THE REVEREND
DAVID HILLHOUSE BUEL, D.D.

Born at Troy, N. Y., May 26, 1817.

Educated at Bristol College, Pennsylvania.

Graduated at the General Theological Seminary, 1842.

Ordained Priest, September 24, 1843.

Among his earliest charges were the churches at Westminster, Sykesville and Cumberland, Maryland. He was afterward Rector of St. Paul's, Burlington, Vermont, and of Christ Church, Cooperstown, N. Y.

In August, 1872, he became Principal of the Ravenscroft Theological Training School and Head of the Ravenscroft Missions in the mountains of North Carolina.

Dr. BUEL served for several years as a Clerical Delegate from this Diocese in the General Convention. He fell asleep at Baltimore, Md., January 13, 1893. Buried January 17 in Oakwood Cemetery at Troy, N. Y.



THE REVEREND
FREEMAN W. DUNN.

Born January 1, 1859.

Educated at St. Augustine's School, Raleigh, N. C., where he graduated in 1885.

Ordered Deacon by Bishop Lyman at St. Augustine's Church, Raleigh, June 3, 1886.

Labored in Wilson for some months and then removed to the Diocese of Georgia where he worked with great acceptance until his return to North Carolina in March, 1892. At that time he was placed in charge of Trinity Chapel, Asheville, and of St. Stephen's Church, Morganton.

After a brief illness he fell asleep at Asheville, August 15, 1892.

JOURNAL

OF THE

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONVENTION, 1893.

The seventy-seventh Annual Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina assembled in Christ Church, Raleigh, at 10 o'clock A. M. on Wednesday, the 17th day of May, 1893.

The Bishop of the Diocese called the Convention to order and offered prayers.

The Secretary called the roll of Clergy and Lay Delegates entitled to seats, and a quorum of both orders being found present, the Convention was declared duly organized and a recess was taken in order to attend Divine Service at 11 o'clock.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Messrs. Julian E. Ingle, Scott B. Rathbun, John A. Deal and James A. Weston. The Bishop proceeded to the celebration of the Holy Communion, in which he was assisted by the Rev. Dr. Buxton, the Rev. McNeely DuBose and the Rev. Dr. Marshall. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Frederick Towers, from the text, Ezekiel XVII, 22 and 23: "Thus saith the Lord God, I will also take of the highest branch of the high cedar, and will set it; I will crop off from the top of his young twigs a tender one, and will plant it upon a high mountain and eminent: in the mountain of the height of Israel will I plant it; and it shall bring forth boughs and bear fruit, and be a goodly cedar: and under it shall dwell all fowl of every wing; in the shadow of the branches thereof shall they dwell."

The offerings of the congregation were appropriated to the New York Bible and Common Prayer-Book Society.

At the conclusion of Divine Service, the Bishop of the Diocese took the chair and announced the first business to be the election of a President of the Convention. The Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D., was nominated. There being no other nomination, the Convention requested the Chairman to cast the ballot for him, and he was declared elected.

The election of a Secretary being next in order, the Rev. Dr. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., nominated the Rev. Julian E. Ingle, and in the absence of other nominations, the Chairman was, on motion, requested to cast the ballot of the Convention, and he was declared elected.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Marshall, it was

Resolved, That the daily sessions of the Convention begin with Morning Prayer at 9:30 o'clock and continue until 2 P. M.; the afternoon session to begin at 4 and continue until such time as may from day to day be agreed upon.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, it was

Resolved, That Clergymen of the Diocese not members of the Convention, visiting Clergymen and candidates for Holy Orders, present in the house, be invited to honorary seats in the Convention.

On motion, the Convention took a recess until 4 o'clock P. M.

WEDNESDAY, May 17, 4 P. M.

The Convention re-assembled, the President in the chair.

The Secretary announced the appointment of Mr. G. C. Lamb, of Henderson, as Assistant Secretary.

Mr. Charles E. Johnson presented his report as Treasurer of the Diocese. (See Appendix C.)

The Rev. R. B. Sutton, D.D., presented the following

REPORT OF THE MANAGERS OF THE THOMPSON ORPHAN- AGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION.

The Managers of the Thompson Orphanage and Training Institution respectfully submit their seventh annual report for the fiscal year ending April 31st, 1893.

To show the present financial condition of the Institution and the improvements so much needed, we submit and incorporate a condensed report of the Superintendent.

THE SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE REV. E. A. OSBORNE, SUPERINTENDENT OF THE THOMPSON ORPHANAGE AND TRAINING INSTITUTION FOR THE YEAR ENDING APRIL 31ST, 1893.

The past year of our history bears testimony to the bountiful goodness of Divine Providence in providing means for our support, and bestowing many blessings.

The health of the children of the Institution has been remarkably good, not having had occasion to call upon our physician more than two or three times during the year, except in case of accidents.

The contributions have been liberal, considering the depressed state of finances in the country, and the political agitations that have taken place during the year.

We have received twenty children during the year, and have now fifty in the Institution, twenty having been discharged. Of these, thirty-five are from this Diocese, and fifteen from East Carolina.

Our farming operations have been quite satisfactory during the year. The proceeds of the farm amount to about \$1,000, besides what has been consumed in the Institution.

The Messenger of Hope has increased its circulation to nearly 1,200 subscribers, and the paper is now paying expenses and adding something to the support of the Institution, besides being a most important auxiliary in the work.

We maintain two schools, one for the larger children and the other for beginners. Our employees now consist of a superintendent, two matrons, two teachers and a foreman of the farm. The salaries of the superintendent, matrons and teachers amount to nearly \$1,400 a year.

I again call attention to some of the urgent wants of this Institution. First, a dormitory for the boys, and more room for carrying on the work of training among the girls at Thompson Hall. An infirmary is also greatly needed. These additions could be made at an expense of \$2,500 or \$3,000, and would add incalculably to the success of the work and to the comfort and improvement of the children.

An Industrial Hall for the boys is also greatly needed, so that they can learn some useful trades. \$1,000 will build it. We also need a play-room for the smaller children at Bronson Hall, which could be built for about \$600, and would be a great blessing to that important department of our work.

I have been compelled to purchase a small lot of land in front of the Orphanage to prevent unpleasant intrusion. I have also added some \$200 worth of improvements to the buildings of the Institution.

We cordially commend in every particular the efficiency of the devoted Superintendent and his faithful assistants. They have set the life of the little orphans to music, judging from their orderly ways and happy faces.

We owe much gratitude to our physician, Dr. S. B. Jones, and also to Drs. Charles Alexander and George Graham for many favors in their respective lines.

The health of the children has been excellent, conducted by strict requirement to hygienic laws, and the physic used is loving attention and kindness to the little waifs.

The Orphanage has been sustained principally by the work of sixteen Guilds, fifty-five Churches and Missions, and the contributions of a few faithful sympathizing friends, the Guilds contributing more than all the Churches. And should the Rectors of all our Parishes put their hearts into this work and organize Guilds, the contributions would double and possibly treble, and give the management the means to design and complete necessary improvements, the adaptability of which would bear some proper proportion to the magnitude of the interest involved.

Again and again has the attention of the Church in Convention been called to the importance of Guilds, the only reliable source of income. Like the tones of the Church bell calling us to our duty, Will we do it?

We are compelled to increase the accommodations for the boys, who, by their efficient labor on the farm and the large returns therefrom, have demonstrated their right to consideration.

To bring this statement more fully to the front, we say sustain the current expenses and the earnings of the boys will pay for the improvements.

We desire our boys taught not only farm labor but a general industrial education—an education of the hand, the head, and pre-eminently the heart; and so, also, we desire for our girls manual training, sewing, dressmaking, cooking, housekeeping. Will you give us the means?

We confidently appeal, in behalf of the orphan waifs, to the Clergy of this Diocese to organize the young people in their Parishes, and they will rise to this their opportunity and help build the beautiful walls of Zion.

CHRIST CHURCH, RALEIGH,
THURSDAY, May 18, 1893.

The Convention met at 9:30 o'clock pursuant to order.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Messrs. Edward Benedict, W. J. Smith and M. M. Marshall, D.D.

The Convention was called to order by the Bishop.

The calling of the roll was, on motion, dispensed with, and the minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

The Rev. B. S. McKenzie presented an application from the Parish of All Saints, Concord, for admission into union with the Convention, which, on his motion, was referred to the Committee on new Parishes.

The Rev. Dr. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., presented the reports of the Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, of St. Peter's Home and Hospital and of the Hospital of the Good Samaritan. (See Appendix B.)

The Rev. Dr. Cheshire also presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons, appointed at the Convention of 1892, beg leave to submit their final report.

There are at present no matters of importance before this Committee by reference from the Convention, and the Committee are not disposed to make inquisition for changes to be proposed in the Constitution and Canons, even where it might be possible to suggest improvements. They are of opinion that frequent changes have the effect of keeping our people, even the Clergy, from becoming familiar with our Diocesan laws and methods; and they therefore think that no amendments should be proposed except where necessity demands a change and experience has pointed out an improvement.

There are, however, one or two matters before the Committee on which a report to this Convention was promised by the action of the Committee last year. These matters have to do solely with the form of our Parochial Reports.

In 1891 on Friday, May 15, the last day of the session of our Diocesan Convention, two resolutions were introduced into the Convention and referred to the Committee on Canons (pages 46 and 50 of the Journal of 1891.) The same day the Committee reported upon the subject-matter of the resolutions so referred to them, and recommended the adoption of the two following resolutions, which are said in the Journal to have been adopted (Journal of 1891, page 51):

"1. *Resolved*, That the Secretary of the Convention have full power to make such changes in the form [*i. e.* the form of Parochial Reports] as he thinks necessary."

"2. *Resolved*, That wherever the words *males and females* occur in the present form of Parochial Report, they be stricken out and the words *men and boys* and *women and girls*, be substituted."

It is a question whether both these resolutions be not void, as not having been adopted in accordance with Article XIII of our Diocesan Constitution. That article provides that "no new Canon shall be passed nor shall any existing Canon be amended upon the day upon which the said new Canon or amendment may be proposed, without unanimous consent." It would seem that where the Constitution imposes certain

conditions upon the Convention in the enactment of Canons for the government of the Diocese, the Journal of the Convention should show affirmatively that the conditions have been complied with when any action is taken touching our Canonical regulations. In the case of the two resolutions above there is nothing to show that unanimous consent was given, or that in adopting them the Convention acted otherwise than in passing the most trivial matters of routine. It is probable that the Committee on Canons recommended their adoption without remembering the bearing of the XIIIth Article of the Constitution upon the method of proceeding.

But in any case, the former of the two resolutions is clearly void. The Convention may alter or amend the Canons of the Diocese, but it may not delegate that power to another. The form of Parochial Report is part of one of the Canons of the Diocese, Canon VI, of Chapter III. It is, therefore, beyond the power of the Convention to authorize the Secretary to make changes in it, and a resolution to that effect is absolutely null and void, however passed.

Should it be thought that the second of the resolutions above recited was lawfully passed, notwithstanding the alleged want of conformity to the requirements of the XIIIth Article of the Constitution, yet it should not have been passed and should now be rescinded. The form of Parochial Report, though part of our Diocesan Canon, is not a mere detail of our peculiar Diocesan methods. For many years the form of these Parochial Reports was a matter of merely Diocesan regulation. With the growth of the Church, and the increasing bulk of statistics to be reported, it has become absolutely necessary to have some general system of reports and a common form. These were set forth and recommended to the several Dioceses by the General Convention; and in 1878 our Diocesan Convention (Journal of 1878, page 72), substituted for our old Diocesan form of report the present form, which had been recommended by the General Convention, and which will be found in the Journal of the General Convention of 1874, page 394. Being thus the form set forth for use throughout all the Dioceses of the United States from which the Triennial Reports for the General Convention are made up, it should not be altered by any Diocese without some very grave cause.

Your Committee are, therefore, of opinion that the resolutions referred to in the Journal of 1891, are of such questionable propriety and authority that they should not be allowed to stand as the action of our Diocesan Convention.

At the same time your Committee are satisfied that the purpose of the former of these resolutions was not unconstitutional, though its form is objectionable; and in our judgment the action of the Secretary of the Convention under that resolution has been in no degree improper or unauthorized.

The form of Parochial Report set out in our Canon, after specifying certain heads of religious and charitable contributions, has a space marked *Miscellaneous*. In having his forms printed off for the use of the Clergy, the Secretary of our Convention has simply expanded this head of Miscellaneous Offerings, and under it has specified certain funds and objects for which offerings are directed or requested to be taken in our Parishes. This does not seem to your Committee any violation of the Canon, but on the contrary it appears to be a desirable and legitimate adaptation of the prescribed form to the necessities of the work of the Church in the Diocese.

The Committee, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That so far as the resolutions reported by the Committee on Canons to the Convention of 1891, found on page 51 of the printed Journal of that year, and purporting to have been passed by the Convention, had or have any force by virtue of the action then taken upon them, they are hereby rescinded and declared void.

2. *Resolved*, That this Convention approves the items of contributions added by the Secretary in the printed forms of Parochial Report sent to the Clergy of the Diocese.

On motion of the Rev. R. B. Sutton, D.D., it was

Resolved, That the subject of the Missions of the Diocese be referred to the Committee of the Whole and made the order of the day for Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D. presented the following

REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE.

The Standing Committee met for organization on June 11th, 1892, when the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D., was elected President, and the Rev. Rob't B. Sutton, D.D., Secretary.

At this meeting, also, the consent of the Committee was given to the consecration of the Rev. Charles Reuben Hale, D.D., LL.D., Assistant Bishop-elect of the Diocese of Springfield, and Herbert Brown Trussell was recommended to be received as a candidate for Holy Orders.

August 2d, 1892. The Committee gave its consent to the consecration of the Rev. George H. Kinsolving, Bishop-elect of the Diocese of Texas, and also to the election of an Assistant Bishop for the Diocese of Oregon, for the reason of "extent of Diocese."

September 8th, 1892. The application of Robert Bruce Owens, for recommendation for Deacon's Orders, with the request that six months of the required time of his candidateship be dispensed with, was laid before the Committee. It appearing that he had practically been a candidate for the Canonically required time, and that the failure to make an earlier application was through no fault of his, the dispensation asked for was recommended to be granted, and he was recommended to be ordered Deacon.

November 8th, 1892. Alvin J. Vanderbogart was recommended for ordination to the Diaconate, and William Bentley Crittenden, A. B. (colored), was recommended to be received as a candidate for Holy Orders.

November 29th, 1892. The application of Frederick A. Fetter for recommendation to be received as a candidate for Holy Orders, was presented. The required testimonials being found to be irregular, the President was requested to return the papers to the applicant for correction. At this meeting, also, formal notice of the organization of the Diocese of Southern Virginia was received, and that the Rt. Rev. Alfred Magill Randolph, D.D., LL.D., is the Bishop of that new Diocese.

December 21st, 1892. Frederick A. Fetter, Charles Fetter, and James E. King (colored), were recommended for admission as candidates for Holy Orders.

February 21st, 1893. Gaston Battle was recommended to be ordered Deacon, and the required time of his candidateship was recommended to be shortened six weeks in order that he might be ordained at the time already set for that purpose. At this meeting, also, Thomas C. Wetmore was recommended to be received as a candidate for Holy Orders.

March 21st, 1893. Eugene Henderson (colored), was recommended to be received as a candidate for Holy Orders, and the Canonical consent of the Committee was given to the consecration of the Rev. Frederick R. Graves, Bishop-elect of the Missionary Jurisdiction of Shanghai (China), and also to the consecration of the Rev. John McKim, Bishop-elect of the Missionary Jurisdiction of Yeddo (Japan).

April 26th, 1893. The application of the Rev. John W. Barker (Deacon) for recommendation to be ordained to the Priesthood, and of James Daniel Miller, a candidate for Holy Orders, to be ordered Deacon, were laid before the Committee. The required testimonials in both cases were found to be defective, and on motion, the action of the Committee in the premises was deferred until the necessary papers were presented in Canonical form.

At this meeting, also, a communication was presented from sub-Committee No. 3, of the Joint Commission of the last General Convention on the revision of the Constitution and Canons of the Church, asking for suggestions with reference to any desired changes in the Constitu-

tion and Canons in the interests of clearing them of technical obscurities and inaccuracies of expression. It was, on motion, ordered that the Secretary of said sub-Committee No. 3 be informed that this Committee, at this time, had no suggestions to make.

May 5th, 1893. James Daniel Miller was recommended to be ordered Deacon, and the Rev. John W. Barker (Deacon), was recommended for ordination to the Priesthood at any time on or after the 24th day of August next.

The Committee requested its President to make out and present to the approaching Diocesan Convention the report of its proceedings for the past year, and adjourned.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Marshall, it was

Resolved, That the Bishop be requested to furnish to the Standing Committee the names of all Postulants received by him, as soon as admitted, and that the Standing Committee, through its President, be directed to send to each such Postulant, as soon as his name is received, a copy of the Canons of Ordination, the cost of the same to be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Marshall, it was

Resolved, That the Diocesan Library, now in the custody of the Rector of Christ Church, Raleigh, be added to the Atkinson Library at Asheville, and that the cost of packing and transporting the same be paid by the Treasurer of the Diocese.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Marshall, it was

Resolved, That the Committee on Canons be requested to consider the propriety of changing the date of the Parochial Reports from the end of March to the 30th day of April, and to report to this Convention.

The report of the Archdeacon in charge of colored work in the Diocese, was presented and, on his motion, referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

Dr. Jos. B. Batchelor was excused, at his request, from service on the Committee on the Report of the Managers

of the Thompson Orphanage, and Mr. J. C. Horner was appointed in his place.

The Rev. C. T. Bland was named by the Bishop as a member of the Committee on the State of the Church in the place of the Rev. I. McK. Pittenger, who was excused from serving.

The Bishop made a statement in regard to the condition of the Ravenscroft Funds, which was, on motion, referred to a Committee of five persons to report to this Convention. The Chair appointed on this Committee, Messrs. J. C. Buxton, Silas McBee, F. S. Spruill, W. L. London and M. E. Thornton.

Mr. R. H. Battle presented the following report of the Committee appointed to sell the lands of the late Miss Mary R. Smith, and moved that the Committee be continued. The motion was agreed to.

The Committee appointed to sell the lands devised by Miss Mary R. Smith to this Diocese and to that of East Carolina, beg leave to report that we have not sold these, for the reason that, owing to the bad crops and general depression of agriculture, we have been unable to find purchasers for the same at what we regarded as fair prices.

The Rev. Dr. Marshall moved the appointment of a Committee to draft suitable resolutions in regard to the death of the Honorable R. H. Smith. The motion was agreed to, and the Chairman appointed as such Committee, the Rev. R. B. Sutton, D.D., Mr. John Wilkes and Mr. R. H. Battle.

Mr. W. H. S. Burgwyn moved the appointment of a similar Committee in regard to the late Rev. D. H. Buel, D.D. The motion was agreed to, and the Chair appointed the Rev. Dr. Jarvis Buxton, Mr. W. H. S. Burgwyn and Mr. J. C. Buxton.

The Rev. A. B. Hunter presented the Report of St. Augustine's School, which was, on his motion, referred to the Committee on the State of the Church. (See Appendix B.)

The Rev. Wm. S. Barrows presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The Committee on Unfinished Business beg leave to report, that the items of unfinished business reported to the last Convention are not yet disposed of; that is, that no report has been submitted by the Committee on the change of site of the Ravenscroft High School, nor by the Committee appointed to confer with the Trustees of the University of the South in relation to the affiliation of our Diocesan School with the University; and the resolution of Mr. T. W. Patton, recorded on page 34 of the Journal of 1891, has not yet been acted upon.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS.

The Committee on Elections respectfully recommend that Mr. S. L. Patterson be admitted as a delegate from St. James' Church, Lenoir. Also that Mr. H. J. Herrick be admitted as a delegate from the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount.

Mr. R. H. Battle presented the

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE DIOCESE.

The Trustees to hold property for the Diocese respectfully report—

First. That the following deeds for real property, not heretofore reported, have been delivered to them :

1. Deed from L. N. Wilcox and wife, for about *one acre* in Tryon City, Polk County. Dated October 23, 1890.

2. Deed from William W. Mayo, for about *one acre* in Tryon City. Dated April 8, 1891, and registered February 23, 1892.

3. Deed from John D. McCollough, Robert W. Shaw and F. L. Frost, surviving Trustees, for about *one-half acre* in Saluda, Polk County. Dated September 1, 1891, and registered May 13, 1892.

4. Deed from Board of Commissioners of Polk County, for about *one acre* (Lot No. 23), in Columbus, Polk County. Dated May 18, 1892. The county seal is wanting to this paper and it can operate only as a contract to convey.

5. Deed from C. A. Hamner and wife, for about *one-ninth of an acre* in High Point, Guilford County. Dated September 30, 1891.

6. Deed from M. A. Closs, in trust for the use and benefit of the Vestry of St. Philip's Parish, Durham, for about *one-fourth of an acre* in the town of Durham—a Rectory lot. Dated February 2, 1892.

7. Deed from George Howard and wife, for a block of about *two acres* in the town of Tarboro for the use and benefit of the Rector of Calvary Church, Tarboro. Dated February 1, 1893.

8. Deed from Arabella C. Parker, for about *one acre* for a cemetery lot for St. Luke's Parish, near Tarboro. Dated March 17, 1893.

Second. That they made the following disposition in respect to other property :

1. In compliance with a *resolution* of the Vestry of St. Philip's Church, Durham, requesting it, they, on November 18, 1892, surrendered to said Vestry an unregistered deed for a cemetery lot, to be exchanged for a more eligible lot.

2. On a like resolution of said Vestry, they executed to the Church Building Fund Commission of New York on December 23, 1892, a mortgage on the Rectory lot in Durham, to secure the notes of the Vestry of St. Philip's Parish for \$500, borrowed to aid in building a Rectory.

3. On April 10, 1893, on the recommendation of Rev. S. S. Bost, they authorized him to sell the brick of the old church, in Mocksville, Davie County, which had been torn down, and turn the proceeds over to the Treasurer of the Diocese.

In the Treasurer's report, from pages 17 to 21 inclusive, will be found a statement of the general funds in the hands of the Trustees, to-wit: the *Ravenscroft Fund*, the *Hicks' Fund* and the *Miss Mary Smith Fund*, showing the receipts and disbursements and a list of securities of each fund; and a reference to that is made as a part of this report. Where it does not otherwise appear, the disbursements were made under the orders of a majority of the Trustees.

The Treasurer's report shows (page 20) that on September 1, 1892, \$350 was paid Rev. Dr. Buel; and on December 24, 1892, \$250 was refunded, as interest, to Bishop Lyman, and \$2,262.50 was paid Dr. Buel, expressed to be "balance in accordance with agreement with Hon. J. H. Merrimon."

It will be remembered that, by resolution of the Convention of 1892, at Greensboro, Dr. Buel's claim "for moneys paid by him from his private funds in the building of Shoenberger Hall" was referred to a Committee of three to investigate and report to the Trustees of the Diocese what was due him; and they were authorized to pay what should be found due (not exceeding \$2,500 and interest) out of the income from the Ravenscroft Funds, or, if necessary, by a sale of part of the Ravenscroft property. That Committee, consisting of Rev. S. B. Rathbun and Messrs. John Wilkes and W. W. Jones, after investigation, reported

that Dr. Buel had expended of his own moneys the sum of \$3,210.21 in the building of Shoenberger Hall. Thereupon Dr. Buel demanded payment of that sum. The Trustees replied that they had authority to pay only \$2,500 and interest from May 18, 1891, the time at which the claim was first made known to the Convention. Dr. Buel declined to take less than the sum reported by the Committee, with interest, and soon thereafter brought suit in the Superior Court of Buncombe against the Diocese, Hon. James H. Merrimon, of Asheville, being his attorney. The Trustees thought the prosecution of such a suit to be deprecated; and Mr. Johnson, one of the Trustees, went to Asheville and had an interview with Judge Merrimon. On the advice of the latter, a compromise was effected and the action dismissed, on an agreement on the part of the Trustees to pay \$2,500, with interest as aforesaid, and leave the residue of the claim for settlement by this Convention. Under all the circumstances, and Dr. Buel having since died, the Trustees think it best to settle the matter, and they respectfully recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the residue reported as having been expended by Dr. Buel, with interest from May 18, 1891, to his personal representative, out of the Ravenscroft Funds, and that the whole amount, with interest, be restored to the fund out of proceeds of sales of part of the Ravenscroft property, so soon as it is thought advisable to sell. Owing to a depression in the market value of real property at Asheville, believed to be temporary, it is not deemed best to sell any part of the Ravenscroft land now.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., it was

Resolved, That the Trustees of the Diocese be authorized and directed to settle the claim of the representatives of the late Rev. Dr. Buel, and to pay such sum in settlement thereof as they may deem just and right, out of any funds in their hands which the Convention may have a right to appropriate to this purpose.

Dr. J. B. Batchelor moved the passage of a resolution offered by Mr. T. W. Patton in the Convention of 1891 in regard to the voting of women in Parochial elections. The motion was lost.

On motion of the Rev. C. C. Quin, the Convention went into the election of the Standing Committee of the Diocese. The Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for the members of the Committee elected by the last Convention, and they were declared elected.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Rathbun, an application from St. James' Church, Hendersonville, for the remission of certain arrearages due the Diocese was referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. R. H. Battle nominated the Rev. McNeely DuBose and Mr. W. W. Jones, of Asheville, as members of the Board of Fellows of Ravenscroft. The Secretary was, on motion, instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for them, and they were declared elected.

Dr. R. H. Lewis resigned his place as a member of the same Board, and, on his motion, the Convention elected in his place Mr. J. H. Law.

The Rev. Walter J. Smith nominated as members of the Education Committee, the Rev. F. J. Murdoch, D.D., the Rev. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., D.D., and Mr. Silas McBee. The Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention, and they were declared elected.

The Rev. I. McK. Pittenger presented the Report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the matter of relief to be provided for the Bishop of the Diocese as follows:

The Committee which was appointed to take into consideration the question of providing some relief to our present Diocesan from the excessive labors of his Episcopate, begs leave to report as follows:

For the last twelve years our beloved Bishop has carried alone the large and constantly increasing burden of care and labor incident to the Episcopate in an extensive Diocese, and during the first four years of these twelve his labor extended over the whole of the State of North Carolina. As was fully attested by the action of the Diocese in 1891, when provision was made for that becoming and felicitous event, the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, his labors have

been abundant and fruitful, and he has discharged the duties of his office and presided over the affairs and interests of the Diocese in a way that has betokened not only an unwonted zeal and constancy, but also a tender affection and solicitous regard for his people and the welfare of the Church.

In view of these facts, the Diocese has felt moved to take steps looking to his relief in his advancing years from the burden of his official cares.

In the absence of any definite instruction, and having no distinct proposition to consider, the Committee sought advice and information from those who are familiar with the affairs, and in a measure responsible for the welfare of the Diocese, and the following is the result of its investigation:

Relief by division of territory could not be obtained until after the General Convention of 1895. Therefore that proposition has not been considered. The only method of obtaining relief is by the election of an Assistant Bishop.

In 1873, when Bishop Atkinson was 65 years old, relief from excessive Episcopal duty was obtained by the election and consecration of the present Bishop, as his assistant.

In 1883 relief was again obtained by the division of the Diocese.

In 1873, when the assistant was secured for Bishop Atkinson, there were in the Diocese 50 Clergy, 66 Parishes and 24 Missions (90 in all), the contributions were \$56,093.81, and Episcopal Fund was \$36,309.21.

In 1883, when relief was secured by division, there were in the Diocese 76 Clergy, 86 Parishes and 38 Missions—124 in all. The contributions were \$61,817.09, and the Episcopal Fund remained still \$36,309.21.

The number of Clergy in the Diocese now is 61—11 more than there were in 1873, when an assistant was elected. The number of Parishes and Missions reported to the last Convention was 118—28 more than there were in 1873, when additional Episcopal oversight was deemed requisite.

The total amount of contributions in the State in 1873, when an additional obligation of \$2,500 was assumed for the needed assistant, was \$56,093.81. The total of contributions in the State in 1883, when a division was deemed necessary, was \$61,817.09.

In 1873, when the contributions amounted to only \$56,093.81, the Diocese or the State paid for the support of the Episcopate \$4,036.53.

In 1892 the total of contributions reported was \$50,233.38. For the year ending April 1, 1893, the amount paid by this Diocese for the support of the Episcopate was \$2,198.34. In 1873 the Episcopal Fund was \$36,309. That fund having been shared with East Carolina at the time of the division of the original Diocese in 1883, our own portion of it is now \$19,383. In 1873, with contributions amounting to \$56,093.81, and with an Episcopal Fund of \$36,309, the Diocese imposed upon itself an

additional obligation of \$2,500 for relief from Episcopal labors, which were not equal to those which the Diocese now requires.

The present Diocesan has carried alone the burden of the cares and labors of his office to an age exceeding that of his predecessor when he died, and who had then enjoyed the aid of an assistant for about eight years, and within the twelve years of his sole Episcopate, by the increase of population and the growth of the Church, the Diocese has again arrived at a condition which requires additional Episcopal care and labor. Your Committee have, therefore, agreed unanimously to recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. *Resolved*, That in the judgment of this Convention the time has come when the Bishop of the Diocese should be relieved from his excessive labors by the election of an Assistant Bishop.

2. *Resolved*, That when this Convention adjourns it shall adjourn to meet in the city of Raleigh on Tuesday, the 27th day of June, for the election of an Assistant Bishop.

3. *Resolved*, That this Convention do now take such steps as it may deem necessary towards fixing the salary of such Assistant Bishop and providing the necessary means for his support.

4. *Resolved*, That the consideration of this report be made the order of the day for half-past eight o'clock this evening.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Cheshire, Jr., the fourth resolution reported by the Committee was adopted.

Mr. Charles E. Johnson offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the expenses in attending the Convention incurred by Clergymen who have been received into the Diocese since the last meeting of the Convention, and who have been given honorary seats in this Convention, be paid by the Treasurer.

The Rev. Dr. Buxton, from the Committee appointed to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of the Rev. Dr. D. H. Buel, presented the following, which were unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

WHEREAS, During the past Conventional year the Rev. D. Hillhouse Buel, D.D., has been removed from the scene of his earthly labors to the rest and felicity of Paradise (as we humbly trust and believe), his brethren who are left behind desire to enter upon record the following brief tribute to his memory:

That they fully accord in the sentiments expressed by the Bishop in his Convention Address concerning his life and character. He was a man supremely devoted to one thing, as the end and purpose of life—and that was to fulfil the work of the ministry which he had received of the Lord Jesus in the Church of God. He spared no pains, no labor, no sacrifice, no cost of health to achieve that end; with him the ministry was the highest honor that could be conferred upon a human being, and especially he delighted in the missionary phase of its work. The field of Missions in Western North Carolina bear witness to the extent and thoroughness of his labors.

As the Head of the Training School for the Ministry for more than twenty years, Dr. Buel proved himself to be of unsurpassed fidelity and ability. He was a thorough classical scholar, and well versed in the Hebrew, and a sound Theologian after the pattern of the old English Divines.

The last days of this servant of God were clouded with much bodily weakness and suffering, to which was added, at the same time, the sore affliction of bereavement of his beloved wife, which he bore patiently and with resignation to the will of God. His Lord was faithful to his promises, and sustained him and bore him through the deep waters to the unclouded land of rest and felicity.

THURSDAY, May 18, 4 P. M.

The Convention re-assembled, the President in the chair.

The hour having arrived for the consideration of the order of the day, the Convention, on motion, went into Committee of the Whole, to consider the subject of Diocesan Missions. The Committee rose and presented through the Chairman, Mr. W. L. London, certain resolutions in regard to the quorum necessary for the transaction of the

business of the Executive Missionary Committee, and to the appointment of an Archdeacon to be placed in special charge of the Diocesan Mission work. The resolutions were, on motion, referred to the Committee on Canons.

The Rev. A. H. Stubbs presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes respectfully report, that the application of the Parish of All Saints, Concord, for admission into union with the Convention, is in proper form, and offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Parish of All Saints, Concord, be admitted into union with the Convention of the Diocese.

The resolution was adopted.

The Secretary moved the reference to the Committee on Canons of a resolution to omit the Form of the Parochial Report from the Canon, and to make it conform more perfectly to the requirements of the Triennial Report called for by the General Convention. The motion was agreed to.

At 5 o'clock, on motion of Mr. John Wilkes, the Convention took a recess until 8:30, in order to attend a reception given by the Bishop and Mrs. Lyman at the Episcopal residence.

THURSDAY, May 18, 8:30 P. M.

The Convention re-assembled, the President in the chair.

The order of the day being called for, Mr. H. G. Connor offered a resolution which was adopted, providing for a separate vote on the several resolutions proposed by the Committee on Episcopal Relief.

The 1st resolution was adopted by a vote by orders.

The 2d resolution was adopted.

The 3d resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Mr. Pittenger offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That a Committee of ten be appointed by the Chair to consider the ways and means of increasing the Permanent Episcopal Fund and raising the salary of the Assistant Bishop; and that the said Committee be instructed to report to the adjourned meeting of this Convention.

A motion to lay on the table was lost, and the resolution was passed.

On motion of Mr. F. S. Spruill, it was

Resolved, That the Convention be canvassed immediately for subscriptions to the Permanent Episcopal Fund.

A motion to adjourn was lost.

The subscriptions were proceeded with and, on motion, the Convention then adjourned.

THIRD DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH, RALEIGH,
FRIDAY, May 19, 1893.

The Convention met at 9:30 o'clock, pursuant to order.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Jarvis Buxton, D.D., and the Rev. Messrs. C. C. Quin and A. H. Stubbs.

The President took the chair.

The calling of the roll was, on motion, dispensed with, and the minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

Mr. R. H. Battle, from the Committee appointed for the purpose, presented the following preamble and resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Mr. R. H. Smith, which were unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT TO THE MEMORY OF THE LATE RICHARD H. SMITH.

The Committee to whom it was referred to report suitable resolutions in relation to the death of Richard H. Smith, Esq., long an honored layman of this Diocese, respectfully submit:

Richard Henry Smith, of Scotland Neck, who died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. F. H. Busbee, of this city, on the 2d day of March, 1893, in the 81st year of his age, was one of the most useful laymen with whom our Church in this State was ever blessed. A communicant and a vestryman for sixty years, and for nearly forty Senior Warden of Trinity Parish, Scotland Neck, where he was born; a member of the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina continuously for fifty-nine years, and for a quarter of a century a Deputy to the General Convention; his faithfulness in all these relations was conspicuous. Few of her laymen have given to our Mother the Church wiser or more efficient service.

As a citizen Mr. Smith was not less useful, and was scarcely less appreciated by the people of his native State. Educated at our State University and for the Bar, but born to affluence, he preferred the life of a planter, and as such his success was marked and his example to others beneficial. Several times a member of the General Assembly, he was forward in all that tends to advance the farming interests of the State, and to him is due the establishment of the N. C. Agricultural Society, of which he was the second President. His large and growing fortune was swept away by the results of the war and the misfortunes of his friends, but with this loss, his honor and self-respect and the confidence and admiration of those who knew him suffered no diminution. Some men, indeed, who witnessed his cheerful resignation under the hand of adversity were drawn closer to him. Leaning on his Heavenly Father for support, he kept on the even tenor of his journey through life, and his patience and other Christian virtues illuminated his pathway. His wise counsel was sought by the State as well as by the Church to the end, and at the age of more than fourscore years he still faithfully and efficiently served as a Director of one of our most important public institutions.

To him life was duty, and surely such a life should be an inspiration to us who are left to mourn his absence from us in the flesh, and we may well pray that our last end shall be like his: therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, his brethren, are profoundly sensible that in the removal of Richard H. Smith to another and better life, the State has seldom lost a better citizen, this Convention a wiser counsellor, or our Holy Mother a more humble, useful or devoted son.

Resolved, That a page of the Journal be devoted to this preamble and resolution.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The Education Committee respectfully report that during the twelve months ending with the Treasurer's report, the state of the funds under our control permitted only one appropriation of \$25. More funds having come into the hands of the Treasurer lately, as shown by his report, they have to-day been appropriated.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Finance Committee recommend the following changes and additions to the schedule of assessments: St. Stephen's, Oxford, changed from \$90 to \$75; Church of the Epiphany, Leaksville, from \$25 to \$15; Church of the Redemption, Lexington, from \$22 to \$4; St. Andrew's, Greensboro, \$10; High Point Mission, \$5; Milton Mission, \$4.

The Committee also offers the following resolution:

Resolved, That the arrears of the following Parishes and Missions be remitted: Cuningham's Mission, \$38; St. Mark's, Halifax, \$47.10; St. James', Hendersonville, \$32.50; All Saints', Concord, \$27.50, and \$15 of the arrears of St. Stephen's, Oxford.

The Rev. I. McK. Pittenger offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Resolved, That the matter of assessments be referred to the Committee on Finance, to report to the adjourned meeting of this Convention, and that the Rectors and Vestries of Parishes be requested and urged to report to said Committee at their earliest convenience what increase, if any, can be made in the present assessment.

On motion of Mr. R. H. Battle, the resolutions with regard to Episcopal Relief were reconsidered in order to substitute the title *Assistant Bishop* for *Bishop Coadjutor*.

The Rev. Dr. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons beg leave respectfully to report :

There have been referred to the Committee two resolutions touching the time and form of making the Parochial Report as provided for under Canon VI of Chapter III. The first resolution introduced into the Convention by the Rev. Dr. Marshall proposes to make the date to which these reports shall annually be brought up April 30, instead of March 31, as it now stands. The second resolution is that introduced by our Secretary, and suggests the necessity of leaving out of our Canon altogether the form of Parochial Report, so as to allow of a more ready adaptation of the same from time to time to the forms recommended by the General Convention.

Your Committee are disposed to recommend both these proposed changes. Much inconvenience has been felt by many of our Clergy at having to make up their annual reports to March 31, and it is believed by the Committee that the proposed change will be generally acceptable.

It seems also well to strike out the form of Parochial Report from our Canons. It is in its nature a thing variable and has no proper place in the Canon Law of the Diocese, which should concern itself with regulations of a more permanent and unvarying character.

Resolutions embodying these proposed changes are appended to this report.

The Convention has also referred to the Committee on Canons a resolution passed in the Committee of the Whole, recommending—1st. That the quorum necessary to transact the business of the Executive Missionary Committee be reduced from five to three, and that an Archdeacon be elected by the Convention, whose duty it shall be, in the absence of the Bishop, to preside at all meetings of the Executive Missionary Committee, and to urge upon the Rectors of the several Parishes, in person or otherwise, some system of raising increased funds for the missionary work, and that he be paid a salary of \$200 and his necessary expenses out of the Missionary Funds of the Diocese.

Your Committee are of opinion that some change may well be made in the number necessary to constitute a quorum of the Executive Missionary Committee, but they hesitate to reduce the number so low. As the Bishop and, at least, two other members of the Committee may be supposed to be in or near Raleigh, four would not seem to be an unreasonable number to constitute the smallest attendance necessary to trans-

act the important business of this Committee. A resolution is appended to this report embodying such an amendment to the Canon (Chapter I, Canon VIII, Section 1).

Your Committee also heartily approve the purpose intended to be effected by the other resolution from the Committee of the Whole. They think it would be a very great practical gain to have some one whose duty it should be to look after the business of the Committee and to devise and put into operation some general scheme of missionary contributions, and to urge upon Rectors and Parishes the necessity of co-operating more heartily in the regular Canonical system of offerings already in force.

Your Committee, however, see no necessity for any change in the Canons in order to carry out the idea contained in the resolution under consideration, and they feel very strongly the impropriety of creating an officer of this Convention with the title of Archdeacon, to whom no powers or functions are granted at all appropriate to the commonly understood significance of that title. They believe that the result desired by the Committee of the Whole may be accomplished in a somewhat different manner. The duties expressed in the resolution in question would, in fact, make him who performs them more the agent and servant of the Executive Missionary Committee than an Archdeacon, who is pre-eminently the personal representative and agent of the Bishop in the administrative part of his office. Your Committee think that a resolution of this Convention authorizing and directing the Executive Missionary Committee to employ a Secretary, to be called the Executive Missionary Secretary, whose remuneration and whose duties shall be such as are expressed in the resolution from the Committee of the Whole, would meet the necessity in a more ready and practicable way, and would also be more readily modified or adapted to changing conditions hereafter as occasion may require. They have endeavored to embody this idea in a resolution appended hereto.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

1. *Resolved*, That chapter III, Canon VI, Section 3, be amended as follows: Strike out from the beginning of said section down to and including the words "each year" and substitute the following:

"Sec. 3. *Parochial Reports*.—It shall be the duty of every Clergyman at the close of the month of April each year to report to the Bishop of the Diocese by such form as shall be from time to time set forth by authority of the Diocesan Convention," etc., as at present; and by striking out the form of reports in said section.

2. *Resolved*, That Chapter I, Canon VIII, Section 1, be amended by striking out the two consecutive words, "any five," near the end of the first sentence, and substituting therefor the words "any four."

3. *Resolved*, That the Executive Missionary Committee be authorized and directed to employ an Agent and Secretary to be designated as the

Executive Secretary of Diocesan Missions, and to pay him out of the Missionary Funds of the Diocese such annual compensation as they may deem proper. It shall be the duty of such Secretary, at least once each quarter, to call a meeting of the Committee at such time and place as may be designated by the Chairman, and to attend the same, and to keep the records thereof; also to acquaint himself as far as possible with the condition and needs of the missionary field, and to urge upon the Rectors of the several Parishes and the people thereof, personally or otherwise, a more zealous and systematic contribution to the Missionary Funds of the Diocese.

The resolutions appended to the report were adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Sutton presented the following report of the Special Committee on the Annual Report of the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage:

The Committee to whom was referred the report of the Managers of the Thompson Orphanage, beg leave to report that they have examined the report referred to them and find the management, so far as they could judge, all that could be desired. The funds appear to have been judiciously and economically expended.

We would recommend to the Church a liberal response to the call of the Superintendent for means to meet the urgent wants of the Institution: (1) a dormitory for the boys; (2) an infirmary for the proper care of the sick; (3) an Industrial Hall for the boys, in which they may learn useful trades; and (4) a play-room for the smaller children.

We heartily commend this noble charity to the prayers and alms of the people.

The Bishop read the concluding portion of his Annual Address.

On motion of the Rev. W. J. Smith, a committee was appointed to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Rev. N. Collin Hughes, D.D. The Bishop appointed on this Committee the Rev. Dr. R. B. Sutton, the Rev. W. J. Smith and Dr. J. B. Batchelor.

The Rev. Mr. Bush presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS.

The Committee on Elections respectfully recommend that Mr. Erwin Holt be admitted as a delegate from St. Athanasius' Church, Burlington.

The Committee desire to call the attention of the Convention to the negligence of certain persons responsible as to the signing and forwarding of the certificates of delegates from Parishes.

On motion, the recommendation of the Committee was adopted.

The Rev. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., D.D., presented the following report which was, on his motion, referred to the Committee on the State of the Church :

The Trustees of the University of the South are glad to be able to report that many encouraging facts relating to this great educational institution of our Southern Church may be observed in looking back over the past year. The noble and self-sacrificing work of the Faculty and officers of the University of the South is making its impression upon the Church throughout the country. It was a great gratification to all Southern churchmen attending the General Convention of 1892 to observe how, in spite of its empty coffers and its brief career, Sewanee took

the lead as an institution of Christian culture and learning over the oldest and richest of our Church colleges, North, East and West. Without a word of remonstrance, the friends and alumni of Trinity, Racine, Hobart and all others yielded the first place of honor and of hope to Sewanee, and in the time set apart by the General Convention for the consideration of Christian education, a Bishop, a Priest and a layman of Sewanee were the men put forward to speak on this great theme.

This generous appreciation of our University has borne more substantial but not more valued fruits in gifts and legacies, which have become available during the last year to a sum of about \$55,000.

Your representatives on the Board of Trustees cannot but urge upon this Convention the solemn obligation lying upon us to co-operate more faithfully and honestly in this great work. We trust that our future may be different from the past. The University of the South demands our support by its own merits and by our deliberate undertakings. It claims our sons to be trained in the nurture of the Church and in the best learning of the ages. It demands our gifts for the glory of God in spreading its light and extending its influence.

Especially would we ask the Clergy of the Diocese to remember the importance of sustaining our Theological Department by taking the offering on the third Sunday in Advent.

The Convention proceeded to the election of the Lay members of the Executive Missionary Committee, as follows: Messrs. W. L. London, H. G. Connor, C. M. Busbee, R. H. Battle and John Wilkes.

The Rev. W. J. Smith offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention are hereby extended to the Young Men's Christian Association of this city for the kind offer of the use of their rooms during our session.

On motion of Mr. Wm. L. Wall, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention are hereby tendered to the Rectors and congregations of Christ Church, the Church of the Good Shepherd and St. Augustine's Church, and to the citizens of Raleigh generally, for their generous hospitality in the entertainment of this body and of the visitors in attendance on our sessions.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Marshall, the Rector of Christ Church was authorized to turn over to the custody of Shoenberger Hall, the Episcopal robes of the late Bishop Ravenscroft.

The Rev. John A. Deal presented the

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your Committee find that of the one hundred and twenty-five Parishes and Mission Stations, there are reports from only ninety-seven. These reports, with the Bishop's address, we have examined as thoroughly as time would allow, and find that they indicate a large work done throughout the Diocese, with large opportunity for extending our borders and entering upon several new fields now opening to us.

In the Piedmont and Eastern sections of the Diocese the seed sown in the past have sprung up and are bearing rich fruit; the same is also true of Asheville and immediate vicinity, but a large portion of the mountain section has yet to become acquainted with Bishop, Priest, Deacon or Layman of the Church. The condition of the missionary work of the Diocese presents one of the most serious questions that have been brought to our attention, and we urge its most earnest and prayerful consideration upon the Church.

While the condition of the country in the Diocese is perhaps more favorably inclined to the Church than ever before since the Revolution, we are not only doing practically no aggressive work, but are in many important sections failing to hold what was gained in former years. We can only account for this upon the ground: *First*, that the accumulative labors of a large and growing Diocese have become so enormous that our beloved Diocesan, even with his remarkable energy and vigor, has become utterly unable to give this most important field that personal care and supervision that it requires. *Second*. Judging from the reports of last year, we believe that there are five thousand or more communicants, while the offerings for Diocesan missionary purposes give a total of less than two thousand dollars; it is self-evident that very little aggressive work can be done in our large missionary field with the resources at our command. We are convinced that the serious trouble here is want of systematic effort. The work that comes to us in our place in the Church of God is great and important, and entails upon Clergy and Laity alike awful responsibilities. We note with peculiar pleasure and satisfaction the growth and development of the charitable institutions within the Diocese. The Thompson Orphanage, St. Peter's Home and Hospital, St. John's Hospital and the Good Samaritan Hospital are faithfully and efficiently performing their noble works of love and mercy, and show that the members of the Church are becoming more and more alive to the great truth that it is better to give than to receive, and we cannot too warmly commend these and similar institutions to the sympathy and support of our people.

In this connection it is well to mention St. Agnes' Female School at Franklin. It is the only female school in the Diocese west of Asheville. During the past year it has done an excellent work, and has great possibilities as the handmaid of the Church in moulding and training the lives of the women of the future in that section, Shoenberger Hall, as the school of the Prophets, has in training two or three young men who are studying for the Holy Ministry. It is doing effective work, and with larger means and more men it might be made the ideal training school of the Diocese.

The school belonging to the Convocation of Charlotte, and located at Salisbury, is an important element in the work done by this Convocation. Institutions of this nature are no mean factors in uplifting men to the true standard of manhood whose home is the Church. This school property, worth \$7,000, is encumbered with a debt of \$3,000. It is the aim of the Convocation through this school to furnish good education at reasonable rates to those unable to patronize the more costly places of learning, and it seems that other portions of the Diocese might, with advantage, co-operate and avail themselves of the benefits here offered.

The Church Schools, St. Mary's at Raleigh, for girls, and Ravenscroft at Asheville for boys, have maintained their well deserved popularity, and are so well known as to require no further notice on the part of this Committee.

We note with pleasure the encouraging fact that our people are manifesting a growing interest in organized methods of Christian and devotional work. Amongst these in increasing numbers are the Daughters of the King, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, Orphanage and other Guilds, and notably the Woman's Auxiliary. This organization of noble women is doing a work whose value is known only to the poor missionary at his lone outpost, as his life by this sympathy and helpfulness is made stronger to do the work of our blessed Lord in whose name these offerings have been given.

The Colored Work also deserves especial mention. It is with the deepest gratitude that we note the increasing results from the efforts made among our colored brethren. At the head of all these efforts stands St. Augustine's, the *Alma Mater* of the many who have gone out from her walls equipped for the battle of life, scattered here and there throughout the Diocese from East to West. The school, the chapel, and the workshop are training them to a higher life and developing and strengthening in these people the character necessary as members of the State and of the Kingdom of God.

We also commend most heartily the efforts set forth in the Report of the Diocesan Trustees of the University of the South.

While your Committee is convinced that the past year has not been unfruitful, in the absence of reports from a large number of Parishes and Mission Stations it seems invidious that any tabulated statement should be attempted.

D., Principal of Trinity School, Chocowinity, in the Diocese of East Carolina, wish to place upon record their high estimate of him as a man of deep learning, pure and guileless life, and earnest devotion to the cause of his Master. Leaving it to his own Diocese to pay a fuller tribute to his memory, we desire simply to extend to the members of his family and of his Diocese our heartfelt sympathy in their severe loss.

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the family of our deceased Brother, and also to the Secretary of the Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina.

The minutes were read and approved and the Bishop briefly addressed the Convention. The *Gloria in Excelsis* was sung, prayers were offered and the Benediction was given by the Bishop, and the Convention adjourned.

FOURTH DAY.

CHRIST CHURCH, RALEIGH,

TUESDAY, June 27, 9:30 A. M.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Junius M. Horner and the Rev. J. W. Barker.

The Bishop preached from the text, Ephesians IV, 11:12, "And He gave some apostles; and some prophets; and some evangelists; and some pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ."

The Rev. Bennett Smedes, D.D., presented Mr. James D. Miller for admission to Deacon's Orders.

The Rev. Dr. Buxton said the Litany. The Bishop proceeded with the Office, the Rev. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., D.D., reading the Epistle. Mr. Miller was then Ordered Deacon and read the Gospel. The offerings were given to the Permanent Episcopal Fund. After the celebration of the Holy Communion, in which the Bishop was assisted by the Rev. Drs. Buxton, Marshall and Cheshire, the Clergy retired to the Chapel.

The Convention re-assembled, the Bishop in the chair.

The Secretary called the roll and reported as present 45 of the Clergy and 45 Lay Delegates, representing 29 Parishes.

On motion of the Rev. F. S. Stickney, papers relating to the admission of the Parish of St. Andrews', South Greensboro, into union with the Convention, were referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

On motion of the Rev. Dr. Murdoch, the case of the Delegates from St. Mary's Church, Rowan County, whose certificates of election had not been received by the Secretary, was referred to the Committee on Elections.

An application from the organized Mission at Grace, Buncombe County, to be received into union with the Convention, was, on motion, referred to the Committee on New Parishes.

On motion of Mr. H. A. London, it was

Resolved, That the Committee on Canons be requested to consider the expediency of amending Article XII, Section I, of the Constitution by striking out all after the word *orders*, at the end of the second line, and inserting the words, *and a concurrent vote of a majority of both orders present*, (the Lay Delegates voting by Parishes,) *shall be necessary to an election*.

Mr. H. C. Jones called for the special order, being the report of the Committee of ten on the increase of the Episcopal Fund. Mr. H. G. Connor read the report, as follows:

The Committee, consisting of ten Laymen, appointed by this Convention at its session on the 17th day of May last for the purpose of considering ways and means of increasing the Permanent Episcopal Fund of the Diocese, respectfully report:

That the members of the Committee met in the City of Raleigh on the 19th day of May, 1893, and organized by the election of a Chairman and Secretary. That for the purpose of soliciting contributions to the Permanent Episcopal Fund, it was determined to employ as special agents Rev. Messrs. F. S. Stickney and T. B. Rathbun, with authority to visit the several Parishes and solicit contributions, either in notes or cash. It was resolved to pay each of them for their services one hundred dollars a month and expenses.

The sum of four thousand dollars was subscribed to the Permanent Fund during the session of the Convention; and this, with the result of the labors of Mr. Stickney and Mr. Rathbun, amounts to about the sum of ten thousand dollars in cash, and notes payable in installments of four and five years, with interest at 6 per cent. have been contributed.

This work has been prosecuted under very unfavorable circumstances. When the shortness of the time, the season of the year, the very great stringency of money and the feeling of uncertainty as to the prospects for the future, coupled with the fact that no notice was given to the Diocese of the purpose to elect an Assistant Bishop, are taken into consideration, the Committee feel that while the amount contributed is not so large as was hoped for, there is no cause for discouragement in the prosecution of the work. It has been impossible to present the subject to many Parishes and to many Laymen living in the country within the time thus far given. The amount of cash and notes, after deducting the expense incurred, has been turned over to the Treasurer of the Diocese.

Your Committee beg leave to call the attention of the Convention to the fact that the Treasurer, as appears by his report made to the Convention, has on hand of "The Miss Mary Smith Fund" the sum of \$1,400 invested in interest-bearing securities, and the further sum of \$1,237.35 in hand not invested. There are some lands belonging to the Diocese, of this fund, under the control and management of Hon. John Manning and Hon. K. P. Battle.

Pursuant to the terms of the will of Miss Mary Smith, this fund is subject to the control of the Convention.

The Committee respectfully suggest that the Treasurer be authorized to apply the income accruing from this fund to the "Current Episcopal and Contingent Fund," retaining always its distinctive name of "The Miss Mary Smith Fund." In this way it will be made available to meet the current expenses of the Diocese, and subject to the control of the Convention in strict conformity with the provisions of the will of Miss Mary Smith.

Your Committee further suggest that the work of increasing the "Permanent Episcopal Fund" be continued under the direction of a Committee appointed by the Convention.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

TUESDAY, June 27, 4 P. M.

The Convention re-assembled, the Bishop in the chair.

The Rev. W. J. Smith presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes recommend that St. Andrew's Parish, South Greensboro, be admitted into union with the Convention, the Canon applicable in such cases having been duly complied with. They also recommend that the organized Mission at Grace, Buncombe County, be admitted into union with the Convention.

The recommendations contained in the report were, on motion, adopted.

Mr. R. H. Battle offered the following preamble and resolutions:

WHEREAS, This Convention in May last determined by a unanimous vote that the exigencies of the Diocese demand the election of an Assistant Bishop; and, whereas, the interest on the sums collected and pledged, as the result of measures taken to increase the Permanent Episcopal Fund, and the increased assessments of the Parishes thus far reported, are inadequate to pay the salary of an Assistant Bishop; therefore,

1. *Resolved*, That the Committee heretofore appointed to provide for the increase of the Permanent Episcopal Fund be continued, with instructions to further prosecute, in such manner as to it may seem best, the duty assigned to it.

2. That the Treasurer be authorized to apply the income from the Mary Ruffin Smith Fund to the Episcopal and Contingent Fund of the Diocese.

3. That the Convention proceed to the election of an Assistant Bishop of the Diocese, and pledge to him a salary of \$2,500, payable quarterly from the day of his consecration.

4. That for the prompt payment of said salary, the Trustees of the Diocese are instructed to supplement the income from the Permanent Episcopal Fund and the Contingent Fund with such moneys as they shall find or can make available for that purpose.

The Bishop presented his Canonical consent to the election of an Assistant Bishop, which, on motion of the Rev. Dr. Murdoch, was ordered to be filed with the Standing Committee of the Diocese.

On motion of Mr. Wm. L. London, it was resolved that the resolutions of Mr. R. H. Battle be acted upon *seriatim*.

Resolution 1 was carried.

Resolution 2 was carried by a vote by orders; the Clergy voting individually, and the Secretary, by order of the Convention, casting the ballot of the Laity.

Resolution 3 was carried.

Resolution 4 was carried.

The Rev. Mr. Bush presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS.

The Committee on Elections offer the following resolutions:

Resolved, That owing to irregularity in the time of his election, Mr. Hugh Morson, of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Raleigh, be not admitted as a delegate to the Convention.

Resolved, That Mr. J. H. McKenzie be admitted as a delegate from St. Mary's Parish, Rowan County.

The resolutions were agreed to.

The first resolution was, on motion, reconsidered, and Mr. Morson was admitted as a delegate to the Convention.

On motion of Mr. J. C. Buxton, the doors of the Convention were closed and, on motion, the Clergy proceeded to the nomination of an Assistant Bishop.

The Rev. Dr. Buxton nominated the Rev. Nathaniel Harding.

The Rev. Dr. Murdoch nominated the Rev. Jos. B. Cheshire, Jr., D.D.

The Rev. Mr. Bynum nominated the Rev. T. M. N. George.

The Rev. Dr. Cheshire, Jr., nominated the Rev. F. J. Murdoch, D.D.

The Rev. Dr. Sutton nominated the Rev. M. M. Marshall, D.D.

The Rev. Mr. Wingate nominated the Rev. R. S. Barrett.

The balloting proceeded with the following results; 29 votes being necessary for election by the Clergy:

The Convention met at 9:30 o'clock pursuant to order.

Morning Prayer was said by the Rev. Dr. M. M. Marshall and the Rev. F. W. Hilliard.

The Bishop took the chair and called the Convention to order.

The calling of the roll was, on motion, dispensed with. The minutes were read and approved.

On motion, the Clergy proceeded to ballot, with the following results:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Finance Committee beg leave to report that the Convention referred to them the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the matter of assessments be referred to the Committee on Finance to report to the adjourned meeting in June, and that the Rectors and Vestries of the various Parishes and congregations be requested and urged to report to said Committee at their earliest convenience what *increase*, if any, can be made in the present assessment."

Under the direction of the Committee their chairman issued a circular letter to the various Parishes and Mission Stations showing the necessity of an increase of the assessments, and urging upon them promptness in informing the Committee what increase, if any, could be made upon the present assessment.

The circulars have been responded to by a small proportion of the Parishes and Missions. Thus far the result has been a voluntary increase of about \$550.

The Committee would respectfully offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee be requested to continue their efforts for the voluntary increase of the assessments, and that they use their discretion as to the best time to resume their work of solicitation.

The Rev. A. H. Stubbs presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NEW PARISHES.

The Committee on New Parishes having examined the papers relating to the Parish of St. Thomas, Reidsville, and found them correct, beg leave to offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Parish of St. Thomas, Reidsville, be admitted into union with the Convention.

The resolution was adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Buxton resigned his position as Trustee of the General Theological Seminary, and upon motion of the Rev. McNeely DuBose, the ballot was dispensed with and the Rev. W. S. Barrows was elected by acclamation Trustee of the General Theological Seminary.

On motion of the Rev. Mr. Bynum, the Treasurer was directed to pay to the Sexton of Christ Church \$10 for his services during the sessions of this Convention.

The motion was agreed to, and the conference took place as ordered.

On returning to the church the Clergy proceeded to the 39th ballot, which resulted as follows:

The Rev. Dr. Cheshire 29; the Rev. Mr. Lloyd 7; Scattering 5.

Whereupon the Bishop announced that the Clergy had nominated to the Laity as Assistant Bishop of the Diocese, the Rev. Joseph Blount Cheshire, Jr., D.D., Rector of St. Peter's Church, Charlotte.

Messrs. H. J. Herrick and F. T. Ward were appointed Tellers of the Lay vote and announced the following result of the ballot: Parishes represented in the Convention 34; Parishes voting 31. Concurring 24. Non-concurring 7.

The Bishop thereupon declared the election of the Rev. Dr. Cheshire, Jr., and, in response to a resolution of the Convention, appointed the Rev. Wm. S. Pettigrew, the Rev. A. H. Stubbs, Mr. R. H. Lewis, M. D., and Mr. H. C. Jones a Committee to inform Dr. Cheshire of his election.

The credentials of the Assistant Bishop-elect were presented by the Secretary and signed by a constitutional majority of the Clergy and Lay delegates.

An application from the Church of the Ascension, Hickory, for the remission of arrears due to the Contingent Fund was, on motion, referred to the Committee on Finance.

The Bishop appointed the Rev. Frederick Towers and Mr. John Manning members for this Diocese of the American Church Building Fund Commission.

The Rev. A. B. Hunter nominated as Delegates to the Missionary Council, the Rev. I. McK. Pittenger and Mr. Silas McBee, and moved that the Secretary be instructed to cast for them the ballot of the Convention. The motion was agreed to, and the gentlemen named were declared elected.

On motion of Mr. John Wilkes, it was

Resolved, That the renewed thanks of this Convention are hereby tendered to the Rectors and congregations of Christ Church, the Church of the Good Shepherd, St. Augustine's Church and to the citizens of Raleigh generally, for their generous hospitality in the entertainment of this body and of visitors in attendance on our sessions.

Mr. R. H. Battle presented the following

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons, to whom was referred a resolution providing for an amendment of Article XII, Section I, of the Constitution, recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That Article XII, Section I, of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows: When a Bishop or Assistant Bishop is to be elected, the Convention shall vote by ballot and by orders, and a concurrence of a majority of all the Clergy entitled to vote in the Convention, and of the delegates from at least twenty Parishes in union with the Convention (the said delegates voting by Parishes), shall be necessary to an election.

Resolved, That after the usual devotions the Convention adjourn *sine die*.

The Bishop addressed the Convention.

The *Gloria in Excelsis* was sung, prayers were offered and the Benediction given by the Bishop, and the Convention was declared adjourned.

APPENDIX A.

ADDRESS OF THE BISHOP.

Dear Brethren of the Clergy and Laity:

It affords me much pleasure to welcome you, once more, to the cheering fellowship of these annual councils. And it is especially grateful, when, as at this time, we have so much to stimulate and encourage us in the growing progress and prosperity of our work. May this pleasant re-union serve to quicken our zeal, and deepen our devotion, and fill us with longing desires to be more and more helpful in efforts for the advancement of the Kingdom of God.

Since we last met in Convention, the Church in our country has been called to mourn two of her prominent Bishops, viz.: the Bishop of Massachusetts, and the Bishop of California. The first was one whose career in the Episcopate had been a very brief one. He was held in high esteem for his many and varied gifts, and his sudden death produced a great shock, not only throughout our own land, but in many other parts of the world.

Quite recently, the venerable Bishop of California, next in seniority to our Presiding Bishop, has been taken from us. He was a man of high culture and scholarship, and to him the whole Church owes a debt of gratitude for the able works which proceeded from his pen, and which have done much to spread more widely a just apprehension of those great fundamental principles of Christianity as set forth by our Lord and His Apostles, which he sought to impress upon the minds of all seekers after the truth. For many years very feeble health, coupled with partial loss of sight, has almost incapacitated him for the discharge

of official duties. His kind and genial spirit, his refined and courtly manners, his fund of general information, made him always a companion of more than ordinary attractiveness. During my residence in California, immediately before my removal to this Diocese, our relations were of the most cordial character, and I felt for him a strong and deep affection.

Within the last year, two of our own Clergy have been taken from us, viz.: the Rev. Freeman W. Dunn and the Rev. Dr. D. Hillhouse Buel. Mr. Dunn had been only a short time ministering among us. He took the place of Rev. Mr. McDuffey, who had been summoned to some temporary work among the colored people of South Carolina. Mr. Dunn had scarcely entered upon his duties in charge of the colored work in Asheville, before he was stricken by a serious illness, which terminated fatally, only a few hours after my visitation to the Parish, of which he had charge.

Rev. Dr. Buel had been seriously attacked and disabled for more than a year previous to his removal from the scene of his long continued labors. For about twenty years he had been actively engaged in missionary work in the western part of the Diocese, while engaged also in instructing young men for the ministry, as Principal of the "Ravenscroft Mission and Training School," at Asheville. He led a very self-sacrificing and laborious life, never sparing himself, but making almost every week a long and fatiguing journey to his several Missions, and carefully keeping his appointments, even in the most severe and inclement weather. Sincerely devoted to his work, and thoroughly conscientious in the discharge of his duties, he ever set an example worthy of all imitation. He departed this life in the city of Baltimore.

My first official act after reading my Address to the last

Convention, was during its sittings, in St. Barnabas' Church, Greensboro.

On Friday, May 20th, I admitted to the Diaconate Mr. Sidney Stewart Bost, upon presentation by the Rev. F. J. Murdoch, D.D., who also preached the sermon. The Holy Communion was administered by me, and in the services I was assisted by Rev. Drs. Buxton, Smedes and Marshall, and Rev. C. C. Quin.

On the evening of the same day, in the hall then occupied by St. Andrew's Mission, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Messrs. Wingate and Stickney, and a sermon by Rev. Dr. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., I confirmed nine persons and addressed them. Rev. F. S. Stickney was then, and is still, in charge of this prosperous Mission. I am glad to report that, during the year, a very commodious and attractive Church edifice has been erected, and is now occupied by this growing congregation.

Sunday, May 22d, in the Church of the Epiphany, Leaks-ville, after Morning Prayer by Rev. N. B. Harris, I preached, confirmed three persons, and addressed them.

At night in St. Thomas' Church, Reidsville, assisted in the service by Rev. N. B. Harris, I preached, confirmed two persons and addressed them.

Monday, May 23d, baptized in private two children. Same day returned to Raleigh.

Wednesday, May 25th, at the Rectory of Christ Church, Raleigh, presided at a meeting of the Trustees of St. Augustine School.

Tuesday, May 31st, left home on a visit to the North. While in New York, on Tuesday, June 14th, attended a meeting of the Board of Managers of the Missionary work.

The same evening, I left New York on my return to Raleigh.

On Saturday, June 18th, I went to Pittsboro, and on the next day, in St. Bartholomew's Church, assisted in the ser-

vices by Rev. Mr. Bland, I preached, confirmed two persons and addressed them.

At 8 P. M., in St. James' Church, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Mr. Bush, I preached, confirmed four persons and addressed them.

Monday, June 20th, returned to Raleigh.

Same day, accepted from the Ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese of South Carolina Letters Dimissory in behalf of the Rev. Stewart McQueen, who had entered upon his duties as Rector of St. Philip's Church, Durham.

Tuesday, June 21, left for Morehead City.

The next day, Wednesday, June 22d, took part, by request, in the opening exercises of the Teachers' Assembly and conducted a brief religious service. Later, at the same meeting, made an address, urging the importance of regular moral and religious instruction in all our public schools.

Friday, June 24th, attended the morning session of the Teachers' Assembly. The temperance question was the subject under discussion. I made an address, deprecating the extreme views advocated by so many as calculated to bring reproach upon the example and teachings of our blessed Lord, and the general tenor of God's Holy Word.

Saturday, June 25th, at the evening session of the Teachers' Assembly, I delivered an address upon Jerusalem and the Holy Land.

Sunday, June 26th, by special request, I held a religious service in the Teachers' Assembly Hall. After Morning Prayer by the Rev. A. B. Hunter, I read the Ante Communion Service, preached, and closed the service with Collects and the Benediction.

Monday, June 27th, left on a visit to the North, and went, first, to be present at the Commencement exercises of Hamilton College, in Clinton, near Utica, New York, where I had graduated in 1837. I reached there at 5 P. M.

on Tuesday, and was warmly welcomed by the Rector of the Parish, who had very cordially invited me to be his guest.

The next day there was a large meeting of the Alumni of the College, but I did not recognize a single person among those who were present. It was a singular fact that I had not visited my *Alma Mater* since my graduation, as my residence had always been quite remote from the College. When I saw so many gray-headed men present, and found that I was the senior of them all, it was difficult for me to take in the situation. By a resolution of the Associate Alumni, I was requested to preside at the public exercises that evening, when three carefully prepared addresses were to be delivered by members of the Alumni Association, who had been appointed to that duty. At 8 P. M. the large Presbyterian Church was crowded to its utmost capacity. I was escorted to the chair by the acting President of the College, and presided over the meeting. I made a brief opening address, and announced the several speakers, whose addresses were both able and interesting. I closed the exercises with the Apostolic Benediction. The next day, Thursday, June 30th, the regular Commencement Exercises took place, and nearly all the orations, from members of the graduating class, were admirably written and impressively delivered. The regular Academic Degrees were then conferred, together with several Honorary Degrees. I felt highly complimented when my name was announced as having had conferred upon me by the Trustees of the College the Honorary Degree of D. C. L., this being the first time that this degree had been conferred by the Trustees in the history of Hamilton College.

I left the next day for Saratoga Springs, arriving there early in the afternoon and remaining until the following Monday.

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On Sunday, July 3d, by invitation of Rev. Dr. Carey, Rector of Bethesda Church, I preached both morning and evening.

On Monday, July 4th, I proceeded on to New York and remained until Thursday, July 7th, when I took the steamer to Providence, and the next morning went on by rail to Boston. After a few hours there, I continued my journey to Portland, and passed several hours very pleasantly in that attractive city, which I had never visited before. Very early the next morning I took the train to Bar Harbour, arriving soon after 8 o'clock, where I was made the recipient of the most kindly and generous hospitality.

On Sunday, July 10th, in the Church of St. Saviour, Bar Harbour, the Rector, Rev. Mr. Leffingwell, conducted the service, when I preached to a very large congregation, and then made an address, asking for help in behalf of some very needed Missionary work in the Diocese of North Carolina. As the result of this appeal, I had sent to me about \$500, which proved a great help to some very needy churches.

On the following Thursday, July 14th, I left Bar Harbour for Boston and New York, arriving at the latter place the next day at 3:35 P. M.

Saturday, July 16th, I went, by invitation of some esteemed friends, to visit them at Tuxedo, and, on Sunday, July 17th, I preached in St. Mary's Church in that place.

I returned to New York on Monday, and went on a short visit to my daughter in the suburbs of the city.

I started on my return to Raleigh on Tuesday, July 19th, reaching my home the following day.

My health I found greatly improved by this interesting journey; and I left on Saturday, July 23d, to enter upon my summer visitation.

My first appointment was at St. Athanasius' Church, Burlington, where, after Divine service, I preached, confirmed one person, and celebrated the Holy Communion. The day was oppressively warm, and the service proved a very trying one.

Tuesday, July 26th, I visited St. Mary's Church, High Point, where I was assisted in the service by the Rev. Charles Ferris; preached, confirmed five persons and addressed them.

Wednesday, July 27th, in the Church of the Redemption, Lexington, I preached, assisted in the service by Rev. Mr. Ferris.

Thursday, July 28th, at St. Matthew's Church, Salisbury, Rev. F. J. Murdoch conducted the Evening Service. I made an address on Confirmation, and then confirmed five persons.

Friday, July 29th, visited St. Andrew's Church, Rowan County, where I was assisted by Rev. Sidney S. Bost. I preached, confirmed three persons, addressed them, and administered the Holy Communion. Quite a large congregation was present, and I found many indications of increasing interest and prosperity.

Sunday, July 31st, in St. Luke's Church, Salisbury, I was assisted in the services by Rev. Dr. Murdoch and Rev. S. S. Bost. I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

At night, in the same Church, after Evening Service, I delivered an address on the Two-fold Aspect of Confirmation, and then confirmed sixteen persons.

Monday, August 1st, went to Winston, and on the evening of the next day I preached, confirmed four persons and addressed them.

Thursday, August 4th, in St. Philip's Church, German-ton, I was assisted in the service by Rev. F. S. Stickney; preached, confirmed four persons and addressed them.

Friday, August 5th, in the Presbyterian Church at Mt. Airy, Rev. Mr. Stickney conducted the Evening Service. I preached to a very large and attentive congregation.

Sunday, August 7th, in St. John's Church, Madison, Rev. Mr. Stickney conducted the Evening Service. I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

After a hurried repast, I left with Mr. Stickney by rail, at 1:30, for Walnut Cove, and thence on toward Mt. Airy, stopping at *King's Cabin, Five Forks*. We were then driven for two miles into the country to a school-house, where a large congregation had gathered. Mr. Stickney had visited the same neighborhood on two or three previous occasions and held services, which awakened a very great interest. The day of my visit brought out a large congregation, many coming from quite a distance away. Mr. Stickney aided me in the service, and I preached for nearly an hour to a most interested and attentive congregation. Our Church was wholly unknown in that entire district, and it was most gratifying to witness the anxiety manifested by the people to learn more and more of the doctrines and principles and Scriptural foundations of the Ancient and Apostolic Church. A large lot was offered me, and great encouragement given to the building of a Church. I trust that during this summer the good work may be carried successfully forward.

Tuesday, August 8th, I made a visitation to Christ Church, Walnut Cove, assisted in the services by Rev. F. S. Stickney. I preached, confirmed six persons and addressed them, and administered the Holy Communion. Left the same afternoon for Greensboro, and continued on to Asheville.

Sunday, August 14th, went to Beaver Dam Church, about two miles out in the suburbs of Asheville, and after Morning Prayer by Rev. W. F. Rice, the Missionary in charge, I preached, confirmed seven persons, addressed

them, and administered the Holy Communion. An excellent work has been going on here, and during the year preceding my visit, a very neat and comfortable parsonage had been erected in close proximity to the church. On the evening of the same day I visited Trinity Chapel, Asheville. The Rev. Mr. Dunn, who was then in charge, had been very ill for some weeks, and died only a few hours after the close of our service. Rev. Mr. Jessup, of Long Island, and Rev. Mr. McDuffey conducted the service. I preached and confirmed two persons. Shortly after this visit, Rev. Mr. McDuffey, whose health had been somewhat impaired, found himself so much improved that he returned to the charge of Trinity Chapel.

Tuesday, August 16th, in Grace Church, Waynesville, after Morning Service, I preached, confirmed four persons, addressed them, and administered the Holy Communion.

At 4:30 P. M. visited St. Mary's, Micadale, and preached, being assisted both morning and evening by Rev. W. S. Barrows.

Wednesday, August 17th, went to Sylva, and in the village school-house confirmed one person and preached.

Went on to Cullowhee in the afternoon.

Thursday, August 18th, consecrated St. David's Church, Cullowhee, which had been for some time in an incomplete state, but by hired help it was now ready for consecration. The request for consecration was read by Mr. Thomas A. Cox, and the sentence of consecration by Rev. J. A. Deal. Morning Prayer was said by Rev. Messrs. Deal and Barber. The sermon was preached by me, and I also administered the Holy Communion. It was a day of great rejoicing in this lovely valley, and we trust that this attractive Church may avail to draw multitudes into the paths of truth and of righteousness.

Friday, August 19th, crossed over some of the spurs of the Blue Ridge to Cashier's Valley, where, on Sunday,

August 21st, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rev. Messrs. Deal and Rhodes conducted the service, and I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Monday, August 22d, I accompanied Rev. Mr. Deal to Franklin, Macon County.

Tuesday, August 23d, in St. Agnes' Church, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. At 4:30 P. M., preached in St. Cyprian's Church, near Franklin. We have a very encouraging colored congregation, which is closely associated with an excellent school, having also quite a successful industrial department. Rev. Mr. Kennedy is doing a faithful work here, both as a clergyman and a teacher.

Wednesday, August 24th, went to Nonah, eight miles from Franklin, to visit St. John's Church. Service by Rev. Messrs. Deal and Barber. I preached, confirmed one person, and administered the Holy Communion.

Went next day to Dillsboro, and thence by rail to Asheville.

Friday, August 26th, went by train to Flat Rock, and at 11 o'clock in St. John's Church in the Wilderness, after Divine service by Rev. Messrs. Rathbun and Hance, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. In the afternoon, in St. James' Church, Hendersonville, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Mr. Hance, I preached and confirmed one person.

Saturday, August 27th, at Gilreath's Cross-Roads, in a school-house, also used as a Chapel, Rev. W. S. Barrows conducted a brief service, when I confirmed six persons and addressed them. I then went one mile further, and in a private house I confirmed a sick person.

Sunday, August 28th, in Calvary Church, Henderson County, Rev. Alban Greaves conducted the Morning Service. I preached, confirmed eight persons, addressed them, and administered the Holy Communion.

Monday, August 29th, took train from Asheville to Morganton. Same evening at 8 P. M., after Prayers by Rev. E. P. Green, I preached, confirmed seven persons and addressed them.

Tuesday, August 30th, I held service in St. Stephen's Church, a new and tasteful building which had been recently erected for the colored people. I confirmed four colored persons and addressed them. I went to a private house and baptized a child. Left same day for Hickory. At night in the Church of the Ascension, Rev. J. A. Weston conducted the service, I preached, confirmed ten persons and addressed them.

Wednesday, August 31st, went by train to Lenoir.

Thursday, September 1st, in St. James' Church, Lenoir, Rev. Dr. Buxton conducted the Morning Service, I preached and confirmed one person.

Friday, September 2d, in the Chapel of Rest, Yadkin Valley, six miles from Lenoir, Rev. J. A. Weston read Morning Prayer. I preached and administered the Holy Communion, assisted by Rev. Dr. Buxton.

Left the next day for Blowing Rock.

Sunday, September 4th, in the large Assembly Hall of the Blowing Rock Hotel, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs. Bush and Weston, I preached and celebrated the Holy Communion.

Left after dinner for Linnville, and at 8 P. M., in the large parlor of the hotel, Rev. Mr. Weston read the Evening Service, and I preached to a large and most attentive congregation.

Monday, September 5th, drove over to Boone, the county seat of Watauga County, and the next day, in St. Luke's Church, Rev. Mr. Weston assisted me in the service, and I preached.

Left at 4 P. M. for the neighborhood of Valle Crucis.

Wednesday, September 7th, in St. John's Church, after

Divine Service by Rev. Messrs. Weston and Bush, I preached, confirmed one person, and administered the Holy Communion.

The same day I returned to Blowing Rock.

Thursday, September 8th, at an early hour, in a private house, I baptized a child and went shortly afterward to Lenoir, and thence by rail to Hickory and Statesville.

Friday, September 9th, at 8 P. M. in Trinity Church, Statesville, after Evening Prayer by Rev. E. A. Osborne, I preached and confirmed three persons.

Went next day to Charlotte.

Sunday, September 11th, in St. Peter's Church, after Morning Prayer by Rev. J. B. Cheshire, Jr., I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

At night, in same Church, I preached and confirmed fourteen persons.

Monday, September 12th, in the Chapel of the Thompson Orphanage, I confirmed eleven of the children and addressed them.

Left soon after for Lincolnton, and the same evening in St. Cyprian's Church, Rev. Mr. Wetmore and Rev. P. P. Alston conducted the service. I preached and confirmed five persons.

Tuesday, September 13th, in St. Luke's Church, Lincolnton, after Evening Prayer by Rev. W. R. Wetmore, I preached and confirmed three persons.

Wednesday, September 14th, in St. Paul's Church near Lincolnton, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Wetmore, I preached, confirmed nine persons and addressed them.

Upon my return to the town, I went by appointment to a private house, and confirmed a blind person.

Left that evening for Shelby.

Thursday, September 15th, in St. Thomas' Church, Shelby, Rev. G. W. Phelps, the minister in charge, con-

ducted the Morning Service. I preached, confirmed one person, and celebrated the Holy Communion.

The same evening, in St. John's Church, Rutherfordton, Mr. Phelps conducted the Evening Service and I preached to a large congregation.

Friday, September 16th, having completed my western visitation, I returned east and went first to Hillsboro.

Sunday, September 18th, in St. Matthew's Church, assisted in the service by Rev. B. McKenzie, I preached, confirmed five persons, and administered the Holy Communion.

In the afternoon, went out into the country six miles from Hillsboro, to St. Mary's Church. Rev. Mr. McKenzie assisted me in the service. I preached, confirmed twelve persons and addressed them. The congregation was so large that more than one hundred persons could not find standing room in the church. It was very evident that a wonderful interest had been aroused, and that the prejudices of the past were rapidly disappearing.

Thursday, September 22d, I returned with my family to Raleigh. The heavy fatigue of my late protracted visitation pressed so heavily upon me, that I gradually fell a victim to quite a serious attack of insomnia.

Sunday, October 2d, took part in the service in Christ Church, preached, confirmed one person, and administered the Holy Communion.

Monday, October 3d, I left for Baltimore to take part in the deliberations of the General Convention. Each day of my continuance there, I found my health increasingly impaired and was suffering so much from aggravated insomnia, that I felt wholly unable to take any part in the duties of the General Convention. After ten days I determined to take leave of the Convention and return to my home. On the day I had arranged to leave the city I had a very painful attack of sciatica, so that I walked with

extreme difficulty, and suffered greatly from it for nearly a fortnight. This severe attack left me very suddenly.

On Sunday, November 6th, I preached in St. Mary's Chapel, Raleigh.

November 9th, I went to Tarboro by special request of the Vestry of Calvary Church to confer with them in reference to recent difficulties in the Parish. I gave to the Vestry such advice and counsel as the circumstances seemed to require, and I hope that my visit was not altogether in vain.

Friday, November 11th, I left for an appointment at Weldon, and on Sunday, November 13th, in Grace Church, Weldon, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Walter J. Smith, I preached and admitted to Deacon's Orders the Rev. Alvin J. Vanderbogart, upon presentation by Rev. W. L. Mellihampe, and administered the Holy Communion.

Monday, November 14th, returned to Raleigh, and on Wednesday, November 16th, I went to Salisbury. The next day, Thursday, November 17th, in St. Luke's Church, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Dr. Murdoch and Rev. Mr. Bost, I preached and admitted to the Sacred Order of Deacons Mr. Robert Bruce Owens, from Christ Church Parish, Rowan County, and administered the Holy Communion, assisted by Rev. Dr. Murdoch.

In the evening went to St. Paul's Church, and after Evening Prayer I preached and confirmed twenty persons.

Friday, November 18th, went to Asheville.

Sunday, November 20th, in Trinity Church, Asheville, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Messrs. DuBose and Rhodes, I preached, confirmed twenty-seven persons, and administered the Holy Communion.

Sunday, November 27th, in Calvary Church, Henderson County, at that time without a Rector, I was assisted in the Morning Service by a Lay Reader, and preached and administered the Holy Communion.

On the following Wednesday I went to Tryon City, Polk County, and was driven over to Columbus, where I spent a day, and sought to secure ere long the erection of a Church in that neighborhood.

Friday, December 2d, I stopped over a few hours in Spartanburg, S. C., and took part in the public services in connection with a meeting of the Convocation of that District. The same evening I went on to Charlotte, and at 8 P. M., in St. Michael's Church, I preached, confirmed twelve persons and addressed them.

The next morning I went to a private house near the Church and confirmed a sick member of the same congregation.

Sunday, December 4th, went to St. Peter's Church, Charlotte, and after Morning Prayer by Rev. Dr. Cheshire. I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Monday, December 5th, went to Concord and found the new and attractive Church edifice almost entirely completed. I held a service in the Church in the afternoon, baptized a child and preached. Left the same evening on my return home.

Thursday, December 8th, left for Washington and New York.

Sunday, December 11th, I took part in the service at St. Bartholomew's Church.

Tuesday, December 13th, at the Bible House, New York, I attended the monthly meeting of the Board of Managers of the Missionary work of the Church.

Wednesday, December 14th, I went to New Haven, and on Friday, December 16th, took part at Trinity Church in the consecration of the Bishop of Spokane.

The same evening I went on a visit to relatives in Waterbury, Connecticut.

Sunday, December 18th, in St. John's Church, after service by the Rector, Rev. Dr. Rowland, I preached and

closed the service. At night, in Trinity Church, Waterbury, I preached to a large congregation.

Monday, December 19th, left on my return home, and reached Raleigh the next day.

Sunday, December 25th, in Christ Church, Raleigh, assisted in the service by Rev. Drs. Marshall and Smedes, I preached and administered the Holy Communion. At night, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, at the Sunday-school celebration, I made an address and afterwards closed the service.

Wednesday, January 4th, 1893, I reached Winston by appointment. In the afternoon I confirmed a sick person in private, and at night, in St. Paul's Church, I preached, confirmed four persons and addressed them.

Thursday, January 5th, went to Charlotte.

Friday, January 6th, Feast of the Epiphany, in St. Peter's Church, I preached and administered the Holy Communion, assisted by Rev. Dr. Cheshire.

Saturday, January 7th, I left for Spartanburg to enter upon a short visitation in the Diocese of South Carolina, the Bishop of the Diocese being disabled from duty, and the Standing Committee of the Diocese gladly welcoming such assistance as I was able to render.

My first services were on Sunday, January 8th, in the Church of the Advent, Spartanburg, where I preached in the morning and administered the Holy Communion, and preached again in the evening.

I continued in the discharge of Episcopal duties for about a fortnight, visiting the churches in Greenville, Pendleton, Abbeville, Union, Columbia and Ridgeway. During this visitation I preached twelve times, delivered five addresses, confirmed forty persons, and administered Holy Communion on five occasions, and also baptized three children.

On Friday, January 27th, left for Charleston.

On Sunday, January 29th, I preached in St. Michael's Church in the morning, and in the evening in Grace Church, made an address at a large missionary meeting.

Sunday, February 5th, preached in Grace Church, Charleston.

[The following passage was introduced at this point, and the remainder of the Address was read to the Convention the next day.]

There is one matter of no little interest and importance, both to the Diocese and myself, which I desire to bring to the notice of the Convention.

During the past year I have suffered no little at times from painful attacks of sleeplessness, and I find, in almost every instance, that it is the result of too heavy a pressure of duties. At the close of my long visitation in the mountain districts last summer, I found myself much oppressed and without my usual elasticity of spirits. Yet a little rest seems soon to restore me to my previous good health. I was feeling quite unwell when the time arrived for me to go on to the late General Convention. But the duties of the Convention proved no little strain upon me, and after remaining in Baltimore for ten days I determined to take leave of the Convention and return to my home. After ten days of entire rest and recreation, I began to recuperate and soon found myself apparently as well as before. But I must not forget that I am not as young as I was ten years ago, and possibly I ought, in some degree, to husband my strength. I feel that I am tempted to overtax my powers. Never have I found in the Diocese so much to cheer and encourage me, and so many opportunities for enlarging our work. At times I am quite perplexed in determining just what I ought to do. I realize that it is only right for me to make known to my brethren in the Diocese these considerations, which have been weighing upon my thoughts and my heart. And I should be greatly

relieved and comforted by any suggestions to which this Convention might think it right and wise to give utterance. Perhaps it might be well to appoint a committee to take this matter under immediate consideration.

The next item of interest is somewhat of a personal nature. On Thursday, February 9th, in the venerable St. Michael's Church, Charleston, South Carolina, I was united in marriage by the Rev. Dr. Charles C. Pinckney to Miss Susan Boone Robertson, daughter of the late Alexander Robertson, formerly a leading Churchman of South Carolina, and for many years Senior Warden of St. Michael's Church, Charleston.

We went directly from the Church to the railway station, and left in a few minutes for Jacksonville and St. Augustine, Florida. After a few days there, we proceeded to New Orleans, spending a very pleasant and quiet week there, when we took the train directly to New York, and I entered almost immediately upon a short visitation in Brooklyn, undertaken at the earnest request of the Bishop of Long Island. The Bishop's health was, at the time, much impaired, and he had left for the Island of Jamaica only a short time before.

My first service was on Sunday, February 26th, in the Church of the Messiah, Brooklyn, when I preached, confirmed twenty-seven persons and addressed them. At night, in St. Bartholomew's Church, I confirmed thirty persons and addressed them. In the Church of the Atonement, I preached and confirmed fifty-nine persons. In the Church of the Redeemer confirmed twenty-nine persons and addressed them. On Sunday, March 5th, I confirmed two persons in private on my way to St. Peter's Church, where I preached and confirmed fifty-eight persons. And at night, in old Christ Church, I preached and confirmed twenty-six persons, making the whole number confirmed by me in Brooklyn 231 persons.

On Wednesday, March 1, in the Church House, Lafayette Place, New York, I attended a special meeting of the House of Bishops, summoned for the election of Missionary Bishops for China and Japan. We could not secure a quorum on that day, but quite a number of additional Bishops were present the next day, Thursday, March 2d, when the elections were duly made.

Tuesday, March 7th, left New York to return to Raleigh. I found a large number of letters awaiting me, which kept me constantly occupied for several days with important correspondence.

Friday, March 24th, I preached in St. Philip's Church, Durham, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Stewart McQueen. I was pleased to find that the new Rector had been most cordially received, and that everything was going on pleasantly and encouragingly in the Parish. Went the next day to Chapel Hill.

Sunday, March 26th, in the Chapel of the Cross, Chapel Hill, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Frederick Towers, I preached and admitted to the Sacred Order of Deacons, Mr. Gaston Battle, upon presentation by Rev. Mr. Towers. I also administered the Holy Communion. At night, in the same Church, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Gaston Battle and Rev. Mr. Towers, I preached, confirmed three persons, and addressed them. Returned next day to Raleigh.

Wednesday in Holy Week, March 29th, in the Church of the Holy Innocents, Henderson, Rev. Mr. Ingle conducted the Evening Service, when I preached, confirmed nineteen persons and addressed them. A very large congregation filled this beautiful Church, and I found everything in the Parish in a very gratifying condition.

Thursday, March 30th, took part in the service appointed for that day. The same day, at 4 P. M., in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Ridgeway, I preached, after Evening Prayer by Rev. W. S. Pettigrew.

Good Friday, March 31st, in St. James' Church, Kitlell, I preached and was assisted in the service by Rev. M. T. Turner. Returned to Raleigh in the evening.

Easter Day, April 2d, in Christ Church, Raleigh, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Dr. Marshall, I preached, confirmed fifteen persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion. At night, in St. Augustine's Church, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Dr. Sutton and Rev. Mr. Dulaney, I preached, confirmed eight persons and addressed them. Rev. Mr. Hunter presented the candidates.

Friday, April 7th, in St. Luke's Church, Gaston, I conducted the service, preached, confirmed two persons, and administered the Holy Communion.

Sunday, April 9th, in Grace Church, Weldon, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Vanderbogart, I preached, confirmed eight persons and administered the Holy Communion.

At 8 P. M., in the Church of Our Saviour, Jackson, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Mr. Picard, I preached, confirmed five persons and addressed them.

Tuesday, April 11th, in St. Mark's Church, Halifax, after Morning Prayer by the Lay Reader, Mr. S. M. Gary, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Wednesday, April 12th, in Trinity Church, Scotland Neck, after Morning Prayer by the Rector, Rev. W. J. Smith, I preached, confirmed four persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion.

Friday, April 14th, in the Church of the Advent, Enfield, I conducted the service, preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Sunday, April 16th, at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount, after Morning Prayer by the Minister in charge, Rev. A. J. Vanderbogart, Deacon, I preached, confirmed five persons and administered the Holy Communion.

At night, in St. John's Church, Battleboro, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Gaston Battle, the Minister in charge, I preached, confirmed two persons and addressed them.

Tuesday, April 18th, in St. Timothy's Church, Wilson, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Charles J. Wingate, I preached, confirmed seven persons and addressed them.

Wednesday, April 19th, in St. Mark's Church, Wilson, after Evening Prayer by Rev. J. W. Perry, I preached.

Left the next day for Tarboro.

The same evening held a meeting of the Vestry of Calvary Church and conferred with them.

Friday, April 21st, in St. Mary's Church, Edgecombe County, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Walter J. Smith, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

At 8 P. M., in Tarboro, after Evening Prayer by Rev. J. W. Perry, I preached in the new and beautiful Church just erected for the congregation of St. Luke's, and not yet wholly completed, confirmed eight persons and addressed them.

Saturday evening, April 22d, had another conference with the Vestry of Calvary Church.

Sunday, April 23d, in Calvary Church, Tarboro, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Dr. Cheshire, I confirmed two persons, preached and administered the Holy Communion.

At 8 P. M., in the same Church, I preached again after Evening Prayer by the Lay Reader, Mr. John Waddell.

Tuesday, April 25th, in St. Clement's Church, Ringwood, Morning Prayer was said by Rev. A. J. Vanderborght, and, after the Second Lesson, I baptized an infant, preached, confirmed three persons, addressed them and administered the Holy Communion.

Wednesday, April 26th, in the Chapel of the Cross, at Littleton, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Wm. Walker, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Thursday, April 27th, in the Chapel of the Heavenly Rest, Middleburg, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. W. S. Pettigrew, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Friday, April 28th, in St. John's Church, Williamsboro, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Pettigrew, I preached, confirmed two persons and administered the Holy Communion. This venerable church where the lion-hearted Bishop Ravenscroft ministered, is greatly in need of thorough repairs, and as the congregation worshipping there is in a very weak condition, financially, I desire to ask contributions throughout the Diocese to renovate and improve this building, as a special memorial to Bishop Ravenscroft. And I trust that the reverence and honor in which our first Bishop is held, may prompt to generous offerings for this praise-worthy object. All contributions may be sent to me, and I specially desire that the contemplated improvements may be carried out under my own direction.

Saturday, April 29th, in the Church at Stovall, after Morning Prayer by Rev. J. M. Horner, now in charge of that mission, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

Sunday, April 30th, in St. Paul's Church, Goshen, after Morning Prayer by Rev. J. M. Horner, and the confirmation of one person, after the Second Lesson, I preached and administered the Holy Communion.

The same evening, in St. Stephen's Church, Oxford, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Mr. Horner, I preached and confirmed two persons. I also made an address to the congregation, urging the commencement at once of the erection of a new church, now so imperatively demanded by the growing needs of the Parish.

For some months this Parish has been without a Rector, but the Rev. Edward Benedict, who had been elected to

the Rectorship and had accepted the same, entered upon his duties a few days after my visit.

Monday, May 1st, in St. Paul's Church, Louisburg, which had been placed at my disposal, for a service for the colored people, after Evening Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Dulaney, I preached, confirmed twenty-two colored people and addressed them. Services have been held in a hall for several months, and a wonderful interest has been awakened on the part of the colored people of the town. I have urged the immediate erection of a capacious church for this congregation, and a zealous and intelligent member of the congregation has gone, under my sanction and commendation, to solicit funds at the North for the building of the church.

Tuesday, May 2d, in St. Paul's Church, Louisburg, after Morning Prayer by the Lay Reader, Mr. F. S. Spruill, I preached a short sermon and left immediately, by train, for Warrenton, arriving at 2 P. M.

At 4 P. M., in All Saints' Chapel, for colored people, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Edward Benedict, I preached, confirmed four persons and addressed them. I then went to Emmanuel Church and met the Vestry, giving them counsel in regard to the election of a Rector to supply the place of Rev. Mr. Benedict, about to leave for Oxford.

At 8 P. M., in Emmanuel Church, after Evening Prayer by Rev. Edward Benedict, I preached and confirmed one person.

Next day, May 3d, returned to Raleigh.

Sunday, May 7th, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Mr. Pittenger, I addressed the congregation in regard to the special dignity and importance of the great Feast of the Ascension, and urged upon the people a more careful and general observance of the day. I then preached, confirmed twenty persons, addressed them, and administered the Holy Communion.

Feast of the Ascension, May 11th, in the Church of the Good Shepherd, after Morning Prayer by the Rev. F. L. Bush, I preached and administered the Holy Communion, assisted by Mr. Bush, the Rector being absent for a few days in New York.

Sunday after Ascension Day, at the Chapel of St. Mary's School, after Morning Prayer by Rev. Dr. Smedes, I preached, confirmed eleven pupils of the school, addressed them, and administered the Holy Communion.

This service concludes the work of the year.

The following is the summary of official duties: I have preached on one hundred and five occasions within the Diocese, and fifteen beyond its limits, making one hundred and twenty in all; have delivered fifty-one addresses; have baptized within the Diocese six children and three in South Carolina, nine in all; have confirmed four hundred and two in the Diocese, forty in South Carolina and two hundred and thirty-one in Long Island, making in all six hundred and seventy-three; have celebrated the Holy Communion at forty-five services; have consecrated one Church and admitted four candidates to Deacon's Orders.

I have given Letters Dimissory to Rev. C. N. F. Jeffery, to the Diocese of Long Island; Rev. Alban Greaves, to the Diocese of East Carolina; Rev. W. W. Walker, to the Diocese of Georgia; Rev. George Hebbard and Rev. Elliot White, to the Diocese of New York; Rev. R. P. Eubank, to the Diocese of South Carolina.

During the year I have received into the Diocese, Rev. Stewart McQueen, by Letters Dimissory from the Diocese of South Carolina; Rev. H. S. McDuffey from the Diocese of South Carolina; Rev. J. C. Davis from the Diocese of Georgia; and four others have been added by ordination to the Diaconate.

The present number of Postulants in this Diocese is six, viz.: Alfred James Griffin, John C. Seagle, John H. Gil-

reath, Isaac Norfleet Neal, Thomas Burke Bailey, Edward L. Whitehead.

The candidates for Deacon's Orders are five: Samuel A. B. Trott, James E. King, Frederick A. Fetter, Charles Fetter, Eugene L. Henderson.

The candidates for Priest's Orders are: Rev. Messrs. W. F. Rice, St. Clair Hester, James D. Miller, B. L. McKenzie, Gaston Battle, James T. Kennedy, R. B. Owens, Samuel Rhodes, John W. Barker, Sidney S. Bost; also Messrs. Nathan A. Seagle, George V. Gilreath, Wm. Bentley Crittenden and Thomas C. Wetmore.

The changes among the Clergy are as follows: Rev. Wm. W. Walker has resigned the charge of St. Stephen's Church, Oxford, and taken Letters Dimissory to the Diocese of Georgia. Rev. C. N. F. Jeffery has resigned the several Missions under his charge and taken Letters Dimissory to the Diocese of Long Island. Rev. George Hebbard has resigned the charge of Calvary Parish, Tarboro, and taken Letters Dimissory to the Diocese of New York. Rev. Elliot White, who has been for some time absent from the Diocese, has taken Letters Dimissory to the Diocese of New York. Rev. Alban Greaves has resigned the charge of Calvary Parish, Henderson County, and taken Letters Dimissory to East Carolina. Rev. W. L. Mellichampe has resigned the charge of Grace Church, Weldon, and the several Missions which have been associated with it, and taken Letters Dimissory to the Diocese of Alabama. Rev. Charles Ferris has resigned the Missions at High Point and Lexington, and has taken charge of the Missions at Tryon and Columbus, in Polk County. Rev. Benj. S. McKenzie has resigned the charge of All Saints' Church, Concord, and taken charge of St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro, and St. Mary's Mission in Orange County.

By Letters Dimissory, I have received into the Diocese the Rev. Henry S. McDuffey from the Diocese of South

Carolina, and he has returned to the charge of Trinity Chapel, Asheville.

Rev. Stewart McQueen has presented Letters Dimissory from the Diocese of South Carolina, and has taken charge of St. Philip's Church, Durham.

Rev. J. C. Davis has presented Letters Dimissory from the Diocese of Georgia, and has become Rector of All Saints' Church, Concord.

By ordination to the Diaconate, the following persons have been added to the number of our Clergy, viz.: Rev. Sidney S. Bost, who has become Assistant to Rev. Dr. Murdoch in St. Luke's Church, Salisbury, and several Missions in the vicinity; Rev. Alvin J. Vanderbogart, who was for a time officiating in Weldon, and adjacent Missions, is now in charge of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Rocky Mount; Rev. Robert Bruce Owens, who is officiating in Christ Church, Rowan County, and St. James' Church, Iredell County; Rev. Gaston Battle, who is officiating regularly at the Church of the Advent, Enfield, and St. Clement's Church, Ringwood. And at the opening of the adjourned Convention in Raleigh, on the 27th June, Mr. James Daniel Miller was admitted to the Diaconate, and will shortly be assigned to some of our Mission fields.

The whole number of Clergy now Canonically resident in the Diocese is sixty-four, of whom fifty-one are Priests and twelve Deacons.

No year of my Episcopate has been more replete with cheering encouragement than that which concludes with this Convention. On every side I find a growing interest among our people in the work of the Church, and an increasing readiness to co-operate in that work. But I do not think that, as a Christian body, we sufficiently realize how great are our opportunities, and how much we are lacking in a readiness to *give freely and generously* to aid in extending around us a better knowledge of those great

principles of truth and of righteousness which were set forth in the beginning by our blessed Lord and His Holy Apostles. We have not only a wonderful field in extent around us, but there is a spirit of inquiry abroad and a remarkable readiness to come and hear the Word. Our congregations at almost every place are steadily increasing, while popular prejudice is rapidly dying away. Surely, then, there is a serious call addressed to us all, both Clergy and Laity, to listen to the voice of the Great Head of the Church as He summons His people to activity, to self-denial, to generous giving, and to personal sacrifices for the extension of the Kingdom of God. The vast Mission field which this Diocese embraces throws upon us a tremendous responsibility, and while asking from abroad a large measure of help, we must also strive ourselves to do more than ever before to carry on this great work where the Providence of God has cast our lot. It is one of the fairest portions of the earth, and must soon attract a very large population when the inhabitants of far less favored regions learn what are the rich blessings which are our especial heritage.

Let me also ask that a deeper and stronger interest may be enkindled and sustained in the noble Thompson Orphanage, which is doing at Charlotte such a wonderful work of mercy and of charity. What, my dear brethren, can appeal more tenderly to the deepest emotions of the Christian heart than the spectacle of these helpless little ones bereft of their natural protectors, whom our Divine Lord has placed at our doors to awaken a kindly and loving sympathy. Surely here is a great work which should touch all our hearts and excite us to liberal gifts, not only while we are living, but should lead us to leave such legacies behind us that, being dead, we may still be speaking and doing for them.

Let me also especially commend that most noble Diocesan School which we have established at Asheville. I mean the Ravenscroft High School for boys. Under the very wise management of Mr. Ronald MacDonald, we have now one of the most valuable institutions for Christian training and sound learning which has ever been inaugurated in our State. Its advantages are of the very highest order, while its cost, in proportion to its superior advantages, is nearly less than half the cost of schools of the same general grade at the North. If our people will only manifest a little more sympathy to this most excellent school, we shall soon place it on the high road to the greatest success, and make an ultimate failure quite an impossibility.

Finally, brethren, in the midst of so many and varying interests, let us all seek to remember what are our *real duties*, and let us rise with united energy and zeal faithfully to discharge them. May we all be stimulated to work faithfully while the day lasts, remembering that "the night cometh when no man can work."

We are *growing*. Our Parish school, although not so large as it was last year, on account of the severe winter, has been quite regularly attended. We have 123 scholars this year. I am proud to say that a great need in the school has been supplied. Recently we have introduced the Industrial feature in our work, and the children are taking hold of it with great earnestness, and I look for good results.

The schools are doing excellent work. St. Agnes', being the only Female School west of Asheville, came into prominence at once. Additional room for the accommodation of boarding-pupils is now a pressing necessity, so I propose to make the addition at once and endeavor to collect the money afterwards. St. Cyprian's system of schools—Sunday, Day, Cooking, Sewing, and Mechanical—is doing a much needed work for the colored people.

The severe winter has hindered the work of the Sewing and Cooking Schools, but the Day and Mechanical Departments have been well attended, and have made good progress. The Chapel has recently received a gift from the Mechanical School consisting of altar, altar rail, lectern and sermon-desk, which will compare favorably with work from much more pretentious establishments.

I have been most zealously aided by my assistants, Messrs. Barker, Rhodes and Kennedy; and though we have little to show in the way of numerical results, the workmen are not in fault; only those who know the difficulties can appreciate the amount of labor necessary to accomplish a very little. “Men sow, the Angels reap.”

I would also place on record here my heartfelt thanks to kind friends in our own Diocese and at the North for their generous contributions towards my school and church building, and also for the support of my helpers.

Epiphany has greatly suffered by this condition of affairs, and is now a Mission all but in name. There have been such a succession of godly ministers serving them, and so many members of the highest and most exemplary Christian character, that there is very little of the prejudice, so common elsewhere, to be found against the Church in this old Parish.

The outlook is brighter just now than it has been for years, and it appears we are going to regain some of our lost ground. The great need is *regular services*, for sometimes I am not able to visit the Parish but once a quarter, though with the kind assistance of Mr. Charles Fetter, I have managed to keep up monthly services.

But the roof of this Church is old and sadly needs new shingling, and I hope that some of the many visitors to this place may find it in their hearts during the year to help us to do what is so essential to the well-being of God's house, temporal and spiritual. I have preached three times at Patterson Springs, four miles from Shelby.

REPORT OF THE REV. JOSEPH W. MURPHY.

Still Canonically belonging to the Diocese of North Carolina, though resident in that of Maryland, it is my duty to report to the Bishop of North Carolina what, with God's help and of His mercy, I have been able to do since my last report.

I have conducted or taken part in forty-one services (Morning or Evening Prayer and Holy Communion), have administered the Holy Communion myself four times, have preached thirty times, and have baptized two infants. This in eighteen different places, without any of the responsibility of having a charge or being a regular assistant. I am stronger in health than when I gave up my loved Parish in Hillsboro, but am still entirely unfit for assuming the responsibility of a charge. Am thankful though, very thankful, for God's loving kindness to me.

CONVOCATION OF ASHEVILLE.

The Convocation of Asheville met at Grace Chapel in August last, attended to the necessary business and held a number of services at Grace and Cornell, with Missionary meeting in Trinity Church, Asheville. In November last a meeting was held in St. David's, Cullowhee, lasting three days. The congregations on such occasions are usually large and attentive, and in a field like this, it might be well to conduct frequent Missions in weak places, and hold the Convocation meeting proper in stronger places, thus keeping each in touch with the other.

The gains most noticeable in our Missionary field are at Grace Chapel and in the neighborhood, in Polk County, Bryson City and St. Agnes' Female School at Franklin. *The Dawn of Day*, our Convocation organ, is doing a good work; and its zealous editor deserves the gratitude of this entire section of country.

I have visited the Missionary work around Asheville and at other points west. In my judgment the truly rural districts which we occupy must, for the present, be worked simply for the work's sake, without hope of material gain. As education increases and these places come into contact with the busy world, they will be strong centers. We can hasten this by a system of schools and by the Missions above suggested.

I believe it would be wise to sell St. Andrew's in West Asheville, secure a lot by gift near Glen Rock Hotel, and with money obtained from sale, build a new church in the midst of a larger population.

It is very necessary that the status of the church property in Murphy should be examined. The old store building has been condemned by the town authorities and pulled down. From the best information I can get, the property was deeded to Bishop Atkinson, Dr. Ramsaur, and Prof. Wm. Beal as Trustees. Prof. Beal, the only surviving Trustee, is getting well up in years; even now he is very infirm in health, and should he die without transferring the property to the Diocese, there might be difficulty in recovering it.

I am sorry to have to report that, so far, we have been unable to put in operation the inexpensive school for boys at Salisbury. This school, as a means of supplying ministers, would be of great help to the missionary work of the Diocese.

Bishop of North Carolina:

Since my last annual report I have visited all the Missions under my charge, and find that the work is being efficiently done and that there is much to encourage us.

The Clergy at present employed in this department of the Church's work are nine, viz.: Four Priests and one Deacon, colored, and four white Priests.

In consequence of the death of the Rev. F. W. Dunn, which took place on the 15th of August last, Mr. McDuffey returned to his former charge in Asheville and Morganton and began his work September 1st. The work in Asheville has been very much retarded by the state of the Chapel, which was thought to be unsafe. The school, on this account, was discontinued until provision could be made for it. The property is held by the Vestry of Trinity Church, Asheville, in trust, and in consequence of the unsafe condition of the school and Chapel, they have divided the property into lots, reserving the site of the Chapel and parsonage, and have offered them for sale, the proceeds to be used in the erection of a new Church.

In Morganton the Church is now free of debt and awaits consecration. The school-room in the basement of the Church has been provided with

desks through the kindness of friends, and the school has been carried on with good results.

In Charlotte the work of the Mission has prospered, and it is exerting a marked influence for good upon the community. The day school is large and flourishing and taxes Mr. Alston and his teachers to the utmost. The industrial feature, lately introduced, adds much to its efficiency and usefulness.

The work in Lincolnton, also under the care of Mr. Alston, who visits it once a month, should have more attention than he is able to give it, and a school is much needed to build it up. There is an excellent opening for such a work, but the appropriation is not sufficient and we have been obliged to see the opportunity go unimproved. If a stipend could be provided, a most excellent work could be done.

The Hospital of the Good Samaritan, connected with the Mission in Charlotte, has already become a blessing to the community in its ministrations of mercy, and it appeals for help to carry on its good work. It depends wholly for its support upon free-will offerings. This is a noble charity, and it should be furnished with means to extend its merciful work.

In Durham, under the efficient and faithful ministrations of the Priest in Charge, there has been much to encourage the prosecution of the work, but the want of proper accommodation has been a hindrance. If we had a Chapel the work would grow without doubt. There has been a school carried on during the past year, and the increase in the number of pupils has been encouraging.

In Franklin, Macon County, the Mission, under the care of Mr. Deal and his assistant, Mr. Kennedy, has met with good success, and the industrial feature of the day school has been especially efficient. A very valuable property has been secured to the Church through the foresight of Mr. Deal, and the work has been supported largely through his influence. Mr. Kennedy's report is, on the whole, encouraging, and deserves a larger appropriation. Much has been done the past year to improve the Chapel and grounds, and the people have contributed of their slender means.

At Lenoir Miss Caison has carried on her schools with an unusually good attendance through the past winter, and reports the progress as satisfactory.

At Louisburg, under the care of the Rev. H. B. Delaney, the success has been very cheering. He has been visiting this place once a month and holding service in the court-house. These services have been faithfully attended, and at a recent visit of the Bishop twenty-two persons were confirmed. The lot has been secured for the church, and work has been begun on the building. A school has been in operation the past season, numbering upwards of a hundred children. A school-house

must be built, and there could be no better improvement for the good of the community.

In Moore County, St. Philip's Mission has carried on its good work with increasing influence under the care of the schoolmaster, Mr. Trott. The property of the Mission consists of an acre of land on which stands a Chapel and house. The Chapel serves for a school-house as well, and the house accommodates the schoolmaster and his family. Some destitute children have been taken in to be cared for, and many others might be rescued if we had the means. The only support which this Mission has to carry on its work is \$100 a year.

The work has gone on at Pittsboro, St. James' Mission, which is served by Mr. Bush alternately with Durham.

In Raleigh the Parish of St. Augustine has labored under the disadvantage of having the Church building at a considerable distance from the colored population. An effort has been made to dispose of the present property and purchase in a more desirable locality, but as yet no change has been made.

The Parish of St. Luke's, in Tarboro, under the care of the Rev. J. W. Perry, has prospered. The corner-stone of the new church was laid on July 28th last, and now they have a very beautiful church almost completed. The services are now held in it, but the furniture and sittings are wanting and the tower is not finished. The congregation have done exceedingly well under Mr. Perry's wise direction, and have contributed of their slender means \$475, besides windows given by the Sunday-school and Guilds. The school has flourished the past year, and needs enlarged accommodation.

Warrenton, All Saints' Mission, has been served by Mr. Delaney and has been doing well.

St. Luke's, Warren County, has been served by the Archdeacon.

St. Mark's, Wilson, is under Mr. Perry's charge, and that of his Lay Reader, Mr. John Clarke. A school has been maintained here, taught by Mr. Clarke, and the attendance has been good.

This is a brief sketch of the work in the Diocese.

Appended to this report is a tabulated statement of the work, giving the status of each Mission.

SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF ST. PETER'S HOME
AND HOSPITAL, CHARLOTTE, N. C., JAN. 1, 1893.

During 1892 St. Peter's Hospital has cared for 63 inmates for a total number of 1,335 days. Males 29; females 24; adults 59; children 4. Lutheran 1; Reformed Presbyterian 1; Roman Catholics 4; Episcopalians 5; Presbyterians 10; Baptists 14; Methodists 20; no religious connection 8. Thirteen were from Charlotte; sixteen from Mecklenburg County; twenty from other parts of North Carolina, and the others were from eight different States. Four-fifths of the number were charity patients. Eight deaths occurred—five women and three men.

Several boxes have been received from branches of the Woman's Auxiliary North, and the wants in the way of bed linen, towels and clothing amply supplied. THE FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GOOD SAMARITAN
HOSPITAL, DECEMBER 31, 1892.

This Hospital was opened for patients September 23, 1891.

During October, November and December, 1891, it had 4 male patients for a total of 112 days one of whom died of pneumonia.

From January 1 to December 31, 1892, this Hospital has cared for 27 patients for 787 days, and has employed extra nurses for 171 days, making the sum of days board for inmates, 958 days. Seventeen of the patients were males and ten were females. All were adults, except three boys from 10 to 14 years old. Sixteen belonged to Charlotte, six to other places in North Carolina, four to South Carolina and one to Virginia. Of the number three have died—one from pneumonia, one from railroad injury and one from dropsy.

There is still a debt for building of \$342.51.

The Hospital has received boxes and barrels of household articles from several branches of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions; also donations of provisions and other necessities from friends in Charlotte.

The list of subscribers in Charlotte is very small, less than twenty names, and amounting only to \$12.50 a month, while the expenses average \$65 a month. Church societies and personal friends, North, East and West have provided the amount to carry on the work.

REPORT OF ST. AUGUSTINE'S SCHOOL, RALEIGH.

We are devoutly thankful in being able to report a year of quiet and steady growth. The daily services have been maintained throughout the school year. For several months daily instruction in Scripture has been given to all the students, the male teachers taking the duty a week at a time. The spirit of work has prevailed as never before. More than double the amount of manual work has been performed, as compared with the previous year. Graded lessons in sewing have been introduced and systematic instruction in cooking has been carried on. Some thirteen acres of cleared land have come back into our possession and this has been worked by our own students. Notwithstanding that so much more work has been done, the money payments have been greater than ever before. During the summer vacation a 27 x 50 feet addition to our girl's building was erected, providing in its four stories a new dining-room and three dormitories, and in its 22 x 30 feet wing, a cooking-school, sewing-room and trunk room. This building and wing were erected

almost entirely by our own students. Some interior painting has been done, and the girl's building and its addition have been painted entirely by our own students. A hydraulic ram has been put in under unusual difficulties, and most of the work was done by our colored Priest and some of our students. Some fifteen tons of corn were put away as ensilage last summer, and we expect to greatly increase the amount this year. Walks have been laid off and fruit and shade trees have been planted.

There have been 167 students enrolled during the year, and of these 132 were in actual attendance on the first day of March, showing a very steady attendance.

REPORT OF A COMMITTEE APPOINTED AT THE CONVENTION OF 1892 TO INVESTIGATE CERTAIN CLAIMS OF THE LATE REV. DR. D. H. BUEL.

(This report was received by the Secretary too late for insertion in connection with the report of the Trustees of the Diocese on page 38.)

RALEIGH, N. C., May 17, 1893.

To the Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina:

Your Committee, to whom was intrusted an investigation of facts and accounts relating to the claim of D. H. Buel, D.D., for moneys advanced by him in the construction of Schoenberger Hall, Asheville, would report that in obedience to the instructions received (see resolution, page 39, Journal of 1892) and on call of the chairman, a meeting of said Committee was held at the office of W. W. Jones, Esq., Asheville, on June 9th, 1892, at which all members thereof were present.

The first efforts of the Committee were directed to the discovery of such sources of information as might still lie open to their investigation, and resulted in developing the following competent witnesses to the facts and data which constituted the ultimate object of their search.

1. D. Hillhouse Buel, D.D., in possession of sufficient memory and other mental faculties, and physical strength to undergo a long and somewhat trying interview with the full committee.

2. Mr. Milton Harding, the builder and contractor who superintended the completion of the building, and to whom (or through whom) most of the payments in question were made.

3. The books of the Asheville Bank, which were kindly opened to the inspection of the Committee by the officers of that institution, and from which a transcript was made of the account of D. H. Buel, Trustee of the Schoenberger funds.

4. Memoranda (contemporaneous with the respective payments), in the handwriting of Dr. Buel, showing checks drawn against his own

private account in payment of claims for work or material furnished in the completion of the building, most of which items were verified, explained and vouched for by the contractor above mentioned, to whom these memoranda were submitted.

The evidence derived from these sources, although from a strictly legal point of view presenting, possibly, some points of weakness as a complete chain or perfect demonstration, seemed to the Committee to be sufficiently clear and definite to establish the following as the *facts* which they had been directed to ascertain:

1. That Dr. Buel had received from Mr. Schoenberger the sum of \$11,000, as shown by deposits to the credit of "D. H. Buel, Trustee," on the books of the bank.

2. That Dr. Buel had expended upon the Schoenberger property the sum of \$14,210.21, as shown by said bank account and his private memoranda, verified and vouched for by himself and the contractor.

3. That consequently the Schoenberger property, at its completion, stood debtor to Dr. Buel in the sum of \$3,210.21.

The Committee accordingly prepared, and afterwards transmitted to the Trustees of the Diocese (in obedience to its instructions), a report setting forth these facts, together with copies of the aforesaid accounts and a recommendation that said Trustees act in the premises in accordance with their instructions from the Convention.

Whereupon, having performed the duties laid upon it by the Convention to the extent of its abilities, the Committee adjourned *sine die*, and now most respectfully present this as its final report, asking to be discharged from further duties.

APPENDIX D.

AMENDMENTS OF THE CANONS, 1893.

Chapter III, Canon VI, section 3, as amended. See Journal, p. 48:

Sec. 3. PAROCHIAL REPORTS.—It shall be the duty of every Clergyman, at the close of the month of April each year, to report to the Bishop of the Diocese, by such form as shall be from time to time set forth by authority of the Diocesan Convention, the number of baptisms, confirmations, marriages and burials among the people of his charge since the close of his last report; also such official acts as he may have performed within or without his Cure, specifying in the latter case the place where performed. He shall also report, so far as practicable, the number of baptized persons and the number of communicants within his Cure, with the number of children receiving religious instruction in Sunday-schools or Parochial schools; also the amount of contributions for Church purposes, as well as such other matters as may throw light on the state of the Parish.

Chapter I, Canon VIII, section 1, as amended, makes *four* instead of *five* a quorum of the Executive Missionary Committee.
