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



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INTRODUCTION.

It is not certain whether our Gibsons are of English or Scottish origin; England, however, is generally the ascribed birthplace of John Gibson, the pioneer of 1634 in Cambridge, Massachusetts, an ascription which, if not based upon proof, may be based upon the fact that migration from Scotland to America was not common at that date. Although several families followed James VI of Scotland (James I of England) to England in 1603, and during his long reign others settled on the confiscated lands in Province of Ulster, northern Ireland, and were the ancestors of the Scottish-Irish element, it was not until about the beginning of the 18th century that Scottish immigration into the American colonies fairly set in, either direct from the mother home or by way of Ireland where many families had taken refuge from the religious persecutions in Scotland under Charles II (1660-1685). Another significant fact is that John's children married into English families, hardly the case had he been a Scot cherishing a Scot's love of clan and native heather.

One of the New York Gibson branches maintains that our pioneer came from London and shows arms-azure, chevron argent between three storks rising proper, and bearing as many crescents sable;—crest, a squire's helmet above which, out of a

ducal coronet or, a dexter arm embowed in armor garnished or, holding a battle ax sable; and in the happy interpretation of another, "its component parts seem to be suggestive of our ancestors, the crescents indicating growth, the helmet safety, while the storks are observant and watchful, and the battle ax comes in for defensive force and the cutting away of opposition—and our race has fulfilled its mission!" One of the Boston Gibson branches holds, and has held for four generations, arms—quarterly 1st and 4th gules, a stork argent, beaked and membered or, between three crescents of the 2d (argent); 2d and 3d argent, chevron sable between three mullets gules pierced or,—crest, on a wreath of the colors (gules and argent), the top of an embattled tower gules, thereon a stork argent beaked and membered or and with its wings elevated;—motto, "Casis tutissima virtus." If not conclusive that our John belonged to the Gibsons of London, Cumberland, Essex, Northumberland or Lancaster, the last migrating from Scotland to England during the reign of James I (1603–1649), and all five of whose arms bear a close resemblance, or that he belonged to the other Gibsons whose arms were confirmed in Stavely in lower division of the Wapentake of Claro in West Riding of Yorkshire, or that he belonged elsewhere in England, or that he was one of the usual traditional two, three or four brothers coming from Scotland-it is sufficient to know that he was John Gibson and left as legacy the escutcheon of an honest man.

The following pages do not purport to be a full Gibson genealogy, more a record of a part of this numerous family;

it has been impossible to reach all its members, and of those reached several have preferred to withhold information, some unable to furnish much or any, and again, others have given hearty co-operation and valuable assistance; there are also Gibsons whose ancestry is not sufficiently clear to determine if they belong to our Gibson race or to one of the many others in this country, and they are therefore necessarily omitted. Data have been gathered from town, church, court and war records, family Bibles, local histories, printed and manuscript genealogical and other papers, public documents, private letters and personal knowledge; and however incomplete and open to criticism and correction this Record may be, it is written in the spirit of kinship, as such inscribed to every descendant of John of Cambridge, and published

I John Gibson of Cambridge, Mass., "ye newe towne" of 1631, Newe Towne or Newtowne of 1632 and name changed to Cambridge May 2, 1638, b. (probably England) about 1601; d. Cambridge, 1694 aged 93 years; m. first, Rebecca—(bur. Dec. 1, 1661 in Roxbury burying ground, the burial recorded by Rev. John Eliot, pastor Roxbury First church: "Moneth 10 day 1—1661—The wife of Goodman Gibson of Cambridge"); m. second, July 24, 1662, Joan, widow of Henry Prentice of Cambridge, "planter," on whose estate in 1663 "his relict widow Joan, and John Gibson, her now husband, administrators."

Mr. Gibson was in Cambridge in 1634 and made free of the corporation (*The Governor and Company of the Massachusetts Bay in New England*) "17th of the 3^d mo. @ 1637" by Julian calendar in use till 1752, equivalent to May 17, 1637 by Gregorian or present calendar. Whether he settled first in Cambridge and when he came over are not known as the year and name of ship are lost; it is probable, however, that

he came neither with the Braintree company in Cambridge Aug. 14, 1632, nor with Rev. Thomas Hooker who followed his people Sept. 4, 1633; he first appears on Cambridge records of Aug. 4, 1634: "To John Gibson 6 Ackrs," in the list of lots granted in Westend, that part of the town lying between Sparks, Wyeth and Garden streets, Harvard and Brattle squares and Charles river. His house which stood on the east of Sparks street, not far up the hill from the path (Brattle street) to Watertown, was built before "10th October 1635," the date in The Regestere Booke of the Lands and Howfes in the Newtowne 1635 under which is recorded: "John Gibfon. In Westend one house with Planting Grounde Aboute Six Ackers Watter Towne Pales fouth west John Arnould North west Nathaniell Elly North east Edward Elmer south east;" in 1639 he bought of Elmer the 3 acres adjoining on the southeast which extended his house-lot to Garden street. Family tradition says that the Gibsons planted linden trees, and if tradition and boundaries can be made to agree perhaps "the old house by the lindens," corner Brattle and Sparks streets, familiar by Longfellow's poem The Open Window, may have stood on land once owned by John Gibson!

Mr. Gibson doubtless belonged to the church formed by Rev. Mr. Hooker on his arrival in 1633; on the removal in 1635 and 1636 of the pastor and most of the families to Hartford (Conn.) he became one of the succeeding society or First church organized Feb. 1, 1636 by Rev. Thomas Shepard and his band of new-comers, and on the earliest list of members (1637) are "John Gibson—Mrs. Rebecca Gibson;" also a church entry of "11th mo. 1658" [Jan. 1659] reads: "John Gibson and Rebecca his wife, both members in f. c. Their children: Rebecca now joyned in full communion with the church at Watertown—Mary—Martha—John

—Samuel—baptized in this church." He continued this membership until his death and during these nearly sixty years worshiped till 1650 in the original building, corner Dunster and Mt. Auburn streets, and afterwards in its successor, southwest corner of the college yard (Harvard); and not only with change of sittings shown by town record of Jan. 19, 1662, "the committee for seating the people in the meetinghouse appoint Jno. Gibson to sit where Mr. Day was wont to sit," but also under change of pastors, Thomas Shepard 1636–1649, Jonathan Mitchell 1650–1668, Urian Oakes 1671–1681, Nathaniel Gookin 1682–1692.

In addition to his "nyne acr" house-lot in the West-end Mr. Gibson had other real estate in Cambridge, namely: 5 acres in the great swamp or Fresh pond meadows, entered in the *Proprietors' Records* "Aprill. 4. 1636," under "A record of the names of the men who were purchasers & haue proprieties in the freshe pond meadow and their quantitie of Acers

—John Gibsone 5 which 5 acres he sold in 1643 to Nathaniel Sparhawk;—again, "Septemb 21th: 1639—three Acres of planteing grounde in the New Lotts next Manotomie" [Menotomy or the Second parish in 1732, West Cambridge in 1807, Arlington since 1867];—granted by the town in 1645 "lott 10 John aks

Gipson—07—0½ " this side Metonomy;—in 1646

"John Gipson—07+00 among wood lots, "ye land to ly in comon for ye townes use;"—60 acres on "the Rocks" near Metonomy river (Alewise brook) meadow, "layd out" to him in 1648 and which he sold the same year to Edward Danforth;—lot no. 52 of 80 acres granted by vote of the church June 9, 1652, in Shawshine (Shawshin), the large tract awarded 1644/5 to Cambridge and May 29, 1655 set off as the original

town of Billerica;—3 acres in the fifth Division of "lands layd out on the South Side Charles River" in 1662, the territory including both Cambridge Village or New Cambridge set off as Newton in 1691 and Little Cambridge or the Third parish set off as Brighton in 1807;—"twenty accrs & three comons" at the drawing of lots and interests in the cow commons (Cambridge common) under entry of "feb 27th 1664 And march the 27th 1665;"—finally, under date of "Novembr 29th 1689," lot no. 103 of 12 acres in the first Division and lot no. 64 of 12 acres in the second Division, "the land that was formerly Comon called by the Name of Cambridge Rocks."

That he was a husbandman and not an artisan is indicated by the "planteing grounde" and a record that John Gibson agreed with the town May 8, 1637, to summer 100 cows for £20. There is no evidence that he ever held any church office and of town offices only minor ones—appointed Mar. 15, 1676 to view fences and in 1678 to drive West-field, the arable land west of West-end often called West-end-field, bounded north by Garden street, east by Wyeth street, south by Vassall lane and west by Fresh pond meadows. His name occurs only once in lawsuits on Middlesex county court records, the suit in 1660 of "Winifred Holman Plt. against John Gibson Sen and his wife et al.," brought as the result of the defendants having accused Mary Holman, daughter of widow Winifred, of being a witch; and at the hearing "3 day of Aprill," several months after the accusation, the finding for John Gibson was "costs of Court, fifteen shillings and ten pence."

He led most likely a quiet life in the small community of his friends, the Dana, Hastings and other families whose homes were within sight of his own, such a life of quiet content that he signed "John Gibson" as nineteenth name on the list of one hundred and seven "inhabitants and householders of the towne,"

in an address "To the Honoured Generall Court of Massachusetts Colonie," dated "Cambridg the 17th of the 8. 1664" and whose purport is told in the clerk's entry of Oct. 19, 1664, two days later:

"The Court being mett together & informed that seuerall persons inhabitants of Cambridge were at the doore desiring liberty to make knowne theire errand were called in & Mr Edward Jackson Mr Rich Jackson Mr Edw Oakes & Deacon Ston: coming before the Court presented a peticon from the inhabitants of Cambridge weh was subscribed by very many hands in weh they testified & declared their good content & sattisfaction they tooke & had in the present goument in church & comwealth with their resolution to be assisting to & encouraging the same & humbly desiring all meanes might be vsed for the continuance & preservation theirof & at the same time & the next day seuerall peticons of like nature from Woborne Dorchester Redding Chelmsford Concord Billirrikey Boston Dedham & Meadfield & also one from seuerall inhabitants of Roxbury all which are on file."

The days of peaceful prosperity came to an end under the oppressive rule of the tyrant Governor Sir Edmund Andros, and early in 1688 a petition asking redress was sent to James II, signed by John Gibson and George Willow representing their neighborhood and giving their respective ages "about 87 and 86 yrs." Despite the forcible statement that "our title is now questioned to our lands, by us quietly possessed for near sixty years, and without which we cannot subsist" - the touching plea that "we are a poor people and have no way to procure money to defend our cause in the law, nor know we of friends at Court, and therefore unto your royal Majesty, as the public Father of all your subjects, do we make this our humble address for relief"-the pathetic closing words, "If we perish we perish"-despite these appeals for redress none came from the king, due perhaps to his abdication, and John Gibson died a poor man.

Mr. Stearns was made freeman "6th 3^d m 1646" [May 6, 1646] and Mar. 15, 1647/8 owned in Watertown "a house and 8 acre lot, 6 acres upland and other lots;" after the death of his wife he moved to Lynn (Mass.) named by order of General court in 1637, "Saugust is called Lin."

Mrs. Stearns prior to Jan. 1659 was a member in "f. c." of the Watertown First church organized June 12, 1630; at one time she partially lost her mind believing herself bewitched by Mary Holman, a delusion which led to the defamation suit "Holman versus Gibson" on Middlesex county court files of 1660.

Mr. Gibson was a glover by occupation, and presumably a tanner as in 1679 the town staked out to him 2 rods "in the Corner next to his pit for his trade;" by thrift and perseverance he amassed a comfortable competency, owning considerable property both sides Charles river. He was of a convivial turn of mind evident from the following court entry: "Cambridge Octob. 1. 1672. Sam1 Gibson being convicted of enterteyneing some of the studts [Harvard] contrary to Law is sentenced to be admonished and to pay a fine of forty shillings in money and he stands comitted untill it be pa; " also evident from the "Records of the Acts of the hon hle Overseers of Harvard Colledge Cambr. 21: 3: 1678" which read: "Samuel Gibson was called before the Overseers & solemnly cautioned of entertaining any of the students in his house frequenting the Colledge or otherwife drawing them into his Company;" and of same date "Js sentenced to pay a fine of forty shillings & costs." But, regardless of several admonitions and forty-shilling fines, this love for "company of scholars" did not abate and was even transmitted to more than one of his numerous descendants!

He was a soldier in King Philip's war—private, on list of Capt. Joseph Sill's co. of foot Jan. 25, 1675/6, starting on order of Council, Nov. 2, 1675, reconnoitering near Marlboro, Sudbury and Groton and not reaching the Narragansett country, west side the Pawtucket, till after the deathblow to the war, the Swamp fight of Dec. 10, 1675; private, on list of Capt. John Cutler's co. of foot July, 24, 1676.

He lived on the east side Brighton street, and was probably prosperous as his name appears (the seventeenth) on the address of "good content and sattisfaction" dated Oct. 17, 1664 and sent to the General court; before his death he became impoverished, and his widow as administratrix, petitioned May 11, 1681 "to sell land." In 1683 his heirs were allotted "Twenty accers Three comous" in the fifth Squadron in "the Divishon of lotts beyond the 8 Mile Line betwixt that and Concord line;" also, in 1689 widow Errington had laid out to her on Cambridge rocks (the Common) lot no. 48 of 12 acres in the first Division and lot no. 34 of 12 acres in the second Division. Mr. Gibson always resided in his native town and doubtless on the homestead in the West-end, his father deeding him Nov. 30, 1668, "3 acres and $\frac{1}{2}$ my house Cambridge;" there is no record that he ever owned any other real estate.

Although a minor at the time of the suit "Holman versus Gibson" in 1660 he was one of the defendants and, boy like, must have been very vehement against the supposed witch, widow Winifred's daughter, as he was sentenced either to openly acknowledge in court that "he hath wronged and scandalously slandered Marye Holman, by speeches irregularly, rashly and sudden spoken," or refusing to do this, to pay the plaintiff five pounds; of the two alternatives he wisely chose the former.

He was a soldier in King Philip's war—private, on list of Capt. Thomas Prentice's troopers Aug. 27, 1675, in the first or Mt. Hope expedition, the company leaving Boston the preceding June 24, fighting at Swansey June 28, skirmishing in July on Mt. Hope neck near Mt. Hope or Pokanoket (Bristol, R. I.), the home of King Philip; private, on list of Lt. Edward Oakes' troopers Mar. 24, 1675/6, scouting near Marlboro; private, on pay list of Capt. Daniel Henchman's co. of foot Sept. 23, 1676, impressed the preceding Ap. 27, starting May 27 and reaching Hadley June 14; possibly the John Gibson on list of Capt. Joshua Scottow's men at Black Point near Saco, Me., Sept. 1677, the garrison being captured the following month by Mogg Megone, the celebrated Indian chief.

His life was the quiet one of a husbandman with no stirring event save the war episode to interrupt the

daily routine of labor; his name appears on Colonial records as "John Gipson" under marginal entry: "11 Octob 1670 ffree men to be admitted," an entry showing that he was then a church member; his name also appears from time to time on town records as holder of some small office, the last and most important, the appointment in 1678 "to view fences in Westfield." At his death of small pox when only thirtyeight years of age, he left little property, and in the First church cash book is recorded Nov. 2, 1679, the contribution of £6 19s. 4d. to his family, "they being in a low condition, they being visited by the small pox and under many wants." "An Inventory of the eftate of John Gibson Jun of Cambridge deceased Octob 15: 1679," taken "Mar. 25: 1679: 80" showed £47 16s. including house and 3 acres, £16; his widow was appointed administratrix by order of court: "Cambridge Aprill 6th 1680 Admstraccon is granted unto Rebecca Gibson on ve eftate whereof her husband dved seized an inventory whereof she presented in Court on her oath;" also the following June the court further decided: "Charlestown 15. 4. 1680 The Selectmen of Cambridge are ordered to dispose of ye children of Jno Gibson & of such a pt of his estate as shall be necessary for ye putting them forth to service," etc. In the proprietors' records of 1683, under division of lots "beyond the 8 Mile Line," is given this allotment in the ninth Squadron: "John Gibsons heirs Twenty accers Three comous."

Stow, Jan. 21, 1754 "in y° 73 year of Her age," bur. at the right of her husband), dau. of Stephen and Sarah (Woodward) Gates; m. second (pub. Nov. 30, 1755), Mrs. Submit Taylor of Sudbury (d. Stow, Jan. 29, 1759 "in y° 75 year of Her Age," bur. at the left of her husband).

i Stephen Gates "of Cambridge," so styling himself, son of Thomas of Hingham, co. Norfolk, Eng., b. England; d. Cambridge, "29. 7. 1662" [Sept. 29, 1662]; m. Ann - (b. England, 1603, d. Stow, Feb. 5, 1683, then widow of Richard Woodward). Mr. Gates came over in the Diligent in 1638 with his wife and two children, and located in Hingham, Mass. (Barecove until Sept. 2, 1635 when the General court ruled that "the name of Barecove is changed and hereafter to be called Hingham"). In 1653 he removed to Cambridge but the next year was in Lancaster, Mass. (Nashwash or Nashaway before its incorporation May 18, 1653), signed the covenant Ap. 3, 1654, "made ffree" May 14, 1656, chosen constable in 1657, and was the third largest taxpayer on the roll; he resided on a farm of several hundred acres in the southeast of the town which after various changes of name became Berlin in 1812; his stay in Lancaster was short and he returned to Cambridge. Children (arranged perhaps not in sequence as each Gates' compiler "gangs his ain gate" with the chronological order of a family whom Lancaster historians describe as "dreadfully tropical in blood"): 1 Elizabeth b. England; m. at Hingham, 1647, John Lasell. 2 Mary b. England; m. Ap. 5, 1658, "the wealthy John Maynard of Sudbury." ³ Stephen. ⁴ Simon of Cambridge, Lancaster and Muddy River bap. ii George Woodward of Watertown, first son of Richard, b. Ipswich, about 1620; d. May 31, 1676; m. first, Mary —; among eight children—Sarah, wife of Stephen Gates.

Dea. Gibson was brought up by selectman Abraham Holman of Cambridge, son of William and Winifred Holman, and after 1689 removed with him to Stow (incorporated May 16, 1683 and previously called both Pomciticut and Shabbukin, the Indian names of its two most notable hills); he continued a member of the Holman household till into 1703 when he moved to the northwest of Sudbury and settled north of Assabet river (Assabeth, Elisabeth, etc.) on a 60 acre farm "bounded westward by bounds of Stow, eastward by highway from Concord to Jewell's Mill, southwesterly by land Joseph Jewell, north by land John and Jonas Burk," and deeded him June 21, 1703 by Mr. Holman, joined by wife Sarah, "for divers good and weighty reasons moving me thereto but in special manner to shew my love unto and care of Timothy Gibson now living with me & hath done from a child." Holman a second time showed "love and good will" by deeding Nov. 29, 1708 to "Timothy Gibson, husbandman, Sudbury, 20 acres in Sudbury, north side of Assabeth river, meadow, the right of way to the 60 acres;" he again testified the "love and affection I bear unto Timothy Gibson of Sudbury, husbandman," by a last gift Ap. 23, 1711, of 10 acres in Sudbury,

"south east of Assabeth river, bounded east by land Thomas Burk, south east upon the highway, south west upon my own land crossing the river to the 20 acres, and northerly by said 20 acres;" he also appointed Timothy Gibson executor of his will dated Sept. 1711, shortly before his death, and devising "To wife Sarah, 40 acres, house and barn, in Stow, butteth on Elsabeth river; all personal property, one half of which to be at her disposal To nephews Abraham and Jeremiah Holman To Abraham Gibson, son of the executor," etc. On Mar. 27, 1712 widow Sarah signed an agreement giving her entire interest to Timothy Gibson on condition that he provided for her during life.

Meanwhile Dea. Gibson had identified himself with the interests of his new home, and the name

timothy gibson

(not "timothy gibfon, jr." as sometimes printed) heads the second column of a list of thirty-one signers to this petition:

"To: his Excelency Josep: Dudly Esquir Captu Generall and Governer in Cheeif In and: over her majestis provence of ye Massachustts bay in New England with Her Majesties honnourable Councell and house of Representitives convenied in Generall Assembly—

To he petition of vs: who are the Subscribs Living on ye west side of Sudbury great River Humbly: Sheweth: that whare as ye all wise and over Ruling provedens of ye great god Lord of Heven & Eearth who is god blessed for ever moore hath Cast our lott to fall on that sid of the River whare By: Reason of the flud of waters which for a very great part of the year doth very much Jncommode us and often by Extremety of water and tereble and violent winds and a great part of the winter by jcs as it is att this presant, so that wee are shutt up and cannot com forth and many times when wee doe atempt to gitt over our flud wee are forced for to seeke our spirituall food with The perrill of our Lives Besides the extream Travill that many of vs are Exposed unto sum 3:45:6 miles much more than a Sabbath days Jurney by Reason of theaf and many more obstructions to many heare to junumerat whereby many of our chil-

dren and little ons anchiant an wek persons Can very Rarly attend the publict worship in the house of god The considered premizes we humbly pray your Excelency and your Honnorrable Councel and house of Representitives to Consider vs & compationat vs in this our Extream Suffering Condition and if wee may obtayne so much favor in your Eyes as to Grant us: a prefinct or to appoint a Commity to see and consider our Circomstances, and make Report that of to: this honnorable Courte And your Pore petitioners shall ever pray

Sudbury January: 15 1706"

For some reason this humble petition was not granted at the time and it was as late as 1723 before the West precinct church was built at Rocky Plains (Sudbury Center), up to which date the one church of Sudbury since its incorporation Sept. 4, 1639 had stood on the other side the "great River" [the Sudbury], in that part of the town set off Ap. 10, 1780 as East Sudbury and name changed to Wayland in 1835. It is doubtful if Dea. Gibson was one of this new society as his name is not among those who Mar. 18, 1724, "entered into and renewed a holy church Covenant," and it may be that he had already left the old church and gone back to the Stow church which he had attended while a member of Mr. Holman's family. Another public improvement, one of importance to Dea. Gibson, was the first bridging of the Assabet, the town voting Dec. 14, 1715, that "there shall be a horse bridge built over Assabeth river, and that the selectmen do order that ve bridge be erected and built over assabeth river between y' land of Timothy Gibson and Thomas Burts [Burk's] land."

There is no record that Dea. Gibson ever purchased real estate in Sudbury; that he owned property in Cambridge is seen from his deed of Dec. 24, 1713 conveying to Isaac Watson for £7, "a small piece of land in Cambridge, part of the lot known as Arringtons lot, containing ½ an acre, bounded N. E. by the highway to Watertown, S. W. by land Rev. Mr. Brattle, S. E. by Holme's land, N. W. by rest of lot—also half the house on it."

He was a large land-owner in Lunenburg, Mass., the southern of two townships laid out as "yo South Town "in the Turkev hills' district in 1720 and incorporated Aug. 1, 1728 as Lunenburg. His name is not among the eighty original proprietors of 1721 and is first mentioned in The Early Records of the Town of Lunenburg under entry: "Concord, June 25th & 26 1723 Ephraim Sautle Desires Leave to Sell his Lott in ye South Town to Timothy Gibson for his son Timothy," house-lot no. 33 drawn by Mr. Sautle at the first drawing May 23, 1721; and in The Proprietors' Records of the Town of Lunenburg it is entered that house-lot no. 33 of 441 acres was "granted unto Timothy Gibson by the Greate and General Courts Committee" and surveyed for him Nov. 7, 1730. The latter book has also the following entries:

"Lunenburg April the 17th 1729 Laid out to Timothy Gibson by the Committee appointed two pieces of third Division Land [about 220 acres] the Rights ariesing from house Lott Number thirty three and seventy two. Lying near the East side of the pearl hill" [the hill west of the center of Lunenburg and in that part of the town set off Feb. 3, 1764 as Fitchburg].

"Lunenburg June the ye 17th 1730. Survayed for Timothy Gibson 2d Division Number 34 the Contents of Which is 53 acres and a halfe" [upland].

"Lunenburg November the 7th 1730 furvayed for Timothy Gibson House Lott Number 38 the Contents of Which is forty four acres and a half." Same date: "Survayed for Timothy Gibson House Lott Number 72 the Contents of Which is forty fix acres and a quarter" [drawn by Benjamin Prescott at the first drawing and granted to Timothy Gibson prior to Ap. 17, 1729].

"Lunenburg March the 18th 1730/I Survayed for Timothy Gibson 2d Division number 69 the Contents of Which is 60 acres [upland] In the fouth east part of the township."

"Lunenburg June the 10th 1740 Laid out to Mr. Timothy Gibson ten acres of Land in said Township for an Equevilent to what is wanting in his House Lott and second Division Lying on the Easterly side of the pearl hill adjoyning to his own third Division."

Although Dea. Gibson never lived in Lunenburg, nor did his son Timothy, he sent four younger sons, John, Arrington, Isaac and Reuben, known in local

history as "the Gibson brothers" and men of such great size, strength and courage that several anecdotes are related of their personal prowess, and it is said that "the Indians standing on the brow of Pearl hill and carefully watching these brave, athletic brothers, did not dare attack them!"

In addition to Mrs. Sarah Holman's gift of "40 acres, house and barn," Dea. Gibson had other property in Stow—lots in the second, third, fourth and fifth Divisions, about 100 acres in all, the surveys recorded in the proprietors' book between Dec. 24, 1721 and Jan. 27, 1729; — 4 acres and 25 rods on Pomciticut hill "bounded west by my own land, south by John Jewell's, east by Sudbury, and north by land of Jonas Burk," deeded him Dec. 6, 1728 by Rev. John Gardner of Stow; — "2½ acres in Stow bounded north by Burk's land, west on widow's premises, south east on Gibson house on the Sudbury and Stow line," purchased Feb. 24, 1731 / 2 from the widow of Jonas Burk; as the deed of Dec. 6, 1728 is to "Timothy Gibson of Sudbury" and that of Feb. 24, 1731/2 to "Timothy Gibson of Stow," his removal to Stow was between these dates and perhaps by merely moving to another part of his home farm which lay on both sides the town line. He is entered on Stow records as selectman 1734, 1735, 1736, 1739, and as "dissenting to £60 for Rev. John Gardner, May 17, 1736." Unfortunately First church has no records earlier than 1774, but doubtless it was in this church that he held his office of deacon under the pastorate of Rev. Mr. Gardner, successor in 1717 of Rev. John Eveleth who had been called in 1700 by thirty-two proprietors of Stow, among whom were Abraham Holman and Simon, Isaac and Nathaniel Gates, the foster-father and three brothers-in-law of Timothy Gibson.

Dea. Gibson's homestead in Stow lay on the southern

slope of Pomciticut hill (also spelled Pompociticut, Pomseticut, Pompositticutt, etc., pronounced Pom-sitcut and name changed to Summer hill). Ten years before his death he deeded on certain conditions, "my house and 50 acres in Stow" to his son Stephen, and like deedings continued in turn from sire to son until the Gibson home for nearly a century was sold in 1823 to strangers and in 1826 became the property of the Maynard family who call it Summer Hill farm; on April 19, 1871 the northwest of Sudbury including the Assabet, and the northeast of Stow including Pomciticut hill, each comprising land once owned by the Gibsons, were incorporated as Maynard. Today a tall flag staff graces the summit of the old hill where in years gone by juvenile Gibsons must have often climbed "to view the smiling landscape o'er."

Wheeler and his troopers. In his True Narrative of the Lord's Providence, called "the epic of New England colonial times" and of whose early copies only a few are extant, he gives an account of the expedition the treachery of the Nipmucks, his own wounds received at Wickabaug pond near Quabaug, his life saved by his son Thomas, the death of Capt. Hutchinson, etc. " 'Allice the dau of Thomas Wheeler dyed 17. 1. 1640" [Mar. 17, 1641]. 2" Nathaniell son to Reuth his mother died 16 Janery 1676" [1677]. ³ Joseph of Stow. ⁴" Ephraim Wheeler ye son of Capt Th. iDolor Davis of Cambridge, Barnstable and Concord, "carpenter and master-builder," b. England; d. Barnstable, June, 1673; m. first, in co. Kent, Eng., Mar. 29, 1624, Margery Willard (bap. Horsemonden, co. Kent, Nov. 7, 1602, d. prior to 1667), dau. of Richard Willard of Horsemonden, "yeoman." Whether

this marriage was solemnized at Horsemonden near Paddockbourne or ten miles distant at East Fairleigh near Maidstone, is not definite as two similar records have been found, one in the vicarage at Horsemonden, the other in the parish church at East Fairleigh, the latter entered thus:

"Mar Dolor Davis and Margerye Wilerd were maryed 1624" ye 29th day of Marche 1624."

Mr. Davis came over in 1634, his wife and three children following early the next year; he was accompanied by his brotherin-law Simon Willard who was one of the founders of Concord, captain of foot in 1646, major in 1654, and at whose death in 1673, "the colony lost one of its most distinguished members." The proprietors' records of Cambridge (The Regestere Booke) under date of June 4, 1635, read as follows: "Dollard Dauis one house lot of halfe a rood more or les watter Street norwest John Bridg Southwe A Willam Andrews northeft Will A Weftwood east"-"more Upon the west Syd of Charls River Twenty & fiue acars Charls River one the eaft Symon willard fouth John bridg north the Comon fouth wast;" this second tract allotted him Aug. 4, 1634, he sold Aug. 25, 1635 for £10 "vnto Richard Girling Marin A " [mariner]. The Records of the Colonv of New Plymouth in New England place him in Duxbury, Mass., taking the oath of fidelity, proposed as freeman Mar. 5, 1638/9 and granted 50 acres in 1640. In 1643 he was living in the Cape Cod town of Barnstable, propounded as freeman June 4, 1645 and admitted June 2, 1646; on Aug. 27, 1648, "Dolor Davis and his wife being dismissed from the Church att Duxbury was joyned to ours," and while in Barnstable he was surveyor of highways, constable, etc. In 1655 he left Plymouth colony and returning to the "Massachusetts Bay," bought some 150 acres including house and lot, in Concord; he was, however, back again in Barnstable in 1666, remaining there until his death. Children: 1 John of Barnstable b. England, about 1626; received under his father's will dated Sept. 13, 1672, the Concord homestead. 2 Mary b. England, about 1631. ³ Elizabeth b. England. ⁴ Lt. Concord, July 12, 1640), dau. of James and Eleanor Blood. Lt. Davis resided near the homestead on the farm given him by his father; he was one of Capt. Thomas Wheeler's troopers in the expedition of 1675 to the Nipmuck country and took command when that officer was wounded; was commissioned lieutenant July 2, 1689, made freeman Mar. 21, 1690 and held the office of deputy 1689, 1690, 1692 and 1705. Mr. Gibson as namesake of Mr. Abraham Holman received under his will of 1711, on the condition of paying "to the legatees ten (10) pounds after my decease," 25 acres in Stow including 5 acres of meadow. must have removed from the parental home in Sudbury to Stow about the time of his marriage as his various deeds of lands in Stow are made to "Abraham Gibson of Stow" - July 3, 1724 from Richard Whitney of Stow, 2 acres or more; — Jan. 8, 1725 from his brothersin-law Deliverance and Thomas Wheeler, 10 acres, "great meadow," £30; — Jan. 14, 1725 from Timothy Gibson of Sudbury and wife Rebecca, "to show fatherly love and affection to my eldest son," two 20 acre lots in Stow, and also for £20 a second conveyance of 8 acres along Concord line; — Jan. 23, 1727 from S. Randall, 5 acres, "great pine Swamp;" — Ap. 10, 1727 from M. Whitney, 6 acres, 78 rods for £35. The proprietors' book of Stow shows that on "Jan 10, 1728/9 Proprietors laid out to Abraham Gibson 4 acres by said Gibson's house" which most likely stood near the Center village, some distance from Pomciticut hill.

His short military service as private reads thus: "Muster Roll of Capt. Nathan Bridgam & comp Troopers from Sept 18 to Oct 9 1725 — Abraham Gibson, Cent — from Sept. 18 to Oct 9 — 3 wks 1 da." He was assessor 1733 and 1734, constable 1735 and 1736

and selectman 1732, 1733, 1739 and 1740 the year of his death. The inventory of his estate returned Jan. 6, 1741, amounted to near £1500, and his widow Mary was appointed administratrix Ap. 20, 1741 with Richard Whitney and "Timothy Gibson Jun" as bondsmen. Mrs. Gibson after July 6, 1745, m. Dea. Daniel Hapgood, selectman of Stow, see note under 14, and by whose will proved June 14, 1791, his homestead (east half of the old paternal plantation of 700 acres) was left to his wife Mary and their three children, and to "my beloved gr. son, Jacob Gibson of Stow, all my lands in Waterford, Cumberland Co. Maine, two lots 300—400 acres." Shortly after her second marriage Mrs. Hapgood made the following application:

"To the Hon ble Judge of Probates for ye County of Midd. As Stephen was the fifth brother-in-law in chronological order, "my Third Brother In Law" probably referred to him as youngest of the three brothers-in-law then residing in Stow — Timothy jr., Samuel, Stephen; for some reason the appointments were not made as requested, and Stephen Gibson gave a bond Ap. 14, 1746, with Daniel Hapgood for surety, as guardian of Sarah and Ephraim; also the same day Daniel Hapgood gave his bond, with Stephen Gibson surety, as guardian of Rebecca, "in 18th year and at her own election."

Gibson as early as 1762 was living in Ashby, part of Lunenberg at that date but in 1764 becoming the northern part of the new Fitchburg, and on Mar. 6, 1767 set off with land taken from Townsend and Ashburnham, under the name of Ashby; his farm was in the southeast of the town near Fitchburg line at Gates' crossing on the Pearl hill road, and comprised 30 acres, 100 rods, purchased May 13, 1762 for £26 from Eleazar Coffin.

Capt. Davis, "the man who headed the first column against the King's troops in the revolutionary war," was early on the ground with his thirty-eight Acton minute-men, and in the hesitancy of the older officers to attack the British regulars, drew his sword, saying "I am not afraid, I haven't a man that's afraid to go;" receiving orders to lead the five companies (his own, two Concord, one Bedford, one Lincoln) he advanced towards the bridge to the tune of the White Cockade

and was instantly shot; his name does not appear upon revolutionary rolls as John Hayward, his 1st lieutenant, immediately took command of the company and the rolls are in his name. In 1851 the state of Massachusetts and town of Acton erected at Acton Center a monument commemorative of the engagement, and the remains of Capt. Davis were removed from Woodland cemetery, the old burying ground in the southeast of the town, and together with those of Abner Hosmer and James Hayward were placed under the monument; Acton has also proudly cherished the memory of its courageous young minute-man by sending the Davis Blues to the war of 1812 and the Davis Guards to the civil war.

Lt. Gibson in early life was a schoolmaster; that he was teaching in Lunenburg (Fitchburg since 1764) at the time of his majority but shortly returned to Stow as master of the parental homestead, is shown by the following deeds dated respectively Oct. 8, 1756 and Jan. 18, 1757:

"Ezekiel and Mary Davis, Ephraim and Rebecca Hapgood, all of Acton, and Peter and Sarah Conant of Stow, to Abraham Gibson of Lunenburg, laborer [teacher], for £128, quit claim of estate of our father Abraham Gibson, being the estate of our mother, Mary Hapgood, from our grandmother Wheeler," etc.

"Daniel Hapgood of Stow, yeoman, and Mary, his wife, quit claim of ½ estate of Abraham Gibson of Stow, deceased [with other tracts and rights], formerly the estate of our father and mother, Deliverance and Mary Wheeler of Stow, to Abraham Gibson of Stow, yeoman," etc.

A year or two after his marriage Lt. Gibson removed from Stow to Concord and about 1768 to Fitchburg, residing on a farm of 150 acres or more on the eastern slope of Pearl hill; a portion of this farm he deeded Mar. 25, 1786 as follows: "I, Abraham Gibson of Fitchburg, gentleman, in consideration of £265 paid me by Jeremiah Kinsman of Ipswich, county of Essex, husbandman—a certain tract of land—containing 55 acres 117 rods—with a house and barn on the same, consisting of Tillage, mowing, pasturage and wood land;" also July 5, 1794, to the same person then of Fitchburg, 73 acres adjoining the first purchase, "said Gibson reserving liberty for the schoolhouse now standing on said land to remain there as long as the town shall support a town school." Besides property in Fitchburg where in 1771 he was one of the largest taxpayers, he owned real estate in the adjacent town of Ashby. He was one of the five Gibsons among the forty-four Fitchburg minute-men in 1775 and selectman 1778 and 1779; as his name disappears from the tax roll after 1791 he may have removed elsewhere that year although in the deed of 1794 to Jeremiah Kinsman he called himself of Fitchburg.

Lt. Gibson was a soldier in the Fr. and Ind. war, his service recorded thus: "Muster Roll—Capt. Abijah Hall Comp. Col. Willard's Reg—in Exp. to Crown Pt. from May 9, 1759 to Jany 12, 1760, 2d Lt. Abraham Gibson, Stow—fr. May 9 to Jany 13—31 wks 2 da." He was also a revolutionary soldier—private, Capt. Ebenezer Woods' co., Col. Asa Whitcomb's reg. of militia,

marched from Fitchburg on Lexington alarm of April 19, 1775, served 7 days.

Mr. Priest resided till 1811 in Rindge (Rowley Canada from 1690 until incorporated Feb. 11,1768) when he removed from the town to Lunenburg and in 1813 and 1814 served as school committee; after the death of his wife Rebecca he married, Nov. 17, 1814, Mrs. Phebe (Atherton) Sherman, and of two daughters by this marriage the elder died young and the other, Abigail, born 1819, married Luke Carter of Leominster, Mass.

He was a revolutionary soldier; in the absence, however, of family confirmatory records it is perplexing to identify him among the Lancaster John Priests whose names appear on official rolls in the Massachusetts archives (Boston)—the private in Capt. Hartwell's co., Col. Dike's reg. July 10, 1776, and if so, marching with his father to Dorchester heights—the trooper in Col. Sheldon's light dragoons—the fifer in Col. Denny's reg.—the private in Col. Marshall's reg. who on the retreat to Fort Ann from Schene (Skeensborough, now White hall on Lake Champlain) was disabled and subsequently pensioned; unfortunately the pension records of 1787, those for disability, were destroyed by fire in 1814 and the earliest extant are those of Mar. 18, 1818 for "9 mos. on Continental establishment."

Mr. Calef while in London early in the revolution was pressed on board a British man-of-war in search of Dutch prizes, and for many years did not see his native country; shortly after his marriage he settled in Cape Elizabeth on part of the Winter-Jordan inheritance, "the ould plantation at Spurwinke," but in 1815 sold his farm of 180 acres and returning to Massachusetts located in Walpole.

Mr. Gibson, one of the "two rival merchant princes of Boston" and a gentleman of great energy and indomitable will, was an extensive iron dealer and real estate owner; he resided prior to 1805 at 105 Orange street (now part of Washington) but that year purchased the large house and garden, 15 Court street (south side near Tremont), remaining there until his death. In the financial crisis of 1815 losing heavily in ships and real estate and by endorsements, he fell ill and died in the prime of active life. His estate was administered upon July 29, 1816 by his brother John Gibson and Ebenezer Farley, the inventory showing the amount of \$261,000; on the same date Gideon Snow was appointed guardian of the minor children by the first marriage, and Josiah P. Cooke of the children by the second. His widow at her death in 1829 left by will \$127,000 to be equally divided among her seven children including Mrs. Susan (Spurr) Marshall and John W. Spurr, the two by her former marriage.

IV **Timothy Gibson** (Capt.) of Sudbury, Groton and Stow, Mass and Henniker, N. H., second child of Dea. Timothy 9 and Rebecca (Gates) Gibson, b. Stow, Jan. 20, 1702/3; d. Henniker, Jan. 18, 1782; m. Dec. 29, 1725, Persis Rice (b. Sudbury, Jan. 10, 1706/7, d. Henniker, Mar. 22, 1781), dau. of Dea. Jonathan and Anne (Darby) Rice, gr. dau. of Joseph Rice, and gt. gr. dau. of Dea. Edmund Rice, the English pioneers in Sudbury in 1639 the year of its incorporation, and in that part of the town set off in 1780 as East Sudbury and since 1835 named Wayland.

Capt. Gibson was very young when his parents moved from Stow to Sudbury and in some inexplicable way his birth is entered on Sudbury copied records although not on the original; there is, however, no question that he was born in Stow even if there is no confirmatory town record, as the family did not remove from Stow to Sudbury till after June 21, 1703, the date of the deed made by Mr. Abraham Holman of Stow "to show my love unto and care of Timothy Gibson [Dea.] now living with me & hath

done from a child." His boyhood and early manhood were spent in Sudbury and he never occupied houselot 33 in Lunenburg, Mass., bought of Ephraim Sautle in 1723 by "Timothy Gibson for son Timothy," the father retaining it for another son.

About the date of his marriage he removed to Groton, locating most likely on property which he purchased Dec. 11, 1724 from two parties, one tract of 30 acres from S. Scripture for £35, the other of 25 acres from "eleven persons" for f, 30, both deeds describing him as "Timothy Gibson Jr. of Sudbury, yeoman;" between Dec. 23, 1729 and Oct. 7, 1730 he made three other purchases (123 acres) in Groton, the deeds naming him "Timothy Gibson of Groton." Whether he remained in the town any length of time after 1730 is not clear, nor do Groton records give the birth of children after that date. It is certain that early in 1733 he was living in Stow shown from the sale made May 7, 1733 by "John Forster to Timothy Gibson Jr. of Stow, yeoman, 1345 acres in Stow including Cornet's pond, the south side of Elsabeth [Assabet] river, southerly of a great brushy hill [a nameless hill southeast of Boon's hill, and bounded east by the highway, north and west by Dea. Nathaniel Hapgood, and southeasterly on Marlboro line to Marlboro Corner, house, barn, &c.also all my right in the meeting house," and this property in the southeast of Stow was his home for the next forty years; he further increased his Stow acquisitions by Philip Brown selling Ap. 28, 1763 for £40, some 21 acres to "Timothy Gibson of Stow, gentleman." That he owned real estate in Lunenburg is seen by a deed for 20 acres dated Jan. 3, 1774 and given by his son "Abel Gibson and wife Mary of Lunenburg, to Timothy Gibson of Stow," which 20 acres were doubtless a portion of Mary's inheritance from her father Arrington Gibson of Lunenburg. He was a prominent person in Stow—selectman 1734, 1735,

1736 and 1739, constable 1745 and probably holder of some military office as he was always called Capt. · Gibson; he was also an active member of First church, joining his father May 17, 1736, in the negative vote for a £60 appropriation to Rev. John Gardner, and on Jan. 27, 1755 buying the "north east corner of pew ground," another version worded: "January 27th 1755... Capt. Tim. Gibson bought the north east corner pew in the old church." As eldest of the sons surviving Dea. Gibson in 1757, he was of great help to his step-mother Mrs. Submit Gibson who by her will dated Sept. 24, 1758, gave among other small bequests to connections, "my mother's gold ring to Capt, Timothy Gibson, to wife Persis, Taffety gown, and neck laces to daughters Persis and Lucy," and named him residuary legatee and executor.

Early in 1774 when over seventy-one years old, Capt. Gibson removed to Henniker on Contoocook river, a promising New Hampshire town incorporated Nov. 10, 1768, his farm lying at the foot of Craney hill south side the Contoocook; his patriotic and beneficial influence was felt in the neighborhood, and until his death he rendered service to the revolutionary struggle especially by pecuniary aid; he was among the fifty-one signers of the "association test" called for by resolution of Continental congress of Mar. 14, 1776, forwarded to Henniker Ap. 12, 1776 and framed as follows:

"In consequence of the Resolution of the Honble Congress and to show our determination in joining our American brethren in defending the lives, liberties and properties of the inhabitants of the United Colonies, we the subscribers do hereby solemnly engage and promise that we will to the utmost of our power, at the risque of our lives and fortunes, with arms oppose the hostile proceedings of the british fleets and armies against the United American Colonies."

He must have been buried in one of the two old cemeteries, the earlier laid out Mar. 26, 1770 in the southerly part of the town, and the other about 1775

near the southeast corner; no stone to his memory, however, is found in either ground though a careful search has been made by Col. L. W. Cogswell, historian of Henniker, and the grave of Capt. Timothy Gibson remains unknown.

Mr. Gibson left no will and his widow Mary was appointed administratrix Feb. 25, 1754, her father-in-law "Timothy Gibson Jr., gentleman," and her brother-in-law "Stephen Gibson, yeoman," as bondsmen; the appraisement of Mar. 1, 1754 by William Rice, Daniel Hapgood and Stephen Gibson, showed "real estate o and personal £581 2 s. including £25 for blue coat, black jacket and blush breeches;" in 1761 Mary, then widow of Eli Jones, made application before Justice Danforth for certain privileges for her children by both marriages.

Sergt. Gibson on Ap. 28, 1769, then nearly sixteen years old but by the usual court entry "upwards of 14 years," selected Ebenezer Marshall as guardian, and as early as 1775, if not earlier, was living in Bellingham; in 1779 he moved to the adjoining Milford (then part of Mendon) and for the next four years made it his home at intervals; that he and his family were in Warner, N. H. late in 1781 is seen by an entry in the record book of the Milford Congregational church, the East parish church of old Mendon organized some 70 years

after the incorporation of the town May 15, 1667: "Thaddeus Gibson, Elizabeth his wife and two children, Lois [Lewis] and Mary, came from Warner, Hampshire S^t to reside in Milford, Jan'y 10th 1782. Taken in by James Sumner."

In 1783 he settled in Henniker on a 300 acre farm in the west of the town known as Westboro Corner and, with the exception of a two years' stay in Warner after his wife's death in 1819, made Henniker his permanent home, leaving the farm for "the village" on returning from Warner. He always took an active interest in both secular and religious affairs—selectman 1799, one of the thirty-three persons in 1801 voting "no" to the settlement of Rev. Moses Sawyer, and in 1807 on the committee for building schoolhouses. Under the will of his father-in-law he became joint owner with his wife Elizabeth and her sister, of considerable real estate in Milford, and Nov. 7, 1795 sold advantageously several tracts of this land "bequeathed to us by our father, James Sumner, deceased."

He was a revolutionary soldier—private, Capt. Samuel Cobb's co., Col. Joseph Reed's reg. Mass. militia (Worcester county) May 6 to Nov. 6, 1775, served at Roxbury; sergt., Capt. Samuel Warren's co., Col. Joseph Reed's reg. Jan. 1776 to Feb. 1777, service at White Plains, Trenton, Princeton and elsewhere; private, Capt. Amos Ellis' co., Col. Benjamin Hawse's reg. Sept. 25 to Oct. 31, 1777, Rhode Island service; private, Capt. Jacob Haskin's co., Col. John Jacobs' reg. July 2, 1778 to Jan. 1, 1779, "the men raised in Bellingham by Resolve of June 12, 1778, and paid bounty by the selectmen." He became a revolutionary pensioner under the act passed Mar. 18, 1818 "for service in the War for 9 mos. on Continental establishment," his pension beginning Ap. 4, 1818, for some reason discontinued, restored Ap. 1, 1823 and in force at the time of his death; there is nothing to show that

he came in under the act of 1786 "for wounds and disabilities" as no public pension documents of that date are in existence. In his own affidavits he stated that "he enlisted in the spring of 1777 at Bellingham for 8 mos. in Mass. line under Capt. Sabin Mann, marched to Rhode Island, chosen sergt., served 8 mos. and then dismissed," but could furnish no documentary evidence; he had, however, the following valuable testimony for service in 1776:

"I certify that Thaddeus Gibson served as Sergt. in my Co. in Col. Joseph Reed's Regt. in the Continental Army in the year 1776—[signed] Samuel Warren, Captain," and dated Milford, Ap. 9, 1787.

Capt. Gibson before reaching his majority served in the Fr. and Ind. war, his record reading thus: "Muster Roll—Capt. Abijah Hall Comp. Col. Willard's Reg—in Exp. to Crown Pt. from May 9, 1759 to Jany 12, 1760, Timothy Gibson, Sergt, Stow—fr. May 2 to Nov. 27—30 wks," and perhaps this service as sergeant may have given rise to his familiar appellation of "Captain Gibson."

Until his marriage, if not afterwards, he remained one of the paternal household; his first purchase in his native town was not till Feb. 19, 1770 when he bought for £300 from John Gordon and wife Mary "35 acres in Stow, estate of our father Ebenezer Graves, ½ house and the mill"—the site of this old mill on the east side the Assabet being only a few rods below the present dam of Rock Bottom woolen mills near Rock Bottom (village) in the south of the town; another purchase, the deed dated Sept. 1, 1773 and describing him as "Timothy Gibson Jr. of Stow, yeoman," was from Jonas Temple of Marlboro, conveying "30 acres by White's pond between Stow and Marlboro," the pond retaining its name to this day.

On the removal of his parents from Stow to Henniker, probably in the spring of 1774, he accompanied them and resided in their home at the foot of Craney hill, busied with farm cares and running saw and grist mills on the Contoocook. During his quarter of a century's stay in New Hampshire he filled many offices of trust, both state and town—delegate to the Provincial congress convened at Exeter, May 17, 1775 and to

the convention held at Concord, June 13, 1778 "to form state government," the first justice of the peace in Henniker by vote of Mar. 21, 1776, selectman 1776 and 1778, town clerk 1776, 1777 and 1778, representative 1776, 1777, 1794, 1796 and 1797; he further showed his love of country by signing the "association test" in 1776 and procuring men and money throughout the revolutionary war.

In 1798, four years prior to its incorporation Feb. 20, 1802, he settled in the north of Brownfield on a tract of 900 acres of tillage and timber land west side Saco river, which property, deeded Nov. 24, 1777 by Benjamin Epes to Benjamin Jacobs, was in turn, together with 100 acres in the adjoining Fryeburg, sold Aug. 18, 1797 in consideration of \$3,500, by "Benjamin Jacobs of Brownfield in the county of York [Oxford since 1805] and commonwealth of Massachusetts [Maine not set off and admitted into the Union till Mar. 15, 1820], to Timothy Gibson of Hannover [Henniker] in the county of Hillsborough and state of New Hampshire." With Capt. Gibson's removal to his new home he carried the reputation as "possessor of sound judgment and excellent executive ability, and as one of the ablest citizens in the state."

Mr. Gibson remained in Stow some little time after his marriage, but was a resident of Lunenburg as early as Jan. 3, 1774 shown by a deed of that date to his father for 20 acres, and as late as Ap. 14, 1776 when "Abel Gibson of Lunenburg, husbandman," joined by wife Mary, conveyed to her brother "Timothy Gibson of Lunenburg, 19 acres with a dwelling house," doubtless a portion of the Arrington Gibson estate in the south of the town; directly after this sale he moved to Henniker and was there in time to sign the "association test" received from Continental congress after Ap. 12, 1776.

He lived in the southeast of Henniker, served on several committees and was selectman in 1778; his name appears for the last time on town records as follows: "Valuation of Abel Gibson's property for 1798. I Poll, 2 cows—1-1 year old. Taxes 2/8" [£2 8 s.]; either in this year or the next he and his family removed to New York and before locating in Solon resided in the Susquehanna valley at Butternuts and Unadilla (Otsego county) and German (Chenango county).

Capt. Gibson was one of "the Gibson brothers" of local history and the first of the four who settled in Lunenburg; he was there as early as 1734, and if earlier than 1731 leaving the parental homestead while in Sudbury, not when removed to Pomciticut hill in the adjoining Stow; he located in the south of the town on property deeded him May 15, 1734 by his father "in consideration of love, good will and effection for my son John Gibson of Lunenburg "-household lot "no. 72 of $46\frac{1}{4}$ acres;" upland of "60 acres, no. 69 in second Division;" "meadow Lott containing five acres and Lyeth on the Northerly side of Massapooage pond," the record entry reading: "Meadow N°-4:5 Acres;" he must have increased his real estate as Feb. 7, 1736 he sold to John Fitch of Lunenburg, in whose honor the future Fitchburg was named, 36½ acres, a part of house lot no. 66.

He was a man of gigantic size and strength, and held an important place in public affairs—surveyor of highways 1736, 1742 and 1754, constable 1741, tithingman 1744, selectman 1747, 1748, 1751, 1752 and 1753,

school committee 1748, 1754 and 1756, moderator at town meetings 1753 and 1757, captain of militia, probably chosen prior to "March 4th 1754;" he served also on various temporary committees—in 1740 "to Buld the South End School house," in 1748 "to Repair the old meeting House," the church which he and his wife had joined Aug. 3, 1740, and in 1761 only a few months before his death, one of three "to Enquire into the Bounds of the Buring yard."

John to Lunenburg ("yo South Town" till 1728) and located near him in the south of the town; as these two brothers were not separated in life so in death they repose on the same sunny slope in the old burying ground; his home was the Ephraim Sautle "House Lott number 33 First Division" deeded him together with "second Division Lott number 34" [upland of 60 acres] by his father "tenth day of March in the thirteenth year [1740] of his Majesty's Reign [George II], in consideration

of Love and goodwill and effection which I have and do bear towards my Dutifull son Arrington Gibson of Lunenburg Husbandman."

He was a man of great size and physical strength and courage, but was prevented by early death from holding many public offices; he was, however, surveyor of highways 1746 and 1750, tithingman 1753 and constable 1754; he was also a good church member, both he and "wife Mary renewing baptismal covenant in the First church Oct. 26, 1740, and Mary admitted to f. c. May 9, 1756," a few months after his decease.

Dea. Gibson remained in Stow after the family removal there from Sudbury in his boyhood, and always resided on the paternal homestead on Pomciticut hill (now Summer hill and since 1871 in Maynard). His first real estate was probably that deeded Sept. 29, 1740, shortly after his majority, by "Timothy Gibson of Stow, yeoman, and wife Rebecca, to my son Stephen of Stow, yeoman, for £100 and fatherly regards — two lots in Stow, one, 5 acres bounded north by Concord road, South and West, by my own land; the other, 25 acres bounded east on Assabeth river." Again, Mar. 31, 1747, his parents deeded him for £152 and services to be rendered, "my house [the homestead] and 50 acres in Stow, bounded by Concord highway on north, east by Stephen Gibson's and Stephen Houghton's land, south by John Jewell's, west by Gardner's, also acre in Sudbury . . . reserving three rooms for ourselves and stabling for three cows;" on June 9, 1752 he increased his Sudbury property by buying for £149 5s., some 20 acres in two tracts from Stephen Houghton of Stow. He was also a large landholder in Ashby, Mass. (Lunenburg till 1764, then Fitchburg till 1767); among purchases—one, June 9, 1763 for £80, from William Benjamin, "100 acres, house &c. in Lunenburg;"-another, May 4, 1768, from William Flagg of Ashby, 12 acres still known as the "Flagg piece;"- a third, Jan. 5, 1771, for £88, from Brown and Blaney of Salem, 110 acres;—a fourth, for £10, from his sonin-law Stephen Barker of Ashby, 1½ acre; doubtless these purchases were the lands occupied by the three of his sons, Rev. Stephen, John and Abraham who lived on adjacent farms in the new town; in addition to his Ashby acquisitions he owned 100 or more acres in what was the north of Fitchburg till 1829 when ceded to Ashby. He left no will, and as his sons, Rev. Stephen, Arrington and Abraham, declined administration, Augustus Tower gave bonds as administrator Ap. 17, 1807; the estate, then wholly personal, amounted to near \$500 and in 1811 was divided among the eight surviving children and the children of the deceased daughter Elizabeth Piper.

Dea, Gibson was a man of sound judgment and executive ability, often chosen appraiser and in 1746 selected guardian of Sarah and Ephraim Gibson, children of his deceased brother Abraham; a faithful attendant, communicant and deacon of First church, and on the rebuilding of the edifice, purchasing Jan. 17, 1755 "next to minister's pew, west of the pulpit;" a loyal and patriotic citizen of his town and country; a dutiful son, his parents voluntarily sharing their home with him and his widowed step-mother Mrs. Submit Gibson returning his respectful attentions by little legacies to his children—" a gold ring" to Sarah, and to Rebecca, Arrington and Timothy each, "a pewter plate;" a loving husband "living respectably in conjugal happiness with his first and only wife more than 60 years."

He was a revolutionary soldier—private, Capt. William Whitcomb's co., Col. James Prescott's reg. of militia (Middlesex county), marched from Stow Ap. 19, 1775 on Lexington alarm, served 3 days; also his name appears on the alarm list (Dec. 1776) of Capt. Benjamin Munroe's co. (6th), Col. Ezekiel Howe's reg. (4th

Middlesex county), reported "between 60 and 65 years of age."

Mr. Gibson, one of the three brothers who resided on adjacent farms in Ashby, settled there shortly after his marriage on the property deeded him as late as Mar. 16, 1779, by "Stephen Gibson of Stow, yeoman, and wife Sarah, to John Gibson of Ashby, husbandman, for 5s. and love and affection for my third son, 8o acres in Ashby, bounded west on line between Ashby and Ashburnham to line of Stephen Gibson Jr., including house, &c." On Jan. 19, 1799, about which time he probably left Ashby, he sold to Josiah Bright for \$1,000 this farm of 80 acres lying both sides the highway and bounded north by his brother Abraham's, south by his brother Rev. He was a gentleman of remarkably fine looks, pleasing address and gentle manners, graduate Harvard coll. 1778 and ranking high as a clergyman of scholarly attainments.

Rev. Mr. Gibson, one of the three brothers who resided on adjacent farms in Ashby, was in the new town prior to 1770; he settled on the 80 acres including the "Flagg piece" deeded Ap. 8, 1773 by "Stephen Gibson of Stow, yeoman, to Stephen Gibson of Ashby, husbandman, and in consideration of 5 s. and love and affection for my eldest son." This farm, the most southerly of the three, lying both sides the highway and bounded north by his brother John's (the Asburnham road between), south by Flint's land and west by Ashburnham line, remained his home until his death; two years later the property was bought by a Gibson nephew whose family retained it till 1896 when it was sold to strangers. He was well fitted for a life of activity and usefulness, beginning on his arrival in his adopted town to hold public offices—framer of "first rates" or tax list, selectman 1770 and 1775, town clerk Mar. 1, 1775-Mar. 1, 1776, moderator 1782, and always taking a deep interest in the religious and educational growth and general welfare of the people.

He was a revolutionary soldier—1st lt., capt. John Jones' co., Col. James Prescott's reg. of militia (Middlesex county), marched from Ashby Ap. 20, 1775 on Lexington alarm, served 7 days; also his name is on the list of commissioned officers of Mass. militia as 1st lieutenant, Capt. James Bennett's co. (9th), Col. Oliver Prescott's reg. (6th Middlesex county), chosen by the company and accepted by the Council Ap. 24, 1776.

Rev. Mr. Gibson was brought up a Congregationalist and on his removal to Ashby became a member of First church in Fitchburg organized Jan 7, 1768; that he experienced a change of religious views is shown by the church voting Sept. 6, 1776, "to send the pastor [Rev. John Payson] and brothers Walker and Goodridge, to discourse with Brother Stephen Gibson and wife for absenting themselves from our communion," and by his reply that "he absented himself because he

disliked the principles of the church in baptizing infants," etc. True to his conscientious convictions, he accepted the Baptist faith, not that of the "profest" but the Freewill sect, and being "gifted in this direction" he began preaching to those who gathered to hear him and in any building selected for the occasion; he did not, however, withdraw from First church, and on Mar. 8, 1783 a committee was appointed "to admonish Brother Stephen Gibson of Ashby for absenting from worship;" this was followed by the church convening June 1, 1783 and voting "to Reject Stephen Gibson from his relation to us for his absenting from us and Irregular & disorderly conduct in preaching from place to place;" but he continued to preach for many years either in private dwellings or schoolhouses in both Ashby and 'Ashburnham and occasionally in Page's schoolhouse in Fitchburg, and in consistence with his unbelief in salaried clergymen, preached "with more acceptance than compensation." It was not until 1810, two years before his death, that his society then worshiping in its own meetinghouse in Fitchburg near Ashby line, was incorporated as the First Baptist society of Fitchburg and Ashby.

Dr. Gibson after his marriage remained in Ashby until 1811, then crossed the state line and settled on a farm in "New Laid out Division, Range XIII, Lot 2," on the western slope of Page hill in the town incorporated as New Ipswich Sept. 9, 1762. In 1823 he bought the old Jeremiah Prichard property, "South Ranges—Range V, Lot 4," about 1½ mile eastward and a little north of his farm, and by further purchases enlarged this future homestead to 200 or more acres; his comfortable farmhouse so full of hospitality to all beneath its roof and such a place of wonder and delight to the young folks of the family, was destroyed by fire some years ago and never rebuilt.

He was endowed with a native genius and versatile talent, the latter preserved and developed in the mechanical pursuits of several of his descendants; for more than half a century he held the respect due a skilled agriculturalist, a successful physician and an honorable and benevolent gentleman.

Col. Gibson resided the first few years of his wedded life on the Appleton homestead but in 1837 moved to the commonly called Gibson village in the south of the town, bought and rebuilt the old Prichard mill on North branch of Souhegan river, ran a saw mill and manufactured chairs and carriages; he was highly esteemed as an enterprising and public-spirited gentleman, was selectman several years, and as organizer of the 2d company of rifles, "Reg. 22 of Militia in State of N. H.," commissioned captain Jan. 20, 1835 and later, colonel of the regiment.

Mr. Gibson was a graduate Appleton acad., and in early manhood a clerk in the Massachusetts towns Concord and Ashby; during his residence in Fitchburg he engaged in mercantile pursuits until his removal in 1867 to Kalamazoo where for twenty-five years he was superintendent of the manufacturing plant of which he became president. He was deeply interested in religious, charitable and educational work—Sunday-school superintendent and trustee the Congregational church, Kalamazoo college and Young women's christian association; he was also much interested in research

pertaining to his ancestry and in the compilation of this book.

Mr. Shepley was greatly interested in genealogical research; in a paper (read Jan. 17, 1876 before the Farmers' club of Lunenburg) on John Fitch for whom Fitchburg was named, he related several anecdotes of "the Gibson brothers" of early Lunenburg, "those giants whose size and strength would have done honor to the days of chivalry."

Dea. Gibson lived in the northwest of Fitchburg which was ceded to Ashby five years after his death; his farm was bounded west by Ashburnham line and north by Flint's land separating him from the home of his brother Rev. Stephen Gibson, one of the three brothers residing on adjacent farms in Ashby. In addition to this homestead of more than 100 acres, partly if not wholly the gift of his father, he owned real estate in Ashby, purchasing 8 acres in 1782 and on June 27, 1783, the property known as "the Woodbury farm;" he also bought in Acton, Jan. 17, 1786 for £200, some "158 acres, house, barn, &c." and Mar. 26, 1790, a 54 acre tract.

In 1775 he was one of the five Gibsons among the forty-four Fitchburg minute-men; at that date he was a member of First church (Congregational) but changed his religious views probably about 1776 when his brother and sister, Rev. Stephen Gibson and Mrs. Sarah Puffer, changed theirs, and in 1783 his name appeared among the thirteen "profest baptists asking rebate of ministers' rates;" this small community later held religious services in the "Lord's barn" which stood on Dean hill from about 1784 to 1826 and was occupied by the Baptists, Methodists and Universalists until the town rebuilt First church in 1796. Dea. Gibson must have again changed his views to those of the Freewill-Baptists as he became a deacon in his brother's church.

Mr. Gibson lived in the southwest of the town on "the 85 acres more or less" which Jan. 1801 he bought from Josiah Bright—the old home until 1799 of his

uncle John Gibson, one of the three brothers who resided on adjacent farms in Ashby; the property is still in the family, now owned and occupied by two gr. daughters. Mr. Gibson always resided on the homestead receiving from his father Mar. 16, 1798, "in consideration of the love I bear to my second son Samuel Gibson Jr—and also three hundred and eighty Dollars paid to me in hand by the above named Samuel Gibson Jr. the one-half of my farm being and lying in the northerly part of Fitchburg, together with one-half the buildings thereon and also the one-half of a meadow lot lying in Ashby, in the whole of both lots about fifty-four acres and one-half;" a few months after his father's death

he bought June 13, 1824 from his brother Stephen Gibson of Ashby, paying \$1,000, "all my right, &c. in the estate which belonged to our late Father, Samuel Gibson, late of Fitchburg, deceased."

He was an important man in his native town—member of the legislature 1805, 1806, 1807 and 1812. By the annexation of the northerly part of Fitchburg to Ashby in 1829 he became without change of location a resident of Ashby.

Mr. Gibson was a revolutionary soldier—private, Capt. William Whitcomb's co., Col. James Prescott's reg. of militia (Middlesex county), marched from Stow on Lexington alarm of Ap. 19, 1775, served 16 days; private, Capt. Caleb Brook's co., Col. Nicholas Dike's reg., "3 mos. service to Dec. 1, 1776 at Dorchester heights;" corp., same company and regiment, Dec. 1776 to Feb. 1777, guarding stores at Boston.

He was a lifelong resident of his native town and on the homestead of his father and gr. father on Pomciticut hill, deeded him June 30, 1785 as follows: "Stephen Gibson of Stow, yeoman, and wife Sarah, to Arrington Gibson of Stow, husbandman, for love I bair my fourth sone Arrington, & also 5 s. half of my lands in Stow & half of the seller and house and half of the barn to his hairs forever;" he was also a large land owner in Fitchburg, Mass. and Dublin, N. H., his father giving him in the former town Jan. 7, 1786, "in consideration of love and 5 s. one-half of my land lying in Fitchburg in the county of Worcester, adjoining to Samuel Gibson's land [Arrington's brother] it being the east end of the lot of said Samuel's land which I gave to him," etc.; again, giving him Sept. 29, 1801, "one-half for quantity and quality of a certain tract of Pasture land lying in the town of Fitchburg, the whole containing by estimate Thirty-two acres, bounded Westerly on land of Samuel Gibson," etc. By his will dated May 13, 1815,

he gave to "wife Rachel, use and improvement of my household furniture during her life, & at her death to be divided to the children, Stephen, Eli, Robert & Rachel," also "Wife \frac{1}{3} part of all my lands and buildings within this Commonwealth," which one-third part after her decease was to be given to Eli and Robert to whom were bequeathed the other two-thirds unconditionally; he left an estate of nearly \$10,000, the realty in Stow (including the homestead of 80 acres appraised at \$3,500), in Fitchburg and in Dublin amounting to over \$7,000. After his death the heirs retained for a few years the old home of four generations handed down from sire to son, but since 1823 it has ceased to be a Gibson possession; the house is gone long ago, its site and that of the well, however, are still discernible.

Mr. Gibson received under his father's will, jointly with his twin brother Robert, personal estate, also real in New Hampshire and eventually all the lands and buildings in Massachusetts. By purchasing in 1820 his brother's half interest he became sole possessor of the nearly one century old Gibson home which Feb. 22, 1823 (then containing some 90 acres), he sold to Mrs. Lucy Smith of Sudbury. On May 29, 1826 Mrs. Smith deeded the entire property to her son-in-law Isaac Maynard whose sons are the present owners and occupants; the place is now known as Summer Hill farm, the name of the hill is changed from the Indian Pomciticut to Summer hill, and both farm and hill since

Ap. 19, 1871 are in the new town of Maynard, not old Stow.

Mr. Gibson was one of "the Gibson brothers" of local history and the third of the four who settled in Lunenburg; he was not much over age when he bade good by to the parental homestead on Pomciticut hill in Stow and followed his brothers Capt. John and Arrington to Lunenburg ("ye South Town" prior to Aug. 1, 1728). He settled in the westerly part of the town set off Feb. 3, 1764 as Fitchburg, and on the "115 acres more or less" deeded him by his father Oct. 25, 1744, "the Southerly part of my Land at Pearl Hill . . . in consideration of Love and good will which I have and do bare to my beloved son Isaac Gibson of Lunenburg provided allways my said son Isaac shall allow one hundred pounds received as part of his Portion out of my Estate Equal to one hundred pounds given by me to any of his Elder Brothers before the Date of this Deed;" his house, "Fort Gibson" in the Indian raid of 1748, stood on the eastern slope of the hill and is still standing in good preservation, the property owned by strangers since about 1873.

He was a man of great size, strength and courage; among several anecdotes told of his personal daring is his well-known encounter with a bear whose cub he was carrying off, the combatants rolling down Pearl hill together, each victorious, each vanquished, the bear losing her offspring, the captor showing on his person through life the marks of the struggle!

Mr. Gibson was always an important person in his adopted home—scout in the Indian troubles of 1748, selectman 1767–1770, 1774–1777, among the thirteen largest taxpayers in 1771, chairman of the committee of seven Dec. 1, 1773 "to respond to the Boston letter" and on the committee in 1774 "to prepare instructions for the guidance of the town's representative in the General court," one of the five Gibsons of the forty-four Fitchburg minute-men in 1775, town moderator 1777.

He was a revolutionary soldier—private, Capt. Ebenezer Woods' co., Col. Asa Whitcomb's reg. of militia, marched from Fitchburg on Lexington alarm of Ap.

19, 1775, served 11 days.

There is no record when he removed to Grafton (Thomlinson under charters of 1754 and 1763 and Tomlinson from 1788 to Oct. 31, 1792 when the name Grafton was bought at auction); that it was between Dec. 26, 1786 and Sept. 4, 1790 is shown by an agreement made on the first date by "Isaac of Fitchburg" and his son "Jonathan of Thomlinson," and by a power of attorney given on the later date by "Isaac of Tomlinson" to his son "Jacob of Fitchburg;" the removal was probably in the spring of 1787 as in 1785 he paid his last Fitchburg real and poll taxes and in 1786 his last personal tax; he did not, however, withdraw his membership from First church (Fitchburg) till Oct. 16, 1791 when at "ye request of Isaac Gibson the church voted to give him a dismission from his special relation to youn. and a recommendation to the church of Christ in Thombleston" [Tomlinson].

Mr. Gibson was a revolutionary soldier - private, Capt. Ebenezer Wood's co., Col. Asa Whitcomb's reg. of militia, marched from Fitchburg on Lexington alarm, served II days (not the private in Capt. John Jones' co., Col. James Prescott's reg. marching from Ashby on Lexington alarm—the hitherto supposed record but which is disclaimed by the writer, and the correct record accepted by James F. D. Garfield, esq., the present Fitchburg revolutionary authority); private, Capt. Abijah Wyman's co., Col. William Prescott's reg. Ap. 30, 1775 until his death at Bunker hill. On Capt. Wyman's muster roll dated Aug. 1, 1775, is written after the name John Gibson: "kild in Battle June 17th as supposed," and on Capt. Wyman's returns of Oct. 3, 1775, after John Gibson's name: "Died June 17." To quote, "his remains were not recognized among the slain, but the last seen of him was in the hottest of the fight when, his ammunition having failed, he was beating back the enemy with the breach of his gun . . . the only man from Fitchburg known to have been slain in the revolution." On Ap. 23, 1776 David Goodridge, Isaac Gibson and Joseph Walker, selectmen of Fitchburg, addressed the following letter. the original found in the Massachusetts archives:

"To the Committee of Cloathing for the Colony of Massachusetts Bay—Gentlemen: This may certify to you that John Gibson who was supposed to be killed in the battle of Bunker Hill, had his last place of residence at Fitchburg, and said Gibson belonged to Capt Abijah Wyman's company in Col William Prescott's Reg. and the said Gibson has not drawn a coat nor any money in lue thereof,

and there is no administrator on said Gibson's estate. Therefore we desire you should pay to some one of us the subscribers, or our order, the sum of twenty-five shillings for the benefit of the heirs of the said deceased, agreeable to a resolve of the General Assembly."

The city of Boston erected June 17, 1889, as a memorial to the patriots who fell at Bunker hill, two double-faced bronze tablets in Winthrop square (Charlestown), the front looking towards the square and the reverse, Adams street; on the front of one is engraved "John Gibson, Fitchburg."

Mr. Gibson was a revolutionary soldier—private, Capt. Ebenezer Bridge's co., Col. John Whitcomb's reg. of minute-men, marched from Fitchburg on Lexington alarm, served six days; private, Capt. John Fuller's co., Col. Asa Whitcomb's reg. of militia, Ap. 25, 1775 to 8 months later, on duty Oct. 4, 1775 at Prospect hill near Boston; private, Capt. John Joslin's co., Col. Job Cushing's reg. (6th Worcester county), marched July 31, 1777 to Bennington "to joyn Gen. Seth Warner." It is said that in the Bennington centennial celebration one of his descendants carried a Hessian drum captured at the battle.

On his removal to Grafton he located on the hills in "the middle-of-the-town," and under town entry of Mar. 4, 1793 "Ens. Jonathan Gibson" was chosen constable and collector but was allowed to hire some one to serve in his place.

By the agreement of Dec. 26, 1786 his father and

step-mother made their home with him, the son signing a bond for £300" to hold Myself Boun to the said Isaac Gibson and wiffe to find the One halaff of the house Namely the Estend of said House from the saller to the Garrot". . . to provide fire-wood, food including "Two Good Cows for Milk Butter & Cheese," clothing "Both for the Lords Day and Every Day," and "a Good Horse as oft as they need it or when they Please" . . . "to Nurse and Docter in Sickness and to Bury the said Isaac Gibson & wife at their Diseease Decently and honourablely"; and in consideration of this the father agreed "to keep for the use of the Family [Jonathan's] two Beed togather with the remainder of the Household stuff and Beading Dureing the Life of Myself and wife," and also "to Give to the said Jonathan Gibson Two Cows as part of the Reward for to Enable the said Jonathan to full fill the above Conditions."

Mr. Gibson passed his early manhood in his native town and in 1775 was one of the five Gibsons among the Fitchburg forty-four minute-men; about 1782 he moved to the southwest of Rindge remaining there till his death of "spotted fever," an epidemic which prevailed in several New England localities in 1811 and 1812.

Miss Gibson during the civil war was actively engaged promoting the interests of "the boys in blue "-the Ellen (Ella) E. G. Hobart, lecturer and writer on questions of morality, giving to the Northwestern sanitary fair at Chicago (1863) the first one hundred dollars realized from the sale of her pamphlet The Soldiers' Gift, and closely identifying herself with the regiment of which her husband was chaplain, the 8th Wis. volunteers or "Live Eagle" regiment whose Old Abe, after safely returning from three years' camp life, was kept in the capitol grounds in Madison, Wis. and died in 1871 at the venerable age of twenty! In 1864, on the recommendation of Gov. Lewis of Wisconsin and other state officials, Miss Gibson was elected chaplain 1st Wis. heavy artillery then stationed at Fort Lyon, Va., and performed the duties of chaplain although the Secretary of War declined to have her mustered, perhaps for the reason stated in the following letter signed by President Lincoln and dated Nov. 10, 1864:

"This lady says she would be appointed chaplain of the 1st Wisconsin Heavy Artillery, only that she is a female. The President has not legally anything to do with such a question, but he has no objection to her appointment.

Congress passed a bill Mar. 3, 1869 granting her chaplain's pay for the time of service; it was not, however, till Mar. 7, 1876 that Miss Gibson received from the U. S. treasurer John C. New, \$1,210.56, the amount in full.

Aged 94" on gravestone and correctly entered "widow Lois Gibson 90" on First church records), dau. of Thomas and Elizabeth Smith, and gr. dau. of John and Sarah (Hunt) Smith of Sudbury.

Capt. Gibson was one of "the Gibson brothers" of local history and the last of the four who settled in Lunenburg; he was probably not of age when he bade farewell to the parental homestead on Pomciticut hill in Stow, followed his brothers Capt. John, Arrington and Isaac to Lunenburg and located on Pearl hill, on a farm of 100 acres or more deeded by his father Oct. 25, 1744:

"I, Timothy Gibson of Stow, County of Middlesex in New England, yeoman, in Consideration of love and good will and affection I have and do bare to my beloved son, Reuben Gibson Jr[junior meaning a minor] of said Stow, Husbandman . . . a Certain Tract of Land Situate Lying and being in Lunenburg and it is bounded Southerly by the Divisionall Line between him and his Brother, Isaac Gibson and is bounded all otherways as it stands Recorded in the Proprieters Book of Records for Lunenburg, provided allways my said son Reuben Shall allow one hundred Pounds Received of my Estate as part of his portion equal to one hundred Pounds Given by me to any of his Elder Brothers before the Date of this Deed . . . I set my Haud and Seal this twenty fifth day of October Annoque Domini, One Thousand Seven hundred and forty-four and in the Eighteenth year of his Majesty's [George II] Reign."

This was Capt. Reuben's home until his death although in 1769 he and Isaac leased together some 200 acres of their lands for gold mining purposes; shortly after 1863 his heirs sold the property to strangers and about 1892 the house built in 1746 or earlier, was torn down.

He was a man of great size, strength and physical

courage, and of such enterprise and force of character that he was a very important person both in old Lunenburg and the new Fitchburg after its incorporation Feb. 3, 1764—selectman on the first board Mar. 5, 1764, surveyor of highways 1767, among the thirteen largest taxpayers in 1771, one of the committee of seven on correspondence Dec. 1, 1773, constable 1775, chairman of the committee of five on safety and correspondence 1776, collector 1781, probably captain of a company as town records call him "Cap^t Gibson" after 1772.

He was one of the five Gibsons among the forty-four Fitchburg minute-men in 1775, also a revolutionary soldier—sergt., Capt. Ebenezer Woods' co., Col. Asa Whitcomb's reg. of militia, marched from Fitchburg on Lexington alarm of Ap. 19, 1775, served 11 days.

By his will dated Mar. 10, 1797 ("the twenty first yeare of the independency of America") and allowed Sept. 2, 1800, Capt. Gibson left his household goods to his children equally, to Arrington, the only unmarried child, "my land and buildings by him freely to enjoy after the decease of myself and wife, on condition of my said son Arrington faithfully providing for myself and wife all necessarys of life both in helth and sickness, and also at death to bury myself and wife in a deacent and Christian form and manner," and one dollar to each of the seven married children-" for the love I have to my daughter Billings . . . for the love I bare to my sons Reuben, Abraham, Thomas, Bezaliel, Isaac & Ephraim Gibson One dollar to each and every one of them at our decease;" the appraisement, made by his nephew Rev. Mr. Gibson was a revolutionary soldier—private, Capt. Ebenezer Woods' co., Col. Asa Whitcomb's reg. of militia, marched from Fitchburg on Lexington alarm of Ap. 19, 1775, served 7 days. He was a man of great strength and courage, and it is said of him and his cousin Jake (Jacob Gibson, see 162) that in the Shay rebellion of 1787 they by their intrepid fearlessness, set at defiance the soldiers sent to arrest them as "suspects."

The Fitchburg records show that he held offices of trust—"Surveyer of Highways & Collector of highway Taxes" 1778, one of the committee "to provide a Scool marfter or marfters" 1783 and on the committee "to provide schooling in each Quarter of the Town" 1786 and 1788.

He owned considerable real estate in Fitchburg—49 acres bought of his father Mar. 22, 1777 for £60;—30 acres purchased Dec. 24, 1789 from John Knight for £80 and sold Mar. 17, 1797 for \$500;—22 acres from the same party May 6, 1790; he also bought June 15, 1792 from John Knight, 20 acres in Lunenburg, and Sept. 9, 1795 from Peter Stone, 53½ acres in the east part of Ashburnham, paying £200 and selling the same May 16, 1798, together with "½ Pew No. 27 in Ashburnham Meeting House," for \$730. In his will dated Nov. 4, 1831 and allowed June 2, 1836, each child was named with some small legacy, and the rest of the property left to his eight surviving daughters and the three children of his deceased daughter Sally Whitcomb.

D. 1897; since removing to Madison in 1856 he has held many important offices—alderman 1861, county judge (Dane county) 1865, 1869 and 1873, senator 1874, q. m. general 1875–1881, postmaster 1882–1886 and 1890–1894, representative since 1898.

He was a soldier in the civil war—on Jan. 9, 1861, the day of the withdrawal of South Carolina from the Union, Capt. Bryant offered the services of himself and his company (Madison Guards), enlisted Ap. 17 and mustered May 17, 1861, capt., co. E (Madison Guards), 1st reg. Wis. vol. infantry (three months' service), mustered out Aug. 21, 1861; commissioned Sept. 27, 1861,

col., 12th reg. Wis. vol. infantry, served as brigade commander in 1863 and 1864, mustered out Nov. 6, 1864; later made brigadier general.
