■ WHAT ARE SOME OF THE JOBS?

CHIROPRACTORS...adjust spinal column and other articulations of the body to prevent disease and correct abnormalities of the human body believed to be caused by interference with the nervous system. They examine patients to determine the nature and extent of the disorder, which may include manipulating the spine or other involved areas. Some supplementary measures that may be utilized are exercise, rest, water, light, heat and nutritional therapy.

DENTISTS...diagnose and treat diseases, injuries and malformations of teeth, gums and related oral structures. They are supported by dental hygienists, who clean teeth and provide other preventive dental care, and dental assistants, who perform a wide range of patient care, laboratory and office duties.


EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS...or EMT's...give immediate care to patients who need urgent medical attention and then transport the sick or injured to medical facilities.

OPTICIANS...or dispensing opticians...fit eyeglasses and contact lenses, following prescriptions from ophthalmologists or optometrists.

PHARMACISTS...dispense drugs prescribed by physicians and other health practitioners and provide information to patients about medications and their use. They are assisted by pharmacy technicians, who fill orders for unit doses and prepackaged medications, and pharmacy assistants, who mix pharmaceutical preparations, issue medicine, and label and store supplies.

SPEECH PATHOLOGISTS...assess and treat speech, language, voice and fluency disorders, such as stuttering. Audiologists assess and treat persons with hearing and related disorders.

VETERINARIANS...diagnose and treat diseases and dysfunctions of animals. They dress wounds, set broken bones, perform surgery, prescribe and administer medicines and vaccinate animals against disease. They are supported by veterinary assistants who are the primary caretakers of animals under their charge—particularly following surgery.



WHAT IS THE JOB OUTLOOK?

A growing and aging population is the driving force which will create many job vacancies for the diverse health service occupations listed in this guide. As the number of middle-aged and older persons continues to rise rapidly over the coming decade, needs for a wide range of medical services—and the workers who provide them—will grow substantially. The demand for dental care, vision care, pharmaceuticals, nutritional counseling, chiropractic services, emergency medical services, and treatment for speech and hearing impairments should all continue to expand. And finally, the outlook for veterinarians and their support staff who are responsible for the health and well being of our growing animal population should be favorable in both urban and rural settings in Illinois.
