

'The Dewannee of Bengal, Behar and Orissa acquired by the English, the Emperor Shah Alum delivering to Lord Clive the formal Grant conferring in perpetuity the administration (or Dewannee) of the revenues of Bengal, Behar and Orissa on the East India Company', a steel engraved frontispiece in volume two of "A Comprehensive History of India" by Henry Beveridge (Lot 860). The illustration is marked "painted by Coke Smyth" but is apparently derived from the huge canvas by Benjamin West in the possession of the National Trust and formerly hung at Claremont, Lord Clive's Surrey seat.

The Society moved to its present premises, which were purpose built by the Adam brothers as part of their Adelphi development, in 1774.

1 Hormazd IV, Drachm, NIHCh = Nishapur, year 3, obv countermark in right margin downwards: la hukma illa li-llahi, "Judgement belongs to God alone," and in the left margin downwards: wahda la sharik lahu "He is one, He has no associate," 4.12g. Extremely fine and extremely rare. £4,000-5,000

...The two countermarks on this piece are probably the earliest appearance of the distinctive Kharijite *kalima* on a coin. The Kharijite movement arose during the Battle of Siffin in Safar 37h/July 657 as a result of the differences between `Ali and Mu`awiya over the murder of the third caliph `Uthman, which had started the conflict. It was proposed that a referee for each side would decide the outcome according to the Qur`an but a group protested against the setting up of a human tribunal above the Divine Word and adopted the slogan "Judgement belongs to God alone." It is unclear from this coin when the countermarks were applied, but it must have been only a few years after the battle, because most of the Kharijites had been suppressed by the year 40h.

... The mint name on this coin is clearly BIJRA but `Ubaydallah's coinage has previously been recorded only from Kirman in the year 84h. The date, though very clearly inscribed, is somewhat uncertain. More research may shed further light on this usurper who appears only rarely, either in history or on the coinage. What makes it even more curious is that the Umayyad mint of al-Basra is known to have struck a plentiful reform-style coinage between 79h and 82h. Perhaps `Ubaydallah organised the rebellion against al-Hajjaj which occasioned the founding of Wasit in 84h.

...The mint of Marw al-Rudh was situated in the province of Khurasan, roughly half way between Marw and Harat. Walker records Arab-Sasanian drachms struck there under the authority of three governors of Khurasan, starting in 63h and possibly continuing as late as 76h. For much of this period, the Umayyad governor Salm b. Ziyad was struggling for control of the province with the Zubayrid `Abd Allah b. Khazim, and both struck coins claiming control of both Marw and Marw al-Rudh.

There are many similarities between this coin and other the post-reform dirhams struck at Marw from 79-84h. Most obviously, the mint-name appears twice, in Pahlawi below the obverse *kalima* and in Arabic in the mint/date formula in the obverse margin. The triplet of pellets in the upper obverse field also recalls early Marw issues, which often have between one and four points to the left or right of the Pahlawi mint-name. There are also epigraphic similarities: the use of *wahad* instead of *ihda* for the unit of the date and the absence of the conjunction *waw* between *wahad* and *thamanin* is paralleled on a dirham of Marw 81h (Walker 487). Comparison with the other mints striking at this time shows that most use *ihda* instead of *wahad* and virtually all include the *waw*. The calligraphy is also similar, with a rather cramped, rounded style which seems better suited for writing Pahlawi than Kufic Arabic.

At first sight, it is surprising that the mint-name on this coin appears in Arabic in the shorter form *Marw*, with the full name only in the Pahlawi legend MRWRUT (for Marw al-Rudh). Any explanation for this can only be guesswork, but it is possible that the Arabs may not have treated the epithet *al-Rudh* ("on the river") as an integral part of the city's name. Throughout mediaeval Islamic coinage, a variety of tags and epithets were added and removed from mint-names, usually for little obvious reason. As an example, the mint of Balkh appears on post-reform dirhams as Madinat Balkh al-Bayda from 111-112h; this is shortened to Balkh from 113h onwards although presumably the same place is meant. In this case, the situation is further complicated because the mint-name al-Mubaraka, believed also to be an epithet for Balkh, alternates with Balkh/Madinat Balkh al-Bayda on dirhams struck from 107-122h. Thus there are three different mint-names used to signify one single location - at least, that is what the most recent studies have determined; earlier scholars have placed both Madinat Balkh al-Bayda and al-Mubaraka in plenty of other locations. The Balkh/al-Mubaraka example is one of a number of cases which illustrate an important point: just because the mint-names on post-reform Umayyad dirhams are normally meticulously engraved and the coins themselves carefully struck, this does not mean that it is always a straightforward matter to identify them.

In this case, the mint-name is quite clearly rendered in Pahlawi as Marw al-Rudh (while the Arabic mint/date formula is rather cramped), and it is not surprising that the Pahlawi version should be more specific than the Arabic form. Like most of the population of Khurasan at this time, the mint officials were almost certainly Persians who will have been much more familiar with Pahlawi than Arabic. The fact that dirhams of Marw and Marw al-Rudh were struck with the mint-name in two different scripts - the only post-reform Umayyad dirhams to do this - surely indicates that even the victorious Muslims had accepted that Pahlawi remained dominant there. Local mint officials may well have felt, with some justification, that having clearly identified the mint in Pahlawi as MRWRUT rather MRW, there was no need to give the full mint-name in Arabic also.

...This remarkable coin is one of the very few Fatimid coins to bear the name of the Holy City of Mecca. The date is not clearly written, but the reading of 356h proposed by Dr. Nicol is almost certainly correct. Another curious feature is that the denomination appears as *al-dirham* rather than *al-dinar*, although this is also found on a number of other Fatimid gold coins. There is no ambiguity with the mint-name, however, which clearly reads *bi-Makka*.

What is less clear is whether the Fatimids actually controlled Mecca in this year. Two other Makka dinars of this period are known, one an `Abbasid issue dated 354h (SICA X 494), and the other an Ikhshidid dinar struck by the vizir Kafur in 357h (Kazan 416). The Qarmatids ousted the Ikhshidids in 358h and a dinar was struck at Mecca there by the Qarmatid Ja`far in 359h (SICA X 496). It is possible that the Fatimids were able to seize power briefly following the death of the Ikhshidid `Ali b. al-Ikhshid in 355, but if so this must have been very short-lived. Furthermore, while the `Abbasid, Ikhshidid and Qarmatid dinars are of standard weight and design, this coin looks more like the Yemeni silver issues struck by Fatimid partisans and petty rulers who acknowledged the Fatimid Caliph. When the Fatimid caliph al-`Aziz issued a dinar of Mecca in 366h, this was also of normal Fatimid pattern (BMC 51).

An alternative theory argues that this coin may not have been struck at Mecca, but was made elsewhere for use on the *hajj*. If this is correct, it would not be surprising if the Fatimids struck coins for this purpose. It is known that many Egyptians undertook the annual pilgrimage, while Egypt was also responsible for sending the *kiswa*, the large black cloth used to cover the Ka ba during the ceremony. This coin may have been struck either to be taken on the pilgrimage or else to be brought back as proof that the pilgrim had completed the *hajj*.

∴It is difficult to explain this coin in any way other than by describing it as a contemporary imitation of a Fatimid dinar issued by another authority, the only likely one being that of a Crusader commander. The Fatimid mints in Egypt were remarkably careful in the accuracy of their die-cutting and striking, and a substantial error such as that found on this coin surely brands it as the work of outside hands. Al-Amir's coinage from 495-500h, while much rarer than the issues from the latter part of his reign, was both clearly and correctly dated.

...This is a conjectural reading for the mint name. The coin may have a Maghribi origin because Tunis and Jaza`ir were the only beyliks which dated their coinage using annual rather than accession years. Yanyâ in western Epirus is not known to have been an Ottoman mint at any time and is usually spelt with a terminal *ta marbuta* rather than an *alif maqsura*. ...Tutush bin Alp Arslan (458-488h) was the younger brother of Malik Shah and the founder of the Seljuq line in Syria (471-488h). Malik Shah appears to have mistrusted his brother's loyalty and sent him as far away from the centre of Seljuq power in Iran as possible, increasing his difficulties by appointing Turkoman commanders as governors of the cities nominally under Tutush's control. Malik Shah died in 485h leaving only children as his heirs, which made a succession struggle almost inevitable. Tutush was the choice of Turkish traditionalists who favoured the accession of the eldest male, but powerful interests favoured the succession of Malik Shah's eldest son Barkiyaruq. Tutush advanced into the central Seljuq lands in his attempt to seize power and had a coin struck in his name in Rayy in 487h on which he was given the titles `Izz al-dunya `Adud al din abu-Sa`id -Tutush. It is said that he received recognition from the caliph in Baghdad in 486h, but it is more likely that this actually took place in 487h, the date of this piece. On the coin of Madinat al-Salam the Caliph al-Mustazhir demonstrated his authority by granting him the relatively austere titles Taj al-dawla al-Qahira - Tutush, "Crown of the State, the Victorious - Tutush." This was in similar style to the titulature he granted to the other Great Seljuq rulers. Tutush was defeated and killed by the forces of Barkiyaruq in 488h.




