

## New Iris for 1971

#### TOWN AND COUNTRY (Gaulter '71)

Each \$20.00

A silvery rose-violet of spreading form and with unusual curls and contrasting appendages in the standards. This is from a long line of seedlings involving Marie Phillips and Sterling Silver; in fact it inherits some of its silvery contrasts from the latter. Both standards and falls are of a uniform, bright rose-violet hue and the beard is white. All petals are gracefully waved at the margins. Large flowers on stout stems, 34 inches in height. Seedling No. 67-34.

#### GONDOLIER (J. Nelson '71)

Each \$20.00

A very brilliant deep, glowing, red-purple self, a child of Doge of Venice and hence the name. Falls are exceptionally broad and clean and the beard is inconspicuous, adding to the one-color, rich effect. 3-foot stems, with plenty of branching and several large flowers to the stalk. We hope to show this in color next year because it is richness personified! Seedling No. 66-11-1.

#### OUTREACH (J. Nelson '71)

Each \$20.00

This golden yellow and white bears so much color similarity to last year's introduction Fairlight from this same hybridizer, that readers may wonder why this one is justified. Well, first of all Outreach is among the first of the giant bearded to come into flower, and while the broad falls are wavy, neither they nor the standards are fringed with lace, as is the very late Fairlight. Although blooming early the stems carry so many big blossoms that they continue past mid-season. Those who see each of these fine varieties will want them both! Height 36 inches.

#### SUMMER SILK (Gibson '71)

Each \$25.00

In color a very odd shade of chamois or creamy tan, described by some as "pongee" and others as creamy flesh, although it is not in any category of pink. It is a complete self, including the beard and styles. As you will note on our cover picture, all petals are extra wide, the falls almost touching each other. They flare out widely and drop gracefully at the outer rim. No. 27-5G. 34 inches.

#### TIBURON (Gaulter '71)

Each \$25.00

From a long line of seedlings involving Arctic Flame we have this deep orchid with flaming red beard and fringed petal edges. All petals are fluted and waved, the blossoms of great size and are indeed remindful of giant orchids. Many blooms to the stem, at least three feet in height. No. 68-12. Shown on the cover.

#### CASINO QUEEN (Gibson '71)

Each \$25.00

A descendant from the April Melody line and one which should leave little to be desired in the way of a "pink plicata." The perfectly formed big flowers are borne on stems over three feet in height, widely branched, and our picture tells more than we can convey in words. Solid pinkish standards, flushed with white, not stitched. Falls pure white, exceptionally broad, delicately trimmed with the pink hue of the standards. Very large, ruffled and clean looking. No. 27-5P. 36-38 inches.

#### BONANZA BELLE (Gibson '71)

Each \$25.00

Opalescent standards of coppery apricot, waved, fluted and folded, very full and upright but closed at the top. Extra large style-arms and a heavy yellow beard are notable features. The falls are broad and rounded, pinkish white, shading out to a blended margin of apricot to match the standards. No. 100-4A. 36 inches.

#### APRICOT BLAZE (Gibson '71)

Each \$25.00

A tangerine bearded plicata of giant size and perfect proportions. The beautifully formed standards are solid copperyapricot or pale amber, without markings, and they are folded and closed at the top. Falls are ivory in the central area, with shoulder markings of amber, shading out to amber at the margins. No. 20-5E. 34 inches. Pictured on cover.

#### **OPENING NIGHT** (Gibson '70)

Although withdrawn because of shortage of stock—a limited number can be supplied this year at \$25.00 each. Early orders only.



#### **EXPLANATION OF TERMS USED IN DESCRIPTIONS**

The American Iris Society makes a number of awards annually to outstanding Iris varieties. Each year the highest honor given is the "Dykes Medal." Other awards are as follows:

H.C. "Highly Commended"

A.M. "Award of Merit"

H.M. "Honorable Mention"

In order to be eligible for the Dykes Medal an Iris must have previously earned both the Honorable Mention and Award of Merit, the latter two having been separated by a one year interval.

Varieties designated as "Plicatas" bear markings of stitches, dots or stipples. A "self" is a flower of one color

Season of bloom is indicated by letters as follows: E. early; EM, early to midseason; M, midseason; ML, midseason to late; L, late, and VL, very late. Height of stem in inches is shown, for example, as 36".

These symbols are approximate, because soil conditions, climate and other circumstances must be considered. The total time span of bloom will extend over a period of several weeks from early to very late.

# The World's Finest Iris

AFRICAN QUEEN (J. Nelson, '70) ML. 38" Each \$15.00

A subtle shade of dark brown, darker at the haft and toward the edges; standards and falls of similar color. Beard is dark yellow. Big flowers on perfect stems, all petals nicely ruffled. Parentage is Torchbearer x Western Welcome. See page 7.

AFTER DARK (Schreiner, '63) E. 40"

Deepest, velvety, rich violet-blue. The big, slightly ruffled flowers are produced on four-branched stems reaching to 44 inches in height. Early. HM AIS, 1964.

ALALOA (Gibson, '59) E. 26"

Lemon-yellow with a lighter area in the center of the falls. Falls flare and possess a heavy enamel-like texture. It is a flower for foreground planting since its height is only about two feet. HM AIS, 1961. See page 52.

ALASKAN CROWN (J. Nelson, '66) M. 36" Each \$5.00

This ruffled combination of white and gold is regarded by Mrs. Nelson as one of the most distinct and beautiful things she has originated. Broad of petal, in both standards and falls, it is pure white with heavy lace and "crimpings" of yellow all about the edges. Hafts are deep yellow set with reddish-orange beards. Height, branching, size and substance are all excellent. HM AIS, 1967. Shown on page 29.

AL BORAK (DeForest, '52) M. 36" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50

A very large brown and copper-russet flower, having wide spreading falls with extremely wide hafts. A light brown garden effect in an Iris which many judges regard as absolutely perfect in form. Three feet in height, finely branched. HM AIS, 1953.

ALLAGLOW (Tompkins, '58) Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50

A gigantic Iris of bright sunburst-gold, blended bittersweet-orange, with an all-over flush of clear copper-yellow. The whole flower has a glistening gold dusted finish and a tiny dash of orchid at the tip of the chrome beard. Very broad petaled, with flaring, ruffled falls and wide domed standards. Late; 38 inches. HM AIS, 1958; AM, 1960.

AMETHYST FLAME (Schreiner, '58) ML. 38" Each \$1.50

Immense in size and elegant in form, a curiously tinted blend of lavender or light violet and rosy heliotrope. The "shoulders" of the falls carry an overlay of chestnut and the beard is almost white. Nicely ruffled, 38 inches tall, medium late. HM AIS, 1958; AM, 1960. Dykes Medal, 1963. Plant Patent No. 1793. See page 6.

AMIGO'S GUITAR (Plough, '64) EM. 36"

Standards are dark Butterscotch with a violet mid-rib, the wide falls blue-violet, lightly tinted rose, ruffled and fluted. This is similar in pattern to Gypsy Lullaby-but the colors are more subdued. HM AIS, 1965; AM, 1967.

ANGEL BRIGHT (Rees, '66) ML. 36"

A creamy combination of sparkling white and vivid chrome yellow. Standards are domed and the falls are broad, with a heavy pattern of gold on the haft and a matching rich golden beard. Well branched, large flowers. HM AIS, 1968.

ANNABEL LEE (Schreiner, '66) VL. 40"

Each \$7.50

A cool, light rose pink with charming ruffling and thick substance. This is a great improvement over the old Briar Rose but of a somewhat similar shade and an equally startling red-orange beard. Large blossoms, wavy sculptured form and 40-inch branching stems. Very late. HM AIS, 1967.

ANTHEM (Schreiner, '58) EM. 40" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50

The richness of the fuchsia-purple tone is intensified by a generous margin of bronze around the huge falls. Metallic plum might well describe the general color effect. Beard is lemon. 40 inches, fairly early. HM AIS, 1960.

APPLE VALLEY (DeForest, '58) EM. 36"

Almost white, flushed pink, with deeper pink cast about the hafts, The pink-tinted beard intensifies the pinkish glow of an otherwise almost white, very beautiful and different flower. Very large, with broad petals and tall stalks. HM AIS, 1960. See page 38.

APRICOT DANCER (Noyd, '58) ML. 34"

Each \$1.00

A late flowering orange-apricot self. The horizontal and flaring falls are nicely fringed with lace. Substance is extra heavy. Here decidedly rich piece of color which won the HM of the AIS in 1959.

APRIL MELODY (Gibson, '67) ML. 36"

This is a pretty close approach to being a pink plicata . . . the ground color light, almost white, pinkish lavender and the markings a bright and intense shade of lavender-rose. In 1965 this was awarded the cup for best seedling at the regional A.I.S. meeting. As noted in the picture, the flowers are a bit lacy and especially well proportioned. Large and long lasting. HM AIS, 1968. See page 8.

ARCTIC FLAME (Fay, '60) ML. 35" Each \$2.50
This breathtakingly beautiful big white has heavy texture and much ruffling. The beard is thick and wide, and glows with a fiery reddish tinge. A stalwart grower, the 35-inch stalks sturdy and well balanced. HM AIS, 1960; AM., 1962.

ARCTIC FURY (C. Benson, '64) M. 36"

Each \$5.00

Large, sculptured, snow white blooms of great width, lightly ruffled and semi-flaring in form. Even the beard is white. Sturdy and well branched stalks. HM AIS, 1965; AM, 1967.

ASPENGLOW (Loomis, '56) L. 40" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50 Vivid cadmium yellow self, the standards pleated near the base. This

fine, large deep yellow is quite late and thus aids in extending the Iris season. One of the "Five Iris of the Year" for 1962. HM AIS, 1958.

AUGUST MOON (Schmelzer, '62) M. 34"

Cool, greenish cream of heavy, leather-like substance. Flowers are of good form with lacy ruffles and the beard is deep yellow. 34 inches; midseason. HM AIS, 1964. See page 16.



BACCARAT (Gaulter, '67) M. 36"

A carnival of color, blended graduations of brown, amber and light purple . . . like changeable silk . . . in the heavily ruffled standards, and extremely broad, flat, flaring falls of bright violet banded golden brown. Hafts are solid light brown and the beard is bright orange. Remindful of some pagan ceremonial dance! Large blossoms; 36-inch, well branched, heavy stems. HM AIS, 1968. See page 8.

BANG (Craig, '55) EM. 36" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50 A red with a name in keeping with the impression it creates in the garden! Broad falls of brilliant color and heavy substance, slightly waved. HM AIS, 1955; AM, 1960. One of the "Five Iris of the Year" for 1963.

**BERMUDA HIGH** (Tompkins, '64) ML. 40" Each \$3.50 A self of glowing "Blood Ruby" red, clean and unblemished, with chocolate brown beard. Wide, domed standards and broad, flaring falls are special features of this new and exciting bright red. Perfectly branched. HM AIS, 1966.

it appear blue all over. Silky sheen and brilliant color! See page 25. **BLUE FORMAL** (Schortman, '64) ML. 36"

Each \$10.00

One of the "bluest of blues", with extra wide petals and thick texture.

Lightly fluted at the margins. The stalwart and justly famous Indiglow is a parent. HM AIS, 1965.

BLUE GROTTO (Grinter, '59) L. 36" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50

One of the largest Iris we have grown or seen anywhere, the wide falls squarely held and the large standards erect and closed. Color is a uniform shade of light violet-blue, the substance that of fine

china. Well balanced, late, three feet in height. See page 39.

BLUE MOUNTAINS (Schreiner, '64) ML. 38" Each \$3.00 Rich, medium violet blue of exceptionally large size and perfect form. A clump of this Iris loaded with huge blooms on heavy, well branched stalks, was the talk of visitors at the Denver A.I.S. convention. HM AIS, 1965.

BLUE SAPPHIRE (Schreiner, '53) E. 36" Each \$1,00; 3 for \$2.50 "Heavenly blue" is a phrase befitting the ruffled addition to an increasingly popular color class. Lighter in tone than many others, with a glowing gold beard it is large in size, on tall well branched stalks which defy both wind and rain. HM AIS, 1954; AM, 1956; DYKES Medal, 1958. See page 35.

BLUSHING BEAUTY (Noyd, '64) M. 38" Fach \$3.50 A warm white with hafts of definite blush pink and a bright coral red beard. Apple Valley is in its parentage. Contrast of colors is striking, the very large blossoms well spaced on stems over three feet in height as it grows here. HM AIS, 1965.

BRASILIA (Schreiner, '61) M. 35" Each \$1.50 Deep but very brilliant henna-brown-red. This is a new and striking color in Iris, much more lively than others in the brownish color tones. It is large, well proportioned and beautifully branched. HM AIS, 1962. See page 16.

BRASS ACCENTS (Schreiner, '59) M. 40" Each \$1.50
Golden coffee-brown, regal in carriage, huge in size, ideal in form.
We regard this seedling of Inca Chief as a leader amongst the host of beautiful brown Iris now available. HM AIS, 1959; AM, 1961. Shown on page 39.

BRAVADO (Hall, '59) M. 35" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50 Deepest golden yellow, ruffled and with wide petals. There is something about this flower-heaviness of texture, metallic glisten, or uniform depth of golden richness-that draws instant attention in the garden or on the show table. HM AIS, 1959; AM, 1963. Shown on page 35.

BRAVE VIKING (Hinkle, '62) M. 38" Each \$2.00 A huge medium to light blue with a white beard tipped yellow. Great ruffled flowers which are three inches broad at the hafts and will last up to 5 or 6 days.

BREATHLESS (Schreiner, '62) EM. 38" Each \$2.50 A new flamingo pink of large size and spreading form, medium in tone but vivid and alive. The flowers are beautifully tailored, the petals waved, and the hafts are flushed with peach. Coral beard. HM AIS, 1963.

BRIGHT CLOUD (O. Brown, '61) EM. 38" Fach \$1.50 With white standards and blue falls this descendant of Melodrama has more and much sharper color contrast than its parent. It does carry the extra wide falls and moderate ruffling, however. Huge blossoms, on 36-40 inch stems. Midseason; long-lasting. HM AIS, 1962. See page 38.

BRIGHT HERALD (Wills, '64) M. 36" Each \$5.00 A bright rose and white amoena. Standards are creamy white, broad and full; falls are a lively shade of rose-red with coppery overlay. This is an attractive big flower in a color combination quite rarely seen.

BRIGHTSIDE (Schreiner, '61) EM. 38" Each \$2.50 Pale, shimmering lemon yellow that is huge, frothy and ivory smooth. The broad petals are heavily laced at the edges. Fine form and branching are added good features of this sparkling Iris. HM AIS, 1962.

**BRILLIANT STAR** (Hall, '61) Each \$2.00 We regard this as the finest red-bearded white we have grown or seen. It is very broad petaled, full and rather rounded but not drooping, beautifully branched and very large. Quite early, 36 inches. HM AIS, 1962. See page 22.

BROADWAY STAR (Schreiner, '57) ML. Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50 Cream standards and rose-red falls combine to fashion a totally different and refreshingly beautiful creation. Hafts are almost free of any venation, lending sharp contrast to the bright ivory standards. 38 inches tall, classically formed and large in size. HM AIS, 1957. See page 30.

BRONZE BELL (Schreiner, '57) EM. 36" Reddish copper-bronze in a huge flower of perfect form and large size. The stalks are heavy and well branched, with many blossoms per stem. It is taller, redder and better branched than its parent, Inca Chief. HM AIS, 1957; AM, 1959. Plant Patent No. 1728.

BUTTERSCOTCH KISS (Plough, '57) ML. 36"

Each \$1.50 A caramel shade of yellow, glistening brightly with gold dust particles. There is an intensification of yellow in the heart and on the petal edges. The large flowers are heavily laced and crinkled at the margins. HM AIS, 1957; AM, 1959. See page 31.

BUTTERCUP BOWER (Tompkins, '61) EM. 38" Each \$1.50

The fine blend of lemon, lime and yellow with giant, fully rounded flowers, broad segments and strong color contrasts. HM AIS, 1962. See page 49.

CAMELOT ROSE (Tompkins, '65) ML. 39"

Each \$10.00

An exciting new Iris with standards of silky, silvery orchid and brightly glowing Burgundy red falls of great width and velvety finish. Hafts are solidly colored and are set with a heavy, bright orange-red beard. HM AIS, 1966; AM, 1968. See page 10.

CANDLEFLAME (Hall, '61) M. 36"

Gigantic ivory-cream self with a tangerine-orange beard which shades to almost white. There is a suggestion of greenish veining in the falls. Style arms are deeper ivory. Extremely broad falls and heavy 3-foot stems with good branching. HM AIS, 1962.

CANDLE MAGIC (DeForest, '61) ML. 38"

Each \$1.50

Wide standards of pink-tinted tan; the falls are cream with bright tan-gold hafts. A creamy version of the Dawn Crest and Dawn Star lusciousness might be an apt description. Tall and large. See page 10.

CAPE TOWN (Gaulter, '67) M. 38"

This subtle interfusion of delicate beige and rose-lilac results from a cross of Claudia Rene and Glittering Amber, as does the new Baccarat. However, there is no color similarity in the two. The first is flamboyant and lively; this one is less exciting, more tranquil, but equally beautiful and appealing. Standards and falls are about the same shade of mauve, but the contrasting brown-purple hafts provide a sharp contrast. Beard is deep orange. Very wide falls and abundant ruffling enhance its all 'round high quality. HM AIS, 1969. See page 11.

CAPTAIN GALLANT (Schmelzer, '59) EM. 34"

One of the finest reds to date. The introducer calls it "the red Iris that is red throughout, with no purple influence and no haft markings." Huge in size and holds its color in heat or wind. HM AIS, 1959; AM, 1961. See page 34.

CAROLINA RUBY (Powell, '64) ML. 36"

Each \$2.00

New deep or glowing Carnelian Ruby. Broad flowers of heavy substance with smooth, clean hafts. Tall stems with good branching and the flowers do not fade in the sun. Long season of bloom. HM AIS,

CAROLINE JANE (DeForest, '51) M. 38" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50 Flowers are huge, the stems very tall, and the white ground glistens like snow. Markings are clean and distinct-a delicate violet blue. Must be seen to be fully appreciated. One of the "Iris of the Year" for 1959. HM AIS, 1951; AM, 1955.

CASHMERE (Fay, '59) ML. 36"

Deep rose-pink or rose-red, however you may choose to describe the color. The very full, heavy beard is brilliant, almost pure red. It is as close to perfection as one could wish for and the color is alive and pleasing. HM AIS, 1959; AM, 1963. Shown on page 32.

CATALDO (J. Nelson, '68) ML, 36"

A huge, deep apricot self, with a slight flush of pink in the standards. A red-tangerine beard adds to the brilliant orange-apricot effect. Both standards and falls are of exceptional breadth, the standards closed and the falls flaring and fluted. It is a deeper and more radiant hue than Lunar Fire, which it to some degree resembles. Very stalwart, well branched stems. See page 7.

CAYENNE CAPERS (Gibson, '61) EM. Each \$1.50; 3 for \$4.00

Shown on page 31 in precise and accurate detail. Vivid and flashing with the sunshine on it or through it . . . glowing and alive on a cloudy day or in pouring rain. For rich, intense color in a plicata, this red-hot eye-catcher has no parallel. Dominant color is fiery burgundy to red pepper but a minor area on the falls is lit with cream. Beard is orange-bronze. HC AIS, 1960; HM AIS, 1962; AM, 1964. 3 feet tall.

CELESTIAL GLORY (Bro. Charles, '61) M. 36"

Bright golden orange or tan with a very bright red beard. It is large ruffled, and extra heavy in texture. HM AIS, 1962; AM, 1964. Shown on page 24.

**CELESTIAL SNOW** (Bro. Charles, '57) EM. 40" Each \$1.50 An absolutely spectacular pure white, the great falls ruffled and folded like white draperies. Stalks are widely branched and will reach a height of almost four feet. Beard is white, tipped lemon. HM AIS, 1957; AM, 1959. See page 31.

CELESTIAL SUNLIGHT (Bro. Charles, '60) ML. 36" Each \$2.00 Clear medium yellow with a small lighter area near the tip of the bright yellow beard. Both standards and falls are beautifully ruffled. Stems are straight and the large blossoms are well spaced on good branches. An Iris of great charm and personality.

CHINESE CORAL (Fay, '62) L. 36" Each \$3.50

A self of strong, pinkish-orange that flaunts a striking beard of Chinese coral-red. Vigorous in growth, with 3-foot stems and fine branching. Color that can be seen a block away! HM AIS, 1963; AM, 1965. Shown on page 11.

CHINESE LANTERN (Fay, '58) Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50
Deep yellow with a tangerine-red beard. This is a seedling of Techny
Chimes crossed with Mary Randall. It is smoothly tailored, large,
and grows to 42 inches; midseason. HM AIS, 1958

CHINQUAPIN (Gibson, '60) M. 34" Each \$1.50

A big golden brown plicata, the standards solid golden brown, the falls same color with ivory shading in the central areas where they are speckled and blended with brown. Beard is bronzy orange. HM AIS, 1960; AM, 1962. Shown on page 25.

CHRISTIE ANNE (Gaulter, '64) EM. 33" Each \$2.50

Peach pink, shaded amber and gold. Here is an exciting piece of color which blends well with the deeper pinks and yellows in the garden. Flowers are lightly edged with lace. Winner of the Premio Firenze award in Italy, 1967.

CHRISTMAS ANGEL (DeForest, '60) L. 38" Each \$1.50
An extra large white with bright gold at the haft, evenly laid on.
Beard is white, tipped gold, and solid golden yellow within the flower.
Very tall and robust; magnificent in every way. Well illustrated on page 53. HM AIS, 1961; AM, 1965.

CHRISTMAS TIME (Schreiner, '65) M. 40" Each \$7.50

A tall, snowy white Iris with flashing fiery red beard. Crimped and lace-edged petals are added attractive features. There are many flowers to the stem and this provides an extra long period of bloom. HM AIS, 1966; AM, 1968.

CITRINE CHARM (Gibson, '69)

A fringed and lacey pale lemon-ivory flower of very large size and with wide petals of thick texture. "Citrine" is a variety of quartz bearing this name, in color tones varying from pale yellow to lemon to elusive light green. Mr. Gibson is a "rock hound" and the source of the name is thus apparent and appropriate. Stalks are stout and well balanced, height about three feet. Midseason. Shown on page 8.

CLAUDIA RENE (Gaulter, '63) M. 36"

Raspberry pink standards with overtones of amber; Rose-violet falls with rich sienna-brown shoulders and a bold burnt-orange beard. Wide, ruffled petals. HM AIS, 1964; AM, 1966. Shown on page 37.

CLIFFS OF DOVER (Fay, '53) M. 36" Each \$1.00; 3 for \$2.50 Large, flaring and ruffled clear white of great substance. There are no haft markings and the beard is light yellow. A strong grower, hardy. HM AIS, 1963; AM, 1955. See page 35.

#### COLTORS OF BRADDED SESS.

Irises prefer full sun but will grow and bloom well if given half a day of sunlight. The bearded iris will not tolerate wet feet and the gardener can avoid many problems by providing good drainage.

Irises will grow in any good garden soil. If other plants make good growth in your garden, irises will flourish in it. But extra food is necessary for best growth and bloom. For the new planting a balanced chemical fertilizer can be dug into the soil at the rate of one ounce per square foot, if this is done three weeks before the plants are set in. Half this amount should be used if it is added just before planting time. Large quantities of well-rotted compost or well-rotted manure are good additions but should be placed eight inches deep or dug into the soil and they should not be piled around the rhizome. It is good to combine the chemical fertilizer with the rotted materials and to dig both in together. In general, fertilizers high in nitrogen should be avoided.


Each spring, after growth begins, one handful of granulated super phosphate plus two handfuls of agricultural gypsum can be sprinkled in a circle around each clump. A half ounce of balanced fertilizer may be substituted for the super phosphate. It is good to make these applications just before a rain, or to hose the plants clean of any fertilizer which has fallen on the new growth.


Like many perennial plants, irises may be moved at any time if proper care is taken. However, there is a best time to move them. This is during the dormant period which extends from soon after they bloom until the time when new growth develops. (It is for this reason that we ship in July, August and September.) If you move your irises within this period you will have the least trouble and the greatest success.

Just one word of caution about injury is necessary. Since disease may enter through open wounds it is better to trim foliage away with shears rather than to tear it away, and to cut rhizomes apart rather than to break them apart. Cut surfaces and injuries which do occur should be exposed to the sunlight for several hours before replanting. A light dusting of sulphur on such wounds is still further insurance against future troubles.

Although your bloom should be fairly good the year after transplanting, your best bloom will occur in the second to fourth years, so do not divide your clumps too soon. But after three or four years the rhizomes will become crowded and should be dug, divided, and replanted. This is also the time to revitalize your soil by adding humus and fertilizer as was recommended for the new planting.

# HOW TO DIVIDE AND PLANT AN IRIS





After about 3 or 4 years an old clump should be dug up and divided. Healthy, growing rhizomes are separated from old bloomstalks and weak, wornout portions discarded. Wash rhizomes thoroughly before replanting. Best time to do this is July, August or early Sept.

Before planting a new bed of Iris, dig in plant food and cultivate well. When ready to plant, dig two slanting holes, leaving a dividing ridge in the center.

Place the rhizome directly over the center of the ridge and spread the feeding roots to either side, so the plant is securely anchored.

Pull dirt towards plant from either side. By pressing on top of root, proper planting depth may be regulated. Firm with foot and water well.

### AIR PARCEL POST

While this is pretty expensive, some of our customers regard the service as worth the added cost. Air packages will now travel to almost anywhere in the U.S.A. in from one to two days. The charges are based on Zone Rates and are rather difficult to accurately predict. However, the chart below will enable you to figure such costs reasonably close.

If you live East of Chicago and a line running down to Houston you are in the 8th zone. If you are West of those points ask your postmaster what zone Silverton, Oregon, is in; then use the chart below.
