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WAR DEPARTMENT, *December 23, 1858.*

SIR: I transmit, herewith, a communication from the Paymaster General, from which it will be perceived that the sum of four hundred and thirteen thousand six hundred dollars (\$413,600) will be required for the payment of the Florida volunteers called into service by General Harney and Colonel Loomis, and have the honor to request the early and favorable action thereon of the House of Representatives.

*Memorandum.*

Mr. A. Dudley Mann's diplomatic services commenced March 27, 1846, and terminated July 13, 1852.

During this time Mr. Mann was employed on four different missions. The first to Hanover, Oldenburg, and the two Mecklenburgs, which lasted eight months and nine days. The second to the States of the Germanic Confederation, or the more important ones thereof, (wherein the United States had no minister,) which lasted one year and twenty-four days. The third to Hungary, which lasted three months and twenty-five days. The fourth to Switzerland, which lasted two years and twenty-nine days. He was, consequently, in a period of six years, two months, and eighteen days, employed four years, three months, and fifteen days.

He received for his first mission, \$3,816 45; for his second, \$6,199 29; for his third, \$1,940; for his fourth, \$5,394 81. Total amount drawn from the treasury on account of all his missions, \$17,350 59.

While engaged in this service he crossed the Atlantic eight times, thus travelling on sea at least 25,000 miles; on land and otherwise on water he travelled at least 25,000 more.

In his second, third, and fourth missions he was accompanied by his son, who acted as his secretary, but for whose services nothing whatever was charged, valuable as they were in translating such documents as he met with abroad, and other publications, from German, French, Spanish, and Italian, as Mr. Mann conceived would be interesting to his government.

He negotiated three treaties, all of which were duly ratified, and are at present in force. He might, therefore, long ago have justly laid claim to three outfits of \$4,500 each, according to the usages of Congress in such cases in the instances of Mr. Niles, Mr. Schenck, Mr. Pendleton, and others; but he has made no such application.

He departed upon his mission as soon as he was appointed, and terminated them voluntarily when he accomplished the objects for which he was commissioned.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President be, and he is hereby, authorized to cause A. Dudley Mann to be paid, out of the foreign intercourse fund, such balance as, upon just and equitable principles, and in accordance with congressional precedents, he may ascertain to be due to him for diplomatic services performed during various missions to Europe as special and confidential agent; but in no case shall higher or other compensation be allowed him, from the commencement to the termination of either mission, or for the aggregate time which he was employed, than is at present allowed by law to ministers resident of the United States.*

*To the Senate and House of Representatives:*

I transmit a copy of a letter, of the 8th of April last, from the minister of the United States in China, and of the decree and regulation which accompanied it, for such revision thereof as Congress may deem expedient, pursuant to the sixth section of the act approved August 11, 1848.

SIR: Conformably to the sixth section of the act of Congress approved August 11, 1848, I have the honor to transmit to the President the accompanying decree and regulation of the 27th of February, 1858, issued and published by me, under the provisions of the said act of Congress, with the opinions of the American consuls at the treaty ports, "to be laid before Congress for revision."

*Regulations for the Consular Courts of the United States of America in China.*

In pursuance of the 4th and 5th sections of the act of Congress approved August 11, 1848, entitled "An act to carry into effect

certain provisions in the treaties between the United States and China and the Ottoman Porte, giving certain legislative and judicial powers to ministers and consuls of the United States in those countries," I, William B. Reed, Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States of America to the Empire of China, do hereby decree the following rules and regulations, which shall have the force of law in the consular courts in China :

1st. That in all cases of assignments for the benefit of the creditors within the jurisdiction of the consuls of the United States in China, distribution or dividends shall be made in the following manner : On the expiration of one year from the date of such assignment the assignees may apply by petition to the appropriate consul, stating the amount of assets in hand, and of the claims proved against the estate, and praying for an order of distribution. The consul shall thereupon direct notice of such intended distribution to be given, either by direct personal communication, or publication for a period of not less than two months in newspapers published at Victoria and Shanghai, if a majority of creditors in amount shall be residents of China, or have agents or attorneys there resident; and when creditors reside out of China, by publication in such places as the consul may direct; and if at the expiration of the time specified in such notices no sufficient cause be shown why such distribution should not be made, the consul shall make an absolute order in nature of a final decree, directing such distribution to be made, and the form of acquittances therefor.

2d. That in no case of trusts or assignments for the benefit of creditors, shall a consul or vice consul of the United States act as trustee or assignee.
