoubtedly at about this time (1636) that he became a settler in Watertown, as no record of an earlier

date has been found of him there. He probably located in Watertown at about the same time as did his brothers-in-law, William Paine and Dr. Simon Eire, all of whom seem to have followed their brother-in-law, John Page, who was one of the first settlers. No record of the date of arrival in America of his elder children has been found and it is supposed that they came with him, two or more years prior to the arrival of his wife and younger children, who came in the ship "Francis," from Ipswich, England, in April, 1634. It is possible that he came with his elder children, in company with his brother-in-law, John Page, prior to, or about 1630, but it hardly seems reasonable to suppose that he was here so long before the arrival of his wife and younger children. It is probable that he was in Scituate some time before removing to Watertown. The statement that his daughter, Anne, married Rev. John Lothrop is not proven, and though there is some evidence to show such connection it seems improbable. Dr. Roland Hammond, in his Hammond Genealogy, published in 1894, uses the quotation from Rev. Mr. Lothrop's Journal to establish a connection in his own line, and the family of William Hammond, of Watertown, is supposed to have been connected with his line in some way. In a note on page 9 of his work he says, "Rev. John Lothrop established a church at Scituate Harbor, Mass., and afterwards at Barnstable, Mass. He is said to have married for his second wife, Anne, widow, daughter of William Hammond, of Watertown, Mass., and had Barnabas, Abigail, Bathshua and John. But the evidence that the widow, Anne, was the daughter of William Hammond is far from convincing."

The marriage of William's daughter, Elizabeth, to Samuel House, of Scituate, which must have taken place soon after her arrival in this country, however, establishes a connecting link between Scituate and Watertown. Deane's History of Scituate, p. 289, says, "Samuel House had lands assigned, by the committee for laying out lands, in 1634, south-east of Colman's hill, between the lots of Rev. Mr. Lothrop and Richard Foxwell. He probably was one of Mr. Lothrop's

Church, who came with him from London." The Pastoral Journal of the Rev. John Lothrop, reprinted in the N. E. Hist. Gen. Register (Vol. IX, pp. 279-87; Vol. X, pp. 37-43) contains the following entry: "Elizabeth Hammond, my sister, having a dismissal from the church in Watertown, was joined April 16, 1638," which shows relationship between the families. If Elizabeth was the mother of the elder children of Samuel House she must have been his wife prior to this time, as the records show that he had a daughter Elizabeth baptized in 1636. It seems probable, however, that she was his second wife and not the mother of this child. No record of her marriage has been found and she was a widow at the time of her father's death in 1662, House having died in 1661. It is probable that William Hammond's other children were in Scituate with their married sister a part of the time, at least, as the youngest son, John, is recorded as able to bear arms there in 1643. William Hammond was admitted freeman in Watertown, May 25, 1636, and was grantee of seven lots and purchaser of three lots before 1644. His homestead of 40 acres was situated on the west of Common Street. It was bounded on the east and north by lands of his brother-in-law, Dr. Simon Eire, on the west by John Simson, Isaac Sterne and John Warren, and on the south by Thomas Boyden. Bond's Hist. of Watertown (p. 1088) says, "It is probable that William Hammond settled first on the Cambridge Road, very near the Cambridge line. Whether this was a grant to him the records do not show. He sold it early and settled on his 40-acre homestead, situated east of Pequusset meadow. He also owned three small lots in Pequusset meadow, one of these granted to him and the other two purchased. This homestead passed to his son (grandson) Thomas." March 10, 1642, in the division of lands, he was granted lot No. 76, in the 4th Division, containing 165 acres, and this, with his other holdings, made him one of the largest land owners in the town. The records do not show that he was often an office holder in the town and this may have been due to his independence in religious

matters, which may have made him unpopular with his more puritanical neighbors, although he does not appear to have been so unpopular as some of his most intimate friends. His near neighbor and most intimate friend appears to have been John Warren, who came from the same locality in Suffolk County, England, and between whose family and his own there appears to have been considerable intimacy for several generations prior to the settlement in America. Mr. Warren seems to have had even less regard for the rigid puritanical regulations of the time than his friend, Hammond, and to have become rather more unpopular thereby. In Oct. 1651, Warren was fined 20 shillings "for an offense against the laws concerning baptism," and April 4, 1654, "for neglect of publick worship" 14 Sabbaths at 5 shillings each. March 14, 1658, he was ordered to be "warned for not attending publick worship," but "old Warren was not to be found in town." May 27, 1661, the houses of "old Warren and Goodman Hammond" were ordered to be searched for Quakers, for whom they were known to have considerable sympathy.

Considerable independence in religious matters, great love of liberty and sympathy for all who are persecuted for conscience sake seem to have been inherent family traits for generations past. It is probable that William Hammond and his intimate friend, Warren, were both inclined toward the religious teaching of Roger Williams, but were too conservative to subject themselves to the persecution which his more radical followers were compelled to endure. This view is supported by the fact that many of their descendants were rigid adherents of the Baptist Church. The tendency, however, in this family has been toward great liberty of thought in religious matters and many of the descendants have been connected with the Unitarian and Universalist denominations, while many in the later generations have held membership in no church.

There is not, so far as is known, a clergyman of the name among the descendants of William Hammond, but on the other hand no criminal records have been found. The

research has been very thorough and complete and the freedom from any taint of crime or known immorality must prove very gratifying to the descendants. The standard of intelligence and general education has been very high, but it is to be deeply regretted that there have been so few college men in the family, even where the wealth and position have been such that a college education could have been obtained without any great difficulty. All, so far as known, have been great readers, studious and thoughtful people, honorable, upright and law-abiding, but rather too modest and retiring by nature and not given to pushing forward in public matters. The inventory of the estate of "Mr. Nathaniel Sparrowhawke," of Cambridge, Mass., who died June 27, 1647, mentions among the assets sums owing from "Old Warren" and "Old Hammond," of Watertown. (See N. E. Hist., Gen. Register, Vol. VII).

The will of William Hammond is on file at East Cambridge, Mass., (Middlesex Probate No. 7167), dated July 1, 1662; proved Dec. 16, 1672. He leaves to wife Elizabeth, his whole estate during her life. To son, John, all lands, &c. after her death.

To Thomas Hamond, "sonne of my sonne, Thomas Hamond, deceased," £40 at the age of 21 years. "If said Thomas, or any for him, oppose this will," then he is not to have the £40.

"Unto daughter Barnes, £30, the same to remain unto her children." "In case she again become a widow" she is to have wood from his lands during her widowhood. To four children of my daughter, Elizabeth House, deceased, various sums of money. "To Adam Smith, son of daughter, Sarah, if he behave obediently to my wife after my decease, one mare colt and £20." To daughter, Sarah Smith, £5.

Appoints widow, Elizabeth and John executors.

 40 acres in great dividend,
 160 acres in a farm.

He had given land to his son, Thomas, prior to his death in 1655, and on Dec. 12, 1647, he had given Thomas a letter of attorney to obtain possession of lands in Lavenham, England, which were then possessed by his (William's) mother, Mrs. Rose Stewart. (See Pope's Pioneers of N. E., p. 210.)

His son, William, died in 1636, and it seems improbable that he left heirs as no mention is found of them. William became surety for a debt in England owed by his son at the time of his death. (Letter of Robert Ryece to Gov. Winthrop.)

His wife, Elizabeth, aged 47 years, with children Elizabeth, aged 15, Sarah, aged 10 and John, aged 7 years, embarked at Ipswich, England, in the ship, "Francis," John Cutting, Master, in April, 1634, and joined her husband in New England. She was born in Nowton Parish, near Bury St. Edmunds, County of Suffolk, England, in 1587, and was the daughter of William Paine.* Anthony Paine, living in Nowton Parish, had a son, William, bapt. Dec. 2, 1565. William Paine had five children baptized in Nowton Parish, all of whom came to America, and were for a time at least residents of Watertown, viz. Phebe, Elizabeth, Dorothy, William and Robert. Her brother, William Paine, came to America in 1635, and settled in Watertown, where he was

one of the largest proprietors in 1636-7, but he soon removed to Ipswich and settled there with his brother, Robert. He was a merchant and large landowner, a public-spirited man and very popular in the affairs of the Colony. About 1652 he removed to Boston where he died in 1660. In his will he left the sum of £5 to each of the children of his sister, Elizabeth Hammond. Her sister, Dorothy Paine, married Dr. Simon Eire, who was one of the early settlers in Watertown, where he took a very prominent part in the affairs of the town until his removal to Boston about 1645. She was the mother of all of his children except two by his second wife, Martha, whom he married in Boston after the death of wife Dorothy. Phebe Paine married John Page, who came to America from Dedham, County of Essex, England, in 1630. He was one of the first settlers in Watertown and was the first Constable, having been appointed by the Court in Sept., 1630. He died in Watertown Dec. 18, 1676, aged about 90 years. She died Sept. 25, 1677, aged 87 years.

In a suit in 1652, Hammond *vs.* Bridge, it appears that Thomas Hammond had an uncle, Page. In testimony in Court in 1678 concerning the estate of John Page, Lieut. John Hammond is a witness when Page is called his uncle. (See Bond's Hist. of Watertown, pp. 270, 865.) The evidence given above, and other similar evidence, proves conclusively the parentage of Elizabeth (Paine) Hammond and were it not for such existing evidence the proof of her parentage would have been impossible as there was another Elizabeth Paine who was of almost exactly the same age and who was born in Lavenham. This family was as follows: Joane Paine, a widow, died in Lavenham in 1594. She had sons, Thomas and William. William Paine m. in 1584 Agnes Lyle, having children Elizabeth, bapt. 1586; Judith, bapt. 1589; Susan, bapt. 1592; Richard and William, bapt. 1597, and Francis, bapt. 1600; d. infant. It will be observed that this Elizabeth had also a brother, William, who might have been the William of Watertown and Ipswich and were it not for the known connection with the family of John Page it might

have been impossible to identify her. The ancestry of Mrs. Elizabeth (Paine) Hammond will be found very fully set forth in "Paine Family of Ipswich, Mass.," by Albert W. Paine, of Bangor, Me. She died in Watertown, Mass., Sept. 14, 1670, "aged about 90" the record says, but really at the age of 83 years.

An explanation of the connection between the families of William Hammond and Timothy Hawkins has been found. That the relationship was close there seemed to be little doubt. Timothy Hawkins was a proprietor in Watertown in 1636-7, and died in 1651. His widow, Hannah, adm. his estate and m. 2d Ellis Barron, Sr. She must have been the daughter "Anne Barnes" mentioned in the will of William Hammond, as the name Barron was often written "Barnes" and Anne was often written for Hannah. Her children were Hannah, Timothy and Mehitable. After the death of Timothy Hawkins his son, Timothy, chose Thomas Hammond as his guardian and his daughter, Mehitable, chose John Hammond. This connection seems so well established that it has been adopted in this work, leaving to future geneologists the problem of establishing the connection with Rev. John Lothrop.

There is some evidence to show that the family of William Hammond had lived in Dedham, Essex, England, for a period at least, before their emigration to America. The evidence in the suit of Edmund Shearman, of Dedham, Essex, against Thomas Hammond, in April, 1648 (see Bond's Watertown, p. 778), and the subsequent proceedings, in which "Bazal" Angier and Nath. Baxter are witnesses, and also the marriage of John Hammond to Abigail Salter, of Dedham (see will of Elizabeth Salter, in which Bazaleel Angier is named as a witness in 1660), all show a connection with that town in England. It is possible that William removed there from Lavenham some years prior to the emigration to America.

He d. in Watertown, Mass., Oct. 8, 1662, and his widow, Elizabeth, d. Sept. 14, 1670.

(II) WILLIAM HAMMOND, (William¹) bapt. Sept. 20, 1607. Supposed to have m. Elizabeth —, and to have d. in Lynn, Mass., in 1637. Land was granted to the widow, Elizabeth Hammond, in Lynn in 1638. There were, no doubt, several children, but no records exist. Elizabeth was granted 60 acres of land and this would indicate quite a family of children. There were Hammonds in Lynn a few years later. A William Hammond appears there in 1662 as witness in an action for debt. Joseph Fiske married there Elizabeth Hammond, and he, with William Hammond, was admitted inhabitant in Rehoboth, Mass., in 1687. Probably nearly all of the Rhode Island Hammonds are descendants of this family.

Further evidence of the connection with the Hammonds of Watertown, exists in the entries of births of William Hammond's children, born at Rehoboth, on page 23, of the Watertown records. This William of Rehoboth, may have been a grandson of William Hammond, of Watertown.

(II) ANNE HAMMOND, (William¹) bapt. Lavenham, Eng., July 14, 1616; d. Watertown, Mass., Sept. 1, 1685; m. 1st., — Timothy Hawkins, who was a proprietor in Watertown in 1636-7. He d. about 1650 or '51, and she married (2) Ellis Barron, another early settler. She was his second wife and had no children by the second marriage.

Timothy Hawkins was a grantee of seven lots in Watertown. His homestead of 10 acres was bounded on the east by Common Street, west by William Hammond, north by the highway and south by John Lawrence. In his will he left the sum of £40 to his widow, who is called "Hannah," £40 to his *eldest* son Timothy, £20 each to his two daughters and the balance of his estate for the education of his youngest daughter. So far as is now known he had but one son and two daughters. Her second husband Ellis Barron was admitted freeman in Watertown, June 2, 1641. He was Constable in 1658 and Selectman in 1668 and 1673. By his first wife, Grace, he had seven or eight children. His eldest son, Ellis Barron, Jr., had been married to her eldest daughter, Hannah or Anna Hawkins, some years before the union of their surviving parents. He died in December, 1676.

There is no doubt whatever that she was the daughter Anne "Barnes," mentioned in the will of William Hammond, as Barnes was frequently written for Barron and her daughter appears to have been known both as Anna and Hannah. Her will, dated Aug. 18, 1683, proved Oct. 6, 1685, mentions son Timothy Hawkins, daughter Hannah Barron's children; Mary, daughter of Timothy Hawkins, and grandchildren Benjamin and Benoni Garfield.

(II) THOMAS HAMMOND, (William^d) bapt. Lavenham, Eng., Sept. 17, 1618; d. Watertown, Mass., Dec. 10, 1655; m. about 1654, Hannah Cross, b. Ipswich, Mass., April, 1636; (bapt. in Hampton, Oct. 9, 1638), d. Mar. 24, 1656-7, dau. of John and Hannah (—) Cross.

John Cross, aged 50, and wife, Hannah, aged 38, embarked at Ipswich, Eng., for New England in April, 1634. He

settled in Ipswich, Mass., where he appears to have taken a very active part in the affairs of the town. He probably was in Hampton two or three years before locating permanently in Ipswich, as his only child was baptized there. He was admitted freeman in Ipswich, in 1639; was Representative in 1640. (See Bond's Watertown, p. 189.)

In December, 1660, he placed a lien for the payment of "ten shillings yearly toward a free school" on his farm near the Rowley line, and in his will made about the same time he bequeathed the same to his daughter, Hannah, with other property and the sum of £100, to be paid her after the decease of his wife, to which bequest he added the proviso: "But in case my said daughter doth depart this life without issue leaving behind her, then my will is to give the said hundred pounds to the town of Ipswich, to remain toward the maintenance of a free school forever. The which is to be ordered and disposed of by the Church of Ipswich for the said work." This contingency, however, did not occur as his daughter left one only child, Thomas Hammond, who afterwards entered into possession of the estate as sole heir of his mother. (See Hammatt Papers, p. 67, and also Ipswich Antiquarian Papers, by Cadwell and Dow.)

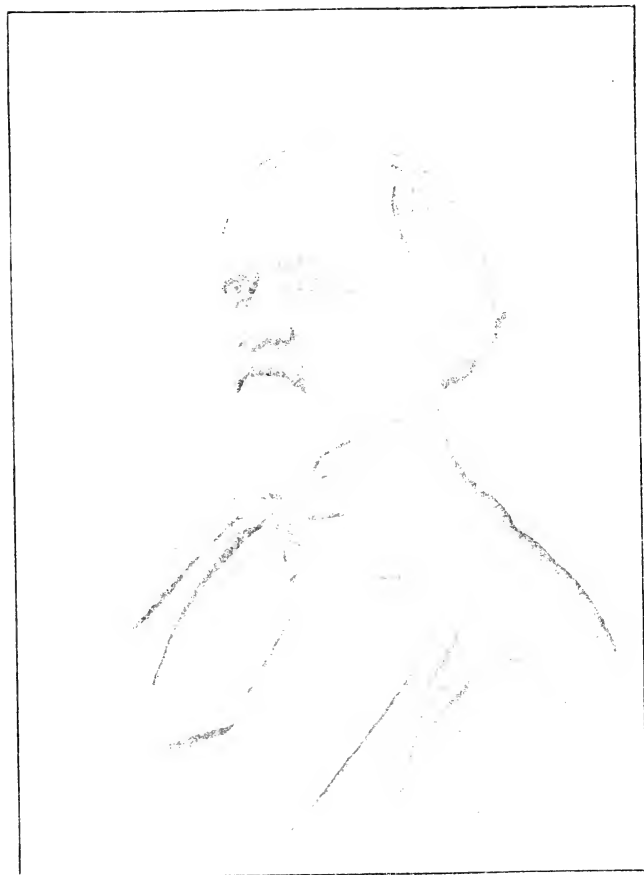
"At a meeting among ye Selectmen of Ipswich, held 21 : 2 : 1705-6, Whereas Mr. Thomas Hammond, of this town is come to reside upon ye farme, yt his late grandfather, John Cross, gave to his daughter, ye sd Hammond's mother, s^d Hammond being y^e only surviving heir y^t we know of to P (possess) land and other lands of his late father Hammond dyed seized of." (See Ipswich Town Records.) John Cross died in Ipswich in 1662, and his widow in Watertown in 1669.

Thomas Hammond seems to have been an active, enterprising man during his short career. In the Court files of April 14, 1648, is found a paper of which the following is an abstract: "I Edmund Shearman, of Dedham, Clothier; do adventure by sea, two broadcloths, by Thomas Hammond, of New England, planter. Signed Thomas Hammond; Edmund

Shearman." By this it would appear that Thomas had visited England in 1648 and brought over with him some cloth for sale in the Colony. There appears to have never been any settlement for the same prior to the death of Thomas, which occurred a few years later, for April 8, 1660, Edmund Shearman and Henry Wright, of Dedham, County of Essex, give a power of Attorney to Rev. John Sherman, and in 1663 he brought suit against the estate for the recovery of the price of the same. This power of attorney is witnessed by "Bazal" Angier and Nath. Backster. There appears to have been some controversy over the will of Thomas Hammond, as on June 21, 1659 "William Waynes and John Parker, indifferent persons, were appointed by the Court to determine the controversies among the heirs of Thomas Hammond." (See Bond's Watertown, pp. 778-9.) How these controversies could have arisen under the will which follows is not now known. There was but one heir, his widow being dead, and that heir a minor child and the controversy must have arisen over the guardianship of his son and the custody of his property during his minority. April 4, 1654, his nephew, Timothy Hawkins, Jr., chose him as his guardian.

His widow, Hannah (Cross) Hammond, survived him but a little over a year. She died March 24, 1657. She made her will March 19, 1657, five days prior to her decease, probably then knowing that her end was near and wishing to make every arrangement possible for her infant son, who was so soon to be doubly orphaned.

In this will she gave to her mother one-half of the rent of the Cross farm in Ipswich. To John Sherman and each of his children £5; to John Livermore £4. 12; the remainder of her estate to her mother and John Sherman, in trust for her son, who was committed to their care. The inventory of Thomas Hammond's estate by Edward Garfield, John Coolidge, Joseph Tainter and Anthony White, dated Dec. 22, 1655. House, barn and upland bought of John Stowers, £120. Cross farm in Ipswich, with seven cows and two oxen, £200. Housing and land in England, at Lavenham, renting at £14

per year, £120. Elizabeth Barrett, debt to be paid in two years, £25; and also some personal estate. In his will which follows he makes John Sherman one of his executors. This must have been Capt. John Sherman as Rev. John Sherman appears to have been the attorney in the suit before mentioned, against his estate.

WILL OF THOMAS HAMMOND,

OF WATERTOWN, MASS. NOV. 21, 1655.

1. Thomas Hamond being att present of sound memory; though sick in body; doe dispose of my outward estate as followeth:

Fy: I will and bequeath to my beloved wife Hannah Hamond the fearme in Ipswich bounds known by the name of Crosses fearme with all the stock be on it; as I had it with her; my meaning is the sd fearme housint lands with all appurtinances and dairy together with the stock; my wife Hannnah should have and enjoy to hur and hur heires to their owne proper use.

2ly. My houseint & land in Watertown wheare I now live with all my land in Watertown my will is my wife shall enjoy it the time of hur widowhod; my meaning is, my house I now dwell in and all the upland & meadow bought of John Stowers in Watertown my wife shall have the use of duerint hur widowhod.

3. All the househould stuff that my wife brought with hur my will she should have it all again to hur self.

4. In case my wife be now with child then my will is that child shall have the foresaid house and land in Watertown; if it be a sonn at the age of twenty one yeares; if it be a daughter then abt the day of marriage; or abt eighteen yeares of age; wher com first; allso my will is that the foresaid child be it sonn or daughter should have the bed I now lay upon with all the furniture about it, too chayers and fouer stooles, one payer of cob irons, with brass bosses upon them, to read (————) too (—) ones & too great pewter platers, also my will is that the estate of land that I have in England, in Lavenham, in Suffolk, my wife shall enjoy duerint hur widowhod.

Also I give to my wife my bay marce. Also I give to my wife too coves; my three sheep to the child, my wife is withall, and six coves and my hors and my two oxen & a heffer of one yeare & (——) to the child my wife is now withall. Also my will is my wife shall have tenn pounds per annum out of my land in Watertown duerint hur life & the remainder for bringing up the child to age. Also my will is the houseint and land, catell and househould stuff given to my child my will is in case my wife be not with child or it be still borne or dy befor the time expressed for receivit it; then the sd estate to be equally divided between my brothers and sisters children. Also my will is that my land in England given to my wife befor daerient hur widowhod shall afterward go to the foresd child if said child be not

borne or live not to age of twenty one years then my will is my brother (John Hammond) shall have it to him & his heires.

(Also my will is) my estate not expressed (be sold by my) executors for the discharge of my debtes in New England and in case the estate of mouvable goods (——) or debts due to me not in this my will shall not be sufficient to discharge all my sd. debts then my will is my Executors shall take of the cattell the oxen or coves for the discharge tharof at the discretion of my executor and the debts to be discharge in the first place. Also I make apoynt and fully authorize my beloved wife, John Livermore & John Sherman executors of this my will firm'd by my hand & seall this twenty one of November in sixteen hundred fifty and five.

(II) ELIZABETH HAMMOND, (William¹) b. Lavenham, Eng., 1619 ; d. —; m. about 1636, Samuel House, of Scituate, Mass.

He had lands assigned to him by the committee for laying out lands in 1634, southeast of Colman's hills, between the lots of Rev. Mr. Lothrop and Richard Foxwell. He probably was one of Rev. Mr. Lothrop's church, who came with him from London in that year. He died in Scituate in 1661. His son, Samuel, and daughter, Elizabeth, administered the estate. His wife was admitted to the church in Scituate in 1638, on her dismission from the church in Watertown. (See Pastoral Journal of Rev. John Lothrop, in N. E. Hist. and Gen. Register, Vol. IX, pp. 279-87; Vol. X, pp. 37-43.

(II) SARAH HAMMOND, (William¹) b. Lavenham, Eng., Oct. 21, 1623; d. —; m. — Smith.

Very little has been learned about her except that she did not live happily with her husband, and separated from him. In Mass. Archives is found a letter from her uncle, Wm. Paine, to Gov. Shirley, in which he asks to be notified when the Governor is to hear the case as he wished to be present.

(II) LIEUT. JOHN HAMMOND, (William¹) b. Lavenham, England, about 1624; bapt. July 2, 1626. His age was given as 7 years at the time he came to America with his mother, which practically agrees with the latter date, but his tombstone gives his age at his death in 1709 as 85 years and 4 months, which places his birth in July, 1624.

He m. (1) about 1652, Abigail Salter, b. at Rattlesden, Co. Suffolk, England, (bapt.) Nov. 9, 1623, daughter of George and Elizabeth (Munning) Salter, who were married at Rattlesden, Oct. 29, 1617. She d. about 1663, and he m. (2) in 1664, Sarah Nichols, of Charlestown, Mass., who d. Jan. 14, 1688, aged 45 years.

He m. (3) in 1689, widow Prudence (Wade) Cotton, dau. of Jonathan Wade, of Ipswich, Mass., and widow of Rev. Seaborn Cotton, of Hampton. He was her third husband as she married (1) Dec. 28, 1659, Dr. Anthony Crosby, of Rowley, Mass., son of widow, Constance Crosby, by whom she had children who survived her and inherited her property. Lieut. John's first wife, Abigail Salter, was a sister of Theophilus Salter, an early resident of Ipswich, Mass. She also had a

sister, Hannah Salter, who married Nicholas Phillips, of Boston, Jan. 4, 1652. Her mother, Elizabeth (Munning) Salter, whose will is given below, was the daughter of Rev. Humphrey Munning, Rector of Brettenham, Co. Suffolk, England, and Elizabeth Winthrop, his wife. Elizabeth Winthrop, who married Rev. Humphrey Munning, was a niece of Adam Winthrop, of Groton, whose diary records the marriage of George Salter and Elizabeth Munning.

WILL OF ELIZABETH SALTER,
COUNTIES OF LOND., ESSEX AND HERTS.

Book 1662-4, Fol. 136.

"The first day of Decr., 1660.

Elizabeth Salter, of Dedham, Co. Essex; widow, aged and weakly. To Thomas Salter, my sonne, £10, and £30 more to be divided between his child^{en}, John, Elizabeth and Hannah, by his first wife, when 21 years of age. Said first wife was Phillippa Rouse. To Theophilus Salter, my sonne, £5 Unto Abigail Hammond, my daughter, of New England, £10. If she die before said sum be due said money to be paid to her children when they are 21 years of age. Unto my daughter Hannah Phillips, of New England, £5, besides £5 that she have of mine already. If she be dead said sum to her children when 21. Unto Robert Astlye, pastor of ye church in Stradford, 20^s. I give 20^s to bee paid into ye hands of ye Deacon, or his hands that supply ye place of Deacon in that church. Lastly I bequeathe unto Samuel Salter, my sonne, the residue of my goods, whom I make and ordayne to be my sole executor. Sealed, &c., in the presence of us, Bazaleel Angier and Stephen How, the Eler. Probatum fuit apud Cole^r 15 die mensis June, 1662. Juranto Exor, &c."

Little can now be learned about his military career as so few records exist prior to 1700.

His tombstone in the old burying ground at Watertown, Mass., contains the following inscription:

"Memento Mori Fugit Hora."

"Here lyes ye body of Lieutenant, John Hammond, aged 85 years & 4 m^o. Who dec'd Nov^{mbr} 22nd, 1709."

"Blessed are the dead that die in ye Lord."

The tomb-stone of his widow bears the inscription:

"Mrs. Prudence Hammond, wife of Lieut. John Hammond, Died Sep^{mbr} 1st, 1711, in ye 74th year of her age."

He was a soldier in King Philip's war in 1675 and 1676, in the garrison at Wrentham. (Soldiers in King Philip's War, pp, 366-7.)

In 1665 he was appointed guardian of his kinswoman, Mehitable Hawkins, dau. of Timothy and Hannah Hawkins. He was selectman in Watertown, in 1664, 1670, 1692, 1698 and 1701. In 1690 his assessment was the largest in Watertown.

His will, (Middlesex Probate, No. 7151) dated Nov. 18, 1709, proved Dec. 9, 1709, mentions wife Prudence, son John, daughters Elizabeth Mason, Abigail Hastings, Hannah Poulter and Hepzibah Shattuck, and also sons-in-law John Mason, John Hastings, John Poulter and William Shattuck.

His inventory, dated Nov. 29, 1709, amounted to £961-8. Through an error the account of the settlement of his estate Jan. 26, 1712-13, is filed at East Cambridge with the papers relating to the estate of John Hammond, of Newton, (No. 7152) who died in 1762. Account of John Hammond, John Mason and John Hastings, executors of will of Lt. John Hammond, Jan. 26, 1712-13.

There is a long list of sums paid. Among those named are the following relatives: Henry Phillips, of Charlestown; Experience Page, ——— Smith, of Roxbury, Timothy Barron, of Watertown; Hopetil Mead, of Cambridge; Joseph and Samuel Hastings, of Watertown, and others who may have been connected by marriage or otherwise.

There is also an account of legacies paid to Sergeant Chadwick, Justice Bond and Sarah Barnard.

"Deceased's funeral charges £38-12-11."

"Lampson, for gravestones for dec'd and his widow, 13^s-0."

"For maintaining widow £10."

For wearing apparel £40-0-0.

Total payments £188-3-7.

Real estate to son John, £773-4-5.

He was left an orphan when but a few months of age. His grandfather, William Hammond, died when he was but four years of age and his grandmother, Cross, surviving but a few years, it is probable that his uncle, Lieut. John Hammond, of Watertown, took charge of his bringing up and education. He appears to have been much better educated than the average man of his time. He was a fine penman as is shown by specimens of his handwriting which are still in existence. It seems that he had some military training in his younger days, probably owing to the influence of his uncle, Lieut. John, and he is credited with service in King Philip's war, in the Companies of Capt. Joseph Syll, in 1675, and Capt. Joseph Cutter, in 1676. It is probable that he took an active part in the military affairs later in life as he is mentioned as "Lieut." in the records at Ipswich. Growing up as he did without parental restraint he early learned self-reliance and became one of the most active, enterprising men of the locality in which he lived. The following account found on page 143, of the Essex County Geneological Register, shows the characteristics of the man:

"Thomas Hammond if living now would be one of our liberal men. Paul Jewett, who was contemporary with him, reports him through his son Dea. Joshua Jewett, that Hammaond had no particular reverence for Sunday, parson or church; that he was a hustler in business and paid little regard to time or place albeit he might coin an honest dollar. He was in too early; the stiff orthodoxy of his day condemned him, and the 'faithful' said the Devil held him. It became the whispered secret that 'Tom Hammond had

sold himself to the Devil.' Time passed, 'Tom' kept business in a whirl and made money. He owed several of his townsmen, as would be natural with a man who drove his business. Gossip was rife and 'Tom' resolved to test it—in modern phrase he suspended. Then calling in his creditors, who were also his accusers, he said: 'Gentlemen, there are two piles of money; the larger pile is ample to pay you all, but I got it through Satanic influence, and you must take the responsibility of its spell upon you. The other pile will pay you only a small dividend, but it is free. I boarded it before I made a league with the Devil. Take which you will and sign a release.' They took the smaller pile. Few people now-a-days play a shrewder game."

Thomas Hammond and his wife rest in the Rowley Cemetery, on the left near the entrance. Their headstones are beautifully engraved in the fashion of that time, and read as follows:

HERE LIES YE BODY OF
MR. THOMAS HAMMOND,
DECEASED FEBRUARY YE [*]6, 1724,
IN YE 69TH YEAR OF HIS AGE.

HERE LYETH BURIED YE BODY OF
MRS. SARAH HAMMOND,
WIFE OF
MR. THOMAS HAMMOND,
WHO DIED JANUARY YE 16, 1712-13,
AGED 57 YEARS.

He appears to have lived in Ipswich on the old Cross farm, after his second marriage, until about 1690 when he removed to Watertown, where he had considerable property interests. He was admitted freeman April 18, 1690, and continued to reside there until about 1706, when he returned to Ipswich and spent the remaining years of his life on the old farm situated near the west end of Muzzey hill, adjoining the town of Rowley. He was a large owner of real estate as is shown by the Essex Registry of Deeds. The following abstracts serve to show the relationship between the parties and prove conclusively that Thomas married a third wife and had two daughters by her, although this marriage is not mentioned in any of the works now in print.

June 11, 1713, he conveyed the old Cross farm to his sons, David and Nathaniel Hammond, "in consideration of parental

love." The farm is described as follows: "Bounded on ye cart way which lyeth next ye line yt parts Ipswich and Rowley, and on ye N. W. side by Bradstreet farm, so-called, containing 100 acres, subject to a yearly lien which John Cross, the former owner, put upon said farm for the support of ye Grammar school." The deed is witnessed by Nehemiah Jewett, Philip Nelson and Elizabeth (her X mark) Bug. (Essex Registry 25; 243.)

Nov. 7, 1717, he conveyed "for love and affection to my son-in-law, Ephraim Jewett—thatch lot on Rogers island in Ipswich and new up-land lot at Jeffries." His wife, Hannah, relinquished her right of dower in the same. (Essex Registry 32; 203.)

May 23, 1724, Thomas Hammond "in consideration of parental love which I bear my son, Thomas Hammond of Watertown," conveyed to him a salt marsh in Ipswich with the proviso that, "should I die before my now present wife my said son, Thomas, shall pay to my said wife the sum of £40, provided she doth acquit rights of dower, or power of thirds in all of my estate according to Covenant, and not else." Thomas was also required to pay his brothers, David and Nathaniel Hammond, £5 each. Proved in Court April 13, 1725, by witnesses Nathaniel Knowlton and Thomas Manning, to have been the deed of Thomas Hammond, late of Ipswich, deceased. (Essex Registry 44; 158.)

March 28, 1724, he conveyed "to my daughter Elizabeth Jewett, the now wife of Ephraim Jewett, in consideration of parental love," &c., lands in Ipswich and Rowley. (Essex Registry 44; 162.)

By a deed proved in Court April 13, 1725, "in consideration of parental love," &c., he conveyed lands to his two daughters, Hannah and Mary Hammond, minors, of Ipswich; "my daughter, Hannah, must pay to my daughter, Sarah Lambert, £10, and my daughter, Mary, shall pay to my daughter, Elizabeth Jewett, £10." (Essex Registry 45; 29.)

His daughter, Hannah, afterwards married Lieut. Nathaniel Bradstreet, and the lands then deeded to her have since

remained in possession of her descendants and are now owned (1897) and occupied by John Francis Bradstreet, who has in his possession the original deed given by Thomas Hammond in 1724. This deed is a finely executed document, written in a bold old English hand, and has a fine signature showing him to have been a good penman at that advanced age, a characteristic of the family for many generations.

Thomas Hammond was selectman in Watertown in 1694 and 1696. He was witness of the will of John Bond in Watertown, Feb. 26, 1690.

He studied law and was admitted to the bar, settled at St. Charles in 1842, removed from there to Chicago in 1852. He was a member of the 35th, 36th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st, and 42d Congress. He raised the Eighth Regiment Illinois Cavalry in 1861, and was its Colonel. Promoted Brigadier General Nov. 29, 1862. He was actively engaged during nearly all of the time until about the close of the campaign in 1862 when he received severe injuries that disabled him from active service in the field and in 1863 he resigned his commission. In the winter of 1863 he raised the Seventeenth Illinois Cavalry, which did valiant service in the field. He was an able and forcible speaker in Congress, and a ready debater. After his retirement from Congress he again engaged in the practice of his profession.

(IX) GEN. ELON JOHN FARNSWORTH, b. Green Oak, Mich., July 30, 1837 ; killed at the battle of Gettysburg, July 3, 1863 ; unm. In 1857 he joined the expedition against the Mormons in Utah. In the spring of 1859, he was in the detachment sent from Camp Floyd, Utah, to the Mountain Meadows. In 1861 he returned home and joined the Eighth Ills. Cav., then being organized by his uncle, John F. Farnsworth, and was appointed Asst. Quartermaster. He was soon promoted to Captain of Co. K. and served in the Peninsular Campaign in Va. In 1863 he was acting Lieut. Col. and Quartermaster of the Fourth Army Corps, under Gen. Pleasanton. In May, 1863, he was on Gen. Pleasanton's Staff. June 29, 1863, he was commissioned Brig. Gen. of Cavalry. He was assigned to the command of a brigade in Gen. Kilpatrick's cavalry division, comprising the 1st Vt., 1st W. Va., 5th N. Y. and 18th Penn. Regts. While leading a fierce charge on the bloody field of Gettysburg, he fell pierced by five mortal wounds.

To children of my son, Samuel, deceased, £133, 6^s, 8^d, to be divided as follows: to his two sons £46, 13^s, 4^d, each at

age of 21 years; to his two daughters £20 each at age of 21 years.

To my son, Thomas Hammond, £80.

To daughter, Mary Lawrence, £90, 13^s, 4^d.

To son, Jonathan Hammond, £154, 13^s, 4^d.

To daughters, Sarah Cutting, Grace Stearns and Hannah Parks, £80 each.

Wearing apparel to be equally divided between sons, Thomas and Jonathan.

To daughters, Sarah Cutting, Grace Stearns, Mary Lawrence and Hannah Parks, each one-eleventh of remainder of estate after all charges are paid.

To children of son, Samuel, one-eleventh of remainder.

Son, Jonathan, sole Exec. The will is witnessed by Jonas Hastings, Jonas Stuart and Jonas Dix.

Thomas Hammond, jun 

Non-cupative codicil added Oct. 17, 1762, made 5 days before his death, witnessed by Jonas Stuart and Hannah Jones, gives of moneys in the house and due to him: To son, Jonathan, £100, "old tenor," the rest equally to children except that Thomas is to have a double share.

To son, Jonathan, best saddle, bridle and gun.

To Thomas, silver buckles and spurs.

To Hannah the "pillyarn;" to Mary the "panel."

March 13, 1763, the heirs chose Samuel Livermore, Jonas Dix and Nathaniel Livermore, to divide the real estate. The paper is signed by John Lawrence, Isaac Cutting and Jonathan Hammond.

The inventory of the estate by Lemuel Livermore, William Coolidge and Jonas Dix, shows a large amount of household goods, cattle, horses, swine, etc. Among the items is seventeen barrels of cider.

Among the books of deceased are named "Great Bible,"

"Mr. Allen, upon Conversion," "Mr. Russell, upon the Unpardonable Sin," etc.

In the Executors account, dated June 29, 1764, are named son, Thomas Hammond, John and Mary Lawrence, Isaac and Sarah Cutting, Nathaniel and Grace Stearns, John and Hannah Parks, David Bemis, guardian of Samuel Hammond's children, Phinehas Warren and others. The division of real estate, dated, June 1, 1765, by Sam'l Livermore, Jonas Dix, Nath'l Livermore, Jonathan Sanderson and Thomas Wellington, gives a good description of the bounds of several tracts of land of which he died possessed, including the homestead on the "way" leading to "Capefare, so called."

He was certainly a very well-to-do man for the time in which he lived.

Piper and Abner Sanderson May 15, 1802, Jacob Hammond, of Cambridge, applied to the Court for the appointment of Jonathan Coolidge as Adm. on his father's estate. He was appointed administrator with the will annexed. Bond signed by Jacob Hammond, Jonathan Coolidge and Jonathan Hammond, and witnessed by Abner Sanderson and James Winthrop.

Inventory, May 25, 1802, by Abner Sanderson, Jonathan Hammond and David Stearns shows personal estate \$1,303.92, real estate \$5,600.00. Total \$6,903.92. Inventory of real estate shows homestead consisting of dwelling house, barns and about 120 acres of land, bounded N. by lands of William Brown, Joel Dix and Jeduthan Wellington, E. by Wellington and a "town way," S. and W. by "town way" and land of Christopher Gore, \$4,400.00. The "Mixer field," so-called, 5 acres, N. by "town way," E. by Est. of William Clark, W. by Jonathan Coolidge, \$300.00. "East Parkhurst" tract, 7 acres, "West Parkhurst" tract, 7 acres, each, \$420.00. "Peach Orchard," 1 acre, \$60.00.

Lands were set off to the widow, Mary Hammond, by the appraisers, and the results were concurred in by Jacob Hammond and Mary Hammond, June 8, 1802. Guardianship of Polly (Mary) and Sally Hammond, over 14 years of age, to Jonathan Coolidge, May 4, 1804, at which time the estate was still unsettled.

The following from a newspaper clipping of 1860, is a fair sketch of his life:

"In Neponset, Sept. 2, Dea. William Hammond, 67. Dea. H. was born in Waltham. In his youth he removed to Boston where he attended the ministry of Rev. Dr. Sharpe. It was there that he was aroused to a sense of his condition as a sinner, and by grace enabled him to receive the Saviour as his own. Soon after this he came to Dorchester and united with the Second Congregational Church, (Dr. Codman's.) Sometime after the organization of the Baptist Church in Neponset Village, he united with it, having been baptized by Rev. Bradley Miner, who was then pastor. He has ever since been a most faithful and constant member of the church, possessing the esteem and confidence not only of christians, but of all with whom he associated, or with whom he had dealings. He was a man of eminent prudence and integrity, true humility, and sincerity, seeming to be just what he was and being just what he seemed to be, 'a good man and just.' For several years he has served the church faithfully in the office of Deacon. He leaves a companion, three children, one grandchild and an aged mother. His family, the church and the community in which he lived, have sustained a loss which will long be felt and mourned."

When a young man he learned the carriage and harness makers trade, which were as one in those days. About 1817 he moved to Dorchester, Mass., where in that part of the town known as Neponset, he established a carriage and harness manufactory in company with his brother, William, and continued at this location for about 30 years. Among his many patrons and friends was Daniel Webster, who made frequent stops while driving from Boston to his home in Marshfield. Oct. 11, 1820, he was married to Mary Ann Clapp, of Dorchester, who was a descendant of Capt. Roger, and also of Nicholas Clapp, the early settlers of Dorchester. On the same day her sister, Hannah, was married to John Tolman, the double wedding being quite an event in Dorchester, all the parties being well known and popular. After residing in Dorchester about 30 years they removed to Woburn, following their eldest son, Joseph, who had located there. They located on Auburn St., where they spent the remainder of their days.

Jonathan Hammond was a man who commanded universal respect; a typical gentleman of the old school; moderate in his movements, of exemplary habits; honest, straight-forward, conscientious, careful of his language, temperate in all things. He died at the ripe old age of 86 years and 7 months, leaving a stainless and honorable name.

The following account of the celebration of the golden wedding of this worthy couple is copied from the "Middlesex County Journal," (Woburn) issue of Oct. 15, 1870:

GOLDEN WEDDING.

"A very interesting occurrence transpired on Tuesday evening last at the residence of Mr. Jonathan Hammond. This being the fiftieth anniversary of the wedding of Mr. Hammond and wife, their friends to the number of thirty assembled to celebrate the golden wedding of the venerable pair. They were married at Dorchester, by the late Rev. John Codman, D. D., and among the guests were several from Dorchester, where Mr. Hammond's family resided. Among these was Mrs. Tolman, a sister of Mrs. Hammond's, who was married the same evening. Remarks were made by Rev. J. H. Means and Rev. Mr. Clapp, of Dorchester, and prayer offered by Rev. S. R. Dennen, of Woburn. Mr. Hammond responded very

happily to the address of his friends. Some beautiful and valuable presents were donated. On the occasion of the wedding, which was a double one, Rev. Dr. Codman composed a hymn which was sung to the tune of "Ganges," an air familiar in those days. Last Tuesday evening it was sung again. The verses we give below :

"Composed at the wedding of Mr. John Tolman to Miss Hannah Clapp, and Mr. Jonathan Hammond to Miss Mary Ann Clapp, by their friend and pastor, John Codman.

Great source of being, mighty God,
Look down from Heaven thy high abode,
And graciously bestow,
Thy blessings on th' united pair,
Who now have both engaged to share
Each others lot below.

For them thy throne we would address,
O! with thy gracious bounty bless,
Their basket, and their store,
And while thy Providence imparts
Their daily mercies, give them hearts,
Thy goodness to adore.

Let smiling health their paths attend,
Their dwellings from alarm defend,
And be their constant Guard.
Thy presence here on earth bestow,
And when they've served him here below
Be thou their great reward.

In his younger days he was in poor health and after a venture in the dry-goods business he sailed for France for the benefit of his health. While in that country he made his home in the family of a vineyard owner, and upon his return a vessel was fitted out with a cargo of wines. Upon his arrival at Boston he disposed of the cargo at so great advantage that subsequent shipments followed.

He became a great traveler for those days, visiting various parts of Europe and making many voyages. After 1852 he made his home in Bermuda during the winter months, returning to Boston and Neponset each spring.

He was a man of sterling integrity and highly respected by all who knew him. The following account of his death and burial is taken from the "Bermuda Royal Gazette" of Dec. 17, 1889 :

"The late Horatio Hammond, of Boston, U. S.—With much regret we have to record the death of the above named gentleman, who died at the Globe Hotel, St. George's, on Friday morning, the 15th instant, at the advanced age of 91 years and 2 months. For many years Mr. Hammond has made Bermuda his winter residence, finding its climate more genial than that of other lands to which he had frequently resorted in search of health. His first visit here was in 1852, and he was therefore well known by the whole community. Possessing a character remarkable for refinement and urbanity secured for him many warmly attached friends. Throughout his illness he has been the perfection of patience, gentleness and resignation.

His remains were followed to their final resting place by the United States Consular Agent, the French and German Vice Consuls, the Mayor of St. George's, the Assistant Receiver General, and a large number of other officials and friends.

The flags of the Consulates, the Corporation flag and those throughout the town generally, were displayed at half mast as a tribute of respect to the deceased."

In 1831, he with his parents removed to Caneadea, Allegany Co., N. Y. In March, 1832, both families removed to Hume, purchasing a tract of fine farming land on the Genesee river. Here he made his home until he

was stricken with paralysis in 1883, when he made his home with his children until the time of his death. He was a sincere christian, a strong advocate of the temperance cause. At the age of nineteen he, with a few other young men, formed the first temperance society in the locality. In politics he was an old line whig, going from that party over the Free Soil bridge into Republicanism. An ardent politician, a strong party man, he was in politics as in every other relation of life, an incorruptably honest, God-fearing man. In 1849, he took a contract for the construction of four miles of the Genesee Valley Canal, which he completed in the following year. In 1851 he was appointed Superintendent of the canal, which office he held for three years, discharging the duties thereof in a thoroughly honorable manner.

During the civil war he took an active part in sending men to the front, and one son gave his life at Malvern Hill. He was elected Supervisor of his town many times, was Member of Assembly in 1858, and delegate to the State Constitutional Convention in 1867. In 1868 he was nominated by the Republican State Convention for the office of Canal Commissioner, but with the balance of the ticket was defeated in the election. He died at the residence of his youngest son, Charles H. Hammond, in Friendship, N. Y., at the ripe age of seventy-six.

He attended the public schools in Dorchester and later graduated from the New Ipswich, N. H., Academy. After graduation he taught penmanship in the Academy; also at Salem and Lynn, until poor health required a change of occupation. In 1850 he was advised by his Lynn physician to remove from the coast, which he did, locating at Woburn, where he continued to reside until his death. In 1851 he started in the clothing business in an old building which stood where the First National Bank building now stands. In 1856, upon completion of the Lyceum Building, he moved into the store now occupied by his son and continued in the business there until a few years prior to his death when he retired from active business, being succeeded by his son, who had been for some years a partner under the firm name of Hammond & Son.

Mr. Hammond, while living in his native town, was a member of the militia. He was Lieutenant of the Company. In 1852-3 he was clerk of the school district in Woburn, and in 1857 he was treasurer of the relief fund. He was one of the organizers of the Co-operative Bank of which he was Vice President, and also one of the investment committee.

In the early days of the Republican party he was treasurer of its town committee. A member of the First Unitarian Parish he was an active worker, and treasurer for fifteen years. He was a life member of the American Unitarian Association. He was for many years president of the Woburn Lyceum Hall Association. When the war broke out in 1861 his health precluded him from enlisting but his patriotism and loyalty found expression in untiring effort in behalf of the families of the soldiers, many of whom he assisted. Mr. Hammond, at the time of his death, enjoyed the distinction of being the oldest business man in Woburn in length of continuous service, and as a mark of respect nearly every business house in the city was closed during the hours of his funeral, which occurred from his late residence on

Hammond Square, on Wednesday, Dec. 9, 1896, Rev. Henry C. Parker, of the Unitarian Church, officiating.

"At a special meeting of the Directors of Woburn Co-operative Bank, held Dec. 7, 1896, the following resolutions were passed."

"RESOLVED, That in the death of our late associate, Joseph W. Hammond, the Directors lose a genial and painstaking associate, and the Bank a faithful and efficient officer. One who has been identified with the Bank since its organization, ever willing to give the fullest extent of his time and advice toward the building up of this institution, which has been such a benefit to this community. The directors desire to tender to the family of the late Mr. Hammond their heartfelt sympathy in this hour of their bereavement.

VOTED: That these resolutions are spread upon the records of the Bank; that a copy of them be sent to the bereaved family and that copies be given to the two local papers for publication."

H., before April 27, 1777, when he enlisted as a private in Capt. Amos Morrill's Co., Col. John Stark's Regiment in which he saw most of his Revolutionary service. (See N. H. State Papers, Vol. 14, p. 603.)

After his service on the Lexington Alarm, he re-enlisted Aug. 1, 1775, in Capt. Ezra Lunt's Co., Col. Moses Little's (17th) Regiment, in which he saw some active service. (See Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in War of Revolution.) He is said to have been with Col. Stark at the battle of Bennington. He was an ingenious pump maker, and laid the first aqueducts in the town of Dunbarton, some of which were in use fifty years after he laid them. (Hist. of Dunbarton, by Caleb Stark, Pub. 1860.) His descendants are still quite numerous in Dunbarton, N. H., and are among the most prominent people of the town.

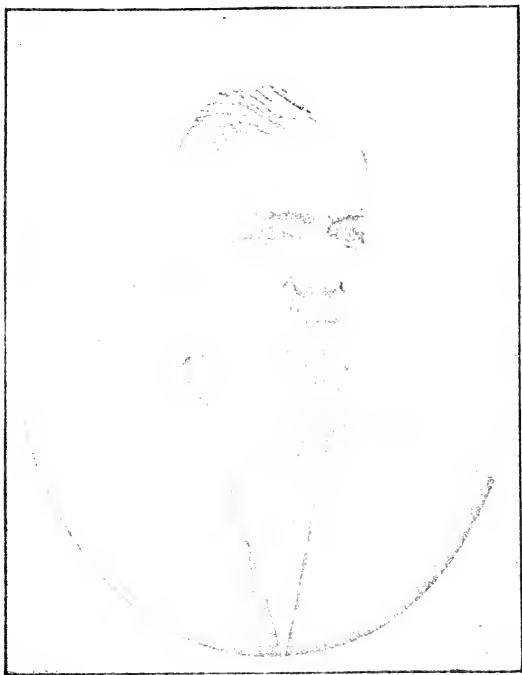

A former town clerk, Mr. James Ayer, who now (1897), resides at Salem Depot, while holding the office arranged and copied all of the fragments of early records he could find and now has in his possession a volume MS. labeled "Scraps of Record" from which he sends me the following: "Nov. 22, 1777. A warrant delivered to Henry Sanders, constable, to warn out of this town David Hammond, who came from the town of Ipswich, in the County of Essex, in the State of Massachusetts Bay, sometime in the last of April or the first of May." Mr. Ayer adds in a note "There is no disgrace attaching to this action as it was the custom for years to thus warn *all* who came into town, so if they should ever become a public charge the expense would be on the County and not on the town. In this way many of the best citizens were

warned out of town. He enlisted in the Revolutionary army from Salem, N. H. Was mustered in by Lt. Col. Jacob Gale for the town of Plaistow, July 21, 1779, and was a private in the 4th Co., 3d N. H. Regt. under Col. Alexander Scammell. (See, N. H. State Papers Vol. 15, pp. 623, 629, 641, 730.) He continued in the service until the close of the war and received a pension until his death in 1840. In the spring of 1791 he purchased the farm now owned by his grandson, Charles F. Hammond, near Woodhill in Bow where he lived until his death.

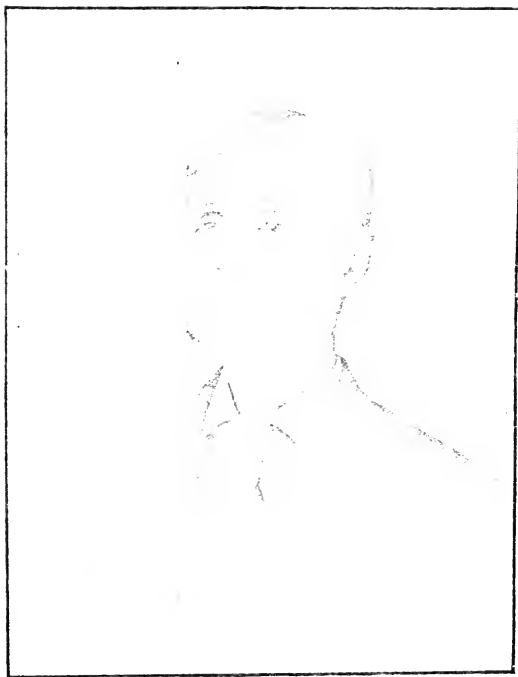

Doctor Hammond was a self made man, whose useful career emphasizes the possible attainment of those who possess courage and perseverance. He obtained all the knowledge possible in the district schools of his native place, and beyond that fought his way single-handed to graduation in the profession he had chosen for his life work. In his youth he had his every day task for a higher education, and finally studied medicine and surgery at New York, Boston, Dartmouth Medical college and Harvard Medical college, graduating at the latter in 1840 with the degree of M. D. He settled in Nashua immediately and steadily practiced his profession for more than forty years. Doctor Hammond, in his thorough knowledge of medicine and surgery, had practical and common sense method as well as a skillful and collegiate basis. He could read human nature "like a book" and was therefore enabled to prescribe effectively in all forms of disease and to all classes of patients. That he had the confidence of the people was recognized in a marked degree by the attorneys of the county, who sought him among the first as an expert witness in difficult cases, knowing that what Doctor Hammond said would be believed in preference to the testimony of college professors who had abundant theory and but limited practice. This was due, also, in a great measure, to the use of easy terms and a lucid explanation that was peculiarly his own method. He sought to make clear rather than make a mystery. He had an extensive and successful practice from which he retired some

years before his death, mainly because of advancing age and a fracture of the bones of his leg which made it difficult for him to travel any great distance. Yet such was his reputation that, for several years after his retirement, his services were in frequent demand, especially among families within whose circles he had for many years been the trusted physician and faithful friend. He was an active member of the New Hampshire Medical Society. But Doctor Hammond was not alone a Nashua physician. He was an active man in the affairs of the town and later of the city. Good government, good schools, church privileges, progress in every department of human endeavor, banking and a hundred and one things that were of concern to a citizen claimed his attention and found him a wise supporter. He held town offices from time to time and represented it in the legislature in 1847 and 1848. When Nashua became a city in 1853 he sat in her first common council, and in 1866 and 1867 served on the board of aldermen. He was city physician in 1862, 1866 and 1867, and for many years was a member of the board of education. During Governor Berry's administration, in the exciting days of the civil war, he was commissioned examining surgeon for exemption from draft for Hillsborough county, and was later appointed United States examining surgeon in cases of application for pensions, a position which he held fifteen years to the entire satisfaction of the government and the veterans. Besides these public duties he was one of the inceptors and promoters of the Second National bank, serving on the board of directors for many years. He was also treasurer of the Mechanics Savings bank and so great was the confidence of the people in him, he invested safely, large sums of money for friends and acquaintances. At the time of his death he was president of the York Beach & Harbor railroad and of the Crosby Invalid Bed company. Doctor Hammond was united in marriage Dec. 23, 1841, with Sarah Ann Adams. Mrs. Hammond was born in Waltham, Mass., Dec. 12, 1816, (died Jan. 15, 1898, since the above was written.) She was a daughter of Phineas Adams, born Sept. 14, 1789, and Sarah

W. (Barber) Adams, born May 28, 1790, a daughter of Hamblet Barber, born at Warrington, England. On the paternal side she is a descendant in the seventh generation from Henry Adams, who came to this country from Devonshire, England, in 1630. From Henry Adams fifteen generations to Ap Adam, of Wales, who "came out of the marshes of Wales, a frontier space," on which English troops were accustomed to march to repress incursions and cut off stragglers in 1220. Mrs. Hammond's lineage is one complete record to Ap Adam.

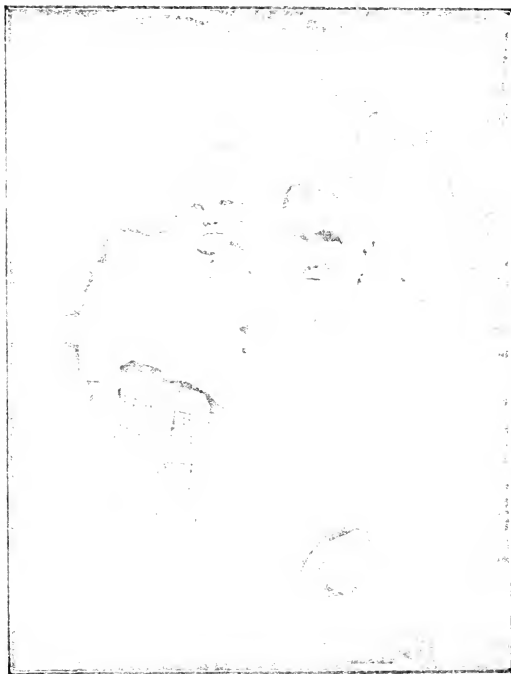

Miss Clara Barton enjoys a world-wide reputation, which she justly deserves for her own untiring efforts have made the Red Cross Society a power for good the world over. She began teaching school at an early age and later entered the Liberal Institute at Clinton, N. Y., where she finished her education. She then went to Bordentown, N. J., where she opened a public free school, beginning with six pupils. The school soon grew to large proportions and the local authorities, taking up the matter, built a large new school house and inaugurated the free public school system with Miss Barton at the head of it. She soon had a large and flourishing school of over 600 pupils and employing eight teachers.

Her health failed and she was obliged to retire from the arduous labors of this position and seek a change of climate.

She then went to Washington, D. C., and after a time became a clerk in the Patent Office. She was retired from this position on the election of Buchanan for political reasons but was re-appointed by President Lincoln immediately on his election. At the breaking out of the civil war she began her career of nursing, caring for and relieving the wants of the sick and wounded soldiers, which work she continued throughout the war.

During the Franco-Prussian war she was with the German army, doing relief work among the sick and wounded and relieving the distress of the starving people after the fall of Strasburg.

She then went to Paris and aided in giving relief to the starving and distressed people of that city. In 1882 she suc-

ceeded in getting government recognition for the Red Cross society which resulted in international recognition and the ratification of treaties among all civilized nations which recognize the society and provide for the protection of those who carry its flag. Miss Barton has made her headquarters in Washington, D. C., for many years. She also has a residence at Dansville, N. Y.

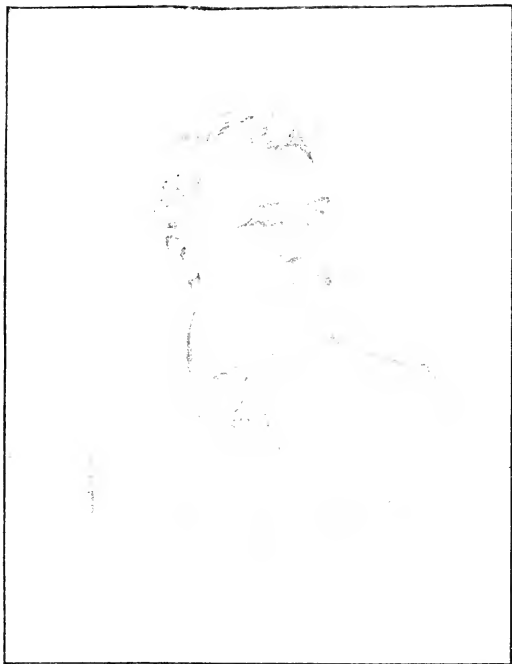

Doctor Hammond was educated in the public schools of Nashua, at Crosby's Literary Institute, and at Dartmouth College, entering in 1873 and graduating in 1877 with the degree of A. B., and in 1880 that of A. M. He studied medicine at the Harvard Medical School, from which he was grad-

uated in 1880 with the degree of M. D. Dr. Hammond succeeded his father, retaining office and patients. The public quickly discovered that he was a worthy successor of a physician and surgeon who had their confidence for more than four decades and the result is shown in the fact that his practice rapidly increased, until to-day there is not a busier man in his profession in the State or one who is more sought after as an expert witness before the courts, or for consultation in critical cases of both medicine and surgery.

Doctor Hammond, following in the footsteps of an honored sire, is an active man outside of his profession. He finds time to serve the public in many ways. He is a member of the Harvard Medical Alumni Association, a member and censor of the New Hampshire Medical Society, was secretary of the United States Board of Pension Examiners at Nashua from 1889 till 1893, and from 1897 to 1901 and a member of the Nashua Medical Association.

Dr. Hammond took an active and effective part, giving time, money and surgical instruments, in establishing the city emergency hospital; is a member of its executive committee and of its medical staff. He has served Hillsborough county four years as county physician, and Nashua as city physician and chairman of the board of health in 1894, doing the most effective work in its history in stamping out contagious diseases, and making a record as a conspicuous and efficient public official that was recognized by the city council by re-electing him to both positions for the year 1895.

Dr. Hammond was elected a member of the Board of Education in 1892 for a term ending in 1898, and is counted as one of the best informed and most enthusiastic educators in southern New Hampshire. He is in fact an enthusiast in school matters, and gives considerable of his time and attention to the study of the different methods of instruction in countries where the free school system prevails. He is quick to perceive and appreciate any improvement upon our own, and zealous in urging its adoption.

The zeal which he shows in looking after the welfare of

the pupils is exhibited not less intensely in his efforts to aid in providing substantial and well appointed school houses. He was chairman of the sub-committee of the school board employed in the building of one of Nashua's most modern and approved school houses, and has been chairman of the text book committee for the last six years.

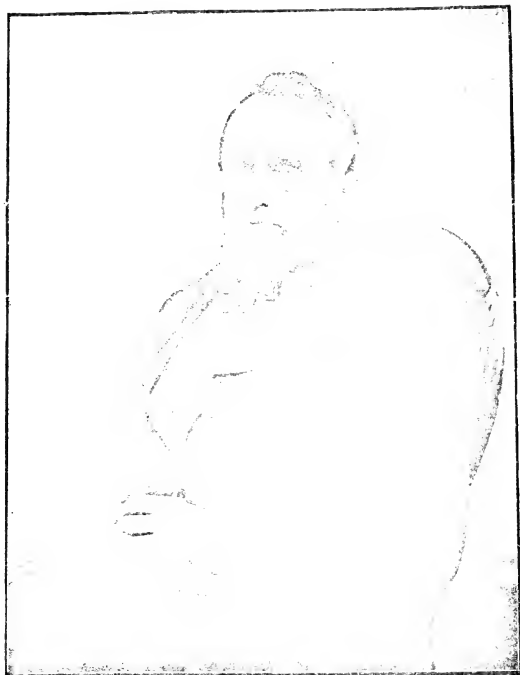

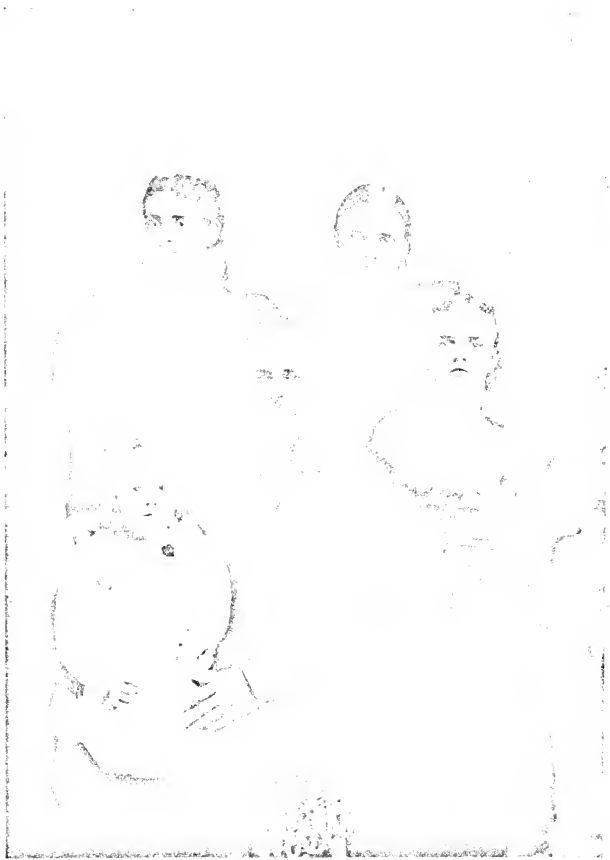

NATHANIEL HAMMOND,

OF SWANZEY, N. H.

(IV) CAPT. NATHANIEL HAMMOND, (Thomas²) b. May 29, 1691; (bapt. with his brother Jonathan, in Watertown, Mass., July 25, 1697;) d. Swanzey, N. H., Feb. 2, 1756; m. 1st in Rowley, Mass., (Pub. Jan. 30, 1713-'14,) Bridget Harris, dau. of Dea. Timothy and Phebe (Pearson) Harris, b. Dec. 17, 1692; d. 1731; m. 2d March 8, 1732, Mrs. Abigail (Hildreth) Chamberlain, widow of Thomas Chamberlain, of Littleton, and dau. of Joseph and Abigail Hildreth; b. Chelmsford, Mass., Oct. 20, 1691; d. Swanzey, N. H., Aug. 20, 1745. Two of her sons, John and Simeon Chamberlain, were living in Swanzey in 1742-3. (See Middlesex Deeds, Lib. 44, fol. 108.) She also had an older son, Thomas Chamberlain, who inherited the homestead at Littleton. M. 3d in Hardwick, Mass., Aug. 6, 1746, Mrs. Martha (Allis) Wells, b. in Hatfield, Mass., Nov. 19, 1703, dau. of Ichabod Allis, of Hatfield, and widow of John Wells, of Hardwick. She survived him and m. 3d July 19, 1758, Nathaniel Kellogg, of Hadley, Mass. She brought up her son Timothy Hammond in Hadley and he probably never had a permanent residence in Swanzey, although he was a large land owner there. The records of Hardwick show that Capt. Nathaniel Hammond formerly resided at Lower

Ashuelot, now Swanzey, N. H., and that the people were driven out by the Indians in 1747, as is stated in the Swanzey history. He evidently returned to Swanzey before 1753 as in that year he signed a petition to the legislature of the state in which he says that he has been improving the land in Swanzey "for the past 18 years."

Capt. Hammond lived in Ipswich, Mass., until 1724. Oct. 10, 1722, he sold to Jonathan Clark, of Rowley, a meadow in Rowley, called "Sachwell's meadow," for which he received the sum of £8. Bridget, his wife, gave up her right of dower in the same (Essex Deeds 42; 215) Nov. 12, 1722, in consideration of the sum of £1050, he conveyed "to my father, Timothy Harris, of Rowley," certain parcels of land in Ipswich, a portion of which was his part in the division with his brother David, and a part was land which his father bought of Jeremiah Nelson. His wife Bridget surrendered her right of Dower (Essex Deeds, 43; 60). Soon after this date he removed with his family to Littleton, Mass., where he continued to hold residence until 1730 or after. There is some uncertainty about his place of residence from this time until 1736, when he erected the first house in Lower Ashuelot, (now Swanzey) N. H. He held nominal residence in Littleton, however, as the records of the First Congregational church, of Littleton contain the following notice of the dismissal of Capt. Nathaniel and his son Jonathan "August, 1739; Capt. Hammond and his son Jonathan were dismissed to the church in Ashuelot." The proprietors records of Lower Ashuelot or Swanzey commence June 27, 1734, at Concord, Mass. "At a meeting of the proprietors of the Lower Township on the Ashuelot river held at the house of Ephraim Jones, innholder, in Concord, Mr. Nathaniel Hammond, of Littleton, was chosen moderator; Ephraim Jones, of Concord, chosen clerk and sworn." "Voted: that John Flint, Esq., of Concord, Mr. Joseph Hill, of Billerica, Mr. Eleazer Robbins, of Harvard, and Mr. Nathaniel Hammond, of Littleton, be a committee to manage the prudential affairs of said township."

At a meeting held at the house of Ephraim Jones, in

Concord, Oct. 19, 1734, he was appointed on a committee "to lay out the interval land in the township into sixty-three equal lots." Each of these lots was numbered and the proprietors drew "lots" for their numbers. Nathaniel drew lot No. 18, for his son-in-law, (step-son) John Chamberlain; No. 27 for himself and No. 35 for his son, Jonathan.

"At a proprietors meeting held at the house of Capt. Nathaniel Hammond, in Lower Ashuelot, (Swanzy) Oct. 26, 1737, it was voted that Capt. Nathaniel Hammond, Benjamin Heywood, Charles Lumis, Samuel Hills and Thomas Cresson be a committee to lay out the fifth division of lots." This is the first house of which mention can be found in Swanzy. It stood where the house of Mrs. Woodcock now stands in Swanzy Center. "At a meeting held Dec. 28, 1738," the proprietors "Voted: to buy 18 lbs. of powder and 36 lbs. of lead, for a proprietors stock, which shall be left in the hands of Capt. Nathaniel Hammond."

At a meeting held Dec. 22, 1740, "Nathaniel Hammond, Abraham Graves and John Evans were chosen a committee to finish the fort which has been begun around Capt. Nathaniel Hammond's house." The Nathaniel first mentioned undoubtedly being his son, Nathaniel, Jr. His son, Jonathan, came to Swanzy with his father in 1735 or 36. The other sons followed at intervals of a few months or years, Thomas probably coming there about the time of his marriage. There is no record of his youngest daughter, Bridget, ever having been a resident in Swanzy, although two of her sons settled there and another owned land there. John is not mentioned in the "History of Swanzy" at all. Probably he never had a permanent residence there. Capt. Nathaniel became a large land owner, he and his sons owning at one time about three thousand acres of land in Swanzy, besides considerable tracts in other towns in N. H. and Vt.

In 1747 the inhabitants were all driven from their homes by Indians. They sunk their iron utensils in their wells or buried them and fled to Mass. for safety. The town was burned by the foe and many of the former inhabitants, having

become discouraged by the frequent depredations of the savages, never returned. The Hammonds, however, soon returned with the exception of the two younger children, Oliver and Bridget, who sought a home with their uncle, David, and other kinsmen in Ipswich, where they remained. Nathaniel (who is always mention as "Capt." Nathaniel in the records of the period,) was a man of indomitable will and a natural born leader in every enterprise. He was essentially a pioneer and was one of the most prominent men in the affairs of the early settlers. He was well educated for the time and an excellent penman, as is shown by records now extant. He was generally clerk of the proprietors meetings and served on nearly every committee chosen by the early settlers. (See "Hist. of Swanzey," by Col. Benjamin Read. "History of Gilsum," by Rev. Sylvanus Hayward, and N. H. Town Papers, State Paper series, Vol. 13.)

Sept. 22, 1744. Nathaniel Hammond, of Lower Ashuelot, in consideration of the sum of £175, paid by each of them, sold to Wait-still Hastings, of Hattfield, in the County of Hampshire, Province of Massachusetts, and Samuel Gaylord, of Hadley, in the same county, weaver; one lot of land, 16 acres, being in an intervail meadow called Hyponeecco, lying at lower end of meadow and on each side of River Ashuelot, it being No. 31, in the 3^d division of land in 8^d town as it stands recorded in ye proprietor's book to Samuel Bacon. Another lot of 16 acres adjoining, being lot No. 32, as recorded to William Whittier, 100 acres adjoining the above lots recorded to Samuel Baron. Another lot of 16 acres, being No. 46, recorded to Ebenezer Connant; a house lot in town plot containing 6 acres, bounded S. by Wm. Carr, N. by Thomas Kendall, E. by meadow, W. by highway, being No. 61, as recorded to Thomas Slayten; a tract of 8 acres adjoining said house lot, being No. 59, recorded to John Tyler; 16 acres in Flat Intervail, being No. 23, of the 3^d division, recorded to John Lampton; another 16 acre lot, No. 24, recorded Charles Prescott; another 16 acre lot in Flat Intervail, No. 28, recorded to John Tyler, and lastly, 200 acres as pitched and laid out by ye proprietors, adjoining ye three last mentioned lots in Flat Intervail, 100 acres on the right of Ebenezer Connant and the other 100 acres on the right of John Tyler. The estate seems to have been amicably settled by the administrator who sold lands to several of the heirs, probably to raise funds to pay off other heirs, and no final accounting or other papers of the settlement are to be found on record. No mention can be found of any of the daughters in the settlement of the estate and it is probable that they received cash in full of their claims against their father's estate.

Sept. 5, 1777, dau. of John and Sarah (Fiske) Hastings, of Lunenburg, and granddaughter of John and Abigail (Hammond) Hastings, of Watertown, Mass. He settled in Swanzey, N. H., in 1737 and had land granted him there. He also had land granted him in the towns of Errol and Claremont, N. H., and in several towns in Eastern Vermont. He took a very prominent part in the affairs of Swanzey and was a very prominent and influential man there as long as he lived. He was a soldier in the Indian wars, was corporal in Capt. Josiah Willard's Co. from June 25, 1749, to Oct. 16, 1749. (Mass. Arch. Muster Rolls Vol. 93, p. 34.) He kept the first public house in Swanzey on the Boston road.

He was town treasurer in 1768, '69, '70, '73 and '74, and moderator in 1768, '69, '70, '72 and '73. Being too old to serve in the war of the Revolution he hired a substitute for three years, whom he paid the sum of £78 for his service. (See Hist. Swanzey, p. 124.) He was a deacon of the Congregational Church in Swanzey for some years prior to his death. His gravestone in the old burial ground at Swanzey Centre bears the inscription, "Deacon Jonathan Hammond, died Sept. 16, 1777, in his 63d year."

(V) DEA. THOMAS HAMMOND, (Nathaniel^b) b. Ipswich, Mass., Oct. 31, 1719; d. Swanzey, N. H., 1782; m. 1st in Brookfield, Mass., Aug. 21, 1741, Martha Olmsted, b. Brookfield, Mass., Sept. 16, 1721, d. Swanzey, Jan. 3, 1744, dau. of Capt. Jabez and Thankful (Barnes) Olmsted. Her father was one of Capt. Wright's Co., May, 1709, in the Indian wars. He was also Captain of the 10th Co. in Col. Samuel Willard's 4th Mass. Regt. under Gen. Sir Wm. Pepperell in the Louisburgh expedition in 1745. He seems to have settled in Palmer, Mass., about 1728 or '29, and built the first grist mill where Ware village now stands. He bought what was known as the Hollingworth grant of 500 acres for £400, and was a man of large means. Tradition represents him to have been a man of great shrewdness and energy, a mighty hunter, and that Indian blood ran in his veins. Appearances seem to indicate that he was a descendant of James Olmsted, who came in the "Lyon," Sept. 16, 1632. Capt. Olmsted married about 1710-'11, Thankful, dau. of Thomas Barnes, and had eleven children, of whom Martha was the fifth. After her death he m. 2d in Dedham, Mass., Feb. 4, 1745, Abigail Farr, parentage unknown. She d. Aug. 9, 1772, and he m. 3d June 16, 1774, widow Priscilla Hale, of Boxford, Mass., dau. of Capt. Stephen and Hannah (Swan) Peabody and widow of John Hale. She survived him and was living in Swanzey in 1784, when her son, Eliphalet Hale, deeded her three tracts of land in Chesterfield. (Cheshire Deeds, Lib. 10, Fol. 125.)

He was selectman in 1766, '78, '80, and a member of the "Committee of Safety" in 1775. He was too aged and infirm to enter the army himself, but he hired two substitutes—Joseph Hammond, Jr., for two and one-half months and Daniel Day for two months, and also sent his son, Lieut. Isaac Hammond. He was chosen deacon of the Congregational Church in 1777. He was a prosperous farmer and a large land owner. He seems to have held the land originally granted to him and that deeded to him by his father until his death. In 1773 he was administrator of the estate of his son, Dr. Nathaniel Hammond, who had lived near him. No record of his death has been found as his family Bible was carried away to Canada by his son, Lieut. Isaac, and is probably lost. Isaac seems to have become hopelessly involved before the final settlement of the estate and to have sold everything belonging to him and removed to Canada.

THOMAS HAMMOND'S WILL.

In the Name of God, Amen. I, Thomas Hammond of Swanzey, in the County of Cheshire and State of New Hampshire; Yeoman, in the sixty-second year of my age, being weak in body but of sound and disposing mind and memory; Blessed be God therefor. Do make and Ordain this my Last Will and Testament; and desire it may be received by all as such: That is to say—First of all I humbly give and recommend my soul to God and Maker; Imploring his most Gracious Acceptance of it through the Merits and Mediation of Jesus Christ who I trust will not reject one flying to him for Mercy; and my Body I give to the Earth from whence it was taken, to be Buried by my Executor, herein after named, in a decent and Christian manner: Nothing Doubting that I shall receive the same again by the Mighty Power of God at the Resurrection of the Last Day: And as touching such worldly Goods and Estate as it has pleased God to Bless me with in this Life; I will and positively order that all my just debts be paid; and then I Give Devise and Dispose of the same in manner and form following:

Imprimis. I give and Bequeath to Priscilla my well-beloved Wife all and every article, goods and household furniture, she brought to me at our marriage, or has since made or procured, to be at her own disposal forever; I also give her the free use and Improvement of the South room and Chamber in my Dwelling House in Swanzey if it please her to live in it, so long as she shall remain my Widow, also the use of two good cows which cows at her Death or Marriage are to revert the one to my executor and the other to my kind and dutiful daughter in law (step daughter) Mehetabel Hale to whom I give Said Cow in Consideration of the kindness and affection she has shown to me; I do also give to my said wife Eight Bushels of Good

Indian Corn, six Bushels of Rye and four of Wheat; one hundred and fifty Pounds of Good Pork and one hundred and fifty Pounds of Beef Annually together with a sufficiency of Fire wood cut and brought into the house, to be provided by my Executor During her widowhood, provided she shall live with him; but if at any time she should return to the Inheritance that was her former husband's then my Executor shall be obliged to deliver to her Annually at my present Dwelling house in Swanzey, only one half of the above quantity of Grain and Meat so long as she remains my widow.

Item. I give and Bequeath to my well beloved son Aaron Hammond, Thirty-Five Pounds Lawfull Money to be paid him in Six Years from the Day of my Decease, which with what I have already given him is his full portion of my Estate.

Item. I give and Bequeath to my Two Grand Children, Thomas and Esther, Children and heirs of my son Nathaniel Hammond, Deceased, the sum of Twenty-Seven Pounds Lawfull Money to be equally divided between them and paid to them when they shall severally arrive at Lawfull age— which sum with what I gave to my said son in his Life time is his full share of my Estate.

Item. I give to my three Grand Children Abia, Bathshua and Joseph Ellis, Children and Heirs of my Deceased Daughter Bridget, late the Wife of Joseph Ellis; the sum of thirty-six Pounds Lawfull Money to be equally Divided amongst them, and to be paid to them when they shall severally arrive to Lawfull Age; all the above Legacies in Money to be paid to my Executor in Silver at Six Shillings and Eight pence per ounce.

Item. I give and Bequeath to my Trusty and Well beloved Son Isaac Hammond and to his Heirs and Assigns forever, the whole remainder of my Estate, Real and Personal, consisting in goods, Testaments, Chatels and Lands, either being in Swanzey or elsewhere; reserving only for my Daughter in Law Mahitibal Hale aforesaid the Right and Privilege of living with him in my Dwelling House (if she pleases) as long as she shall remain a single woman; and I do constitute and Appoint him, my said trusty son Isaac Hammond the sole executor of this my last Will and Testament, Rati-fying and Confirming this to be my Last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this Eleventh Day of October Anno Domini 1781.

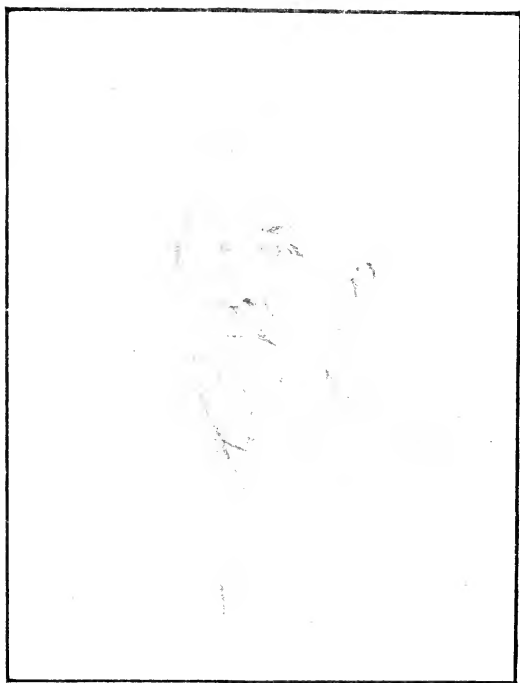

Joseph probably came to Swanzey with his father about 1736, but as he was but a youngster at that time he does not appear on the town records until about 1744, when he became of age. He was one of the grantees of the town under the second, or New Hampshire, grant in 1753, and was a large land owner as long as he lived. He was also a grantee of lands in Rutland, Saltash and Shrewsbury, Vt., in 1761; in Barnet, Vt., in 1763; in Claremont, N. H., in 1764; in Dartmouth (now Jefferson), N. H., in 1772, and in Success, N. H., in 1773. He was always prominent in town and local affairs and held office almost continually. He was moderator in 1766, '67, '71, '74, '75, '76 and '77; selectman in 1766, '68, '69, '72, '73, '74 and '76; town treasurer in 1771; was chosen member of the "Committee of Safety" in 1775, and was always during his life first in all military affairs of the town. He was Capt. of the Swanzey Co. that marched to Cambridge, April 21, 1775, two days after the battle of Lexington, and on the muster rolls of this company are found the names of his son, Joseph Hammond, Jr., and his nephews, Isaac Hammond

and Josiah Prime. He was soon after appointed recruiting officer, and was at home raising men for the Continental army when the battle of Bunker Hill was fought. "When he heard that the battle had been fought he prepared to start the following morning for the field of conflict." He rode through, a distance of ninety miles the next day. This ride has been immortalized by a Swanzey poet in a rather lengthy poem, entitled "Col. Hammond's Ride," which is given on pages 106, 107, 108 and 109 of Col. Benjamin Read's History of Swanzey. The poem is believed to have been written by Hon. Elijah Sawyer, for many years a justice of the peace and clerk of the Cheshire County Court. As recruiting officer he mustered a company of men Sept. 22, 1776, which contained his two sons, Joseph Hammond, Jr., and Benjamin Hammond. This company took part in the battle of White Plains. In June 1777, he was Lieut. Colonel in Col. Samuel Ashley's 6th New Hampshire Regt., which marched to the relief of Ft. Ticonderoga. Feb. 17, 1778, he signed a "Return" of men enlisted for two years as Lieut. Colonel of the regiment. He resigned and retired from active military duty in 1779. The following is a copy of his letter of resignation and its acceptance:

"SWANZEY, June 14, 1779.

TO THE HONORABLE THE COUNCIL AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES FOR THE
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Gentlemen: I Beg leave to inform you that it is my Ernest desire to Resign the Trust Reposed in me as a Lieut. Colonel of the Sixth Regiment of militia in the State of New Hampshire and I do now by these Presents make a full Resignation of the Said Trust and office of Lieut. Colonel and pray that the same may be Ratified by the Honorable General Court.

(A sketch of the life of Col. Joseph Hammond appeared in the "New Hampshire Sentinel" published at Keene, N. H., many years ago, which was written while people were still living who had known him personally. The author once had a copy but has been unable to find it or it would be reproduced.)

May 19, 1769, Joseph Hammond deeded lands in Swanzey to his younger brother, Timothy Hammond. (Cheshire Reg. Deeds, Lib. 3, Fol. 18.)

Dec. 29, 1774, Joseph Hammond sold to William Carr, 75 acres of land in Swanzey. (Cheshire Reg. Deeds, Lib. 1, Fol. 172.)

May 4, 1776, Joseph Hammond sold to his son, Benjamin Hammond, 250 acres of land in Swanzey, for £100. (Cheshire Reg. Deeds, Lib. 2, Fol. 491.)

On the same date he sold to his son, Joseph Hammond, Jr., 207 acres in Swanzey, for £125. (Cheshire Reg. Deeds, Lib. 2, Fol. 290.)

Aug. 5, 1772, he sold to Samuel Chapman, lands in Swanzey. (Cheshire Reg. Deeds, Lib. 4, Fol. 376.)

May 29, 1772, he sold to Joseph Cummings land in Swanzey, for £24. (Cheshire Reg. Deeds, Lib. 4, Fol. 477.)

He also signed deeds of several large tracts of land in Swanzey as administrator of his father's estate, which appears to have been unsettled for many years.

Timothy enlisted first Jan. 13, 1776, in Capt. James Hendrick's Co. and served a short time. He next re-enlisted in the same year in Capt. Reuben Dickinson's Co., Col. Rugles Woodbridge's Regt., and was at Fort Ticonderoga. It is not known how long he served in this company. He again enlisted in Capt. Dix's Co. under command of Brig.-Gen. John Glover, July 6, 1780, for six months. Residence, Hadley; age, 32 years; stature, 5 ft. 8 in.; complexion, dark; arrived at Springfield, July 6; marched to camp July 7, 1780. He again enlisted in a company of six months' men, returned as having passed muster by Brig.-Gen. Paterson at Camp Totoway, Oct. 25, 1780, served until Dec. 4, 1780. (Massachusetts soldiers and sailors in war of Revolution.)

H., where he d. Aug. 26, 1785. His residence was on Meeting-house hill; the homestead having been occupied by the descendants continuously from his settlement down to the present time. He was a graduate of Harvard College, was ordained at Hull, Mass., in 1725, and preached there 21 years prior to his settlement at Swanzey. He was an able divine, a rational preacher of the gospel, a lover of good men, a kind and loving husband and parent. He was a very social, genial, hospitable man and won the respect and affection of all who knew him. The family has held a foremost rank among the good people of Swanzey and has furnished many able men for other localities.

Greenwood Carpenter m. 1st Sarah Leathers, by whom he had three children, viz: William, Betsey and Olive, not of Hammond ancestry. He was a respected farmer, succeeding his father on the Carpenter homestead in Swanzey.

Edward and Lois (Howe) Goddard, of Swanzey. Her father was the second settled minister of Swanzey and a very prominent man in the early affairs of the town. She m. 2d Gen. John Steele, b. Feb., 1773, son of David and Jean (Little) Steele, of Peterboro, N. H. She was his 2d wife and had no children. He retained the homestead in Swanzey and was a wealthy farmer. Little is now known of him; he appears to have been a quiet, retiring man who rather shunned any prominence in public affairs. He erected a family tomb in Swanzey cemetery to the memory of his parents.

(VI) Aaron Hammond, (Thomas⁵) son of THOMAS and Martha (Olmstead) Hammond, was b. in Swanzey, N. H., Oct. 7, 1742, and d. in Gilsum, N. H., April 7, 1818. He

m. in Swanzey April 28, 1771, Rachel Woodward, b. 1743; d. in Gilsum, N. H., Dec. 6, 1812. Her parentage has not been ascertained, but it seems very probable that she was of the family of Woodward which came from Sutton, Mass., and settled in Marlboro, N. H., some years prior to his marriage. Little has been learned of this family in Sutton and it is probable that they had not long resided there when they removed to New Hampshire. There seems to be little, if any doubt of her descent from George and Elizabeth (Hammond) Woodward, the early settlers of Watertown, Mass. This would include her descendants in the line of Thomas Hammond, of Newton, as well as in the line of William of Watertown. It is probable that her father was Jonas Woodward, b. Feb. 8, 1712, in Newton, Mass.; m. 1734, Mary Cook, of Needham, Mass. This family left Newton and presumably removed to Sutton. This Jonas had a son Jonas born in Newton who was probably the Jonas Woodward that settled later in Marlboro, N. H. It is known that she had a sister, Rebecca Woodward, who became the 2d wife of Elijah Osgood, of Swanzey, N. H., and the step-mother of Lucy Osgood, wife of Aaron Hammond, Jr. If these premises are correct she was left an orphan some years before her marriage which accounts for the difficulty in tracing her ancestry. Jonas Woodward died in 1764. He was a son of Daniel, grandson of John and great grandson of George Woodward mentioned above.

Aaron Hammond

Aaron purchased from Jonathan Hammond a fifty-acre lot in "South Division" of Swanzey "numbered thirty-three" "for the consideration of the sum of Thirty Pounds Lawful Money." The deed, dated April 6, 1771, and witnessed by Joseph Ellis and Nathaniel Hammond, is now in the possession of his great-great grandson, Frederick S. Hammond, of Oneida, N. Y. In 1773 he purchased of Nathan Blake for "the sum of Twenty Six Pounds, thirteen shillings and four

pence" another fifty acres described as "House Lot No. 11, being the most Northerly Lot in the Range, Second Division of Upland."

In 1782 he sold his lands in Swanzey and purchased land of Moses Belding in the part of Gilsum which has ever since borne the name of "Hammond Hollow," and on which there was a log house into which he moved his family. In 1785 he built the frame house which is now the sugar house owned by Mrs. T. T. Clark. "He drew the boards from Swanzey with an ox team and split and shaved his own shingles and clapboards, some of which were sound and bright one hundred years later. He took an active part in organizing the Congregational Church in Gilsum and was one of the signers of the charter. He paid the sum of 'Six pounds, thirteen shillings for pew No. 1,' at the first sale of pews. He was tithingman from 1789 to 1793; school committee in 1790; moderator in 1791 and selectman four years. He was the progenitor of all the Hammonds of Gilsum. * * This has always been one of the leading families of the place, and though mostly scattered at present, those who have gone to other places have maintained the reputation of the family elsewhere." (Hist. Gilsum, p. 209.) His wife, Rachel (Woodward) Hammond was one of the most respected and influential women of the town. The following extract from the New Hampshire Sentinel, of Dec. 19, 1812, shows something of the esteem in which she was held:

"Died, in Gilsum, on the 6th inst., Mrs. Rachel Hammond, wife of Mr. Aaron Hammond; aged 70 years. Her exemplary attachments, as a wife, a mother, and a friend were never surpassed in those endearing relations. She ever performed every duty to the utmost extent of a generous, disinterested affection. As a daughter of Zion she constantly exhibited that meekness, charity and benevolence which are ever highly ornamental to the Church of Christ, of which she was a respected member. A firm and fervent piety characterized her uniform conduct from her early youth to her last moments. She trusted for acceptance with God only through the merits and suffering of her adored Redeemer. She spent her last expiring breath in prayer; and praising God. These excellent qualities blessed the large circle of her intimate friends who, with her inconsolable husband, will ever revere her memory as they now deplore her loss. Her

funeral was attended by the Rev. Mr. Muzzy, who delivered a discourse from Job 19 : 21."

Their daughter, Rachel, was born blind. "She was the only child in Gilsuim who was born blind. Her mother took unwearied pains to instruct her so that she learned to knit and sew. Hearing others read she would repeat the words after them and called it reading. In this way she read the Bible through more than once. But for her blindness she would have been a woman of more than common activity and influence." (See Hayward's Hist. Gilsuim, p. 209.)

No account of his education has been found, but he was the first regular physician of whom there is any record in Swanzey. He owned and resided on what is now the W. C. Belding place, near Swanzey Centre. Little has been learned about his wife's family or parentage, but it seems certain that she was a sister of Rachel Franklin, who married his cousin, Oliver Prime. Administration on his estate was granted to his father, Thomas Hammond, who gave a bond in the sum of £200, Nov. 16, 1773. An inventory of the estate was

returned to the Court and a license to sell real estate granted, but there is no account of the final settlement of the estate. After his death his widow and children went back to Winchester to live, probably with her parents.

(VI) LIEUT. ISAAC HAMMOND, (Thomas^s) was b. in 1748, probably in some town in Massachusetts, whither his parents had fled to escape the fury of the savages, who had overrun all of Cheshire Co., N. H., in the previous year. His parents soon returned to Swanzey, however, and he was brought up there. He married in Sutton, Mass., Feb. 16, 1773, his cousin, Mehitable Prime, b. in Rowley, Mass., Aug. 29, 1755, dau. of Joshua and Bridget (Hammond) Prime, who removed to Sutton, Mass., about 1769. After his death in 1795, she m. 2d in Caldwell's Manor, Canada, Samuel Fyler, a tory refugee from Long Island, by whom she had a son, Isaac Fyler. The following letter written by his daughter, Mrs. Mehitable (Hammond) Rice, to her nephew, Capt. Russell Prime Hammond, contains all that remained in that branch of the family history and traditions, and while it contains some inaccuracies it is given in full, as it contains the only authentic account of the removal of this family to Canada. (The original, now in possession of Capt. Hammond, has been slightly defaced by mice and a few words are entirely eaten away. These defects are marked with * *.)

ST. JOHNS, 26 January, 1861.

Dear Nephew: I remember you asked me some years since for information on the subject of our ancestors, and something at the time intervening, which caused a delay—and since I have not had a convenient opportunity of a personal communication. I resolved to make no longer delay, and having it in writing you can always refer to it, as our memories do not always serve us, and we should not remain in ignorance of our progenitors. I now commence by informing you that both the Hammond and Prime families origi-

ally came from England, and emigrated to the United States of America, something like two centurys since. My memory only serves me to speak confidently so far back as your great grandfather—yes, I can go one generation more remote on my father's side and say my great grandfather Hammond, (his given name I do not remember,) but he and two of his brothers made a purchase of the best part of the township of Swanzey, in New Hampshire, where they took up their residence, sometime about, (I think) the middle of the last century, 1700. His son Thomas Hammond inherited his estate in that place after his father, who died at the age of about 60, leaving three sons and one daughter, and my father Isaac Hammond being one of them, and who had ever lived with his father Thomas Hammond, became his successor to the family estate by an arrangement with the other brothers. But unfortunately for him and his family he subsequently became involved. Naturally of a most kind and obliging disposition, he yielded to the persuasion and became security for a friend in trouble to a large amount and to the ruin of his earthly prospects. Being in consequence obliged to dispose of his valuable property and the inheritance of his fore-fathers at a very great sacrifice, a misfortune deeply deplored by both my poor father and mother, and which was the means of bringing them to Canada with their * * * children where we all landed on the 9th of October (I think) in the year 1794, at Caldwell's Manor. In the following summer my father went on business to Albany, N. Y., where he caught the smallpox, which was prevailing at that time, and of which he died, I think the 24th of June, 1795, with bright hopes of immortal glory, and in his 46th year. I will now give you some outline of my mother's, the Prime family, which lived in the town of Rowley, Mass. Joshua Prime, your father's grandfather, after whom he was called Joshua Prime Hammond. Our grandfather Prime succeeded to his father's estate in Rowley, where he continued to reside until my mother was of the age of 15 years. He then with my grandmother, (who was also Hammond of the same family), and all of his family, three sons and three daughters, emigrated to Sutton, a distance of about 60 miles. I believe that is also in the state of Massachusetts. They were successful agriculturists. His three sons, brothers of my mother, subsequently removed to the Town of Swanzey, New Hampshire; all agriculturists—and there continued to live during their lifetimes. Uncle Prime, of New York, being the youngest and only one of that family, with the exception of my mother, that you can have any knowledge of, was born a few weeks after his father's decease. And so one generation follows another down to that result of death for all the living. It would be dreadful to think of, and very sad, had not Our Lord Christ * * * tears before us and the sins of * * * might cause us to tremble and despair * * * the attoning efficacy of His precious blood.

I will say that your grandfather was born in 1748—your grandmother in 1755. I remain ever your affectionate aunt,
M. Rice.

His widow d. in Caldwell's Manor, Canada, April 5, 1838. Isaac was very active in the Revolutionary war as were all of the Swanzey Hammond's, and was a Lieutenant

in the local Militia. He enlisted first in Capt. Joseph Hammond's Co., which marched to Cambridge, April 21, 1775, two days after the battle of Bunker Hill. (Hist. of Swanzey, pp. 103-4.) He next enlisted in Capt. Davis Howlett's Co. under Lieut. Col. Joseph Hammond, which marched to the relief of Fort Ticonderoga in June, 1777. (N. H. State Papers, vol. 13, p. 63.) He also marched with a Swanzey Co. to Otter Creek, and probably did other military duty of which there is now no record extant. He was selectman from 1781 to 1788 and moderator in 1785. He was coroner of Cheshire County in 1784 and deputy sheriff in 1790. He was the owner of considerable land in Swanzey and also of a tract of land in Gilsun, N. H. July 1, 1782, he sold a lot in Swanzey, originally laid out to his brother-in-law, Joseph Ellis, to Daniel Newcomb, of Keene. (Cheshire Registry of Deeds, lib. 10, fol. 422.) May 31, 1784, he gave a deed of lands in Swanzey to the "heirs of Dea. Jonathan Hammond, namely: Susanna, wife of Greenwood Carpenter, Mary Hammond, Abigail Hammond, of Swanzey, and Mariam, wife of John Hastings, of Charlestown, N. H." "It is to be remembered that the reason for said Hammonds signing the above deed is that it is presumed that Dea. Thomas Hammond, late of Swanzey, deceased, was to have given deed in his lifetime of said premises, the other party or grantee engaging that said Isaac Hammond shall not meet with any trouble or loss in consequence of his signing the said deed." The deed is witnessed by Joseph Hammond and Sarah Hammond. (Cheshire Registry of Deeds, lib. 14, fol. 425.)

There are also many other land transactions showing him to have been quite an active land speculator. The only existing records of him after his removal to Canada was a

deed of some land in Gilsum, N. H., and a power of attorney to his brother, Aaron Hammond, executed in Montreal in 1794, and which are now in possession of the writer, who is a great-great grandson of the said Aaron.

After the expiration of his eight months' service he re-enlisted for the winter and Sept. 22, 1776, he again enlisted in the company mustered by his father on that date and went with the regiment to White Plains.

He was corporal in Capt. Jonathan Whitcomb's Co., Col. James Reed's Regt., while at Cambridge.

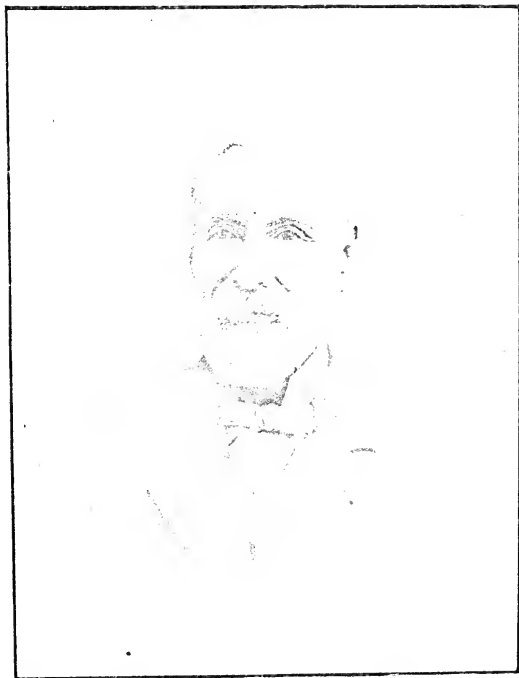

of his mother he was taken to Lunenburg, Mass., where he remained with his mother's relatives much of the time until he arrived at manhood, when he took up his residence on the farm since owned by D. B. C. Hill in Swanzey, where he lived until the time of his death. He was a quiet, reserved man, and does not appear to have taken an active part in politics or held office; a consistent member of the Congregational Church but latterly an attendant at the Baptist Church, of which his son, Joseph, was an active member. He enlisted in Capt. John Houghton's Co., Col. Baldwin's Regt., mustered by Col. Joseph Hammond, Sept. 22, 1776, and was with the Co. at the battle of White Plains. (N. H. State Papers, vol. 14, p. 428.) The town rolls credit him with two and one-half months service. (Hist. of Swanzey, p. 121.)

He was the owner and occupant of the old Stephen Perkins farm in Topsfield for many years. This farm is now, or recently was, owned and occupied by Rev. George L. Gleason.

He was a man of more than ordinary intelligence and for many years was the most prominent man in town. He was representative to the general court several years, selectman 26 years, town treasurer many years, served as tythingman and was town clerk 19 years in succession.

He is said to have lost much of his property before his death.

Ward, and on coming of age wrote him the letter of which the following is a copy:

Boston, Feb. 1, 1789.

JOSEPH WARD, Esq.

Dear Sir: This morning (according to the laws of man), I have entered on the theatre of action for myself. For three years and five months I have been acting for you, which time I have spent the most agreeably of any part of my life. It is with pleasure I can look back and feel conscious to myself that I have at all times made your interest my own, and have acted according to the best of my judgment to increase the shining ball. Should it meet your approbation I shall feel peculiarly happy.

I am dear, sir, with every sentiment of esteem. Your most obedient and very humble servant,

NATHANIEL PRIME.

Mr. Prime at once established himself in business in Wall street, New York City, where he acquired a large fortune and became a distinguished financier and one of the most prominent men of the city. He was always highly respected by his former employer and his family, and they had many business transactions in later years. The descendants of Nathaniel Prime have always maintained the family prestige and are among the most highly respected residents of New York City.

Nathaniel Prime, always, during his life, kept up a correspondence with his Hammond relatives and evinced a friendly interest in their affairs, and many old letters bearing his signature are among the treasured papers of the descendants of his nephew Josiah Prime Hammond. A very neat and attractive genealogy of his descendants, in pamphlet form, printed for private circulation, was compiled a few years ago by Temple Prime, Esq., to whom the writer is indebted for many of his records of this family. The double connection between this family and the Hammond family makes it of especial interest to the many descendants.

She was of the White family that settled in Mendon, Mass., at an early period.

John came to Gilsum with his father when he was about ten years of age and lived in Hammond Hollow until his death. He was a young man of brilliant intellect and began teaching at a very early age.

He built his house in Gilsum in 1796, where he resided until his death. This house was still standing in 1900. He was a man of large mind, broad and liberal in his opinions, always ready to examine, weigh and measure every idea that presented itself to his mind. He was a noted school teacher for many years and also taught singing school. Having a good common school education he was regularly called upon to fill some office within the gift of the people. He often served the town as moderator, was selectman fourteen years and justice of the peace many years. He was county coroner in 1805, and was three times elected to the N. H. House of Representatives. He wrote fluently both in prose and poetry and many of his articles were published.

The following satirical poem, characteristic of the man, was written at an early day and the original in his own handwriting is in the possession of the author of this article, who also has many other papers written by the same hand, some of which were published in the newspapers of the time.

THE GULL TRAP.

(WRITTEN BY JOHN HAMMOND.)

In one of Cheshire's goodly towns,
 Where orthodoxy stiff abounds,
 And folks have charity refined,
 Not of that good old-fashioned kind
 Which should, in sooth, begin at home,
 As strangely argued by some.

Nigh to the sanctuary where
 People of every sect repair
 On days devoted to the Lord
 To sing, give thanks, and hear the word,
 A tavern stands, where travelers call
 For "straw and provender," and all
 Refreshments tending to revive
 And keep themselves and beasts alive.

There, as I stopped not long ago,
 Whether to take a glass or no
 Of whiskey, brandy, rum or gin
 It matters not, but soon I read
 From faces long and what was said
 That pious folks, in sooth, met there,
 Who feigned a deal of Christian care—
 Much to their credit be it known—
 For heathen children not their own.

Good souls : and that the world might see
 Their works of love and charity
 Displayed as public as they could,
 A box they made, which yawning stood
 Within the aforesaid tavern, whither
 These folks most often met together—
 A "gull trap" called by some howe'er
 No matter what the name, or where
 It stood. 'Twas ample to receive
 What things these people chose to give.

How many mittens, shirts, and socks ;
 Coats, vestings, pantaloons, and frocks ;
 Shoes, boots, and other presents rare,
 With gowns for lady squaws to wear,
 Were here deposited ! and some,
 As poor as church mice, faith will come
 With aprons stuffed with goodly things,
 Pure missionary offerings,
 And safely lodge them in the box
 Because the deed is orthodox !

And is it reader, thus decreed
 That country folks must clothe and feed
 Those savage children far away,
 And tell their own go naked? Say?
 Say, where in the Scripture is't we find
 Commands thus lavish to be kind
 To foreign people, while our own
 For bread and clothing freeze and groan?
 The book expressly says that one
 Who does not amply for his own
 Provide is worse, oh sad to tell,
 Is worse than what? An Infidel.

Would it not better be for some
 To keep their charity at home?
 Or use it oftener for the good
 Of sufferers in their neighborhood?
 Nay, priestcraft sly has other ways
 To show their hearers now-a-days
 To serve the Lord than doing good
 To one another as they should—
 "Stint yourself and cheat your neighbor
 To pay for priests' pernicious labor."

Notwithstanding his apparent lack of orthodoxy and frequent sarcastic comments on the customs of those who were more strictly orthodox in their opinions, John Hammond was very popular with a large majority of the people. He was honorable, upright and just in all his dealings, kind hearted, generous and charitable to a fault, and while his wit probably cut deeply into the vanity of some of the most rigidly orthodox people he was generally forgiven, and highly respected for his many virtues, while his superior education and great business ability gave him a foremost place in civil affairs.

He and his sister Martha were married on the same day at their father's house, the affair being very elaborate for the time and the number of guests large. He served the town as moderator many years, was town agent in 1824, town clerk fifteen years, selectman many years, tythingman and school committee several years and was elected to the New Hampshire House of Representatives in 1830. He suffered from paralysis during the last few years of his life and was unable to move about freely. During this time he read much and wrote some, commenting freely on all that he read. He devoted considerable time to a careful reading of the Bible. Considerable of his manuscript is still in existence and in the possession of his great grandson. He was not orthodox in his religious views and was a close friend of Abner Kneeland, whose religious opinions he shared. He was not aggressive, having great respect for the rights and feelings of others, and this probably saved him in a great measure from the malice of the bigoted and narrow-minded. Before the abolition of church rates in New England a widow with a family of small children lived in Gilsum who could not raise the money to pay her church rates. Her only cow, the chief means of support for herself and family, was seized and sold to satisfy the claim. Josiah Hammond bid off the cow and

told the widow to drive her home and keep her until he called for her. He never called for the cow and the widow continued in peaceable possession as she could not be seized again on account of the ownership being vested in 'Squire Hammond. He was a thrifty farmer and a progressive citizen until bodily infirmities confined him to the house. Like nearly every other member of the Gilsum branch of the family, he was a very large, powerful man, weighing over 200 pounds.

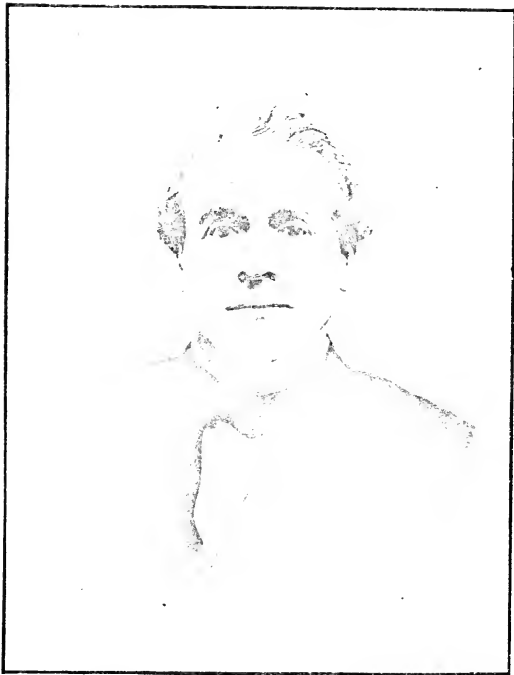
His wife, Mehitabel Bill, was a lineal descendant of John and Anne (Mountford) Bill, of Much Wenlock, Shropshire, England, whose only son, John, came to America as early as 1635 and settled at Ipswich, Mass., removing later to New London, Conn. Her father, Ebenezer Bill, was born in Hebron, Conn., Jan. 19, 1750-1, and after his marriage removed to Gilsum, N. H. He was a Revolutionary soldier in Capt. Elisha Mack's Co., Col. Ashley's Regt., (6th N. H.) and one of the most prominent men in the early history of the town. She was well educated for the time and a very intelligent woman. It is my intention to make your mother a visit in the course of two or three years, in that case shall certainly go as far as Montreal.

After serving out his apprenticeship with Mr. Sanford, in Montreal, Joshua went to Norwich, Conn., where he worked at his trade of a hatter and met and married his wife. Montreal about 1810, and was admitted to Union Lodge, No. 8, F. & A. M., in Montreal, July 16, 1812.

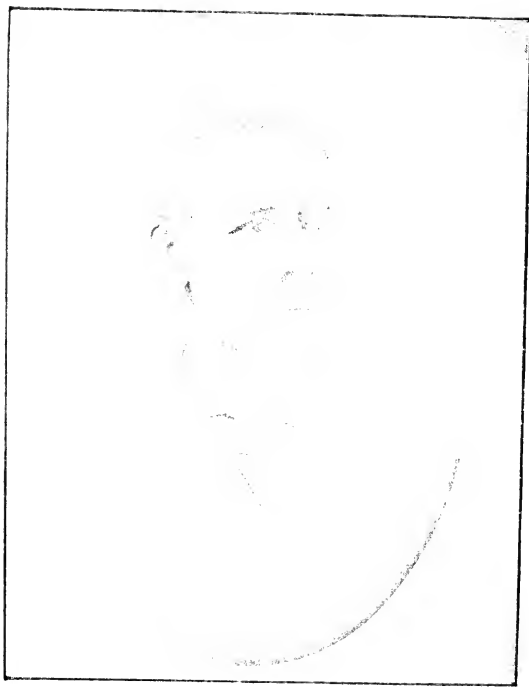

In 1874 he celebrated his golden wedding and his fellow citizens presented him with a beautiful and expensive gold headed cane. His neighbors and townsmen will long remember his kind, benevolent face and his cheery voice and hearty laugh.

To him the author of this work owes the respect for, and love of the family name, that has led him to persevere for more than ten years in the collection of material for a family memorial.

Doctor Hammond was one of the most prominent men of his native town and no one has received more attention in the "History of Gilsum" than is given to his life. The following extract from that volume, page 182, gives a brief and concise account of his life and the esteem in which he was held: "George Washington Hammond was one of Gilsum's most distinguished citizens. A long and dangerous sickness from disease of the heart having rendered him in early life, unable to endure the severe labor of the farm, he determined to fit himself for the medical profession. Unable to meet the expense of a collegiate course, which he much desired, he attended Alstead Academy a few terms, teaching district schools in the winter to obtain the necessary funds. He then entered Dartmouth Medical College where he graduated with more than average honor, August 21, 1824. Prof. R. D. Mussey, one of his instructors, secured him the offer of an excellent position with flattering recommendations. But

not having the funds to purchase the Medical Library that he needed for the place, he felt obliged to decline the favorable opportunity. He began the practice of his profession in Richmond, where he became acquainted with the family of Josiah Rawson, Esq., whose eldest daughter he married. Removing from Richmond, he settled at Proctorsville, Vt. At the urgent desire of his parents he returned to Gilsum in February, 1830, where he engaged in the practice of his profession for thirty-six years. In February, 1866, he removed, with all his family, to Stockbridge, Madison County, N. Y., where he died at the age of 70 years.

“He had a mind of more than common activity and his life was spent in study. In his chosen profession he deservedly occupied a high position for his scientific attainments, but this did not engross his entire attention. He had a taste for literary labors and wrote with beauty and force. He wrote many articles for the press, thereby wielding a much greater influence in political and temperance reforms of the day than was generally known at home. He was one of the leaders in the Washingtonian temperance movement in this vicinity, and frequently lectured with good success in this cause. In lyceums and debating societies he was one of the most active and useful members, both with tongue and pen. Historical matters connected with the town especially interested him. (Appendix, G. Hist. of Gilsum.) He was interested in education, using his influence in behalf of the improvement and enlargement of school privileges for the young. He served the town as Superintending School Committee five years. He was one of the founders and most efficient supporters of the Universalist Library. He was always an able and conscientious advocate of equal rights to all of whatever color or creed. He was of the firm belief that it is the prerogative of the *Eternal* alone to judge man's motives and spiritual conduct and that one man was better than another, only in so far as he behaved better.

“He inherited from his father one of the best farms in Gilsum and few professional men take as deep interest in

agriculture as he did, or practice farming with better success. He was chosen to represent the town in the Constitutional Convention of 1850. He served the district as State Senator in 1855 and 1856 and was Justice of the Peace for many years. Pleasant in his intercourse, genial in his manners, he left many warm friends to mourn his death." He was a very large, powerful man, standing over six feet in height and his usual weight being over 250 pounds, at one time he weighed over 300 pounds. It is recorded that at one time seventeen Hammonds of Gilsum averaged over 200 pounds, he being the heaviest and John Hammond, who weighed 175 pounds, being the lightest.

Diansa Rawson, his wife, was a descendent of some of the oldest and best puritan and pilgrim families of New England. Her father, Josiah Rawson, was a lineal descendant of Edward Rawson, Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, under Governor Endicott. Edward Rawson, son of Edward and Margaret (Wilson) Rawson, of London, England, came to America in 1636 and settled at Newbury, Mass. His mother, Margaret Wilson, was a sister of Rev. John Wilson, the first minister of Boston. He married Rachel Perne, daughter of Thomas Perne, of Newbury, Mass. He was one of the most influential men in the early history of the colony and was so bitter in his persecution of the Quakers that Whittier has immortalized his fame in his "Cassandra Southwick." The softening influence of time and the broadening and liberalizing of the mind under the benign rule of liberty and equality work wonders and a few generations later one of his descendants was united in marriage with a lineal descendant of one of the victims of his persecution and the family of the tyrannical puritan and the non-resisting Quaker live in peace and harmony.

His son, William² Rawson, born May 21, 1651, married Anna Glover, daughter of Nathaniel and Mary (Smith) Glover, of Dorchester, Mass. Mary Smith, wife of Nathaniel Glover, was the daughter of Quartermaster John Smith, of Dorchester, Mass., by his first wife, Mary Ryder, born in

Toxteth Park, Lancashire, England. Quartermaster Smith was a freeman in Dorchester in 1633, and filled many of the civil offices in the colony. He had acquired military experience under DeVere in the Netherlands before coming to New England and took an active part in the military operations of the colony. He was with Capt. John Mason in the Pequot war. After the death of Lieutenant Glover she married, March 16, 1660, Gov. Thomas Hinckley, of Barnstable, Mass.

Their son, David³ Rawson, born in Braintree, Mass., Dec. 13, 1683, married Mary Gulliver, daughter of Lieut. Jonathan and Mary (Robinson) Gulliver, of Milton, Mass. Mary Robinson, wife of Lieutenant Gulliver, was the daughter of Samuel and Mary (Baker) Robinson, of Dorchester, and granddaughter of William Robinson and Richard Baker, two of the early settlers of that town. Their son, Josiah⁴ Rawson, was born in Braintree, Mass., Jan. 31, 1727, and married, Aug. 28, 1750, Hannah Bass, daughter of John and Hannah (Neale) Bass. John Bass, her father, was the son of John and Abigail (Adams) Bass, the grandson of John and Ruth (Alden) Bass, of Braintree, Mass. Ruth Alden, his grandmother, was the daughter of Hon. John and Priscilla (Mullins) Alden, of the "Mayflower." His grandfather was the son of Deacon Samuel Bass, one of the first settlers of Braintree. His mother, Abigail Adams, was the daughter of Joseph and Abigail (Baxter) Adams, of Braintree, and granddaughter of Henry Adams, one of the first settlers of that town. These were also the progenitors of President John Adams. Hannah Neale, his wife, was the daughter of Benjamin and Lydia (Paine) Neale, of Braintree, Mass.

Their son, Josiah⁵ Rawson, was born in 1751. He married Elizabeth Barrows, daughter of Ebenezer and Experience (Ormsbee) Barrows, of Cumberland, R. I., and granddaughter of Ebenezer and Elizabeth Barrows, of Attleboro, Mass. They settled in Warwick, Mass., where their son, Josiah⁶ Rawson was born May 22, 1780. While a young man he went to Richmond, N. H., and was there employed in the store kept by Jedediah Buffum, whose grand-daughter became his wife.

Diansa (Rawson) Hammond's mother was of little less distinguished ancestry. Robert Buffum and his wife, Tamosin (Thompson) Buffum, came from Yorkshire, England, to Salem, in the ship "Mary and John," in 1630. They settled at Salem, Mass. His wife was a sister of the wife of Lawrence Southwick and she and her children were persecuted with the Southwicks in 1658. Robert Buffum himself does not appear to have undergone persecution so far as the records show and he may not have been a Quaker at that time. Their son, Caleb² Buffum, married Hannah Pope, daughter of Joseph Pope, who came to America with Robert Buffum. They had a son, Benjamin³ Buffum, born in Salem in 1686, who married Sarah Buxton, daughter of John (or Joseph) Buxton, and grand-daughter of Anthony and Elizabeth Buxton, of Salem, Mass. They removed to Smithfield, R. I., with many other Quaker families to escape persecution. Their son, Joseph⁴ Buffum, was born in Smithfield in 1717, and married Margaret Osborne. Their son, Jedediah⁵ Buffum, born in Smithfield, R. I., Aug. 17, 1737, married Sarah Taft, born in Uxbridge, Mass., Sept. 22, 1736, daughter of Mijamin and Sarah (Sweeting) Taft, and grand-daughter of Benjamin and Sarah (Thomas) Taft, of Mendon and Uxbridge, Mass. Her great-grandfather, Robert Taft, with wife, Sarah, was one of the early settlers of Braintree, Mass.

Jedediah Buffum and his wife were among the first settlers of Richmond, N. H., coming there from Smithfield, R. I., in 1763. He was one of the most prominent men in the early history of the town.

Their son, Robert⁵ Buffum, born in Richmond, March 10, 1765, married June 28, 1787, Lucy Whipple, daughter of Capt. Daniel and Amy (Comstock) Whipple, born Jan. 5, 1770. Her father, Capt. Dan.⁵ Whipple, was the son of Nathaniel⁴ and Bethiah (Slack) Whipple, of Smithfield, R. I., son of Israel³ and Mary (Wilmarth) Whipple, of Providence, R. I., son of David² and Hannah (Tower) Whipple, of Hingham, Mass., son of John and Sarah Whipple, who were among the earliest settlers of Dorchester, Mass. His wife, Amy Comstock, was

the daughter of Azariah and Zeruah (Sprague) Comstock, who removed from Smithfield, R. I., to Richmond, N. H., in 1763.

Josiah Rawson and Sarah Buffum were married in Winchester, N. H., Jan. 14, 1805, and lived in Richmond until after the marriage of their eldest daughter to Doctor Hammond. They then removed to Richmond and Sutton, Vt., where Josiah was elected to the Vermont Legislature. After living a few years in Vermont they removed to what is now the extreme southern limit of the city of Oneida, N. Y., then known as Lenox, N. Y., where he carried on the business of a merchant until his death. They were eventually followed by all of their children, Doctor Hammond and his wife being the last to emigrate to this section in 1866.

She was a lady of quiet and retiring disposition, very refined and with high ideals, yet without ostentation or undue pride. A kind, loving wife and mother and one who was ever held in high esteem by all who knew her. She died at the home of her only son in Stockbridge, N. Y., May 20, 1879.

Otis G. Hammond was a farmer. He built his house in Hammond Hollow, Gilsum, N. H., in 1829. The following extract from Hayward's "Hist. of Gilsum," p. 209, gives a fair account of his life :

"He was a successful school teacher for many years, and served as Superintending School Committee. He was one of the first to join the Washingtonian movement and was an earnest worker in the cause, being quite successful as a temperance lecturer in this and neighboring towns. He served the town as moderator and selectman and was commissioned justice of the peace."

The following beautiful tribute to his memory was written by his brother, Dr. George W. Hammond :

Brother, thou'rt sleeping in thy grave !
The world to thee is hushed !
We struggled hard thy life to save,
But all our hopes were crushed ;
Death seized thee in the noon of life,
The brittle thread did sever ;
The anguish of that fearful strife ;
I shall forget it never.

Brother, most we miss thee here,
In this thy natal place ;
Here, where thy presence used to cheer
We miss thy cheerful face ;
The temperance band we used to meet,
Will miss thee too forever,
No more thy presence will they greet,
They will forget thee never.

Brother, father sleeps by thee,

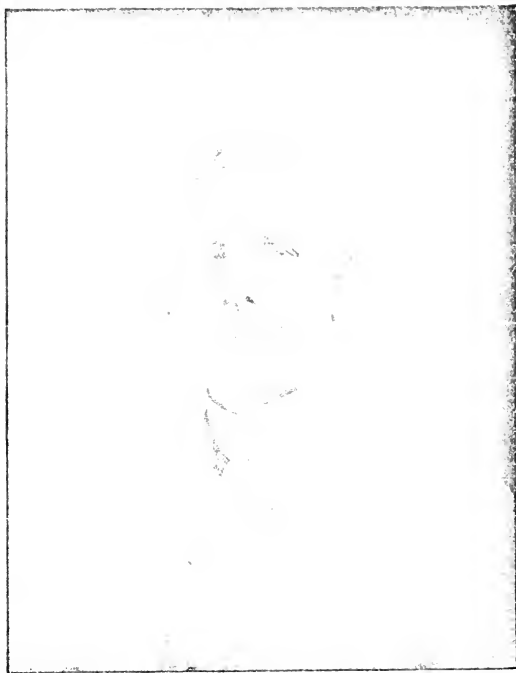

He was the author and compiler of a small Hammond Genealogy of the Swanzey branch of the family, published in 1890, and also of a "Genealogy of the Richardson Family," which he published a few years later. He was also one of the most active citizens in collecting the material for the "History of Swanzey," by Col. Benjamin Read, and was one of the publication committee. To him is due the credit for a large part of the genealogical work on the volume.

He was one of nature's noble men, a true gentleman, far above the sordid level of humanity, both intellectually and morally.

The following editorial from the N. H. Sentinel, (Keene, N. H.) of Sept. 18, 1891, gives a very fair sketch of his life:

DEATH OF JOSEPH HAMMOND.

Joseph Hammond, one of Swanzey's oldest and best known citizens, and one of the oldest persons in Cheshire county, died at his home in West Swanzey, Wednesday night, at the age of 92 years and 5 months. He had been in very good health until about a week or ten days before, when he was taken ill with dysentery and other complications which proved fatal, owing probably to his advanced years. Only two or three weeks ago Mr. Hammond was in Keene one day and missed the train for West Swanzey. He then walked home, a distance of about six miles.

Mr. Hammond was a descendant of Nathaniel Hammond, who came from Watertown, Mass., to Swanzey in 1740. Nathaniel was quite conspicuous in the public life of the town, erecting the first house there and being one of its earliest settlers. He had two sons, Joseph and Benjamin. The deceased was one of Joseph's nine children, there being four sons and five daughters. He was born April 5, 1809, and after attending the common schools and Chesterfield Academy he taught school in Swanzey and else-

where for twenty terms. As a young man he was unusually vigorous and muscular, and it is narrated that at Hinsdale Ferry, in 1832, he lifted a box of steel weighing 722 pounds in the presence of several men. His principal business after he finished teaching was that of a lumber measurer and dealer and general surveyor. The latter work he kept up until very recently. Within a few years he sold his compass, that he had made in Keene in 1850, to a citizen of this town, and afterwards obtained the loan of it, saying he was lonesome without it and often had occasion to use it. He was allowed to retain the compass thereafter.

In 1834 he was captain of the Swanzey rifle company. He was selectman three years and had been town clerk, treasurer, superintending school committee, representative in 1850 and 51, postmaster under Lincoln and a justice of the peace since 1843. He was clerk of the Baptist church thirty-eight years and treasurer of the Dublin Baptist association fifteen years. He was in the grocery business from 1850 to 1863, and was at one time a member of the firm of Nims, Gates & Hammond, of Keene.

Mr. Hammond's first wife was Luthera S. Rogers, by whom he had two daughters, Sophia J. and Maria E. She died April 24, 1860. His second wife was Ardelia C. Randall, who died Feb. 11, 1884. His third wife was Marion E. Farmer, who survives him, together with his daughters, Mrs. Martin Mason, of West Swanzey, (Sophia J.) and Mrs. Eugene M. Keyes, of Keene, (Maria E.)

The funeral was held at the Baptist church Friday afternoon. The services were conducted by Rev. Thomas Cain, of Windsor, Vt., a former pastor, assisted by Rev. Robert Bennett, pastor of the local church. The singing was by a male quartette and the interment was in the old cemetery. Mr. Hammond's funeral took place on the sixty-first anniversary of his becoming a member of the Baptist church.

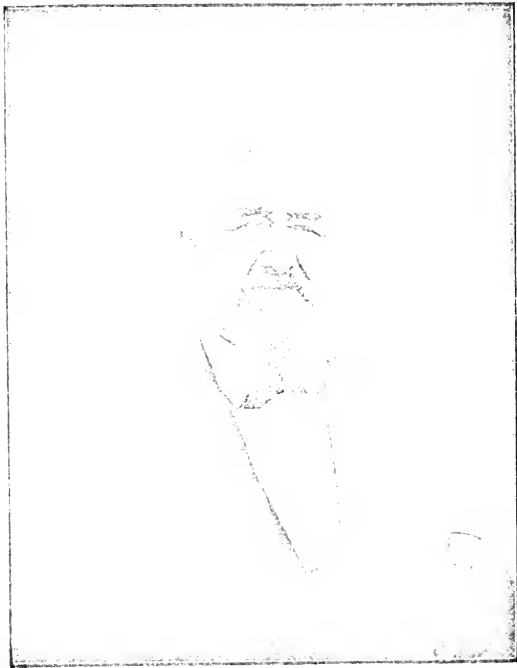

He then commenced teaching while still quite young. He first taught at Langdon, N. H., and later in Keene, N. H. He was very successful as a teacher but preferred a mercantile life. He went into business with his uncle, Stephen Day, Jr., at Perkinsville, Vt., where he remained about three years. In 1853 he removed to Chicago, Ill., where he again engaged in mercantile pursuits for some years. In 1862 he removed to Omega, Ill., where he remained until a short time prior to his death.

He served as supervisor some years and in 1878 was elected a member of the Illinois State Legislature where he served with distinction. He was an able and very successful man

July 28, 1892, dau. of George and Betsey (Stam) Snell, of Stockbridge, N. Y. Her grandfather, Joseph P. Snell, removed from the town of Manheim, Herkimer County, N. Y., to Stockbridge, about 1822; a lineal descendant of Johan Jost Snell, who came from Germany to America in 1710. Three of Mrs. Hammond's great grandfathers were in the battle of Oriskany in the Revolutionary war. Of these Peter Snell, the father of Joseph P. Snell, was wounded in battle. John Frederick Snell, the father of Mary Elizabeth Snell, the wife of Joseph P. Snell, was killed, and George Stam escaped uninjured. All of these with many others of their kinsmen were in Capt. Jacob Klock's Co. under General Herkimer.

George Hammond finished his education at Mt. Cesar Seminary in Swansey, N. H. He took an active part with his father in the early temperance movements of this locality and was during his whole life a total abstainer from all intoxicants and tobacco. He wrote largely for the agricultural press and was for many years a valued correspondent of the "Cultivator and Country Gentleman" and also of the "Mirror and Farmer." He also wrote much on temperance subjects, but never took an active part in politics, although he was a life-long Republican. He held the office of justice of the peace in his native town for about ten years and held some minor offices in the town where he lived the last years of his life, but they were always unsought as he declined to attend party caucuses or to take any active part in partisan politics. He was very reserved in his intercourse with others and always preferred to write rather than talk. He was a great reader upon all subjects of interest and was a great thinker. He was never a church member but held advanced opinions on matters of religion. On account of his excellent education and fine penmanship he was frequently called upon to write

the wills and other legal papers of his neighbors and to make out tax lists, &c., in the locality. He was much interested in agricultural pursuits and in breeding fine blooded sheep, cattle and horses during his entire life but suffered the loss of the most of his property during the financial panic of 1873 to 1879. His wife, Almira Snell was quite well educated and a very intelligent woman. The following obituary notice from the "Oneida Union" of August 3, 1892, shows something of the esteem in which she was held by her neighbors:

"Mrs. Almira S. Hammond, wife of George Hammond, of Stockbridge, died at her home on Thursday last. She had suffered from cancer nearly three years when it was removed about a year ago, but her blood had become so poisoned by it that the wound never entirely healed and gradually undermined her health until death released her from her sufferings. Mrs. Hammond was the daughter of George and Betsey Snell and was born in Stockbridge Aug. 30, 1836. In 1857 she married and removed to her husband's home in Gilsun, N. H., where she lived until 1866 when in company with Mr. Hammond's father, the late Hon. Geo. W. Hammond, M. D., they removed to their present home in Stockbridge. She is survived by her husband, two brothers, Morey Snell, of Stockbridge, and Jay S. Snell, of Kenwood, and two sons, Fred S., of Oneida, and Edwin G., who resides at the old homestead. She was loved and respected by all who knew her and will be sadly missed by all the sick and afflicted in this vicinity. She was a kind friend to everyone in time of need and though barely able to do so, she kindly cared for her aged uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Stam, and did for them as if she were their own child for several years prior to her death. The funeral was held at her late home on Saturday last, Rev. F. W. Betts, pastor of the First Universalist church, of Syracuse, officiating. Mrs. Hammond was broad and liberal in her religious views, respecting the opinions of everyone and freely according to them the same rights that she claimed for herself. Though a terrible sufferer she never complained, but ever thought of the sufferings of those around her. She passed away at peace with all and with the consciousness of a life well spent. Her end was as peaceful and tranquil as sleep. The interment was at Stockbridge cemetery."

March 16, 1863, Martha Washington Kimball, b. Jan. 28, 1836, dau. of Benjamin and Olive (Price) Kimball, of East Concord, N. H. She is of the eighth generation from Richard Kimball, the emigrant and early settler of Ipswich, Mass. She resides on North State St. in Concord, N. H., and is an estimable lady, loved and highly respected by all who know her. She was a worthy helpmate, a wise counselor and faithful companion to the husband whose loss she mourns.

Isaac Ware Hammond was born at Gilsun, N. H., July 9, 1831. Here he spent his boyhood and acquired a common school education in the village schools, and afterward attended Mount Cesar Seminary in Swanzey and the old Marlow Academy. Not being inclined to the life of the farm he entered the employment of the Cheshire Cotton Mills at Jaffrey as bookkeeper and paymaster. Here he remained for a year and a half and then went to Keene, where he spent another term of equal length as salesman in the dry goods store of J. W. Briggs & Co. Feeling himself now qualified for a larger field he went to Boston where he found employment as salesman and bookkeeper in the dry goods establishment of Libby & Brothers, and was afterward occupied as an expert bookkeeper on private accounts. On account of poor health he was soon obliged to leave Boston and seek an inland location. He went to Northern New York and kept a general store at Rouses Point and Fort Covington until 1857, when he returned to his native state and resolved to try his fortunes at the Capitol. He remained in Concord until the breaking out of the war, being employed as a salesman by John P. Johnson, a prominent dealer in dry goods. The President's call for three months' men aroused his patriotic spirit and he enlisted under that call but was not mustered. A short time afterward he received from Col. Cross the appointment of Commissary Sergeant in the 5th regiment of infantry then being formed. He enlisted Sept. 25, 1861, and was mustered in Oct. 26, 1861, served his three year's term with this famous regiment and was mustered out Oct. 29, 1864.

The 5th New Hampshire was the fighting regiment of all the federal forces, as is proved by official figures. It bears the proud record of having lost more men killed and mortally wounded in action than any other regiment in the Union armies, heavy artillery excepted. Twenty-three engagements it passed through and the losses in action were 282, of whom 18 were officers, and 176 died from disease and other causes than wounds, making a total loss of 458 officers and men. William F. Fox, in his book "Regimental Losses in the Civil War," says:

"The one regiment in all the Union armies which sustained the greatest loss in battle during the American Civil War was the Fifth New Hampshire Infantry. [This statement does not include heavy artillery.] * * * It served in the first division, second corps. This division was commanded successfully by Generals Richardson, Hancock, Caldwell, Barlow and Miles, and any regiment that followed the fortunes of these men was sure to find plenty of bloody work cut out for it. The losses of the Fifth New Hampshire occurred entirely in aggressive, hard, stand up fighting; none of it happened in routes or through blunders. Its loss includes eighteen officers killed, a number far in excess of the usual proportion and indicates that the men were bravely led."

Mr. Hammond's only brother, Albert O. Hammond, was also in the service in the latter part of the war, and his patriotism cost him his life. He enlisted in Company M., Second Massachusetts Cavalry, and was mustered in Jan. 4, 1864, being a resident of Dedham, Mass. He was captured and sent to Andersonville prison, where he was so reduced by starvation that he died Sept. 12, 1864, shortly after being transferred to Savannah.

After the expiration of his three years of service, Mr. Hammond resided in East Concord for a short time, and in 1868 removed to Manchester, where he successfully carried on a small farm in the district known as Hallsville. His health was so undermined by malaria and other afflictions incident to army life in the south, that some such out-door life as this was deemed necessary. He also improved this time in learning the carpenter's trade. He returned to Concord in 1874, and followed his new occupation until disabled by a fall from

the roof of a building, from the effects of which he never fully recovered.

In 1877 he was appointed deputy secretary of state and continued in that office by successive re-appointment for ten years. In June, 1887, he was elected librarian of the New Hampshire Historical Society, and he served the society for three years or until he was obliged by failing health to resign. During this time he edited volume 9 of the collection of the society. In 1881 he was appointed editor of state papers, and during the remainder of his life he compiled and edited volumes 11 to 18 of the State Papers of New Hampshire, including the Revolutionary rolls, which comprised volumes 14, 15, 16 and 17. He was deputy U. S. marshal for taking the census of 1870, member of the New Hampshire constitutional convention of 1876, commander of the E. E. Sturtevant Post, No. 2, G. A. R., of Concord, secretary of the New Hampshire college of electors in 1884, vice-president of the Manufacturers' and Merchants' Insurance Co. He was a member of the New Hampshire Historical Society, and the New England Historic Genealogical Society, honorary member of the Maine Historical Society, and was elected a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science. Although not a man of college education, he received the degree of A. M. from Dartmouth College in 1883. He was a Mason, a member of Blazing Star lodge of Concord, and served as marshal of the lodge for several years. During his army service he was secretary of one of the "traveling" lodges then in existence in the field.

M., 2d Massachusetts Cavalry, and went to the front, was taken prisoner by Moseby's Guerrillas at Drainsville, Va., Feb. 22, 1864, was kept in Libby prison at Richmond a short time and then removed to the Andersonville prison pen where he suffered starvation and the most inhuman treatment until Sept. 9, 1864, when a mere skeleton, unable to stand, he was removed to Savannah, Ga., and laid upon the ground where he remained without food three days after his arrival. He died Sept. 12, 1864, aged 27 years and 11 months, a victim of the barbarism of slavery. "He gave his life that his country might live."
