But reading some of the books about the town of Prescott, I find I have more material than any of the books I have read. Some people have asked me why I did not have it published as they thought it would be of interest to a good many people. I decided if a publisher thought it good enough to print I would have it done.

The dates of events go back over a hundred years, to 1822 when the town was incorporated.

The material has been obtained from a number of sources, histories, colonial records and my own observation; there were many citizens who were willing to assist in a work which would shed light on the past. I acknowledge myself under special obligation to all who gave me their assistance.

PAST EVENTS OF PRESCOTT

Concerning the history of the territory occupied by the town of Prescott, previous to its occupancy by the white man we know very little, and probably nothing more will ever be known. We know that these valleys and hills have existed from the earliest period of time. We know that this whole region for a hundred years after the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth Rock, was an unbroken forest, an unexplored wilderness. Its hills and valleys were covered with many kinds of trees such as the pines, hemlock, oak, birch, chestnut, ash, spruce and maple; and in these forests was the home of the wolf, fox, panther and bear.

We know that the waters of the rivers and brooks have ever been flowing toward the sea. Along these streams in the grassy meadows was the feeding place of the moose and the deer. The pickerel, trout and the pout were plenty in the ponds and brooks. Wild turkeys and partridges were found everywhere.

For unnumbered generations Indians had been in possession of this land; they were a branch of the Nipmucks, whose domain extended from Springfield on the south to as far north as Northfield. They had no fixed place of habitation, but remained only at one place while the fish and game were plenty.

Hampshire County is one of the original counties of the state; the fact will readily be seen by reference to the first division of the colony into counties in the year 1643.

When Hampshire County was erected and organized on the 7th day of May, 1662, it was not set off from an older county of the colony but it was erected entirely out of virgin territory never before placed under any county organization.

Prescott was situated in the northeast corner of Hampshire County. The town in shape was like the inverted letter L.

A tract of land three miles long was taken from the south part of New Salem and joined with the East Parish of Pelham, and on January 28, 1822, the town of Prescott was incorporated. It was 6 miles long, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles wide in the widest part, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles in the narrowest. It contained 12,706 acres of land, 187 occupied by roads, and 322 acres covered by water.

NATURAL FEATURES

The town was rugged in aspect. Mount Ell in the northeast part of the town attained a considerable elevation. Russ mountain was also in the northeast part of the town. In the west part of the town was Rattlesnake mountain. On the west side of the mountain which is mostly of a rocky nature, it is almost perpendicular and rises abruptly to an altitude of about three hundred feet. At the foot of the mountain there was a den or cave, probably formed by the falling of debris from above, where ice was found nearly the year around. The accumulation of debris at the base made a hiding place for a great number of rattlesnakes, which no doubt gave the mountain its name. No rattlesnakes have been seen in that vicinity for many years.

There are several other hills that exist in different parts of the town; Fish Hill in the north, Kelley Hill in the southeast, Egypt and Pine Hill in the east part of the town.

In this pleasant valley nestled among the hills were found many good farms. The soil of Prescott was good and easy cultivation, varying from a sandy soil to a clayey loam. Vegetables and grain with the exception of wheat were raised in fair abundance.

The largest natural body of water was Russ pond or Jim Little pond in the northeastern section of the town. There were several smaller ponds, Gibbs pond, Lily pond and a number of made ponds in different sections of the town.

BOUNDARIES

Beginning on the west line of New Salem, at the southwest corner of the lot No. 23, in the third division, once owned by Samuel Wood; from thence running east by the south line of that lot and the south line of Ebenezer and David C. Vaughn's farm to the southwest corner of David and Luther Hunt's farm; thence eastwardly on the line between said farm and Samuel H. Hunt's land, and on the south line of William Walker's land and the south line of the farm now occupied by Winslow Packard to the west line of Nathaniel Bang's farm; thence southwardly and eastwardly by this line to Amos Martin's west line; thence south and east by the west and south line of his farm to the west line of the farm once owned by Ebenezer Lincoln (later owned by

Nymphas Stacy); thence southwardly by the west line thereof to the southwest corner; thence eastwardly on the south line until it came to the highway that ran eastwardly on the south side of said farm; thence along the middle of said highway eastwardly and southwardly to the southwest corner of land owned by Varney Pearce; thence east on the south line to the southeast corner; thence north to the southwest corner of the lot on which Samuel Linzie once lived; thence east on the south line of that lot and on the south line of the lot on which Rufus Stacy lived to the east line of New Salem; then south and west, following the line of New Salem to the northeast corner of Pelham until it came to the stream called the west branch of Swift River, being the line between the two parishes in Pelham; thence northwardly along the middle of said stream to the first mentioned boundary on the west line of New Salem.

The people in the East Parish of Pelham and the south part of New Salem wanted to be a town by themselves long before 1822 but were opposed by Pelham. However the opposition proved of no avail, and on January 28, 1822, the town of Prescott was incorporated.

The people assembled and chose the name of Warren, in commemoration of General Warren who was killed at Bunker Hill. They sent a messenger, Caleb Peirce, to the Legislature at Boston with their request. When he arrived there he found the name of Warren had been granted to another town about an hour before. Another name must be chosen and rather than take the long journey again, perhaps without any better success, he decided to name the town himself.—It was suggested to him that he name the town after Colonel William Prescott of Pepperell, who had command of the American forces at the Battle of Bunker Hill. Then and there Caleb Peirce decided to give the town the name of Prescott.

Prescott was bounded on the north by New Salem; on the eastby Dana and Greenwich and south by Enfield; on the west by Shutesbury and Pelham.

The western branch of the Swift River formed the boundary line between Prescott and the towns of Pelham and Shutesbury. In the extreme eastern part, for a short distance, the middle branch of the Swift River flowed. Some of the other brooks were the Egypt Brook, Schoolhouse Brook, Pegmill Brook and Sugar Brook. There were several small brooks that flowed into the larger ones.

On February 13, 1822, the warrant of the first town meeting was issued by Barna Brigham, a justice of the peace, at the written request of Samuel Henry, Caleb Peirce, Nathan Felton, Abel Gilbert, Josiah Hemenway, Proctor Peirce, Charles Staples, Stacy Lindsey, Chester Gray, Brigham Mills and Joseph Hodgkins.

The moderator chosen for the first town meeting was Josiah Peirce, and Chester Gray was the clerk. The first selectmen were Barna Brigham, Caleb Peirce and Nymphas Stacy.

The assessors were Moses Gray, Henry Haskins and Josiah Peirce. The first town clerk was Chester Gray.

FORTY YEARS AS TOWN CLERK

Fred N. Peirce made a remarkable record serving the town of Prescott as town clerk for forty years. He began his duties in 1869 and continued until 1909, when he resigned. Mr. Peirce had been a most faithful official and in all his years of service had missed only one town meeting. He had also served the town as treasurer, member of the school committee, and in other positions. He was a justice of the peace for a long period.

Mr. Peirce was a lifelong resident of Prescott, being born there, the son of Appleton and Marilla Peirce. In early life he taught school for some years. About 1856 he married Angeline F. Thayer, a daughter of Deacon Ellis and Eunice Thayer.

Clarence C. Fuller took Mr. Peirce's place as town clerk.

Prior to 1857, each town in the county was entitled to separate representation in the General Court. Districts were first formed in that year, each comprised of two or more towns, and each empowered to send one or more representatives. Two changes in the composition of the districts have been made. Prescott was in the sixth district, with Enfield, Greenwich and Ware,—one representative from 1857 to 1866. From 1877 to 1879, Prescott was in the fourth district with Amherst, Pelham and South Hadley,—one representative.

SETTLEMENT

The south part of Prescott, which was taken from Pelham, was probably first settled, as the latter town contained about, forty families in the year 1742. At this time New Salem had, just commenced to receive settlers.

Some of the first settlers in Prescott were the McConkeys (afterwards Conkeys), McMillins, (later Millins and Mellen) Grays, Crossetts, Peirces and Berrys.

There were four Conkey brothers, John, William, Alexander and Thomas. The last three settled along the banks of the Swift River near "Bobbinville". John lived on Prescott Hill near the location of the Congregational parsonage. The house used by William Conkey, not far from "Rattlesnake mountain" and near the "old east cemetery", was still standing in 1910, and on a heavy stone over the ancient fireplace there was neatly chiseled the inscription, "William Conkey, June Ye 21 st. 1776."

In all probability the McConkeys and McMillins were the first to settle in the territory of what was afterwards Prescott. Their settlement was about 1740.

John Mellen lived in the first part of the nineteenth century in the south part of the town, in what was known as "Mellen Hollow."

The Crossett family came from the north of Ireland and settled in Pelham about the year 1750. William Crossett settled in the south part of the valley, (afterwards Prescott), and one of them settled in the north part of the town. James Crossett, father of Liberty, passed his life on the original Crossett place and was a man of great influence and sterling worth.

The Berry family settled in town about 1755, coming from Rutland, Massachusetts, and finally settled on the old farm occupied for many years by Betsy Berry, a descendant, and later by her nephew, Charles Berry, until sold to the Water Commission. The great grandfather of John Berry (father of Charles), was a cloth weaver as well as a farmer. He had four sons, James, Alexander, and two others, who went west. James located on the Gilbert place, and Alexander on the old farm. He had four sons, John, James, Lockes and Alexander. John settled on the old place, and died there in January 1873, at the advanced age of eighty-four years. He had two children, John and Betsy. John lived on the farm south of the Berry farm. He had several children: Monroe, Charles, Annie, Henry and Frank. John Berry died in June, 1901, the largest man to live in Prescott. He weighed 354 pounds at one time.

Daniel Gray, a descendant of John Gray who located at an early date in the west part of Pelham and was one of the original proprietors of that town, settled and lived on the place where Alden Reed lived. Moses and Aaron Gray lived at an early day where George H. Allen lived. Harry Gray lived for many years in the house just west of the George Allen house. Frank Allen was the last to live in this house.

Buenos Ayres came to Prescott at an early date, and lived on the C. H. Gray farm. A Mr. Wright, father of Gains and Gad Wright, was an early settler, and lived at the top of Egypt hill, where Madison Peirce lived. Fred Thrasher was the last owner of this place.

Jacob Sampson lived where Joseph N. Shaw's barn once stood, in the last part of the eighteenth century and removed to Stamford, Vermont in about 1826.

James Hathaway lived on the farm where later Nelson Whitaker lived, in the early part of the nineteenth century. At about the same period Roswell Jennings, from Middlebury, lived on the farm later owned by David F. Peirce. John Atchinson about this time lived in Atchinson Hollow, (later spelled Atkinson) and was one of the first to own a four wheeled wagon.

John Pierce, a descendant of Abraham who was a taxpayer in Plymouth in 1623, came from Middleborough, Massachusetts, (now Middleboro), settled and lived where Arthur Brown lived. He was the father of Appleton Pierce, No. 1 "Praying App". There were two Appleton Pierces in the town, who were neighbors. Appleton Pierce, a descendant of Abraham, was very religious. Appleton Peirce, a descendant of David Peirce, used profane language quite freely. So the neighbors to distinguish them called one "Praying App" and the other "Swearing App".

Peleg Pierce, a half brother of John, located in Prescott about 1812 or 15, and lived where Howard Shaw lived (or the John Vaughan place).

David Peirce came from England at an early day, and was one of the first settlers of the north part of the town. He served in the Revolutionary war from New Salem, which later was the north part of Prescott, and died in 1779 on his return home from the war. His companions carried him four days on a bier, before he expired. He left four sons, Alden, John, Caleb and Alexander. John and Alexander removed to Maine, both afterwards returning. Alexander died soon after. Alden removed to Leverett and later John and Alden settled in Ohio.

Caleb was born April 15, 1771 and died May 10, 1829. He lived in the old Peirce house situated on the road from Atkinson Hollow to Cooleyville. He was married twice, had ten children by his first wife and six by the second. He was the agent appointed to secure the incorporation of the town of Prescott. Six of his sons settled in the town, Pomeroy, Appleton, Madison, Clesson, David and Caleb.

Simeon Pierce (another family of Pierces) was one of the first settlers, and lived on the Park Hannum place.

Obadiah Cooley lived where F. B. Paige lived in the first part of the nineteenth century. At about the same time John

Mecklem, a descendant of one of the original proprietors of Pelham, lived where West C. Paige lived.

Peleg Aldrich was born in New Salem and settled in Atkinson Hollow in the early part of the last century, on the place where his son Wales lived. Another son, B. Whitman, lived in Prescott.

Seth Peibles settled at an early day where Henry Grover lived. His widow married a Mr. Savage, who lived near the original No. 4 school house (more commonly known as the old brick school house) that stood on the west side of the present main road, nearly opposite the Jarvis Shaw road.

Jotham, Amasa and Levi Leach were early settlers and lived where Daniel K. Vaughan lived.

The Eddy family settled on the John Berry farm. The old house which they occupied, was moved to Prescott Hill and occupied by John Atchinson.

Paul Haskins was one of the first to settle, and lived where L. H. Gaylord lived. Luke was also one of the first settlers and located where Uzziel Haskins lived. Shadrack Haskins settled about the same time and lived where George L. Johnson lived. George Johnson removed the old house and built a new one about 1882-83. This place was later bought by Walter M. Waugh, who lived there until the property was sold to the Metropolitan Water Commission.

As early as 1800, Moses Gray lived where George Allen lived. About the same time Simon Stockwell lived at the top of "Stockwell Hill" where West C. Aldrich lived, just south of Atkinson Hollow.

Nathaniel Fish came from Middlebury and settled where Erastus Fisk Gross lived. He had one of the first four wheeled wagons used in the town. Austin Gross, son of E. F. Gross, lived on this place until the property was sold to the Water Commission.

Stephen Powers settled on the place where Jason Powers lived. Eden Briggs settled very early where J. H. King resided.

James and Shipman Shaw came from Middlebury, Shipman settling on the farm where Varnum Vaughan lived. This place

was later occupied by Justin Smith, afterwards by A. M. Haskins. James settled on the farm where Addison Thayer lived. Ellis Thayer, a son of Addison Thayer, was the last to live on this place before it was bought by the Water Commission.

Joseph Haskins, father of Luke, lived where Rev. Nelson B. Jones lived. This place had several owners. Mrs. Adelaide Aldrich owned it a short time, and sold to Monroe W. Berry. Later George Upton lived there. Then Mr. Blake of Waltham bought it for a summer home, had it for several years and sold to the Water Commission.

Sylvester Titus came from Middlebury, and settled where Algernon Peirce lived. His son, Lucian, later lived on this place. He had two sons and a daughter, Lucian Mortimer, Oscar A., and Eliza Ann. Later Frank Berry lived on this place. The last owner was Mr. Griswold.

Chauncy Upton, born February 7, 1822, son of Samuel and Esther Upton, was the first child to be born in Prescott after the town was incorporated. They lived in the house where David B. Lawless lived. About 1826 or '27 Timothy Upton, father of Samuel, Timothy and Isaac lived on this same farm.

Barna Brigham was an early settler and a very prominent citizen. He lived on Prescott Hill where Edwin Paige lived.

Nymphas Stacy was one of the first settlers and lived a little south of the John Wood place. He was another prominent man.

Jacob Gibbs lived where Leonard Lincoln lived. Later this place was owned by Edgar Wood.

Abel Gilbert came from Brookfield, about 1818 or '20, and lived where Henry Grover lived. This place was later owned by Arthur Brown.

Amos Blackmer settled about 1810, and located on the Daniel Gray farm. He died in 1820. His sons, Daniel and Peter, lived in Prescott.

Thomas Vaughan came early and settled on the farm where Samuel Thrasher lived. David Sloan located where Dr. George H. Lee afterwards lived.

David Hunt was born in Worcester, lived for some time in Heath and finally settled in New Salem near what was later the Prescott line, in about 1808. He had three sons and a daughter who reached maturity, Samuel, Luther, Lorena and Horace. Luther and Lorena remained in New Salem for a time, and later Lorena removed to Holly, New York. Samuel lived where the "Poor Farm" was. At an early date he removed to Athol, and lived to the advanced age of ninety years.

Horace was born January 15, 1801, in New Salem and lived there for thirty-six years. He lived in Prescott for nine years, engaging in store-keeping and finally removed to New Salem, but retained his store in Prescott, and was in business for many years. Later he removed to Enfield where he had a store. He lived there the remaining years of his life.

TOWN FARM

In 1863 the town of Prescott bought the farm once owned by Samuel Hunt, of Euclid Owen for \$1800 for a poor farm. The town used this farm for several years. After a time the town did not have enough paupers to pay to run the farm, so it was decided to board them out in private families, which it did.

Prescott for several years had no town poor. The buildings, being old and not occupied, soon decayed and disappeared.

NOTES

After the incorporation of the town there was a long contest between the north and south parts in relation to the proper place for holding town meetings. In 1826 it was voted to hold half of the town meetings at "the hall of John Atchinson, inn holder, in Prescott," In 1833 a committee of non-residents was chosen to find the town center and to locate the place for the erection of a town house. The committee found the center "to be Rounseville Pierce's land, about twenty rods east of the town road that leads by Moses Gray's and about twenty rods north of the line formerly between New Salem and Pelham", and the proper place for the location of a town house, at the guide post at the corner of the road north of John Berry's on the north side of the road leading to New Salem. The report of the committee was not adopted, but after a few years of controversy "a modern"

neat town house was erected in the fall of 1838. In 1846, John Atchinson presented the hearse house to the town.

John Atkinson, who also erected a monument in the cemetery in honor of General George Washington, was a soldier in the Revolutionary War. He was born in 1755 and died August 16, 1854 at the age of 89 years. His wife, Eunice Atkinson, died January 4, 1844, at the age of 73 years.

The Prescott hearse house was later bought from the Water Commission by George C. Tierney and erected on Poplar Mountain road off Route 63, Erving, Mass.

In 1932, the town house was sold by the Water Commission to Judge John M. Woolsey of the U. S. Federal Court of New York. It was moved by Judge Woolsey to his summer home in Petersham, Mass., where it serves as a court room. Every bolt and beam was hauled over from Prescott and reassembled, even its nearly century old foundation. It is said Judge Woolsey calls it his Country Courthouse. It is situated in the north part of Petersham.

TAVERNS

Probably the earliest tavern was kept by William Conkey, in the old house where Milo Abbott lived. And it is affirmed that it was in and around this old inn that the first Revolutionary soldiers from these parts were recruited. Shays, the commander of Shays' rebellion was a resident of that part of Pelham, afterwards in the town of Prescott. And it is said he mustered his first recruits at this ancient inn. This building was two stories high with capacious rooms and was conveniently fitted for this purpose.

One of the first inns in the north part of the town was kept by Captain Jacob Sampson, where Joseph N. Shaw's barn stood. For a good number of years in the first part of the nineteenth century, Nathan Felton kept one where Lyman S. Johnson lived on Prescott Hill. He was succeeded by Mr. Hinds and Charles Scott. Tradition says that at an early date an inn was kept where the Congregational parsonage stood.

In the first part of the nineteenth century, Joseph Warren

kept a tavern on the hill where Edwin Paige lived. It was afterwards run for a short time by Noble Weeks.

Soon after the town was incorporated John Atkinson opened a tavern at "Atkinson Hollow", where Cheney Abbott lived, and operated it for many years. No doubt this was the last one in the town.

STORES AND POST OFFICES

The village of Prescott (more commonly called Prescott Hill) was situated in the south part of the town, in what was the East Parish of Pelham, and consisted of several dwellings, a Congregational church and parsonage, a store and post office, and at one time a cheese factory.

One of the first stores which sprang into existence was in the last part of the eighteenth century, and was run by Peleg Canada near the house where Edwin Paige afterwards lived. This store was probably little better than a trading post. Isaac Conkey some time after kept one, then Joseph Warren Hamilton, and later Hamilton and Brigham.

The Prescott post office was established about 1822 or '23, and the first postmaster was Barna Brigham. He was followed by Stacy Lindsey, Dexter N. Richards, Charles Hodgkins, W. E. Johnson, who afterwards had a store in Enfield. Liberty Crossett was appointed in 1868 and held that position until his death which was in 1890. He was succeeded by Warren Whipple, who ran the store a short time and sold to George Hunter, who later moved the stock to a store he built near his home. In 1907 Clarence Fuller bought this store and ran it until it was sold to the Water Commission.

On the left side of the road about a quarter of a mile north of the Congregational church, on the road to Atkinson Hollow, lived West Paige. His son, Warren, had a store in the back part of the house and sold dry goods and groceries. He had a horse and closed wagon and drove to nearby towns and had a very successful business. This was about 1886 or '87. He ran the store several years.

The North Prescott post office was situated in the north part of the town, and the hamlet was partly in the limits of Prescott and partly in New Salem. It consisted of a Methodist church and parsonage, and several dwellings, (the parsonage and several of the houses were in New Salem), and at one time a Baptist church, which stood on the line between the two towns (New Salem and Prescott) and passed longitudinally through its center. This church was afterwards used as a store.

Elbridge Shaw kept the store at North Prescott about 1830, and was succeeded by Alpheus Thomas; the latter by Thomas and Partridge, then E. A. Thomas who became postmaster. He was followed by Frank Sampson, until 1877, and Mr. Sampson was succeeded by Lucian K. Baker who was burned out. Mr. Baker in 1878 bought what was called the New Baptist church, and remodelled it into a store and dwelling house. He was burned out the second time in 1886.

In 1837 Horace Hunt erected and opened a store in the northwest part of the town, about one mile west of North Prescott, and kept it until 1869. The post office was established in 1844 or '45, and Horace Hunt was the first postmaster and kept the office for a number of years. He was succeeded by S. L. Haskins for a short time, and then Mr. Hunt held the office again. It was finally removed to North Prescott, and E. A. Thomas became postmaster.

In 1869, Horace Hunt transferred his mercantile business to Enfield, Massachusetts. On May 15, 1878 he disposed of his store and lived in retirement until he died at the age of 78. He was married four times; first to Susannah Fish of New Salem, April 4, 1822. She died November 25, 1825. His second wife was Roxana Chamberlin of New Salem. They were married August 27, 1829 and she died June 13, 1837. His third wife was Naomi Haskins of Prescott. They were married May 22, 1839, and she died January 17, 1845. His fourth wife was Mrs. Sarah E. Freeman, widow of Dr. Nathaniel Freeman. She died after several years of illness at the home of her son, J. Luther Hunt, Prospect street, Athol, Massachusetts, in about 1902 or 1903, at the age of 86 years. In 1844 she married Dr. Freeman, who died and she subsequently married Horace Hunt.

In 1894 Warren Whipple erected a new building, a dwelling house, store and hall combined where dances and entertainments were held. Mr. Whipple was postmaster until 1905 when he sold to Frank J. Currier, who kept the store until 1921 when he sold to Charles Wheeler, who succeeded him as storekeeper and postmaster, until his death. Mr. Wheeler was the last to keep store in this building.

At one time Atchinson Hollow (afterwards spelled Atkinson) was a hamlet of some importance. In times past it had been the seat of a tavern and several stores.

John Atkinson, about 1823 or '24, had a store in the John Atchinson house (later owned by Cheney Abbott, the last to live there being Dr. Walter A. Clark), and kept it several years. This building was sold to the Water Commission, which later re-sold it and it was subsequently moved to the Eastern States Exposition grounds in Springfield, Massachusetts.

In Aldrich Hall, later called Grange Hall, Allen Beaman kept the store in about 1852. He was succeeded by Eliakins Hill; Enos S. Richards and Son; J. W. Adams; West C. Aldrich, Henry Shaw, Waldo H. Peirce. After the latter's death his son Harrison kept the store until it was sold to the Water Commission.

It has been told there was a store in the old Henry house at one time, but the author never found anyone who could give information about who owned it or kept the store.

INDUSTRIAL PURSUITS

The principal occupation of the inhabitants of the town had been agriculture. However, various pursuits of a mechanical and manufacturing nature had been followed from time to time.

At a very early day, Amos Thomas ran a grist mill, where Joseph N. Shaw's blacksmith shop stood. Josiah Hemenway had one of the first mills, east of where Oscar A. Titus lived. In the last part of the eighteenth century, a Mr. Cannon had a grist mill in the east part of the town, and Asa Moore manufactured batting in the mill later.

Early in the eighteenth century, near where Nelson Whit-

aker lived, Dexter and David Hathaway manufactured carriages. About the same time Gregory Ellis and Samuel White engaged in cloth dressing in a building near where Joseph N. Shaw's blacksmith shop stood.

Hemenway and White, about 1826 erected a grist mill in the northwest part of the town, and operated it for many years. Eli W. Chapin succeeded to the business for several years, then Asa Moore, James Fitz, Alonzo Percival, and finally Mr. Moore again.

John Hoar had one of the first sawmills on the Swift River about two miles north of "Bobbinville,"

Pomeroy Peirce built a sawmill in the northwest part of the town, about 1828, and ran it until his death in 1855. It was later owned by his widow, Susannah Peirce and his son Alden Peirce, and run by William H. Winter. Later this mill was owned by Eli W. Chapin, who ran it for several years. It was an up and down saw. The mill was situated a short distance below Joseph Shaw's blacksmith shop.

In 1836 Appleton Peirce and his brother Madison established a sawmill on the left side of the Poor Farm road, east of Appleton Pierce's residence, and they operated it together until 1848. It was afterward run by Mr. Appleton Peirce and his son, Fred N. Peirce. In 1864 a circular saw was placed in the mill, which turned out 100,000 feet of lumber annually.

Theodore F. Cook had a sawmill at "Pelham Hollow," which was erected in 1878 to take the place of one destroyed by fire in the same year.

F. B. Paige at one time was successfully engaged in making vinegar on an extensive scale, in the south part of the town.

In about the year 1869, a cheese factory was operated for some time in the south part of the town, called Prescott Mill. The cheese factory was later bought by Walter M. Waugh, taken down and rebuilt into a barn on his farm in the north part of the town.

In the east section of the town there was Barrows' Mills, owned by Mr. Osgood, who had a grist mill and a soapstone factory. A new mill was erected in 1878. In the same part of

the town Foster Brown had a saw and planing mill and engaged in making boxes of various kinds. There was also a charcoal kiln which turned many thousands of cords of wood into charcoal in its day, at a little hamlet called the "Soapstone", near the North Dana line. Bailey and Goodman were at one time engaged in quarrying granite in this part of the town.

Ellis White was a contractor and builder. He built a house and shop for himself, where Oscar A. Titus later lived. He built several houses in town. In the shop he made wagons and sleighs, and did a very successful business as a wheelwright.

About 1886 or 1887, Oscar Titus had a still and made cider brandy in the lower part of his shop.

Daniel T. Pierce, also, was very ingenious. When he was about 14 years old he began to repair watches and clocks, working at this business for many years. He also repaired jewelry, soldered tinware, and so forth. He did painting and paperhanging and also at one time a considerable amount of surveying. He was sealer of weights and measures for the town for a number of years.

He lived on the old Pierce farm at the end of the road, about one mile east of Atkinson Hollow. In 1849 Appleton Peirce, father of Daniel, built a new house (the builder was Ellis White) joining on to the ell of the old house. He lived there until his son married on January 1, 1857, Ellen A. Peirce of Prescott, and then gave the farm to his son Daniel. It was in the latter's possession as long as he lived. All of their children were born there. This farm was sold to the Metropolitan Water Commission in 1929.

In the house was a built-in wood box, where a week's supply of wood could be kept. On the inside of this door Daniel Pierce painted a stencil design. After the place was sold to the Metropolitan Water Commission, aman from Maine was going around to the vacant houses in Prescott, looking for antiques. When he saw this door, he was much surprised. He said, "The person who painted that design must have traveled a great deal or was a great reader." (Mr. Pierce read a good deal but never traveled very much.) This man was the owner of a hotel near Portland, Maine, which was three hundred years old. He bought

the door, for the design was the same as some of those in his hotel. He paid the sum of \$10.

Also on this farm was an old cellar hole, where a house once stood, and in this house lived "Uncle Tim," a slave once owned and set free by John Pierce, grandfather of Daniel Pierce.

In 1929 the farm was sold to the Metropolitan Water Commission, which sold the house to a young man by the name of Wyman. It was later taken down and rebuilt on Pelham Hill, on the road to Amherst.

PRESCOTT GRANGE

Golden Rule Grange, No. 52 of Prescott was the oldest in the valley. It was organized April 24, 1874, by Deputy Hurd of Hadley, and had 37 charter members. Alson Scott was the first master and Fred N. Peirce, secretary. It was quite active for some years, then interest seemed to diminish for a time but on March 28, 1907, it was reorganized by Carlton D. Richardson, and from that time on it was very active until it was forced to give up its Charter in 1927, when the Water Commission bought up the town. At the end it had 81 members.

PHYSICIANS

Of the physicians who once practiced in Prescott, the first was Dr. Nehemiah Hinds, as early as 1786, and into the nineteenth century. He erected and for a long time occupied the house that stood opposite the store of Liberty Crossett, on Prescott Hill. His son Leonard practiced with him for a while, and continued after his death. Dr. Isaac Powers who lived in "Mellon Hollow" was a contemporary of Dr. Hinds.

About 1822 Dr. Hubbard Vaughan was the resident physician and lived in the north part of the town, in the house where Joseph Stone resided. The next physician to come was Dr. George H. Lee, who began practice about 1826, and continued for about ten years, living in the south end of the town. He was a prominent man and held various positions of trust. Dr. David Hale practiced a short time about 1855.

For a number of years Prescott did not have a resident physician. The people employed out-of-town physicians. Dr. Wright, who lived in Cooleyville, (in New Salem) was a prominent man, and as the Orange Enterprise once stated, "He was not always tactful nor discreet in his utterances but everyone recognized his intellect and his capabilities". He practiced several years in Cooleyville and was employed by many of the people in Prescott. Afterwards he moved to Orange. Soon after came Dr. Snow, then Dr. Johnson, who later went to Erving, Massachusetts. The last resident physician in Cooleyville was Dr. Fearl, who was there several years, before locating in Orange. Dr. Willard Segur of Enfield had many patients in Prescott, and was liked by all.

Prescott's last resident physician was Dr. Walter A. Clark who came here about 1888, and was there for over 35 years. He lived a short time in the Freeman house, later moving to Mrs. Eleanor Gilbert's house, opposite the Oscar Titus place. His sister, (Mrs. Burroughs) later bought the Cheney Abbott, (or John Atkinson) place and he lived there several years, until it was sold to the Water Commission. He died of apoplexy in Athol about September 26, 1930, at the age of 73 years. At the time of his death he was living with his nephew, Warren Tolman, 51, at Winter street, Athol.

CHURCHES

The inhabitants of the south part of the town were connected with the established church of Pelham Heights for a long time after the first settlement, and those in the north part worshipped with the New Salem church. But the great distance which the people were compelled to go to attend divine worship induced a division, and on June 28, 1786, the eastern part of Pelham, with a portion of New Salem, was incorporated as the East Parish of Pelham.

A church was organized soon after and a meeting house erected, but the records are meager. The articles of faith of the new church were first signed by Moses Gray, John Lindsey, Aaron Gray, Alexander Berry, William Berry, James C. Mc-Millen, John McMillen and Thomas McMillen. Other members

of the church, a little later, were Isaac Baker, Jeremiah Gray, James Lindsey, William Lindsey, Joel Gray, Israel Crossett and their respective families.

The first regular minister was Rev. Matthias Conzier, a graduate of Princeton College in 1785. He was installed March 23, 1794. Prior to that time the church had been ministered to by supplies, and by the pastors of the west parish of Pelham. On the date of the installation of Rev. Mr. Conzier, a protest against him was presented to the Council by William Conkey, Minonder Conkey, William Cowan, Thomas Conkey, Joseph Aiken, Daniel C. Grav. Joel Conkey and Samuel Sloan, the reason assigned being "the want of acquaintance, difference of religious sentiments, and lordly ways". Mr. Conzier seemed to have a stormy time, for on June 22, 1795, charges were preferred against him by Nehemiah Hinds for untruthfulness and profanity, the latter consisting, according to Mr. Hinds, in his saying, under certain circumstances, "O Lord! Damn such damnable doctrines." After some years, Mr. Conzier was dismissed by the Council, on March 14, 1798.

About October, 1806, Rev. Sebastian C. Cabbott, a graduate of Dartmouth College in 1797, became the pastor. In 1810 the Council voted to dismiss Rev. Mr. Cabbott.

About this period for some years the society remained inactive. It was not revived until after the incorporation of the town, when a new church was formed at the house of Christopher Paige on January 15, 1823, the first deacon being John Sears. No minister was settled for several years after the reorganization, Rev. Ebenezer Brown of Brimfield, Massachusetts being the first pastor of the revived church. He was a graduate of Yale College, in the class of 1813, and was installed October 17, 1827. During his ministry an extensive revival occurred, and the church was greatly enlarged. He was dismissed March 25, 1835. His successor was Rev. Job Cushman, who was installed October 28, 1835, and dismissed October 1, 1839. At the same time his successor, Rev. Francis Wood, was installed, and dismissed by the Council, March 8, 1848, after nine years' service. The church then remained several years without a pastor.

Rev. Solomon B. Gilbert was next installed, February 23,

1853, and dismissed by the Council January 25, 1854. The next pastor was Rev. David Bancroft, who commenced his labors January 1, 1858 and after a long, faithful and popular ministry, died "in harness" on March 11, 1875. The next pastor was Rev. T. S. Norton, who began preaching regularly July 1, 1875 and was employed for stated periods for some time. The membership at this time was 49, with about 50 in the Sabbath school. The volumes in the library numbered several hundred and L. S. Johnson was superintendent of the Sabbath school.

The original meeting house was used on its first site for many years, and was afterwards moved to the location of the present one. It was taken down and the present edifice erected in the spring of 1848, dedication taking place the following June.

Rev. Augustus Alvord was called to be pastor in 1881, remaining until 1887. In May, 1888, Rev. Charles E. Houghton accepted the pastorate. Rev. Calvin Chase followed him, remaining only six months, from January 30, 1899 to the following August.

On March 1, 1900, Rev. William S. Anderson was called, and remained until March 1, 1901. Rev. George Chalmers Richmond came April 7, 1901, and remained eight months.

Rev. Joseph Wheelwright followed Rev. George Chalmers beginning his work January 19, 1902 and remaining until January 19, 1903.

Rev. George Lyman Dickinson entered upon his services in Prescott on July 5, 1903. He remained until March 4, 1907.

Addison F. Gifford who began his labors in the church on June 10, 1908, was ordained by the Council and resigned his position as pastor on October 1, 1909.

For several years there was no regular pastor. Dr. Chapman, the evangelist of world renown, and one of the workers with him, occupied the parsonage from June 4, 1911 to September 17, 1911.

On October 12, 1911, Prescott church voted to unite with Pelham church in order to support a pastor. Rev. Frederick C. Taylor was then called as pastor of both churches and promised a salary of \$300 a year, \$250 to be paid by Pelham, \$250 by the

Prescott church, and \$300 promised by the Massachusetts Home Missionary Society. He closed his labors November 1, 1914.

During the year between November 1, 1914 and November 1, 1915 the church was without a pastor, and also between the closing out of Mr. Norris's term of office in November 1, 1917 and the coming of the last pastor, Caleb E. Smith, Deacons William Wendemuth and Clarence C. Fuller read sermons. The meetings were called Deacons' meetings.

During the year in which the church was without a pastor, the Association of Pelham and Prescott for the support of a minister was given up, and Prescott voted to unite with the Methodist church at North Prescott.

On November 1, 1915, Rev. John Norris accepted the call of the two churches. He left on November 1, 1917 to take up work with the Westhampton church.

Rev. Caleb E. Smith became minister of the Congregational and Methodist churches in Prescott on May 1, 1918.

On March 26,1919, the church voted to incorporate, adopted by-laws and elected officers. Rev. Mr. Smith was elected moderator and Alice J. Smith, clerk.

The Certificate of Incorporation was granted to the First Congregational church of Prescott, Massachusetts, under date of April 8, 1919, signed by Albert Langtry, Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The certificate was placed in the care of the treasurer of the said church, Eugene G. Kelley, who was duly authorized to care for the same.

The trustees of the First Congregational Church and Society, on March 16, 1920, signed a quit claim deed in the presence of Edwin H. Howe, justice of the peace, Enfield, Massachusetts, by which all church and parsonage properties became the property of the First Congregational Church of Prescott.

On July 13, 1924 the church voted to deed all its property to the Massachusetts Congregational Missionary Society, when the church ceased to exist.

There was a large attendance on June 24, 1928, at the closing services at which the pastor, Caleb E. Smith, officiated. Mr.

Smith on July 1, 1928 entered upon new duties at Paxton, Massachusetts.

During 1928 the Massachusetts Home Missionary Society sold out all of its holdings in Prescott to the State authorities. The Society received \$16,000 for the property.

The Congregational church was sold about 1930 to Joseph A. Skinner of the William Skinner and Sons silk mill of Holyoke, and moved to South Hadley to be used to store historical relics. A gem of colonial church architecture, more than 100 years old, it was placed on a vacant lot near the center of the town, having been taken down piece by piece and reassembled.

UNITED BRETHREN

In the east part of the town Jason Powers built a church in 1838. It was known as "The Old Brick Meeting house", the only church for miles around which was built of brick. In 1855 or '56, the Church of the United Brethren was established, and held meetings in this church. It flourished for about ten years, before it was discontinued. The building was not used for several years, and collapsed about 1895, the bricks being later sold. All of the members died many years ago.

D. S. Caldwell was one of the pastors who officiated for about two years. Another minister was a Mr. Briggs.

BAPTIST DENOMINATION

In 1772 the Baptist denomination built a meeting house across the road from the Fish Hill cemetery. About thirty years later this church was taken down and removed to New Salem, about 60 rods from the line. In 1834 or '35 it was again taken down and rebuilt at the cross road on the line between the two towns, (New Salem and Prescott), the line passing longitudinally through its center. It was called the "New Baptist Church". The Society as an organization was dissolved in 1876.

Rev. John Shepardson, in June 1842, yielded to the earnest desire of the church and served it as pastor from 1842 to 1849.

At about the time of his coming to this church he married Miss Maria A. Chamberlain of New Salem, a most estimable lady.

The first pastor was Ebenezer Smith, some of the others including: Samuel Bigelow, Josiah Orcutt, Joel Butler, Paul Davis, Calvin Orcutt, Asa Niles, Stephen S. Nelson, Thomas Rand, ——Dwyer, George Daland, Alden B. Eggleston, Elijah Fish, ——Baker, Nelson B. Jones (who officiated about 1835), and William A. Worthington who was the pastor about 1863.

In about 1878 this church was bought by Lucian K. Baker, made into a store and dwelling house, and about 1886 the building burned.

METHODIST CHURCH

The Methodist society originated in Prescott, a society being formed December 19, 1831, and choosing Appleton Pierce, Erastus Hanson, Nelson Horr of Prescott, Constant Shaw and Elisha Shaw of New Salem as a committee. On April 13, 1833, a meeting was held at which time it was voted to build a house of worship, and a committee was chosen to locate the church. In 1837 it was decided to build on land purchased of Sally Bangs.

There are people who say this church was in New Salem, and others who say it was built in Prescott. The county atlas of Hampshire, Massachusetts, from actual survey by and under the direction of F. W. Beers, and published by F. W. Beers and Company in 1873, shows the line between the two towns. There is a jog in the line which shows that the church was in Prescott, and the parsonage in New Salem.

In 1903, when Rev. J. A. Betcher was pastor, the church was remodelled. The singers' gallery in the rear of the interior was removed and 11 new memorial windows were placed. Ten of these were memorials to prominent members of the church, and one was dedicated to the pioneer builder of Methodism, Bishop Asbury. This window was broken when the church was struck by lightning during a storm some years later, but since has been partially replaced. The other windows were given in memory of Alpheus Thomas, Edward Thomas, Shubael Vaughan, Howard Freeman and Henry Freeman, A. Willard Paige and C. Maria

Paige, Maria E. Mitchell, Mager Brown, John Powers, Varnum V. Vaughan and Rev. J. Alexander Betcher. The latter was the small window over the door.

Instead of the two doors on the front of the building, one was removed and the other placed in the center of the front wall of the church. An extension was also put on the spire and a bell was installed. The spire, not many years after, was struck by lightning and partially destroyed. It was not thought best to rebuild. The bell still remains in the belfry.

Names of some of the pastors include: Rev. H. B. Collier, minister for the society in 1833; Rev. Philetus Green in 1836—Rev. Mr. Green might possibly have been the first pastor in the church which it is thought was built in 1837)—Rev. Asa Barnes; Rev. Randall Mitchell, Rev. Mr. Miller, Rev. W. H. Atkinson; Rev. Elwin Hitchcock, (about 1875); S. A. Bragg, (about 1885;) Rev. James Sutherland; Rev. W. B. Groves; J. A. Betcher (1903); Rev. Berkley (about 1906); Rev. William E. Dwight; Rev. E. C. Bridgham; Rev. Caleb E. Smith (about 1918); Rev. O. J. Anderson, and Rev. Ernest Mills (about 1940); Rev. Thomas T. Johnston and Rev. Gordon C. Capen.

The officers of the Prescott Historical Society, Inc., heard in December 1947 that the Methodist Episcopal church at North Prescott had been sold to the Water Commission of Boston for \$8400. They realized that this building would be worth trying to buy for the Society as a relic of Prescott. The directors and officers of the Society, therefore, decided to make an effort to purchase it. Mr. Arthur Haley, chairman of the directors, got in contact with the Commission and made it an offer.

On January 8, 1948, the Metropolitan District Commission, at its meeting, voted to sell the church to the Prescott Historical Society, Inc., for the sum of \$5.00, with the understanding that it would be moved on or before December 1, 1948. On February 9, 1948, the church was paid for by Mr. Haley, as chairman of the directors of the society.

It was voted by the trustees of the church to give the society the memorial windows.

The trustees included Miss Mary Vaughan, Henry D. Freeman, Malcolm Freeman, Edward L. Eaton, Chester L. Eaton and Ralph E. Longueil.

CEMETERIES

Prescott had five cemeteries. The one in the southwest part of the town near "Bobbinville" (or what was Pelham Hollow) is the oldest, being in use long before the town was incorporated. Some of the stones bear the dates as far back as 1767. It was laid out in 1744, in conformity with a vote passed on April 26th of that year, to the following effect: "Voted that there be one acre of land fenced with a Good Stone wall, and also that Robert Peibles, Samuel Gray and Robert Lothridge oversee ye Building of ye sd wall at their own Charge."

That vote was after rescinded, and instead it was "voted yt ye Burying Place be fenced with good five Rail fence, ye Reals ten feet Longe, and twelve Lengths to Each Quarter."

This fence was built by John Conkey for L51OS and was probably the first fence to be put around the cemetery.

Among the stones are those of John McCrelis, died 1765; William Conkey, November 5, 1788, aged seventy years; James Berry, 1782, in his sixty seventh year, "a ruling elder"; John Conkey, April 15, 1784, in his seventy sixth year; Margaret Taylor, 1781; Joshua Conkey, son of Capt. John Conkey, April 12, 1790; Isaac Gray, September 9, 1786; James Peibles, March 6, 1787; Robert Maklem, October 5, 1780, in his sixty seventh year and Andrew Maklem, September 25, 1783, in his eightieth year.

At the left of the principal entrance is buried the Rev. David Bancroft, one of the pastors of the Congregational church. His stone bears the following inscription: Rev. David Bancroft, for twenty years pastor of Congregational Church in Willington, Conn., and of the Congregational Church in Prescott for sixteen years. Born February 10, 1800; died March 11, 1875.—"A workman that needeth not to be ashamed. 11 Tim, 11.15."

The Fish Hill cemetery is another old one. There is about an acre and a half of land and was probably used by the Baptists, when the church was on the opposite side of the road from the cemetery, in about the year 1772. It has but few stones, which include markers for Silas Haskins, died 1788; Jacob Trask, 1794; Joseph Packard, October 25, 1800, in his seventy

third year; Caleb Peirce, May 10, 1829, and his wife, Nancy Aldrich, February 1, 1817. These are a few of the oldest buried there.

The cemetery in the rear of the Town House contains one and a quarter acres of land and was laid out in 1838. Eliza Ann Titus, who died March 4, 1840, was the first person to be buried in this cemetery.

The one near the old Brick Meeting House contains about one acre, and was accepted by the town April 15, 1847.

There was also a small cemetery near the Leonard Lincoln farm in the east part of the town.

PINE GROVE CEMETERY

The latest cemetery to be made in Prescott was a private one, "Pine Grove cemetery". There was an association organized in about 1880, which Appleton Pierce, Daniel Pierce, C. D. Powers, Fred Peirce and others in the town were responsible for forming. Ellis White gave the land which was situated on the Newhall place, about one third of a mile south of the North Prescott church, on the east side of the road going to Atkinson Hollow. It included an area of about one and three-fourths acres of high and dry soil.

Ellis White made all of the pickets for the fence which surrounded it, by hand; Oscar Titus and Linus Peirce got out the stone posts; Daniel Pierce, Waldo Peirce, Fred Peirce, Edward Freeman and others helped to make the fence and paint it. The stone posts were bought of Joseph Stone for two shillings apiece.

Everybody who owned a lot and signed the by-laws was considered a member of the Cemetery Association.

Hannah (Cole) Pierce was the first person buried in this cemetery. She died January 29, 1881, and her husband, Appleton Pierce, was the second. He died May 20, 1881.

In the beginning, these lots (four burial lots) were sold for \$5.00 each. Later they were sold for \$10.00. About one half of the lots were sold. Among those owning lots were: E. M. and William Fisher, Daniel T. Pierce, Leslie M. Pierce, Lillie B.

Coolidge, Appleton Pierce, Ellis White, Joseph White, George L. Johnson, Orison Powers, James P. Vaughn, M. E. Powers, Howard A. Vaughan, Martin Vaughan, Frank Wolff, Joseph A. Stacy, Oliver L. Wood, James D. Barnes, Wells Wheeler, Joseph N. Shaw, David Peirce, E. White, William G. Hamilton, Herman E. Powers, Oscar A. Titus, William I. Thresher, Mrs. George R. Paige, Foxwell T. Pierce, Park Hannum, Hosea T. Hunt, J. W. Vaughn, L. A. Upton, Charles D. Powers, Henry R. Cook, Edward A. Freeman, Ira Alden, Joseph Stone, Nelson Whitaker, Elmer M. Aiken, Joseph N. Hamilton, J. D. Stone, F. W. Wheeler, Herbert W. Barnes, Elmer A. Berry, Charles J. Berry, George H. Berry, Charles Wheeler, Dexter M. Vaughan, J. Andrus Hemenway, Jane Ashley, David B. Lawless, Charles Hamilton, Henry E. Shaw, Howard I. Shaw, Criton G. Haskins, R. Wheeler, Henry M. Haskins, Rector Reed, C. Welden, S. Lee Haskins, Asa Moore, Henry N. Grover, William Dickey, Arthur Barrows, Walter O. Shaw, Carl W. Brown, Dr. Walter A. Clark, Ed. P. Mitchell, Charles C. Tinkey, William L. Newton, W. O. Miller, C. M. Brooks, William H. Jones, Frank A. Pettengill, Ellis A. Thaver and Gould, Homer R. Blinn, Carl M. Pierce.

Bodies in two of the lots on April 1, 1942 were Joseph White, his brother, Ellis White and wife, Hannah Almira (Pierce) White, Appleton Pierce and wife Hannah (Cole) Pierce, their son, Daniel T. Pierce and wife, Ellen A. (Peirce) Pierce. These bodies were moved from Pine Grove cemetery to the South cemetery, Orange, Massachusetts, October 20, 1943, by the Water Commission. The body of Elizabeth Peirce, first wife of Madison Peirce, was also moved, and the stone on the lot was also moved from Fish Hill cemetery, Prescott, to the Quabbin Park cemetery.

The Metropolitan Water Commission bought land in the town of Ware for a cemetery wherein to re-locate all the bodies it was necessary to remove from the cemeteries of the towns bought up for the reservoir, including the three in Prescott, Town House, Fish Hill and Pine Grove. The new burial ground, given the name of Quabbin Cemetery, spreads over a large area in which there is no segregation of graves according to towns.

The writer's ancestors on both sides were born for many generations back, in Prescott, long before its incorporation, as

were some who rebelled at the thought of eventually being buried in Ware. At the time Prescott was taken by eminent domain, the writer owned a lot in Pine Grove Cemetery which, if it had been possible, she would have been happy to retain. Second choice, then, was South Cemetery in Orange, since it was nearer the homes of the living members of the family. Accordingly, the bodies of Appleton Pierce, Hannah Pierce, Daniel T. Pierce, Ellen A. Pierce, Joseph White, Ellis White and Almira White were removed to South Cemetery.

On May 23, 1942, payment was received for Pine Grove Cemetery from the Water Commission and on July 9, in that year, an acre of land was bought from Charles Doubleday of the South road in Orange. Later, this land with a sum of money received from the sale of the cemetery was presented by Henry White and the writer to the Prescott Historical Society, Inc., for future establishment of an historical museum.

Two days were spent taking down the fence around Pine Grove Cemetery, August 16th and 23rd and the fence was moved away to storage September 15th. It was saved with the plan in mind that it eventually enclose the plot on which the museum will be erected. Edward and Elsie Goodreau, Alvin and Ethel Brown and their children, Ruby and Henry White and Ruby's nephew, Robert Sisson, Carl and Eva Pierce and the Harry Coolidge family, Harry, Lillie and Ellen, performed this work.

SCHOOLS

The first school house in the town was probably built in 1754, in accordance with a vote passed on that date. It was located on "East Hill", Pelham, later Prescott Hill. School had been kept as early as the year 1746 at the dwelling of Alexander Conkey, near "Bobbinville."

Another early school house stood where Number 1 now stands. It was destroyed by fire about 1819 or '20.

Some of the first teachers were: Caleb Peirce, Tristram Aldrich, James Kellogg, Josiah Peirce, James Ballard, Polly Smith and Polly Hathaway. The latter is said to have taught ex-President Franklin Pierce his A. B. C.'s.

There were six school districts: Number 3, on Prescott Hill; Number 2 near Herman Powers'; Number 1, about one mile north of Atkinson Hollow on the road to Cooleyville; Number 4, on the hill by the Charles Powers place, about three quarters of a mile south of North Prescott, and Number 5, under the hill near Joseph Harrington's, "the old Red School House", and Number 6 near the Leonard Lincoln place.

Opposite the Jarvis Shaw road, about one mile from North Prescott, on the road to Atkinson Hollow was where the old brick school house stood. This was vacated when the Number 4 school house was built.

Prescott in 1878 had 100 school children and appropriated \$500 to maintain the schools. In 1921 there were 49 scholars, and \$5000 was appropriated. The town had five school houses, but the last few years only three were used. All pupils desirous of going to high school had their tuition and transportation paid to New Salem or Athol, by the town.

The Legislature required all of the towns to be formed into districts which should choose a superintendent of schools. Dana, Greenwich and New Salem were associated with this town, and Emerson L. Adams, who had been principal of the high school, (called New Salem Academy), for ten years, (about 1901 or '02), was chosen superintendent. He resigned and went to Fryeburg, Maine, in 1903. Afterwards he went to Rhode Island and was Commissioner of Education for the state of Rhode Island for a number of years.

I have been informed that the district No. 6 school house was in the east part of the town, near J. M. Stacy's and Leonard Lincoln's. The building was gone or was not used in 1873, the year F. W. Beers and Company printed the Hampshire County Atlas, which gave the location of all the other five districts. The author scanned records to see when some of the pupils in the other districts were born, and found it must have been about 1866 or '67. Oella Lawless was born October 28, 1856; Lula A. Peirce about 1859; John Lawless, June 3, 1859; Herbert E. Peirce, June 28, 1861; Mary Emma Haskins, August 31, 1856; Carrie A. Powers, September 28, 1859; Lucy Flora Stone, June 29, 1860; Henry Powers, July 22, 1857; Whitney O. Haskins, May 13, 1861; Her-

bert Powers, December 10, 1861; Frank W. Pierce, November 6, 1852. The youngest would be about five or six and the oldest would be fourteen or fifteen.

The population of Prescott in 1863 was 596. There were six schools; 87 pupils in summer and 128 in winter. The population in 1870 was 541.

Following is a list of pupils who were not absent from school, in the schools of Prescott, about the years 1865-'66 or '67:

District No. 5:—Summer term, Alice Lindsey, Addie Lindsey, George Lincoln, Myron Lincoln. Winter term: John M. Horr.

District No. 6:—Summer term, Ida D. Caswell, Milford D. Thayer. Winter term: Adella E. Albee, Ida D. Caswell.

In 1889-90 there were about sixty children who attended the schools in Prescott.

The teachers at this time were: In No. 1 school, 1st term, Miss Jennie E. Haskell; 2nd term, Miss Mabel M. Emmons.

In No. 2, 1st term, Grace G. Gibbs; second and third, Miss Gibbs.

Miss Lizzie E. Houghton taught the first and second term in No. 3, and Hattie E. Haskins taught the third term.

In No. 4: First term, Miss Eveline M. Belden; second term, Mrs. Adeline D. Powers.

In No. 5, the first term was taught by Miss Alice E. Wood, who also taught the second term.

The teachers were paid salaries of \$691.50.

Roll Of Honor

Following is the attendance roll of honor:

The pupils from No. 1 school were conveyed to No. 2 school during the spring term at an expense of \$25.00.

The Town appropriation was \$500.00, the State School Fund was \$303.07, dog tax \$30.16, balance on hand from the year before \$139.33—total \$972.56.

Henry N. Grover, William F. Wendemuth and Herman C. Powers made up the school committee.

In 1894-5 there were 73 pupils. The actual cost of schools for this year was \$1006.62.

The Superintendent of Schools made the following report:

"There have been thirty weeks of school the past year, divided into three terms at five different houses with the exception of No. 1 of the spring term, when the scholars were conveyed to No. 4 at an expense of \$45.00.

"The general attendance has been good, and the result, on the whole, satisfactory. We have had two scholars from New Salem at No. 5 the past year, lowering the expense somewhat there. We have also schooled one at North Dana at an expense of \$9.00, which is much cheaper than we could have done otherwise. "We have quite a fair amount of supplies on hand, but books are somewhat short in some kinds, especially Spellers, Primers and Geographies. The houses as a whole are in good repair, with the exception of Numbers 3 and 5, which need new doors in the entries, also No. 1 needs a slight repair. We recommend that \$500 be appropriated for schools, \$150 for transportation of pupils, \$25 for textbooks and supplies.

"Our surplus or overlay money is somewhat exhausted at the present time, and if there are to be five schools kept, more money must be raised and appropriated for school purposes. It has cost \$850 the past year for teachers, which may seem a large price, but when you take into consideration that there have been five schools instead of three, you will see that the programme is somewhat changed. We will admit that it is cheaper to convey pupils and to have only two or three schools, but does it give as good satisfaction? Our schools are all small and far between at the best, and when only three are kept it is still farther. There are some scholars who will be likely to want conveyance even if five schools are kept. In the west part of the town there are quite a few scholars at the present time who will want some accommodation."

No. 3, 1st term, Estella A. Vaughn; 2nd and 3rd terms, Mrs. A. L. Brown. No. 4, 1st term, Lizzie Wesson; 2nd term, Grace Thayer; 3rd term, Henry Vaughn. No. 5, 1st, 2nd and 3rd terms, Alice Wood.

William Dwight Davis served as superintendent of schools in 1903-04. He was a school master for 45 years, retiring as principal of the Cummings school in Woburn in 1937, after a period of 22 years there. Previously he taught in Brockton, North Weymouth, Dover, N. H., Ludlow, Vt., Lawrence and Derry, N. H.

Louis A. Pratt who died July 17, 1934, was superintendent of schools about 1907.

In 1909-10, G. Alvin Grover was superintendent of schools for $13\frac{1}{2}$ months, receiving a salary of \$364.06, for the above number of months.

Charles L. Clay commenced his duties as superintendent of schools April 1, 1910, and continued as superintendent of the Prescott schools until June, 1915.

The following is a report of the superintendent of schools, February 17, 1914.

AN OLD STORY

"The same teachers remained during the winter terms with one exception as when the last report was made. The exception was at Number 3. The school life of the teacher 'was made miserable' and she resigned. Miss Ruth V. Maddock, who has 'made good' in another difficult school of the district was engaged for the position and taught quite acceptably. She could not be persuaded to return.

"School Number 1 received Mrs. Thayer as its instructor in March and has been fortunate in retaining her since. The teacher's intense earnestness makes the school a constant reality.

"Number 2 has been equally fortunate in keeping Mrs. Laplant. In its personnel, this school, the largest in town, is almost a pure 'State Institution.'

"Number 3 opened in the fall with a well trained and promising teacher but without experience. Having acquired a good deal of experience in a short time she resigned at the Christmas recess, not having an altogether happy stay with us.

"It seems almost incredible that 'no, not one good teacher' should be among the many the present superintendent has been instrumental in securing for this school. Had a similar result been connected with any other of the schools of this district, he might think it was from a general lack of good judgment on his part in selecting the teachers. At any rate, his anxiety resulting from possible failures in all the schools of the district combined has not been greater than that of this one school, and one of the results coming to him, he was told, 'is a good bunch of enemies.' The trouble, however, has not been entirely with the teachers, nor is it with the school itself.

"Acting upon good 'advice' I set out to find the 'perfect teacher' for our 'next'. She must not be 'hity-tity'; must buck fashion and 'wear long dresses', must never have seen 'a normal school'; must not share 'in the games of the children'; should have 'a proper chin'; must be past 'the giddy age'—from 30 to 40; ought to know intuitively any physical defects of the pupils; must have the piercing eye and severe facial expression that will squelch even an incipient thought of disorder; etc., etc.

"Calling two other superintendents, representative of a normal school, and two agencies to my assistance, I got 'in touch' with 16 different teachers. After answering such questions as 'How far is the school from the railroad station?' 'Can I get home (to Worcester) every Friday night?' 'Do the electrics pass the school?' etc., most of the 16 were no longer 'interested.' My fast vanishing hope revived in an 'interview' with Miss O'Connor who seemed to possess several of the requisite conditions, and was willing 'to go into the country'. She was engaged and ap-

parently nearly everyone is happy. Miss O'Connor was heard casually to remark, 'While I stay, I propose to be mistress of my school.'

"Number 5 offered no inducement to Miss Vaughn to continue to another year, and Miss Chapin of Springfield has been in charge, doing good work with all of her pupils interested.

"Music and Drawing:—Upon my earnest solicitation, Miss Rodowsky was engaged to supervise the subject of music in all of the schools and of drawing in two of them. She gives a day once in every two weeks. The interest manifested by all of the children in these exercises shows 'a thirst for knowledge' in the subjects that I wish every patron of the schools might witness for once at least.

"Introductions:—'Minimum Essentials' are sheets of number exercises like 'the tables of division' for instance, or questions on grammar, etc., all serving to give 'drill' and save time; pre-American history for the sixth grade is designed to give the youngsters the idea that there was something going on in the world worth knowing about before '1492'. With a music teacher the children had to have music books of course.

"January 7 and 8, Miss Hanna P. Waterman, supervisor of Correspondence Courses at North Adams normal school, spent in the districts, giving half a day to each town. It is hardly necessary to say that the lessons were both very interesting and instructive.

"Another Instance:—A boy is haled into court for some misdemeanor; he has been unmanageable; the father suggests that what the boy needs most is a good thrashing; Judge Fowler concurs. Without delay 'an old fashioned lickin' ' is administered. The judge, who could send the boy to an institution, instead places him on probation. Immediately a hullabaloo arises. The whole neighborhood shudders. This is all in accordance with latter day teaching. We learn if the boy is bad, he is not to blame. It is his heritage—perhaps of two or three generations. In any case the boy should never be punished. And if an old fashioned judge dares to see otherwise, recall him. But some of us retain a sneaking gratitude to judges like William Fowler and to occasional parents who still keep their vision of bringing up

children unobscured by all the sentimentality that is afloat in the world.—From a recent editorial in the Boston Herald.

"A Selection:—Education constitutes the most important institution in the national economics. The public schools are the most important agencies of education, because nine-tenths of those who receive any education at all, attend them.

"Governors, legislatures, boards of education and school buildings do not teach. They are means to the existence of the school. It all depends upon the teacher; the teacher makes the school; the teacher creates the school in his own image; he makes the school according to his own character. The teacher is, in fact, the school and the most important function of government is to place in the school teachers of the highest moral character. If pure democracy must succeed in this great land, the school teachers must hold the highest ideal of citizenship.—U. S. Commissioner of Education.

"Three Legislative Enactments of 1913:—1. A town not required to maintain a high school 'shall, through its school committee, when necessary, provide for the transportation of any child who resides in said town and who, with the previous approval of the school committee of the town, attends the high school of any other town or city, and shall pay for the expense of such transportation, a sum not exceeding one dollar and fifty cents per week during the time of the actual attendance of such child in high school. A town which expended for the support of its public schools for the preceding year from the proceeds of local taxation, an amount not less than four and less than five dollars per thousand dollars of valuation, shall receive from the treasury of the Commonwealth one half of the amount actually expended for transportation under this act.'—Chap. 396.

This year Prescott comes under the above stipulation as to repayment.

"2. A new law relating to the employment of women and children. Between 14 and 16 years of age, twenty-one kinds of employment are forbidden; must attend school regularly unless they hold employment certificates and work six hours per day regularly, or have the written permission of the superintendent of schools to engage in profitable employment at home; or unless

otherwise receiving instruction in a manner approved in advance by the superintendent of schools or the school committee.

"Boys 16 to 18 and girls 16 to 21 may not work more than 10 hours in any one day and 54 hours in any one week; children under 21 must not be employed in, about or in connection with saloons or bars or sent to immoral resorts.

"Educational certificates must show completion of fourth grade work in reading, writing and spelling completed, otherwise employment is illegal, etc.—Chap. 779.

"3. The Massachusetts Teachers' Retirement System is an arrangement for paying annuities and pensions to teachers. As far as teachers are concerned, it goes into effect July 1, 1914. The cost of membership is five per cent of a teacher's salary. A teacher may retire at the age of 60 and must retire at the age of 70. Upon order of the school committee, the town or city treasurer is to deduct the assessment from the teacher's salary. These deductions he will forward once a month to the secretary of the Retirement Board.—Chap. 832.

LIST OF TEACHERS

Following is a listing of teachers and their respective salaries: No. 1, Mrs. Fanny G. Thayer, Belvedere Seminary—wages \$40.00; No. 2, Mrs. Annis E. Laplante, New Salem Academy—wages \$40.00; No. 3, Ruth V. Maddock, Salem Normal—wages \$40.00; No. 3, Maud A. Edson, North Adams Normal—wages \$40.00; No. 3, Catherine O'Connor, Taunton High School—wages \$44.00.

Spring term, to January 1—Special teacher since September 1: Mabel Rodowsky, New England Conservatory—wages \$5.00.

Charles L. Clay of North Dana took the office of superintendent April 1, 1910, and held that position until June 1915. It was taken over in September, 1915, by Charles C. Richardson for three years.

In 1932 Superintendent Charles Richardson was sub-master in a boys' private school in Bridgeport, Conn., owned by his son, Mark Richardson. Ruth Richardson, his daughter, took her A. B. and A. M. degrees from Boston University, and has completed all tests for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Columbia University, New York. She later accepted the position of associate professor of Spanish at the College of Wooster, Ohio.

In September, 1918, Arthur W. Smith became superintendent of the Prescott schools and held that position for 12 years, retiring in 1930 and moving to Whitman, Mass. Mr. Smith was instantly killed by an automobile as he alighted from a bus upon his return home from a visit in Westfield, Mass., in 1935.

The first school physician was Stephen Witt, M. D., of North Dana, in 1915. In 1921 J. C. Feindel, M. D., of North Dana became school physician.

In 1914 Mrs. Jennie McCullock was music teacher in the school. In 1915 the music supervisor was Elizabeth F. Strecher, followed in 1916-17 by Ruth C. Sprague; 1918, Mrs. Ruth B. Dwelley; 1921, Mrs. Clara W. Whitaker; 1924, Genevieve H. Gale. Francis J. Gorman of Westboro was supervisor of music from September 7, 1925 to June 21, 1928. Mrs. Ferne S. Bacon of Boston supervised music and drawing from September 3, 1929 to January 1, 1930.

Miss Barbara M. McClelland of Chicopee taught in No. 3 school from September 4, 1928 to June 21, 1929. Miss Grace Southworth of Dana was the last teacher to teach in Prescott. She taught from September 3, 1929 to January 1, 1930. There were 10 pupils—six boys and four girls.

No. 3 school house was situated in the south part of the town on 'Prescott Hill.'

The town report for 1881 was just concerned with the schools and printed by Waterman's Steam Printing House, opposite Union Depot, Athol, Mass., 1882.

The teachers were: District No. 1, Belle P. Estey of Petersham, Mass., 16 pupils; District No. 2, Emily Wheeler, New Salem, Mass., 15 pupils in summer and 18 in winter; District No. 3, Mrs. Mary A. Stiles, 22 pupils in summer and also in the winter term; District No. 4, Mrs. W. M. Aldrich, part of term, and J. Fayette Stone, 22 pupils; District No. 5, Mrs. Kate B. Stowell, 17 pupils in summer and 16 in winter. West C. Aldrich, Rev. A. Alvord and Varnum V. Vaughan comprised the school committee.

The following is an article which was printed in the Athol Transcript about forty years ago and it comes from a reliable source that the teacher concerned was teaching in District No. 1 school in Prescott.

TALE OF A SCHOOL TEACHER

"We are called to relate an incident in the career of a schoolteacher. We will be excused if we do not locate the affair or the parties concerned. It is said to have occurred in a neighboring town.

"The last term of school a young lady teacher was engaged to teach in one of the little district school houses. When she came to take up her duties she went to board with one of the well known residents of the town, who lived a short distance from the school house. What seemed then a matter of common courtesy. the teacher was invited to accompany the man and his family to such places as were proper for mild amusement and instruction. There came a time, however, when the man invited the teacher to go somewhere with him unaccompanied by others, and she promptly declined. A young man came forward and offered his services as an escort, and they were accepted. Hence the man seemed to take offense, declaring that when the white horse came around his bay horse was of no account, and proceeded from that time forth to make himself disagreeable. The teacher, coming home one night at 9 or 9.30 o'clock, found the door tied from the outside by a rope to a tree, and it took her escort a long time to untangle the thing, and it would have been well nigh impossible for her to do it herself. Then again, she would find herself locked out, with a disposition upon the part of the man to keep her waiting a long time. She asked for a key to use upon such occasions. The man gave her one, but straightway replaced the old lock with a new one, and her key was useless. The climax of this man's ingenuity was worthy a better cause—he hung a bell under her bed, attached to it a string which went down through the floor, and we suppose the man kept awake nights to pull the string. Of course no self respecting school teacher was going to stand that kind of fun long, and three or four days before the end of the term, she paid her board and took her trunk away, finding temporary quarters elsewhere.

"By a careful observer we are informed that North Prescott seems to be the storm center of an epidemic of unsatisfied longing and aching hearts. Whether it was caused by the extended dry season, or by a scarcity of good fellows or otherwise, we do not know. Unrequited love is said to be a disease which can double discount the smallpox, and then beat it all to thunder for disagreeable features, and we wonder if one man we know of is not using his knowledge of Materia Medica to compound a Remedia Amoris, or balm for injured hearts. There would be money and fame in such a discovery, doubtless, provided of course that the discoverer did not himself contract the disease, and use so much of his own remedy as to eat up all profits on sale."

ANOTHER AMUSING INCIDENT

Here is a little incident which gave Rev. Nelson Jones and family some amusement. One day a young man and a young lady called at his home in Prescott, to be married. He invited them in and ushered them into the parlor, where he performed the ceremony that made them man and wife. After the ceremony was over, the young man turned to the parson and said, "Well, Elder, how much is the bill?"

Being somewhat surprised by the question, Rev. Mr. Jones replied, "The law allows me \$1.25."

"All right," said the young bridegroom, "here is 75 cents. That makes you two dollars."

MR. HARRISON L. THRESHER, THE FIRST AND ONLY RURAL MAIL CARRIER IN PRESCOTT AND GREENWICH

Mr. Harrison L. Thresher began his duties as rural mail carrier on May 2, 1904, when the first rural mail was delivered in Greenwich and Prescott and continued for thirty years. During all of this time, he lost only three days on account of sickness and one of those was unnecessary—a very remarkable career.

The route was originally 22.4 miles and about half of this was in Prescott. At the time he started on the route in 1904, there were no vacant residences on the route.

Nearly all of the route in Prescott was discontinued on December 15, 1933. The route from Atkinson Hollow towards Cooleyville, in Prescott, was discontinued in April, 1930. The Greenwich postoffice was closed and the people were served from the Greenwich Village office.

Mr. Thresher was the first and only regular carrier starting from Greenwich Village and having had only five different substitutes during his period of service. His post as mail carrier was discontinued on May 31, 1934, and the last passenger and mail trains were discontinued in May, 1935.

At the time Mr. Thresher discontinued his work on May 31, 1934, the few miles of the route which he had left in Greenwich were taken over by Enfield. Mr. Thresher deserves much credit for his long and faithful service.

He was born in Prescott, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Thresher.

MR. EARL WHITAKER

Mr. Earl Whitaker, on June 30, 1938, completed 24 years of active service for the government, delivering mail on the Star Route between Orange and Cooleyville, including Millington and North Prescott.

The Star Route carrier is required to put up a bid for the work every four years, and the lowest bidder gets the job. In 1938 Mr. Whitaker forfeited the job to a lower bidder.

For many years the mail had been carried on this route, when the only means of travel was with the horse and buggy, and in the winter months the sleigh. Mr. Whitaker, during the last few years of service, had the advantage of the older carriers on this route by having an automobile, with which he could make the trip in much less time.

Mr. Whitaker gave very efficient service. He carried passengers and was entrusted to do many errands for people living on the route.

At the Orange postoffice, on the concluding day of his service, he was presented a bagful of gifts labeled 'Whit' by the local force, as a token of respect and friendship.

MILITARY RECORDS

In the military records of Prescott are listed those who served in the Revolutionary war: Alexander Conkey, Capt. Isaac Gray, Joel Gray, David Peirce, John Atchinson, Stephen Powers and Jesse Aldrich (who served at Ticonderoga). These men lived in the part of New Salem which was afterwards Prescott.

With the Shays Rebellion the people of the town are said to have been in sympathy, and many of them participated in the insurrection, Jacob Sampson being one of the principal of these. At the time of the uprising, Daniel Shays, the recognized leader of the movement, lived within the limits of the town of Prescott, occupying the house where Ansel Johnson lived. Here the first councils were held, and the first troops were mustered at the inn of William Conkey, near "Bobbinville", later known as the Milo Abbott house.

At the country's call for men in 1861, the following 46 men went into service from Prescott: Oscar A. Titus, Lucian Mortimer Titus, Dexter M. Vaughan, George H. Upton, Daniel Lombard, John Abbott, F. William Fawcett, Henry S. Upton, John W. Upton, William A. Stockwell, Collis W. Vaughan (Wales MacCollis Vaughan), Farnum Lindsey, James P. Little, William R. Caswell, Dexter Oaks, Isaac Powers, William H. Oakes, Alphonso Oaks, Whitman A. Aldrich, Horace Lindsey, Henry A. Peirce, Simon Stockwell, David J. Oakes, Marcus E. Vaughan,

Jason B. Cowan, James J. Woodard, William Akers, Henry O. Oakes, Martin S. Vaughan, Lyman Gibbs, Augustus Upton, Levi G. Osborn, Darbey Fakey, Lawrence McCarthy, Frederick Clapp, Charles Saunz, Merrick Bliss, Simon Gilbert, Orin S. Oakes, William T. Upton, J. E. Smitherly, Charles F. Warner, William Tourtelott, Almon A. Powers, Forest E. Hanson, Joseph N. Shaw.

Eight of these men died in service.

Varnum V. Vaughan, second lieutenant, 53rd Infantry M. V. M. in service of the V. S., October 17, 1862, was mustered out September 2, 1863.

In the war of 1812 there went from the territory of what was later Prescott: Jno. T. Conkey, Samuel Sampson, Caleb Peirce, Isaac Upton, Andrew Newhall, Chester Gregg, Levi Davis, Samuel and Luther Hunt, from New Salem, near the Prescott line.

In World War I Prescott sent, in 1917, 13 young men: Frank A. Bowen, John R. Fisher, Milfred A. Grout, Robert A. Newbury, Harrison Peirce, Harold Peirce, Harry Upton, Willis F. Shaw, Joseph Venette, Conrad Lincoln, John M. Currier, Jesse L. Haskins and Albert Wendemuth.

Harold F. Peirce, John Currier and Willis Shaw died of influenza while in the service at Camp Devens. Conrad Lincoln was killed instantly near the Argonne Forest in France, September 10, 1918, the day after he had been made corporal. Frank A. Bowen was badly wounded by a shell a few days before the Armistice, and lay in a hospital in France for months, coming home in the spring of 1919.

The sons of Prescott, who gave loyal service,—some of whom gave their lives for their country—are especially dear in our remembrance.

METROPOLITAN WATER AND SEWAGE BOARD

Many could never see the necessity of taking over the towns for the Boston water supply. For much less money, it seemed, wells could have been driven supplying all the extra water needed. The towns could then have been left as they were

and the people could have continued to live in the homes they loved.

If one could only see into the future, there might come a time when Boston would decide it did not need the water for drinking purposes, and then on the hills of Prescott and other sections, there would be summer homes. The woods and the reservoir would be used for hunting and fishing and other sports:

Time alone can tell.

It was in 1919 that the Legislature ordered the Department of Health and the Metropolitan Water and Sewage Board to survey the water supply sources. In 1922 the report, a voluminous affair, was made, and among its many recommendations was the development of the Ware and Swift river basins. The Legislature waited until 1924 to order a further investigation, which brought into being another commission composed of Charles R. Gow of Boston, George F. Booth of Worcester and Elbert E. Lochridge of Springfield, with the engineering aid of Allen Hazen of New York.

In 1926 the Legislature passed an emergency act and the Metropolitan Water Commission was given all necessary authority to speed up the work.

It had power to buy land, buildings, rights of way and about anything that would help rush water into Wachusett reservoir. It included the right to draw on the Commonwealth for \$15,000,000 and it will be seen it has been drawing steadily ever since. —

It is said the Quabbin reservoir will cost more than the work on Boulder Dam which was \$54,000,000, while Quabbin will cost at least \$85,000,000. It is claimed the water from Quabbin is to be used solely for consumption in greater Boston.

During the construction of the Metropolitan Water Commission reservoir, there were 28 persons killed. But strange as it may seem, there was very little publicity about it in the papers.

EVERY ABLE-BODIED MAN VOTED IN PRESCOTT

Prescott voters favored Hoover and Curtis in 1932 and cast 12 of the 14 votes for the Republican candidates. Roosevelt and Garner had one supporter and one of the voters in the hill town voted for Thomas.

Every able bodied man in Prescott was on hand to vote and only four eligibles failed to cast a ballot. Two elderly women and two men who were living away from the town were the only ones failing to vote.

Ely received five votes, Youngman eight and Lewis for governor, one. The rest of the ticket went Republican in Prescott, with the percentage for these candidates being about the same as in the presidential vote.

Mrs. Fred W. Doubleday of Greenwich Village acted as town clerk, and she and most of the other precincts' voters had to cast their ballots in Greenwich before going to Prescott and opening the polls at 10 o'clock.

STRANGE ELECTION

On April 28, 1936, in what remained of the town of Prescott, was held one of the strangest elections ever to take place in the state. Eight voters met in the deserted home of Charles Berry and in the presence of five election officials, only one of whom was a registered voter in Prescott, cast their ballots for the Republican candidates for state and national delegates.

Algie Griswold, a farmer, cast the first vote. On the delegate vote, Constable Albert Wendemuth received the largest vote of the ballot, totalling seven with a single blank.

Practically the whole ballot carried a total of four votes and four blanks after each designation.

Mr. Fred Doubleday, the registrar of voters and superintendent of the roads, and his wife, Celia Doubleday, town clerk, were the first on the scene. They arrived at the deserted homestead shortly after 9:30 o'clock in the morning. Mr. Doubleday brought from his car the ballot box, ballots, a table and several chairs and paper and pencils for the voters. They started a fire in an ancient range in the kitchen where the voting was held.

Constable Albert Wendemuth arrived soon after, he being the lone voter of the election officials' group. Mr. Wendemuth, incidentally, was the only candidate of either party for the delegate post from the district.

Walter M. Waugh, appointed selectman of the town by the Metropolitan Water Supply Commission, under whom the other four officials were also employed as town officials, came just before 10 o'clock, the appointed hour for opening the polls, and immediately Mrs. Doubleday, in her capacity as clerk, read the official notice, the warrant for declaring the polls open. A little time was spent in getting the ancient ballot box in order. Then the group sat down and patiently waited for the arrival of any of the fourteen registered voters of the town.

Harrison Peirce of Greenwich was ballot clerk. At the noon hour the election officials partook of their dinner, heating the food on the kitchen range. Mrs. Harry Peirce, wife of the ballot clerk, assisted in preparing the meal.

Prescott was turned over to the Water Commission more than six years before with the provision that it remain an incorporated town until the land was submerged by the waters of Quabbin reservoir. The Legislature designated the Commission as town administrator, with authority to conduct the election by special appointees.

Previous elections were held in the town hall, later in No. 3 school house, but as both of these buildings had been demolished, it necessitated the holding of the meetings in the uninhabited home about one half mile south of Atkinson Hollow.

THE RABBIT ROAD PASSENGER SERVICE ENDED SATURDAY, APRIL 28, 1934

The Boston and Albany railroad announced that on Saturday, the 28th of 1934 the regular passenger train on the Athol branch of the road, operated between Athol and Springfield, would be given up, leaving only a mixed freight and passenger service on this road, which was opened for traffic back in 1871.

This railroad ran through a corner of the east part of Prescott, and had a flag station there called the 'Soapstone' station.

A LETTER WRITTEN BY CHARLES J. ABBOTT

Charles J. Abbott, a son of George and Hannah Abbott, born September 15, 1839 in Prescott, wrote a very interesting article in the Athol Transcript of April 8, 1921, which is as follows:

The Proposed Valley Reservoir—A Prescott Man Objects "Editor of the Transcript:

"I have been somewhat interested in reading the different articles that have appeared in your paper from time to time in regard to the Enfield reservoir. I believe all but one of them have gone against the project. I think they have taken the right stand. I have not seen but one communication that was written by a Prescott man. As I am getting to be one of the oldest men in town, I think some of us old fellows should register our kick against it while we can. It does not seem possible that Massachusetts would, through its legislature, ever give a private corporation the right and power to entirely destroy a number of old towns and three or four villages containing so many beautiful homes, many of them surrounded by noble shade trees, trees set out by fathers, grandfathers and even great grandfathers, taking at least 150 years to bring them up to their present state of development, affording shade to man and beast, as well as being ornamental.

"I asked why is the Metropolitan Water Commission so anxious to supply Boston and other cities with water? The answer is easy. There is large money behind it for the investors. It is even now talked that they may build an electrical power plant below the dam to use up the surplus water, and manufacture power to sell to customers all over Massachusetts and Connecticut, and thereby add to their already bulging pocketbooks.

"The building of the Enfield reservoir would surely execute Enfield and Greenwich, mutilate the town of Dana to a large extent, materially injure New Salem, and impound Prescott on three sides, leaving us no chance to go out of town except over Shutesbury or New Salem hills. We could take our choice as the little boy did when he ate bread and milk for dinner.

"Our nearest railroad depot would be 10 miles over the hills to Leverett. We should lose one third of our land area, including a waterhead one half mile wide on each side, leaving a strip about two miles wide by six miles long. But it would be the best farming land in town. So much for good luck!

"But if it has to come, we must brace up and bear it. Life is short. Why should we worry? We may soon be flying planes! It has been said "man wants but little here below, nor wants that little long." Might not women be included in that quotation by changing one small word, when we consider the way she dresses herself at the present time? (Look at her scant skirt, decollete waists, with next to no sleeves, and also at the very strongly accentuated brevity of some of her fashionable creations, called 'bathing suits'. We can't help seeing she wears but little, nor wears that little very long.

"But, Mr. Editor, I am digressing. Please excuse me. Reservoirs and ladies' bathing suits are some way apart and always will be as bathing in reservoirs is always strictly forbidden, I believe.

"To come back to the matter under discussion, there are, I think, about 50 persons in Prescott of the old native stock left. Most of us are getting old, not long to live anywhere. Should the worst happen, I think most of us would stay and die here.

"Prescott is my home, though rough and poor she be, The home of many a noble soul, the birthplace of the free:

I love her rock-bound woods and hills, they are good enough for me,

I love her brooklets and her rills, but couldn't, wouldn't and shouldn't love a man-made sea.

THE PRESCOTT HISTORICAL SOCIETY, INC.

The Prescott Historical Society was organized in Prescott, August 26, 1932, at the Old Home Day celebration, and with the assistance of Jennie Shaw 28 members were secured. Frank Allen was put in as temporary chairman, and the following officers were nominated and elected: President, Harrison Peirce, Greenwich; vice-president, Ellis A. Thayer, Brookfield; treasurer, Jennie Shaw; secretary, Henry A. White, both of the latter from Orange.

The purpose of the Society shall be to engage in historical study relating to the town of Prescott and especially of individuals and families identified with its early history; to establish and maintain an historical building; and to collect, hold, preserve and exhibit letters, books, papers, relics and other objects that may be of historical value and interest to the people and friends of Prescott; and for such other purpose not inconsistent with law as may be reasonable, incident and necessary to the promotion of such objects.

The second annual meeting of the society was held at Atkinson Hollow, on Friday, August 25, 1933, on Old Home Day. The members of the Prescott Historical Society thought it would be pleasant to have the Old Home Day observance and the Historical Society meeting on the same day and in the same place, but some of the Old Home Day members did not approve of this idea, so the P. H. S. voted to have its meeting on the first Saturday in August, wherever the directors chose to have it.

The officers elected in 1933 were as follows: Harrison Peirce, of Greenwich, was re-elected president; Edgar Wood, of Athol, vice-president; Henry White and Jennie Shaw, both of Orange were re-elected secretary and treasurer, respectively. Lillie Coolidge of New Salem was elected historian. The society had about 40 members at this time.

In 1934 the annual meeting was held in Moore Hall, Millington, the following officers being elected: President, Lester Lincoln of Athol; vice-president, Edgar Wood, Athol; secretary, Henry White, Orange; treasurer, Jennie Shaw, Orange; historian, Lillie Coolidge, New Salem. The executive committee included

Ellen Coolidge for three years; Harold Patterson of Barre for two years; Flora Brown of Warren, for one year.

On August 3, 1935 the Prescott Historical Society held its annual meeting at Moore Hall in Millington. The officers elected were the same as the year before except that Lillie Coolidge was elected to the executive committee for one year in place of Mrs. Flora Brown. At this meeting the members voted to hold their next meeting in 1936 in the church at South Hadley, which was the Congregational church of Prescott, afterwards bought by Joseph Skinner and used as a museum.

The old church proved a very interesting meeting place. The whole interior of the building, balcony and basement, is full of relics—even the horse sheds were put into use and hold many very old vehicles such as one sleigh with the date 1755 on it.

The officers elected at this meeting were as follows: President, Lester M. Lincoln; vice-president, Ruby B. White; secretary, Henry A. White; treasurer, Jennie L. Shaw; historian, Lillie B. Coolidge; executive committee, Lillie Coolidge, Ellen Coolidge and Ruby White.

It was voted to hold the next annual meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Coolidge in North New Salem, and so on Saturday, August 7, 1937, there was a basket picnic and entertainment by Lincoln Entertainers of Athol which was enjoyed by all. A business session which followed the basket picnic, was marked by the introduction of the plan to incorporate the society, and by the election of officers. Lester M. Lincoln of Athol was re-elected president; Harold Patterson of Barre was elected vice-president; Henry White, secretary. Jennie Shaw resigned as treasurer and Ruby White was elected in her place. Lillie Coolidge was reappointed historian and a member of the executive committee for three years to work with Ruby White and Ellen Coolidge.

It was voted to hold, at an early date, a meeting of the president and executive committee. Application for a corporation charter was open for signatures also at this meeting.

Soon after the annual meeting in 1937, the committee engaged a lawyer in Athol, with a view to incorporation of the society.

A month of waiting for action to be forthcoming lengthened into nearly ten. Communication with Secretary of the Commonwealth Frederic W. Cook disclosed that he had received no application for incorporation of the society. Secretary Cook sent back the proper papers and the committee decided to put the negotiations in the hands of another attorney. Accordingly, it sought the services of a young lawyer in Orange and the result was receipt of the charter within two weeks, on July 7, 1938.

The New Salem Historical Society invited the Prescott Society to join with it and have an historical building on New Salem Hill. The Prescott Society agreed to the union if the designation of the society could be changed to include both names—New Salem and Prescott. At this time Dr. Thompson, who organized the New Salem society, thought his group would be willing to be incorporated under that name. But later the members changed their minds. The Prescott society then suggested to the New Salem society the name, United Historical Societies: New Salem, Dana, Prescott and Greenwich. None of the towns would then lose its identity. But this did not seem to appeal to the New Salem society and it subsequently was incorporated under the name of the Swift River Valley Historical Society. The Prescott group, not wishing to lose the identity of its town, incorporated under the name of The Prescott Historical Society, Inc.

The seventh annual meeting was held in Hunt's grove, Orange, August 6, 1938, with a good number of members and friends present, from Athol, Orange, Warwick, Springfield, Montague, Middleboro, Elmwood, New Salem, Lynn, Canton, Me., and Plainfield. A basket lunch was partaken at noon. In the afternoon there was an entertainment and a business meeting.

Officers elected at this meeting were: President, Lester Lincoln, Athol; vice-president, Herbert W. Foote of Canton, Me.; secretary and clerk, Henry A. White, Orange; treasurer, Ruby B. White, Orange; historian, Lillie Coolidge, New Salem; director for the three year term, Franklin A. Pierce, Middleboro; two year term, Bertha C. Pierce, Montague; one year term, Ellen A. Coolidge, New Salem. Several new members were taken in.

One hundred and fifty members and friends of the Prescott Historical Society, Inc., met at North Prescott church on Satur-

day, August 5, 1939, registering from Maine, New Jersey, Washington, D. C., New York City, Brookfield, West Brookfield, Petersham, Athol, Orange, West Pelham, Springfield, Amherst, Brockton, Elmwood, Bridgewater and New Salem. A short business meeting followed the basket picnic at noon. Some 200 views of Prescott were particularly interesting to the assemblage. The same officers were re-elected.

"Put's Rube Band", the Misses Rowena O'Mara, Nancy Powers and Abbie Whitney, and Carroll Brown of Orange, and Lester Lincoln of Athol entertained.

The ninth annual meeting was also held in the North Prescott church, which is located only about 25 feet from the deadline of the Quabbin area, with a locked gate which bars all people from the former town of Prescott. The former officers were all re-elected with the exception of Bertha Pierce, one of the directors. Harry L. Coolidge was elected to take her place.

During the afternoon a program was given. Rev. Joseph Moline of Phillipston offered prayer; readings were given by John Whitney, Miss Abbie Whitney and Rowena O'Mara, all of Orange and Ellen Coolidge of New Salem. Little Miss O'Mara also rendered three cornet solos and a trio consisting of Lillie Coolidge, Dewene Chamberlin and Ellen Coolidge sang several selections. The two oldest former residents present were Miss Mary Vaughan of New Salem and Mrs. Cora Abbott of Belchertown.

Since the society was organized, several of the members have died: Carrie Berry, Frank Currier, Ella Currier, Anson White, Mary White, Charles Welden, Hattie Haskins, Cora A. Abbott and Myron Algie Griswold.

The Prescott Historical Society, Inc., held its annual meeting at the North Prescott church on August 2, 1941, about 100 people being present from Forestville, Conn., Ware, Barre, Wilbraham, Springfield, Amherst, Pelham, Leverett, Athol, Orange, New Salem, Norfolk, Va., Washington, D. C.

The society had lost three members during the previous year and six new members were taken in.

The entertainment consisted of The Sailorettes (a young girl orchestra of Orange) and a talk by Arthur B. Haley of Orange on the purpose of the society which was very much appreciated.

Officers were all re-elected.

The following are excerpts from the paper read by Mr. Haley:

"That which happens today is History tomorrow; or, to express it more briefly—Tomorrow, Today will be Yesterday. Tomorrow is our goal. Today is ours. Today and Tomorrow are in the making. Our opportunities lie at hand and ahead. Our castles in the air are possible History Tomorrow. The foundations of these castles are in the deeds of Yesterday. History is the story of Yesterday told today or tomorrow.

"Historical societies should assume the responsibility of passing on traditions of the past and discover methods and means of uncovering new stories of facts and persons and passing them on to posterity. Historical societies need an organization and an historic building for a meeting place, which is a safe repository for antiques and valuable documents and letters.

"Youth must be enlisted in historical societies' programs or the meetings become as lifeless as the old fashioned parlor where the clergy used to visit. Youth needs live subjects or enlivened presentations of historical subjects to be enlisted in interest.

"Historical society buildings should be centers for the diffusion of knowledge about the past. The building should have a custodian who will open the building at any time for visitors. This is one of the best ways to advertise the society's belongings and program. The museum should be arranged in good taste. Reports of meetings should be sent to newspapers and also to all members of the society and to friends. Gifts should be acknowledged by a letter from the secretary. A program of tactful approach for gifts should be well planned. Genealogical records are a vital part of the program. Enrollment of members and a sound financial set-up are problems that are to be keenly attended to. Preservation and perpetuation of Yesterday's historic lore go hand in hand."

Mr. Haley ended his talk by reading the poem written and read by Rev. Charles H. Smith, at the Prescott reunion of 1938.

MEMOIRS

For a number of years in the eighties and the early part of the nineties dances were held in what was Aldrich Hall (later called Grange Hall) in Atkinson Hollow, Prescott, every two weeks during the winter months.

How well are remembered the good times the old and the young had together, when Gene Lincoln played on his violin and Rose Wheeler played the organ. And how well you might remember too the way Lou Giffin would sit and play those old contra dances on his violin with his eyes closed. You would think by looking at him that he was asleep—perhaps he was asleep. He played them so much one would not be surprised if he could play them in his sleep.

Then again we danced to the music of Whitney Haskins' violin, with his sister-in-law, Carrie Wheeler, playing the organ and West Aldrich as prompter. Sometimes in Mr. Aldrich's absence Waldo Peirce would call the dances.

What big gatherings we would have! Some would come from Orange, some from Athol, Dana, Greenwich, Enfield, New Salem, Pelham and Shutesbury. The old hall would be crowded. How we would all dance those old contra dances—Money Musk, Lady Walpole's Reel, Fishers' Horn Pipe, Hull's Victory, square dances, the Tempest, waltz, five-step schottische, polka and Portland Fancy.

This is the way we used to dance the Portland Fancy: Join hands and swing eight, head couple (gentleman opposite lady) down the middle, foot couple up the outside (at the same time), back to places; head couple down the outside and the foot couple up the middle, back to places; ladies' chain at the head, right and left at the foot, right and left at the head and ladies' chain at the foot, all forward, forward and cross by opposite couple and face the next four and repeat.

All of these dances bring many happy memories back to all. One recalls one winter, when Dr. Walter Clark played first violin, Fred Potter second violin and Dexter Wheelock clarinet, and also Carrie Wheeler played the organ. There was what was called a music stand where the musicians sat when they played

and a shelf where they had their music. This particular night we were dancing "The Tempest", which was always the last dance of the evening. The dancers all lined up on each side of the hall, the two head couples would promenade down the center. then back, ladies' change, right and left, then down the center again and so on down through the line. When every other couple was going down the center the dance became quite exciting. The writer was dancing with Charlie Hunter, both of usin our teens and full of life. We were at the head and went down the center. When we came back we were going with such speed that, the floor being very slippery, we were unable to stop until we hit the music stand. The music flew in all directions. We glanced at the musicians, expecting to see them all scowling at us in anger, but instead, to our surprise, they were laughing and there was a merry twinkle in Dr. Clark's eyes. Those were grand old days, which will never be forgotten.

Gentlemen were admitted to these dances for 25 cents, ladies free. Sometimes there would be an oyster supper, at a charge of 25 cents. Those who came from a distance with teams were charged 25 cents for putting them up. These dances would begin around eight o'clock and last until two or three in the morning and sometimes later. How well we remember walking home with neighbors and friends and going up the road a good many times after it was daylight, (this in the spring or early fall). For many days we would live over again the good time we had at these dances and look forward to the next dance scheduled in two weeks.


ANOTHER GOOD TIME

A girl friend, Miss Eva Fisher of Orange, came to visit us once in the winter time and my brother Carl and I thought it would be nice to entertain her by going skating. My brother suggested that the best skating would be down on Marshall Brown's pond. It was only about four miles and we could slide on the double runner half of the way. So right after dinner we started out. We rode down the hill and then had to walk about a mile, past the Oliver Wood place, Criton Haskins', George Upton's, Mason Haskins', then around the curve past where Uzziel

Haskins used to live. (Mr. Haskins has been dead several years and the author has forgotten who lived there then). Then we passed the Henry Johnson place and George Johnson's house, which was new, (built in about 1882 or 1883) and came to the Charles Powers place, then No. 4 school house. From there we rode down the cross road towards Rev. Nelson Jones' house and over a small hill between there and Joseph Stone's property. We stopped at Mr. Stone's and asked Mabel and Leon if they would like to go along with us. They said they would, so Leon got his sled and we were ready to go on our way. It was only a short distance from there to a long hill down past Joseph Vaughan'sfrom there we went up a short hill around a curve and came to the Stacy place. Luke Stacy and Ellis Thayer joined us there and we had two double runner sleds, full. From the Stacy house there was a long hill, which, being icy made grand sliding, with some genuine 'thank-ye-marms'. We got on our sleds, Mabel Stone sitting back of me, last on the sled. We started and were going like the wind down the hill when we went over one of those 'thank-ye-marms'. Wemissed Mabel, glanced around and saw her coming down the middle of the road—only she wasn't on the sled! We stopped as soon as we could and asked her if she were all right. Luckily she was but I am afraid if she had been dressed the way the girls dress today she would have had to have given up the trip and gone home. In those days young girls in their teens wore long wool dresses in winter and heavy underwear. So everything was all right and we got back on the sled and went to the foot of the hill where we found the others waiting for us.

We stopped at Mr. and Mrs. Brown's, (Mrs. Brown being Mabel's and Leon's sister) to relate Mabel's experience, with much laughter at her expense, and then went over to the pond which was only a short distance from the house. Ada Ramsdell was at Mrs. Brown's so we invited her to go skating with us. When we got to the pond we all put on our skates and the boys made a fire and the skating began. We had not been there long when Jim Wood and his sister Alice came, Alice with a new pair of skates. Jim was a good skater and was going to teach her to skate. He could cut circles, forward and backward and do quite a bit of fancy skating. We were all standing around the fire talking when Jim started out with long strides and circled

around, saying as he started, "Well, Alice, this is the first lesson." Then he skated around some more and said, "This is the second lesson." Whereupon he jumped over the fire! No doubt Jim had done that stunt a great many times and made out all right, but this time he came down with a hard thud—and not on his skates! "Pity sakes," said Alice, "if that is the second lesson, I guess I don't want it." I think anyone could have heard the shouting for two miles. We skated around after that until almost night without any more mishaps, and then we started for home. The hills seemed much longer going back, but we were young and having a good time and we did not mind too much. We walked about two miles to Leon's home, where he hitched up his horse and carried us home for which we were all very thankful. We had all had a wonderful time, and that paid us for the long journey.

The token of love that the author feels for the memory of her mother is one reason that impelled her to collect these records of the David Peirce family—it is the debt of gratitude that she owes her ancestors, that although they are dead and gone and perhaps forgotten by many, their names will be preserved and shall not go into oblivion.

The author has never heard that there was a genealogy written of the David Peirce family. She has done the best she could to collect and type these imperfect records and to the people who read them and decide that it ought to have been better, the author will say, "The fault may be with you. Perhaps you are the person on whom the blame should fall for withholding the information you possessed."

These facts have been derived from a great number of sources. Weeks and months have been spent gathering information in cemeteries and libraries, from vital records in different towns and cities and from the offices of town clerks.

Much information came from aged people, and from younger people whose parents have thoughtfully left records behind them. The letters the author has written are too numerous to mention, some with good results, and some never answered. Those who did not care enough about their relatives to spend a few minutes to write a letter giving information concerning them, probably will not care to read these records. Certainly there will be a few who will be interested and if there is, the author will be fully repaid.

PEIRCE

In the book, Wars of the Revolution, the author saw 34 ways of spelling the name of Peirce. It is often spelled differently in the same families. The most common form is Peirce, Pierce, Pearce.

DAVID PEIRCE

David Peirce of Middleboro and Martha Canedy (sometimes spelled Cannede) filed marriage intentions September 25, 1763, in Rochester, Mass. (Rochester vital records). In Middleboro, December 5, 1764, Martha Canedy married David Peirce, (information from the town clerk of Middleboro.)

The author has been unable to find any date of their settlement in New Salem. David Peirce was evidently one of the first settlers of the south part of the town, which was later the north part of Prescott.

David Peirce served in the Revolutionary War and he died when he was returning home. His companions carried him for four days on a bier before he expired.

Martha (Canedy) Peirce, widow of David, married for her second husband, Abel Fish of New Salem, moved to Greenfield, Ohio, and died there.

For an example: David and Martha (Canedy) Peirce had four children. These children are designated as "a". Therefore the eldest son of David and Martha Peirce would be designated as "a 1", Alden the second son would be "a 2", their third son would be "a 3", and Caleb the fourth son would be designated as "a 4". The next generation down from Caleb would be known as "b"; the third generation would be known as "c", and so on down to the present generation.

Example: The following:—b 7, c 1, d 6, would indicate that the seventh child (Madison Peirce) of Caleb and Nancy (Aldrich) Peirce had as their first child (c-1) Ellen Peirce, who had as her sixth child (d-6, the compiler of the book), Lillie B. (Pierce) Coolidge.

Caleb Peirce taught school for several years, was a justice of the peace, and served as town clerk and selectman of Prescott for several years. He was a very active and capable man.

Jesse Aldrich served in the war of the American Revolution. David and Martha Peirce had four sons, Alexander, Alden, John and Caleb. Two of his sons, Alexander and Alden removed to Maine. Both afterwards returned, Alexander dying soon after. Alden removed to Leverett and later John and Alden settled in Greenfield, Ohio, and died there. Caleb remained on the old home place, which was situated about three-fourths of a mile north of Atkinson Hollow, on the road to Cooleyville. He was twice married, had ten children by his first wife and six by the second. He was the agent appointed to secure the incorporation of the town of Prescott.

RECORDS OF DEACON EDWARD CONVERSE

Rev. Nelson B. Jones of Prescott was a descendant of Deacon Edward Converse, b. January 30, 1590, died August 10, 1663. He came to this country from England with Governor Winthrop's company of about 700 people who arrived here June 12, 1630. Some of the company settled in Boston, some in what is now Malden, but Deacon Edward landed and settled in Charlestown, finally removing to Woburn where he died.

- (2) Sergeant Samuel Converse, of Woburn, youngest son of Deacon Edward Converse, born about March 12, 1637, died February 20, 1669. He married Judith, daughter of Rev. Thomas and Mary Carter. The above Samuel came to an untimely death by an accident in a corn mill which he had inherited from his father, Deacon Edward Converse. The record of his death is on file at East Cambridge, Massachusetts.
- (3) Samuel Converse, born at Woburn, Mass., April 4, 1662, died in Thompson Parish, Killingly, Connecticut, about 1732. His wife's first name was Dorcas.
- (4) Ensign Edward Converse, born in Woburn, Mass., September 25, 1696. At the age of 14, removed to Thompson, Connecticut; married Elizabeth, daughter of John and Elizabeth Cooper. Ensign Edward Converse died July 9, 1784. He was a man of energy and sound judgment, much employed in public affairs, was one of the constituent members of the church, and served as committee in building the meeting house. He was appointed to settle with distrained Baptists on as easy terms as he could.
- (5) Jonathan Converse, born in Thompson Parish, baptized April 28, 1723, died 1761, married June 19, 1743, Kiziah, daughter of Jonathan Hughes, an early resident of Killingly, Connecticut.

He lived when a boy with James Larned of Killingly, Connecticut; was enlisted into Putnam's Regiment, Co. 8, May 1775, though only 17 years of age, and was in the army at Cambridge through that memorable campaign, sharing in the closing service battle of Bunker Hill. He was a man of great energy, much engaged in running mills and manufacturing experiments. He removed after a time to Wardsboro, Vermont, where he acquired considerable estate. He had nine children, Roswell, Jonathan, Polly, Lucy, Adelphie, Louisa, Esther, Elisha, late of Palmer, Massachusetts, and John Mason.

JOHN BEECHER

News of the untimely death of John Beecher, 38, in Berkeley, California, on August 27, 1922, came as a great shock to his many friends in New Salem and Prescott. Mr. Beecher died in a

hospital in Berkeley of complications following an operation removing his tonsils. Just before this operation he appeared to be in good health, but not quite up to normal. The physician found that his tonsils were diseased and recommended that they be removed. The operation was considered to be a minor one, from which he was expected to fully recover in a few days. Septicemia set in after the operation, however, causing his death. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. John Albert Eov. of Wilshire Presbyterian church, Los Angeles, and he was buried in Forest Lawn cemetery, Los Angeles. Mr. Beecher leaves one brother, Daniel Beecher, who is a lawyer in Los Angeles, Cal. Another brother was Henry Ward Beecher, who was an instructor in the American International College in Springfield, Mass. He died in Madison, Wisconsin on August 25, 1913. Concerning Mr. Beecher's life, his brother, Daniel Beecher, writes as follows: John was born May 10th, 1884, near Mallow, Ireland. parents were John and Ellen Beecher. He was brought to this country when about three years of age. Having been left an orphan at an early age, he was placed in the care of Mr. and Mrs. Lyman S. Johnson of Prescott, Mass., with whom he lived until entering New Salem Academy, from which he graduated in 1903. He then entered Cushing Academy, Ashburnham, Mass., and graduated from there in 1904. After spending a year in work of various kinds he entered Middlebury College, Middlebury, Vermont, and remained there one year, from which institution he entered the sophomore class of Amherst College, and graduated from Amherst in 1909 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts.

During the first year after graduating from Amherst he was employed by a telephone company owning or controlling telephone lines in New York City and elsewhere, and then took up the teaching profession. He spent two years as instructor in Yamaguchi, Japan, high school, and taught in Honolulu, going from there to Southern California where he taught in Los Angeles, Norwalk, and San Luis Obispo. He was principal of Norwalk high school. Just before his death he was elected to the position of instructor of economics, civics, etc., in Sacramento Junior College. He received the degree of Master of Arts from the University of Southern California in 1914. At that time he wrote a thesis on Los Angeles harbor which was subsequently published in the West Magazine. John was a member of the First

Congregational church of Los Angeles, Cal. He also belonged to the Knights of Pythias.

Mr. Beecher had resigned his position in the local high school to assume an important position as instructor in political science and economics in the Junior College at Sacramento. He had taught history for the past three years here and had become so attached to the school that it was with a great deal of reluctance and after long consideration that he decided to accept the position to which he had been elected although it carried almost a third more salary and was a promotion to one of the most flourishing Junior colleges in the state.

Mr. Beecher was a graduate of Amherst College and stood high in scholarship. He was an excellent teacher, was loyal and faithful in his work and unusually ready to assist in the details of school management. While friendly to all that were at all approachable, he was to his intimate friends an extraordinarily congenial and lovable character.

Arthur A. Vaughan, 72, of Arlington, Va., died at the home of his stepdaughter, Mrs. George G. Engel, 64 Prospect street. Athol, after an illness of only a few days, although he had experienced some heart trouble in the past two years. He had been visiting at the Engel home with Mrs. Vaughan for a week. Funeral services were held at the Higgins funeral home on Grove street, Orange, July 20, 1937. The Orange Commandery members acted as bearers. Arthur Vaughan was a son of Howard and Frances (Howe) Vaughan, and was born in New Salem. As a boy he lived in that town, Dana and Prescott. His first wife was the late Emma Vorce of Orange, and after her death he was married, six years ago in April, to Mrs. M. Etta (Thayer) Gorton of Athol, a friend since childhood. Mr. Vaughan lived in Orange from 1890 to 1894, going to Providence, R. I., where he lived for four years. He was in charge of buying and paying for all material used in building the Rhode Island state house. During the succeeding 20 years he was employed as chief estimator for the Norcross Construction company of Worcester. In 1918 Mr. Vaughan was called into government service in Washington and he had remained in that service since retiring as chief estimator in the War Department on the first of March, this year. Higgins funeral home, Athol, Mass. Burial was in Quabbin Park cemetery in Ware. Rev. F. B. Crandall officiated.

ORREN E. VAUGHN

Orren E. Vaughn, 83, former resident of Dana and father of Myron E. Vaughn of Athol, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Herman G. Stone of Gardner, Sunday, March 12, 1939. He had lived in Gardner since the previous May when his Dana home was taken over for the Quabbin reservoir. A retired lumberman, Mr. Vaughn was a native of Prescott, the son of Dexter and Mary (Lincoln) Vaughn. ERNEST HOWE VAUGHAN

Mr. Ernest Howe Vaughan died at his home, 2 Germain street, Worcester, on Tuesday, August 17, 1937, in his 80th year,

Burial was in the Quabbin cemetery, with Rev. John Brown of Cobles, N. Y., officiating, assisted by Rev. J. H. Gaylord of New Braintree.

Waugh, a daughter, Alice Waugh of Springfield; three sons, Arthur, at home, Clifton, a student at the Massachusetts State College, and Philip of Springfield; three sisters, Mrs. Fred Doubleday of Pelham, Mrs. Frank Bowen of Amherst, and Mrs. Carl Brown of this town. The funeral was in the home of Mrs. Walter Waugh, Rev. J. Howard Gaylord officiating. Burial was in Quabbin cemetery, Ware, Mass.

ANSON AUGUSTUS WHITE

Anson A. White, 71, for nearly half a century a well known resident of Orange, died at 11:15 o'clock Friday morning, January 10, 1936, in the Mann Memorial hospital, South Athol, where he was taken the Monday before. In failing health for four years, Mr. White suffered a fall at his home on Mayo street and as a result it became imperative that he be removed to the Mr. White, who was familiarly known as "Anse" hospital. White, was a keen lover of hunting and fishing and most of his leisure time was spent in the woods, or along trout streams in this section. Mr. White was born in Prescott, the son of Ellis and Hannah A. (Pierce) White. He lived in that town until he was 18, when he left home to follow the carpenter's trade. He was married to Mary J. Long in his home town on August 20, 1885, Rev. Elder Jones performing the ceremony. He lived in Prescott three or four years after he was married and then went to Orange to live. Only his widow and one son, Henry White, well known mail carrier and active Legionnaire and Mason, survive Mr. White.
