EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

for the year ended 31st March 1967.

The Council has pleasure in presenting its 18th Annual Report for the year ended 31st March 1967, in accordance with the provisions of Section 18(5) of the Chartered Accountants Act, 1949.

I. THE COUNCIL

A. PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT

Shri R. Thakur (New Delhi), who was the Vice President in the preceding year, was elected President by the Council at its meeting held on the 12th, 13th & 14th September 1966. At the same meeting, Shri V. B. Haribakti (Bombay) was elected as the Vice-President.

B. MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL AND ITS VARIOUS COMMITTEES

The names of the members of the Council and its various Standing and other Committees constituted under Section 17 of the Act, are given in Appendix I(A) & (B).

C. COUNCIL AND COMMITTEE MEETINGS

During the year, the Council held its meeting on two occasions, the first from 12th to 14th September 1966 and the second on 21st & 22nd March 1967. Details of the meetings held by the various Committees are given in Appendix I(C).

II. FINANCES

(a) *Accounts*: The Balance Sheet as at 31st March 1967 and the Income & Expenditure Account for the year ended on that day, duly audited, are appended at the end of this Report. The Income & Expenditure Account for the year shows an excess of income over expenditure amounting to Rs. 64,273 as against excess of expenditure over income of Rs. 20,193 in the previous year. These accounts include the accounts of the Regional Councils and their branches and the Students' Associations and their branches.

(b) *Auditors*: Sarvashri P. R. Mehra and M. R. Venkataraman continued to be the Auditors of Institute's accounts for the year ended 31st March 1967.

III. PROFESSIONAL MATTERS

A. PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The suggestions made at the All India Conference of Accountants held at Jaipur in January 1967, regarding

steps to be taken to provide industrial training to students during the course of their articles were considered by the Council and it was decided that though experience had shown that those articulated clerks who had opted for industrial training had certainly benefited industrial training could not be substituted for training under articles. However, it was felt necessary to give a more practical bias to the system of training and examination and to revise the syllabi in such a manner that for passing the examination, it would be necessary to have adequate practical experience both in industrial and commercial accounting and audit practice. The appropriate Committees of the Council are examining these suggestions.

For creating greater opportunities of work for the members, it has been decided to give publicity to the variety of assignments which a chartered accountant can handle and also to revise the booklet "Do you know what a Chartered Accountant does?" in a suitable manner for circulation amongst the various Chambers of Commerce, Industrial Houses etc. The booklet is under revision and will draw attention to the services which a chartered accountant can render both in employment as well as in practice. If possible, a Hindi edition of the booklet may also be published.

The Professional Development Committee issued during the year a booklet "Staff Training Programme."

Ways and means of strengthening professional knowledge of the members in the field of auditing, to enable them to keep their knowledge up-to-date on the latest developments in auditing techniques with particular reference to modern methods of business control, data-processing and modern concept of the auditor's responsibility *vis-a-vis* public and private sector companies etc. are under consideration.

The various forms of audit reports and certificates which chartered accountants are required to sign and certify during the course of their professional work are being analysed critically. After the study is completed it is intended to approach the authorities concerned for effecting such modification or revision of the forms of reports/certificates, as may be found necessary to remove the attendant difficulties.

B. RESEARCH

During the year, the following Notes were issued in the Members' Hand-Book series:

- (i) Note on Devaluation prepared jointly by the Research Committee and the Taxation Committee.
- (ii) Statement on Treatment of Gratuity in Accounts.

These notes were published for the guidance of members and supplied free of charge.

For the guidance of members a short note reminding them to keep in view, during the course of audit, certain provisions of the Companies Act which were sometimes overlooked was also published in the October 1966 issue of the Institute's Journal.

Apart from the notice for guidance of members, representations were also made to the Government regarding certain legal aspects of Devaluation. The Government have accepted most of the suggestions made by the institute and necessary amendments to the Income-tax Act have been incorporated in the Finance Act 1967.

Similarly, the views of the Institute on the treatment of Retirement Gratuity in Accounts were also conveyed to the Government on the basis of the Statement issued for the guidance of members.

The Central Government also sought the views and suggestions of the Institute in respect of the following matters :

(i) Preparation of a Vertical form of Balance Sheet to be considered for insertion in Schedule VI of the Companies Act, 1956.

(ii) Treatment of Depreciation on Fixed Assets used during Construction period.

Notes regarding both these matters are expected to be finalised shortly. Regarding the latter, the Research Committee has undertaken the preparation of a comprehensive note on the treatment of Expenditure during Construction Period which is in an advanced stage of preparation by the Sub-Committee appointed for the purpose.

A note for the guidance of members regarding qualifications in auditors' reports is also getting ready and will be issued shortly. This note has been prepared on the basis of a large number of qualified audit reports which had been collected from the offices of the Registrars of Companies at different places.

The Research Committee has decided to publish some of its studies in the form of Research Studies as distinct from the notes for the guidance of members. In pursuance of this policy, the following studies are being prepared :

- (i) Payment of Bonus Act
- (ii) Price Fixation (in collaboration with the Indian Merchants' Chamber)
- (iii) Bank Accounts and Audit
- (iv) Valuation of Shares

Regarding the Research Study on Comparative Taxation prepared in association with the Association of Indian Trade and Industry, the Research Committee regrets that it has not so far been possible to publish it.

The following new projects were also taken up by the Research Committee during the year :

- (i) Preparation of a note on contingent liabilities.
- (ii) Preparation of a brief note on auditors' reliance on internal control, together with a suitable bibliography.
- (iii) Preparation of a note on Standards of Independence in the conduct of audit of companies.
- (iv) Recommendations on the subject of fall in the purchasing power of the Rupee and the replacement of fixed assets.

It has also been decided that the Statement on Auditing Practices issued by the Institute should be revised in keeping with the latest developments and the suggestions received from the members on the original Statement.

Under the scheme of financial assistance for research work, a grant of Rs. 1,000 was sanctioned for a Research Study on "Integrated System of Cost and Financial Accounts." Two studies on "Internal Auditing—An aid to Management" and "Comparative Review of Audit Reports" prepared under this scheme are under the consideration of the Research Committee.

An important event during the year was the visit of Mr. H. G. C. Nanninga, an I.L.O. Expert on Inter-firm Comparisons for Management, to India. The Research Committee took full advantage of his visit and the officers of the Research Department were associated with his work during his stay at Bombay for about 3 weeks. The Committee would like to record its gratitude to Mr. Nanninga, for this gesture. The Research Committee has decided that the officers should acquire sufficient theoretical and practical know-how in this field before

any steps are taken for the establishment of an independent Centre for Inter-firm Comparisons for Management.

During the year, a Deputy Director of Research and a Research Officer were appointed in the Research Department of the Institute.

C. POST-GRADUATE COURSE

The Post-Graduate Course Committee carried out several activities for promoting the interest of members in the subject of Management Accounting.

The first Residential Course on "Accounting System for Productivity" was held at the Administrative Staff College of India, Hyderabad, from 22nd August to 2nd September 1966. The Course was primarily intended for practising chartered accountants and was devoted particularly to the subject of designing, installing and operating an integrated accounting system for the purposes of communication and control. The Course was attended by 32 participants.

The Second Residential Course on Profitability Accounting was also held in collaboration with the Administrative Staff College, Hyderabad, from 3rd to 9th January 1967. This Course was attended by 48 Participants.

In order to increase the awareness among the public about the significant contribution accountants can make in improving efficiency and productivity and with a view to obtaining closer association with the Productivity Movement in the Country, in addition to the usual programmes of arranging Seminars, Courses etc., several articles were published in the Journal under the special section on "Accountant and Productivity" and special programmes were arranged in different parts of the country. Details of the programmes arranged upto March 1966 were given in the last report. During the period under report, the following programmes were arranged :

1. An Inter-City Meeting of chartered accountants was arranged at Bhopal. The principal theme was "Accountant's Role in National Productivity" and discussions were held on different topics under this subject.
2. A symposium on Accountant's Role in increasing Productivity was arranged by the Northern India Regional Council at New Delhi. Shri S. G. Barve, Member, Planning Commission, inaugurated the Symposium and Dr. P. S. Lokanathan, Director General, National Council of Applied Economic Research was the Principal Speaker.

The Institute collaborated with the National Productivity Council in making a survey of Management Accounting Practices in medium and small size Undertakings. The team of experts appointed for making this survey has visited various industrial organisations throughout the Country and its report is expected to be finalised very shortly.

The particulars about number of members who appeared and were declared successful at the May and November 1966 Management Accounting Examinations are given in Appendix II.

Twenty-two members are engaged in practical training for Part II of the Course. In the preparation of their thesis, they are being guided by the top executives from Industry.

With a view to making the Course popular and more attractive, it has been decided that the practical training under Part II may also be allowed to be undergone in professional firms of chartered accountants fulfilling certain basic requirements and would be recognised in the case of both partners and employee chartered accountants of the firm.

The syllabus for the Post-Graduate Course on "Secretaryship and Management" has been finalised and referred to Government for obtaining its approval and the matter is under consideration of the Government.

It has been decided to award the "R. Rajagopalan prize" in the form of a Gold Medal to the best candidate completing both Groups of the Examination under Part I of the Course at one sitting commencing from the November 1967 examination. The value of the prize would be Rs. 200.

It has been decided that the members of the Institute on completing both Parts of the Course should be allowed to use the description "D.M.A." after their names. To implement this decision, paragraph 1(2) of Schedule 'C' to the Chartered Accountants Regulations, 1964, is being amended. The amendment has been referred to the Government and is awaiting their approval.

D. TAXATION

The Institute submitted a pre-budget memorandum to the Hon'ble Deputy Prime Minister and Finance Minister, Government of India, on 28th March 1967. After the budget for the year 1966-67 was presented to Parliament, a preliminary representation on the Finance (No. 2) Bill, 1967, was also submitted to the Deputy Prime Minister and Finance Minister on 29th May 1967. Personal representation were also made to the Hon'ble Deputy Prime Minister and Finance Minister on 23rd June 1967 followed up by submission of a detailed memorandum.

The draft of "A Guide to Tax Practice" intended primarily for educating assistants and staff in the offices of chartered accountants in the details of taxation practice is under finalisation for publication.

In the last report it had been mentioned that the Taxation Committee had under its consideration the issue of a paper on "Taxation of Salaries". On a further consideration of the cost involved in bringing out the publication and its utility, the Committee has decided to drop the project.

A representation was made to the Central Board of Direct Taxes with a view to ensuring that there was no unauthorised search of the offices or residences of chartered accountants. This representation arose out of a case where an Income-tax Inspector searched the office as well as residence of a practising member of the Institute and took away an inventory of the books of his clients available in the office and an inventory of the almirahs available at the residence.

Particulars of the more important representations made by the Taxation Committee to the authorities during the year are given below :—

1. Representation regarding the modification in the qualifications of accountants for acting as valuers under the Estate Duty Act.
2. Representation regarding rate of depreciation allowance.
3. Representation with a view to ensuring that there was no unauthorised search of the offices or residences of members.

E. EXPERT ADVISORY SERVICE

It was mentioned in the last report that one of the queries referred to Expert Advisory Committee was pending. During the year under report, 10 further queries were referred to the Committee. Out of the total 11 queries, 6 have been answered, 3 are under consideration, one was withdrawn by the querist and one was not considered suitable for being answered by the Committee.

F. EMPLOYMENT COMMITTEE

There has been an increasing demand from trade and industry for employing members of the Institute. A list of candidates who secured first 25 ranks in the Final

Examination of the Institute was sent to important industrial and business concerns with a view to assisting them in securing the services of talented persons for their organisations. The successful candidates in the Final Examination were also informed of the assistance provided by the Institute in the matter of securing employment.

The total number of members on the Employment Register on 31st March 1967 was 95 as against 450 on 31st March 1966. During the year under report, recommendations were made to 17 concerns for employment of chartered accountants. There were 4 more organisations to whom no recommendations could be made as the pay scales offered by them were very low.

A survey conducted revealed that by and large there was no problem of unemployment as such among the members of the profession and it was only one of seeking better employment.

To further improve the employment prospects of chartered accountants and to educate the public about the types of services rendered by them, an attractive pamphlet "Why don't you employ a Chartered Accountant" containing information about the functions performed by chartered accountants and the advantages that could be derived by employing them in their organisations, has been circulated amongst the medium and small sized business houses.

The service of cutting Newspaper advertisements relating to employment of chartered accountants for display on the notice boards of Regional Councils was started in the Eastern India Region. This service having proved successful has now been extended to the Southern India Region also. Further, the prospective employers, who generally advertise in the newspapers, are being approached to seek the Institute's assistance for employment of chartered accountants and also to insert their advertisements in the Institute's Journal.

G. AD HOC COMMITTEE FOR DEALING WITH UNJUSTIFIABLE REMOVAL OF AUDITORS

During the year, no complaint was received by the Committee.

H. PRIZE-PAPER COMPETITION

A Prize-paper Competition on "Audited Financial Statements—Scope of Function" was organised through the Institute's Journal. The paper submitted by Shri N. Krishnaswamy, A.C.A., of Nepal Industrial Corporation, Kathmandu, was adjudged the best and he was awarded the prize of Rs. 500/- in the form of Books. The article of Shri Krishnaswamy has been published in the November 1966 issue of the Journal.

I. JOURNAL OF THE INSTITUTE—"THE CHARTERED ACCOUNTANT"

During the year Shri M. P. Chitale, F.C.A., Bombay, was the Editor-in-chief.

Steps were taken to improve the quality of the Journal by publication of articles on a wider variety of subjects and addition of special features.

The circulation of the Journal increased from 10,000 to 11,000 copies per month.

IV. OTHER MATTERS

A. THE CHARTERED ACCOUNTANTS ACT AND REGULATIONS

(a) The Chartered Accountants Act.

It was mentioned in the last report that the Government had been requested to amend the Chartered Accountants Act to provide for the President continuing in office after the expiry of his term in a case where the Council for any reason does not meet and a new President is not elected in time.

Government have accepted the proposal in principle and an amendment would be made in the Act in due course.

(b) The Chartered Accountants Regulations.

The Government have accepted in principle for placing a time-limit on entertaining complaints against members of the Institute for misconduct where more than 10 years have elapsed except in cases involving moral turpitude where no time-limit shall be placed. Amendments in the Regulations to give effect to this decision will be introduced shortly.

The following are the more important amendments in the Chartered Accountants Regulations made during the year :

1. The regional councils shall be self-supporting and apart from the grant-in-aid that may be given to them, they shall not borrow or obtain credit without the prior sanction of the Council. (Notification No. 1-CA(10)/66 dated 20th July 1966).
2. (a) Provision for accounts of the Regional Councils being maintained by them, being audited by auditors appointed by the Regional Constituencies and for their being passed at their annual general meetings.
(b) Provision for there being only one meeting of the Regional Constituency instead of two and the date for such meeting being advanced to a date between 15th May and 15th June every year so as to give sufficient time for the incorporation of the accounts of the regional councils in the accounts of the Council. (Notification No. 1-CA(8)/1/66 dated 31st August 1966).
3. Providing that with effect from 1st January 1967, the students shall send one application in duplicate to the Institute's secretariat and to discontinue separate registrations of practical training and that for purposes of postal tuition, in the interest of the convenience of students and in order to avoid delays. Notification No. 1-CA(14)/66 dated 22nd December 1966).

and

4. Changes in election regulations.

B. JOINT COMMITTEE ON THE FUTURE OF THE ACCOUNTANCY PROFESSION IN INDIA

Members have already been informed through "The Chartered Accountant" issue for October, 1966 about the communication received from the Government of India referring to the discussions in the United Kingdom regarding the future, scope and structure of Accountancy, profession there, the suggestions received from various quarters regarding the unification of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India and the Institute of Cost and Works Accountants of India, as also the desirability of having an unified profession of Accountancy with all the facets thereof, coming within the purview of an integrated body. Government had suggested that the two Institutes, namely the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India and the Institute of Cost and Works Accountants of India, might set up a Committee for

considering the question of the reorganisation of the set up of the profession in this country for imparting training in the related subjects and for regulating the Accountancy profession. According to the Government communication, the Committee to be so set up is expected to make its recommendations regarding the various issues, the most important of which is the scope and structure of the Accountancy profession in India. The Committee was also expected to consider the question of the necessity or otherwise of continuing the two Institutions in their present form and other related matters.

The Government communication was considered by the Councils of the two Institutes and a Joint Committee comprising of 12 members from each Council, was constituted. The names of members of the Committee are given in Appendix III. Shri G. P. Kapadia, the First President of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India was elected as the Chairman and Shri C. Balakrishnan was appointed as the Secretary to the Committee. The Committee has completed its deliberations.

C. HISTORY OF THE ACCOUNTANCY PROFESSION

The work in this connection had to be suspended as Shri G. P. Kapadia, who had kindly undertaken this assignment, has been busy with the deliberations of the Joint Committee on the Future of the Accountancy Profession in India as its Chairman.

D. ELECTIONS

The Supreme Court in its Judgment of 13th December 1966 has upheld the validity of Council's Notification No. 1-CA(34)/64 dated 22nd February 1964 whereby the Council had prohibited (1) issuing manifestoes or circulars; (2) canvassing votes by visiting places of business or residence of the voters or in any other manner; and (3) organising parties to entertain voters.

At its meeting held in March 1967, the Council took into consideration observations of the Supreme Court and the various representations received in the matter and after a review of the various suggestions made and after considering all the aspects relating to the matter, the Council resolved that the restriction contained in Clause (2) relating to the canvassing of votes by visiting places of business or residence of the voters or in any other manner, need not be retained. A notification was accordingly issued (No. 1-CA(18)/67 dated 27th March 1967) in supersession of the previous notifications.

Copies of the notification were circulated to members of the Institute with an appeal from the President that even though the restriction on canvassing had been deleted the Council expects that the members would refrain from all such practices as might undermine the honour and dignity of the profession.

E. NOMINEES OF THE COUNCIL ON OTHER BODIES

F. LIBRARY

During the year 850 books were added to the Central Council Library at New Delhi, bringing the total number of books to 6,634. Increasing use of the Library was made by members and students, which can be seen from the figures given below :—

According to the decision of the Council, books are being sent by post to the members who are preparing for the Post Graduate Course in Management Accounting Examination and residing outside Delhi. In addition, there are 480 books on Management Accounting in the Regional Council Libraries for the use of members, who are preparing for the Management Accounting Examination.

G. COMMITTEE ON HINDI EQUIVALENTS

The Council had appointed a Committee for evolving equivalents in Hindi for Accountancy expressions so that they could be of use to members in preparing accounts.

The Committee proposes to publish in the Journal the translations of the Balance Sheet and Profit & Loss Accounts containing Hindi equivalents of the Accountancy expressions and inviting members to send their comments thereon.

H. BENEVOLENT FUND

During the year, the membership of the Fund increased from 129 to 138 and the assets from Rs. 30,421/- to Rs. 55,675/-. The increase principally is the result of the Charity Show organised at Bombay which brought in Rs. 17,503.

During the year, 2 more applications for financial assistance were received and a sum of Rs. 1300/- was disbursed. At present allowances aggregating to Rs. 3,100/- are being paid to 4 persons.

I. S. VAIDYANATH AIYAR MEMORIAL FUND**Scholarships**

During the year, five scholarships of Rs. 50/- each tenable for one year were granted; two for payment to articled clerks serving in the Central India Region and three to those serving in the Northern India Region.

Memorial Lecture

A Memorial Lecture was organised by the Southern India Regional Council on 16th February, 1967 on the subject "Return on Capital in a Developing Economy". The speaker was Shri R. S. Bhat, Chairman, Unit Trust of India.

Charity Show

The Fund received a sum of Rs. 5,834.50P. as its one fourth share out of the net proceeds of the Charity Show organised in Bombay in September, 1966.

Funds

The assets of the Fund at the close of the year were Rs. 19,938 61 as compared to Rs. 16,012.20 as at the end of the previous year.

V. CONFERENCES**A. ALL INDIA CONFERENCE OF ACCOUNTANTS**

The Council is happy to report the successful conduct of the All India Conference of Accountants which was held at Jaipur from 27th January to 29th January 1967 jointly with the Institute of Cost and Works Accountants of India. This was the first All India Conference of chartered accountants and cost and works accountants.

The Conference received good response from accountants both in practice and in service. Particulars of the attendance are given below .

The Conference was inaugurated by Dr. C. D. Deshmukh. A brief summary of the important events of the conference was published in the Institute's Journal for February 1967.

The Council wishes to place on record its appreciation of the help rendered by the members and students of the Central India Region in making the Conference a success.

B. NINTH INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF ACCOUNTANTS

Information about the Council's intention to send a delegation to the Ninth International Congress of Accountants held in Paris from 6th to 12th September 1967 has already been published in the last report.

The President of the Institute has been chosen as the leader of the delegation.

C. INVITATION TO THE TENTH INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF ACCOUNTANTS

It was decided to extend an invitation for the Tenth International Congress of Accountants to meet in New Delhi in 1972.

D. FIFTH CONFERENCE OF ASIAN & PACIFIC ACCOUNTANTS

An invitation was received from the President of the Fifth Conference of Asian & Pacific Accountants which is to be held in New Zealand from 13th to 17th February 1968 for sending a delegation to the Conference.

The Council has accepted the invitation and has decided to send a delegation.

On the invitation of the organisers, a paper on the following subjects has been submitted to the conference authorities by Mr. J. Anderson, a member of the Council :

"Accounting as an aid to Management".

VI. REGIONAL COUNCILS**A. REGIONAL COUNCILS**

Regional Councils continued to function in five regional constituencies viz., Western (Bombay), Southern (Madras), Eastern (Calcutta), Central (Kanpur) and Northern (Delhi).

In the Western India Region, several study circle meetings were held during November and December, 1966.

A new well-equipped library, at the Regional Council building was inaugurated by Shri M. P. Chitale on 17th August, 1966.

A meeting was arranged with Shri S. Ranganathan, Comptroller and Auditor General of India, on 30th December, 1966 at the Indian Merchants Chamber Hall. A seminar on inter-firm comparison for management was also organised on 17th and 18th February, 1967.

Amongst the notable events in Southern India Region was a Seminar on Machine Accounting held on 18th August, 1966 with the assistance of the L.B.M. World Trade Corporation, Madras. The third Regional Seminar on Taxation was inaugurated by Shri M. Bakthavatsalam, the then Chief Minister of Madras on 10th December, 1966. A meeting was held on 2nd January, 1967 which was addressed by Hon'ble Shri G. S. Pathak, the then Minister of Law, Government of India and Shri C. R. Pattabhi Raman, the then Deputy Minister of Law, Government of India.

Members of the Eastern India Regional Council met Hon'ble Shri G. S. Pathak, Law Minister, Government of India at a Lunch on 15th July, 1966 at the Calcutta Club. The Regional Council also organised a symposium on "Audit of Public Sector Undertakings" from 25th to 27th February 1967. This was inaugurated by Shri S. Ranganathan, Comptroller and Auditor General of India.

In the Central India Region, a meeting of the chartered accountants from various cities of that region was sponsored during April, 1966. The principal theme of the meeting was "Accountant's Role in the National Productivity".

The Northern India Regional Council formed a Research Committee to conduct research on "Budgeting and Budgetary Control in Engineering Industry".

B. BRANCHES OF REGIONAL COUNCILS

Four branches in Southern India Region *viz.*, Bangalore, Coimbatore, Hyderabad and Madurai and two in Western India Region *viz.* Ahmedabad and Poona also continued to function.

A three day seminar on "Management Accounting" was held at Ahmedabad from 15th to 17th December, 1966. The Seminar was inaugurated by Hon'ble Shri Utsavbhai Parikh, Minister of Industries, Gujarat State.

A lecture on "Profitability Accounting" by Shri B. N. Pardiwalla was organised on 18th February 1967 by the Poona Branch of the Western India Regional Council. Other branches also held some lectures and study circle meetings in their respective cities.

VII. MEMBERS

A. MEMBERSHIP CHANGES

The number of members of the Institute on 31st March, 1967 was 7987—an increase of 655 since 31st March, 1966. During the year, 167 Associates were enrolled as Fellows compared to 168 in the previous year. A table showing the number of members on 31st March, 1967, compared to the number on 31st March, 1966, is given as Appendix IV.

B. LIST OF MEMBERS

The list of members as on 1st April, 1967 has been published and copies have been supplied on request to the members.

It has been decided that in future letters indicating the membership or qualification of overseas professional bodies which admit members wholly on the basis of training and written tests approved by the Council, may be published in the list of members against the names of members.

C. RECOGNITION OF FOREIGN QUALIFICATIONS

The Council has amended its resolution under Section 4(1)(v) of the Chartered Accountants Act (published

as Appendix No. (5) to the Chartered Accountants Act) to include the name of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia, as one of the bodies whose membership is recognised for purposes of enrolment in the case of those who are permanent residents of India.

D. MEMBERSHIP OF OTHER ASSOCIATIONS

The Council has decided that, as a matter of general policy, members of the Institute might be permitted to become members of various associations so long as the provisions of the Chartered Accountants Act and the Regulations framed thereunder are not infringed, particularly those relating to the Code of Conduct which members were expected to observe and more particularly those relating to advertising and canvassing for professional work.

E. DISCIPLINARY ACTION

Details of the findings of the Council in the Cases referred by it for enquiry to the Disciplinary Committee under Regulation 11(8)(i) since last report are given in Appendix V.

F. PROFESSIONAL ETHICS

The Council decided to issue the following statements which were published in "The Chartered Accountant".

(a) Charging of Premium under the new Regulations. (June & July 1966).

"Attention of the members in practice is invited to Regulation 31 of the Chartered Accountants Regulations which prescribed that no premium shall be charged or be payable in the case of articulated clerks entering into service on or after the 18th day of July 1964. This provision is being specifically brought to the attention of the members so as to remove any misconception that there may be in their minds on this subject. The charging of premium is now completely prohibited under the Regulations and any member doing so will render himself liable for disciplinary action under Section 21 read with clause (i) of Part II of the Second Schedule to the Chartered Accountants Act, 1949."

(b) Advertisements in the public press (February 1967).

"Recently instances have come to the notice of the Council where members advertise in the public press for the post of internal auditor, for income-tax, sales-tax and secretarial work. In this connection the attention of members is drawn to the following directive issued by the Council and published in the booklet "Code of Conduct" (Page 24, September 1966 edition) :

"An advertisement for a part-time Directorship, part-time secretarial work or any part-time work in the field of work undertaken by practising accountants, would essentially be an offer of professional services and therefore would offend against the unwritten rule. The only exception is that a member may properly advertise in the professional accountancy press an offer of his part-time services to a practising accountant. It is important that the wording of the advertisement should be abundantly clear in this respect."

VIII. AWARD FOR THE

BEST PRESENTED ACCOUNTS

During the year, 106 entries, as compared to 159 in the previous year, were received for the award for best presented accounts.

The Shield Panel did not consider, for the purpose of award of the Institute's Shield for the best Annual Report and Accounts for the year 1964-65, the Reports received from companies which had been awarded the Shield in earlier years, as, in the opinion of the Panel, while they had maintained the standard already attained in the past, there was no substantial improvement in the Reports and Accounts submitted by them this year. The Panel did not consider that any of the Annual Reports

and Accounts submitted by the other entrants had attained the standard expected for the award of the Shield. Therefore no award of the Shield was made for the year 1964-65. The Reports and Accounts of the undermentioned companies were highly commended, but as in the past, their ranking 'inter se' was not fixed :—

1. The Dunlop Rubber Co. (India) Ltd. for the year ended 31st December 1964.
2. The Ramond Woollen Mills Ltd. for the year ended 31st December 1964.

The above companies were awarded plaques.

IX. ARTICLED AND AUDIT CLERKS

A. FRESH ENROLMENTS

The numbers of articled and audit clerks registered during the year, compared to those registered in the previous year, are given below :—

B. CHANGE IN THE PROCEDURE FOR REGISTRATION WITH EFFECT FROM 1ST JANUARY, 1967.

The articled and audit clerks hitherto were required (1) to register with the Coaching Board for the postal tuition within 10 days of the commencement of their training and (2) to register their service with the Institute's office within 30 days of the commencement. To avoid this duplication of work and to add convenience to all concerned in the matter, the Council has decided that with effect from 1st January, 1967, there shall be only one registration for the purpose. The application form is to be sent in duplicate so as to reach the Institute's office within 15 days of the commencement of the training.

The Chartered Accountants Regulations have been suitably amended.

C. PAYMENT OF STIPEND

The Council decided to issue the following recommendation to the members regarding payment of stipends to their articled clerks. This was published in August 1966 issue of the Journal :

"With a view to bringing in larger number of young men of the requisite calibre and high educational qualifications into the profession, the Special Committee for revising the system of training and examination had recommended that articled clerks should be paid stipends by the principals.

It is felt that, for attracting better talents to the profession, it is essential that articled clerks should be paid stipends. The Council, therefore, strongly recommends that all members of the Institute who are training articled clerks should pay them stipends. It is sincerely hoped that this suggestion would be implemented by the members."

D. INDUSTRIAL TRAINING

The numbers of the articled and audit clerks undergoing industrial training on 31st March, 1967 as against those who were undergoing such training on 31st March, 1966, are given below :

E. ALL INDIA STUDENTS' CONFERENCE AT NEW DELHI.

The All India Students' Conference scheduled to be held in December, 1966 at New Delhi was postponed due to the All India Conference of Accountants held in January, 1967 at Jaipur. It has now been decided that the Conference may be held towards the end of 1967.

F. STUDENTS' ASSOCIATIONS AND THEIR BRANCHES

The students Associations and their branches were very active during the year. They held conferences, study lectures meetings, symposia etc. and arranged matches, industrial visits and picnics.

G. COACHING BOARD

Registration

During the year under report, 2,432 students were enrolled for the Intermediate Course as against 2,053 in the previous year also 1,703 students commenced tuition for the Final Examination as against 763 in the previous year. The increase in the enrolment which had taken place in the previous years and was maintained during the year under review also had an impact on the number of students appearing for the Examinations of the Institute. Complete details in this regard are contained in Appendix VI.

Revision Classes

The popularity of Revision Classes continued to increase; both the number of students who attended the classes and the number of places in the country at which these were held were greater as compared to those in the previous year. Special Oral Courses for sub-standard students, both for the Intermediate and Final Examinations were also announced, but could not be held since the number of students who offered to join them was not sufficient.

Library facilities

During the year the scheme for establishing small libraries for use of students in towns where there is a concentration of 50 or more articled or audit clerks was completed. There are at present such libraries in eleven towns in addition to those at the Regional headquarters. Further the stock of books in the libraries at the Regional headquarters is being increased from time to time.

Merit and Loan Scholarships Scheme

Under this scheme only nine Merit Scholarships were awarded during the year on the basis of the examinations held in May and November, 1966. since one candidate who had qualified for it was already receiving a scholarship from the Government of India.

During the year only eighteen articled clerks applied for Loan Scholarships and out of them scholarships were awarded to eleven.

H. REVIEWING COMMITTEE

During the year the working of the Coaching Board was reviewed by a Committee set up by the Council. Its principal recommendations were :

(a) that the student's should be given the option to answer 25% of the total number of test papers comprised in their Programmes of Studies;

(b) that when the performance of a student is found to be unsatisfactory, the student may be required to answer all the optional test papers and even more;

(c) that the student who completes the required percentage of papers prescribed by the Committee, two months before the date of the examination should be issued a certificate showing that he has satisfactorily completed the course of tuition for being attached to his application for permission to sit for the examination;

(d) that the cadre of Tutors be expanded so that a greater number of students' answer papers can be examined internally;

(e) that the Chartered Accountants Regulations be amended to dispense with the necessity of students having to enrol separately with the Coaching Board;

(f) that Special Revision Courses should be organised for the benefit of students who repeatedly keep on failing at the examinations of the Institute; and

(g) that the publication of Suggested Answers should be expedited.

Appropriate action on these recommendations has been taken.

X. EXAMINATIONS

A. EXAMINATION IN 1966

Examinations as usual were held in May and November, 1966 at various centres all over India. The statistics regarding the number of candidates who appeared and those who declared successful are given in Appendix VII.

B. PRIZES AND CERTIFICATES OF MERIT

Names of candidates who were awarded prizes and Certificates of Merit in these examinations are included in Appendix VIII.

As mentioned in the last report, another award in the form of a Gold Medal to be called "G. Basu Foundation Award for the best student of the year" has been instituted with effect from the year 1966. The candidate fulfilling the following conditions will be eligible for the award :—

- (i) Candidates appearing in both groups of the Final Examination held twice in a financial year.
- (ii) The candidate passing in both the Groups of the Final Examination at one sitting.
- (iii) the candidate obtaining the highest number of marks in the aggregate in the Final Examination; and
- (iv) in case more than one candidate obtains the same aggregate, the following further factors will be taken into consideration in making the selection :—
 - (a) the marks obtained at the Intermediate Chartered Accountants Examination;
 - (b) the marks obtained at the Degree Examination; and
 - (c) the time taken for passing the Final Examination after completion of the Intermediate Chartered Accountants Examination.

The first recipient of this award would be Shri Anand Kishore Rathi, Roll No. 419 of the Final Examination held in November 1966.

C. STOCK-PILING OF QUESTIONS

The Council has decided to stock-pile model questions based on practical situations encountered by the members of the Institute in their professional life, to test the knowledge of students appearing in Institute's Examinations.

XI. CHARTERED ACCOUNTANTS IN LEGISLATURE

The Council is happy to record here the election of the following members to the Lok Sabha and the State Legislative Assemblies.

Shri Narayan Dandekar—elected to the Lok Sabha from the Jamnagar Constituency in Gujarat.

Shri Swatantra Singh Kothari—elected to the Lok Sabha from Mandasaur Constituency in Madhya Pradesh.

Shri Narendrakumar Prasadrao Salve—elected to the Lok Sabha from the Betul Constituency in Madhya Pradesh.

Shri Dattatray Keshav Rajarshi—elected to the Maharashtra State Assembly.

Shri Krisbnadas Bhattacharjee—elected to the Tripura Legislative Assembly and a Minister holding the portfolios of Finance & Education.

Shri Pukhraj Kalani—elected to the Rajasthan State Assembly.

APPENDIX V

Disciplinary Action against members

Finding of the Council

Wrongful retention of books of accounts etc. on termination of appointment and disclosure of information acquired in the course of professional engagement without the consent of the client.

A member was found guilty of "other misconduct" for having retained the books of accounts and documents and failed to hand them over to the clients regardless of their repeated requests. He was also found guilty of professional misconduct under clause (1) of Part I of the Second Schedule to the Act for having disclosed to the Income Tax Officer information acquired in the course of his professional engagement without the con-

sent of his clients. The Council had recommended to the High Court removal of his name for a period of three months. The High Court accepted the findings of the Council on both the charges and ordered removal of his name for one month.

Extortion of money from articled clerk apart from premium.

A member was found guilty of professional misconduct for having taken money from an articled clerk and retained it as his fee outside the articles. The Council had recommended to the High Court removal of his name for a period of three years. Being the first case of the kind coming before that particular High Court and apart from this incident nothing had been heard against the member and in view of the offer made by him to pay off the amount without delay, the High Court held that it would be sufficient if his name was removed for a period of six months.

Causing delay in the finalisation of the Profit & Loss Account and the Balance Sheet.

A member was found guilty of professional misconduct for having delayed the finalisation of the Profit & Loss Account and the Balance Sheet by raising several queries and writing several letters to his clients with a view to making them agree to an enhanced audit fee which the clients were not prepared to accede to. The Council had recommended to the High Court removal of his name for a period of one year. The High Court held that though the evidence on the record did not clearly prove that the member was guilty of misconduct by raising several queries and writing several letters to his clients with the object of securing agreement to an enhanced audit fee to which the clients were not agreeable, nevertheless, the Court was fully satisfied that he had been extremely negligent and careless in not attaching due importance expected of a professional man to the factor of delay in the matter of preparation of the Profit & Loss Account and the Balance Sheet of his clients. On this view of the matter the High Court held that in the circumstances of the case it would serve the ends of justice if the member was reprimanded.

Failure to return the money obtained by way of premium for articled clerkship.

A member was found guilty of professional misconduct for having obtained the money by way of premium of articled clerkship and failed to return it when it was found that he had no vacancy, in spite of several demands. The Council had recommended to the High Court removal of his name for one year. The High Court however, finding the punishment proposed by the Council not commensurate with the nature of the offence reprimanded him and directed him to pay the costs.

Soliciting professional work by means of letters

A member was found guilty of professional misconduct under clause (6) of Part I of the First Schedule to the Act for having written several letters to the Co-operative Department asking for allotment of audit work to his firms. In terms of Section 21(4) of the Act, the Council after considering his written representation reprimanded him.

I. Before the agenda was taken up, the Vice-Chancellor referred to the sad deaths of Dr. Gopi Chand Bhargava and Principal A. R. Khanna, who were formerly distinguished members of the Senate.

Paying tributes to the late Dr. Gopi Chand Bhargava, the Vice-Chancellor said that Dr. Bhargava was a distinguished alumnus of the Panjab University, having graduated in Medicine in the year 1912 at Lahore. As the first Chief Minister of the Panjab State, Dr. Bhargava was responsible to a large extent for the rehabilitation of not only the East Panjab State but also of the East Panjab University. In spite of considerable difficulties, Dr. Bhargava set the East Panjab University on its feet. In the year 1960, the Panjab University conferred on Dr. Bhargava the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws in recognition of the remarkable service he rendered to the Panjab State and the Panjab University.

Referring to the services rendered by the late Principal A. R. Khanna to the Panjab University, the Vice-Chancellor stated that Principal Khanna was connected with the Panjab University in many ways, firstly as Professor at Government College, Lahore, and later as Principal of Government College, Ludhiana. After retiring from government service, Principal Khanna headed a number of affiliated colleges. Principal Khanna, he said, was a sportsman to the core and was connected with the sports activities of this University, first as Vice-President and later as President of the Panjab University Sports Committee. Principal Khanna's sporting spirit reflected in all what he did. He was very genuine, transparent and upright.

The Senate placed on record their deep sense of grief and sorrow and paid homage to the departed souls, all standing in their seats for two minutes.

(Para 4, 18-3-1967)

Introducing the budget estimates for 1967-68, as recommended by the Syndicate, the Vice-Chancellor said that he wished to make a few observations. He said that the current year's budget had worked well, on the whole. While the deficit was estimated at Rs. 16 lacs, the actual expenditure had showed that deficit had been reduced to Rs. 3 lacs. He mentioned that in the budget for the next year, an expenditure of about Rs. 8 lacs was being provided for various measures towards the welfare of University employees. Mentioning a few of these measures, the Vice-Chancellor said that the pay-scales recommended by the Kothari Education Commission were being given to the University teachers also, though this decision could not be implemented so far, as the final decisions of the State Governments were still awaited. As the members were aware, 80 per cent of the expenditure on this account would be met by the Central Government, but the balance of 20 per cent has to be given by the State Governments. He drew attention to his remarks at the Finance Board meeting that even though the State Governments introduced the new pay-scales from 1-11-1966 (this was because the new States were set up as a result of reorganisation from this date), the University should stick to their previous decision to introduce the new pay-scales with effect from April 1, 1966. The Syndicate had further recommended that if the necessary sanction from the governments were not received during the current year, the provision made for this purpose should be carried on to the next year. In regard to the college teachers, the University had unanimously decided that they should also be given the same pay-scales as recommended by the Kothari Education Commission. He hoped that the State Governments will give their approval soon. The Vice-Chancellor also mentioned the threats given by the college teachers for boycotting the University examinations. He said that he had appealed to the teachers not to take any such steps as were likely to disrupt the life in the State and jeopardise the interests of students and work of the University. He hoped that the examinations would be held in the normal way and the teachers would eventually abandon the proposed boycott of the examination. In regard to the future of the University, the Vice-Chancellor stated that it will continue to serve the State of the Punjab, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh and the Union Territory of Chandigarh. The situation was a little peculiar in that none of these States owned the Panjab University. According to the Reorganisation Act, however, the Central Government has to determine the grants to be given to the Panjab University by the four States. The Central Government does not take responsibility for giving any grants to the Panjab University, as according to the Reorganisation Act

they have only to determine the amount to be given by these States. The finances of the Panjab University, he said, were linked up with the conduct of the Matriculation and Higher Secondary examinations and when changes are made to set up Higher Secondary Education Boards, the Panjab University would have to be adequately compensated for the loss of revenue on account of these examinations. During the next, however, the Panjab University will continue to function as previously, and the budget for the next year had been prepared accordingly. With these words he asked the members to discuss the budget proposals.

Shri Virendra, opening the discussion on the budget, remarked that the income shown in the budget on account of grants from the States may not come and so the final picture of the budget as presented may not be correct. He said that the position of the Panjab University was rather strange in that while it was under the Central Government, no financial responsibility had been taken by that government. He was of the opinion that certain items included in the budget appeared to him to be superfluous and, therefore, should be deleted. One such item was the new post of Director of the Department of Laws. There was already a post of a Professor who was Head of this Department and if the present incumbent was not competent, he should be removed. He felt that all surplus and unnecessary expenditure included in the budget should be deleted.

The Vice-Chancellor read out relevant provision in the Reorganisation Act which gave full authority to the Central Government to determine the grants payable to the Panjab University by the States, namely Panjab, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh and the Union Territory of Chandigarh. He added that the Central Government had determined the grants and had sent necessary instructions to the respective States for payment of the grants as included in the budget proposals.

Prof. D. C. Sharma remarked that the budget, as presented to the Syndicate, was a welfare budget. This University, he said, was a welfare institution in many ways including the employees from class IV to the top. Referring to the remarks that none of the States owned up the Panjab University, Prof. D. C. Sharma said that the Central Government had already determined and written to the States and the Union Territory of Chandigarh to give grants to the Panjab University. When the Panjab University was started in 1947, it was quite small, and its growth can be well imagined if the budget figures for that year were compared with the present figures; the budget has risen from 34 lacs to 2.62 crores. He said that no power on earth could topple the Panjab University. If the States do not give any grants, the Central Government would have to take over control of this University, so that the finances did not suffer. He was sure that the Central Government would ultimately become foster-parent of this University. Striking an optimistic note, Prof. D. C. Sharma said that the Panjab University was the pride not only of the United Panjab, but also of the whole country because people from all over the world come here and paid glowing tributes to its campus and the teachers. The Panjab University would continue to grow and flourish and maintain its welfare character. With these words, he proposed that the budget proposals, as recommended by the Syndicate, be approved.

Principal B. L. Kapur remarked that during the current year there had been considerable student unrest in the whole of the country. He asked whether it was not worth while to arrange a Seminar to consider the problem. Kohari Education Commission, he said, had recommended that the students may be given an opportunity to come on to the University bodies. That, he thought, might be considered too radical by conservative people. Drawing attention to the fact that students paid to the University about Rs. 1.53 crores by way of examinations fees, etc., Principal Kapur asked whether the

Panjab University was doing anything for the students. These point, he said, would be considered in the Principals' Conference. He also thought that the rules relating to eligibility of students to appear in the University examinations needed revision. He suggested that the University should adjust itself to the present circumstances and try to do its best for the students. Agreeing with Shri Virendra, he said, that the income from the examination fees might be soon considerably reduced when the Panjab and Kurukshetra Universities assumed affiliating powers. Therefore, unnecessary expenditure should be cut down. He, too, felt that the proposed post of Director of Department of Laws was unnecessary.

Prof. O. P. Sharma, congratulating the Vice-Chancellor on the proposed budget, agreed with Prof. D. C. Sharma that the recommendations of the Syndicate be approved. The budget, he said, was pragmatic, realistic and dynamic. The Panjab University was a growing and expanding institution. Referring to the feeling that the Panjab University had lost belongingness, Prof. O. P. Sharma said that there was no control over these things. He proposed that the recommendations of the Syndicate in regard to the budget proposals be accepted.

Principal O. P. Dogra said that while approving the budget, the University should think of income also and not only expenditure. The bigness of an institution should not be determined by the size of its expenditure. He suggested that it was not necessary to create the post of Dean of Student Welfare and also the Director, Department of Laws. He felt that small units of the preliminary law classes might be set up in different towns and the students should come to Chandigarh for the final year of the LL.B course. He also felt that the Evening Colleges were not very useful. He thought that the regular Colleges could start evening classes also. He was even opposed to the Regional Post-Graduate Centres. He was, however, in favour of raising the rate of examiners' fees. If it entailed considerable expenditure the budget could be scrutinised to reduce other items of expenditure.

Shri Kanwar Lal Sharma asked the house to scrutinise the budget with a view to see what was desirable and what was wrong and not to describe the budget with unnecessary adjectives. The Panjab University should strive to be known by its products and not merely by the pay-scales, etc. of its teachers and other staff. He strongly felt that a good University should use all its resources towards producing better quality of graduates even though their number may be small. The University should also look into the causes of student unrest in the country. He emphasised that these were the things to which the University should pay more attention. He wanted to know the necessity for the proposed post of Director of Department of Laws.

Shri Ram Chandra congratulated the Vice-Chancellor for the deficit budget. He congratulated because he noted with satisfaction that the Vice-Chancellor had volunteered at the Finance Board meeting to cut down the additional demands in order to balance the budget, as much as possible. Another reason why he was happy over the budget was that a provision of about Rs. 8 lacs had been made for the workers of the University. He felt gratified on this account, because the success of a University depended upon the satisfaction and the way in which the colleagues of the Vice-Chancellor performed their duties. He agreed with the suggestion made by a member of the house that the rate of remuneration of examiners should be increased. This, too, was necessary because of the high cost of living and necessities of life. The consideration that it would cost the University a good deal should not stand in the way. He urged that the commitments made in regard to the salaries of University teachers should be implemented. He did not understand why the State Governments had not so far agreed to provide necessary funds. He agreed with Prof. D. C. Sharma that no power on earth could topple down

the Panjab University, though he felt that its shape and character was bound to change. Referring to the provision in the Reorganisation Act empowering the Central Government to determine the grants to be paid by the States to the Panjab University, Shri Ram Chandra feared that the amounts of such grants will be affected when the affiliating powers are given to the Panjabi and Kurukshetra Universities. Referring to the proposed provision for the post of Director of Department of Laws, Shri Ram Chandra said that no reasons had been given either by the Syndicate or by the Board of Finance, although there might be good reasons for this provision. He, however, remarked that provision for such a post in the Department of Laws might lead to similar demands from other Departments. He, therefore, requested the Vice-Chancellor to give reasons for the necessity of this post.

Principal P. L. Anand, congratulating the Vice-Chancellor on the budget, said that provision for the welfare of the University teachers and administrative staff was being made for the first time. It was a matter of gratification to see these provisions inspite of the fact that the budget was a deficit one. The various measures for the welfare of the employees included house rent to temporary employees, medical assistance, Chandigarh Compensatory Allowance for certain categories of staff and fee concessions for such employees as were studying in the University Colleges and Departments. The fee concessions alone were worth about Rs. 30,000. For all these provisions, any University could be rightly proud. He, however, drew attention to the necessity for raising the pay-scales of Instructors. He was sorry that even the Kothari Education Commission Report did not contain any reference to this category of teachers. He urged that the pay-scales of Instructors should be upgraded as in Delhi University where after two years' service they are placed in the lecturer's grade. He also suggested that for recruitment of Instructors, the Principals of the Evening Colleges concerned should be associated with the committees.

Principal Jagjit Singh, referring to the undue pessimism on the one hand and unbounded optimism on the other, displayed by certain members, remarked that a realistic assessment of the future of the University should be made in the light of the present political situation. He, however, felt that there was no reason to be unduly alarmed at the uncertainty of the future of this magnificent University. He felt sure that a great institution like the Panjab University could not be toppled down by any power. If at any time there was any danger, it would be when its teachers lost their faith in their mission as educators of the young people entrusted to their care.

Shri K. L. Sethi, congratulated the Vice-Chancellor on the manner in which he had managed the affairs of the University. The fact that the deficit had been reduced showed that all expenditure had been carefully scrutinised. While in the past the University had been indulging in some useless expenditure, the budget for the next year showed that the future of the University was quite safe in the hands of the Vice-Chancellor. He, however, remarked that he would be happier if a larger provision was made for the welfare of students. He felt that the appointment of Dean of Student Welfare was not enough, and the University should have a wider and comprehensive programme for students' activities. Referring to student indiscipline, Shri K. L. Sethi remarked that it was much less in the Panjab University as compared with other Universities in the country. He thought that a politician was responsible for student indiscipline as much as a teacher, if not more. It was well known that certain parties had exploited the students. Referring to the opposition on the part of certain members in regard to the proposal for creation of the post of Director of Department of Laws, Shri Sethi said that when the proposal first came, he also felt that the post was not necessary, but it was not correct to compare the Department

of Laws with other Departments. While the other Departments had post-graduate classes and the number of students was easily manageable, the Department of Laws had three classes consisting of more than 1,000 students. The Director was, therefore, very much needed. With these words, he supported the recommendations of the Syndicate in regard to the post of Director of Department of Laws and also other budget proposals.

Dr. Govardhan Lal Bakhshi said that he too wanted to congratulate the Vice-Chancellor on the able manner in which he had managed the affairs of the University and had prepared such a good budget. He asserted that the graduates produced by the Panjab University were in no way inferior to those produced by any other University in India. The University Campus at Chandigarh was attracting a large number of students even from foreign countries. His college alone had more than 100 students from the various foreign countries in Asia and Africa. In spite of this he wanted the standards to be improved. He wanted the house to take serious note of the fact that it was highly desirable to reduce the wastage of failures which created bitterness and frustration in students and was, to some extent, the cause of unrest amongst them. He appealed to the house to address itself to the desirability of improving the efficiency of education.

When all the members who wished to comment on the budget had made their speeches, the Vice-Chancellor rose to reply to the various points raised by the members. The Vice-Chancellor said that he agreed that poverty of resources should be no excuse for poverty of thinking. He, however, hoped that the members will agree with him that financial resources of a University were a very important factor. Finance, he said, was the sinews of all educational reform. In America, a student had to pay very high fees—600 to 2,000 dollars a year apart from the fact that American Universities were richly endowed. In India, the donations were very sparse. For laboratories and all similar things, a University needed money very hardly, and, therefore, all resources had to be tapped so that the tempo of progress could be maintained. Expressing his gratitude to the members who had spoken on the budget, the Vice-Chancellor remarked that the compliments paid to him for the provisions made in regard to the welfare of the University employees should be really addressed to the Board of Finance and the Syndicate who had accepted his recommendations. Referring to the remarks of Principal B. L. Kapur in regard to student unrest, the Vice-Chancellor reminded Principal Kapur that it was intended to call a Conference of Principals to consider the problem, but it could not be convened because most of the Principals did not wish to be away from their headquarters in those days. The Principal had now sometime to consider this problem and so the Conference would be arranged shortly. The problem of student unrest was considered at a meeting of the Vice-Chancellors held in December 1966, which was addressed by the Prime Minister and the Home Minister, both of whom felt that the trouble was due to attempts at indoctrination on the part of politicians. Agreeing with Principal Kapur that appropriate steps should be taken to solve the problem of student unrest, the Vice-Chancellor remarked that the situation was not so bad in this University as in some others. Referring to Principal Dogra's objection to the expenditure on the appointment of Dean of Student Welfare, the Vice-Chancellor said that the suggestion came from the Vice-Chancellors' Conference and while considering the recommendations of the Education Commission, the Syndicate and Senate had already approved the creation of this post. The Senate was now considering appointment of a Professor as the Dean of Student Welfare. In this connection, the Syndicate had decided that the Dean of Student Welfare should be a senior teacher who was actively teaching and enjoyed the respect of the students. Even the Colleges had been advised to appoint Deans of Students. This post, he said, was necessary for the wel-

fare of students. Referring to Principal Dogra's objection to the Evening Colleges in Simla and Rohtak, the Vice-Chancellor said that these institutions were set up by the Panjab University at the initiative of the State Governments concerned and after the University Grants Commission had approved the scheme. Necessary funds had been provided by the State Governments and the University Grants Commission. The position in regard to the suggestion, but he would obtain information from Recently, the college teachers had made a demand that the rate of examiner's fees should be raised. Such demands had to be examined in terms of the resources of the University. The proposals made by the teachers in this regard envisaged an additional expenditure of Rs. 30 lakhs every year. It was impossible to find so much money unless admission fees for examinations were increased or some other sources were found. The Vice-Chancellor had told the teachers that he was not opposed to the suggestion, but he would obtain information from other leading Universities of the same type and would make sure that the examiners of the Panjab University did not receive lesser fees than those obtaining in other Universities. Sharing the anxiety of Shri K. L. Sharma in regard to the quality of our graduates, the Vice-Chancellor said that he was not ashamed of the products of this University and the contribution it had made to the cause of education. Some of its professors enjoyed international reputation and were being invited by other Universities as Visiting Professors, Visiting Professors from other Universities who come to us and work with our teachers have appreciated the work being done here and have paid fine compliments to the teachers with whom they have worked. He, however, agreed with Shri K. L. Sharma that the University should pursue excellence and all our efforts in that direction should continue unabated. The results of the Indian Administrative and allied Services examinations indicated that the products of the Panjab University were much better than those of many other Universities. Regarding the future of the Panjab University, the Vice-Chancellor said that it was linked with the future of Chandigarh. The finances of the Panjab University were closely linked with the Matriculation and Higher Secondary examinations. If these examinations are taken away, the University would have to be adequately compensated. Regarding the proposal for raising pay-scales of Instructors, the Vice-Chancellor said that approval of the University Grants Commission had to be obtained for the proposed improvement of their grade, and he hoped that it would be forthcoming. He said that this matter would be looked into further, if necessary. Referring to the objection raised by some members in regard to the proposed provision for the post of Director of Department of Laws the Vice-Chancellor said that this Department was a misfit at the University Campus. The students of other Departments were not happy about its location here on this Campus. He felt that the law students did not seem to have faith in the discipline which they professed. On the recommenda-

tion of the Law Faculty, the Syndicate had decided that from next session the number of students to be admitted to this Department should be restricted, but even then the number will be quite large as compared with other Departments. The suggestion for creation of the post of the Director came from the Dean of the Faculty, Dr. Mehar Chand Mahajan. It was not easy, he said, to secure a good administrator for such Department. The provision was not being made to bring a particular person. He hoped that it would be possible to obtain a person of the required calibre. The Professor of Laws was due to retire after about a year and the Dean of the Law Faculty was of the opinion that efforts to obtain a suitable Director should be started now, as it always took a long time to find a suitable person. Reasons for this need had not been given in the Syndicate minutes, because it was decided sometime ago that only decisions should be recorded. Intervening Shri Ram Chandra suggested that reasons leading to a decision should be given, wherever feasible. The Vice-Chancellor replied that he would refer this suggestion to the Syndicate.

After giving replies to the various points raised, the Vice-Chancellor asked the house to take up the budget page by page.

Referring to the provision for improvement of education on page 40 of the budget, Principal B. L. Kapur suggested that some provision should be made for the colleges to enable them to provide staff for General Education course. The Vice-Chancellor replied that now that a Coordinator of General Education was being appointed, a proper scheme will be prepared for the University Campus and the affiliated colleges. After this scheme has been approved, supplementary grants would be obtained, if necessary.

The committee had not recommended any provision for exclusion of such members. He suggested that the whole matter should be reconsidered by the committee and the Syndicate.

Prof. D. C. Sharma said that by suggesting that the recommendations of the committee be referred back for reconsideration, Principal B. L. Kapur had not done justice to the Chairman of the committee, Shri Tek Chand, who had taken pains in the good work that the committee had done. The recommendations of the committee, Prof. Sharma said, were specific and concrete. Sending them back will result in providing a loophole. He proposed that the recommendations of the committee which were foolproof should be accepted and a vote of thanks should be recorded to appreciate the work of Shri Tek Chand who spared so much time and had given such a good report.

Shri G. L. Chopra, thanking Prof. D. C. Sharma, said that the recommendations of the committee be accepted and the suggestion of Principal B. L. Kapur be sent to the committee for their consideration. Principal B. L. Kapur accepted the suggestion made by Shri G. L. Chopra.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that the committee was appointed in consequence of the Senate Resolution of March 1966. He proposed that the recommendations of the Syndicate be approved and the suggestion made by Principal B. L. Kapur be referred to Shri Tek Chand, who may be requested to call a meeting of the committee to consider this suggestion, if he considered that necessary.

RESOLVED: (i) That the recommendations of the Syndicate be approved.

(ii) That the suggestion of Principal B. L. Kapur be referred to Shri Tek Chand, who may be requested to call a meeting of the committee, to consider this suggestion, if he considered that necessary.

XIII. Items Nos. 47 to 55 on the agenda were read out and unanimously approved, i.e.—

47. That as all the conditions had been complied with provisional affiliation in M. A. English Part I, granted to Baring Union Christian College, Batala, for one year in the first instance, with effect from the admissions of 1966, be confirmed. (Para 100, 21-1-1967)

48. That as the college had complied with conditions imposed on it, the provisional affiliation granted to Guru Kashi College, Damdama Sahib (Bhatinda), for Pre-Engineering, Pre-Medical and 1st year of the Three-Year Degree course, be confirmed. (Para 101, 21-1-1967)

49. That as Hindu College, Sonapat, has complied with all the conditions, the provisional affiliation for the M. A. English Part I course, already granted to the college, be confirmed. (Para 83, 25-2-1967)

50. That as the syllabus of Agriculture Groups of the Higher Secondary Course had been revised with effect from the admission made to 9th class in 1966, candidates who failed in this Group in Higher Secondary Part I in 1947 or earlier be allowed to appear in the old syllabus for two years, i.e. 1968 and 1969, and those who fail in this Group in Higher Secondary Part II in 1968 or earlier be allowed to appear in the old syllabus for two years, i.e. 1969 and 1970. (Para 124, 21-1-1967)

51. That Professor T. P. Srinivasan, Head of the Mathematics Department, be granted leave without pay from the date on which the Department reopens after summer vacation of 1967 to the date on which it reopens after the summer vacation of 1968, with permission to prefix summer vacation of 1967, to enable him to work with Professor J. L. Kelly of the University of California, Berkeley (U.S.A.), on a book on Measure Theory as a part of a project of the Centre for Advanced Study in Mathematics. (Para 134, 21-1-1967)

52. That Dr. V. J. Gupta, Research Associate in the Centre of Advanced Study in Geology:

(a) be permitted accept the assignment regarding his attachment by U.G.C. to Aberystwyth College, North Wales (U.K.) for two terms (from March, 1967) and to Imperial College, London, for the spring term of 1968, under the programme of assistance and collaboration from the Government of United Kingdom/British Council to the University Grants Commission's project of Centres of Advanced Studies in Indian Universities; and

(b) be granted duty leave on full pay for one year, with effect from the date fixed by the Vice-Chancellor. (Para 138, 21-1-1967)

53. (i) That Professor D. N. Shukla be appointed a delegate to the XXVII International Congress of Orientalists to be held at the University of Michigan, on the condition that the University will meet half the expenditure if the other half is sanctioned by the University Grants Commission.

(ii) That Professor B. Ch. Chhabra be appointed a delegate to the XXVII International Congress of Orientalists to be held at the University of Michigan, on the condition that the University will not make any contribution towards the expenditure. (Para 152, 21-1-1967)

54. (i) That Prof. R. C. Paul be allowed to accept the assignment offered by the University Grants Commission to visit Soviet Union to deliver lectures and develop inter-University contacts, under the Indo-Soviet Cultural Exchange Programme, and for this purpose he be treated on duty for a period of four weeks with effect from the date approved by the Vice-Chancellor.

(ii) That Prof. R. C. Paul be also allowed to accept the offer of McMaster University, Canada inviting him to lecture at the NATO Advanced Study Institute on non-aqueous solvent Chemistry and contribute a paper at the International Conference which will follow the Institute both of which will be held at McMaster from 22nd of May, 1967 to 3rd of June, 1967; and

(iii) That Prof. T. P. Srinivasan be allowed to accept the assignment offered by the University Grants Commission to visit Soviet Union for about four weeks to deliver lectures and develop inter-University contacts, under the Indo-Soviet Cultural Exchange Programme, and for this purpose he be treated on duty with effect from the date fixed by the Vice-Chancellor up to 16-4-1967, with permission to suffix summer vacation and leave without pay from 9-7-1967 already granted to him.

(Para 16, 25-2-1967)

55. (i) That Prof. B. Ch. Chhabra, Head of the Department of Ancient Indian History and Culture, be permitted to accept the offer of Visiting Professorship at the California Western University, San Diego, U.S.A.

(ii) That the Vice-Chancellor be authorised to decide the dates of Prof. B. Ch. Chhabra's absence from this University for purposes of (i) and also whether this University shall pay him any salary for this period.

(Para 132, 25-2-1967)

XIV. Item No. 56 on the agenda was read out, viz.—

56. (i) That Shri K. C. Anand be allowed *ex-gratia* payment of deputation allowance at the rate of 25 per cent throughout his service in the University, subject to admissibility be audit.

(ii) That, as desired by him, Shri K. C. Anand be allowed to go back to his parent department on the expiry of the present period of his deputation, *i.e.* March 31, 1967.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that after the agenda had been issued, he had received a representation from Shri K. C. Anand. He, therefore, suggested that while the

recommendation in (i) be approved, the one contained in (ii) be referred back to the Syndicate.

RESOLVED: (i) That the recommendation of the Syndicate contained in (i) be approved.

(ii) That the recommendation contained in (ii) be referred back to the Syndicate.

XV. Item No. 57 on the agenda was read out, viz.—

57. That with effect from the admissions of 1967, a University continuation fee of Rs. 2 be charged from every student of the University and affiliated colleges, every year. (Para 4, 25-2-1967)

Principal B. L. Kapur remarked that though the proposal appeared innocuous, the levy suggested should not be imposed as it was likely to be misunderstood in view of the prevailing conditions in the country. He said that the University was getting about Rs. 1.53 crores from the college students and, therefore, there was no moral justification for tapping this new source.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that it was incorrect to say that the University realised Rs. 1.53 crores every year from the colleges. A large part of this income was on account of the Matriculation and Higher Secondary fees. Moreover, the admission fees realised from the candidates were largely utilised in the conduct of examinations. Referring to the suggestion of the Syndicate for continuation fee of Rs. 2 per annum, the Vice-Chancellor said that at Lahore the registration fee used to be Rs. 4 and later it was raised to Rs. 5. This amount has not been raised for a long time now although the services of the University to the colleges and their students have expanded in many directions. Previously, there was one University examination after two years and now we have examinations every year. This has resulted in the work of entries in the Register of Students being multiplied. In some of the other Universities, the amount of registration fee was higher than ours. It was not considered desirable to raise the registration fee. The University of Delhi was charging a continuation fee of Rs. 2 per annum from every student and that was why the Syndicate considered that a similar fee be charged by the Panjab University also. After all, the services rendered by the University had to be adequately paid for. The suggestion for charging the continuation fee was considered by the Syndicate sometime ago and Principal B. L. Kapur also agreed though he suggested that the decision to this effect should be recorded at a subsequent meeting as there was student unrest at the time and possibly there might be repercussions. The expenditure of the University had gone up considerably during the recent years in every direction and therefore legitimate sources of revenue must be tapped. For all these reasons, the Vice-Chancellor proposed that the unanimous recommendation of the Syndicate be approved.

RESOLVED: That the recommendation of the Syndicate be approved.

XVI. Items Nos. 58 to 67 on the agenda were read out and unanimously approved, viz.—

58. (a) That Traditional Section of the V.I.S. & I.S. be taken over by the Panjab University in view of the original terms of agreement;

(b) that vacancies arising in the Traditional Section be not filled so as to adjust the teaching load within the minimum strength;

(c) that U.G.C. be approached to give adequate grants for running the Institute, in addition to the other grants that may be admissible to V.I.S. & I.S. (Para 15, 25-2-1967)

59. That for efficient and faithful service, Shri R. S. Chopra, Reader in Botany, who retired on 26-1-1967, be paid gratuity due to him under Regulation 52 at page 99 of the Calendar, Volume I.

(Para 26, 25-2-1967)

60. That half the cost (about Rs. 11,000) be sanctioned for purchase of a Jeep (with trolley) for PL-480 Project, "Collection, description and identification to the specified fungal flora in the Western and Central Himalayas up to Kathmandu in Nepal" attached to the Botany Department on the condition that after the above scheme has come to an end, the Jeep shall become the property of the University.

61. That the following provision in Regulation 10 at page 100 of the Calendar, Volume II, 1966, for admission to M.A. Sociology Part I, which was up to the admissions of 1966, be extended upto the admissions of 1968:

"That for Sociology course up to the admission of 1966, a person who has passed the B.A. examination, with Sociology, or Economics or Political Science or Psychology, or Philosophy, or History, obtaining at least 45 per cent marks in one of these subjects or who has passed the B.A. examination (2-Year Course) with Sociology and Public Administration as one of his subjects obtaining 45 per cent marks in the Sociology paper alone, or who has passed the B.Com. examination obtaining at least 45 per cent marks in the subject of Economics, shall also be eligible for admission."

62. That revised regulations for B.Sc. Textiles examinations may take effect from the examinations of November, 1966.

63. That with effect from the examination for B. Com. Part I to be held in April, 1967, Mathematics be treated as an additional subject and a candidate shall be deemed to have passed in Mathematics if he obtains not less than 35% marks in the subject.

Provided that if a candidate fails to pass in Mathematics, he will not be declared as having failed in B.Com. Part I on that account alone and he shall have two more opportunities of qualifying in the subject—one at the supplementary examination in the same year and the other at the following annual examination along with the examination for B.Com. Part II. If he still fails in Mathematics, his result of B.Com. Parts I & II will be cancelled; and if he passes in Mathematics, the marks obtained by him will be counted for the purpose of declaring his division.

64. That with effect from 1967, admissions to the law course (both day and evening students) be restricted as under:

- (a) The applicant must have obtained at least 40% marks at the degree examination, including the optional subject; a candidate passing the degree examination in parts must obtain 40 per cent of the aggregate of all the subjects taken by him;
- (b) A person holding M.A. degree shall be eligible without having obtained 40 per cent marks of the aggregate.

That as suggested by Chief Commissioner, Union Territory of Chandigarh, direction charges of Rs. 1,250 per mensem payable to Capital Project be re-allocated as under for a period of one year to begin with and the date from which the new arrangement is to operate may be fixed by the Vice-Chancellor in consultation with the Chief Commissioner:

(a) Rs. 1,000 per month to Shri P. L. Verma.

(b) Rs. 250 per month to the Capital Project.

XVII. Item No. 68 on the agenda was read out, viz.—

68. That report of the enquiry committee on the conduct of Shri M. M. Sharma, Pandit, Sanskrit Department, be considered and suitable action taken.

NOTE :—The Syndicate while agreeing with the report of the said committee considered Shri M. M. Sharma guilty of serious misconduct, unbecoming of a teacher of the University and concurred with the view of the committee that Shri M. M. Sharma was not a fit and proper person to be retained in the University service.

(Para 106, 25-2-1967)

Shri G. L. Chopra said that in the interests of natural justice, Shri M. M. Sharma be asked to show cause why his services should not be terminated. He proposed that Shri M. M. Sharma be suspended from service and, before a final decision is taken, he be served with a notice to show cause why his services should not be terminated, in the light of the report of the enquiry committee.

RESOLVED: (a) That Shri M. M. Sharma be suspended from the University service till final decision is taken on the report of the enquiry committee referred to above;

(b) That the Vice-Chancellor or any person appointed by him should serve Shri M. M. Sharma with a notice to show cause why his services be not terminated. The matter should then be placed before the Syndicate along with the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor.

(c) That the matter shall, thereafter, be placed before Senate for final decision.

XVIII. Item No. 69 on the agenda was read out and unanimously approved, i.e.—

69. That the appointment of Shri S. R. Nayyar as Deputy Registrar be cancelled, as he has declined the offer.

(Para 126, 25-2-1967)

XIX. Item No. 70 on the agenda was read out, viz.—

70. To consider the following resolution of Principal, B. L. Kapur:

"Members of the Revising Committee should be appointed from the Syndics and Senators, who are not members of the Boards of Studies, since the inclusion of the members of the Boards of studies is likely to make the decisions of the Revising Committee less objective and thus defeat to some extent at least the purpose for which it is constituted".

The Vice-Chancellor drew attention to the discussion that took place at the Senate meeting held on July 30, 1966. Originally, Principal B. L. Kapur had sent up two resolutions. The Senate had decided that Principal B. L. Kapur should amend his resolutions in the light of the discussion, but he had sent in the proposed resolution in its original form. The suggestion was discussed in July, 1966 in great detail. He asked Principal B. L. Kapur to place his arguments again before the house to refresh the memory of the members.

Principal B. L. Kapur said that the resolution was self-explanatory. It was a very simple matter, he said, that a person whose recommendations were being considered by another committee should not be a member of that committee also because an objective decision could not be expected from that body.

Prof. D. C. Sharma proposed that the resolution be not accepted.

The Vice-Chancellor said that he had given his own views at the Senate meeting held in July, 1966. He had stated that the Revising Committee as at present constituted had been functioning for 40 or more years without any difficulty. He pointed out that the Revising Committee was not an appellate authority against the decisions of the Boards. It is a body set up by the Syndicate for administrative convenience in order to scrutinise the recommendations of the Boards. Actually, the first screening of the lists recommended by the Boards is done by the office and the Revising Committee merely checks the work done by the office in order to see whether their objections were valid. In reality, the appellate authority

was the Syndicate itself. He did not, therefore, think that any change in the constitution of the Revising Committee was justified. Academic persons should be members of the Revising Committee and if any change had to be made, members of the Boards should be debarred from being members of the Syndicate, but that too would be wrong as it would exclude academicians from the Syndicate. He proposed that *status quo* should be maintained.

Principal B. L. Kapur insisted that his proposal be put to vote.

On being put to vote, the proposal of Principal B. L. Kapur was declared lost; 17 voted for it and 27 against it.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that the Senate meeting held on 11-12-66 considered the structure of education in the country and took certain decisions, but consideration of the rest of the Education Commission Report was postponed. He stated that copies of the following had been circulated to the members once again :—

1. Minutes of the Syndicate meeting, dated October 29, 30 and 31, 1966.
2. Comments of the Academic Council meeting held on 26-11-1966 (Para 25).

(ii) Heads of University Teaching Departments,
(iii) Panjab University Teachers Association (these were received with the views sent by the Heads of University Departments).
4. Recommendations of the following Committees appointed by the Syndicate :—
(i) Education Committee (Chapter IV—Teacher Education).

(ii) Agriculture Committee (Chapter XIV—Education for Agriculture).

(iii) Engineering Committee (Chapter XV—Vocational; Technical and Engineering Education).

(iv) Science Committee (Chapter XVI—Science Education & Research).

Inviting discussion on the various recommendations contained in the Report, the Vice-Chancellor drew attention to the observation that the Report should not be an excuse for procrastination but it should serve as lever for dynamism. A meeting of the Vice-Chancellors had been fixed in the month of December, 1966 to consider the Kothari Education Commission Report, but it was postponed and will now take place in the month of May. As the members were aware, the Panjab University had done some thinking about Education Commission Report. Special meetings of the Syndicate for this purpose were held on three consecutive days in the month of October, 1966 and the Academic Council had also considered various recommendations contained in the Report. Heads of University Teaching Departments and Principals of affiliated colleges had also sent in their observations in response to the University letter. The office had prepared a compendium of all the information and had circulated it to the members. He requested the house to discuss it and take appropriate decisions, so that the views of this University may be sent to the Education Ministry and the University Grants Commission and also for use at the conference of Vice-Chancellors which will be held in May, 1967.

The following is a gist of the discussion by Senate on the various points in regard to which the Syndicate had made their recommendations :—

CHAPTER II (Para 2.35).

Time-Table for Schools, Colleges and University.

Prof. R. N. Safaya remarked that while he agreed with the time-table suggested by the Syndicate, there would have to be a separate time-table for the Teachers' Training Colleges. He also suggested that a recommendation should be made to the Education Department that the dates for summer vacation in the schools and colleges should synchronise with each other.

The Senate accepted the recommendation of the Syndicate and also the suggestions made by Prof. R. N. Safaya.

N.C.C. Training.

There was a good deal of discussion on this subject.

Principal O. P. Dogra was of the opinion that compulsory N.C.C. training should continue, because the students had benefited from it a good deal. He also suggested that students who wanted to take part in sports should be allowed to do so and they should be granted exemption from compulsory N.C.C. training to the extent they attended sports, on production of proper certificates.

Shri Virendra, agreeing with Principal Dogra, said that nobody could deny the necessity of N.C.C. training, but the present method, he said, appeared to be a fraud and there was a lot of wastage. The University should see that the training being imparted was really good and the real object should be ensured. As it was, students were not getting any training nor were they having any sense of responsibility. What was more, they did not get any training in discipline. He proposed that committee should be appointed to visit some colleges and study the present working of this scheme.

Shri Kanwar Lal Sharma asked for detailed information about the N.C.C. training.

Principal Gurbakhsh Singh Shergill mentioned in brief the salient features of N.C.C. training. He felt that there

should be proper co-ordination between the N.C.C. training and the Physical Training Departments. He was of the opinion that N.C.C. training should be compulsory at the Pre-University stage and at the B.A./B.Sc. stage it should be allowed only to selected students.

Shri Hanuman Singh said that there was no practical utility in the N.C.C. training. On the other hand, it had resulted in deterioration of academic standards and sports. The students who are supposed to have received N.C.C. training knew little about military life and discipline. He agreed with Shri Virendra that it was not serving any useful purpose. He thought that the students were attracted by N.C.C. training only because of the refreshments. He proposed that N.C.C. training should be made optional, so that only such students offered it as were really interested in it.

Shri Ram Chandia said that he was happy at the recommendation of the Syndicate. Giving reasons how N.C.C. training was introduced as a compulsory discipline, he said that there was a similar suggestion for women students also which was ultimately rejected. He drew attention to the remarks of certain members that huge sums of money were being wasted on this scheme and students obtained exemption from it by producing false medical certificates. He mentioned that sometime ago the Central Government appointed a committee which was known as Kunzru Committee and this Committee was asked to examine the various schemes like N.C.C. training, physical training, etc., and to report which one was desirable and should be retained. The unanimous recommendation of this committee was that N.C.C. training should be optional and not compulsory. This committee also recommended that, if considered necessary, military studies may be introduced as an elective subject. He said that he was in favour of recommendation of the syndicate being accepted.

Ch Suraj Mall was strongly in favour of retention of N.C.C. training as compulsory discipline. He said that this training had done very good work. Students wanted to undergo this training with enthusiasm. He felt strongly that every young man of India should be properly trained to defend his country whenever necessity arose. During the Pakistani aggression in 1965, N.C.C. cadets did very good work. He was, therefore, opposed to the recommendation made by the Syndicate.

Principal Pritam Singh said that as the Panjab State was on the border, it was necessary for the nation to keep prepared for any emergency. He however, said that the present training was no good. His feeling was that indiscipline amongst students was partly due to the introduction of N.C.C. as a compulsory training. Students were driven to obtain exemption by producing false medical certificates. The purpose of the scheme was not being served. He was in favour of such training but it should be done in a proper way. His experience was that the present scheme had failed. He proposed that the best thing would be to send the students for a certain period to regular Army and Army Camps for such training during summer vacation. He was also of the view that N.C.C. training should not clash with academic students and sports activities of the students.

Prof. D. C. Sharma said that he was in a way connected with the N.C.C. training because for sometime he was a member of the Advisory Committee on N.C.C. training appointed by the Lok Sabha. He had no doubt that if the usefulness of the training was desired to be downgraded, it should be made optional. He was, therefore, opposed to the proposal of the Syndicate. The need of the modern times was that the studies should be made defence oriented. He thought that compulsory N.C.C. training had been of great help to India. He, however, agreed that improvements should be made in the method, for which a committee should be appointed. He agreed with the suggestion made by Shri Ram Chandra that

military students should be introduced as an elective subject.

Shri Gurbachan Singh Bajwa was of the opinion that every student should be compulsory required to spend at least one month in a Military Camp.

Principal Bishan Singh was in favour of whole-time N.C.C. training for a period of at least one month. The whole-time training could be done during the summer vacation. He was opposed to the present scheme, as it meant quite a lot of wastage.

Principal O. P. Mohan, supporting the recommendation of the Syndicate, said that everyone agreed that India should keep its young men ready for purposes of defence and the students should be made to rough out military life. He, however, felt that the present method needed revision. At present hardly 10 to 20 per cent students gained anything from N.C.C. training.

Shri Kanwar Lal Sharma was of the opinion that N.C.C. training which was a good thing should be retained, and if there were any difficulties, they should be met. He was opposed to the suggestion that this training should be made voluntary, because as soon as that is done, no student would take it. He agreed with Ch Suraj Mall for retention of N.C.C. training on a compulsory basis. The students should keep themselves prepared for any emergency. He was opposed to voluntary training, as that was a half-hearted measure.

Principal B. L. Kapur agreed that the youth of the country should be prepared for defence, and that measures for it should not be half-hearted. All the members were anxious about their responsibilities. He was in favour of compulsory N.C.C. training, but the method required reconsideration. He also said that the entire nation should be prepared for defence of the country and not only the students. The present training, he said, was not efficient and would not, therefore, lead to any measure of success. Supporting the resolution of the Syndicate, Principal Kapur said that N.C.C. training should be made compulsory and should be imparted before a degree is conferred on a student. By making it whole-time the training would be put on a very sound footing and the students who undertook it would do so willingly and seriously.

The Vice-Chancellor remarked that there had been a good deal of fruitful discussion on the subject of N.C.C. training. This training, he said, was introduced as a compulsory discipline in the wake of Chinese aggression. The then Defence Minister addressed a meeting of Vice-Chancellors and appealed to them to accept the scheme which he wanted to introduce. The Vice-Chancellors willingly agreed to the suggestion as a patriotic duty. After sometime, some Vice-Chancellors expressed dissatisfaction on the working of the scheme. At the last meeting of the Vice-Chancellors, this dissatisfaction appeared more pronounced. He drew attention to the views of the Kothari Education Commission, as they appeared in the Report. He personally felt that if it was desired to retain compulsory N.C.C. training, it should be on sustained basis for a period of six months or a year. The Syndicate felt that it should be on whole-time basis after the student has completed his examination. If the Army authorities are unable to arrange whole-time training at one stretch, they can spread it over the summer vacation. The Vice-Chancellor observed that some people had said with some justification that compulsory N.C.C. training affected other activities in the colleges to which students had a natural right. He felt that the recommendation of the Syndicate was quite correct in the sense that in due course, the University should try to make it voluntary and it should be treated as one of the activities of a college. If feasible it should be made compulsory on a whole-time basis, for six months or a year.

The consensus of opinion was that the recommendation of the Syndicate be accepted.

It was ultimately.

RESOLVED : That, as early as possible, N.C.C. training should be imparted on voluntary basis; the proper remedy, however, was that compulsory N.C.C. training should be given for a period of six months or a year on whole-time basis after the student had completed the final B.A./B.Sc. examination, or in stretches during the vacations.

II. The Senate then took up recommendations of the Syndicate contained in their minutes dated 30-10-66.

All the recommendations of the Syndicate were approved except the one in regard to the medium of education (11.58 of the Education Commission Report).

In regard to the medium of education, Principal Bishan Singh was of the opinion that the medium of instruction upto the B.A. stage should be the regional language. He said that this should be so now that the State of Punjab had been re-organised on language basis.

Prof. D. C. Sharma proposed that the recommendation of the Syndicate should be accepted.

Mrs. R. L. Sethi also was in favour of the recommendation of the Syndicate being accepted.

RESOLVED : That in view of the uncertainty of the future character of the Punjab University and political situation in the State, the matter may be considered later on.

The Senate decided that the affiliated colleges should be advised to have Deans of Students, who may be given a suitable allowance from the Amalgamated Fund, at the discretion of the Principal.

III. The Senate took up consideration of the recommendations of the Syndicate contained in their minutes dated 31-10-1966.

In regard to the recommendation of the Syndicate contained in Para 2(i) regarding expansion of existing colleges, Prof. R. N. Safaya observed that norms should not be laid down and in rural areas colleges may be permitted to be started even with smaller number of students. Similarly, good colleges may be allowed to have large

number of students. He also suggested that all the government colleges should be run by the University.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that the University Grants Commission had already decided that no norms should be laid down. He mentioned that he had recently appointed a committee which would be visiting all colleges with enrolment of more than 1,000 students to find out the facilities available and to submit its report to Syndicate. In regard to government colleges, the Vice-Chancellor said that the University had no authority to take a decision in regard to transfer of control pertaining to these institutions.

(a) All the recommendations of the Syndicate contained in paragraphs 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 were approved.

(b) The recommendations of the committees appointed by the Syndicate for the following Chapters (Para 8) were also approved :—

Chapter XIV—Education for Agriculture.

Chapter XV—Vocational, technical and engineering education.

Chapter XVI—Science education & research.

(c) The recommendations of the Syndicate contained in paragraphs 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 were also approved.

In regard to Teacher Education (Chapter IV), the Senate approved recommendations of the Committee and further decided that seminars, refresher courses and summer institutes be arranged for college teachers also.

IV. The Vice-Chancellor drew attention of the members to the observations and comments received from the Principals of affiliated colleges, Heads of University Teaching Departments and also the Academic Council.

The Senate decided that the above observations and comments be forwarded to the Ministry of Education after due sifting.

(1) Before the agenda was taken up, the Vice-Chancellor made a reference to the very sad demise of Ch. Siri Chand, Speaker, Haryana Legislative Assembly, who was an outstanding criminal lawyer, a seasoned parliamentarian and an eminent philanthropist. Ch. Siri Chand was one of the noblest products of the Hindi Region which had recently been constituted into the separate State of Haryana. A nephew of the late Sir Chhotu Ram, Ch. Siri Chand was born in his uncle's traditions and during his life-time tried to uphold those traditions by pursuit of high ethical standards. He was associated with many nation-building activities. During the Chinese aggression and the Pakistani aggression, he promoted defence effort to a remarkable degree. He was a prominent office-bearer of the organisation which had been running for many years Jat College Rohtak, Jat School, Rohtak, Chhotu Ram College of Education, Rohtak, and Chhotu Ram Polytechnic. He was also a member of the Panjab University Senate for a number of years. His contributions to the deliberations of this house were always very valuable and he used to regale the house with his flashes of wit and humour.

The Senate of the Panjab University mourned the passing away of such an eminent Indian. All the members of the house observed one minute's silence in the memory of the departed soul.

RESOLVED : That condolences of the Senate be conveyed to members of the bereaved family and the Haryana Government.

3. Grant of extension of affiliation to certain colleges as detailed in Statement 'C' (vide Appendix III).

Shri Harbhajan Singh drew attention to item Nos. 23 on page 19 of Appendix III regarding grant of independent affiliation for M. A. English (Part I) to the D.A.V. College, Jullundur. While teaching of Philosophy was being discontinued by the College on grounds of deficit, and a permanent member of the Philosophy Department

staff had been made a part-timer, a new course, *i.e.*, M.A. English, was being started. He wanted to know why the Philosophy Department was being wound up.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that he had already looked into the matter. The Department of Philosophy in the college was being wound up because there were very few students taking up this subject. As the members were aware, this subject unfortunately had fallen on evil days and students did not take kindly to it. Even he had to close this Department at one time on a similar ground but later some people suggested that it should be revived. It was because of the fall in the number of students offering this subject that the management of the college was thinking of discontinuing teaching of Philosophy. As far as the teacher of this Department was concerned, the Vice-Chancellor said that he would look into his case.

Shri Teja Singh observed that the country was really proud of institutions like the D.A.V. College, Jullundur, and monetary considerations should not weigh with teaching of different subjects. Affiliation in M.A. English on independent basis would involve more expenditure than what the college was spending in its teaching on inter-collegiate basis.

Principal Bishan Singh, drawing attention to item No. 24 on page 19 of Appendix III, said that whereas in item No. 23 the affiliation was not provisional, it was so in case of item No. 24. He said that this disparity should be removed.

The Vice-Chancellor agreed that affiliation recommended in item No. 23 should also be provisional.

RESOLVED: That grant of extension of affiliation to certain colleges, as detailed in Statement 'C' (Appendix III) be approved with the modification that affiliation recommended in item No. 23 on page 19 of Appendix III shall also be provisional.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that the point was raised at the Syndicate meeting, when he had stated that he would look into the representation of Mrs. Sheila Arora and refer the matter to the same committee which had selected Dr. Harish Khanna and Dr. Hardial Singh Gill.

Shri Bhan Singh Bhaura referred to the extension recommended for Dr. R. R. Sethi, Professor of History, and wanted to know the procedure followed in such cases. He thought that only such persons as had some 'links' in the University were retained even after reaching the age of 60 years. He also said that he could produce a photostat copy of a letter written by the present Vice-Chancellor on an earlier occasion which did not speak well of Dr. Sethi. He did not understand how the Syndicate had recommended extension in the face of that letter.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that grant of extension had been recommended in accordance with the regulations of the University. He said that extensions could be granted beyond the age of 60 upto 3 years and even beyond 63 years in exceptional circumstances if it was felt that the person was required in the interests of the University and no better person was available. The Syndicate considered the case of Dr. R. R. Sethi and had recommended 2 years' extension. As the members will recall, Dr. K. S. Narang was granted extension for two years, and Dr. H. P. Dwivedi and Dr. P. N. Mehra were granted extension for three years each. Regarding the reference which had been made to a letter written by him 5 or 6 years ago when he was Principal of the D.A.V. College, Jullundur to the then temporary Vice-Chancellor of Kurukshetra University—Mr. Justice Tek Chand—who wanted to get his advice in regard to a particular appointment, the Vice-Chancellor said that his letter was based on the information available at that time and that too on hearsay. This letter, he said, had been pilfered by somebody as reported by Justice Tek Chand. He knew Dr. Sethi now more closely, because of official dealings pertaining to University work, for a couple of years. He considered him a competent teacher, an able organiser, and as a whole, an asset to the University.

Shri Hardwari Lal wanted the letter in question to be read out.

The Vice-Chancellor ruled that he did not permit reading out of the letter which was a personal and confidential document that had been pilfered. He also did not allow further discussion of the document.

Principal B. L. Kapur protested.

On being put to vote, the recommendation of the Syndicate was approved—40 votes in favour and 18 against.

RESOLVED : That the recommendations of the Syndicate be approved.

VII. The Vice-Chancellor informed the House that Ch. Hardwari Lal, Education Minister, Haryana, had requested that items 65 and 66 be taken up earlier as he wished to speak on them and after that to go away for urgent work. He had, therefore, allowed these items to be considered earlier.

The Registrar read out item No. 65 on the agenda, viz.—

65. To consider the case of Shri M. M. Sharma, Pandit, Sanskrit Department, under suspension, in pursuance of Senate decision, dated 28-3-1967.

NOTE.—1. The Senate at their meeting held on March 28, 1967, decided as under :

"RESOLVED : (a) That Shri M. M. Sharma be suspended from the University service till final decision is taken on the report of the enquiry committee referred to above;

(b) That the Vice-Chancellor or any person appointed by him should serve Shri M. M. Sharma with a notice to show cause why his services be not terminated.

The matter should then be placed before the Syndicate along with the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor.

(c) That the matter shall, thereafter be placed before Senate for final decision.

2. Accordingly, a show-cause notice was issued to Shri M. M. Sharma, and his reply has been received.

3. Copies of the following papers were forwarded for information of members of Senate :

(i) Report of enquiry committee.

(ii) Para 106 of Syndicate minutes, dated 25-2-1967.

(iii) Para XVII of Senate minutes, dated 28-3-1967.

(iv) Show-cause notice.

4. As decided by Senate, the reply received from Shri M. M. Sharma was placed before the Syndicate on July 20, 1967.

The Registrar read out the following decision of the Syndicate dated 20-7-1967 (Para 17) on the case of Pt. M. M. Sharma :—

"RESOLVED : That, as recommended by the Vice-Chancellor, Shri M. M. Sharma be afforded another opportunity to defend himself before another enquiry committee.

"RESOLVED FURTHER : That Shri G. L. Chopra, Retired Judge, Panjab High Court, be nominated as one-man enquiry committee, for the purpose.

Principal Shergill thought that some sort of limit should be placed on the period of suspension. In the affiliated colleges no one could be kept under suspension for more than three months. He desired that the same should be observed in the University also, if possible.

Ch. Hardwari Lal said that he was grateful to the Vice-Chancellor for accommodating him. He suggested that

all the relevant papers should have been circulated well in time so that the members could go through them. He noted the decision of the Syndicate dated 20-7-1967, which the Registrar had read out, to the effect that another enquiry committee had been appointed and that Shri G. L. Chopra, a retired Judge of the Punjab High Court, would constitute as one-man committee for that purpose. There were, however, certain points in regard to the procedure which he wanted the house to consider. He suggested that there should be sufficient time-lag between meetings of the Syndicate and the Senate so that proceedings of the former could be circulated to the members well ahead of the Senate meeting. There were certain serious aspects of this case which needed to be brought before the house. The matter concerned the termination of the services of a teacher and in fact it concerned the whole of the teacher community in the University's employment. The first point he wanted to make was about the duration of suspension period as pointed out by Principal Shergill. The second point was about the procedure employed by the enquiry committee for the conduct of enquiry and also the procedure which the proposed one-man committee would employ. He did not understand why Pt. M. M. Sharma had been suspended, but there might be some charges other than those mentioned in the papers received by him. If these were the only charges as were contained in the papers circulated, it was grossly unfair not only to Shri M. M. Sharma but also to the teachers in general. He thought that the action was arbitrary. The charges were trivial, even if they were proved. For instance, there was a charge that Pt. M. M. Sharma had abused the Vice-Chancellor, the Dean of University Instruction and the Head of the Sanskrit Department. The University wanted him to produce documentary evidence in his defence. He thought that the charges contained in the papers circulated would not justify suspension of Shri M. M. Sharma. There should be valid reasons on which an employee of an organisation could be suspended. For example, an employee should be suspended only if his continuance in active employment of the institution is likely to vitiate any enquiry pending against him or if his fault is so great that his continuance in service is likely to damage the organisation. As far as he could see, Pt. M. M. Sharma should not have been suspended.

Shri Tejinder Singh raised a point of order and asked whether the observations made by Ch. Hardwari Lal did not impinge on the judicial aspect of the question.

The Vice-Chancellor said that his own feeling was that Shri M. M. Sharma may be afforded another opportunity to defend himself because he had expressed lack of faith in the previous committee appointed to go into his case. Without going into the merits of his stand, he was anxious to be very fair to him. He was, however, of the view that any observations made in the house for or against the case would prejudice the enquiry which was yet to be made. He would leave the matter to the person who had been entrusted with this enquiry and who was a man of great eminence in his field. As regards suspension of Shri M. M. Sharma, it had been ordered unanimously by the Senate at the last meeting.

Principal O. P. Mohan also remarked that the matter under discussion was of great importance because it involved the security of service of a teacher. He, therefore, stressed that the members should be given full time to have their say.

Continuing, Ch. Hardwari Lal said that he appreciated the views expressed by the Vice-Chancellor but he felt that his own points were very vital which may influence the decision of Senate. He suggested that Pt. M. M. Sharma should be immediately reinstated. He was very much concerned about the procedure. As far as he could see, no procedure had been followed at all. Referring to the procedure laid down for conducting enquiries against teachers of affiliated colleges, he felt that the University

should extend to its own employees and teachers greater security of tenure than it expected from the colleges. The new enquiry committee should proceed according to the procedure which may be prescribed. It might take some time more to evolve such a procedure and that was another reason why Shri M. M. Sharma should be reinstated. The whole thing appeared to him to be arbitrary. Shri M. M. Sharma was asked to come personally, but he refused to come for reasons of his own. Generally, the witnesses were examined in the presence of the man under enquiry, but in the present case the witnesses were asked to file written statements. The enquiry committee even cross-examined the witnesses. Shri M. M. Sharma had made some serious allegations against the Head of the Department which had come to the notice of the house incidentally.

Intervening, the Vice-Chancellor stated that he had received a reference in connection with these allegations from the Chancellor and after looking into them, had already sent his report to him.

Continuing, Ch. Hardwari Lal said that even if half of the allegations were true, the Head of the Department should not have been in the employment of the University.

When certain members objected to such observations, Ch. Hardwari Lal said that there was intimate connection between these allegations and the enquiry which had been going on against Pt. M. M. Sharma.

Shri Gurdial Singh Dhillon said that the matter came before the Senate in March, 1967 and it was decided to suspend Shri M. M. Sharma. The report of enquiry revealed that it was a serious case of indiscipline. Very important persons like the Dean of University Instruction conducted the enquiry. He was glad to hear the speech of the Haryana Education Minister (Ch. Hardwari Lal) because it was very rare that an Education Minister should take so much interest in such a case. Shri Gurdial Singh Dhillon said that Shri M. M. Sharma had met him also outside the house, but a reading of the report of enquiry made it clear that the decision taken by the Syndicate was the only course to be followed. He, however, requested that the indiscipline amongst college teachers should not be brought into the University. He had full confidence that a person of the eminence of Shri G. L. Chopra, who had now been appointed to conduct fresh enquiry will proceed in the proper manner. He proposed that there should be no further discussion in the matter, till the report of Shri G. L. Chopra, who was appointed as the one-man enquiry Committee, by the Syndicate, becomes available.

Principal B. L. Kapur said that according to the procedure for college teachers, a tribunal was appointed on which a representative of the teacher concerned was also appointed. He asked whether, after the receipt of the report of the new enquiry committee, Shri M. M. Sharma will have the right of appeal.

Principal S. D. Vasishth remarked that Ch. Hardwari Lal, Education Minister of Haryana, had said everything.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that Shri G. L. Chopra, who was an eminent jurist, would certainly bear in mind all the points that had been raised by the various members and would see that full justice was done to Shri M. M. Sharma.

On being put to vote, the proposal of Shri G. S. Dhillon was carried: 41 members voting for it and 5 against.

RESOLVED. That the recommendation of Syndicate be approved.

VIII. Item No. 66 on the agenda was read out, viz.—

66. That Government Evening College, Bahadurgarh, be granted provisional affiliation for the Pre-University (Humanities Group) and B.A. courses, with effect from the admissions of 1967, on the condition—

- (a) that a regular day college shall be started at Bahadurgarh to which these evening classes may be attached and this may preferably be done within a period of one year, but in no case later than two years.
- (b) that all the requirements recommended in the inspection report are complied with.

Ch. Hardwari Lal drew attention to the condition for starting a regular day college within one or two years. He said that there was hardly any justification for such a condition. Until a few years ago, the Panjab University was running a Camp College at Delhi, and as far as he remembered, there were no day classes attached to it. There were quite a few villages around Bahadurgarh and the residents of these places, a large number of whom were employed in Delhi, wanted to improve their qualifications. It was largely for the benefit of such persons that it was suggested to have an Evening College at Bahadurgarh. He agreed that proper facilities such as the buildings, furniture, the staff and laboratory equipment, etc., must be provided, and as long as these were provided, it should not be necessary that the evening classes should be attached to a day college.

Principal P. L. Anand said that he and Principal Bhagwan Dass of the D.A.V. College, Ambala, were asked to inspect this college. He said that the existing regulations of the University did not allow setting up of a separate individual Evening College run by either the government or a private organisation. Subject to and in anticipation of the change in the regulations, therefore, he had suggested that the Govt. Evening College at Bahadurgarh might be allowed, as an experimental measure. The Evening Colleges were open only to employed persons. He also said that when the inspection committee visited Bahadurgarh, local leaders, Chairman of the Municipal Committee and other local citizens met them and passed that their need was a day college and that they were even willing to give Rs. three lacs to the Haryana Govt. and provide 30 acres of land for that purpose, because it was difficult for their children to go to places like Jhajjar, Delhi and Rohtak. A day college would solve their problem to some extent. Principal Anand also feared that some students would try to obtain false certificates of employment to get admission to the Evening College. If this was encouraged, every school in every village would apply for permission to start an Evening College.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that the University had started four Evening Colleges, one each in Haryana, Panjab, Himachal Pradesh and the Union Territory of Chandigarh. All these colleges, he said, were started in accordance with a scheme approved by the University Grants Commission. The University was getting financial aid for these colleges. As regards other colleges, the University had been permitting day colleges to add evening shifts where it considered necessary. There were regular rules approved by the Senate governing administration of these colleges. In accordance with the present regulations, an Evening College of the type envisaged by the Haryana Govt. could not be started and housed in a school building but, considering the educational needs of Haryana, he decided, in consultation with the Education Secretary and the Director of Public Instruction, Haryana State, that this might be allowed, as an experimental measure. To meet the needs of the Hqa as express-

ed by the people who met the committee and also to maintain proper educational standards, it would be better if these classes were attached to a day college and it was on this account that it was decided to suggest to the Haryana Govt. that they may start a day college in Bahadurgarh within a year or two. He was certainly averse to evening classes being attached to schools. No one had any doubt that there was pressure of numbers due to all round expansion of education, but the University could act only within the frame work of its regulations. The suggestion made by Ch. Hardwari Lal would certainly be looked into.

Dr. V. S. Puri said that 3 members dissented at the Syndicate meeting against the appointment of Shri K. L. Sethi. He objected to the appointment of Shri K. L. Sethi as Shri S. N. Sehgal whom the former was replacing was younger in age. Shri Sethi was appointed to this post sometime ago. Before Shri Sethi joined, Shri Bakhshish Singh, Principal of Evening College, Simla, wanted to go on deputation and Shri Sethi was appointed in his place. Later on, Principal Bakhshish Singh did not go, and the Syndicate decided to cancel Shri Sethi's appointment as Principal of the Evening College, Simla. This appeared to him like a vote of censure against Shri S. N. Sehgal. He wanted to know if there was anything against Shri Sehgal. He had nothing whatsoever against Shri K. L. Sethi. The Vice-Chancellor had the right to appoint anybody as his secretary, but he thought the appointment of Secretary should be for the period for which the Vice-Chancellor held his own office.

Shri Teja Singh asked if any selection committee was appointed for this post.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that by a unanimous vote of this house on 28-3-1967, Shri K. L. Sethi Director of Education Himachal Pradesh, was appointed temporarily as Secretary to Vice-Chancellor with effect from April 1, 1967, if he was permitted to accept this post by the Himachal Pradesh Government, and Shri S. N. Sehgal was re-employed with effect from February 21, 1967, till his successor joined. At the Senate meeting, Shri K. I. Jaura wanted to know the age of Shri K. L. Sethi and the Vice-Chancellor had told him that it was 60 years. The Vice-Chancellor also pointed out that his appointment was on temporary basis under regulation 55 at pages 100-101 of the Calendar, Vol. I. He added that in the appointment of his Secretary, the Senate gave the Vice-Chancellor unfettered discretion. He read out Senate resolution dated 25-10-1953 on this point. In the past, people beyond 60 years had been engaged temporarily in the interest of the University. He cited a few examples of persons who remained in University service in temporary capacity up to the age of 62, 63 and even 64 years. The Vice-Chancellor further remarked that after the Senate had unanimously approved Shri K. L. Sethi's appointment as Secretary to Vice-Chancellor, the Secretary of Sri Guru Gobind Singh College, Chandigarh requested that Principal Bakhshish Singh of the P.U. Evening College Simla, be spared for the Principalship of his College. Shri Sethi wished to stay in Simla as he had been there for a number of years. He had worked as Principal of the Evening College, Simla, in the beginning without any allowance. He did that work honorarily even when he was Director of Education Himachal Pradesh. There could be no question about his

merits and even Dr. Puri had not questioned them. The Syndicate considered the new situation and recommended that Shri Bakhshish Singh be allowed to go to Sri Guru Gobind Singh College, Chandigarh, on deputation for a period of 2 years, and in his place Shri K. L. Sethi be appointed temporarily Principal of Evening College, Simla, for the same period. Before this recommendation came up to Senate, the authorities of Sri Guru Gobind Singh College, Chandigarh, informed the University that the situation had altered and so they did not need Principal Bakhshish Singh for their College. He, therefore, recommended that the resolution of the Syndicate allowing Shri Bakhshish Singh to go on 2 years' deputation and appointing Shri K. L. Sethi in his place at Simla, be rescinded. The Syndicate accepted this with the result that *status quo* was restored. The appointment of Shri K. L. Sethi as Secretary to the Vice-Chancellor which was unanimously approved by Senate under regulation 55 at pages 100-101 of the Calendar, Vol. I, therefore, stood. As regards Shri S. N. Sehgal, he was appointed under a different regulation, as a permanent hand, when he was 56 years old. On reaching the age of 58 years, he was granted 2 years' extension as in the case permanent Assistant Registrar and Deputy Registrars. Extension beyond 60 years of age is permissible only on technical grounds or on account of non-availability of suitable substitutes for a particular post and had seldom been granted. Only in one case that of Shri Bodh Raj Malhotra extension was allowed by the Senate beyond 60 years, but it seemed to him that this, too, was more on compassionate grounds than on technical grounds. Ever since the creation of the post of Secretary to Vice-Chancellor, retired officers of Education Department have occupied it. Shri Sehgal had had his innings for more than four years, and had done good work, and it was time he made room for another capable person. The Vice-Chancellor's Secretary as a major part of his duties has to deal with reviews of books submitted by publishers. This work is very important and of a highly confidential nature. Naturally, therefore, when the head of a leading publishing firm, takes such keen interest in the continuance of a particular person as the Vice-Chancellor's Secretary, he could not resist having second thoughts about that person.

Continuing, the Vice-Chancellor stated that when the Senate unanimously approved Shri K. L. Sethi's appointment as his Secretary, they wanted him to recommend the period of this temporary appointment. There is no rule or regulation or even a decision of the Syndicate or Senate that the office of his Secretary should be co-terminous with the Vice-Chancellor's own office. Dr. V. S. Puri did not raise this point when the present Vice-Chancellor took office two years ago and Shri Sehgal was continuing to hold the Secretary's post. The Syndicate, on his recommendation, had now proposed to Senate that Shri K. L. Sethi's appointment be for a period of three years with effect from July 1, 1967.

Principal B. L. Kapur drew attention to the point raised by Dr. V. S. Puri that the tenure of the Secretary's appointment should be co-terminous with the term of the Vice-Chancellor.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that he had already given a reply. There is no rule or regulation that the term of the Secretary should be co-terminous with the term of the Vice-Chancellor. He also pointed out that Dr. Puri should have raised this point when the present Vice-Chancellor took office two years ago if he wanted to raise it at all.

On being put to vote, the recommendation of the Syndicate was approved by a voice vote, only 4 members voting against.

RESOLVED: That the recommendation of the Syndicate regarding temporary appointment of Shri K. L. Sethi as Secretary to the Vice-Chancellor, already ap-

proved by the Senate on March 28, 1967, for a period of three years, with effect from July 1, 1967, be approved.

XI. Item No. 38 on the agenda was read out, viz.—

38. That in consequence of revision of grades, an employee be allowed to postpone fixation of his pay in the revised grade till he has drawn his increment in the present grade.

(Para 111, 3-6-1967)

Dr. B. R. Chauhan said that the new grades had already been introduced by some younger Universities like the Panjabi and Kurukshetra. He wanted to know the date when the revised grades would be introduced by the Panjab University. He also pointed out that in view of the fact that at the time of revision of grades, the teachers of affiliated colleges would be given benefit of service in the form of one, two or three increments, depending on the length of service, the same benefits be given to the teachers of the University also. He, therefore, suggested that the wording of para 38 may be considered as clause (a) and the following two clauses be added to it :—

- (b) That at the time of revision of grades and fixation of pay in the new grades, the Panjab University teachers be given, one, two or three increments, as the case may be, in the form of service benefits as granted to the teachers of affiliated colleges in Punjab, in accordance, with the formula applied by the Punjab Govt. in the light of their length of service.
- (c) That for the purpose of calculation of length of service, the time of his service put in an affiliated college before joining a University Department should be taken into account, provided there was no gap between the time of leaving the earlier job in an affiliated college and his taking up the present job in the Panjab University.

The Vice-Chancellor replied that so far as the date of revision of grades was concerned, the latest information he had from the Education Secretaries of the two States was that they were going to make definite announcements in this regard by the end of this month. As regards the suggestions made by Dr. B. R. Chauhan, the matter may be examined by the Finance Board. He, however, pointed out that item 38 had nothing to do with the revision of grades.

Shri M. L. Anand proposed that the recommendation of Syndicate be approved, and the suggestion made by Dr. B. R. Chauhan be considered

RESOLVED : (i) That the recommendation of Syndicate that in consequence of revision of grades, an employee be allowed to postpone fixation of his pay in the revised grade till he has drawn his increment in the present grade, be approved;

(ii) That the suggestion of Dr. B. R. Chauhan be considered by the Board of Finance and Syndicate.

(1) That, in accordance with the policy hitherto followed for payment of Dearness Allowance to University employees at State Government rates, and as the Punjab Government, Himachal Pradesh Government and the Union Territory of Chandigarh have sanctioned Central Government Dearness Allowance to their employees and the Haryana Government has agreed to it in principle, the Panjab University employees be paid Dearness

Allowance at Central Government rates on the same basis as allowed by the Panjab Government, Himachal Pradesh Government and the Union Territory of Chandigarh, with effect from May 1, 1967, viz.—

- (i) That the Chandigarh allowance at 6½ per cent being paid to the employees drawing pay up to Rs. 370 per month with marginal adjustment up to Rs. 393.12 be continued to be paid as heretofore.
- (ii) That the approval of the Central Government to the additional expenditure involved in payment of Dearness Allowance at Central Government rates be obtained.
- (iv) If, in order to meet this expenditure, additional sources have to be found, the Vice-Chancellor may be authorised to find ways and means and to sort out matters with the Government.
- (v) (a) That one additional Store Keeper in the grade of Rs. 120-5-145-7-180-12-300 may be provided by conversion of one of the existing posts of Copy holders provided in the same grade in the Press.

Shri Teja Singh was happy that the Panjab University had agreed to sanction Dearness Allowance at Central Government rates, for which the Vice-Chancellor has been requested to find additional sources. He suggested that the rate of remuneration to examiners should also be suitably increased and the additional sources for the increased expenditure on this account should also be found.

Principal O. P. Mohan asked whether the approval for payment of Dearness Allowance at Central Government rates was conditional. The Vice-Chancellor replied in the affirmative. It will depend on the availability of funds for which he has been in touch with the Central Government and also the State Governments of Panjab and Haryana.

Prof. D. C. Sharma remarked that in the legal sense of the word, the decision was certainly conditional. He knew that the Vice-Chancellor had been kind enough to approach the State Governments and also the Central Government and had even met the Chairman of the University Grants Commission and the Union Education Minister in his efforts to get the required funds. He, therefore, said that the matter should be left to the Vice-Chancellor who was already pursuing it earnestly.

Principal O. P. Dogra remarked that the students of the affiliated colleges should not be included in the possible additional sources.

Dr. K. L. Jaura suggested that the words used in the Syndicate resolution "University employees" should be clarified so as to include both teaching and non-teaching employees. This was agreed to.

Principal B. S. Bahl, appreciating the efforts of the Vice-Chancellor for getting additional funds to pay to the University employees. Dearness Allowance at Central Government rates, requested for help in regard to the payment of Dearness Allowance to the teachers of affiliated colleges also.

The Vice-Chancellor stated that it would not be possible to enforce the Dearness Allowance at Central Government rates till the approval of the Government had been received. He said that it was not possible with the resources of the University to bear the additional expenditure. The Panjab University, he said, was now attached to the Central Government, but they had not taken any responsibility in regard to financial assistance, for which they issue necessary directions to the State Governments. The State Governments had all agreed to give to their own employees Dearness Allowance at Central Government rates, and, therefore, the demand of the University employees (both teaching and non-teaching) would be irresistible. After the Senate approved the recommendations of the Syndicate, he would again approach the Central Government. The Government would have to secure necessary funds, but if that was not possible,

Senate would have to consider ways and means to meet the demand for payment of Dearness Allowance at Central Government rates.

RESOLVED : That the recommendations of the Syndicate be approved with the modification that the University employees in clause (i) shall mean both teaching and non-teaching.
