AMABILE. A rare Korean of interesting shape. Grenadine-red, freely spotted black. July. 3 to 4 ft. 75c each, 3 for \$2.00.

AURATUM. Var. *platyphyllum*. The strikingly large and beautiful Gold Banded Lily you've asked for. Blooms July-Sept. 3 to 5 ft. \$1.00 ea.

AURELIAN HYBRIDS. Var. *Golden Sunburst*. Star-shaped flowers, true lemon and gold-yellow. Petals, very slightly recurved. Graceful sprays 5 to 8 ft. 6-7 in. bulbs. Aug. to Sept. \$1.25 ea.

Mostly tall Ferns with bold, broad foliage, and imposing appearance. They are adapted to sunshine but need the shelter of adjacent plants about the base of the fronds. Plant them in mixed groups among low shrubs.

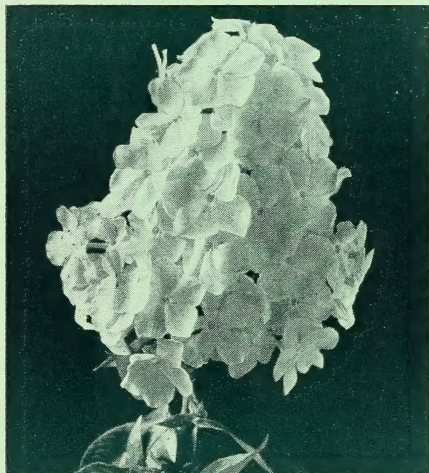
