Orders for Plants and Seeds.-We send plants or seeds either by mail or express, but we do not advise sending plants by mail only where there is no express office. We can send much larger, better, and stronger plants by express, which are sure to give satisfaction, and we add enough gratis to pay the express charges Purchasers will find it for their interest to leave the selection to us, as it is often difficult to judge of the merit of varieties by descriptions.

Packing.-No charge is made for boxes, baskets, or packiges (except in extra large specimens), and all packages are delivered in Boston free of charge. Our morle of packing is such that we can forward plants safely at all seasons of the year, without regard to cold or heat.

Our Gardens in Cambridge are only two miles from the city, within twenty-five minutes' time by horse cars from Scollay square, Boston.

Plants and Seeds.-As our business includes both seeds and plants, as well as fruit and ornamental trees, shrubs, vines, etc., orders for both may be sent together, and additional express charges saved.

The Safe Arrival of Plants, seeds or bulbs by mail or express in good condition we guarantee. All complaints, however, should be made immediately on the receipt of the packages. Plants or seeds by freight are at the risk of the purchaser.

## WATER LILIES.



These beautiful and fragrant aquatic plants have been in much demand the last few years, and are now among the most fashionable of summer flowers. They are very easily cultivated, either in the greenhouse or the open air, during the warm season. We have cultivated them latgely, particularly the Blue Lily (Nymphoea coerulea), and have had them in bloom from July to November. They may be grown in pans five inches deep and eighteen inches in diameter, in good rich soil, one plant in the centre of each pan, filling the pans with water, which should be kept full. The pans may be placed in the greenhouse, or in a frame, where they can be covered cool nights, when they will continue to bloom very late. The lovely White Water Lily ( $N$. odorata) may be planted in large tubs or half-barrels, in the open air, using the same rich soil, and keeping the tubs full of water. The Yellow Lily ( $N$. fluva) may have the same treatment. It is a beautiful flower. See description and price on p. 9 .

## VEGETABLE PLANTS AND ROOTS. ASPARAGUS ROOTS.

For a good asparagus bed, the soil should be well prepared, not in the expensive way once thought necessary, but in a thorough manner. Select, if possible, a good sandy loam, which should be well drained, and well manured. If not naturally deep, trench to the depth of eighteen to twenty-four inches, working in the manure which should be six inches thick. When this is done, open shallow trenches six inches in depth, and three feet apart, and in these set the plants ab ut twelve inches apart, spreading out the roots carefully and covering the crowns about three inches deep. The roots may ke set out in the fall or in spring, as soon as the ground is in good condition. Five or six rows, fifty feet long, will give a good supply for an ordinary family.
