PREFACE

The parent Eckhard family, our progenitors, lived in Germany. Three sons of the family, -John, Henry, and George, came to America more than one hundred years ago to improve their economic opportunities and in search of religious freedom. In their day the State Religion in Germany was Lutheran, and it was the only faith tolerated.

An introductory page provides information on this "first" family. The history of the three brothers and their descendants is recorded in Parts, I, II and III respectively. Part IV contains brief records of five daughters of the family who did not emigrate. In Part V are records of the immigrant members of the Pullman family, related by marriage to George, one of the three brothers.

In the lines of descent there are now many Eckhar(d)ts. They are widely scattered from Philadelphia and the Atlantic seaboard on the East, through the central and mountain states to Los Angeles and the Pacific on the West. Some retained the original spelling, Eckhard. Some added the letter "t". Some changed the letter "d" to "t".

An attempt was made to obtain the correct name and accurate information of every descendant. It was only through the cooperative efforts of interested relatives that an accurate and somewhat complete history of almost every family in line of descent has been made possible.


Diligent search was made for some "lost" family groups. A few were found and records provided. If in the future others are located, and if there are any corrections in present records to be made, it is suggested that the information be recorded and passed on to interested relatives.

To all relatives and kinsfolk sharing in the work of obtaining, recording and transmitting information we who were responsible for compiling and arranging the history and having it mimeographed express our deep gratitude and heartfelt thanks. We acknowledge our indebtedness in particular to Lillie McCormick, Clara Langlas, Mae Jacobs, Allie Haynes, Olive Eberth, Edith Militzer, Hazel Knight, Louis Eckhardt, and Mae Kaiser for their very generous assistance in compiling and forwarding much information of their own and other family groups. Their help and encouragement had much to do in completing the lineage records.

We are also deeply indebted to Margaret Muegenburg and Adolf Klein in Germany and to the parochial registrar of the "Pfarramt" in Grosszimmern for records of those members of the family who did not come to America. This established our progenitor relationship and helped clarify our lineage positions in the family history.

The ECKHARD FAMILY in Germany

The Parents - One hundred fifty years ago, a young couple, then in their first months of married life, lived in the village of Grosszimmern, Germany. The husband was JOHANNES ECKHARD (Dec. 6, 1770-Dec. 6, 1818). He was a son of J. Henrik (Ober-Kinzig) and Barbara (Wagner) Eckhard. Johannes was engaged in the weaving of hosiery.

Johannes was married on Oct. 13, 1801 to ELIZABETHA KATHARINA KREISEL (May 23, 1779-Dec. 10, 1840). She was a daughter of Johann (from Spachbruecken) and Dorothea (Goebel) Kreisel. The home village, still in existence, is near the city of Darmstadt in the Province of Hessen. The area is known as the Odenwald, a mountain region between the Main and Neckar rivers.

The Children - To Johannes and Elizabetha (Kreisel) Eckhard were born nine children, -four sons and five daughters. Three sons, -JOHN, HENRY and GEORGE, came to America. Their lineage records follow in Parts I, II and III, respectively. The daughters, -ELIZABETHA, DOROTHEA, MARIA, ANNA and BARBARA remained in Germany. Records available for them are provided in Part IV. Names and birthdates as recorded by the "Evangelisches Pfarramt" in Grosszimmern are as follows:

Part I

JOHN ECKHARDT and DESCENDANTS

(Son of Johannes and Elizabetha Eckhard)

John ECKHARDT (Johannes Eckhard, Germany) was born on August 2, 1805 in the village of Grosszimmern, near the city of Darmstadt, in the Province of Hessen, Germany. He was married to Caroline Fraley in the early eighteen-thirties. They lived in the village and their son, Henry, was born there.

In 1838 they came to America and settled in Germantown, near Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Here five sons were born: George; Charles; William; John Jr.; Francis.

In Germantown, John was engaged in the weaver's trade which he had learned in Germany. He designed and wove for the first time a particular type of loosely woven scarf for women as a shawl over their heads. This was known as a "nubia".

Three sons of the family were Civil War Veterans: George, Charles and William. Two were wheelwrights and one was a shoemaker. One learned the silver plating trade by an old fashioned method of fastening a thin plate of silver to some metal.

I. HENRY ECKHARDT

(Son of John and Caroline Eckhardt)

ECKHARDT, Henry (1836-1917). At age two he came with his parents to Germantown, Pa. He was married to Bridget ____?. He was a shoemaker and leather worker by trade. Toward the end of his life he became quite feeble. Then Charles Eckhart, a brother, gave \$500 to the "Little Sisters of the Poor", a Catholic home in Germantown, to take care of him. Here, at the age of 81, he died. The family Bible in the possession of a granddaughter, Hannah Spitz, contains the names and birthdates of five children.

1. ECKHARDT, Margaret, b. Dec. 24, 1859. Some relatives believe she died in infancy.

3. ECKHARDT, George, b. Nov. 4, 1862. He was a shoemaker by trade. He was married in Philadelphia to Katherine Flannigan. They had five children: (1) Harry; (2) William; (3) Katherine RENO; (4) John; (5) Margaret CARBERRY. All children grew to maturity. Two daughters and one son were married. Very little is known of them. The family lived on D Street in Philadelphia between Clearfield and Indiana Street.

(1) ECKHARDT, Harry (deceased). No information is available.

(2) ECKHARDT, William. No information is available.

(3) RENO, Katherine (Eckhardt). She was married. Her husband's name was Reno. They had two children. They lived in Camden, N.J. This is all the information available.

(4) ECKHARDT, John (deceased). No information is available.

(5) CARBERRY, Margaret (Eckhardt) (deceased before the age of 20). She was married. Her husband's name was Carberry. This is all the information available.

4. ECKHARDT, Henry, Jr. (July 16, 1866-Jan. 3, 1903). He was m. in Philadelphia to Catherine Bonner (June 9, 1871-July 20, 1924). They lived in Philadelphia where Henry was a teamster.

Henry and Catherine (Bonner) Eckhardt had thirteen children. Eight of these were (3) Hannah SPITZ; (4) Emma CAMERON; (6) Katherine FLYNN; (9) Louis; (10) Henry II; (11) Lillian YEAGER; (12) Ida McGinty; (13) Charles. Missing numbers in this list are for children whose birthdates are not known and who died in infancy. These were Minnie, the oldest; Thomas (?); Margaret; Henry I; one other child.

(3) SPITZ, Hannah (Eckhardt), b. May 26, 1890 in Philadelphia. She was m. on Nov. 26, 1919 to John Spitz, b. July 10, 1895. They had no children. Hannah was divorced. She owns and operates a tap room in Masonville, N.J. Her sister, Lillian, lives with her. Home: Masonville Road, Burlington Co., Masonville, N.J.

(4) CAMERON, Emma (Eckhardt), b. Oct. 30, 1891 in Philadelphia. She was m. on April 30, 1909 to Robert Cameron, b. in 1887 in Ireland, son of Samuel and Sara Cameron. Robert was a shoer of horses by trade. He is now a bridge tender for Burlington Co., N.J. They have a son, Samuel. Home: R.F.D. Rt. 2, Moorestown, New Jersey.

CAMERON, Samuel Malcom, b. April 15, 1910 in Philadelphia. He was m. (1) to Edith Hoffman. They had two children: Samuel; Edith. Both were born in New Jersey. In 1940 Samuel was divorced. He was m. (2) in 1941 to Margaret Pine. He worked at plumbing and stocking weaving, but now he is owner and operator of Sam's Tavern at his home address. Home: 1903 South 6th Street, Camden, N.J.

CAMERON, Samuel Malcom, Jr., b. Dec. 12, 1937.

CAMERON, Edith C., b. Dec. 19, 1939.

(6) FLYNN, Katherine Ann (Eckhardt), b. July 19, 1894 in Philadelphia. Educ.: Grad. City Schools, 12th grade. She was m. on Dec. 24, 1920 to Alexander Joseph Flynn (Sept. 1, 1830-Mar. 15, 1949), son of Michael and Mary Flynn. Alexander was a cabinet maker. In World War I he was wounded in combat. He died in the U.S. Naval Hospital in Philadelphia. They had a son, Thomas. Katherine lives on Masonville Road, Centerton, Masonville, New Jersey.

FLYNN, Thomas (April 4, 1924-Apr. 15, 1924 in Camden, N.J.).

(9) ECKHARDT, Louis Henry, b. Apr. 3, 1897 in Philadelphia. He was m. on June 17, 1925 to Freda Stauss, b. Apr. 17, 1899. Louis is a mechanic. He has worked for the Philadelphia Transit Co. since 1931. They have four children: Florence BOYLE; Louis; Joseph; Robert. Home: 2706 W. Seltzer St., Philadelphia 32, Pa.

BOYLE, Florence Theresa (Eckhardt), b. July 5, 1928. She was m. on June 12, 1943 to Edwin Boyle, b. Oct. 22, 1921. Edwin is a truck

driver for an oil company. They have three daughters: Florence; Kathleen; Mary. Home: 2917 McKinley St., Philadelphia, Pa.

ECKHARDT, Joseph Edward, b. Nov. 13, 1932. He is a Grad. of the N.E. Catholic High School. He works on sleds and farm tools at S.L. Allen & Co., Inc., 5th St. and Glenwood Ave., Philadelphia.

ECKHARDT, Robert Thomas, b. Jan. 6, 1934. He is a Junior in the N.E. Catholic High School.

(11) YEAGER, Lillian Katherine (Eckhardt), b. Mar. 21, 1900. She was m. (1) on Sept. 19, 1923 to Eugene Peter Dubreuil (1887 in Germany-1936). He was a shoemaker in Philadelphia. They had a son, Eugene. Lillian was m. (2) on Jan. 12, 1937 to Andrew Yeager, b. in 1887 in Germany. Andrew is a machinist at public service. They have no children. Home: Masonville Road, Masonville, New Jersey, with Lillian's sister, Hannah Spitz.

DUBREUIL, Eugene Peter, Jr., b. Feb. 7, 1925 in Masonville, N.J. Educ.: Moorestown High School, 2½ yrs. In World War II he served as Seaman 1st Class, U.S. Navy, more than 3 yrs. He was m. on Nov. 26, 1949 to Eleanor Jean Williams, b. Nov. 4, 1928. Eugene is an automobile mechanic. They have a daughter, Christina. Home: R.F.D., Olt Road and S. 41st St., Marlton, New Jersey.

DUBREUIL, Christina, b. Feb. 9, 1950.

(12) McGINTY, Ida Mae Virginia (Eckhardt), b. Apr. 26, 1901 in Philadelphia. She was m. on Sept. 5, 1917 to James C. McGinty, b. Sept. 30, 1897, son of James and Jessie McGinty. James is a truck driver. They have two children: Ida May BURKE; James. Both were born in Philadelphia. Home: 239 South Maple Ave., Maple Shade, N.J.

BURKE, Ida May (McGinty), b. June 30, 1919 in Philadelphia. She is a Grad. of Moorestown High School, 1937. She was m. on June 24, 1939 to George Lee Burke, b. Aug. 30, 1910. George is a machinist by trade. He worked 17 yrs. for the New York Shipbuilding Corp., Camden, N.J. For the past 5 yrs. he has been employed by George W. Swift & Co., Bordentown, N.J., mfrs. of paper making machinery. They have three

daughters: Elaine; Brenda; Shirley. Home: 1634 North 45th St., Pennshanken, New Jersey.

McGINTY, James C., Jr., (Feb. 21, 1922- 1945). He was a Grad. of Moorestown High School, 1941. He was m. on July 8, 1944 to Gertrude V. Mansfield. They had no children. In World War II, James was a Lt. in the Air Force. On June 29, 1945, he was reported as missing in action over Burma.

(13) ECKHARDT, Charles (April 1903-July 1903). He was a namesake of Charles Eckhart, Auburn, Ind.

5. ECKHARDT, John Mickel, b. Feb. 22, 1869. He was a son of Henry and Bridget Eckhardt. A relative believes he died when he was very young. No other information is available.

II. GEORGE ECKHARDT

(Son of John and Caroline Eckhardt)

ECKHARDT, George, (1839?-). He was married. His wife, Mary, was crippled. George was a Veteran of the Civil War (Coat of Arms picture). He died quite young. They had three children: George; Mary; Charlotte. All three grew to maturity and all remained single. All are deceased. This is all the information available.

III. CHARLES ECKHART

(Son of John and Caroline Eckhardt)

ECKHART, Charles (Feb. 24, 1841 in Germantown Pa.-Sept. 30, 1915 in Auburn, Ind.) At age eight he began to help his father spool yarn.

He had a year and a half of schooling. At 16 he was apprenticed to a wheelwright. At 19 he set up a repair shop at Hilltown, Bucks Co., Pa. In 1860 he enlisted in the 104th Regiment of Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry in the Union Army and served until May 20, 1863 when he was discharged because of heart trouble. At that time he ranked as 1st Sgt. He re-enlisted later and remained in the service until six months after the Civil War. His signature, Eckhart, when he enlisted was continued for pensions after the war.

After his discharge from the Army, Charles came to Indiana to visit his uncle, George Eckhardt. He worked at his trade a short time in the Studebaker Carriage Works. Here he met and was m. on Oct. 30, 1866 to Barbara Ellen Ashleman (Nov. 13, 1836-Sept. 10, 1903), dau. of John Ulery and Mary (Everhart) Ashleman from Berne, Switzerland. (John helped to lay out the townsite of Auburn in 1864).

Charles and Barbara moved to Pennsylvania in 1867 where their four children were born: Frank in Chester Co. and Anna, Morris and William in Montgomery Co., all not far from Phoenixville.

In 1873, the family moved back to Indiana in a brick house on a five acre tract in Auburn, where Charles established the Eckhart Carriage Co. It supplied the wholesale trade for a complete line of buggies and surries. (He also built red wheelbarrows for his namesakes. One compiler of these records was one of them-C.M.R.). Charles retired in 1893, leaving the business in the hands of his sons.

On Oct. 18, 1904, Charles m. (2) Martha A. Hoffman (1855-1937), dau. of Rev. J.H. and Margaret Hoffman. Charles was an ardent prohibitionist and ran for Governor of Indiana on the Prohibition Party ticket. He was a Lutheran and gave one-tenth of his earnings to the church. Eckhart Hall of Advent Christian Coll., Aurora, Ill. was named in recognition of his gifts to that institution. He gave to the city of Auburn, the Eckhart Public Library and a City Park. With his son, Frank, he gave a completely equipped Y.M.C.A. building to his home city.

(Charles has been described as a "humble, earnest, honest-workman, soldier, manufacturer, public spirited citizen, philanthropist, Christian husband, father and friend to everybody"- Auburn Weekly Bee, Oct. 6, 1915).

Four children of Charles and Barbara Eckhart

1. Frank; 2. Anna SHUGERS; 3. Morris; 4. William.

1. ECKHART, Frank Everhart, b. Oct. 9, 1867. At age 16 he was made foreman of his father's paint shop. He was m. (1) in June, 1896 to Jessie Boland (Aug. 22, 1876-Mar. 28, 1898). To them was born a son, (1) George Boland.

Upon the retirement of his father, Frank assumed active management of the Eckhart Carriage Co. In 1902 he formed the Auburn Automobile Co. as a family enterprise. This grew into a large and profitable business through the years.

In 1903 Frank m. (2) Grace Leiter, b. June 30, 1867, dau. of Eli and Mary Leiter. They have two daughters: (2) Mary Ellen; (3) Josephine LEONARD.

In 1917 Frank moved to Los Angeles, Calif. There he has served as a trustee of the Orthopedic Hospital for many years, as Pres. of the Los Angeles Y.M.C.A. for 12 years, and as a trustee of the University of Southern Calif., being its Vice-pres. part of the time. He has given liberly to charity and has been active in the Methodist Church. His home is at 719 North Camden Drive, Beverly Hills, Calif.

(1) ECKHART, George Boland, b. Oct. 11, 1897 in Auburn, Ind. He was m. on Sept. 27, 1929 to Agnes Matilda Carmichael, b. June 12, 1901. They were divorced in 1935. They had no children. George attended De-Pauw Univ., Greencastle, Ind. He graduated from Stanford Univ., Palo Alto, California. He served in the U.S. Navy in World War I and in the U.S. Air Force in World War II. For several years he was an automobile dealer in Calif. Since 1942 he has been employed as a clerk with the Southern Pacific R.R. in Tucson, Ariz. Listed in The Handbook of Am. Genealogy, Vol. V. Address: Post Box 5315, Tucson, Ariz.

(2) ECKHART, Mary Ellen, b. May 6, 1904. She lives at home with parents at 719 North Camden Dr., Beverly Hills, Calif.

(3) LEONARD, Josephine (Eckhart), b. Sept. 26, 1905. She is a Grad. of the Univ. of Southern Calif. at Los Angeles. She was m. on Oct. 9, 1929 to Adna Wright Leonard, Jr., b. in 1904, son of Bishop Adna Wright and Mary Day Leonard. Bishop Leonard (1874-1943) was Senior Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the U.S. Adna Jr. is a Grad. of the Univ. of Southern Calif. He owns and manages an Executive Placement Bureau in Pittsburgh, Pa. They have two children: Carley Jo; Barry. Home: 5734 Wilkins Ave., Pittsburgh 19, Pa.

LEONARD, Carley Jo, b. Oct. 18, 1932. In 1950 she enrolled in Goucher Coll. for Women, Baltimore, Md.

LEONARD, Adna Barry, b. Aug. 15, 1935.

2. SHUGERS, Anna (Eckhart) (Jan. 22, 1869-June 4, 1942). She was m. in Oct., 1904 to George Shugers (Aug. 20, 1869-Oct. 10, 1937). George was associated with the Auburn Automobile Co. at its beginning. In about 1904 they moved to Los Angeles where George had an Auto Trimming Shop for many years. Later he was in the oil business in that city. They had an adopted daughter, (1) Clara ROULETTE.

(1) ROULETTE, Clara (Eckhart by adoption), b. Feb. 20, 1906. She was m. in 1928 to John Roulette. They had three children: George; Ray; William. Home: 417 Kelso Ave., Inglewood, Calif.

ROULETTE, George Wallace, b. Apr. 28, 1930. He was m. on Dec. 15, 1950 to Joan Ball of Anaheim, Calif. George has been in the U.S. Navy since 1948.

ROULETTE, Ray Shugers, b. June 9, 1932. He is enrolled in Redlands Univ., Redlands, Calif.

ROULETTE, William Roger, b. June 6, 1934. He is attending High School.

3. ECKHART, Morris (Mar. 25, 1871-Apr. 15, 1942). Morris began working for the Eckhart Carriage Co. as a blacksmith. In the early nineties he went on the road selling buggies wholesale. He was m. in 1896 to Ada McEnterfer, b. July 11, 1874. They had a daughter (1) Ruth JARVIS.

Morris became active manager of the Auburn Automobile Co. after his older brother's retirement. He developed the business into a large concern with well over a million dollars of net worth. The auto industry was sold to a Chicago bank in 1918. Two years later he retired and moved to Los Angeles. She maintains a summer home in Harbor Springs, Mich.

(1) JARVIS, Ruth (Eckhart) (Nov. 12, 1899-Jan. 1, 1933). She was a graduate of Smith Coll., Northampton, Mass. She was m. on Aug. 12, 1922 to Lewis Jarvis, b. Aug. 1, 1890. They have two daughters: Betty Jo; Ann SMITH. Lewis lives at 155 E. 72nd St., New York 21, N.Y.

JARVIS, Betty Jo, b. Sept. 18, 1923. She attended the Univ. of Michigan. Address: Box 2070, Hartford, Conn.

Part III

GEORGE ECKHARDT and DESCENDANTS

(Son of Johannes and Elizabetha Eckhard)

George ECKHARDT (Eckhard in Germany) was born on April 30, 1813 in the village of Grosszimmern, near the city of Darmstadt, in the Province of Hessen, Germany. He was m. in 1841 to Catharina PULLMAN (her signature) who was b. in Grosszimmern on Jan. 5, 1823. She was the oldest of six children. (Part V). George was engaged in the manufacture of pottery. He was the last of three brothers to come to America. (Part I, John; Part II, Henry; Part IV, their sisters).

Upon receiving word from his brother, Henry, in New York State that "there is religious freedom here", and seeking economic opportunities, George disposed of his business and came to America with his wife and two children, Eva and John. They embarked from Amsterdam in 1847, were nearly three months at sea, and were quite destitute when reaching Henry's home near Troy, New York. Here George became seriously ill with "ship's fever". Upon recovery he worked for a farmer named Weatherwax. The brothers felled trees in weather so cold that it froze their noonday lunch.

In a short time the American Bible and Tract Society sent George as a missionary and colporteur to northeastern Indiana at a salary of \$150 per year. The family lived at first in an abandoned bar room of a hotel in Auburn, where their son, George was born. Then they moved to a farm $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles southeast of Waterloo, Ind., which they bought. Here daughter, Mary, was born. For about eight years before a new house was built they lived in a log cabin with a loft reached by a ladder. They were devout Methodists and on occasion were hosts for the "Quarterly Meeting" and for traveling preachers. In time the family moved to Toledo, O., where George died on Nov. 16, 1874.

Catharina (Pullman) Eckhardt was almost totally blind in her last years. Still, with help for threading needles, she sewed silk "carpet rags" together, wound them into balls and had them woven into neat sofa pillows for each of her four children and fourteen grand children. In her last years she lived with her daughter, Mary. She attended church a mile from home by riding in a buggy given her by Charles Eckhart of Auburn, Ind. Her death occurred on June 15, 1913, shortly after her ninetieth birthday.
