FIRST DAY.

Wednesday, Dec. 1, 1880.

The Forty-Fourth Session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the City of Winston, N. C., at 9 o'clock, A. M., December 1, 1880, Bishop J C Keener, President.

The Conference was opened with religious exercises, conducted

by the Bishop. By direction of the Bishop, the Secretary of the last Conference

called the Clerical Roll of the Conference.

The Roll of Lay Delegates was then completed and called. On motion of Dr. Wm. Closs, B. Craven was elected Secretary.

J. T. Harris was appointed Financial Secretary, and W. C. Gannon Secretary of Statistics.

On motion of P. J. Caraway it was ordered that the daily sessions of this Conference shall begin at 9 o'clock, A. M., and adjourn at 1 o'clock, P. M.

On motion of J. B. Bobbitt, the Bar of the Conference was

fixed at the aisle even with the third window.

On motion of N. H. D. Wilson, W. H. Bobbitt, P. J. Caraway, T. H. Pegram, and J. W. Alspaugh were appointed a Committee on Divine Service.

On motion of D. R. Bruton, the Presiding Elders were appointed a Committee to Nominate the Regular Standing Committees.

A report from the South Georgia Conference, on the subject of Church Extension, was received and read, and was referred to a Special Committee, consisting of W. S. Black, D. R. Bruton, J. B. Bobbitt.

Dr. J. O. A Clarke, of the South Georgia Conference, was introduced, and addressed the Conference on the interests of the Wesley Monumental Church at Savannah, Ga.

Question 6th was called, -"Who are received by transfer from other Conferences?"

Answer. None.

Reports from Dr. McFerrin, Agent of the Publishing House at

Nashville, Tenn., were read, and referred to the Committee on Books and Periodicals.

A report from Dr. A. W. Wilson, Missionary Secretary, was re-

James M Waynick, an elder in the Methodist Protestant Church, having joined our Church, and having been recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Wentworth Circuit, as a suitable person to exercise the office of elder in our Church, and having testified his belief in our doctrines, discipline and ordination vows, was recognized as an elder.

The elders on the Hillsboro, Greensboro, and Fayetteville Districts, passed the usual examination of character.

L D Palmer, of Nashville, Tenn., was introduced. He addressed the Conference in the interests of the Publishing House in all its departments and publications.

The Conference then adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

SECOND DAY.

Thursday, Dec. 2, 1880.

Conference met at 9 o'clock, Bishop Keener in the Chair; was opened with religious exercises conducted by Daniel Culbreth.

The Journal of the first day was read and approved.

A communication was received from the Trustees of Davenport Female College: it was read and referred to the Committee on Education.

Question 2nd was taken up,-"Who remain on trial?"

Thomas A. Stone, James O. Guthrie, J. Edwin Thompson, Wm. I. Hull, F. L. Townsend, Francis B. McCall, Wm. L. Cunninggim, Joseph T. Arrington, W. J. Gay, Wm. S. Hales and Franklin J. Hoke, passed the examination of character, were approved by the Examining Committee, and were placed in the class of the second

Calvin G. Little and Samuel L. Douglas, passed the examination of character, and were approved by the Committee of Examination, except on two books each, on which they are required to

stand next year.

On motion of J. W. Lewis, Monday next at 11 o'clock, was set apart for Memorial Services for Bishop Doggett and the members

W. C. Wolfe, of Monroe, proposed to publish the Minutes of this Session on the same conditions as heretofore, and on motion of

B. Craven the proposition was accepted.

On motion of N. H. D. Wilson, the Bishop was requested to draw on the Treasurer of the Conference Trustees in favor of the Chairman of the Joint Board of Finance for \$400.

The Conference then adjourned with the benediction by the

Bishop.

THIRD DAY.

Friday, Dec. 3, 1880.

Conference met at 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Keener in the Chair, and was opened with religious exercises conducted by J. W. Floyd.

The Journal of the second day was read and approved.

A report from Trinity College was received, read, and referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion of E. A. Yates, W. F. Kornegay was elected a Trustee

of Trinity College.

A communication on Temperance, from Rutherford College, was received, and referred to the Committee on Temperance.

Question 20 was called—"Are all the preachers blameless in

their life and official administration?"

All the elders in the remaining seven districts passed the examination of character.

When the name of F. L. Reid was called, Dr Wilson, Presiding Elder of the Raleigh District, announced that Dr. Wm. Closs had placed in his hands complaints against F. L. Reid. The Bishop appointed the following as a Committee of Investigation, viz: T. W. Guthrie, D. R. Bruton, T. A. Boon.

Question 18 was again taken up,-"Who are superannuated?" Daniel Culbreth was placed in the superannuated relation at

his own request.

Rev. Dr. Wiley, District Superintendent for the American Bible Society; Dr. Rondthaler, pastor of the Moravian Church in Salem; and Rev. F. H. Johnson, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Winston, were introduced to the Conference.

When the name of J. P. Simpson was called, it was announced

that he had withdrawn from our Church.

A report from Greensboro Female College was read by Dr. F. M. Jones, the President, and was referred to the Committee on Education.

The Committee on the Bible Cause presented and read their report.

Rev. Dr. Wiley then addressed the Conference on the work.

The report of the Committee was then amended, and adopted as follows:

THE COMMITTEE ON THE BIBLE CAUSE RESPECTFULLY REPORT:-

That in view of the recognized importance of the Bible Cause, and of the position of this Conference, and of our Church to it as a fundamental and cherished interest, there should be greater excritions by ministers and lay members of the Church in aid of the circulation of the Divine Word. And the Committee respectfully asks this Conference to recom-

lation of the Drvine Word. And the Committee respectfully asks this Conference to recommend to our Church Conferences, the appointment in each congregation, of some suitable person—male or female—to search for and report destitutions, with a view to their supply. Your Committee also recommend that each pastor be requested to present the Bible Cause in detail, once every year, to each Church under his care; and in this connection your Committee would express, with emphasis, their regret that so few of the preachers comply with the off repeated desire of the Church, to take up, annually, a collection for this cause. In conclusion, your Committee offer the following resolution and the conference of the Church of the preachest comply with the other conference of the conference of Respectfully submitted: J. T. The Conference then adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

FOURTH DAY.

Saturday, December 4th, 1880.

Conference met at 9 o'clock, A. M., Bishop Keener in the Chair. Religious services by J. B. Alford.

The Journal of the third day was read and approved.

A communication from Rev. J. T. Zorn, Principal of Salem Female Academy, inviting the Conference to visit the Academy, was received and read.

On motion of B. Craven the invitation was accepted, and the

time of the visit was fixed for this evening at 3 o'clock.

Rev. J. J. Lafferty of the Va. Conference and Rev. J. H. Jefferson, formerly a member of this Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

Question 3rd was taken up,-"Who are discontinued?"

On motion of W. H. Bobbitt, S. P. Douglas was discontinued at his own request.

Question 17 was called,-" Who are supernumerary?"

On motion of J. E. Mann, S. M. Davis was placed in the supernumerary relation.

Question 7 was again taken up .- "Who are the deacons of one vear?"

Nereus E. Coltrane, Wm. P. McCorkle, George W. Hardison, Jonathan B. Carpenter and J. T. Lyon passed the examination of character, were approved by the Examining Committee, and were passed to the studies of the fourth year.

Rufus C. Beamon, A. P. Tyer and Nicholas S. Norton, passed the examination of character, but failed to be examined, and were

continued in the studies of third year.

The Committee on Education presented their report No. 1, which was read and adopted as follows:

THE REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION .- No. 1:

The Committee on Education have had under consideration a paper referred to them by the Conference, from the Trustees of Davenport Female College, setting forth, in substance,

the following facts, to-wit

That the action of the last Conference authorizing said Trustees to dispose of the property to a Joint Stock Company, could not be complied with, for the reason that the Deed vesting the title of said property in the Conference, for the benefit of the Church, expressly provides that it shall never be alienated from this Conference expresslip. Also, asking the Conference to assist the Board of Trustees to the amount of \$2,500 to complete the College building burnt a few years ago, and now in process of re-construction.

Your Committee therefore fore recommend that the action of last Conference in this re-

gard be, and the same is hereby rescinded.

Your Committee take pleasure in saying, as expressing the sentiments of this Conference, that we heartily sympathize with the Trustees and friends of Davenport Female Colence, that we heartily sympathize with the Trustees and triends of Davenport Female College, in their efforts to have a good school in their midst; and sincerely regret that at the present we are not in a condition to render them the desired aid. WE, YOUR COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE, BEG LEAVE TO REPORT THE FOLLOWING:-

Whereas, The sale of alcoholic liquors, as a beverage, is not, in any sense, necessary to the well-being of society, but is on the contrary, productive of a great deal of moral and social evil; educating the youth of our land down to drunkenness and other vices; producing poverty and crime throughout the country, and such moral obliquity as greatly retards

ing poverty and ermie throughout the country, and such moral obliquity as grouty setters, the progress of the cause of Christ. And Whereas, moral suasion is inadequate to the removal of this incubus from society, because there are those in every community who will yisit the open saloon, and induce oth-

ers to do likewise, thereby perpetuating patronage and consequently the traffic.

And Whereas, legal prohibition is being resorted to in other States and in portions of
this, and is found to be the most effective means that has ever been adopted for the extirpa-

tion of intemperance; Therefore

RESOLVED 1. That we, the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South, in annual session assembled, do hereby respectfully memorialize the Legislature of North Carolina, at its next session, to cenact a law prohibiting both the manufacture and the sale of alcoholic liquors as a beverage, within the bounds of this State.

2. That we, the members of this Conference, do pledge ourselves, to use all proper efforts to circulate petitions, and procure signers to the same, said petitions to be forwarded to some person to be designated by this body, whose duty it shall be to present them, to-gether with a certified copy of this action, to the Legislature aforesaid.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH EXTENSION:-

The committee to whom was referred a paper from the South Georgia Annual Conference, on Church Extension, have carefully considered the same, and beg leave to submit it as their report. W. S. BLACK, Chairman.

South Georgia Annual Conference, Perry, Ga., Dec. 15th, 1879.

The Committee on Church Extension, appointed at the last Annual Confer-

ence, beg leave to submit the following report:

Your Committee is profoundly impressed that some movement, looking to Church Extension, ought to be inaugurated by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Such a movement has been put into successful and practical operation by several other Evangelical Churches, and notably by the Wesleyans of Great Britain and Ireland, and the Methodist Episcopal Church of these United States. By Church Extension Societies, they have aided weak Churches to build house of worship adapted to the wants of the places where they were respectively located, and have builded others where they were greatly needed and the people too poor to build for themselves. In this way Churches, Methodist and others,

who have tried the plan, have greatly enlarged their borders, and strengthened themselves in communities where they respectively needed strengthening. We are satisfied that much has been lost to our Church because a similar plan has not been adopted by us.

But something in this direction has been done by our Church in our missionary fields, and, as we are told, with good results. Our Mission Board has expended money in building houses of worship where it has established missions. In this way, it is claimed, whatever has been given was wisely appropriated. Indeed, the houses of worship which we have erected in our mission fields were absolutely essential to success.

Now, the same kind of aid which has effected so much in our missions proper will do much to build up our Church in other places not properly missionary ground. Besides, too, such aid is especially needed in our own borders, where thousands have already been expended, and thousands more will be expended to strengthen those who are seeking to supplant us. If we awake to the dangers which threaten us, we will awake to the importance of helping our weak and building up our waste places.

By this means, we not only strengthen ourselves against encroachment upon our work at home, but enable our Mission Board to send more laborers into our missions abroad. For, if money raised for churche strension be money raised for aiding the building of mission Churches abroad, as well as weak Churches at home, much will be zaved to our Mission Board that may be appropriated to the support of more laborers "in the regions beyond."

Your Committee is persuaded that this will be the result. We are convinced that a Church extension movement will not diminish our missionary collections. We believe that, in a very short time, our missionary collections will be largely increased by the Church entansion movement. For this movement will soon increase the number of self-sustaining Churches at home—Churches not only able to support themselves, but to give to the cause of missions. This result we believe, has been witnessed wherever the Church extension plan has been employed. The Church extension policy of the Wesleyans and the Northern Methodists has not taken a dime from their respective missions. Where the most has been contributed for Church extension, there the most has been given for missionary purposes.

Your Committee, however, after careful consideration of the subject submitted to us, does not deem it advisable to recommend any plan of Church extension for our adoption at this time. But while this is so, we do earnestly advise that the initial step in this movement, be taken by the adoption of this report, in hope that, if adopted by this Conference, the attention of our sister Conferences and our next General Conference will be called to it.

Doubtless, the pecuniary difficulties which have, for years, envipromisents, discreases. Doubless, the pecuniary tunctures which fave, for years, environed the institution, may be chargeable with much of its slow and unsatisfactory advancement. But we rejoice with the Conference and the Church in North Carolina that, by the labor and management of Dr. Bobbitt, the agent during the past year, means have been provided for the payment of the debt; and we hope and believe that a better day has not dawned, but is well on in its brightness, when the College shall rise to the full measure of its strengh in spreading sauctified education over these lands.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE.

Your Committee have had, with regard to Greensboro College, but little light or facts to make their report more than a mere formality. The annual report of the President, Dr. Jones, exhibits the gratifying fact that the present session of the Institution is a decided success—better than for many years; and doubtless, if the terrible incubus of debt could be removed from the College, it would, under the splendid scholarship and management

or removed from the College, it would, under the splends concarsing and management of Dr. Jones and his very able faculty, spring forward in a career of usefulness that would gladden the hearts of the Church, and all the friends of female education.

While we find some increase, still there are a large number of charges without parsonages; we would, therefore, respectfully urge both preachers, and people to see to it that every charge has a comfortable and convenient parsonage, and as far as practical, to have with it three or fora scress of land. Therefore:

RESOLVED, That all pastors keep these important interests before their people, and take auch steps as will accomplish the same.

In Memoriam.

REV. ISHAM H. HILL.

Rev. Isham H. Hill, son of the Rev. Micajah Hill, was born in Randolph county, N. C., in the year 1823, and joined the North Carolina Conference at Raleigh, A. D., 1853. He filled the following appointments, to wit: Montgomery, Straits, Portsmouth, Ocracoke and Hatteras, Neuse, Trent, Beaufort Station, Swift Creek Mission, Mattamuskeet, Topsail, Uwharrie, and Frankville, when he was returned to Mattamuskeet. While on this Circuit his health failed, and at the ensuing aunual Conference he was placed on the supernumerary list. For a number of years he sustained this relation to the Conference, but his health growing worse, he was superannuated by the Conference at its session in Salisbury, N. C., in the year 1877.

Bro. Hill was happily married to Miss Eugenia Wahab, of Hyde county, in 1859, who, with a married daughter, survives him. He was a good man, and most appreciated by those who knew him best. He closed a life of usefulness and suffering on the 7th day of May, 1880, at his home near Slades-ville, N. C. He displayed very great patience and resignation during his last illness, and died confidently assuring his friends of his readiness, through Grace, for the home of the

blest in Heaven.

REV. WM. D. LEE, M. D.

Rev. Wm. D. Lee, M. D., was born in Union county, S. C., Nov. 17, 1833; joined the M. E. Church, South, in 1851; obtained religion 1854; was licensed to preach in 1864, and joined the S. C. Conference at Cheraw, 1869; was transferred to the N. C. Conference in 1870, in which he remained, a faithful. earnest, and useful minister of Jesus Christ, till his death, which occurred in Shelby, N. C., September 20th, 1880. 1870, he was appointed to Lincoluton Circuit; 1871, and Rutherford; 1873-'74-'75 and '76, Pineville; 1877, he was supernumerary; in '78, he was appointed to Concord Circuit; 1879. to Shelby and Kings Mountain, where he labored faithfully till about the first of September, when he was taken sick, from which he lingered about two weeks, and passed over the river, to join the ransomed gone before. His reason, at times, was entirely dethroned, for several days previous to his death; yet in his lucid moments, he gave unmistakable evidence of his strong faith in God; would get happy, and shout God's praises. In the family, he was firm and affectionate; in the social circle. genial and pleasant; in the pulpit, faithful and efficient; in all the relations of life, he was possessed of the deepest humility. He had a poor opinion of himself, yet he was a great man. fact, Dr. Lee was no ordinary man, for he was full of power, and the Holy Ghost; an excellent preacher, his preparations for the pulpit were thorough. He analyzed, compared and expounded Scriptural truth, as if always impressed with the divine injunction: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth;" consequently, he gave each their portion in due season. In his pulpit efforts he labored not to tickle the ear, or please the fancy, with high sounding words or rhetorical flourish, falling like the perfect concord of harp strings, softly touched with delicate fingers; -but in obedience to the divine command, with clear conceptions of Divine Truth, and aided by the Divine Spirit, he unsheathed the sword, and lifting it in tne face of the enemies of the Cross, demanded their surrender in the name of his Master, "praying and ye reconciled Christ stead be to God. in perhaps, Some of his last sermons were. the powerful of his life, for they left their impress upon many hearts and minds. His heart was in the work; he loved to tell of Gethsemane's Garden, and a Saviour's Cross; a bleeding victim, and a risen Prince; of consequent death, and a vacant grave; of a victor's wreath, and a monarch's crown, worn by ransomed Spirits in that Heavenly land. Like the great Apostle, he gloried in nothing, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. He had a desire to go fresh from the field of conflict

to glory when his earthly pilgrimage ended, and so he did. Only two weeks before his death, he preached his last sermon at Kings Mountain, and while proclaiming the Truth of the Gospel, from his favorite text, "For moto live is Christ, and to die is gain," he became very happy, and appeared to stand just between two worlds, with his face lit up with a Heavenly smile, as if to say, like St. Paul, "I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart and be with Christ." No doubt then he realized more than a mere foretaste of Heavenly joys, as he was standing so near the Pearly Gate of the Eternal City, and almost in hearing of the rippling of the crystal stream, and the melody of Angel harp-strings, softly touched with Heavenly fingers. Hearing him shout God's praises then, was akin to hearing Angels whisper, and seeing his face while in such ecstatic joy, was like catching a glimpse inside the veil and beholding the scenes that enrapture immortal vision.

But, Dr. Wm. D. Lee is gone-

"The voice at midnight came; he started up to hear; A mortal arrow pierced his frame: he fell; but felt no fear."

REV. IRA T. WYCHE.

Rev. Ira T. Wyche, the subject of this sketch, was born in Brunswick County, Va., in the year 1816, and died at LaGrange, N. C., in the month of October, 1880, and was sixty-four years old.

His parents, James and Amelia Wyche, were both members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and trained up their children in the fear of God. They removed to North Carolina and settled in Granville County, where they raised up a numerous

family of children.

The religious training of Ira T. Wyche, led him, in early life, to embrace religion and join the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was blessed with the advantages of a liberal education, and while young his mind was deeply, impressed that

it was his duty to preach the Gospel.

At the age of twenty-one years, he entered the traveling connection of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and was received into the North Carolina Conference on probation at its first session, which was held in the town of Greensboro, N. C., in the year 1838. He stood his annual examination four years, with credit to himself, and became a full member of the Conference. Bro. Wyche was acceptable and useful in his various fields of labor as a pastor, and also as a minister of the Gospel; he had many seals to his ministry. He traveled circuits, filled stations, was Presiding Elder for several years, and was, at one time,

Agent for the American Bible Society; he was also Secretary of the Conference for several years, and in all these relations he was acceptable and useful; he was literally a man of one work.

and that work was to do good, and to save souls.

At a suitable age he was happily married to Miss Martha Pierce, of Halifax County, N. C., an amiable Christian lady. After the year 1850, he filled the following appointments, viz: New Berne Station, 1 year; Person Circuit, 2 years; Rockingham Circuit, 1 year; Presiding Elder on the New Berne District, 4 years; on the Washington District, 4 years; on the Salisbury District, 4 years; Henderson Circuit, 2 years; Forsythe Circuit, 1 year; Bible Agent, 2 years; Roanoke Circuit, 2 years; Robeson Circuit, 2 years; and Albemarle Circuit, 2 years.

At the N. C. Conference, held last year, in the town of Wilson, N. C., he was appointed to LaGrange Circuit. On this charge he labored in feeble health, until the month of October, when his trials on earth were suddenly ended by death.

He retired to bed in usual health, and on retiring, remarked to his wife, "that he would have a comfortable night's rest;" but he was found dead the next morning! having slept the

sleep of death.

Thus passed away from the toils of earth, to the joys of Heaven, a good, and holy man. He was a faithful pastor, a good preacher, and an able expounder of the Holy Scriptures. He went in and out before his brethren of the N.C. Conference for the space of forty-three years—his character was unblemished. He leaves a bereaved widow and children, and his brethren of the Conference to mourn their loss; but they have one tie less to bind their affections to earth, and one cord more to draw their souls to Heaven.

The number of Sunday Schools within the bounds of this Conference is 743, a decrease from last year of 28.

The number of 8cholars is 38,933, an increase of 1749. There is also an increase of 146 volumes in hibraries, and an increase in value of libraries to the amount of \$419.

The Board of Mission's reported as follows:

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

The following Domestic Missions were served in the bounds of the Conference for the year 1880. They are twenty in number, as follows:

Calvary Mission, on Charlotte District, has 2 local preachers; 112 white members. It reports 3 infants and 5 adults baptized; 1 Sunday School with 11 teachers, 113 pupils, and 160 volumes in the library, valued at \$40; also, 1 church, valued at \$1500. It paid \$4 to the Bishop's fund; \$25 to the P. E.; \$395 on Pastor's Salary; \$12 on Conference Collections; \$10 for Foreign and \$7 for Domestic Missions; \$62.81 for Sunday Schools; \$38.25 for building and repairing Church and Parsonage, and \$63.15 for incidentals. This Mission will hereafter be self-sustaining.

The Newberne District has-

Straits Mission that reports 1 local preacher; 210 members; 11 children and 3 adults baptized. It has 4 Sunday Schools; 15 teachers and 150 papils; 200 volumes in libraries, worth \$25, and 2 churches worth \$800. It paid \$2 to Bishop's fund, \$14 to P. E. and \$132.50 towards the salary of its pastor.

The Swift Creek Mission, has 3 local preachers, and 170 members; 1 Sunday School with 5 teachers and 30 pupils. There are 2 churches worth \$800. There was raised on the salary of the pas-

tor \$28 80.

There is no report from the Pamlico Mission, though \$50 were contributed for the support of that Mission by Dr. J. Bryan who is not a member of our church.

Pitt Mission has 1 local preacher; 20 members; 2 adults were

baptized during the year. It has I church worth \$300.

Robinsonville, 6 members; 2 infants baptized, and no collections. Portsmouth, Ocracoke and Hatteras makes no report.

The Shelby District has-

Columbus Mission which reports 2 local preachers; 144 white members; 2 infants and 20 adults baptized; 2 Sunday Schools; 10 teachers and 96 pupils; 1 parsonage worth \$550; and 4 churches worth \$500. It paid to Bishop's fund \$1; to P. E. \$3; to the pastor \$153; to Conference Collection \$2, to Foreign Missions \$7.20; to Domestic Missions \$5.00; to Sunday Schools, \$4.60; and for building and repairing churches and parsonages, \$200.

Upper Broad River reports 131 members; 5 infants and 1 adult

baptized; 2 Sunday Schools; 12 teachers, and 75 pupils; 4 churches worth \$1,000. It paid \$1 to the Bishop's fund; \$5 to the P. E.; \$35 on the pastor's salary; \$1.85 for Foreign Missions; \$2 for Sunday Schools; and \$150. for building and repairing churches. &c.

Cherry Mountain has 2 local preachers; 375 members; 33 infants and 5 adults baptized; 5 Sunday Schools; 25 teachers; 200 pupils; 100 volumes in the libraries, worth \$15; and 6 churches worth \$2,000. It paid \$5 on Bishop's fund; \$5 to the P. E.; \$235 to the pastor; \$15.00 for Sunday Schools, and \$425 for building and repairs.

South Mountain has 2 local preachers; 240 members; 2 infants and 2 adults were baptized. There are 2 Sunday Schools, with 6 teachers and 90 pupils, and 3 churches worth \$100. It paid to P. E. \$1.65; to the pastor, \$29; for Sunday Schools, \$1, and for build-

ing &c., \$40.

On the Wilmington District we have-

The Coharrie Mission that reports 1 local preacher; 174 members; 3 infants and 1 adult baptized; 7 Sunday Schools; 36 teachers, and 230 pupils; and 20 volumes in the libraries, worth \$15. There were paid \$2 to the Bishop's Fund; \$2.70 to the P. E.; \$135.02 to the pastor; \$5.25 to the Conference Collection, \$2.65 to the Foreign, and \$2.65 to the Domestic Missions; \$3 to the poor; \$5 to Sunday Schools, and \$400 to building, repairs &c.

There is the New River Mission on this District that has not

sent up a report for the year.

The Waccamaw Mission, on the same District, reports 1 local preacher; 283 white and 3 colored members; 2 infants and 2 adults baptized; 4 Sunday Schools, 24 teachers and 140 pupils, and 4 churches, worth \$1435.

From the Salisbury District, we have the Roaring River Mission, that reports \$50.45 collected on the pastor's salary; \$5 for Sunday Schools, and \$400 for building and other purposes.

On this District, there is the Hunting Creek Mission, reports 32 members; 3 infants and 3 adults baptized; 4 Sunday Schools, having 21 teachers and 167 pupils; also, 2 churches worth \$300.

This District has also, the Pilot Mountain Mission, that re-

ports \$64.69 collected on the pastor's salary.

On the Fayetteville District, Lillington Mission reports 156 white members; 6 children and 4 adults baptized; and 3 churches worth \$750. It has paid \$115.16 on its pastor's salary.

Dan River Mission, on the Greensboro District, makes no re-

port.

Hillsboro, on the Hillsboro District, reports 1 local preacher, 58 white and 1 colored member; 2 infants and 1 adult baptized; 1 Sunday School, with 6 teachers and 25 members; 800 volumes in the library, worth \$200, and 1 church worth \$3,000. It has paid \$5.50 to Bishop's Fund, \$21.92 to the P. E.; \$160.82 to the pastor for salary; \$21.50 to the Conference Collection; \$13.20 to the For-

eign, and \$11 to the Domestic Missions; \$3.50 to Sunday Schools. and \$36.75 incidental expenses.

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
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
