



BACONE(Bay-cone) COLLEGE owes her founding directly to three great men: Professor Almon C. Bacone, Reverend Joseph S. Murrow, D.D., and Reverend Daniel Rogers, D.D., all of whom were missionaries to the Indians of the Five Civilized Tribes. A charter was granted by the National Council of the Creek Nation in 1884.

BACONE COLLEGE for fifty-eight years has been a training camp for Indian citizens. It was dedicated in service to all Indians of the United States by our Pioneer Fathers. It has a rich and romantic history, unexcelled anywhere by any educational institution. Bacone's unselfish service to the ever widening cause of church and state challenges the admiration and appreciation of all right thinking people. Thousands of students have gained information and inspiration within her classic walls. They have carried the benefits and blessings of Christian education into every Indian tribe in America.










CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Bacone Junior College is accredited by the Oklahoma State Board of Education. 








Sunday School Classes






BACONE is the only college in existence maintained exclusively for North American Indians.

BACONE students are classified as Junior College, high school and grade school. 300 students can be accommodated. All branches are fully accredited.

BACONE enrollment represents 42 different tribes.

BACONE has many graduates in Indian Service, public schools in cities and rural communities, and Civil Service positions.

BACONE has for many years helped students to further their education in other institutions in order to become doctors, lawyers, ministers, missionaries, nurses, and social service workers.
