COUNTRY CHURCH EDITION

The Conference held in Fayetteville, N. C., a year ago, adopted the following resolution:

Inasmuch as the year 1926 marks the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the first Methodist circuit in North Carolina and since it is to be the first year when the new funds from the beneficent gift of Mr. James B. Duke will be available for use in the country church buildings, it seems highly fitting that the two Annual Conferences of the state should take special notice of these facts in some suitable and uniform manner. Therefore, be it resolved:

First: That the North Carolina Conference unite with the Western North Carolina Conference in an appropriate celebration of the anniversary.

Second: That the celebration consist of setting apart the 1926 Journal of the Conference as a "Rural Church Number," and that this special number contain the data usually recorded, with an additional statistical table to include reports of each church within the bounds of the Conference.

Third: That "Rural Church Number" be printed on the cover page and that a preface be inserted within to set forth the reasons for such a number.

Fourth: That the Historical Society be requested to select some subject for the 1926 paper that will be in harmony with the celebration.

Complying with the above action of the Conference, this issue is called the Rural Church Number, and Statistical Table No. 5, found in another part of the Minutes, gives interesting facts about the Rural Churches of the Conference.

APPENDIX

BOARD OF MISSIONS—REPORT NO. 1

Our last General Conference enacted that, "during the months of January and February a special missionary cultivation campaign shall be conducted throughout the whole Church in every congregation, during which each member of the Church shall be given an opportunity to make a freewill offering for maintaining the General Work of the Board, which freewill offering shall be over and above the missionary assessments for the year and shall not include the income from Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues; provided, that all moneys so raised shall be directed to the Board of Missions, Section of General Work."

Regarding the method of carrying out this campaign of cultivation and taking the freewill offering from our people, the General Conference provided that "the Missionary Committee shall conduct an every-member canvass in every congregation to secure a freewill offering for missions," and, further, that the goal, in this special appeal, shall be to secure at least one million dollars for maintenance each year of the quadrennium over and above the income from assessment, Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues. Since this is the plan of our Church to raise the mission money the utmost cooperation of all our agencies becomes a necessity. We, however, consider it a high privilege and an opportunity in which we rejoice. The world calls for Christ as never before. The world needs Christ as never before. In no moment of history has more critical consequences hinged upon our giving Christ to the nations.

No discriminating Christian can look out over the world today without being stirred by the call which the conditions make. To falter now would not only be disloyalty—not only sin—but it would mean certain disaster to the whole structure of society.

Resolved, therefore, that this Annual Conference hereby pledge its hearty and energetic support to the plan outlined by the General Conference and that we enter heartily into every feature of the campaign of missionary cultivation during the months of January and February.

Resolved, that we accept and agree to raise an allotment of sixty thousand dollars by means of an every-member canvass for a freewill offering, our share of the million dollars asked by the General Conference for missions.

Resolved, that we request the Presiding Elders to fix the dates and places for their district missionary institutes as provided in

the Discipline, before the adjournment of this session of the Conference.

BOARD OF MISSIONS—REPORT NO. 2

The Board of Missions submits this report with the sincere regret that it has not been able to grant all the requests made upon it, but it is truly thankful that by means of the Duke Fund, and by the payment of the assessments upon the Conference, it has been able to maintain generally the appropriations of last year.

It is with apprehension, however, that your Board looks upon this budget system as now conducted in providing for our benevolent causes. There has been an appreciable tendency during the past few years to underestimate the importance, the ministry, and the necessity of the benevolent work in the Methodist itinerancy. In many of our charges the laymen have considered the minister's salary the main item of importance and have consequently failed to raise the benevolent funds and thus have crippled the work of the Church.

Your Board concurs with the intent and spirit back of the Lay Activities movement, to place the financial obligations of the Church upon the laymen, but your Board is also apprised of the necessity of the ministers to hold a position of leadership, counsel, and inspiration with the laymen in the fulfillment of the financial burdens of the Church. Your Board, therefore, earnestly requests that the preachers realize the obligations that the Benevolent Causes make upon them and that full co-operation be given to the laymen in order that these moneys may be paid in full. If financial victory for the benevolent causes of Methodism is attained it will be attained only through sympathetic and intelligent co-operation of pastor and people.

Your Board nominates Rev. F. S. Love as Conference Missionary Secretary to serve without salary.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

Christian Education Movement

According to the action of the recent General Conference, the Church is allowed the year 1927 to close up the subscriptions of the Christian Education Movement. The months of September and October 1927 are suggested as the time of special effort in the North Carolina Conference. The Bishop, the Presiding Elders and pastors are requested to give this cause prominence in their Conferences and institutes during the year.

Duke University

We rejoice in the increased growth of Duke University. During the last scholastic year the number of students enrolled was 1396, with an additional number of 1143 in the Summer School. We note that in buildings and grounds and money for building the institution has holdings amounting to \$6,818,345, and an endowment equal to \$27,500,000. The formal opening of the new School of Religion took place on November 9th, last. An excellent program was observed, and many visitors from other institutions were present to bring good wishes to this new and most important School. This marks the first of the departments in the new University, and it is most fitting that it should be of a religious nature. Developments will necessarily be slow for a few years, and our people are asked to be very patient during the time of construction.

Greensboro College

We are glad to note a prosperous year in this institution. Three heads of departments have been added. The faculty numbers twenty-five; the enrollment of the student body is 374. We have there a property valuation of \$703,801 and an endowment of \$302,808. We recommend that the Conference endorse the continued campaign to raise at least \$500,000 on endowment. This college, being one of our oldest and most useful institutions, deserves the support and patronage of all our people.

Louisburg College

This college is passing through a period of rapid growth. Louisburg is a Junior College and does most excellent work. The student body has more than doubled in three years, numbering for year just passed 240 students, with 73 graduates. It has a faculty of twenty-one. The value of the property is \$469,000 with an endowment of \$100,000. The Wright Building has been completed and is occupied; the Franklin County Building is half finished. The object of the management is to provide adequately for 500 students, the maximum number fixed by the trustees. The college would like to have the support of our people in increasing both the equipment and the endowment.

Carolina College

We regret that Carolina College was not able to open last fall. The reason was that the President resigned in the summer. When the trustees canvassed the situation in August, they found it too late to secure a President and faculty, so they decided not to open the doors for this year. However, the prospects for a larger student

body last September were brighter than for many years. The Board recommends the following: That a commission be appointed to consider the whole case of Carolina College and report its findings to the Board of Trustees of that college not later than February 1st, 1927, and that the trustees of said college be instructed to act according to the advice of this commission. We recommend that this commission be composed of W. A. Stanbury, H. C. Smith, Graham Woodard, Robert Ruark, and Willis Smith. We recommend further that the Conference authorize the trustees of Carolina College to issue bonds for an amount not exceeding the total indebtedness of the college, which is now approximately \$30,000.

Chapel Hill Church

We recommend that a commission composed of Claiborne Carr, W. A. Stanbury, and W. W. Peele, be appointed to act with a similar commission of the Western North Carolina Conference and with a Joint Commission of the Chapel Hill Methodist Church to investigate the advisability of establishing a state-wide Board of Control; and, further, that W. A. Stanbury be named as one of the directors of the School of Religion at Chapel Hill. We ask the General Board of Education to donate the sum of \$1,000 to the support of a student pastor at the University of North Carolina.

In the Elizabeth City District, Perquimans County, New Hope was granted a donation of \$400 when the charge raises \$400; Plymouth was granted a donation of \$500 on condition that the General Board make a donation of \$2,000.

To Parsonages: Kitty Hawk, a donation of \$250; Stumpy Point, a donation of \$300; Perquimans, a donation of \$300 when it clears the debt; Parkton, a loan of \$1,000 and a donation of \$500 when the Church raises \$1,500; Straits, a donation of \$300; Creedmore, a loan of \$500 and a donation of \$500 when it clears debt; Grimesland, a donation of \$200; Seaboard, a loan of \$1,000 and a donation of \$300 when it clears debt.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board submits the following report:

Leadership and Teacher Training

Each year shows a decided advance in our training program. In the number of training schools conducted, students enrolled, credits issued, and Sunday Schools represented there has been a steady increase from year to year. This year 19 Standard schools were conducted as compared to 18 Standard schools last year, and 32 Cokesbury schools as compared to 9 last year.

In summary, we find that a total of 2,888 training awards were issued this year in the North Carolina Conference.

Attention of Small Schools

For several years we have been devoting much attention to our small Sunday Schools. Especially so has this been during the year just closed. For instance, 32 Cokesbury schools were conducted in country Churches and small towns and villages, serving 122 Sunday Schools. Not only so, but our Standard training schools ministered to more rural schools than town and city schools. Of the 266 Sunday Schools represented in our Standard training schools this year, over 175 of them were rural Sunday Schools and over 200 of them were small Sunday Schools in rural communities and small towns.

Programs of Work

Not only in training but also in that equally essential phase of our program, namely, the placing, promoting, and checking of the

Programs of Work, have we made progress during the year. A total of 364 schools have adopted a Program of Work.

Recruiting and Evangelism

During the year 1925 our Conference gained 3,870 in Sunday School enrollment, and 3,884 pupils joined the Church. Over the period of the past quadrennium our records show a net gain of 13,048 in enrollment, as compared to an increase of 10,351 in Church members. For this period 15,326 Sunday School pupils joined the Church.

Recommendations

For the continuation and advancement of the work committed to us, the following are submitted as recommendations:

1. That Standard Training Schools be conducted in communities guaranteeing an enrollment that will make it possible to issue a minimum of 50 certificates of credit.

2. That Cokesbury Training Schools be conducted, where practicable, in communities not already served by Standard Training Schools.

3. That we ask local Churches to assume greater responsibility for providing trained leaders and teachers and to conduct local training classes and encourage correspondence work.

4. That we continue our activities in promoting Programs of Work and seek to make them operative throughout the Conference.

5. That we co-operate heartily with the General Sunday School Board in its Church-wide Sunday School membership campaign.

6. That special stress be laid upon the matter of evangelism in the Sunday School and that we recommend to the pastors and Sunday School officers and teachers the plan outlined by the General Sunday School Board.

7. That we heartily approve and recommend the observance of Childrens' Week in as many of our Churches as practicable.

8. That we ask all our Churches to observe Sunday School Day with program and offering, the offering to be sent to our Treasurer as required by the Discipline.

9. That we express our gratitude for the widespread observance of monthly Missionary Day and request all schools to observe the day next year and devote the offering to the Dual Extension Special.

10. That we hold our fourth annual Conference-wide Conference in First Church, Rocky Mount, March 30-April 1, 1927.

11. That Rev. W. C. Martin, Professor R. N. Wilson, and Rev. J. H. Lanning be elected as Sunday School Board representatives on the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School.

The Sunday School Board is pleased to announce the re-employment of Mr. L. L. Gobel as Conference Superintendent of Sunday

School Work at \$3,500 per annum, and Miss Georgia S. Keene as Conference Elementary Superintendent at \$2,000 per annum. Due to the resignation of the incumbent, the position of Conference Extension Secretary is temporarily vacant and remains to be filled.

All of our employed workers have labored faithfully and effectively in the promotion of the work which we have committed to them, and we bespeak for them the continued co-operation of all of us that our work may continue to go forward.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

Your Epworth League Board submits the following report:

The year preceding has shown growth and progress throughout the League work and world. The General Conference again endorsed the work of the Epworth League, and expressed its hearty approval of its policies. Proposals to merge the Epworth League were accorded with little consideration. Legislative changes distinctively advantageous to the League were made, increasing its purpose and enlarging its scope.

The most encouraging phase is the progress of the League idea in the mind of the Church, and the real interest and loyalty of an increasing number of our pastors. Specific results are seen in part in the statistical report of the work of the year.

The quadrennium just concluded shows a total of 8,845 chapters and 267,289 members—a gain for the year of 573 chapters and 11,593 members, exhibiting for the four years 515% increase in chapters and 393% increase in members. This increase is about six times that of the Church. Our North Carolina Conference shows a gain of 40 chapters and 1,657 members for the year.

The Summer Assembly at Louisburg College broke all former records in Leadership Training and total of awards. There were 197 Christian Culture certificates, 12 Christian Culture diplomas, one title of Efficient Epworthian, and one Master's degree.

The Epworth League Board rejoices in the measures taken by this session of Conference following the resolutions adopted at the last Assembly to purchase and preserve the Green Hill House near Louisburg, where the first Annual Conference of American Methodism was held by Bishops Coke and Asbury, 140 years ago.

Commendation and thanks are due our Conference League President, Thomas McM. Grant, the District Secretaries, and other League officers and teachers for their free and voluntary service in the

Assembly and institutes held during the year. These are the most vital factors of chief value in the promotion of the League work.

We recommend to all our Churches and preachers a more serious effort to approximate the disciplinary requirement of organizing Epworth Leagues in all our Churches. We are not yet awake fully to the worthwhileness of the League. This is our growing conviction.

We recommend that all Epworth League officers be publicly installed and proper recognition made to further the general interest and specific loyalty of our promising young people as leaders in process of training.

We urge upon all pastors and Leagues the proper observance of our League calendar of the year and a consistent effort toward the Standard of Efficiency.

Mention should be made of the Methodist Young People's Convention at Memphis—the seeing out the old and ushering in the new and better year and world to be. In this great Convention was a mighty demonstration of spiritual life and intelligent loyalty to the best traditions of our beloved Church.

Of greatest promise to the League work, we think to be the Church-wide League program of the year to hold a Young People's Revival in an effort to bring our young people in vital relation to Jesus Christ, and to train in personal work in winning others and all for Christ.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

After four years of studious attention to those important interests committed to our care, we are firmly fixed in the conviction that they richly deserve hearty support by our entire Church membership, not only because of the intrinsic merit of all our publications, but also because our people surely need the beneficial effects of reading just such literature as we offer. This need is the more emphasized by reason of the shameful fact that vast quantities of damaging reading is openly spread before would-be readers. Besides being needed as a counteractant of poisonous publications, every department of the work of our beloved Church would be greatly strengthened and made of far larger service by its free and habitual use. And the young people, in particular, ought to be trained regularly to read Christian literature, that is, if we expect them to become intelligent laborers in God's vineyard.

Publishing House

Every report from our publishing agents is more assuring than the previous one, and in this there is reason for general rejoicing. Let our pastors, both by precept and example, persistently persuade the people perseveringly to patronize the branch of the Publishing House most convenient. To this end it would be wise to make our congregations wise as to the application of the profits on our literature. The Christian Advocate and The Methodist Review are maintaining high standards, and their circulation is entirely too small.

We especially commend our publishing agents for spending nearly \$10,000 in foreign language translations and publications, and rejoice with them in the prosperity which distributes more and more every year to the Conference claimants. No enterprise of the Church is so old as the Publishing House, and it improves with age, vigorously promoting those interests that are vitally related to the Church's growth in power and usefulness.

North Carolina Christian Advocate

The heavy loss in subscribers this year must have some real cause; but whatever that may be this fact is regrettable, and we sanguinely hope that it can be changed to gain within the next twelve months. The Methodist Board of Publication now holds assets to the amount of nearly \$139,000.00, which includes an increase over 1925 of \$6,558.26. However, this increase would have been much greater had the vast number of unpaid renewals been collected. We heartily recommend a thorough campaign from January 15th for all possible renewals, and not fewer than 2,550 new subscribers, apportioned to Districts as follows, viz.:

This recommendation will appear extremely modest when it is known that it means not quite three new subscribers to each one hundred Church members. Of course, however, the plan will fail should the pastors not give, at the least, their full moral support to it. In the prosecution of this good work the Business Manager and the Editor may be commanded for assistance.

Our splendid Conference organ is soon to have a new home in Greensboro, as all arrangements have been made to dispose of the old property for an advantageous consideration, and to build more largely on a new site, and that without incurring any indebtedness.

We respectfully recommend that Bishop Mouzon re-appoint as Business Manager Rev. T. A. Sikes, whose salary is understood to be \$4,500.00.

Let our pastors and people show abundant appreciation of all our superior literature by cheerfully and constantly giving it free and full circulation, and all their earnest efforts will be justified by the harvest.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Being conscious of the organized and persistent effort of the liquor forces to have repealed the Volstead Act, followed by the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment,

We, therefore, urge all our people to support the cause of prohibition by financial aid and the practice of temperance, sobriety, and total abstinence.

We note that the courts of our commonwealth are granting divorces for various causes and with alarming frequency. We, therefore, urge the next General Assembly to enact divorce laws to prohibit divorce for any but the one scriptural cause—marital infidelity. We name as a committee, Hon. Josephus Daniels and Revs. M. T. Plyler and W. A. Stanbury to urge the necessary modification of our present divorce laws.

We further recommend that the above committee co-operate with the Federated Council of North Carolina Women in their proposed legislative program.

REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

We, the Orphanage Committee, submit the following report:

The Committee is glad to state that the Orphanage has experienced a gracious revival during the year, conducted by Rev. W. A. Stanbury, assisted by Rev. W. H. Brown, pastor of Jenkins Memorial Church. As a result of this revival about seventy were added to the Church. At the close of the revival all the children (with the exception of two or three small children) were members of the Church.

On account of the financial condition of our Orphanage the Superintendent recommended that a special finance committee, composed of five members of the Board of Trustees, be appointed to ascertain the facts regarding the financial situation. On the investigation of this committee the following facts were found, which we deem wise to incorporate in this report, that the Conference may know the real situation:

"After going into the matter very fully and carefully we are constrained to believe that the essential thing is to acquaint our people with the facts as to the income of the institution, the sources from which it comes with an appeal to their generosity.

"We are constrained to believe that if there is one institution of the Church in the North Carolina Conference that has an universal appeal to the membership of the Church, that institution is the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh. The attitude of many of our people toward it has been liberal since its organization—many have made it the object of special gifts. The source and amount of our income for the year 1924 was as follows: Assessment was \$39,676.50; paid on assessment, \$34,928.50; received from Specials, \$46,470.63; total received from all sources for the year 1924, \$81,399.13. The sources and amount of our income for the year 1925 was as follows: assessment was \$41,540.70; paid on assessment, \$33,067.85; received from specials, \$33,070.62; total received from all sources for the year 1925, \$66,138.47.

"The interest from our \$98,000 endowment fund for the years 1924 and 1925 was applied to the indebtedness on buildings. There was nothing received from the Duke Foundation during the year 1924 and 1925. You will see, therefore, that our income from the year 1925 from these two sources of receipts was \$15,261.66 less than for the year 1924.

"The budget covering the necessary expenses of operations amounts to \$82,000 annually.

"From the news stories published at the time of the Duke bequest we feel that our people have been misled as to the amount we will receive from this fund, and we fear that many people who would

otherwise make donations to the Orphanage concluded that we had been taken care of by this fund. During the present year we have received from the Foundation \$3,240. It is impossible at this time to state whether the regular income from the Duke Foundation will be more or less than this each year. The terms of trust imposed on the Trustees the apportionment of the income among all the Orphanages of the two Carolinas, white and colored, upon a per capita basis."

We recommend that the Churches visited by the Orphanage Singing Class, take a freewill offering, and that this offering be applied to "Specials" and not on the 10 per cent assessment.

We further recommend that since the Orphanage Finance Committee of the Trustees have urged the Superintendent to solicit Specials from all the Churches, Sunday Schools and friends of the Home; in as much as the Superintendent has sent to every pastor and Sunday School Superintendent a sufficient number of envelopes and Orphanage literature, we recommend that said Churches and Sunday Schools make a Thanksgiving offering on some Sunday near Thanksgiving Day to remain as a Special to meet the urgent and immediate needs of the Orphanage.

We also recommend that the Assessment of ten per cent remain as formerly, and that it be put back into the Conference Budget.

We recommend that Rev. A. S. Barnes be re-appointed as Superintendent for the ensuing year at a salary of \$4,000, as last year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Assuming the responsibility committed by the General Conference to the Board of Lay Activities for leadership in the promotion of Christian Stewardship, man's work through the Wesley Brotherhood, and the full payment of the benevolent assessments, we resolve:

1. To organize a Christian Stewardship Committee in each local Church for the training of this Committee itself and the other Church officials in the principles and practice of Christian Stewardship as a part of a program of stewardship education to reach the entire membership, and to this end we urge every lay leader to set a worthy example as a Christian steward and be an organizer and promoter of this doctrine.

2. To promote in a business-like and aggressive way the organization of Wesley Brotherhoods throughout the Conference for fellowship, personal evangelism, and all phases of men's work. The

month including and following World Brotherhood Sunday in November (November 28), has been designated as Brotherhood month. We would urge that ministers and laymen alike give the most loyal support to the Brotherhood movement.

3. To dedicate our time, talents, and possessions in co-operation with our Bishop, Presiding Elders, and pastors to the task of securing one hundred per cent payment of all the benevolent assessments, and we call upon District, Charge, and Church Boards of Lay Activities to do likewise. We recommend that a meeting of the Conference Board of Lay Activities, the Bishop and Presiding Elders, and the Conference Commission on Benevolences be held as early in the Conference year as practicable to consider plans for the attainment of the one hundred per cent goal. We would call attention to the fact that May 1st has been fixed by the General Commission on Benevolences as the date by which every Conference, District, Charge, and Church should complete the every-member canvass and provide for the benevolences in cash and subscription with a safe margin, and at that time they are to report the results of the canvass.

4. To give the widest possible circulation to the Methodist Layman, the official organ of the General Board of Lay Activities and the Wesley Brotherhood. Each lay leader, Conference District, Circuit and Church has a definite responsibility for its circulation.

We nominate Dr. W. P. Few for Conference Lay Leader.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION

The Joint Commission of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church, in North Carolina, submits the following report:

1. In order to promote fellowship and bring mutual benefit to the two Churches we would reiterate the recommendations set forth in the four items in our report made one year ago, namely, that there may be, as opportunity affords, an interchange of pulpits by ministers of the two branches of Methodism and an interchange of preachers in revival work.

Also that continuous effort be made for readjustment where the two Churches overlap in rural districts and to avoid crowding or overlapping where new preaching places are being established in towns and cities, and that the Presiding Elders involved and the Presidents of the Methodist Protestant Conference constitute a Board of Mediation to act with the parties interested in making the adjustment.

2. We would further report that at the annual meeting of the Joint Commission recently held, Dr. W. P. Few and Revs. A. G. Dixon, M. T. Plyler and R. C. Stubbins were elected a commission to study the problem of co-operation and readjustment of rural Church work in territory where the two Churches overlap, this committee to report to the next annual meeting of the Joint Commission, making recommendation as to a basis of operation.

3. On motion it was agreed that the term of office of two of the six members representing each the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church, should expire each year, the respective annual Conferences to elect the successors of the members whose terms thus expire.

Dr. W. P. Few is nominated to succeed himself.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMISSION ON CHURCH BUILDING AT CHAPEL HILL

Your Commission on Church Building at Chapel Hill submits the following report:

The task of building an adequate Methodist Church at Chapel Hill is practically completed. The Church with its appointments

for worship, for educational and social purposes stands to witness for itself. One of the controlling aims has been to provide an auditorium that would inspire the spirit of reverence and worship as well as accommodate comfortably those who come to pray and to be ministered unto. This purpose has been faithfully maintained by both the architect and the builders.

The religious, social and educational demands that have been made upon the Church this fall have proved the wisdom of the undertaking, and clearly indicate that within a few years the educational unit will have to be provided.

We report with satisfaction that as a culmination of the Church building program by the denominations represented at Chapel Hill a School of Religion has been established by the local Churches and the Young Men's Christian Association of the University. Through the recommendation of Bishop Mouzon and others, Rev. Mims Thornburgh Workman has been chosen as acting dean of the school and professor of Biblical History and Literature.

The number and the personnel of the students enrolled in the courses now offered are indicative of a much larger enrollment when credit shall be allowed by the University for work done in this school.

We are aware that with the opportunities now offered and the enlarged plans for more intensive and inclusive work on the part of the Chapel Hill Methodist Church for the Methodist students attending the University an obligation is upon the Methodist Conferences of North Carolina to create a permanent organization to hold and to control the Church property at Chapel Hill and to foster, encourage and develop the work that is in process for the religious and spiritual culture of these students. To this end we recommend that some such organization be created.

That this matter may be given due consideration we recommend that it be referred to the Board of Education for consideration and recommendations.

We understand that when such organization shall be effected the services of this Commission shall have been completed, and its duties discharged.

Whereas, on this annual Armistice Day our thoughts are inevitably turned towards the innumerable tragedies with which war has filled the world, and,

Whereas, poignant memories of the great world war with its waste of uncounted billions of wealth and its destruction of uncounted millions of human beings come to us today, and,

Whereas, we come in reverent commemoration of our American soldiers who unselfishly offered all and gave all to bring the war and all wars to an end, and,

Whereas, our hearts yearn to see a world in which men "beat their swords into plough-shares, and their spears into pruning-hooks," a world in which "nation shall not lift up sword against nation; neither shall they learn war any more," and,

Whereas, in the words of Lord Bryce, "If we do not destroy war, war will destroy us," and,

Whereas, manifestations of military force or of the military spirit seriously hinder the cause of Christ in all foreign fields, bring America under suspicion abroad, and increase the ever-present danger of the recurrence of world-wide war,

Therefore, be it resolved:

1. That in the name of Jesus Christ we protest against the growth of militarism in America, and against an increase in armaments of any kind which may be used in the prosecution of war.

2. That we condemn the introduction of compulsory military training in high schools or anywhere else; that we condemn the policy of military training of any character in schools operated and controlled by the Church; and that we call upon all institutions of our Church which have such training to discontinue it.

3. That while we believe that the Church should teach the patriotic support of the State, we also believe that the Church should never become the agent of the government in any activity alien to the spirit of Christ. We are dedicated to peace and the promotion of peace, and we will not, as a Church, undertake at any time to sanctify international strife and slaughter by asking God's blessing upon it. We look to the responsible statesmen of a Christian country to conduct the public business along those lines of justice and reason which will not lead to war.

4. That since war is everything that the Christian religion and Christian morals are not, we call upon the preachers of this Conference to preach against the spirit of national jealousy, preparedness, and jingoism, and to proclaim the spirit of Jesus for international affairs as well as for individual life.

CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

We, the Committee appointed by the Presiding Elders of the Conference to formulate plans for the entertainment of the Annual Conference at its annual assemblage, wish to present the following:

First: With a feeling of profound respect for the Conference

in its action already taken levying an assessment of \$5,000 on account of the entertainment of the Conference at its next session we beg to submit as a substitute therefor the following:

That a preferred assessment be laid in the sum of \$3,500 for or on account of the entertainment of the 1927 session of the Annual Conference, sum to be set apart by the Conference Treasurer before any distribution or apportionment be made to the causes set up in the budget, and that it be paid to the local Church, or its Treasurer, entertaining the Conference on the first day of the Conference; some of the reasons moving your commission on budget being that this particular assessment addresses itself to the operating expenses of the Conference placing it on all fours with other items of like character such as salaries, printing minutes and such; that if this assessment is left in the regular budget it may run short of the amount in contemplation, working an appreciable loss and burden to the one Charge entertaining the Conference, and not to the entire Conference as in the case of the regular budget items; that this cause will protect the Treasury of the Charge entertaining the Conference against what should be regarded as an unexpected and indefinite deficit.

That under this provision the amount recommended by us will furnish an increase of 57% over the amount which Trinity Church, Durham, will receive on account of this session's entertainment. Jno. F. Bruton, W. A. Stanbury and J. M. Downum, for the Budget Commission.

Second: That a quadrenial committee of five members be appointed by the Conference to be known as the Conference Entertainment Committee. It shall be the duty of this Committee to recommend to the Conference each year the place where the Conference shall meet the year following. This report shall be presented on or before the adjournment of the Conference. They shall also determine upon the plan of entertainment, presenting same to the Conference for approval, and assisting the Committee from the Church entertaining the Conference in working out the details. From the adjournment of each session of the Conference through the following session the Pastor and the Chairman of the Board of Stewards where the Conference is to meet shall be ex-officio members of this Committee.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON BENEVOLENCES

We, your Commission on Benevolences, composed of the Presidents of the several Conference Boards, appointed as auxiliary to the General Commission on Benevolences and to co-operate with the General and Conference Boards of Lay Activities in the promotion of Christian Stewardship and the full payment of the benevolent assessments, beg to report as follows:

1. We rejoice in the opportunity afforded in this Commission for mutual counsel and closer fellowship among the several Boards of the Conference. The work of the Kingdom is one work; the ultimate objective of all our boards is one and the same—the extension of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

2. We recognize the wisdom and timeliness of the action of the last General Conference in providing for the correlation of all the educational and administrative agencies of the Church in a great program of stewardship cultivation. Our hope of stemming the tide of materialism that is threatening our civilization, of saving our members from the deadly sin of covetousness, and of securing adequate funds for the regular work of our Church and the forward movements of the Kingdom lies in educating and training our people in the principles and practice of Christian Stewardship. We heartily join with the Board of Lay Activities in urging that a Christian Stewardship Committee be organized and a campaign of stewardship education be conducted in every Church in the Conference.

3. We deplore the great loss to the cause of Christ and the interests represented by our various General and Conference Boards occasioned by the shortage in the collections for the benevolences. We believe that the bringing up of this base line of our work is the most important and fundamental connectional task before us the coming quadrennium. We recommend that we fix our minimum goal one hundred per cent payment of these sacred claims, and that we pledge our wholehearted co-operation to the Board of Lay Activities, the Bishop and Presiding Elders in the plans to educate our members on the significance and importance of these interests to the end that this goal may be attained.

GREEN HILL ASSEMBLY GROUNDS

Inasmuch as this Conference has already expressed an interest in the historic Green Hill place near Louisburg, being followed by a similar expression made by the Epworth League assembly at Louisburg last summer; and, furthermore, because of its historic importance and wealth of sentiment for American Methodism, therefore, be it resolved:

1. That this Conference approve the purchase of so much of the Green Hill land—including the dwelling—as may be necessary for converting this place, made memorable by the first Conference of organized Methodism in America, into an assembly grounds to foster evangelism, to aid the work of the country Church, and to stimulate the efforts of youth in Epworth Leagues and kindred organizations.

2. That the presiding Bishop appoint a commission of three preachers and two laymen to work out all necessary details in connection with the proposed assembly grounds. This commission shall have authority to devise ways and means for financing the enterprise, so as not to involve this Conference financially, and it may also contract with the owner, Rev. E. H. Davis, at reasonable figures, for the land needed for the contemplated assembly.

3. That this commission in the effort to preserve this ancient shrine and to capitalize the sentiment gathering about this old house shall strive to make this a place to keep fresh and strong

in the Methodism of the future the same passion for conquest and evangelistic fervor as that which characterized those early itinerants who went everywhere in the effort to redeem a continent.

4. That this shall be held as the property of the North Carolina Conference and the entire enterprise shall be under the fostering care and control of this Conference.

REV. PHILLIP GREENING

Rev. Phillip Greening was born in Petertavey Parish, Devonshire, England, April 13th, 1841. The village in which he was born was named for a small stream which ran near by, named Tavey, on the banks of which he played in childhood. He was descended from a sturdy, conservative and patriotic ancestry. His father and mother, Phillip and Charlotte Greening, were religious and loyal Church folks: The father was an exhorter and held religious services in his community when he had opportunity. In this religious atmosphere Phillip Greening was born and reared to young manhood. In early childhood he was converted and joined the Wesleyan Church with which his parents were affiliated. At about the age of eighteen he was licensed to exhort and began holding prayer meetings and other religious meetings, walking sometimes ten miles to reach his appointment.

When a young man Brother Greening began to hear of the advantages of America and decided to try his fortune in this country. Together with a brother he sailed for America in the Spring of 1864, landing in New York in March of the same year, after a voyage of four weeks. That part of England from which he came being a mining section and he having had some experience as a miner, secured a position as miner in the state of New York. After working in that state for nearly two years he heard of the mining operations in the South, particularly in North Carolina, and decided to come to this state, which he did about the year 1868 and located in the community of Mt. Pleasant, N. C., where he worked in the mines of that section.

It was during his stay at Mt. Pleasant that Brother Greening felt the call to preach the gospel. To supplement his early education received in boyhood in the English schools of that period and to better fit himself for his life work he entered the Lutheran College at Mt. Pleasant where he was a student in the fall of 1867 and spring of 1868. At about this time, 1868 or 1869, he was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of the Mt. Pleasant

Circuit, held at St. Pauls Church on Rocky River. At the Conference held in Greensboro, 1870, he was appointed to supply on the Monroe Circuit. He was admitted on trial into the traveling connection, 1871, at the Conference held in Charlotte, N. C., and received as his first appointment the Pleasant Grove Circuit. He was ordained deacon, 1874, by Bishop Marvin, at Raleigh, and elder by Bishop Doggett, 1877, at Salisbury.

The following list of appointments will show the wide range of territory covered by this sturdy Methodist itinerant over a period of forty-three years in the active ministry in North Carolina: 1872-73, Pleasant Grove Circuit; 1874-75, South Charlotte Circuit; 1876, Whiteville Circuit; 1877-79, Buckhorn Circuit; 1880-81, Rockingham Circuit; 1882-85, Deep River Circuit; 1886-88, Rolesville Circuit; 1889-92, Cokesbury Circuit; 1893, Clinton Circuit; 1894-95, Carteret Circuit; 1896-98, Meherrin Circuit; 1899-1900, Harrelsville Circuit; 1901-03, Aurora Circuit; 1904-05, Grifton Circuit; 1906-08, Mt. Olive Circuit; 1909-10, Jones Circuit; 1911-13, Millbrook Circuit.

At the Conference held in Oxford, 1913, Brother Greening was granted the superannuate relation, which honorable relation he held until his death.

On March 12th, 1868, Brother Greening was happily married to Miss Elizabeth A. Lefler of Mt. Pleasant, N. C. To this happy union were born four children, two sons and two daughters, P. A. Greening, now of El Paso, Texas., J. W. Greening, El Dorado, Arkansas, Jennie, now Mrs. J. P. Stell of Raleigh, N. C., and Mary Ada, who married H. H. Johnson of Smithfield, N. C. The last named preceded her father to the home above. Brother Greening's first great sorrow came during his pastorate at Stedman, on the Cokesbury Circuit, when his wife died August 18th, 1891. On December 22nd, 1892, he was again happily married to Miss Rena Dunham of White Oak, N. C. To this union were born two children, a daughter, Blanche, now Mrs. J. E. Carter of Wilmington, N. C., and a son, Thomas Greening of White Oak, N. C. Besides his widow and children, there survive him eleven grand children, and two brothers and one sister, who live in England.

A few years ago Brother Greening had a serious illness

and thought the end was near but he recovered sufficiently to walk about the house, though far from well. About the middle of October of this year he had an attack of the same nature and gradually grew worse until Sunday, October 17th, when he quietly and peacefully slipped away to his long sought home. The funeral services were held from the Methodist Church at Stedman, conducted by Rev. J. D. Bundy, Presiding Elder of the Fayetteville District, assisted by Revs. S. S. Ellington, C. H. Caviness, E. W. Hurst and J. C. Humble. His mortal remains were laid to rest by the side of his first wife, in the little cemetery near the town of Stedman. It was here in the town of Stedman that Brother Greening located after his superannuation, but a few years ago he moved to White Oak, N. C., where he had built a neat little home in which to spend his last days.

These are but the bare outlines of a great life that stretches across eighty-five and a half years, half of which was freely given in faithful service to the Methodist itinerancy, but such a life cannot be measured by years nor circumscribed by calendar dates. If, as the Master led us to believe, one soul is worth more than all the world, then God alone can compute the value of the hundreds won to Christ by this faithful servant of God, who through the long years served the larger circuits, drove the rough roads, weathered the storms, forded the streams, spent the night in the cabin of the poor as well as in the home of the rich, went where he was sent, and stayed on the field until he was sent to another, that he might make full proof of his ministry and win men to Christ whom he loved. Like a true prophet of God Brother Greening preached, not only from the pulpit, but by Godly exhortation on the streets and in the home and interpreted the gospel he preached by the life he lived among men. The weight of his prophetic hand on a child's head, with a "God bless you, my son," has turned many a life into new channels for God and for good.

Phillip Greening was a strong preacher, not possibly in the sense that the world would call strong, nor was he a great orator, he never rose in the scale of appointments to the city church, but he searched the Scriptures and out

of them, after much prayer, he got his message and that message was burdened with the great essential truths of the gospel.

He was a fearless preacher. He received his message from God and was not afraid to declare it to men. At times his arraignment of sin was sharp and his words pointed but he made no apology for it, though sometimes it might cost him the friendship of men.

He was an evangelistic preacher. In the earlier years of his ministry he had few equals in revival work and the results were abiding. He used no questionable methods to get men to confess Christ. He preached repentance for sin and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as the only way to salvation for a sinner. He insisted on sinners coming to the altar in true Methodist style and many were the souls who went out from his meetings with faces beaming with the joy of having found the Christ whom he preached.

He was powerful in prayer. When he prayed in the pulpit the congregation felt that God was near. When he prayed at the altar, penitents praised God. When he prayed in the family circle of his people children felt that a prophet of God was guest in the home.

Only two of his pastorates extended the full four year limit. These were the old Deep River Circuit and the Cokesbury Circuit. During his pastorate on the Deep River Circuit, among the many others who were converted and received into the Church were four boys of tender age, who afterwards became members of the two North Carolina Conferences. These were Revs. T. B. Johnson of the Western North Carolina Conference, and W. B., J. C., and H. A. Humble of the North Carolina Conference, the last named having triumphantly crossed the Great Divide a few weeks ago. There may have been other boys converted under his ministry, who afterwards became preachers of the gospel, but these were won to Christ during one pastorate, and he called them his boys.

The writer visited Brother Greening during the summer and found him very feeble in body but buoyant in spirit. There was no shadow across his pathway. He said, "I want to go home. The way is all clear. I do not know why God leaves me here when there is nothing more I

can do." To his loved ones who had so tenderly nursed and cared for him during his invalid years he said, "I hate to leave you all, but I am longing to cross over and be with those who have gone before."

Nearly fifty-six years this brave soldier of the cross bore the banner of his Lord aloft, and for forty-three years he carried it into the thick of the fight, in town and village, on hill and plain, in the malaria infected sections and waste places of North Carolina, as a Methodist itinerant, but always and everywhere he was faithful to the trust committed to him. During all these years Brother Greening took but one vacation and that when on Cokesbury Circuit, when he was granted a three months vacation to visit his parents and kindred in England. He availed himself of this long deserved visit to his loved ones across the sea but returned with renewed vigor and a determination to finish the work which God had committed into his hands and be ready, when the time of his departure should come, to give an account of his stewardship to Him who had called him to this apostleship among men.

Brother Greening loved to meet with the brethren at the great annual gatherings and through his long period of service he missed but two Conferences and these because of swollen streams and impassable roads, and as long as he was able, after his superannuation he attended the Conferences, though suffering with the infirmities of age.

Phillip Greening has gone from our midst. He has answered the last roll call of his Conference on earth. He has received his appointment for the new Conference year which has no limitations, in all the dateless calendar of eternity.

"Servant of God well done!

Rest from thy loved employ,

Rufus Cicero Beaman, son of Joseph E. and Harriett Braswell Beaman, was born near Rocky Mount, North

Carolina, February 21, 1860, and died in Tarboro, North Carolina, April 27, 1926.

He sleeps under the green sod of Willow Dale Cemetery in Goldsboro, North Carolina, hard by Saint Paul Church to which he was devoted and where he preached with great effectiveness in the days of his strength.

The North Carolina Conference which Dr. Beaman joined in 1877 covered practically the entire State. Had he been spared to serve another year he would have realized one of the dreams of his life by rounding out fifty years as an itinerant Methodist preacher.

He entered the ministry in his seventeenth year and was at that time, to use his own words, "a green, awkward, overgrown boy without training and with little education." He was fortunate in being associated in those formative years with Dr. William Closs, a wonderful personality in his day, and this veteran Presiding Elder had much to do with shaping the future career of the young itinerant.

On the 25th of February, 1880, he was married to Miss Kate Cordelia Dudley who shared with him the burdens and joys of a Methodist parsonage until her death on the 18th of June, 1906. Of this union there are three surviving children: Mrs. Mary Beaman Suiter, of Newbern, North Carolina; Mrs. Kathryne Beaman Durham, of Durham, North Carolina; and Mr. James Southgate Beaman, of Norfolk, Virginia.

On the 30th of December, 1914, he was married to Miss Mattie Clements who walked by his side, a faithful wife and companion, until he folded his tent in Tarboro last April and went forth on life's last great adventure. To her, to the three children and to the two surviving brothers our hearts go out today in tender sympathy and loving remembrance.

Dr. Beaman felt keenly the lack of college training and his first task was to overcome this handicap. He gave himself to study and reading with unremitting diligence. He never left home without taking with him at least two books—the Bible and Shakespeare. On railroad trains, when forced to wait in making pastoral calls, riding along country roads, in all sorts of places this young preacher, intent upon an education, might have been seen pouring

over his pocket edition of the great poet. He had a special fondness for Carlyle and Emerson. He walked the way made glorious by the pens of Browning and Tennyson. He found recreation and strengthened the wings of his imagination by reading Scott and Dickens. He knew, as few knew it, the story of the great Church leaders from the days of the Fathers down to the present time.

So well did he succeed in overcoming the lack of early training that by the time he reached his prime he was master of the purest English and in the depth and richness of his knowledge was the equal of any man among us.

R. C. Beaman was first of all a preacher. The pulpit was his throne of power. He preached in the darkest corners of our remotest circuits as well as to the congregations in our largest cities. His pilgrimage as an itinerant starting on the Youngsville Circuit carried him to Beaufort, Clayton, Mattamuskeet, Chapel Hill, Wilmington, Goldsboro, Elizabeth City, Washington, Durham, Newbern, Henderson, Lumberton, and Tarboro. He was twice pastor of Trinity Church, Durham, in 1892-93 and again in 1903-04-05-06. He served the Church as Presiding Elder on two districts, on the Wilmington district in 1897-98 and on the Durham district 1910-11-12-13. He represented this Conference in the General Conference which met at Asheville in 1910.

To this man salvation was a wonderful, a supernatural thing won through battle and agony and "garments rolled in blood." Believing this he did not rely on organization or Church machinery or any other sort of human appliances for results. Statistics, elaborate programs, theatrical performances were not to his taste. He was out after souls and his sole reliance was the uplifted Cross. In his preaching he spoke to the cravings, the hopes and aspirations as well as to the pains and sorrows of human hearts. He literally obeyed the injunction which sends us forth to comfort the people, to strengthen the brethren. He was terrible as one of the old prophets when he thundered against sin. His touch was gentle as the fall of a rose leaf when he spoke of the love of God, the gentleness of Christ, the grace of the Comforter.

What the difference would have been if our friend could

have had the background of a university training we can only surmise. As it was, it is doubtful if this Conference in all of its history has sent forth a stronger preacher. It is safe to say that he never left a community without leaving the impression on the people that a man had been in their midst.

This sturdy preacher was not easily understood. He was to a certain extent a man of moods, disposed to a gloomy outlook some may have thought, but this was simply the mystical quality of his soul showing itself. The distinguished clergyman who fills the pulpit of St. Paul's, London, has been called the "gloomy dean." That great preacher is a mystic. Dr. Beaman was a mystic. He represented that type of religious experience as fully as any man I have ever known. Most of the great preachers from Paul's day till now have had something of this in their make-up. In the whirl and rush of these times when there is such an insistent call for the practical there is danger lest we become too practical. It is important that every preacher should make at least one visit to Arabia or to some Isle of Patmos and stand face to face with the mystery of the Gospel and listen for the voice out of the Eternities. I doubt if one can attain unto the highest Christian experience without such a visitation.

And then some did not understand this man's silence. But those who knew him best know that in these silent hours he was walking the way with the Christ, or he was moulding one of his great messages or he was sitting in the heavenly places with his Lord and Master. There were times when he wrapt himself in a reserve which not even his best friend could penetrate, but this did not last. When he did throw off all restraint and turn himself loose one could not wish for a more delightful companion.

His humor was of the finest sort. One winter evening a company of congenial souls gathered about the fireside of a refined Christian home, with Dr. George Stuart and Dr. Beaman leading the conversation. There was a fine play of wits that night, with a strange hush now and then as they touched on the more sacred themes. It was a revelation to some of those present that this modest North Carolina preacher did not suffer by comparison with the

genial Stuart in that great man's own chosen realm.

Silent man that he was he had a wonderful capacity for friendship. The list of his intimates may not have been a long one but those who were admitted to his inner circle were bound to him by hooks of steel. It was pathetic at times to see how dependent this rugged soldier was on his friends. Although a giant physically and intellectually he could not stand alone in the hour of trial. Just as the dove when storm driven sought the shelter of the Ark, so this strong man when the storms beat about him sought shelter in the friendship of those he loved and trusted. He stretched out his hands to those who stood close to him with all the trust of a little child. To him friendship meant chivalry; it meant loyalty; it meant open-hearted frankness. I am glad I can put it in the record concerning this knightly character who honored me with his confidence that he would have died rather than betray a friend.

There was no littleness of soul about this Methodist preacher. It is most fitting that the last honors to his memory should be paid in this Church, the scene of his greatest triumphs. While pastor here he led a campaign which made a new chapter in the annals of this city. It was a time when the forces of righteousness were just beginning to take a stand for prohibition, feeling was tense, the Church was being challenged in an unmistakable way. With his magnificent physical presence, with his eloquent tongue, with his consuming zeal, the pastor of Trinity Church seemed an ideal leader for such an hour. He threw himself into the struggle with all the ardor of a crusader and that dashing campaign has not yet been forgotten. R. C. Beaman appears in this picture like another Henry of Navarre and wherever the fight was hottest there might have been seen the white plume of this intrepid soldier of the Cross. When the smoke of battle cleared away the power of the saloon was forever broken in this community. Many of his friends regarded that victory as the crowning achievement of his life.

And it is fitting that this last service in his memory should be held in Trinity Church for another reason. It was here that he formed ties that were never broken. He

found in this great Church a group of men who seemed to understand him and they formed an association which he talked about as long as he lived. There was not a small man in that group. It was a comradeship of towering men. All of them are gone now—Briggs, Southgate, Captain Parrish, General Carr and last of all the big-hearted Beaman. We may well believe that they have found each other and renewed their friendship on the other side. In thinking of the heavenly country I have often wished that I could slip up behind a group like that and catch a little of their conversation. What themes! What a blessed fellowship! What songs— What abounding joys—

I once heard Dr. Beaman preach from the text, "I shall be satisfied when I awake with His likeness." He appeared as one transfigured that day as he described the meeting of the faithful disciple with his Lord. As he talked to us in that hour and went deeper into his great theme, he seemed to be like the Apostle Paul on one occasion impatient for his departure. Our friend has found out by this time what that text means. Those of us who knew him can picture him standing in that glorified company with a look of adoring wonder in his eyes gazing upon the central figure of the scene—the Christ he preached for well nigh fifty years.

The pull of the home which Jesus has gone to prepare is getting a strong hold on some of us. Our comrades are passing, they keep on passing, and there are times when our hearts cry out in the words of the old chorus: "What must it be to be there?" We have our rich hours here. To many of us, to some whose heads are covered with the frosts of many winters this is still a beautiful world, with its wide outlooks and glorious chances, and life is sweet, but "the best is yet to be"—

"There are depths of love that I cannot know
Till I cross the narrow sea.

There are heights of joy that I may not reach
Till I rest in peace with Thee."

This white-souled prophet knows now "what makes the stars shine.

It was a long, hard fight—the fight he made against the disease that was eating his life away but even here he

sounded not a note of surrender and met the last enemy with the victorious words of the great apostle: "I know whom I have believed."

During my last visit to his bedside he opened his eyes just one time, for a moment I caught a flash of the battle fire in the old warrior's eyes, lying there as helpless as a babe, and I left his room that day prepared to say, and I say it now, that no braver soul ever broke lance in a holy cause.

Strong preacher of the world, loyal friend, devoted servant of the Church, leader of the forces of righteousness in many a hard fight, the North Carolina Conference with bowed head and heavy heart pauses in this hour to say, hail and farewell!

REV. JOHN HUBBARD HALL

Rev. John Hubbard Hall, son of Henry G. Hall and Emily Robinson Hall, was born in Fayetteville, North Carolina, January 2, 1858, and died in Elizabeth City, North Carolina, December 15, 1925. Brother Hall received his preparatory training in Donaldson Academy in Fayetteville and then was for two years a student in the State University. After leaving the University he taught two years in the high school in Fayetteville. He joined the Church in 1878, the same day that his wife joined. In 1881 he was licensed to preach and in December, 1882, at the Conference held in Raleigh, he entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

That Brother Hall should become a preacher seemed but natural. He had two uncles who were Methodist preachers, Rev. Charles Hall of the Virginia Conference and Rev. John Hall of the New York Conference, while an aunt became the wife of the Rev. James Stacey of the South Carolina Conference. His older brother, Rev. Benjamin R. Hall, was for many years an honored and beloved member of the North Carolina Conference.

* At the end of his first year of service in the ministry, December 18, 1883, he was married to Miss Ida Holland also of Fayetteville. Five years before they had stood

together at the altar to take the vows of loyalty to the Master and His Church; now from that altar they went forth, husband and wife, to labor side by side, heart to heart, through forty-two years in the Master's vineyard. The best gift earth has for any man is a true wife, and here is one who through long and sometimes trying years was true indeed. In her he found companion, friend, helper, comforter and in the closing years a tireless and loving nurse.

His appointments were as follows: 1882-83, Pekin Circuit; 1884-85, Lillington Circuit; 1886-87, Carr Church, Durham; 1888-91, Oxford Circuit; 1892-93, Haw River Circuit; 1894-97, Elizabeth City; 1898-1901, Fifth Street, Wilmington; 1902-04, Rockingham; 1905-08, Elizabeth City District; 1909-10, Kinston. Early in the year Rev. W. L. Cuninggim, Presiding Elder of the Raleigh District, died and Brother Hall was appointed his successor and remained on that district through four years; 1914-17, Rockingham District; 1918, Aberdeen Station. During the next two years he occupied a supernumerary relation and at the Conference of 1921 was superannuated. Since that time he has made his home in Elizabeth City.

Looking back over this long and faithful ministry it is not easy to select the high points, but perhaps those four heroic years in which he completed the rescue of Fifth Street Church, Wilmington, and the ministry in Rockingham and Elizabeth City in each of which he served both as pastor and presiding elder should have special mention. Wherever he went, on circuit, station or district, he was a conscientious worker. In pulpit, as pastor, and in district administration he sought to do well the task assigned. But as Horace Bushnell pointed out in his great sermon on Unconscious Influence, the real service of a man is not in what he says or does so much as in what he is. John Hall radiated righteousness. He was and every one who touched him knew that he was and in every syllable of the words, he was a Christian gentleman. In the first place he was, as few men are, a man. Four square, firm-footed, unshaken. He stood always for the right as it was given him to see the right. Neither fear, favor, reward nor hope of reward moved him from it. But with

all his strength he was a gentleman. He was patient. He was kindly. He was always sympathetic in his dealing with his brethren and with his people. Perhaps his outstanding mark was his humor. John Hall and the hearty laugh, the well-loved joke will always be associated in the minds of those who knew him. But how rare a humor! It was as clean as a maiden's prayer. It was always reverent; he would not lower holy things or the Holy Name to cause a laugh. And he was considerate. There was no harping on your handicap, no holding up to ridicule a brother's weakness. Truly he was a gentleman. And he was a Christian. His faith in God was simple. To some of us perhaps he was too slow to see new views. But it was because the old had been tried and found enough. He walked with God and found sweet companionship with Jesus Christ. God's Word was the man of his counsel. He was a Christian: full of faith and of good works.

My own association with this prince of gentlemen ran through my whole ministry. My first circuit adjoined his. He was the beloved pastor of my favorite sister. He was my presiding elder. We labored together in the Bishop's cabinet. Then I was his pastor through his last four years of life. In a peculiar way, I can say he was my friend. And yet I may not claim to the exclusion of any other. He was the friend of every man. He had the faculty of drawing men to him. He loved his brethren and they gave him their love. I doubt not that many in this company will say as I do: "He was my friend. In a peculiar sense he was my friend." And among the laymen, what mighty host would rise up to say, "And he was my friend." We lay this tribute on his new made grave: Christian gentleman, faithful worker, sympathetic friend.

One sister, Mrs. Charles Roberts of Shelby, survives. The oldest son, William Holland Hall, is a professor in Duke University; the youngest, Gilbert, a student in the State College. Two daughters, Mrs. M. B. Sawyer and Mrs. W. A. Brock, made their homes in Elizabeth City. A son, John H. Hall, Jr., a successful attorney at law, resides with his mother in the home at Elizabeth City

over which the shadow has fallen. May God give to these loved ones the comfort of His grace.

This world is full of mystery. "God moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform." How often do our hearts cry out in unavailing agony, "Why, oh why?" Why such an one as John Hall was permitted to suffer so; why the shadows were permitted to fall on such as he? We can not say. Not in reason but in faith is our victory. Heaven is God's opportunity to make up to His suffering ones for all they suffer. Eternity has glorious years in which the afflictions of earth, in retrospect called light, can work for him a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory.

Sometimes when all life's lessons have been learned,

When sun and stars forevermore have set,

The things which our weak judgments here have spurned,

The things o'er which we grieved with lashes wet,

Shall flash before us out of life's dark night

As stars shine most in deepest tints of blue;

And we shall know how all God's plans were right,

What seemed reproof was love most true.

REVEREND MARCUS DURANT GILES

Marcus Durant Giles, a member of the North Carolina Conference, died at his home in Reidsville on July 22, 1926. Brother Giles was seventy-two years old at the time of his death and had been a member of this and the Western North Carolina Conference for forty-three years.

He joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1875, and remained a loyal and consistent member to his death.

In 1883 he joined the North Carolina Conference and was sent to the Double Shoals Circuit as his first work. After his work at Double Shoals he served the following charges: Table Rock, Shelby, Stanley, Pineville, Olin, Taylorsville, Newton, Denver, Roxboro, Durham, Stem, Hookerton and Goldston.

In 1877 he was married to Julia Emma Gibbs, to which

union were born eight children, seven of whom survive. In 1909 his wife died, while he was serving the Hookerton Circuit. In 1910 he married Lulu Royster, who survives him and who nursed him tenderly and affectionately during his declining years.

When the North Carolina Conference was divided, Brother Giles was given work in the Western North Carolina Conference, where he remained until 1901, when he transferred to the North Carolina Conference. His health gave way ten years ago, at which time he retired from the active ministry. High blood pressure was his first infirmity, which was followed in less than a year by a paralytic stroke. Three other slight strokes of paralysis followed, each of which left him weaker in body and mind. In all of his sickness and suffering never did he lose faith in the healing power of his Master. Each year his faith increased; each day he loved to recount the work of his early ministry. Nothing delighted him more than for his children and his friends to talk with him and tell him about the places where he had lived and the people and Churches he had served. He kept in constant touch with his Church. Each District, Annual and General Conference was for him a season of prayer and hope. He prayed constantly that the new order and younger generation might carry on more and more to the perfect day. After he was an invalid and before his eyesight became impaired he read his Bible through five times. Up to his death he availed himself of every opportunity to speak a word for the God he loved.

Brother Giles was an evangelical preacher. A great revivalist. The revival meetings at his own Churches and when assisting his brethren on other charges were always marked with great results. Under his ministry more than six thousand joined the Church.

His life is an inspiration to all who knew him or knew of him. A greater inspiration to those who knew him best. Each step in his life, as it leads to the final upland, is a definite marker for those of us who remain to carry on.

JOHN ALBERT HORNADAY

John Albert Hornaday, son of Nathan and Christianna Hornaday, was born in an humble home, near Foust's Mill in Randolph County, N. C., September 17th, 1853, and died at his home in Maxton, N. C., May 20th, 1926.

At the early age of 16 years, with the full consent of his parents, who had not the means to give him much educational advantage, he began life for himself and at 20 located and established a business in Laurinburg, N. C.

On April 18th, 1878, he was happily married to Miss Lucretia Ellen McCall, then of Richmond County, N. C., a sister of Rev. F. B. McCall and the late Rev. J. Calton McCall, two of our most beloved brethren. Throughout his ministry he gave her the credit of being the chief human assistant in whatever success he achieved. Unto this blessed union were born five sons as follows: Professor Clifford L. Hornaday, now President of Henderson-Brown College, Arkadelphia, Ark.; John A. Hornaday, Beaufort, N. C.; D. Lattimer Hornaday, Richmond, Va.; Leslie B. Hornaday, Frederick Hornaday and two daughters, Mrs. G. D. Stephenson, Richmond, Va., and Miss Bernice Hornaday, Maxton, N. C. Of these children, all save one, Frederick, still live, and certainly no family was ever bound together by a stronger affection than this.

Soon after their marriage this happy couple made their home in Chatham County, N. C., near Mt. Pleasant Methodist Church. In the same year of their marriage under the preaching of the late Rev. W. H. Moore, D. D., he was soundly converted, and joined this Church with his wife, who transferred her membership from the Presbyterian Church. At once he realized his pre-conversion impression to preach deepened, and delayed not to heed the call of his Lord to His ministry. Soon the Lord's seal of approval upon his labors in the conversion of souls, demonstrated the genuineness of his impression.

After serving three years as a licensed exhorter, he was granted license to preach by the Fourth Quarterly Conference of the Pittsboro Charge, at Mt. Zion Church, September 23rd, 1882, Rev. N. H. D. Wilson, D. D., Presid-

ing Elder and Rev. R. A. Willis, preacher in charge. At the Annual Conference November 28th, 1883, he was appointed a supply to the Ashpole Mission. At the Annual Conference, November 27th, 1884, Wilmington, N. C., Bishop Parker presiding, he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection, returned to the same charge, which he continued to serve, with the charge name changed to Shoe Heel Mission, the remaining three years of the quadrennium. At the Annual Conference, December 5th, 1886, he was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon, and at the Annual Conference, December 3rd, 1888, he was ordained elder, both ordinations being administered by Bishop John C. Granberry.

In addition to the one already mentioned he served the following charges: Cumberland, 1888; Carthage, 1889-92; Ridgeway, 1893-96; Weldon, 1897; Hertford, 1898-1900; Beaufort, 1901-03; Greenville, 1904-06; Roxboro, 1907-09; Burlington, 1910-11; Weldon, 1912-15; Dunn, 1916-17; Warrenton, 1918; Maxton, 1919-22. Thus is presented the broad field of his ministerial activity, with this unique fact, that where he began, he closed his active ministry of 40 years, which started with a people who grieved to see his first quadrennium in the ministry end, and, whose children warmly welcomed him back to the walks of his young preacher days. Here, though his active ministry ended in 1922, his services remained so acceptable that vacant pulpits of his own and other Churches called for and used them so long as his strength permitted.

As a man, brother Hornaday's stability of view may have tended sometimes to alienate, but his warmth of heart most generally counteracted the hurt of any apparent stubbornness, and won to him hosts of friends. His great place in the genuine affections of those among whom he lived longest and to whom best known was attested by the large attendance upon the funeral services in the Maxton Methodist Church and the burial services at the cemetery. His position on any subject could always be known, for he spurned any straddling or any ambiguity of word or act. In his make-up was a vein of innocent humor, that would sometimes bubble over in spicy additions to sermon or conversation. In his make-up also was a positive can-

dor, softened by love, that gave him directness to the hearer's tender spot and aroused to serious thought.

As a preacher he was possessed of more than ordinary executive and preaching ability, which helped make his ministry an all-round unusual success. For want of early advantages, he brought to the ministry limited equipment, largely remedied by gradual growth and development of his native strength, which made him a preacher of striking interest and exceptional correctness of language. I join my testimony to that of others to the remarkable fact of his freedom of speech, private and public, from glaring errors of grammar or chastity, though he started with such a poor chance. His convictions of truth were strong and vigorous. He believed what he said and he said what he believed. His were strictly Bible standards of right living, as his keen insight into its teachings gave him. He was original, and his thoughts carried in them the dynamic power of the Holy Ghost, which often made them burn their way to cold reason and sleeping conscience. He was evangelical in spirit and fervency, and was in demand for assistance in revival services. With him, preaching was a calling and not a business. His sermons were most often God-given messages that warmed cold hearts with melting pathos and broke hard hearts with Gospel power. No doubt souls are in heaven and others are on the way, as fruits of his preaching.

As a Christian, Brother Hornaday had the Spirit of Christ, and through all the 48 years of his Christian life I heard of no stain on his robe of righteousness. The difference in his life before and after his conversion presents a contrast that reveals the divine power of God's saving grace. He lived what he preached and his religious experience gave him power with God and man.

As well as he appeared in all other circles, in the home circle he was at his best. The beneficiary of her most congenial, helpful companionship, he was always the true husband who showed tender appreciation of his companion. As a father he greatly enjoyed his children, loved and provided for their life-equipment to the extent of his means. What they are is good testimony to the success of both their father and mother. Thus by our Lord's standard:

"A tree is known by its fruits," brother Hornaday's life and labors, private and public, in all exacting relations, approvingly stand the test.

Through long suffering he patiently ripened into readiness for the coming summons, the signs of whose approach he indicated his recognition of months before by his words, "My work is done and I am ready to go." Glorious retrospect! Still more glorious prospect. With his bereaved wife and children many other hearts sorrow at his going, but with the legacy of a sacred, precious memory of him.

Farewell brother! You have made the world better and brighter by having lived in it. You have at last walked up the shining way to the goal of all light, the unveiled face of Him, which shines forever. Rest in peace, for in eternity we will know where to find you.

REV. GEORGE WASHINGTON FISHER

Rev. George Washington Fisher, pastor of the Garner Circuit, passed away Friday afternoon, January 15, 1926, in Garner, North Carolina. That morning he was in Raleigh in conference with his Presiding Elder, following which he made two pastoral calls. He reached home about twelve and ate a light lunch. A little later he went down to have some work done on his car. While this was being done, he suddenly fell over by the front wheel. When a physician who was not more than a block away reached him he was gone.

This faithful and devoted itinerant came to the end of his journey as he was making ready to take the road again. On horseback, in buggy and in automobile for more than forty years this devoted pastor had gone with the shepherd's heart and with the preacher's message. Oftentimes he grew weary on the way but he never faltered though the road was rough and the burden heavy. The imminent Burden-bearer was consciously with him and the sun was on the hills the afternoon he left us.

G. W. Fisher was born in Catawba County, May 8, 1859.

He was educated at Oak Institute, Mooresville, and at Rutherford College. He joined the North Carolina Conference in 1885. His entire ministerial life touched the country places of the state, though many of his churches were in villages and in towns. He was a notable success among the plain, substantial people of North Carolina. They knew his worth and trusted him without reserve. He served Wilkesboro one year, Rowan two, Salisbury one, Kittrell two, Yanceville two, Tarboro one, Battleboro two, Kennansville one, Williamston and Hamilton two, Garysburg two, Clayton four, Durham four, Cary four, Gates four, Zebulon four, Elm City three, and he was beginning his second year on the Garner.

Whether in the valley of the Yadkin, or of the Cape Fear, or of the Neuse, or of the Tar, or of the Roanoke, or in the Albemarle country, the same rare devotion and fine fidelity marked the labors of this Methodist circuit rider. He got a good start in the section rich with the traditions of "Prophet of the Long Road" and that long line of heroic men who carried the banner of Methodism through all the hill country of the Carolinas. This is the section out of which the camp meeting came and where they linger still; through all the years much has been made of the songs and shouts of the redeemed. Among the notables, George Washington Ivey, a Sir Galahad of the saddlebags, proved to be the patron saint of George Washington Fisher. The memories of his childhood experiences followed our brother to the end and the fires in his heart never went out.

No man did a more faithful and successful year's work than did he on the Garner Circuit last year, and this year was starting most auspiciously. With what care he looked after every detail, and how he carried every member on his heart! One would never have suspected that the end was so near. His sudden going was a sore bereavement to a wide circle.

George Washington Fisher, son of Stephen and Elmira Fisher, married Ida Lee Love, who was born in Leasburg, Caswell County, on May 29, 1889. This was a union on earth and in heaven.

Through all the years, this man and this woman were

one in the work they did and rich in the life they lived. They knew their sorrows and carried their grief. One child left them at Battleboro, one at Clayton, and one at Durham; five children remain to bless the world and to cheer the heart of the dear, devoted mother. The daughter, Alma Love, is Mrs. Wayland Finch of Zebulon. Clyde Olin is professor in Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn.; Ralph Lee is a doctor in Michigan; Henry Elbert has just finished law at Harvard; and Edgar Beauregard is doing graduate work at Columbia. All the boys graduated at Duke and are well started in life. They have a rich heritage in a father and mother that did so much for them in the long years given so largely to others.

This is not the time to analyze the character of our brother or to sum up the activities of his life. However, one or two observances should be made:

First, this man was always more than his message. Not that he did not bring a good sermon; he did preach well. His sermons were well wrought out and sound to the core. They were vibrant with life and dealt with things essential. He never frittered away the hour on trifles; he never grew red in the face in the defense of imaginary ills. G. W. Fisher preached the gospel of the Son of God as he had tried it out in his own experience. But he was so genuine, so devoted to his work and so conscientious in every relationship that the preacher made the proclamation. All who really knew him saw only the man back of the message. This man who went up and down the long weary roads and out through the narrow by-paths in search of the sheep of his flock; this man who was equally at home in a cabin in the backwoods and in the pretentious house on the high-way was the man every one saw in the pulpit on Sunday. Love filled his heart and a fire burned in his bones as he spake with the voice of a prophet.

Second, this man was preeminently a man of peace. The petty squabbles and silly contentions which he often proved a source of annoyance in the community and an element of hurt in the Church brought sorrow to his heart. This good man could never rest until he had done all possible to show the way of peace and good will. Men

often marvelled as they watched him in his own earnest and conscientious efforts to unite the Church for the work ahead. He won by his honesty and genuineness.

Sunday afternoon, January 17, a great company of friends and parishioners gathered at Garner and a long funeral procession accompanied the family and friends to Zebulon, where the funeral was held and the burial took place. There old parishioners from Zebulon Circuit and ministers and friends from elsewhere were assembled.

Reverends D. N. Caviness, C. P. Jerome, J. G. Johnson, E. M. Hall and M. T. Plyler conducted the services. In the crowd that filled the Church and overflowed into the yard were citizens from every walk of life, fully agreed as to the unusual character of the man who this day was laid away among a people so dear to him; a people whom he cherished and for whom he had labored in other days.

Friends came with their flowers and tears to do honor to him they loved as the shadows lengthened that evening but beyond the sunset they saw a glorious sun-rise.

REV. H. M. EURE

Hilliard Manly Eure, son of Alfred Brinkley and Delilah Eure, was born in Nash County, North Carolina, June 14, 1861, and died in his parsonage home at Norlina, N. C., January 7th, 1926. Brother Eure came of sturdy, industrious and honorable parentage. Besides Brother Eure, there were four brothers in the home, all grew to manhood and all have given faithful service in their various professions. From this home came two Methodist ministers, one physician, one lawyer and one teacher. The four brothers are still living. Stephen E. Eure, Wilmington, N. C., has devoted his life to educational work in the state; Frank F. Eure is pastor on the Robersonville charge, North Carolina Conference; J. B. Eure is a physician located a Poplar Bluff, Mo.; and N. L. Eure is a lawyer at Greensboro, N. C.

Brother Eure received his preparation for college at Mt. Pleasant and Stanhope High Schools, after which he spent two years, 1884-85, at old Trinity College in Ran-

dolph County. He was twice married, his first marriage was to Miss Narcissa Privette of Nash County in 1886, to this union was born one son, N. F. Eure of Beaufort, N. C. The second marriage was to Miss Estella McCoy of West Plains, Mo. She was a teacher before her marriage to Brother Eure, a woman of culture, refinement and education, blessed with energy and endowed with fine practical sense. She made the itinerant an ideal wife and made the parsonage a real home. God blessed this marriage with five fine, bright children, all of whom are still living. Mrs. E. A. Hamilton of Red Springs, N. C.; Mrs. Q. M. Wiggins of Sunbury, N. C.; Eva Lind Eure who was in the last year of her college course at Greensboro at the time of her fathers death; Hilliard M. Eure, Jr., and Alfred Francis Eure.

Here is a brief record of Brother Eure's itinerancy. He was admitted into the North Carolina Conference on trial at Reidsville in 1886 and was appointed to the Brunswick Circuit, which he served two years, 1887-1888. He served Whiteville charge one year, 1889. In the fall of that year he was transferred to the Missouri Conference, to that Conference he gave ten years of faithful service; 1890 he was pastor of Moody Circuit. He served Marble Hill Circuit 1891-1892. Morley Circuit, 1893-1894. Bertrand Circuit, 1895. He served as Presiding Elder on West Plains District one year, 1896, and was Presiding Elder on the Poplar Bluff District four years, 1897-1900. Brother Eure was transferred from the Missouri Conference back to North Carolina Conference in the year 1900, and served charges as follows: Greenville Station, 1901-03; Beaufort Station, 1904-06; Carthage Circuit, 1907-10; Jonesboro Circuit, 1911-12; Red Springs Circuit, 1913-16; Williamston-Hamilton Circuit, 1917-19; Rich Square Circuit, 1920-23; Norlina Circuit, 1924-26, until the time of his death. If he had been permitted to complete this year, it would have made forty years of service without a break.

I was intimately associated with him for four years on the Weldon District and I feel that I can speak of him and his work with a certainty of knowledge. Brother Eure was blessed with a good personality, good health and fine physical endurance. From infancy until near the end of

his life he never knew a day's sickness, and, I think in all the years of his ministry, he was never absent from an appointment on account of any physical cause. His mind was equally alert and vigorous. No man in our ministry has impressed me as having fewer faults, no man in our ranks has impressed me as being more brotherly, more unselfish, more loyal and more consecrated. He had no eccentricities, he rode no hobbies, he had no intellectual or moral aberrations. There was no place in his heart for suspicions and jealousies. He lived a sun-crowned life. In the fine soil of his soul, only things that were gentle, pure and lovely could live and grow.

Brother Eure was remarkably well poised. His clear, searching mind looked all the way through situations and came to safe conclusions. He was in the truest sense what we call in our Methodist terminology a good, all around man. Brother Eure was a charming conversationalist. He possessed a vein of wit and humor that was perennial. In addition to this he seemed to have an almost inexhaustible fund of jokes and anecdotes which he used to fine advantage. If someone came to him out of humor or in a fault-finding way, he would say, "that reminds me," and then he would tell some joke or relate some incident which relieved the irritation and left the person in a fine humor. He knew human nature too well to argue with people; there were other ways that were so much better and more successful.

Brother Eure believed genuinely in our itinerant system. He never interfered with his appointment and he never complained of any appointment that he received. I never knew him to speak a word of criticism of the Church or anyone in the Church. He loved all the brethren with a fervent love. In fact, his capacity for loving was one of the outstanding traits of his life. He was a great lover and yet without ostentation. This scripture was true in his case as everywhere else, "With what measure ye meet, it shall be measured to you again." Because Brother Eure showed bountifully in love, he gathered a large harvest of love from those that he served, not only was he loved by his own people that he labored with, but all the people of all denominations in all the places where he served loved

him. Brother Eure was easily one of the best preachers among us. He made religion attractive. Young people were drawn to him. He turned many of them to the Christ. He seemed to have a genius for leading young men into the ministry. Brother Eure had a clear apprehension of the great doctrines and themes of the Bible. He also had a clear, definite experience of the saving grace of God in his own life. In a most convincing and winsome way, did he proclaim the glad tiding of great joy to others.

Our friend and brother has labored among us. He has left a noble record, from henceforth his name will appear among our honored dead. He never knew the infirmities of age. The young itinerant with the dew of youth on his brow answered the call of God away back in 1886 and for almost forty years he was not disobedient to the heavenly voice. He was still following the gleam when God called him on the seventh day of January of this year. With energy unabated and vision undimmed he has entered upon the work which God has appointed him to in heaven.

REV. HILARY AUGUSTUS HUMBLE

At the close of the war between the States, Daniel Humble and his wife set up a modest home over in the hills of Randolph County. They shared with other Southern farmers the hardships of those reconstruction days. While they shared in a lost cause they had not lost faith. They believed in God and worshiped Him around their own fireside as well as at the old Rehobeth Methodist Church of which they were faithful members. In the atmosphere of that home the four children, three sons and one daughter, found it easy to become Christians and members of the Church. Not only so but each one of the three sons heard and heeded the call to enter the ministry.

Rev. Hilary A. Humble, one of the three and the subject of this paper, was born in Randolph County, N. C., December 17, 1873, and passed to his reward from the district parsonage in Wilmington, N. C., September 11, 1926. He was converted when he was only nine years old. He

heard the call to preach while yet in his early teens and began at once to conduct prayer meetings and other services in his home Church. He was ambitious to become the best preacher he could be. He was denied the privilege of a college education, but none could say that he was an uneducated man, for he was a careful student all his life. He kept up with what men were thinking in the religious world. Even during his year and a half of sickness before he died, he bought and read several new books. One of the younger men on his district tells me that Brother Humble urged him again and again to give heed to reading. He was also a student of nature. He knew plants and birds and trees and it was interesting to hear him talk of their habits as he had observed them.

In 1894 Brother Humble was licensed to preach in Front Street Church, Burlington, N. C. In July of the same year he was appointed junior preacher under Rev. J. E. Underwood, at Rocky Mount. In the fall of 1895 he joined this Conference and was appointed to Rocky Mount Mission. His other appointments were as follows: Swan Quarter, 1897; Nashville, 1898-1900; Littleton, 1901-04; Weldon, 1905-08; Hamlet, 1909-10; Laurenburg, 1911-13; Kinston, 1914-17; New Bern (Centenary), 1918-21; Fayetteville (Hay Street), 1922-24; Wilmington District, 1925-26.

Brother Humble was a devoted pastor, he knew and loved the people he was appointed to serve. He knew how they lived and was able and did enter into their joys and sorrows. We heard him say soon after he was made Presiding Elder, "I miss having a congregation of people that I can call my own." He was one of those good souls that must have close friends and he always found them in his pastorates. After serving for nearly thirty years as pastor, he was made Presiding Elder of the Wilmington district two years ago. He did a most remarkable work on that hard district even though he was sick most of the time. He inspired young preachers to preach better; he urged the importance of the Sunday School work and promoted training schools for the teachers; he would often preach at as many as three of the Churches when he held the Quarterly Conference for a circuit. He was interested in every charge and every preacher. Those who were in

the Bishop's cabinet with him testify that he never made reference to a preacher's character or work except in the most brotherly way.

The work, however, in which he found most joy was in conducting revival meetings. He was in demand for that kind of service all over the Conference and held meetings in every district, in the largest Churches as well as in the smaller. He always preached with conviction and power. He did not use any of the objectionable methods, but with great faith in the word of God he preached believing in the power of the Spirit to produce results, and there were hundreds of people converted.

Brother Humble was married to Miss Ella Gaskill of Swan Quarter, who with their three children, Mrs. W. L. Hunter of Fayetteville, Lelia and Hilary A., Jr., of Wilmington, survive. His aged father is in very poor health at Elon College, the brothers, Rev. J. C. and W. B., are honored members of this Conference and are with us. The mother and sister have gone on.

About eighteen months ago he was taken sick and went to Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore for treatment. They discovered that that fearful malady, cancer, had gotten a firm hold. He took treatment and suffered a severe operation, but received only temporary relief. Thousands of his friends offered prayer for his recovery, but the Lord did not see fit to spare him. He did not understand God's purpose any more than we understand it, but he did not doubt Him. Two weeks before the end he said to me, "I have given up all hope of getting well, but I have not lost faith in God." He was in great pain that morning and said that he would not be able to stand it much longer. "I shall not be in Durham to answer when they call my name. The brethren will know where to find me." Brother Cade was with him a few hours before the end and heard him say, "If I had a thousand lives to give I would give them all to the ministry. I wish I could take every member of the North Carolina Conference by the hand and say, 'God bless you.'" He loved his brethren and was never happier than when in their fellowship.

He requested that his close friend, Rev. S. A. Cotton, have charge of his funeral, but asked him not to sound a

note of sadness. He was not defeated by sin or death, but he conquered death through our Lord Jesus Christ and mortality is now swallowed up in victory. Brother Cotton was assisted at the funeral by Revs. J. D. Bundy, J. H. Shore, and the writer. The pastors of the Wilmington Churches with Rev. L. A. Watts, acted as pall bearers. Hay Street Church was filled with preachers and friends from over the Conference. Just after noon on a perfect Indian Summer day in September, we laid the body of our brother and friend under the flowers in beautiful Cross Creek Cemetery. He was indeed a good minister of Jesus Christ, we shall miss his noble face and brotherly smile, but his memory will remain with us as a benediction. I shall always be thankful that he came my way; I shall be better for having known him. We may believe with the poet,

"All the world's a stage,
And all the men and women merely players;
They have their exits and their entrances."

But we do not believe the drama is played out here. The curtain has merely gone down on act one of Brother Humble's life.

"He'll catch the broken threads again,
And finish what he here began;
Heav'n will the mysteries explain,
And then, ah then, we'll understand."

REV. J. J. LEWIS

Rev. John J. Lewis was born near Aurora in Beaufort County, March 16th, 1865, and died in his parsonage home at Grimesland, July 20th, 1926.

Brother Lewis was born at a time when poverty was the lot of most Southern people and he suffered along with his neighbors. When he had grown old enough to earn even a small wage, he went to work to assist his widowed mother in the struggle to maintain the family.

At that time there were no public schools to speak of and his education was necessarily very limited.

Brother Lewis married Lula Bateman of Plymouth, N. C., March 14th, 1890. There were born to this union two children, a son who died in infancy, and a daughter, Mrs. D. L. Stubbs of Aurora, N. C. His wife died September 15th, 1892.

Brother Lewis was powerfully converted in 1893, and almost immediately began to preach. He was then a member of the Free Will Baptist Church and remained in that communion until the year 1900, when he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was admitted into the Conference in full connection in 1904.

Brother Lewis was married the second time to Hannah L. Lewis, October 18th, 1894. To this union were born six children, Marion Smith, Charles Frost, Oma Bliss, Ola Dale, John Thoburn, and Ruth. The mother and all the children are living.

Brother Lewis spent ten years of his life in the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, serving the following charges in the order given: Windfall, 1900-01; Morehead City, 1901-03; Harker's Island, 1903-06; Wildwood Circuit, 1906-09; Superintendent of Indian Mission in Roberson County, 1909-10. He transferred to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Elizabeth City in 1910, and faithfully served the following charges in our connection: Vanceboro Circuit, 1910-12; Bailey Circuit, 1913-14; Bath Circuit, 1914-17; Dare Circuit, 1917-19; Currituck Circuit, 1919-21; Mattamuskeet Circuit, 1921-23; Grimesland Circuit, 1923 until the time of his death.

This brief outline indicates that this servant of God had his ministry among the people of the rural districts, living with them, close to nature, and he loved both the people and the open country, and wherever he went he carried cheer and sunshine. No finer type of optimism has been shown among us than that which radiated from the devoted life of our departed brother. While he contended with the stern realities of the world, knowing its sins and its tragedies, he ever kept his face to the future, believing in the ultimate triumph of the cause of Christ.

He endured hardship and privation as few men of our times, but because he loved the Lord and was given wholly to his cause, he laughed and preached and prayed his way to Glory.

Brother Lewis was a good preacher. He knew the Christ whom he preached. He believed the Bible was the inspired word of God, and he preached it fearlessly and faithfully, yet tenderly and lovingly, and many souls found their way to salvation through his ministry. What greater tribute can be paid to God's representative? He was a faithful pastor. Wherever there were people in distress or trouble there this man of God might be found with words of comfort and consolation.

If destitution and want were encountered his hand was opened in mercy and he divided with them his meager store.

As a friend, Brother Lewis was true and loyal, and he was blessed in return with a great host of friends; men, women and little children. As a husband and father, he was tender and devoted, and loved ones gave back to him in multiplied measure.

His body sleeps in beautiful Oakdale Cemetery in Washington, N. C.

Blessings on his loved ones!

Her mother died when she was six years of age. Following that bereavement she went to live with her aunt, Mrs. E. J. Lynch, in Greensboro. Her only sister, Addie Garrett, died some years ago. There are two brothers, Percy Garrett, living in Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Jeff E. Garrett of Reidsville. Members of her family were charter members of Lowe's Methodist Church in Rockingham County. For many generations her people have been loyal Methodists. She joined West Market Street Church when quite young.

She was educated at the North Carolina College for Women, being graduated in 1903. Following her graduation, she taught in the city high schools of Durham and Greensboro. She was a musician of rare ability.

January 19, 1910, she was married in Greensboro to Reverend James M. Daniel, a member of the North Carolina Conference. Of this union two children, Helen Garrett, now aged 13, and James M., Jr., 11, were born.

She died November 2, 1926, at Sanatorium, North Carolina, following an illness of more than four years.

There are those who say that they find "books in the running brooks, sermons in stones, and good in everything." There are others who see hints of divine things in "the meanest flower that blows." To still others "every common bush is afire with God."

But for most of us the reality of God is made plain not from facts or manifestations in nature, but from a life that is lived. Even the humblest and blindest of us want to know God, and we want to know Him on the levels and in the concerns where we dwell through our common days.

That was what Jesus did; He lived the life of God in this plain flesh. In smaller degree, but genuine no less, things that make us think of God are found in the human lives of our daily friends.

Of these things that remind us of God, nothing is more unavoidable as we pay memory's tribute today than the thought of purity. Says Paul, "Whatsoever things are pure, think on them." That which is without stain and bears no taint of foulness; that which is so pure it purifies—that reminds us of God. You have looked out on the hills and valleys clad in their mantle of snow in winter. You could not escape the feeling that they were wrapped about in purity. But the snow is cold. We want a purity that is not only white, but also warm with the sweet and stimulating throb of life.

And there is patience in suffering. The spirit that bears without complaining, that does not murmur, but coins discipline and strength of soul out of pain—such a spirit brings the thought of God. If we know God at all, if we are acquainted with Him as He shines forth in His son, this we are sure of: He brings out of pain richer treasures, and out of suffering redemption.

Also there is motherhood. We believe that we are children of God. The highest point of our life, and also its deepest reach, is where it touches hands with God, and out of pain brings new life to birth. She who looks with love into the face of new-born flesh and blood, which is a part of herself; she who tenderly watches through days and nights and months and years, and thinks never of herself, but always first of her children—she makes us think of God.

In our sister who has been called away these virtues in harmonious union with many others, dwelt abundantly. Doctors, nurses, servants, who waited at her bedside, loved her for her gentleness and patience and courage. Husband, into whose face she smiled but a few minutes before her going, and children, into whose lives she had poured the largeness of her motherhood—all who knew her intimately read in such a life not hints only, but an open word of God.

For sixteen years she entered into the work of a Metho-

dist preacher's life, took into her heart the anxieties, sorrows, sympathies, and hopes incident to such a ministry, was loyal to the Church of Christ, and lived from a source of religion deep within. Out of her suffering, gladdened by the goodness that was about her, and cheered by the presence of her constant Friend, she passed "to where beyond these voices there is peace."

SESSIONS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

The North Carolina Conference was set off from the Virginia Conference in May, 1836, and in 1850, and again in 1870, North Carolina territory in the South Carolina Conference was transferred to this Conference. In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.
