Government takes action against sexual abuse

The Ontario government has introduced a new law aimed at minimizing sexual abuse in the health-care system.

After a year of consultation and public hearings, Bill 100, the Health Protection Act, 1993, is now in effect. It will be in force by June 1, 1994.

"This relates not to improving the health care system, but to protecting the public from abuse," said Ontario Health Minister Ruth Cooper.

"People working health care have the right to expect that the treatment they receive from health care providers is going to be caring and not damaging."

There are three main provisions: including doctors, nurses, pharmacists, and registered nurses will be required under the act.

According to an Ontario Ministry of Health spokesman, a central theme of the act is to ensure that the public has the right to expect that the treatment they receive from health care providers is going to be caring and not damaging.

Conestoga solar car project still waiting for green light

Plans for a solar car at Conestoga Poly, a 1980s concept, took on life's "real" world aspects several days after students had barely finished a first progress race in the campus basement on the 15th state Electronic Exposition (EXPO) week.

University of Waterloo (UW) engineering students from Ontario, presented a preliminary design for the car, which looks like an airplane covered with solar cells by a grid of wires.

The car is about 1.5 metres long

0.55 m wide and 1.1 m high. According to Fleming's comments, the car would run 500 miles, at an average speed of at least sufficient to cross three European oceanic zones.

The car is being built in preparation for a race that starts next fall. It will be built after the summer break, says Peter van der Linden, former president of the team, who is currently a student at the University of Waterloo.

The race is organized by the National Renewable Energy Lab (NREL) at Colorado and is run every two years.

The top National Organizers for

the race will make a \$1,000,000 grant over the U.S. Department of its original \$400,000 from the Government. The National Agency is presently conducting and conducting tests from Toronto.

There are about 20 students interested in working on the project, says Peter van der Linden, who is currently a student at the University of Waterloo.

"By Feb. 20 they (NREL) want a report from us on the progress of the design of the car, how we plan to build it, where we plan to do our test drive and on that," Fleming

said.

"They just want to make sure we know what we're doing," Fleming said. He is director of the NREL, which houses the car's test track.

"It is probably true and I believe the car will be in condition for a study for the race," he said.

"We will need a second or third if acceptable results, and maybe a fourth if that is the case."

An increased turbine speed system is going to be set up specifically for the project in the 1985 race in Vancouver, says Fleming, and

talk between UW and Conestoga.

"The projects we built used a great deal of support from Conestoga's resources."

"The only reason we were able to do this was because we had that support," a faculty adviser on the project.

"We may not be probably going to do it for the car, but we are planning to do it in the next year as part of our ongoing education."

Conestoga on the car will take a full year and will be available to the September project. Fleming is proud of the car's progress.
