JOINT MATRICULATION BOARD.

Admission to the above Universities of candidates who have been on active service, in His Majesty's Forces during the present war.

1. Each candidate will be required to present an application to the Board on a form : for that purpose, and to supply experience with a statement of the purpose in joining a Faculty of a University.

2. The Representatives on the Board appointed by each of the Universities which constitute the Board, will conduct an examination, with the assistance of such Examiners as they may think necessary, for the purpose of ascertaining the general standard attained by the candidate.

45. Clothing.—Renewals of clothing and necessaries to British troops (except those on consolidated rates of pay), Indian troops and followers while on leave in India from any of the various expeditionary forces will be made on the following conditions:—

- (i) Every man must be in possession of the full kit as authorised by scale in force in the force he is leaving.
- (ii) A man should bring with him an inventory of the clothing and necessaries in his possession (India Army Form 860-A (or B or C) for British troops (or Indian troops or followers). Immediately he reaches his leave camp, reserve battalion, dépôt, etc., this inventory will be checked and amended if necessary. If no inventory exists, one will be prepared and pasted into his service-book.
- (iii) Any articles in possession which have become necessary

disposed of to the best advantage of the State.

- (iv) Deficiencies are not to be made good unless absolutely necessary and then only on payment.
- (v) When payment issues are made and the value of the articles is not recovered from the man in India, a note should be made in the man's pay book to the effect that the amount is to be recovered on his return to his unit or corps. The amount to be recovered from the man should also be intimated by the officer in charge of the leave camp, reserve battalion, dépôt, etc., to the Divisional Disbursing Officer. - (vi) British troops who wear uniform during their period of leave must be provided with sufficient clothing to enable them to present a clean and tidy appearance at all times. 67. **Memorial Chapel, Sandhurst.**—An appeal has been received from the Commandant, Royal Military College, Sandhurst, for subscriptions towards a fund now being raised for the purpose of erecting a Memorial Chapel in memory of officers educated at Sandhurst who have fallen during the war.

The following is extracted from a pamphlet issued by the Committee of the Fund, giving an explanation and description of the proposed scheme:—

In January 1918, a circular letter was sent to relatives of Sandhurst cadets who up to then had laid down their lives in the war, appealing for funds to rebuild and decorate the chapel as a memorial to the fallen. It is now proposed to give some further explanation and description of the proposed scheme.

There are two main reasons why the enlargement and beautification of the chapel has been selected as a war memorial.

In the first place, the chapel has become wholly inadequate as to size since the college was added to and its strength increased to 700, and would in any case have needed enlargement; secondly, there is a very general sentiment that a commemorative chapel has a stronger appeal and a deeper meaning than an undedicated monument. One or two of the replies to the circular letter have suggested such a monument, and others a new chapel on a new site.

Particularly is this the case in the present choir and sanctuary, where the oak reredos and altar are in memory of those who laid down their lives in the South African War. It will be understood that this part of the building is retained as a side chapel.

The marble dado on the north and south side walls of the nave form part of the original decorative scheme, and almost every available inch has a name inscribed upon it.

So great was the difficulty in finding room for 262 names after the South African War that the design of the marble dado on the south wall was modified to provide for a greater number of names.

There is no space to enter into a description of the windows, but it must be mentioned that the window over the north door is in memory of King Edward VII, and almost opposite is one in commemoration of Queen Victoria's Jubilee in 1887.

Of the colours hanging in the chapel it must suffice to mention one, that of the 9th Foot (The Norfolk Regiment), presented to the chapel in 1837. These are probably the oldest Infantry Colours in existence, having been carried in the American War of 1777.

These are only a few of the visible signs of the chapel's traditions. No number of memorials, however, can adequately symbolize the memory of countless officers, many of whom will live in history, who have worshipped in the chapel as cadets, whether at parade services on Sundays or in the quiet devotional evenings during the week.

The Chapel in the future.

This is the chapel of which we have now to consider the alterations.

The point was naturally raised as to why the enlargement would not be carried out from public funds. This was under consideration before the war, but the project has of necessity been abandoned in that form.

The Army Council has, however, approved of the enlargement being carried out on the lines of the present scheme. This is the design of the architect selected by the Committee, Captain Arthur Campbell Martin, a Fellow of the Royal Institute of Architects, and an officer till recently of "M" Company in the Royal Military College.

Having decided on the enlargement of the present chapel, the problem became primarily an architectural one. The difficulties were many, the chief one being to double the accommodation of the present building in the most convenient manner. New aisles, transepts, and the lengthening of the nave were all suggested, but they left the "scale" what it is now, and the enlarged building threatened to appear ill-proportioned in elevation and awkward in its plan.

* The approximate total of ex-cadets of the Royal Military College who have fallen in this war up to 30th September 1918, is just over 4,000.

Another difficulty was that the new wall space obtained by these methods, offered little extra accommodation for the names to be recorded.*

At this stage the suggestion was made by the architect, that a new chapel should be placed across the present building. The orientation offered no difficulty, for whereas the new would face north-east, the old one faces south-east,

This at once gives a greater height and a broader span to the nave, ample accommodation and great possibilities for the decorative treatment of the interior.

The present chapel will still tell its story, for the existing west end and the apse will remain, the latter as a side chapel, the old monuments and memorials being grouped around them. At the same time the new chapel will be a complete and practically self-contained memorial to those we wish to commemorate.

The Memorial Fund.

As to the appeal for funds, the matter stands thus. College funds available will account for the bulk of the structural work, but for the memorial to Sandhurst we are appealing to the generosity of their relatives and friends, their follow-officers, and their regiments.

The decoration of the interior is to form the memorial. The piers and columns will be of marble, the domes will be adorned with mosaics and the windows with stained glass; and the whole building, as it is to be, will not, it is hoped, be unworthy of the great purpose for which it is erected.

The interior decoration has been governed by the very large number of names that have to be recorded. The problem has been dealt with in the only possible way, which is by making the memorial panels an essential part of the decorative scheme.

The names will be grouped in regiments; on the white marble panels, at the top of each Sandhurst cade

The cost.

For this tribute to "Sandhurst Cadets" it is necessary to appeal to the nation for £50,000.

Such a sum would ensure the completion of the memorial, and as to Great

The Royal Military College is, along with the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, the cradle of the British Army. This college is the place where for over a hundred years every regular officer of the Cavalry, Infantry, Army Service Corps and the Indian Army has been trained. It is,

in fact, a national institution, and the planned memorial of necessity takes on something of a national importance. It is with some confidence, therefore, that this appeal for funds is made not to the Army only but to the nation at large.

Private Memorials to individual officers.

Owing to the great demand for private memorials and the limited wall space available (after the erection of the regimental panels), the Committee is obliged to exercise great discretion in this matter.

Generally speaking, it will not be possible for names to be cut on walls or piers (other than those inscribed on the regimental panels) or for new tablets to be put up. The memorial tablets already on the walls of the present chapel will, however, be reinstated.

The Committee invite those who wish to put up an individual memorial to bear the cost of any of the following pieces of work, which would be designed and inscribed under the superintendence of the architect:—

Coloured glass windows—

Ten large round-headed windows, costing, say, £350 each.

Two tall narrow windows, costing, say, £50 each.

Large west windows, costing probably £600.

Clerestory windows—eighteen two-light and five four-light windows, costing £50 to £60 per light.

Seat ends, treated in a variety of ways with the officers' crest or coat of arms, in colour, with an inscription inlaid in white wood on the dark oak.

These might be designed to cost from £7 upwards.

Among the more costly items that might be erected as memorials are:—The marble screen across the chapel, choir stall, altar and reredos, sanctuary furniture and fittings.

A lecturn has already been promised, also one of the ten large windows:

Though present circumstances are against the giving of large subscriptions, unless a certain number of really substantial sums are given the difficulty in carrying on the work will be very great.

131. Military Training.—Unit Commanders are reminded that when constructing final Assault Courses, the type of course as shown in "Bayonet Training," 1916, must be strictly adhered to, as far as ground space permits. Special attention is to be paid to the necessity for the edge of the trench nearest the gallows, as shown in Section A, being from 7' to 9' from the gallows, the exact distance being governed by the average activity of the men under training.

132. Drill and Instruction—Musketry.—With reference to India Army Orders No. 1254 of 1917 and Nos. 208 and 430 of 1918, it is notified for the information of all concerned that the General Musketry Course—Indian Recruits, contained in Addendum No. 1 to Indian Supplement, Musketry Regulations, will remain in force till March 1920.

133. Officers—Unemployed.—Lieutenant-General Sir A. Phayre, K.C.B., late Commanding 9th (Secunderabad) Division, is permitted to reside *ex* India.

138. Demobilization.—General Officers Commanding will observe the following procedure in dealing with the surplus stocks of books, forms and stationery, also India Army Orders, Army Instructions (India) and Extracts from the *Gazette of India* which will be available from disbanded units:—

1. Books, pamphlets, regulations, army forms, army books and India Army Forms will be returned to the Superintendent, Government Printing, India, Calcutta.
2. Stationery will be returned to the Controller of Printing, Stationery and Stamps, Calcutta.
3. Army Orders, India Army Orders, Army Instructions (India) and Extracts from the *Gazette of India* will be withdrawn and utilised to meet any demands from other units serving under their command; any surplus stock not required for such purpose will be returned to the Superintendent, Government Press, Delhi.
4. Lists (in duplicate) should accompany each consignment returned to any of the abovementioned officers.

139. Demobilization—Compilation of Personal Record Form—Officers.—Some doubt appears to exist as to the meaning of the questions Nos. 16 (a) and (b) of the Personal Record Form—Officers (India Army Form Preliminary X 1).

The following explanation is therefore published:—

Question 16 (a).—Is to enable a record to be kept of those officers who, on demobilization being ordered, wish their names to be considered for retention in the Indian Army Reserve of Officers.

Question 16 (b).—Enables a record to be kept of those Indian Army Reserve of Officers, who wish to be released from military duty prior to general demobilization.

2. No resignations or relinquishments of commissions will be sanctioned previous to general demobilization.

3. The grant of gratuity is in no way affected by the answers given to questions 16 (a) and (b). Gratuities are calculated on the full pay and allowances of the appointment last held on the day when he ceases to be employed on Army Service and on the length of service to date of release. Officers who desire and are selected to remain in the Indian Army Reserve of Officers after demobilization, are entitled to gratuities, under existing rules, based on the service completed to the date of their being released from Army Service whether such date is prior to general demobilization or not.

140. Ammunition—Packages in magazines to be examined for presence of steel uncoated screws.—It

has been brought to notice that steel screws which have not been tinned, galvanized, or painted, have been found in some Imperial Service packages containing explosives which are placed in Group 1, Division 1-A. This prohibits the storage of such packages in magazines (*vide* Regulations for Magazines in India, etc., paragraph 154).

Steps should, therefore, be taken for all packages received from overseas which contain, or are intended to contain, ammunition or explosives which are stored under "clean" conditions, to be examined for the presence of any such unprotected screws. If any such unprotected screws are found the heads should be locally painted over.

Army Order No. VII of 13th December 1918 is republished :—

ARMY ORDER VII, DATED 13TH DECEMBER 1918.

VII. *Demobilization Regulations.*—Demobilization, when ordered, will be carried out in accordance with the Army Demobilization Regulations, which are being issued separately. General Officers Commanding-in-Chief Expeditionary Forces and General Officers Commanding-in-Chief and General Officers Commanding Commands at Home and Abroad, will be responsible that copies of the Army Demobilization Regulations, as soon as received, are communicated to all concerned.

2. The procedure on discharge, transfer or re-transfer to reserve, disembodiment of individual soldiers, or retention for service with the Colours in the *Post-Bellum Army*, shall be the procedure as laid down in the Demobilization Regulations, notwithstanding any provisions which may have been available heretofore for effecting such purposes.

3. In the event of any inconsistency arising between the provisions of the Army Demobilization Regulations and any other Orders, Regulations or Instructions for the time being in force the provisions of the Demobilization Regulations shall prevail.

4. Demobilization Regulations will not apply to men who continue in or join for service with the Colours under existing or new engagements when they are required to report for duty after dispersal or enlistment.

RE-ENLISTMENT IN THE BRITISH ARMY.

Bounty, pay, furlough and conditions.

Explaining the conditions notified in Special India Army Order No. 39-S., dated 17th December 1918, under which soldiers at present serving in the Army may re-enlist for a limited period with

SPECIAL BOUNTY AND SPECIAL FURLOUGH

in order to provide the necessary garrison overseas and reserves at Home for the next 1, 2, 3, and 4 years.

All bounties, furlough and other conditions set forth in this leaflet are only open up to the 15th March 1919. All re-enlistments under these terms must, therefore, be carried out by that date.

1. Men eligible to re-enlist.

- (a) Men serving on "duration of war" engagements (temporary soldiers).
- (b) Men serving on regular normal engagements (regular soldiers) whose term of colour service has expired, or is due to expire before 1st April 1919. A normal engagement is for 7 years with the colours and 5 years with the Reserve.

(The phrase "term of colour service" does not include the additional year for which a man is liable under Section 87 of the Army Act. Provided therefore that a man has completed or completes the period of colour service of his present engagement before 1st April 1919, he is eligible to re-enlist.

For example :—

A man is eligible to re-enlist who :—

- (a) enlisted for 7 years with the colours and 5 years with the reserve, and whose period of colour service (viz., 7 years) has expired or is due to expire before 1st April 1919.

- (b) extended his service to complete 12 years with the colours whose 12 years expires before 1st April 1919.
- (c) Men of the Special Reserve and Territorial Force.

2. Qualifications.

All men must be of medical categories "A" or "B. (i)" and not under the age of 19 or over the age of 35 on the date of re-enlistment.

3. Periods of service and bounties given.

- (a) From date of re-enlistment to 31st March 1920—Rs. 100.
- (b) From date of re-enlistment to 31st March 1921—Rs. 300.
- (c) From date of re-enlistment to 31st March 1922—Rs. 600.
- (d) From date of re-enlistment to 31st March 1923—Rs. 750.

You therefore have a choice of serving for one, two, three or four years.

If you re-enlist for one year, you will receive Rs. 100 on re-enlistment.

If you re-enlist for two years, you will receive Rs. 100 on re-enlistment, another Rs. 100 on 31st March 1920 (the end of your first year) and a further Rs. 100 on 31st March 1921. Total Rs. 300.

If you re-enlist for three years, you will receive Rs. 150 on re-enlistment, another Rs. 150 on 31st March 1920, a further Rs. 150 on 31st March 1921, and a final Rs. 150 on 31st March 1922. Total Rs. 600.

If you re-enlist for four years, you will receive Rs. 150 on re-enlistment, another Rs. 150 on 31st March 1920, another Rs. 150 on 31st March 1921, a further Rs. 150 on 31st March 1922, and a final Rs. 150 on 31st March 1923. Total Rs. 750.

(The above will be in addition to any pension, bounties (see Note 3) or gratuities (see Note 4) to which men may be entitled on account of war or other service. Each instalment of bounty will only be payable provided the man is still serving with the colours on the date on which such instalment becomes due. Should he become non-effective for causes other than misconduct before that date, he will receive a proportion of that instalment.)

4. Furlough.

If you re-enlist for two years, you will be granted a furlough of two months in the United Kingdom, exclusive of the time spent on journey.

If you re-enlist for three or four years, you will be granted a furlough of three months in the United Kingdom, also exclusive of time spent on journey.

Men re-enlisting under these terms and taking furlough are *the first for despatch to the United Kingdom*, and will be sent as soon as possible.

This furlough will commence from the date of passing through the Dispersal Station in the United Kingdom. On the expiration of the furlough, namely, two or three months as the case may be, a man will rejoin for duty at a station in the United Kingdom in accordance with instructions he will receive before proceeding on furlough.

This will give the man re-enlisting an undoubted advantage in obtaining priority to proceed home. The desire for two or three months' freedom and rest at home on pay and allowances is probably more attractive to many of the men than actual final demobilization.

Furlough is to be granted as soon as possible to men who engage for further service, and if it chances that any during the period of their re-engagement happen to serve for a while in the United Kingdom, they will be eligible for the annual leave granted during what is known as "the furlough season" to the troops at Home. When serving abroad, local leave is given for sport, etc., as and when circumstances admit.

Furlough to the Colonies on re-enlistment is not admissible.

5. Cash instead of Furlough.

You will be paid Rs. 250, should you not wish to avail yourself of this passage to the United Kingdom. The amount will be paid immediately a man decides to forego his furlough to the United Kingdom.

6. Conditions.

Re-enlistment will be for service in the following arms of the Service only :—

Cavalry of the Line.

Royal Artillery.

Royal Engineers.

Infantry of the Line.

Machine Gun Corps.

A man serving on a regular normal engagement will on re-enlistment resume his existing substantive rank and seniority.

A man serving on any engagement will retain his rank and seniority, such rank is not above that

Certain exceptions are provided for as explained in Special India Army Order No. 39-S., dated 17th December, 1918, copies of which have been sent to all units.

Men may re-enlist in their present arm or in an arm or branch of the service other than that to which they now belong, provided they have previously served in it, and that it is one of those specified above.

Men will not be liable afterwards to be transferred from the arm or branch of the service in which they now re-enlist to another without their consent. They will, however, should the requirements of the service render it necessary, be liable to transfer at the discretion of the military authorities within that arm or branch of the service. For instance, a man who re-enlists for one Regiment of Infantry may be transferred to another Regiment, but *not outside the Infantry*.

Acceptance for re-enlistment will be subject to the following limitation :—

The man, in the opinion of the approving officer, must be an efficient soldier in the rank and capacity in which he is to serve on re-enlistment.

The above conditions will not affect the position of men who may desire at the termination of this new enlistment to remain in the service for the purpose of qualifying for pension, and who would under regulations now existing have had a claim to re-engage if they had continued to serve on their present attestations instead of re-enlisting.

7. Re-enlistment to be for General Service.

It should be distinctly understood that re-enlistment under the conditions given in this leaflet is not confined to service in India. Re-enlistment will be for *general service*. It may involve service in any other part of the world where British forces are to be maintained, including the United Kingdom. It does not therefore follow that a man who re-enlists in India and proceeds on leave to the United Kingdom will return to India at the expiration of that leave. He may be sent for service with any Army of Occupation (*e.g.*, the Army of the Rhine), or may be retained in the United Kingdom for home service.

Men who re-enlist under these conditions will not be detained for any further period under Section 87 of the Army Act by reason of the fact that they may happen to be serving overseas at the expiration of the period for which they may now re-enlist.

8. Extensions and Re-engagements.

The following are the conditions under which soldiers may extend their service to complete 12 years with the colours, or re-engage to complete 21 years' service for pension.

(a) As regards soldiers serving on a regular normal engagement (regular soldiers), including those who have completed their engagements :—

Provided they fulfil the conditions in King's Regulations, paragraphs 263 and 264, they may be permitted to extend their service or re-engage as the case may be; in such cases the above bounty concessions are not admissible.

If they re-enlist under the bounty conditions, their continuance in the service after the completion of the period for which they re-enlist will then be subject to—

- (i) that they are recommended by their commanding officer.
- (ii) that the interests of the army at the time are such as to render their retention in it desirable.

All previous service on a regular normal engagement will count towards completing 12 years, or towards 21 years' service for pension.

(b) As regards soldiers serving on an engagement other than regular normal engagements (temporary soldiers) :—

They have no claim of any sort or kind to extend or to re-engage on the expiry of the period for which they may now re-enlist; but if they should desire to continue in the service on completing the period for which they may now re-enlist, they will be subject to the conditions given in (a) (i) and (ii) of this paragraph.

In the event of their being permitted to continue in the service, all service with the colours subsequent to the 4th August 1914 will count towards qualifying service for pension and towards the completion of their engagements.

The necessary qualification in all the foregoing cases is that the soldier must be fit for service at the time of his application to extend or re-engage.

9. Bounty not to be refunded.

Men who are permitted to continue in the service at the expiration of the period for which they may now re-enlist, will not be required to refund any portion of the bounty received under these conditions.

10. Terms.

(a) **PAY**—The ordinary rates of pay of the corps into which a man re-enlists, laid down in the Royal Warrant for Pay, etc., as increased by Army Order 1 of 1918 (see Note 1 at end of leaflet), will (subject to (b) below) continue in force for periods of re-enlistment, but special rates such as those authorised for wheelers, saddlers, motor drivers, clerks, etc., under Army Order 283 of 1914 and subsequent similar regulations will not be continued after re-enlistment.

(b) **Service** after the date yet to be fixed by Order in Council as that of the termination of the war will not count for increased war pay under Article 3 of Army Order 1 of 1916 (see Note 2).

(c) THE RATES OF SEPARATION ALLOWANCE AND DEPENDANTS' ALLOWANCE (including special parents' allowance) now in force will be continued in the case of men in respect of whom they were issuable on the 17th December 1918, *viz.*, the date of Special India Army Order No. 39-S. Separation allowance will not be given to the families of men who marry after that date.

The soldier will therefore serve on financial conditions more favourable than those which have ever before obtained in the history of the British Army. The poorest paid man will have at least a clear 10s. 6d. to himself per week, (exclusive of the bonus of 10s. 6d. per week or higher rates according to rank recently sanctioned for British soldiers), and the scale of pay and allowances rises steadily in accordance with rank and numbers of dependants until in the higher ranks an aggregate of some five pounds per week is drawn by the soldier and his dependants.

The value of a man's wages lies not so much in what he draws weekly as in what is left to him weekly after all expenses are paid. In civil life to-day prices are so high that not only is there in many cases practically nothing left of a working man's wages at the end of the week, but it requires very careful management to make ends meet. The soldier is freed from this. In food alone he has a great advantage over the civilian, for the soldier's ration is far greater than that purchased by families in civil life and the quality much better.

The bounty, too, is no small consideration, and even if the soldier is not so minded as to put by savings from his pay he can, without any sacrifice, assure himself of £50 at the end of 4 years.

Notwithstanding this high rate of pay and the bounty, men are further favoured by being permitted in certain circumstances to continue on for pension, and in this connection it is pointed out that it would take a very considerable amount of capital to provide the equivalent even of such a small pension as 7s. per week.

11. Proficiency Pay.

Proficiency pay (Class 9 is included in minimum pay of 1s. 6d. per day which men re-enlist. which ho have not obtained at : ebarred from retaining that rate of proficiency pay, provided they satisfy the other conditions until the educational certificate is again required as a condition of the grant of proficiency pay to the troops generally.

12. Deferred Pay.

On final discharge a man formerly serving on a regular normal engagement (regular soldiers), will draw gratuity (deferred pay) under Article No. 1117, Pay Warrant, in respect of his period of colour service subject to the conditions of that

Article, that is, up to a maximum of £12-0-0 plus £1-0-0 per annum for any period in excess of 12 years, during which they were retained with the colours prior to re-enlistment. If discharged to permanent pension, a gratuity of £2-0-0 only is issuable. A man re-engagement (temporary soldier) service since date of re-enlistment at Article.

13. Married Men.

A limited number of married men may be accepted, but passages will only be provided for their families up to the maximum number for which accommodation can be made available in the various foreign garrisons. The privilege of passage for a family cannot be commuted for a money bounty.

Separation allowance or passage to and from foreign garrisons can only be given to the families of such men as were married on the 17th December 1918, *viz.*, the date of issue of Special India Army Order No. 89-S.

14. General.

A man re-enlisting will be automatically discharged as from the day prior to re-enlistment, and will in due course receive a certificate of discharge from his present engagement.

As explained above, this discharge in no way affects a man's position as regards pension and discharge with a view to re-enlistment and will not be held to constitute a break in service for pension.

In any case where there would remain uncompleted, at the termination of the period of re-enlistment, any portion of a man's present engagement, a man re-enlisting will be allowed, if he so desires, to enlist into the Army Reserve to complete such period.

A man who re-enlists will not be allowed to purchase his discharge during the period for which he has so re-enlisted.

The above conditions in no way affect the subsequent privilege of a soldier to be permitted, under such regulations as may be in force, to re-engage to complete service for pension.

15. Sport and Recreation.

There is no other institution which affords the working man such fine facilities for recreation and all kinds of sport as the Army in peace time.

Every day and days games are liable to settle, have also the advantage of seaside sports, boating, swimming, etc., high stations present special

advantages for hunting, shooting, etc., to take part in which leave is periodically given.

Indoor recreation is also catered for, in messes and other institutions, and dances, concert parties, etc., are regular features in garrison stations at home and abroad.

In civil life the expense of these recreations would be prohibitive if indulged in on a large scale, but this is not so in the Army owing to the help received from the various regimental funds

16. Conclusion.

In conclusion, it is realised that no doubt for many men definite and well paid employment is being kept open by former employers, but there must still remain a large number who on return to civil life will find themselves at a loose end, many will be restless and will find it difficult at the expiration of their demobilization furlough to settle down again in civilian life. Many men who have been demobilised have already expressed a desire to return to the Army, and men would do well to bear in mind that they may sacrifice financial and other benefits should they now elect to leave the service, and yet return to it in the future.

NOTES.

Note 1.—Army Order No. 1 of 1918 sanctioned the increased rates of pay. These increased rates will be continued to those who re-enlist.

Note 2.—Article 3 of Army Order No. 1 of 1918 gave a penny a day war pay in respect to each completed year of service since the commencement of the war. A man who re-enlists will continue to draw the rate of war pay to which he is entitled at the date the war comes to an end, but there will be no further increase of it.

Note 3.—It should be noted that at the expiration of the war, Orders No. 209 and 210 were issued in the service of the Government (including the extra year) have been re-enlisted under this order. A man who has already drawn one third of the bounty due under those orders, will receive the remaining two thirds on re-enlistment.

Note 4.—The gratuity referred to is a gratuity of £1 per year granted under Article 1117, Pay Warrant, to men who enlisted for more than 3 years with the colours or who extended their service beyond 3 years. For those entitled to it, it will be included in the war gratuity when that gratuity is paid, or paid on final discharge.

Applications, together with the notes or coins for exchange, should be handed over or sent by registered post to the Officers Commanding the Units to which the applicants belong, accompanied by a certificate to the effect that the coins or

notes were received by them while prisoners of war. The Officers Commanding the Units will forward such coins and notes in batches to the nearest currency office and obtain Indian currency in exchange and disburse it to the individuals concerned. The notes and coins so received will be forwarded by the Currency Officers to the Accountant General, Bombay, for re-issue to Turkish prisoners of war to be repatriated. Commandants of Turkish Prisoners of War Camps should accordingly indent on the Bombay Currency Office for their requirements. The notes and coins exchanged by Treasure Chest Officers, Bombay and Karachi, will also be forwarded to the Accountant General, Bombay.

- The incidental expenses incurred in exchanging these notes will be debitable to His Majesty's Government.

181. Records.—As some misunderstanding appears to

exist with regard to the correct procedure to be adopted in the issue of Part II Orders (British Troops), the following instructions are issued for future guidance :—

Part II Orders should contain all matters which affect the service of pay of officers and men and these should be published on the day of occurrence, or if this is not possible, as soon after as practicable.

2. In accordance with Special India Army Order No. 36-S. of 19th November 1918, as amended by Special India Army Order No. 40-S. of 21st December 1918, Part II Orders will be issued daily by all Officers Commanding Units (including Branches of Army Headquarters, Command, Division and Brigade Headquarter Offices), Formations, etc. When, however, no matter for entry exists on any particular day or days, orders will not be issued but at the head of the next actual issue of orders a notification will appear to the effect that "No Part II Orders were issued on _____", giving the date or dates upon which no orders were issued. Under no circumstances should more than a week elapse without the issue of Part II Orders, *nil* or otherwise; if *nil* three copies only are required.

3. Consecutive numbers will only be issued when orders are actually issued, i.e., if Part II Orders issued on Monday, January 27th, bear the number 23 and no orders were issued on Tuesday, January 28th, the number given to Part II Orders of Wednesday, January 29th, would be 24.

Accounts.—It has been brought to notice that cases have occurred in which men of Indian units have not been brought on payment, have been retained on payment after decease or discharge, or brought on payment of more than one company. Considerable overpayments have thus been made and confusion has resulted in the subsequent adjustment of the accounts. The chief cause of these defects is attributed to the incorrect preparation of Part II Orders, and with a view to avoiding such errors in the future, Officers Commanding units will prepare quarterly nominal rolls of all men in their units and forward same to the Controller of Military Accounts concerned. These rolls should show the men in numerical order of regimental numbers in the rolls of each squadron or company, and should state the dates of casualties (if any), promotions, discharges, etc., during the preceding quarter.

The first nominal roll will be submitted on the 1st April 1919.

Accounts—War Office have decided that, in cases in which Military Accountant a serving soldier who has been granted General's unOfficial No. a pension under Army Order 1 of 5663-Accts., dated 7th February 1919. 1918 wishes to make an allotment from his combined emoluments, he should be required to state the exact apportionment of such allotment as between pay and pension, so that, in cases of death or of soldiers reported missing, there may be no doubt as to the rate of allotment which should be issued with separation allowance for the continuation period.

In the absence of a specific form for making an allotment from pension in such cases, Army Form O.-1796-A should be adopted for the purpose.

208. Accounts—Issue of pay books to men

proceeding home.—It has been brought to notice that the provisions of paragraph 2 of Army Instruction (India) No. 1458 of 1918 are not being complied with in all cases, in that pay books have not been issued in certain instances and also that a number of pay books issued have been incomplete or obsolete.

The attention of all Officers Commanding units is drawn to the absolute necessity for strict compliance with the above-quoted order, as a speedy settlement of a soldier's account depends entirely on the production of the pay book complete and in proper order.

the records of a combatant unit of the Indian Army on the disbandment of the cadre of the unit:—

All accounts will be brought up to date and properly closed. The account documents, books, equipment ledgers, general correspondence and the administrative papers and records will be sorted, catalogued and arranged according to months in two sets labelled respectively "R" (for retention) and "D" (for destruction after three years). They will be packed in boxes marked with the name of the unit so that they can be easily referred to. It will be necessary to maintain the account documents and books separately for retention as they cannot be destroyed until a period of five years has elapsed. Although accounts and equipment ledgers relating to public money and stores are on record with the audit offices, it will be necessary for the regimental records to be complete in a

211 respects as acquittances and subsidiary documents relating to the accounts are maintained in regimental charge and a reference to them may become necessary. (See footnote.)

2. These records, both accounts and administrative, will be handed over under the orders of the General Officer Commanding Division or Independent Brigade concerned as under:—

- (a) *Artillery units*.—To the Artillery Depôt on which the unit being disbanded is dependent.
- (b) *Sapper and Miner units*.—To Corps Headquarters or Signal Service Depôt, Poona, according to the nature of the unit being disbanded.
- (c) *Cavalry and Infantry units*—
 - (i) In general, where there is any other unit which, either because it provided a nucleus at the formation of the unit being disbanded, or for any other reason can be regarded as the parent unit, the documents will be sent to such parent unit.
 - (ii) Where there is no such other unit, the documents will be sent to the headquarters of the division in which disbandment takes place.
 - (iii) *Men's personal documents*—Where the man is retained in the service, will be despatched to the unit with which he is retained; where he is discharged, will form part of the general documents of the unit being disbanded and will be disposed of as in paragraph 2 (c) (i) and (ii) above.

3. Units or headquarters to which records are sent in accordance with these instructions, will give a receipt to the Officer Commanding Cadre being disbanded, a copy of the receipt being furnished to the Adjutant General in India.

4. No records will be destroyed without the sanction of the Adjutant General in India.

5. The accounts and documents on record with the Military Accounts Department will be maintained, so far as Field accounts are concerned, at one centre, viz., Poona, and accounts and documents, on record with Divisional Controllers, will be maintained, for the present, at Divisional Account Centres.

6. After the accounts have been finally brought up to date, closed and handed over, *vide* 2 above, no objections can ordinarily be raised by any department in regard to matters connected with equipment, stores, clothing, etc., of the unit of which the cadre has been disbanded. 21

NOTE.—It is for the General Officer Commanding Division or Independent Brigade concerned to decide whether the sorting and completion of records, outlined in paragraph 1 above, is to be carried out by the Officer Commanding Cadre or by a special Board of Officers assembled for the purpose.

212. Dress—British Officers.—With reference to India Army Order No. 305 of 12786 (Q. THE TERRITORIAL OFFICERS' DECORATION AMENDING WARRANT (1918).

George R. I.

Whereas His late Majesty, Our Beloved Father King Edward VII, by a Warrant dated the 17th day of August, 1908, did institute and create a new Decoration to be designated "The Territorial Decoration";

And whereas it was ordained by the said Royal Warrant that persons should be eligible for this Decoration;

And whereas by a warrant dated the 3rd day of May, 1912, We did ordain that the said Royal Warrant dated the 17th day of August, 1908, should be amended for the purpose of defining more strictly what persons should be eligible for this Decoration;

And whereas We desire to recognise specially the meritorious service of officers of Our Territorial Force during the present war;

Now therefore We do by these Presents for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, ordain that Our said Royal Warrant dated the 3rd day of May, 1912, shall be revoked and that the following Ordinance shall be substituted for the corresponding Ordinance in the Royal Warrant dated the 17th day of August,

1908, and shall henceforth be construed and have the same effect as if it formed part of the said Royal Warrant :—

Fourthly :—It is ordained that no person shall be eligible for this Decoration who is in possession of the Volunteer Officers' Decoration nor shall he be nominated thereto unless he—

(1) Is or was a commissioned officer and has served for twenty years on the Active List of Our Territorial Force, including commissioned service in the Senior and Junior Divisions of Our Officers' Training Corps ; previous commissioned service in Our Yeomanry Cavalry, Imperial Yeomanry or Volunteer Force ; previous service qualifying for the Colonial Auxiliary Forces' or Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve Officers' Decoration ; and all service, while holding a Volunteer Officers' Commission, as an acting or honorary officer of a Cadet Corps, or Cadet Battalion, after attaining the age of seventeen years ;

(2) Is recommended by the Commanding Officer of the Unit in which he has served ; and

(3) Is duly certified by the District Military Authorities in which the Unit is located as having been an efficient and thoroughly capable officer in every way deserving of such a Decoration.

Provided nevertheless and We do hereby declare that any time during which an officer of Our Territorial Force may have served as an officer on the Active List of that Force (or of Our Royal Navy, Our Regular Army, Our Special Reserve, or Our Royal Air Force) or, if an officer of the Territorial Force Reserve, has been recalled to active military service during embodiment in the present war shall reckon twofold as qualifying service towards the twenty years required as aforesaid, subject always to the proviso that such officer was serving in Our Territorial Force on the 4th day of August, 1914, and either before or after that date had signed an agreement to serve outside the United Kingdom.

Provided also and We do further declare that any time during which an officer of Our Territorial Force may have served on the Active List in the ranks of that Force (or of Our Royal Navy, Our Regular Army or Our Royal Air Force) during embodiment in the present war shall reckon as full qualifying service towards the twenty years required as aforesaid, subject always to the proviso that such officer was

1292. Applicability of Air Ministry Orders to the Army and of Army Orders and Army Council Instructions to the Royal Air Force.

1. Doubts having arisen as to the applicability of Air Ministry Orders to Army personnel, it is notified that such orders have no validity as far as the Army is concerned unless embodied in orders or instructions issued by or on behalf of the Army Council. Such portions of Air Ministry Orders as it may be considered desirable to publish for the information of the Army will be promulgated by Army Orders, A.C. Is, or other recognized means of communication as may be necessary.

2. Similarly Army Orders or A. C. Is are not normally applicable to the Royal Air Force.

When it is intended that an Army Order or A. C. I. should be so applicable this will be specifically stated in the Order or Instruction.

ARMY ORDER.

I.—Class Z, Army Reserve.—1. While, as has been already stated officially, the present military situation does not admit of the beginning of general demobilization, yet, at the same time, it is possible, gradually, to release from the colours a number of soldiers who are urgently required in civil life. In view, however, of the fact that it cannot be said definitely that all risk of a recrudescence of hostilities has passed, it is necessary to make provision for the recall of these men to the Army in the event of an emergency re-mobilization becoming necessary.

2. To meet this the Army Council have decided to form under the powers conferred on them by Section 12 of the Military Service Act, 1916 (Session 2), a new class of the Army Reserve to be designated Class Z.

3. The present state of uncertainty will probably continue for some time and therefore so long as the Military Service Acts remain in force—which will be until the date fixed by the Termination of the Present War (Definition) Act, 1918, *i.e.*, until the deposit of the ratifications of the Treaty of Peace—it will be necessary to keep the new Reserve open.

4. Accordingly, until further orders, all men released from service with the colours on the expiration of their demobilization furlough will be passed to this class of the Reserve, except men to be discharged as physically unfit for further service or on medical grounds, soldiers referred to in paragraph 11 who have not completed their periods of engagement on the date of release, soldiers serving on a Territorial Force engagement (*vide* paragraph 12), and soldiers who are finally discharged in accordance with recognized practice. Men being withdrawn from Reserve Classes W and P will not be transferred to this class of the Reserve.

5. As the power of recall will not be exercised except in case of military emergency, its existence will not interfere with the re-settlement of the men in civil life, nor is it intended that it should be a bar to emigration or repatriation overseas.

6. The only immediate obligation on men passed to the new Class Z will be that they will have to notify changes of address to their record offices.

7. Class Z Army Reservists will receive no pay or other emoluments from Army funds, and their time in Class Z will not be reckoned as service for pension or gratuity. They will not wear uniform.

8. Soldiers in Class Z will be liable at any time to be recalled in case of urgent military necessity for service with the colours, either individually or collectively, and by means of either individual or public notification.

9. Soldiers will not be subject to military discipline whilst in this class of the Reserve.

10. No soldier will forfeit the right to consideration for a disability pension or the right to payment of any pension by reason of his transfer to Class Z Army Reserve.

11. No soldier who is eligible on demobilization for transfer to Section B of Class I of the Army Reserve will be transferred to Class Z nor will mobilized Special Reservists whose period of engagement in the Special Reserve has not expired, be transferred to this class. Such soldiers will be relegated or transferred to their respective sections of the Reserve.

12. The above instructions do not apply to soldiers serving on a Territorial Force engagement. Separate instructions will be issued for the temporary demobilization of soldiers serving on the colours during the war.

ARMY ORDER.

XII.—Release from the Colours of Men of the Territorial Force.—1. In paragraph 12 of Special Army Order I, dated 3rd December 1918, in which provision was made for the transfer to Class Z, Army Reserve, of soldiers other than those serving on a Territorial Force engagement, it was pointed out that separate instructions would be issued in regard to the temporary disembodiment of similar men of the Territorial Force.

2. As in the case of soldiers transferred to Class Z, Army Reserve, it is necessary to make provisions for the recall of disembodied men of the Territorial Force in the event of an emergency re-mobilization becoming necessary, and so it is not at present expedient to order a general disembodiment of the Territorial Force.

3. It is intended, however, that the release from the Colours of men of the Territorial Force should proceed *pari passu* with that of the rest of the Army, and the Army Council has therefore decided to exercise the powers conferred on them by Section 18 (2) of the Territorial and Reserve Forces Act, 1907, to provide for their gradual disembodiment as the exigencies of the service permit.

4. Men of the Territorial Force so disembodied will be liable at any time before the general disembodiment of the Territorial Force, to be re-embodied in case of urgent military necessity either individually or collectively.

Any necessary directions under Section 18 (2) of the Territorial and Reserve Forces Act, 1907, as to disembodiment and re-embodiment will be issued separately.

5. As the power of re-embodiment will not be exercised except in case of military emergency, its existence will not interfere with the re-settlement of the men in civil life, nor is it intended that it should be a bar to emigration or repatriation overseas.

6. The only immediate obligation on men disembodied in accordance with this Army Order will be that they will have to notify changes of address to their record officers.

7. Except as provided in the Territorial Force Regulations, men of the Territorial Force while disembodied in accordance with this Army Order will receive no pay or other emoluments from Army funds and will not wear uniform.

8. No man will forfeit the right to consideration for a disability pension or the payment of any pension by reason of disembodiment in accordance with this Army Order. For all pension purposes such disembodiment whether individual or general will be equivalent to discharge.

9. Disembodied service will not reckon as part of the period qualifying a man to reckon service for gratuity.

10. Disembodied men of the Territorial Force will only be subject to military law under the conditions normally applicable to the Territorial Force in time of peace.

Similar boards have been set up in the provinces and executive action will be, for the most part, taken by the local bodies, the Central Board being in the main an advisory and co-ordinating authority on questions of general policy arising from time to time.

The Board will shortly address commanding officers of Indian Army units on the subject of the grant of land and special pensions in recognition of distinguished service rendered by Indian officers and other ranks during the War, 1914-18.

Arrangements exist at the concentration camps at Deolali and the rest camp at Karachi, for the issue of British postal orders in exchange of Indian currency in the possession of British troops proceeding home. If available British currency may be obtained from the Treasure Chest Officers, Bombay, and Karachi (at the rate of Rs. 13-5-0 per sovereign, at present).

(For the procedure to be adopted in exchanging Indian currency in the United Kingdom, attention is invited to India Army Order No. 179 of 1919.)

(2) *Troops proceeding direct to the United Kingdom.*—

Arrangements have been made with the Treasure Chest Officer, Alexandra Docks, Bombay, for the exchange of Indian currency into English money when required. In order to facilitate matters and to prevent delay at the port of embarkation, Officers Commanding parties who are proceeding *direct to Bombay* for embarkation to the United Kingdom, will inform the Treasure Chest Officer in advance (by telegram) of the probable date of arrival and, if possible, the approximate amount of money to be exchanged.

The officer in charge of the party should then collect the money to be exchanged and prepare, as soon as possible, a list of the amounts. On arrival at Bombay he should detail a small party (under the charge of a junior officer if possible) to proceed to the office of the Treasure Chest Officer and arrange for the exchange to be effected while the other members of the party are embarking.

(3) *Exchange of Indian currency in Egypt.*—It is also notified that facilities exist in Egypt for the exchange of Indian currency into the English equivalent.

(4) As it is possible that troops may be unavoidably detained at concentration camps or ports of embarkation for short periods, they should be advised to keep sufficient small change in their possession to meet petty requirements during such detention.

Ganjam, Vizagapatam, and Jeypore and Rs. 10 in the other districts of the Presidency. If the first Monday be a gazetted holiday, the examination will be held on the second Monday or if that is also a gazetted holiday on the next working day thereafter. Preliminary examinations in Persian will also be held by the Secretary, Board of Examiners, Calcutta, at Lucknow and Lahore in March and October. The dates on which these examinations will be held can be ascertained from the Secretary, Board of Examiners, by application in the months of February and September, respectively."

the Royal Navy, the Army, and the Royal Air Force, directed by a Council containing representatives of all ranks and ratings and of *ex*-service sailors, soldiers, and airmen.

This Council will organize the distribution of such military and other service funds as are placed at its disposal for the benefit of serving and *ex*-serving men. Such benefits will include information agencies, employment bureaux, social and recreative clubs, provision of additional benefits for widows and children beyond those provided by the States, sports, organizations, etc. Further, it is hoped to promote efficiency and prevent overlapping by co-ordinating under this League the efforts of many existing voluntary societies and institutions, including Regimental Benevolent Associations.

5. In addition to the benefits indicated above, there are many other ways in which it will be possible to use Service funds, however large they may be, for the general and individual good of all for whom or by whom they have been contributed, and the Central Funds Representative Committee will advise the Army Council upon these points and act as the spokesman of the serving and *ex*-serving officers and other ranks and their dependants.

6. It is considered that the system which has existed hitherto of attempting to secure benefits for *ex*-serving officers and men through the agency of Regimental Associations will not, by itself, suffice in future. The vast number of men who have served in the present war, and the fact that many have been transferred frequently from one corps to another, make it clear that something more is needed than mere sectional dealing with the all important matter of the interests of the *ex*-service officer and man, and that the multiplication of local or regimental agencies wholly unconnected with one another is undesirable. Moreover, if voluntary effort is to supplement what the State is doing on a scale it has never done before, the closest co-operation between the State organization and the organization of the voluntary bodies which aim at supplementing State aid is above all things essential. The machinery of the voluntary organizations, whatever it is, must be national in character and as widespread as is the State machinery. Such machinery the new League aims at bringing into existence.

7. In these circumstances it is desired that G. Os. C.-in-C., G. Os. C., C. Os., and other authorities concerned,

will do their utmost to prevent any hasty or unnecessary spending of funds under their control owing to uncertainty as to the future. It will be seen that all possible steps are being taken carefully to safeguard such funds against misappropriation, and that the proper beneficiaries will have both a voice in their distribution and an interest in the benefits to be derived. Money that is not required for immediate expenditure in the real interests of the troops should be carefully retained for the many objects for which it will be needed during the next few years for the benefit of those who have served or are serving. For these objects very large sums will be required and the more money that can be saved the stronger will be the position for ministering to the good of all concerned.

8. Further particulars of The Army Trustee, the new League, and other matters connected with the administration of the above-mentioned funds are in course of issue. Mean time it is desired that the utmost economy be exercised consistent with the present needs of the officers and men now with the Colours.

838. The Administration of Funds existing for the benefit of the Army.

1. With a view to providing for the safe custody of Funds which are not public money but exist for the benefit of the Army, it is proposed to appoint an Army Trustee to administer such funds and to report to the Army Council on the conditions of the respective trusts or the orders of the Army Council or of the Army Council. Detailed instructions will be issued defining the functions of the Trustee.

2. Further, in order to assist in the administration of such Funds as are controlled by the Army Council, and to ensure that those for whom and by whom these funds have been contributed shall have a voice in their distribution, the Army Council have decided to appoint an advisory body to be styled "The Central Funds Representative Committee." This Committee will advise upon such questions connected with the custody, control and disposal of the above funds as are referred to it by the Army Council.

3. The Central Funds Representative Committee will be composed as follows :—

A chairman nominated by the Army Council.

Two members nominated by the Army Council, of whom one will specially represent the interests of Overseas Forces and garrisons other than the armies in France.

One member nominated by the G. O. C.-in-C. the Forces in Great Britain.

Three representatives nominated by each of the following :—The F. M. C.-in-C. British Armies in France, the G. O. C.-in-C. each of the Commands in the United Kingdom, and the G. O. C. the London District. At least one of the three representatives from each Command will be from the warrant or other ranks selected from warrant officers, non-commissioned officers or men.

Subject to the Army Council's approval, the Representative Committee will have power to add to its numbers in order to ensure the representation of all interests concerned. It is also empowered to appoint committees of its members for special objects.

4. The clerical work of the Representative Committee will be carried out in the office of the Army Trustee, by whom the secretary will be supplied. The secretary will not be a member of the Representative Committee.

5. The Representative Committee will frame its own rules for the conduct of business, subject to the provisions of this A. C. I.

6. A meeting of the Committee will be held at least twice a year. Notice of the agenda will be given by the secretary one month before the date of meeting, and steps will be taken by the G. Os. C.-in-C. to ascertain the views of all ranks in their Commands upon the subjects to be discussed. Special or urgent business not upon the agenda may be considered at the discretion of the chairman of the meeting, provided that a notice of such business has been circulated to the members of the Committee at least seven clear days before the meeting.

Terms of service of constables in the Calcutta Police.

1. A constable on enlistment will get (a) actual travelling and diet expenses for his journey to join first appointment; (b) a bonus of Rs. 8-8 for bedding and cooking utensils; (c) pay and allowances as detailed below; (d) free quarters; (e) free medical aid and medicine, and (f) free kit.

2. From the date of enlistment, and until the completion of 3 years' service, he will draw Rs. 13 per month as pay, plus the special allowances sanctioned, i.e., Traffic Police Rs. 2 each, Mounted Police Rs. 5 each, and Armed Police Re. 1; also other special allowances in the Detective Department and Special Branch.

3. All constables, excepting armed police sepoy, will receive an increment of Re. 1 each on completion of 3 years' approved service; another rupee on completion of 10 years; and other rupee on completion of 17 years' approved service.

Promotion to higher ranks depends entirely on good conduct and fitness.

Constables on promotion to the rank of head constable, get Rs. 18-8 rising by grade promotion to Rs. 21 and Rs. 26.

4. Promotion in the armed police depends upon the vacancies in the higher grades. The following is the scale of pay in the different grades:—

5. The following are the principal leave rules:—

- (a) Casual leave on full pay; up to 14 days in a year, to constables resident in Bengal; up to 16 days to constables resident in Bihar and Orissa and 18 days to constables residing in Provinces west of Bihar and Orissa.
- (b) Privilege leave on full pay for one month for each eleven months' uninterrupted service (period in hospital not counted as interruption).
- (c) Special leave for men drawing pay up to Rs. 20 for 4 months, after completion of 4 years' uninterrupted service (privilege leave counted as interruption), is allowed to residents of Bengal and Bihar, 5 months to residents of the United Provinces and Punjab, and 6 months to residents of Provinces further west.
- (d) Medical leave on half pay is also granted up to the limit of 4, 5 and 6 months to constables and head constables drawing pay up to Rs. 20 per month, according to their place of residence, as in the case of special leave. Leave granted to men drawing above Rs. 20 as pay, is regulated according to Civil Service Rules.

6. Pensions to constables and officers are regulated according to Civil Service Rules.

7. Military service will be counted towards pension, according to Civil Service Rules.

8. A constable on enlistment is required to sign an agreement that he will serve for three years uninterrupted service, before he can tender his resignation on two months' notice, and in case he is a member of the mounted branch, 6 months' notice. If he wants to resign before the expiration of the three years, he shall have to refund the bonus of Rs. 6-8 together with any sum Government may expend during the period he is attached for training, i.e., pay, travelling allowance, etc., in such case also, the usual notice before resignation is necessary.

1371. Guncotton primers not to be thrown with burning fuze.

It has been brought to notice that guncotton dry primers with a length of safety fuze attached have occasionally been used as bombs and thrown by hand.

Accidents due to this practice have been reported.

Throwing dry primers with any length of burning fuze attached is dangerous and the practice is therefore forbidden.

The attention of all concerned is drawn to A. C. I. 1775 of 1917 (I. A. O. 632 of 1918) and instructions on Bombing (S. S.-182), dated November 1917, Part II, Chapter IX.

48. Representation of the People Act. Instructions for preparation of second register.

1. Under the Representation of the People Act it is necessary to prepare a fresh register every six months in England and Wales and Scotland, termed the Spring Register and the Autumn Register respectively. The qualifying period for the second Register ends on 15th January, 1919. The new Register comes into force on the 15th May, 1919.

2. Although the Army may be in a state of rapid demobilization when the new Register becomes effective, its preparation and the re-registration of naval and military voters is necessary for the following reasons:—

- (a) The Act requires it to be made (*see* Part II, of the Act).
- (b) Elections occurring during the currency of the Register will be contested on it.
- (c) Officers and soldiers who are still serving and away from their constituencies, when an election takes place, will be unable to vote if their names are not on the Absent Voters List. When such officers and soldiers are demobilized and return to civil life, the fact of their being on the Absent Voters List in no way affects their powers of voting, even if they have returned to their qualifying addresses, as the ballot papers can be sent to any address the voter names.

3. It has been decided that the basis of the new Register and Absent Voters List, so far as military voters are concerned, will be:—

- (a) The reproduction of the names of persons on the present Register and Absent Voters List, so far as such persons remain qualified.

- (b) A house-to-house enquiry instituted by Registration Officers to ascertain the naval or military voters either omitted from the present Register and List, or newly qualified to be registered.
- (c) Facilities for all officers and soldiers, who are not on the present Register and List, to notify their qualifying addresses, so that their claims may be investigated in view of their names being placed on the new List.

4. In order to meet the requirements of para. 3 (c) above, all officers or soldiers :—

- (a) who have joined the Army since 15th April, 1918, the end of the qualifying period for the present Register and List, and who have not been placed on the present Register and Absent Voters List,
- (b) who have joined the Army since 15th April, 1918, and whose names have therefore not appeared on the present Register and Absent Voters List,
- (c) who for any other reason are aware, or believe, that their names are not recorded on the present Register and Absent Voters List, but who are able to furnish a qualifying address, and who consider that they are thereby entitled to have their names included in the new List

should immediately inform the Registration Officers of the constituencies in which they are serving through Officers of the Army, as mentioned in para. 5 below.

as possible, in time for publication of the Electoral Lists, which are now in course of preparation.

The qualifications for registration of naval or military voters will be found in the instructions on the forms referred to in para. 5 below.

Similar action should be taken in the case of Q.M.A.A.C., but the age in their case in 30 years instead of 19 years.

Officers i/c Records will, after preparing A. Fs. W. 3913,* forward without delay to Registration Officers concerned *except in the case of Scotland* all such applications verified by them, and will make enquiry in the case of applications which cannot be verified with the view of tracing the correct

7. Officers i/c Records will, commencing from January 1st, 1919, notify to Registration Officer all casualties, as under, affecting soldiers whose names are or may be placed on the Absent Voters List:—

- (a) Discharge, transfer to Reserve, or disembodiment.
- (b) Death.
- (c) Transfer to another Corps (New Record Office to be stated).
- (d) Desertion.

In the case of men discharged or transferred to Reserve they will also notify the address which the soldier gives on his Protection Certificate, A. F. Z. II, or A. F. W. 9372B (Notification of Discharge), so that the Registration Officer can communicate with the discharged soldier, etc., direct, for the purpose of ascertaining whether he wishes to remain on the Absent Voters List or to have his name removed therefrom. The notification hitherto given to the discharged soldier, etc., as to the constituency in which he is a voter will be discontinued from the same date (1st January, 1919). The notifications to Registration Officers will be given on slips 4½ inches long by 8 inches wide, and on the *pro forma* issued as Appendix III to this A. C. I.

8. On a soldier being discharged, transferred to Reserve dying or deserting, the Officer *i/c* Records will remove his card in the Record Office Parliamentary Register from the box of effective soldiers, into the non-effective soldiers' box, where they will be retained for future reference.

2. **CONDITIONS**—*Paragraph 5 (C) (i)*.—A man may be allowed to re-enlist in a branch of the service other than that in which he is now serving although he has no previous experience of such an arm, provided he is generally suitable for the arm into which he desires to re-enlist, and provided it is one of the arms enumerated in paragraph 5(A). In every case a man must re-enlist for the longest period, *viz.*, 31st March 1923, and must be accepted by an officer commanding a unit of the arm or branch of the service in which he desires to re-enlist.

3. *Paragraph 5 (E) (ii)*.—Corporals count as rank and file and are not limited either in numbers or proportion.

Officers commanding units and depôts in which men of any of the above named classes are serving, who are about to return to civil life and who may be desirous of enrolling in the Punjab Police or Punjab Railway Police, should apply to the Superintendents of Police of the districts in which applicants wish to serve.

Candidates for enlistment must be Punjabis of the agricultural classes, not belonging to the menial castes, and not more than 30 years of age.

The minimum physical standard is height 5' 7", chest 33", good eyesight and freedom from organic weakness. The regulations as to height and chest measurement can be relaxed in favour of suitable men.

Smart and well behaved literate constables can look forward to promotion to the Head Constable grades (Rs. 1 to Rs. 25 per mensem) and even to eventual promotion to the rank of Sub-Inspector.

At the present time constables are also drawing a war allowance of Re. 1* to 1-8 per mensem and scarcity allowance of Rs. 2-8 per mensem.

Reserve, or is disembodied, the rank shown on his discharge certificate (Army Form B 2079), Army Form Z 21, and character certificate (Army Form B 2067) when the issue of that document to him is provided for will be the highest temporary or acting rank held by the soldier for a minimum period of 6 months' continuous service during any period of his service, or otherwise the substantive rank held at the time of release, whichever is the higher rank, provided he was not reverted to a lower rank through misconduct or inefficiency. If the soldier was reverted to a lower rank through misconduct or inefficiency, only the higher rank held during the period subsequent to reversion is to be shown.

In cases where the soldier is discharged on account of wounds, or ill health, caused in and by military service, the foregoing rule will also apply, except that if more favourable to him the rank shown will be that held at the time of discharge, irrespective of any time limit as regards acting or temporary rank.

3. Reports in hospital lists are not to be regarded as authoritative for the purpose of eligibility.

4. Accidental or self-inflicted injuries do not qualify.

5. The reports "wounded-gas," "wounded-shell-shock," do qualify.

6. *Entry in official documents of eligibility for the distinction in dress.*—The fact of eligibility, together with the nature and date of the casualty, will be entered as follows:—

(a) *Officers.*—In Part II, of Orders, in Army Book 435, and if serving overseas in Army Form B-103.

(b) *Other ranks.*—In Army Book 64, attested by the signature of an officer, in Part II, of Orders, in Army Form B-103, and in the Army Attestation or Record of Service paper. On discharge the number of strips of gold braid to which a man is entitled will be entered on the discharge certificate.

(c) *Nurses, members of Voluntary Aid Detachments and special probationers in Military Hospitals, and officials and members of Queen Mary's Army Auxiliary Corps, of the Women's Legion Motor Drivers, and of the Women's Army Forage Department, whether wounded abroad or at home.*—In the appropriate official records of the service of the individuals concerned.

In no case will any of the above entries be made unless the wound has been officially reported as laid down either in Paragraph 2 (B) or 2 (C).

7. *Wearing of the distinction in dress after leaving the Service.*—Retired officers, ex-officers, discharged soldiers, nurses and others who, whilst serving, became entitled, as above laid down, to wear on uniforms or service dress the distinction in dress for wounds, may, at their own option, continue to wear it on plain clothes after leaving the Service or after cessation of their military employment.

8. *Unreported and doubtful cases.*—Where an officer, soldier, or other eligible person has been wounded and has not brought the wound to notice within six months of its date,

he or she should be required to abide by the fact, unless it is clear that he or she was not in a position to make the report. Cases not reported at the time, but brought to notice within six months, may be adjudicated by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief an Overseas Force or by the Adjutant-General's Office at an Overseas Base.

If it is desired, exceptionally, to bring to notice cases which are out of time they will be submitted through the applicant's present commanding officer and through the other usual channels to the Secretary, War Office, Finsbury Court, Finsbury Pavement, E. C. 2.

9. *Unauthorised wearing of the distinction in dress.*— It should be noted that any unauthorised person who wears the distinction in dress for wounds, and any person who, without lawful authority or excuse supplies the same to any person not authorised to wear it, renders himself or herself liable to prosecution under Defence of the Realm Regulations No. 41.

Officers Commanding units and depôts in which men of any of the above named classes are serving, who are about to return to civil life and who may be desirous of enrolling in the United Provinces Police, should communicate on the subject to the Inspector General of Police, United Provinces, Allahabad. In all cases the age, home residence and length of military service should be communicated.

Service in the Army will, however, count as service in Police both for the periodic increments in pay and for pension. Full pension will be earned after 30 years' combined Army and Police service. Promotion to the rank of Head Constable on Rs. 15, Rs. 20 and Rs. 25 per mensem, to that of Sub-Inspector (Rs. 50, 60, 70, 80 and 100 per mensem) from Head Constable will be open to all men who read and write.

An enlistment allowance of Rs. 6-8 will be paid on enlistment.

357. *Notes on aviation landing grounds in India.*—In view of the faster types of aeroplanes which will eventually be used on aerial routes in India the following instructions on aviation landing grounds in India are issued for the information of and action by all concerned in supersession of orders previously issued.

It must, however, be clearly understood that these instructions do not convey authority to General Officers Commanding concerned to increase the size of existing aerodromes and to incur expenditure on this or on the acquisition of land without the sanction of competent authority and until funds have been allotted for the purpose.

Classes of landing grounds.—Landing grounds may be either permanent or emergency.

- (a) Permanent landing grounds are required for use by flights and squadrons.
- (b) Emergency landing grounds are used in case of a machine being forced to land on account of engine failure or other cause. They may also be used as report centres when no good permanent ground is available at the point required.

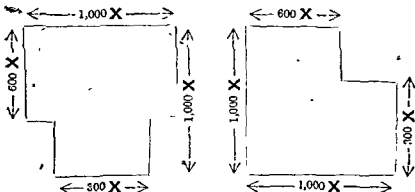
2. *Points to be considered when selecting landing grounds—*

- (a) When there is a choice between two landing grounds the one in more open country should be selected.
- (b) Roads sufficiently good for mechanical transport should lead to the ground. A side road leading to it, unused by ordinary traffic, is also of a great use if transport can be parked on it.

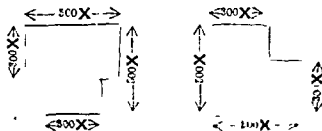
(c) Wherever possible police or other protective posts should be near at hand, if the ground selected be outside Cantonment limits.

(d) (i) Permanent landing grounds wherever practicable should be selected so as to allow a clear run of 1,000 yards in any direction. Square grounds are preferable but where such are not available, "T" or "L" shaped grounds, as in the drawing below, may be selected



(ii) Emergency landing grounds should be selected to give the same expansion as permanent landing grounds, but may be reduced to a minimum of 500 yards \times 500 yards, where a larger size cannot be obtained.

(iii) All landing grounds should be chosen clear of trees, bushes, stones, and cattle grounds; and should be as level as possible.

- (e) Landing grounds with telegraph posts and wires or tall trees on their boundaries should be avoided. If, however, it is necessary for trees and telegraph wires to border the ground, a minimum of 300 yards to clear the obstacle is necessary.

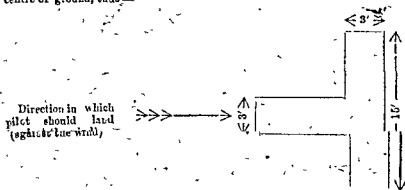
This distance must be increased if the trees exceed 50 feet in height.

- (f) All sides of the boundary of landing grounds (for a distance of 500 yards) should, as far as possible, be devoid of nullahs, tall trees, and hills.
- (g) A water supply is essential at all permanent landing grounds and an advantage, at emergency landing grounds.

3. *Method of marking landing grounds.*—A circle of white stones 50 yards in diameter (outside) and 3 feet in width should be let into the ground in the middle of each landing ground except where the landing ground happens to be a parade or recreation ground, arrangements in this case being made by Officer Commanding, R. A. F. unit concerned for a landing "T" to be put out when the ground is required. It is possible that he may also be required to

N. B.—The "T" is formed by fastening with pegs, two strips of white American or other snow-white cloth, each measuring 15 feet by 3 feet in the centre of ground, thus—



The head of the "T" should face directly into the wind. Care should be taken to alter the position of the "T" with any change of wind.

4. *Work on landing grounds—*

- (a) All work should begin from the centre and proceed outwards, in order that a space for a machine to land on may be provided as quickly as possible.
- (b) Working gangs must not leave their tools lying about on the ground and when they see a machine about to descend, must at once clear the ground.
- (c) Care must be taken that any filled-in-ground is made firm and solid.

5. *Inspection of landing grounds.*—All landing grounds should be periodically examined with a view to keeping the grounds in good condition permanently. The circle of white stones should be kept white to enable a pilot to spot the ground at all times.

6. *Caution.*—When a machine is about to make a landing, it is essential that the ground should be quite clear.

Fatal accidents have frequently occurred through persons remaining on the landing ground when a machine is landing or starting off.

SUPPLEMENTARY INSTRUCTIONS FOR MEDICAL UNITS.

Chapter I, para. 2 (ii).—In 2nd line cancel "except sweepers required for the cadre of the unit," and in 7th line to the end of paragraph cancel "Sweepers required for cadres should, as far as possible, be volunteers. Failing a sufficient number of volunteers, the Officer Commanding cadre should demand in the prescribed manner, for replacements, should the men detained with cadres be required for more than a month."

After the word "disembarkation" add (In order to minimise congestion at ports), "with a view to their entrainment for depôts inland, normally on the same day."

Chapter II, paragraph 1, Personnel—

Cancel "If the unit has to be prepared to remobilise, a cadre on the scale shown in Appendix 'A' will be maintained at the demobilization station until ordered to be dispersed."

Chapter II, paragraph 6, Equipment, is cancelled and the following substituted:—

"G. Equipment.—As soon as possible after arriving in the station, a Board of Survey*

will be assembled to take stock of the equipment.

The Officer Commanding the unit will then, in direct consultation with the officers of the department or arsenal concerned, arrange to de-patch the equipment to the departments of supply. Delivery vouchers in quadruplicate duly enfacéd "Demobilization" and with the name of the Expeditionary Force, e.g., "A," "D," or "E," as the case may be, from which the units returned, will be furnished to Medical Storekeepers to Government, in the case of medical stores returned. One copy will be returned by the Medical Storekeeper to the Officer Commanding the Medical unit."

372. Barrack Department.—With reference to India Army Order No. 567 of 1918, it has now been decided that the scheme for the employment of

British military pensioners instead of effective soldiers in the Barrack Department, the introduction of which was held in abeyance owing to the war, shall be abandoned, and that the Department shall be re-opened to the recruitment of effective soldiers of the Regular Army forthwith.

2. The following instructions should be observed in regard to applications from candidates for admission to the Barrack Department :—

- (a) Barrack Department candidates will be recruited from regiments and corps. Applications should be submitted on I. A. F.-U.-1740 (Army Regulations, India, Volume XII, paragraph 30).
- (b) The names of candidates under 25 and over 30 years of age will not be registered.
- (c) The names of candidates will be submitted to the Garrison Engineer or Assistant Commanding Royal Engineer of the station. Marks will be allotted to each candidate according to his qualifications as shown in the statement published as

an annexure to this order, and if the candidate obtain 46 marks or over, his name together with a list of marks obtained will be forwarded to the Director General of Military Works for registration.

If, however, the candidate fails to obtain 46 marks his Commanding Officer should be informed that his name cannot be registered and no further action need be taken.

373. Clothing—General.—With reference to paragraph 3 of Army Instruction (India) 13869 (Q. M. G.-8-A.) No. 179 of 1919, a limited supply of riband for "1914-15 Star" has been received and is available for issue by the Officer-in-charge, Medal Distribution, Army Department, Calcutta.

374. Clothing.—The changes in standard patterns of clothing and necessaries that have occurred during the months of March and April 1919, are published as an annexure to this order.

374A. Clothing.—The supply of blacking having now been taken over by the Ordnance Department (Clothing Depôts) recoveries for local purchase will no longer be admissible. Blacking will be supplied in bulk in 56 lb. tins and units should indent accordingly. Wastage must be guarded against and in no case will the allowance per unit exceed an average of 2-oz. per man per month.

2. Blacking tins authorised as "necessaries" to certain classes of troops in scales contained in "Clothing Regulations (India), 1919" are also available for supply from Clothing Depôts. These will only be condemned when unserviceable. Replacements will be demanded, and supplied, empty.

ed the provision of passage at the public expense to the United Kingdom, who, India or a Dominion, have married, or whose families have joined them at such places during the war. The concession applies when the husbands are being sent back to the United Kingdom for demobilization or for transfer to the reservé.

2. Passage will be restricted to Government vessel or hired transport; but in the absence of such accommodation passage by private steamer will be provided.

378. Exchange of Indian currency in possession of British troops proceeding to the United Kingdom.—In supersession of India Army Order No. 240 of 8th April 1919, the following arrangements for the exchange into British currency of Indian currency in possession of British troops proceeding to the United Kingdom are hereby notified.

(a) *Facilities in India.*

2. Arrangements exist at the concentration camps at Deolali and the rest camp at Karachi for the issue of British Postal Orders in exchange of Indian currency in the possession of British troops proceeding Home.

3. Arrangements have also been made with the Treasure Chest Officer, Alexandra Docks, Bombay, for (i) the issue of British Postal Orders in exchange for Indian currency; and (ii) the exchange of Indian currency into British currency when required and up to the following maximum limits:—

For a private	5

The rate of exchange will for the present be Rs. 13-5-0 per sovereign. If available, British currency may also be obtained, at the same rates and subject to the same maximum limits, from the Treasure Chest Officer at Karachi, in the case of troops embarking at Karachi, and from the Accountant General, Bengal, in the case of troops embarking at Calcutta.

4. The officers in charge of the concentration camps at Deolali and the rest camp at Karachi, and the officers in charge of parties proceeding *direct* to Bombay, should persuade all individuals to exchange into British Postal Orders all surplus Indian currency in their possession in excess of the maximum amounts mentioned above, in respect of which exchange into British currency will be allowed at Bombay.

5. In order to facilitate matters and to prevent delay at the Port of Embarkation, Officers Commanding parties who are proceeding to Bombay for embarkation to the United Kingdom will inform the Treasure Chest Officer in advance (by telegram) of the probable date of arrival and, if possible, the approximate amount of money to be exchanged (i) into British postal orders and (ii) into British currency. The officer in charge of the party should collect the money to be exchanged and prepare, as soon as possible, a list of the amounts, and on arrival at Bombay he should detail a small party (under the charge of a junior officer if possible) to proceed to the office of the Treasure Chest Officer and arrange

378 for the exchange to be effected while the other members of the party are embarking.

A similar procedure should be followed in respect of troops embarking at Karachi on vessels which call at Bombay on their way to England.

6. As it is possible that troops may be unavoidably detained at concentration camps or ports of embarkation for short periods, they should be advised to keep sufficient small change in their possession to meet petty requirements during such detention.

(b) Facilities in Egypt.

7. Arrangements have also been made for the exchange into British currency in Egypt of Indian currency in the possession of British Troops passing through. The Field Treasure Chest Officer, Suez, will board all transports at Suez and if necessary will travel to Port Said exchanging Indian currency into British currency.

(c) Facilities in England.

8. For exchange of Indian currency in the United Kingdom, attention is drawn to the I. A. O. No. 179 of 11th March 1919. Intimation has since been received from the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India that arrangements have been made for rupee currency in possession of British troops arriving in England to be exchanged at port of disembarkation by local representatives of Barclay's Bank up to a maximum of Rs. 80. Particulars of the arrangement will be obtainable from the disembarkation staff officers. Sums in excess of Rs. 80 will continue to be exchanged by the India Office by post, as already mentioned in I. A. O. No. 179 of 11th March 1919.

379. Discipline.—In connection with the provision of accommodation at Summer Hill for British Military Clerks employed at Army Headquarters an attached Section was formed at Summer Hill with effect from 21st April 1919.

2. If a man can read, without glasses, not less than 6-12 with each eye, he may be accepted for category A without examination by an ophthalmic specialist. If the vision is below this standard, the recruit shall be sent for examination to an ophthalmic specialist.

3. A man will be considered fit for Category A if his vision, without the aid of glasses, is 6-60 with one eye (R. or L.), and not less than 2-60 with the other, provided that with the aid of glasses, if necessary, his vision is not less than 6-12 with one eye, and that both eyes have good fields of vision as tested by hand movements.

4. A man whose vision is not equal to the standard laid down for Category A will be considered fit for Category B (i) if his vision, without the aid of glasses, is not less than 3-60 with the better or only eye, provided that with the aid of glasses his vision is not less than 6-18 with one eye.

5. A man whose vision is not equal to the standard laid down for Category B (i) will be considered for Category B (ii) if his best obtainable vision with the better or only eye (with or without glasses) is not less than 6-60.

6. The standard of vision for clerks will be the same as for B (i), while that for the other occupations included in B (i) will be the same as for B (ii).

7. India Army Order No. 950 of 1918, paragraph 3, is hereby cancelled and the following substituted:—

If a recruit is not found capable of carrying out the work for which he was considered fit on being called up he may be brought before a Medical Board at any time, with a view to re-categorisation.

It has been decided that a stereotyped plan of assault course should not be adhered to.

Taking the plans and diagrams in "Bayonet Training, 1918" as a guide, officers planning new courses should at the same time take into account local features and natural obstacles. The following should be borne in mind :—

VI.—Retention of Men for the Military Machinery of Demobilization, and for Administrative and other purposes.—With reference to paragraph 3 (c) of Army Order 55 of 1919, some difficulty may arise in deciding what personnel are included in the schedule attached to the Army Order, and the following instructions are issued to remove any doubt which may exist:—

1. Immediate action must be taken by all General Officers Commanding-in-Chief and General Officers Commanding, with a view to determining at the earliest possible moment the units and personnel to be retained in connection with the military machinery of demobilization. Such early action is desirable in the interests of economy, but it is even more essential that every officer and man shall know exactly how he stands as regards demobilization and, if he is retained, be able to draw at once on the bonus to which he is entitled.

2. The ultimate responsibility for the limiting of the personnel retained for **machinery of demobilization** to the minimum consistent with the efficient performance of essential duties, must necessarily rest with the Commander-in-Chief or General Officer Commanding concerned, but the following instructions are issued for general guidance:—

- (a) The Commander-in-Chief or General Officer Commanding will in the first instance determine what units must be retained as a *whole* for the machinery of demobilization. These will, of course, include all the units referred to in paragraphs (1) to (5) and (14), (16) and (17) of the Schedule to Army Order 55 of 1919, and in addition such other units as may be *entirely* employed on the supply and transport, etc., services in connection with demobilization. The whole of the personnel of units so selected will be retained so long

as required, and those so retained will be eligible for the full bonus from the 1st February 1919,* until they can be demobilized after being individually released or replaced by men who are not demobilizable. Officers Commanding such units will notify the General Officer Commanding concerned as to the demobilizable personnel thus retained with a view to ultimate relief as laid down in paragraph 4 below.

- (b) In the case of many of the units, such as those in paragraphs (6) to (13) of the Schedule to Army Order 55 of 1919, it will not be necessary to allot the whole of the personnel on duties in connection with demobilization, and steps will at once be taken by the Commander-in-Chief or General Officer Commanding to determine the *individuals* in each unit whom it will be necessary to retain solely for this purpose. Personnel so selected will be retained for so long as required and will be eligible for the full bonus from 1st February 1919,* until demobilized.

The precise steps which a Commander-in-Chief, or General Officer Commanding will take to determine the individuals to be

discrimination of Officers Commanding units subject to general supervision by Commanders-in-Chief or General Officers Commanding, who will ensure that all Commanding Officers are acting on the same principles.

3. The paragraphs above refer to the military machinery of demobilization, but in addition there is the case of Officers and men employed on **administrative and clerical duties** (e.g., War Office, Command, District and Area Staffs, General Headquarters, Army, Corps, Division and Brigade Staffs, Lines of Communication and Base Staffs, staff of enemy Prisoner of War Camps, orderly rooms of units, etc.), and personnel of units who, for purposes of **discipline or administration**, are definitely required for retention (e.g., the officer commanding a Young Soldier's Battalion may find that all his non-commissioned officers are

available for demobilization at once, and it is essential to retain some of them). Personnel for these purposes, although eligible for demobilization, will, if necessary, be detained to continue their duties until they can be individually replaced or released, and those so retained will be eligible for the full bonus from 1st February, 1919,* until demobilized.

The numbers of any such personnel as are retained will be immediately reported by Officers Commanding to their immediate military superiors for covering approval. The retention of personnel under this paragraph is to be avoided to the utmost possible extent, and any demobilizable men detained under this authority will be released at the earliest possible moment, and the higher military authorities will closely scrutinize the lists submitted to them for covering approval to ensure that these instructions are carried out.

4. Steps will be taken by Command Headquarters to replace demobilizable personnel selected for temporary retention under paragraphs 2 and 3 above, directly non-demobilizable or volunteer personnel becomes available for their relief in all cases where replacement is necessary and where the retention is likely to last for any appreciable period.

The term "demobilizable personnel" is used for convenience to signify men who are eligible for demobilization under the conditions laid down in paragraph 3 (i) to (ix) of Army Order 55 of 1919.

5. The provisions of this Army Order must be strictly adhered to before lists under paragraph 1 of the Army Council's Instructions to the Royal Warrant of 29th January, 1919, published as Army Order 54 of 1919 are forwarded to the Army Agents or Paymasters. In the event of incorrect lists having been already forwarded, amended lists will be sent without delay.

6. No lists need be rendered in the case of personnel of the Army Pay Department (including Acting Paymasters) as they are all included in the military machinery of demobilization; nor in the case of personnel of the Royal Army Medical Corps, as they are all to be considered, either under paragraph 2 or paragraph 3 above, as definitely required and not awaiting demobilization. The whole

2. The attention of all Officers Commanding Indian corps, departments and depôts and British units with Indian personnel is, therefore, directed to paragraphs 6 to 11 of Special India Army Order No. 20-S, dated 29th June 1918.

3. In all cases in which it is not desired that prisoners should return to military duty, Officers Commanding will take steps to procure an order of dismissal under either section 13 or 14, Indian Army Act, or in special cases an order of discharge under the appropriate item of the table annexed to Rule 13, Indian Army Act Rules.

This action will be taken forthwith in respect of persons already undergoing sentences, and as soon as possible after commitment to prison in respect of future offenders.

4. It is obvious that when a person subject to the Indian Army Act has been dismissed under either section 13 or 14 of that Act the Indian Army (Suspension of Sentences) Acts can no longer apply. Hence, in the case of an offender to whom it may be intended to apply the provisions of the Suspension of Sentences Acts, dismissal (or discharge) should not be applied for until either—

- (a) the idea of suspending the sentence is abandoned ;
- (b) The Indian Army (Suspension of Sentences) Acts cease to apply, or
- (c) the prisoner is within four months of the time when he will be released ;

whichever event occurs first.

5. As soon as an order of dismissal (or discharge), is obtained, the requisite discharge certificate will immediately be forwarded to the Superintendent of the prison concerned for delivery to the prisoner.

If not already done, this action will be taken now in respect of all prisoners for whom an order of dismissal or discharge has already been obtained.

6. If dismissal or discharge is not desired, Officers Commanding are responsible that a non-commissioned officer is

sent to the prison on the expiry of an offender's sentence to take him over and conduct him back to his unit. The probable date of release should be ascertained from the Superintendent of the prison concerned, regard being paid to the possibility of remission of sentence having been earned by good conduct.

XII. The Territorial Decoration.—1. In special recognition of the meritorious service of Territorial Force officers during the recent war, His Majesty has been graciously pleased, by Royal Warrant, to authorize the following additions to the conditions of qualifying service for the award of the Territorial Decoration to officers belonging to that force, as follows:—

- No. 022121 (A. G.-10)
- (a) An officer of the Territorial Force (including the Territorial Force Reserve) will be allowed to reckon as double qualifying service all embodied service during the present war as an officer on the Active List or as an actively employed officer of the Territorial Force Reserve (including service as an officer of the Royal Navy, Regular Army, Special Reserve, or Royal Air Force), provided (i) that he was serving in the Territorial Force or the Territorial Force Reserve on the 4th August 1914; and (ii) that he served overseas, or signed the Imperial Service obligation prior to the 11th November 1918.
- (b) An officer of the Territorial Force (including the Territorial Force Reserve) will be allowed to reckon as full (not double) qualifying service all embodied service during the present war on the active list in the ranks (including such service in the Royal Navy, Regular Army, Special Reserve, or Royal Air Force), provided (1) that he was serving in the Territorial Force or Territorial Force Reserve on the 4th August 1914; and (2) that he served overseas, or signed the Imperial Service obligation prior to the 11th November 1918.

2. Applications for the decoration under this Army Order will be made direct to the War Office [M. S. 4-(r)] on Army Form E.-643 by the commanding officer under whom the officer is serving, or if he is not serving, by the

officer commanding the unit he last served with. 473. Military Training—Training of Indian Cavalry Recruits.—The syllabus for the training of Indian cavalry recruits contained in G. S. T.-21 will continue

to be used in conjunction with cavalry training as a guide for the preparation of training regulations.

2. The sequence or training in all subjects will be, as far as possible :—

Explanation, demonstration, practical instruction, test.

3. At suitable periods during the training, all recruits will be required to pass the tests prescribed in Appendix A. In the case of recruits, who are required on completion of training to proceed overseas with a draft, those who fail to pass any of these tests, will not be retained in India, but will be sent as a "special" (see Appendix B).

4. The form of nominal roll showing numbers and qualifications of each recruit to be used in the case of drafts for overseas or to join another unit is given in Appendix B.

5. A syllabus for training in the Hotchkiss gun showing the numbers to be trained in units is given in Appendix C. This syllabus is issued as a guide only and will be read in conjunction with Cavalry Training and G. S. T.-21.

6. The standards to be attained by each recruit in the several branches of his training are as follows :—

(i) *Discipline.*—Discipline must be maintained, and unquestioned obedience exacted at all times, whether in the field, in quarters, barracks or stables. The foundation of discipline is best laid by frequent practice of close order drill. Discipline cannot, however, be learnt on the drill ground only. An appeal must be made to the soldier's reason and intelligence, and the vital importance of discipline in all circumstances explained.

(ii) *Equitation, horsemastership and skill at arms.*—The standard of riding will be such as will enable the recruit to ride across country and use his weapons mounted. Quickness in mounting and dismounting and the correct method of using the weapons with which armed is essential. The importance of horsemastership and care in fitting saddlery will be emphasised.

(iii) *Musketry.*—A high standard in shooting is required. Field practices, whenever possible,

will be combined with movement and mounted approach to the targets. Fire discipline and fire control require special attention.

- (iv) *Tactical training*.—Especial attention will be given to the approach to, and occupation of, fire positions, and to tactics in an advance and in a rearguard action, both mounted and dismounted.

In both musketry field practices and tactical training, the recruit should be taught to develop to the utmost the combination of mobility and fire action, which constitutes so important a factor in cavalry action.

- (v) *Reconnaissance and protection*.—In addition to instruction in the general principles of reconnaissance and protection, recruits will be trained in the duties of outposts and reconnoitring detachments, including correct methods of reconnoitring and making good commanding ground and villages. Special attention will also be given to training in the transmission of reports, both verbal and written.

- (vi) *Hotchkiss gun*.—All ranks trained in this weapon will be trained in leading pack horses and in the fitting of pack saddlery.

7. *Collective training*.—(i) The amount of collective training to be carried out by the recruit must be dependent on the progress made in individual efficiency.

All recruits should, however, before being passed or drafted overseas have carried out troop exercises in order to accustom them to drill and manœuvre in their sections in the troop.

- (ii) Collective training will be carried out in accordance with the principles laid down in Cavalry Training and Field Service Regulations, Part I.

Training must be progressive, section training being completed before commencing troop training. Recruits will then be trained in squadron drill and manœuvre both mounted and dismounted, and squadron tactical exercises including night work.

- (iv) *Equitation*.—Including the correct use of the weapon with which armed at all paces.
- (v) *Troop drill*.—Mounted and dismounted, including rapid mounting and dismounting and the correct method of "handing over" horses.

2. *Musketry*.—General musketry course. Addendum No. 1. In addition Parts IV, V and VI, Table B, Appendix I, Chapter III, Musketry Regulations, Indian Supplement.

3. *Bayonet training*—

- (i) Has passed in lessons 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, Bayonet Training, 1916.
- (ii) Has carried out the final assault practice (See page 20, Bayonet Training, 1916).

4. *Hotchkiss gun*.—(Only for those men trained in this weapon.)

The King's Certificate on Discharge for Disabled Soldiers of the Imperial Forces.—1. His Majesty the King has been pleased to approve of the issue of a certificate entitled "The King's Certificate on Discharge," to all warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of His Majesty's Imperial Forces who have served since 4th August 1914, and who have been discharged from the service under paragraphs 392 (xvi) or (xvi a), King's Regulations, on account of disabilities contracted under the following circumstances:—

(a) After service overseas in a theatre of operations with an Expeditionary Force in the present war, on account of disablement certified, under the authority of the Army Council, to have been caused or aggravated by military service.

- (b) On account of disablement certified, under the authority of the Army Council, to be directly attributable to the action of the enemy, *e. g.*, air or naval raids.
- (c) Previous to the transfer of the Royal Flying Corps to the Royal Air Force, on account of disablement certified, under the authority of the Army Council, to have been caused or aggravated by military service while engaged on flying duty in connection with operations against the enemy, other than in a theatre of operations.

2. His Majesty the King has further approved the award of a special distinctive certificate, entitled "The King's Second Certificate on Discharge," to warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men who, after the award of the King's Certificate on Discharge, voluntarily serve again and are again discharged from the service under the circumstances detailed in paragraph 1 of this Army Order.

3 The term Imperial Forces will include any of His Majesty's Regular, Reserve or Auxiliary Forces, and any of the Expeditionary Forces raised by the Government of any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom.

4. In the case of the Oversea Dominion Forces, in which discharges do not take place under the King's Regulations, the equivalent conditions will apply.

In connection with the above order attention is drawn to the instructions contained in Army Council Instructions Nos. 336 and 1304 of 1918.

4. *Paragraph 9.*—All soldiers proceeding to the United Kingdom on furlough will be struck off the strength of their unit in India from the date of embarkation. This decision will not apply to details who have already left their units to proceed on furlough to the United Kingdom and have been struck off the strength of their units in accordance with previous instructions, but who have subsequently been detained in India and have not yet embarked.

5. *Paragraph 12.*—Cancellation of re-enlistment is not permissible.

495. **Military Training.**—A syllabus for the annual training of the personnel of Pioneer battalions in pioneer duties is published as an annexure to this India Army Order as a guide.

In this connection it is to be understood that the object aimed at is to arrive at a high standard of technical training as pioneers combined with reasonable efficiency as infantry.

496. **Equipment—Preservation of.**—It has been brought to notice by inspecting 13960-Q. M. G.-16-A. offices that in certain cases Indian Infantry units appear to have used a scrubbing brush for cleaning Web Equipment.

The following extracts, taken from the pamphlet "The Pattern 1908 Web Infantry Equipment" regarding the care and preservation of web equipment, are published for the information and guidance of all concerned:—

"Should the equipment become in a dirty greasy condition, it may be washed using warm water, then rinsed with clean water, cleaner in the accompanying it. No cleaner may be applied to the equipment unless previously approved by the War Office. A scrubbing brush should not be used on the equipment on any account. Dust and mud (when dry) should be removed with the ordinary clothes brush. The metal work should not be polished but allowed to get dull so as to avoid catching the rays of the sun."

- (g) to understand how to make, and the uses of, knots and lashings and generally the principles on which ropes and spars can be made use of for bridging, etc., to be able to climb spars skilfully and tie knots or make lashings at a height from the ground ;
- (h) to understand the use of the various tools and materials employed in platelaying and railway work generally ;
- (i) to understand thoroughly the precautions to be taken in handling explosives and their accessories, to understand how to cut and light fuzes, up charges, and generally to act as assistants to officers and non-commissioned officers in demolition work.

II. Collective training—

The company should be trained in the principles indicated in Infantry Training, sections 6 and 7, and should be :—

- (j) proficient in the extension of working parties ;
- (k) proficient in the lay out and execution of fire, communication trenches, dugouts, etc., in sapping, revetting, and erection of wire entanglements ;
- (l) practised in hill-road making, including rock-cutting, dry stone-walling, drainage, etc ;
- (m) practised in trestle, cantilever, crib pier bridges and in bridging expedients ;
- (n) have a good knowledge of railway work, including formation level and platelaying.

During the collective period pioneers should have some training in trench warfare in such duties as the consolidation of positions, making of roads and communications across a trench system, and in passing rapidly from fighting to working conditions and *vice versa*.

Items (b), (d), (e), (f), (g), (h), (i), (k) should be practised by night as well as by day.

ANNEXURE TO INDIA ARMY ORDER

NAVAL, MILITARY, AND AIR FORCE SERVICE ACT, 1919.

(9 Geo. 5, Ch. 15.)

AN ACT TO MAKE PROVISION FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF SUCH FORCES OF THE CROWN AS MAY BE REQUIRED TO MEET EXIGENCIES ARISING BEFORE THE THIRTIETH DAY OF APRIL NINETEEN HUNDRED AND TWENTY, AND WITH RESPECT TO THE CONDITIONS OF SERVICE OF SUCH FORCES AND FOR PURPOSES CONNECTED THEREWITH.

(16th April 1919.)

Be it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :—

1.—(1) If the competent authority is of opinion that as respects any men to whom this section applies or any class of such men, they cannot consistently with the public interest be released from actual service at the time when in pursuance of the terms of their service they would be entitled to be discharged, any such man may be retained and his service may be prolonged for such further period, not extending beyond the thirtieth day of April nineteen hundred and twenty, as the competent authority may order, but at the expiration of that period, or at any earlier date at which the competent authority considers that he can be released, he shall be discharged with all convenient speed, but in no case later than three months after the thirtieth day of April nineteen hundred and twenty.

(2) The men to whom this section applies are men (not being soldiers of the regular forces serving on a pre-war attestation) who at the termination of the present war are

in actual service in the naval, military, or air forces of His Majesty and whose term of actual service expires at the termination of the present war or before the said thirtieth day of April.

2.—(1) Notwithstanding anything in section one of the Army (Transfers) Act, 1915, a soldier who in pursuance of that section has been transferred from one corps to another shall not, until the said thirtieth day of April be entitled to be retransferred to the corps in which he was serving at the time when he was so transferred.

(2) Sections fourteen, fifteen, and sixteen of the Military Service Act, 1916 (Session 2), which relate to the transfer of officers and men of the territorial force, the constitution of corps of that force, and the liability of officers and men of that force to serve outside the United Kingdom, shall continue in force until the said thirtieth day of April.

(3) The Army (Suspension of Sentences) Acts, 1915 and 1916, both as originally enacted and as applied to the Air Force, shall, from the passing of this Act and until the said thirtieth day of April apply to soldiers and airmen, whether employed on active service or not, and whether employed beyond the seas or not, and shall have effect as if references to imprisonment and prison included references to detention and detention barracks.

3.—(1) In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,—

The expression "competent authority" means in relation to the naval forces, the Admiralty, in relation to the military forces, the Army Council, and in relation to the air force, the Air Council;

The expression "Naval forces" includes the marine forces;

The expression "actual service" means, in the case of the military forces, army service, or, as respects men of the territorial force, embodied service and in the case of the air force, air force service.

The liability of soldiers serving on a "duration of war" engagement was previously limited to the termination of the war, which date has been defined by statute in the terms given in India Army Order 50-S., dated 10th May 1919, but has not yet been specifically fixed.

This liability has now been prolonged until April 30th, 1920, unless the men concerned can, consistently with the public interest, be released by the Army Council earlier. On April 30th (or earlier if the Army Council releases them sooner) they will be discharged with all convenient speed, but in no case later than July 31st, 1920.

The prolongation of the liability to retention under this Act does not, of course, in any way interfere with the progress of *release by demobilisation* when demobilisation is again re-opened and personnel will continue to be demobilised as soon as reliefs become available to take their place.

The time-expired regular soldier serving on a pre-war attestation is exempted from the above prolongation of liability. (India Army Order 50-S., dated 10th May 1919, should be read with this qualification.)

His liability to retention is explained in India Army Orders 381 and 591 of 1916 and 738 of 1918. At the termination of the war (to be defined as explained above) he will be eligible for discharge with all convenient speed, as provided for in the Army Act.

2. Army soldier transferred under the Army (Transfers) Act, 1915 (published as India Army Order 397 of 1915) had the right to claim re-transfer as soon as convenient after the conclusion of the present war. Section 2 (1) of the new Act postpones such right of re-transfer till April 30th, 1920.

3. As regards officers and men of the Territorial Force, Section 2 (2) of the new Act continues the operation of Sections 14-16 of the Military Service Act, 1916, (Session 2) until 30th April 1920.

4. Two important alterations are made in respect of the Army (Suspension of Sentences) Act, 1915 and 1916, (republished in India Army Orders 260 of 1915 and 41b of 1916 respectively.) Those Acts, which are now extended till April 30th, 1920, will now also apply to all British soldiers in India and not merely to those who are on active service;

497 and it will, in future, be possible to suspend sentences of
 1st July 1919. *detention* as well as sentences of penal servitude and imprisonment.

For the purpose of the Army (Suspension of Sentences) Acts, His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India is, at present, the sole "Superior Military Authority" as regards sentences of British soldiers in India not on active service. The "Competent Military Authorities" are those shown in India Army Order 399 of 1918.

No. 2032.—In exercise of the powers conferred by section 113 of the India Army Act, 1911 (VIII of 1911), the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct that the following shall be added to the Enrolment Form No. 1-D, Combatants, published in Army Department Notification No. 809, dated the 19th April 1918, as subsequently amended, and that such addition shall be made in the case of persons enrolled on that form who, having served for not less than six years and being medically fit for further service, wish to be transferred to the Reserve in the rank of driver until they shall have completed a continuous period of ten years' service including such period as they shall have already completed.

** Transfer to the Reserve.*

On being transferred to the Reserve I consent to the conditions as to discharge previously accepted by me being cancelled and to the following being substituted instead:—

When I have served in the Reserve for such period from this date as will, including my previous service whether on the active list or in the Reserve, make up a total continuous period of ten years' service I will be entitled to receive my discharge within two months from the date of applying for it, unless war is imminent or existing; provided that in the event of my deserting, service between the date of desertion and the date of apprehension or surrender shall not reckon as service towards discharge.

582. Rewards.—Army Order No. III, dated 5th May 1919, is republished:—
C25169 (A. G.-10).

ARMY ORDER NO. III, DATED 5TH MAY 1919.

III.—Rewards for officers and soldiers for services in the field, and for services rendered in captivity or in attempting to escape, or escaping therefrom.—1. It has been decided by the Army Council that recommendations for reward for services in the field unconnected with capture and rendered prior to the 15th November 1917, may now be accepted provided that the services in respect of which recommendation is made are substantiated by at least two witnesses who have first-hand knowledge of the services under consideration, *one of whom must be an officer.*

If the individual recommended was captured in subsequent operations the recommendation form should be superscribed "Prisoner of War" in red ink.

The recommendation must also embody a certificate to the effect that the services brought to notice have not been previously recommended for reward and rejected by the responsible commander in the field whose duty it was to deal with such recommendations.

The provisions of War Office letter 0137/5335 (M. S-3) of the 4th September 1918, are cancelled accordingly.

2. It has also been decided by the Army Council that the restrictions whereby recommendations in respect of services connected with capture could not be considered if such services were rendered prior to the 15th July 1918, shall now be removed. Such services will now be considered *irrespective of date*, provided that the individual has been absolved by competent authority from blame in the matter of capture.

Recommendations superscribed "Prisoner of War" in red ink, must in all cases be duly supported by the evidence of at least two witnesses who have first-hand knowledge of the services under consideration, *one of whom must be an officer.*

'Such provisions of War Office letter 0137/3565 (M. S.-3) of the 3rd May 1917 (reprinted 15th July 1918), as may be in conflict with this decision are cancelled accordingly.

3. Recommendations under paragraphs 1 and 2 above for officers and soldiers who are still serving must be submitted through the usual official channels. Recommendations for officers and soldiers who have been demobilized may be addressed to "The Secretary (M. S.-3), War Office, London, S. W.-1," should it not be possible owing to the disbandment of the unit or for other reasons, to submit through the usual official channels.

All recommendations must be recorded on Army Form W.-3121, *see* form Appendix A., the supporting statements of witnesses as necessary in each case being duly attached.

4. The Army Council have further decided that the following services are eligible for such forms of reward as may be considered appropriate, provided that no blame has been attached to the individual in respect of original capture:—

- (a) Exceptional services rendered by officers and soldiers whilst prisoners of war or interned.
- (b) Exceptionally gallant conduct and/or determination displayed by officers and soldiers in escaping or attempting to escape from captivity.

When merited services of this nature will be eligible for such "gallantry" distinctions as are normally reserved for "services under fire."

Recommendations under (a) for "*services whilst in captivity*" should be addressed to "the Secretary (P. W.-1), War Office," and must be supported by an officer.

Recommendations under (b) "*escaping or attempting to escape*" should be addressed to "the Secretary (A. G.-3, P. W.), War Office."

Army Form W.-3121, *see* form Appendix* A., superscribed "*Prisoners of War*" in red ink, should be used for all recommendations under (a) and (b) and the statements of at least two

witnesses having first-hand knowledge of the circumstances of the case must be attached in support.

4 above, when in the course of investigations circumstances are brought to the notice of the Committee which appear, in their opinion, to merit recognition.

6. The evidence of witnesses as required in 1, 2, 3 and 4 above, must be in the handwriting of and duly signed by each witness. A single statement signed by two or more witnesses will not be accepted.

7. No recommendations for services of the nature referred to in this Army Order will be accepted after the 31st August 1919.

Recommendations on behalf of Indian ranks, which must be supported by the evidence of at least one British officer who has first-hand knowledge of the services under consideration, should be addressed to the Adjutant General in India, and must reach Army Headquarters not later than the 31st October 1919.

case may be, for the term of the imprisonment or detention. Imprisonment commences on the day on which the sentence and proceedings of the court-martial were signed by the president of the court-martial. Detention commences at the hour at which the soldier is received at the place of detention or on the day after the day of the award whichever is the earlier. Soldiers not drawing separation allowance during the period immediately preceding the term of imprisonment or detention shall not be entitled to the grant of separation allowance by reason of their being called out or ordered to perform military duty.

3. Soldiers sentenced to imprisonment or awarded detention

during a period in respect of which they are entitled to pay under the Regulations for the Indian

Defence Force will be subject to the same stoppages of pay as if they were soldiers of the British Regular Forces.

4. If a guard is found by the corps or unit to which a

soldier sentenced to imprisonment or awarded detention belongs and suitable accommodation exists under

the charge of that guard a sentence of imprisonment if it does not exceed seven days or the award of detention may be carried out in the custody of such guard. If the officer commanding the brigade orders that such sentences or awards shall not so be carried out, or when any sentences of imprisonment or award of detention cannot be so carried out, an escort as laid down in paragraph 63S, King's Regulations, will, if necessary, be detailed under the orders of the commanding officer to conduct the prisoner or soldier under detention to the nearest place of confinement or detention in which the sentence or award can legally be carried out. The escorts when so detailed will be deemed to have been called

out for general military service or to perform local military duty as the case may be."

The following will be added as paragraphs 5 and 6 :—

"5. Soldiers should not be sent to a distance in order to undergo an award of detention or a short sentence of imprisonment as Short sentences. in some cases the term of the award or sentence might expire before the offender reached the nearest place of detention or confinement. Summary awards of detention should not be made, and short sentences of imprisonment should not be passed, in cases in which, owing to circumstances, the punishment cannot be carried out locally. Fine should be resorted to instead.

6. A person deemed to be enrolled for local military service can, if legally sentenced to imprisonment by court-martial under the Indian Defence Force Rules, be made to undergo the sentence, if necessary, outside the prescribed local area within which he is liable to perform actual military duty. Such a sentence is carried out in accordance with Indian Defence Force Rules 39 and 40; and if there is no place of confinement within the area prescribed in Rule 21 in which it can be legally carried out, the sentence may be carried out in a place outside that area. But an escort of persons deemed to be enrolled for local military service only cannot be sent on escort duty outside that area."

Chapter XI, paragraph 531.—*Delete* from “These will be regulated” to end of paragraph, and *substitute*—

“The ‘mustered out’ rules in paragraph 1044-B., Army Regulations, India, Volume I, are applicable to all ranks enrolled up to the 13th May 1916, and Officers Commanding Units and Depots will submit to the Controller or Divisional Disbursing Officer concerned the pension applications and bills for gratuity admissible.

In the case of personnel of units which have been disbanded, the officer in whose custody the records of the unit have been deposited will carry out the foregoing instructions.

Men enrolled after the 13th May 1916, will not get the benefit of the ‘mustered out’ rules.”

588. Discipline—Complaints.—As misapprehension appears to exist concerning the right of appeal of British officers who consider themselves wronged, it is explained that this right is exercisable as follows :—

(i) To the Army Council under Army Act, Section 42, by—

- (a) officers of the British service, and
- (b) officers of the Indian Army of the substantive rank of Colonel or upwards ;

(ii) To the Governor-General of India under Army Act, Section 180 (2) (d), by—

officers of the Indian Army whose rank is not higher than that of Lieutenant-Colonel or Brevet-Colonel.

2. With reference to the amendment to Army Act, Section 42 (published with Special India Army Order No. 68-S, dated 16th July 1919), officers desiring to exercise their right of appeal under that section must state specifically whether they wish to obtain the decision of the Government or to the matter represented, complaint be submitted to His Majesty thereupon.

3. In either case the prescribed channels for complaints and correspondence must be strictly followed.

588. War Gratuity.—Forms for claiming war gratuity are now being printed by the Government Contractors, Calcutta, and will shortly be ready for issue.

The two last forms are those referred to in Army Instruction (India) 262 of 1919.

General Officers Commanding will be informed when the forms are ready for issue and they will then indent on the Government Contractors for the numbers required.

Their appreciation of the gallant and meritorious services of the Mercantile Marine, who, by their unfailing devotion to duty, assisted in securing the victory. They recognise that the maintenance of supplies for the Allies was due to their unflinching courage in facing and helping to overcome the submarine menace.

And they further wish to lay their tribute of gratitude on the resting places of all those members of His Majesty's Forces who, for the sake of King and Country, laid down their lives, and to express their profound sympathy with those who remain to mourn their loss.

592. Notes on aviation landing grounds in India.—The following should be added to Army Order (India) No. 357 of 1919, paragraph 2—*Points to be considered when selecting landing grounds* :—

(A) The maximum slope permissible on a landing ground is 1 in 100.

(B) Landing grounds should be selected with a view to use in all weathers wherever practicable.

593. Forfeiture of pay and allowances for contraction of preventible disease.—Owing to the very large number of cases of venereal disease among Indian troops now in hospital the republication of India Army Order No. 836 of 1918 becomes necessary. All Commanders concerned are to see that the provisions of that order are fully explained to all Indian troops and followers under their command and are responsible that the stoppages mentioned therein are strictly enforced.

594 Clothing.—The changes in standard patterns of clothing and necessaries that have occurred during the month of June 1919, are published as an annexure to this order.

595. Clothing—Forms.—When special size-rolls are submitted on India Army Form 37451 (Q M. G.-8-A) C.-837, the clause from "and in the case" to "jersey also" should be deleted from the instructions for diagram No. 1 on the back of the form. Attention is directed to the difference between the orders concerning *fitting on* of blouses, tunics, frocks, etc., and the orders about *taking measurements for* these garments, *vide* Army Regulations, India, Volume XI, Appendix III, paragraph 3, and paragraph 1 of the "instructions". Measurements for frocks, etc., will be taken *over the shirt only*, but the garments should invariably be *fitted over the jersey*. Sufficient allowance is made in manufacture to admit of this being done.

596. Dress.—The War Office desire it to be generally known that for the present no officer is required to provide himself with any uniform other than service dress or for hot climates, khaki drill. An officer who at the present time provides himself with other than service dress or khaki drill uniform is therefore incurring avoidable expenditure.

597. Demobilization Forms.—All officers or soldiers, compulsorily retained in India, who have already in their possession a completed Army Form Z-22 will be given the opportunity of signing a second Army Form Z-22 for the period of retention. The second form will be marked in red ink "For period of compulsory retention in India—From . . . To . . ." The second Army Form Z-22 will be attached to the original.

367. Disposal of Attestations.

The existing instructions regarding the disposal of soldiers' attestations are modified in the following cases :—

1. Attestations of soldiers serving in either of the following categories will be disposed of as stated in paragraph 2 :—

- (a) *Regular normal engagement.*
- (b) Re-enlistment for 2, 3 or 4 years' service under A. O. 4, 124 or 155 of 1919.
- (c) Extension of service from a "Duration of War Engagement" under A. O. II, dated 2nd May 1919 (A. O. 192 of 1919).

In the event of duplicate attestations not now existing for soldiers serving in either of these categories, they will be prepared forthwith by the Officer i/c Records concerned.

In all other cases the duplicate attestations will as heretofore be retained and maintained by the Officer i/c Records.

GEORGE THE FIFTH by the Grace of God of the United

WHEREAS We did by Royal Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated 25th March 1916, institute and create a silver medal entitled "The Military Medal" to be awarded to non-commissioned officers and men for bravery in the field;

AND WHEREAS We did by Royal Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated 21st June 1916, ordain that, under special circumstances, women should be eligible for the award of the said medal;

AND WHEREAS We did by Royal Warrant under Our Sign Manual dated 1st August 1916, ordain that warrant officers should be eligible for the award of the said medal;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that Our said Royal Warrants should be amended and consolidated;

NOW THEREFORE We do hereby declare that the rules and ordinances contained in Our said Royal Warrants shall be abrogated, cancelled and annulled, and We are pleased to make, ordain and establish the following rules and ordinances in substitution for the same, which shall from henceforth be inviolably observed and kept:—

Firstly—It is ordained that the medal shall be designated "The Military Medal."

Secondly—It is ordained that the Military Medal shall bear on the obverse the Royal Effigy, and on the reverse the words "For bravery in the Field," encircled by a wreath surmounted by the Royal Cipher and a Crown.

Thirdly.—It is ordained that the Military Medal may be awarded to warrant officers, Class I and Class II, non-commissioned officers and men for individual or associated acts of bravery in the field on the recommendation of a Commander-in-Chief in the Field.

Fourthly—It is ordained that in cases where warrant officers, Class I and Class II, non-commissioned officers and men who have been awarded the Military Medal shall be recommended by a Commander-in-Chief in the Field for further acts of bravery, a bar may be added to the medal already conferred.

Fifthly.—It is ordained that the Military Medal may, under exceptional circumstances, on the special recommendation of a Commander-in-Chief in the field, be awarded to women, whether subjects or foreign persons, who have shown bravery and devotion under fire, and a bar may be added for further such acts.

Sixthly —It is ordained that the Military Medal shall not confer any individual precedence, but shall entitle the recipient to the addition after his or her name of the letters M. M.

Seventhly.—It is ordained that the names of those upon whom We may be pleased to confer the Military Medal shall be published in the *London Gazette* and that a register thereof shall be kept in the Office of Our Principal Secretary of State for War.

Eighthly —It is ordained that the Military Medal shall be worn immediately before all war medals and shall be worn on the left breast pendent from a ribbon of one inch and one quarter in width, which shall be in colour dark blue having in the centre three white and two crimson stripes alternating

Ninthly —It is ordained that the Military Medal shall be forfeited when the recipient, if an officer, is cashiered or dismissed by sentence of Court-Martial, or is removed from Our Army for misconduct; or, if a soldier, is discharged with disgrace from Our Military Forces. It is further ordained that the Military Medal may otherwise be forfeited in the event of the conviction of the recipient by the Civil Power, or when the recipient is sentenced by Court-Martial for an offence which, in the judgment of the Court-Martial, is of such a nature as to justify forfeiture of the Medal, in which case it shall be competent for the Court-Martial to award the forfeiture of the Military Medal as part of their sentence. Provided nevertheless and it is further ordained that when a recipient of the Military Medal is convicted by the Civil Power, or when forfeiture of

the Medal is awarded by sentence of a Court-Martial, the Army Council shall determine whether or not the offence is of such a nature that the Medal shall be forfeited. Notwithstanding, it is hereby declared that it shall at all times be competent for Us, Our Heirs and Successors to restore a forfeited Military Medal if such restoration should be justified by the circumstances of the case, and it is further ordained that a forfeited Military Medal may also be restored at the discretion of the Army Council.

The Royal Warrant published above supersedes the Royal Warrant published in India Army Orders Nos. 595 of 1916 and 62 of 1919.

II.—Extension of Service.—1. An efficient soldier of good character serving with the colours on a (regular army) duration of the war engagement if medically fit, under 37 years of age, and in the opinion of his commanding officer likely to continue efficient for the full period of his extended engagement may now, as provided in Section 78 (1) (c) of the Army Act, be permitted to extend the term of his original enlistment up to a total of 12 years. The period to be served with the colours will be that laid down in paragraph 262, King's Regulations, and the residue will be reserve service.

2. A soldier at present serving with the colours who, on enlistment, was immediately transferred to the reserve under the conditions of the Royal Warrant of 20th October 1915

(Army Order 415 of 1915), or who was compulsorily enlisted under the Military Service Acts and who, though not serving on a regular army duration of the war engagement satisfies the other conditions set forth in the preceding paragraph, may extend the term of his original statutory enlistment under this Army Order. The date from which the extended enlistment will count is the date on which he enlisted or was deemed to be enlisted under the Military Service Acts. Any service in the reserve previous to the extension will not count as colour service or as qualifying service for pension if the man should eventually become entitled to pension.

3 No bounty will be payable in respect of extension of service under this Army Order.

4. From the date of extension only the ordinary rates of pay, as laid down in Royal Warrant for Pay, etc., and * Army Instruction increased by Army Order* 1 of 1918, (India) 333 of 1918 will be issuable and any special rates such as those granted by Army Order 283 of 1914 will be relinquished. 5 Separation allowance or dependants' allowance (including special parents' allowance) will, subject to the usual conditions, continue to be issuable for the whole period of the extended engagement. Payment will be made at current rates up to 31st March 1923, and thereafter at such rates as may be decided upon.

Separation allowance will not, however, be paid in respect of any man who marries after the date of the termination of the war, as defined by statutory authority, unless and until he is admitted to the married establishment.

**ANNEXURE TO INDIA ARMY ORDER
No. 654 of 1919.**

**Indian Army Officers—Conditions of Transfer
or Attachment to the R. A. F.**

1. The general conditions under which officers of the Indian Army and Indian Army Reserve are attached or transferred to the Royal Air Force are laid down in Air Force Memo.* No. 1, but, as stated in the footnote to paragraphs 5 and 7 of that memorandum, the questions of pensions, gratuities and retired or half-pay and of any reward dependent on length of service, have needed special consideration. The decisions announced in the following paragraphs have now been reached; but these will be subject to possible revision when the future peace conditions of service in the Royal Air Force have been determined.

PAY, ALLOWANCES, &c, DURING SERVICE

2. Officers already attached or transferred to the R. A. F. prior to the 1st March 1919, will have the option of drawing pay (staff or other), as follows:—

- (a) Air Force rates of pay and allowances according to their rank or appointment in the Force;
- (b) The Indian pay and allowances of their substantive Indian rank and appointment, with the addition of flying pay where applicable; but in the case of those transferred this will, apart from flying pay, be limited to the emoluments of the substantive rank held at the date of transfer; or
- (c) In the case of officers transferred or attached on 1st April last, the R. F. C. or R. N. A. S. rates drawn immediately prior to transfer, so long as they remain engaged on the same duties as those discharged before transfer.

3. Officers electing to draw under (b) or (c) of R. A. F. rates, on as the emoluments of their rank or appointment in the Air Force become more beneficial.

5. Officers who may be attached or transferred to the Air Force on or after the 1st March 1919, will receive the Air Force rates of pay of the rank in which they are graded, i.e., they will be paid as in paragraph 2 (a) above. Up to the date of graduation they will receive Indian rates of pay and allowances.

7. Officers attached or transferred will receive an outfit grant of £10.

SICK LEAVE.

8. Officers attached or transferred prior to the 1st March 1919, will have sick leave privileges under the Indian or Air Force code, as the case may be, according as they remain on Indian rates of pay or transfer to Air Force rates. Those subsequently attached or transferred will be subject to Air Force regulations after graduation.

RETIREMENT GRATUITIES.

9. Officers of the Indian Army Reserve will be entitled, on the termination of their service, to such gratuities as may be admissible under the class of pay (British or Indian) which they may have elected to draw.

SERVICE PENSIONS.

10. Whilst attached to the Air Force Regular Officers of the Indian Army will continue to earn pension under Indian rules, but in view of the fact that they will be enjoying

British conditions of service during that period, officers attached on or after the 1st March 1919, may be required to make a contribution towards maintaining their rights to pension at Indian rates and under Indian conditions. Officers joining before that date will not be required to contribute in this way.

11. Indian Army Officers attached to the Air Force prior to the 1st March 1919, who subsequently transfer and take up permanent commissions in the Force, will be dealt with as follows:—

- (a) If they have not earned an Indian pension prior to accepting a permanent commission, their qualifying pensionary service under British or Indian Army rules will count as qualifying service for an Air Force pension (see F. S. Publication 68), but they will have no rights to Indian rates of pension;
- (b) If they have earned an Indian pension prior to transferring to a permanent Air Force commission, their service will count as in (a) above, and the minimum pension to be awarded will be that earned at the time of transfer.

Officers attached to the Air Force on or after the 1st March 1919, who subsequently transfer will be dealt with as at (a) above, and will not have reserved to them any right to Indian rates or conditions.

12. Officers of the Indian Army Reserve granted permanent commissions in the Air Force will not draw any gratuity on the termination of their service under temporary commissions, but the period of mobilised service in the Indian Army Reserve will count as qualifying service for an Air Force pension.

FAMILY PENSIONS.

13. Attached Officers will continue subscribers under the Indian Military Service Family Pension Regulations or to the Indian Military Widows' and Orphans' Fund, as the case may be. Officers transferred to permanent commissions in the Air Force will continue subscribers under the Indian Military Service Family Pension Regulations or to the Indian

Military Widows' and Orphans' Fund, as the case may be, until 31st March 1923, but this arrangement may, after that date, be terminated or modified.

WIDOWS' AND CHILDREN'S PENSIONS.

14. The Air Force rates and conditions will apply generally. Service in the British or Indian Army prior to transfer to permanent commissions in the Air Force will count as qualifying service for these pensions. Awards to the families of attached officers will be made by the India Office; and to those of transferred officers, if arising out of the present war, by the Ministry of Pensions.

DISABILITY RETIRED PAY.

15. Attached officers will be eligible for disability retired pay at Indian rates during the period of attachment. Transferred officers will, in the event of disablement, receive retired pay or gratuities under Air Force regulations. Awards to attached officers will be made by the India Office, and to transferred officers by the Ministry of Pensions.

WOUNDS, PENSIONS AND GRATUITIES.

16. The Air Force scale and conditions (see F. S. Publication 68) will apply in all cases. Awards to attached officers will be made by the India Office, and to transferred officers by the Air Ministry.

HALF (OR UNEMPLOYMENT) PAY.

17. During the period of attachment officers will remain subject to Indian rates and conditions, the rate of half-pay being dependent on their substantive rank in the Indian Army. On transfer to permanent commissions in the Air Force they will become subject to Air Force Regulations (see F. S. Publication 68, paras. 16 to 18), and the rate of unemployment pay will be governed by their rank in the Air Force.

DETERMINING RANK FOR PURPOSES OF PENSION OR HALF PAY.

18. For the purpose of assessing pensions or half pay under paragraphs 14 to 17 above, rank will be determined as follows :—

(1) *Officers of the Indian Army.*

- (a) If attached to the Air Force prior to the 1st March 1919, they will be eligible, both during the period of attachment, and subsequently on transfer to permanent Air Force Commissions, for awards based on their permanent rank in the Indian Army, or on their rank, either permanent or acting,* in the Air Force whichever is higher.
- (b) If attached to the Air Force on or after the 1st March 1919, they will be eligible during the period of attachment for awards as in (a) above, but if subsequently transferred to permanent Air Force Commissions, awards will be according to Air Force rank.

(2) *Officers of the Indian Army Reserve.*

- (a) If transferred to the Air Force prior to the 1st March 1919, they will be eligible for awards based on their permanent rank in the Indian Army Reserve, or on their rank, permanent or acting,* in the Air Force, whichever is higher.
- (b) If transferred to the Air Force on or after the 1st March 1919, they will be eligible for awards based on their Air Force rank.

SERVICE IN THE EAST.

19. Officers serving in India, Aden or Mesopotamia, whether or not they have served in the Indian Army or Indian Army Reserve prior to joining the R. A. F., will be eligible

* The right to awards based on acting rank applies to the war period only. Ordinarily awards are according to the substantive or permanent rank.

(iii) The husband must furnish his wife with a written statement from the General Officer Commanding the Division or Brigade that there is no objection to her being permitted to join her husband in India. This statement should be submitted to the India Office, London, when application is being made for a passport.

672. Malaria.—During the last few weeks the rainfall at many stations has been above normal. From experience gained in previous years when the rainfall was high, it is probable that there will be a high incidence of malaria unless energetic action is taken by all ranks to enforce and carry out every measure likely in any way to lessen the chances of infection, and cut short or arrest the disease in those who unavoidably become infected.

The procedures that can be adopted or are suitable to the conditions prevailing at each station vary, but close co-operation between Commanding Officers, Medical Officers in charge of units, Sanitary and Administrative Officers invariably proves effective where recognized methods of prevention are applied with zeal and intelligence in accordance with local circumstances.

The following instructions (issued under India Army Order 1191 of 1917) are republished and will be forthwith brought into force wherever possible :—

- (1) Mosquito nets will be inspected daily by Company officers. When torn, nets should be darned and not sewn.
- (2) Shorts should not be worn after sun-down, and chills should be guarded against.
- (3) Men are warned that they are more likely to contract malaria in the bazaars than in the lines.
- (4) Men on guard at night should be protected by the application of mosquito repellants. Arrangements

should be made to ensure that men on night duty are provided with a meal during the tour of night duty.

- (5) While medical opinions are divergent as to the value of the prophylactic issue of quinine, the general opinion appears to be that when properly carried out it is efficient in preventing attacks, mitigating the effects of an attack, or preventing relapses.
- (6) All possible mosquito breeding places should be filled in, drained, regularly oiled, or otherwise dealt with.
- (7) Men are to be directed to report sick if they get fever.
- (8) These orders will be supplemented to meet local conditions.

Maxim and Vickers guns.—The barrel will be removed and a straight funnel used.

675. Veterinary--Diseases--Linseed Cake--Poisoning from—Instances have occurred of poisoning

20233 (Q. M. G.-11). of animals through feeding on linseed cake.

The poisonous substance is prussic acid which is developed through the interaction of a glucoside and a ferment normally present in cakes manufactured under a cold process, such as in Indian cakes.

In cakes manufactured under a hot process such as in English cakes, the ferment is destroyed.

All Indian linseed cakes should therefore be boiled before use, the dangerous principle thereby being neutralised.

676. Transfer of certain Supply and Transport Corps equipment to Ordnance Department.—The articles enumerated in the annexure to this

All British units in India with the exception of two British Cavalry and five British Infantry Regiments, two Royal Field Artillery Batteries and all Royal Garrison Artillery units are, as far as is known, due for relief this trooping season.

paragraphs (ii) and (iii) (British) No. 95, will proceed units, but the personnel

mentioned in paragraph (iv) will, in many cases, not proceed Home until after their units have left India; men serving on pre-war regular engagements with unexpired colour service to complete and men who have re-enlisted and accepted bounty in lieu of furlough will be retained in India.

3. It is necessary to make arrangements now for the disposal of these details and the procedure to be followed is stated below for information and necessary action:—

(a) As soon as a British unit is relieved of its duties either in the Field Army or on Internal Security duty, it will be placed at the disposal of the Adjutant General in India.

(b) The unit will then proceed to a convenient station and there reform and dispose of the personnel who will not accompany it to the United Kingdom and who are retainable in India as below:—

British Cavalry—

- (a) If borne on the books of the 21st Lancers or the 1st King's Dragoon Guards, the details will remain with these regiments.
- (b) If in the Reserve Cavalry Regiment, they will be posted to a regiment of their own Corps on its arrival in India.

Royal Artillery—

Royal Horse Artillery to Royal Artillery Depôt, Jubbulpore.

Royal Field Artillery to Royal Artillery-Depôt, Ambala.

Machine Gun Corps—

To the Machine Gun Centre, Mhow.

Royal Artillery and Machine Gun personnel will then be posted to units as required under the orders of the Adjutant General in India.

As in Statement "A" attached. As, however, some units may leave India before the arrival of the battalions which their details are to join, all British battalions in India which are due for relief will be affiliated to Nos. 1 and 2 Combined British Infantry depôts.

The details who are retainable in India will be despatched to the depôt to which the unit is affiliated and will be despatched from the depôts to the battalions of the post-war garrison when the latter reach India.

Men now borne on the books of the two Combined British Infantry Depôts will be posted to their own regiments on the latter's arrival in India and their documents will be transferred.

Men coming under paragraph (iv) of Demobilization Instructions (British) No 95, who are to be attached, and not posted or transferred, to another regiment will continue to be borne on the books of their regimental depôt.

4. It must be remembered that the period which will be available after a unit is placed at the Adjutant General's disposal and before it can be despatched Home will, in some cases, be very short, so all preliminary arrangements to ensure the expeditious despatch of personnel retainable in India to their new units should be made without delay; nominal rolls, shewing how men are extra-regimentally employed, etc., being made out now.

5. Retainable personnel who are extra-regimentally employed will remain in their extra-regimental employment, but will be taken on to the books of the unit to which they are posted or transferred, or in the case of men attached for duty to another unit, they will remain on the books of their own depôts.

6. Men who have re-enlisted and accepted bounty in lieu of furlough and have volunteered to serve in a particular regiment will be posted to that regiment if it is one of those forming the post-war garrison of India. In the same way men under column 3 of Statement "A" may volunteer for transfer to any regiment forming part of the post-war garrison. Registration Act. Instructions
Register for England
and second Register

1. The third half-yearly register of electors for England and Wales and Scotland, and the second yearly register for Ireland, are now in course of preparation. The qualifying period of six months for the new Registers has been fixed to end on the 15th June, 1919. The new Registers come into force on the 15th October, 1919.

2. It has been decided that the basis of the new Registers and Absent Voters' Lists, so far as military voters are concerned, shall be similar to that adopted for the preparation of the second register for England and Wales and Scotland.† This involves:—

- (a) The reproduction of the names of persons on the present Registers and Absent Voters' Lists so far as such persons remain qualified.
- (b) A house-to-house enquiry instituted by Registration Officers to ascertain the naval or military voters either omitted from the present Registers and Lists, or newly qualified to be registered.

† See A. C. I. No. 48 of 1919.

- (c) Facilities for all officers and soldiers, who are not on the present Registers and Lists, to notify their qualifying addresses, so that their claims may be investigated in view of their names being placed on the new Registers and Lists.

3. In order to meet the requirements of para. 2 (c) above, all officers or soldiers.—

- (a) Who have joined the Army since the end of the qualifying period for the Registers now in force (*viz.*, 15th January, 1919, in the case of England and Wales and Scotland, and 15th April, 1918, in the case of Ireland), and whose names have not been placed on those Registers and Absent Voters' Lists,

- (b) Who have reached the age of 19 years since 15th January, 1919, in the case of soldiers whose qualifying addresses are situated in England and Wales and Scotland, and since 15th April, 1918, in the case of those whose qualifying addresses are situated in Ireland,

- (c) Who, having reached 19 years of age by 15th June, 1919, are aware, or believe, that for any reason their names are not recorded on the present Registers and Absent Voters' Lists, but who are able to furnish a qualifying address, and who consider that they are thereby entitled to have their names included in the new Registers and Lists

should immediately notify the Registration Officer in their constituencies in the manner prescribed in the instructions referred to in para. 1 above, and their names should be made as quick as possible in the Electors' Lists before publication, but must in no case reach the Registration Officer later than the date of last day for claims shown in para. 6.

The qualifications for registration of naval or military voters will be found in the instructions on the forms referred to in para. 1 below.

Similar action should be taken in the case of Q.M.A.A.C., but the age in their case is 30 years instead of 19 years.

4. Where the forms A. F. W. 3940* for men or A. F. W. 3942* for women are still available, the notification can be made on these forms altered as stated in para. 5 below, and where they are not obtainable, on the *pro formas* shown as Appendices I and II to this Army Council Instruction, in accordance with the instructions accompanying the forms. These forms will only be accepted by the postal authorities free of charge for postage if they are posted unenclosed in an envelope. Applications made on ordinary letter form can only be accepted if they clearly contain the particulars recorded in Appendices I and II to this A. C. I., and the signature is duly witnessed as a proof *bona fides*.

ANNEXURE TO INDIA ARMY ORDER
No. 716 of 1919.

In publishing the enclosed amendments which are hereby made in the General Provident Fund Rules, issued with their communication No. 584-F. E., dated the 20th May 1915, as subsequently amended, the Government of India desire to give to subscribers of the Fund a brief explanation of the reasons why the amendments have been found necessary.

2. Certain proceedings, which took place in the High Court of Bombay, led the Government of India to examine the legality of rule 10 of the Provident Fund Rules, as it has hitherto existed, and they were advised that except in one set of circumstances, the Provident Funds Act, 1897, does not protect a subscriber to the Fund on his retirement from attachment of the sum which has accumulated to his credit in the Fund. If the subscriber dies after retirement but before his accumulations in the Fund are handed over to him, they are secure from attachment from payment of his debts, and will accrue to the benefit of his widow and children; but in all other circumstances when a subscriber retires, any assignment which he may have made of his interest in the Fund either before or after retirement is valid in law and becomes effective in favour of the assignee. Now that the amendments necessary to bring rule 10 into consonance with the legal position have been affected, the Government of India think it proper that subscribers should be warned of the effect of assignments made while they are still in service or after they have left service, but before their provident fund accumulations are handed over to them.

3. The Government of India have at the same time considered the position of policies of insurance, payments towards which have hitherto been permitted to be substituted for subscriptions to the Fund on the assignment of the policy to the Secretary of State for India in Council and its delivery to the Account Officer for custody. They are now advised that even though the policy be assigned to the Secretary of State as security for the payment of sums which the subscriber may become liable to pay to the Fund, its proceeds cannot be considered for the purposes of the Provident Funds Act either as compulsory deposits or as sums standing to the credit of a subscriber to, or depositor in, the Fund. Consequently neither when a subscriber is alive and in service, nor

A subscriber holding a temporary appointment may, subject to the same conditions, either withdraw the amount on the termination of his appointment or leave it in the Fund to be withdrawn at the time he finally quits the service.

Disposal on subscriber's death.

11. Each subscriber will, as soon after he joins the Fund as possible, be called upon by the Account Officer to furnish a "Form of Declaration" showing how he wishes the amount of his accumulations to be disposed of on his death. A specimen of the form will be found at the end of these rules.

12. For the purposes of these rules, only the following survivors of a subscriber shall be held to constitute his family:—

(1) Widow or widows.

(2) Children.

(3) Widows and children of a deceased son.

An adopted child shall be considered to be a child within the meaning of this rule when, under the personal law of the subscriber, adoption is legally recognised as conferring the status of a natural child, but in this case only. If doubts arise in an individual case, the Account Officer concerned will refer the matter to Legal Remembrancer to the Local Government (or corresponding officer) and his opinion shall be final for the purposes of these rules. A Declaration in favour of an adopted child is made at the subscriber's risk and can be challenged at any time.

13. A subscriber may in his Declaration provide for the distribution of a portion only of the amount. Thus the Form of Declaration may mention a specific sum or a specific proportion of the total amount. The disposal of the balance will be governed by rules 15 (b) and 15 (d) below, according as the subscriber leaves a family or not.

Any Form of Declaration submitted by a subscriber is revocable at any time and from time to time. A fresh Declaration shall be operative only on being received by the Account Officer. On a subscriber's marriage or remarriage, any Declaration already submitted by him will forthwith become null and void and, unless a revised Form of Declaration is received, the amount of his accumulations will be dealt with under rule 15 (b) or (d) as the case may be.

If minors are nominated in a Form of Declaration, the person or persons, to whom sums intended for their benefit are to be paid should be stated in the Form of Declaration.

14. In the event of the subscriber having a family, as defined in rule 12, he is not permitted in his Form of Declaration to leave the amount of his accumulations or any part of it to any one outside his family. Where a Form of Declaration purports to leave money otherwise than to a member or members of a subscriber's family, the Account Officer shall call upon the subscriber to state whether he has a family, and if it is found that he has one, the Form of Declaration shall not be accepted. A subscriber who has a family has absolute discretion regarding the distribution of the amount at his credit at the time of his death among the members of that family. He may exclude any one or more of them in favour of another or others of them and the manner in which the distribution is to be made among them is also within his absolute discretion.

15. On a subscriber's death before retirement, the amount shall be disposed of as follows:—

(a) It or such portion of it as may be specified in an accepted Form of Declaration will be divided among all or any members of his family in accordance with the terms of the Declaration.

If the Declaration relates to a portion only of the amount, the balance will be distributed in the manner described in clause (b) below.

If the Declaration does not state the person or persons to whom the sum intended for the benefit of a minor is to be paid, the sum due shall be paid to the minor's legal guardian to be used for the minor's benefit, or, failing a legal guardian, to such person or persons as the officer whose duty it is to make the payment considers to be the proper person or persons to receive it on the minor's behalf.

(b) Where a subscriber leaves a family, but no Form of Declaration in favour of any member or members of the family has been received from him, the amount will be distributed among his family, except that sons and sons of a deceased son, who

have attained legal majority, and married daughters, and married daughters of a deceased son, whose husbands are alive, shall be excluded from participation.

The division among the persons entitled shall be in equal shares, except that the widow or widows and child or children of any deceased son shall take equally between them only the share which that son would have taken had he survived the subscriber.

Any sum due to a minor shall be paid to the minor's legal guardian to be used for the minor's benefit, or, failing a legal guardian, to such person or persons as the officer whose duty it is to make the payment considers to be the proper person or persons to receive it on the minor's behalf.

(c) If there be no party to receive the amount under (a) or (b), it will be divided among or paid to such persons (whether related to the subscriber or not) as may be specified in an accepted Form of Declaration. If the Form of Declaration relates to a portion only of the amount, the balance shall be distributed in the manner described in clause (d).

(d) If there be no party entitled to receive under (a), (b) or (c) above, the amount will be paid to the subscriber's legal representative or such other person or persons as may be determined by a Civil Court competent to pass orders in this respect; provided that if the sum remaining at the credit of the subscriber does not exceed Rs. 500, it may be paid to such person or persons as the officer making the payment considers to be the proper person or persons to receive it.

NOTE 1.—A husband may make a written application for exclusion of his wife from participation under clause (b) if she has been judicially separated from him. In the absence of such an application, the widow will retain her rights under clause (b).

NOTE 2.—When a person named in a Form of Declaration dies before the subscription is completed, the amount due to him may be.

deceased subscriber as determined by rule 15 are resident in England, the Account Officer in a similar manner, on receipt of due intimation, shall forward the amount payable to them by sterling bills.

(5) *Renumber rule 11 as rule 20.*

(6) *Substitute the following for rule 12:—*

Substitution of other forms of life insurance for subscriptions to the Fund

NOTE.—The provisions of rule 21, so far as they relate to policies of insurance, are not applicable to subscribers joining the Fund after the 1st September 1919.

21 Subscriptions to a recognised Family Pension Fund or payments towards a policy of insurance may, at the option of subscribers, be substituted for subscriptions to the General Provident Fund, subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) If the subscriptions or payments to be so substituted shall be of less amount than the minimum subscription under rule 7 of these rules, the deficiency shall be paid by the subscriber as a subscription to the General Provident Fund.

NOTE.—The monthly payment on account of deficiency shall be a sum expressed in whole annas. For this purpose in calculating the insurance payment amount higher or to exceed—8 annas.

- (2) An insurance policy must be on the subscriber's own life, in which case it is immaterial what form the policy takes, *i.e.*, it may be a life or an endowment policy, but it must be such as is legally assignable to Government.

NOTE 1.—A guarantee policy, which ensures the payment of the sum assured in the event of the policy-holder being retired by the Medical Board may be accepted for the purposes of this rule.

NOTE 2.—If a policy of insurance is affected by a subscriber on his own life for the benefit of a sole beneficiary specifically named therein, a formal assignment by both the insured and the sole beneficiary is permissible. An assignment of a policy affected by a subscriber on his own life for the benefit of more than one beneficiary, whether existent or not at the date of the policy, is not, in view of the attendant legal difficulties, permissible under this rule.

NOTE 3.—Premia paid to an insurance company for a contingent of other annuity cannot be substituted for subscriptions to the General Provident Fund.

- (iii) Government will not make payments on behalf of subscribers to insurance companies nor will they take steps to keep the policy alive. If a subscriber records on his salary bill that he is making payments to an insurance company or to a Pension Fund of not less amount than the minimum subscription prescribed in rule 7 of these rules, the Account Officer will content himself by demanding periodically to see the receipts or certified copies of the receipts showing that such payments have been made. Failing such receipts he will make the necessary deduction from the subscriber's salary and place it to his credit in the Provident Fund. Should subscribers prefer to do so, they may make the usual deduction from their pay bills for credit to the Provident Fund and arrange with the Account Officer to draw from the Fund, at stated intervals, the sums necessary to pay quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly premia.
- (iv) Any sums already at the credit of the subscriber in the Provident Fund can be withdrawn for payment of premia or for the purchase of a single-payment life policy; but the utilization of sums already at credit will not relieve the subscriber from continuing to make the usual reduction from his current salary within the usual limits prescribed in rule 7 of these rules whether the amount is to be paid into the Provident Fund or towards an insurance policy, except when the subscriber is on leave and exercises the option allowed by rule 8 to discontinue subscriptions.
- (v) (a) If a policy of insurance matures, not at death, but after a term of years, the sum accruing, with the assent of the assured, shall be drawn by Government and placed at his credit in the Fund at $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. compound interest.
- (b) The bonuses which accrue on any policy should be allowed to accumulate with the policy until the latter matures. If, however, it is incumbent on the policy-holder to withdraw them as they fall due, the amounts should be credited in the Fund to the subscriber's account.

- (c) The sum which accumulates to the credit of the subscriber will be dealt with on his quitting the service or in the event of his death before retirement in accordance with rules 10 and 15.
- (vi) In the event of a subscriber's interest in a recognised Family Pension Fund, any subscriptions to which shall have been substituted under sub-rule (c) for his subscription to the General Provident Fund, ceasing from any cause whatever or of a policy of assurance, any payments for premium which shall have been so substituted, or withdrawn, under sub-rule (iv) from sums already at credit of such subscriber in the General Provident Fund, being allowed to lapse or being assigned, charged, or incumbered (except in favour of Government as hereinafter mentioned) or maturing and the amount thereof being withdrawn by the assured under sub-rule (v) (a), the amounts of the payments or subscriptions so substituted, or withdrawn, as the case may be, shall be paid or repaid, as the case may be, by such subscriber to the Account Officer and may in default be deducted from such subscriber's salary.
- (vii) A policy, the payment or payments for any premium which shall, under this rule, be substituted for subscriptions to the Fund or withdrawn from the sums at the credit of a subscriber for the same purpose and which has not already been assigned to the Secretary of State for India in Council and delivered to the Account Officer under this rule shall, within three months of such payment, or withdrawal, be so assigned and delivered as security for the payment contingently of the sum which in the event of lapse of the policy or any assignment, charge or encumbrance thereof or thereon will, under the last preceding sub-rule, become payable by the subscriber to the Fund. No payment so made by a subscriber shall be considered as in substitution for any subscription by him to the Fund unless and until the life policy shall have been so assigned, and in default of such assignment *within three months*, after such payment or withdrawal, as the case may be,

the amount so paid or withdrawn, as the case may be, shall forthwith be paid or repaid, as the case may be, by the subscriber concerned to the Account Officer or may in default be deducted from such subscriber's salary.

- (viii) (a) The assignment of a policy under the preceding sub-rule shall be endorsed on the policy and shall be in the following form:—

"I, A. B., of etc., hereby assign unto the Secretary of State for India in Council the within policy of assurance as security for payment of all sums which under rule 21 of the rules of the General Provident Fund I may hereafter become liable to pay to that Fund."

- (b) Save as provided in sub-rule (viii) (c), the policy shall be re-assigned to the subscriber, and handed back to him on his quitting the service, and in the event of his death before quitting the service, a re-assignment shall be executed in favour of, and the policy handed to, the legal representative of his estate as determined by a civil court having competence to pass orders in this respect. Notice of a re-assignment shall be sent to the Insurance Company by the Account Officer.

- (c) If notice has been received by the Account Officer of any assignment or attachment of, or incumbrance on the policy, he shall not execute a re-assignment of the policy in favour of the subscriber, or in the event of his death, of the legal representative of his estate as determined by a civil court having competence to pass orders in this respect, until he shall have obtained the orders of the Comptroller General.

- (ix) The following procedure shall be observed in regard to the assignment and re-assignment of life policies:—

- (a) When the assigned policy is delivered to the Account Officer under sub-rule (ix) above, it shall be accompanied by a certificate from the subscriber to the effect that no prior assignment of the policy exists. The Account Officer

shall satisfy himself independently that this is the case by direct reference to the Insurance Company.

- (b) Notice of the assignment of the policy must be given by the subscriber to the Insurance Company and acknowledgment of the notice of the Insurance Company must be sent by the subscriber to the Account Officer within three months of the date of the assignment. Subscribers are advised to send notice of the assignment to the Insurance Company in duplicate, accompanied, in cases in which the notice has to be sent to a Company in Great Britain or Ireland, by a remittance of five shillings, which is the fee for the acknowledgment authorised by the Policies of Assurance Act, 1867. The policy itself, bearing the assignment endorsed thereon, need not be sent to the Company as Insurance Companies do not ordinarily require the production of the original instruments affecting a policy-holder's title until the policy becomes a claim.

NOTE.—Subscribers who proceed to Great Britain or Ireland on quitting the service are advised that under the English Stamp Law assignments or re-assignments are required to be stamped within 31 days of their first arrival in those countries. Otherwise penalty will be incurred under the Stamp Act and difficulties may arise when the policy matures for payment.

280. Higher Education and Training for *ex-officers* and men of similar educational qualifications—
Provision for Financial Assistance.

1. It has been decided that *ex-officers* and men of similar educational qualifications and of British nationality, whether ordinarily domiciled in the United Kingdom or elsewhere, if they have served during this war in the Naval, Military or Air Forces of the Crown for which payment is made out of monies provided by the Parliament of the United Kingdom, shall be eligible for financial assistance to pursue courses of Higher Education at Universities or other approved institutions, in agriculture, and in offices and works—

(a) In the United Kingdom.

(b) In the British Empire overseas or in foreign countries elsewhere than in the Dominion or country of a candidate's own domicile.

2. Forces of the Crown for which payment is made out of monies provided by the Parliament of the United Kingdom include the following:—

- (e) The Royal Air Force.

3. The privilege of receiving financial assistance for training overseas or in foreign countries will only be granted for special reasons and in a limited number of cases.

4.—(a) Candidates ordinarily domiciled in the United Kingdom should apply to the District Director, Appointments Department, Ministry of Labour, nearest to their own home. (The districts and addresses of their Directors are detailed in Appendix A.)

(b) Candidates not ordinarily domiciled in the United Kingdom should apply to the Director, Overseas Appointments Bureau, Appointments Department, Ministry of Labour, *St. Ermin's Hotel, London, S. W. 1.*

5.—(a) Serving candidates should forward their applications on A. F. Z -15, obtainable from Commanding Officers, or on D. O Form obtainable from all District Directorates of the Appointments Department, Ministry of Labour.

Camp kettles, on return to store after use, are to be thoroughly cleaned by boiling, first in a strong solution of caustic soda, 80 per cent., and then in clean water. When dry they should be lightly greased with mineral jelly, inside and outside, to protect them from rust. It is not necessary to repaint camp kettles from which the lacquering has worn off.

Order Tabanidæ are concerned in the transmission of the disease Surra from affected to healthy animals, it is considered that reduction of the prevalence of the disease and mortality arising from it can very materially be effected by a systematic crusade directed towards the destruction of these flies, their eggs and their larvæ during the fly season.

2. It has been decided in the first instance to conduct a "Fly Survey" in the Northern and North-western parts of India where Surra chiefly prevails and to map out "Surra Areas". This survey will be undertaken under the guidance of the Imperial Pathological Entomologist to the Government of India whose Head Office is at Pusa, Bebar, and any evidence as to the existence of "Biting Fly" areas, stations or camps occupied by troops should be sent to him through Administrative Veterinary Officers of Formations concerned.

3. Organised "Fly Hunts" will be instituted by Commanding Officers of Camel Corps, during the "Fly Season"—say from the middle of May to the middle of October—and periodically carried out by them at all watering places used by camels and within a mile of the same whether such watering places are at permanent camps, or at temporary camps on a line of march route.

4. "Fly Hunts" will be directed towards (a) eggs, (b) flies and (c) larvæ, a sufficient number of sarvans being detailed for the purpose, acting under the guidance of the Veterinary Assistants of the unit concerned.

5. For identification the following information is given:—

- (a) The female tabanidæ lay their eggs on the under surface of blades of grass growing along the edges of streams and the margins of wheels and pools. The eggs are laid in brown roundish masses about the size of an ordinary pea, each mass containing from 80 to 100 eggs. They are very easily detected and the importance of their collection and destruction by burning will be fully realised. When eggs are hatched out they appear on the blades of grass as shells only.

- (b) Larvæ from the hatched-out eggs drop from the blades of grass into the soft wet earth round the edges of streams, pools, wheels, etc, and can be found by lightly digging or disturbing the surface layers of earth after the manner of finding "grubs" of other flies in garden earth, manure, or refuse. The larvæ of the tabanidæ are yellowish-white in colour, elongated and cylindrical, $\frac{3}{4}$ inch to $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length, about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch in diameter, and have a number of fleshy rings or bands round the body.
- (c) Tabanidæ flies are large and of stout build, varying in size from $\frac{1}{4}$ inch to 1 inch in length. The head and eyes are large. The thorax and abdomen are clothed with short hair, and often soberly striped or banded. The abdomen has seven visible segments. The female flies only are concerned in piercing and blood sucking, and as they do not operate as a rule beyond a mile from water, where they lay their eggs or in other words practise their mother-hood, they are usually to be found within that radius, or attacking animals within that distance.

6. It is realised that the "Fly Season" of this year is now nearly over, and that proper measures for destruction cannot be systematically put in force until next season, but there is still time to do a certain amount this season. Officers Commanding Camels Corps will, therefore, adopt the above measures without delay.

Paragraphs 35 (j) and (k) are reconstructed as follows:—

(j) In the case of parties which are sent to take over animals from a remount depot, to ensure the following articles of gear and equipment are despatched with the conducting parties:—

Head-stalls, G. S.	1 per animal
Bags, rusa, pattern 1916	1 per animal.
Buckets, water, G. S., canvas I. P.	1 per 4 animals.
Bags, jute, A. twill, No. 2	As many as required to hold the grain ration for the number of animals and number of days the journey will occupy.
Bags, jute, A. twill, No. 2	1 per animal per day's journey, for the carriage of fodder.
Pails, iron, galvanized, 3 gallons.	2 per truck.

NOTE 1.—Officers Commanding units must make suitable provision for feeding fodder to animals in trucks (*vide* India Army Order No 1003 of 1918).

NOTE 2.—Officers Commanding units will be held responsible for delay in the despatch of animals due to non-observance of these instructions.

NOTE 3.—Condemned pails suitable for holding earth or sand will be issued if available in lieu of pails, iron, galvanized, 3 gallons.

(k) In the case of drafts of mules for despatch overseas, that the following gear accompanies the animals in the truck:—

- (i) Collars, head.
- (ii) Chains, forefoot.

- (iii) Pails, I. G., 3 gallons (4 per truck).
 (iv) Shackles, hindfoot.
 (v) Bags, nose, pattern 1916.

NOTE 1.—Bags, nose, pattern 1916, should be attached to the mules' head before detaining.

NOTE 2.—Pails, I. G., 3 gallons, will be returned to the Ordnance Department at the port of embarkation and not taken on boardship.

NOTE 3.—~~When the mules are taken on board~~ will be packed in gunny and should be marked 'spot from which they

NOTE 4.—Separate R. & D. vouchers will be made out for—

- (a) articles in use with the animals,
 (b) pails, I. G., 3 gallons,
 (c) gear packed in gunny bundles or boxes

Paragraph 72 (a) —Delete the second portion of the paragraph from "When ordered to travel".....to "paragraph 643 (a)" and substitute the following:—

"When ordered to travel by mail train, on emergent occasions in the interests of the public service, on journeys occupying not less than 6 hours, he will receive an enhanced allowance at the rate of Rs. 5 per diem, to enable him to obtain meals from the restaurant car on the train, [vide Army Regulations, India, Volume I paragraph 643 (d)]. Claims for meal money at this rate will be supported by a certificate signed by the Officer Commanding Station or unit, that the soldier will travel by a mail train on which a refreshment car is provided."

APPENDIX Q.

Paragraphs 12 to 17 are reconstructed as follows :—

"12. *Equipment.*—British soldiers proceeding to the United Kingdom will proceed in accordance with the scale appended in accordance with the scale appended of the service. Unit commanders will ensure that arms and personal equipment are in a serviceable condition, necessary replacements being made locally.

"The scales of arms and equipment for the various branches of the service are laid down in paragraph 1803, Army Demobilization Regulations, Part I. These scales should be followed with the exception that articles not forming the equipment of units in India, such as web equipment packs, steel helmets, ration bags and box respirators will not be required. Intrenching implements and sea-kit bags will not be taken.

"Details proceeding singly or in small parties who are not in possession of arms and personal equipment will be armed and equipped as above before despatch, bandolier equipment and pattern 1914 rifles, bayonets and scabbards being issued in such cases.

"Where time does not admit of these items being issued before departure they will be issued by the Commandant, Concentration Camp, Deolali, to whom telegraphic information should be sent by the Officer Commanding the unit, giving the rank, name and unit of the individual and the items required to complete the scale.

" 13. *Clothing*.—The scale of clothing to be taken is that laid down in Clothing Regulations, (India), 1919, Table I, without blankets or the additional articles for special services, but with the following additions :—

" (1) Every British soldier proceeding to the United Kingdom will be in possession of a serge suit. If not already in possession of a khaki serge suit, he will be provided free, except for those categories mentioned in Clothing Regulations (India), paragraph 3, for whom the issue will be on payment.

" (2) With reference to Army Regulations, India, Volume XI, paragraph 72, two pairs of drawers, flannel, will be issued to all men as above. Serge lining for frocks will not be issued.

" Unit commanders will ensure that clothing is in a serviceable condition, necessary replacements being made locally.

" 14 *Sea kit*—Army Regulations, India, Volume XI, paragraph 72, will only apply to women and children, invalids and insanes (but see paragraph 13 above).

" 15. *Packing warm clothing*—All troops and families should be warned of the necessity of packing warm clothing, so that it can be taken into wear when required.

" 16 *Extra issue blankets*.—Extra issue blankets will be admissible under the provisions of Army Regulations, India, Volume II, paragraph 451-C.

" 17. *Vouchers for blankets*.—In the case of British soldiers proceeding to Deolali, extra issue blankets will be vouchered to the Commandant, Concentration Camp, Deolali, who will withdraw and account for the same. The ~~Major~~ will arrange for the issue on loan of any blankets necessary for the onward journey, and will voucher them to the Chief Ordnance Officer, Bombay. In the case of men proceeding to Karachi, the existing procedure will prevail, vide Army Regulations, India, Volume II, paragraph 451-C.

" All vouchers for blankets will accompany the men when they leave their units."

Certificate for Mention in Despatches.—It has been decided by the Army Council to issue a certificate to all personnel of the Navy, Army and Royal Air Force, and to members of the Indian, Dominion, Colonial and Egyptian Forces, who from time to time have been "mentioned" in the Military Despatches during this war by a commander in the field.

XXIII. Reception of Army Schoolmistresses at ports of disembarkation and their onward despatch by road, rail and sea.

88. A schoolmistress who is unmarried or a widow, or if married to a civilian, unaccompanied by her privileges when travelling that country :—

- (a) On school-

an) who
will, if she is required to be detained at the port pending orders to proceed up country to join her corps, conduct her to a respectable hotel, to be selected by the staff officer superintending the disembarkation.
- (b) If orders posting her to a corps are awaiting her arrival at the port, she will probably proceed up-country on the date of disembarkation.
- (c) If detained at the port of disembarkation she will be granted an allowance of 5 rupees per diem to cover hotel expenses. This allowance will be paid in advance, on the authority of a certificate signed by a staff officer at the port, showing that the detention for the period was considered necessary [see sub-paragraph (e)].
- (d) The schoolmistresses will be conducted to the railway station of departure by a non-commissioned officer (if possible a married man) provided with the necessary railway warrants for herself and baggage, who will procure her railway ticket and see her safely started

Her time of departure by rail from the port and time when due at destination, will be telegraphed by the staff officer commanding the corps to which she is posted for duty, who will arrange

For a married non-commissioned officer to meet the schoolmistress at the railway station, with the necessary conveyance for herself and baggage to the barracks

She will not be required to travel by a troop train, which involves halting at rest-camps, but will proceed through to her destination by mail train, in which a compartment is always reserved for ladies. This arrangement will enable her to travel comfortably and free from anxiety. As it is cold at night in India during the months of the military relief season, schoolmistresses are recommended to provide themselves with a warm rug before leaving England; a small pillow is also desirable.

Unmarried schoolmistresses (including widows) when proceeding alone, and schoolmistresses married to pensioners and civilians when not accompanied by their husbands, on arrival in, or departure from, India, receive a consolidated travelling allowance of 4 rupees per day, which will meet the cost of refreshments at the various railway stations, where meals are provided on the journey. This allowance, together with that specified in sub-paragraph (c), will be paid in advance to the schoolmistresses by the staff officer superintending the disembarkation, the amount being recovered by him on the authority of a station order for the number of days the journey will occupy according to the railway timing.

When proceeding from port to port in India, if there are no other female passengers on board, the schoolmistresses referred to in sub-paragraph (c) will not be required to proceed by Government steamer, but in such cases passage by private steamer will be provided.

The travelling allowance of 4 rupees per diem is admissible to the schoolmistresses referred to in sub-paragraph (c), when moving on duty by rail under any circumstances.
