PREFACE.

On the 29th of November, 1867, at a meeting of the Committee of Town Council on the Galleries, it was moved by Mr. Couper, and seconded by the Lord Provost, that an Exhibition of Portraits should be opened in the Galleries lately formed, towards the end of January or the beginning of February; the Exhibition to consist of Portraits of deceased persons, especially of those who have been connected with Glasgow—with its University and other public institutions—with its Municipality, manufactures, and trades, as well as of those who have been distinguished at home or abroad. This proposal was approved of by the Town Council at a meeting held on the 5th December following, and a Committee was appointed to carry the resolution into effect.


The collection of Portraits now exhibited in the new Galleries consists of three hundred and ninety-seven pictures in oil, twenty-seven in water colours, fifteen in crayons, and twenty-six are busts or medallions. Of these Works of Art, two hundred and fifty have been lent by residents in Glasgow, twenty-eight have been brought from Edinburgh, fifty from Lanarkshire, twenty-three from Dumbartonshire, twelve from Ayrshire, twelve from Renfrewshire, ten from Stirlingshire, three from Perthshire, three from Argyleshire, three from Berwickshire, two from Fifeshire, one from Inverness, and four from London. Most of those from the counties of Lanark, Dumbarton, Renfrew, Ayr, and Argyle, are the property of contributors intimately connected with Glasgow by family ties or business connections. By far the greatest number of the Portraits have been painted by artists of the Scottish school. Thirty-eight are by the late Sir Henry Raeburn, R.A.; twelve by the late Sir John Watson Gordon, R.A.; fifty-nine by the late Mr. John Graham Gilbert, R.S.A.; one by the late Mr. George Watson, first President of the Royal Scottish Academy; * two by the late Mr. Dyce, R.A.; three by the late Mr. Andrew Geddes, A.R.A.; seven by the late Mr. John D. Gibson, W.S.A.; four by the late Mr. Thomas Duncan, A.R.A.; and one by Alexander Nasmyth. Of those by living artists, forty-four are by Mr. Macnee, R.S.A.; two by Sir Francis Grant, P.R.A.; two by Mr. Napier; and a number of others by artists who have resided in Glasgow. No less than ninety pictures are returned in the lists by contributors as by artists whose names are unknown or forgotten.

Amongst the pictures by eminent English artists, there are—one by Sir Joshua Reynolds, P.R.A.; three by Mr. Thomas Gainsborough, R.A.; one by Sir Martin Shee, P.R.A.; two by Sir Thomas Lawrence, P.R.A.; four by Mr. John Partridge; one by Mr. Phillips, R.A.; one by Mr. Pickersgill; and a few others. The Busts are by the late Mr. James Fillans; the late Mr. Patric Park; Mr. John Mossman; Mr. G. E. Ewing; Mr. Robert Kauer, and others.

These Portraits are arranged in five rooms and galleries; the oldest pictures being placed by themselves in the two smallest rooms, and the more modern ones in the east, west, and south galleries.







NUMBERING OF THE PORTRAITS AND ORDER OF THE CATALOGUE.

First, The Numbers commence in the Vestibule to the Right of the Hall of Sculpture.

Second, The Numbers are continued in the West Gallery, entering from the Vestibule.

Third, The Numbers follow in order in the South Gallery.

Fourth, The Numbers are continued in the East Gallery, and are completed in the Vestibule leading into the Sculpture Hall.

Born, 1713; died, 1760.

Merchant in Glasgow, and engaged in the tobacco trade with America. A Bailie 1749-1753. Father of Thomas Donald (No. 14), and grandfather of Colin D. Donald (No. 224).

Lent by James Dunlop, Esq. of Tolcross.

2 George Murdoch.

A Bailie 1744-1747; Dean of Guild 1750-51; and Provost of Glasgow in 1754-55.

PAINTER—The picture is inscribed Alexander Pingebat, 1757.

3 Mrs. Murdoch.

Her maiden name was Bogle, of Hamilton Farm, and she became wife of George Murdoch, No. 2.

PAINTER, Gavin Hamilton.

Lent by Miss Dunlop, Gogar Mount.

4 Colin Dunlop of Carmyle.

Born, 7th January, 1706; died, 13th August, 1777.

Sixth son of James Dunlop of Garnkirk, an extensive merchant in Glasgow, and one of the "Virginia Dons:" principal partner and one of the founders of the Old Ship Bank in 1750. A Bailie in 1747 and 1761; Dean of Guild 1759-60; and Lord Provost in 1770. His handsome town residence still stands on the south side of Argyle Street, the second east from Dunlop Street, which was named after him. Father of Nos. 229 and 230, Grandfather of No. 231, and great-grandfather of James Dunlop, Esq., of Tolcross.

5 James Gordon.

Died at Glasgow, 1803.

Merchant in Glasgow, and apprentice to, and thereafter son-in-law of John Glassford of Dougalston and associated with him in business; a member of the Merchants' House, a magistrate of the Gorbals and youngest merchant Bailie of Glasgow, 1789.

6 CAPTAIN THOMAS MAXWELL.

Time of William III.

Son-in-law of Bass John Spreull.

7 JOHN SPREULL.

Born, 1657; died, 1722.

Intercommuned for Non-conformity; twice tortured before the Duke of York and the Committee of Privy Council of Scotland; 14th June, 1681, detained in prison; and 14th July fined £500 stg. and sent to the Bass. He lay there six years, whence, "from his long continuance in that place," Wodrow adds, "he has got the compellation of Bass John Spreull, whereof he need not be ashamed." The Duke of York said of him, that "Mr. Spreull was more dangerous than five hundred common people."

8 ALEXANDER, Earl of Eglinton.

Born, 1590; died, 1661.

Commonly called Grey Steel. Great-great-grandfather of Lady Euphemia Montgomerie, wife to George Lockhart, of Carnwarth.

9 SIR GEORGE LOCKHART of Carnwarth.

Born about 1634; died, 1689.

"Precedent" of the Court of Session.

Painter unknown.

10 SIR WILLIAM LOCKHART of Lee.

Born, 1621; died, 1675.

Lieutenant-General, and Ambassador at the Court of France; elder brother of Sir George Lockhart. Painter unknown.

11 John Maxwell of Williamwood.

An advocate, and Sheriff principal of Renfrewshire; descended from the Maxwells' of Auldhouse; a branch from the family of the Maxwells of Pollok; married in 1691, Elizabeth, daughter of Henry Wardrop of Dalmarnock.

12 JAMES SPREULL.

Born, 1699; died at Glasgow, 1769.

Son of Bass John. Merchant in Glasgow. Treasurer of the City in 1753, and a Bailie in 1755. He left some money to the Town's Hospital, the Merchants' House, and to the Society for propagating Christian Knowledge in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland.

13 RONALD CRAUFORD.

A citizen of Glasgow.

PAINTER, William Cochran.

14 THOMAS DONALD of Geilston.

Born, 1745; died, 1798.

Merchant in Glasgow. Son of James Donald (No. 1), and father of Colin D. Donald (No. 224).

Painter unknown.

15 ROBERT DONALD of Mountblow.

Born, 1724; died at Mountblow about 1800.

Virginia merchaut. A Bailie from 1765 till 1763, and Lord Provost of the City of Glasgow in 1776-1777. Took an active part in raising a regiment for H.M. Service. Brother of Jas. Donald (No. 1),

Painted in London in 1762.

16 Robert Hamiltone.

Flourished at the end of the 16th and beginning of the 17th centuries.

Mr. Robert Hamiltone, "Professoure of Medecine," so styled in the charter of the Incorporation of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons, 1599. When the charter was granted it is probable that doctor of medicine, and professor of medicine were synonymous terms; at all events, there was no professor of medicine in the University for many years afterwards. Mr. Hamiltone was the first I resident of the Faculty, and was one of the commissioners for settling the differences between the merchants and crafts in 1604.

17 Dr. Peter Lowe.

Flourished at the close of the 16th and commencement of the 17th centuries.

An eminent Surgeon. He was author of "A Discourse on the whole Art of Chyrurgerie," which passed through six editions. In the second edition, published in 1612, he styles himself in the title-page, "Peter Lowe, Scottishman, Doctor in the Facultie of Chirurgerie at Paris, and Ordinary Chyrurgion to the French King and Navarre." He practised twenty-two years in France and Flanders, had been two years surgeon to the Spanish regiments at Paris, and had followed the King of France, Henry IV., six years in his wars before he settled in Glasgow, about 1595. He found the practice of medicine and surgery in Glasgow and the West of Scotland in the hands of "cosoners, quack-salvers, charlitans, witches, charmers, and divers other sorts of abusers;" on a representation of which to James VI., "His Majestie and Honourable Councell thought not to be tolerated," and granted to Dr. Lowe and others, in 1599, the charter of Incorporation of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons, in which he is designed as "Maister Peter Lowe, our Chirurgiane, and Chief Chirurgiane to oure dearest son the Prince." From the records of the city it is evident that he was a leading citizen in his day, he was one of the commissioners for the settlement of the differences between the merchants and crafts in 1604. His tomb, with a quaint inscription, is on the south wall of the Cathedral burying-ground, near the entrance gate. It is now the property of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons.

18 WILLIAM SPANG.

Flourished at the end of the 16th and beginning of the 17th centuries.

In the charter of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons, 1599, he is thus referred to:—"That na manir of personis sell onic droggis within the citie of Glasgow, except the sam be sightit be the saidis visitouris and be William Spang, apothecar, under the paine of confiscationne of the droggis."

19 Henry Marshall.

Living in 1720.

Surgeon in Glasgow.

PAINTER, School of Sir Godfrey Kneller.

20 John Hamilton, D.D.

Born about 1670; died about 1735.

Minister of the College Church, Glasgow. Father of the Rev. John Hamilton, D.D. (No. 84), and grandfather of John Hamilton of Northpark (No. 131).

21 ALEXANDER HORSBURGH.

Lived, 1700—1764.

Surgeon in Glasgow.

PAINTER, School of Sir Godfrey Kneller

Lent by Major Cumming Bruce of Dumphail, M.P.

22 James Bruce of Kinnaird.

Born at Kinnaird House, December 14th, 1730; died at Kinnaird, April 27th, 1794.

The Abyssinian traveller. The history of this likeness is interesting. When Mr. Bruce went to Algiers as Resident in 1762, he was engaged to be married, on his return, to Miss Murray, of

Polmaise. On his way to Africa, he wrote from Rome-"I begin sitting to-morrow to the best painter in Italy; but, as he paints only in oil, I am obliged to sit for a head, as it is called-that is, the same size as Mrs. Nisbet's; and the miniature is to be copied from that picture by the best painter of miniatures in Italy, who is a lady. This is as certain a way of your having as good a picture as the subject will admit of." Miss Murray was very delicate; her brother took her to Italy for her health, so that she might sooner meet her intended husband. There they heard that he had perished in Abyssinia, and she was unwillingly persuaded to marry the Marchese Accoromboni. Some time after, on the return of Mr. Bruce homewards, they met unexpectedly in the theatre at Florence. The lady fainted. Next day the gentlemen met and fought. The Marchesa pined away and died, leaving a daughter, who was placed in a convent, and subsequently sought for in vain by her uncle, Mr. Murray, of Polmaise."

PAINTER, Pompeo Battoni.

No. 23 John Maxwell of Williamwood.

Grandson of John Maxwell (No. 11.) Married, in 1761, Martha, daughter of John Baird of Craigton. Painter unknown.

24 James Thomson.

Died at Glasgow, 1717.

Tanner in Glasgow. He bequeathed twelve thousand merks to the Trades' House, for the maintenance of six poor old men of the trades' rank, amongst whom the interest is divided quarterly. The names, Thomson or Peddie, to be preferred for the pensions.

No. 25 James Muirhead.

Born in Glasgow, 1657; died in Glasgow, 1727.

Baker in Glasgow. He gifted to the incorporation of bakers five hundred merks, and bequeathed to that incorporation six thousand merks, that the interest might be applied towards the support of three poor old freemen thereof; and five hundred merks, that interest might be applied every second year in paying apprentice-fee of a boy descended of honest parents, and one thousand merks to the General Session of Glasgow, that the interest might be distributed among the general poor yearly—by deeds dated 4th, 16th March, and 21st November, 1726.

26 John Stevenson.

Deacon of the Corporation of Cordiners. Left his means and estate to the corporation, with the burden of portion to his children and oyes, and of 200 merks to be distributed yearly among the poor of the trade.

27 JOHN BELL, Minister.

Died at a great age in 1641.

He was inducted in 1592 to St. Mary's or Tron Kirk, and was the first minister in it after it became a Presbyterian place of worship. In 1604 he was chosen, with Sir George Elphingston, Knight, Provost, and others, as Oversmen and Oddsmen in the submission between the merchants and craftsmen of the city, which resulted in the famous Letter of Guildry of 1605. In the year 1637 he was appointed, as the oldest minister in the bounds, to preach the opening sermon before the Great General Assembly held that year in Glasgow. He was father-in-law of George Luke, of Merkdaily father of John Luke, of Claythorn. (No. 29.)

No.

28 JOHN ANDERSON, Elder of Dowhill.

Merchant in Glasgow. Treasurer of the City in 1646; a Bailie in 1646-1652, and thereafter till 1655; and Lord Provost of Glasgow in 1667-68. appears to have been one of the earliest foreign merchants of Glasgow. M'Ure, in his account of the Seaadventurers, trading to sundry places in Europe, Africa, and America, since 1668, says, "Before this time John Anderson, elder and younger, of Dowhill, James Peadie of Roughill, John Luke of Claythorn, Ninian Anderson, and Captain John Anderson, owners of the ship "Providence," first imported cherry sacke to Glasgow." He was also partner in the Soap Work established in 1667, of which Sir George Maxwell of Polok, Sir John Bell of Hamilton Farm, John Graham of Dougalston, John Luke of Claythorn, and others were partners. The capital of this joint stock concern, which M'Ure considered worthy of historical mention, was only £13,500. Sir John Moore was a descendant of the above Provost Anderson through his grandmother Marion Anderson, daughter of Provost John Anderson, younger, of Dowhill, who married the Reverend Charles Moore of Stirling. Provost John Anderson, the elder, was father-in-law of John Luke of Claythorn. (No. 29).

Painter unknown.

29 John Luke, Elder of Claythorn.

Died in 1702.

Merchant in Glasgow. Master of Works in 1646, and Treasurer of the City in 1652, 1654, and 1669. He was concerned with his father-in-law, John Anderson, elder, of Dowhill, as a "sea adventurer," and joint proprietor of the ship "Providence;" and also as a partner in the soap work established in 1667. This "Soaperie" stood at the head of what is now the Candleriggs; so named after it. This John Luke was the grandfather of Robert Luke. (No. 31).

30 John Stirling.

Born, 1677; died 1736.

He was a Bailie in 1716, 1724, and Lord Provost of the City of Glasgow in 1723-29. The name of "John Stirling, late Provost," appears in M'Urc's list of Merchants "trading to Virginia, Carribey Islands, &c." Provost Stirling was the great grandson of Walter Stirling, Merchant in Glasgow, who was Dean of Guild in 1637, and died 1656. He was the father of William Stirling (born 1717) who established the calico-printing firm of William Stirling & Sons, still existing in this city. He was also uncle of Bailie Walter Stirling, who founded Stirling's Library. His second daughter, Janet, (born 1707, died 1800), was married to Robert Luke (No. 31.)

Painter unknown.

31 ROBERT LUKE.

Born about 1700; died, 1752.

Goldsmith and brewer. Treasurer of the City in 1730. M Ure, writing in 1737, says, in his account of "public works" within the City, "There is a stately brewarie belonging to Robert Luke, Goldsmith, consisting of a large kiln, lofts, cellars, and other store-houses, with all easements, and other pertinents thereto belonging." This "brewarie" stood in the Gallowgate, on the "brook or rivolet Molandinar." He is also mentioned by M'Ure as one of the proprietors of an "Iron Manufactory," situated near the "great key or harbour of the Broomielaw," for manufacturing "all sorts of iron works, from a lock and key, to an anchor of the greatest size." Robert Luke was the grandson of John Luke of Claythorn (No. 29), and married Janet (born 1707), second daughter of Provost John Stirling (No. 30). His eldest daughter, Isobel, was married to George Bogle, merchant in Glasgow; and their daughter, Janet Bogle, was married to John Stirling, of Tilliechewan (No. 398). Mrs. Luke survived her husband 48 years, and at her death in 1800, left the Luke family portraits to her greatgrandson, William Stirling (No. 65).

32 Peter Murdocii.

Born at Glasgow, 1670; died at Glasgow, 1761.

Merchant and sugar refiner. Lord Provost of Glasgow in 1730-1. This gentleman, with his son, John Murdoch, Provost in 1746-7, 1750-1, 1758-9; his son-inlaw, Andrew Cochran, Provost 1744-5; his cousin, John M'Ure alias Campbell, Clerk to the Registration of Saisines, and other evidents for the city of Glasgow, town-clerk (the historian), with others of his family, managed the affairs of the city till the year 1768.

Painter unknown.

33 JOHN WALLACE of Cessnock and Kelly.

Born at Cairnhill, 1712; died at Kelly, 1805.

For many years a leading West India merchant in Glasgow. He was father of the late Robert Wallace, M.P. for Greenock, and of the late Sir James Maxwell Wallace, K.H. Sce No. 459.

34 Peter Murdoch.

Born, 1704; died, 1734.

Merchant. Married in August, 1732, to Margaret, youngest daughter of Sir Archibald Stewart, of Blackhall, Bart.

Painter unknown.

Lent by T. Craig Christie, Esq. of Bedlay.

35 John Craig of Auchinearn.

Born, 1737; died at Glasgow, 1814.

An ironmonger in Glasgow, and a large burgage proprietor in St. Andrew's and Charlotte Streets.

The latter formed part of the lands acquired by him from Bailie Luke.

36 Mrs. Jean Blair or Craig.

Born at Glasgow, 1749; died, 1818.
Wife of John Craig, Esq., of Auchinearn.
Painter unknown.

37 GEORGE MILNE.

Born at Edinburgh; died at Glasgow.

Goldsmith in Glasgow about a century ago; elected a councillor, 1775, and bailie of Glasgow, 1777; married Miss Louden, aunt of the late Lord Jeffrey, who, while attending Glasgow College, lodged with his aunt.

38 ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL of Succoth.

Born about 1650; died about 1710.

Governor for a time of the Castle of Dumbarton. Father of Sir Islay Campbell, Bart., Lord-President of the Court of Session (No. 283).

Painter unknown.

39 HELEN WALLACE OF CAMPBELL.

Born at Ellerslie, 1712; died at Garseube, 1767. Heiress of John Wallace, of Ellerslie; married Archibald Campbell, of Succoth.

Lent by Mrs. Patrick, Athole Place.

40-48 Eight Portraits of the Dunlops of Garnkirk.

The first proprietor of Garnkirk, named Dunlop, was John, third son of James Dunlop, of Dunlop, and he purchased it in 1630. His son, grandson, and great-grandson succeeded. The first James married in 1654 Elizabeth Robertson, daughter of Lord Bedlay. Their daughter was twice married, first in 1680 to Robert Campbell of Northwoodside, second son of Colin Campbell of Blythswood; and secondly, in 1697, to Patrick

Coutts, Merchant in Edinburgh. The eldest son of this last marriage, Lord Provost of Edinburgh, in 1742, founded in that city the banking house of Coutts, Brothers, and Co., afterwards Sir William Forbes and Co. Two of the younger sons of Provost Coutts founded the still existing banking house in London. Thomas Coutts, the great-grandson of the first James Dunlop, of Garnkirk, died in 1822, aged about 90, leaving his large fortune to his granddaughter, Miss Burdett Coutts. The Dunlops are an Ayrshire family. The first that is mentioned as Dunlop of that ilk is in the year 1260. The lineal representative of the Garnkirk branch of the family is Judge Dunlop, of Georgetown, Maryland, United States. The representative in this country is James Dunlop, Esquire of Tol-These portraits are the property of cross. Mrs. Patrick, great-grand-daughter of the last proprietor of the estate in the direct line. No. 47, portrait of a boy, represents James Dunlop of Garnkirk, brother of Colin Dunlop of Carmyle, Lord Provost of Glasgow.

49 Andrew Buchanan of Drumpellier.

Born, 1691; died 1759.

Merchant. Dean of Guild 1729-30, 1740-41, and Lord Provost of Glasgow in 1746. He along with his brothers, Neil and Archibald, founded the Buchanan Society. He was also one of the founders of the Ship Bank, established in 1750.

Painter unknown.

50 George Buchanan of Mount Vernon.

Born, 1725; died, 1762.

Merchant in Glasgow. Second son of Provost Andrew Buchanan, of Drumpellier. He opened Virginia Street.

51 ROBERT TENNENT.

Born, 1671; died, 1741.

Merchant in Glasgow, and Bailie in 1720-1723. He bequeathed to the Town's Hospital £850 sterling.

52 GEORGE SCOTT.

Born, 1730; died at London, 1767.

Merchant in the East Indies. Bequeathed £100 stg. to the poor of the Town's Hospital.

Painter unknown.

As soon as he could form or announce a wish, he declared that he would be a minister. When a mere child he was found standing on a chair preaching vigorously from the text, "Let brotherly love continue." In 1791, when not yet twelve years old, he entered the United College of St. Andrews as a student; and in 1795 he was enrolled a student of divinity. Although he showed more predilection for mathematics and chemistry than theology, yet when the young student in his turn conducted the devotional exercises in the public hall, he attracted crowds to listen to him. On leaving college he became tutor in a family, where he was ill-used; and when nineteen he was licensed as a preacher. He preached his first sermon at Wigan, on the 25th August, Having studied in the University of 1799. Edinburgh in 1801, he became assistant minister at Cavers. In 1803 he was appointed assistant to the Professor of mathematics at St. Andrews. His brilliant lectures proved very attractive. In 1803 he was presented to the living of Kilmany. In 1814 he was elected by the Town Council of Glasgow minister of the Tron parish: he was by this time the most powerful preacher in the Scottish Church. In 1817 he preached for the first time in London, his marvellous eloquence attracting crowds to hear him, amongst whom were the greatest in

the land for intellect and power, who freely acknowledged his superiority. In 1819, when he was minister of St. John's, the Town Council of Glasgow gave him power to carry out his principles for the relief of the poor. At this time, the Rev. Edward Irving became his assistant. In 1823, Dr. Chalmers was elected Professor of moral philosophy at St. Andrews, and in 1828 to the divinity chair in Edinburgh, which he resigned at the Disruption, and took the lead in the organization of the Free Church of Scotland. In 1845, he retired from the weighty duties of leadership, and devoted his attention principally to his duties as Professor, "for a more special and intense care of those students who are to the Church her future guides and guardians." On the 31st May, 1847, this noble spirit passed away.

He wrote the article Glasgow for "Brewster's Encyclopædia," and published in 1816, "The Annals of Glasgow," in two volumes, and subsequently many works on statistical subjects. The degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon him by the University. In 1834, on retiring from office, a number of his fellow citizens, as a mark of their esteem, raised the sum of £4600, which they vested in a building called the "Cleland Testimonial." He was a member of the Society of Civil Engineers, London, President of the Statistical Society, Glasgow, a corresponding member of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland, and Honorary Member of the "Société Français de Statistique Universelle."

He was the largest importer of tobacco in Europe, and chief of "the Virginia Dons," so well known in old Glasgow story. Was also a leading partner in "The Glasgow Arms Bank," established in 1750—the firm having been at one time Speirs, Murdoch, and Company. When the first American war broke out, tobacco rose in price one thousand per cent. Mr. Speirs was a large holder, and made an immense fortune. He purchased the lands of Elderslie from the lineal representative of Sir William Wallace, the great Scottish patriot, as well as various other extensive estates in Renfrewshire, which he united into a barony, under the general title of "Elderslie;" and built, in a central portion of it, the mansion bearing that name, facing the Clyde. The town residence of Mr. Speirs was known as "The Virginia Mansion," and stood at the head of, and looked down, Virginia-street-a spacious edifice, with hot-houses and ornamental garden, reaching south to the line of the modern Wilsonstreet, where stood a handsome gateway and two lodges. A monument to Mr. Speirs was erected at the time of his death, by a number of his friends, in the Episcopal Church of St., Andrew, facing the Green.

The paternal grandfather of Mrs. Speirs was George Buchanan, an eminent merchant in Glasgow, of the Leny branch of the ancient family of Buchanan, of Buchanan. Her maternal grandfather was Peter Murdoch, of Rosehill, Renfrewshire, another of the Virginia merchants, and Lord Provost of Glasgow in 1730. She was the sister of Andrew Buchanan, of Ardenconnel, Dumbartonshire, and niece of Andrew Buchanan, of Drumpellier, Lord Provost in 1740 (See No. 50); and of Neil Buchanan, Member of Parliament, in 1744, for the Glasgow district of burghs. These uncles of Mrs. Speirs were two of the founders of "The Buchanan Society" of Glasgow in 1725—the oldest of the charitable institutions of this city, except Hutchesons' Hospital. Her grand-nephew, Sir Andrew Buchanan, is the British ambassador at the Court of Russia. Mrs. Speirs gifted £2000 to the Merchant's House of Glasgow.

Educated at the University of Glasgow; distinguished himself as a student, especially by proficiency in mathematical science; graduated as Master of Arts in 1778; in 1781 succeeded his father as Factor to the late Earl of Glasgow; in 1792 he became Tacksman of the Earl's coal and lime-works at Hurlet; in 1795 he was named, by

the founder, a trustee of Anderson's University, in which he took a deep interest. He was one of the visitors of the University of Glasgow under the Royal Commission of 1830. For thirty years he acted as Chancellor of the Jury in striking the Fiars prices for the county of Renfrew. In 1843 resolutions were unanimously adopted at the General Quarter Sessions, expressive of the high value at which Mr. Wilson's long services were estimated. Mr. Wilson published various works. In 1790 the gold medal of the Highland Society was awarded for his "Essay on Enclosing Highland Farms under Breeding Stock." In 1833 he published "The Political State of Scotland," containing a list of all the Scottish representatives from 1707 till 1832. Mr. Wilson was an active member of various literary and scientific societies, and, as President of the Statistical Society, he devoted much time to the consideration of the question of weights and measures, the Society, in 1836, recording its appreciation of his services.

Returning to Glasgow, he was employed to paint some large landscapes by the late Provost Lumsden, and his success in these brought him into notice. In 1834 he was elected an associate, and in 1838 a Royal Scottish academician. He worked diligently, and painted many admirable landscapes, and made a very high reputation in Scotland, painting Scottish scenery with a truthfulness, vividness, and poetical feeling, which ensured him a high place in the regard of his countrymer.

He became a student of the Royal Academy, London, and gained first the silver and then the gold medal. He then went to Italy, and remained two years. In 1827 he settled in Edinburgh, and followed his profession with great success and industry, filling up any time to spare between sittings for portraits, by painting female figures in Italian or Scottish costume. He was elected a member of the Royal Scottish Academy in 1830, married in 1834, and settled in Glasgow. Although endowed with ample fortune, with the feeling of a true artist he painted to the last, and formed an admirable small collection of pictures by the old masters.

These plans were approved, and Parliamentary powers obtained for carrying them into execution. The building, however, was afterwards abandoned. She was also the first that ever sailed on the Thames for traffic, plying between Gravesend and Wapping Old Stairs from January to April, 1815, when the commander was prosecuted and fined for plying, not being a member of the Corporation of Watermen. The Margery was consequently sold to a French company, and was taken to Paris, where she was visited by Louis the 18th; thus it appears that the Margery was the first steam vessel to cross the Straits of Dover or to ascend the Seine. Mr. M'Cubbin was also part owner of the Greenock, built at Dumbarton by Mr. Denny, in 1815, which was the first steam vessel to enter Belfast Loch; and the first that entered the Mersey.

Born at Bellow Mill, Old Cumnock, 1754; died, 1839.

In 1777 he was employed by Boulton and Watt to superintend the construction of steam engines at the Soho Works, Birmingham; he then went as their agent to Cornwall, where, according to M. Charles Dupin, he "showed that he was full of the resources of genius and the wisdom of experience, so as to triumph over every difficulty," in adapting steam power to the drainage of the Cornish mines. It was while thus employed that Mr Murdock, in 1792, at his house and office at Redruth, was the first to use coal gas for light. "The original inventor of this application of gases," said James Watt, in 1809, "is Mr. William Murdock, a most ingenious man . . . Mr. M.'s invention is of fifteen or twenty years' standing. I saw it employed at Soho in the fireworks for the celebration of the last peace." This was the peace of Amiens in 1802, when Mr. Murdock, for the first time, applied gas to illuminate the works at Soho. In 1808 he received the Rumford Gold Medal from the Royal Society, for his paper on "The economical employment of gas light from coal." Mr. Murdock made a number of other useful inventions, and improvements on details of the steam engine. He died in 1839, and is buried beside his partners, Boulton and Watt, in Handsworth Church, where there is a bust of him by Chantrey.

Fifth son of Patrick Bell, a mechanic. Disliking the occupation of mason, he was bound apprentice to his uncle, a mill-wright. After various changes of fortune, he settled at Helensburgh, his wife keeping the inn there, and pursuing a series of mechanical projects, he hit upon the discovery of the application of steam to the purposes of navigation. Dr. Cleland (No. 151) states that he "invented the steam-propelling system, for he knew nothing of the principles which were so successfully carried out by Mr. Fulton," a Scottish engineer, in America. In 1812 Bell caused a vessel to be built on a plan entirely his own, which was

named the Comet. The engine, of three horsepower, was constructed by John Robertson, engineer, who is still alive. He made the engine in Dempster Street, and it was taken to Port-Glasgow, and there placed in Bell's vessel, which was 40 feet long and 12 feet beam, built by John Wood. She was a nice craft, and sailed well. Her first voyage was made from Greenock to Glasgow on 6th August, 1812, in five hours, fares 4s. William M'Kenzie, master; Robert Robertson, engineer; Duncan M'Innes, pilot; and a fireman. The Comet was finally lost near Fort-William. Bell did not derive any advantages from his important discovery, and in his old age would have been in destitute circumstances, but for the liberality of the Trustees of the Clyde, who granted him an annuity of one hundred pounds. A monument was erected to his memory on a rock abutting on the Clyde at Dunglas.

272 NEIL SNODGRASS.

Born at Ayr, 1776; died at Glasgow, 1849.

Civil engineer. Mr. Snodgrass was one of the most inventive and remarkable geniuses of our time. His name must ever be connected with the history of the steam-engine, and the rise and progress of the cotton manufacture in this country. He invented, and first put into practice in 1798, a process of heating factories by steam. In 1802 he invented the scutching or blowing machine, for opening and cleaning cotton or flax waste; in 1809 a new application of mendoza pulleys, for leading out the mule-jenny carriages; in 1822 metallic ring packings, for the piston of steamengine cylinders, and also for the air-pump of condensing engines; in 1822 an apparatus for the prevention and consumption of smoke; and he

introduced, in 1823, a superior arrangement of the tube-roving machines. By these inventions he enriched every one but himself: he lavished the riches of science on his country, bequeathing nothing but the fame he had acquired to his family.

Professor of anatomy and Lecturer on chemistry, University of Glasgow; son of John Black, of Belfast, and his wife, a daughter of Robert Gordon, of Hillhead, Aberdeenshire, by whom Dr. Black was nearly related to the wives of Dr. Adam Fergusson and Professor James Russel; assistant in the University of Glasgow of Dr. Cullen (No. 287). In 1756 Dr. Black succeeded to Dr. Cullen—one of his great pupils was James Watt (No. 316). He was appointed professor of medicine in Edinburgh in 1766, which chair he occupied for thirty years. Dr. Black was the founder of pneumatic chemistry.

Thomas Campbell, the poet, was born in the High Street of Glasgow, and was baptized by Dr. Thomas Reid, professor of moral philosophy in the University (No. 290). He received the rudiments of his education at the Grammar School, and entered Glasgow University in his thirteenth year. A strong inclination for poetry was already discernible, and at an early age he wrote verses. He remained seven years at the University, and each year an academical prize was conferred on him; and his career there merited and secured the encomiums of its most distinguished Professors. In 1797 he commenced his poem of "The Pleasures of Hope," residing at the time in Edinburgh. The success of this work was such as to place the young author in the foremost rank of the poets of the time. visited Germany in 1800. "The Battle of Hohenlinden," which he witnessed, was then written. "The Exile of Erin" was also written in Germany; as well as the noble lyric, "Ye Mariners of England." The poet settled in London, in 1803, and married Miss Matilda Sinclair, of Greenock. He lived by his pen; but, in recognition of his genius, George III. bestowed upon him in 1803 a pension of £200 a year. In 1809 appeared the second volume of his poems, containing "Gertrude of Wyoming," "The Battle of the Baltic," and others. In 1826 Mr. Campbell was elected Lord Rector, by the students of the University of Glasgow. This honour was enhanced by his being chosen three times successively Lord Rector, and the Senatus Academicus conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws. His literary labours continued; his liberal strong sympathies were enlisted in the cause of Greece and in that of Poland. In 1842 he published his "Pilgrim of Glencoe;" but, his health declining, he retired to Boulogne in 1843, dying there in 1844.

In 1826 he was called to the bar at Lincoln's He was elected Member of Parliament for Calne in 1830. He took a prominent part in the agitation for reform. In 1832, he became secretary to the Board of Control, and was elected member for Leeds. In 1834, he was appointed fifth member of, and legal adviser to, the Supreme Council of India. From Sept., 1839, to Sept, 1841, he was secretary for war. In January, 1840, he was elected member for Edinburgh; and, seven years afterwards, the electors of Edinburgh refused to reelect him. In 1849 he was elected Lord Rector of the University of Glasgow. In 1852 he was spontaneously re-elected member for Edinburgh. He was advanced to the peerage as Baron Macaulay in 1857. Without specifying his earliest literary works, his "Lays of Ancient Rome" appeared in 1842. His Essays appeared in 3 vols. in 1843. In 1848 the first 2 vols. of his "History of England from the Accession of James II." In 1853 his speeches were published, and in 1855 the 3d and 4th vols. of his "History of England."

His mother, Helen Wallace (No. 39), was the daughter and representative of Wallace, of Ellerslie. He was admitted Advocate in 1757, and was one of the counsel for the defence in the celebrated Douglas cause. In 1783 he was Solicitor-General, in 1784 Lord-Advocate, and in the latter year he was returned Member for the Glasgow district of burghs. The University of Glasgow conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Laws, and he was elected Lord Rector in 1799. In 1789 he was appointed Lord-President of the Court of Session; and, on his resignation in 1808, he was created a Baronet.

In his travels on the Continent he was attended by Dr. Moore (No. 348), whose work, "A View of Society and Manners in France and Italy," contains an account of their excursion. When he came of age in 1777 he raised the 82nd Regiment of Foot, in which he accepted a captain's commission. He had a grant of the offices of Keeper of the Palace of Linlithgow and Castle of Blackness in 1777. In 1798 he was appointed colonel of the militia, and Lord-Lieutenant of the county of Lanark.

287 WILLIAM CULLEN, M.D.

Born at Hamilton, 1710; died at Edinburgh, 1790.

Professor of medicine in Glasgow University from 1751 to 1756; educated at the Grammar School, Hamilton; he served a short apprenticeship to a surgeon and apothecary in Glasgow; after a voyage as surgeon on board a merchant vessel, he settled at Hamilton in 1737; in 1740 he took the degree of M.D. at the University of Glasgow, and afterwards removed to that city in 1746, and delivered lectures on chemistry and medicine from that time, in connection with the University, till 1751, when he was chosen regius professor of medicine in the University. In 1756 he became Professor of chemistry in Edinburgh University, and, on the death of Dr. Gregory, he succeeded to the chair of the practice of medicine, which he held with distinguished honour to the close of his life. Dr. Cullen published many valuable works. He was the instructor of William Hunter and of Joseph Black. A monument was erected to his memory over his grave in Kirknewton Churchyard by the College of Physicians, Edinburgh.

Died 18th August, 1840.

Professor of Divinity in the University of Glasgow; had been educated in that University; in 1790 offered the chair of civil history in St. Andrews, a charge united with a small country parish; he declined, being in principle the opponent of ecclesiastical plurality. In 1791, presented to the parish of Eastwood, and in 1797 to the charge of the Tron Church, Glasgow. Active in every

good work, besides promoting other charitable institutions, he was a chief originator of the asylum for lunatics. He devoted much time to the promotion of church extension, and Glasgow owes much to his exertions in this direction. In 1814, Dr. Macgill was elected professor of divinity. He devoted himself to the great object which he had at heart-the formation of a learned, pious, and effective ministry. In 1824 he proposed that a monument should be erected to the memory of John Knox, on the hill of the Necropolis, which proposal was soon afterwards carried into effect. In 1838 he was made one of the Deans of the Chapel Royal. In 1838 he was busily occupied with the plan of creeting a refuge for juvenile delinquents.

290 THE REV. THOMAS REID, D.D.

Born in the Manse of Strachan, 1710; died, 1796.

On his father's side he was descended from a long line of clergymen. His mother belonged to the family of the Gregorys, so illustrious in the medical and scientific history of Scotland. Reid studied at Marischal College, Aberdeen. In 1737 he was licensed to the ministry, and ordained to the charge of New Machar, where he continued till 1752. In the quiet of this country parish he read Hume's "Treatise of Human Nature," which had recently appeared; and this roused him, as it did another great thinker—Kant—to active reflection on the great questions of intellectual philosophy. In 1752 he was promoted to a professcrship in King's College, Aberdeen. The fruit of his thinking during these

days was given to the world in 1763, in the form of an "Inquiry into the Human Mind "-the most original and profound of all his writings. His reputation at this period was so great that he was solicited by the University of Glasgow to take the chair of moral philosophy there, which had been vacated by Adam Smith. This position he occupied until his death in 1796. Original in thought, clear and simple in style, grave and earnest in character, Reid was the founder of a school of philosophy which has greatly influenced opinion in his own country, in France, and in America. His principal works, besides the "Inquiry," are "Essays on the Intellectual Powers," 1785: "Essays on the Active Powers," 1788.

291 Matthew Baillie, M.D., Oxon., F.R.S., of Duntisbourne.

Born at the Manse of Shotts, 1761; died at London, 1823.

Medical doctor, son of Dr. James Baillie, (No. 324,) and his wife, Dorothy Hunter. He was educated at Glasgow University from 1773 to 1778, when he obtained a Snell Exhibition to Baliol College, Oxford. He lectured with great reputation from 1784 till 1799. In 1795 he published his great work, "The Morbid Anatomy of some parts of the Human Body," followed by many other important works. Such was his celebrity in London, that his professional income amounted to £10,000 a-year. He was appointed one of the physicians to the King. He presented his collection of morbid specimens of anatomy to the College of Physicians, London, with a sum of money to be expended in keeping it in order. He left large sums to medical institutions and public charities.

Son of James Douglas of Mains, who succeeded as heir of entail to the estate of Blythswood in 1767 (No. 422), and took the surname of Campbell. His mother was Henrietta, daughter of James Duulop of Garnkirk (see portraits 40 to 48). There were three sons of this marriage. First, John, a Lieut.-Colonel in the Army, killed at Martinique in 1794 (No. 415), without issue; second, Archibald, who succeeded; and, thirdly, James, a Lieutenant in the 55th Regiment, who died without issue at Antigua in 1781.

300 WILLIAM HUNTER, M.D., of Long Calderwood, Lanarkshire.
Born at Long Calderwood, 23d May, 1718; died in London,
30th March, 1783.

One of the most eminent teachers of anatomy of the last century, author of several celebrated works, and physician to Queen Charlotte. Studied in Glasgow University, from 1731 to 1733; settled in London, as assistant to Dr. James Douglas, in 1741, and shortly afterwards succeeded that physician in practice. Was the instructor, in anatomy, of his brother, John Hunter. By his will, of date 23d July. 1781, he left the ultimate possession of his extensive and valuable museum and library, with a considerable sum of money, to the University of Glasgow. The collection was conveyed to Glasgow in 1807, and now constitutes the Hunterian Museum.

304 John Campbell, Second Marquis of Breadalbane, K.T.

Born at Dundee, 26th October, 1796; died, 8th November, 1862.

He represented Perthshire in the Parliament of 1832. He was Lord-Lieutenant of Argyleshire. In 1838 he was made a Knight of the Thistle. In 1841 he was elected Lord Rector of Glasgow University. In 1842 he received the Queen and Frince Consort at Taymouth with magnificent hospitality. In 1848 he was appointed Lord Chamberlain, and sworn in a member of the Privy Council. The universal popularity of this nobleman was attested by an invitation to a public banquet held at Perth in 1860, from representatives of various political opinions, who adopted this method of testifying their respect and goodwill.

305 LORD ARCHIBALD HAMILTON.

Born, 1769; died, 1827.

Second son of Archibald, ninth Duke of Hamilton. He distinguished himself as a political reformer and as an active and eloquent public speaker. Chosen in 1802 M.P. for Lanarkshire, he represented that county till his death. He invariably endeavoured to correct abuses, and his exertions in the cause of burgh reform made his name very popular in Scotland. He was Lord Rector of Glasgow University in 1811, and revived the practice of the Rector making a speech at installation, at the suggestion of Professor Mylne.

306 Alexander, Tenth Duke of Hamilton.

Born, 1767; died, 1852.

In early life he spent many years in Italy, where he acquired a taste for the fine arts. In 1801 hereturned home, and the following year he was appointed Colonel of the Lanarkshire Militia, and Lord-Lieutenant of the county. In 1806 he was appointed British ambassador at St. Petersburg. In 1819 he

succeeded his father. His energies after that period were principally devoted to the improvement of his estates, and the building and embellishment of his princely palace. He formed the greater portion of the superb collection of works of art which it contains. When he succeeded to the dukedom, finding that his father had excluded his brother, Lord Archibald, from any share in his personal property, he presented him with £20,000.

308 Francis Hutcheson, LL.D.

Born, 1694; died, 1747.

Professor of Moral Philosophy in the University of Glasgow; was the son of a Presbyterian clergyman in the North of Ireland; the family, however, had been one of some antiquity in the county of Ayr. Dr. Hutcheson studied in the University of Glasgow, and was educated for the ministry. Instead of entering the Church, however, he accepted the position of head of an educational establishment in Dublin, where his liberal political opinions, and his Presbyterian connection, subjected him to considerable hostility and persecution. The earliest, and, at the same time, the freshest and ablest of his writings, "An Inquiry into the Original of our Ideas of Beauty and Virtue," appeared in 1725. This was followed by the "Essay on the Nature and Conduct of the Passions," in 1728. The high reputation which these writings gained him, taken in con-

nection with his brilliant career as a student, led to his appointment to the chair of moral philosophy in the University of Glasgow, as successor to the learned Gershom Carmichael in 1729. He discharged the duties of this position until his death in 1747, at the early age of fifty-three. Dr. Hutcheson was a man of very varied attainments; his writings and teachings embraced æsthetical, moral, and political subjects; and in all of these departments he has left the impress of a powerful and cultivated mind. He may, in truth, fairly be regarded as the originator of those branches of reflective inquiry in Scotland, in which the names of Adam Smith, Thomas Reid, and Dugald Stewart are conspicuous. As a lecturer on morals, he was high-toned, able, and eloquent. Besides the works already mentioned, there is the posthumous one, "A System of Moral Philosophy," with his Life, by Principal Leechman, published in 1755. He has also left Logical and Ethical Compends.

309 James, eighth Earl of Elgin, and twelfth of Kincardine, K.T. G.C.B., &c.

Born in London, 20th July, 1811; died at Dhurmsala, 20th November, 1863.

As governor of Jamaica, he reduced that island to order after the convulsions of the Emancipation Act. As governor of Canada, he converted the mass of the population from a state of chronic disaffection to permanent loyalty. When proceeding on his high mission to China, he saved the Indian Empire by that decisive stroke by which he sent the troops back from Singapore to Calcutta. By that rare union of tact with firmness, of fertility of resource with simplicity of aim, which belonged to his race, he twice over brought to a prosperous end the provoking negotiations, and no less provoking wars, of the most inaccessible and intrac-

table of earthly empires. As Viceroy of the Indian empire, succeeding a great man and a great war, he entered upon the consideration of questions of the most important nature, which demanded a pacific solution, and was approaching that solution when attacked by severe illness. In his last hours, having seen that every care was taken for the public interests, and for the interests of those still nearer and dearer to himhaving dictated a telegram to the Queen resigning his office, with a request that a successor might be immediately appointed—he died, and was buried at Dhurmsala. The Earl of Elgin was bound to Glasgow by various ties-by the respect and high estimation in which he was held by the citizens, by his election to the office of Lord Rector of the University in 1859, and by his acceptance of the rights of citizenship.

He was President of the Geological and Archæological Societies of Glasgow, and President of the Andersonian University. He was one of the earliest members of the Yacht Club, now the Royal Yacht Squadron, and was one of

the earliest and latest Commodores of the Royal Northern Yacht Club. He was also, about the beginning of the century, a Captain in the Renfrewshire Militia. Mr. Smith contributed many papers to the transactions of the Royal and other societies of London and Edinburgh, on geology, conchology, &c. In 1816 he edited "A Voyage Round the World, by Archibald Campbell." In 1848 he published "The Voyage and Shipwreck of St. Paul," with "Dissertations on the Life and Writings of St. Luke," and "The Ships and Navigation of the Ancients." In 1853, "Dissertations on the Origin and Connection of the Gospels;" and, in 1862, "Researches in Newer Pliocene Geology."

The celebrated natural philosopher and engineer; the great improver of the steam engine. In 1784 he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, and the year following, of that of London. In 1787 he was chosen a member of the Batavian Society. In 1806 the University of Glasgow conferred upon him the honorary dignity of LL.D. In 1808 he was elected a corresponding member of the Institute of France, and in 1814 one of the eight foreign associates—the highest honour they could confer-of the Academy of Sciences of the same Institute. A statue to his memory was erected in Westminster Abbey, another in Glasgow, another in the Hunterian Museum, and two in Edinburgh; the same homage has been paid to his name and genius in his native city. This portrait was painted by desire of Mr. Watt, to be presented to his friend, Dr. Barr. It was sold at Dr. Smith's sale to Professor Fleming, from whom Mr. Napier acquired it.

The best eulogium on the character and merits of Mr. Jardine as a professor, is to be found in the affectionate respect of the numerous students whom, during his long tenure of office, he sent forth to fill with usefulness and with distinction important stations in society, and who never failed in after life gratefully to acknowledge their deep obligations to his teaching, to the zeal, the energy, the judgment, and the tact which he displayed in disciplining their youthful minds, and training them to habits of just and manly thinking while under his tuition at the University.

In 1806 Mr. Cockburn was appointed Advocate-Depute; in 1830 he was Solicitor-General of Scotland; and in 1834 he was elevated to the bench. In 1831 Mr. Cockburn was elected Lord Rector of Glasgow University.

328 FIELD-MARSHAL LORD CLYDE, G.C.B., Knight of the Star of India, &c.

Born at Glasgow, 20th October, 1792; died in 1863.

He was educated at the Grammar School of Glasgow, and entered the 9th Regiment of Foot, as Ensign, in his sixteenth year, and was immediately ordered on active service. He was first under fire at Vimiera, and closed his first campaign at Corunna. He was again sent to the Peninsula, and fought at Barossa, Tariffa, Taragona, Vittoria, and at San Sebastian, where he was severely wounded. He was again disabled at the passage of the Bidassea, in 1813. In the following year he accompanied the army to America, and closed his service there at New Orleans. In 1823 he was sent to quell the insurrection in Demerara; and in 1825 he obtained the rank of Major. In 1832 he became Lieutenant-Colonel of the 98th Regiment, which he took out to China, fighting at Chusan and Nankin. In 1848 he was sent to

India, and fought, amongst other battles, at Ramnuggur, Chilianwalla, and Goojerat, which closed the war, when he was made a Knight Commander of the Bath. His services were next required in Scinde, under Sir Charles Napier, and he was engaged in the crowning victory of Sakotu. He returned home in 1853, but only to be called again into active service when the Crimean War broke out. He was made Brigadier-General, commanding the Highland Brigade, when he contributed in a signal manner to the victory on the Alma. In the end of the following year, when his junior was made commander of the army in the Crimea, he resigned his command and returned home. The circumstances under which he returned to the Crimea. so honourable to himself, are well known. He was made G.C.B. In 1857 the Indian Mutiny broke out, and at twenty-four hours' notice he left for India, being appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Indian army. After a series of brilliant operations, of which the relief of Lucknow was the most prominent, he returned to Europe in 1860, when he was created a Peer as Baron Clyde, and Field-Marshal in 1862. The people of Glasgow presented him with a magnificent sword after his return from the Crimea.

Born about 1773; died, 1860.

Son of Thomas Brisbane, of Brisbane. This distinguished officer and astronomer entered the army as an ensign, in the 38th infantry, in 1789. In 1793, he raised an independent company in Glasgow, and joined the 53rd Regiment at Edinburgh. He was present in all the Duke of York's campaigns; he was with the army in the West Indies, under Sir Ralph Abercromby, in very active service: he commanded his regiment at the siege of Porto Rico; and afterwards he commanded a brigade in the Duke of Wellington's army in the Peninsula, taking part in nearly all the battles fought in Spain. In 1813 he received the thanks of Parliament. He next served in America. On his return he joined the British army at Paris with twelve brigades, which, on being reviewed by the Duke of Wellington, he said, "Had I had these regiments at Waterloo, I should not have wanted the Prussians." When in

France, in 1816, Sir Thomas was elected a corresponding member of the Institute. In 1821 he was appointed Governor of New South Wales. He founded an observatory at Paramatta, 14 miles from Sydney, for which, and his contributions to science, the Astronomical Society presented him with a gold medal.

He again visited the Continent, with the young Duke of Hamilton (No. 284). Dr. Moore finally settled in London, where he died. He published various works of travels, and three novels, of which the one best known is "Zeluco."

349 SIR JOHN MOORE.

Born at Glasgow, November 13th, 1761; killed at Corunna, January 16th, 1809.

Son of Dr. John Moore (No. 348). He received the rudiments of education at the Glasgow Grammar School. In 1776, he obtained an Ensign's commission in the 51st Foot. He was next promoted to a Lieutenancy in the 82nd, and served in America till 1783. On his return to Britain, with the rank of Captain, he was, on the change of Ministry which took place at the peace, elected Member of Parliament for the Lanarkshire burghs. In 1787, he became Major in the 4th battalion of the 60th Regiment, and in 1788, he exchanged into his first regiment, the 51st. In 1790, he was Lieutenant-Colonel, and in 1791. went with his regiment to Gibraltar. In 1794, he accompanied the expedition for the reduction of Corsica, and received his first wound in storming the Mozello Fort. In 1795, he was promoted to the rank of Brigadier-General, and served with great distinction in the West Indies. He was

appointed governor of St. Lucia, but, owing to attacks of yellow fever, returned to England in 1797, and was promoted to the rank of Major-General. In the disastrous expedition to Holland, he was twice wounded, and again severely, in Egypt, at the battle of Aboukir, where he was general officer of the day, and greatly contributed to the victory. He again served in the Mediterranean, and was appointed Commander-in-Chief of all the troops in the Mediterranean. He was next sent to Sweden with ten thousand men, to assist Gustavus Adolphus; and in 1808, he was appointed Commander-in-Chief of the British army in Portugal. After advancing to Salamanca, he was compelled to retreat. In this memorable retreat of 250 miles, he did not lose a single piece of artillery, a standard, or military trophy of any kind. At the victory of Corunna, on the 16th of January, 1809, he was killed by a cannon shot. When informed that the French were beaten, he said, "I hope the people of England will be satisfied; I hope my country will do me justice." A monument was erected over his grave by Marshal Soult; and there are statues of Sir John Moore in St. Paul's Cathedral, and in Glasgow.

He was educated in Glasgow for the medical profession, and it was whilst in Dr. Gordon's quaint old surgery, in the High Street, that he observed some of the characters afterwards depicted in Roderick Random. "Strap" was a barber in Bell Street, who used to dress Dr. Gordon's wig, and had certain peculiarities which arrested Smollett's fancy; from that time medicine was neglected for literature, and he wrote a tragedy in his eighteenth year. His first novel, "Roderick Random," appeared in 1748, and "Peregrine Pickle" in 1750. He translated "Don Quixote," and wrote a "History of England." He edited the Critical Review and the Briton. His novel of "Ferdinand, Count Fathom" appeared in 1753. "Sir Launcelot Greaves" was written in 1756. His "Travels in Italy" on his return, in 1764. "The Adventures of an Atom," in 1767. At Leghorn, in 1771, he died, having just completed his novel of "Humphrey Clinker."

Robert Boyd was successively Professor of Philosophy at the College of Montaubon, Professor of Theology at the University of Saumur, Principal of the University of Glasgow (1615—1621), and Principal of the University of Edinburgh for a few weeks in 1622-3. These offices he resigned, in consequence of his unwillingness to conform to the Articles of Perth. He was called to be minister at Paisley, in 1625, and died at Edinburgh, in January, 1627.

358 THE REV. ALEXANDER HENDERSON.

Born, 1588; died at Edinburgh, 1646.

An eminent minister of the Church of Scotland. He held in succession the offices of Professor of Philosophy, at St. Andrews (1611—1614); Minister of Leuchars, in Fife (1615—1639); first Minister of Edinburgh, and Rector of the University there (1640—1646). He drew up the renewal of the National Covenant in February, 1638, and was Moderator of the memorable General Assembly which met at Glasgow, November 21st, 1638. He resided in London nearly three years, as one of the Commissioners to the Westminster Assembly, and took a prominent part.

entered the University of Glasgow as a student in 1771, to attend the lectures of the celebrated Dr. Reid (No. 290); and during the session he composed his admirable Essay on Dreams. At the early age of nineteen, he assisted his father, Professor of Mathematics in the University of Edinburgh, and, on his death in 1785, he was nominated to the vacant chair. In 1778, during Dr. Adam Ferguson's absence in America, he supplied his place in the Moral Philosophy class. In 1783, he married Helen, daughter of Neil Bannatyne, Esq., merchant in Glasgow, by whom he had one son. In 1785, he took the place of Dr. Adam Ferguson, as Professor of Moral Philosophy. In 1790, having lost his first wife, he married Helen D'Arcy Cranstoun, daughter of the Hon. George Cranstoun. So extensive were his acquirements, so ready his talent for communicating knowledge, that his colleagues frequently availed themselves of his assistance in lecturing in their classes, in cases of illness or absence. The house of Professor Dugald Stewart,

in Edinburgh, was the resort of all who were most distinguished for genius, acquirements, or elegance, in that city, and of all the foreigners who were led to visit it. From the immense range of his erudition, the attention he bestowed on almost every branch of philosophy, his eloquence, the ease, grace, and dignity of his action, the compass and harmony of his voice, besides other admirable qualities, he was the most impressive lecturer of his age; and his popularity increased to the last. In 1810, he relinquished his professorship, and spent the remainder of his days in retirement.

He is now best known by his edition of Euclid, of which all modern editions are little more than reprints. Among his pupils were Colin Maclaurin, James Stirling, Mathew Stewart and Professor Robison of Edinburgh.

366 WILLIAM CROSS of Parkhouse.

Born at Glasgow, 1711.

Advocate. Appointed Professor of Law in Glasgow University in 1745, and subsequently Sheriff of Lanarkshire. He took an active interest against the Jacobites, and, besides the proofs of his zeal contained in "The Cochran Correspondence," published by the Maitland Club, he was the occasional correspondent of President Forbes. In 1745 he published "A Loyal Address to the Citizens of Glasgow;" and in 1748 he wrote an essay "On the means of Civilizing the Highlands, and Extinguishing Jacobitism in Scotland." He was with the Glasgow Volunteers at Falkirk, and wrote an account of the battle. He is said to have been an eminent agriculturist, and the first who introduced the cultivation of turnips in the fields in the neighbourhood of Glasgow, in 1756. He died at Parkhouse, Renfrewshire, at an advanced age. It may be noted as an illustration of the divisions in families, caused by the early troubles of the eighteenth century, that Sheriff Cross's father, Bailie John Cross, married, first, Joan, daughter of Walkinshaw of Scotstown, a notorious Jacobite, forfeited for his share in the enterprise of 1745; and second, Agnes, daughter of Crawford, of Crawfordland, mother of the Sheriff, who supported the opposite side.

The inventor of logarithms. John Napier was the head of the family of Napier—a branch of the house of the ancient Earls of Lennox—a title claimed through him by his descendants, the Lords Napier. He held extensive ancestral estates in the Lennox and the Menteith. At Gartness, on the Endrick, in the Lennox, Stirlingshire, he is said to have frequently resided and prosecuted his mathematical researches. He also held of the Crown the Castle of Merchiston,

near Edinburgh, and hence is known as Baron, or, as he signed himself, Fear, of Merchiston. He was one of the delegates from Glasgow to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, 17th October, 1593, at which he was appointed one of the four Commissioners of the Church to confer with King James the Sixth. "Of Napier, if of any man, it may safely be pronounced that his name never will be eclipsed by any one more conspicuous, or his inventions superseded by anything more valuable." (Playfair's Dissertation.) Laplace calls his discovery an admirable invention, that, reducing to some hours the work of months, doubles, it may be said, the life of the astrono-His eldest son, Archibald, afterwards created a Baronet of Nova Scotia (now represented by Sir R. Milliken Napier), and the first Lord Napier was matriculated in the University of Glasgow in 1594.

M'Ure, in his "History of Glasgow," says that, "In 1669 there were five merchants concerned in the Easter Sugar-house, viz., John Cross, James Peaddie, John Luke, George Bogle, and Robert Cross, who put in a joynt stock for carrying on another sugar-work, and built large buildings, and employed a German to be master-boiler. This project likewise proved effectual, so that their stock wonderfully increased. The representers of four of those partners does now enjoy the same, viz., John Graham of Dougalston, the heirs of Provost Peadie, Robert Bogle, and Robert Cross." And in the last edition of the work quoted, the following extracts are given from the family Bible of Robert Cross, father of our subject, and Dean of Guild and Bailie of Glasgow, 1684-85:-

"October 23, 1663.—I was maried in the Laighe Churtche, at on a cloke in the afternoon, by Maister Edwart Wright, then principall of the Coledge of Glasgow, upon Joanet Peadie, secound dochter to Thomas Peadie, merchant in Glasgow: shoo was baptized the 22 day of September, 1643. Godfathers, James Peadie and Thomas Findlay. Shoo departit this lyfe, Saterday, the 28 day of May 1687. Ane dochter, born Martch 3, 1670, calit Issobel. Martch 21, 1695.—Shoo was married to James Lowk, goldsmith, son to John Lowk, merchant in Glasgow, in my own hous, by Maister James Widrow, professor of divinity in the Colledge of Glasgow. December 8, 1695.—My son John was maried to Joan Walkinshaw, eldest dochter to William Walkinshaw of Scotstowne, in his own hous, by Maister Neill Gillis, on of the towne ministers. Scotstowne said she was 17 years of age. My son was born Aug. 26, 1671." His John carries down the family history. We select a short specimen. "June 25, 1711 .--Betwixt eight and nine in the morning, my wife brought forth a son; baptised in the Laigh Church by Mr. James Clark, on of the ministers in this place, on Tuesday, the 10 July, called William. This William became the Sheriff of Lanarkshire."

376 ADAM FERGUSON, LL.D.

Born at Logierait, 1724; died at St Andrews, 1816.

Educated at Perth, whence he removed to St. Andrews, where he took his degree of M.A. He then attended the divinity class in Edinburgh-at that time "a hot-bed of genius"-where he upheld with Robertson, Blair, Home, and Carlyle, the philosophical society. He was appointed to the chaplaincy of the 42nd Highlanders, with which regiment he served in Flanders. In 1759 he was appointed professor of natural philosophy in the University of Edinburgh, which chair he resigned in 1764 for that of moral philosophy. In 1767 he published his "Essay on Civil Society," and the degree of LL.D. was conferred upon him. He was appointed to a mission to America, and in the meantime his chair was occupied by Dugald Stewart, who in 1785 succeeded him. Dr. Adam Ferguson was the author of the "History of the Progress and Termination of the Roman Republic," and of other works.

He was also a member of the City Council, and a Magistrate of Glasgow, and in 1819 Lieut. Colonel of the fine Regiment of Glasgow Sharpshooters, one thousand strong. He was popular with men of all parties, of every rank.

Born at Glasgow, 1788; died at Edinburgh, 1856.

Advocate, Professor of Logic and Metaphysics in the University of Edinburgh, corresponding member of the Institute of France, &c., &c. His father was Dr. William Hamilton, Professor of Anatomy and Botany in the University of Glasgow; and his mother was Elizabeth, daughter of Mr. William Stirling, merchant in Glasgow-heir male of the Stirling's of Bankier and Lettyr. Sir William's grandfather, Dr. Thomas Hamilton, and his granduncle, Dr. Robert Hamilton, were medical professors in the University. They were of the family of Hamilton of Airdrie-a cadet of that of Preston. which again was the oldest branch of the ducal house of Hamilton. Through this relationship Sir William established his right to the Baronetcy of Preston, which was assigned to him by a jury before the Sheriff of Edinburgh in 1816. Sir William Hamilton studied at the University of Glasgow, and proceeded to Baliol College, Oxford, as a Snell Exhibitioner in 1807. His career at Oxford is one of the most brilliant on record. He studied medicine, but abandoned it for law. He passed advocate at the Scotch bar in 1813. His tastes, however, were more towards philosophy than law, and he continued to devote his time chiefly to profound research in nearly all departments of learning,

including, besides speculative philosophy in its various branches, modern Latin poetry, the theory of classical grammar, and history. He was also greatly distinguished by the accuracy and originality of his inquiries into the nature and functions of the brain. He was appointed to the chair of Universal History in Edinburgh in 1821. From 1829 to 1839 he contributed to the Edinburgh Review those philosophical essays which speedily made his name famous on the continent of Europe and in America. The chief of these were on the philosophy of Cousin, on Perception, and on Logic. They contain the substance of his philosophical opinions, and marked new epochs in the departments of Metaphysics and Logic. The wonderful force of thought which they exhibit is matched only by the rareness of the erudition. Sir William also contributed to the Review important articles on University Reform. Sir William was appointed to the chair of logic and metaphysics in the University of Edinburgh in 1836, which he occupied until his death in 1856. It is not too much to say of him, in his capacity of professor, that a more powerful or impressive lecturer has not occupied a chair in any Scottish University. As a philosophical writer, Sir William Hamilton is characterized by great dialectical force and subtilty, luminous order, and rare learning. No man was ever more loved and revered by his pupils and friends for kindliness, courtesy, generosity, and simplicity, combined with the highest gifts of intellect.

During the time that he was Town-Clerk, from 1842 to the period of his death, he was the zealous and faithful servant of the city in all its varied interests, which came within his sphere of duty-performing that duty with a judgment and singleness of purpose which invariably won the respect of the various councils which he advised, and of the public at large. Conspicuous amongst the good services which he rendered, was the carrying through Parliament of the Loch Katrine Water Bill, which has been a source of such signal benefits to the inhabitants of Glasgow. His arduous labours in the promotion of this noble object so affected his health that he died a few months after the bill was carried.

412 WILLIAM MOTHERWELL.

Born in 1797; died, 21st October, 1835.

His first literary occupation was assisting Dr. Watt in the compilation of the "Bibliotheca Britannica." In 1827 he edited a valuable collection of ballads, under the title of "Minstrelsy, Ancient and Modern." He was editor of the Paisley Advertiser and Paisley Magazine. In 1830 he became editor

of the Glasgow Courier, and till his death conducted this paper with great ability and success. In 1832 he published a volume of his poems, "Narrative and Lyrical," which was most favourably received. A few months previously he had furnished his friend, Mr. Andrew Henderson (see No. 202), with an excellent preface for his collection of Scottish Proverbs. Besides other publications, Motherwell superintended, with James Hogg, the Ettrick Shepherd, an elegant edition of the works of Robert Burns.

Born at Roseneath, 1726; died at Glasgow, 1796.

Grandson of John Anderson, M.A., author of the celebrated "Defence of Presbyterianism," and son of the Rev. James Anderson, minister of

Roseneath. He studied in Glasgow University, and was professor of Oriental languages in 1756. In 1760 he was removed to the chair of natural philosophy. Imbued with an ardent zeal for the diffusion of useful knowledge, he instituted a class, in addition to his usual one, for the instruction of the working classes—thus anticipating an educational movement only lately commenced, and forced upon this country by the evidence in international exhibitions of a greater diffusion of scientific knowledge amongst foreign workmen than amongst our own. Professor Anderson invented an ingenious modification in cannon, for the diminution of recoil, and a method successfully practised in Germany, of conveying information, by means of small balloons, to people whose frontier was surrounded by hostile troops. By his will, dated 7th May, 1795, he bequeathed all his money and effects for the establishment, in Glasgow, of an institution to be called Anderson's University, for the education of the unacademical classes. He also endowed it with a valuable philosophical apparatus, museum, and library.

415A John Ferguson, of Cairnbrock.

Born at Irvine, 28th February, 1787; died there, 8th January, 1856.

Mr. Ferguson never was in business. He spent a part of his early life in America. His latter years were passed quietly and unobtrusively, partly in London and partly at Irvine. His large fortune, amounting at his death to about £1,300,000, was mainly the accumulated wealth of his uncles, which fell to him by succession. Besides numerous private legacies, which amounted in cumulo to upwards of £700,000, all free of legacy duty, he left £12,000 for the poor of Irvine; £80,000 for educational and religious objects throughout Scotland, part of which was employed in founding the Ferguson Scholarships. The residue of his

estate, amounting to upwards of £375,000, forms the Ferguson Bequest Fund, the interest of which is spent in building and repairing churches and school-houses, 'supplementing the stipends of ministers and the salaries of missionaries and teachers of schools, and in assisting public libraries, in accordance with the testator's instructions.

For thirty years, the firm of Robert and Andrew Foulis produced a series of correct and wellprinted books, in the Latin and Greek Classics, which, for beauty and fidelity, were not equalled by any publication of the time. In 1753, Robert Foulis, having visited Italy and engaged Teachers, commenced his Academy of the Fine Arts. He formed a collection of 459 pictures, numerous drawings by eminent Masters, engravings and casts from statues, for the instruction of the people of Glasgow in Art; but the effort was premature—the collection was dispersed, the pictures being sold in London in 1776. The casts were actually broken to pieces by workmen, so little were they cared for. Andrew, the subject of the medallion, partner of Robert, is described as painter, printer, and inventor of stereotyping. Sculptor unknown.

He tirst became a teacher at Haddington, and then at Kirkcaldy; and, whilst at the latter place, he completed his course at the divinity hall, and was licensed to preach in 1815. Through the introduction of Rev. Dr. A. Thomson (No. 85), he received

an invitation from Dr. Chalmers to become his assistant in St. John's parish church, Glasgow, in 1819. After three years he received a call to the Caledonian church, in London; and, in consequence of the great increase of his congregation, a new church was built for him in Regent-square, called the National Scotch Church. Deposed by the presbyteries of London and Annan, he was re-ordained a minister of the Catholic Apostolic Church. He was an eloquent preacher, and the author of several works on religions subjects. He was interred in the crypt of Glasgow Cathedral, and over his grave a memorial window was erected by his nephew, Mr. John Fergusson, of Glasgow.

He promoted and carried a bill for the Clydesdale Junction Railway, originated the Greenock line, and actively promoted the Caladonian Railway to Carlisle, being a subscriber and member of the provisional committee. He took a deep interest in politics, and in 1847 contested the city of Glasgow in the Liberal interest.

Mr. Wallace became a partner of the West India firm of Wallace, Hunter & Co., Greenock, and in 1805 succeeded his father in the estate of Kelly. In 1833 he was elected Member of Parliament for Greenock, and for four successive elections he was returned free of expense. Besides other services, he was the first to urge the reform of post-office abuses; and Mr. Rowland Hill, who brought forward the scheme of penny postage, freely admitted the value of Mr. Wallace's efforts. Mr. Hill wrote-" By four years of incessant attacks, Mr. Wallace destroyed the prestige once enjoyed by the post-office, and exposed it to the wholesome influence of public opinion." Mr.

Wallace received the freedom of Glasgow, Aberdeen, Paisley, Perth, Dingwall, Inverness, and Dornoch. He was presented with an address by the people of Kilmarnock, and a complimentary communication from the Postmaster-General of France. Mr. Wallace retired from parliament in 1845.
