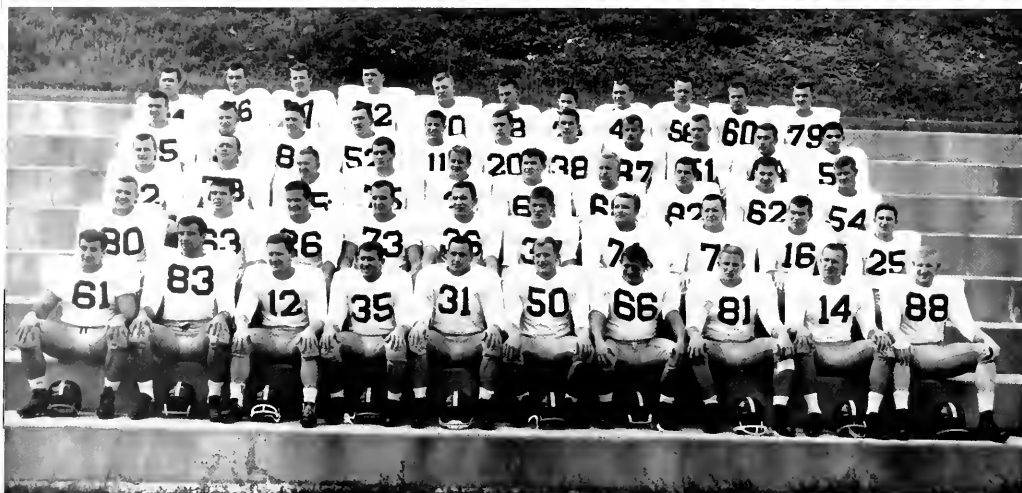
spirit reached a high pitch which really paid off as the fans witnessed the most successful season since 1951, six wins and four losses, to grab third place in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Three of these losses were real heartbreakers. Tulane's victory came when the Deacs failed to score time after time from inside the five yard line of the Green Waves. The difference between winning and losing the Carolina game was a matter of our failure to cash in on conversions. Perhaps our greatest disappointment was the loss by two points to Clemson, a nationally recognized powerhouse, after scoring thirty-one points against them. We cheered, we cried, we built bonfires and had pep rallies and then we cheered some more; one of these days, we promised ourselves, we will beat Carolina and Duke. It was a year of real surprises ending in a 43 to 20 rout of South Carolina. Quarterback Norman Sneed had quite a season, setting four ACC records for total passing yardage, total yardage gained rushing and passing, touchdown passes completed (12), most passes completed and most passes attempted. Pete Manning and Neil MacLean were invited to play in the Blue Gray game while Nick Parella was invited to play in the North South game. We were sorry to lose Head Coach Paul Amen at the end of the season after he had built the team up from a winless season two years before.

The 1960 edition of the Demon Deacon football team should be even tougher with the loss of only four lettermen from the probable starting unit and four strong men coming in to fill their positions.

WAKE FOREST N. C. STATE

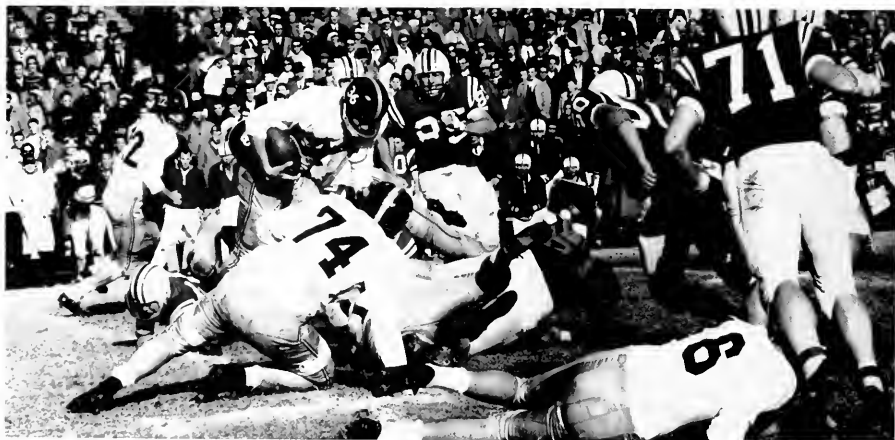

Duke scored first on a long pass early in the game, but Wake came right back with a touchdown when Sneed completed a pass to Jerry Ball. The Blue Devils closed out the first half with a sixty-yard drive which made the score 21-6 in favor of Duke. We couldn't overcome this deficit in the second half despite the record-breaking forty-four passes thrown by Norman Sneed.

The game provided plenty of excitement. Duke fumbled five times, and Wake Forest had five passes intercepted. The ball changed hands many times but 27-15 was the best that we could do.

WAKE FOREST VI P81.

Trailing by eleven points at the half, Wake Forest's offence rose to the occasion by crushing V.P.I. in the second half before a Homecoming crowd of 10,000 at Bowman Gray Stadium.

The Deacs scored first after a short punt return gave them the ball on the Gobbler's 35 yardline. Norman Sneed completed a pass to Pete Manning from the 9 yard line and after the conversion Wake led 7-0. Virginia Tech bounced back before the half with a devastating running attack which climaxed in a score. A field goal and another touchdown put an end to the half with V.P.I. ahead 18 to 7.

The second half was all Wake Forest with two offensive drives ending with touchdowns to give us a 21-18 lead. Behind the ground attack of Bill Skippon and Joe Bonecutter we scored again when Chuck Reiley smashed over to put the stopper on it 27 to 18.

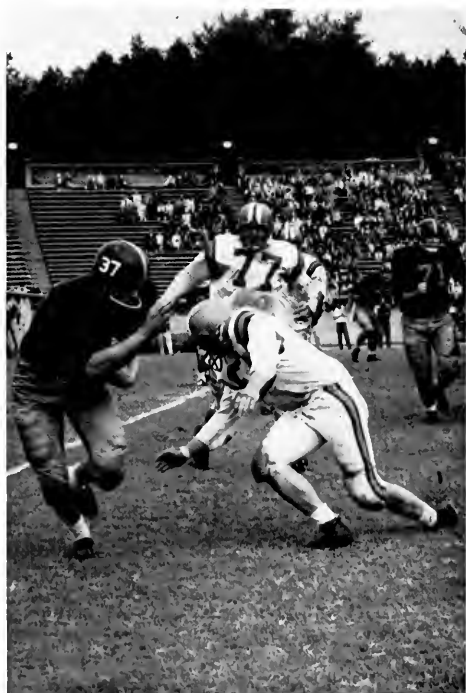

Wake Forest took a first half lead of 9-0. The scoring began with a twenty-nine yard field goal by Nick Patella. Later in the first half, Quarterback Norman Sneed completed a touchdown pass to Bill Hull. However, the Seminoles countered quickly in the second half to take a 20-9 lead. With less than six minutes remaining Wake fought back to score two more touchdowns, highlighted by the passing of Norman Sneed. The Seminole offence stalled, and Wake Forest held on for a two point advantage and a final score of 22-20.

Wake scored two more times the second of these coming in the closing seconds of the game when Buck Jolly went all the way for the final tally, 43-20.

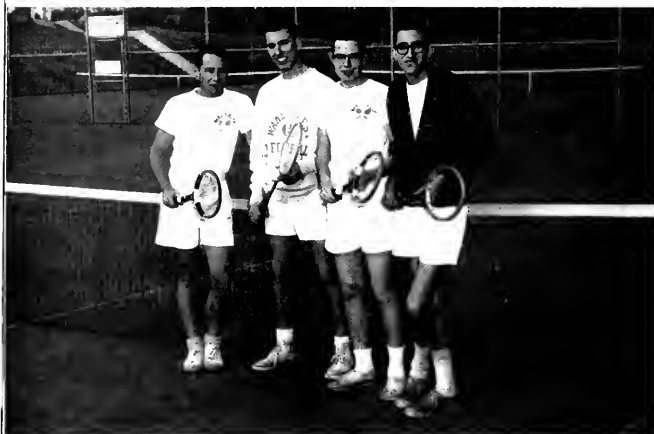

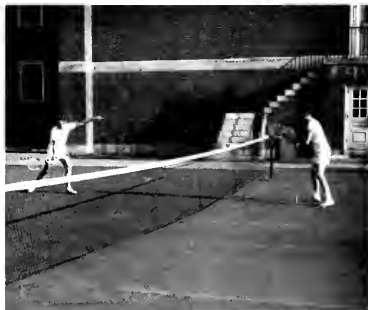

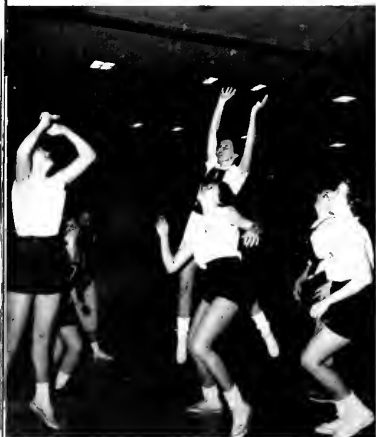

The legislature, meeting every two weeks, proved to offer an abundance of students who were willing to devote their time so that student government might operate smoothly. The legislators worked on the election committee, Freshmen Parents' Weekend committee, parking committee, and the constitutional revision committees.

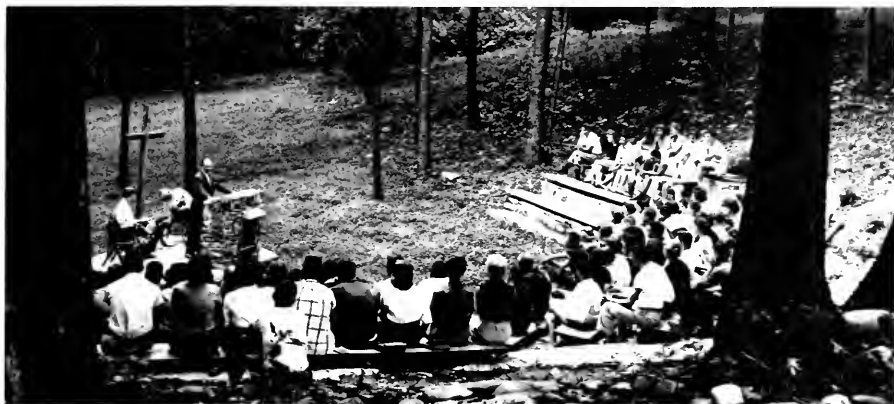


B . S . U .

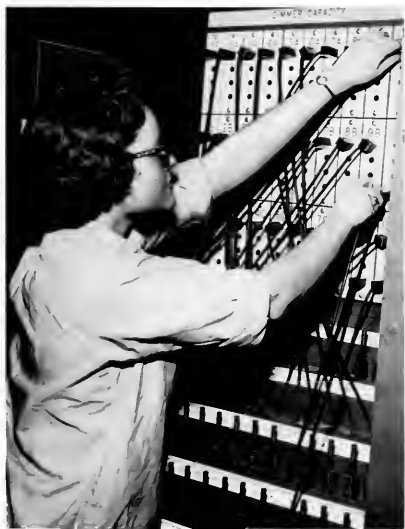

The band sounds off, and the companies come on line for passing in review.

The R.O.T.C. Cadet Corps at Wake Forest is organized into a Cadet Battle Group. Cadets hold officer and non-commissioned officer ranks in the Cadet Corps, and under the supervision of Regular Army Officers, are responsible for the command, discipline, administration, and training of the Battle Group.

Activities open to members of the Cadet Corps are the National Honorary Military Societies of Scabbard and Blade and Pershing Rifles, the R.O.T.C. Rifle Team, the R.O.T.C., Band and the Drill Platoon.

All cadets in the advanced R.O.T.C. course attend a six week camp during the summer following their junior year. During the camp period cadets live as soldiers and receive training in many phases of military life. The emphasis during training at summer camp is on practical application of training that has been received in R.O.T.C. classes during the school year. Cadets from Wake Forest attend summer camp at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

Each year the Wake Forest companies of the National Honorary Military societies of Scabbard and Blade and Pershing Rifles sponsor the Military Ball for members of the R.O.T.C. Cadet Corps and their guests.

Cadets resplendent in dress uniforms with dates in beautiful gowns, refreshments, good music and colorful decorations, have made the Military Ball a success each year.

MURRAY GREASON

Murray Crossley Greason was born in Raleigh, North Carolina, December 26, 1901. In 1921 he entered Wake Forest College and became one of its best athletes of all time. His long period of service to Wake Forest College could be evaluated from several standpoints. His coaching record was excellent and brought much recognition to the College. Of greater service to the College, however, is the character of Greason the man, rather than Greason the coach. His linkage with alumni was of inestimable value. The affection and respect accorded him by athletic officials of other institutions made much easier the negotiations in that sometimes complicated area. His calm manner and instinct for proper public relations insured the College of amiable and sympathetic press coverage. He was respected as a gentleman and as a friend by faculty and students. It is in gratitude for the years of service rendered by the late Murray Greason that the FLOWER presents this page in memoriam to him.
