PART ONE

Reflections on Purgatory

Chapter 1

Purgatory

THE word *Purgatory* is sometimes taken to mean a place, sometimes as an intermediate state between hell and heaven. It is, properly speaking, *the condition of souls* which, at the moment of death, are in the state of grace, but which have not completely expiated their faults, nor attained the degree of purity necessary to enjoy the vision of God.

Purgatory is, then, a transitory state which terminates in a life of everlasting happiness. It is not a trial by which merit may be gained or lost, but a state of atonement and expiation. The soul has arrived at the term of its earthly career; that life was a time of trial, a time of merit for the soul, a time of mercy on the part of God. This time once expired, nothing but justice is to be expected from God, whilst the soul can neither gain nor lose merit. She remains in the state in which death found her; and since it found her in the state of sanctifying grace, she is certain of never forfeiting that happy state, and of arriving at the eternal possession of God. Nevertheless, since she is burdened with certain debts of

temporal punishment, she must satisfy Divine Justice by enduring this punishment in all its rigor.

Such is the signification of the word *Purgatory*, and the condition of the souls which are there.

On this subject the Church proposes *two truths* clearly defined as dogmas of faith: first, *that there is a Purgatory*; second, *that the souls which are in Purgatory may be assisted by the suffrages of the faithful, especially by the holy sacrifice of the Mass.*

*

Location of Purgatory

ALTHOUGH faith tells us nothing definite regarding the location of Purgatory, the most common opinion, that which most accords with the language of Scripture, and which is the most generally received among theologians, places it in the bowels of the earth, not far from the hell of the reprobates. Theologians are almost unanimous, says Bellarmine,¹ in teaching that Purgatory, at least the *ordinary* place of expiation, is situated in the interior of the earth, that the souls in Purgatory and the reprobate are in the same subterranean space in the deep abyss which the Scripture calls *Hell*.

“A very probable opinion,” says St. Thomas,² “and one which, moreover, corre-

sponds with the words of the saints in particular revelation, is that Purgatory has a double place for expiation. The first will be destined for the generality of souls, and is situated below, near to hell; the second will be for particular cases, and it is thence that so many apparitions occur."

The holy Doctor admits, then, like so many others who share his opinions, that sometimes Divine Justice assigns a special place of purification to certain souls, and even permits them to appear either to instruct the living or to procure for the departed the suffrages of which they stand in need; sometimes also for other motives worthy of the wisdom and mercy of God.

*

Purgatory in the Divine Plan

PURGATORY occupies an important place in our holy religion: it forms one of the principal parts of the work of Jesus Christ, and plays an essential rôle in the economy of the salvation of man.

Let us call to mind that the Holy Church of God, considered as a whole, is composed of three parts: The Church Militant, the Church Triumphant, and the Church Suffering, or *Purgatory*. This triple Church constitutes the mystical body of Jesus Christ, and the souls in Purgatory are no less His members than are the faithful upon earth and the elect in heaven. In the Gospel, the

Church is ordinarily called the *Kingdom of Heaven*; now Purgatory, just as the heavenly and terrestrial Church, is a province of this vast kingdom.

The three sister Churches have incessant relations with one another, a continual communication which we call the *Communion of Saints*. These relations have no other object than to conduct souls to eternal glory, the final term to which all the elect tend. The three Churches mutually assist in peopling heaven, which is the permanent city, the glorious Jerusalem.

What then is the work which we, members of the Church Militant, have to do for the souls in Purgatory? We have to alleviate their sufferings. God has placed in our hands the key of this mysterious prison: it is *prayer for the dead*, devotion to the souls in Purgatory. . . .

Prayer for the departed, sacrifices, and suffrages for the dead form a part of Christian worship, and devotion toward the souls in Purgatory is a devotion which the Holy Ghost infuses with charity into the hearts of the faithful. *It is a holy and wholesome thought, says Holy Scripture, to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins.* (II Machab. xii, 46.)

In order to be perfect, devotion to the souls in Purgatory must be animated both by a spirit of fear and a spirit of confidence. On the one hand, the sanctity of God and

His justice inspires us with a salutary fear; on the other, His infinite mercy gives us boundless confidence. . . .

This fear of Purgatory is a salutary fear; its effect is, not only to animate us with a charitable compassion toward the poor Suffering Souls, but also with a vigilant zeal for our own spiritual welfare.

Think of the fire of Purgatory, and you will endeavor to avoid the least faults; think of the fire of Purgatory, and you will practise penance, that you may satisfy Divine Justice in this world rather than in the next.

Let us, however, guard against excessive fear, and not lose confidence. Let us not forget the mercy of God, which is not less infinite than His justice. *Thy mercy is great above the heavens*, says the Prophet;¹ and elsewhere, *The Lord is gracious and merciful: patient, and plenteous in mercy.*² This ineffable mercy should calm the most lively apprehensions, and fill us with a holy confidence, according to the words, *In te, Domine, speravi, non confundar in æternum* —“ In Thee, O Lord, I have hoped; let me never be put to confusion.”³

If we are animated with this double sentiment, if our confidence in God's mercy is equal to the fear with which His justice inspires us, we shall have the true spirit of devotion to the souls in Purgatory.

Chapter 2

Proofs of the Existence of Purgatory

PURGATORY is a state of suffering where the souls of those who die in grace, but without having fully satisfied the justice of God, remain for a time, to pay the debt of temporal punishment due to their sins, and to be purified for heaven, into which, according to Holy Scripture, *nothing defiled can enter.*

Proofs of the existence of Purgatory are to be found:

1st. In Holy Scripture.

In the Old Testament we read of Judas Machabeus sending twelve thousand drachms of silver to Jerusalem, to be offered in sacrifice for the dead who died in battle; and we are told in the same chapter that *it is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from sins.*

In the New Testament Our Lord plainly tells us there are sins which *shall not be forgiven in this world or in the world to come* (St. Matt. xii.); again in St. Matthew we read of a prison which the debtor shall not leave until he has paid the last farthing (St. Matt. v.); and St. Paul in his epistle to the Corinthians says: *Every man's work shall be manifest: for the day of the Lord*

shall declare it, because it shall be revealed in fire: and the fire shall try every man's work of what sort it is. If any man's work burn, he shall suffer loss: but he himself shall be saved: yet so as by fire. (I Cor. iii. 13, 15.)

2d. In all tradition, which is thus incontestably confirmed by the following decree of the Council of Trent:

“If any one claim that a penitent sinner when he receives the grace of justification obtains the remission of the guilt and the eternal punishment, so that neither in this life nor in Purgatory has he any temporal punishment to undergo before he can enter heaven, let him be anathema!” (Sess. 6th.)

*

On the Sufferings of Purgatory

REVELATION, which speaks very clearly of the existence of Purgatory, is not so clear on the state of the Suffering Souls, and we have no accurate knowledge of their place of suffering, or of the nature or the form of their sufferings. We know with certainty, however, that the pains of Purgatory are extremely great, and of two kinds. The first and most unendurable, says the Council of Florence, is the privation of God.

The soul released from the body comprehends God as the only object of its happiness, and the desire to see and possess Him is felt with extraordinary keenness in all its

faculties. It is a burning thirst, a devouring hunger, a terrible void, a species of suffocation produced by the absence of God, the food and breath of the soul.

The second is suffering which subjects the soul to tortures more terrible than those inflicted on the martyrs. The Church has not defined the nature of this suffering; it is generally taught, however, with the permission of the Church, that Purgatory is a mysterious fire which, like that of hell, devours the soul without destroying it; and though this is not an article of faith, says *La Luzerne*, yet all authorities so strongly support the doctrine of an expiatory fire, that it is best not to depart from it.

*

On the Causes of Purgatory

WHERE are two causes of Purgatory: 1st. The lack of sufficient satisfaction for remitted sin. It is of faith that God, in pardoning sins committed after Baptism, and remitting the eternal punishment due to mortal sin, usually leaves the absolved soul a debt of temporal punishment which it must pay in this life or the next.

2d. The venial sins which may mar the souls of the just when they depart this life.

*

On the State of the Souls in Purgatory

THOUGH in the midst of the most cruel sufferings, the Holy Souls never

yield to impatience or despair; they are in a state of grace and charity, and their will is so at one with that of God that they cheerfully will all that He desires. They adore the hand that strikes them; and however ardently they yearn for their deliverance, they would only have it in the order of God's will. The certainty that they will never offend God more, and that they will one day possess Him in heaven, is a source of great consolation to them.

*

On the Duration of the Sufferings of Purgatory

THESSE sufferings are of short duration compared to the eternity of the pains of hell, but considered in themselves they are long, very long. The Church authorizes anniversaries of prayers for years and even centuries after souls have departed this life; and eminent writers, Bellarmine among others, think that there are sinners who will remain in Purgatory until the end of the world.

There is a communication of the fruit of good works between the living faithful and the departed. The Catholic Church, enlightened by the Holy Spirit, and guided by the Scriptures and the traditions of the early Fathers, teaches in her Councils the existence of Purgatory, and that souls detained in this place of suffering are helped

by the suffrages of the faithful, and particularly by the precious Sacrifice of the Altar (Council of Trent, Sess. 25).

Chapter 3

“*Hæc Hicq̄ on Hæ!*”

ST. BRIDGET had once a vision of Purgatory, and there beheld the souls of the just being cleansed from every stain of sin, as iron is purified in a fiery furnace. She tells us that she heard an angel calling down the blessing of God upon the charitable Christians who hasten to the rescue of the Poor Souls, for unless they are released by the good works of the faithful, God in His ineffable justice is resolved to purify them by the flames of Purgatory. When the angel had spoken, there arose a most piteous moan from a great multitude of souls. They entreated the Eternal Judge to forget their many sins, to apply to them the merits of His sacred passion, and to admit them into His presence. They besought Him most earnestly to inspire the faithful, but particularly priests and nuns, to offer up prayers, Masses, alms, and indulgences in their behalf, because by doing this they would lessen and shorten their torments, and enable them to enjoy the sooner the beatific vision of Jesus, their Love. Sud-

denly a mysterious light, the brilliancy of which was tempered by a certain dull hue, broke forth and hovered over the dark prison. It was the symbol of approaching deliverance, and the poor souls greeted it with acclamations of joy. But they did not forget their benefactors; on the contrary, they asked our blessed Redeemer to reward a hundredfold the charity of those who had prayed for them.

WE HAVE it in our power to help these suffering friends of God. We can do so by prayer, almsdeeds, the Holy Mass, our indulgences, and to do so is certainly a work of mercy and charity. Understanding this full well, the saints, without exception, have been most earnest and constant in their efforts to help them. Some of them have made this devotion one of the strong characteristics of their sanctity, and we venture to say that no truly devout or sincere Catholic neglects this spiritual work of mercy.

In Ireland this devotion has obtained a strong hold on the faithful. Even the very poor make many sacrifices in order to secure for their departed relatives, and others also, the special benefits of the Holy Mass. May the same enlightened piety ever remain firmly rooted in the hearts of our people, and may the day never come when they will cease to follow beyond the grave with tender

solicitude the souls of those they loved in life.

In praying for the dead and gaining indulgences for them, let us remember that every prayer we say, every sacrifice we make, every alms we give for the repose of the dear departed ones, will all return upon ourselves in hundredfold blessings. They are God's friends, dear to His Sacred Heart, living in His grace, and in constant communion with Him; and though they may not alleviate their own sufferings, their prayers in our behalf always avail. They can aid us most efficaciously. God will not turn a deaf ear to their intercession. Being Holy Souls, they are grateful souls. The friends that aid them, they in turn will also aid. We need not fear praying to them in all faith and confidence. They will obtain for us the special favors we desire. They will watch over us lovingly and tenderly; they will guard our steps; they will warn us against evil; they will shield us in moments of trial and danger; and when our hour of purgatorial suffering comes, they will use their influence in our behalf to assuage our pains and shorten the period of our separation from the Godhead.

ST. MALACHY having lost his sister by death, offered many fervent prayers and pious suffrages for her eternal repose.

Having after some time desisted from doing so, he heard one night an unknown voice say to him that his sister waited outside the church and asked him for assistance. The Saint well understood what the needs of his sister were, and having resumed the pious exercises which he had discontinued, he saw her some time after at the entrance of the church in robes of mourning, and having a sad and disconsolate aspect. This vision caused him to redouble his prayers in her behalf, nor did he allow any day to pass without performing many acts of piety for her relief. The soul on its next appearance had a less mournful garb and was inside the church, but durst not approach the altar. The Saint having his confidence in the efficacy of his suffrages thus sustained, multiplied them even more than before, and did his utmost to satisfy the Divine Justice in her behalf. On her third appearance, he was consoled with the assurance that his pious intention had been effected. He saw her clad in garments of dazzling brightness, and advancing to the altar, surrounded by a joyous band of blessed spirits, thus signifying to her holy brother that she had obtained admission into heaven.

The various states or stages in which this soul appeared, teach us the ordinary economy of God's providence—that He does not ordinarily liberate souls from Purgatory by an absolute act of His power and will, but

exacts from them with the strictest justice the full payment of their debt, ever accepting the suffrages of the faithful in their behalf—which succors are the more advantageous to these poor souls the more frequently and fervently they are offered.

Chapter 4

Apparitions

ST. TERESA had great charity toward the souls in Purgatory, and assisted them as much as lay in her power by her prayers and good works. In recompense, God frequently showed her the souls she had delivered; she saw them at the moment of their release from suffering and of their entrance into heaven. Now, *they generally came forth from the bosom of the earth.* “I received tidings,” she writes, “of the death of a Religious who had formerly been Provincial of that province, and afterward of another. I was acquainted with him, and he had rendered me great service. This intelligence caused me great uneasiness. Although this man was commendable for many virtues, I was apprehensive for the salvation of his soul, because he had been Superior for the space of twenty years, and I always fear much for those who are charged with the care of souls. Much grieved, I went to an

oratory; there I conjured our divine Lord to apply to this Religious the little good I had done during my life, and to supply the rest by His infinite merits, in order that this soul might be freed from Purgatory.

“ Whilst I besought this grace with all the fervor of which I was capable, I saw on my right side this soul come forth from the depths of the earth and ascend into heaven in transports of joy. Although this priest was advanced in years, he appeared to me with the features of a man who had not yet attained the age of thirty, and with a countenance resplendent with light.

“ This vision, though very short, left me inundated with joy, and without a shadow of doubt as to the truth of what I had seen. As I was separated by a great distance from the place where this servant of God had ended his days, it was some time before I learned the particulars of his edifying death; all those who were witnesses of it could not behold without admiration how he preserved consciousness to the last moment, the tears he shed, and the sentiments of humility with which he surrendered his soul to God.

“ A Religious of my Community, a great servant of God, had been dead not quite two days. We were saying the Office for the Dead for her in choir, a Sister was reading the lesson, and I was standing to say the versicle. When half of the lesson had been said, I saw the soul of this Religious come

forth from the depths of the earth, like the one of which I have just spoken, and go to heaven.

“In this same monastery there died, at the age of eighteen or twenty years, another Religious, a true model of fervor, regularity, and virtue. Her life had been but a tissue of maladies and sufferings patiently endured. I had no doubt, after having seen her live thus, that she had more than sufficient merits to exempt her from Purgatory. Nevertheless, whilst I was at Office, before she was interred, and about a quarter of an hour after her death, I saw her soul likewise issue from the earth and rise to heaven.” Behold what St. Teresa writes.

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ACCORDING to St. Thomas and other Doctors, Divine Justice, in particular cases, assigns *a special place upon earth for certain souls*. This opinion we find confirmed by several facts, among which we quote the two mentioned by St. Gregory the Great in his “Dialogues.”¹ “Whilst I was young and still a layman, I heard told to the seniors, who were well-informed men, how the Deacon Paschasius appeared to German, bishop of Capua. Paschasius, deacon of the Apostolic See, whose books on the Holy Ghost are still extant, was a man of eminent sanctity, devoted to works of char-

ity, zealous for the relief of the poor, and most forgetful of self. A dispute having arisen concerning a pontifical election, Paschasius separated himself from the bishops, and joined the party disapproved by the Episcopacy. Soon after this, he died, with a reputation for sanctity which God confirmed by a miracle: an instantaneous cure was effected on the day of the funeral by the simple touch of his dalmatic. Long after this, Germain, bishop of Capua, was sent by the physicians to the baths of St. Angelo. What was his astonishment to find the same Deacon Paschasius employed in the most menial offices at the baths! 'I here expiate,' said the apparition, 'the wrong I did by adhering to the wrong party. I beseech of you, pray to the Lord for me: you will know that you have been heard when you shall no longer see me in these places.'

" Germain began to pray for the deceased, and after a few days, returning to the baths, sought in vain for Paschasius, who had disappeared. 'He had but to undergo a temporary punishment,' says St. Gregory, 'because he had sinned through ignorance, and not through malice.' "

The same Pope speaks of a priest of Centumcellæ, now Civita Vecchia, who also went to the warm baths. " A man presented himself to serve him in the most menial offices, and for several days waited upon him with the most extreme kindness, and even eager-

ness. The good priest, thinking that he ought to reward so much attention, came the next day with two loaves of blessed bread, and, after having received the usual assistance of his kind servant, offered him the loaves. The servant, with a sad countenance, replied, 'Why, Father, do you offer me this bread? I cannot eat it. I, whom you see, was formerly the master of this place, and, after my death, I was sent back to the condition in which you see me, for the expiation of my faults. If you wish to do me good, ah! offer up for me the Bread of the Eucharist.'

"At these words he suddenly disappeared, and he, whom the priest had thought to be a man, showed by vanishing that he was but a spirit.

"For a whole week the good priest devoted himself to works of penance, and each day offered up the Sacred Host in favor of the departed one: then, having returned to the same baths, he no longer found his faithful servant, and concluded that he had been delivered."

It seems that Divine Justice sometimes condemns souls to undergo their punishment in the same place where they have committed their sins. We read in the chronicles of the Friars Minor, that Blessed Stephen, Religious of that Order, had a singular devotion to the Blessed Sacrament, so that he passed a part of the night in adora-

tion before it. On one occasion, being alone in the chapel, the darkness broken only by the faint glimmer of the little lamp, he suddenly perceived a Religious in one of the stalls. Stephen approached him, and asked if he had permission to leave his cell at such an hour. "I am a deceased Religious," he replied. "Here, by a decree of God's justice, must I undergo my Purgatory, because here I sinned by tepidity and negligence at the Divine Office. The Lord permits me to make known my state to you, that you may assist me by your prayers."

Touched with these words, Blessed Stephen immediately knelt down to recite the *De Profundis* and other prayers; and he noticed that whilst he prayed, the features of the deceased bore an expression of joy. Several times, during the following nights, he saw the apparition in the same manner, but more happy each time as it approached the term of its deliverance. Finally, after the last prayer of Blessed Stephen, it arose all radiant from the stall, expressed its gratitude to its liberator, and disappeared in the brightness of glory.

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JOSEPH HAROLIUS tells us the following touching story in his discourse of "The Holy Souls."

Two Fathers of the same Order had con-

tracted a close and holy friendship, their object in view being to exhort and encourage each other in the service of God, and fervently to work out their eternal salvation. Their mortifications were many, their penances austere, their prayers fervent, and their example most edifying. They avoided carefully infringing any rule of the Order, being, above all, anxious always to arrive in good time for the recitation of the Divine Office. After some time, one of these Fathers fell ill, and all hopes for his recovery were vain. Besides, an angel appeared to him and warned him that his end was near, telling him at the same time that on account of his venial sins, he would have to go to Purgatory until a Mass was offered up in his behalf, and that then he should enter into the joys of heaven, and receive the reward of his zeal for the salvation of his fellow-men. Full of joy, the Father told his friend of the apparition, and entreated him, for the sake of their long friendship, to say a Mass for him as soon as possible after his death. Deeply touched, his friend assured him he would do as he wished, and he faithfully kept his promise. Scarcely had the Father closed his eyes in death on the morrow, than his friend went into the sacristy, vested for Mass and went to the altar. With great fervor, he offered up the Holy Sacrifice and besought God, in the name of the Victim on the altar, to have pity on the soul of his

departed friend, and to admit him into the heavenly kingdom. After Mass, as he was making his thanksgiving, the soul of the dead Father appeared to him, beaming with happiness and holy joy. But with a sad voice, he reproached him, saying: "O brother, how badly you have kept your promise! you have left me in Purgatory a whole year, and during all this long time neither you nor any other of the Fathers have ever said a Mass for me. What cruel neglect, as you could so easily have delivered me from those awful flames." Awestruck by these words, the Father answered: "I have just finished saying the Mass, which I was able to begin directly after your death; you see your body still lying there, for it is not yet buried; I assure you, I have faithfully kept my promise." For a long time the apparition looked at him in speechless astonishment, but said at last, terror-struck: "Oh, how awful are the sufferings of Purgatory, that such a short time should appear to be a year. Blessed be God, who, in His mercy and goodness, has shortened them so much for me! Forgive me, dear brother, I thank you with all my heart for your love and faithful friendship. I hasten now to heaven, where I shall see my Beloved face to face. But I shall not forget to ask Him to bless you for all you have done for me and to beg Him to unite us again in His kingdom, where the friendship we have begun upon earth, will

flourish through the ages of eternity. Farewell! In heaven we shall meet again."

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ST. MARGARET of Cortona had been, at one time of her life, a great sinner, but by the grace of God, she became a great saint. Among the many virtues which adorned her soul after her conversion, was a great love and devotion to the poor souls in Purgatory. So great was her desire to assuage their sufferings, that she offered herself a living victim for them, and beautiful was the reward our blessed Lord bestowed upon her. When the hour of her death was approaching, a great number of souls, all of whom she had released from the flames of Purgatory, assembled round her bed and, ranging themselves like a guard of honor, escorted her to heaven. Our love is due, in the first place, to our parents; and for this reason, Margaret's first care was to pray for her dead father and mother. Many were the Masses, communions, and good works she offered up for them; and it was revealed to her that, owing to her, they were admitted into paradise much sooner than they would have been otherwise. But her charity embraced all, as we see from the number of souls who appeared to her at her death.

Two merchants were attacked and killed by robbers, as they were travelling across a

desolate tract of country. Their souls appeared to St. Margaret and made known to her that, previous to their death, they had been truly sorry for their manifold transgressions, and had consequently found mercy in the eyes of God. Moreover, thanks to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary, they had obtained the grace to receive the death-stroke in a true spirit of penance, and offered it in expiation for their sins. In their past lives they had, however, been unfair in their dealings, and for this sin they were suffering in the flames of Purgatory. They implored the servant of God to go and tell their relations to make satisfaction to all those they had wronged in any way, to pay the debts they had contracted, and to give abundant alms in order to assuage their inconceivable sufferings, and eventually release them from Purgatory. St. Margaret herself they entreated to pray for them, which she promised to do with pleasure. And her prayer was heard; for a short time after, the souls of the two merchants took their flight to heaven. St. Margaret was not content to pray herself for the faithful departed, she also did all in her power to impart this useful and beautiful devotion to priests and nuns, as well as to people living in the world. Our divine Lord Himself commanded her once to recommend the poor souls in Purgatory to the charity of the Friars Minor of St. Francis in these

words: "Recommend them, in My name, to think of the Poor Souls, whose number, at the present moment, is innumerable, because there are scarcely any people who pray for them."

This great zeal on the part of St. Margaret accounts for the multitude of souls, who, at the hour of her death, showed their gratitude by coming and escorting her to the gates of paradise.—*Voices from Purgatory.*

Chapter 5

We Owe It to God, to Our Neighbor, and to Ourselves, to Help the Poor Souls in Purgatory

LET us descend in spirit into the dark prison where the souls in Purgatory are detained until the entire and perfect expiation of their sins has been accomplished. Let us adore the infinite justice of God, who never passes over any fault, even the slightest; His ineffable purity, which cannot endure in His court anything which is not perfectly pure; His ineffable holiness, which cannot ally itself with the shadow of a stain; and at the sight of Purgatory, as well as at the sight of heaven, let us repeat the eternal canticle: "*Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord.*"

FIRST POINT

We Owe It to God, to Help the Souls in
Purgatory

WHAT, in fact, in relation to God, are the souls in Purgatory? They are His elect, His beloved children, the heirs of His glory, called to bless Him eternally in heaven, His spouses whom He tenderly loves. His heart will delight to introduce them into His paradise, to inundate them with a torrent of delights; but His justice and His holiness require that all the satisfaction due from these souls should be paid down to the last farthing. If some Christian or other upon earth paid the debt of one of these souls, God would receive it with joy into His bosom, and a saint more would sing His praises in heaven. Now, things being thus, should we love God if, having at our disposition several means for reuniting to Him the souls He desires and loves, we should leave them separated from Him, without trying to put Him in possession of them? Should we love His honor and His glory if, being able to make new worshippers enter into heaven, and enable another mouth to sing His praises, another heart to love Him we took no trouble about it?

SECOND POINT

We Owe It through Charity toward Our Neighbor to Help the Souls in Purgatory

FOR, first, they are persons who are in great suffering; they suffer above all from the privation of God. Sighing with indescribable ardor for their reunion to the Supreme Good, they dart toward Him as the arrow shoots toward the target, and are always repelled. They endure in addition sufferings which are unknown to nature, the least of which, the saints tell us, incomparably surpass the greatest torments it is possible to suffer here below. Now, would there be charity in our hearts if, being able to obtain for these souls the great blessing for which they sigh, we were not to procure it for them; if, being able to withdraw them from the extreme sufferings they endure, we were not to withdraw them? Secondly, they are unfortunate beings who, sighing beneath the weight of misery, could not make their voices heard if they were to cry for help; and to whom could they cry?—to God? But justice, which is there, replies: The debt must be paid, the soul must be purified. If they were to cry to us, alas! we should not hear them; their only resource is to borrow the voice in which the Church speaks to-day, exclaiming: “Have pity on me, you at least.

my friends, because the hand of the Lord
hath touched me!"

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THIRD POINT

*We Owe It to Our Own Interests to Help
the Souls in Purgatory*

FOR, first, these good souls which we have withdrawn from their prison and introduced into heaven, will be our protectors in the presence of God, and will there pray continually for us. Secondly, Jesus Christ Himself will be our advocate, as being also indebted to us, seeing that He was in prison in the person of one of His members, and we withdrew Him from it; He was thirsty, and we made Him drink from the fountain of life. Oh, if the works of mercy here below, if the glass of cold water given to a poor man, touch His heart and obtain for us an eternal recompense, what will He not do in return for the still more excellent mercy which is exercised on behalf of the suffering souls in Purgatory? Thirdly, if it be written that we shall be treated as we treat others, God will not permit us to be forgotten when we in our turn shall be in the place of expiation, or He Himself will apply to us the merits which have no other destination, such as there are when those for whom they are offered have been damned or have already entered into heaven; whilst He will allow those who have

not been helpful to their deceased brethren to languish without any succor being given them. Fourthly, at the same time that we procure for ourselves such great advantages, we shall lose nothing of the merits which we offer for the solace of these souls; for there will always remain to us the merit of charity which abundantly compensates all that we give up for their deliverance. Would it not then be to understand our own interests very badly if we had no zeal for the solace of the souls in Purgatory?

Example

ST. PHILIP NERI was a great servant of the Poor Souls, for whom he prayed much and offered up the merit of all his good works. Above all, he was zealous for the deliverance of the souls whose spiritual director he had been during their life, believing he owed them more, because he had once worked for the eternal salvation of their souls. Many a time dead people appeared to him and asked for his prayers, which he never refused. Our blessed Redeemer always heard the supplications of the Saint, and the released souls obtained by their intercession innumerable graces for him. After the death of this great servant of God, a Franciscan Father was praying at the bier on which St. Philip lay, when the Saint appeared to him in the midst of a daz-

zling light and surrounded with heavenly spirits. Of these, he said, some were members of his Order, others were his benefactors, whilst a large part of them were souls he had freed from Purgatory and who had come to accompany him to heaven.

The spirit of devotion and sacrifice seemed to have gone over from the holy founder to the whole Order. A certain priest of the Order prayed nearly without ceasing for the dead; and splendid and encouraging were the results with which his zeal was crowned. He was the director of a child whose name was Elizabeth, and who lived at Aquila. Elizabeth was poor with regard to earthly possessions, but extremely rich in virtues. The only reason for which she regretted her poverty was that it proved an obstacle to her entering a convent, where she wished to consecrate her life to her heavenly Spouse. Her director comforted her, saying she need not be downcast, because, ere long, she would be for ever united to her Beloved. He bade her prepare herself for death, and added that she would not have to stay in Purgatory long. All happened as the priest had foretold. Elizabeth died, soon after, a happy death. Her family grieved for her most bitterly, but the good Father comforted them, and assured them that they had now a powerful advocate in heaven. Elizabeth appeared soon after to one of her brothers, and said to him: "Tell my father he need

not pray for me any longer, because, through the prayers of my director, this friend of my soul, the hour of deliverance has arrived."

This priest used the numerous alms he received, partly for the poor and partly for Masses for the dead. To these he added his fasts, penances, and prayers. He even asked our blessed Lord to allow him to suffer part of their pain, so that the Poor Souls might experience some alleviation. This heroic wish was granted. He was at times seized with such intense suffering that he was totally unable to move.

For so many and such great things in their behalf, his children were not ungrateful. To them he owed innumerable graces and the preservation from the dangers of soul and body. Many appeared to him and, by words and action, showed their gratitude. Innumerable incidents are recorded of the gratitude of priests to those who have prayed for them after their death, and these ought to encourage us to pray much and fervently for these benefactors of our souls.

Chapter 6

Gratitude of the Holy Souls

By Their Prayers They Can Help Us

WHO PROVE that the souls in Purgatory show their gratitude even by temporal

favours, Father Rossignoli relates a fact that happened at Naples.

If it is not given to all to offer to God the abundant alms of Judas Machabeus, who sent twelve thousand drachms to Jerusalem for sacrifices and prayers to be offered in behalf of the dead, there are very few who cannot at least make the offering of the poor widow of the Gospel, who was praised by our Saviour Himself. She gave only two mites, but these two mites were of more value than all the gold of the rich, because, said Jesus, "*she of her want cast in all she had, even her whole living.*"¹ This touching example was imitated by a humble Neapolitan woman, who had the greatest difficulty in providing for the wants of her family. The resources of the house depended upon the daily earnings of the husband, who each evening brought home the fruit of his labors.

Alas! one day this poor father was imprisoned for debt, so that the responsibility of supporting the family rested upon the unhappy mother, who possessed nothing but her confidence in God. With faith she besought Divine Providence to come to her aid, and especially to deliver her husband, who languished in prison for no other crime than his poverty.

She went to a wealthy and benevolent gentleman, and, relating to him the sad story of her woes, entreated him with tears

to assist her. God permitted that she should receive but a trifling alms, *a carline*, a piece of money worth about ten cents of our coin. Deeply afflicted, she entered a church to implore the God of the indigent to succor her in her distress, since she had nothing to hope from earth. She was absorbed in her prayers and tears, when, by an inspiration, no doubt, of her good angel, it occurred to her to interest the sympathy of the Holy Souls in her behalf, for she had heard much of their sufferings, and of their gratitude toward those who befriend them. Full of confidence, she went into the sacristy, offered her little piece of money, and asked if a Mass could be celebrated for the dead. The good priest, who was there, hastened to say Mass for her intention, and ascended the altar for that purpose, whilst the poor woman, prostrate on the pavement, assisted at the Holy Sacrifice, offering her prayers for the departed.

She returned quite consoled, as though she had received the assurance that God had heard her prayer. Whilst traversing the populous streets of Naples, she was accosted by a venerable old man, who inquired whence she came and whither she was going? The unfortunate woman explained her distress, and the use she had made of the small alms she had received. The old man seemed deeply touched by her misery, spoke some words of encouragement, and

gave her a note enclosed in an envelope, which he directed her to take to a gentleman whom he designated, and then left her.

The woman went in all haste to deliver the note to the gentleman indicated. The latter, on opening the envelope, was seized with astonishment, and was on the point of fainting away; he recognized the handwriting of his father, who had died some time previous. "Where did you get this letter?" he cried, quite beside himself. "Sir," replied the good woman, "it was from an old man who accosted me in the street. I told him of my distress, and he sent me to give you this note in his name. As regards his features, he very much resembles that portrait which you have there over the door." More and more impressed by these circumstances, the gentleman again took up the note, and read aloud: "My son, your father has just been delivered from Purgatory, thanks to a Mass which the bearer has had celebrated this morning. She is in great distress, and I recommend her to you." He read and re-read those lines, traced by that hand so dear to him, by a father who was now among the number of the elect. Tears of joy coursed down his cheeks as he turned toward the woman. "Poor woman," he said, "by your trifling alms you have secured the eternal felicity of him who gave me life. In my turn I will secure your temporal happiness. I take upon myself to sup-

ply all the needs of yourself and your whole family."

What joy for that gentleman! what joy for that poor woman! It is difficult to say on which side was the greatest happiness. What is most important and most easy is to see the instruction to be derived from this incident; it teaches us that the smallest act of charity toward the members of the Church Suffering is precious in the sight of God, and draws down upon us miracles of mercy.

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WE HAVE just spoken of the gratitude of the Holy Souls. This they sometimes manifest, as we have seen, in a clearly visible manner, but most frequently they exercise it invisibly by their prayers. The souls pray for us not only when, after their deliverance, they are with God in heaven, but even in their place of exile and in the midst of their sufferings. Although they cannot pray for themselves, yet, by their supplications, they obtain great grace for us. Such is the express doctrine of two eminent theologians, Bellarmine and Suarez. "These souls are holy," says Suarez, "and dear to God. Charity urges them to love us, and they know, at least in a general way, to what dangers we are exposed, and what need we have of the divine assistance. Why, then, would they not pray for their benefactors?"

Why? But it will be answered, because they know them not. In that dismal abode, in the midst of their torments, how can they know who are those that assist them by their suffrages?

To this objection it may be replied: the souls feel at least the alleviation which they receive and the assistance which is given them; this suffices, even should they be ignorant of the source whence it came, to call down the benedictions of Heaven upon their benefactors, whosoever they may be, and who are known to God.

But in reality do they not know from whom they receive assistance in their sufferings? Their ignorance of this is nowise proved, and we have strong reason to believe that no such ignorance exists. Would their angel guardian, who dwells there with them to give them all the consolation in his power, deprive them of this consoling knowledge? Is this knowledge not conformable to the doctrine of the Communion of Saints? Would the intercourse which exists between us and the Church Suffering not be the more perfect for its being reciprocal, and that the souls know their benefactors better?

This doctrine is confirmed by a great number of particular revelations, and by the practice of several holy persons. We have already said that St. Bridget, in one of her ecstasies, heard several souls cry aloud, "Lord, God all-powerful, reward a hundred-

fold those who assist us by their prayers, and who offer to you their good works, in order that we may enjoy the light of your divinity."

We read in the Life of St. Catherine of Bologna that she had a most tender devotion toward the holy souls in Purgatory; that she prayed for them very frequently, and with the greatest fervor; that she recommended herself to them with the greatest confidence in her spiritual necessities, and advised others to do the same, saying, "When I wish to obtain any favor from our Father in heaven, I have recourse to the souls that are detained in Purgatory; I entreat them to present my request to the Divine Majesty in their own name, and I feel that I am heard through their intercession." A holy priest of our own day, the cause of whose beatification has been commenced in Rome, Venerable Vianney, Curé of Ars, said to an ecclesiastic who consulted him, "Oh! if it were but known how great is the power of the good souls in Purgatory with the Heart of God, and if we knew all the graces we can obtain through their intercession, they would not be so much forgotten. We must, therefore, pray much for them, that they may pray much for us."

These last words of Venerable Vianney indicate the true manner of having recourse to the souls in Purgatory; we must assist them, to obtain their prayers and the effects of their gratitude in return—*We must pray*

much for them that they may pray much for us.

There is no question here of invoking them as we invoke the saints in heaven. Such is not the spirit of the Church, which, before all else, prays for the departed, and assists them by her suffrages. But it is nowise contrary to the spirit of the Church nor to Christian piety to procure relief for the souls, with the intention of obtaining in return, through the assistance of their prayers, the favors which we desire. Thus, it is a laudable and pious act to offer a Mass for the departed when we are in need of any particular grace. If, when the Holy Souls are still in their sufferings, their prayers are so powerful, we may easily conceive that they will be much more efficacious when, being entirely purified, these souls stand before the throne of God.

Chapter 7

Two Views of Purgatory

WHERE have always been two views of Purgatory prevailing in the Church, not contradictory the one of the other, but rather expressive of the mind and devotion of those who have embraced them. One is the view met with in by far the greater number of the lives and revelations of Italian and Spanish saints, the works of the Germans of

the Middle Ages, and the popular delineations of Purgatory in Belgium, Portugal, Brazil, Mexico, and elsewhere. The other is the view which has been made popular by St. Francis of Sales, though he drew it originally from his favorite treatise on Purgatory by St. Catherine of Genoa; and it is also borne out by many of the revelations of Sister Francesca of Pampeluna, a Teresian nun, published with a long and able *censura* by Fra Giuseppe Bonaventura Ponze, a Dominican professor at Saragossa. Each of these two views, though neither denies the other, has its own peculiar spirit of devotion.

The first view is embodied in the terrifying sermons of Italian *Quaresimali*, and in those wayside pictures which so often provoke the fastidiousness of the English traveller. It loves to represent Purgatory simply as a hell which is not eternal. Violence, confusion, wailing, horror, preside over its descriptions. It dwells, and truly, on the terribleness of the pain of sense which the soul is mysteriously permitted to endure. The fire is the same fire as that of hell, created for the single and express purpose of giving torture. Our earthly fire is as painted fire compared to it. Besides this, there is a special and indefinable horror to the unbodied soul in becoming the prey of this material agony. The sense of imprisonment, close and intolerable, and the intense palpable darkness, are additional features in the horror of the

scene, which prepare us for that sensible neighborhood to hell, which many saints have spoken of as belonging to Purgatory. Angels are represented as active executioners of God's awful justice. Some have even held that the demons were permitted to touch and harass the spouses of Christ in those ardent fires. Then to this terribleness of the pain of sense is added the dreadful-ness of the pain of loss. The beauty of God remains in itself the same immensely desirable object it ever was. But the soul is changed. All that in life and in the world of sense dulled its desires after God, is gone from it, so that it seeks Him with an impetuosity which no imagination can at all conceive. The very burning excess of its love becomes the measure of its intolerable pain. What love can do even on earth, we may learn from the example of Father John Baptist Sanchez, who said he was sure he should die of misery if, any morning when he rose, he should know that he was certain not to die that day. To these horrors we might add many more which depict Purgatory simply as a hell which is not eternal.

The spirit of this view is a holy fear of offending God, a desire for bodily austerities, a great value put upon indulgences, an extreme horror of sin, and an habitual trembling before the judgments of God. Those who have led lives of unusual penance, and the severer Orders in religion,

have always been impregnated with this view; and it seems to have been borne out in its minutest details by the conclusions of Scholastic theologians, as may be seen at once by referring to Bellarmine, who, in each section of his treatise on Purgatory, compares the revelations of the saints with the conclusions of theology. It is remarkable also, that when the Blessed Henry Suso, through increased familiarity and love of God, began to think comparatively lightly of the pains of Purgatory, Our Lord warned him that this was very displeasing to Him. For what judgment can be light which God has prepared for sin? Many theologians have said, not only that the least pain of Purgatory was greater than the greatest pain of earth, but greater than all the pains of earth put together. This, then, is a true view of Purgatory, but not a complete one. Yet it is not one which we can safely call coarse or grotesque. It is the view of many saints and servants of God; and it is embodied in the popular celebrations of All Souls' Day in several Catholic countries.

The second view of Purgatory does not deny any one of the features of the preceding view, but it almost puts them out of sight by the other considerations which it brings more prominently forward. It goes into Purgatory with its eyes fascinated and its spirit sweetly tranquillized by the face of Jesus, its first sight of the Sacred Humanity at the particu-

lar judgment which it has undergone. That vision abides with it still, and beautifies the uneven terrors of its prison as if with perpetual silvery showers of moonlight, which seem to fall from our Saviour's loving eyes. In the sea of fire it holds fast by that image. The moment that in His sight it perceives its own unfitness for heaven, it wings its voluntary flight to Purgatory, like a dove to her proper nest in the shadows of the forest. There need no angels to convey it thither. It is its own free worship of the purity of God. This is beautifully expressed in a revelation of St. Gertrude, related by Blossius. The Saint saw in spirit the soul of a Religious who had passed her life in the exercise of the most lofty virtues. She was standing before Our Lord clothed and adorned with charity; but she did not dare to lift her eyes to look at Him. She kept them cast down as if she was ashamed to stand in His presence, and showed by some gesture her desire to be further from Him. Gertrude marvelled at this, and ventured to question Him: "Most merciful God! why dost Thou not receive this soul into the arms of Thine infinite charity? What are the strange gestures of diffidence which I behold in her?" Then Our Lord lovingly stretched out His right arm, as if He would draw the soul nearer to Himself; but she, with profound humility and great modesty, retired from Him. The Saint, lost in still greater

wonder, asked why she fled from the embraces of a Spouse so worthy to be loved; and the Religious answered her: "Because I am not yet perfectly cleansed from the stains which my sins have left behind them; and even if He were to grant me in this state a free entrance into heaven, I would not accept it; for, all resplendent as I look to your eyes, I know that I am not yet a fit spouse for my Lord."

In that moment the soul loves God most tenderly, and in return is most tenderly beloved by Him. To the eyes of those who take this view, that soul seems most beautiful. How should a dear spouse of God be anything but beautiful? The soul is in punishment, true; but it is in unbroken union with God. "It has no remembrance," says St. Catherine of Genoa most positively, "no remembrance at all of its past sins or of earth." Its sweet prison, its holy sepulchre, is in the adorable will of its heavenly Father; and there it abides the term of its purification with the most perfect contentment and the most unutterable love. As it is not teased by any vision of self or sin, so neither is it harassed by an atom of fear, or by a single doubt of its own imperturbable security. It is impeccable; and there was a time on earth when that gift alone seemed as if it would contain all heaven in itself. It cannot commit the slightest imperfection. It cannot have the least movement of impatience.

It can do nothing whatever which will in the least degree displease God. It loves God above everything, and it loves Him with a pure and disinterested love. It is constantly consoled by angels, and cannot but rejoice in the confirmed assurance of its own salvation. Nay, its very bitterest agonies are accompanied by a profound unshaken peace, such as the language of this world has no words to tell.

There are revelations which speak of some who are in Purgatory, but have no fire. They languish patiently, detained from God, and that is enough chastisement for them. There are revelations, too, which tell of multitudes who are in no local prison, but abide their purification in the air, or by their graves, or near altars where the Blessed Sacrament is, or in the rooms of those who pray for them, or amid the scenes of their former vanity and frivolity. If silent suffering, sweetly, gracefully endured, is a thing so venerable on earth, what must this region of the Church be like? Compared with earth, its trials, doubts, exciting and depressing risks, how much more beautiful, how much more desirable, that still, calm, patient realm over which Mary is crowned as queen, and Michael is the perpetual ambassador of her mercy.

The spirit of this view is love, an extreme desire that God should not be offended, a yearning for the interests of Jesus. It takes

its tone from the soul's first voluntary flight into that heritage of suffering. As it took God's part against itself in that act, so is it throughout. This view of Purgatory turns on the worship of God's purity and sanctity. It looks at things from God's point of view, and merges its own interests in His. It is just the view we might expect to come from St. Francis of Sales, or the loving St. Catherine of Genoa. It is the helplessness rather than the wretchedness of the souls detained there, which moves those who take this view, to compassion and devotion; but it is God's glory and the interests of Jesus which influence them most of all.

How solemn and subduing is the thought of that holy kingdom, that realm of pain. There is no cry, no murmur; all is silent, silent as Jesus before His enemies. We shall never know we really love Mary till we look up to her out of those deeps, those vales of dread mysterious fire. Beautiful region of the Church of God! Lovely troop of the flock of Mary! What a scene is presented to our eyes when we gaze upon that consecrated empire of sinlessness, and yet of keenest suffering! There is the beauty of those immaculate souls, and then the loveliness, yea, the worshipfulness of their patience, the majesty of their gifts, the dignity of their solemn and chaste sufferings, the eloquence of their silence; the moonlight of Mary's throne lighting up their land

of pain and unspechful expectation; the silver-winged angels voyaging through the deeps of that mysterious realm; and, above all, that unseen face of Jesus, which is so well remembered that it seems to be almost seen! What a sinless purity of worship is here in this liturgy of hallowed pain! O world! O weary, clamorous, sinful world! who would not break away if he could, like an uncaged dove, from thy perilous toils and unsafe pilgrimage, and fly with joy to the lowest place in that most pure, most safe, most holy land of suffering and of sinless love?—Rev. Chapter 8

Union of the Two Views of Purgatory

The Sufferings and the Helplessness of the Holy Souls

BUT let us now see what is common to both these views of Purgatory. This is a more practical consideration. I suppose there are none of us who expect to be lost. We know and feel, with more or less of alarm, the greatness of the risk we are running; but to expect to be lost would be the sin of despair. Hell is only practical to us as a motive of greater diligence, greater strictness, greater circumspectness, greater fear.

But it is not so with Purgatory. I suppose we all expect, or think ourselves sure, to go there. If we do not think much of the matter at all, then we may have some vague notion of going straight to heaven as soon as we are judged. But if we seriously reflect upon it, upon our own lives, upon God's sanctity, upon what we read in books of devotion and the Lives of the Saints, I can hardly conceive any one of us expecting to escape Purgatory, and not rather feeling that it must be almost a stretch of the divine mercy which will get us even there. It would more likely be vain presumption than heroic hope, if we thought otherwise. Now, if we really expect that our road to heaven will be through the punishments of Purgatory—for surely its purification is penal—it very much concerns us to know what is common to both the views of Purgatory, which, it appears, prevail in the Church.

First, both these views agree that the pains are extremely severe, as well because of the office which God intends them to fulfil, as because of the disembodied soul being the subject of them. Both agree also in the length of the suffering. This requires to be dwelt upon, as it is hard to convince people of it, and a great deal comes of the conviction, both to ourselves and others. This duration may be understood in two ways: first, as of actual length of time; and, secondly, as of seeming length from the

excess of pain. With regard to the first, if we look into the revelations of Sister Francesca of Pampeluna, we shall find among some hundreds of cases that by far the greater majority suffered thirty, forty, or sixty years. Here are some of the examples: a holy bishop, for some negligence in his high office, had been in Purgatory fifty-nine years, before he appeared to the servant of God; another bishop, so generous of his revenues that he was named the alms-giver, had been there five years because he had wished for the dignity; another bishop had been forty; a priest forty years, because through his negligence some sick persons had died without the sacraments; another, forty-five years for inconsiderateness in his ministerial functions; a gentleman fifty-nine years for worldliness; another, sixty-four for fondness for playing at cards for money; another, thirty-five years for worldliness. Bishops seem, upon the whole, according to her revelations, to remain longest there, and to be visited with the extreme of rigor.

Without multiplying instances, which it would be easy to do, these disclosures may teach us greater watchfulness over ourselves, and more unwearied perseverance in praying for the departed. The old foundations for perpetual Masses embody the same sentiment. We are apt to leave off too soon, imagining with a foolish and unenlightened fondness that our friends are freed from

Purgatory much sooner than they really are. If Sister Francesca beheld the souls of many fervent Carmelites, some of whom had wrought miracles in their lifetime, still in Purgatory ten, twenty, thirty, sixty years after their death, and still not near their deliverance, as many told her, what must become of us and ours? Then, as to seeming length from the extremity of pain, there are many instances on record in the Chronicles of the Franciscans, the Life of St. Francis Jerome, and elsewhere, of souls appearing an hour or two after death, and thinking they had been many years in Purgatory. Such may be the Purgatory of those who are caught up to meet the Lord at the last day.

Both views agree again in holding that, what we in the world call very trivial faults are most severely visited in Purgatory. St. Peter Damian gives us many instances of this, and others are collected and quoted by Bellarmine. Slight feelings of self-complacency, trifling inattentions in the recital of the Divine Office, and the like, occur frequently among them. Sister Francesca mentions the case of a girl of fourteen, in Purgatory because she was not quite conformed to the will of God in dying so young; and one soul said to her: "Ah! men little think in the world how dearly they are going to pay here for faults they hardly note there." She even saw souls that were immensely

punished only for having been scrupulous in this life; either, I suppose, because there is mostly self-will in scruples, or because they did not lay them down when obedience commanded. Wrong notions about small faults may thus lead us to neglect the dead, or leave off our prayers too soon, as well as lose a lesson for ourselves.

Then, again, both views agree as to the helplessness of the Holy Souls. They lie like the paralytic at the pool. It would seem as if even the coming of the Angel were not an effectual blessing to them, unless there be some one of us to help them. Some have even thought they cannot pray. Anyhow, they have no means of making themselves heard by us on whose charity they depend. Some writers have said that our blessed Lord will not help them without our co-operation; and that our blessed Lady cannot help them, except in indirect ways, because she is no longer able to make satisfaction; though I never like to hear of anything our dearest Mother cannot do, and I regard such statements with suspicion. Whatever may come of these opinions, they at least illustrate the strong way in which theologians apprehend the helplessness of the Holy Souls. Then, another feature in their helplessness is the forgetfulness of the living, or the cruel flattery of relations who will always have it that those near or dear to them die the death of saints. They would

surely have a scruple, if they knew of how many Masses and prayers they rob the souls, by the selfish exaggeration of their goodness. I call it selfish, for it is nothing more than a miserable device to console themselves in their sorrow. The very state of the Holy Souls is one of the most unbounded helplessness. They cannot do penance; they cannot merit; they cannot satisfy; they cannot gain indulgences; they have no sacraments; they are not under the jurisdiction of God's Vicar, overflowing with the plenitude of means of grace and manifold benedictions. They are a portion of the Church without either priesthood or altar at their own command.

These are the points common to both views of Purgatory; and how manifold are the lessons we learn from them, on our own behalf as well as on behalf of the Holy Souls. For ourselves, what light does all this throw on slovenliness, lukewarmness, and love of ease? What does it make us think of performing our devotions out of a mere spirit of formality, or a trick of habit? What a change should it not work in our lives! What diligence in our examens, confessions, communions, and prayers! It seems as if the grace of all graces, for which we should ever be importuning our dear Lord, would be to hate sin with something of the hatred wherewith He hated it in the Garden of Gethsemane. Oh, is not the purity of God

something awful, unspeakable, adorable? He, who is Himself a simple act, has gone on acting, multiplying acts since creation, yet He has incurred no stain! He is ever mingling with a most unutterable condescension with what is beneath Him—yet no stain! He loves His creatures with a love immeasurably more intense than the wildest passions of earth—yet no stain! He is omnipotent, yet it is beyond the limits of His power to receive a stain. He is so pure that the very vision of Him causes eternal purity and blessedness. Mary's purity is but a fair thin shadow of it. Nay, the Sacred Humanity itself cannot adequately worship the purity of the Most High; and we, even we, are to dwell in His arms for ever; we are to dwell amid the everlasting burnings of that uncreated purity! Yet, let us look at our lives; let us trace our hearts faithfully through but one day, and see of what mixed intentions, human respects, self-love, and pusillanimous temper our actions, nay, even our devotions, are made up; and does not Purgatory, heated sevenfold, and endured to the day of doom, seem but a gentle novitiate for the vision of the All-Holy?

But some persons turn in anger from the thought of Purgatory, as if it were not to be endured, that after trying all our lives long to serve God, we should accomplish the tremendous feat of a good death, only to pass from the agonies of the death-bed into fire—

long, keen, searching, triumphant, incomparable fire. Alas! my dear friends, your anger will not help you nor alter facts. But have you thought sufficiently about God? Have you tried to realize His holiness and purity in assiduous meditation? Is there a real divorce between you and the world, which you know is God's enemy? Do you take God's side? Have you wedded His interests? Do you long for His glory? Have you put sin alongside of our dear Saviour's passion, and measured the one by the other? Surely, if you had, Purgatory would but seem to you the last, unexpected, and inexpressibly tender invention of an obstinate love, which was mercifully determined to save you in spite of yourself. It would be a perpetual wonder to you—a joyous wonder, fresh every morning, a wonder that would be meat and drink to your soul—that you, being what you are, what you know yourself to be, what you may conceive God knows you to be, should be saved eternally. Remember what the suffering soul said so simply, yet with such force, to Sister Francesca: “Ah! those on that side the grave little reckon how dearly they will pay on this side for the lives they live.” To be angry because you are told you will go to Purgatory! Silly, silly people! Most likely it is a great false flattery, and that you will never be good enough to go there at all. Why, positively, you do not recognize your

own good fortune. when you are told of it. And none but the humble go there. I remember Maria Crocifissa was told that although many of the saints while on earth loved God more than some do even in heaven, yet that the greatest saint on earth was not so *humble* as are the souls in Purgatory. I do not think I ever read anything in the Lives of the Saints which struck me so much as that. You see it is not well to be angry; for those only are lucky enough to get into Purgatory who sincerely believe themselves to be worthy of hell.

But we not only learn lessons for our own good, but for the good of the Holy Souls. We see that our charitable attentions toward them must be far more vigorous and persevering than they have been; since men go to Purgatory for very little matters, and remain there an unexpectedly long time. But their most touching appeal to us lies in their helplessness; and our dear Lord, with His usual loving arrangement, has made the extent of our power to help them more than commensurate with their inability to help themselves. Some theologians have said that prayer for the Holy Souls is not infallibly answered. I confess their arguments on this head do not convince me; but, conceding the point, how wonderful still is the power which we can exercise in favor of the departed! St. Thomas has at least taught us that prayer for the dead is more readily

accepted with God than prayer for the living. We can offer and apply for them all the satisfactions of our blessed Lord. We can do vicarious penance for them. We can give to them all the satisfactions of our ordinary actions, and of our sufferings. We can make over to them, by way of suffrage, the indulgences we gain, provided the Church has made them applicable to the dead. We can limit and direct upon them, or any one of them, the intention of the Adorable Sacrifice. The Church, which has no jurisdiction over them, can yet make indulgences applicable or inapplicable to them by way of suffrage; and by means of liturgy, commemoration, incense, holy water, and the like, can reach efficaciously to them, and most of all by her device of privileged altars. The Communion of Saints furnishes the veins and channels by which all these things reach them in Christ. Heaven itself condescends to act upon them through earth. Their Queen helps them by setting us to work for them, and the angels and the saints bestow their gifts through us, whom they persuade to be their almoners; nay, we are often their almoners without knowing that we are so. Our blessed Lord vouchsafes to look to us, as if He would say: Here are My weapons, work for Me! just as a father will let his child do a portion of his work, in spite of the risk he runs of having it spoiled. To possess such powers, and not to use them,

would be the height of irreverence toward God, as well as of want of charity to men. There is nothing so irreverent, because nothing so unfilial, as to shrink from God's gifts simply because of their exuberance. Men have a feeling of safety in not meddling with the supernatural; but the truth is, we cannot stand aloof on one side and be safe. Naturalism is the unsafe thing. If we do not enter the system, and humbly take our place in it, it will draw us in, only to tear us to pieces when it has done so. The dread of the supernatural is the unsafest of feelings. The jealousy of it is a prophecy of eternal loss, which far too often comes true.

All that I have said hitherto has been, indirectly at least, a plea for this devotion; but I must come now to a more direct recommendation of it.—Father Faber, *ibid.*

Chapter 9

Devotion for the Conversion of Sinners and Devotion for the Holy Souls

EVERY hour—at least, so we trust—a new soul lands in Heaven from Purgatory, or from earth, and begins its eternity of rapture and of praise. Each soul that swells the throng of worshippers, each silent voice added to the angelic choirs, is an in-

crease to the glory of God; and so it is the interest of Jesus to make these arrivals more frequent, and that they should bring more merits and higher degrees of love with them when they come.

Look at that vast kingdom of Purgatory, with its Empress-Mother, Mary. All those countless throngs of souls are the dear and faithful spouses of Jesus. Yet in what a strange abandonment of supernatural suffering has His love left them! He longs for their deliverance; He yearns for them to be transferred from that land, perpetually overclouded with pain, to the bright sunshine of their heavenly home. Nevertheless, He has tied His own hands, or nearly so. He gives them no more grace; He allows them no more time for penance; He prevents them from meriting; nay, some have thought they could not pray. How, then, stands the case with the souls in the suffering Church? Why, it is a thing to be meditated on when we have said it—they depend almost more on earth than they do on Heaven, almost more on us than on Him; so He has willed it on whom all depend, and without whom there is no dependence. It is clear, then, that Jesus has His interests there. He wants His captives released. Those whom He has redeemed He now bids us redeem—us whom, if there be life at all in us, He has already Himself redeemed. Every satisfaction offered up to God for

these suffering souls, every oblation of the precious blood to the eternal Father, every Mass heard, every communion received, every voluntary penance undergone—the scourge, the hair-shirt, the prickly chain—every indulgence gained, every jubilee whose conditions we have fulfilled, every *De Profundis* whispered, every little alms doled out to the poor who are poorer than ourselves—all these things are part of the glory of Jesus; and if they be offered for the intention of these dear prisoners, the interests of Jesus are hourly forwarded in Mary's kingdom of Purgatory. There is no fear of overworking the glorious secretary of that wide realm, the Blessed Michael, Mary's subject. See how men work at the pumps on board a ship when they are fighting for their lives with an ugly leak; oh, that we had the charity so to work, with the sweet instrumentality of indulgences, for the holy souls in Purgatory! The infinite satisfactions of Jesus are at our command, and Mary's sorrows, and the martyrs' pangs, and the Confessors' weary perseverance in well-doing. Jesus will not help Himself here, because He loves to see us helping Him, and because He thinks our love will rejoice that He still leaves us something we can do for Him. There have been saints who have devoted their whole lives to this one work, mining in Purgatory; and to those who reflect in faith it does not seem, after all, so strange. It is

a foolish comparison, simply because it is so much below the mark, but, on all principles of reckoning, it is a much less work to have won the battle of Waterloo, or to have invented the steam-engine, than to have freed one soul from Purgatory.

See how far some have gone, whose praise is in all the churches. Father Ferdinand de Monroy, a most apostolic man, at the hour of death made in writing a donation and transfer to the souls in Purgatory of all the Masses that should be said for him after he was dead, of all the penances offered up for him, and all the indulgences gained for him. He might well make the donation, for little need of such things had one who loved God so tenderly, and had wedded the interests of Jesus so utterly, as this very action shows he must have done. "Love is strong as death: many waters cannot quench charity, neither can the floods drown it; if a man should give all the substance of his house for love, he shall despise it as nothing" (Cant. viii. 6, 7).

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ROSSIGNOLI, in "Wonders of God in Purgatory," which he wrote at the request of the Blessed Sebastian Valfré, of the Turin Oratory, relates from the Dominican annals an interesting dispute between two good friars as to the respective merits of devotion for the conversion of sinners and devotion for the Holy Souls. Fra Bertrando

was the great advocate of poor sinners, constantly said Mass for them, and offered up all his prayers and penances to obtain for them the grace of conversion. "Sinners," he said, "without grace are in a state of perdition. Evil spirits are continually laying snares for them, to deprive them of the beatific vision, and to carry them off to eternal torments. Our blessed Lord came down from heaven, and died a most painful death for them. What can be a higher work than to imitate Him, and to co-operate with Him in the salvation of souls? When a soul is lost, the price of its redemption is lost also. Now, the souls in Purgatory are safe. They are sure of their eternal salvation. It is most true that they are plunged into a sea of sorrows; but they are sure to come out at last. They are the friends of God; whereas sinners are His enemies, and to be God's enemy is the greatest misery in creation."

Fra Benedetto was an equally enthusiastic advocate of the Suffering Souls. He offered all his free Masses for them, as well as his prayers and penances. "Sinners," he said, "were bound with the chains of their own will. They could leave off sinning if they pleased. The yoke was of their own choosing; whereas the dead were tied hand and foot against their own will in the most atrocious sufferings. Now come, dear Fra Bertrando, tell me: Suppose there were two beggars, one well and strong, who could use

his hands and work if he liked, but chose to suffer poverty rather than part with the sweets of idleness; and the other sick, and maimed, and helpless, who, in his piteous condition, could do nothing but supplicate help with cries and tears. Which of the two would deserve compassion most, especially if the sick one was suffering the most intolerable agonies? Now this is just the case between sinners and the Holy Souls. These last are suffering an excruciating martyrdom, and they have no means of helping themselves. It is true they have deserved these pains for their sins; but they are now already cleansed from those sins. They must have returned to the grace of God before they died, else they would not have been saved. They are now most dear, inexpressibly dear, to God; and surely charity, well-ordered, must follow the wise love of the divine will, and love most what He loves most."

Fra Bertrando, however, would not give way, though he did not quite see a satisfactory answer to his friend's objection. But the night following he had an apparition which, it seems, so convinced him, that from that time he changed his practice, and offered up all his Masses, prayers, and penances, for the Holy Souls. It would appear as if the authority of St. Thomas might be quoted on the side of Fra Benedetto, as he says, "Prayer for the dead is more acceptable than prayer for the living; for the dead

are in the greatest need of it, and cannot help themselves as the living can."

How acceptable this devotion is to Almighty God, and how He vouchsafes to seem, as it were, impatient for the deliverance of the souls, and yet to leave it to our charity, is taught us on the unimpeachable authority of St. Teresa. In the "Book of her Foundations," she tells us that Don Bernardino di Mendoza gave her a house, garden, and vineyard for a convent at Valladolid. Two months after this, and before the foundation was effected, he was suddenly taken ill, and lost the power of speech, so that he could not make a confession, though he gave many signs of contrition. "He died," says St. Teresa, "very shortly, and far from the place where I then was. But Our Lord spoke to me and told me that he was saved, though he had run a great risk, for that He had had mercy upon him because of the gift he had given for the convent of His blessed Mother; but that his soul would not be freed from Purgatory until the first Mass was said in the new house. I felt so deeply the pains this soul was suffering, that although I was very desirous of accomplishing the foundation of Toledo, I left it at once for Valladolid. Praying one day at Medina del Campo, Our Lord told me to make haste, for that soul was suffering grievously. On this, I started at once, though I was not well prepared for it, and

arrived at Valladolid on St. Lawrence's Day." She then goes on to relate that, as she received communion at the first Mass said in the house, her benefactor's soul appeared to her all glorious, and afterward entered heaven. She did not expect this, for, as she observes, "although it had been revealed to me that this would happen at the first Mass, I thought it must mean the first Mass when the Blessed Sacrament would be reserved there." We might multiply almost indefinitely the revelations of the saints which go to prove the special favor with which our blessed Lord regards this devotion wherein His interests are so nearly and dearly engaged. But it is time now to get a clear view of our subject.

There are, as we all know, two worlds, the world of sense and the world of spirit. We live in the world of sense, surrounded by the world of spirit, and as Christians we have hourly and very real communications with that world. Now it is a mere fragment of the Church which is in the world of sense. In these days the Church Triumphant in heaven, collecting its fresh multitudes in every age, and constantly beautifying itself with new saints, must necessarily far exceed the limits of the Church Militant, which does not embrace even a majority of the inhabitants of earth. Nor is it unlikely, but most likely, that the Church Suffering in Purgatory must far exceed the Church Militant in

extent, as it surpasses it in beauty. Toward those countless hosts who are lost we have no duties; they have fallen away from us; we hardly know the name of one who is there, for many have thought that Solomon was saved, some have gone so far as to regard the words in the "Acts of the Apostles" about Judas as not infallibly decisive, and there is not quite a consent even against Saul. We are cut off from them; all is blackness and darkness about them; we have no relations with them.

But by the doctrine of the Communion of Saints, and of the unity of Christ's mystical body, we have most intimate relations both of duty and affection with the Church Triumphant and Suffering; and Catholic devotion furnishes us with many appointed and approved ways of discharging these duties toward them. For the present it is enough to say that God has given us such power over the dead that they seem, as I have said before, to depend almost more on earth than on Heaven; and, surely, that He has given us this power, and supernatural methods of exercising it, is not the least touching proof that His Blessed Majesty has contrived all things for love. Can we not conceive the joy of the Blessed in heaven, looking down from the bosom of God and the calmness of their eternal repose upon this scene of dimness, disquietude, doubt and fear, and rejoicing, in the plenitude of their

charity, in their vast power with the Sacred Heart of Jesus, to obtain grace and blessing day and night for the poor dwellers upon earth? It does not distract them from God; it does not interfere with the Vision, or make it waver and grow misty; it does not trouble their glory or their peace. On the contrary, it is with them as with our guardian angels: the affectionate ministries of their charity increase their own accidental glory. The same joy in its measure may be ours even upon earth. If we are fully possessed with the Catholic devotion for the Holy Souls, we shall never be without the grateful consciousness of the immense powers which Jesus has given us on their behalf. We are never so like Him, or so nearly imitate His tender offices, as when we are devoutly exercising these powers. We are humbled excessively by becoming the benefactors of those beautiful souls who are so immeasurably our superiors, as Joseph was said to have learned humility by commanding Jesus. While we are helping the Holy Souls, we love Jesus with a love beyond words, a love that almost makes us afraid, yet also with a delightful fear, because in this devotion it is His hands we are moving, as we would move the unskilful hands of a child. Dearest Lord, is it not incredible that He should let us do these things? That He should let us do with His satisfactions what we will, and sprinkle His precious blood as

if it were so much water from the nearest well? That we should limit the efficacy of His unbloody Sacrifice, and name souls to Him, and expect Him to obey us, and that He should do so? Beautiful was the helplessness of His blessed Infancy; beautiful is His helplessness in His most dear Sacrament; beautiful is the helplessness in which for the love of us He mostly wills to be with regard to His dear spouses in Purgatory, whose entrance into glory His Heart is so impatiently awaiting! What thoughts, what feelings, what love should be ours, as we, like choirs of terrestrial angels, gaze down on the wide, silent, sinless kingdom of suffering, and then with our own venturous touch wave the sceptred hand of Jesus over its broad regions, all richly dropping with the balsam of His saving blood!

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WHERE was an old Spanish Jesuit, who could not for the life of him make up his mind whether it was better to gain an indulgence for the soul in Purgatory that was most neglected and forgotten, or for the soul that was nearest to its release and entrance into glory. There was a puzzle; both were sweet acts of charity, but which was the sweetest? which would Jesus most approve? He was such a kind-hearted man, that good Father, that he inclined very much to the poor neglected soul, just because it

was so neglected: it went to his heart to pass over that forgotten soul. But at last he decided in favor of the other; and now see the reasons. Although it seems the greater mercy to offer it for the other soul, because it is most in want, seeing that it is in greater misery; notwithstanding, charity is a greater virtue than mercy, and it is a greater act of charity to offer the indulgence for the soul that was most just and loved God most, looking simply to the greater glory of the Divine Majesty as the Creator of that soul; for it is nearest to its entry into heaven, where it will at once begin to glorify God immensely by its praises and its bliss. Here was eagerness for the glory of God. Again, the soul is not properly the full conquest of Jesus till it is safely landed in heaven, and our dear Redeemer presents it to the Eternal Father as a trophy of His sacred passion; and was it not better to keep the poor neglected soul waiting in Purgatory than to keep Jesus waiting in heaven? Moreover, all this sadness about passing over the forgotten soul, would it not influence Jesus, and something would be done for that poor soul? Here was touchiness about the interests of Jesus. Furthermore, thought our good old Jesuit, the sooner this soul, that is so near heaven, gets into heaven, the sooner will it begin to gain all manner of graces from God for my soul, and for the souls of sinners upon earth. Here

was anxiety for the salvation of souls. So away went the indulgence to the soul that was nearest its release, not without a very fervent sigh, and a very wistful look to Mary, and a comfortable suspicion that Jesus would do something extra for the poor forgotten soul.

The decision of the good Father seems to have high authority; for among the revelations made to Sister Francesca of the Blessed Sacrament, a Spanish Teresian nun, it was told her that immense numbers of souls issued from Purgatory on the evening of All Souls' Day; and that they were mostly those who were near to glory, among whom God distributed the suffrages of the universal Church on that day. Yet, on the other hand, we know that St. Vincent de Paul's special devotion was to the most destitute soul. But, then, destitute souls were his line; he was their property and possession.—Father Faber, *ibid.*

Chapter 10

Devotion to the Holy Souls in Relation to Other Devotions

IT IS not saying too much to call devotion to the Holy Souls a kind of centre in which all Catholic devotions meet, and which satisfies more than any other single devotion our duties in that way, because it is a

devotion all of love, and of disinterested love. If we cast an eye over the chief Catholic devotions, we shall see the truth of this. Take the devotion of St. Ignatius to the glory of God. This, if we may dare to use such an expression of Him, was the special and favorite devotion of Jesus. Now, Purgatory is simply a field white for the harvest of God's glory. Not a prayer can be said for the Holy Souls but God is at once glorified, both by the faith and the charity of the mere prayer. Not an alleviation, however trifling, can befall any one of the souls, but He is forthwith glorified by the honor of His Son's precious blood, and the approach of the soul to bliss. Not a soul is delivered from its trial, but God is immensely glorified. He crowns His own gifts in that dear soul. The cross of Christ has triumphed. The decree of predestination is victoriously accomplished, and there is a new worshipper in the courts of heaven. Moreover, God's glory, His sweetest glory, the glory of His love, is sooner or later infallible in Purgatory, because there is no sin there nor possibility of sin. It is only a question of time. All that is gained is real gain. All that is reaped is true wheat, without chaff or stubble or any such thing.

Again, what devotion is justly more dear to Christians than the devotion to the Sacred Humanity of Jesus? It is rather a family of various and beautiful devotions than a

devotion by itself. Yet see how they are all, as it were, fulfilled, affectionately fulfilled, in devotion to the Holy Souls. The quicker the souls are liberated from Purgatory, the more is the bountiful harvest of His blessed passion multiplied and accelerated. An early harvest is a blessing, as well as a plentiful one; for all delay of a soul's ingress into the praise of heaven is an eternal and irremediable loss of honor and glory to the Sacred Humanity of Jesus. How strangely things sound in the language of the sanctuary! yet so it is. Can the Sacred Humanity be honored more than by the adorable sacrifice of the Mass? But here is our chief action upon Purgatory. Faith in His sacraments as used for the dead is a pleasing homage to Jesus, and the same may be said of faith in indulgences and privileged altars and the like. The powers of the Church all flow from His Sacred Humanity, and are a perpetual praise and thank-offering to it. So, again, this devotion honors Him by imitating His zeal for souls. For this zeal is a badge of His people and an inheritance from Him.

Devotion to our dearest Mother is equally comprehended in this devotion to the Holy Souls, whether we look at her as the Mother of Jesus, and so sharing the honors of His Sacred Humanity, or as Mother of Mercy, and so specially worshipped by works of mercy, or, lastly, whether we regard her as,

in a particular sense, the Queen of Purgatory, and so having all manner of dear interests to be promoted in the welfare and deliverance of those suffering souls.

Next to this we may rank devotion to the holy angels, and this also is satisfied in devotion to the Holy Souls. For it keeps filling the vacant thrones in the angelic choirs, those unsightly gaps which the fall of Lucifer and one-third of the heavenly host occasioned. It multiplies the companions of the blessed spirits. They may be supposed also to look with an especial interest on that part of the Church which lies in Purgatory, because it is already crowned with their own dear gift and ornament of final perseverance, and yet it has not entered at once into its inheritance as they did. Many of them also have a tender personal interest in Purgatory. Thousands, perhaps millions of them, are guardians to those souls, and their office is not over yet. Thousands have clients there who were specially devoted to them in life. Will St. Raphael, who was so faithful to Tobias, be less faithful to his clients there? Whole choirs are interested about others, either because they are finally to be aggregated to that choir, or because in lifetime they had a special devotion to it. Marie Denise, of the Visitation, used to congratulate her angel every day on the grace he had received to enable him to stand when so many around him were falling. It was, as

I have said before, the only thing she could know for certain of his past life. Could he neglect her, if by the will of God she went to Purgatory? Again, St. Michael, as prince of Purgatory, and Our Lady's regent, in fulfilment of the dear office attributed to him by the Church in the Mass for the dead, takes as homage to himself all charity to the Holy Souls; and if it be true that a zealous heart is always a proof of a grateful one, that bold and magnificent spirit will recompense us one day in his own princely style, and perhaps within the limits of that special jurisdiction.

Neither is devotion to the saints without its interests in this devotion for the dead. It fills them with the delights of charity, as it swells their numbers and beautifies their ranks and orders. Numberless patron saints are personally interested in multitudes of souls. The affectionate relation between their clients and themselves not only subsists, but a deeper tenderness has entered into it, because of the fearful suffering, and a livelier interest because of the accomplished victory. They see in the Holy Souls their own handiwork, the fruit of their example, the answer to their prayers, the success of their patronage, the beautiful and finished crown of their affectionate intercession. All this applies with peculiar force to the Founders of Orders and Congregations. Who can tell how Founders yearn over their

children in the cleansing fires? Those souls honored them through life; they lived in their Father's and Founder's house; his voice was ever in their ears; his feasts there were days of song and joy and spiritual sunshine; his relics were their shield; his rule their second gospel; his sayings and doings were ever on their lips.

But there is another peculiarity in this devotion for the dead. It does not rest in words and feelings, nor does it merely lead to action indirectly and at last. It is action in itself, and thus it is a substantial devotion. It speaks and a deed is done; it loves and a pain is lessened; it sacrifices and a soul is delivered. Nothing can be more solid. We might almost dare to compare it, in its pure measure, to the efficacious voice of God, which works what it says, and effects what it utters and wills, and a creation comes. The royal devotion of the Church is the works of mercy; and see how they are all satisfied in this devotion for the dead! It feeds the hungry souls with Jesus, the Bread of Angels. It gives them to drink in their incomparable thirst His precious blood. It clothes the naked with a robe of glory. It visits the sick with mighty powers to heal, and at the least consoles them by the visit. It frees the captives, with a heavenly and eternal freedom, from a bondage drearer far than death. It takes in the strangers, and heaven is the hospice into which it receives

them. It buries the dead in the bosom of Jesus in everlasting rest. When the last doom shall come, and our dearest Lord shall ask those seven questions of His judicial process, those interrogatories of the works of mercy, how happy will that man be—and it may be the poorest beggar amongst us who never gave an alms because he has had to live on alms himself—who shall hear his own defence sweetly and eloquently taken up by crowds of blessed souls, to whom he has done all these things while they waited in their prison-house of hope! Three times a day St. Francis of Sales put himself in the presence of God as before his judge, and tried to judge himself in his Saviour's way. Let us but do that, and we shall become so many servitors of Michael, so many guardian angels of that beautiful but melancholy land of suffering and expectant souls.

Chapter 11

Means of Assisting the Holy Souls in Purgatory

WE HAVE as many means of assisting them as we have means of gaining grace and merit for ourselves, since we can apply all our good works to the Poor Souls by way of intercession. The holy Fathers therefore advise prayer, the invocation of

the Mother of God, of the angels and saints, fasting or works of penance, almsgiving or works of mercy, and the holy sacrifice of the Mass. There are many other ways of assisting them, such as offering up our merits, applying indulgences, using holy water, burning blessed candles, making pilgrimages to holy places, etc. In holy communion we have one of the greatest means of assisting them.

-Help for the Poor Souls in Purgatory.

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1. **WE** READ in the Catechism of the Council of Trent (Part II., Chap. iv., Question 77) that such is the efficacy of the holysacrifice of the Mass, "that it is profitable not only to the celebrant and communicant; but also to all the faithful, whether living with us on earth, or already numbered with those who are dead in the Lord, but whose sins have not yet been fully expiated; for, according to Apostolic Tradition, the most authentic, it is not less available when offered for them than when offered for the sins of the living, their punishments, satisfactions, calamities, and difficulties of every sort."

It must be evident to every thoughtful mind that nothing can be so surely efficacious in satisfying the justice of God and in obtaining the remission of the temporal punishment due to sin as the Holy Mass, in

which Jesus Christ renews the sacrifice He once offered on Calvary, the Holy Mass, being one and the same sacrifice as that of the cross, is of an infinite value, and would, therefore, suffice to redeem a thousand worlds; hence it follows that every soul in Purgatory, however burdened with debt for sins committed, could be released by one Holy Mass, if there were no impediment in the soul to its full application. From the time of the apostles it has been the custom of the Church to make a commemoration of the faithful departed in every Mass after the Consecration, since, as St. Cyril says, "this sacrifice affords them extraordinary relief."

Another most efficacious means of delivering one individual soul from Purgatory is the offering of the holy sacrifice of the Mass at a *privileged altar*. An altar is called privileged when the Pope, by a special concession, has attached to it the favor of a plenary indulgence granted to the deceased person for whom the Holy Mass is said at that altar. It depends, it is true, on the dispensation of God's mercy how far this indulgence will benefit that soul, for there are often obstacles which prevent its full application. But even in this latter respect the Holy Mass is of special efficacy. Being a sacrifice of atonement, it appeases God's justice, and removes precisely that impediment which deprives the soul of the entire fruit of the

Mass and other good works performed in her behalf. Hence it is always advisable, and this is the practice of pious Catholics, to have several Masses said at a privileged altar.

We read in the Life of St. Nicholas of Tolentine, O.S.A., who was noted for his devotion to the Holy Souls, that after his daily Mass it was frequently revealed to him that the souls for whom he had offered the Holy Sacrifice had been released from Purgatory.

2. Besides the Holy Mass, there are numerous other ways of aiding the Holy Souls. We have the practice of fervent prayer, almsgiving, the gaining of indulgences, and the offering of holy communion on their behalf.

In addition to its power of impetration, holy communion also possesses a great power of satisfaction, since, as it is one of the most excellent acts of religion, it honors God in a special manner and makes atonement for the offences committed against Him. Moreover, in receiving holy communion, various acts of virtue, such as humility, love, sorrow for sin, etc., are exercised and they are so much the more meritorious as the soul performs them while Jesus Christ is sacramentally united to her. Now, all these acts of virtue can be offered up to the Divine Majesty for the souls in Purgatory, especially in atonement for those sins they may have committed in regard to the

Blessed Sacrament, and for which they have not yet made satisfaction.

3. Christ, Our Redeemer, as we know, has left to His Church the rich treasure of His own infinite merits and satisfactions, together with the superabundant merits and satisfactions of the Blessed Virgin and the saints. This treasure He entrusted to St. Peter, on whom He bestowed the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven, and to his successors on earth, the Sovereign Pontiffs, to be dispensed by them for the spiritual benefit of the faithful. From this inexhaustible treasure, then, the Church draws and imparts to her children, both living and dead, what are called indulgences, by means of which the temporal punishment due to sin is remitted. The Council of Trent says that "the use of indulgences is in the highest degree beneficial to Christian people"; we should, therefore, strive with holy eagerness to gain as many indulgences as possible, both for our own spiritual good and also for the relief of the faithful departed.

4. We read in the Book of Tobias (xii. 9) the following striking declaration of the Archangel Raphael:

"Alms delivereth from death, and the same is that which purgeth away sins, and makes to find mercy and life everlasting."

In another passage the Holy Ghost exhorts us: "Stretch out thy hand to the poor, that thy expiation and thy blessing may be

perfected," by which He gives us to understand that there is no perfect satisfaction without almsgiving; hence St. Thomas does not hesitate to attribute to alms-deeds a greater power of satisfaction than to prayer. For the same reason St. Ambrose exhorts parents to give in alms for the repose of the souls of their deceased children that portion of their fortune which they had destined for them. St. John Chrysostom gave the same advice to his flock, and St. Jerome praises Pammachius, a Roman nobleman, because after the death of his wife he assembled all the poor of the city in the Church of St. Peter, and distributed a dole of bread among them, in order to comfort by this abundant almsgiving the soul of her for whom he mourned. "While other husbands," said the Saint, "adorn the grave of their wives with flowers, our Pammachius covers her dear remains with the balm of almsgiving."—Vy. Rev. Richard A. O'Gorman, O.S.A., *A Novena for the Holy Souls in Purgatory*.

Chapter 12

The Heroic Art

THIS heroic act of charity in behalf of the souls in Purgatory consists in a voluntary offering made in their favor to the Divine Majesty, by any one of the faithful,

of all works of satisfaction done by him in his life, as well as of all the suffrages which shall be offered for him after his death. Many of the faithful, devout to the Blessed Virgin, have followed the praiseworthy practice, introduced, or at least much spread since the last century, by F. D. Gaspar Oliden, Theatine, of placing them in the hands of the Blessed Virgin, that she may distribute them in behalf of those souls whom it is her good pleasure to deliver sooner from the pains of Purgatory. By this offering he foregoes in their behalf only that special fruit which belongs to himself; so that a priest is not hindered thereby from applying the holy sacrifice of the Mass for the intention of those who give him alms.

This heroic act of charity was enriched with many indulgences: first, by Pope Benedict XIII., in a decree, August 23, 1728, confirmed by Pope Pius VI., in a decree, December 12, 1788; and lastly, these indulgences were specified by the Sovereign Pontiff, Pius IX., in a decree of the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences, September 10, 1852. They are as follows:

I. *The Indult of a Privileged Altar*, personally, every day in the year, to all priests who shall have made this offering.

II. *A Plenary Indulgence*, applicable only to the departed, to all the faithful who shall have made this offering, whenever they go to holy communion, provided they visit a

church or public oratory, and pray there, for some time, for the intention of His Holiness.

III. *A Plenary Indulgence*, every Monday, to all who hear Mass in aid of the souls in Purgatory, provided they fulfil the other conditions mentioned above.

All indulgences granted or to be granted, which are to be gained by the faithful who have made this offering, may be applied to the Holy Souls in Purgatory.

Lastly, his Holiness, Pope Pius IX., having in view the young, who have not yet made their first communion, as well as the sick, those who are afflicted with chronic disorders, the aged, farm-laborers, prisoners, and others who are debarred from communion, or are unable to hear Mass on Mondays, declared, by another decree of the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences, November 20, 1854, that, for all the faithful who cannot hear Mass on Monday, the Mass heard on Sundays should be available, and that in favor of those who have not yet made their first communion, or who are hindered from receiving holy communion, he has left it to the will of their respective Ordinaries to authorize confessors to commute the works here enjoined.

And note, lastly, that, although this act of charity is called *heroic vow of charity* in some printed sheets, in which also is given a formula for making the offering, no inference is to be drawn therefrom that this offering

binds under sin; neither is it necessary to make use of the said formula, or any other, since, in order to share in the said indulgences, no more is required than a heart-felt act of the will.—*The New Raccolta*.

Formula for Making This Offering

HEAVENLY Father, in union with the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, I offer Thee all the works of satisfaction of my life, as well as the prayers and good works, which will be offered for me after my death, for the poor souls in Purgatory. All these works I put into the hands of the immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, that she may apply them to the souls she wishes to deliver from Purgatory. Graciously accept this my humble offering, O my God, and grant me, in return, mercy and forgiveness for my sins, a daily increase of holy charity, and Thy grace at the hour of my death. Amen.

Chapter 13

The Gregorian Masses

For the Release of the Souls in Purgatory

POPE St. Gregory the Great (590–60), the first Pontiff of that name, tells us in his “*Dialogues*” that he caused thirty Masses to be said on thirty consecutive days

for the repose of the soul of Justus, a monk who had died in his convent of St. Andrew on Mount Coelius, where the church of St. Gregory now stands. At the end of the trental the deceased appeared to his brother Copiosus who, in quality of physician, had assisted him in his last illness, and announced to him that he had been delivered from the flames of Purgatory.

Copiosus went at once to the convent to tell the brethren. The latter having carefully counted the days, found that this had happened on exactly the thirtieth day on which the Holy Sacrifice had been offered for Justus. Now Copiosus did not know anything about these thirty Masses celebrated for his brother, nor did the monks know anything of the apparition which Copiosus had just had. On comparing notes, it was found that the thirtieth Mass and the apparition coincided, and it was evident that the deceased had been delivered from his sufferings by the merits of the Holy Sacrifice.

With regard to the foregoing fact, the Bollandists tell us that on the thirtieth day St. Gregory was assured of the deliverance of the soul of Justus. An inscription, also, in the church of Sts. Andrew and Gregory, erected in the ancient dwelling of the Holy Pontiff, on Mount Coelius, Rome, confirms the fact. St. Gregory was instructed by a revelation upon the efficacy of these thirty Masses.

The obligation of having the thirty Gregorian Masses for every deceased member may be found in the Constitutions or other writings of most Religious Orders. The Carmelites, Dominicans, and Visitandines still follow this custom. The Dominican Missal has, in a very old edition, special prayers for the Gregorian Masses.

St. Vincent Ferrer had a trental celebrated for his sister, whom he saw delivered from Purgatory by these Masses.

We subjoin a few questions put to the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences regarding the celebration of the Gregorian Masses, along with the answers given to them.

A Decree regarding these Masses was issued January 14, 1889.

Q. Is it necessary that the Masses called *Gregorian* be celebrated in memory of St. Gregory, without, however, making commemoration of the saint?

A. They need not be said in memory of St. Gregory.

Q. Must the thirty Masses, called *Gregorian*, be said by the same priest?

A. There is no obligation that they be said by the same priest.

Q. Must they be said for one soul alone, without any other special intention?

A. The Masses should be said *exclusively* for the soul whose deliverance from the pains of Purgatory is especially solicited from the divine mercy.

Q. Should they be said on thirty consecutive days without interruption?

A. Yes; for thirty days without interruption.

Q. Must they be said at the same altar?

A. No; they may be said at different altars.

Many are astonished that thirty Masses said consecutively can obtain grace which cannot be obtained by a greater number. But God alone knows the reason of this. What is certain is that the custom of offering prayer for thirty days for the dead without interruption dates back to the remotest antiquity. We read in Holy Scripture that the Jewish people wept and prayed for thirty days after the death of Moses and Aaron, respectively. St. Gregory revived this custom, and the *revelation* given him, as we have stated, confirmed him in the idea that he was acting rightly.

Pope Benedict XIII extolled the pious practice of these Masses, in one of the thirty sermons that he preached on Purgatory, in 1720, in the cathedral of Benevento, of which he was then archbishop. He says: "The reason of the special utility of this custom lies in the merits of St. Gregory who, then a monk, obtained by the great efficacy of his prayers the satisfactory virtue for these thirty Masses."

It would be very conformable to the end proposed if the thirty Gregorian Masses

were celebrated at a privileged altar, when that is possible. Their efficacy would then be more highly guaranteed.

On August 24, 1888, the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences declared that these thirty Masses *cannot be said for the living*. These thirty Masses, moreover, cannot always be *Masses of Requiem*, since in the course of thirty consecutive days, Sundays and certain other days occur on which it is not permitted to say *Requiem Masses*. The only essential on this point is that, during *thirty consecutive days*, Mass be offered for the soul whose deliverance is demanded (*Ferraris, L. c. v. Missae Sacrificium, art. 14, no. 27*).

Even on days when a *Mass of Requiem* is permitted, the obligation of the Gregorian Masses is rigorously satisfied by saying the Mass of the day, because neither the custom introduced by St. Gregory nor the decisions of the Church already cited make a *Mass of Requiem* an essential condition. Such a Mass, however, seems more appropriate to the end in view, by reason of its special prayers for the dead. If the *three last days of the Holy Week* fall in the course of the *trental*, they do not constitute any interruption (on account of the precept of the Church), provided that, immediately after, the celebration of the thirty Masses be continued (Benedict XIV, *Instit. 34, No. 22*).

Chapter 14

Voices from Purgatory

THE Venerable Sister Paula of St. Teresa was a Dominican nun of the Convent of St. Catherine in Naples. Close to them she saw our divine Lord, attended by His angels, who pointed out, one after the other, several souls that He desired to take to heaven, whither they ascended in transports of delight. "I have released," He deigned to reply, "those who during life performed great acts of charity and mercy, and who have merited that I should fulfil My promise in their regard, *Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.*"

WHERE are few souls, even of the just, who directly after this life pass immediately to the eternal joys of heaven. Even the imperfections of the saints have to be

cleansed by fire. The following example, related by St. Peter Damian, will serve to prove this: St. Severinus, archbishop of Cologne, was a prelate of such extraordinary sanctity that God vouchsafed to distinguish him by remarkable miracles. After his death the Saint appeared one day to a Canon of Cologne cathedral in a small branch of the Rhine, in which he stood plunged up to the waist. The canon asked him why he stood there in the water—as on account of his extraordinary sanctity he ought to be reigning gloriously in heaven. “If you wish to know,” replied the Saint, “give me your hand, in order that you may understand the pain which I suffer, not by hearing of it, but by touch.” Then, having seized his hand, he dipped it gently into the water. Though he drew it rapidly out, so great was the heat that he felt from it that the flesh fell off scorched, and the bare bones held together by the joints were in great pain. Then the Saint said: “I do not suffer this great torment for anything more than for having recited the Canonical Hours hastily and with distraction. For while I was counsellor in the Emperor’s Court, having a great deal of business, I did not recite the Divine Office at the proper hours or with devotion. This is my only fault.” Then, begging the canon to join with him in prayer to obtain the cure of his hand, and beseeching him to obtain his own liberation from such great sufferings

by the suffrage of prayers, alms, and Masses, he suddenly disappeared, leaving the priest miraculously cured and full of fear of God's judgments.—*Ibid.*

QANTIPRATANUS writes of a sick man who was so impatient at the length and severity of his illness that he earnestly begged of God either to restore him to health, or to take him out of the world. God sent an angel to say to him that he might choose whether he would suffer the pains of Purgatory for three days, or those of his sickness for another year. The sick man thought to himself that the three days would soon be over, while a year of illness meant a long trial of one's patience. He therefore chose the three days in Purgatory. According to his wish, he died and went to Purgatory, but was hardly an hour there when he imagined the three days and even more had expired. He grew exceedingly anxious, sighed, suffered, and wept. "Ah!" he said, "I must be more than a month here, and yet the door is not opened to let me out! I am afraid that he who gave me that choice was not an angel in reality, but one disguised as an angel, who has shamefully deceived me." While busied with these thoughts, the angel came to comfort him, and to congratulate him on having accomplished the third part of his atonement. "What!" exclaimed

the suffering soul, "the third part! No more than that?" "No more. You have been here but one day; your body is not yet buried." "Ah, holy Guardian Angel!" cried the poor soul, "help me to return to my body and my former sufferings; I would rather endure them patiently for ten years than bear these pains for two days more."

St. Antoninus relates in his "Summo" (Part IV., c. x.) that a preacher of his Order appeared a month after his death to the infirmarian of the convent in which he had lived, and told him that he had been kept in Purgatory all that time for no other reason than that he had been too familiar and jocose in his conversations with seculars. A whole month he had to suffer because he had not observed that gravity of demeanor that becomes the Religious when in the society of seculars. And how many Masses and prayers had not been offered for him by his brethren in the meantime!—*Ibid.*

4

WE READ in the life of St. Monica that, feeling her last hour at hand, she sent for St. Augustine, and thus addressed him: "My son, I know that I shall soon be no more; but when I am gone pray for the repose of my soul! Do not forget me who have loved you so dearly. Especially think of me when you are at the altar and about to offer the Holy Sacrifice." St. Augustine,

bathed in tears, made the required promise, and after his mother's edifying death he never ceased to intercede for her. "God of Mercy!" he exclaimed in his sorrow, "forgive my mother the faults which she may have committed; enter not into judgment with her; turn aside Thine eyes from her sins. Remember that on the point of expiring she thought not of the honors which should be paid to her lifeless corpse; she asked only that she should not be forgotten at Thine altar, in order that any stains of sin which might not have been expiated during her life should be washed away."—*Ibid.*

ST. MARY MAGDALENE de Pazzi had assisted in her last moments a member of her Community who died with the reputation of great sanctity. The sisterhood not only lost no time in reciting for her the usual Offices, but also applied in her behalf all the indulgences which it was in their power to gain. The body was laid in the church exposed to view, and St. Mary Magdalene from the grating gazed upon it with feelings of tenderness and devotion, whilst she offered fervent prayers for the eternal repose of the Sister. Suddenly she saw the soul of the deceased, beaming with light, arise from the cold remains and ascend to heaven, there to receive the crown of eternal glory. The Saint, at the sight, could not refrain from ex-

claiming: "Farewell, sister, farewell, happy soul, who enterest heaven before thy body has been committed to the tomb. What a happiness! What glory! In the bosom of the Eternal Spouse be not forgetful of us poor mortals who still pine and sigh on earth." Then Jesus Himself appeared to console her, and told her that this soul had been thus promptly delivered from Purgatory and admitted to heaven by virtue of holy indulgences. Thenceforth the zeal of the Sisters for gaining indulgences was such that each one would feel a scruple unless she tried to obtain every one she could. Let us imitate the piety of these good Religious, and if we but possess the requisite dispositions, we cannot fail to deliver many souls from Purgatory.—*Ibid.*

A CERTAIN mother, inconsolable at the death of her only son, wept for his loss long and bitterly, without, however, helping him by those means which religion affords. To give her affection a useful direction, God sent her a vision. She beheld a procession of youths, clad in white garments, enriched with various ornaments, and directing their joyous course toward a magnificent temple. This temple represented heaven, the white garments were the garb of faith, and the ornaments upon them were the works of charity. The bereaved

mother, having her lost son unceasingly in her mind and heart, anxiously sought for him amongst this chosen band, but her searching glance could not discover him till all the rest had passed. She then beheld him, but clothed in a dark and sullied robe, and she saw that he advanced but slowly and with difficulty. This sad sight caused her tears to flow anew, and, with a voice broken with sobs, she exclaimed: "Why, O my son, are you so sad, and differ so much from your companions? Why do you remain so far behind?" The young man sorrowfully replied: "Mother, you see these mournful and sullied garments. Behold in them what your obstinate grief and tears for me produce! Your unreasonable grief weighs heavily upon me and impedes my progress. Ah! cease to abandon yourself to mere natural feelings, and, if you truly love me, if you desire to see me happy, arouse your faith, and aid me by works of faith and charity. Assist me by your pious suffrages, as is done by other mothers not less affectionate, but more wise and more religious than you. Then I shall be enabled to join the happy company you have seen, and attain to that heavenly bliss, for which I long with so much ardor."

Without saying more he disappeared, leaving his mother as eager to procure him spiritual help as before she had been remarkable for giving herself up to useless grief.

May similar sentiments of faith animate us with regard to our departed friends, and render us more mindful of aiding and consoling them by meritorious works than of abandoning ourselves to unprofitable grief and sadness for their loss.—*Ibid.*

SAINTE MARGARET MARY, praying one day for two persons of rank in the world who had died, one of them was shown to her as condemned for several years to the pains of Purgatory, notwithstanding the solemn services and the great number of Masses that were offered for her. All these prayers and suffrages were applied by the Divine Justice to the souls of some families subject to her who had been ruined by her want of charity and equity in their regard; and as these poor people had left nothing after their death to obtain prayers for their souls, God supplied them in this way. The other person was in Purgatory for as many days as she had lived years upon earth. Our Lord made known to Saint Margaret Mary that amongst all the good works this person had performed He had had particular regard to certain humiliations she had received in the world, which she endured with a truly Christian spirit, not only without complaint, but even without mentioning them, and that in reward He had been mild and favorable in His judgment.

A gentleman, father to one of the novices, being dead, was recommended to the prayers of the Community at Paray. The charity of Saint Margaret Mary, then Mistress of Novices, induced her to pray more particularly for this person, and on the novice repeating her request for her prayers some days after, she said: "Be satisfied, my child; he is in a state to benefit us by his prayers instead of needing ours." She then added: "Ask your mother what generous action her husband performed before his death, for it is that which made the judgment of God favorable to him." The novice did not see her mother until the time of her Profession. She then asked what this act of Christian generosity was, and learned that when the Holy Viaticum was given to her father, a butcher of the town joined those who accompanied the Blessed Sacrament, and placed himself in a corner of the room. The sick man, perceiving him, called him by his name, told him to approach, and, cordially pressing his hand, asked his pardon, with a humility very unusual in persons of high rank, for some severe words he had said to him some time before, and was desirous that everyone should witness the satisfaction he made him. Saint Margaret Mary had learned from God alone what had passed, and the novice knew by this the truth of what had been revealed to her holy Mistress regarding the happy state of her father.—*Ibid.*

THE celebrated Father Lacordaire, in the beginning of the conferences on the immortality of the soul, which he addressed a few years before his death to the pupils of Sorèze, related to them the following incident:

The Polish Prince of X., an avowed infidel and materialist, had just composed a work against the immortality of the soul. He was on the point of sending it to press, when one day walking in his park, a woman bathed in tears threw herself at his feet, and in accents of profound grief said to him, "My good Prince, my husband has just died. . . . At this moment his soul is perhaps suffering in Purgatory. . . . I am in such poverty that I have not even the small sum required to have a Mass celebrated for the dead. In your kindness come to my assistance in behalf of my poor husband."

Although the gentleman was convinced that the woman was deceived by her credulity, he had not courage to refuse her. He slipped a gold piece into her hand, and the happy woman hastened to the church, and begged the priest to offer some Masses for the repose of her husband's soul. Five days later, toward evening, the prince, in the seclusion of his study, was reading over his manuscript and retouching some details, when, raising his eyes, he saw, close to him,

a man dressed in the costume of the peasants of the country. "Prince," said the unknown visitor, "I come to thank you. I am the husband of that poor woman who besought you the other day to give her an alms, that she might have the holy sacrifice of the Mass offered for the repose of my soul. Your charity was pleasing to God: it was He who permitted me to come and thank you."

These words said, the Polish peasant disappeared like a shadow. The emotion of the prince was indescribable, and in consequence he consigned his work to the flames, and yielded himself so entirely to the conviction of truth that his conversion was complete. He persevered until death.

THERE were at Cologne, among the students in the higher classes of the university, two Dominican Religious of distinguished talent, one of whom was Blessed Henry Suzo. The same studies, the same kind of life, and above all the same relish for sanctity, had caused them to contract an intimate friendship, and they mutually imparted the favors which they received from Heaven.

When they had finished their studies, seeing that they were about to be separated, to return each one to his own convent, they

agreed and promised each other that the first of the two who should die should be assisted by the other for a whole year by the celebration of two Masses each week—on Monday a Mass of Requiem, as was customary, and on Friday that of the Passion, in so far as the rubrics would permit. They engaged to do this, gave each other the kiss of peace, and left Cologne.

For several years they both continued to serve God with the most edifying fervor. The brother whose name is not mentioned was the first to be called away, and Suzo received the tidings with the most perfect sentiments of resignation to the divine will. As to the contract they had made, time had caused him to forget it. He prayed much for his friend, imposing new penances upon himself, and many other good works, but he did not think of offering the Masses which he had promised.

One morning, whilst meditating in retirement in the chapel, he suddenly saw appear before him the soul of his departed friend, who, regarding him with tenderness, reproached him with having been unfaithful to his word, given and accepted, and which he had a perfect right to rely upon with confidence. Blessed Suzo, surprised, excused his forgetfulness by enumerating the prayers and mortifications which he had offered, and still continued to offer, for his friend, whose salvation was as dear to him as his own.

“Is it possible, my dear brother,” he added, “that so many prayers and good works which I have offered to God do not suffice for you?” “Oh! no, dear brother,” replied the suffering soul, “that is not sufficient. It is the blood of Jesus Christ that is needed to extinguish the flames by which I am consumed; it is the August Sacrifice which will deliver me from these frightful torments. I implore you to keep your word, and refuse me not that which in justice you owe me.”

Blessed Suzo hastened to respond to the appeal of the suffering soul; and, to repair his fault, he celebrated, and caused to be celebrated, more Masses than he had promised.

On the following day several priests, at the request of Suzo, united with him in offering the Holy Sacrifice for the deceased, and continued this act of charity for several days.

After some time the friend of Suzo again appeared to him, but now in a very different condition; his countenance was joyful, and surrounded with beautiful light. “Oh! thanks, my faithful friend,” said he; “behold, by the blood of my Saviour I am delivered from my sufferings. I am now going to heaven to contemplate Him whom we so often adored together under the Eucharistic veil.” Suzo prostrated himself to thank the God of all mercy, and understood more than ever the inestimable value of the August Sacrifice of the Altar.¹—*Ibid.*

THE Church advises the faithful to have prayers said for the dead, to give alms, and perform other good works, to apply indulgences to them, but especially to have Holy Mass celebrated, and to assist thereat. Whilst giving the first place to the Divine Sacrifice, she approves and makes use of various kinds of suffrages, according to the circumstances, devotion, or social condition of the deceased or his heirs.

It is a Catholic custom, religiously observed from the remotest antiquity, to have Mass celebrated for the dead with solemn ceremonies, and a funeral with as much pomp as their means will allow. The expense of this is an alms given to the Church, an alms which, in the eyes of God, greatly enhances the price of the Holy Sacrifice, and its satisfactory value for the deceased.

It is well, however, so to regulate the funeral expenses, that a sufficient sum be left for a certain number of Masses, and also to give alms to the poor.

That which must be avoided is, to lose sight of the Christian character of funerals, and to look upon the funeral service less as a great act of religion than a display of worldly vanity.

What must be further avoided are the profane mourning emblems which are not conformable to Christian tradition, such as

the wreaths of flowers, with which, at a great expense, they load the coffins of the dead. This is an innovation justly disapproved by the Church, to which Jesus Christ has intrusted the care of religious rites and ceremonies, not excepting funeral ceremonies. Those of which she makes use at the death of her children are venerable by their antiquity, full of meaning and consolation. All that presents itself to the eyes of the faithful on such occasions, the cross and the holy water, the lights and the incense, the tears and prayers, breathe compassion for the Poor Souls, faith in the Divine Mercy, and the hope of immortality.

What is there of all this in the cold wreaths of violet? They say nothing to the Christian soul; they are but profane emblems of this mortal life, that contrast strangely with the cross, and which are foreign to the rites of the Catholic Church.—*Ibid.*

Spiritual Bouquets for the Dead

THE early Christians were distinguished for their love and remembrance of the dead. Their devotion consisted not so much in tears and gifts of flowers, but in prayers, communions, and the offering of the sacrifice of the Mass. We would do well to model our devotion to the faithful departed on that of our predecessors in the Faith.

There is a custom fast becoming common

of sending cards of condolence to the parents or members of the family of the deceased. These cards, besides extending sympathy, also express the intention of having Masses said, communions offered up, and Rosaries and other indulgenced prayers recited for the repose of the soul of the deceased. This custom is thoroughly Catholic and expresses our sympathy in a more efficacious way than do offerings of flowers. If the deceased was at all known to us, we should certainly prefer to aid his soul in this way than to parade our generosity by a pompous display of expensive flowers, which cannot aid the dead.—Rev. Thomas S. McGrath, *Prayers for Our Dead*.

Chapter 15

The Blessed Virgin Mary, the Angels and the Saints, in Relation to the Holy Souls

All Saints—All Souls

IT WAS well done to place thus close together these two beautiful solemnities. There is a fitness, too, in this reason of the fall of the leaf for such a commemoration of the departed. The flowers and green leaves of May, the yellow harvests and the warm glow of August, would be out of place upon

All Souls' Day. Better to sing this universal Requiem when Nature herself has laid aside the garments of her gladness, when the warm blood of youth is no longer coursing through the earth's veins, when the very sunshine seems chill and sad, and the wind through the naked branches is a dirge. But at whatever period they come, All Saints' and All Souls' should come together. And they come together, though one might be tempted, in all reverence, to wish that the order of their coming were reversed. If the commemoration of All Souls came first, we might hope that the suffrages of all the Church Militant on that day, joined with the prayers of all the Church Triumphant, might avail much to the relief of the Suffering Church; might procure the discharge of many, perhaps, amongst the patient victims detained in that prison-house of mercy, and so increase the hosts of those honored in the festival of All Saints. Or is it only by a tender after-thought, as it were, that the Church, having rejoiced in the glory of those of her children who have secured their crown in heaven, turns with affectionate compassion to those others who are not yet *there*, though they are no longer *here*, whose earthly fight is over, but whose heavenly happiness is not yet attained? Would that all who are gone were gone to join that multitude which no man can number, thronging the Courts of Heaven! But so many disap-

point the yearnings of the Heart of Jesus. So many live and die as if Jesus had not lived and died for them. And even of those who die in the grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ, how few are found "with the perfect sheen of Heaven upon them"! How few are pure enough, at once, after closing their eyes upon this sinful world, to open them to the full piercing light of glory, to meet, without shrinking, the all-discerning eye of the God of infinite purity! And we are living under that same eye, and we are laboring for that heaven which the saints have not earned too dearly, and for which the Holy Souls are not undergoing too severe a preparation. Have we worked and prayed during the past year as if we believed this?

Before the month closes which is opening now may our hearts have grown more pleasing to the Heart of Jesus and the Heart of Mary—more dear to them because more like to them; and, as all belongs to Jesus, let us give to Mary a mother's share in all the days of our lives, especially in these two sacred days which invite us to love and honor her as Queen of All Saints and Compassionate Mother of the Suffering Souls.

Our Lady

THE souls in Purgatory receive great consolation from the Blessed Virgin. Is she not the *Consolation of the Afflicted*? And what affliction can be compared to that of the Poor Souls? Is she not the *Mother of Mercy*? And is it not toward these holy Suffering Souls that she must show all the mercy of her heart? We must not, therefore, be astonished that in the "Revelations of St. Bridget" the Queen of Heaven gives herself the beautiful name of *Mother of the Souls in Purgatory*. "I am," she said to that Saint, "the Mother of all those who are in the place of expiation; my prayers mitigate the chastisements which are inflicted upon them for their faults."¹

On October 25, 1604, in the College of the Society of Jesus at Coimbra, Father Jerome Carvalho died in the odor of sanctity, at the age of fifty years. This admirable and humble servant of God felt a lively apprehension of the sufferings of Purgatory. Neither the cruel macerations which he inflicted upon himself several times every day, not counting those prompted each week by the remembrance of the passion, nor the six hours which he devoted morning and evening to the meditation of holy subjects, seemed suf-

ficient, in his estimation, to shield him from the chastisement which he imagined awaited him after death. But one day the Queen of Heaven, to whom he had a tender devotion, condescended herself to console her servant by the simple assurance that she was a *Mother of Mercy* to her dear children in Purgatory as well as to those upon earth. Seeking, later, to spread this consoling doctrine, the holy man accidentally let fall, in the ardor of his discourse, these words: "*She told me this herself.*"

It is related that a great servant of Mary, Blessed Renier of Citeaux, trembled at the thought of his sins and the terrible justice of God after death. In his fear, addressing himself to his great Protectress, who calls herself *Mother of Mercy*, he was rapt in spirit, and saw the Mother of God supplicating her Son in his favor. "My Son," she said, "deal mercifully with him in Purgatory, because he humbly repents of his sins." "My Mother," replied Jesus, "I place his cause in your hands," which is to say, be it done to your client according to your desire. Blessed Renier understood with unutterable joy that Mary had obtained his exemption from Purgatory.

It is especially on certain days that the Queen of Heaven exercises her mercy in Purgatory. These privileged days are, first, all Saturdays, then the different feast-days of the Blessed Virgin, which thus become as

festivals in Purgatory. We see in the revelations of the saints that on Saturday, the day specially consecrated to the Blessed Virgin, the sweet Mother of Mercy descends into the dungeons of Purgatory to visit and console her devoted servants. Then, according to the pious belief of the faithful, she delivers those souls who, having worn the holy scapular, enjoy this Sabbatine Privilege, and afterward gives relief and consolation to other souls who had been particularly devout to her. A witness to this was the Venerable Sister Paula of St. Teresa, a Dominican Religious of the Convent of St. Catherine in Naples.¹

Being rapt in ecstasy one Saturday, and transported in spirit into Purgatory, she was quite surprised to find it transformed into a paradise of delights, illuminated by a bright light, instead of the darkness which at other times prevailed. Whilst she was wondering what could be the cause of this change, she perceived the Queen of Heaven surrounded by a multitude of angels, to whom she gave orders to liberate those souls who had honored her in a special manner, and conduct them to heaven.

If such takes place on an ordinary Saturday, we can scarcely doubt that the same occurs on feast-days consecrated to the Mother of God. Among all her festivals, that of the glorious Assumption of Mary

seems to be the chief day of deliverance. St. Peter Damian¹ tells us that each year, on the day of the Assumption, the Blessed Virgin delivers several thousands of souls.

The following account of a miraculous vision illustrates this subject: "It is a pious custom," he says, "which exists among the people of Rome, to visit the churches, carrying a candle in the hand, during the night preceding the feast of the Assumption of Our Lady." Now it happened that a person of rank, being on her knees in the basilica of the Ara-Cœli in the Capital, saw before her, prostrate in prayer, another lady, her godmother, who had died several months previous. Surprised, and not being able to believe her eyes, she wished to solve the mystery, and for this purpose placed herself near the door of the church. As soon as she saw the lady go out, she took her by the hand and drew her aside. "Are you not," she said to her, "my godmother, who held me at the baptismal font?" "Yes," replied the apparition immediately, "it is I." "And how comes it that I find you among the living, since you have been dead more than a year?" "Until this day I have been plunged in a dreadful fire, on account of the many sins of vanity which I committed in my youth, but during this great solemnity the Queen of Heaven descended into the midst of the Purgatorial flames and delivered me,

together with a large number of other souls, that we might enter heaven on the feast of her Assumption. She exercises this great act of clemency each year; and, on this occasion alone, the number of those whom she has delivered equals the population of Rome."

Seeing that her goddaughter remained stupefied and seemed still to doubt the evidence of her senses, the apparition added, "In proof of the truth of my words, know that you yourself will die a year hence, on the feast of the Assumption; if you outlive that period, believe that this was an illusion."

St. Peter Damian concluded this recital by saying that the young lady passed the year in the exercise of good works, in order to prepare herself to appear before God. The year following, on the Vigil of the Assumption, she fell sick, and died on the day of the feast itself, as had been predicted.

The feast of the Assumption is, then, the great day of Mary's mercy toward the Poor Souls; she delights to introduce her children into the glory of heaven on the anniversary of the day on which she herself first entered its blessed portals. This pious belief, adds Father Louvet, is founded on a great number of particular revelations; it is for this reason that in Rome the Church of St. Mary in Montorio, which is the centre of the arch-confraternity of *suffrages for the dead*, is dedicated under the title of the Assumption.

The Angels

BESIDES the consolations which the souls receive from the Blessed Virgin, they are also assisted and consoled by the holy angels, and especially by their guardian angels. The Doctors of the Church teach that the tutelary mission of the guardian angels terminates only on the entrance of their clients into paradise. If, at the moment of death, a soul in the state of grace is not yet worthy to see the face of the Most High, the angel guardian conducts it to the place of expiation, and remains there with her to procure for her all the assistance and consolations in his power.

It is an opinion common among the holy Doctors, says Father Rossignoli, that God, who will one day send forth His angels to assemble the elect, also sends them from time to time into Purgatory, there to visit and console the Suffering Souls. No doubt there cannot be any relief more precious than the sight of the inhabitants of heaven, that blessed abode whither they will one day go to enjoy its glorious and eternal felicity. The Revelations of St. Bridget are filled with examples of this nature, and the Lives of several saints also furnish a great number. . . .

If the holy angels interest themselves in

behalf of the souls of Purgatory in general, it is easy to understand that they have particular zeal for those of their clients. . . .

It may be here asked how the saints and blessed already crowned in heaven can assist them. It is certain, says Father Rossignoli, and such is the teaching of all masters in theology, St. Augustine and St. Thomas, that the saints are very powerful in this respect by way of supplication, or as we say, by *impetration*, but not by *satisfaction*. In other words, the saints in heaven may pray for the souls, and thus *obtain* from divine mercy a diminution of their suffering; but they cannot *satisfy* for them, nor pay their debts to divine justice; that is a privilege which God reserves to the Church Militant.—*Ibid.*

St. Joseph

IF WE reflect on the close alliance St. Joseph has with the Incarnate Word and His Immaculate Mother, we must surely acknowledge him worthy of our deepest love and veneration. One of the best modes of honoring him is to supplicate the Most High for souls who were devout to him during life and are now suffering in Purgatory.

St. Joseph may be regarded as the special Patron of Purgatory, because he is, after our blessed Lady, the most powerful and charitable of all the saints. The Prime

Minister of Egypt had authority to open or shut the gates of the prison at will, which has always been considered a privilege of the highest order. Thus it is with St. Joseph, of whom the first Joseph was a true type. Assured of the power of our holy Patriarch, can we doubt his good will? Who can express his burning zeal in favor of the poor sufferers in Purgatory, who are in his eyes all-beautiful by sanctifying grace, beloved by God, and destined soon to enjoy the beatific vision in the realms of bliss? St. Joseph, before entering into heaven, passed through Limbo, which, doubtless, was not a place of torments like Purgatory; still, it was not paradise. Here eager souls sighed for the coming of the Messias, and saluted Him from afar. This great Saint mingled his desires with theirs. In consoling the souls in Purgatory, St. Joseph continues the merciful avocation Divine Providence assigned him in Limbo. . . .

The beautiful mission of Consoler of the Dead is too glorious, too dear to God and to the saints, not to have it still continued to St. Joseph after the ascension of our divine Redeemer. A venerable writer says that the Son of God, having the keys of paradise, has given one to His Immaculate Mother and the other to St. Joseph. Oh, then you who so much love the dear departed ones, you who still weep at the remembrance of a cherished parent, a beloved brother or sis-

ter, or dear friend, have recourse to St. Joseph! You who dread the flames of Purgatory invoke St. Joseph, for though he is the mediator of all who are detained in those cleansing fires, he exercises special influence in behalf of persons who during life have been distinguished for their zeal in honoring him. Lastly, after the example of St. Joseph, let us be messengers of joy to those helpless souls detained captive in the fiery prison by offering fervent prayers and gaining indulgences for their relief.

St. Thomas Aquinas

ST. THOMAS AQUINAS showed a most tender devotion to the Poor Souls, making frequent commemoration of them in Mass, in his prayers and penances. When he was Professor of Theology at the University of Paris, his sister—who was Abbess of the Convent of St. Mary of Capua, and had lately died—appeared to him, and told him she was suffering great torments in Purgatory. St. Thomas immediately began to pray and fast and mortify himself for her; he also asked several of his friends to join him in prayer. He obtained the release of his sister's soul. She appeared to him again in Rome, whither he had been sent; but this time overflowing with heavenly joy

and radiant with glory, and told him of her deliverance, and happy entrance into heaven. And she added: "Thou, my brother, hasten and finish those writings and works which thou hast begun, for thou wilt soon be called away to eternal life."

St. Catherine of Ricci

ST. CATHERINE of Ricci cultivated a special devotion to the passion of Christ and in union with the sufferings of Our Lord endured many pains and torments and offered many prayers and mortifications for the relief of the holy souls in Purgatory. Her charity on behalf of the Holy Souls became so famous, as we read in the "Miniature Lives of the Saints," that whenever a death occurred in the vicinity of her convent (or indeed anywhere throughout Tuscany) the friends of the deceased invariably hastened to Catherine to secure her prayers. She knew by revelation the arrival of a soul in Purgatory and the hour of its release. She died, amid angels' songs, in 1589.

St. Philip Neri

THIS Saint was animated with the most tender love for the poor suffering souls in Purgatory. He prayed constantly for

them, and bestowed on them the merits of his good works. He was particularly anxious to help those souls who during life had been under his spiritual care. He considered he owed more to them because, as a priest, he had labored for the salvation of their souls. Many dead appeared to him, because they hoped to be delivered from Purgatory by his prayers, and indeed he never failed to pray for them forthwith. His biographer assures us that the results of his prayers were most wonderful. The Saint was all the more anxious to pray for the dead, as they often obtained wonderful graces for him.

This devoted love to the souls in Purgatory has passed from the founder on to the whole Congregation of the Oratorians. Father Magnanti scarcely ever ceased praying for the dead, and like St. Philip Neri, was often made aware of the happy results of his prayers. This zealous priest spent the alms which pious Christians gave him, partly in alms to the poor, and partly for Masses in behalf of the Suffering Souls. He himself loved and practised poverty, but he kept in his cell an alms-box, which he called the "box of the souls." He thus followed the example of the divine Saviour, who, according to the Ven. Bede, gathered the gifts of the faithful in a box in order to distribute them among the poor and sick. To the treasury of his alms Father Magnanti added his prayers, fasts, vigils, and complete retire-

ment from the vain and idle joys of this world. His burning love for the Poor Souls carried him so far, that he asked Our Lord to lay on him some of their sufferings in order to give them relief. His heroic prayer was heard and accepted; he became a prey to the most cruel pains, which hardly allowed him to change from one position to another, and yet, from zeal for salvation of souls, he undertook several long journeys. We may well apply to him the words which a Roman historian pronounced upon a victorious soldier, who, in consequence of a wound received in battle, returned with a limping leg: "His every step is a mark of his glory."

The souls of the faithful departed were not ungrateful to him. A great part of the many wonderful graces he had received Father Magnanti ascribed to their intercession. He had the gift of knowing the future, of discovering hidden sins, and of frustrating and escaping the numerous snares of the enemy.

St. Bridget

IN THE revelations of St. Bridget, we have wonderful accounts of the appearances of the poor departed souls. Nor are they untrustworthy, because they have been ex-

amined by learned divines, and recognized by them as authentic, so that the words spoken of Judith, "All things which thou hast spoken are true, and there is nothing to be reprehended in thy words" (Judith viii. 28), might fitly be applied to St. Bridget, and put at the foot of her portrait.

Once, St. Bridget saw in a vision the souls of the faithful departed being purified, as it were, in a crucible before they reached their place of eternal rest. And at the same time she heard the voice of an angel saying, "Blessed are those who dwell upon earth, and who by their prayers and other good works hasten to the relief of the souls in Purgatory. For the justice of God demands that their sins be atoned for either by their sufferings or else by the prayers and good works of their friends on earth." Then the Saint heard a great number of voices praying in piteous tones, "O Lord Jesus Christ! O great and just Judge! We implore Thee in Thine infinite mercy to regard not the number and magnitude of our offences, but to look on the merits of Thy most precious passion and death. Oh, let the streams of Thy great charity flow into the hearts of all Thy priests, monks, and all the faithful, that by their Masses, prayers and alms, they may come to our relief. If they wish, they can help us greatly by their prayers and indulgences, and can shorten the term of our awful sufferings. They can

hasten our happy reunion with Thee, O God." At other times, St. Bridget heard appeals from Purgatory like the following: "O Lord, send down Thy grace a thousand-fold to those charitable Christians, who have helped us in our affliction by their prayers!"

Then she saw a certain light, half clear, half obscure, coming down, as it were, like the dawn of day, whereby she knew was meant, that the day of deliverance had dawned for some. And she heard new voices singing, "O God, whose power is infinite, we beg of Thee to reward a thousand-fold all those, who pray for our deliverance, and help us to come to Thine everlasting light."

From all this we can easily see, what great rewards all those will receive, who pray for the dead and obtain their release, and what grateful friends they make for themselves near the throne of God. God grant, that there may be instilled into the hearts of a great many Christians even a small portion of the love and sympathy which St. Bridget, in consequence of her visions, felt for the Poor Souls as long as she lived.—*Ibid.*

St. Margaret of Cortona

MARGARET was a great sinner in her youth. She lost her mother when quite young, and so was mostly left to her-

self. Her extraordinary beauty and lively temperament soon led her away from the right path into a frivolous and sinful life, which lasted for some considerable time. Amongst the many virtues which she practised after her conversion, the most striking was her love and devotion for the poor suffering souls in Purgatory, for whose deliverance she sacrificed time and rest, and everything. Great was her reward for it! As she lay on her death-bed, she saw a crowd of souls, released by her, hastening to her side, to form, as it were, a guard of honor, escorting her to the heavenly kingdom.

An intelligent love of the dead will, above all and in the first place, embrace one's own parents. Margaret always remembered her parents first, in all her supplications for the dead. Her father and mother were both dead, and for their repose she offered up communions, Masses, and other good works. God revealed to her, that she had very much shortened their term of punishment by her fervor, and delivered their souls from Purgatory much sooner than it was at first determined. With like affection, Margaret also remembered a faithful servant of the name of Julia. She prayed for her with such intense zeal, that she delivered her, as was told her by revelation. In the next place, Margaret prayed with great ardor for all the dead, whether known or unknown to her.

In fact, we might say that praying for the dead was her special daily occupation. Her every thought and desire was tending toward the deliverance of the souls in Purgatory: to hasten the day of their deliverance, to shorten the term of their punishment, to soothe their pains, was her one aim and object. She seemed to completely forget her own self, for all the merits which she gained by her virtuous, penitential life, she bestowed with heroic and most unselfish love on her poor suffering brethren in Purgatory.—*Ibid.*

St. Gertrude

ST. GERTRUDE had great zeal in praying for the Suffering Souls. On one occasion while Mass was being offered for a person of her acquaintance who had died a short time before, the Saint recited five *Paters* in honor of Our Lord's five wounds for the repose of her soul; and, moved by divine inspiration, she offered all her good works for the increase of the beatitude of this person. When she had made this offering she immediately beheld the soul in heaven in the place destined for her, and the throne prepared for her was elevated as far above the place where she had been as the highest throne of the seraphim is above that of the lowest angel. The Saint then

asked Our Lord how this soul had been worthy to obtain such advantage from her prayers, and He replied: "She has merited this grace in three ways: First, because she always had a sincere will and perfect desire of serving Me in religion, if it had been possible; secondly, because she had a special regard for all Religious and all good people; thirdly, because she was always ready to honor Me by performing any service she could for them." He added: "You may judge by the sublime rank to which she is elevated how agreeable these practices are to Me."

St. Magdalene of Pazzi

AS REGARDS indulgences; I shall tell you how St. Magdalene of Pazzi and her Religious were encouraged to persevere in their great zeal for the souls of the dead. Shortly after the death of one of the Sisters, the holy Superioress went into the church in order to take a last farewell of her dear daughter, for the repose of whose soul she had offered up all her indulgences. She had scarcely advanced as far as the communion rails, when she saw the soul of the dead Sister ascending toward heaven. Overcome with joy, St. Magdalene exclaimed: "Farewell, dear Sister! farewell,

happy soul! Your body has not yet been deposited into the grave, and you have already taken possession of heaven." As Our Lord revealed to St. Magdalene afterward, this soul was detained but fifteen hours in Purgatory, because, during her life, she had endeavored to gain and offer up holy indulgences for the dead. Such is the power of indulgences.

St. Dominic

THE VENERABLE ALANUS stated that the Blessed Virgin, when appearing to St. Dominic, declared that the redemption of the Holy Souls from Purgatory was one of the principal effects of the Rosary. The following illustration proves this also: "A woman named Catherine, having been converted by the sermons of St. Dominic at Rome, devoted herself most zealously to the recitation of the holy Rosary, which she usually applied to the Holy Souls in Purgatory. In an apparition St. Dominic saw Our Lord displaying fifty-five fountains, from which refreshing waters flowed into Purgatory." The Venerable Alanus writes that many of the brethren had assured him that numerous souls had appeared to them whilst reciting the Rosary and had declared that next to the holy sacrifice of the Mass

there was no more powerful means than the Rosary to help the Poor Souls. Also, that numerous souls were daily redeemed thereby who otherwise would have been obliged to remain there for years. St. Liguori therefore says: "If we wish to be of material assistance to the souls in Purgatory we must always recommend them in our prayers to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and especially offer up the holy Rosary for them." St. Augustine

ST. AUGUSTINE writes the following in his treatise on the Solitude for the Dead: "The souls in Purgatory have a knowledge of what is going on in this world through the medium of their angels, and in so far as Almighty God permits it. If there were no angels who could be present at the places of sojourn of the living as well as of the dead, Our Lord would not have said: 'And it came to pass that the beggar died and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom' " (Luke xvi, 22). . . .

It is certain, as St. Augustine and St. Thomas teach, that the saints in heaven have great power by their intercession to redeem souls from Purgatory; and we cannot doubt but that they extend this love to their

suffering brethren in the greatest measure possible, as they know well the extent of their suffering. Their being in heaven does not change their sentiments in this regard, but rather increases their charity; and if they were zealous and successful while on earth in obtaining God's help and grace for their sinful fellow men, why should they not in heaven exercise a greater charity for these souls, who are adorned with the grace of sanctification and are destined to share their eternal bliss? They cannot suffer themselves, but they sympathize with the suffering, and, standing before the throne of the all-merciful God, are necessarily imbued with sentiments of mercy. If the Church urges us to have recourse to the saints of God in all our necessities, and if we often experience their actual assistance, it naturally follows that the devout invocation of saints for the souls in Purgatory is a most salutary work.—*Ibid.*

The Saints in Reference to Works of Penance
for the Holy Souls

THE saints have always had recourse to works of penance as the best means of obtaining extraordinary graces from God either for themselves or for others. There is no doubt that these works of mortification have a great efficacy for the departed, as

numerous examples will show. Boudon says: "If we had but a little faith, fasting, scourging, and other works of penance and mortification would be our usual means of assisting the Poor Souls." Although such zeal is not expected of every one, yet there is no one who could not occasionally deny himself a part of some favorite dish or some amusement, mortify his eyes, ears, or tongue, preserve silence for a short time, bear in patience the pains of sickness, heat, or cold, or any other adversity, or curb his self-will or inclinations; in fact, bear with submission and gratitude to God everything that causes pain or distress. Thus the husbandman, the tradesman, the servant, and all others who have corporal and spiritual suffering to bear, possess much that can be offered for the Holy Souls. At the same time this Christian charity will draw the greatest blessings down upon themselves and give them strength in their own suffering. Boudon relates that persons who had offered up all the hardships of a journey for the Poor Souls had been rescued from great dangers in a miraculous manner, as God chose to reward their charity for the Holy Souls by a special protection of His loving providence.—*Ibid.*

St. Ludwina's Spirit of Penance for the
Holy Souls

THOMAS À KEMPIS, the author of the *Following of Christ*, writes the following in the biography of this holy virgin, who was a contemporary of his and lived in his neighborhood: "This patient sufferer was afflicted throughout thirty-four years with the most painful diseases. In her repeated ecstasies she often saw her guardian angel, who led her to Purgatory, where she saw the Poor Souls tortured in many different ways, according to the variety of their guilt. Among them she recognized many of her friends. Moved by this sight, she not only bore with the greatest patience her own excruciating pains, but took upon herself many other painful works of penance. She constantly implored the infinite mercy of God for these Poor Souls, and often wept very bitterly over their misery." Her biographer states also that although she always redeemed a great number of souls by her penances, she increased this number largely on the principal feasts. Another biographer writes of her that she once formed the heroic resolution rather to suffer the most terrible pains for the Poor Souls till doomsday, if it were permitted, than to be received immediately into heaven, and that she had re-

deemed thereby the souls of her parents and of all her relatives and friends.—*Ibid.*

St. Cæsarius of Arles

ST. CÆSARIUS of Arles writes: "Some one may say, I care little for the time that I shall suffer in Purgatory if I only attain to eternal happiness. Such a sentiment, however, is not pleasing to God. All the sufferings of this life cannot compare with those of Purgatory. And who knows how many days, months, or years he is to remain there? We fear to hold our finger above the fire and do not fear to remain a long time in these devouring flames." In a similar sense St. Bernard says: "Purge out the old leaven, brethren, whilst you still have time to do so. The days that are given us for our purification pass by, whether we will it or not; but woe to us, if, when the days are ended, the purification is not completed, so that it will be necessary for us to be cleansed by that fire, than which nothing more painful, more severe, or violent can be imagined." St. Bernard and St. Malachias

IN THE life of St. Malachias, St. Bernard commends the great zeal this Saint had for the Holy Souls, and blames his sister,

who was of an entirely different disposition. Already before Malachias was raised to the holy priesthood, he assisted frequently at burials, and at the recitation of the prayers for the dead. Often he buried them with his own hands, to practise Christian charity, and, above all, the virtue of humility. His worldly-minded sister was very much displeased at his performing such mean actions, because she considered them as degrading the rank of her family; but the Saint continued in all humility, and God rewarded his perseverance with many interior consolations. The sister, on the contrary, was severely punished. She died young, and her brother, solicitous for a soul who was so soon called upon to render a strict account of herself to the Eternal Judge, prayed much and fervently for her. A long time after her death he saw her. She appeared sad, was dressed in black, and standing in the porch of the church, she implored him to have pity on her, because for thirty days she had experienced no alleviation of her sufferings. The Saint remembered then that, for a whole month, he had not offered up the Holy Sacrifice for her. No doubt, God had allowed this to happen in order to punish her indifference toward the Poor Souls. Malachias offered up the Holy Mass for his sister on the next morning, and saw her again a short time after. She was standing sighing and weeping at the threshold of the

church, as if some one was preventing her from crossing it. The Saint continued to pray and say Mass for her, and at last he saw her in a third apparition. This time she was, with many other souls, standing at the foot of the altar, resplendent in heavenly glory.

St. Malachias was beautifully rewarded for his love and zeal for the Poor Souls. He had wished to die in the monastery of Clairvaux, which St. Bernard had founded, because directly after his death he knew there would be so many holy Masses said for him. And the day he desired to depart this life was All Souls' Day, because this was the day the Holy Church had set apart for special prayers for the dead. His wish was granted; he died at Clairvaux, on the 2d day of November, and went to receive in heaven the reward for his zeal in behalf of the souls in Purgatory.

Chapter 16

The Origin of All Souls' Day

THE great historian, P. Surius, of the Carthusian Order, traces the origin of this anniversary of the Poor Souls to the following occurrence, which St. Peter Damian relates in the Life of the holy Abbot of Clugny. A pious Religious from France,

who, on his return from a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, was cast by a storm upon an unknown island, there met a devout hermit. This hermit informed the Religious that near his cell he frequently heard an awful and terrific howling of the evil spirits, crying out that the prayers and good works for the departed wrought much damage to themselves, as they released, or at least greatly relieved, the souls that had been given over to them for torture. They expressed an especial hatred against the Abbot Odilo of Clugny and his monks. Upon his return, the Religious, in accordance with the wishes of the hermit, communicated this information to the Abbot of Clugny, who was the more incited thereby to continue this work of charity; and to spread it more widely, he introduced in the year 1030, on the 2d day of November, in all the monasteries of his Order an annual commemoration of all the faithful departed. Pope John XIX, after conferring with Abbot Odilo, extended the practice to the whole Church. Tertullian, even in the third century, mentions that the Christians of his time celebrated an annual commemoration of the departed; and Bishop Amalarius of Treves had introduced an All Souls' Day in his diocese two centuries before Odilo.

¶^O THE truly fervent Catholic, the Church's calendar is ever replete with the most beautiful symbolism. He who unconsciously classifies the successive seasons of the year in accordance with the ecclesiastical rather than the civil division; he who habitually thinks of Advent and Lent instead of winter and spring, and in whose vocabulary May, June, and October are not more familiar terms than are the months of Mary, of the Sacred Heart, and of the Holy Rosary—such a one discovers in the physical characteristics of each season much that harmonizes wonderfully with the special devotion which Holy Church has associated therewith.

And if ever such symbolism becomes strikingly manifest, it is assuredly during the month of November, when the age-stricken year is being hurried to its dissolution. A spirit of sadness and gloom invests the leafless trees, the bare brown fields, and sodden meadows; ashen clouds sweep across the unlovely firmament, and the desolate sighing of the November winds is incessantly wailing the sad plaint of each suffering soul in Purgatory: "*Miseremini mei, miseremini mei, saltem vos amici mei.*"—"Have pity on me, have pity on me, at least you my friends." The depressing aspect of the physical world during this dreary month must typify to every sympathetic child of the Church the cheerless and wretched con-

dition of hosts of our brethren detained in sad and lonely exile from the heavenly home they long to enter, doomed to wear out a tedious probation of keenest pain and keenest sense of loss before they may hope to stand "before the throne, clothed with white robes, and palms in their hands" (Apoc. vii.). . . .

If ever we entertained for some of those hapless Prisoners of the King sentiments of tender affection; if ever we rejoiced in their presence and experienced the bliss of their unfailing sympathy; if ever we vowed undying remembrance of their manifold kindnesses, and proffered them the tribute of our enduring gratitude—now is the time to make good our protestations, now the time to prove the genuineness of our love.—Rev. A. B. O'Neill, C.S.C., in the *Ave Maria*.

"As you measure to others," says our blessed Saviour, "it shall be measured to you again." Now, what would you wish to be done for you if in Purgatory? Surely you would not like to be forgotten—to have no longer a share in the prayers of the faithful. To escape so great a misery, which is often an effect of Divine Justice on such as have had no charity for the deceased, be very earnest to-day in your supplications for those poor souls who have none to pray for them.

Chapter 17

The Happiness of Purgatory

1. **T**HE happiness of Purgatory is a happiness of prospect, not of actual enjoyment. It is *in spe* and not *in re*, hoped for, not already possessed. But the hope is something more than hope, it is a certain expectation which the Holy Souls know cannot be disappointed. This is their support and strength, their joy and consolation, amid their unspeakable anguish. They can look forward to the long years of eternal bliss when they will repose in the bosom of God. O happy prospect, to us always uncertain, so certain to those Holy Souls!

2. Happiness consists in union with God. If the soul is united to God by supernatural charity, beneath every kind of sorrow and misery there is an underlying joy. Now the Holy Souls are perfect in their charity. They have made an act of fervent charity at their judgment, and the habit of charity is in them as strong as ever. Hence in spite of all their sufferings they are intensely happy, and cry out, "I know that my Redeemer liveth."

3. Happiness is not incompatible with intense suffering. A man may be light-hearted while he is shrieking with physical pain; he may be light-hearted even when

separated from one whom he loves better than all the world beside. He is happy by reason of his internal dispositions, and in spite of the bitterness of the separation or the fierceness of the physical pain. So it is with most Holy Souls. Their dispositions are perfect, their will is God's. They are full of hope and love; how can they fail to be happy?

Pray for an unceasing union with God by charity.

Chapter 18

The Alleviations of Purgatory

1. **O**UR LORD does not forget the souls that He loves. As at the time of His death He visited Limbo, so He from time to time manifests Himself to the holy souls in Purgatory, to comfort and cheer them. What a day of joy must it be for the Holy Souls when their Lord and King vouchsafes, if it be but for a moment, to illumine the dark prison-house with the light of His divine presence! How they must sigh after Him when He departs! for what joy is there like the joy that comes of the presence of Jesus?

2. Our Lady, too, comes also with the same merciful design, especially on a Saturday, on her great feasts, and, above all, on the feast of the Assumption, when she re-

leases not a few holy souls every year, and carries them with her to heaven. What a delight it must be to them to be thus comforted by the holy Mother of God! How they must rejoice in having gained this privilege by their devotion to her while they were yet alive!

3. The angels, too, are often sent by God to assuage the pains of the Suffering Souls. Our Lord does not forget the angel who consoled Him during His sacred agony, when He took upon Himself the intolerable weight of the sins of the whole world, and He knows what it is to be suffering for sin that has no hold on the soul, but nevertheless drags it down, like some heavy weight attached to it by the divine justice. Hence there are angels appointed to comfort the Holy Souls, to refresh them amid the devouring flames.

Ask your guardian angel never to let you fall into sin, that so you may not need his help after life is done.

Chapter 19

Means of Avoiding Purgatory

1. **A** GREAT devotion to the sacred passion of Christ is one of the surest methods of escaping the penalty due to our sins. He is always touched by any compassion shown Him in His sacred sufferings. He is said to have revealed to

some saint that He would remit the temporal punishment due after death to any one who for fifteen years should say every day seven *Paters*, seven *Aves*, and one *Gloria* in honor of His sacred passion. It seems very likely that such perseverance in honoring Him in what He suffered for us would exempt from Purgatory altogether. What do I do in this respect?

2. We may also hope to avoid Purgatory if we pray God to give us our purgatory in this life. It requires some courage to do so, as, if God hears our prayer, we must expect to suffer greatly before we die, and perhaps to spend our lives in intense pain. How small will be the price paid in comparison with the advantage gained! All the sufferings of this life are small compared with the sufferings after death; and moreover here we can merit, we can go on increasing our eternal reward, but not in Purgatory.

3. Purity of intention in all our actions is another of the most efficacious means of attaining the same end. Any one who does all his actions purely for God's sake will have nothing for the searching fire to lay hold of. It is self that has to be burnt out of us; self-will, self-love, self-indulgence. He who is rid of these may hope to go straight to heaven.

Pray that by one or other of these means you may avoid separation from God after your death.

Chapter 20

How to Help the Holy Souls in Purgatory

1. **WE** SHOULD make it our practice to offer each day some special prayer or work for the Holy Souls. We may not do much, but by constancy in laboring on their behalf we shall gradually accumulate a treasure for their benefit. We should never miss saying a *De Profundis* for them every night, and we should offer up holy communion for them from time to time. In our morning oblation we should pray that God may accept our labors, our sufferings, our penances for them.

2. We should also be careful to say as many indulgenced prayers as we can for them. Every prayer offered for them benefits them; every indulgenced prayer has a double efficacy. It has a satisfactory value in itself, and has a further power to obtain relief for them by reason of the indulgence attached to it. In this way how much we may do for the Holy Souls!

3. There are some whom God inspires to make what is called the *Heroic Act*, by which they offer up all the satisfactions of all their works, of the prayers and Masses said for them, and the indulgences gained for them after their own death, to be bestowed on the

Holy Souls according to Our Lady's pleasure. This supreme act of self-sacrifice is indeed heroic, for it includes a willingness to remain in Purgatory as long as God shall please for the sake of helping others out. What a great reward this will obtain in heaven! What gratitude it will earn from the Holy Souls!

Chapter 21

Purgatory

THE object of this meditation is to excite in us a desire to make satisfaction for past sin and at the same time to help with our prayers the suffering souls in Purgatory, with whom we shall some day be numbered.

History.—"It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins" (II Mach. xii. 46). Men, as a rule, when they die, are not fit to go straight into the presence of the All-Holy God. Common sense, as well as Scripture and Tradition, tells us that there must be a Purgatory.

Mental Picture.—A land of sadness and suffering where the souls of the just are cleansed from their sins.

Petition.—Grace to satisfy God's justice in this life, that so my purgatory may be shortened.

FIRST POINT

THE guilt of sin must be forgiven before we pass out of this world; yet even then its debt remains upon the soul. This debt must be cleared off before we can find admittance into the heavenly city; for it is written: "There shall not enter into it any thing defiled" (Apoc. xxi. 27). Now the sufferings of this life borne humbly and patiently, as also punishments voluntarily inflicted on ourselves, are accepted by God in atonement for sin. They are also meritorious, whereas the pains of Purgatory are not. How much better, then, to clear off our debt now, seeing that we can do it at far less cost to ourselves and at the same time increase our eternal reward.

SECOND POINT

WE CALL the souls in Purgatory the *Poor Souls*. They are in truth very much to be pitied, and that for three reasons:

1. Because they are *suffering*. What their sufferings are we do not know; but the mere fact of their being shut out of heaven is enough. They realize now, as they never did before, the blessedness of possessing God, and, as they cannot attain it, they have to endure the bitterness of "hope deferred that afflicted the soul" (Prov. xiii. 12).

2. Because they are *helpless*. They can do nothing to shorten their banishment nor

to ease their pain; for that they depend entirely on our charity.

3. Because they are often *forgotten*. "Out of sight out of mind." Even their dearest friends think of them only occasionally; and some, were it not for the prayers of the Church for all her dead, would not be thought of at all.

Let us resolve, then, to pray often for the dead, above all for those who have any special claim upon us and for those who are most forgotten. This is a great act of mercy which draws down God's mercy on us and earns the gratitude of the Poor Souls themselves, who will pray in return for those that help them, and, when they get to heaven, will not be like Pharaoh's cup-bearer, who forgot Joseph.

THIRD POINT

WE ALSO call them the *Holy Souls* and holy indeed they are.

1. Because they are *confirmed in grace*. What a joy it must be amid their sufferings to know that they can never again fall away from God!

2. Because they are free from all affection to sin and everything that leads to it. Sin is now the one thing they hate; its cruel consequences still clinging to them are a source of intense loathing and anguish.

3. They love God with a perfect love, with their whole heart, with their whole soul, with

their whole mind, with their whole strength; and they are unspeakably dear to Him.

So, whereas in hell there is neither joy nor love nor hope, in Purgatory we find all three, mingled nevertheless with heart-breaking sorrow, which love and longing only increase. It will be well for us if we learn to love God now; for love will teach us to do penance for our offences against Him, and then we shall not have for such a weary while to lament: "Woe is me, that my sojourning is prolonged!" (Ps. cxix. 5).—Rev. C. W. Barraud, S.J., *Meditations on the Mysteries of Our Holy Faith*.

The Church Law of Abstinence and Fast

1. The Law of Abstinence forbids the use of flesh meat and of the juice thereof (soup, etc.). Eggs, cheese, butter and seasonings of food are permitted. The Law of Fasting forbids more than one full meal a day, but does not forbid a small amount of food in the morning and in the evening.

2. All Catholics seven years old and over are obliged to abstain. All Catholics from the completion of their twenty-first to the beginning of their sixtieth year, unless lawfully excused, are bound to fast.

3. Abstinence alone is prescribed every Friday, unless a holy-day falls thereon. Fasting and abstinence are prescribed in the

United States on the Wednesdays and Fridays of Lent and Holy Saturday forenoon (on all other days of Lent fasting alone is prescribed and meat is allowed once a day), the Ember days, viz.: the Wednesday, Friday and Saturday following the first Sunday of Lent, Pentecost or Whitsunday, the 14th of September, and the third Sunday of Advent; the vigils of Pentecost, Assumption, All Saints and Christmas. There is no fast or abstinence if a vigil falls on a Sunday. Whenever meat is permitted, fish may be taken at the same meal. A dispensation is granted to the laboring classes and their families on all days of fast and abstinence except Fridays, Ash Wednesday, Wednesday in Holy Week, Holy Saturday forenoon, and the vigil of Christmas. When any member of such a family lawfully uses this privilege all the other members may avail themselves of it also; but those who fast may not eat meat more than once a day.

*The Manner in which a Lay Person is to
Baptize in Case of Necessity*

Pour common water on the head or face of the person to be baptized, and say while pouring it:

“ I baptize thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.”

N.B. Any person of either sex who has reached the use of reason can baptize in case of necessity.

And when this mortal hath put on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is thy victory? O death, where is thy sting? Now the sting of death is sin: and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, Who hath given us the victory through Our Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel

John v. 25-29

AT THAT time, Jesus said to the multitudes of the Jews, Amen, amen, I say unto you, that the hour cometh, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God; and they that hear shall live. For as the Father hath life in Himself, so He hath given to the Son also to have life in Himself; and He hath given Him power to do judgment, because He is the Son of man. Wonder not at this, for the hour cometh wherein all that are in the graves shall hear the voice of the Son of God; and they that have done good things shall come forth unto the resurrection of life, but they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of judgment.

Secret

MERCIFULLY look down, we beseech Thee, O Lord, upon the sacrifice which we offer Thee for the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, that, to those on whom Thou didst confer the merit of Christian faith, Thou mayst also grant its reward. Through Our Lord.

Postcommunion

DAY the prayer of Thy suppliants profit the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, we beseech Thee, O Lord, that Thou mayst free them from all sins and make them sharers in Thy redemption. Who livest.

NOTE

Pope Benedict XV has granted priests permission to offer three Masses on All Souls' Day. One of these Masses the Celebrant may say according to his own intention; one must be offered for the faithful departed and the third for the intention of the Holy Father. The first Mass is that of All Souls' Day, page 283, the second, the Anniversary Mass, page 281, omitting in the prayers the few words referring to the anniversary only. In the third Mass the Epistle and Gospel are from the Common or Daily Mass of the Dead, page 286. The Prayer, Secret, and Postcommunion are modified so as to be general. In the prayer, "O God, the bestower of pardon," page 287, instead of "brethren, kindred, and benefactors," the words, "the souls of Thy servants and handmaids" are substituted; and so with the Secret and Postcommunion.

The Common or Daily Mass for the Dead

Any Mass whatever, whether festal, ferial, or votive, may be offered up for the repose of the soul or souls of one or more of the faithful departed. But it is not lawful to celebrate in black vestments, with the rite proper to Masses for the Dead on certain days of the year. In this Common or Daily Mass for the Dead (*Missa Quotidiana*), the number of prayers, with their corresponding Secrets and Postcommunions, may not be less than three; the first, that answering to the particular intention for which the Mass is offered up (for instance, for one or for several persons deceased, for a priest, for all buried in a graveyard, etc.), the second, either for all deceased brethren, relatives, and benefactors, or another at choice, and the last, that for all the faithful departed. The Sequence in low Masses of this kind may be recited or omitted at the choice of the celebrant. If the Mass be offered for the faithful departed *in general*, the prayers found in the *Common or Daily Mass for the Dead* are said.

It is of counsel, that, should the day on which it is desired to have a Mass said for the repose of the soul of a deceased person, happen to be one on which Masses for the dead are not permitted, the Mass of the occurring feast or feria be offered up for the intention, rather than that the benefit accruing to the suffering soul be delayed by waiting until a day supervene on which a Mass in black vestments may be said.

(The Mass is said as on page 232, but the Collects, Secrets, and Postcommunions are as mentioned above, and the Epistle and Gospel as given below.)

Collects

For Bishops or Priests Deceased

O GOD, Who, in the apostolic priesthood, didst cause Thy servants to be honored with pontifical (or sacerdotal) dignity, grant,

we beseech Thee, that they may be joined in fellowship with Thine apostles for evermore. Through Our Lord.

For Deceased Brethren, Friends, and Benefactors

O GOD, the bestower of pardon and lover of man's salvation, we beseech Thy clemency, through the intercession of blessed Mary, ever a virgin, and all Thy saints, that the brethren, kindred, and benefactors of our congregation who have passed out of this world may together enjoy everlasting happiness.

For the Souls of All the Faithful Departed

O GOD, the creator and redeemer of all the faithful, grant to the souls of Thy servants and handmaids the remission of all their sins, that by devout prayers they may obtain the pardon which they ever desired. Who livest, etc.

Epistle

Apoc. xiv. 13

IN THOSE days I heard a voice from heaven, saying to me, Write, blessed are the dead, who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors, for their works follow them.

Gospel

John vi. 51-55

AT THAT time, Jesus said to the multitudes of the Jews: I am the living

bread, which came down from heaven. If any man eat of this bread he shall live for ever: and the bread that I will give is My flesh for the life of the world. The Jews therefore strove among themselves, saying, How can this man give us His flesh to eat? Then Jesus said to them, Amen, amen, I say unto you, Except you eat the flesh of the Son of man, and drink His blood, you shall not have life in you. He that eateth My flesh, and drinketh My blood, hath everlasting life: and I will raise him up in the last day.

RECEIVE, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the sacrifices which we offer for the souls of Thy servants, bishops (*or* priests); that Thou mayst command those whom on earth Thou didst invest with the episcopal (*or* sacerdotal) dignity to be joined to the fellowship of Thy saints in the heavenly kingdom. Through.

For Deceased Brethren, Friends, and Benefactors

O GOD, Whose mercy is boundless, mercifully receive the prayers of our lowliness, and grant, through these sacraments of our salvation, to the souls of our brethren, kindred, and benefactors, to whom Thou didst grant the confession of Thy name, the remission of all sins.

For the Souls of All the Faithful Departed

MERCIFULLY look down, we beseech Thee, O Lord, upon the sacrifice which we offer Thee for the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, that, to those on whom Thou didst confer the gift of Christian faith, Thou mayst also grant its reward. Through.

Postcommunions

For Deceased Bishops or Priests

MAY Thy clemency, which we implore, O Lord, benefit the souls of Thy servants, bishops, (or priests), that, by Thy mercy they may attain to everlasting fellowship with Him in Whom they hoped and believed. Through.

For Deceased Brethren, Friends, and Benefactors

GRANT, we beseech Thee, O almighty and merciful God, that the souls of our brethren, kindred, and benefactors, for whom we have offered this sacrifice of praise to Thy majesty, being purified of all sins by the virtue of this sacrament, may, by Thy mercy, receive the beatitude of perpetual light.

For the Souls of All the Faithful Departed

MAY the prayer of Thy suppliants profit the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, we beseech Thee, O Lord, that Thou

mayst free them from all sins and make them sharers in Thy redemption. Who livest.

Various Prayers for the Dead

See Note under the caption: "The Common or Daily Mass for the Dead," p. 286.

For a Deceased Pope

Prayer

O GOD, Who, in Thine ineffable providence, didst will that Thy servant, N., should be numbered among the high priests, grant, we beseech Thee, that he, who on earth held the place of Thine only-begotten Son, may be joined forevermore to the fellowship of Thy holy pontiffs. Through Our Lord.

Secret

RECEIVE, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the sacrifices, which we offer for the soul of Thy servant, N., supreme pontiff, that Thou mayst command him whom on earth Thou didst invest with the pontifical dignity to be joined to the fellowship of Thy saints in the heavenly kingdom.

Postcommunion

MAY Thy clemency, which we implore, O Lord, benefit the soul of Thy servant, N., supreme pontiff, that he may by Thy mercy attain to everlasting fellowship

with Him in Whom he hoped and believed.
Through Our Lord.

For a deceased cardinal the Prayer, Secret, and Postcommunion are those appointed, as follows, for a bishop, priest, or deacon, with mention inserted in these of his rank as a Prince of the Church.

O GOD, Who didst cause Thy servant, N., to be honored in the apostolic priesthood with the episcopal dignity, grant, we beseech Thee, that he may be joined to the fellowship of Thine apostles for evermore. Through.

Secret

RECEIVE, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the sacrifice which we offer for the soul of Thy servant, the pontiff, N., that Thou mayst command him, whom on earth Thou didst invest with the episcopal dignity, to be joined to the fellowship of Thy saints in the heavenly kingdom. Through Our Lord.

Postcommunion

DAY Thy clemency, which we implore, O Lord, benefit the soul of Thy servant, the bishop, N., that, by Thy mercy, he may attain to everlasting fellowship with Him in Whom he hoped and believed. Through Our Lord.

Or the following:

Prayer

GRANT us, O Lord, that Thou give to be a companion of Thy saints the soul of Thy servant, N., bishop, whom Thou hast taken out of the toilsome struggle of this world. Through Our Lord.

For a Priest Deceased

Prayer

O GOD, Who didst cause Thy servant, N., to be honored in the apostolic priesthood with the sacerdotal dignity, grant, we beseech Thee, that he may be joined to the fellowship of Thine apostles for evermore. Through Our Lord.

Secret

RECEIVE, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the sacrifice which we offer for the

soul of Thy servant, N., that Thou mayst command him, whom on earth Thou didst invest with the sacerdotal dignity, to be joined to the fellowship of Thy saints in the heavenly kingdom. Through Our Lord.

Postcommunion

MAY Thy clemency, which we implore, O Lord, benefit the soul of Thy servant, N., priest, that he may attain to everlasting fellowship with Him in Whom he hoped and believed. Through Our Lord.

Or the following:

Prayer

GRANT, we beseech Thee, O Lord, that the soul of Thy servant, N., the priest, whom, while he dwelt in this world, Thou didst adorn with sacred gifts, may evermore rejoice in the glory of heaven. Through Our Lord.

RECEIVE, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the sacrifice we offer for the soul of Thy servant, N., that, as Thou didst grant him the dignity of the priesthood, Thou wilt also grant him its reward. Through Our Lord.

Postcommunion

GRANT, we beseech Thee, O almighty God, that Thou command the soul of Thy servant, N., the priest, to be a sharer of

everlasting beatitude in the congregation of the just. Through Our Lord.

For a Man, Other than a Priest, Deceased

Prayer

INCLINE Thine ear, O Lord, to our prayers, with which we supplicate Thy mercy that Thou set the soul of Thy servant, which Thou hast commanded to pass from this world, in a region of peace and light, and order that it be of the fellowship of the saints. Through Our Lord.

Secret

CONSENT, we beseech Thee, O Lord, that the soul of Thy servant may be benefited by this oblation, by the offering of which Thou hast granted the sins of the whole world to be forgiven. Through.

Postcommunion

ABSOLVE, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the soul of Thy servant from every bond of sin, that, in the glory of the resurrection, he may rise to a new and better life with Thy saints and elect. Through Our Lord.

For a Woman Deceased

Prayer

WE BESEECH Thee, O Lord, that of Thy loving-kindness Thou have mercy on the soul of Thy handmaid, free her from the defilements of this mortal life and

number her for evermore among the saved.
Through Our Lord.

Secret

BY THESE sacrifices, without which no one hath ever been free of offence, may the soul of Thy handmaid be rid of all sins, we beseech Thee, O Lord; that by these offices of pious propitiation it may obtain everlasting mercy. Through.

Postcommunion

DAY the soul of Thy handmaid, we beseech Thee, O Lord, partake of eternal light, as it hath obtained the sacrament of Thine everlasting mercy. Through Our Lord.

*For the Father and Mother of the Celebrating Priest
Prayer*

O GOD, Who hast commanded us to honor our father and mother, in Thy clemency have mercy upon the souls of my father and mother, and pardon their sins; and make me to see them in the joy of the eternal brightness. Through Our Lord.

Secret

RECEIVE, O Lord, the sacrifice which I offer Thee for the souls of my father and mother, and grant them everlasting joy in the land of the living; and make me to share with them in the happiness of the saints. Through Our Lord.

Postcommunion

DAY the partaking of the heavenly sacrament, we beseech Thee, O Lord, obtain rest and light everlasting for the souls of my father and mother; and may Thy eternal grace crown me with them. Through Our Lord.

Should the Mass be offered up by a priest for his father only, or for his mother only, the above prayers are worded in the singular number. When the Holy Sacrifice is offered up for the fathers and mothers of others besides the celebrant, in place of "my father and mother" is said "our fathers and mothers."

For Deceased Brethren, Friends, and Benefactors

The Prayer, O God, the bestower of pardon (see "Common or Daily Mass for the Dead," p. 287), Secret, and Postcommunion are said with the proper variations.

For All Who Are Buried in a Cemetery or Graveyard

Prayer

O GOD, by Whose mercy the souls of the faithful find rest, mercifully grant pardon of sins to Thy servants and handmaids, and to all who, here and elsewhere, repose in Christ, that, being freed from all guilt, they may rejoice with Thee for evermore. Through the same Our Lord.

Secret

GRACIOUSLY receive, O Lord, the sacrifice offered for the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, and of all Catholics who sleep in Christ, whether in this place or

elsewhere, that, being delivered from the bonds of grim death by this most excellent sacrifice, they may be found worthy of life everlasting. Through the same Our Lord.

Postcommunion

O GOD, the light of faithful souls, give ear to our supplications, and grant to Thy servants and handmaids, whose bodies, here and elsewhere, repose in Christ, an abode of refreshment, the blessedness of rest, and the brightness of light. Through the same Our Lord.

For More than One Person Deceased

Prayer

O GOD, Whose property is ever to pity and to spare, have mercy on the souls of thy servants and handmaids, and forgive them all their sins, that, being loosed from the bonds of mortality, they may be found worthy to enter into life. Through Our Lord.

Secret

O CONSENT, we beseech Thee, O Lord, that this oblation benefit the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, as Thou hast granted that by the offering of it the sins of all the world should be forgiven. Through Our Lord.

Postcommunion

O GOD, Who alone art competent to administer healing remedies after death,

grant, we beseech Thee, that the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, rid of earthly contagion, may be numbered among those whom Thou hast redeemed. Who livest.

For More than One Person Deceased. Other
Prayers

Prayer

GRANT, we beseech Thee, O Lord, everlasting mercy to the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, that the faith and hope which they placed in Thee may avail them for eternity. Through Our Lord.

Secret

LOOK with favor upon these gifts, we beseech Thee, O Lord, and may that which we offer with supplication to the praise of Thy name avail for the pardon of the departed. Through Our Lord.

Postcommunion

WE POUR forth, O Lord, our prayers and supplications for the souls of Thy servants and handmaids, beseeching that Thou mercifully forgive whatever faults they have committed in their earthly careers, and set them in the blissful abode of Thy redeemed. Through Our Lord.

Devotions for Confession

Before Confession

Reflect that this confession may be the last of your life. Therefore, prepare yourself for it as if you were lying sick upon your death-bed, and already at the brink of the grave. Ask God to give you the grace to make a good examination of conscience, the light to see your sins clearly, and the strength to make a sincere confession and to amend your life.

Prayer

MOST merciful God, Father in heaven, relying on Thy goodness and mercy, I come to Thee with filial confidence to confess my sins and to implore Thy forgiveness. Thou wilt not despise a contrite and humble heart. Bless me and receive me again into Thy favor; I acknowledge that I have been most ungrateful to Thee, but I sincerely repent and detest the wrong I have done, and I desire henceforth to walk in the way of perfection, in accordance with Thy holy will.

O Jesus, my Saviour, my good Shepherd, I have strayed far from the path that Thou hast marked out for me; I did not follow in Thy footsteps; I wandered into forbidden places. Repentant and sorrowful, I beg to be admitted again into the fold of Thy faithful followers. I want to confess my sins with perfect sincerity, as if I were at the

point of death. My Jesus, I look to Thee with confidence for the grace to examine my conscience well.

O Holy Spirit, come in Thy mercy; enlighten my mind and strengthen my will that I may know my sins, humbly confess them, and sincerely amend my life.

Mary, my mother, immaculate spouse of the Holy Ghost, refuge of sinners, assist me by thy intercession.

Holy angels and saints of God, pray for me. Amen.

Examination of Conscience

BEGIN by examining yourself on your last confession: Whether a grievous sin was forgotten through want of proper examination, or concealed or disguised through shame. Whether you confessed without a true sorrow and a firm purpose of amendment. Whether you have repaired evil done to your neighbor. Whether the penance was performed without voluntary distractions. Whether you have neglected your confessor's counsel, and fallen at once into habitual sin.

Then examine yourself on the ten commandments, the commandments of the Church, the seven capital sins, the duties of your state of life, and your ruling passion. Calmly recall the different occasions of sin which have fallen in your way, or to which your state and condition in life expose you,

the places you have frequented, the persons with whom you have associated. Do not neglect to consider the circumstances which alter the grievousness of the sin, nor the various ways in which we become accessory to the sins of others.

Preliminary Examination

WHEN did you make your last confession? Did you take sufficient pains to awaken contrition?

Did you omit to confess a mortal sin either intentionally or through forgetfulness?

Did you intentionally neglect to say the penance which was imposed on you, or were you so careless as to forget it?

Have you carried out the resolutions you made at your last confession or have you paid no heed at all to them?

Examination on the Ten Commandments of God

I. **H**AVE you doubted in matters of faith? Murmured against God at your adversity or at the prosperity of others? Despaired of His mercy?

Have you believed in fortune-tellers or consulted them?

Have you gone to places of worship belonging to other denominations?

Have you recommended yourself daily to God? Neglected your morning or night prayers? Omitted religious duties or practices through motives of human respect?

Have you read books, papers, and periodicals of anti-Catholic or atheistic tendency? Made use of superstitious practices? Spoken with levity or irreverence of priests, Religious, or sacred objects?

II. Have you taken the name of God in vain? Profaned anything relating to religion?

Have you sworn falsely, rashly, or in slight and trivial matters? Cursed yourself or others, or any creature? Angered others so as to make them swear, or blaspheme God?

III. Have you kept holy the Lord's Day, and all other days commanded to be kept holy? Bought or sold things not of necessity on that day? Done or commanded some servile work not of necessity? Missed Mass or been wilfully distracted during Mass? Talked, gazed, or laughed in the church?

IV. Have you honored your parents, superiors, and masters, according to your just duty? Deceived them? Disobeyed them?

Have you failed in due reverence to aged persons?

V. Have you procured, desired, or hastened the death of any one? Borne hatred? Oppressed any one? Desired revenge? Not forgiven injuries? Refused to speak to others? Used provoking language? Injured others? Caused enmity between others?

VI and IX. Have you been in lewd com-

pany? Read immodest books? Been guilty of unchaste songs, discourses, words, or actions? Wilfully entertained impure thoughts or desires?

VII. Have you been guilty of stealing, or of deceit in buying, or selling, in regard to wares, prices, weights, or measures? Have you wilfully damaged another man's goods or negligently spoiled them?

VIII. Have you borne false witness? Called injurious names? Disclosed another's sins? Flattered others? Judged rashly?

X. Have you coveted unjustly anything that belongs to another?

Examination on the Precepts of the Church

HAVE you gone to confession at least once a year? Received holy communion during Eastertime?

Have you violated the fasts of the Church, or eaten flesh-meat on prohibited days?

Have you sinned against any other Commandment of the Church?

Examine yourself also in regard to the seven capital sins and the nine ways of being accessory to another's sin.

After the Examination

HAVING discovered the sins of which you have been guilty, together with their number, enormity, or such circumstances as may change their nature, you

should endeavor to excite in yourself a *heartfelt sorrow* for having committed them, and a sincere detestation of them. This being the most essential of all the dispositions requisite for a good confession, with what humility, fervor, and perseverance should you not importune Him who holds the hearts of men in His hands to grant it to you!

An Act of Contrition

Recite very attentively one of the following acts of contrition:

I

O MY God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee, and I detest all my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven and the pains of hell, but most of all because they displease Thee, my God, Who art all-good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve, with the help of Thy grace, to confess my sins, to do penance, and to amend my life.

II

O MY God, I am truly sorry that I have sinned, because Thou art infinitely good and sin displeases Thee. I purpose, with the help of Thy grace, never more to offend Thee, and to avoid the occasions of sin.

III

O MY God, I am heartily sorry for having offended Thee; and I detest my sins above every other evil, because they displease Thee, my God, Who for Thy infinite goodness art so deserving of all my love; and I firmly resolve, by Thy holy grace, never more to offend Thee, and to amend my life.

An Act of Charity

O MY God, I love Thee with my whole heart and soul, and above all things, because Thou art infinitely good and perfect, and most worthy of all my love; and, for Thy sake, I love my neighbor as myself. Mercifully grant, O my God, that, having loved Thee on earth, I may love and enjoy Thee forever in heaven.

Approach the confessional with the same recollection and reverence as would fill your heart if Christ Our Lord were seated there in person ready to hear your confession. The priest is really the representative of Christ.

When you kneel down, say: "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned." Then tell when you made your last confession and begin the avowal of your sins. Confess all your sins with a contrite and humble heart, and conclude thus:

For these and all the sins of my past life, especially my sins of (*naming some grievous sin*), I am heartily sorry, beg pardon of God, and absolution of you, my Father.

Listen then with humility and docility to the instruction of your confessor.

While the priest pronounces the words of absolution, endeavor to excite an act of perfect contrition.

Thanksgiving after Confession

ETERNAL Father! I thank Thee for Thy goodness and mercy. Thou hast had compassion on me, although in my folly I had wandered far away from Thee and offended Thee most grievously. With fatherly love Thou hast received me anew after so many relapses into sin and forgiven me my offences through the holy sacrament of Penance. Blessed forever, O my God, be Thy loving-kindness, Thy infinite mercy! Never again will I grieve Thee by ingratitude, by disobedience to Thy holy will. All that I am, and all that I have, shall be consecrated to Thy service and Thy glory.

Ejaculations

ALL for Thee, most sacred Heart of Jesus!

Indulgence: 300 days, each time.—Pius X, Nov. 26, 1908.

Sacred Heart of Jesus, I trust in Thee.

Indulgence: 300 days, each time.—Pius X, June 27, 1906.

Jesus, my God, I love Thee above all things.

Indulgence: 50 days, each time, Pius IX, May 7, 1854.

Sweet Heart of Mary, be my salvation.

Indulgence: 300 days, each time.—Pius IX, Sept. 30, 1852.

Mary, our hope, have pity on us!

Indulgence: 300 days, each time.—Pius X, Jan. 8, 1906.

Intentions for Holy Communion

Before receiving holy communion, direct your intention; that is, offer to God your Mass and communion for the glory of His holy name, in thanksgiving for benefits received, in reparation for your sins and in humble supplication that you may obtain new graces and blessings, above all the gift of final perseverance. Offer to God also some special intention, *e.g.*, the conversion of a friend, the welfare of your family, the relief of the souls in Purgatory. Pray, also, according to the Holy Father's intention.

The Pope's intention always includes the following objects:

The progress of the Faith and triumph of the Church.

Peace and union among Christian princes and rulers.

The conversion of sinners.

The uprooting of heresy.

Resolve to struggle earnestly against your ruling passion and pray that the spirit of Christ may dominate all your actions.

Before Communion

*Direct your intention*¹

O MOST high and mighty God, I, an unworthy sinner, desire to receive the

sacrament of the most holy body and blood of Thy Son, for the praise and glory of Thy supreme majesty; in memory of the most holy life, passion, and death of Jesus Christ my Saviour; in thanksgiving for all Thy gifts and blessings bestowed upon me, an unworthy sinner, and on Thy whole Church; for the propitiation of my numberless sins; for the salvation of myself and my relations, N., N., and for the repose of the departed, N., N. Truly, O Lord, in Thee alone is all that can satisfy my heart's desire. For besides Thee what have I in heaven, or what do I desire upon earth? Wilt Thou not Thyself be our reward exceeding great?

*Acts of Faith, Adoration, Hope, Charity, and
Contrition*

JESUS, I believe in Thee, because Thou art Truth itself.

JESUS, my God, I adore Thee here present in the Sacrament of Thy love.

JESUS, I hope in Thee, because Thou art merciful, and faithful to Thy promises.

Never, O Lord, let me be separated from Thee! Pray for the Pope's intention, which always includes the following objects: i. The progress of the Faith and triumph of the Church. ii. Peace and union among Christian princes and rulers. iii. The conversion of sinners. iv. The uprooting of heresy.

Be mindful, also of the poor souls in Purgatory.)

O MOST holy Mary, my mother and my hope, obtain for me the graces which I desire; obtain for me the grace of loving thee sincerely, and of recommending myself to thee in all my necessities.

Eternal Spirit, I thank Thee for the gift that Thou hast given me. It is Jesus, Whose soul Thou didst sanctify with Thy holiest treasures. Make me, dear Spirit, more loving, that I may cling more closely to God.

The Stations of the Cross

Note.—The pious exercise of the Stations of the Cross is a continued meditation on the passion of Our Lord. To it innumerable indulgences have been annexed by the Sovereign Pontiffs, even the same as those of the Via Crucis in Jerusalem, or other places of the Holy Land, whence it appears how profitable this exercise must be to the Holy Souls. We read in the life of the Venerable Mary of Antigua that a nun of her convent, having died, appeared to her, and said: “Why is it that you do not offer for me and for the other souls the Stations of the Cross?” The servant of God remained in suspense at these words, when she heard Our Lord say to her: “The exercise of the Way of the Cross is so profitable to the souls in Purgatory that this soul has come to ask it of you in the name of all. The Via Crucis is a suffrage of great importance for these souls. By offering it for them you will have them as so many protectors, who will pray for you and defend your cause before My justice. Tell your sisters to rejoice in this treasure and the precious capital they have in it, that they may profit by it.”

JESUS did not descend from the cross, but remained on it until He died. And when taken down from it, He, in death as in life, rested on the bosom of His blessed Mother. Persevere in your resolutions of reform and do not part from the cross: he who persevereth to the end shall be saved. Consider, moreover, how pure the heart should be that receives the body and blood of Christ in the adorable Sacrament of the Altar.

Thy kingdom come. I pray Thee, most

Lead us not into temptation. I pray Thee, most loving Father! grant pardon to the souls in Purgatory for not having resisted their evil inclinations and habits, and consenting to the suggestions of the devil and the flesh. In atonement for all these sins I offer up the glorious victory which Thy Son gained over the world and the devil, as likewise His most holy life and conduct, with all His labors, trials, fatigues, and His most bitter suffering and death. Amen.

But deliver us from evil, and from all punishment, through the merits of Thy beloved Son, and bring us to the kingdom of Thy glory, which is Thyself. Amen.

HAIL MARY! Behold, most merciful Mother! thy poor and sorrowful children who suffer so grievously in the flames of Purgatory. We beseech thee for the sake of the great joy which the angelic salu-

tation caused thee, have compassion on them, and send them thy holy angel to bring them also joyful greeting, and to announce to them release from their sufferings.

Full of grace! Obtain for them grace, mercy, and remission of the great punishment they now endure.

The Lord is with thee! He will deny thee nothing, but will hear thy prayer and mercifully come to the assistance of these poor souls.

Blessed art thou amongst women! ay, among all creatures in the whole world! Bless and render happy with thy intercession the poor imprisoned souls, and deliver them from their bonds.

And blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus, Who is the Saviour and Redeemer of the whole world, born without pain of thee, a virgin! O merciful Jesus, blessed fruit of her inviolate virginity! have mercy on the souls departed! O merciful Mother, hasten to their assistance!

Holy Mary, Mother of God! Thou wonderful Virgin Mother, *pray for us sinners* and for the souls in Purgatory *now* and forever, *and at the hour of our death;* and as thou didst assist the souls departed in their last agony, so assist them now in their grievous suffering and imprisonment, that delivered by thy motherly intercession they may pass from present suffering to ever-

lasting joy, from their anguish and torment to everlasting rest and glory, and rejoice with thee and the whole heavenly host through all eternity. Amen.

Conditions for Gaining Indulgences¹

General Conditions Required for All Indulgences

- I. The state of grace.
- II. Intention of gaining the Indulgences: a general intention is sufficient.²
- III. Accuracy and devotion in fulfilling the specified conditions.

Special Conditions Usually Required for Plenary, And Sometimes for Partial, Indulgences

I. Confession.

1. If confession is prescribed for an indulgence attached to a particular day, it may be made within the eight days immediately before or after that day.
2. To gain indulgences attached to pious exercises of a triduum, a week, etc., confession (and communion) may be made within the octave following the completion of the triduum, etc.
3. The faithful who are accustomed, unless lawfully impeded, to confess at least twice in the month, or who daily, or almost daily (though they omit holy communion a day or two in the week) receive holy communion in the state of grace and with the

right intention, may gain all occurring indulgences, without actual confession otherwise necessary, except Jubilee indulgences.

II. *Communion.*

1. May be made on the day before the day to which the indulgence is attached, or on the day itself or within the eight days immediately following.

2. See 2 and 3 above.

III. *Visit* to a church or a public oratory, where required, may be made from noon the day before, till midnight of the day to which the indulgence is attached.

IV. *Prayer.*—*Vocal* prayer for the Pope's intentions.

repeated daily for a month; and the communion may be made, unless otherwise declared, on any day of the month, or within eight days after. Note: Confession, if required as a condition, may be made within eight days before or eight days after the appointed day. Communion, if required, may be made on the Vigil, or within eight days after. In case of devotions spreading over several days, confession and communion may be made within eight days after the completion of the devotions. Confession made habitually twice a month, or daily communion, releases from all obligation of actual confession, except in cases of Jubilees or similar extraordinary indulgences (Can. 931). Cf. p. xii, 9 and 430 N. R.

3. The Roman numerals, I, II, III, IV, placed after an indulgence, indicate the special conditions, viz., I, CONFESSION; II, COMMUNION; III, VISIT to a church or public chapel; IV, PRAYER according to the Pope's intention.

4. The references at the foot of the page correspond with the indulgences; and the dates are those of rescripts of the Congregation of Indulgences, unless otherwise noted.

5. The Our Fathers, Hail Marys, and Glories prescribed for an indulgence are indicated throughout by the Latin *Pater Noster*, *Ave Maria*, and *Gloria Patria*, or in

short, *Pater, Ave, and Gloria*. They can of course be said in English, and this applies to similar references in Latin to familiar prayers, antiphons, etc.

N. B.—A general intention of gaining all Indulgences is sufficient. It should be renewed from time to time, say, every morning.
