Army Headquarters, Delhi, the 3rd January 1922.

1. India Army Orders.—In future India Army Orders, other than "Special," will issue fortnightly instead of weekly.

They will be restricted to matters of a general nature; orders relating to appointments, leave, promotions, rewards, etc., of individuals will be notified in a list to be published as an annexure to India Army Orders.

2. London Gazettes of the 30th November and 1st, 2nd, 5th and 6th December 1921 were received at Army Headquarters on 28th December 1921.

3. Promotion of Indian officers and other ranks of Artillery.—It has been decided that in order to standardise the system of recommendations for promotion of Indian officers and non-commissioned officers of Artillery, examination boards will be held under arrangements to be made by artillery brigade Commanders once every quarter.

2. Promotion to the rank of Naik will be carried out in batteries, 50 per cent. of these promotions being made from amongst old soldiers. In and beyond this rank a non-commissioned officer, before he is recommended for promotion, will be passed by the brigade examination board.

3. Each board will consist of the brigade commander, with one officer from each battery or ammunition column of the brigade in the station.

In the Training Centres the board will consist of the officer commanding as president with one officer from each company.

4. The syllabus of examination is published as an annexure to this order.

5. This order will take effect from the 1st January 1923. The object of publishing these instructions now is to enable officers commanding to inform the Indian ranks of the standard required in order that they may be prepared to pass the test laid down.

4. Organisation.—War Establishments.—The war establishments of the under mentioned units has been approved by the Government of India and will shortly be issued to all concerned.

5. Legal and Judicial. Suspension and review of sentences awarded by courts martial.—Army Council Instruction No. 430 of 1921, is republished as an annexure to this order.

6. Legal and Judicial.—With a view towards ensuring that the Military authorities immediately concerned shall have the earliest possible opportunity of gauging the probable requirements of the situation, it is directed that at the first warning by the Civil authorities of the possibility that the presence of troops may be required at any point in aid of the Civil Power, the Military Commander receiving the warning will forthwith detail and despatch a military liaison officer to get into personal touch with the Civil authority in the affected area.

2. This liaison officer will furnish reports, as ordered by the authority detailing him, regarding the situation as he appreciates it.

3. He will continue this procedure until the services of the troops are no longer required by the Civil authorities maintaining a close liaison with the local Civil authorities, and through them with the local Police officer, throughout, and also with the Commander of the troops employed, under whose orders he will be during the presence of the latter at the scene of action, provided the latter be senior to him. Alternatively should the liaison officer be the senior he will automatically be in military command (unless specially ordered to the contrary by the officer who detailed him), but, (if it be so arranged) it is preferable that the liaison officer shall be of such rank that he will not have to take command of the troops.

4. On the withdrawal of the troops, or if it is decided that they need not be called out, the liaison will submit a written report to the officer who detailed him. The report will comprise a brief narrative of events and a brief summary of his observations and his appreciation of the cause of the trouble. The liaison officer will remain in the disturbed area until ordered to rejoin his station.

The report will be submitted to Army Headquarters through the usual channel.

7. Ammunition—Artillery.—H. E. Shell used 35000 (Q. M. G.-11) in Coast and Inland Defences with the following guns that have not yet been fitted with base plates must not be fired except during operations when base plated shell are not available:—

8. Casualties, reports of.—Several instances having recently occurred in which the reports of casualties have been unduly delayed or incorrectly reported, the attention of all concerned is drawn to the Annexure to India Army Order No. 384 of 1920, the terms of which are to be strictly adhered to.

9. Method of submission of petitions by Indian ranks for settlements of accounts, etc.—The notice appended to India Army Order No. 712 of 1920, has been printed in the marginally noted vernaculars. Copies may be obtained by units by direct application to the Superintendent, Government Printing, Calcutta.

10. Transfer to the home establishment or leave to the United Kingdom on compassionate grounds—Cancellation of.—Special India Army Order No. 14-S. of 1920, which authorised transfer to the Home establishment or leave to the United Kingdom on compassionate grounds, is hereby cancelled.

11. Expenditure incurred in the employment of clerical establishments, purchase of stationery, etc., over and above authorised office allowances.—Cases have recently occurred in which Officers Commanding Units have, on their own initiative, incurred considerable expenditure on account of the entertainment of extra clerical assistance, the purchase of stationery, etc., over and above their authorised contract allowances, without the previous sanction of the Competent Authority. This practice is irregular.

2. It is therefore notified for the information and future guidance of all concerned that in no circumstances will the Government of India accept liability for any expenditure incurred by Officers Commanding Units, in excess of the authorised contract or other allowances without the previous sanction of the Competent Financial Authority.

3. This order is not intended to prevent Officers Commanding Units from incurring expenditure which they are prepared to meet from their purely private funds.

12. Organization—Auxiliary Force—India.—

It has been decided that the Peace establishment of the Auxiliary Force

India, shall be limited to the numbers under each unit, arm and branch set forth in the annexure to this Order.

2. Establishments of squadrons, companies, batteries and the like will conform to those laid down in Appendix IX, Auxiliary Force Regulations, 1921. In the case of infantry units the establishments have been fixed on three scales, with platoon strengths of 38, 47 and 56. All battalions of four companies whether on the lower, intermediate or higher establishment, will be identical as regards battalion, company and platoon headquarters, and will differ only as regards the number of rank and file, the total of all ranks being 720,863 and 1,007 respectively, exclusive of the permanent staff.

Enrolments in excess of the total laid down for each unit will be permitted only under the orders of the General Officer Commanding the district by re-adjustment of the totals of one or more units of each arm or branch within the district, or under the orders of the General Officer Commanding in Chief if re-adjustment which he considers essential cannot conveniently be carried out within an individual District: subject to the provision that the Command total for each arm and branch shall not be exceeded. This power does not extend to an increase in the authorised number of companies, platoons and the like within units so that in all cases the number and ranks of officers and non commissioned officers will conform to the scale laid down.

3. These establishments do not take into consideration cadet-companies or platoons, which are to be regarded as additional in all cases to the combatant establishment.

4. In view of the fixation of establishments every effort should be made to ensure that the largest possible proportion of those enrolled are actually available for service in the event of an emergency necessitating embodiment. Should the full numbers be reached, preference must be given to applicants of the Active Class or to reservists who undertake to perform the training required of that class.

5. Enrolment by the unit commander in excess of establishment is permissible when the unit is called out or embodied for service.

6. In the case of regiments comprising two or more battalions, the establishment for the purpose of this Order will be the aggregate establishment of the component battalions. If one is of the authorised strength and another is below such strength, further enrolment in the former is permissible under the orders of the regimental commandant so long as the total is not exceeded. The same principle applies to local groups of several arms under a single command, save as regards any increase over the authorised cavalry establishment.

7. Subject to any re-adjustment made by higher military authority under paragraph 2, units which have already attained the authorised strength will, in the case of other than infantry units, be reduced by transfer of reservists to infantry units, where possible. An infantry unit already in excess of establishment will restrict enrolment until the numbers reach the strength authorised.

8. Attached units or sections forming portions of a unit and constituted under proper authority, unless specially provided for, are, for the purposes of this Order comprised in the aggregate strength of the unit.

9. This order will be repeated in Command, District, Brigade and Regimental (Auxiliary Force) Orders.

13. Disabled Officers' Fund.—The attention of all concerned is invited to India A.O.16696 (A. G.-11). Army Order No. 209 of 1921; any subscriptions or balances which may be lying in Banks should be remitted Home.

14. Army Book 142.—Reference India Army Orders Nos. 334 and 611 of 1921 copies of 7587 (G. S., M. T.-1). Roman-Urdu edition of Army Book 142, Musketry Small Book, Table B, General Musketry Course, (British and Indian) 1920, are ready for issue by the Superintendent, Government Printing India, Calcutta, on whom indents may be submitted through the usual channel.

15. Correspondence—Telegrams.—“ Uptrans, Roorkee ” has been registered as the abbreviated telegraphic address for the Officer Commanding, No. 36 (Indian) Mechanical Transport Company, Roorkee, and will be taken into use forthwith.

India Army Order No. 581 of 1921 is hereby cancelled. To avoid congestion of telegraph traffic, it is desirable that officers in possession of the Indian Word Code should ordinarily use it for transmitting lengthy inland telegrams when there is no objection to this course.

16. Accounts.—It has been brought to notice that Station Orders authorising advances, issued under the provisions of paragraph 24, Army Regulations, India, Volume III, frequently contain incorrect particulars regarding which the individual receiving the advance is borne or the appointment held by him. It has further been brought to notice that unauthorised advances are not infrequently granted by Officers Commanding Stations and it does not appear to be generally understood that, before an advance can be granted under the provisions of the above quoted rule, two conditions must be fulfilled, namely :—

- (a) The advance applied for must, be authorised under the rules in paragraphs 43 *et seq.*, Army Regulations, India, Volume III, or under any other special or general orders of Government.

430. Suspension and Review of Sentences awarded
by Courts-Martial.

PART I.—SUSPENSION OF SENTENCES AND REVIEW OF
SUSPENDED SENTENCES.

1. *Some remarks on Section 57A of the Army Act.*—(a) Under sub-section 2 (a) of section 57A of the Army Act a superior military authority may issue general instructions that no soldier sentenced to penal servitude, imprisonment or detention shall be committed to prison until his orders have been ascertained.

If such general instructions have been issued the officer confirming a sentence of penal servitude, imprisonment or detention must defer committing the soldier to undergo his sentence until the directions of the superior military authority have been taken.

(b) If the superior military authority has not issued any such general instructions, then under sub-section (1) the confirming authority may exercise his discretion (except as laid down in paragraph 5 below), and if he confirms a sentence of—penal servitude, imprisonment or detention, can either (i) let the man be committed in the ordinary way to undergo his sentence, or (ii) refer the case to the superior military authority if he considers such a course desirable.

(c) Under sub-section (5) a suspended sentence must be reviewed every 3 months and may be reviewed more often.

(d) It should be noted that, where a sentence immediately after its award is referred to a superior military authority

for decision as to whether it shall be suspended or not, if the sentence is put into execution it will run as from the date of award; whilst if it is suspended no part of the sentence is deemed to have been performed (subsection (3)).

Where a sentence already in suspension is put into execution, the sentence is deemed to run as from the date ordering it to be put into execution and where a sentence in execution is remitted or suspended its currency is deemed to end on the day on which the man is actually released (subsections (4) and (6)).

It is important therefore that these dates should always appear on Army Form A-3104.

(e) The powers under section 57A in no way affect the powers of a confirming or reviewing authority under section 57 of the Army Act.

(f) Every superior military authority will keep a list of officers whom he appoints to be competent military authorities under section 57A, and superior military authorities in the United Kingdom will send a copy of this list and notify any alterations therein to the War Office in order that officers in charge records may be informed. Appointments should be made to the holders of certain appointments and not to officers by name, e.g., to the general or officer commanding, 1st division, and not to Major-General Browne, Commanding 1st Division.

In the United Kingdom all officers to whom the power to convene and confirm District Courts-Martial has been delegated, will be appointed competent military authorities provided their rank is not below that of field officer.

2. *Notes for guidance of officers considering sentences under Section 57A.*—(a) The considerations which guide an officer in deciding whether or not it is advisable to suspend a sentence immediately after trial are many and vary with the discipline of the force under his command, the nature of the duties on which it is engaged and the character of the man concerned.

Suspension of sentence is primarily applicable to offences of a military nature only, although in special cases it may be applied to offences of a civil character.

In all cases special attention must be directed to the following points:—

- (i) The age and previous character of the soldier.
- (ii) Whether the offence is a first one.
- (iii) Whether the offence was premeditated.
- (iv) Whether the soldier was at the time subjected to any special stress, fatigue, disability or temptation.
- (v) Whether the soldier was influenced by others older or of worse character than he.

On active service additional considerations may arise. For example, some men may deliberately commit crimes in the hope that a long sentence may enable them to avoid doing duty with their units, whilst others may commit grave military offences through momentary loss of control over their nerves and without any real wrongful intent. It must further be remembered that, except on active service, a sentence of penal servitude or imprisonment will usually entail discharge from the Army, and that, therefore, a sentence of penal servitude or imprisonment, not on active service, should not usually be suspended unless it is commuted to detention.

Each case, therefore, must be considered on its merits, it being remembered that the system of suspension of sentence is designed, on the one hand, to ensure instant punishment for those who properly deserve it, and, on the other hand, to postpone, and often entirely to avoid, punishment for those whose offences, though serious, are such as may in the circumstances not call for immediate committal to prison; the power of suspension of sentence places in the hands of the commander a means of clemency and within reach of the soldier an opportunity to redeem his character.

(b) Upon review of an already suspended sentence other considerations arise. All that need be considered then is the gravity of the offence of which the soldier was convicted, his previous character and his conduct since conviction. As a general rule it may be said that the more grave the offence and the worse his character before conviction the longer is the period required to prove whether the soldier is honestly trying his best to redeem himself and that only acts of conspicuous merit (such as bravery or devotion to duty in

action or, in peace time, such conduct as is referred to in paragraph 1919 (xiv), King's Regulations) would justify a remission of sentence without regard to the length of the period during which it had been suspended.

Apart from such special acts, remission of sentence would be justified (no partial remissions of a sentence in suspension are allowed under section 57a) if the soldier has by his consistent good conduct really shown that he has done his utmost to retrieve his character and become a good and efficient soldier. Promotion to a higher rank should always be regarded as sufficient proof of good conduct to justify remission.

Unsatisfactory conduct subsequent to suspension will justify an order to put a suspended sentence into execution, whilst a mere negative abstention from crime would point to the advisability of directing a reconsideration of the sentence at a later date.

In considering a case reports must always be obtained from the soldier's Commanding Officer and attached with a copy of the soldier's company or field conduct sheet to Army Form A.-3104 for future reference.

It is desirable that some intimation of the reason actuating the superior or competent military authority in his decision upon review should, if possible, be communicated to the soldier.

Attention is drawn to paragraph 583 (iv), King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order 467 of 1920, a suspended sentence of imprisonment or penal servitude should not, except on active service, be put into execution without first being commuted to detention unless it is intended that the soldier should be discharged from the army for misconduct.

(c) A soldier under a suspended sentence is to be regarded entirely as a free man and is to be placed under no disability whatever excepting only the liability of having his suspended sentence put into execution if he misbehaves.

3. *Procedure after trial when the case is referred to a superior military authority.*—(a) A confirming authority upon receipt of the proceedings of a trial will consider whether (i) he wishes to recommend suspension of the sentence to the superior military authority, or (ii) he is bound

to refer the case to the superior military authority under paragraph 5 below or under the general instructions referred to in paragraph 1 (a) above. If the confirming authority decides to recommend the sentence for suspension or is bound to refer the case to the superior military authority, he will, when returning the proceedings to the unit for promulgation attach Army Form A.-3104, having filled in paragraph 1 as far as possible.

At the same time the confirming authority will direct that the man be not committed to undergo his sentence pending further orders.

The Officer Commanding unit will complete paragraphs I, VII and IX of Army Form A.-3104 and return them with the proceedings to the confirming authority who will complete paragraphs II and X of the form and forward it with his remarks through the usual channels to the superior military authority.

(b) The superior military authority will telegraph his decision direct to the confirming authority who will at once take the necessary action to commit the man to undergo his sentence in the ordinary way or to release him and ensure that the necessary entries as to suspension are made in the documents referred to in paragraph 8 (b).

(c) The superior military authority will at the same time despatch through the usual channels Army Form A.-3104, having filled in paragraph III, and the proceedings to the confirming authority. The proceedings will subsequently be disposed of by the confirming authority in the usual way and the Army Form A.-3104 will be passed through the Officer Commanding unit to the authority directed to hold it (see Part III).

(d) A sentence of penal servitude or imprisonment coupled with discharge with ignominy cannot be suspended unless the discharge with ignominy is remitted.

4. *Three-monthly review of sentences under suspension.*—

(a) Every sentence under suspension must be reviewed at intervals of not more than 3 months and may be reviewed more frequently.

This review will be carried out by the competent military authority (if there is none, by the superior military authority) under whose command the man is serving, to

whom Army Form A.-3104 will be sent by the authority laid down in Part III, 14 days before the review is legally due, through the Officer Commanding unit with which the man is serving, who will attach reports as to the conduct of the man since suspension and copies of his company or field conduct sheet.

(b) The competent military authority may himself remit the sentence or direct that it be brought forward again at a date not more than 3 months ahead, which will be entered by him in paragraphs VI or XI of Army Form A.-3104.

He will notify his decision to the Officer Commanding the unit concerned and will ensure that in the case of a remission the necessary entries are made in the documents mentioned in paragraph 3 (b).

(c) If the competent military authority considers that the sentence should be put into execution he will submit Army Form A.-3104 to the superior military authority, and the procedure will then be as laid down in paragraph 3 (b) and (c) except that the place of the confirming authority will be taken by the competent military authority.

(d) Cases may arise in which a competent military authority may desire without any delay to remit a suspended sentence on the spot for some specially meritorious act on the part of the soldier. In such cases it will be sufficient if the competent military authority notifies his decision to the man and his Commanding Officer and subsequently at the first opportunity secures Army Form A.-3104 and takes the other action laid down in sub-paragraph (b) and (c) of this paragraph.

If, on the other hand, it is desired at any time before the three-monthly review to put a suspended sentence into execution the Commanding Officer must at once wire for Army Form A.-3104 and transmit it with his recommendation through the competent military authority, if one exists, for decision of a superior military authority who will act on the principle indicated in paragraph 3 (b).

(e) When all action on review has been taken the competent military authority will despatch Army Form A.-3104 (ensuring that it is correctly completed) through the Commanding Officer to the authority directed to hold it in Part III. If a sentence which is put into execution has been in execution before, Army Form A.-3104 will be

also passed through the Officer Commanding detention barracks or governor of the prison to which the soldier is committed in order to inform him of the number of marks earned towards remission, (if any).

5. *Trial of a soldier already under a suspended sentence.*—If a soldier under a suspended sentence is again to be tried by court-martial, the Officer Commanding unit will telegraph to the authority holding Army Form A.-3104 for its immediate spatch to him and will forward it (with application for al if possible) to the convening authority. The convening authority will attach this form to the proceedings before turning them for promulgation.

In a case such as this reference will invariably be made to the superior military authority, whose attention is drawn to sub-section 7 of section 57A of the Army Act. The procedure generally will be as laid down in paragraph 3.

If a soldier is committed to undergo a sentence, as a rule if he has a previously suspended sentence should also be put into execution to run either concurrently or consecutively with the new sentence.

6. *Removal of a soldier under suspended sentence from one command of one competent military authority to that of another.*—If a soldier under suspended sentence is transferred from the command of one competent military authority to that of another just before or after Army Form A.-3104 has been received from the authority holding that document, the former competent military authority will consider the man's conduct up to the date upon which he left his command and will attach his remarks to Army Form A.-3104 which he will forward through the authority directed to hold that form to the new competent military authority who will act as directed in paragraph 4.

7. *Transfer of soldier under suspended sentence from the United Kingdom to overseas and vice versa.*—When a soldier under suspended sentence is transferred from the United Kingdom to a station overseas, from a station overseas to the United Kingdom or from one station overseas to another station overseas, the authority directed to hold the Army Form A.-3104 in the old station will at once pass the form to the authority directed to hold it in the new station.

8. *Completion of Army Form A.-3104 and entries to be made in documents.*—(a) The various paragraphs in Army

Form A.-3104 are self-explanatory, but care must be taken that they are correctly filled up in each case, the dates of entries being especially important, *see* paragraph 1 (d).

Entries in Army Form A.-3104 may generally be signed by a staff officer for the superior or competent military authority although the latter is responsible for the decision; but where the decision is to put the sentence into execution the direction to do this must be signed by the superior military authority himself. The various conduct reports, etc, upon the man will be pasted to the form where marked, for reference on further reviews.

(b) Entries will invariably be made in the following documents, giving dates and authority, whenever—

A sentence in execution is suspended, remitted, commuted or mitigated;

A suspended sentence is remitted, or

A suspended sentence is put into execution;

as they are casualties affecting a soldier's service.

In Peace.

As in (ii), (iv), (vi) and (vii) above, and also in the company conduct sheet (*see* paragraph 1924, King's Regulations).

9. *Miscellaneous.*—(a) When a soldier serving at home under a suspended sentence becomes due for discharge, disemboliment, transfer or relegation to the Reserve, the

Officer Commanding the unit with which the man is serving is responsible for bringing the case to the notice of the superior (or competent) military authority one month before the man leaves his unit and that authority will as a general rule remit the sentence.

If, however, it is considered that in the interest of discipline the suspended sentence ought to be put into execution the case must be referred to a superior military authority who will, if he decides to put the sentence into execution, take steps to carry out his decision and to notify the War Office at once of his action, giving the date of the soldier's last trial.

If a soldier under a suspended sentence serving overseas is due to be sent home for discharge or transfer to the Reserve, the Officer Commanding the unit with which he is serving overseas will take steps to ensure that the case is brought to the notice of the superior (or competent) military authority for decision on the lines indicated above one month before the soldier embarks for the United Kingdom.

In the case of a soldier in hospital who is to be invalided from the service, the Officer Commanding hospital, being Officer Commanding the unit with which the man is serving, will be responsible for bringing to the notice of the superior (or competent) military authority the existence of any suspended sentence under which the soldier may be, before the soldier, if serving at home, is invalided, or if serving overseas, is sent home for the purpose of being invalided.

Where, owing to the circumstances of the case, it is impossible to give the month's notice referred to above, the Officer Commanding unit will be responsible that the longest possible notice is given and that the question of the disposal of the suspended sentence is submitted at once to the proper authority.

(b) If a soldier is committed to prison under two sentences, a separate committal warrant will be made out in respect of each sentence.

(c) If a soldier whilst undergoing field punishment or confinement to barracks is sentenced to penal servitude, imprisonment or detention, which sentence is suspended, the previous sentence of field punishment or confinement to barracks may be carried out and will not affect the currency of the suspended sentence.

(d) Any consequence of a conviction or sentence and any part of a sentence which would have taken immediate effect if no part of the sentence had been suspended will take immediate effect notwithstanding suspension, e.g., reduction to the ranks under Section 183 (4) of the Army Act, fines and stoppages.

10. All previous instructions and orders on the subject (except Army Orders 312 of 1920 and 32 of 1921) are hereby cancelled.

PART II.—REVIEW OF SENTENCES IN EXECUTION.

11. *Review of sentences in execution upon men not discharged from the Army.*—(a) It has been decided that sentences in execution upon men who are not discharged from the army shall be reviewed at intervals of not more than 6 months and may be reviewed more frequently. In the case of this 6 monthly review Army Form A.-3104 will be sent 14 days before this date arrives by the authority who is responsible (see Part III) for bringing the case forward for review to the competent military authority (if none to the superior military authority) in whose command the man is serving his sentence. If the sentence has never been considered for suspension and therefore no Army Form A.-3104 for the soldier exists, the authority responsible for holding such form if one existed (see Part III) will prepare one in accordance with the note below. If any sentence is reviewed before the expiration of 6 months the authority instituting the review will ask the authority holding Army Form A.-3104 to forward it to him. The competent (or superior) military authority will secure a report of the man's conduct from the governor or commandant of the place in which the sentence is being served.

(b) If, after reference to the competent military authority to the suspended, the con ary steps to secure the man's release and to ensure that the necessary entries in documents are made [see paragraph 8 (b)].

NOTE.—The authority directed to hold the document will prepare Army Form A.-3104 by completing paragraphs I and VII and cancelling paragraphs II, III, IX and X. He will initial the parts struck out, and will stamp paragraph II with his office stamp. Action on review will be recorded in paragraph VI.

14. *Stations overseas (other than India).*—The authority both for holding Army Form A.-3104 and for bringing each case forward for review every 3 months or 6 months will be the General Officer Commanding or colonel commandant.

When a suspended sentence is remitted or a soldier has served his sentence Army Form A.-3104 will be despatched to the officer in charge records at home for retention with the man's documents.

15. *India.*—Subject to such regulations as may from time to time be issued by the Commander-in-Chief, the authority both for holding Army Form A.-3104 and for bringing each case forward for review every 3 months or 6 months will be the Officer Commanding unit.

When a suspended sentence is remitted or a soldier has served his sentence Army Form A.-3104 will be despatched to the officer in charge records at home for retention with the man's documents.

16. *An expeditionary force.*—Subject to such instructions as the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief may issue the authority both for holding Army Form A.-3104 and for bringing each case forward for review every 3 months or 6 months will be the officer in charge the Adjutant-General's office at the base, who will, if possible, institute a card index of all men under sentence of penal servitude, or imprisonment or detention of over 6 months, and of all men under suspended sentence of whatever length. He will act as directed in paragraph 13 (b).

When a suspended sentence is remitted or the soldier has served his sentence Army Form A.-3104 will be despatched to the officer in charge records at home for retention with the man's documents.

17. *Small punitive force or minor expedition.*—No definite rules can be laid down as to the authority both for holding Army Form A.-3104 and for bringing each case forward for review every 3 months or 6 months as the case may be.

But the commander will be responsible, through the Adjutant-General's branch of the staff, for initiating a system which will ensure proper review both of sentences in suspension and in execution on the principles laid down in Parts I and II. Particular care must be taken by the commander of the force to ensure that Army Form A.-3104 is

evacuated at the same time (or as soon after as possible) and to the same destination as the man concerned.

18. *Duplicate Army Form A.-3104.*—In order to avoid trouble in the case of a lost Army Form A.-3104, the authority directed to hold this form will always prepare a duplicate of any form which he is responsible for holding.

If an original form which is despatched from his office does not return in due course, he will institute enquiries and if it is found to be lost the duplicate will be taken into use and a fresh duplicate prepared.

The duplicate taken into use will be headed "Duplicate, original lost" and bear the office stamp of the authority preparing it. The duplicate will be disposed of as indicated in paragraph 7 but will be despatched under separate cover.

19. A copy of Army Form A.-3104 is printed as an Appendix to this Army Council Instruction. In any case in which an Army Form W.-3104 is now in existence that form will continue to be used until filled up, when, if necessary, an Army Form A.-3104 will be prepared. In cases arising subsequent to the issue of this Army Council Instruction, Army Form A.-3104 will be used.

Traffic regulations for certain bridges on the North-Western Railway when used by troops.

1. The bridges named below can only be used for military traffic in emergent cases and after first obtaining the permission of the Traffic Manager, North-Western Railway, in each case.

2. When the Traffic Manager has given permission, he will wire the Permanent-Way Inspector, with a copy to the Executive Engineer. He will also wire to the Station Masters concerned, with a copy to the District Traffic Superintendent, to be prepared to block the line between the nearest station on each side of the bridge.

3. The District Traffic Superintendent will fix the time at which the troops may cross and will inform the Officer Commanding the troops by telegraph. He will also wire jointly to the Permanent-Way Inspector and Traffic Inspector concerned, with a copy to the Executive Engineer of the District and Station Masters concerned.

4. The line will then be blocked in accordance with General and Subsidiary Rules 339 and 339 (a) to (h) and the Permanent Way Inspector will remove the block.

ARMY ORDER No. 411 of 1921.

Extension of Service.—1 Under the provisions of Section 78 of the Army Act, the Army Council have decided that the periods and conditions under which soldiers may be allowed to extend their service will be as follows :—

- (a) Extension of service of soldiers serving on normal engagements will be dealt with as provided for in paragraphs 262 and 263, King's Regulations.
- (b) Extension of service of soldiers serving on special short engagements at home or abroad will be dealt with as provided for in appendix A to this Army Order.

2. Married soldiers now serving on special short engagements and not below the age of 26 years are eligible for extension of service provided they have not more than three children dependent upon them. In the case of such soldiers who have been placed on the married quarters roll extension of service may be allowed irrespective of the number of children dependent upon them.

3. Warrant officers and non-commissioned officers will only be permitted to extend their service in their present substantive rank, although any acting rank at present held may be retained whilst the establishment of their units and Army Regulations permit

4. No soldiers will be permitted to extend their service with the Colours after having been sent home from abroad for discharge. Such soldiers may, however, be allowed to extend their service for service in the Army Reserve under Section VI of Appendix A.

Service in France, Flanders or Germany will, for the purposes of this Army Order, be regarded as Home Service:

5. No special bounty or furlough privileges will be allowed in respect of extension of service, but soldiers who re-enlisted under Army Orders 4, 124 or 125 of 1919, or Special India Army Orders 39-S of 1918, or 47-S of 1919, will continue to draw their bounties until the expiration of

the period for which they re-enlisted under those Army Orders.

6. Soldiers who re-enlisted with special bounty privileges under Army Orders 4, 124 or 125 of 1919, or Special India Army Orders 89-S of 1918 or 47-S of 1919, and now extend their service under this Army Order will not be allowed to purchase their discharge until the period for which they re-enlisted under the above-quoted Army Orders has lapsed, except with the consent of the Army Council.

7. Soldiers extending their service will not be entitled to repatriation on final discharge except in such cases as may be allowed under the Allowance Regulations.

8. No man serving on a Territorial Force or Special Reserve engagement can extend his service under the Army Act for the purpose of serving with the Regular Army. In the case of any such men who may now be serving with units of the Regular Army and who are desirous of remaining with the Colours they must re-enlist on a Regular Army engagement for the normal period or for a special short period under existing regulations, and should be discharged from their Territorial Force or Special Reserve engagement as on the date preceding that of re-enlistment.

In such cases it should be noted that any previous embodied or mobilized service on the Territorial Force or Special Reserve engagements will count for pension purposes as "service" and "qualifying service" under Articles 1135-1136, Pay Warrant, or paragraph 4, Table 5, of Army Order 325 of 1919.

9. Extension of service under this Army Order will be approved by the Commanding officer of the units in which soldiers are serving except in the case of the Royal Engineers, Royal Corps of Signals, Royal Army Service Corps, Royal Army Medical Corps, Army Dental Corps, Royal Army Ordnance Corps, Royal Army Veterinary Corps, Royal Army Pay Corps, Corps of Military Police, Military Provost Staff Corps, Corps of Military Accountants and Army Educational Corps, in which cases extension of service will be approved by the officer i/c records concerned.

ARMY ORDER No. 410 OF 1921.

Enlistments and re-enlistments into the Regular Army. Enlistments and re-engagements into Section "D," Army Reserve.—1. The object of this Army Order is to summarize in a convenient form the existing orders dealing with enlistments and re-enlistments into the Regular Army and kindred subjects as above, and to bring instructions relating thereto up to date.

2. All information concerning the carrying out of routine enlistments and re-enlistments on a normal engagement will be found in the Recruiting Regulations, 1912 (reprint 1914), as amended and amplified from time to time by Recruiting Instructions and Recruiting Memoranda.

3. Appendix I to this Army Order is designed to provide information regarding enlistments and re-enlistments for short periods, or for normal engagements in cases where certain complications are involved. In these cases also it is necessary to consult current Recruiting Instructions and Recruiting Memoranda. In Appendix II will be found the instructions and conditions governing the enlistments and re-engagements into Section "D," Army Reserve.

4. Enlistments and re-enlistments for the Regular Army will be carried out on the Universal Attestation, Army Form B.-271 (Notice Paper, Army Form B.-271A), see Army Order 359 of 1921.

5. Married men will not usually be accepted for normal engagements or under Appendix I, but some exceptions for certain trades, etc., are made from time to time and published in current Recruiting Instructions and Recruiting Memoranda. Married men who are accepted as such will be eligible for marriage allowance in accordance with the provisions of Army Order 357 of 1920.

6. Men in receipt of disability pensions will not be accepted, except as provided for in column 7, Section 3, of Appendix I.

7. The conditions under which 'service pensioners' can be accepted for re-enlistment are contained in the Royal Warrant published as Army Order 445 of 1920.

8. The rates of pay for men enlisting and re-enlisting will be those laid down in Army Order 325 of 1919 and subsequent amendments.

9. This Army Order is issued in substitution of the following Army Orders, which are hereby cancelled:—

Army Orders 165, 238, 240 and 413 of 1919; 192, 243, 313, 340, 411, 436, 516, 521 and 561 of 1920; 26 of 1921.

—In spite of the orders issued in India Army Orders Nos. 712 of 1920 and 484 and 491 of 1921, many appeals and complaints regarding the non-receipt of pay, arrears of pay, pensions, gratuities, etc., are being sent direct to Army Headquarters. The result of this procedure is that extra work is caused all round, and the complainant is not benefitted owing to the delays which occur in the transmission of his complaint. All complaints and appeals regarding these matters must be submitted as under:—

- (a) By staff officers and officers in departmental employ as laid down in paragraphs 67 to 71, Army Regulations, India, Volume II.
- (b) By Officers serving in units, and other ranks, or by pensioners or discharged men to the Officer Commanding their unit or depôt. These complaints should be settled as far as possible by the Officer Commanding the unit or depôt in consultation with the unit accountant and local auditor (if available), and if necessary, referred to the Controller of Military Accounts. It is only after failure of settlement between the Officer Commanding the unit or depôt and the Controller of Military Accounts that complaints should be forwarded to Army Headquarters, and in this case they should be sent through the channels prescribed in Army Regulations, India, Volume II, paragraphs 67 to 71, to the Head of the Department concerned.

Form C.-863 (Clothing Ledger) has been approved and will be taken into use by all British and Indian units with effect from 1st April 1922. Indents for the forms, on the scale of 15 copies per unit, will be submitted so as to reach the Superintendent of Government Printing on or before the 15th February 1922.

*Memorandum for officers arriving in England on sick leave
from India.*

Officers coming to England on sick leave are informed that it will be to their advantage to appear before the Medical Board at as early a date as possible after their arrival, in order that the Board may advise them as to the best steps to take regarding tropical diseases.

It may not be generally known by officers that arrangements have been made for the diagnosis and preliminary treatment of such diseases at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, Endsleigh Gardens, N. W. A report is furnished to officers by the hospital which they can take with them to their own medical adviser, who can then carry out the treatment suggested. The expenses of the examination and preliminary treatment at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases is defrayed by the India Office.

To secure these advantages, however, a recommendation to the Hospital for Tropical Diseases by the Medical Board is necessary, and therefore officers who wish to avail themselves of this arrangement should apply to appear before the Medical Board of this office as soon as possible after arrival.

ANNEXURE TO INDIA ARMY ORDER No. 103 OF 1922.

ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTION No. 672 OF 1921.

672. Medical Examination. Procedure for the Purpose of Ascertaining and Recording the State of Health of every Officer and Soldier.

1. The medical examinations which have been carried out in accordance with the provisions of A. C. I. 250 of 1920, as amended by A. C. I. 705 of 1920, were intended to place on record the state of health of every officer and man at a date as near as possible to that on which the Ministry of Pensions Warrants would cease to operate, after which disabilities incurred would cease to be regarded as due to service in the Great War.
2. As it was subsequently decided to extend the operations of the Ministry of Pensions Warrants to the 30th day after the termination of the War, under the Termination of the Present War (Definition) Act, 1918, * and as, owing to unforeseen circumstances which had necessitated the postponement of the official declaration of the termination of the war, the primary object of the medical examinations above referred to has not been attained, it has become necessary to arrange, as soon as possible, for a further examination of the officers and soldiers defined in paragraph 3.
3. Unit commanders will therefore :—
 - (a) arrange for every officer and soldier who, when medically examined under the provisions of A. C. I. 250 of 1920, was found to be suffering from a disability attributable to, or aggravated by, service during the war period, to be re-examined by a medical board;
 - (b) notify all other officers and soldiers, except those who joined after 30th September, 1921, who are serving on the date of the receipt of this A.C.I., that, if they so desire, they may claim to be examined or re-examined by a medical board, under the provisions of A. C. I. 250 of 1920. Those deserving to claim such an examination or re-examination must submit their

claims within one month from the date of the receipt of this A. C. I., otherwise they will be held to the finding of the examination which may previously have been carried out in accordance with A. C. I. 250 of 1920, or if no such examination was carried out, any disability from which they may subsequently be found to suffer will not be regarded as due to service in the Great War;

- (c) arrange for all officers and soldiers who claim an examination under sub-paragraph (b) to be medically examined as soon as possible in accordance with paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 of A. C. I. 250 of 1920.

4. Unit commanders will carefully scrutinize the documents of officers and soldiers who join their units from leave and of those who are *en route* at the time when the medical examination under this A. C. I. should take place to ensure that they have been or will be examined, or be given the opportunity to claim an examination under the provisions of this A.C.I., and they will take steps to ensure that the provisions of paragraph 3 (b) of this A.C.I. are given the widest possible publicity in order that they may be brought to the notice of every officer and soldier concerned.

5. The instructions contained in paragraphs 6 to 12 of A. C. I. 250 of 1920, as amended by A.C.I. 705 of 1920, will apply, and will be strictly adhered to, in examinations under this A. C. I., the entries in A.B. 64 and in A.P. B. 108, 175 and 198A being recorded thus—"examined (or re-examined, under A.C.I. 672 of 1921 on ."

8. I am to request that a brief report as to the situation of supernumeraries be furnished to the War Office on 1st February, 1922.

(c) Such interval should be left between each of the names on the roll as will admit of the "Remarks" column being fully completed.

4. *Number of copies required of each Nominal Roll and their disposal*—(a) The Officer Commanding despatching unit will hand to the officer in charge party, nominal rolls, as specified above, in triplicate. The copies of each roll will be disposed of as follows:—

- One copy will be handed to the embarkation staff officer at the port of embarkation.
- One copy will be retained by the officer in charge party.
- One copy will be handed to the Officer Commanding troops on the ship.

The use of Army Form B.-127, as laid down in paragraphs 1509 and 1652, King's Regulations, will be discontinued until further orders. Instead of Army Form B.-127, the Officer Commanding troops on the ship will prepare consolidated rolls in triplicate in conformity with the requirements of paragraph 3 (b) above, for each arm of the service, as defined in Appendices III and IV to Army Council Instruction No. 479 of 1921. On arrival at the port of disembarkation, these rolls will be handed to the E. S. O., who will record against the name of each man and family the manner in which he disposes of them. The E. S. O. will dispose of the three copies of these consolidated rolls as follows:—

- One copy to be given to the officer or non-commissioned officer conducting the party to its destination in the United Kingdom.

One copy to be sent to the officer in charge records concerned.

One copy to be retained for record purposes.

(b) Officers in charge parties will be responsible for keeping these rolls up-to-date until they hand them to the Officer Commanding troops on the ship and the E. S. O. at the port of embarkation, respectively.

(c) The Officer Commanding troops on the ship will then be responsible that all casualties which may occur at sea are entered in the "remarks" column of the consolidated nominal rolls which he makes out and that the accuracy of the rolls is checked during the voyage.

(d) The E. S. O. at the port of disembarkation will be responsible that after the disposal of each man and family has been entered on the rolls, the rolls are dispatched to officers in charge records on the day of disembarkation. It is essential that officers in charge records should receive information concerning troops and families disembarked in the United Kingdom without delay, particularly in connection with Parliamentary procedure.

5. The procedure as regards such nominal rolls, referred to in the last sub-paragraph of paragraph 4 of Army Council Instruction No. 479 of 1921, is modified accordingly by Army Council Instruction No. 687 of 1921.

6. With reference to the first 5 sub-paragraphs of paragraph 4 of Army Council Instruction No. 479 of 1921, as amended by Army Council Instruction No. 687 of 1921, in addition to the rolls referred to in paragraph 4 of this Army Council Instruction, Officers Commanding units overseas will forward to officers in charge records at home, at least a fortnight before embarkation, nominal rolls of all soldiers sent home not only for discharge or transfer to the reserve as directed in the Army Council Instruction first quoted, but for any cause, and also similar rolls in the case of "unaccompanied families." Officers in charge records will forward, as may be found necessary, the duplicate copies of these rolls to Officers Commanding units, etc., concerned.

7. Copies of this Army Council Instruction are to be available for reference on ships carrying troops during the trooping season, 1921-1922.

686. Procedure to be followed when soldiers are sent Home from Overseas for Discharge or Transfer to the Reserve.

Except in very exceptional cases all vehicles transferred from one unit to another will be complete as to equipment and component parts.

2. All motor vehicles will be issued by Reserve Vehicle Park to units without equipment. Similarly all vehicles evacuated to Base Mechanical Transport workshops will be despatched without equipment.

India Army Form (M. T.)-3 will be completed as above, but will show deficiencies of component parts and defects only, e.g., "Vehicles complete except foot brake shoe assembly."

Every endeavour will be made to replace evacuated vehicles by vehicles of similar make. In the case of the issue of a vehicle of a dissimilar make to

Indents for school books and materials should be submitted once a year only. Supplementary indents should be avoided as much as possible and should not be passed by General Officers Commanding Districts unless satisfactory reasons are given.

168. Army sports.—Matters in connection with the Army Sports Control Board are published as an appendix to this Order.

169. Records—British Army.—As documents of men addressed to the Assistant Adjutant General, Record Section, Bombay, have of late frequently been received at Army Headquarters, attention is drawn to Special India Army Order No. 10-S. of 1920 and India Army Order No 563 of 1921, which notified the abolition of the Record Offices at Bombay and Delhi respectively.

"With reference to War Office letter number 103-K. H.-919 (A. G.-4-D.), dated 30th September 1920, I am commanded by the Army Council to inform you that the question of the age limit of students entering the Royal Military School of Music, Kneller Hall, for training as bandmasters, under the conditions of paragraph 797, King's Regulations, has been under consideration, and it has been decided that the age of such students should not be over 30 years on the date of entrance.

The Council desire me to add that in view of the instructions contained in the above quoted War Office letter it is thought that there may be some soldiers over the age of thirty years now preparing themselves for the entrance examinations, therefore it has been decided to adopt the following sliding scale as regards the age limit for entrance for the course up to December 1925 :—

- 174. Soldiers' Service—British Army—Continuance in the Service beyond 21 years.**—It is notified that India Army Order 1276 of 1921, does *not* apply to non-commissioned officers borne on the India Unattached List.

- 175. Bounty for Extension of Service—British Infantry.**—All extensions of service in British Infantry under the terms notified in Special India Army Order No. 65-S., dated 26th October 1921, will cease with effect from 1st March 1922.

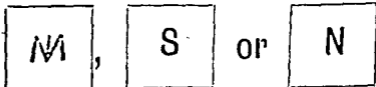

Reference India Army Order No 45 of 1921. As plugged shell become available all artillery ammunition will be issued in peace to Horse, Field and Pack Batteries and ammunition columns with shell plugged, fuzes in cylinders, and the necessary complement of fixing screws.

2. When such issues are made, batteries and ammunition columns will normally carry shell plugged and retain the fuzes in stores, except:—

(a) Those in carriage limbers of Horse and Field Batteries.

(b) 28 rounds per piece in 2.75-inch and 16 rounds per piece in 3.7-inch Pack Batteries.

(c) Such additional rounds of shrapnel and H. E. as may be ordered by General Officers Commanding in accordance with local conditions.

(d) Practice ammunition when proceeding to practice.

(e) On active service.

3. Fuzes already in shell will not be removed.

4. Ultimately H. E. shell will not be carried fuzed with 101, 101-E. or 106 fuzes, except on active service and for practice. With reference to 2 (a), (b) and (c) the proportion of H. E. fuzed 103-E. and fuzed shrapnel will be decided locally.

180. Artillery Practice Camps.—Chief Ordnance Officers will arrange, when-

5. To obtain all the information that can assist in determining the cause of a failure, or inability of any part to

function properly, officers commanding will have their equipments examined by the I. O. M., or armament artificer, on conclusion of their practice and at any time a failure occurs)

3. A report on each failure, giving full particulars, will be drawn up by the armament artificer and sent immediately by the officer commanding with his remarks to the I. O. M.

4. Damaged fittings, samples of oil, etc., will be retained by the unit until disposal orders are received.

5. The I. O. M. concerned will forward these reports with his remarks to the C. I. O. M.

181. Equipment.—Reports submitted in accordance with India Army Order No. 1260-2321 (Q. M. G.-9-C.) of 1921 shew deficiencies in equipment of items common to peace and war.

183. Exemption from articles of uniform.—The duty of officers is drawn to Dept. of Commerce letter No. 477, January 1922, a copy of which is published to this Order.

184. Shoulder titles—Indian units.—It has been decided that Indian ranks of signal units will wear "Signals" as their shoulder title. The size and description of the titles will be as laid down in India Army Order No. 26 of 1920.

185. Stores returned to arsenal for repair.—

Stores sent to an arsenal for repair or alteration under the authority of the Chief Ordnance Officer will be addressed to the Chief Ordnance Officer (Workyard) and, in the case of arms, the letter "A" will be added after "Workyard".

At the same time India Army Form O.-1370 will be used as an issue voucher by the unit concerned and forwarded in quadruplicate to the same address. One copy with the work order number and date entered on will be returned duly receipted.

When an article is found to be unfit for repair, a regular receipt on India Army Form Z.-2096 will be sent to the unit concerned as authority to strike it off ledger charge.

The necessary forms (I. A. F. O.-1370) will be supplied to a unit with the order on India Army Form Z.-2098 by the Chief Ordnance Officer.

When returning such repaired stores to a unit, the ordinary issue voucher (India Army Form Z.-2096) will be used.

Paragraph 863, Army Regulations, India, Volume II, will be amended accordingly.

186. Vicker's Guns.—The annual allowance of

practice ammunition for Vicker's Guns is 900 rounds per officer, non-commissioned officer and man of the team.

2. The machine gun course to be fired is laid down in Section 39, Machine Gun Training, Part-I, dated 1919.

187. Signal Cartridges.—The annual practice

allowance of cartridges illuminating, parachute $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch, will be restricted from this date to 10 per cent. of the number authorised as equipment.

2. Any cartridges in excess of 10 per cent. of equipment, already drawn by units but not expended, will be returned to arsenals in communication with the Chief Ordnance Officer concerned.

188. Equipment.—In view of the urgent necessity at the present juncture of avoiding expenditure, paragraph 1 of Indian Army Order No. 21 of 17th January 1922 is reconstructed, and the orders regarding animals and equipment moving in relief by rail are as follows:—

(i) Mobilization tentage, mobilization equipment and clothing and stocks of peace clothing (with the exception of those articles peculiar to the unit being relieved) will be handed over to the relieving unit in all cases.

(ii) Further, in all cases, except very short moves—which exceptions will be specified in the orders for relief—all regimental animals, other than officers' chargers, and all peace tentage and peace equipment other than the arms, equipment and pouch ammunition of the personnel, will also be handed over to relieving unit.

2. In movements by road, all equipment that increases the use of transport vehicles will be handed over to relieving units.

189. Clothing—Disposal of clothing in possession of Indian units under orders for disbandment.—

The following procedure will be adopted by Indian units under orders for disbandment in regard to the disposal of clothing and necessaries in unit charge:—

(a) On disbandment—

(i) all serviceable and unserviceable part worn articles of personal clothing and necessaries and all unserviceable articles of public clothing will be disposed of to the best advantage, and the proceeds thereof credited to Government;

(ii) all new articles of personal clothing and necessaries and all new and serviceable part worn articles of public clothing will be returned to the clothing depot on which dependent, unless these units are relieved by other units in which case the latter will take over such articles as they may require to complete their three months' stocks or to meet outstanding indents on clothing depôts which should be cancelled to the extent of the articles thus taken over.

(b) For the purpose of these orders public clothing includes special articles referred to in Army Instructions (India) 749 of 1921.

2. The procedure detailed in (i) above will also be observed in respect of clothing and necessaries withdrawn from soldiers and followers on becoming non-effective by discharge, dismissal, etc.

3. The scales of clothing and necessaries which are allowed to be taken away by men mastered out under the reorganization scheme are laid down in Special India Army Order 20-S. and India Army Order 1266 of 1921.

Exemption from customs duty of articles of uniform.

SIR,

I am directed to address you on the above subject.

2. Under article 11 of Schedule II to the Indian Tariff Act, 1894 (VIII of 1894), as subsequently amended, uniforms and accoutrements appertaining thereto, imported by a public servant for his personal use are free; and under the Notification of the Government of India in the Finance and Commerce Department, No 583-S. R., dated the 26th January 1904, uniforms and accoutrements are admitted free of duty when imported directed by an officer of His Majesty's Regular Forces provided that he is required to maintain the articles for the due performance of his military duty. It has been brought to the notice of the Government of India that exemption is often claimed in respect of articles such as ordinary evening collars, shoes, waterproofs, vests, drawers, khaki shirts, military canes, etc., which, although used with uniform, can also be used for ordinary purposes. The Government of India have, therefore, decided that the exemption should, in accordance with the original intentions, be restricted to such articles as can only be worn as a part of uniform; and I am to request that, with the

permission of His Excellency the Governor in Council, & local customs authorities may be informed accordingly.

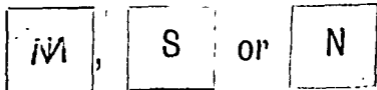

(ii) Further, in all cases, except very short-moves— which exceptions will be specified in the orders for relief—all regimental animals, other than officers' chargers, and all peace tentage and peace equipment other than the arms, equipment and pouch ammunition of the personnel, will also be handed over to relieving unit.

2. In movements by road, all equipment that increases the use of transport vehicles will be handed over to relieving units.

189. Clothing—Disposal of clothing in possession of Indian units under orders for disbandment.— 41492 (Q. M. G.-12). The following procedure will be adopted by Indian units under orders for disbandment in regard to the disposal of clothing and necessaries in unit charge :—

(a) On disbandment—

(i) all serviceable and unserviceable part worn articles of personal clothing and necessaries and all unserviceable articles of public clothing will be disposed of to the best advantage, and the proceeds thereof credited to Government ;

(ii) all new articles of personal clothing and necessaries and all new and serviceable part worn articles of public clothing will be returned to the clothing depôt on which dependent, unless these units are relieved by other units in which case the latter will take over such articles as they may require to complete their three months' stocks or to meet outstanding indents on clothing depôts which should be cancelled to the extent of the articles thus taken over.

(b) For the purpose of these orders public clothing includes special articles referred to in Army Instructions (India) 749 of 1921.

2. The procedure detailed in (i) above will also be observed in respect of clothing and necessaries withdrawn from soldiers and followers on becoming non-effective by discharge, dismissal, etc.

3. The scales of clothing and necessaries which are allowed to be taken away by men mustered out under the organization scheme are laid down in Special India Army Order 20-S. and India Army Order 1266 of 1921.

Exemption from customs duty of articles of uniforms.

SIR,

I am directed to address you on the above subject.

2. Under article 11 of Schedule II to the Indian Tariff Act, 1894 (VIII of 1894), as subsequently amended, uniforms and accoutrements appertaining thereto, imported by a public servant for his personal use are free; and under the Notification of the Government of India in the Finance and Commerce Department, No 589-S R., dated the 26th January 1904, uniforms and accoutrements are admitted free of duty when imported directed by an officer of His Majesty's Regular Forces provided that he is required to maintain the articles for the due performance of his military duty. It has been brought to the notice of the Government of India that exemption is often claimed in respect of articles such as ordinary evening collars, shoes, waterproofs, vests, drawers, khaki shirts, military caps, etc., which, although used with uniform, can also be used for ordinary purposes. The Government of India have, therefore, decided that the exemption should, in accordance with the original intentions, be restricted to such articles as can only be worn as a part of uniform; and I am to request that, with the

permission of His Excellency the Governor in Council, the local customs authorities may be informed accordingly.

Memorandum No. 017875-2 (A. G. 5), dated 16th April 1919.

From—The Adjutant General in India,

To—The General Officers Commanding Divisions and Independent Brigades (Except Aden).

It has been pointed out that Civil Administrative Officers though very desirous of doing honour to pensioned Indian Officers in their Districts are often unable to do so as they are not informed where they go on pension.

All Indian units and deptôs, therefore, are directed to submit early to Deputy Commissioners or Collectors concerned the names of pensioned Indian Officers in their Districts and to keep them informed of those who proceed on pension in the future.

Information on the following points should be given in submitting names:—

- (1) Rank and name.
- (2) Father's name.
- (3) Regiment or Corps with date of pension and its amount.
- (4) Village, Thana, Tahsil and District.
- (5) Remarks such as distinctions held, war-services, medals, etc
- (6) If desirous of civil employ; if so what form?
- (7) Or, if he has secured any civil employ, his address there, so that he can be communicated with and his home address obtained.

2. Similar information should be supplied about non-commissioned officers and men retiring, as far as possible.

232. Demobilisation, Indian.—*Disposal of Records of Disbanded Indian Cavalry, Infantry and Pioneer Units.*—

(A. G.-2).

The Appendix to this Order contains a list of units and formations which hold the records of Indian Cavalry Regiments and Indian Infantry and Pioneer Battalions which have already been disbanded or are earmarked for eventual disbandment and, in some cases, of the units and formations to which such records are now to be transferred.

The intention is, generally, that the records of disbanded Infantry and Pioneer Battalions, except Gurkha Rifles, should be maintained by Training Battalions.

The transfers of records indicated by the last Column of the Appendix will be carried out at once, except in the case of units which are now disbanding or for whom disbandment orders have not yet been issued. The records of these units will be handed over as soon as their disbandment is complete. The transfers of records to the Training Battalions of the 12th and 15th Indian Infantry Groups and of the 2nd Indian Pioneer Group, will be made as soon as these Training Battalions function as such.

233. Ammunition.—Paragraph 830, Army Regulations, India, Volume II, regarding 12741 (G. S.—M. T.-1). the expenditure of surplus practice gun ammunition is hereby cancelled.

This class of Instruction is that which normally is held annually for Royal Engineer officers below the rank of Lieutenant Colonel who have completed ten years' Indian Service and who have not given notice of their intention to revert to Imperial service.

Alterations and additions to the defensive works named in paragraph 335, the maintenance of which is debitable to Military Works funds, may be approved as follows:—

(a) *By the Government of India.*—All works exceeding Rs. 10,000 for all defences.

(b) *By General Officers Commanding-in-Chief of Commands and Quartermaster General in India.*—All works not exceeding Rs. 10,000 for all defences.

(c) *By General Officers Commanding Districts and Officers Commanding Independent Brigade Areas.*—All works not exceeding Rs. 2,500 for all defences.

(d) *By Officers Commanding Brigades.*—All works not exceeding Rs. 500 for all defences.

In the case of Class II and Class III defences, power to approve works of Ordnance establishments costing less than Rs. 1,000 which in no way affect the defences may be delegated by the General Officer Commanding concerned at his own discretion, to the Deputy Assistant Director of Military Works.

Paragraph 415 (c) (d). In 7th line for "Paragraph 337(a)" read "paragraph 339-A."

No. 287 OF 1922.

ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTION No. 39 OF 1922.

39. Suspension and review of sentences awarded by Courts Martial.

The following amendments will be made to Army Council Instruction 434 of 1921 :—

(a) Paragraph 1. Add at end of sub-paragraph (e) "but, by virtue of sub-section (8) of section 57-A every superior military authority is a reviewing authority under Section 57, whether the soldier is undergoing his sentence within his Command or not."

(b) Paragraph 11 :—

(i) For "the man is serving his sentence" in line 8 of sub-paragraph (a) substitute "the man's unit is serving."

(ii) Add at end of sub-paragraph (a) "and from the Officer Commanding the unit to which the man belongs as to the desirability or otherwise of any remission or suspension."

(c) Paragraph 12. Add new sub-paragraph :—

"(c) Sentences of a man discharged from the Army, which are being served in the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man, will not be remitted by superior military authorities or by other reviewing authorities, under section 57 of the Army Act, without reference to the War Office."

265. 2. Claims for pensions and children's allowances, for alternative pensions, for gratuities, or for special grants, should be addressed to the Audit Officer concerned.

257. Organization.—It is notified that before permitting men to proceed on leave to Bombay, Officers Commanding British Units should first ascertain from the Officer Commanding, British Infantry, Colaba, whether accommodation is available in the Attached Section.

This does not apply to men who make their own arrangements for accommodation elsewhere in Bombay.

258. Organization—Signal Service.—Artillery brigade signal sections form an integral part of divisional or corps signals, and, when reliefs take place between signal units or between artillery brigades, these sections will accompany or remain with their parent signal unit.

When reliefs between signal units necessitate a re-allotment of artillery brigade signal sections (owing to the varying requirements of different districts and divisions) special instructions for such re-allotment will be included in the orders for the relief.

2. The chain of command of divisional artillery brigade signal sections is:—

Officer Commanding divisional signals.

Officer Commanding No. 2 divisional signal company (assisted by the officer in charge divisional artillery signals).

Officer Commanding artillery brigade signal section.

3. The Officer Commanding divisional signals is responsible for the training and administration of his artillery brigade sections. He must act in the closest possible co-operation with artillery brigade commanders, and must bear in mind that the *raison d'être* of an artillery brigade

signal section is to provide the signal requirements of the artillery brigade commander.

4. The officer in charge artillery signals is the adviser of the Commanding Royal Artillery on all signal matters, and the officer commanding an artillery brigade signal section is responsible to him, as such, that the signal requirements of the artillery brigade commander are met:

5. The artillery brigade section officer acts as adviser to his artillery brigade commander on signal matters, and is responsible for technical advice and assistance to battery commanders in training their signallers.

6. When an artillery brigade signal section is not in the same station as the headquarters of the signal unit to which it belongs, mutual arrangements will be made between the Officer Commanding signal unit and the artillery brigade commander as to such administrative details as can be more efficiently dealt with by the latter. As regards discipline, the artillery brigade signal section will, subject to the orders of the district concerned, be placed under the artillery brigade commander.

2. The return should be submitted by units as directed in paragraph 3, with the exception that the first copy will be submitted to the General Officer Commanding the District concerned. The latter officer will when all the returns for his district are received, submit them to Army Headquarters, India.

271. System of indication of targets by Infantry to Artillery.—India Army Order No. 658 11303 (G. S.—M. T.-1). of 1921, is hereby cancelled.

The following system of indicating targets by Infantry to Artillery and of sending observations of the fall of rounds will be adopted whenever practicable.—

1. *Indication of target.*—In a well-mapped country the observer will ordinarily indicate to the battery his own map position and that of the target.

When good maps are not available, the observer must be in a position to see the battery or be able to place, in close proximity to him, a signalling post, which can see the battery and which is in the line observer battery.

The observer will consider himself at the centre of a clock and the battery at 6 o'clock. In the message he sends to the battery he will describe the target, indicating its direction by the clock-code and its distance from him in yards; thus in the case of machine guns holding up the advance from a position 800 yards to his right front, the message will be "Machine guns 800 yards 2 o'clock".

 April 22. 2. *Observation of fire.*—For observation of fire the observer will consider himself at 6 o'clock on a clock circle of which the target is the centre and will send the results to the battery by the clock-code, giving the distance of the fall of the rounds from the target in yards, *e.g.*, he observes a round fall 100 yards to the right of the target and therefore signals "100 yards 3 o'clock."

Defective Small Arms Ammunition.—With reference to paragraph 857, Army Regulations, India, Volume II (as amended by October Appendix, India Army Orders, 1921), the word "defective" in line 1 includes all ammunition which in any way unsatisfactory, and boxes containing mixed lots or inaccurate cartridges will be set aside and reported on India Army Form O-1453.

276. Titles, Shoulder—Indian Army Educational Corps.—Reference India Army Order No. 96 of 1921. The shoulder title of the Indian Army Educational Corps will be "I. A. E. C."

277. Boarding-out of Cavalry Horses.—Reference India Army Order No. 638 of 1921. In future no horse over 13 years of age will be boarded out by British and Indian Cavalry regiments.

278. Signal Training.—Army Order No. 91 of 1921 is applicable to India and is republished as an Annexure to this Order. The corresponding paragraphs of Signal Training, Part VI (India), i.e., paragraphs 3 and 30, Volume I, and paragraphs 4 and 20, Volume II, will be amended in due course.

279. Passages—Railways.—Pending the next reprint of Railway Warrant Form (I. A. F. 4008 (Q. M. G.-2-A). T-1707), the following information will be clearly endorsed on the form in red ink by despatching officers:—

"Name of particular unit joined by personnel in cases of move of personnel from unit or formation to unit or formation. In cases of move of recruits, the particular unit, etc., joined by recruits should be stated."

280. Passage rates recoverable from soldiers purchasing their discharge.—India Army Order No. 1076 of 1921 will remain in force until such time as the revised rate of passage money, required to be deposited by a soldier purchasing his discharge, is notified.

281. Lands.—So that there may be no misconception as regards Grass and Dairy farm lands, the following is published:—

46311 (Q. M. G.-8).

(a) Certain Military lands have been and are from time to time assigned to Grass and Dairy farms for administration and control, and this land is of two natures.—

(i) That wholly in charge of the farms department.

(ii) That of which they are responsible for taking the hay crop at certain times, but which at other times is used by the troops, *e.g.*, parade grounds, rifle ranges, etc.

(b) Land in category (a) (i) above can at all times be increased or reduced as the Commander-in-Chief may direct. That in category (a) (ii) will be controlled by the General Officer Commanding the district, who will give definite dates to the Assistant Controller of Grass Farms in the circle, after hearing that officer's recommendations.

(c) When local Military authorities wish to put up proposals for reallocation of farm lands for other military purposes or for the use of municipal revenues, Assistant Controllers of farms and subordinates in charge of farms will render every assistance to the local Military authorities in their enquiries and indicate what, from their point of view, would be the result if any were reappropriated.

The farm authorities have power neither to acquiesce in nor can they refuse the transfer of land.

(d) Reappropriation of land will be approved and orders will be issued to all concerned by the competent authority.

 under the supervision of the Inspectors of Ordnance

283. Equipment.—The "Pouch, rifle grenade dis-
 35669 (Q. M. G.-11-B). charger" will be worn on the left
 side of the belt between the buckle
 and the left cartridge carrier of the 1908 pattern web
 equipment.

The buckle on the loop, by which the pouch is attached
 to the belt, allows the pouch and contents to be easily
 detached. A one-inch retaining strap is also provided to
 buckle through the loop of the cartridge carrier to prevent
 the pouch from slipping off the belt when unbuckled.

The pocket on the right side of the pouch carries the
 special blank cartridges.

284. Rules for the conduct of Garrison and Regimental
 40237 (Q. M. G.) Institutes.—With reference to Army
 Canteens Instruction (India) No. 881, dated
 29th November 1921, the Provisional Rules for the conduct
 of Garrison and Regimental Institutes by the Army Canteen
 Board (India) are published as an Annexure hereto
 and will be brought into force on the publication of this
 Order.

2. In order to facilitate working of the Board and to
 ensure that matters requiring adjustment are dealt with
 expeditiously, the senior local Army Canteen Board (India)
 representative in each District or group of Districts, who
 will be styled District Manager, will wait on General

287. Machine Gun Training.—Reference India Army Order No. 124 of 1922. It is notified for information that Machine Gun Training (Provisional), 12251 (G. S.—M. T.-1.) 1921, has been made applicable to India with effect from the 13th February 1922.

88 288. *Baggage scales for units moving in relief.*—Units moving in relief are allowed free conveyance of the weight of stores laid down for the various formations in paragraph 110, Army Regulations, India, Volume X, in addition to the baggage allowed to individuals under paragraph 104, *ibid.*

24. The cost of conveying any baggage or stores in excess of the amounts laid down in the regulations referred to above, must, in all cases, be defrayed by the units concerned.

289. *Detailed control over expenditure on movement of Troops and carriage of stores.*—48748 (Q. M. G.-2-B.) It has been decided that a detailed control should be exercised at Army Headquarters over the expenditure on movement of troops and carriage of stores to enable the Quartermaster General in India to watch expenditure incurred, against the sanctioned budget.

2. In order to give effect to the above decision necessary information regarding the monthly expenditure incurred on all movements should reach the Director of Movements and Quarters, Quartermaster General's Branch, Army Headquarters, soon after the close of the month.

3. The statement printed as an Annexure to this India Army Order shows the various classes of Movements, the officers responsible for furnishing the information and the channel through which it should be furnished to the Director of Movements and Quarters.

4. A specimen form in which the necessary information should be supplied by the individuals concerned is also printed as an Annexure to this Order.

5. The first statement should be furnished for the month of April 1922 showing all movements during that month and should be despatched in ample time so as to reach the Director of Movements and Quarters by end of May 1922.

290. *Transport, Special and Miscellaneous.*—With regard to the question of individual responsibility of road transport vehicles—animal or mechanical transport—for the loads with which

they are entrusted for conveyance, it is desired to bring the following general principles to the notice of all concerned:—

(i) Transport at the disposal of officers in charge transport may be allotted in any of the following manners:—

- (a) A vehicle or vehicles may be allotted temporarily to meet bulk requirements of a unit or establishment.
- (b) The Supply and Transport Corps may undertake specifically the carriage of a definite tonnage of stores.
- (c) The Supply and Transport Corps may undertake the collection or delivery (or both) of small packages (e.g., at railway stations) or the distribution operations, etc., from a central store.

(ii) Responsibility for the safe custody of the stores in the three classes of cases mentioned above rests respectively:—

- (a) With the unit having general charge of the stores, whose business it should be to take safeguard;
- (b) With the Supply and Transport Corps, who prescribe the manner of conveyance;
- (c) With the Supply and Transport Corps as at (b) except in cases where units representatives attend to take charge of stores and accompany them to their destination.

(iii) In cases of (b) and (c) owing to the limited personnel available, it becomes the essential duty of the officer in charge transport and the officer commanding unit providing transport, by a scrutiny of the transport requisition, to take cognizance of the value and portability of the load to be carried, and to make arrangements as discretion may determine to safeguard the contents of vehicles. Thus, where consignments under (b) are in question, and stores are of considerable value, the officer in

charge transport should require from the unit demanding the transport, a custodian who should have responsible custody of the stores during road conveyance. Where this is not possible the officer commanding unit providing the transport must endeavour to supply a custodian. In the case of (c) the responsibility will devolve upon the Supply and Transport Corps and provision of a custodian must, if possible, be made where such a course is deemed necessary.

Whenever arms, ammunitions and treasure are being carried for a unit, that unit must detail an armed party to take charge of the stores and accompany them to their destination.

In the case of rations in (c) the units representative present at drawing rations shall remain in charge of them until delivered at destination.

(iv) In dealing with losses arising during transit by Government vehicles, and in fixing the responsibility for such losses, it should be borne in mind, firstly that the resources of personnel are limited, and, secondly, that, where the vehicle is unaccompanied either by a second driver or by someone especially detailed to be in charge of the load, a period must invariably occur during which the driver is unable to keep any adequate check on the contents of the vehicle.

This is particularly the case in regard to motor lorries, where the control of the vehicle, the noise inseparable from its running and the nature of its construction, all preclude the driver's attention from being directed to the load. In this case, where possible, the custodian should ride in the body of the lorry, and not on the front seat.

(v) Drivers of vehicles are not personally required to load or unload their vehicles, but they are responsible that the load is correctly stored and secured for the intended journey, having

regard to the nature of the load and the means at their disposal for securing it.

- (vi) In all cases of loss, due consideration must be given to the factors mentioned above, in arriving at a decision as to the pecuniary responsibility of those concerned for the contents of vehicles entrusted to drivers.

In this connection, the attention of presiding officers of courts of enquiry should be drawn to the system of control and the obligations as to the safe custody of stores, which rest upon the several individuals in the charge of responsibility.

291. Training of British and Indian soldiers in tailoring.—Classes of instruction for the training of British and Indian soldiers in tailoring will be held at the Clothing Depot, Madras.

The conditions appertaining to the formation of these classes will be as follows:—

- (i) Each class will consist of 10 men to be detailed as under:—

- (ii) The men will be attached for discipline to units and will live in barracks under arrangements to be made by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, Southern Command.
- (iii) The first class will commence at 9 A.M. on the 1st May 1922, and will terminate on 31st December 1922, thereafter, classes will be for one year commencing on 1st January.
- (iv) The names of men selected to attend the first class will be sent by Commands to the Chief Ordnance Officer, Madras, as soon as possible, those to attend subsequent classes will be sent by 15th December annually.

(v) Candidates must be of good character, and in the case of—

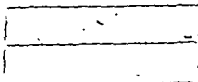
(a) British soldiers must also be tailors by trade, possess a second class certificate of education, have not less than four years unexpired service and must declare their willingness to extend to complete twelve years with the colours or re-engage as the case may be before being selected for the course of instruction.

(b) Indian soldiers must also be under 28 years of age, have not less than four years' unexpired service, be able to read and write in the vernacular, have a natural aptitude for tailoring and be able to sew well and put cut garments together. Officers Commanding will satisfy themselves that only the names of men possessing these qualifications are forwarded.

(vi) The tools, etc., necessary for the instruction of the classes will be provided under arrangements to be made by the officer in charge the clothing depôt.

(vii) British soldiers who qualify will be given a certificate (I. A. F. X-1843) as master tailors. Indian soldiers will be given a certificate of proficiency signed by the officer in charge clothing depôt.

292. Armlets for Officers of Military Adviser Staff of Indian State Forces.—It has been decided that officers of the Military Adviser Staff of Indian State Forces will wear armlets. The armlets will be of cloth, 3½" wide and of the following colours:—

2. Officers of the Military Adviser Staff will wear an embroidered badge on the armlet comprising the letters I. S. F. below the Crown.

3. Officers of the rank of full colonel and upwards will wear gorget patches of scarlet of the same pattern as worn by Officers in military employ.

296. **Indents.—Equipment and Ordnance Stores.**—The attention of all concerned is directed to India Army Order No. 222 of 1921. Units will find that they will receive the articles indented or with less delay if they adhere to the orders regarding the framing of indents.

The chief difficulties which have to be contended with by the arsenals are:—

- (a) Incorrect and incomplete nomenclature.
- (b) Correct authority not shown.
- (c) Vocabulary sections mixed instead of separate pages for each section of the Priced Vocabulary of Stores.
- (d) Indents for authorised stores submitted on other than due dates laid down in I. A. F. Z-2000
- (e) Indents for unauthorised stores not countersigned or accompanied by orders of competent financial authority on I. A. F. A-497.

Note 1—Rail charges not chargeable to Army Estimates will not be included in the statements (e.g., despatches of Medical Stores to civil institutions, despatches of personnel and stores to and from Mesopotamia)

Note 2—Separate statements to be furnished from the following classes of movements:—

- (a) Movements of units on change of stations and movements of units and drafts to and from the United Kingdom and colonies including charges on account of animals and stores, etc., belonging to the units.
- (b) Movements of personnel and stores taken with them.
- (c) Movements of stores other than (a) and (b).

Note 3.—Any wharfage or demurrage charges which have been incurred by officers should be included in these returns.

Note 4.—In the case of despatch of stores by passenger train, a brief explanation of the reasons necessitating the despatch by passenger train will be given in the column of remarks.

Submission of claims for increased pay on account of the grant of temporary rank to officers holding staff appointments.—With a view to facilitating the early settlement of claims on account of the grant of temporary rank, all officers who are affected by the decision promulgated in A.-11260 (A. G.-10). Army Instruction (India) No. 918 of 1921 authorising the grant of temporary rank to officers holding staff appointments with retrospective effect from 5th August 1914, should immediately the grant of such temporary rank is notified in the *Gazette of India*, submit their claims to the Controller of Military Accounts or other Audit Officer, on whose payment they were at the date of the Gazette notification.

All claims must be supported by a reference to the Gazette notification.

299. Furlough and Leave.—India Army Order 966 of 1921 is hereby cancelled and the following substituted:—

“ With a view to minimizing the interference to training caused by the same officer or officers of a unit frequently taking leave during the drill season for sport, games or other amusements, the following orders are issued:—

No individual officer will be given more than two periods of ten days leave (in addition to the recognized Christmas holidays) during the period 1st November—31st March, for any purposes whatever."

ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTION, No. 700 of 1921.

Savings Associations.

1. The attention of Officers Commanding units at home and abroad is drawn to Army Order No. 253 of 1921.

2. Arrangements have been made for command paymasters at all stations abroad (except Malta), and controllers of military accounts in India, to hold, as agents of the General Post Office, stocks of savings certificates for sale to Associations. Certificates are obtainable at Malta through the Anglo-Egyptian Bank.

3. A return, in manuscript, as shown in the Appendix to this Army Council Instruction, completed to 31st December 1921, will be rendered (in the case of units at home) on 10th January 1922, by all units and formations in which a Savings Association has been formed, to the Headquarters of the command concerned. A second copy will, at the same time, be sent direct to Major H. Spencer-Johnson, C.B.E., Commissioner for the Army, National Savings Committee, Princes House, Kingsway, London, W.C. 2.

Nil returns will be rendered by all units and formations which have not yet formed an Association. Units stationed overseas will render returns as soon as possible after 10th January 1922.

**ANNEXURE TO INDIA ARMY ORDER
No. 284 of 1922.**

Provisional Rules for the Conduct of Garrison and Regimental Institutes.

1. The Army Canteen Board (India) [hereinafter called A. C. B. (I)] is established in accordance with the terms of Army Instruction (India) No. 881, dated 29th November 1921.

2. A. C. B. (I) upon taking over the management of a Regimental Institute will be responsible for the conduct of the following branches of it:—

- (a) Grocery Bar.
- (b) Supper Bar.
- (c) Beer Bar.
- (d) Regimental Institute Bakery.
- (e) Mineral Water Factory.
- (f) Hawkers.

3. All articles required by units for messing purposes which are not issued in kind by the Supply and Transport Corps or sold by Government Dairies will be purchased from A. C. B. (I).

4. A. C. B. (I) have the sole right of supply, within barracks or lines concerned, of all articles and goods usually or which may usefully be sold in Regimental Institutes. This sole right does not extend to the supply of the messes of Officers and Sergeants, but such messes may deal with A. C. B. (I).

5. No hawkers or other vendors of articles or goods usually or which may usefully be sold in Regimental Institutes will be allowed within the barracks or lines concerned other than in accordance with arrangements made by A. C. B. (I), subject to the approval of the Officer Commanding as regards the individuals to be employed but not as to the terms of their employment.

6. A. C. B. (I) will pay to officers Commanding those units whose Regimental Institutes it conducts, a rebate at the rate of Rupees two Annas eight per head of the average messing strength of the unit for each calendar month, excluding Warrant Officers, Sergeants, married families and men in hospital, on furlough, or absent from any cause. A. C. B. (I) will provide Officers Commanding with a form on which to claim the payment of rebate. This form will be filled in on the 1st day of each month

and certified by the Officer-Commanding as a correct statement of the messing strength calculated according to the provisions of this paragraph. This form will be forwarded to the District Manager of the A. C. B. (I) concerned, and a cheque will be forwarded to the Officer-Commanding by the A. C. B. (I), Simla, if possible, before the 10th of each month for the amount due in respect of the previous month provided that all unit accounts due to A. C. B. (I) have been paid to A. C. B. (I) in accordance with the provision of paragraph 17.

7. A. C. B. (I) will allow 5 per cent. discount on purchases made at list prices, by Officers' Messes, Sergeants' Messes and married families.

8. In the event of a unit moving, before the end of a month, out of territory in which A. C. B. (I) conducts Regimental Institutes, a proportionate rebate will be paid for the actual number of days which have elapsed since last period up to but excluding the day of departure, calculated in accordance with the provision of paragraph 6 hereof.

9. When a unit or any part of it accompanied by A. C. B. (I) is (a) on line of march, (b) on manoeuvres or training or in camp for any purpose and it becomes necessary to establish temporarily new or detached Institutes, A. C. B. (I) will be entitled to retain one quarter of the rebate in respect of the numbers and the period involved (calculated in accordance with the provision of paragraph 6 hereof) in view of the special expense connected with the original and recurring cost of transportation of goods, utensils and staff, the provision of additional staff, etc.

10. A. C. B. (I) will be provided with accommodation by the local Military Authorities in which to carry on those branches of the Regimental Institutes which it conducts, excepting Bakery ovens, whether the unit concerned is in barracks, on line of march, in camp or on manoeuvres, etc. Living and sleeping accommodation will be provided for European staff.

11. A. C. B. (I) will supply only genuine articles of good quality at the lowest possible prices, and will maintain in the Institutes stock sufficient in volume and variety as the requirements of units may demand.

12. The prices of everything sold in the Institutes and by hawkers or other vendors controlled by A. C. B. (I) will be fixed by A. C. B. (I) who will furnish Officers

Commanding with copies of the price lists as issued from time to time.

13. Copies of the price lists will be conspicuously posted up by A. C. B. (I) in the Institutes.

14. The hours of opening and closing the various branches of the Institutes will be fixed by Officers Commanding.

15. The hour or time at which goods required for messing purposes shall be drawn from the Institutes, will be fixed by Officers Commanding.

16. Officers Commanding should arrange as far as possible that diet sheets for one week in advance are handed to the Institute Manager normally 48 hours in advance of the time when the first supply is required, but in special circumstances 24 hours' notice may be regarded as sufficient. Generally speaking, diet sheets will be handed to the Institute Manager on Friday, showing the men's diet for seven days commencing from the first meal on the following Monday.

17. A. C. B. (I) will allow credit accounts to units for messing goods, which will be rendered at the end of each period, and paid within seven days after being rendered.

18. A. C. B. (I) will allow credit accounts to recognised officers' messes, individual officers, Sergeants' messes and married families, but in the case of individual Officers and married families, credit will be allowed only to those whose names appear on an approved list for credit accounts prepared by the Officer Commanding and handed to the Institute Manager. This list will be submitted to the Officer Commanding on the 1st of each month by the Institute Manager for any revision which may be necessary. Credit accounts allowed in accordance with this paragraph will be rendered by A. C. B. (I) monthly and must be paid within seven days. If any accounts is not paid to A. C. B. (I) within fourteen days of being rendered, the Institute Manager will bring same to the notice of the District Manager, A. C. B. (I), who will, if the account continues unpaid, bring same to the notice of the Officer Commanding.

19. Institute Managers may cash cheques up to an amount of Rs. 50 on one day for Officers whose names appear on the approved list of names for credit accounts furnished by the Officer Commanding in accordance with paragraph 18.

20. When required to do so by Officer Commanding, A. C. B. (I) will sell Regimental necessaries in the Institute at Regulation Schedule prices in accordance with the terms of India Army Order No. 239 of 1921. A. C. B. (I) will pay for the articles sold monthly, in arrear. Upon the closing down of the Institute, or upon the moving of the units, such quantities of Regimental necessaries as may remain in A. C. B. (I) stock unsold will be taken back into Quartermaster's stores and credit allowed to A. C. B. (I) for the original value of goods so returned.

21. Special articles of Officers' clothing from the Officers Shop will be sold for cash only.

22. Wilful damage to, or theft of, any property of the A. C. B. (I) by individuals of the unit, which can be proved against such individuals, will be recognized by Officers Commanding as a claim against the amount of rebate to be paid to Officers Commanding by A. C. B. (I). The value of the damage or loss, and the amount to be allowed off the rebate, will be agreed between Officers Commanding and A. C. B. (I).

23. Malt liquor will not be served until further notice in larger measures than 14 liquid ounces, in Institutes conducted by A. C. B. (I).

24. The sale in the grocery bar of intoxicating liquors or poisons is prohibited. Harmless drugs and medicines approved by the M. O. may be sold.

25. No intoxicating liquor will be sold to any person appearing to be in the smallest degree under the influence of drink.

26. Officers and soldiers with their families and servants, the staff of the A. C. B. (I) and the civilian employees referred to in paragraph 27 are the only persons permitted to purchase articles at any of the branches of Institutes conducted by A. C. B. (I).

27. District Commanders are authorized, in any case where they consider it necessary, to grant special permission to civilians permanently employed on military service in barracks or camps, to deal at Regimental Institutes conducted by A. C. B. (I) subject to such special permits being kept within the narrowest limits and safeguarded against abuse. The civilians to whom this permission is granted will be provided with a pass or written authority issued by H. Q. of the district concerned, to produce on demand at the Institute. A record of these permits will be kept and the list reviewed quarterly.

28. All persons entitled to deal at Institutes conducted by A. C. B. (I) are prohibited from purchasing or being concerned in the purchase of articles for the benefit of persons not so entitled. This is not, however, to debar a soldier from entertaining a civilian friend.

29. The C. O. may permit soldiers to introduce male friends into the supper bar during the usual hours. The person who introduces a friend will be responsible for his good behaviour. The C. O. may exclude any individual at any time.

30. Entertainments and amusements may be organized under the supervision of the C. O. in connection with either Garrison or Regimental Institutes. They will not take place within the premises of liquor bars unless it cannot be otherwise arranged.

31. Detachments or units which, for any reasons, have had no Institute of their own, and have consequently dealt with the Institute of another unit, will receive a proportion of the rebate paid in respect of such Institute. The share of each unit will be calculated according to the period during which it has used the Institute and on its strength for that period (calculated in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6), but no detachment or unit will be entitled to a separate share unless it has exclusively used the Institute for not less than seven days.

32. A Committee will be appointed by the C. O. (in the case of a Garrison Institute, by the O. C. garrison), under whose orders they will act. The President should be the P. R. I. (a field Officer); in no case will he be under the rank of Captain. A C. O. may appoint himself President. The Adjutant and Quartermaster will not be members. The members will consist of one Corporal or Private per squadron or company to be elected by his comrades with the approval of the C. O. In the R. H. A. and R. F. A., each battery will elect a representative to act on the committee of the Brigade or Battery Institute, the same number being elected in the case of a company of R. G. A., R. E., S. & T., etc. In the case of a mixed Institute (i.e., common to two or more units) the O. C. the Brigade or station will decide the number of representatives on the committee from each unit using the Institute. The committee are not empowered to make any changes or issue any instructions but will submit their recommendations to the A. C. B. (I).

33. A locked box will be kept in a suitable place in each Institute into which complaints may be placed by soldiers and others dealing with the Institute. The key will be kept by the P. R. I. who will open the box ~~once~~ once a day. Officers Commanding will take up all complaints with District Manager, A. C. B. (I) or with the local Inspector. Complaints which cannot be dealt with locally, or which may not be satisfactorily dealt with locally, will be forwarded direct to the Controller, A. C. B. (I), Simla, who will investigate and take action. Any complaint not satisfactorily dealt with in accordance with the provisions of this paragraph will be forwarded through the ordinary channels to Q. M. G., Army Headquarters.

34. Contractors employed as sub-contractors by the A. C. B. (I) are not to be employed as caterers for Officers or Sergeants' Messes in the same unit.

35. The practice of contractors (sub-contractors or otherwise) or their agents, of lending motor cars, horses, etc., or "standing treat" in any shape or form, or making presents, directly or indirectly, to anybody connected with the units which they supply, is prohibited, and contractors must not subscribe in any way for the direct or indirect advantage of the unit or any person connected therewith.

36. If a C. O. desires to obtain an analysis of any commodity supplied in his Institute, he may do so by submitting the sample, or samples, to the Officer in Charge, Military Food Laboratory, Kasauli, in accordance with instructions as to the procedure from time to time in force.

If the results are arrived at by ordinary firing a note should be made on the Memorandum of Examination of the degree of reliability of information available at the time of firing on atmospheric conditions, meteor, etc.

320. Passages—Railway.—A Railway Agency having been opened at Chakrata, all future consignments of military stores intended for Units at Chakrata and Kailana are to be booked direct *via* Saharanpur.

The Supply and Transport Corps Forwarding Agency at Dehra Dun will be closed with effect from the 30th March 1922.

321. Movements of Transport Units.—Movements of transport units when changing station will normally be carried out by road.

In arranging such moves, however, Commands and Independent Districts are responsible for ensuring that in the absence of adequate reasons to the contrary the method adopted is that which involves least expense to the Government.

In deciding whether it would be more economical to carry out a long distance move by rail, rather than by road, allowance must be made for the possibility of having to hire local transport temporarily to perform station duties for the period during which the move is actually taking place.

323. Memoranda of Examination for Ordnance.—The various charges should be converted into equivalent full charge rounds by all artillery units and coast and inland defences in India as follows for entry in Memoranda of Examination:—

- (1) Multiply the totals of the various charges, find by their fractional equivalents which will give whole numbers and a resultant balance.
- (2) Multiply the resultant balance, if any, by the decimal equivalent of the fraction referred to in (1).
- (3) Add the whole numbers obtained in (1) and the decimal fraction obtained in (2).

This gives the result for record.

2. *Example:* To convert 214 first charges of a Q. F. 4.5-inch howitzer: the equivalents are $\frac{1}{3}$ and .03; the calculation will, therefore, be as follows:—

$$214 \times \frac{1}{3} = 6 + 22 \text{ (resultant balance).}$$

$$22 \times .03 = .66.$$

$$6 + .66 = 6.66 \text{ result.}$$

GENERAL ROUTINE ORDER.

157. *Malicious Injuries (Ireland) Act, 1919-20.*—General Routine Order 87/22 is cancelled and the following substituted:—A public Notice on behalf of the Provisional Government of Ireland has been issued to the effect that:—

- (i) All persons who have obtained decrees under the Criminal Injuries (Ireland) Act, 1919-20, shall lodge Notice of such decrees with the Secretary of the County Council in which the casualty was sustained before April 1st, 1922.
- (ii) All persons who have lodged claims on which judgment has not yet been given shall take the same action.
- (iii) All persons who have claims which they propose to lodge, but who have not yet done so, shall notify their intention to do so to the Secretary of the County Council as above.

To comply with paragraph 3 above, notification should be made to the solicitor whom it is proposed to employ, in order to enable him to lodge the necessary notice. If the name of a suitable solicitor practising in the neighbourhood of the scene of the occurrence is not known, reference should be made to General Headquarters, Parkgate, Dublin.

In cases coming under paragraphs 1 and 2, the solicitor already employed should be requested to lodge the necessary notice.

Decrees when received should be lodged with the Under Secretary, Dublin Castle.

Officers Commanding Units should bring this information to the notice of the next-of-kin of any soldier of the unit who has died of injuries received, and any ex-soldier who has been discharged on account of injuries.

2. Procedure to be followed when soldiers are sent home from overseas for discharge or transfer to the Reserve.

In order to enable soldiers returning from overseas to be given leave on arrival home, the following amendment will be made to Army Council Instruction No. 479 of 1921:—

Paragraph 10. Delete lines 11 to 16 and substitute:—

“Soldiers who are not due to be discharged, or transferred to the reserve, until after two months from date of disembarkation (i.e., those specified in heading B of paragraph 3 above) will be dealt with as follows:—

- (i) Soldiers of cavalry regiments, the linked regiment of which is in Ireland, will be despatched to the depôt of their regiment (No. 5 Cavalry Depôt, Bristol, if their depôt is in Ireland), where they will be given 28 days' furlough, if they have more than 3 months to serve, or 14 days' leave, if they have 3 months or less to serve.

Soldiers of infantry regiments, the home service battalion of which is in Ireland, will be despatched to the depôt of their regiment (home service details in the United Kingdom if their depôt is located in Ireland), where they will be given 28 days' furlough, if they have more than 3 months to serve or 14 days' leave if they have 3 months or less to serve.

On completion of this furlough or leave, they will be despatched to the units shown in column 3 of Appendix IV to this Army Council Instruction.

- (ii) Soldiers of cavalry regiments, the linked regiment of which is not in Ireland, of infantry regiments, the

home service battalion of which is not in Ireland, and soldiers of all other arms, will be despatched to join the units shown in column 3 of Appendix IV to this Army Council Instruction, where they will be given 28 days' furlough, if they have more than 3 months to serve, or 14 days' leave, if they have 3 months or less to serve.

Such soldiers will be posted or attached to the units to which they have been despatched. The proceedings on discharge or transfer to the reserve of these soldiers will be carried out at the units shown in Appendix IV in due course, in accordance with the 'Instructions for Discharges and Transfers to the Reserve, March, 1920.'

3. In dealing summarily with officers under the provisions of Section 46-A. of the Army Act, the following instructions should be strictly observed:—

(a) The authority having the power to deal summarily with a case against an officer within

the meaning of Section 40-A. of the Army Act, should only exercise this power when the offence is laid under the following sections of the Army Act:—6, except on active service; 8 (2) (Threatening or insubordinate language only), except on active service; 9 (2) except on active service; 10, 11, 14, 15, 19, 20 (except when the act is wilful), 21, 22, 26, 28 (1), 30 (3), 31 (2), (4), 34, 39 and 40.

- (b) When a General Officer, or Colonel Commandant, who has power to dispose summarily of a case against an officer, decides to award a sentence of forfeiture of seniority he should not in any case order the officer concerned to forfeit more than 12 months' seniority.
- (c) When a General Officer, or Colonel Commandant, who has power to dispose summarily of a case against an officer, decides to award a sentence of forfeiture of service for the purposes of promotion in the case of an officer of the Indian Forces, he should not in any case order the officer concerned to forfeit more than 12 months' service.
- (d) When a General Officer, or Colonel Commandant, in paragraph 549, decides not to deal summarily with a charge against an officer which has been referred to him for disposal but to refer it for trial by Court Martial he may convene a Court Martial for the trial of the officer concerned, whether or not he has investigated the case.

4. Attention is particularly drawn to sub-section 2 of Section 40-A. of the Army Act, as amended by the Army and Air Force Annual Act of 1921. The authority dealing with a case summarily under this Section can only award punishment after either hearing the evidence or, if the accused consents thereto in writing reading a Summary or Abstract of Evidence.

In cases which are disposed of on the evidence of witnesses given orally before the authority dealing with the case "documentary evidence" is only admissible to the same extent and for the same purposes as before a Court Martial.

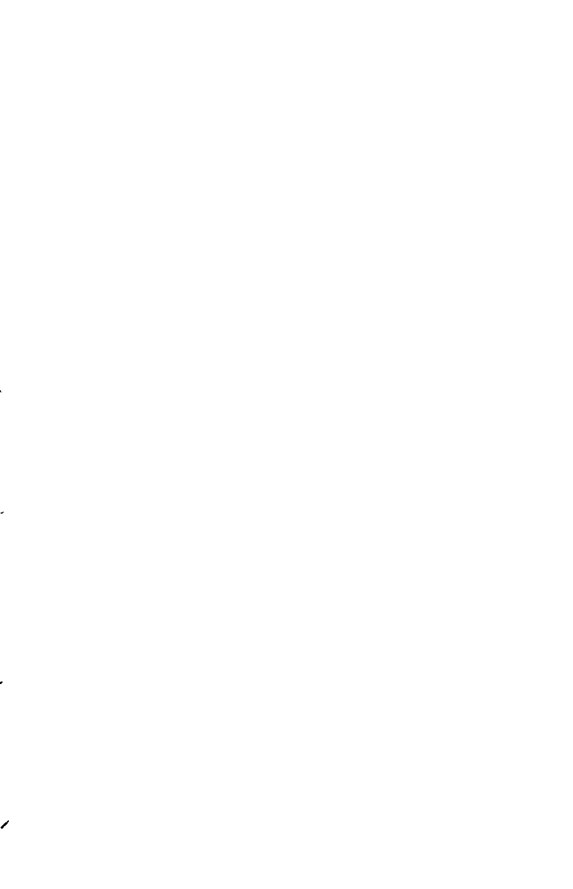

371. Disposal of serviceable veterinary instruments and equipment of Indian Silladar Cavalry Regiments on commission to non-silladar basis.—It has been decided not to proceed with the formation of a separate Army Veterinary Stores, India. The serviceable instruments and equipment, referred to in paragraph 4 (b) of India Army Order No. 414 of 1921, will be returned to the nearest depôt of supply, in direct communication with the officer in charge concerned.

372. Military Widows' Fund, British service.—Attention is invited to the advantages of joining this Fund, which was established in 1820 to assist the families of British Service officers dying in India, and mainly to enable them to return home without delay. Only officers of the *British Service, serving on the Indian establishment are eligible to be members*. British officers of the Indian Services, e.g., Indian Army, Indian Medical Service, Indian Army reserve, etc., etc., are ineligible to join the Fund, also temporary commissioned officers of the British Service, officers of the Supplementary List, Royal Engineers, and officers of the Royal Air Force.

2. The Fund enables a British Service (Army) officer, by subscribing from Rs. 6 to Rs. 12 per quarter, to assure, in the event of his death while on the Indian establishment, immediate payment of—

Rs. 5,000 to 6,000 to his widow.

Rs. 500 to 750 to each child.

Payments are made immediately on receipt of report of the death of the subscriber, irrespective whether the death occurred in or out of India, or whether his family is residing in or out of India at the time. The sum paid to the widow varies with the subscription paid, and the sum for each child varies with the age of the child. Subscriptions are based on the pay of the officer.

3. It is to the advantage of an officer to join the Fund on his first tour of service in India, as otherwise, on joining it in a subsequent tour he would have to pay subscriptions for any previous tours in the country as a married officer.

4. The management of the Fund is controlled by a Committee consisting of and elected by subscribing officers serving at Army Headquarters, Simla.

5. Application for admission to the Fund, and for copies of the Regulations relating thereto should be addressed to the Secretary, Military Widows' Fund, British Service, Army Headquarters, Simla.

407. **Examination for promotion of Royal Engineer officers.**—With reference to Appendix XI, subject (f) King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 467 of 1920. The following modifications are made in the case of officers serving on the Indian establishment.

Paragraph 3.—For officers of Sappers and Miners serving at Headquarters or Corps the project will be set under the direction of the Commandant of the Corps concerned.

Paragraph 4.—In the hot weather, the hours of work may be varied according to circumstances; though the total time allowed should not be exceeded.

Paragraph 5.—In India the projects will be criticised by the officer who set the project; he will especially state his opinion as to the extent to which local conditions are satisfied. The projects will be finally examined and marked by a Standing Board consisting of the Major-General, Royal Engineers and an officer nominated by the Director, Military Works. The Standing Board will communicate the results to Army Headquarters, India.

Paragraph 6.—Does not apply. Officers in Railways, Survey, etc., will have their projects set by the C. R. E. most conveniently situated for the purpose, in each particular case.

Paragraph 10.—In India applications from officers to be set a project will be submitted by the officers concerned, through the regular channels, to Army Headquarters, India.

Paragraph 11.—In the case of Sapper and Miner officers with the Headquarters of a Corps, the Commandant of the Corps of Sappers and Miners will insert the site and any other particulars necessary to adapt the project to local conditions.

II. The revised system (India Army Order No 1021, date the 20th September 1921) for the payment of miscellaneous remittances from Gurkha Units in India to Gurkha soldiers and their dependants resident in Nepal has been found to be extremely unsatisfactory.

2. To remedy the matter the procedure detailed below will be adopted in future

Remittances are divided into two classes (i) those intended for pensioners, and (ii) those intended for others, e.g., heirs of deceased Gurkhas, etc.

- (i) *Those intended for pensioners*—These generally consist of arrears of pay due to them, and in the case of family pensioners, the estates of the deceased. They should, as far as possible, be forwarded *monthly* by Gurkha Units to the Treasury Officers at which Treasuries the pensioners draw their pensions. A list in duplicate of such remittances should accompany each remittance. These will be paid by Treasury Officers to the payees when they next call for their pensions, and their receipts will be taken on the list, which when complete, will be returned to the remitter. Officers Commanding Units should personally see that these remittances are reduced to the lowest limit possible and so far as may be feasible complete all payments due to men going on pension to-Nepal before they leave their units.
- (ii) *Remittances for heirs of deceased Gurkha soldiers and demobilised men, etc.*—These should be forwarded, with a list giving complete and correct addresses of the payees in Nepal to the British Envoy at the Court of Nepal, who on receipt will forward them to the Nepal Government for payment. The Nepal Government will in due course forward to the British Envoy the payees' receipts, when payments are effected, or return the money if payees cannot be traced. These receipts of monies will then be forwarded on by the British Envoy to the remitters.

3. It is often found that Gurkhas on enlistment describe themselves wrongly and give fictitious addresses. This causes a great deal of trouble in tracing heirs, and dependants in case of decease, and the attention of Officers Commanding Gurkha Units is drawn to the paramount necessity of obtaining and verifying as far as possible the correct addresses of recruits. Addresses given can be checked to some extent from the list of villages contained in the Gurkha Handbook. A publication giving Thums and Districts in Nepal, with map has already been supplied to all

Gurkha Units. Any Officer Commanding a Gurkha Unit who has not received a copy may obtain one from the British Envoy, Katmandu, on application.

4. Officers Commanding Gurkha Units are instructed to make fuller use of the Nepalese Post Office in sending ordinary communications, parcels, etc., to residents in Nepal. Letters sent by post should bear Nepalese as well as Indian stamps. The rates of Nepalese postage are as shown in the table which was published as Annexure III to India Army Order No. 1021 of 1921.

5. India Army Order No. 1021, dated the 20th September 1921, is hereby cancelled.

6. The Officer Commanding, Detachment "L" Company, Royal Corps of Signals, will be responsible for the issue of Part II Orders affecting all Royal Corps of Signals soldiers serving under his command.

7. The Commandant, Signal Training Centre and Depot, Jubbulpore, in his capacity as Officer Commanding Detachment "L" Company, Royal Corps of Signals, is authorised to correspond direct with the Officer in charge of Royal Corps of Signals Records, Chatham, on all matters of a routine nature affecting Royal Corps of Signals soldiers serving under his command.

420. Attendance of students at Small Arms Schools.— India Army Order No. 184 of 1921 (G. S.—M. T.—I). is republished below for information. Failure on the part of Commanding Officers to comply with paragraph 2 of this Order results in unnecessary expense to Government, waste of the time of the instructional staff and considerable inconvenience to individuals.

" 131. Commencing with the second course of 1921 Entrance Examination will be held at the commencement of every rifle and light gun course held at a Small Arms School.

Any officer or non-commissioned officer who fails to qualify at this examination will be returned to his unit.

The scope of the examination will be as follows:—

Rifle course.—Candidates must be able to pass any of the following tests of elementary training as laid down in Musketry Regulations, Part I, paragraphs 297, 298 and 299 (as amended by the Indian Supplement, Chapter I).

Oral tests, Nos. 1 and 2.

Inspection test, No. 1.

Standard tests, Nos. 4, 5, 6, 8, 9 and 10.

They must also possess a reasonable working knowledge of the use of the bayonet in accordance with Musketry Regulations, Part I, Addendum No. 5.

Light Gun course.—Candidates must possess a working knowledge of the mechanism of the gun and of elementary drill and standard tests. They must also be able to remedy simple stoppages.

2. No non-commissioned officer below the rank of corporal, lance-dafadar or naik is to be selected to attend a course at a Small Arms School."

ANNEXURE TO INDIA ARMY ORDER

SIR,

1. I am commanded by the Army Council to inform you that it has been decided to effect considerable reductions in the Royal Field Artillery. The majority of the junior units, which will be absorbed, are serving overseas, and as it would be very costly to carry out the movement of personnel which would be involved if the senior units now in the United Kingdom were sent abroad complete to absorb the junior units and these latter were brought back to be broken up, it has been decided to effect the necessary absorptions by sending only the records and private funds and property of the old units in charge of certain officers to be detailed as in paragraph 8. The date of the absorption of the junior unit by the senior will be the date on which these officers arrive with the records of the senior units.

2. The steps which will have to be taken in connection with the records and personnel of Royal Field Artillery units in the United Kingdom and on the Rhine other than Reserve Brigades and Depôts are shown on the table annexed.

3. As regards the dispersal of personnel of units at home, this will be facilitated if advance information can be given to the Secretary, The War Office, A. G.-6 (A), on the following points:—

- (i) The names of the officers selected to convey abroad the Records, funds and property from Units at Home. The ranks of the Officers to be detailed will be as follows:—

5. With regard to the disposal of funds and property of units to be absorbed or disbanded, the following will be the procedure:—

- * * * * *
- (b) *Officers' Messes and Serjeants' Messes.*—Should be disposed of in accordance with the decision of the O. C., which should be based on the recommendation of the respective Committees. Mess Furniture and other articles which are the property of the unit and not of the public may be sold, and the proceeds credited to the regimental funds of the unit. Where practicable this will be done before the funds are disposed of.

There is, however, no objection to transfer of articles in kind on absorption of one unit by another.

- (c) *P.R.I. and any other funds.*—Will be handed over to the United Services Trustee, together with a certified statement giving the following particulars:—

- (i) Unit.
 (ii) Name of Officer making the remittance.
 (iii) Amount and particulars of cash transferred.
 (iv) *The allocation desired.*—The principle of regimental funds following the men from whom the funds have been derived should be adhered to as far as possible. When a definite allocation cannot be made owing to deferred posting of personnel, the money should be handed over to the United Services Trustee, who should be informed that an allocation by the last C. O. of the disbanded or absorbed unit will be made when a definite posting of personnel has been decided upon. The United Services Trustee will conform to the allocation made after all liabilities have been met, or two months after disbandment of the unit.

It is to be understood that any funds or property held under a trust can only be disposed of in accordance with the terms of the trust.

It is, however, suggested, with a view to keeping funds and property of all regimental institutes, *i.e.*, Officers' Mess, Serjeants' Mess, P.R.I., etc., in the Regiment that:—

- (a) When the records of units are transferred abroad the funds and property accompany the records.
- (b) When one unit is absorbed by another, the funds and property will also be absorbed.

It is for consideration of the officers of the units to be disbanded whether it would not be desirable to hand over any articles and other effects of historic interest to the R.A. Officers' Mess, Woolwich.

ANNEXURE I TO INDIA ARMY ORDER

CORRECTIONS TO ARMY REGULATIONS, INDIA, VOLUME X.

Paragraph 44.—Clause (a) of paragraph 44 is reconstituted as follows:—

44 (a) When accommodation is available on Indian Service transports or R. I. M. vessels, not-entitled passages, as indicated below may be granted by the D. R. I. M., the Q. M. G. in India and such authorities as may be laid down from time to time by Army Headquarters. They will be restricted to one passage in three years unless spare berths are available. If spare berths are available, individuals who have received passages within three years may be considered in the same order of precedence, but after all others. Passages for officers of the R. I. M. will be similarly allotted according to their relative rank. Families of officers who die in the service will be granted not-entitled passages on their first voyage, irrespective of the period that may have elapsed since the death of the officer.

After clause (c) of paragraph 44, insert:—

Appendix X enumerates the categories of those eligible for such passage; the order of precedence in that appendix gives the normal priority of each category. The authorities entitled to allot passages will do so in accordance with their view of the urgency of the case, such urgency depending as a rule on the financial condition and juniority of the applicant within each category; at the same time the authority is permitted to depart from the order of priority in special cases.

CORRECTIONS TO ARMY REGULATIONS, INDIA, VOLUME X.

Appendix X.—The order of precedence for first class not-entitled passengers is re-arranged as follows:—

- (i) Families of all officers who die in the service.
- (ii) Officers' families proceeding Home on the recommendation of a medical board who are not entitled to passage under paragraph 72.
- (iii) Officers of the British and Indian services proceeding Home on resigning the service and their families, when passages are recommended on financial grounds.
- (iv) Families of officers who move out of British India or to the frontier on duty to a station, where families are not allowed to accompany them.
- (v) Children of deceased officers sent home for education.
- (vi) Departmental commissioned officers in military employ and their families.
- (vii) Quartermasters and riding-masters and their families
- (viii) Departmental commissioned officers in civil employ and their families
- (ix) Officers, other than the above, of British and Indian Services, in military employ, below the substantive rank of Major, whose circumstances render such a concession desirable; and their families.
- (x) Substantive field officers, other than those mentioned above, of the British and Indian services, in military employ whose circumstances render the concession desirable; and their families.
- (xi) Officers of British and Indian services in civil employ, below the substantive rank of Major, whose circumstances render such a concession desirable; and their families.

- (xii) Lady nurses of the Q. A. M. N. S. for I.
- (xiii) Families of chaplains doing duty on board ship, when they can be accommodated in the same cabin as the chaplain.
- (xiv) Chaplains below the rank of senior chaplain, who minister to the troops in India, and their families: in the case of those not actually ministering to the troops at the time of application, they must have done at least three years with troops since last receiving a not-entitled passage.
- (xv) Families of chaplains doing duty on board ship who cannot be accommodated in the same cabin as the chaplain.
- (xvi) Officers of the Indian service proceeding Home on retirement after service entitling them to a pension or gratuity, and their families.
- (xvii) Civilian mechanics and other civilian employees of Army Departments and the R. I. M. eligible for first class accommodation and their families.
- (xviii) Widows and unmarried daughters of officers who died after leaving the service, on finally leaving India; but not-entitled passages should not be granted to those who, after having gone to the U. K. or the colonies after the officer left the service, come back to India again.
- (xix) Retired officers of British and Indian services, who have remained in India after leaving the service, and their families, if they were not domiciled in India on joining the service, on finally leaving India.
- (xx) Ex-soldiers who are serving Government in a civil department, after completing 12 years service in the Army in India and who are eligible for first class accommodation and their families.
- (xxi) Substantive field officers of British and Indian services, in civil employ whose circumstances render the concession desirable and their families.
- (xxii) Lady nurses of Lady Minto's Indian Nursing Association.

CHAPTER 6

AN ACT TO PROVIDE, DURING TWELVE MONTHS, FOR THE DISCIPLINE AND REGULATION OF THE ARMY AND AIR FORCE

[12th April 1922.]

WHEREAS the raising or keeping of a standing army within the United Kingdom in time of peace, unless it be with the consent of Parliament, is against law:

And whereas it is adjudged necessary by His Majesty and this present Parliament that a body of land forces should be continued for the safety of the United Kingdom and the defence of the possessions of His Majesty's Crown, and that the whole number of such forces should consist of two hundred and fifteen thousand, including those to be employed at the depôts in the United Kingdom for the training of recruits for service at home and abroad, but exclusive of the numbers actually serving within His Majesty's Indian possessions :

51.

And whereas under the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, His Majesty is entitled to raise and maintain the air force, and it is judged necessary that the whole number of such force should consist of thirty-one thousand one hundred and seventy-six, including those employed as aforesaid, but exclusive of the numbers serving as aforesaid, and the provisions of the Air Force Act are due to expire at the same dates as the provisions of the Army Act :

And whereas it is also judged necessary for the safety of the United Kingdom, and the defence of the possessions of this realm, that a body of Royal Marine forces should be employed in His Majesty's fleet and naval service, under the direction of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom, or the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral aforesaid.

And whereas the said marine forces may frequently be quartered or be on shore, or sent to do duty or be on board transport ships or vessels, merchant ships or vessels, or other ships or vessels, or they may be under other circumstances in which they will not be subject to the laws relating to the government of His Majesty's forces by sea :

And whereas no man can be forejudged of life or limb, or subjected in time of peace to any kind of punishment within this realm, by martial law, or in any other manner than by the judgment of his peers and according to the known and established laws of this realm; yet, nevertheless, it being requisite, for the retaining all the before-mentioned forces, and other persons subject to military law or to the Air Force Act, in their duty, that an exact discipline be observed and that persons belonging to the said forces who mutiny or stir up sedition, or desert His Majesty's service, or are guilty of crimes and offences to the prejudice of good order and military or air force discipline, be brought to a more exemplary and speedy punishment than the usual course of the law will allow.

And whereas the Army Act and the Air-Force Act will expire in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-two on the following days:—

- (a) in the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man, on the thirtieth day of April; and
- (b) elsewhere whether within or without His Majesty's dominions, on the thirty-first day of July:

Be it therefore enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Army and Air Force Short title. (Annual) Act, 1922.

2 (1) The Army Act and the Air Force Act shall be Army Act and Air Force Act and remain in force during the Act to be in force for specified periods hereinafter mentioned, and cited times. no longer unless otherwise provided by Parliament (that is to say).—

(a) Within the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man, from the thirtieth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-two, to the thirtieth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, both inclusive; and

(b) elsewhere, whether within or without His Majesty's dominions, from the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-two, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three, both inclusive.

(2) The Army Act and the Air Force Act, while in force, shall apply to persons subject to military law or to the Air Force Act, as the case may be, whether within or without His Majesty's dominions.

(3) A person subject to military law or to the Air Force Act shall not be exempted from the provisions of the Army Act or Air Force Act by reason only that the number of the forces for the time being in the service of His Majesty, exclusive of the marine forces, is either greater or less than the numbers hereinbefore mentioned.

3. There shall be paid to the keeper of a victualling-house for the accommodation provided by him in pursuance of the Army Act or the Air Force Act the prices specified in the Schedule to this Act.

AMENDMENTS OF ARMY AND AIR FORCE ACTS.

Part I.—Amendments of Army Act.

4. In section 44 of the Army Act (which relates to the scale of punishment by courts martial).—

(1) At the end of paragraph (f) there shall be inserted the following words—

“ or, in the case of an officer whose promotion depends upon length of service forfeiture of all or any part of his service for the purposes of promotion.”

(2) The following proviso shall be inserted after proviso (2) —

“ (2A) The Army Council may restore the whole or any part of any lost seniority or forfeited service in the case of an officer who may perform good or faithful service, or who may otherwise be deemed by the Army Council to merit such restoration.”

5 In sub-section (2) of section 46A of the Army Act (which relates to the power to deal summarily with charges against officers, and shall hereafter be numbered 47) for paragraph (a) the following shall be substituted:—

“ (a) Forfeiture of seniority of rank either in the army or in the corps to which the offender belongs, or in both, or, in the case of an officer whose promotion depends upon length of service, forfeiture of all or any part of his service for the purposes of promotion.”

6 The following paragraph shall be inserted at the end of section seventy-six of the Army Act (which relates to the limit of an enlistment) —

“ Provided that the Army Council in special cases may by order direct that where any boy is

enlisted in a particular corps before attaining the age of eighteen, the period of twelve years shall be reckoned from the day on which he attains the age of eighteen years."

Part II.—Amendment of Air Force Act.

7. The following paragraph shall be inserted at the end of section 76 of the Air Force Act (which relates to the limit of an enlistment):

Amendment of sec. 76.

"Provided that, where any boy is enlisted in the regular air force before attaining the age of eighteen, the period of twelve years shall be reckoned from the day on which he attains the age of eighteen years."

Part III.—Amendments of Army Act applicable also to the Air Force Act.

8. Sub-section (2) of section 87 of the Army Act (which relates to the prolongation of service in certain cases) shall be amended as follows:—

Amendment of sec. 87.

After the words "foreign power" there shall be inserted the words "or while such soldier is on service beyond the seas."

At the end of the subsection the words "unless at that time a proclamation calling out the army reserve or any part thereof is in force" shall be added.

9. In subsection (8) of section 190 of the Army Act (which provides for the definition of the expressions "regular forces" and "His Majesty's regular forces")

Amendment of sec. 190.

- (c) Any alterations that may be necessary, after the vouchers have been prepared, must be attested by the signature of the issuing officer. Initials are not sufficient.
- (d) The rank and designation of the issuing officers must be legibly written.

With regard to (c), instructions are being issued to all railway officials concerned to the effect that tickets are, on no account, to be issued in exchange for incomplete or unsigned vouchers, or, in the case of altered vouchers, unless the alterations are properly attested by the issuing officer.

460. Co-operation of Aircraft with other Arms, India, 1921.—Reference India Army Order No 385 of 1922 suspending the use of "Co-operation of Aircraft with other Arms, India 1921." Pending the issue of an Air Ministry Operations Manual, which is shortly due for publication and which will contain a chapter on Co-operation of Aircraft with the Army, the instructions contained in Chief of the General Staff letter No. 3873—3 (S. D.-2), dated the 23rd March 1922, will hold good in India and will continue to be acted on. In this connection it is to be noted that the instructions contained in Appendix III to Signal Training, Part II, 1920, are applicable not only to infantry but to all arms equipped with the Popham Panel

462. Closing of Clothing Depôt, Lahore.—The Clothing Depôt, Lahore, will be closed for all issues from the 15th August 1922.

2. All units now dependent on the Lahore Depôt will, as a special case, immediately arrange to place indents on that Depôt to complete six months working stocks of clothing and necessaries [in place of three months' stock authorised to be maintained under paragraph 5, Clause (a) of the "Provisional Clothing Regulations (India), 1919."] Working stocks with units should, however, be reduced to three months' consumption before the end of the current financial year.

The Ordnance Officer, Clothing Depôt, Lahore, will meet these special demands to the fullest extent possible from his stocks, cancel any items not available, and inform the indenting officers accordingly. These inabilityes on special demands will not be met from other depôts. The intention is to reduce the Lahore Depôt stocks to the minimum before closing, to avoid double expense in railway freight and handling which would otherwise be incurred. Inabilityes on ordinary demands should be passed on to Sháhjahanpur for compliance.

3. Pending a revision of the areas of supply of clothing establishments published with India Army Order No. 605 of 1921, the following amendment should be made to the annexure to that India Army Order.

For "Fort Lahore Clothing Depôt" read "Shahjahanpur Clothing Depôt".

This affects the indents for medal ribbons of all units in India except the Royal Air Force, *vide* footnote (v) to the above-mentioned annexure.

463. Documents—Royal Engineers.—It is notified that the regimental documents of warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of the Corps of Royal Engineers sent to the United Kingdom for discharge, transfer to the Army Reserve, invalided, or on completion of their tour of duty, will in future be despatched to the Officer Commanding, Depôt Battalion, Royal Engineer, Chatham, instead of to the Officer in charge, Royal Engineer Records, Chatham, as has hitherto been the practice.

464. Organisation—Indian Signal Service.—It has been decided to proceed with the formation of one lower establishment cavalry brigade signal troop in cadre form only, i.e., without equipment or horses.

1. The unit will be designated 'D' Cavalry Brigade Signal Troop' and will be formed on the provisional peace establishment as laid down in the (India) No. 474 of 1921,

Animals and vehicles required for training purposes will be provided by the Signal Training Centre and Depot, to which the troop will be affiliated until further orders.

3. The class composition of the troop will be Hindustani Mussalmans.

4. The necessary action should be taken by the Commandant, Signal Training Centre and Depot, for the posting of British and Indian personnel to this unit as they become available, without depleting existing units.

465. Medals.—The Colonial Office have informed the Secretary of State for India that the rolls of all the personnel entitled to the African General Service Medal and Clasp "Somaliland 1920" are being prepared by the Somaliland Government for submission to the Colonial Office.

2. Officers Commanding units concerned will not therefore forward medal rolls to the Colonial Office as directed in paragraph 4 of India Army Order No. 984 of 1921.

466. Rail—Movements.... "Instructions for rail movements."—Paragraph 32. (Chapter 2283?—R S. (Q. M & 2-B.) IX) is amended to read as follows:—

"Soldiers when travelling by rail are permitted to purchase 1 pint of beer, or $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce spirits once daily, between the hours of 6 P.M. and 12 midnight, at all times of the year."

467. Annual Musketry courses for Armoured Car Companies.—In supersession of all previous orders on the subject, personnel of Armoured Car Companies in India will fire the following annual courses in Vickers gun, rifle and revolver.

(a) Vickers gun—(i) All personnel of companies equipped with armoured cars will fire the

- (c) *Pistol*.—All personnel armed with the pistol will fire the Annual Revolver Course specified in Table 4 of Armoured Car Training, 1921.

2. No individual will fire a rifle as well as a pistol course in the same musketry year, but all personnel, in addition to firing courses as prescribed in (a) above, will fire the course laid down in (b) or (c).

468. Language Examinations.—With reference to India 9319 (G. S.-M. T.-3). Army Order No. 376 of 1922, it is notified that the first examination under the revised 'Indian Regulations relating to the study of Foreign and Indian Languages' will be held on January 8, 1923.

ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTION No. 478 OF 1921.

478. *Procedure to be followed when soldiers are discharged at their stations overseas.*—1. This Army Council Instruction contains the procedure to be carried out when soldiers are permitted to be discharged from the army at their stations overseas and remain overseas.

2. *The soldiers who may be permitted to take their discharge overseas.*—Paragraph 371, King's Regulations, will be held in abeyance.

Soldiers due for transfer to the Reserve are not to be permitted to be transferred to the Reserve and remain overseas. Such soldiers, however, who have completed any period for which they are required to be retained in army service while serving overseas under Section 77 (2) of the Army Act, may be discharged from army service at their stations overseas in accordance with sub-paragraph (XVC) of paragraph 392, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 373 of 1920

Soldiers due for discharge from the army, who have completed any period for which they are required to be retained in army service under Section 87 (1) of the Army Act, and soldiers who are granted their discharge as a concession, may elect to be discharged at their stations overseas and remain overseas.

In this connection it is to be noted that soldiers serving with—

The British Army of the Rhine;

The British Troops in France and Flanders;

The British Troops of the various Plebiscite Areas;
and

Soldiers enlisted under Army Orders No. 4, 124, 125 of 1919, and Special India Army Orders Nos. 39-S of 1918 and 47-S of 1919;

are not to be retained in army service under Section 77 or 87 of the Army Act.

3. *Accounting.*—As soon as permission has been granted for a soldier to take his discharge overseas the Officer Commanding unit will inform the paymaster keeping the soldier's accounts.

In the case of a soldier whose accounts are kept locally the Officer Commanding unit is to render Army Form O-1809-F. (*see* Appendix I to this Army Council Instruction) to the paymaster seven days before the date on which the discharge is to be approved, and the paymaster is to complete and return the Army Form immediately.

In the case of a soldier whose accounts are not kept locally, the Officer Commanding unit is to render Army Form O-1809-F. to the fixed centre paymaster in the United Kingdom in sufficient time to enable the paymaster to notify (by telegram if necessary) the amount due to the soldier, before the date on which the discharge is to be approved.

4. *Furlough pending discharge.*—Soldiers due for discharge may be granted furlough under paragraph 1322, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 345 of 1920.

In this connection it is to be noted that furlough is not to be granted which will extend beyond the date on which the soldier's period of colour service terminates; also that soldiers due for transfer to the reserve, but whose discharge is authorized under sub-paragraph (XVC) of paragraph 392, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 373 of 1920, and soldiers who are granted their discharge as a concession, are not eligible for furlough under paragraph 1322, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 345 of 1920.

5. *Medical examination.*—A soldier to be discharged overseas is to be examined by the medical officer-in-charge unit at least two weeks before the date on which he leaves his unit. This examination is for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not the soldier has suffered impairment in health since his entry into the service.

If a soldier does not claim to be suffering from a disability, he is to sign the statement on Army Form Z-22 to that effect. If the r . . . unit does not discover any disability . . . to have been impaired in . . . he is to make an entry to that effect in the space reserved for question 9 on Army Form Z-22, complete particulars

as to the date of examination, sign and date the Army Form.

If a soldier claims that he is suffering from a disability, or the medical officer considers he has been impaired in health since entry into the service, he is to be brought before a medical board as near as possible to the day on which he is due to leave his unit. And the Officer Commanding unit is to ensure that the soldier completes Army Form B.-179-B, and the medical officer completes the first two pages of Army Form B.-179-A, before the assembly of the medical board.

In view of the purpose for which this examination is held the medical officer will omit the recommendation regarding permanent unfitness or change to the United Kingdom at the end of the "Statement of Case" on Army Form B.-179-A, and the medical board will omit the recommendation regarding discharge as physically unfit, categorization, or change to the United Kingdom at the end of the "opinion of the Medical Board" on Army Form B.-179-A.

6. *Date of discharge.*—The discharge of a soldier, who has been permitted to take his discharge overseas, having been authorized by the competent officer under paragraph 392, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 373 of 1920, will be approved by the Officer Commanding unit for the date on which the soldier leaves his unit; if furlough under paragraph 1322, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 315 of 1920, is granted this date of approval will be the day on which the soldier proceeds on furlough.

The discharge having been authorized and approved as above will be confirmed by the competent officer under paragraph 392, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 373 of 1920, to take effect from the date of termination of the soldier's engagement, or when the discharge has been granted as a concession, or in lieu of transfer to the reserve, it will be confirmed to take effect from the date of approval.

7. *Payment.*—On date of approval of discharge the soldier will be paid the balance due on his account as notified by the paymaster, less any cash payments made, and bills and stoppages incurred, since the date up to which the account was balanced.

On receipt of the date of confirmation of discharge from the officer-in-charge records, the paymaster will close the

account and forward any balance of pay and gratuity that may be due to the soldier at the address which has been notified (see paragraph 9 below).

8. *Protection certificate*.—Before leaving his unit the soldier is to be given a certificate of character (Army Form B.-2067), and a protection certificate made out in manuscript (see Appendix II. to this Army Council Instruction) pending receipt of his discharge certificate (Army Form B.-2079) from the officer-in-charge records.

9. *Notification of approval of discharge*.—Immediately the discharge of a soldier has been approved the Officer Commanding unit will notify to the officer-in-charge records:—

The date of approval of discharge, and the number of days furlough that may have been granted to the soldier under paragraph 1322, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 345 of 1920.

The sub-paragraph of paragraph 392, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 373 of 1920, under which the discharge has been approved.

The address to which the soldier's discharge certificate (Army Form B.-2079) is to be sent.

And particulars of the soldier's character:

And to the paymaster concerned:—

The date of approval of discharge, and the number of days furlough that may have been granted to the soldier under paragraph 1322, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 345 of 1920.

The sub-paragraph of paragraph 392, King's Regulations, as amended by Army Order No. 373 of 1920, under which the discharge has been approved; and the address to which any further balance of pay and gratuity that may be due is to be sent.

10. *Disposal of documents*.—Paragraphs 377 and 390, King's Regulations, will be held in abeyance.

Immediately the discharge of a soldier has been approved the Officer Commanding unit will forward the following documents, together with the notification referred to in paragraph 9 above, to the officer-in-charge records:—

Army Form Z.-22

or

Army Forms B.-179A and B.

Army Form B.-103.

Army Form B.-120.

Army Form B.-121.

Army Form B.-123.

Army Form B.-178.

Army Form B.-200 or duplicate attestation.

Army Form B.-198.

And the authority for discharge in the case of a soldier who has not completed his period of army engagement, but whose discharge has been authorized by the competent authority. In the case of discharge by purchase a statement showing by whom the purchase money has been received is also to be sent.

11. *Instructions to officers-in-charge records.*—On receipt of the notification, referred to in paragraph 9 above, and the documents, referred to in paragraph 10 above, the officer-in-charge records will confirm the soldier's discharge in accordance with, and carry out the further procedure laid down in, Section IV—"Instructions for Discharges and Transfers to the Reserve, March, 1920"

12. *Soldiers in hospital.*—In the case of a soldier in hospital at the date he is due to be discharged overseas, the Officer Commanding unit will approve the soldier's discharge with effect from the termination of his engagement, and will arrange with the officer-in-charge hospital for the medical examination, referred to in paragraph 5 above, to be carried out.

Such a soldier will then be dealt with in accordance with the instructions contained in paragraph 414, King's Regulations.

In order to enable this to be carried out the following procedure will be adopted.

As the procedure laid down in Army Instruction (India) No. 643, dated 1st August 1922, is completed in respect of each depôt (see definition of depôt in that Instruction which also applies herein) and the accounts and credit balances of each depôt have been transferred to the Regimental Paymaster, Poona, or to the Field Controller of Military Accounts, Poona, as the case may be, the documents including sheet-rolls but other than accounts documents, of each man so affected will be forwarded by the Officer Commanding Depôt to the Officer Commanding the Overseas Depôt.

These latter documents will only be forwarded on receipt of a call for them from the Officer Commanding the Overseas Depôt on his being informed by the Regimental Paymaster, Poona, or the Field Controller of Military Accounts, Poona, that a final settlement has been effected. The Regimental Paymaster, Poona, and the Field Controller of Military Accounts, Poona, will, so far as possible, work on the accounts of the same depôt concurrently. When future personnel proceed overseas, the depôt of the unit concerned will forward similar documents to the Overseas Depôt at Kirkee. Men returning from Overseas will proceed to the Overseas Depôt at Kirkee and will be settled up with by the Regimental Paymaster, Poona, to the date of embarkation, and by the Controller of Military Accounts, Bombay District, in respect of the period subsequent to embarkation. The Officer Commanding Overseas Depôt will report weekly to Army Headquarters, as he takes over the documents of each depôt. He will also inform the Embarkation authorities at Bombay and Karachi whenever he is ready to receive personnel of any particular Depôt, and he will request that any of these men returning from Overseas shall be sent to his depôt in future instead of to their depôt of origin. If during this interim period there is any

ANNEXURE TO INDIA ARMY ORDER
No. 513 of 1922.

ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTION No. 140 of 1922.

140. *Proficiency Pay.*—1. The attention of Commanding Officers is drawn to the instructions contained in Army Orders Nos. 325 and 368 of 1919, and Army Council Instructions Nos. 97 of 1920 and 482 of 1920 as amended by Army Council Instructions Nos. 601 of 1920 and 112 of 1921, wherein it is notified that men eligible for the grant of proficiency pay must be classified every six months.

2. These instructions have in many cases not been followed, and it has been brought to notice that in some cases soldiers have not been classified by their Commanding Officers for as many as three or four classification periods.

3. Commanding Officers are notified that these instructions must in future be strictly adhered to. Injustice may be inflicted on the man because of the omission to classify him, and Commanding Officers will be held responsible for ensuring that every man is classified within the proper period. The initiative rests with the Commanding Officer and not with the man.

4. It is also pointed out that a soldier cannot be granted proficiency pay under paragraph 3 of Army Order No. 368 of 1919, prior to the date on which he is classified for such pay by his Commanding Officer. Cases have occurred where men who have obtained 2nd Class certificates of education, have been classified 3 months later, and have been erroneously granted proficiency pay from the earlier date.

5. The attention of Commanding Officers and paymasters is also directed to paragraph 6 of Army Order No. 368 of 1919. A number of instances have come to light where, after a soldier has ceased to draw proficiency pay (e.g. on admission to hospital for illness due to his own fault), the emolument has been restored to him without his being in possession of a 2nd class certificate of education. The greatest care should in future be taken to comply with the above mentioned paragraph, and paymasters should at once review all cases where proficiency pay has been restored since 1st January 1921.

EXTRACT FROM ARMY COUNCIL INSTRUCTIONS FOR 1921.

489 Revised Classification of Ammunition and Explosives

1. Pending the issue of revised Magazine Regulations the revised general classification of ammunition and explosives is shown in the Appendices to this Army Council Instruction.

2. The storage of ammunition and explosives on land service charge should be re-arranged according to the revised classification on the first available opportunity.

3. The existing group and division labels will continue to be used until instructions are issued for the new group labels to be taken into use.

APPENDIX III.

Special Instruction as to Storage.

When possible, ammunition and explosives will be stored strictly by groups, each group in a separate building.

When practicable, each type of ammunition or explosive will be kept together so that, where stocks allow, buildings will be completely filled with one type instead of several.

The following groups must be kept separate (except as stated in paragraph 115, Magazine Regulations), viz.,

Groups III, IX, XII and XIII.

Groups XII and XIII must be stored in separate explosive stores isolated from other buildings containing explosives. They must be transported separately from other ammunition and care exercised that these conditions are adhered to in the field, whether in buildings or in dumps.

A. Z. ammunition filled with any of the following compositions:—"D. W.", "S. R.-260", "S. R.-512" at A. A. gun stations may, however, be stored in the same building as other A. A. ammunition when separate accommodation is not available.

Where present accommodation will not admit of all groups being stored separately, the following groups may be stored together, as shown, viz.,

Groups I, II, and IV (except gunpowder which has been wetted*) but under Magazine Conditions.

Or

Groups V, X and XI unboxed,

or

Groups VI, X and XI boxed,

or

Groups VII, VIII and XI boxed or unboxed.

When such groups are stored together under one roof they will be separated by partitions, where partitioned buildings are available or by suitable traverses.

*Gunpowder which has been wetted will still be treated as an explosive. Packages containing it should be kept in a cool place, and if possible, in an explosive store, upon a stone floor.

Where fuzed shell or bombs are stored under the same roof with plugged shell or bombs they will be separated from each other by a suitable partition or traverse not less than 3 feet thick.

This proviso is not necessary in the case of cartridge and filled shell stores of works which contain equipment ammunition for the guns.

Army Headquarters, Simla, the 10th October 1922.

680. The London Gazette of the 29th August 1922 were received at Army Headquarters on the 25th September 1922 and those of the 1st, 5th and 8th September on the 2nd October 1922

681. Appointments, Promotions, Leave, etc.—List No. 19 of Appointments, Promotions, Leave, etc., which have been approved by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, is published as an annexure to this Order

682. Reliefs, Indian Army.—Reference India Army Order No 580 of 1922, delete the item, 2/4th Royal Gurkhas, from Bakloh to Kohat and outposts

683. Establishments.—It is notified that the Indian Convalescent Camp, Bombay, will close with effect from the 15th October 1922.

2. After that date the segregation and classification of Indian details will, when necessary, be carried out at Deolali by the existing establishment at that station.

684. Moves of British units during the cold season 1922-23.—The 2nd Gloucestershire Regiment will not move in relief this cold weather.

The following alterations are made to India Army Order 470 of 1922 —

Under Infantry delete " 2nd Battalion, The Gloucestershire Regiment," and connected entries.

In column 3 opposite 2nd Battalion, The Essex Regiment, delete "Rawalpindi" and substitute "Ambala".

685. Drafts.—Paragraph 2 of India Army Order No. 542 A.-11336 (A. G.-1). of 1922 is hereby cancelled.

2. An explanatory memorandum in respect to paragraph 1 (3) "B" of the above quoted order has been issued to all concerned under Adjutant General in India's No. A. 11336-14 (A. G.-1), dated 13th September 1922.

686. Rates at which contributions to the Indian Civil Service and Indian Military Service Family Pension Fund and the Indian Military Widows' and Orphans' Fund are recoverable during the month of October 1922.—Contributions to the above funds will be at the rate of 1s. 3½d. the rupee during the month of October 1922.

The percentage admissible as exchange compensation allowance on salary paid during the same month is Rs. 8-1-0 per Rs. 100. The allowance is subject to the maximum of Rs. 179-3-0.

687. Despatch of British Other Ranks' families to Deolali.—Owing to the shortage of accommodation in Bombay, the following procedure will be adopted with regard to the despatch, during the trooping season, 1922-23, of British Other Ranks' families when accompanying medical cases for direct embarkation:—

- (1) The Deputy Assistant Director, Medical Services (Embarkation), Bombay, instead of directing such invalids and families to report at Bombay, will instruct them to be despatched to Deolali, so as to arrive at the latter place two clear days previous to date of embarkation.
- (2) Their onward despatch from Deolali will be arranged direct between Deputy Assistant Director, Medical Services (Embarkation), Bombay, and Officer Commanding, British Concentration Camp, Deolali, in communication with Officer Commanding, British Station Hospital, Deolali.

688. **Extra Warm Clothing for Troops and Followers** at certain cold stations.—Reference 42281 (Q. M. G.-12) : *Army Instructions (India) No. 749 of 1921* paragraph 6 (b) and 267 of 1922.—Owing to Government having been able to purchase from the Imperial Disposal Board considerable quantities of knitted woollen vests, these articles will be issued in large quantities during the ensuing winter months in lieu of vests, flannel. These woollen vests are much superior to the standard pattern article. Every care should, therefore, be taken of them in the interest of the service generally.

It is to be clearly understood that their supply in India is only a temporary arrangement.

689. **Records—Maintenance of regimental documents of British ranks serving with the Indian Signal Service other than those borne on the rolls of the India Unattached Lst.**—India Army Order No. 1129 of 1921 is hereby cancelled and the following substituted:—

A. 15157 (A. G. 3).

Royal Engineers and Royal Corps of Signals—The duplicate attestation paper and Regimental Conduct Sheet will be maintained by the Commandant, Signal Training Centre and Depôt. A copy of the duplicate attestation paper and the remaining regimental documents will be maintained by the Officer Commanding unit in which the soldier is serving.

2. All casualties affecting such ranks will be promulgated in Part II Orders of the unit in which the soldier is serving, copies of which will be forwarded without delay to the Commandant, Signal Training Centre and Depôt, Jubbulpore, who will be responsible for recording such casualties in the documents in his possession and for notifying these casualties to the Officer-in-charge R. E. or R. C. of S. Records at home as the case may be

The Commandant, Signal Training Centre and Depôt, Jubbulpore, will correspond direct with Officers-in-charge R. E. and R. C. of S. Records at home in regard to all regimental matters affecting personnel of these Corps serving with the Indian Signal Service and compile and submit returns required by King's Regulations and when specially asked for by the War Office and the Officers-in-

charge R. E. and R. C. of S. Records. He will also maintain the duplicate attestation papers pertaining to warrant and non-commissioned officers of the Establishment for Engineer Services employed at Radio Stations in India under the Director General, Posts and Telegraphs, and will be responsible for the administration of these ranks in so far as maintenance of regimental documents are concerned. These men will be accounted for as supernumerary to the establishment of the Signal Service.

4. The procedure laid down in Army Instruction (India) 659 of 1922 will be followed in regard to the maintenance and custody of documents of British ranks of the Signal Service borne on the rolls of the India Unattached List.

690. Examination of Officers for Promotion.—Reference 13341 (G. S.—M T-1) India Army Order No. 751 of 1921. The publication "Report on the examination of officers for promotion held in April 1922" has been placed on sale in India at Rs. 1-11-0 per copy.

Copies may be obtained from the Superintendent, Government Printing, India, Calcutta, or from Agents for the sale of Government publications.

691. Nomination of officers to the Staff College, Quetta.—With reference to India 13355 G S—M. T.-1) Army Order No. 429 of 1922, when selecting officers for nomination to the Staff College, Quetta, His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India will take into account the following points:—

- (a) The officer's record and staff service in war and peace.
- (b) Marks obtained in this and previous examinations.
- (c) His age.
- (d) The proportion of vacancies allotted to the various arms and services.

2. Except under very exceptional conditions no officer who has never sat for the examination will be considered.

3. Officers who qualify in an examination but fail to secure a nomination, and are prevented from attending the examination in the following year on account of active

service or illness, will be eligible for nomination during that year provided that the age-limit has not been reached and that an application has been received at Army Headquarters before 1st June in that year.

4. In order to assist His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in his decisions, General Officers Commanding-in-Chief, Commands, are requested to bring to notice before the date of the examination the names of officers whom they consider specially deserving of a nomination, giving their reasons in each case.

5. Officers of the British Service serving on the Indian establishment and of the Indian Army who apply to sit for the examination for the Staff College, Camberley, will be required to state at the time of submitting their applications whether or not they wish to be considered for nomination to the Staff College, Quetta, in the event of their qualifying but failing to obtain a vacancy at Camberley.

692. **Army Rifle Association (Home).**—The Committee of the Army Rifle Association (Home) intimate that in cases where entries for matches have been inadvertently overlooked, if entries are made now there will still be time for registers to be despatched, matches to be fired and registers returned so as to reach the Secretary by the closing dates, viz.—Units abroad, 15th January next, and units at Home, 30th November next.

693. **Passages.**—Applications have been received from individuals for non-entitled passages to countries other than the United Kingdom.

It is hereby notified that non-entitled passages can be granted in Government vessels or hired transports only, and that, as such vessels do not normally ply between India and countries other than the United Kingdom, no useful purpose is served by the submission of such applications.

Ribands of medals and decorations.

When medals and decorations are worn on the breast riband will be .1 inch in length, unless the possession of clasps necessitates its being longer. When two or more medals and decorations are worn they will be so arranged that the lower edges (or lowest point of a star) are in line. The lengths of all ribands will be regulated by that of the decoration or medal which, including any clasps, is the longest. These instructions will apply equally to miniature medals and decorations.

2. The necessary amendments to Dress Regulations, 1911, will be made on revision.

The following Army Order was published specially on 27th July, 1922.

Promotion from the Ranks to Combatant Commissions as Second-Lieutenants.—The following regulations are issued in substitution of those issued under Army Order 86 of 1920, as amended by Army Order 398 of 1920:—

1. A candidate for promotion from the ranks to a combatant commission as second lieutenant must be unmarried. He must also be a British subject and the son of British subjects and of pure European descent. In a doubtful case the burden of clear proof of nationality and descent will rest upon the candidate or upon the parents or guardians of a candidate who is a minor. No candidate will be accepted unless, in the opinion of the Army Council, he is in all respects suitable to hold a commission.*

2. He will be required to undergo a special course of training of about one year's duration at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, and to obtain a satisfactory report therefrom.—

3. The first course of training will commence on 1st September, 1922; the second course will commence in January, 1924, and subsequent courses in January of each year.

4. The number of candidates admitted to the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, each year will vary according to the requirements of the service. The number of vacancies for the first course commencing in September, 1922, will be 35. The number of vacancies available for subsequent courses will be announced in Army Orders of May each year, commencing May, 1923.

5. Candidates for admission to the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, will be selected from those recommended on Army Form B.2081 (reprinted 1920)

6. To be eligible for recommendation by his Commanding Officer a candidate must—

(a) Be medically fit (see Appendix).

*For the present, candidates from the ranks will be granted commissions only in the Cavalry, Infantry, Royal Army Service Corps of the British Service and in the Indian Army.

- (b) Be in possession of a Special† Army Certificate of Education, unless he is exempt from obtaining such a certificate (*see* paragraph 7.)
- (c) Be at least an unpaid lance-corporal and have held that appointment or any higher rank for 6 months prior to the 1st July of the year in which he is recommended.
- (d) Be under 22‡ years of age on the 1st January of the year in which he is recommended.

7. A candidate who—

- (a) has qualified for admission to the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, the Royal Military College, Sandhurst, or the Royal Air Force Cadet College, or
- (b) has passed the First Public Examination at the University of Oxford or the equivalent examination at any other approved university or
- (c) has been granted a commission in the army from an officer cadet unit during the war of 1914-1919, will be exempt from obtaining a Special or First Class Army Certificate of Education. In all cases reference will be made to the War Office to ascertain whether the candidate is so exempt

8. The commanding officer and the officer commanding the candidate's squadron, battery or company must be able to certify that the candidate has shown promise of leadership in all branches of training, including both educational and recreational training, and that his military knowledge and bearing are such as to warrant his being trained for a commission. They must also certify that they would be willing to accept him, when trained, as a platoon, etc., commander in their unit.

The brigade commander will see the candidate and *state his opinion as to his fitness and suitability.* The

†For admission to the course commencing in September, 1922, and January, 1924, a Special Army Certificate of Education will not be obligatory, but a candidate must be in possession of a First Class Army Certificate of Education. A candidate, however, who is in possession of a Special Army Certificate of Education will be given preference over those not in possession of this certificate.

‡For admission to the Royal Military College in September, 1922, and January, 1924, the maximum age will be 24 years, after which it will be 22.

7. The following additional points will then be observed:—

- (a) That his hearing is good.
- (b) That his speech is without impediment.
- (c) That his teeth are in good order. Loss or decay of ten teeth will be considered a disqualification. Decayed teeth, if well filled, will be considered as sound. Non-erupted wisdom teeth should not be counted as deficient.
- (d) That his chest is well formed and that his lungs and heart are sound.
- (e) That he is not ruptured.
- (f) That he does not suffer from a severe degree of varicocoele (*see* Appendix 16, Regulations for Army Medical Services) or varicose veins. A candidate who has been successfully operated on will be accepted.
- (g) That his limbs are well formed and developed.
- (h) That there is free and perfect motion of all the joints.
- (i) That his feet and toes are well formed.
- (k) That he does not suffer from any inveterate skin disease.
- (l) That he has no congenital malformation or defect (*see* Appendix 16, Regulations for Army Medical Services).
- (m) That he does not bear traces of previous acute or chronic disease pointing to an impaired constitution.

8. If the candidate, in the opinion of the board, does not appear to be of pure European descent, a statement to this effect will be entered in the proceedings of the board.

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 113 of the Indian Army Act, 1911 (VIII of 1911), the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the following further amendments shall be made in the Army Act Rules, namely:—

1. In sub-rule (A) of the rule 7 of the said rules, after item (iv), the following item shall be inserted, namely:—

“(iv-a). The Officer Commanding a Battalion of a corps”.

2. In rule 161 of the said rules:—

(a) For item (ziii) of sub-rule (A), the following item shall be substituted, namely:—

“(ziii) Each group or each ungrouped battalion (as the case may be) of Indian Infantry or of Pioneers”.

(b) For item (ix) of sub-rule (C), the following item shall be substituted, namely:—

“(ix) Each battalion of Indian Infantry or of Pioneers.”

3. In the footnote (e) to Form No. 1 (Combatants) of the “Forms of Enrolment” in the first Appendix to the said rules, after the words “The Indian Signal Corps” the words “an Indian Infantry Corps or Pioneer Corps” shall be inserted.

Sir,

I am commanded by the Army Council to inform you that during the trooping season 1921-22 unnecessary and avoidable difficulties were experienced on board ship, and on disposal after disembarkation, in connection with soldiers sent home from overseas.

2. These difficulties were due to the provisions of Army Council Instructions Nos. 479 and 688 of 1921 not being complied with. The most common errors brought to light were the following —

- (a) The return "Details of Detachments" (A. F. B. 142) referred to in paragraph 5, of the above quoted Army Council Instruction No 479, was not forwarded so as to arrive in advance of the troops in accordance with paragraph 1514 King's Regulations 1914.
- (b) The nominal rolls which should have been sent in advance of the soldiers, or should have accompanied the soldiers, were often not sent either in advance or with the soldiers, and when sent were often very inaccurate as regards Army numbers and names.
- (c) The documents which should have accompanied soldiers throughout their journey either were not sent or when sent, were incomplete.
- (d) The rolls accompanying soldiers were not divided into the several categories showing the reasons for which the soldiers were being sent home, with the result that the soldiers concerned could not be despatched to their correct destination immediately on disembarkation.
- (e) The instructions regarding the Provisional Last Pay Certificate (A. F. O. 1809-G.) were often not

followed, and the Army Form when used was often incomplete.

E Money was not placed on board ship to enable soldiers to be paid during the voyage, nor was English Currency made available for the last payment immediately before disembarkation.

(g) Parties of soldiers were not formed into Sections as laid down in the above quoted Army Council Instruction.

3. I am to say that the instructions to be followed when sending soldiers home from overseas have now been revised in accordance with the experiences of the last trooping season and are issued in Army Council Instruction No. 440 of 1922.

4. I am commanded by the Council to request that steps may be taken to ensure that these revised instructions are strictly adhered to during the coming trooping season, and am to add that the following additional distribution is being made to overseas commands to enable a copy of the instructions to be available for all officers concerned:—

ANNEXURE to INDIA ARMY ORDER
No. 735 of 1922.

1. These rules apply to the children (boys and girls) of all men, of whatever rank, whether combatants or non-combatants, who have since 4th August 1914 died while on the active list duty or become permanently incapacitated owing to wounds or disease contracted while on the active list.

2. A list of all such persons in the form below showing their place of residence, will be sent by the Officers Commanding Depôts and Units to the Collector of each District in British territory for disposal. A similar list for Native States will be sent to the Secretary, Political Department, for such action as that Department may determine. Supplementary lists will be forwarded at the beginning of each calendar year.

3. The Collector on receipt of the list will ascertain and record the names and ages of all children under 16 years of age of the men mentioned in the list (due respect being had in the case of girls to the customary feelings of the people as regards the recording of such names) and will furnish their guardians with a certificate for each child stating that he or she is entitled to the benefit of these rules, provided that the child has attended a school before attaining the age of 10.

N. B.—The above proviso should not be too rigorously enforced in cases where hardship might ensue and the restriction should always be waived in cases where adequate private arrangements have been made for the elementary education of the children.

4. Any child producing such a certificate before the head of a recognised educational institution will be entitled under these rules:—

(a) to free primary education plus an annual allowance according to requirements but not exceeding Rs. 6 to cover incidental expenses such as slates, books, &c.;

(b) on passing primary boys' standard IV or girls' standard III to scholarship of Rs. 3 per mensem in standard I, II, or III of a recognised Anglo-vernacular school plus (in the case of an aided or recognised school) the cost of fees levied in those standards and of such games and

extra fees as may ordinarily be charged. In Government schools a free studentship will be granted in addition to the scholarship and no games fees will be levied;

The scholarship will ordinarily be tenable for three years, but when the education of the child has been retarded by sickness or any other unavoidable cause, the period may be extended to four years at the discretion of the Inspector of Schools concerned;

- (e) to a scholarship of Rs. 5 per mensem in an industrial or technical institution recognised by Government on completion of the primary course or Anglo-vernacular standard III. The scholarships will be tenable for the period necessary to complete the course in the institution. These scholarships will not usually be granted to children who are under 12 or over 17 years of age at the date of their admission to the technical institution concerned.

NOTE.—Applications for concessions under (a) should be made to the Deputy Educational Inspector of the District and for scholarships under (b) and (c) to the Divisional Inspector through the head of the school the child is attending.

- (d) to scholarships in High schools and Colleges reserved for the benefit of persons possessing the Collector's certificate referred to above without prejudice to the right to compete for all open scholarships. The reserved scholarships in High schools will be awarded on the results of the examination for the award of scholarships in high and special schools in each district, will be of the same value as the open scholarships, and awarded on the same conditions to the candidates eligible for reserved scholarships who secure not less than 40 per cent. of the total number of marks for the examination. To those who qualify for the school leaving certificate examination and wish to join a College or higher technical institution, scholarships of Rs. 10—15 will be awarded, provided that the candidates secure not less than 50 per cent marks in the school leaving certificate examination or such other equalifying examination.

5. When education of the type required is not available in the town or village in which the pupil resides, or when the conditions of home life or the poverty of the guardian is such, that residence in a hostel is considered necessary by the Inspector of Schools concerned (or in the case of College students by the Director of Public Instruction) for the efficient training and education of the pupil, an addition will be made to the school or College scholarship to cover hostel charges, on receipt of an application from the guardian, provided that the hostel chosen is approved by the Educational Authorities. Applications should be made to the Educational Inspector of the Division or in the case of College students, to the Director of Public Instruction.

6. Any concession or scholarship granted under these rules may be withdrawn if, in the opinion of the Inspector or the Head of the College which the scholar attends, the progress of the pupil is inadequate or his conduct unsatisfactory.

7. No scholarship will be given to a pupil who has not passed such test as may be prescribed for entry into the class of school for which the scholarship is given.

8. Concessions or scholarships will not be open to children who up to the age of 10 have not attended any school. (For cases in which this rule may be relaxed, see the note to rule 3.)

Allowances for the voyage period for officers proceeding to India.

1. Claims should be made by Command Paymasters against the India Office for recovery of allowances issued to married officers who have proceeded to India since 1st April 1921, unaccompanied by their families and who have received allowances under paragraph 9, Table XIV, Army Order No. 324 of 1919.

2. Claims at present with Command Paymasters will be examined and if found admissible will be certified and returned to the officers for payment direct by their Indian paymasters.

3. In future officers proceeding to India who are unaccompanied by their families on account of separation by the exigencies of the Service should, before embarkation, obtain certificates from their General Officers Commanding to that effect. This authority is required to support the claim for allowances for the voyage period which should be made, after disembarkation, on the Indian pay authorities.

I am directed to state for your information

that a wireless service was established with effect from the 24th April 1922 between Oxford and Cairo. The service is now available for the transmission of State messages between India and England and instructions have been issued to telegraph offices in India to accept State messages marked "Via Cairo Wireless". Such telegrams will be signalled from Bombay to Cairo by cable and thence by wireless. The charges will be the same as for State telegrams by cable, the words "Via Cairo Wireless" being signalled free. The service is at present more or less experimental and its use is confined to short telegrams in code or in plain language of an unimportant nature. Confidential messages or messages in cypher should not be sent by this route. The General Post Office have pointed out that a considerable saving to Imperial funds may be effected by the use of this service as the receipts derived from it accrue to the State.

Men infected with malaria endure badly even ordinary vicissitudes of climate. They are prone to suffer from sun-stroke and effects of heat and owing to diminished powers of resistance are liable to contract other diseases easily and to suffer severely from them.

Every measure therefore to diminish the incidence of this disease is of the greatest importance to the welfare of the soldier and the efficiency of the Army and must receive the close personal attention of officers.

2. Malaria, in most instances, is not cured in hospital: to do so would involve protracted detention, which is neither necessary nor desirable. It is after discharge and when the soldier is with his unit that the disease is finally eradicated. The closest collaboration between Company Officers and the Medical Officer in charge of the regiment is therefore necessary. Two objects have to be borne in mind firstly the complete cure of the infected soldier and secondly the prevention of infection of others.

3. The principal points to which attention must be directed are:—

- (a) Men under treatment by quinine must regularly attend for the administration of the drug and other duties should not be allowed to interfere with this.
- (b) It is very important that affected men should avoid chills after exercise or during the evening. At the conclusion of football or hockey they should not be permitted to sit-about in shorts but should be required to change their clothes as soon as possible. After playing a game in which they have sweated freely a sweater or great coat should always be worn. This is a common sense precaution for all but is especially important for malaria cases.
- (c) Malaria cases must be careful to avoid undue exposure to the sun and a helmet must invariably be worn until sundown.
- (d) Mosquito nets will be inspected daily by an officer—a net with holes is worse than none. Holes must be properly darned and not gathered together with a few stitches which

give on the first strain and leave a larger hole. Non-commissioned officers in charge of barrack rooms will ensure that men use their nets during the mosquito season. This is necessary not only to prevent fresh infection but also to prevent an existing case from infecting mosquitoes.

- (e) Guards on night duty should be encouraged to use Bamber oil and a supply of this must always be available.
- (f) Unremitting attention to the sanitary conditions of the lines is essential. Officers in conjunction with the Medical Officer must see that pools are oiled or drained, that breeding places of mosquitoes are destroyed and that undergrowth is removed, etc.
- (g) Bazaar and cinemas are frequently infested by infected mosquitoes and visits to these places during the malarial season should be discouraged.

777. Auxiliary Force (India) Course at Machine Gun School, Ahmednagar.—With reference to India Army Order No. 69-S, dated 31st of October 1921, the Auxiliary Force (India) Course to be held at the Machine Gun School, Ahmednagar, from 26th November to 16th December 1922 is cancelled.

778. Horses—Remounts.—In future all indents for (a) officers' chargers; (b) horses and mules required to complete establishments of units (except Supply and Transport units which are provided for under India Army Order No. 508 of 1921) will be submitted by the officer or unit requiring them direct to Inspectors of Remounts of the Command concerned.

2. The indents will be countersigned by the Inspectors of Remounts and passed by them for action to the Deputy Assistant Directors of Remounts of remount circles in whose areas the remount depôts of supply are located as indicated in the Annexure to this Order.

792. Appointments, Promotions, Leave, etc.—List No. 22 of Appointments, Promotions, 6031 (M. S.) Leave, etc., which have been approved by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, is published as an annexure to this Order.

793. Accounts, Razmak Operations.—All contingent bills, travelling allowance claims, and other claims chargeable to the A-16383 (A. G.-10) Razmak Operations should be endorsed in red ink "Razmak Field Force".

794. Passages.—Applications for the grant of passage under the provisions of paragraph 65, 42734 (Q. M. G.-2) Volume X, Army Regulations, India, will be submitted in the first instance to the Adjutant General in India.

795. Legal and Judicial.—The following amendment is made to India Army Order A-15283 (A. G.-8) No. 668, dated the 26th September 1922.

For "The Officer Commanding the Military Forces in Iraq." substitute "The Military Officer Commanding the Military Forces in Iraq."

797. Responsibility for work done by Mechanical Transport Vehicles other than those on the strength of Mechanical Transport Companies.—1. Formations and Units other than Mechanical

42772 (Q. M. G.-8). Transport Units will themselves detail the work to be performed by Mechanical Transport vehicles held by them. If however the vehicles are accommodated in the lines of the Mechanical Transport Unit which maintains them such detail will be given through the Officer Commanding of that Unit.

2. The Mechanical Transport Commander and his Staff will have access at all times to all Mechanical Transport vehicles maintained by him, and is responsible for bringing to notice all cases of overwork, misuse, or neglect. His decision that a vehicle must be taken off the road for repair, is final, except in case of public emergency.

798. Mechanical Transport Demands.—I. If Mechanical Transport Stores demanded from
1521 (Q. M. G.-8).

and the demand remains outstanding up to a maximum of eight months, when if still 'uncomplished' with, it is automatically cancelled at Central Mechanical Transport Store Depôt. If the articles are still required they must be re-demanded.

- Units no longer requiring stores which they have on demand will cancel such items at once. They will also review all outstanding demands at the end of each month with a view to such cancellation.

II. Brackets for side and tail lamps will cease to be supplied by the Officer-in-Charge, 32274 (Q. M. G.-S). Central Mechanical Transport Store Depôt, when present stock is exhausted, and will, in future, be treated as unit manufacture.

799. Mechanical Transport—Repairs of private motor cars in Mechanical Transport Workshops.—In modification of the orders contained in India Army Order No. 850, dated 2nd November 1920, regarding the basis on which the cost of repairs is to be assessed, it has been decided that the cost of labour will be calculated by the Depôt Accountant attached to the Mechanical Transport Workshop, in accordance with paragraph 32, Volume III, of the *Cost Account Instructions*

800. Vickers Guns.—With reference to Army Instruction (India) No. 865 of 1922, the 35072 (Q. M. G.-11-B). luminous sights referred to will be issued on indent up to war scale to all units.

2. The difference between peace and war scale will be treated as mobilization equipment in unit charge and will not be used in peace.

801. Dress—Royal Artillery.—The following amendment is made to India Army Order 42210 (Q. M. G.-12-B). No. 621 of 1922:—

Under sub-heading "F. Other ranks", paragraph (3) delete the words "clothed as dismounted" in line 2.

802. Transport—Gear and Equipment.—When buckets and feeding cloths are issued to transport units for animals travelling by rail these articles will be returned to the nearest Ordnance Depot or Arsenal on completion of the rail journey.

803. Mechanical Transport—Forms and Returns.—Records and accounts as laid down in India Army Order No. 1223 of 1921, 42555 (Q. M. G.-8). will be maintained by all units holding Mechanical Transport on charge, and who maintain the vehicles themselves.

Units which hold Mechanical Transport on charge, the maintenance of which is carried out by a Mechanical Transport unit, will not be required to do so.

804. Intrenching Tools.—With reference to the appendix 37188 (Q. M. G.-11). to Army Instruction (India) No. 367 of 1922, footnote (d), units will demand spades up to 2/3rds of the total number sanctioned. "Shovels, R. P." will be retained for the balance until arsenal stocks are reduced to normal requirements.

805. Courses of Instruction—Small Arms Schools.—With reference to Special India Army Order No. 69-S. of 1921. The Senior Officers' Course from 11th to 15th December 1922 to be conducted by the staffs of the Small Arms Schools at Lucknow, Satara and Rawalpindi, is hereby cancelled.

806. Administration of Mechanical Transport Personnel.—In supersession of previous orders on the subject, it is notified that all mechanical transport personnel, including those employed with other arms of the Service, will be borne on the strength of some Mechanical Transport Units.

2. In some cases, the number of such personnel employed with a single unit of another arm, warrants the formation of a special Mechanical Transport Unit which is self-contained, e.g.—

• A Mechanical Transport Company attached to Medium Artillery;

A Mechanical Transport Company attached to a Motor Ambulance Convoy.

3. In all other cases, such personnel will be borne on the strength of the Mobile Repair Unit, or other Mechanical Transport Unit, which maintains the Mechanical Transport vehicles. Drivers of Staff Cars and miscellaneous vehicles, and Mechanical Transport personnel attached to Sappers and Miners, and Signals, come under this head.

In such cases, the Officer Commanding Mechanical Transport Unit:—

- (i) pays and clothes them;
- (ii) shows them on their establishment as authorised additions; replaces casualties, receiving reinforcements for this purpose;
- (iii) is responsible for their records, promotions, etc.

The question of responsibility for discipline, rations and accommodation, is for local consideration, and decision by the General Officer Commanding formation. Normally in the case of Sappers and Miners and Signals the responsibility will lie with the Officer Commanding Sappers and Miners or Signal Unit, to which the Mechanical Transport personnel is attached.

In other cases, Mechanical Transport personnel will, whenever possible, be accommodated with their companies, but when their work is at such a distance as to render this impossible, they will be attached to such other unit as the General Officer Commanding may direct.

Orders will be issued by Mechanical Transport Column Commanders showing the Mechanical Transport Units on whose strength such Mechanical Transport personnel will be borne.

807. Despatch of Stores by Rail—Instances have occurred in which military credit notes (India. Army Form T-1711) (Q. M. G.-2-A.) have not been furnished to the railway authorities at the time of the despatch of stores, with the result that public tariff rates have been claimed by the railway on arrival of stores at destination.

Attention of all concerned is drawn to Note 2 of Rule 4, Appendix V, Volume X, Army Regulations, India, the provisions of which will be strictly observed.

808. Transport—Field Operations.—It has been brought to notice that inventories of kits of 17593 (Q. M. G.-7). animal transport personnel proceeding on and returning from field service are not always accurately prepared.

Necessary action will be taken to ensure that the officer concerned will in all cases personally satisfy himself that the inventory of kit of each man contains a full and true list of articles in possession of the latter at the time of despatch, as shortages on inventories are charged to the men in question.

809. Horses—Regimental.—India Army Order No. 414 46637 (Q. M. G.-13). of 1922 is hereby cancelled.

2. As some misapprehension exists in the matter, it is notified that the insurance fee of Rs. 7-8 per month is payable, under regimental arrangements, by all ranks, British and Indian, for each horse played at polo, *vide* paragraph 3 of Army Instruction (India) No. 249 of 1922.

810. Units and Drafts proceeding to Waziristan—Instructions regarding clothing.—The 42216 (Q. M. G.-12-B). following amendments are made to India Army Order No. 614 of 1922:—

In the heading *delete* the words "and equipment".

In paragraph 1 for the words "Now that field service concessions have been withdrawn from Waziristan" read "Now that field service concessions as regards clothing have been withdrawn from Waziristan".

In paragraph 2, line 2, *delete* the words "and equipped".

811. 13 and 18-pr. Carriages, Mark I.—India Army Order No. 404 of 1922 is amended as follows:—

Paragraph 3, *delete* the words "Q.F. 18-pr., Mark II".

812. Equipment, Wireless, Repairs to.—Repairs to wireless telegraphy equipment will normally be carried out by the unit, in tents being submitted to Ordnance for the spare parts and materials required.

2. Equipment which units cannot repair will, after replacement, be returned to Ordnance for despatch in convenient batches for repair in the Wireless Workshop Section, Rawalpindi.

3. Chief Ordnance Officers will give units such assistance from arsenal workshops as lies within their power.

813. Trade Tests.—It is notified that the Indian Trade Proficiency Certificate (Army Form A.-13210 (A. G.-1), B.-195) will not in future be accepted in lieu of a standard trade test but should be regarded as a temporary classification under paragraph 4 (b) and (c) of Army Instruction (India) No. 323 of 1920.

Army Form B.-195 has been cancelled by the issue of Army Order No.-429 of 1921 and replaced by Army Form B.-197, which is being introduced into India. Copies of this form will shortly be issued to all concerned.

814. Organization—British Army.—Army Council Instruction No. 503 of 1922 is published for information as an annexure to this Order

A.-14048 (A. G.-1).

815. Records of Service—Regular British Service Officers.—Duplicate copies of Army Form B.-199-A. in respect of a number of officers of the Royal Artillery serving in India have not been received in the office of the Military Secretary, Army Headquarters. Attention of all concerned is invited to India Army Orders No. 1021 of 1919 and 10-S. of 1920. Duplicate copies of the Army Form referred to should be submitted without delay, the originals being forwarded direct to the Secretary, War Office, London.

818. Machine Gun Barrels.—Only new barrels of Lewis Hotchkiss and Vickers machine guns, 35786 (Q. M. G.-11-B) which have been modified in accordance with India List of Changes, § 9883, will in future be held as mobilization equipment in unit charge and for Ordnance War Reserves. For identification purposes, these barrels are marked "S. C." in the position stated in India List of Changes, § 9883.

2. During peace unmodified barrels will be used until stocks are exhausted. When the barrel in the gun becomes unserviceable, an unmodified barrel will be demanded in replacement. Where modified barrels are already fitted to guns in possession of units and have been used for ball firing, such barrels will be used until unserviceable and then be replaced by unmodified barrels.

3. In order that the necessary adjustments may be made, units will report, to Chief Ordnance Officers concerned, the numbers of modified and unmodified barrels actually in possession. Chief Ordnance Officers will then take steps firstly, to complete Ordnance War Reserves with modified barrels and, secondly, to adjust units equipment as far as possible, reporting inabilities to the Director of Equipment and Ordnance Stores.

819. Scales of Store Issues for Mechanical Transport in India.—India Army Order 49805 (Q. M. G.-8) No. 633, dated 12th September 1922, is amended as follows:—

In lines 9 and 10, for the words "and stocked and issued by the Central Mechanical Transport Stores Depot" substitute the words "stocked by the Central Mechanical Transport Stores Depot and issued to all Units entitled to demand them".

820. Uniform, etc.—Amalgamated British Cavalry Regiments.—Army Council Instruction No. 483 of 1922, is made applicable to India and is published as an annexure to this Order.

821. Clothing.—The changes in standard patterns of clothing and necessaries that have occurred during the month of September 1922, are published as an annexure to this Order.

822. Hot weather establishments for the barracks of British Troops, for 1922-1923.—With reference to Army Instruction (India) No. 318 of 1922, it has been decided that expenditure in connection with hot weather establishments in barracks of British troops will not be adjusted until the actuals for the current season are reported to Army Headquarters.

2. General Officers Commanding-in-Chief, will, therefore, submit, at the earliest possible date, reports from Districts, with remarks of the Controllers of Military Accounts endorsed thereon, showing the actual expenditure incurred on hot weather establishments for the current year.

3. Allotments sanctioned in the above quoted Army Instruction (India) will be confined to hot weather establishments in the barracks of British troops (fighting services), and charges on these establishments entertained for ancillary services and headquarters offices will be met out of the allotment of the service affected.

4. Expenditure on this service will be reduced to the lowest possible figures compatible with ensuring that the health of the troops is not affected thereby.

823. Musketry Competitions.—With reference to India Army Order No. 930 of 1921. Attention is invited to the Imperial Challenge Shield Competitions for 1923 held under the auspices of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

The competition is open to boys not over 18 years of age, the object being to encourage every boy to learn to use a rifle.

The competition is open to any cadet platoon, company or squadron, troop of boy scouts, any school, or similar organization of British boys subject to the approval of the National Rifle Association.

In the Junior competition boys not over 15 years of age may compete. In the senior competition boys not over 18 years of age may compete.

The prizes include a Challenge Shield, silver and bronze medals and money prizes. His Excellency the Viceroy has also presented two Challenge Cups for presentation to the two winning teams in India.

“When and Where held.—(a) All languages, except Urdu, first Monday in January, April, July and October at any military station in India.

Candidates will ordinarily be examined in the district in which they are posted. General Officers Commanding may, at their discretion, permit a

departure from this rule after the necessary arrangements have been made in intercommunication with each other.

- (b) Examinations in Urdū will be held by the Central Board at Calcutta on the first Monday in January, April, July and October, and at Lahore and Lucknow on the first Monday in April and October. They will also be held by a local board, on papers set by the Central Board, at Quetta and Poona on the first Monday in April and October provided there are three or more candidates. Examinations may also be held in countries overseas in which Indian troops are located, with due regard to economy.

Applications should reach the District office two months and the Central Board (see paragraphs 55 and 56) six weeks before the date of the examination.

**Disbandment and amalgamation of Units on reduction of
 certain Infantry Corps.**

1. With reference to A.O. 78 of 1922, the disbandment of the 3rd Battalion, The Middlesex Regiment (The Duke of Cambridge's Own), has been carried out under instructions which have been issued separately.

2. With reference to A.O. 811 of 1922, the disbandment of the 2nd Battalion, The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, and the amalgamation of the 1st and 2nd Battalions, The Royal Irish Fusiliers (Princess Victoria's), will be proceeded with forthwith.

2 Officers.—(a) The reduction of the number of officers is being effected throughout the infantry. Only a sufficient number of officers will be retained to provide officers for the number of battalions in the reduced establishments. Thus, after a sufficient number of officers have been eliminated from the infantry by the general method of reduction, the officers of regiments whose regular battalions are being reduced in number and who are recommended for retention in the service but are surplus to the requirements of the reduced regiments will be transferred to fill vacancies in other regiments. Officers so transferred will retain the date of their present regimental seniority.

(b) Officers who do not accept transfer to other regiments will not be eligible to go on half-pay under Article 475, Pay Warrant, 1922, nor will they be eligible for the special terms of compensation laid down in A.O. 179 of 1922. They will, therefore, have no option but (i) to accept such transfer, or (ii) to apply to retire or to resign their commissions as the case may be.

(c) The C.O. of each of the regular battalions of the regiments being reduced will forward to the Secretary, The War Office (M.S. 2B), through the usual channels a list of officers who may wish to transfer to other regiments. Officers may submit to their C.Os. applications to transfer, giving five regiments in order of preference. No guarantee can be given that an officer will be transferred to one of the regiments selected by him, but every endeavour will be made to comply with individual selections as far as the exigencies of the service permit. It is intended as a general rule to transfer officers to other regiments in which their regimental seniority and service will correspond, as far as possible, with those of the officers already in the regiment. This should be borne in mind when choice of regiments is made.

(d) The C.O. of each of the regular battalions of the regiments being reduced will also forward the names of the remaining officers (i.e., those not electing to transfer), showing separately those recommended for retention in the

reduced regiments in order of priority in their respective ranks. In each case after the name of the officers should follow five regiments in order of priority to which the officer would elect to be transferred in the event of his not being chosen for retention in his own regiment. The claims and merits of officers should be carefully weighed when determining this order of priority, and should be based on territorial and family connections with the regiment or on any other special claims. These claims will be given every consideration and should, therefore, be stated fully; but no promise can be given that any individual officers recommended for retention in his regiment will not be transferred to another. When making these recommendations Os.C. battalions will include, in their order of priority, any officers of the regiment extra-regimentally employed who last served in the battalion before being extra-regimentally employed, or who may have served under their command at any time in the regiment.

(e) Until the reduction of the number of officers in the infantry allows the transfer of officers from regiments being reduced to be carried out, such officers will be attached for duty as they may be required, but their attachment to one regiment will not affect their possible eventual transfer to another.

(f) The O.C. 2nd Battalion, The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, will select the following officers to proceed with the draft referred to in para. 3 (b), and these officers on arrival in India will be posted to the 1st Battalion of the regiment to fill existing vacancies—

1 major.

2 captains.

3 subalterns.

The names of the officers selected will be reported through the usual channels to the Secretary, The War Office (A.G. 2), not later than 10th October, 1922.

(c) All other ranks for discharge or transfer to the reserve within one month will be discharged or transferred to the reserve on the due date.

(d) The remaining other ranks may volunteer for transfer as under:—

(i) To the R.E. or Royal Corps or Signals under the terms of para. 3 of Part II of A.C.I. 279 of 1922.

(ii) To regiments of Foot Guards, subject in each case to the approval of the O.C. the regiment of Foot Guards concerned.

Transfers under (i) and (ii) should be proceeded with forthwith under the provisions of paras. 323—334, King's Regulations, 1914.

(iii) For general service in the infantry for allotment to corps by the War Office according to the requirements of the service.

(e) Other ranks not disposed of under (a), (b), (c) or (d) above will be dealt with as under:—

(i) If serving on an engagement which includes service in the reserve and electing to accept premature transfer to the reserve, they will be transferred to the reserve forthwith.

(ii) All others will be discharged under para. 392 (xxv), King's Regulations, 1914, as amended by A.Os. 373 of 1920 and 417 of 1921, the cause of discharge being amended to read "His services being no longer required on reduction of establishment."

Qs.C. will ensure that it is made clear on A.F.O. 1809 and in Part II Orders, whether men who are discharged or transferred to the Army Reserve under these instructions have previously refused any of the options under sub-para. (d) above.

4. The terms and conditions of compensation and furlough to be given to soldiers who are prematurely transferred to the reserve or compulsorily discharged under the

PART IV.—DISPOSAL OF ANIMALS, STORES, ARMS, EQUIPMENT, CLOTHING AND COLOURS.

1. *Animals*.—All animals on charge of the 2nd Battalion, The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, are to be returned to the Remount Depôt, Arborfield Cross, under command arrangements.

Notification of despatch is to be sent to the Superintendent, Remount Depôt, Arborfield Cross.

On completion of the amalgamation of the 1st and 2nd Battalions, The Royal Irish Fusiliers, the Headquarters, Eastern Command, will select the most suitable animals for retention to complete the establishment of 8 chargers and 10 mules.

All animals surplus to the above establishment are to be returned to the Remount Depôt, Arborfield Cross, under command arrangements.

Notification of despatch is to be sent to the Superintendent, Remount Depôt, Arborfield Cross.

Lists of books (educational) issued as libraries or for instructional purposes, and the number and make of all typewriters so despatched, will be forwarded to the Secretary, The War Office (C. 2).

3. *Unconsumed rations* are to be returned to the nearest supply officer. Attention is drawn to para. 1 of A.O. 13 of 1919 as regards cash credits in the messing account.

4. *Arms and Equipment*.—Separate instructions will be issued later

5. *Clothing*.—All new articles of public and personal clothing and necessaries and part-worn articles of public clothing held in store which are quite serviceable and fit for re-issue, are to be returned, accompanied by the usual vouchers, to the clothing depot supplying the area.

The public and personal clothing and necessaries in possession of men transferred to other units or discharged will be dealt with under the existing regulations.

2. Similarly, the benefits under Army Order No. 180 of 1922 will not be admissible for soldiers enlisted or re-enlisted after the date of that Army Order and subsequently discharged prior to the termination of their engagements or prematurely transferred to the Army Reserve.

Examination of Officers for Promotion.—1. With reference to Appendix XI to King's Regulations, the revised syllabus for examination in subjects (b) (i), (b) (iv), (d) (i) and (d) (iv), as shown in the Appendix to this Army Order will be *substituted* for the corresponding parts in the existing syllabus for this examination.

2. The new syllabus will first come into force at the examination to be held in October, 1923.

3. Attention is directed to the following points:—

- (a) Administration of troops in the field will be transferred to (b) (iv) in the case of the lieutenants' examination, and to the new syllabus for (d) (iv) in the case of the captains' examination.
- (b) No books of reference will be allowed in answering Parts I of (b) (i) and (d) (i).
- (c) Educational training will no longer form a separate subhead, but will be embodied in the syllabus for (d) (i), Part I.

[NOTE—The Manual of Military Law, King's Regulations and Pay Warrant will be allowed for answering Part II of this paper. These books may not contain any additions whatever other than amendments made by Army Orders.]

Candidates will be required to qualify in Part I and Part II of this paper taken separately.

Part I.

Examinations will be set on administration, organization and training arrangements and on discipline and military law in approximately equal proportions.

A detailed knowledge will be required of the duties of a company, or equivalent commander in the candidate's own arm of the service in peace.

There will be required a general knowledge of—

The titles and scope of the official publications which concern the administration of his unit;

The general system of the organization and administration of the land forces of the United Kingdom in peace, including the Reserve Forces and Territorial Army;

An outline of the armed forces throughout the Empire;

The regulations for mobilization of the candidate's unit;

Candidates will be set problems such as might confront the commander of a company or an equivalent unit in peace; for example—

Discipline, arrest and military custody, investigation of charges, summary and minor punishments, Courts of Inquiry, Court-Martial procedure, laws of evidence.

Organization of training and education within the unit, including allotment of time and methods employed

Extensions, re-engagements and transfers

Pay and messing

Clothing and equipment.

Commandant, Army School of Cookery, Poona For himself, school staff, students, establishments, animals and stores.

47336 (Q. M. G.-2-A) Paragraph 95—After the word "reserve" in the sixth line of the last clause of paragraph 95, insert—
"and a discharged man proceeding to a recruiting officer for enlistment in the reserve if certified, as suitable for the reserve in his discharge certificate."

Appendix IX.—In column 1, the first entry, as amended by July Appendix to India Army Orders of 1921, is reconstructed as follows:—

Captains and subalterns of the British and Indian services (including I. M. Payment of messing charges.—Messing charges will be paid in the following manner:—

When proceeding by any Government vessel or hired transport.

Messing contributions, where recoverable, will be collected before embarkation by the Embarkation Staff Officer at the port of embarkation and will be assessed according to the actual number of days of the voyage as shown in the trooping programme, the amounts realized being paid over to the District C. M. A. concerned. The advance payment thus made will be considered as final, and no readjustment will be made should the passage be longer or shorter than anticipated.

When proceeding by private steamer or freight ship.

Messing contributions, where recoverable, will be collected before embarkation. The period for which charges at the appropriate rates will be made will be that of the schedule time advertised by the steamship company for the particular voyage in question. The advance payments thus made will be considered as final, and no readjustment will be made should the passage be longer or shorter than anticipated. The embarkation authority at the port will, as soon as the passage is allotted, obtain payment of the amount due, credit the same to Government and complete the certificate on the passage requisition (India Army Form T-1724). In the case of passages from the United Kingdom, the necessary recovery will be made by the War Office.

"if, during the absence of an Indian service officer on leave out of India on private affairs, his unit moves to an Imperial station, or if an officer of the same service, while similarly absent on leave, is transferred to a unit serving at an Imperial station, he will be reimbursed any actual expenditure incurred by him by reason of his having been called upon to proceed to an Imperial station, up to a maximum of the cost of a passage for himself from India to the Imperial

station plus the cost, if any, of conveying his heavy baggage from the Indian to the Imperial station."

"An officer who holds a return ticket to India will not be eligible for any additional refund on account of such a ticket, but will be permitted to proceed to the Imperial station, either *via* India or direct as may be most convenient. An officer holding a return ticket, who elects to proceed to the Imperial station *via* India will be provided with passage from India to the Imperial station in a Government vessel or hired transport, if available, otherwise by private steamer. An officer who does not hold a return ticket to India will proceed direct to the Imperial station. Similarly an Indian service officer who, whilst on leave in the United Kingdom from an Imperial station nearer to the United Kingdom than India, is ordered to resume duty in India without returning to the station from which he was granted leave, retains his right to free passage from such station to India, passage being provided by transport whenever possible. A regimental officer whose unit is moved otherwise than by route march to another station within Indian limits during his absence on leave will be allowed free conveyance from the original to the new station for his chargers, servants, baggage and camp equipage left behind in charge of the unit concerned and actually present with it at the time of its move, provided that the authorized scales are not exceeded and that the chargers, etc., are removed simultaneously with the unit to which the officer belongs."

secured by 2 long and 1 short eyelet. The
eyelets are clinched by means of the Tool re-
pairing belt. Any canvas projecting at the out-
ends is then trimmed off.

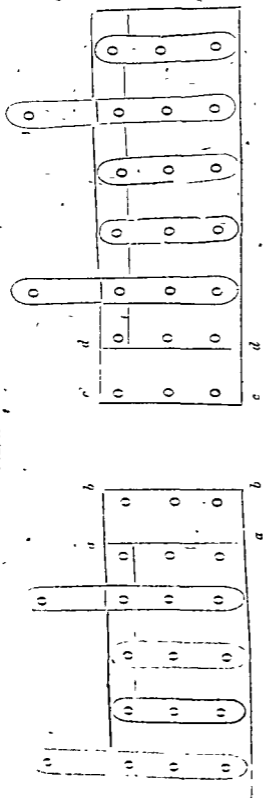
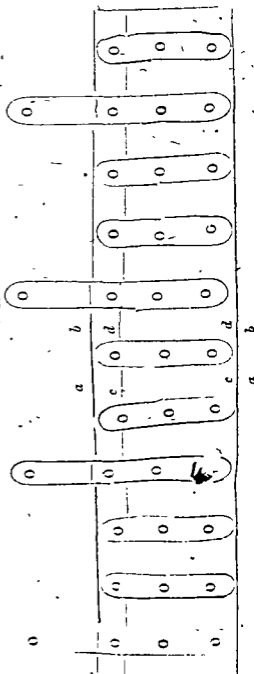
