(1) Maharajah of Jeypore Endowment

Shri Sri Sri Maharaja Vikrama Deo Varma, Maharajah of Jeypore executed a deed agreeing to pay towards the recurring expenditure of the University College of Science and Technology (called after him as the Jeypore Vikrama Deo College of Science and Technology in grateful recognition of his munificent gift) an annual contribution of Rs. 50,000 in 1933—1934, of Rupees 75,000 in 1934—35, and of Rs. 1,00,000 thereafter, till such time when he or his heirs might pay up a capital sum of Rs. 15,00,000.

The Senate at its meeting held on 8—3—40 resolved as per clause V (1) of the Instrument of Gift of a perpetual annuity executed by the Maharajah Sahib of Jeypore, one Professorship in Physics in the Jeypore Vikrama Deo College of Science and Technology designated as "Ramachandra Deo Professorship in Physics" after Sri Ramachandra Deo, the late Maharajah of Jeypore and one Professorship in Chemistry in the Jeypore Vikrama Deo College of Science and Technology, as "Vikrama Deo Professorship in Chemistry" after the benefactor, the present Maharajah of Jeypore.

(2) Maharajah of Bobbili Endowment

Maharajah Sri Rao Sir Venkataswajachelapati Ranga Rao Bahadur of Bobbili, G. O. B. L., the first Pro-Chancellor of the Andhra University made a donation of one lakh of Rupees to the University for the encouragement of Telugu and Sanskrit learning. The Senate at its meeting held on 30th August 1926 accepted the donation.

The Senate has since resolved that two-thirds of the income from the endowment be utilized for the encouragement of Telugu and one-third for the encouragement of Sanskrit. The amount of income allotted to Telugu will be utilized in the first instance for the compilation of a History of the Telugu Language and Literature and the amount allotted to Sanskrit was utilised, as a temporary measure for four years, for the institution, of two scholarships each of the monthly value of Rs. 50 and awarded to competent scholars for research in Sanskrit, and from the year 1931-32 on wards, it was resolved to utilize the funds for the publication of rare books of literary value,

(3) Rajah of Panagal Endowment

Rajah Rama Rayanimvar the late Rajah of Panagal, announced at the time of the inauguration of the senate on 30th August 1926, through His Excellency the Chancellor, his intention to endow in due course the University with landed property of the annual value of Rs. 5,000 for the purpose of the institution of a Readership in Experimental Psychology and undertook that he would pay till the endowment was made a sum of Rs. 5,000 per annum to the University from the time the work was begun. The landed endowment has not been made. As a temporary measure the senate on the recommendation of the Syndicate instituted a Fellowship in Experimental Psychology of the annual value of Rs. 5,000 and awarded it during 1928-31 to Mr. T. A. Purushottam, M. A.

On the death of the late Rajah of Panagal, his successor disputed the claim of the University for Rs. 5,000 a year and the Syndicate after obtaining legal opinion in the matter entered into a compromise with the Present Rajah whereby the Rajah agreed to pay a consolidated sum of Rs. 30,000 within five years and in the meanwhile also pay annual donations of Rs. 1,500 with the proviso that the sum of Rs. 1,500 is to be reduced in proportion to any part payments that may be made to redeem the sum of Rs. 30,000. The Senate approved the proposals and the Rajah Sahib has executed the agreement on the above terms.

(4) H. E. H. The Nizam's Endowment

The Government of His Exalted Highness The Nizam of Hyderabad generously donated a sum of Rupees one lakh for the purposes of the University and the Senate at its meeting held on the 3rd December 1937 accepted the donation and conveyed its thanks to His Exalted Highness.

(5) His Highness The Maharajah and Her Highness The Maharani of Travancore's Endowment

His Highness The Maharajah of Travancore and Her Highness The Maharani Setu Parvathi Bayi of Travancore generously donated a sum of Rupees one lakh for the purposes of the University and the Senate at its meeting held on the 3rd December 1937 accepted the donation and conveyed its thanks to Their Highnesses.

(6) Sir Alladi Krishnaswami Aiyer Endowment

Sir Alladi Krishnaswami Aiyer, Advocate-General, Madras, offered an annual donation of Rs. 1,000 to the University for the purpose of instituting lectures by distinguished Scholars. The Senate, at its meeting held on 6-12-1932 accepted the offer under the following terms and conditions:—

- (1) The donation shall continue in the first instance for a period of ten years, and is conditioned on the donor being alive during the period.

- (2) The first payment shall be made in April 1932 and shall be treated as the contribution for 1931—32. So long as Prof. Sir S. Radhakrishnan is the Vice-Chancellor, it shall be in his absolute discretion to devote the said sum for any Lecturership by any distinguished scholars he thinks fit, provided that the decision of Prof. Sir S. Radhakrishnan shall be subject to confirmation by the Syndicate.
- (3) If Prof. Sir S. Radhakrishnan ceases to be the Vice-Chancellor, during the currency of the period of ten years referred to, the Donor shall have the right to prescribe the purpose for which and the conditions subject to which the donation shall be utilised.

(7) Mr. Tikkavarapu Ramireddy & his Daughters' Endowment

Mr. T. Ramireddy, and his daughters Kumari T. Syamala and Kumari T. Lakshnikantam, donated Rs. 10,000/-, Rs. 10,000/- and Rs. 5,000 respectively making a total of Rs. 25,000/- for the construction of a Sabha to be called after Mr. Ramireddy's father Tikkavarapu Lakshminarayana Reddy Sabha.

(8) The Vice-Chancellor's Fund

(a) Dr. C. R. Reddy's Donation.

The Vice-Chancellor, Dr. C. R. Reddy, offered to draw, as from pay due to him from July 1936, Rs. 1,000 only as his pay, leaving the undrawn amounts with the University to form part of a fund called "The Vice-Chancellor's Fund" and the Senate at its meeting held on 22-8-36 accepted the offer and approved the following conditions for its administration:—

- (1) A separate account will be maintained in the Endowment Funds account to be called the Vice-Chancellor's Fund, to which the undrawn amounts of Rs. 1000 per month will be credited.
- (2) The corpus and interest thereon, if any, in this account will be utilised by the Syndicate for purposes of benefit to the University.
- (3) All proposals of expenditure under this account shall, during the period of Mr. C. R. Reddy's Vice-Chancellorship, emanate in the first instance from him or have his approval.

Owing to the many calls on his purse of an imperative nature that he could not possibly ignore Dr. C. R. Reddy reduced his contribution of Rs. 1000/- per month to Rs. 500/-† per month.

(b) Prof. V. Appa Rao's Contribution.

At the meeting of the Senate held on 18th March 1939, Prof. V. Apparao, Principal, University Colleges offered to contribute, with effect from 1st April 1939.

a sum of Rs. 100/—per mensem from out of his salary to the Vice-Chancellor's Fund. At the same meeting, from out of this contribution the Senate sanctioned the institution of a Tutorship in South Indian Archæology and Epigraphy with special reference to Andhra Desa on a fixed salary of Rs. 75/ p. m. in the department of History, Economics and Politics in the University College of Arts and Commerce.

The East Godavari District Board, Cocanada generously agreed to make an annual recurring grant of Rs. 3,000 for founding in the Andhra University a Lecturership to be called the "Goutami Lecturership." The Senate accepted the endowment at its meeting held on 6—10—39 and instituted a Lecturership in Bio-Chemistry called the "Goutami Lecturership" in the J. V. D. College of Science and Technology in the grade of Rs. 125-15/2-200 at a cost inclusive of salary and research grants etc. not exceeding Rs. 3,000 per annum. At its meeting held on 5-12-41, the Senate on the recommendation of the Syndicate converted the Goutami Lecturership into "Goutami Readership" on a fixed pay of Rs. 200/— per mensem and gave effect to it as from 1st April 1942.

(11) West Godavari District Board's Endowment

The West Godavari District Board, Ellore agreed to make an annual grant of Rs. 4,200 for founding a chair called the Gandhian Chair in the Andhra University and sent a bank draft for Rs. 4,200 towards the Board's contribution for the year 1939—40. The Senate at its meeting held on 6—10—39 accepted the endowment and instituted a Readership in Applied Mathematics.

The West Godavari District Board has since raised the contribution to Rs. 4,800/—per annum with the object of having the Readership converted into a Professorship. In view of the enhanced grant by the District Board and the

condition attached thereto the Senate at its meeting held on 11th Dec. 1942 converted the Gandhian Readership in Applied Mathematics into Gandhian Professorship in the same subject on a fixed salary of Rs. 100/- per mensem.

(2) Kistna District Board Research Fellowships & Research Scholarships

(a) Scheme in force till the end of 1937—38.

These Fellowships are *two in number, each of the value of Rs. 75 per month tenable in India for a period of one year. The Syndicate has power to extend these fellowships for a period not exceeding two years if necessary. The amount is to be met from the interest derived from the donation of Rs. 50,000 made by the Kistna District Board. The Fellowships are awarded for research in department of Science.

Scheme in force from 1938—39.

Out of the annual income from the Kistna District Board endowments Fund of Rs. 50,000 it shall be competent for the Syndicate to award each year two Research Fellowships for D. Sc. and two Research Scholarships for M. Sc. of the monthly value of Rs. 30 each to persons engaged in research in the Jaypore Vikrama Deo College of Science & Technology. Conditions of award etc. will be as per rules governing the award of Research Fellowships and Research Scholarships contained in the Appendix to Chapter XI of the Code (Vol. I.).

(3) **Guntur District Board Research Fellowships**

(a) *Scheme in force till the end of 1937—38.*

These Scholarships are two in number, each of the value of Rs. 75 per mensem and shall be tenable in the University College of Arts and Commerce. They shall be awarded for a period of two years in the first instance for research in Humanities to Honours Graduates or Masters of Arts of outstanding merit who have got an aptitude for research. The Syndicate shall have power to extend in any particular case the Scholarship by another year. The cost of the Scholarships shall be met from the interest derived from the donation of Rs. 40,000 made by the Guntur District Board.

(b) *Scheme in force from 1938—39.*

Out of the annual income from the Guntur District Board endowment fund of Rs. 40,000 it shall be competent for the Syndicate to award each year two Research Fellowships for Ph. D. of the monthly value of Rs. 25 in the first year and Rs. 30 in the subsequent years to persons engaged in research in the University College of Arts and Commerce. The conditions of their award will be as per rules governing the award of Research Fellowships contained in the Appendix to Chapter XI of the Code Vol. 1.

It shall however be competent for the Syndicate to utilise the balance available during the transitory period for award of Studentships.

(6) **Dr. C. R. Reddy Research Fellowship**

Mr. P. V. Krishnayya Choudary, Syndicate Member, Andhra University offered an endowment of Rs. 360/- per annum for a period of three years for founding a Research Fellowship to be called "Dr. C. R. (14) **The Andhra University Dufferin Trainingship Scholarship.**

On the recommendation of the Syndicate, the senate, at its meeting held on 5th December 1941 instituted 'the Andhra University Dufferin Trainingship Scholarship' and approved the following terms for its award :—

- (1) The Scholarship shall be called "The Andhra University Dufferin Trainingship Scholarship".
- (2) It shall be of the value of Rs. 40/- per month and will be tenable for a period of three years with effect from January each year.
- (3) The Scholarship is available only for those students who belong to the area of affiliation of the Andhra University and shall be awarded annually by the Syndicate to a candidate who among those eligible for the award stands highest in the qualifying examination of the Indian Mercantile Marine Trainingship Dufferin."
- (4) (a) Special consideration will be given to applicants who but for the aid of the scholarship, would be unable to afford the cost of training. They may if required have to produce evidence of the need for financial help.
 (b) Other things being about equal preference will be given to applicants from sea-faring communities,

- (5) The Scholarship will be payable at the beginning of each term i. e., in January and September on bills from the cadet, counter-signed by the Captain Superintendent, and will only be paid on the Captain Superintendent's certificate of the Cadet's satisfactory progress.
- (6) Any holder of the scholarship who neglects his studies or whose work, conduct or progress are not reported to be satisfactory at any time during the course of his training or who tries to work for any other profession concurrently will render himself liable to forfeiture of his scholarship and the Syndicate's decision shall be final.

(15) The Lord Goschen Scholarships

The Lord Goschen Memorial Fund Committee offered an endowment for a sum of Rs. 8,700 to be invested in Government Securities for the purpose of founding two Scholarships to perpetuate the memory of Lord Goschen, who was the Governor of Madras from 1924—29. The Senate at its meeting held on 6th March 1931 accepted the endowment and approved the following conditions for award of the Scholarships —

 - (b) continue their studies for the B. A. Degree Examination in Group (iv)—History and Economics (Economics Main) in the University College or in an Affiliated College.
- (4) The scholarships shall ordinarily be tenable for two years but shall not be held in conjunction with any other Scholarship or Scholarships, excepting such fee concession as may be granted under the Madras Educational Rules.
- (5) The amount of each Scholarship shall be disbursed in three instalments each year at the beginning of each term through the Principal of the College concerned.
- (6) The Syndicate shall have power to declare that the holder of the Scholarship has forfeited it for want of satisfactory progress in his studies or for any misconduct which it may consider as sufficient cause for such forfeiture, and there shall be no appeal from the decision of the Syndicate.

- (7) All unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.
- (8) The Senate shall have the power consistently with the spirit of the endowment to make such changes in the conditions of award as new circumstances may render necessary.

(16) The Andhra Insurance Company Studentships.

The Andhra Insurance Company Ltd., Masulipatam offered a sum of Rs. 300 per annum for a period of 3 years for the purpose of awarding studentships in the name of the Company to B. Com. - (8) In the case of any vacancy occurring in the course of a year, the Syndicate may award the studentship for the remaining part of the period to any student studying in the class in which it was previously held subject to other conditions being satisfied.

- (9) The Senate shall have power consistent with the object of the endowment to make such changes in the conditions of the award as new circumstances may render necessary.

The donors having generously renewed their offer for 1940—41, the Senate, at its meeting held on 9th March 1940, accepted the offer with thanks.

(18) V. P. Brahmananda Sastry Studentships.

During the year 1932, Mr. Veluri Purna Brahmananda Sastry of Rajahmundry executed, on the eve of his death, a will bequeathing properties valued at about Rs. 25,000 to the University. The question of taking possession of the properties engaged the attention of the University for a long time. In November 1934, the Syndicate entered into a compromise with Mr. Veluri Venkatarainayya father of the testator of the will, and agreed to receive Rs. 6,000.

The sum of Rs. 6,000 has since been realised and the interest accumulated from the amount is being spent for the award of three Studentships one in each of the I, II and III year Hons. Classes with Sanskrit or Vernacular branch and three to students of Hons. Classes with any other group. The Syndicate recommended to the Senate that till the University opens Honours courses with Sanskrit branch, three Studentships each of the annual value of Rs 70/- tenable one in each of the three Telugu Hons. Classes be instituted out of the interest accruing from the endowment and the Senate at its meeting held on 18—3—39 accepted the recommendation and approved the following conditions for award of the Studentships :—

- (1) The Studentships shall be called the "V. P. Brahmananda Sastri Studentships" and shall be three in number.
- (2) The Studentships shall be each of the annual value of Rs. 70/- tenable in each of the three Telugu Honours classes.
- (3) The Studentships amount shall be disbursed each year in three instalments each of Rs. 30. Rs. 20 and Rs. 20 at the beginning of each term respectively through the Principal, University Colleges, Waltair.

His Excellency Lt. Col. the Rt. Hon'ble Sir George Fredrick Stanley, P. (v) **Eka (Yeka) Dandiah Pantulu Prize.**

(vii) Dewan Bahadur B. V. Sri Hari Rao Nayudu Prize

The Gazetted officers of the Registration Department offered a sum of Rs. 500/—for instituting a prize in the University in the name of Dewan Bahadur B. V. Sri Hari Rao Nayudu, B. A., B. L. Retired Inspector General of Registration and the Senate at its meeting held on 18th March 1943 approved the following conditions for award of the prize:—

- (1) The prize shall be called "Dewan Bahadur B. V. Sri Hari Rao Nayudu Prize."
- (2) The prize shall be in the shape of books of the value of about Rs. 15/-
- (3) The prize shall be awarded annually at the Convocation to the candidate who in passing the B. Com. (Hons.) Degree examination held in the year shows merit.
- (4) The Syndicate shall have discretion not to award the prize if in its opinion none of the candidates deserves the award.
- (5) In the event of the prize not being awarded in any year, the unused interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.
- (6) The Senate shall have power to make such changes in the conditions of award as new circumstances may render necessary.

(viii) Other Prizes

At its meeting held on 11th Dec. 1942, the Senate accepted a donation of Rs. 50/- each from Peddapur and Nandyal Municipalities and approved the following terms for the award of the prize:—

(a) Terms of award regarding Peddapur Municipality contribution :

- (1) The amount of Rs. 50/- sanctioned by the Peddapur Municipal Council may be given to any two poor and deserving students of the three University Colleges, equally i. e. Rs. 25/- each for the purpose of purchasing books approved by the Heads of their departments of study.
- (2) The amount will preferably be given to students coming from Peddapur or East Godavari District and who are not in receipt of any Studentship, Scholarship or Fellowship.
- (3) The Senate shall have power to make such changes in the conditions of award as it deems desirable.

(b) Terms of award regarding Nandyal Municipality contribution :

- (1) The amount of Rs. 50/- sanctioned by the Nandyal Municipal Council may be given to any two poor and deserving students of the three University Colleges equally i. e. Rs. 25/- each for the purpose of purchasing books approved by the Heads of their departments of study.
- (2) The amount will preferably be given to students coming from Nandyal or Kurnool district and who are not in receipt of any studentship, Scholarship or fellowship.
- (3) The Senate shall have power to make such changes in the conditions of award as it deems desirable.

M. R. Ry. Rao Sahib Dr. V. Ramakrishna Rao, M. A., Ph. D., L. T., President., Sir R. Venkataratnam Shastipurti Celebrations Committee, Cocanada, offered an endowment of a sum of Rs. 3,600 for the purpose of founding three medals and the Senate, at its meeting, held on 30th August, 1926 accepted the endowment and approved the following conditions for award of the medals.—

- (1) The first medal, of the value of two years' interest on Rs. 1,200 shall be called "Sir R. Venkata Ratnam Post-Graduate Research Medal", and shall be awarded at the Convocation in alternate years to the author of the best research thesis among the B. A. (Hons) and M. A. Degree holders of any year in the University, on a literary philosophical or cognate subject to be determined and announced by the Syndicate not less than 1½ years in advance of the due date provided that the medal shall not be awarded unless the thesis exhibits a sufficient standard of excellence as adjudged by a Special Board of three examiners appointed by the Syndicate. Up to 1945 the medal may be awarded *annually* to the writer of the best thesis

or essay from among the Research and Honours students of the University, and Honours and Post-Honours graduates of the University.

- (2) The second medal, of the value of the annual interest on Rs. 1,300 shall be called "Sir R. Venkata Ratnam, B. A. Medal" and shall be awarded every year at the annual Convocation to the candidate, who in passing the whole examination for the B. A. Pass Degree at the usual annual non-supplemental test, shows merit in any of the optional branches.
- (3) The third medal, of the value of the annual interest on Rs. 1,200 shall be called "Sir R. Venkata Ratnam Intermediate Medal" and shall be awarded every year to the candidate who, in passing the whole of the Intermediate Examination at the usual annual non-supplemental test, shows, whichever his optional group, merit and is placed in the First Class and proceeds directly to study for a Degree Examination, in any of the Universities constituted under a Act of any British Indian Legislature or in any of the Chartered Universities.
- (4) If in any year, any of the medals be not awarded, the unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.
- (5) The Senate shall have power consistent with the spirit of the endowment to make such changes in the conditions of awards as new circumstances may render necessary.

(B) General MacDonald Medal

"General MacDonald Medal" was founded by some friends of the late Major-General MacDonald to commemorate his name by the award of a medal and was accepted by the Senate of the Madras University at a meeting held on 31st August 1893. After the Andhra University was formed the Senate of the Madras University, in view of the fact that it would not be practicable to give effect to the desire of the founders of the medal, the Northern Circars having come within the jurisdiction of the Andhra University, transferred to the Andhra University the corpus of the fund which then consisted of 3 per cent Government Promissory Notes of Rs. 1,900 (face value) and 5 per cent Government Promissory Notes of Rs. 200 (face value). The Senate of the Andhra University accepted the transfer and approved the following conditions for award of the medal which were in force in the Madras University :—

The medal shall be awarded annually at the Convocation in accordance with the following rules:—

- (1) Candidates who having matriculated from a recognised High School in the Northern Circars have appeared for the final examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Arts (Honours) from an affiliated college in the Northern Circars and have qualified for the Degree are alone eligible.
- (2) The medal of the value of about Rs. 50 is awarded to a candidate who among eligible candidates, has in the opinion of the Syndicate, shown merit in English.
- (3) All unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.

- (1) The medal shall be called 'The Major Ebdon Memorial Medal' and shall bear the effigy of the late Major Ebdon.
- (2) The medal shall be of the annual value of the interest derived from the amount of the endowment.
- (3) The medal shall be awarded annually at the principal Convocation to the best candidate of the year who qualifies himself for the M. S. Degree Examination and who, in the opinion of the Examiners has shown a high standard of proficiency.

The Syndicate shall have discretion not to award the medal in any year, if in its opinion none of the candidates deserves the medal.

- (4) In the event of the medal not being awarded in any year, the unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the fund.
- (5) The Senate shall have power, consistent with the spirit of the endowment, to make such changes in the conditions of award as new circumstances may render necessary.

(27) Lakkaraju Sarabhayya Mahalakshmanma Medal

Mr. Lakkaraju Subba Rao, B. A., B. L. of Cocanada, member of the Syndicate of the Andhra University, offered an endowment of Rs. 2000/- to the University for founding a medal in the name of his parents, Lakkaraju Sarabhayya and Mahalakshmanma.

The Senate at its meeting held on 11-12-1942 approved the following conditions for award of the Medal :-

- (1) The Medal shall be called "Lakkaraju Sarabhayya Mahalakshmanma Medal" and shall bear the inscription on it.
- (2) The Medal shall be of the annual value of the interest derived from the amount of the endowment.
- (3) (a) The medal shall be awarded annually at the Convocation to the woman candidate^a who in passing the Final M. B. B. S. examination shows merit in 'Obstetrics and Gynaecology'. No candidate getting less than 50% of the marks will be eligible for this award.
- (b) If in any year there is no successful woman candidate eligible for the award of the medal under rule 3 (a) above, the medal shall be awarded that year to a male candidate who has obtained not less than 60% of the marks on the whole in M. Sc. Chemistry (including Microscopy of Foods, Drugs and Water).
- (4) The Syndicate shall have discretion not to award the medal in any year, if in its opinion no deserving candidate is available.
- (5) In the event of the medal not being awarded in any year, the unexpended interest shall be added to the corpus of the Fund.
- (6) On the recommendation of the Syndicate, the Senate shall have power, consistent with the intention of the donor, to make such changes in the conditions of award as it may deem necessary.

***(a) SCHEME RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY RESEARCH
FELLOWSHIPS RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS AND
STUDENTSHIPS.**

1. GENERAL

Total No. of research workers :

1. The total number of persons doing research in any one department with a view to obtaining research degrees of the Andhra University or any other University shall not exceed twelve. This number shall include Demonstrators, Lecture Assistants and Tutors who are permitted to do research work but not teachers of higher grades.

Latest date for applications :

2. Applications from persons desirous of doing research in the University Colleges shall be made in the prescribed form accompanied by a Treasury or Bank chalan for Rs. 2/- to the Principal so as to reach him not later than the 15th June each year. No admissions shall be made after the 5th July. But it shall be open to the Vice-Chancellor to relax this rule in exceptional cases.

Authority to admit :

3. The Vice-Chancellor shall make all admissions in consultation with the Principal, who shall previously consult the heads of the departments and the directors of research concerned.

Qualifications for admissions :

4. Admissions shall be generally restricted to those who have passed the Honours or other higher examinations of this University. In special cases similar graduates of any other recognised University may be admitted. But in all cases, proved capacity for research shall be the determining consideration in addition to meritorious college record.

Casual Research :

5. Ordinarily no persons shall be admitted to casual research. But admission may at the discretion of the Vice-Chancellor be given to persons of other Universities who desire to do research in any special branch for short periods under conditions prescribed.

Disciplinary control :

6. Every person doing research shall be under the disciplinary control of the Director of his studies, of the Head of the Department, and of the Principal.

Quarterly reports :

7. A report of the work of all the research workers in each department shall be made by the Principal to the Registrar for submission to the Vice-Chancellor in the second week of September, December and April respectively.

Fees :

8. Every person admitted to research shall pay at the commencement of each academic year a fee of Rs. 50/- in the case of Science and Technology subjects and Rs. 25/- in the case of Arts subjects per annum.

Cancellation for unsatisfactory work :

9. It shall be open to the Syndicate to cancel at any time the enrolment of any research student on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor for continued unsatisfactory work or conduct.

10. Research fellowships, research scholarships and studentships are not vacancies to be filled by the next best. Admission to these are determined by absolute standards and if the right type of candidates are not forthcoming they shall not be awarded.

Awards to research workers :

11. Awards by the University in aid of Post Graduate study and research will be of three kinds :

- (i) *Research Fellowships* : These shall be awarded only to persons who are prepared to engage themselves in research leading to the Doctorate degree in Science or Arts.
- (ii) *Research Scholarships* : These shall be awarded only to persons who are prepared to engage themselves in research leading to the Master's degree in Science.
- (iii) *Grants-in-aid of Research* : Grants in-aid to cover expenses in connection with research may be given at the discretion of the Syndicate to persons who are desirous of prosecuting definite research outside the University Colleges.

Equipment :

12. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Code and the rules framed thereunder, where the amount of a research fellowship or research scholarship is Rs. 360 or above a year, a sum of Rs. 60 or more per year shall be given for the equipment of the recipient concerned. The Principal will take all the circumstances into consideration and decide on the amount to be given.

N. B.—Persons admitted to do research leading to the Doctor's or Master's degree of the University and paying the fee prescribed by the University without receiving any stipend from the University will be styled "Research Students."

II. RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS

(D. Sc. or Ph. D.—Three years course.)

Distribution of Research Fellowships :

13. The Syndicate may at its discretion award each year the undermentioned research fellowships in order to enable persons to engage in research in the University Colleges subject to the conditions mentioned hereunder.

Execution of bond .

14. The holders of research fellowships shall execute a bond in the form prescribed, the cost of the bond being met by the University. They shall not enter on their duty as research fellows until the bond is executed, nor shall the research fellowships come into effect until they actually join duty.

Minimum qualification :

15. The minimum qualification for research fellowship is.—

For D. Sc. — M. Sc. or M. B. B. S. of Andhra University, passed in the first chance with merit.

For Ph. D. — B. A. (Honours) of Andhra University— I or II class.

Value :

16. The monthly value of a research fellowship on the Arts side will be Rs. 25/- for 9 months in the first year and Rs. 30/- for 12 months in each of the succeeding years.

Tenure :

The monthly value of a research fellowship on the Science side will be Rs. 30/- throughout the period—9 months in the first year and 12 months in each of the succeeding years.

17. The research fellowships for D. Sc. and Ph. D. shall be awarded each year in July and shall be tenable in the first instance till the 31st. March following. If renewed they will be tenable for the next 2 years.

Deprivation for unsatisfactory progress etc. -

18. The Syndicate may deprive a holder of his research fellowship at any time for unsatisfactory progress or conduct or for indiscipline.

Residence -

19. Holders of research fellowships shall be required to reside in the University hostel unless they are residing with their parents or relatives. They shall be eligible at the discretion of the Vice-Chancellor for grant of free residence in the University hostel on production of satisfactory evidence of poverty.

Not eligible for any other monetary assistance .

20. Holders of research fellowships shall not be eligible for any other monetary assistance from the funds or resources of the University, but they may be permitted by the Vice-Chancellor to accept scholarships or other monetary grants from other sources, provided they do not entail duties which, in the opinion of the Vice-Chancellor, may conflict with their research work or abridge the time that ought to be devoted to such work, provided, however, that the total amount does not exceed Rs. 40/- in the case of boys or Rs. 50/- in the case of girls per month.

Transfer not permitted :—

21. Research fellowship awardable in one department or one subject shall not be transferred to another department or another subject.

Whole-time engagement .—

22. Each research fellow shall be a full-time research worker while holding the fellowship and shall not accept any other remunerative work and shall not study for or appear at the I. C. S. or any other professional or state competitive examination.

23. A research Fellow or Research Scholar will be permitted to apply for or accept outside appointments on the recommendation of the Principal of the University Colleges and the Director of his research, provided, however, that if he gets the appointment and leaves the University before the expiry of the period for which the Research Fellowship has been given, he shall refund to the University the moneys received by him from the date of his appointment as a Research Fellow up to the date of his leaving the University, but the claim for refund of the moneys may be waived by the Syndicate if the Research Fellow or Research Scholar accepts an appointment in which he can make use of his special training.

Endowed Research Fellowships.

21. Sections 14, 15 and 17 to 23 shall *mutatis mutandis* be followed in respect of the grant of endowed research fellowships.

III. RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS.

(*M. Sc.—One year's course*)

Distribution of Research Scholarships:

22. The Syndicate may at its discretion award each year the undermentioned research scholarships to persons capable of research in order to enable them to undertake research subject to the conditions mentioned hereunder:

Minimum qualification.

26. Only persons who in passing the B. Sc. (Hons.) examination in the first chance have obtained 1st Class or show distinguished merit and are further prepared to undergo the entire course are eligible for research scholarships for the M. Sc. courses.

27. Section 26 shall also apply to the awards under Endowed research scholarships.

Value:

28. The monthly value of a research scholarship will be Rs. 30/- (10 months).

Tenure:

29. The research scholarships shall be awarded each year in July and shall be bonable till the 30th April following.

30. Sections 14 and 18 to 23 shall *mutatis mutandis* be followed in respect of the grant of research scholarships including endowed research scholarships.

31. Research Fellowships and Research Scholarships (Endowed and the University) shall be awarded on considerations of merit and poverty.

IV. STUDENTSHIPS.

Two classes.

32. The Syndicate shall award annually in the University Colleges two senior and two junior studentships in each of the following courses (Honours and Post-graduate): Provided, however, that 4 junior studentships in the B. Com. (Pass) course and 2 junior studentships in Geology (Pass) shall be awarded.

Value and tenure :

33. The senior studentships will be of the value of Rs. 20/- per month and the junior studentships of the value of Rs. 15/- per month payable for 9 months during the period July—March.

Qualifications :

34. Applicants for studentships shall possess the following minimum qualifications :

(a) *Pass courses -*

- (i) Geology :- Intermediate in the first chance with 15% in Part III preference being given to those that offered Natural Science subjects in the Intermediate.
- (ii) Commerce :- Intermediate in the first chance with 15% in Part III preference being given to those that offered commercial subjects in the Intermediate.

To whom preference given :

35. Preference will be given to students who, to the knowledge of the Vice-Chancellor, are financially badly off and so could not be expected to undergo the courses without this aid.

Once awarded ordinarily renewed :

36. A studentship once awarded will be renewed each year till the course for which it was originally awarded is completed, subject to the holder thereof proving himself to be worthy of it by his talents and progress and by his character and sense of discipline.

Not eligible for half-fee concession etc.

37. Holders of these studentships are not eligible for half fee concession; nor shall any University studentship be held in conjunction with any endowed studentship granted by the University.

But Research Fellowships, Research Scholarships and Studentships or other concessions may however be granted to students who are in receipt of monetary assistance from sources other than the University, provided that the total amount they thus receive does not exceed Rs. 40/- per mensem in the case of boys and Rs. 50/- per mensem in the case of girls; in case the total amount exceeds the maximum the amount of the studentship or the concession shall be reduced so as to bring the total to the maximum allowed.

38. Sections 18, 19, 21 shall *mutatis mutandis* be followed in respect of the grant of studentships including endowed studentships.

39. Except under extraordinarily special circumstances to be proved to the satisfaction of the Principal, no Studentship, Half-feeship or free residence or any other facility offered by the University will be continued if the recipient thereof fails at the University examinations or the terminal examinations held by the Colleges,

39-A. It shall be competent for the Syndicate to sanction at its discretion in the case of such of those students as are in receipt of Government Scholarship of Rs. 11/- per mensem, the difference in value of a Government Scholarship and a University Studentship, provided they are eligible for the award of a University Studentship. If in any year any endowment for the award of a Research Fellowship or Research Scholarship or Studentship cannot be utilized for the purpose for which it was endowed owing to the absence of qualified candidates, it shall be competent for the Syndicate to utilize the amount for the award of either of the categories without prejudice to the resumption of the award according to the original terms when qualified candidates become available, or the same category in another department of the same Faculty.

40. It shall be competent for the Vice-Chancellor to award a Research Fellowship or Research Scholarship or Studentship to candidates who become eligible for the award on the basis of merit. But in case their parents or guardians are able to provide them with education without such financial aid, the recipients of the same shall be declared as 'Honorary Fellows' or 'Honorary Scholars' or 'Honorary Students' as the case may be and the emoluments thereof shall be withheld and the moneys thus released may be utilised for award to the next in merit who is in needy circumstances.

41. Any student who has obtained any of the concessions under the rules governing the award of studentships etc. by means of a false certificate or by false representations of any kind or who has been found guilty of grave misconduct shall not only forfeit the concession awarded but may also be required to refund to the University the total amount which shall have been paid to him up to the date of such forfeiture in respect of the concession or benefaction.

42. Studentship-holders who receive amounts more than Rs. 180/- per year (including the studentships and any allowances that they may be paid) will be paid the amounts in excess of Rs. 180/- in July or August every year on their producing vouchers for the books or equipment purchased by them in consultation with the Heads of Departments.

43. Unsecured benefactions will be contingent on the grant being made each year by the bodies or persons concerned.

All questions to be decided by the Vice-Chancellor :

44. All questions arising out of the above rules and others not included in them shall be decided by the Vice-Chancellor and his decision shall be final.

II. PROFESSIONAL COLLEGES

4. Rajahmundry Government Training College

1. (a) *Historical Account*—

The beginnings are to be traced to the Elementary Normal School opened by the District Board, Godavari, in 1883, which seven years later was raised to the rank of a Secondary Grade Normal School, and after a lapse of two more years was taken over by the Government in 1892. With the opening of the L. T. Class in February 1894, approved by the Government on the recommendation of Dr. Duncan in G. O. No. 519. Educational, dated 18th July 1893, the school attained the status of a college, and was placed under the supervision of the Principal of the local Arts College. The Union High School, then transferred by the Private managers to the Government served as a Model School, and the High School classes with the L. T. and Secondary Training classes were held in the Arts College, while the lower departments worked in a rented building in the centre of Innespet. This arrangement continued till 1899, when on the completion of the present substantial building, the whole Training College, with the Model School, was removed to it. It then consisted of the L. T. Upper Secondary, Lower Secondary, and Primary Departments, with the Model School, which had only the forms from the first to the sixth. The Vice-Principal, an officer of the Provincial Educational Service, managed the work with a competent staff of teachers, under the superintendence of the Principal of the Arts College.

The Training College became fairly popular, and the L. T. Class numbered 17 in 1910. The outlay incurred on account of the College was, however, considered to far outstrip its usefulness, and on the proposal of Dr. Bourne, approved by the Government in G. O. No. 155. Education dated 15th March 1909, the L. T. Class was removed from Rajahmundry and amalgamated with the Teacher's College, Saidapet, in July 1911; when that College was enlarged and reorganised to train annually about one hundred graduates.

In 1914 the scheme of reorganization of the Higher Elementary Training Schools having come into force, the Higher and Lower Elementary Training classes were transferred to the jurisdiction of the Inspector of European and Training Schools, and were removed to a separate rented building.

The provision for the training of the Telugu graduates at Saidapet was soon felt to be inadequate, especially in view of the more pressing demands of the southern districts. The proposal (which had been under consideration for some time past) to reopen a Teachers' College for the Telugu districts at Rajahmundry was sanctioned by Government in G. O. No. 580 Educational dated 26th May 1916 but had to be postponed on financial grounds to the year 1917. The proposal was to train a batch of fifty graduates a year, and the Staff which should not be inferior to that of the Teachers' College, Saidapet, should include specialists in English, Mathematics, Science, History, and Geography. The College has now been placed under a separate Principal; and the institution is thus made quite independent of the Government Arts College.

The new Training College was opened on the 2nd July 1917, and since then about 2018 graduates have undergone training.

(b) *Management.*— The College is managed by the Madras Government under the control of the Director of Public Instruction, Madras.

II. *Endowments.*— There are no endowments belonging to the college department.

III. *Special subjects taught.*—

In the College Department all the students undergoing Secondary training as well as the students of the Mathematics, History and Geography sections of the B. Ed. class take a course in wood-work. For the B. Ed. Examination the students are prepared in special methods of teaching Mathematics, Physical Science, History and Geography.

IV. *Library.*— Library contains 15,105 volumes. The figure includes the volumes in the sectional libraries.

V. *Hostel Facilities.*— A hostel is attached to the College exclusively for the benefit of the B. Ed. students.

VI. *Sports.*— Hockey, Foot-ball, Badminton, Base-ball, Basket-ball, Ring Tennis, Tennis, Volley-ball, Cricket are played. There are two Tennis courts, a Badminton Court, a Volley ball court, a Ring tennis court, a Chedugudu court and a Cricket field.

5. Vizagapatam—The Andhra Medical College.

I. (a) 1. *Historical Account* :—In response to the request of the people of Telugu Districts, the Government of Madras decided in 1923 to establish a Medical College at Vizagapatam. The College was opened in July 1923 in the old Hospital Buildings.

2. Since then three new blocks of buildings were erected and a further extensive building programme has been undertaken.

* *Note.*—L: Lecturer; D. I.: Drawing Instructor; P. T. I.: Physical Training Instructor.

3. There is a large hospital to which students are attached during the three clinical years of the medical course. The Children's Ward and the extensions to the Maternity Ward have almost been completed. The completion of these two blocks will increase the bed strength of the Hospital from 432 to 531. Diseases of great incidence treated are beriberi, deficiency diseases, elephantiasis, cataract and chronic duodenal ulcers. There are also Tuberculosis, Venereal, Skin, Dental Orthopaedic and Ear, Nose, Throat departments attached to the Hospital where clinical instruction in the subjects is given to the students. The new Ebbien Outpatient Department with 60 Beds was opened by H. E. the Governor of Madras on 7-12-1940.

4. The Government of Madras have decided that the number of students admitted yearly shall be limited to 50 and that preference be given in selection to students from the Telugu Districts.

5. Graduates and undergraduates of this college are permitted to appear for the Primary F. R. C. S. Examination of England.

6. The M. B. B. S. & L. M. S. degrees have been recognised with retrospective effect by the All India Medical Council.

(b) *Management*:—The Government of the College is vested in the Principal of the College aided by a consultative council composed of all the Professors and Lecturers of the rank of civil surgeons and the Heads of departments of the college, subject to the General control of the Surgeon-General with the Government of Madras.

VI. *Sports*:—The Government have sanctioned a separate Sports Ground for the College. The ground is situated behind the Collector's Office. A Foot-ball field has been completed by the P. W. D. and handed over to this Department. A Physical Director was appointed to the College in September '40 and is in Charge of the Physical activities of this College. Intra-mural competitions are organized every year. There are facilities for Foot-ball, Hockey, Volley ball, Tennis, Cricket, Badminton and Gymnastics and there is a separate Ladies' Section. The Major Ebdon Memorial Cricket Tournament which is open to all Colleges in India is conducted annually.

III. FIRST GRADE COLLEGES**6. Cocanada - Pittapur Rajah's College.**

1. (a) *Historical Account*—Established in 1852 through the exertions of Mr. Prondergast, Collector, and Mr. Tulasinga Chettiar, his Sharnstadar, for imparting general education in English and Vernacular to pupils drawing from all sections of the community, the Institution gradually fell into a languishing condition in course of a decade but was given a fresh impetus in 1862 by Mr. Purvis, the then Collector and Mr. K. Jagannadham Pantulu, his deputy. It was endowed with a sum of Rs. 28,000 besides the grant of a spacious building site by the then Rajah of Pithapuram in 1866, in which year it first presented candidates for the Matriculation Examination under the name of Hindu High School. In 1884 it was raised to the status of a Second Grade College when it assumed the present designation of "Pittapur Rajah's College." It was under the management of a Council of 21 members for several years up to 3rd August 1909, when it was handed over to the present Maharajah of Pithapuram to be controlled by him as Trustee and Manager with a Committee of 7 comprised of elected and *ex-officio* members besides his own representatives. The College with the Secondary Department was finally transferred to the Maharajah as sole Proprietor at the beginning of the academic year 1926—27, when it was elevated by him to the First Grade. The Institution is thus a permanent charge on the Pithapuram Estate. Since its first transfer to his management, the Maharajah has given the College Rs. 45408-6-9 towards equipment and annual deficits.

(b) *Management* :—The Institution is managed by the Maharajah with the help of a Committee of three members nominated by him consisting of Sri P. Bhadrarayya garu, M.A., M.E.S., Divisional Inspector of Schools, Guntur, the Dewan of the Estate, and the Senior Lecturer in charge (*ex-officio*), the last named being also both Convener and Correspondent.

II. *Endowments*.—(a) CAPITAL. The unlikely contingency of the Estate declining the charge at any future time has been generously provided against by the Maharajah with an endowment of one and a half lakhs in 4 per cent debentures and an additional investment of Rs. 95,000 at 7 per cent.

Prizes are awarded for Proficiency in all subjects, Games, Sports and Races, besides special prizes for Good Conduct, and General Proficiency.

IV. *Library* --The Library consists of 12063 volumes.

V. *Hostel Facilities* :--There are two Hostels attached to the college, including one specially intended for girls. The Boarders pay only a part of the charges for medical attendance, messal service etc., the rest, including the supervision charges in full being met by the Management. The Room rent is Rs. 5 per term.

There is also a separate hostel "The Rammohun Student's Home" for Ahi-Andhra Boys. The management gives an Annual subsidy of Rs. 300/- and supervises its working.

VI. *Sports* :--Provision is made for Sports, Games and Gymnastics. Each student is required to pay a subscription of Rs. 6 per year to the Recreation Club, which organises Tennis, Foot-ball, Cricket, Hockey, Volley-ball, Playground-ball, Ring Tennis, Basket-ball, Athletics and Badminton. Separate provision is made for girls for Tennis, Ring Tennis, Basket-ball and Badminton. The Club has for its Managing Committee the Senior Lecturer in charge as *ex-officio* President, the Physical Instructor as *ex-officio* Secretary, and the captains of the different games and a girl representative as members.

7 Guntur—Andhra Christian College.

1. (a) *Historical Account*.—The Andhra Christian College is supported by the board of Foreign Mission of the United Lutheran Church in America which began work in Guntur district in 1842. It was in 1818 that the first English school of the Mission was opened in Guntur. Largely from lack of funds and from difficulties arising out of the American Civil War, the school was closed in 1863. In 1874 it was re-opened and organised as a High School under the Principalship of Rev. L. L. Uhl, Ph. D., D. D., and from this time the school steadily increased in numbers and influence. The first College class was organised in 1885 and the institution was affiliated to the Madras University as a Second Grade College in September of that year.

Through the energetic efforts of Dr. Uhl and friends in America, funds for the development of the College were secured and the Watts Memorial Building was erected and was occupied in 1893. Since 1893 the progress of the institution has been steady.

During the years 1916-18 the Mission authorities in America raised a sum of 1,70,000 dollars for the equipment and endowment of the college. With a part of this money the Uhl Memorial High School building was erected and the remaining monies invested as endowment.

During the years 1921-26 a sum of more than eight lakhs was secured for the further development of the institution. At the same time plans were formulated for the establishment of a United Mission College. As a first step in this direction the College was affiliated as a First Grade College in March 1926 and the High School was separated from the College.

The Andhra University Act came into force in April 1926 and the first B. A. class was admitted to the College in July following. This step inaugurated a new era in the life of the institution which in the following years rapidly won an outstanding place among the colleges of the new University. However the development of the College was delayed for almost 10 years owing to prolonged negotiations concerning the proposed establishment of a United Mission institution but in 1936 these proposals were given up and steps were taken to develop the college on its present site. In 1937 the District Munsif's court site was purchased to provide additional land for college purposes.

From July 1, 1937 by the merging of Noble College, Masulipatam, with the Andhra Christian College, the Church Missionary Society became a co-operating Body in the support of the institution and the long desired United Institution a reality.

During the years 1938-41 the College carried out an extensive building programme which provided a new Administration Building and an Assembly Hall and modern hostel accommodation for 150 students.

(b) *Management* - The management of the College is vested in the Council of the India Mission of the United Lutheran Church which appoints the Principal and the Bursar and sanctions the annual budget, but the Managing Committee of the institution is really the College Board whose membership is fixed by the bye-laws of the Mission Council. In the internal administration of the College the Principal is assisted by the Staff Council which consists of all the full-time lecturers on the college staff.

8. Masulipatam—Hindu College.

I. (a) *Historical Account:* The institution was founded on the 1st January 1856 by the distinguished South Indian Scholar and Statesman the late Sir Seshaiah Sastriar of revered memory, under the name of the Hindu Anglo-Vernacular school, primarily for the benefit of the Hindu community who then desired a good general education for their children free of any unfair interference with their religion from the missionary Christianity. In 1869 it developed into a High School and acquired the central block of buildings together with the extensive compound of 33 acres, thanks to the strenuous exertions of the then President Mr. Mungamuri Narasimham Pantulu. For over 60 years after this the Hindu High School, as the institution now came to be termed, ran a prosperous course under the stewardship of able Managers and eminent Headmasters until in July 1928 it was raised to the status of a Second Grade College by the united exertions of the Management of the old pupils and of the philanthropic public. The growing usefulness and popularity of the institution encouraged the Management to raise it to a First Grade College in July 1934.

Two new blocks and several Lecture rooms have since been added to accommodate the growing numbers in the College classes.

(b) *Management:* The College is under a Managing Committee, which administers the College, and its affiliated institutions. The Principal is an ex-officio member of the Committee. The following is the personnel of the Committee:—

9. Maharaja's College—Parlakimedi.

1. (a) *Historical Account*:—The institution has grown out of a primary grade school established in 1857 as the result of local effort. It was originally supported for some years from local subscriptions; but after a time the Court of Wards, on behalf of the Rajah of Parlakimedi, made a monthly grant of Rs. 70 towards its upkeep. In 1878 it became a Middle School; In 1884 a High School; and in 1896 it was raised to a Second Grade College and was affiliated to the Madras University. In 1890 the committee of Management was dissolved, when the Court of Wards handed over the administration of the Zamindari to the late Raja whose agent was till 1902, the sole Manager of the Institution. The Institution was afterwards directly managed by the Rajah at whose death in 1905 it was again placed along with the Zamindari under the management of the Court of Wards acting through its agent, the Collector of Ganjam. In April 1913 the Court of Wards handed over the administration of the Zamindari to the present Maha Rajah and the College is now under his management. It was raised to the status of a First Grade College in July 1936 in commemoration of the conferment of the title of "Maha Rajah on the Maha Rajah Sahib of Parlakimedi.

(b) *Management* :—The College is managed by a Governing Body consisting of the Maha Rajah Sahib of Parlakimedi, the Dewan of the Estate and the Principal. The following is the personnel of the Governing Body —

II. *Endowments*

(a) *Capital* :—The college is maintained as a direct charge upon the Samasthanam. Fees from the students and Government Grants form the sources of income. The Maha Rajah Sahib has with a view to create an endowment for the college purchased a village, called Rankini, which fetches an average net income of Rs. 500. The rest of the expenditure is met from the Samasthanam funds.

(b) *Scholarships etc.* :—There are four merit Prizes, two of Rs. 15 each and the other two of Rs. 20 each, granted to the students of the Intermediate and B. A. classes respectively who obtain the highest mark in the previous Annual Examination. There are also attached to the College two scholarships, one in the first year class and the other in the second year class, of the respective values of Rs. 6 and Rs. 8 per mensem granted from the Johnson Scholarship Fund which was formed from public subscriptions and is managed by the Ganjam District Board. One studentship called Sri Sri Sri Krishna Chandra Gajapathi Narayana Deo Maha Rajah Studentship of the monthly value of Rs. 12/- for 10 months in the year is granted to the student in the B. A. Junior class who has secured the highest number of marks in the Intermediate examination of the University. 26 free boardings are granted to the deserving students in the College classes from Sri Padmanabha Charity Fund. Some Free Helps are granted to the deserving students of the classes.

10. Rajahmundry Government Arts College.

I. (a) *Historical Account.*—The College was originally instituted as a Zilla School in 1853. In 1868 it was raised to the rank of the provincial school. It was raised to the standard of a Second Grade College in 1873. In 1877 it became a First Grade College. The High School classes were discontinued in 1885.

The College has provided instruction in the B. Sc. courses from July, 30 in Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry, both as main and subsidiary subjects.

(b) *Management.*—The college is maintained by Government.

II. *Endowments* :— (a) *Capital*—Nil.

(b) *Scholarships, etc.*—

(1) *The Subrahmanya Aiyar Prize.*—Capital Rs. 350. Given to the student who stands highest in English Language and Literature in the Annual Examination of the Third Year class.

(2) *The Sundara Rao Prize.*—Capital Rs. 250. Given to the student who stands highest in the Annual Examination of the 1st year class.

(3) *The Bhasikara Rao Prize.*—Capital Rs. 900. Awarded to the best essay in Telugu written by a student of the College on a subject selected by a committee appointed by the Principal.

(4) *The Young Scholarship.*—Capital Rs. 900. Awarded annually to the student of the II year University class of this College, adjudged by the administrators of the scholarship fund to be the best student of his class, who continues his studies in the Third Year University class of this College. It shall not be held with any other scholarship.

(5) *Poor Scholar's Fund Endowments Scholarship.*—Capital Rs. 3,000. Awarded annually to poor and deserving students in such proportions as may seem fit to the administrators (The principal and the Senior Lecturer of the College.)

(6) *The Muhammadan Scholarships.*—Capital Rs. 10,150. A limited number of scholarships for poor Muhammadan students. The monthly value of the scholarships ranges from Rs. 7 to Rs. 8.

(7) *The Dharwada Venkatakrishna Rao's Scholarship.*—Capital Rs. 1,000. Of the yearly value of Rs. 52, the scholarship is administered by the Principal and it is given to the most deserving and well behaved student of the third year class in the college. Tenable for two years, but may be forfeited if the scholar is not promoted to the fourth year class on other than medical grounds.

(8) *The Rajahmundry Coronation Durbar Endowment Medal.*—Capital Rs. 900. Awarded annually to the successful student in the B. A. Senior class of the College who obtains the highest number of marks in English in the B. A. degree Examination.

(9) *N. K. Venkatesam Sw. Mark. Hunters' Memorial Prize*.—Capital Rs. 400. This prize of the value of Rs. 15/- instituted by Mr. N. K. Venkatesam is awarded annually to the student of the Senior B. A. class who obtains the highest number of marks in English at the Selection Examination. The prize is awarded in the shape of books.

(10) *The Fazlullah Scholarship*. Capital Rs. 1,500. The scholarship is of the yearly value of Rs. 60. It is awarded to a Moslem student of the B. Sc. class or B. A. class with Science or Economics as an optional subject who in the opinion of the administrators deserves the same and who cannot without such financial help prosecute his studies. The scholarship is tenable for such period as may be necessary to enable the student to complete the course of studies in which he is engaged. In case the student fails in the examination in any one year the scholarship may be extended for one more year provided there is no other student eligible to receive the same. This scholarship cannot be held along with any other scholarship.

(11) *Metcalf Memorial Scholarship Fund*.—Capital Rs. 700. Awarded annually to poor deserving students of the Arts College, Rajahmundry in such proportions as may seem fit to the administrators—the Principal and the Senior Lecturer for the time being of the Government Arts College, Rajahmundry.

11. Vizianagaram - Maharajah's College.

I. (a) *Historical Account.* The institution was founded in 1857 by Sir Vizaramaraj, Maha Rajah of Vizianagaram. He made it a High School in 1868 and a Second Grade College in 1879. His son, Sir Ananda Raja raised its standard to that of the B A. in 1883.

(b) *Management.*—The Government of the College is at present vested in the Court of Wards. There is a College Council consisting of the Chief Lecturers of the College, which considers questions of internal management such as holidays, promotions, etc.

11. *Endowments.*—(a) *Capital*—There are no capital endowments.

(b) *Scholarships, Medals, etc.*—

(1) Six scholarships of the annual value of Rs. 106 each are awarded to students of the Junior B. A. Class on the results of the Intermediate Examination. They are continued in the IV year class also provided the conduct and progress of the students are satisfactory.

(2) One scholarship of value varying from Rs. 36 to 18 per annum founded to perpetuate the memory of the late Mr. C. Chandrasekhara Sastri, first Principal of the College, is awarded to a deserving student of the Junior Intermediate Class. This also is continued in the II year class if the student's conduct and progress are satisfactory.

(3) Two scholarships of the annual value of Rs. 84 each are awarded to students of the Junior Intermediate Class on the results of the School Final Examination. These are continued in the Senior Intermediate Class if the conduct and progress of the students are satisfactory.

(4) Six freeships are awarded to poor and deserving students of the College Classes.

(5) One scholarship named after Sree Rama Sastri Garu, former Telugu pandit in the college and founded by Mr. Maremanda Narasanga Rao of Warangal, an old student of the college, is awarded to the student of the Junior Intermediate class, who having been a student of the Maha Rajah's High School, obtains the highest number of marks in the S. S. L. C. Examination.

Medals.—(1) Two gold medals endowed by Rajah Sir Surj Bux Singh Jee Rajah Sahib of Kasmanda and named after him are given yearly to two students of the College who distinguish themselves in the B. A. Examination.

(2) Two gold medals named after the late Dr. Quina, who was once Superintendent of the Maha Rajah's Hospital in Vizianagaram, are awarded, one to the best student in the Mathematics group and the other to the best student in the History group of the Intermediate Class, on the result of the Intermediate Examination subject to certain conditions.

IV. SECOND GRADE COLLEGES.

12. Berhampore--Khallikote College.

1. (a) *Historical Account.*—The Berhampore Zillah School was established in 1856 and the college department was opened in February 1878. The College was until the middle of 1888 a Government institution. It was then transferred to a Committee, and was reaffiliated under the name of the "Native College," Berhampore. In 1893 the name was again changed to the "Khallikote College" in honour of the Rajah of Khallikote who has since endowed it liberally. It is maintained by Government grant and income from fees and endowments.

(b) *Management.*—The College is managed by a Committee of twelve members of which the President is the Sri Rajah Sahib of Khallikote and Atagada and Vice-President is Mr. Lingaraj Panigrahi, B. A. B. L.

13. **S. R. R. College - Bezwada.**

(a) *Historical Account*.—The College owes its origin to the fondness for spread of education and the philanthropy of Sri Rajah Rangayya Appa Rao, First Zamindar of Vuyyur Estate, Nuzvid.

In accordance with his intentions and in perpetuation of his memory, the idea of starting a College at Bezwada has long been in consideration by the present Zamindar, Sri Raja Venkatadri Appa Rao Bahadur. He applied for permission to start the Sri Rajah Rangayya Appa Rao College and the authorities of the Andhra University were kind enough to accord sanction for the affiliation of the same.

I. (a) *Historical Account*:—The institution was founded by the late Mr. S. Narayanaswami Chetty, B. A., Dewan of Venkatagiri, in 1875. When it experienced financial stress, the late Maharajah of Venkatagiri came to its rescue in 1896 and it has progressed ever since. The institution has borne the name of its patron since 1895. In fulfilment of the promise made by his father, and to commemorate his name, the present Maharajah has raised the High School to the status of a College, and has undertaken to equip and maintain it from the funds of the estate. The College department was formally opened by the Maharajah on July 2, 1920.

(b) *Management*:—The College is managed by a Committee, the strength of which is fourteen. The Maharajah of Venkatagiri has four representatives on it while the old students of the institution have four, two Brahmins & two non-Brahmins. The Principal is an *ex-officio* member.

16. Vizagapatam -Mrs. A. V. N. College.

1. (a) *Historical Account* -The institution, which was founded in 1859 by Sir Alexander Grant, Inspector of Schools, Mr. E. Fane, Collector of Vizagapatam, the Maharajah G. N. Gajapathi Rao and Mr. Chandika Venkataswami Naidu, was originally called "The Anglo Vernacular School" but on its being raised to the status of a Second Grade College and affiliated to the University of Madras, in July 1878, the name was changed to the "Hindu College". In 1892 the late Mr. A. V. Narasinga Rao of Vizagapatam bequeathed a lakh of Rupees (besides a building fund of Rs. 15,000) for a College to be named "The Mrs. A. V. Narasinga Rao College, Vizagapatam". The Managing Committee of the latter College took over the Hindu College on April 1, 1899, as a basis on which to construct the Mrs. Ankitam Venkata Narasinga Rao College. The funds of the College are lodged in the Government Treasury at Vizagapatam.

The hostel is managed by a Committee subject to the control of the management of the College. In the management of the Hostel the Principal is assisted by Warden who shall stand in *loco parentis* to all students resident and by a committee composed of the Warden and two lecturers of the College department to be nominated by the Principal annually. The Warden resides in the quarters provided for him in the College premises.

VI. *Sports*.—Tennis, Foot-ball, Badminton, Hockey, Volley-ball, Base-ball and Basket-ball are played. The College has a *pucca* Foot-ball and Hockey field just adjacent to the college building. A trained Physical Director has been appointed to supervise the athletic activities of the boys.

I. (a) *Historical Account* :— The College was founded in July 1923 by Mr. S. T. G. Varadachary, M. A. (Hons.) in memory of his late revered father Sriman S. T. G. Narasimhacharyulu Garu.

II. *Endowments* :—The College is maintained out of the income from the permanent fund that is being raised at present. The fund stands now at Rs. 18,000.

III. *Subjects in which recognised* :—Bhasha Praveena—Telugu and Sanskrit, Vidya Praveena—Vyakarana and Sahitya, Proficiency course—Comparative Philology. There is also an advanced section, preparing students for the Sanskrit Entrance Examination conducted by Government.

IV. *Library* :—The institution possesses a decent library bearing on several branches of Sanskrit literature, Telugu and the researches of Western Scholars. Provision is made for adding to it annually.

V. *Hostel Facilities* :—All students are provided with free lodging. There is a boarding house attached to the institution which contains three sections, namely (1) Smartha (2) Vaishnavite, and (3) Non-Brahmin. Boarders in each section cook their food by turns, and manage their own sections. The supervision of students outside class hours is done by the Principal and the other members of the staff who are also provided with quarters. A few students are provided with free-boarding by the Principal himself.

18. Guntur --Sarada Niketanam.

1. (a) *Historical Account* :- This institution was founded by Mr. V. Lakshminarayana, Bar-at-Law and Srimati V. Lakshmi Bayamma in the year 1922 with the help of local public. It is established for the purpose of imparting higher education for women on national lines. Shortly after a boarding house has been opened for the benefit of mofussil pupils. The institution is being run with the help of donations by the generous public. Ever since the establishment of the Institution, Telugu and Sanskrit are made compulsory subjects while English and Hindi are made optionals. Besides these subjects, Fine Arts and Industries are taught.

In 1933, the institution made a beginning to send up pupils to Vidwan B Course of the Madras University.

In July 1936, the Syndicate of the Andhra University was pleased to grant temporary recognition as a special grade oriental college offering instruction in Bhasha Praveena course of study. In July 1939 the recognition was made permanent.

The College has a secondary department which prepares pupils for the Entrance Test to the Bhasha Praveena course and has been recognised by the Superintendent of Sanskrit Schools, Madras.

II. *Endowments*:—The institution owns 70 acres of land. A part of it has been brought under wet cultivation with good results. A free gift of Rs. 5,000/- was made by late Kota Lakshmaiah Nayudu in 1937. Attempts are being made to add monies to the permanent fund. The other sources are the monthly and the annual subscriptions.

III. *Subjects in which recognised*:—Bhasha praveena Sanskrit and Telugu.

IV. *Library*: A pucca building has been recently constructed for the Library, by Messrs P. H. Gupta, Bar-at-law & Masetty Hanumanthu Rao at a cost of Rs. 2500/- There are about 3,500 volumes in the Library in different languages—Sanskrit, Telugu, English and Hindi. Additions are being made to the Library every year.

V. *Hostel Facilities*. The institution has a boarding house which is free to a large extent. There are about 60 boarders in it. There is a kitchen and

a spacious dining hall. A storied building to serve as quarters to pupils was built by Mr. K. Nageswara Rao and other charitable gentlemen at a cost of Rs. 10,000/- A wide deep well was constructed by Mr. M. Sambasiva Rao at a cost of Rs. 1000/- Recently a tiled house for the sick to live in has been completed at a cost of Rs. 1,500/- by the daughters of Mr. T. Seetha Ramaiah. P. Mallaiiah Garu has constructed a temple at a cost of Rs. 1,500. Mr. N. Seetha Ramaiah, B. A., B. L., has installed the idol of Sarala in it.

The institution is located in one of the healthy extensions of Brodipet, Guntur. The area of the site is 10,000 sq. yards. The whole site is a free gift of Rajah Sahib of Munagala. The whole site with all the buildings raised, is rented out for the Andhra University Hostel at the request of the Registrar, Andhra University. The college is, at present, shifted into the new sheds constructed on the site which is quite opposite to the old site and buildings of Sarda Niketanam and has been recently purchased by the Managements.

19. Koyvur—S. V. J. Sanskrit College.

I. (a) *Historical Account*.—The Andhra Geervana Vidyapitham was founded on the banks of the Godavari by the late Mr. Tallapragada Suryanarayana Rao, Pleader, Koyvur, on the 20th October 1912 for resuscitating Oriental literature and Culture and for promoting research work therein as well as for

fair and impartial criticism of the present theological beliefs and customs of the Hindus in the light of their ancient books. In this Vidyapitham, a Sanskrit College was established which since April 1932, goes by the name of "Sri Vadrevu Jogayamma Sanskrit College" after the name of the donor who gave a permanent annual donation of the interest on Rs. 20,000 to this Vidyapitham.

The College is situated very near the Railway Station in buildings of its own, consisting of the main building, boarding house and three minor buildings for Pandits, constructed at a cost of Rs. 25,000. The College premises is nearly 5 acres in extent. The institution has at present lands about 50 acres in extent that fetch an annual income of Rs. 1000. There are two temples attached to the institution, one dedicated to Siva, and the other to Vishnu. The College did not function during 35—36 and hence the recognition was withdrawn. The University renewed the recognition from 1938—39.

Besides the University courses the College has the following courses and classes: (1) "Ayurveda Bhishak" course of All India Ayurveda Mahamandali, (2) Smartha course in Yajusha Karmakanda. (3) Hindi courses of Dakshina Bharat Hindi Prachar Sabha, Madras, (4) Entrance Test to Bhasha Praveena of Andhra University (5) Government Entrance, and (6) Lower Classes in Sanskrit.

(b) *Management*:—The Vidyapitham and its College are under the management of a Committee registered under Act XXI of 1860. The Committee consists of 8 permanent members and 6 temporary members.

II. *Endowments*:—The late Mr. Valluri Suryanarayana Rao, B. A., B. L. & L. T., Advocate, Kovvur, the former secretary, gave a permanent donation of Rs. 70,000 to the Vidyapitham both for publication of books and for meeting the principal's salary from its income. Mr. Garapati Ramachandriah and Mr. Tallapragada Ramachandra Rao executed registered deeds creating charge on their landed properties for Rs. 100 each per annum in favour of the Vidyapitham and have thus enrolled themselves as permanent members of the Committee. So also Mr. Dronamraju Venkatachalam gifted the whole of his father's library consisting of books on Vedas and Sastras valued at Rs. 2,000 to the Vidyapitham and also land about acres 5 in extent for the improvement of the library and thus became a permanent member of the Committee.

III. *Subjects in which the College is Recognised*:—Bhasha Praveena-Sanskrit, Telugu.

IV. *Library*:—The library consists of about 1100 Sanskrit books, 1000 Telugu books, 460 English books and 70 Hindi books.

V. *Hostel Facilities*:—The College is conducted on residential lines and all the Pandits and the students reside in the College premises alone. Quarters are provided to the staff. Students are given free lodging.

20. Nellore—Sanskrit College.

1 (a) *Historical Account :—*The Institution has been in existence of over 49 years. It was first started in the year 1891 with the help of private subscriptions with one teacher for teaching Sanskrit Kavyas, and another to teach Yajurveda. After a time some donations were collected. The late Ayalur Venkayya Pantulu Garu made an endowment from which a small monthly income was ensured. This was supplemented by other local subscriptions and donations. The Pathasala was registered in the year 1926, under the Act XXI of 1860. In the year 1925 application was made to the Madras University for the recognition of the institution for the Siromani course in Vyakarana and Sahitya groups and the Syndicate accorded its sanction for the same

(b) *Management* :—The institution is managed by a committee consisting of nine members with M. R. Ry. S. Venkatasubba Rao Pantulu Garu, B. A., B. L. Retired Sub-Judge as President. The principal is an ex-officio member of the committee.

In addition, 3 Non-Brahmin students and 2 Brahmin students were given stipends

anging from Rs. 3 to 4 per month. Sri T. B. Salasivam, Accountant-general, Burma (on leave) has been maintaining one boarder from 1940 - 41.

These students live in the premises under the direct supervision of the Principal and four other teachers who live in the premises in buildings constructed for their use. Three other buildings have been put up to serve as students' quarters, one by Mr. Manakur Bahamani Reddi, one by Mr. Bodireddi Ranga Reddi at a cost of Rs. 1,200 and Rs. 4,000 respectively, and the third building by Mr. Chetarvedula Sriramulu.

Three rooms have been built by Mr. Bodireddi Ranga Reddi at a cost of Rs. 1,200 for the sick students to live in.

The main building of the college with a Saraswati temple has been built by the late Mr. B. Ranga Reddi at a cost of Rs. 12,000.

21. Rajahmundry—Andhra Women's Sanskrit College.

I. (a) *Historical Account:—*Sriyūta Nalam Ramalingayya Garu of Cocanada founded the Vysya Seva Sadanam in 1920, an institution for the educational and cultural advancement of women and girls and endowed the institution with land yielding an annual income of Rs. 4,000/- and a sum of Rs. 50,000 for acquiring a suitable building. The College is the educational branch of the Seva Sadanam. To-day situated in its own beautiful building and extensive premises, the institution has on its rolls over a hundred and fifty girls and young women.

The institution fulfils two needs: the need of the young girls for education and the need of the helpless young women for sympathy and support. While it imparts therefore education having a cultural value, it also provides for vocational course such as would enable young women to earn an independent living. The subjects taught are literary courses in Telugu, Sanskrit, English and Hindi beside Arithmetic, History, Geography, Elementary Science, Music, (Veena, Harmonium, Violin and Flute) garment making, embroidery, needle work, fretwork, free-hand drawing and painting.

The institution has been recognised both by the Andhra University and the Director of Public Instruction, Madras. Since this is the first recognised College preparing ladies for the Oriental Title Examination, the management hopes the young women all over the Andhra Desa will take advantage of the College in large numbers.

(b) *Management:—*The College is managed by the President (Founder) with the help of an Advisory Committee. The governing body consists of 15 persons and the association managing the College is registered under Act XXI-1860. The governing body now consists of

II. *Endowments.*—A sum of Rs 15,000 is earmarked for the College from out of the funds of the Seva Sadanam the income from which is spent for the College and the deficit is met from the funds of the Seva Sadanam.

III. *Subjects in which recognised.*—Bhasha Praveena, Sanskrit and Telugu. Coaches students for the B. P. Entrance Test instituted by the University.

IV. *Library.*—The Library of Seva Sadan which is well furnished with books on several branches of Telugu and Sanskrit Literature and the Reading room with Telugu Magazines and News Papers is placed at the disposal of the students of the College.

V. *Hostel Facilities.*—All the students of the College coming from the mofussil are given free lodging in the Seva Sadan and some poor girls are given free boarding also. The Principal of the College is also the resident Superintendent of the hostel.

VI. *Sports.*—Students are encouraged to take active part in games such as Ring-Tennis, Badminton, Ping-Pong, Nrityam, Drill and Swimming.

VII. *Strength, Rates of Fees etc.*—Women and girls are given free education in the College and free lodging in the hostel. No school fees are charged from the students.

23. *Vizianagaram—Maharajah's Sanskrit College.*

I. (a) *Historical Account:*—The institution was founded by Sir Vijayarama Gajapati Raj K. C. S. I., Maharaja of Vizianagaram in 1860. The Maharaja also opened about the same time a boarding house for the benefit of the students of

the Sanskrit School. After his death, his successors, Maharaja Sir Ananda Gajapati Raj, G. C. I, E. and Sir Vijayarama Gajapati Raj continued to maintain the college on the original lines.

In 1900 the college was affiliated to the Government Sanskrit College, Benares and the students were sent up for the first time for its examinations in 1901.

When the Madras University instituted Oriental Titles Examination, the College was approved for the Vyakarna and Nyaya Branches of the Siromani Examination and Sanskrit and Telugu of the Vidwan. The College was sending up students for the Oriental Title Examinations from 1915. It was subsequently approved for the Mimamsa and Sahitya branches of the Siromani and also for the Certificate of Proficiency in Indian Philosophy and Indo-European Philology. Since 1926, when the Andhra University was established, the College has come under the jurisdiction of the University.

The College has a Secondary Department consisting of the Elementary and Advanced classes in which students are coached for the Government Sanskrit Entrance Examination. It has also a Vedic Department attached to it in which provision is made for teaching the Rig-Veda as well as the Yajur-Veda.

(b) *Management*:—The institution is maintained by the Maharaja Sahib of Vizianagarain.

III. *Subjects in which recognised*:—

Bhasha Praveena—Sanskrit and Telugu.

Vidya Praveena—Mimamsa, Nyaya, Vyakarana and Sahitya.

IV. *Library*:—There are 5109 volumes in the College Library. These are in different languages: Sanskrit, Telugu and English. Additions are made to the Library every year.

V. *Hostel Facilities*:—There is a Free Boarding house attached to the Sanskrit College and some of these that are not free-boarders are provided with stipends in lieu of free boarding. Most of the students live in the out-house of the College. Site round the main building of the College have been acquired for the construction of a Hostel.

VI. *Sports*:—Students play at Indian Games, Badminton and Volley-ball.
