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#### Occasions for Sesquicentennial Ceremonies

Ceremonies at which the Indiana Sesquicentennial theme may be introduced and employed to advantage range from opening exercises in a school room to two- or three-day celebrations by an entire community or county. Below are listed examples of events that might be enhanced by a ceremony honoring the state's 1816 birth or its subsequent progress and development:

In schools -

School assemblies or convocations on "statehood" days or other patriotic days P T A meetings Daily announcements on public address system Social studies classes English literature classes General music classes Honor day with special honors for citizenship Formal opening of a school concert Concert of Indiana music Prologue to a school play Use pioneer motifs to decorate for school dance

In communities -

Special program at service clubs Opening ceremonies at service club meetings Youth meetings - Boy Scout, Girl Scout, 4-H, etc. Dedications of public buildings Little theater openings Antique shows or sales Political rallies Local centennials, local sesquicentennials, or other local bistorical observances Memorial Day events Fourth of July events Armed Forces Day events Etc.

Some Ideas for Ceremonies

Since, in many cases, the purpose of ceremonies will be to remind people that Indiana is enjoying its 150th birthday, the ceremonies may be brief, simple and even subordinate to the event with which they are connected. It is hoped that the following suggestions may stimulate local committees to think of appropriate ceremonial activities: Singing and/or playing the state song, "On the Banks of the Wabash" Present the Indiana state flag along with the U. S. flag Costume the color guard in pioneer garb Display a 19-star U. S. flag along with a 50-star flag Use two color guards, one in pioneer costume, the other in modern military uniform Focus a spot-light on a large sesquicentennial seal Project the image of the sesquicentennial seal on wall or screen Use outlines of the map of Indiana or state capitol in Corydon to decorate back-drops on stages or other settings for ceremonies Re-enact the signing of the state constitution Re-enact the signing of the proclamation of statehood Display birthday cake with 150 candles (or 15 candles one for each decade) Sing or play the songs of Indiana colleges Announce, with fanfare and dignity, forthcoming events in the Indiana Sesquicentennial Herald the arrival of the Sesquicentennial mobile display Etc.

Developing a Sesquicentennial Pageant

Dramatic presentations to mark the 150th anniversary of Indiana's statehood may be simple, do-it-yourself scenes enacted in an elementary school classroom, an all-evening, fully-staged pageant complete with orchestral accompaniment, or anything in between.

The episodes in an historical pageant may be short, informal skits or lavish, extended "production numbers". The pageant form permits free juxtaposition of episodes which may vary widely in their dramatic style, scenic resources and historical significance. Amateurish episodes may be sandwiched between highly professional ones with only a minimum of transitional material, provided that the movement from one scene to the next is achieved with promptness and confidence.

The "book" for a pageant may be written piecemeal by various groups or individuals or it may be the creation of one skilled person. If the piecemeal development is used, someone must be given the authority to edit the various parts, to prevent redundance, to give a measure of unity and to determine the best sequence for dramatic effect. The device or "vehicle" by which the scenes of a pageant may be tied together and given a degree of continuity frequently helps to determine which events will most easily dramatize and best fit into the pageant. Only a few of the many such vehicles are suggested below:

# Some Ways to Connect the Episodes of a Pageant into a Logical Sequence

 Use a narrator who can carry the story from one scene to the next and also fill in the pauses between scenes.

2. Have two students searching through their history book for the sesquicentennial story. The episodes then represent the events they find described in their history book.

3. Project slides to supply information which will guide the viewer from one scene to the next.

4. Use a quartet or trio (male or female) to sing parodies which will introduce the next episode.

5. Interludes of instrumental music which set the moods for scenes that follow.

6. Have characters enter a time-ship which will take them back in time to 1816 to view the constitutional convention and other historical events.

7. While reading imaginary letters from an imaginary Corydon girl of the 1816 period, act out in pantomine or dramatic scenes events that might have occurred in those times.

8. A then-and-now approach in which a series of scenes contrasts the way things were done in 1816 or pioneer times with the way they are done in 1966.

9. Reviewing Indiana's cultural heritage in a series of episodes and performances which present the advances in poetry, art and music.

10. Make the stage a classroom in which a class is being taught a lesson concerning Indiana gaining statehood. Visual aids shown to the staged class will be viewed by the audience as well and the class discussion can provide the narration.

# Events for Dramatization in Pageant Episodes

The events selected for dramatization in a sesquicentennial pageant may center on pioneer times, on the constitutional convention

and the formalities of achieving statehood, on Corydon as the State's first capital, on the local community and its pioneer days, on 150 years of progress in Indiana, on the history and progress of the local community, on political and economic development, or on cultural development of the State or local community.

The list below is intended to suggest a few of the kinds of events which might be selected for dramatization.

#### Practical Considerations in Pageant Production

If a pageant is undertaken as a community project, there should be an organization with an over-all committee and chairman to formulate policies and make major decisions. Working under such a committee there needs to be a director or pageant master, the real coordinator and possibly the most important person connected with the production. Sometimes it is convenient for the director to also be the musical director, but it is wise to have a separate business manager, who may or may not double as the advertising manager, but who will have the responsibility for estimating income, arranging ticket sales, and guarding the purse strings for the entire enterprise.

The director may find it expedient to have episode directors who can take the responsibility for casting, rehearsing and costuming the separate episodes. The size and complexity of the pageant will determine whether the director needs a cast director, a dance director, and a musical director to work with him. Generally a stage designer with some skill in this area and a scenic manager, an electrician, and a costume committee to carry out his ideas, are essential.

The pageant should be written and cast so that the various episodes may be rehearsed separately and then combined with a minimum number of full rehearsals. Mimeographed instructions to the cast, staff and musicians can help to minimize rehearsal time.

The use of flood lights and spot lights in addition to the usual general lighting is strongly recommended.

Many costumes for a pageant may be found in attics, but adequate ones may be made from cheeze cloth, cotton crepe, cotton poplin, Canton flannel, or burlap. Cheap dyes may be used for the bright colors which show up to advantage in pageantry.

Sets may consist of mere suggestions achieved through stick outlines or outlines of masking tape applied to backdrops or neutral flats. Some effective sets are obtained by projecting pictures upon a plain backdrop or cyclorama.

While the staging for a pageant may be less formal and less realistic than for a play, the acting may be more formal, for the pageant doesn't aim at dramatic perfection, but at a more spontaneous community effort.

The music for a pageant should either be definitely background music, like accompaniment to a solo, or it should demand principal attention, avoiding any in-between levels. It should be suitable to the mood and to the period and, if possible, the orchestra or band should be hidden. A cue sheet for each musician will save much rehearsal time. Having the audience sing an opening or closing song has a strong unifying effect.

In writing a pageant it is important to identify the characters through the dialog and to keep speeches short and natural. If songs are brought in they should be introduced as naturally as possible so that they seem to be a genuine outgrowth of the dramatic situation. The show should be planned in units or scenes each of which has its own set and personnel (cast). It is a good idea to plan for small scenes between big ones so that the small ones, with two or three characters, may be enacted in front of a curtain while the ensuing large scene is being set.

In pageants employing a narrator, when parts of documents are quoted. a different voice may be used to make the quote stand out clearly.

A bit of homespun humor is an asset in a pageant; and an effective finale can be a hymm of thanks, a patriotic air or a patriotic pledge.

#### Radio-type Productions

Much less ambitious than a pageant, but very effective as a class project, is the development of a radio-type show for broadcast over the school public address system or over a local radio station. Various members of the class may be assigned responsibilities for script writing, music selection (recorded or live), writing original songs or parodies, acting roles, singing solos or in a chorus, operating and monitoring the tape recorder, editing the tape, and announcing the credits. Certain aspects of Indiana's cultural heritage may form the center of interest for unitized study in the classroom or community. Resource units may be prepared by taking advantage of the <u>Handbook on Indiana History</u> by Donald Carmony (available from the Indiana Sesquicentennial Commission), the bibliography therein, and the lists of music in this bulletin. Supplementary resource material of a local nature should be sought to provide for local color and interest.

In developing such instructional units, it is important that each student has a part in:

- 1. Choosing and initiating the center of interest for the unit
- Planning the ensuing activities regarding what, where and how information, understandings and skills are to be acquired
- Working alone and with others on tasks related to solving problems which are meaningful to him
- 4. Summarizing and unitizing his experiences with other of his group, and
- 5. Evaluating his progress in the light of his purposes and those of his group.

Starting Points for Unitized Learning Experiences Centered about Indiana's Cultural Heritage

- Make a study of the history of your locality. Look for buildings, monuments, shrines, streets, books, pictures, old music, etc., which will help you.
- Read stories, biographies and plays about Indiana's creative people, writers, musicians and artists, and their home towns.
- 3. Read, write and make reports about Hoosiers in the musical and theatrical world.

- Make a map showing places where you would find evidences of Indiana's cultural history or where outstanding cultural experiences might be found today.
- Write your own songs about Indiana, your community and your school.
- Write and present a play, operetta or puppet show about some phase of Indiana's cultural history.
- Collect and report on old song books and sheet music and discuss how these reflect the people who made and used them.
- Visit museums and historic sites and while there observe any articles or writings about Indiana's music and music makers, her play wrights and actors, and her painters and sculptors.
- Make individual booklets about what you read or what you see in museums, films, newspapers, and field trips.
- 10. Bring old musical instruments to school, examine them and find out about their development and history.
- Look through your music books for songs about Indiana or pioneer days. Learn what these songs can tell you about Indiana and its music.
- 12. Write a story about some Indiana musician, writer or artist and read it to the group, then place it in your Indiana scrapbook.
- Make a display of old articles relating to Indiana's music, art, drama, poetry, and architecture and share your display with others.
- 14. Make posters showing musical instruments and dances of the Indians, early settlers, Civil War days, "Gay Nineties", and other eras in Indiana's cultural history.
- 15. Trace the source of some of the songs of the pioneers to the "old country" from which they came. You may be surprised at the age and origin of some of the songs we still sing today.
- 16. Pretend that you are living in Knightstown, Indiana, and that the National Road has just been completed. Plan how you would celebrate the day with singing, dancing, and entertainment.
- Plan a concert of music about Indiana or made up of pieces written by Indiana composers.
- 18. Read aloud a play written by a Hoosier.

Some Topics for Unit Studies

A class may be divided into committees to study and report on topics such as: A Musical History of Indiana; Hoosiers in the Entertainment World: Indiana Anthem and Hymm Writers; Music of Indians in the Indiana Territory; Music of the Indiana Pioneers; The Music Industry in Indiana (Elkhart); The Show boat: Indiana's Symphony Orchestras; Indiana's Dramatists.

#### INDIANA COMPOSERS

The sesquicentennial year provides a splendid opportunity to feature music written by native Hoosiers and composers who lived in Indiana for a significant length of time. Such compositions might comprise an entire program which might be advertised as a concert of Indiana music, a Hoosier Hootenanny, or a sesquicentennial serenade. If an entire concert can not be devoted to music from our state, individual numbers by Hoosier composers may be given prominent places on public concerts and attention may be directed to such sesquicentennial selections by special announcements or program notes.

The following list of Indiana composers was developed from a book "Indiana Composers--Native and Adopted" compiled in 1936 for the Indiana Federation of Music Clubs by mesdames Frank Cregor, Clyde Titus and Ruby Mosemiller and from scripts for a series of radio broadcasts about Indiana's composers produced at Indiana University by Harry Skornia in 1946.

Communities may wish to feature those composers most closely identified with their part of the state and to present performances of works composed by local youths who deserve and need such encouragement.

> Patr. -Music of a general patriotic nature.
> Pioneer - Folk music and other music which may be associated

with the early days in the Northwest Territory or Indiana's statehood.
