Is it in your power to suggest to them a mode to find friends or employment for the time being, until they can have time to adjust themselves to our usages? They will tell you their story, and I know that you will listen to it not only with respect, but interest? Cannot something be done to procure some temporary assistance? Are there not those who will contribute to their necessities, who might not be willing to aid an unpopular movement?
