RESET DANGERS: IF YOU RESET YOUR VZ VIA AN ON/OFF SWITCH OR RESET BUTTON THEN MAKE SURE DRIVE DOOR IS OPEN OTHERWISE THE DIRECTORY TRACK COULD BE WIPED OUT MAKING YOUR PROGRAMS INACCESSIBLE. GET IN THE HABIT OF OPENING DRIVE DOOR AFTER EVERY DISK ACCESS TO AVOID THE RISK AND MAKE BACKUPS OF YOUR WORK AS YOU GO.

DISKS: ONLY THE BOTTOM SIDE OF THE DISK IS USED FOR DATA STORAGE, NOT THE TOP AS MANY PERSONS BELIEVE. BY NOTCHING OTHER SIDE OF DISK YOU CAN STORE DATA THERE AS WELL SO DOUBLING YOUR STORAGE SPACE AND HALVING COSTS. I USE OTHER SIDE FOR BACKUPS SO THAT STORED DATA IS NOT ALL LOST IN CASE OF MISHAPS.

USING DOS COMMANDS IN A PROGRAM:

SOME BASIC CONVENTIONS WILL NOT WORK LIKE IN THE EXAMPLE BELOW, EG:

1000 IF A$="D" THEN DIR:STATUS

```

THE FIRST LINE WILL PRODUCE AN ERROR. IT IS CORRECT FOR BASIC BUT NOT FOR DOS AS IT REQUIRES A (:) COLON AFTER THE THEN AS SHOWN IN THE SECOND LINE AS DO ALL DOS COMMANDS.

DOS CANNOT USE VARIABLES FOR FILENAMES BUT CAN USE NON VARIABLE FORMAT AS IN THE TWO EXAMPLES BELOW, EG:

1030 IF A$="R" THEN:REN"SCREEN","PICTURE"

IN BOTH ABOVE LINES THE FILENAME MUST BE ENTERED INTO EACH LINE MANUALLY AND YOU MUST BREAK TO CHANGE THEM AND LOSE ALL VARIABLES IN THE PROCESS. NOTE THE COLONS AFTER THE THEN STATEMENTS. NEXT ISSUE I'LL EXPLAIN HOW TO GET AROUND THIS PROBLEM WHICH IS A FAIRLY SIMPLE.

LDIR:LSTATUS: THE VZ DOS DOES NOT HAVE A COMMAND FOR PRINTING OUT THE DIR OR STATUS FUNCTIONS BUT AS USUAL THERE'S A WAY AROUND IT, EG:

POKE30876,1:DIR:STATUS
```

SIMPLE ISN'T. IT WILL PRINT OUT ONLY ONCE AFTER WHICH YOU HAVE TO USE THE POKE AGAIN. MAKE SURE YOUR PRINTER IS ON LINE (READY) FOR PRINTING FIRST.

SUMMARY: THE VZ DOS LIKE THAT FOR MANY OTHER COMPUTERS CAN ONLY BENEFIT FROM IMPROVEMENTS AND THANKFULLY THERE ARE SOME VERY GOOD UTILITIES AROUND FOR IT. IF YOU HAVE A LOOK AT PAGE 20 OF THIS ISSUE YOU'LL SEE A COUPLE EXCELLENT DOS UTILITIES WRITTEN BY DAVE MITCHELL WHICH I USE ALL THE TIME.

IF YOU HAVE 2K OF BATTERY BACKED RAM INSTALLED AT 8000H JUST ABOVE THE DOS ROM THEN DAVE HAS VERSIONS FOR IT TOO. WHAT IT MEANS IS THAT THE DOS UTILITY IS AVAILABLE AT POWER UP JUST LIKE YOUR NORMAL DOS.

THE TRACK MAP OF YOUR DISK IS EXTENSIVELY USED BY THE SAVE, LOAD, DIR, STATUS AND DCOPY COMMANDS. IT KEEPS AN INDEX OF THE USED TRACKS AND SECTORS ON YOUR DISK. IT IS LOCATED ON SECTOR 0FH (15), TRACK ZERO. YOU NEED SOME UNDERSTANDING OF HEXADECIMAL TO FOLLOW THE LAYOUT OF THE TRACK MAP. ONE BIT OF A BYTE IS SET FOR EACH SECTOR THAT HAS BEEN USED. THE TOTAL NUMBER OF SECTORS PER TRACK IS 16. EACH BYTE CONTAINS 8 BITS. THEREFORE 2 BYTES ARE NEEDED TO DESCRIBE THE STATUS OF ONE TRACK.

THE DISK HAS 39 USABLE TRACKS, SO 78 BYTES ARE USED FOR THE ENTIRE TRACKMAP. THE TRACKS USED ARE NUMBERED FROM 1 TO 39, BUT ONLY THE SECTORS ARE SHOWN IN THE TRACKMAP. THE TRACKMAP IS COPIED INTO MEMORY EACH TIME THE DISK IS READ. THE MAP ADDRESS IS LOCATED AT $1Y + 34H$, OR 53 BYTES ABOVE YOUR TOP OF MEMORY ADDRESS.

THUS WHEN ALL SECTORS ARE USED ON A TRACK, THIS IS REPRESENTED AS FFFFH IN THE TRACKMAP. IF ONE SECTOR IS USED, THIS WILL BE SECTOR NUMBER 00, AND IT WILL BE REPRESENTED AS 0100H IN THE TRACKMAP.

IN THE COURSE OF NORMAL USE OF A DISK, YOU WILL ONLY SEE THE HEX NUMBERS 1,3,7,F IN THE TRACKMAP. IF ANY OTHER NUMBERS APPEAR, THEN THIS IS DUE TO THE ERASING OF SOME SECTORS.

E.G. 00000010 00000000 BINARY (0200H) REPRESENTS A TRACK IN WHICH ONLY THE SECTOR WHICH IS INDEXED IN THE DIRECTORY IS SECTOR NUMBER 1 (THE SECOND SECTOR ON THE TRACK).

WITH THE UNDERSTANDING OF THE TRACKMAP FIRMLY IN YOUR GRASP, YOU CAN NOW GO ON TO UNDERSTAND THE WAY IN WHICH DATA IS SAVED IN THE DIRECTORY. AS EACH SECTOR IS USED, THE TRACKMAP IS AUTOMATICALLY UPDATED. YOU RISK LOSING "TRACK" OF YOUR FILES IF YOU INTERFERE WITH THE TRACKMAP. BE CAREFUL.

A TYPICAL SECTOR 0FH (TRACK 1), ON AN ALMOST FULLY USED DISK, WOULD LOOK LIKE THIS (WHEN VIEWED WITH A SECTOR EDITOR):-

AS YOU CAN SEE, A LOT OF SPACE IS LEFT UNUSED IN THIS SECTOR OF THE DISK. THE LAST ENTRY IN THE TRACKMAP ABOVE IS 7F00. THIS MEANS THAT TRACK 39 SECTORS 00-06 HAVE BEEN USED. THE SECTORS 07-0F (9 SECTORS) ARE FREE IN TRACK 39. IF YOU LOOKED AT THIS DISK WITH THE STATUS COMMAND, YOU WOULD SEE:-

9 RECORDS 1.125K BYTES FREE

THIS INFORMATION IS OBTAINED FROM THE TRACKMAP AND CONVERTED INTO USEFUL DATA FOR YOU. THE TOTAL NUMBER OF SECTORS PER DISK IS 39 TRACKS OF 16 SECTORS = 624 RECORDS. EACH SECTOR HOLDS 128 BYTES (0.125K). THE AMOUNT OF DATA THAT CAN BE STORED ON A DISK IS 128 TIMES 624 = 79872 BYTES. DIVIDE THIS BY 1024 AND YOU GET 78K BYTES.

8 BIT INPUT PORT BY GARY BULLEY . . .

WHILE WORKING ON MY LATEST PROJECT FOR THE VZ THE NEED AROSE FOR AN 8 BIT DATA ENTRY PORT. AFTER STUDYING THE CIRCUIT DIAGRAM OF THE VZ PRINTER INTERFACE I FOUND THAT BY ADDING ONE MORE IC AND AN ADDITIONAL INPUT SOCKET IT COULD EASILY BE MODIFIED TO DO THE JOB.

THE MODIFICATION CONSISTS BASICALLY OF MOUNTING A 20 PIN IC ON A SMALL PIECE OF VERO BOARD TO WHICH IS ATTACHED 11 FLYING LEADS WHICH IN TURN CONNECT TO A 15D TYPE SOCKET MOUNTED ON THE END OF THE PRINTER INTERFACE CASE. ADDRESS DECODING IS DONE BY USING THE EXISTING HARDWARE OF THE PRINTER INTERFACE MODULE AND THE INPUT PORT IS SELECTED BY READING INPUT PORT 1.

CONSTRUCTION :

START BY REMOVING THE 4 SCREWS THAT HOLD THE INTERFACE MODULE TOGETHER. CAREFULLY REMOVE THE TOP COVER WHICH WILL EXPOSE THE COPPER SIDE OF THE CIRCUIT BOARD. ON THE FLAT END OF THE COVER AND WELL TOWARDS THE TOP, SO AS TO CLEAR THE CIRCUIT BOARD, CUT OUT A HOLE TO FIT A 15 PIN 'D' SOCKET. THE SOCKET IS MOUNTED ON THE INSIDE OF THE LID SO LEAVE ENOUGH CLEARANCE AROUND THE SOCKET TO ALLOW SMOOTH ENTRY OF A PLUG.

THE NEXT STEP IS THE SMALL CIRCUIT BOARD. CUT A PIECE OF VERO BOARD AS SHOWN IN THE DIAGRAM AND WITH A SMALL DRILL BIT CUT THE COPPER TRACKS WHERE REQUIRED. SOLDER IN THE 6 BRIDGES AND A 20 PIN IC SOCKET. THERE ARE 8 X 100PF CERAMIC CAPACITORS USED ON THE DATA INPUT LINES.

SOLDER THESE IN PLACE AND THEN USING A SHORT LENGTH OF TINNED WIRE ON THE COPPER SIDE OF THE BOARD SOLDER A LINK FROM THE GROUND LEG OF THE CAPACITORS TO THE VERO BOARD GROUND RAIL. TWO PIECES OF STRIP HEADER SOCKET (8 PIN AND 10 PIN) ARE USED TO CONNECT THE VERO BOARD TO CORRESPONDING PINS ON THE PRINTER INTERFACE BOARD.

CHECK WITH THE DIAGRAM FOR THEIR CORRECT POSITION ON THE VERO BOARD AND SOLDER THEM IN PLACE. NEXT YOU WILL NEED 11 PIECES OF HOOKUP WIRE EACH ONE 80MM IN LENGTH WITH ITS ENDS STRIPPED AND TINNED. SOLDER 10 OF THESE IN PLACE ALONG THE IC SOCKET FROM PIN 1 TO 10 AND THE LAST PIECE AT PIN 19.

NOW TAKING CAREFULL NOTE OF THEIR ORIENTATION, SOLDER EACH LEAD INTO THE 'D' SOCKET. DOUBLE CHECK THE CIRCUIT BOARD THAT THERE IS NO SOLDER BRIDGES ETC. AND IF ALL IS OK INSERT THE 74LS245 IC AND SCREW THE 'D' SOCKET IN PLACE.

THE NEXT STEP IS TO CUT 2 PIECES OF STRIP HEADER, ONE PIECE 10 PINS THE OTHER PIECE 8 PINS. NOT ALL THE PINS ARE REQUIRED SO STUDY THE DIAGRAM CAREFULLY AND CUT THE ONES NOT NEEDED. THE FIRST PIN ON THE 10 PIN STRIP HAS TO BE BENT AT RIGHT-ANGLES. USE A PAIR OF PLIERS TO HOLD THE PLASTIC BODY OF THE STRIP WHILE DOING THIS SO AS TO AVOID THE PIN FROM SNAPPING AWAY FROM THE REST.

TIN THE REMAINING PINS. THE STRIPS NOW HAVE TO BE SOLDERED ONTO THE SOLDER PADS OF THE 74LS373 IC. BEFORE YOU START SOLDERING MAKE SURE THE STRIP WILL FIT OK IN ITS CORRECT POSITION AND NOT CAUSE ANY SHORT CIRCUITS ETC. SOLDER ONLY ONE PIN AT A TIME, MOVING IT IN TILL IT RESTS AGAINST THE LEG OF THE IC. MAKE SURE YOU SOLDER THE STRIPS DOWN THE CORRECT SIDES OF THE 74LS373 SO AS TO MAINTAIN THE CORRECT WIDTH BETWEEN THE STRIPS.

LASTLY A BRIDGE HAS TO BE SOLDERED BETWEEN THE PIN BENT AT RIGHT-ANGLES AND THE PORT SELECT PIN ON THE 74LS138. THERE ARE 2 CIRCUIT VERSIONS FOR THE PRINTER INTERFACE, IF YOUR PARTICULAR ONE HAS A DIFFERENT LAYOUT (WHEN VIEWED FROM THE COPPER SIDE) TO THE ONE DRAWN BELOW, YOU WILL HAVE TO LOCATE THE 74LS138 IC AND USE PIN 12.


IN THE VERSION DRAWN BELOW PIN 10 IS USED. ONCE THE BRIDGE IS SOLDERED IN PLACE PLUG IN THE VERO BOARD TO THE INTERFACE MODULE AND FOLD THE 11 LEADS TO ALLOW THE COVER TO BE SCREWED INTO PLACE.

TESTING :


START BY CHECKING THAT THE PRINTER INTERFACE STILL WORKS OK WITH THE PRINTER. ENTER AND RUN THE SIMPLE 3 LINE TEST PROGRAM. BECAUSE THERE IS NOTHING PLUGGED INTO THE PORT THE DATA LINES WILL BE FLOATING SO YOU WILL GET A RANDOM NUMBER DISPLAYED ON THE SCREEN. WITH A 4.7K RESISTOR SOLDERED TO A SHORT LENGTH OF WIRE, BRIDGE EACH DATA LINE TO EITHER +5V OR GROUND TO PRODUCE A CORRESPONDING BIT CHANGE IN THE NUMBER DISPLAYED.




VZ-200 PRINTER INTERFACE (EARLY VERSION)

CORRECTIONS:

VZ JOURNAL # 29 - THE TXD AND RXD SIGNALS ON DB9 & DB25 CONNECTORS WERE TRANSPOSED ON PAGE 14 WHILE THOSE ON PAGE 15 WERE CORRECT.

2ND SERIAL INTERFACE ON PAGE 14 - ALL SIGNALS LEFT OF DASHED LINE INCLUDING Q6 & Q7 WITH THE EXCEPTION OF +5V MUST GO TO 2ND VZ'S DISK CONTROLLER.

THERE WERE ALSO SOME ERRORS WITH CONSTRUCTION DETAILS THAT CAME WITH THE SOFTWARE.

- 1) MAX232 CHIP - PIN 7 (TXD) GOES TO PIN 2 OF DB25 CONNECTOR.
PIN 8 (RXD) GOES TO PIN 3 OF DB25 CONNECTOR.
- 2) 74LS47 MENTIONED IN THE INSTRUCTIONS AS U3A SHOULD BE 74LS74 AND IS A NEW CHIP. DO NOT CONFUSE IT WITH U10-74LS74 IN THE DISK CONTROLLER.
- 3) U6-74LS138 - PIN 16 HAS +5V NOT PIN 14 WHICH IS OUTPUT Q1.

CONSTRUCTION DETAILS:

IF YOU ARE BUILDING ONLY SINGLE RS-232 PORT THEN IT CAN ALL FIT INSIDE THE DISK CONTROLLER QUITE EASILY AND ONE LESS IC IS REQUIRED, NAMELY THE 74LS125.

MAX232 PINOUT: IT SHOWS CAPACITOR CONNECTIONS AND THEIR ORIENTATION. BOTH ELECTROLYTIC AND TANTALUM CAPACITORS ARE SUITABLE WITH THE LATTER BEING SMALLER BUT MORE EXPENSIVE. THE CAPACITOR VOLTAGE RATINGS MIGHT NEED EXPLAINING TO SOME CONSTRUCTORS.

HIGHER VOLTAGE RATINGS CAN BE USED BUT NOT LOWER AND YOU MAY FIND IT DIFFICULT TO GET 16V TYPE AND UP TO 35V ARE OK, BUT THE SMALLER THE VOLTAGE RATING, THE SMALLER THE CAPACITOR NORMALLY AND SIZE IS IMPORTANT IN THIS PROJECT. OK TO USE 10UF-22UF FOR C1-C4 AS THE CAPACITY VALUE IS NOT CRITICAL.

VERO BOARD: ONLY A SMALL PIECE IS REQUIRED, 8 HOLES ACROSS AND TEN STRIPS DOWN. CUT 8 TRACKS ON THE VERO BOARD AS INDICATED BY THE X'S. FIT TWO LINK WIRES NEXT. SOLDER THE THREE WIRES FOR J2 FROM THE COPPER SIDE NEXT, AS C1 HAS TO GO ON TOP AND BE BENT OVER.

CAPACITORS: ALL CAPACITORS MUST BE BENT 90 DEG'S TOWARDS THE SIDES JUST CLEARING EDGE BEFORE SOLDERING IN TO REDUCE HEIGHT.

C1-C3 & C5: FIT THE LEADS IN FROM THE TOP AND BEND OVER TOWARDS THE EDGDE AND SOLDER IN.

C4: FIT A BIT OF SLEEVING OVER THE NEGATIVE LEG TO AVOID THE POSSIBILTY OF SHORTING AND BEND THE LEG AS DEPICTED IN THE DIAGRAM AND SOLDER IT IN PLACE.

MAX 232: SOLDER IN MAX232 CHIP WITHOUT A SOCKET AGAIN TO REDUCE HEIGHT. PUT VERO BOARD MODULE NEAR 44 WAY EDGE CONNECTOR TO GET IDEA FOR THE LENGHT OF THE 4 CONNECTING WIRES WHICH YOU SOLDER IN NEXT. AT THIS TIME YOU CAN ALSO SOLDER ON THE 3.5 MM STEREO SOCKET.

74LS74: BEND ALL PINS EXCEPT PIN 7 & 14 AT RIGHT ANGLES AND PLACE IT OVER U3-74LS32 IN DISK CONTROLLER AND SOLDER PINS 7 & 14 OF THE 74LS74 TO IT WHICH SUPPLY GND AND +5V TO THE 74LS74. MAKE SURE PIN 7 OF 74LS74 IS SOLDERED TO PIN 7 OF 74LS32 AND THAT PIN 14 IS SOLDERED TO PIN 14.

WITH A SHORT LENGTH OF BARE WIRE JOIN PINS 1, 2, 3, 4 & 13 TO PIN 14 AS SHOWN ON THE DIAGRAM. SOLDER THE 4K7 RESISTOR ON NEXT AND TRIM THE LEADS. CONNECT THE REMAINING WIRES BETWEEN U4, U6, U7, PIGGY BACKED 74LS74 AND MAX232 MODULE NEXT. IT SHOULD BE EASIER FOLLOWING WIRING DETAILS ON THE DIAGRAM THAN A BLOW BY BLOW DESCRIPTION.

CHECK ALL YOUR WORK FOR SHORTS OR ERRORS ESPECIALLY BETWEEN IC PINS. WRAP MAX232 MODULE IN THIN CARDBOARD TO PREVENT SHORTS AND FIT 3.5 MM STEREO SOCKET IN THE BOTTOM RIGHT ABOUT 3 CM'S FROM THE REAR. AFTER TESTING UNIT OUT AND ALL OK AND IF FITTING RF SHIELD BACK ON THEN THE FRONT OF THE SHIELD WILL HAVE TO BE BENT UP 90 DEG'S TO CLEAR MAX232 MODULE.

TESTING: THIS IS GOING TO BE THE DIFFICULT PART IF YOU HAVEN'T A SECOND VZ WITH DRIVE AND DISK CONTROLLER. IT WILL WORK WITH ANOTHER COMPUTER PROVIDING IT HAS A RS-232 PORT. THE COMMODORE 64 IS NOT SUITABLE AS THE SIGNALS ARE INVERTED. I HAVEN'T BUILT MY UNIT YET, SO I CAN'T ADVISE ON TESTING EXCEPT THAT YOU FOLLOW INSTRUCTIONS SENT WITH THE SOFTWARE.

U7-74LS125: IT HAS FOUR TRISTATE BUFFERS AND ONLY THREE ARE USED BY THE DISK CONTROLLER. THE BLOCK DIAGRAM DEPICTS ALL BUFFERS INCLUDING THE SPARE ONE WHICH WE CAN PRESS INTO SERVICE.

Piggy-backing: THE DIAGRAM SHOWS HOW THE PINS ARE BENT OUT AND CHIP SOLDERED ONTO THE ONE BELOW. IN PRACTICE THE CHIPS WILL BE CLOSER THAN DEPICTED.

U2-74LS138: THE DISK CONTROLLER ONLY USES FOUR OUTPUTS, Q0-Q3 WITH Q4-Q7 BEING SPARE AND PETER AND ANDY HAVE CLEVERLY UTILISED TWO OF THE UNUSED OUTPUTS.

74LS74: FOR A SINGLE RS-232 PORT ONLY THE MAX232 AND 74LS74 CHIPS ARE NEEDED WITH THE UNUSED INPUTS ON THE LATTER TAKEN TO +5V TO PREVENT POSSIBLE OSCILLATION.

3.5 mm STEREO SOCKET: A ROUND METAL TYPE AS SOLD BY D. SMITH IS OK AND IS THE ONE WHICH I'VE CHOSEN FOR MY OWN USE. FILE THE FLANGE DOWN ON ONE SIDE SO IT CAN SIT FLUSH ON THE BOTTOM OF THE CASE. TRY TO GET ONE WITH A NUT AS THEY ARE EASIER TO FIT.

CASES: IF BUILDING YOUR UNIT INTO A CASE THEN I WOULDN'T ADVISE THE ONES FROM D. SMITH AS THEY HAVE INTERNAL RIBBING WHICH MAKE IT DIFFICULT TO MOUNT SOCKETS, SWITCHES, ETC. THE ONES FROM TANDY DON'T SUFFER FROM ABOVE PROBLEM.

USING YOUR RS-232 PORT: PETER AND ANDY HICKMAN HAVE PROVIDED VZ USERS WITH A RS-232 PORT TOGETHER WITH A PROGRAM TO DRIVE IT. AT THIS STAGE I KNOW OF NO OTHER PROGRAM AROUND FOR IT. THE PORT CAN'T BE USED WITH A PRINTER WITH A SERIAL INPUT PORT SIMPLY BECAUSE AT THIS TIME THERE'S NO PRINTER PATCH OR HARDWARE INTERFACE THAT I KNOW OF FOR IT.

IN MY OWN CASE I'LL BE USING IT TO TRANSFER DATA BACK AND FORTH BETWEEN THE VZ AND IBM PC COMPATIBLE WHICH HAS A SPARE RS-232 PORT AND WITH A MODEM WHICH I HOPE TO ACQUIRE BEFORE CHRISTMAS. AT OUR LAST CLUB MEETING PETER JONES DEMONSTRATED HIS DUAL VERSION WHICH WILL ALSO BE SHOWN AT THE NEWCASTLE COMPUTER SHOW.

THERE ARE SOME UNDOCUMENTED FUNCTIONS WITH BOTH BASIC AND DOS WHICH ARE HANDY TO KNOW AND WHICH THE INSTRUCTION BOOKS DON'T TELL YOU ABOUT, ESPECIALLY DOS WHICH CAN BE A BIT DANGEROUS AT TIMES.

LIST & LLIST DOT: THE DOT IS AN UNDOCUMENTED EXTENSION OF THE L/LIST COMMAND AND IS A VERY USEFUL FUNCTION.

- L/LIST. * L/LISTS LAST LINE THAT RETURN WAS ENTERED.
- L/LIST.- * L/LISTS FROM LAST LINE RETURN PRESSED TO END OF PROGRAM.
- L/LIST-. * L/LISTS FROM START TO LINE THAT RETURN WAS LAST PRESSED.
- L/LIST.-X * L/LISTS FROM LINE RETURN LAST PRESSED TO DESIGNATED LINE NUMBER.
- L/LISTX-. * L/LISTS FROM DESIGNATED LINE NUMBER TO LINE THAT RETURN WAS LAST PRESSED.

THERE ARE PROBLEMS AS YOU CAN'T EDIT THE EXTRA LINES AND ONCE YOU PRESS RETURN OVER LINE 10 YOU LOSE EXTRA LINES. IT'S OF DOUBIOUS VALUE BUT THE FUNCTION IS THERE FOR THOSE WHO WANT TO USE IT.

REM OR ('): THE (') SINGLE QUOTE CAN BE USED IN PLACE OF THE REM STATEMENT AND IS VERY HANDY IF YOU NEED TO SQUEEZE IN AN EXTRA ONE OR TWO CHARACTERS IN A LINE.

INVERSE TEXT: SOME OF YOU HAVE FOUND PROBLEMS PLACING INVERSE TEXT IN A REM STATEMENT, BUT THERE IS A WAY, EG:

THE FIRST LINE IS WHAT WE NORMALLY ENTER WHILE THE SECOND IS SHORTENED VERSION, BUT 500 AFTER THE COLON WILL NOT WORK AS YOU NEED A GOTO OR A GOSUB AND IS A CASE WHERE THEY MUST BE USED. THIRD LINE WILL WORK WITH NO PROBLEMS. GOSUB CANNOT BE LEFT OUT AND I KNOW OF NO OTHER SYMBOL WHICH WILL DO ITS FUNCTION.

COMMA PROBLEMS: THE COMMA CAN CAUSE PROBLEMS WITH RENUMBERING ROUTINES IN SOME EXTENDED BASICS, EG:

IT'S A PECULIARITY OF SOME RENUMBERING ROUTINES.

MODE (X) : NOT MANY PERSONS REALISE THAT A VARIABLE CAN BE USED TO SWITCH BETWEEN MODE(0) AND MODE(1). TYPE IN THE DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM BELOW AND TRY IT OUT.
