BOARD OF MISSIONS—REPORT NO. 2

Your Board of Missions has given long and prayerful consideration to the work you have committed to it. Not in many years has that work been more difficult. The lessened income reduces the pay to our preachers on mission charges below a living income and threatens the necessity of recalling missionaries from the field and the closing of our schools in home and foreign lands. Not only has the money available for appropriations for conference work been less by approximately \$2,000, but after a generous estimate of income, the deficit of your General Board at the end of this year will be not less than \$391,000.

The reports are not entirely discouraging. There have been happy results at home and abroad in spiritual awakening and in the saving of souls. The work of many years came to partial fruition when some of our mission conferences were set up as Annual Conferences and national churches were organized in our foreign fields. The results of the first year of such life more than justifies the action of the church. It is no time to sound a retreat.

We rejoice in and urge a hearty and perfect response from our pastor to the call of the Bishops of the church for a special cash offering to be taken in the churches on the 29th of November or the 6th of December for our general missionary work. Let us make this appeal after earnest prayer and careful prepa-

ration. We must not fail.

We call to the attention of our pastors, our church schools as the one agency through which the whole church can be made missionary. The fourth Sunday offering for missions, which is administered by the Board of Christian Education, is indispensable, but more significant that the church of the future shall thus be missionary minded.

Let us make it a year of cultivation of world-wide interest on the part of

the church.

We gratefully acknowledge the receipt from the Duke Endowment of the sum of \$28,150 which has been used for church maintenance during the past year.

We recommend that F. S. Love, J. M. Ormond and E. C. Crawford be approved as members of a joint committee of Sunday School Extension and the Rural Church, as provided in paragraph 451 of the 1930 discipline.

We recommend further that W. V. McRae be asked to raise in our churches the sum of \$400 for the support of a chaplain at Oteen; and that F. S. Love be appointed conference missionary secretary.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION—REPORT NO. 1

Having examined the reports of the General Board of Christian Education and noted carefully the recommendations contained therein, your board observes that the reports of our executive secretary and of our director of young people's work and extension secretary indicate a large and gratifying fulfillment of the program suggested by the General Board. This is true, and especially in regard to organizing for Christian education in the local church, conducting Standard and Cokesbury schools, training conferences, and institutes, developing the young people's division, and cultivating interest in the children's and adult divisions. Your board feels that this conference can do nothing more fitting than to provide ample support for the executive secretary and his associates in carrying out the program which they propose.

I. We recommend for the coming year that our conference direct its efforts

along the lines of three major emphases:

- Organization. We are unanimous in our feeling that the first step in setting up the organization in local churches is the local church board of Christian education. Following the set up of this board, and after the board has made a careful study of the situation in the local church, the divisional organizations should be set up; that is, in the children's division, the young people's division, and the adult division. Detailed suggestions regarding the work of these divisions is now available in booklet form. In order that all three divisions of the local church may be helped in carrying on their work, it is suggested that the executive secretary and extension secretary, in co-operation with the presiding elders, be authorized to secure volunteer district workers for each of the three divisions. We recommend, further, that the new plans for Christian education be presented either in a conference-wide meeting or in the regular district conferences, provided the presiding elders will find it possible to allow sufficient time for the presentation of these plans at each district conference. In connection with the young people's program, we suggest the holding of two separate summer assemblies (or camps)—one for those 12 to 16 and one for those above 16 years of age, definite plans for these assemblies to be worked out by the executive secretary and director of young people's work, in co-operation with the conference young people's organization.
- 2. Promotion of the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise. Attention is called to the fact that the General Conference provided one great missionary special for the Sunday schools and Epworth Leagues of the church to be known as the "Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise." It includes what was formerly in the old dual special in the Sunday school, and in the Epworth League special. It provides for an extension program in the Annual Conference, for a program of extension in church school work on the foreign field, and for other work in China and Africa. We lay emphasis upon the importance of every Sunday school and League coming in on this "Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise," observing Missionary Day once each month, preferably on the fourth Sunday. Funds accruing from the offerings on the fourth Sunday should by no means be diverted to any other cause, however worthy.
- 3. Reaching the Unreached. We call particular attention to the recommendation of the General Board of Christian Education that a special effort be made to reach the unreached for whom our church is responsible, and we call upon our pastors and other leaders to co-operate with the plans of our General and conference board staffs for making effective this special effort. We would hold carefully in mind the fact that the departments of the church exist for the whole church program, and that the planned-for increase should set as its goal the landing of every departmental member into active membership and service in the church.

Although we would give special emphasis to the three items referred to, attention is called to the fact that we cannot let up on other lines of work. The various aspects of the work in the three age-group divisions, in missionary education, in week-day sessions, in expanded Sunday morning sessions, in vacation schools, and more particularly in training work, must be carried out. Attention is called to the necessity of undergirding our entire program and organization under the new legislation with an adequate training program. There is perhaps greater need for an effective training program today than ever before. The permanent success of our new plans depends upon this. If anything, there should be a larger number of Standard training schools, standard training classes, and Cokesbury schools than ever before.

We recommend that our policy of using the North Carolina Christian Advocate as a means of promoting the program of our board, be continued and that its circulation be fostered through our training schools, institutes, and other

contacts with our churches.

II. Concerning the interests of schools and colleges within the bounds of our annual conference, your board endorses the following recommendations of the General Board:

- 1. That College Day be observed on the last Sunday in May, or as near thereto as practicable.
- 2. That the quarterly program in the interest of education, suggested for the fifth Sunday, be emphasized and its importance enhanced by suitable observance in every pastoral charge.
- 3. That in churches from which students have gone to college, student recognition night, suggested by the General Board, be observed as widely as possible.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

Greensboro College continues to fill a place of large service and distinction in the field of Christian education. The report of the board of trustees for the year 1930-31 is encouraging and demonstrative of the fact that, in the face of disconcerting economic conditions, it is yet possible for the small church college to carry on in heroic fashion.

With deep regrets we note the passing of Dr. W. B. North who, as a trustee of Greensboro College, rendered valuable and loval services to the institution.

With a re-enforced and thoroughly qualified faculty and adequate buildings and teaching facilities, Greensboro College deserves the ever-increasing patronage of our Methodist families.

The value of property of Greensboro College is \$582,716 and the endowment amounts to \$368,717. The indebtedness is listed at \$10,561.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

Under the presidency of Rev. A. D. Wilcox, Louisburg College opened this year with an enrollment of 167 students, an increase of 62.7% over last year. Through conservative and most economical operation, the college is not only making current expenses, but has also made substantial payment on debts of long standing. Equipped with an able faculty and patronized by a promising and enthusiastic student body, there is that type of co-operation at Louisburg College which assures gracious future results.

The charter of Louisburg College has been so amended upon proper authority as to allow the admittance of boys as students of the college. This amendment

has been instrumental in considerably increasing the student body.

During the year Rev. S. A. Cotton, a trustees of untiring devotion, was called into Eternity. Sorrowfully do we take knowledge of his sudden passing.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

Built about Trinity College, which goes back in its origins to 1835, Duke University, as now constituted, includes seven units: Trinity College, the Woman's College, the graduate and professional schools of arts and sciences, medicine, law, theology, and the Duke forest. With the exception of the Woman's College, all of these units have been operating on the new campus since September 30, 1930.

Although each of the various schools of the university is enjoying a steady growth and an enlarging scope of influence, with peculiar pride, we make mention of the progress in the school of religion and the graduate school of arts and sciences.

During the past five years, the school of religion has increased in its student body from 25 to 146. Manned by a faculty of the first rank and occupying its own specially adopted building, the school of religion is destined to succeed in a signal way.

The graduate school of arts and sciences, which is the school by which Duke University will be largely judged in educational circles, is a going concern. This school has had a progressive growth from 41 students, in 1924-25, to approximately 281 for the present year. In the faculty of the graduate school are many able and some famous teachers and scholars.

The Duke Hospital and the school of medicine, which opened in July and October, 1930, respectively, have already fully justified Mr. Duke's life and large philanthropy.

It is a source of strange gratification to all of us that during these days of financial depression, Duke University, in one form or another, is giving aid to a total of 1,357 students; \$366,128 will go from the several funds of the university to aid students in the payment of their university expenses in the academic year, 1931-32.

We announce the election of Miss Blanche Barringer as executive secretary and director of young people's work.

We announce the appointment of Dr. L. R. Wilson, Mrs. J. H. Highsmith, and our executive secretary, to serve with a like committee from the Board of

Christian Education of the Western North Carolina Conference to form a Wesley Foundation Commission to have charge of promoting religious work among students in the schools and colleges within the bounds of the two conferences.

We are deeply conscious of our limitations, and again we ask for the prayers,

the co-operation, and the constructive criticism of our people.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The inadequacy of funds this year is distressingly great and your board found it impossible to grant any new donations to applications at this time.

And we desire to call attention to the wide-spread distress caused by church debts and the inability of many congregations to meet promptly their debts during these financial hours of depression. In many instances these obligations have been contracted with a reckless disregard for the disciplinary law of the church which forbids the beginning of construction until three-fourths of the entire amount of said construction is in hand.

We desire to emphasize the injury to the cause and the great embarrassment to the board and the local churches caused by the defaults of payments. We deem it much better to worship in a church of moderate construction and even of inadequate accommodations rather than to erect larger churches with heavy indebtedness which overload the congregation. We recommend to this conference that no church buildings be enterprised which could not be paid for even in times of depression and financial distress.

It is the policy of the board to give preference to congregations which have no churches or parsonages rather than to those who would tear down their old buildings to construct new and larger buildings, thus contracting oppressive debts.

Your board desires to warn the brethren that we strenuously object to applying aid to churches which disregard the law of the church, either in the contracting of debts or in the failure to procure approved plans for construction and subsequently acquire the habit of frequent applications to the Boards of Church Extension.

We desire also to urge upon every preacher and presiding elder the urgent necessity of pressing upon the local congregations the work of church extension, since even mission appropriations go largely to naught where there is no church in which to preach and no parsonage for the pastor.

Your board, following the action of the Western North Carolina Conference board, enters into an agreement to pay its proportionate amount to Chapel Hill and College Place Churches for the relief of the interest and indebtedness of these churches. It is understood that this special donation is to be appropriated in toto to pay the principal of the bonded indebtedness.

There being no money in the treasury subject to appropriations, and not being able, as yet, to obtain the information from the Budget Commission as to how much we may expect, your board could make no definite grants, leaving both the applications and the distribution of same in the hands of the executive

It was ordered that interest to the amount of \$79.00 be paid to the General Board and the Chapel Hill-College Place grant be paid in full before making other grants.

This board, realizing the importance of Christian literature in the homes and churches of our people, and realizing that in order for Methodists to be an intelligent people they must be a reading people, presents the following resolutions:

THE PUBLISHING HOUSE

There are facts of interest contained within the annual statement of the Publishing House to which we call the sympathetic attention of our people.

The Cokesbury Press continues to make progress. We are now recognized as one of the largest and most progressive publishers of religious books in America. During the past year we have issued forty-six new books. Sixteen of these were written by Southern Methodists, the other authors on our list representing practically every Protestant denomination.

The circulation of our Sunday school periodicals shows some slight decrease. This is to be expected when financial conditions throughout the country are

taken into consideration.

Every effort possible has been made to increase the circulation of the Christian Advocate. Results have been disappointing. However, the church must have a periodical, and we trust that our preachers and members will make an aggressive effort to place this General organ of the church in the homes of all Southern Methodists during the coming year.

Total sales for the year amounted to \$1,842,864.39, a decrease of less than 5 per cent. In the face of the depression that has caused every church and Sunday school to curtail their expenses in every way possible, we feel that we can be proud of such a showing. Our profit for the year amounted to \$104,431.35.

We express to our preachers and members of the church our deep and sincere

appreciation for their continued loyal support,

ADVOCATES AND OTHER CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The Christian Advocate deserves our continued support. The North Carolina Christian Advocate must continue to make its helpful weekly visits to our homes. The Methodist Board of Publication, Incorporated, has encountered the financial stress and strain that during the past year has been the common lot of most, if not all, business enterprises. Constant hard work has been the order of each day without the results that one would like to see.

The job department has an income this year of \$2,723.68 over last year, but notwithstanding this increase, our expenses have been \$7,025.03 more than our income, which is to be accounted for by the following: The income from advertising this year has been \$4,122.60, while three years ago the income from the same source was \$12,193.03, a difference of \$8,070.43. The income this year from subscriptions was \$2,626.78 less than last year. For the last twelve months our mail has almost daily brought the message, "I am not able to pay for my paper." With a loss of \$8,070.43 in advertising and \$2,626.78 in subscriptions, it is easy to see why we are in the red \$7,025.03.

There are other heavy drains upon our income. To the clerical members of the Annual Conferences, including superannuates and widows of preachers, and to charity subscribers go 1,000 Advocates without cost to them. Then there are approximately 1,000 who receive the paper for one dollar a year. These are ministers of the gospel and people unable to pay to whom friends send the Advocate as a gift. These items constitute a donation of \$3,000 from the Metho-

dist Board of Publication to the parties we have mentioned.

Our only recourse is to increase our business. A united effort must be made to secure renewals and new subscriptions to the Advocate. We, therefore, submit the following plan for next year:

- Let two weeks be set apart in each district to stress good literature in all our churches, special effort to be made in each church to get new subscribers and renewals for the North Carolina Christian Advocate. The presiding elder and pastors in their district meetings will select the time and determine the methods of procedure in their several districts. One of the editors of the Advocate will try to be present at each district meeting.
- Let our church literature have a prominent place in all the efforts for Christian education. The Advocate gives two pages each week to the Boards of

Christian Education. The contents of these pages should go into many more homes each week, Let plans be laid to foster the reading of the church paper by securing new subscriptions among the young people and the teachers in our Sunday school.

3. Let the Woman's Missionary Societies extend the work for the Advocate and Voice. Many auxiliaries have a Voice and Advocate agent who is doing a fine work. Let every auxiliary have one member devoted to this end. The Advocate has two pages each week telling of the wonderful work of the missionary societies. To this missionary cause the Advocate is fully committed. And be it ever realized that in all church work the minister in charge is the man who must lead.

Michael Bradshaw is nominated to succeed himself on the board representing

the North Carolina Conference.

We request that M. T. Plyler be appointed editor of the North Carolina Christian Advocate,

We are not unmindful of the fact that excellent books have come from the press, bearing recent dates of publication, the authors of which are members of our conferences in North Carolina. Such books as Garber's "The Romance of Methodism," Ormond's "The Country Church in North Carolina," North's "The Harvest and the Reapers," Shackford's "Education in the Christian Religion," deserve our sympathetic reading, and their authors receive our grateful commendation.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

We gather at a time when the world is out of joint. This plight did not happen. Nothing happens in God's world. No generation can witness the killing and maining and wounding in mind and body of thirty million men, and the destruction of all the savings of a continent for a century without dislocation. When that tragedy was followed by an orgy of corruption, speculation and selfishness, the spectacle was witnessed of the United States withdrawing its cooperation towards reconstruction when it had the opportunity of leading mankind to peace and prosperity. Present conditions will end when governments and individuals replace national and personal interest with just laws and equal reward for industry and skill.

We call upon our people to extend practical sympathy and benevolence to the victims of a system which has worked inequitably. The test of Christian civilization is its attitude toward the poor and underprivileged. By that standard our country today stands shamed. The obligation of church and state is to find ways to prevent the tragedy of men willing to work denied opportunity, and in the present emergency to permit no human suffering. The Christian principle is that every man is his brother's keeper. That principle is disregarded as long as any shiver for want of fuel or hunger for want or bread or are cold for want of clothing.

In order to bring immediate relief to our own people and the starving in the Orient, we join with the Western North Carolina Conference in urging the president of the United States to request congress to enact laws so that the 200,000,000 bushels of wheat and more than 1,000,000 bales of cotton, purchased and held by the Farm Board, for which no normal market can be found, be used to aid the unemployed in our own country, and the millions who are victims of the floods in China.

In this dark hour let us recall that God is in His world and summon all people to become His agents in carrying help to the helpless. And let us turn to Him in our extremity, praying that He will give courage and strength, in the confidence that the God of our Fathers will bring deliverance to all who put their trust in Him.

EMPHASIS ON THE HOME

As Christian people we must never forget or fail to emphasize the central position of the home in human affairs, the supreme importance of family life, the place of childhood, the unity of parents and their offspring. These are the fundamental matters of civilized society. Today there are various inroads being made upon home life, such as easy divorce, literature in abundance urging companionate and trial marriage, and an abandon of reserve and the prevalence of looseness in practice in the relation of the sexes. During our recent legislature, bills were introduced to invite additional laxness to our own state's increasing divorce rate. We note with gratitude that our lawmakers resisted such proposals, but we warn the ministers and laymen of our church that such bills may be introduced again. Let us keep a watchful eye to uphold the Bible standards. Let us emphasize that the home, with its holy marriage tie and its faithful observance, is the foundation stone of the structure of the church and the state.

THE EVIL OF GAMBLING

During the recent legislature, active bodies were busy in the effort to encourage the most demoralizing species of gambling in our state. Earnest efforts were made to legalize pari-mutuel forms of chance, which the moral leaders of another generation outlawed with righteous indignation. We go on record as commending the lawmakers of our state and the citizens who prevented the enactment of such laws. In opposition to this and all forms of amusement that debase character, we stand where Wesley stood. We oppose "the taking such diversions as cannot be used in the name of the Lord Jesus." Let this rule apply to any and all types of amusements, now and forever. We shall resist to the bitter end the attempts to make North Carolina an open and shameless Reno or a commonwealth inviting gambling on the race track.

In view of the wide-spread and demoralizing gambling mania, which is in part responsible for the present economic depression, we quote and call to the attention of all our membership and all people the following declaration by the General Conference adopted in May, 1930:

"Gambling is one of the most degrading sins of our day. From this evil no division of society is exempted. . . By this practice men and women are degraded and the nobler qualities of character are endangered and destroyed.

"To continue to gamble is to weaken the best qualities of the individual, no matter what the form of gambling may be, whether on the race track, in the popular sports of the day, at the card table, or in the stock market.

. . The courts of our country, both state and federal, have held that gambling contracts are against public policy and unenforceable at law. The church approves these decisions of our civil tribunals and with greater emphasis condemns speculative contracts with reference to stocks as well as all other such gambling dealings."

PROHIBITION A SETTLED POLICY

From its foundation, the Methodist Church has been the foe of intemperance, of the still and the saloon. "Were it in my power," said John Wesley, "I would banish distilled liquors out of the world." Recognizing the drink evil as the most fruitful destroyer of the finest things in life and the worst enemy of the

home and the church, the followers of Wesley have joined with good people of all religious creeds and all others to put intoxicants under moral and legal outlawry. To that end our church has, from the beginning, consistently urged its membership to refrain from the use of intoxicants and to urge laws forbidding their manufacture, transportation and sale. Step by step, from the township and county and state up to and including the entire republic, laws have been enacted for complete prohibition. It is now embodied in the constitution of the United States. There it stands upon a par in authority with the guarantees of freedom of religion, the freedom of the press and the liberty and equality of all the people who believe that all just government rests upon the consent of the governed. Where the law has been enforced, it has brought the blessings of sobriety and improvement in every relation of life. Prohibition has not failed anywhere. In every place where failure and near failure exists, it can be traced to the laxness of public officials and the recession of faith and determination upon the part of those who violate it and wink at violations by others. Drink degrades manhood and debauches womanhood alike under the open saloon and its illegal traffic. Our fight is against the drink habit because of the evils that follow in its train. In this hour of organized effort to modify or repeal the eighteenth amendment, we declare our unalterable adhesion to national prohibition and to all laws, state and national, enacted to carry it into effect. We call upon all public officials from the lowest to the highest to use all diligence to secure its full enforcement. We have enlisted for the war, and stand firmly and resolutely against any backward steps. We pledge ourselves to uphold the hands of all public officials who stand sincerely for the law as it is, against any letting down of the law, and we stand unitedly for its effective enforcement.

The church is challenged to urge upon its membership not only respect for the law, but to set the example of non-indulgence and to set their faces against its use in the home and in society. Our preachers are urged to preach upon the evils of intemperance as if there were no law and to depend upon securing a

sober country both upon reason and law.

AN ENLIGHTENED PEOPLE

The recent survey, disclosing that there are approximately one hundred thousand adult whites and a larger number of negroes incapable of reading and writing in North Carolina, demands a deeper interest in the education of all people. We recognize the supreme duty of the state to be to guarantee the inalienable right of an opportunity of schooling to every child in the commonwealth. The recent recession from the goal set in the Aycock era calls for renewed resolve to make sacrifices for public schools and institutions of the state, and of the colleges and universities established by the church. Investment in immortal mind brings the largest dividends.

OUR COLORED BRETHREN

The Methodist Church feels a peculiar interest in the welfare of our Negro neighbors, and recognizes its duty of co-operation in all ways that work for their welfare and religious improvement. We commend the delicate and difficult work of the interracial commissions operating in North Carolina and the South. We must remember that one of our own Methodist ministers—Dr. W. W. Alexander of Atlanta—is director of this noble work. Let us give him and all engaged in this good work our co-operation. For eight or ten years our state has witnessed only a single lynching due to our people's consideration for the law. That was one too many. We rejoice that state and church leaders alike have set their faces like flint against the crime of lynching and rejoice in the sound public sentiment against mob law.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE

Our preachers are urged to stress Sabbath observance. One day in seven for rest and worship is God's appointed plan. Any let-up or let-down relating to this day means a weakening of the moral stamina. Let us go on record strongly as believing and accepting the fourth commandment—Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy.

THE OUTLAWRY OF WAR

The church, founded on the precepts of the Prince of Peace, cannot give its blessings to war. When the armistice was signed, and the treaty of peace agreed upon at Paris, mankind believed the dreams of a warless world were about to be realized. The four and a half million soldiers and sailors, responding to the call to fight in what was called "a war against war," felt that their sacrifices and those of their fallen comrades would save unborn generations from the agonies and tragedies of war. In the years that have followed, while failing to ratify the Versailles Treaty and declining to take the vacant seat at Geneva or enter the World Court, this country has signed treaties to preserve the territorial rights of China and prevent war in the Far East, and has led in the treaty of outlawry of war and has co-operated to secure reductions in naval fighting power. When the war clouds lately loomed in the Orient, and there was danger that the treaties and pledges of peace would be regarded as mere scraps of paper, the president wisely sent an American to sit with the League of Nations and to co-operate to prevent war between Japan and China. Peace advocates of all creeds approved this evidence that the peace-loving republic was ready to throw the weight of its influence to prevent the scrapping of solemn treaty rights, and to use its good offices and whole-hearted co-operation to put an end to the war in its first stages. We pledge to the president full approval of every step taken to secure peace in the Far East and urge upon those in authority the most complete co-operation of this country which the League of Nations and all agencies now mobilized or that may be mobilized for peace. If, in this crisis the friends of peace do not exert themselves to prevent war, all that has been gained for peaceful settlement of national disagreements will be lost.

The supreme need of the world today is a workable substitute for war. The only agency now functioning to replace war with arbitration is the League of Nations, and we urge that America take its seat in that peace federation.

The preacher who during his years of active service fails to support this cause, when his active days are over can not complain if the fund is not sufficient to support him.

We urge that every preacher present this cause to every congregation at

some time during the year and an offering be taken for it.

We request the Bishop to appoint Rev. T. M. Grant conference director of Superannuate Endowment, and ask that he be given the hearty co-operation of every member of the conference, and that each presiding elder provide in his District conference program an opportunity for the director, or his representative, to present this cause.

The conference having already taken care of the orphanage, their claims

were not considered by us.

REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

Our Methodist Orphanage is caring for 340 fatherless children, the largest number in the history of the institution. The superintendent reports that there are now 108 bona fide applications for admissions on file, and every bed in the institution is now occupied. In addition to these applications, scores of requests have been made for the care of destitute children throughout the bounds of the conference.

Recently there was held a revival at our orphanage which resulted in the conversion of thirty of the children, and all of these were baptized and received into Jenkins Memorial Church. All the children of the institution, over 6 years of age, are members of our church. The orphanage has a well-organized Sunday

school and two Epworth Leagues that are functioning successfully.

We note with pleasure that the orphanage is being operated upon a very economical basis. The Duke Endowment report shows that the average per capita cost per annum of the 10 largest orphanages of the two Carolinas is \$306. The per capita cost of our orphanages per annum is \$262. This report reveals the fact that the per capita cost of the Methodist Orphanage per annum is \$44.00 less than the average among the ten mentioned.

Since the orphanage had to remove the dairy from the city limits, the trustees have erected a large barn and dairyman's house at a cost of \$18,000 on the

Caraleigh Farm, which is owned by the orphanage.

Mr. John L. Borden, of Goldsboro, during the past conference year has given \$5,000 which has been added to the \$1,000 previously given by him as a loan fund for higher education for our boys and girls after finishing high school. Also, during this year, Mrs. Alice Y. Cole, of Smithfield, N. C., left in her will property appraised at \$100,000 which is to be applied to the orphanage endowment in memory of her father and mother. Because of outstanding indebtedness, however, against the property it will be at least two years before the orphanage will receive any dividends for operating expenses. For these benefactions we wish to acknowledge our gratitude to Almighty God, and we wish to commend their example to others whom God has blessed with this world's goods.

The orphanage singing class, during this year, has visited many of our churches in which they have given sacred concerts. The unanimous opinion of the preachers and people is that these concerts have been an inspiration and benediction to our people. Furthermore, these concerts have deepened the interests

of the conference in our orphanage.

Your committee, after careful investigation of the many requests coming from pastors and laymen, has unanimously come to the conclusion that it would be to the best interest of the orphanage for this conference to take the orphanage assessment out of the conference budget and we hereby recommend that this be done. We further recommend that the conference levy an assessment for the coming year of an amount equal to 10 per cent of the salaries assessed for the pastors for year now closing, 1930-1931. We further recommend that all specials raised during the Thanksgiving season, both in churches and Sunday schools, and the monthly offerings from the Sunday schools, individual gifts, organized classes, and from all other sources, be applied to specials and not on assessments. Since

the assessment we are asking the conference for, if paid in full, will only meet 50 per cent of the operating expenses, we, therefore, urge all our Sunday schools, superintendents, teachers of organized classes, to give a monthly offering as far

as is practicable.

Your committee learns with pleasure that, immediately following the close of the last conference, the salaries of the superintendent and all his corps of workers were reduced. We are also glad to state that the superintendent, of his own accord, stated to your committee that while the board of trustees had fixed his salary at \$4,000, that he only accepted \$3,800, and at the beginning of this conference year has further volunteered to reduce it \$200, thus making the salary \$3,600 for the coming year.

We wish to commend the efficient manner in which the superintendent has conducted all the interests of our children's home. We further commend the efforts and investigations which are being made by Mr. Barnes looking toward state aid for operating the orphanage school. At present the 10th and 11th grades

are being sent to the city school with very gratifying results.

We respectfully request the appointment of Rev. A. S. Barnes as superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage for the ensuing year. We further recommend the appointments of Rev. C. K. Proctor as superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage; and Rev. E. L. Stack as superintendent of the Odd Fellows Orphanage.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Conference Board of Lay Activities submits the following report:

In the face of world conditions, out of which come a challenge and an opportunity to the church, we recognize the supreme obligation of the laymen to consecrate their lives anew to the task of Christian service, and we urge them to give themselves whole-heartedly to the work of carrying through the full

program of the church for the coming year.

We suggest that the pastor, in co-operation with the local Board of Lay Activities and the local Board of Christian Education, work out at the beginning of the conference year a complete program of activities of the church for the year. In planning this program, we recognize the need of bringing more laymen into the active work of the church and suggest that some plan be devised for developing the men of the church in point of deeper spiritual experience and larger service.

The Board of Lay Activities, under the direction of the Commission on Benevolences, will continue its efforts to promote the full payment of benevolences. To this end, we recommend that special effort be made by the local Board of Lay Activities to develop the spirit of connectional-mindedness in our people and to increase their inspiration and liberality through a program of information

concerning the benevolent interests of the church.

We recognize the increasing difficulty inherent in an enlarged program of Christian service on the part of our church without the development of a stewardship conscience and the cultivation of the practice of stewardship principles on the part of the members of the board of stewards and the membership of the church. We, therefore, urge greater activity on the part of the Stewardship Committee of the local church in the work of education in stewardship.

There is another reason for the necessity of stewardship cultivation. It lies in the necessity of deepening the spiritual life of our people. The cold and clammy mist of materialism hovers over us with such density that our vision cannot pierce through into the clear light of the Invisible. We need to recover a consciousness of the fact that we live in an essentially moral and spiritual universe. Our people must be challenged to go on a great spiritual adventure for God. They must be set aflame with a passion for lost souls. The sad thing is that we are so disturbed by the economic depression and have felt so little concern about the depression of our souls—of our spiritual life and activity.

Without this deepening of our spiritual life, we cannot hope to carry out the supreme object of our great church for the coming year—"To reach the unreached." We cannot lead others any further than we have gone ourselves. If we are ever to reach the multiplied thousands of the "unreached," it must be

through the vitalized contagion of a rebirth of religion in ourselves.

We recommend that "Layman's Day" be observed in every church the second Sunday in June, June 12th, 1932, and we request the General Board of Lay Activities to prepare a special program to be used throughout the entire church on that day. We especially urge district lay leaders, in co-operation with the charge and church lay leaders, to make early plans for this observance.

We earnestly recommend the Methodist Layman as an invaluable aid to every

member of the church in a position of responsibility.

We specifically recommend, as our goal for the coming year, a subscription to the *Methodist Layman* from at least every district, charge, and church lay leader; from every chairman of a board of stewards, and from every chairman

of a Stewardship Committee in each district of the conference.

We endorse the recommendation of the Findings Committee of the Lake Junaluska Laymen's Conference, held in August, 1931, that there should be at Lake Junaluska, July 20-25, inclusive, 1932, a great gathering of the laymen, representatives from every district of our conference in our territory, for a program of study and inspiration such as would vitally affect practically every local church in this territory. If this conference is called by the General Board of Lay Activities, we urge every district lay leader to present this matter at his District conference in the spring.

We respectfully request the conference to set apart Thursday night of conference week for the annual program of the Conference Board of Lay Activities.

We nominate W. P. Few for conference lay leader, W. K. Greene for associate conference lay leader, and F. S. Aldridge for secretary-treasurer of the board.

REPORT OF HOSPITAL BOARD

Your Conference Hospital Board met at 2:30 p. m., Thursday of conference. In the absence of Dr. Charles C. Jarrell, Dr. W. A. Lambeth brought his message to the board, telling in his own interesting way what the various church hospitals are doing for patients with limited means and for those who are wholly subjects of charity. He gave concrete illustrations of the work done at our hospitals of the Southern Methodist Church and showed this to be the greatest means of advancing the enrollment in the Golden Cross.

Dr. F. R. Yarborough supplemented Dr. Lambeth's talk by naming concrete cases of his own practice who were taken care of at Duke Hospital partly by aid of the limited Golden Cross donation from his church. He also told of the greatly increased interest in this movement since the building of the Duke Hospital.

With information from the General Hospital Board, we find that the last ten years of hospital history has witnessed the opening of the following splendid institutions: Montgomery Memorial Hospital, Montgomery, Ala.; The Good

Samaritan Hospital, Lexington, Ky.; Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium, Tucson, Arizona; Methodist Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee; Methodist Hospital, Houston, Texas; Methodist Hospital, Hattiesburg, Miss.; Dallas Methodist Hospital, Dallas, Texas; Methodist Hospital, Fort Worth, Texas; Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital, Elkin, N. C.; Duke Hospital, Durham, N. C.; and Warren A. Candler Hospital, Atlanta, Ga. Duke University celebrated in April the formal opening of its great medical center, combining a medical college with a hospital. No one year has gone by without signal event in the development of the hospital enterprise. It is doubtful if any enterprise of the church ever saw, in one decade, such rapid development. It is interesting to note with what liberality other conferences are responding to this worthy cause (North Georgia with \$5,400, Kentucky with \$1,331, and Western North Carolina Conference with \$2,659.04), while our own North Carolina paid only \$158.00 in 1930 and \$255.00 this year. In view of the fact that we, of the North Carolina Conference, have one of the largest and most modernly equipped hospitals of the country in Duke Hospital at Durham, N. C., should not we, more than any other conference of Southern Methodism, take the lead in contributing to the worthy cause of the Golden Cross?

We recommend that every presiding elder, together with the pastors of the various local charges, recommend and encourage the hospital work and Golden Cross enrollment, throughout the North Carolina Conference.

That the second and third Sundays in May be known as Golden Cross enroll

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON BENEVOLENCES

Your Commission on Benevolences is not a commission or board seeking aid for itself to carry on a special line of work. It is a commission charged with informing the children, youth and adult membership of the church concerning all our connectional work and to enlist their whole-hearted support of all these

causes. In this, the first year of our work, we have tried to co-operate with the General Commission to the best of our ability. Literature has been sent out and each of the district meetings have been visited by members of the commission.

We desire to make the following recommendations regarding the work next

year:

1. The Discipline now requires that the district lay leader, with the presiding elder, shall call the charge lay leaders to meet with the district stewards in the annual meeting to plan for the year's work. The pastors are also to be invited to this meeting. We feel that this can be made one of the most important district meetings of the year. We urge the presiding elders to make careful plans for this meeting. That there may be no conflict, the following dates are suggested for these meetings:

Orphanage, \$50.00.

4. We heartily approve the following resolution adopted by the Executive

Committee of the General Commission on Benevolences:

"That in order to meet an emergency which has come to our great Board of Missions in its world-wide work, we join with the College of Bishops in approving a voluntary cash collection on either November 29 or December 6 of this year."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SPIRITUAL LIFE

Your Committee on Spiritual Life of the Church begs leave to make the following report:

Knowing that when the Holy Spirit departs from any form of character it

withers like a sapless tree.

Knowing that there is a vast deal of religious emotion that carries with it no

inspiration of duty and service.

We call our ministers and laymen to the nobler realities of spiritual experience, such as was the joy of the men whom Jesus trained in the way of the spirit, that we, too, may make that discovery of a fellowship with one another and with Christ that makes Him still present with power in our midst.

They spoke of that fellowship as an unquestioned reality—"It seemed good

to the Holy Spirit and to us." Acts 15:28.

We suggest Bible reading as a means of deepening spiritual power, and urge our people to study that book of the Spirit from the first page where the Spirit of God changed the chaos and darkness that was upon the face of the deep, to the last page that rings out the evangelical challenge of the church to the world, "The Spirit and the bride say, come." Let us search that vast storehouse of spiritual wealth.

For our spiritual life conference this year we recommend that each District conference be at least two days in session, and that the first day be given over entirely to the cultivation of the Spiritual life of the church, and that a program covering the entire day may be planned so as to emphasize the place of the Holy Spirit in our lives, and, so far as human agencies can do so, to provide an

opportunity and channel for the revelation of His power.

We feel that our District conferences will result in real spiritual feasts by giving the first day entirely to the work of the Holy Spirit in our own lives and in the lives of our local church leaders.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION ON METHODIST CO-OPERATION

The Joint Commission on Methodist Co-operation submits the following

1. We rejoice that, through this commission and through the messages of the fraternal messengers sent annually to the sessions of our three conferences, finer fraternal feelings and a spirit of closer co-operation in Kingdom service are constantly growing among us.

2. We recommend that our agreements for closer co-operation in communities as practiced for the last two years, and as recorded in the conference journals of 1929 and endorsed in journals of 1930, be still held in force, and that both denominations continue to seek to foster a spirit of brotherly love which will

best build up the Kingdom of our Christ,

3. We submit the following for the consideration of the three conferences: Desiring earnestly the union of Methodism in America, and praying for its speedy coming, we recommend that the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and the North Carolina Conference and the Western North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, take such action at their approaching sessions as will hasten such union, and that steps leading thereto be taken through the properly constituted channels.

4. Following our usual agreement that two members of the Joint Commission, representing each of the denominations, shall expire each year, we recommend that the matter of electing their successors be left to the respective

conferences concerned.

PROPOSALS FOR UNION OF THE METHODIST EPISCO-PAL CHURCH, SOUTH, AND THE METHODIST PROTESTANT CHURCH IN NORTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, meeting at Albemarle, N. C., November 10, 1930, by formal resolution proposed union with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in this state, and,

WHEREAS, the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, assembled in Greensboro, N. C., on the same date, passed a resolution seeking to consummate this union and appointed a commission to meet with a similar commission of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and,

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Conference, assembled in Henderson, N. C., on November 22, 1930, adopted a similar resolution and appointed a similar commission, and,

WHEREAS, this joint commission has met in Greensboro, N. C., on this 24th day of September, 1931, Bishop E. D. Mouzon presiding, for the purpose of formulating proposals to be submitted to the three conferences concerned,

THEREFORE, be it resolved:

First, that superannuates, their widows, and orphans of the three contracting conferences receive equal consideration in the distribution of all funds held by the Board of Finance.

Second, that all funds, endowments, and foundations administered by the several boards and commissions of the three contracting conferences be distributed impartially.

Third, that a readjustment of the education and philanthropic work of the two churches, with a view of consolidation of institutions, be worked out by a joint commission created by the three contracting conferences.

Fourth, that the consolidation of local churches and charges, made advisable by the proposed union, be effected by gradual process so as to protect the interests of the churches and the preachers of the three contracting conferences.

Fifth, that we recommend that, during the period of transition and readjustment, representation of the Methodist Protestant Conference be provided for in the Bishop's cabinet.

Sixth, that Dr. W. P. Few and Rev. W. A. Newell be appointed to present these resolutions to the three annual conferences involved in this proposed union.

REPORT OF THE DUKE FUND COMMISSION

From the first, money received from the Duke Fund went to aid in the building of churches in the country, and to support preachers in country places. Later, assistant pastors have been sent out to the country places to engage in various lines of church work.

For several years the Board of Church Extension of Louisville has placed a competent architect, Mr. H. N. Haines, at Duke University, Durham, N. C., to co-operate with Duke University and the Duke Foundation in the building

of country churches. He is available for drawing plans and for supervising all kinds of church buildings in both town and country.

The several lines along which the Duke Foundation proceeds are well known.

ASSISTANT PASTORS

Sixty-seven assistant pastors were sent out to work on the rural circuits of North Carolina for ten weeks during the summer of 1931. Some did evangelistic work exclusively, some Cokesbury work exclusively, some did the general work of an assistant pastor, and one man distributed books.

Special attention is directed to a new book just off the press by Prof. J. M.

Ormond, entitled, "The Country Church in North Carolina."

SOLON A. COTTON

By John H. Shore

Solon Ashe Cotton, son of James Granberry and Abbie Russell Cotton, was born in Montgomery County, N. C., March 11, 1869, and passed away almost suddenly in the parsonage at Sanford, N. C., September 10, 1931. He was married to Miss Maluna Odessa Davenport, daughter of J. C. R. and Mary A. Davenport, in Edgecombe County, N. C., December 21, 1898. Surviving him are his widow and six children, Mabel Ruth, Solon Russell, Maude Garland, Ingram Speight, Joe Granberry and Worth Bagley Cotton.

He leaves also one sister and five brothers: R. H. Kearns, a half brother; Thom L., Letha, P. H., M. E. and Joe T. Cotton. Brother Cotton gave his heart and life to God at the age of sixteen and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and heard at once the call of God to

preach the gospel.

He received his educational training in the public schools and at Union

Institute in Union County.

He was licensed to preach June 23, 1894, by Dr. J. T. Gibbs, presiding elder at Prospect Church on the Prospect Circuit in the Rockingham District. He joined the North Carolina Conference at its session held in Durham in December, 1894.

He was ordained a deacon in 1896 and ordained an elder in 1898. If he had lived until the session of this conference he would have been

in the ministry thirty-seven years.

He served the following charges in the conference: Conetoe Circuit, 1895-98; Durham Mission, 1899; Clayton Circuit, 1900-01; Enfield and Halifax, 1902-04; Roper, 1905-06; Elizabeth City, 1907-08; Red Springs, 1909-12; Beaufort, 1913; Littleton, 1914-16; Smithfield, 1917-20; Franklinton, 1921; Washington District, 1922-25; Weldon District, 1926-29; Sanford, 1930 and until date of his death, September 10, 1931.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church at Sanford, conducted by J. H. Shore, E. H. McWhorter and his presiding elder, W. A.

Cade.

His body was carried to Weldon and laid away tenderly by loving hands under a mound covered with the richest profusion of flowers. We are accustomed to death, but when those whom we have known and loved pass from us, we are always shocked at their going. When a man has reached his three score years and ten, and is just "walking up and down the banks of the Jordan, looking for a place to cross," we are not so shocked when the boatman comes. But when a man is cut down in the midst of the years, and at the time of his greatest usefulness, human reason staggers at the mysterious providence.

When the message went out to every part of our conference that Rev. Solon A. Cotton, pastor of the Methodist Church in Sanford, had almost suddenly passed from among us, there was cast a shadow of gloom and loneliness over multitudes of people that had known and loved him

through the years.

He lived a beautiful, well rounded, faithful life, and he had not left the shadow of a doubt as to where his friends may find him. He surrendered his life to God in early youth, and he always loved to talk with his intimate friends about the gracious experience that came to him when he found a personal Saviour, and how God called him to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Brother Cotton was well endowed with native ability and he made the most of what God had invested in his life, improving every opportunity to prepare himself for a life of the greatest usefulness in his chosen work, and he could say at the end, "this one thing I have done." He always magnified the grace of God in his own personal life, and in the gospel he preached to others. He met every specification of God, in the measurement of a man. As a husband and father, he was devotedly attached to his family, and made every sacrifice possible for their comfort and happiness. In the life that he lived and in the work that he did, he has left to his family, his church and the world, a legacy that is richer than gold.

As a preacher he had experimental knowledge of the verities of eternal truth, and when the people heard him preach, they knew that they were listening to a man who had come from the secret presence of God and that he spoke with divine authority. He never wasted his time, nor brought his commission into disrepute by giving to hungry, sin-sick souls the husks of human speculations, but fed them with the fundamentals of the gospel that saves men from sin, and God honored his faithful ministry with the salvation of many souls.

As a pastor he had a sympathetic approach to the people and sought to bring renewed strength to the weak, and comfort to the sorrowing. He possessed an attractive type of religion and a sanctified humor that radiated joy and sunshine in every home that he and in every group of persons where he was found.

As a presiding elder he had the absolute love and confidence of his preachers, and they were willing to trust themselves in his hands. The laity followed his leadersh because they had the utmost faith in his ability, his honesty and his sincerity.

He was popular in every relation to which he was called to serve, but he never used the superficial arts of guile to gather about him a personal following, but he reflected the mind and spirit of Jesus Christ, and so magnified his Lord and Saviour, that the people loved him for the sake of the Christ whom he represented.

Brother Cotton was a man of strong convictions and believed intensely in what he conceived to be the right, and every one knew where he stood on every issue, effecting the interest of the church, and on every moral question affecting human society.

Expediency had no place in his character when it was at the compromise of principle, and he would have gone to the stake and died a martyr before he would have deviated one iota from the highest standards of moral integrity.

Those who were admitted to the inner circle of his friendship, knew with what courage and fortitude he bore the burdens of his life, and how he fought its battles with an unflinching faith in God, believing that "all things work together for good to them that love God." Faithfulness, honesty, sincerity, and devotion to duty marked every worf and act of his life. He was inspired by the highest ideals of what a Christian minister ought to be, and there is no question mark about his character as a man, or his ministry in the world. His brethren honored him with membership in two General Conferences, at Memphis and at Dallas.

The great throngs of people that attended his funeral at Sanford and that gathered in the cemetery at Weldon, bore strong testimony to the affection in which his memory is held. There were a great number of preachers present, both at Sanford and at Weldon, where we laid his body at rest.

His friends believe that his going was just as he would have planned. He preached twice on the Sunday before he was translated, and held his Wednesday evening service before he passed away the next day. Good night, friend and brother, we will see you in the morning.

W. F. GALLOWAY

William Franklin Galloway was the son of John and Laura Robinson Galloway. He was born in Montgomery County, N. C., March 12, 1860. He attended school at Mt. Gilead High School and then spent three years at Yadkin College.

On October 1+, 1886, he was married to Miss Lucy H. Ross, of Albemarle. To them were born three sons: Frank Ross, who died in Farmville in 1906; Haddon Lamar, of Burlington; and Craig H., of same place.

He joined the conference at Greensboro in 1889 and served the following appointments: Kenly, 1890; Aurora, 1891; (sick, 1892); Cape Fear, 1893-96; Newton Grove, 1897-99; (evangelistic work, 1900-03); Hatteras, 1904; Bath, 1905; Farmville, 1906; Dover, 1906-08; Hobgood, 1909-10; Roanoke Rapids, 1911; South Alamance, 1912-15; Burlington Circuit, 1916-19.

He was superannuated at the conference of 1919 and spent the last years of his life in Burlington, where he was loved and respected. For a number of years his health was very poor, but whenever he was able he attended the church services and found great joy in the gospel which he had loved so long and preached so faithfully.

He died at his home in Burlington, September 17, 1931. The funeral services were conducted in Front Street Church by the presiding elder, J. C. Wooten, and his pastor, L. D. Hayman. The large congregation attending this service bore testimony of the love for him and the esteem in which he was held in his own church and town. More beautiful floral offerings are not often seen.

He was a faithful husband, a devoted father, a fine friend, and an exceptionally good pastor. His devotion to his work did not keep him from seeing and enjoying life and sympathizing with the joyous and happy, but his greatest work was done when he carried words of comfort and cheer to those in distress.

The ruling passion of his life was to see souls saved. So the revival season was a happy time for him. His simple faith made the Word the power of God unto salvation. There are many who will remember him as God's messenger, whose words brought them from sin to salvation.

RODERICK BELTON JOHN

Roderick Belton John was born in Marleboro County, South Carolina, July 11, 1859. The son of Captain James Thomas John and Mrs. Margaret (McRae) John, he inherited the strength of two great lines, Welsh and Highland Scotch. While he was yet a lad, the family moved to the Caledonia neighborhood in what was then Richmond, now Scotland County. It was never my privilege to know his mother, but in after years, as pastor of Caledonia Church, I was closely associated with his father, and count him easily one of the great men of my acquaintance.

Though living on a farm, Brother John had excellent early advantages. His father and his mother's brother, Mr. Peter McRae, saw to it that the local school had a series of well equipped teachers. Later he spent three years at Wofford College, over which presided that prince of men and teachers, Dr. James H. Carlisle. While here he was impressed with a call to preach. In a vain effort, as he himself told me, to escape that conviction, he left Wofford and entered the University of North Carolina, where he graduated in 1880. He taught school in Richmond County two years and acted as superintendent of public instruction for that county one year. During 1882-83 he attended the Biblical department of Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn., from which institution he was graduated in 1883. In each of the three colleges which Brother John attended, though in equipment they fell far short of their present rank, he was brought into close contact with some of the greatest Christian scholars of that day.

In December, 1883, he joined the North Carolina Conference at States-ville. His appointments were as follows: 1883-85, Chapel Hill; 1886, Central Church, Raleigh; 1887-90, Greenville; 1891-93, presiding elder Washington District; 1894-95, the first presiding elder from our conference on the Elizabeth City District; 1896, St. Paul Church, Goldsboro; 1897-99; Centenary, New Bern; 1900-03, Wilmington District; 1904, Kinston; 1905, Washington District; 1906-09, Raleigh District; 1910-13, Fayetteville District; 1914-15, Smithfield; during the year 1916 he was elected president of Carolina College, Maxton, which he held until 1922; 1922, supernumerary; 1923, superannuate; 1924, Roseboro Circuit; 1925 until his death, superannuate. He was thus a pastor 16 years, a college president six years, a presiding elder 18 years, and on the retired list nearly seven years.

He was elected an alternate to the General Conference of 1910 and sat as delegate during its closing hours. He was deeply interested in our paper problem and was one of those whose investment of thought and money saved our *Advocate* in a critical hour. He was acknowledged one of the wisest among us, and his counsel was sought both by the leaders and his lesser brethren in many matters.

My own association with Brother John began when he came to Chapel Hill as pastor toward the close of my student life there. As my pastor there and later as my friend and almost elder brother, he added much in many ways to my life. On the other hand this close association enabled me to know him and to appreciate him as few could. To others he might seem hard; I knew the tenderness of his kindly heart and his loyalty to his brethren and to his church. To an acquaintance he sometimes appeared

stolid; I and others close to him knew how almost abnormally keen was his sensitive soul.

As a preacher he did not practice the arts of an orator. Indeed he did not practice art in any department of his life. His intense hatred of sham made pretense of any kind impossible to him. But in the pulpit as in all his work he was strong. One of our most intelligent women, who heard him preach often, said to me recently, "You might have to make yourself listen to the beginning of Mr. John's sermon, but if you did that you would have to listen to the balance of it." It was my good fortune to serve, several years after in each case, the churches to which he gave 12 of the 15 years of his pastoral care. The records and the testimony of those who knew him best showed a wise, faithful and constructive pastoral work in each. His four years at Greenville came at a transition period in the life of the town and of the church; and judged by the records was one of the most fruitful pastorates of which I have personal knowledge.

The period of his service as president of Carolina College was, I fear, a time of trial to my friend. As the events proved, it was a hopeless situation. Perhaps he did all that could have been done. But the task, reluctantly accepted, was to him a heavy burden. Nevertheless he gave himself to it, and many of the teachers and students went out into life broader.

and stronger because of his wisdom and fidelity.

But the 18 years spent in district work was Brother John's chief contribution to his church. For that office he was naturally fitted. Criticism of the presiding eldership is usually from those who are not well informed enough to know its importance in our itinerant system. Then there are those who emphasize the incidental rather than the essential in the office. These may not appreciate the work done by Brother John as presiding elder. But one who shares with your writer the belief that the presiding eldership is the most important office in the church and who believes with me that its essentials are thorough knowledge of the work throughout the district, wise, constructive planning, ability to measure men and skill to fit men to tasks, with courage and fidelity to do what one's best judgment demands without fear, favor, reward or hope of reward—to such an one the work of R. B. John through 18 years on five districts is a service beyond words. I feel sure his Master has said of it, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

December 26, 1886, Brother John married Miss Sallie Warren Atwater, of Chatham County. Their happy married life only lasted six years as she died at Greenville December 22, 1891. To this union were born two daughters: Margaret, now Mrs. N. T. Holland, of Durham, and Louise, who died in the bloom of her girlhood. June 25, 1902, he married Miss Florina Worth, who not only shared with him the labors of his ministry until the end, but who has made large contribution on her own part to the life of the church through the work of the woman's missionary society. When he first took a retired relation, they established their home in Fayetteville. He has busied himself with his farm. She has been a teacher in the city high school. Fayetteville has been enriched by their residence here.

When I came to Fayetteville two years ago as pastor I found in them appreciative friends and loyal helpers. Brother John was already breaking under the strain of years and disease, but he was often in my home and regularly in his place in church. Some months ago it became manifest that his malady was serious. With characteristic quietness and completeness he

set his house in order, and, with seeming realization of all that was involved, placed himself in the hands of his physician. At one time there seemed hope, but after months of suffering and helplessness, he quietly fell

asleep August 25, 1931.

Owing to the sickness of the pastor, the funeral services in Hay Street Church were conducted by the presiding elder, Rev. W. A. Cade. At his request, Rev. W. R. Royall, a long time friend, paid tribute to the departed. Aided by Dr. C. M. Hawkins, they laid him to rest in his own chosen place in the Laurinburg Cemetery.

Indeed, my brethren, we have lost a great man, a great Christian and a great servant of God and his church. Verily, a prince in Israel has fallen.

WILLIAM BURROUS NORTH

To review, even in a brief way, the history and character of a life so truly great as was Dr. North's, is both an inspiration and a blessing to any one. He was born of noble parentage, brought up in the finest religious atmosphere, splendidly trained for his life's work, served his church in a distinguished way, and received almost every honor the church had to offer.

William Burrous North was born in York County, S. C., April 2nd, 1861, and passed away in the parsonage at Edenton, N. C., June 21st, 1931. He had already closed his fourth year of service in that station and had rounded a ministry of fifty years. When William was four years of age his father, who was a preacher, moved to North Carolina, where he served many important charges before his death in 1893. William B. North was licensed to preach August 7th, 1880, by the Laurinbur Quarterly Conference, under the presiding eldership of Rev. L. L. Hendren. He was admitted on trial into the Annual Conference held at Winston-Salem in December, 1880. At the Raleigh Conference, December 11th, 1882, he was ordained deacon by Bishop Keener; and ordained elder by Bishop Linus Parker in Wilmington, November 30th, 1884. For ten years he served charges in the North Carolina Conference and then transferred to Missouri, being one of the young men to answer Bishop Duncan's plea for ministers much needed in the middle western conferences. He went out there with the idea of staying possibly ten years, but in reality remained for eighteen. He filled several of the larger stations and districts in Missouri, returning to North Carolina in the fall of 1908.

Dr. North was educated at Wofford College, S. C., and at Rutherford College, North Carolina. In addition to this, he took summer courses at Vanderbilt University and also completed a course in law, While pastor at Chapel Hill in 1889, during the illness of Dr. Mangum, he occupied temporarily the chair of Mental and Moral Philosophy in the State University. About that same period he received the degree of Doctor of

Philosophy.

While in the Saint Louis Conference Dr. North was a delegate to the Educational Convention at Fayette, Missouri, in 1890, and the General Missionary Conference at New Orleans in 1901. He was also one of the representatives to the International Christian Endeavor Convention which met in Washington, D. C. The Saint Louis Conference sent him as a delegate to the General Conference of 1902, meeting in Dallas, Texas. For several years immediatel—preceding his death he was a trustee of Greensboro College for Women.

Surviving him are his wife, who was miss Emma Stem, of Stem, N. C., and two children, Paul H. North, of Columbus, Ohio, and Mrs. Tillman Hines, of Raleigh, and the following brothers and sisters: T. K. North, of Dunnellon, Florida; Dr. Harry M. North, of Raleigh; Mrs. T. J. Gill, of Laurinburg; Mrs. T. W. Stacy, of Marion; Mrs. W. E. Severance and Miss Eva North, of Lake City, S. C.

Funeral services were held at Laurinburg by Rev. O. W. Dowd, presiding elder of the Elizabeth City District, assisted by Dr. C. M. Hawkins, Rev. F. S. Love and Rev. J. C. Wooten, and the interment was in the cemetery there.

We know no minister in our conference who served his Lord more devotedly, his church more faithfully and efficiently than Doctor W. B. North. There were no side issues, no avocations for our friend in the ministry. Through all the long years there was but one passion, and to this high calling of God he gave his best; he gave his all. I think the controlling purpose in his life was to be a good minister of Jesus Christ. That aim was seen in his persuasive pulpit ministry, in his wise and faithful pastoral relations, as a Christian citizen and as a home builder.

He was a blessing to any community he might serve.

As a preacher he was faithful and untiring in the preparation of his messages. His sermons were the result of most careful and faithful study of the word of God, and of many other great books which he read. He was never satisfied with the superficial conceptions of the truth—with a truth or half truths, but the whole truth contained in the word. He was in a true sense a man of one book, and yet a student of hundreds of inspiring volumns. He loved his New Testament Greek. He sought rightly to divide the word of God. He preached a social gospel, but fundamentally, and first of all, his was a gospel of redemption, the gospel of the Cross. And so his messages centered around one theme: "We preach not ourselves, but Jesus Christ the Lord, and ourselves your servant for Jesus' sake." In his earlier ministry he was counted as one of our great revivalists and church builders. Like the great Apostle Paul, he thought, spoke and wrote magnificently of Jesus Christ.

But Dr. North was held in high esteem not only as a preacher of righteousness, but as pastor of the church to which he was sent. He was as faithful in his pastoral oversight as in the preparation of his sermons. His laymen as well as his conference brethren were ready to answer, "Nothing against him." He never forgot the stranger, to shepherd the sheep, to feed the lambs. All men were precious in his sight. One who knew him best said this of one of his pastorates: "The prosperity of the church was greater under his pastorate than at any time during the past ten years." Of his last pastorate, Edenton Station, a friend wrote: "Any community. . . we feel would have been better, due to the fact that Dr. North was a part of it. He was always considerate of others, in his church and out, not injuring anybody, either by word or deed. His whole heart and soul was taken up with the work of his Maker. His friends are legion, and the memory of his life will be a benediction to all who knew him." For fifty long years this faithful itinerant of our church went

to his appointments as a preacher and pastor, or as presiding elder, to

put all he had in the service of his Master and Lord.

In appraising this character we are thinking of him not simply as a preacher and pastor, but also in terms of his sterling manhood. "The elements so mixed in him that nature might stand up and say to all the world, 'This is a man'." We think of him as gentle and brave, humble and loving, daring and tender. He had mental power and moral worth. His was a deep religious experience. He was a Christian gentleman of the old school. His gentleness made him great. He was pure in thought, chaste in speech, gentle in manner, and exemplary in his conduct. That fine, Christian culture was his by birth, by Christian training in the home and in the school, and by the cultured companionship which he had in his wife. Friends and books were factors also in the making of this nobleman. The finest culture he knew was the culture of the soul. Those who knew Dr. North best saw new and richer meaning in the terms, royal and loyal. He was royal in his attentions to his friends, loyal to his home, to his friends, his church, his country, and to his God. He rendered unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's.

About nineteen years ago, when closing up his splendid work in the Saint Louis Conference, he told one of his brethren, "I am going back home," and he came back home to his friends, loved ones, to his home conference, and here these years he has served his church faithfully and well. On the twenty-first day of June, 1931, at the closing hour of the Lord's day of rest, Dr. North, in the Edenton Methodist parsonage, fell on sleep, and entered into eternal rest. When this last summons came I think he must have said again, "I am going home", this time to his eternal home, to join the comrades of the Cross. For him there was the happy welcome, and the blessed approval, well done, enter thou into the

joy of thy Lord.

"And he that winneth souls is wise." "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever." "For one star different from another star in glore."

The crowning ambition and passion of the soul life of this man of God was to bring lost ones to Jesus. The burden and appeal of his message was not to win the popular applause of men, but to say to sinful men, "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world." When the curtains are lifted and the scroll unfolds we shall expect to see

his name on the roll of honor, and written in letters of gold.

Rev. Daniel Anderson Watkins, the son of Jesse and Rachel Bowers Watkins, was born in Rowan County, N. C., July 4, 1859, and died in Durham, February 5, 1931. He was the youngest of six children. Both father and mother having died, at the age of three he was left to the care of relatives, and others, and the county home for the poor. Often hungry, poorly clad, friendless, with no motherly soul to pity nor tender hand to soothe a pain or hurt; his child heart sad, and hungry for some-

thing not yet in sight, at the age of six he ran away. As he expressed it in later years, he believed that God guided his child feet to the home of Jacob L. Lipe and his good wife. Here, as a son, for eleven years, in the midst of plenty, loved and kindly treated, he lived the care-free life of a normal boy upon the farm.

At the age of fourteen, he gave his heart to Jesus. His happy conversion while plowing in the field was a living reality in his experience and a joyous memory through the years. He joined the Lutheran Church. With his conversion came a definite call to preach, and at the age of seventeen, he left the shelter of his adopted home to seek an education preparatory to his life work as a minister in the church to which he belonged. He first attended Union Academy and later Franklin Academy. He then taught school and continued his own studies. When about the age of twenty, and while listening to a sermon preached by Rev. L. S. Burkhead of the North Carolina Conference, he experienced a definite call to be a Methodist itinerant preacher. With his face already toward the morning sun and his soul vision upon the "light that shineth more and more unto the perfect day," and literally without "two coats," but with a horse blanket about his shoulders for an overcoat, and with "neither gold, nor silver in his purse," he was admitted to the North Carolina Conference on trial at its session held in Wilson in December, 1879.

He served charges as follows: Snow Hill Circuit, junior preacher, 1880; Straits Mission, 1881-82; Brunswick Circuit, 1883; Newton Grove Mission, 1884-85; Earpsboro Mission, 1886; Rutherford Circuit, 1887; South Fork Circuit, 1888; Henrietta Circuit, 1889; Pamlico Circuit, 1890. At the 1890 conference held in Wilson he was transferred to the St. Louis Conference where he served in 1891. He was then transferred back to his home conference and served as follows: Kenly Circuit, 1892; Hatteras Circuit, 1893-94; Swan Quarter Circuit, 1895; Ayden Circuit, 1896; Kennekeet Circuit, 1897-98; Pekin Circuit, 1899; Lillington Circuit, 1900; Washington Circuit, 1901-02; Spring Hope Circuit, 1903-04; Sampson Circuit, 1905-06; Shallotte Circuit, 1907; Elizabeth Circuit, 1908; Laurel Hill Circuit, 1909-11; Ellerbe Circuit, 1912; Raeford Circuit, 1913; superannuate relation and living at Laurel Hill, 1914; Montgomery Circuit, 1915; superannuate relation and living at Laurel Hill, 1916-18; Town Creek Circuit, 1919-20; Hatteras Circuit, 1921; Fairfield, 1922-23; Robersonville Circuit, 1924. At the 1924 conference, held in Wilmington, on account of failing health he was granted the superannuate relation in which he continued until his death. The first four years of his superannuation he lived in Laurel Hill where his friends, whom he had formerly served, were affectionately kind to him. In 1929 he was admitted to the Penny Farm Home in Florida where he remained nine months. That he might be nearer to his brethren of the conference and his life time friends, he returned to North Carolina and resided in Durham until he had no further need for an earthly home.

In 1883 he was married to Miss Sallie Brogden, daughter of the late Rev. John T. Brogden, a local Methodist preacher. To this union were born one son and one daughter, Marvin B. and Miss Bertie, of Leland, N. C. In 1899 his wife went peacefully to the other side to be with her Lord. His second marriage was to Miss Lula Patterson, April 17, 1900. This union was born one daughter, Miss Maxine, of Durham, N. C. His widow, with his three children, survives him.

A personal letter from his son contains the following tribute to his father and is worthy of a place in this sacred record: "So started his fifty years of service in the fighting forces of his Master. Of these fifty years I need not write. They are written into the record of his church, into the hearts of the thousands with whom he came in contact, and in the Book that shall be opened on the last day. And on that day when the Book shall be opened, his stooped shoulders will straighten and his head will go up, for it is a record of which any man could be proud. I had rather have it for my heritage than lands or money. I do not think of him as being dead; he has just gone on ahead a little way. Some day I will round the bend in the road and come upon him sitting in the shade waiting for me, and we will go on together."

He was the type of preacher which makes stronger and richer in spiritual values, and more fruitful to the glory of the Christ in the world, our Methodism. Rich in his own Christian experience he made a good direct witness for his Lord. Whether to the hills, the swamps of the eastern border, to the front lines of the enemy on the other side of "no man's land," and without a question as to size of salary, he accepted his appointment without a murmur. Not a scar on his back from the guns of the enemy. The strong point in his ministry was in the field of revival work. He was never more at ease or happier than when in a revival calling sinners to repentance. Many of the meetings he held may be counted with the great revivals of his day. Not favored with college training, yet with a strong spiritual and native mental capacity to grasp the higher values attainable in the school of God.

Brother Watkins and this writer first met and were together at the time of the memorable earthquake shock on the night of August 31, 1886. While others were frightened and almost panic stricken, he, as if fixed upon foundations more secure than this rocking and trembling earth, was calm and unafraid. "Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed, and though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea." We see him again; he is weary. His physical strength, through the several years of failing health, is broken, his physical vision is dim, his mental faculties are wavering, yet in the clearer moments he is calm and unafraid. He is consciously resting upon "the foundation of God which standeth sure."

"How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, Is laid for your faith in his excellent Word."

On the 6th day of February, Rev. J. C. Wooten, assisted by Dr. W. A. Stanbury, conducted his funeral from the home in Durham. The body was then taken to Goldsboro and in the presence of a group of devoted friends from Laurel Hill, and others, was tenderly laid to rest in Willow Dale Cemetery. Under the direction of Rev. J. C. Wooten, the ritual service at the grave was read by Rev. W. V. McRae, Rev. J. G. Johnson, and Rev. W. H. Brown.

This brave knight and hero of the Cross has fallen, but not in defeat. His sword is sheathed, but on his forehead is written Victory. The help-less child of six, without a mother heart to offer a good night kiss or prayer, wandering alone in the dusk of the evening looking for an open door, a friendly smile, a morsel of food, a place to sleep. But in the distance we see another picture, and in a golden setting. "Who are these who are arrayed in white robes? And whence come they? And he said to

me, 'These are they which come out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."

"In my Father's house are many mansions." "I go to prepare a place

for you."

"I saw him in the evening,

MRS. W. S. RONE

Mrs. Annie Bell Rone, widow of the late Rev. Dr. W. S. Rone, of the North Carolina Conference, was a daughter of Robert C. and Mary Ardrey Bell, of the Harrison Church section of Mecklenburg County, and was born November 2, 1857; married to Rev. W. S. Rone November 12, 1879, and died at her home in Charlotte May 4, 1931.

In her youth she gave her life to Christ and joined the Harrison Methodist Church and was a devout and active Christian to the end of her days. After preparation in local schools she was a student at Greensboro College

for several years during the presidency of Dr. T. M. Jones.

It was her good fortune to be the child of cultured and consecrated parents, who taught her the lesson which it seems difficult for most of us to learn, that noble living is never found in self-indulgence and worldly vanity, but rather in humility of spirit and unselfish service for others; so when she married to an itinerant preacher and dwelt in parsonages, she appreciated her responsibility and was ever thoughtful of the needy and distressed, and found satisfaction in ministering to sorrowful and troubled souls. Through all the years of her pilgrimage she lived for others rather than for self, and was a blessing to multitudes who came within the range of her influence.

During the thirty years of her married life she lived in various sections of the state and was a valued helper to her husband in his ministerial work. After his death in 1909, Mrs. Rone was, for five years, in charge of the girls' dormitory at Trinity College and used well that fine opportunity to the benefit of many young women who were there under her care and supervision. They all loved her for she was interested in everything that pertained to their highest welfare, and proved to be a friend who

guided them wisely and in the spirit of a true mother.

As daughter, sister, wife, mother, friend, she was obedient, gentle, constant, affectionate and true in all the relations she sustained to society.

In apparent health on May 4, 1931, in her home in Charlotte as she talked with friends, she died peacefully and without pain, and her pure

spirit went to dwell with God.

The funeral service was conducted by her pastor, Rev. J. N. Randall, assisted by the writer, at Harrison Church in the presence of many who knew and loved her, and then the body was laid to rest by the side of

the graves of her husband and children, and near the graves of her

parents, in the Harrison graveyard.

There were six children, four of whom, Mary, Grace, Roberta and W. S. Rone, Jr., preceded her to the heavenly world. Two sons, J. Ralph Rone, of Charlotte, and Lloyd Ardrey Rone, of Mexico, still survive. She leaves also a brother, Mr. James A. Bell, and a sister, Mrs. Bobbie Bell Cunningham, both of Charlotte.

May the Lord give comfort and grace to those upon whom this stroke

falls most heavily.

"Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them."

Quite well is this scripture fulfilled in the life and death of Mrs. Nan Julia Taylor, wife of Rev. R. F. Taylor of the North Carolina Conference. Born December 22, 1879, she had lived more than fifty-one years when she died in the parsonage home at Glendon, N. C., May 21, 1931.

In early girlhood she was converted and joined the Methodist Church. She lived her entire life as a devoted and consecrated Christian. This she abundantly exemplified and practiced in all her relationship as a daughter, a sister, a wife, a mother and a friend of all she met and knew.

She and Brother Taylor were married in 1920. This happy union of only a little more than ten years seems all too short. She filled well the responsibility of a Methodist minister's wife. Not only did she keep the home fires burning, giving the comfort, the encouragement and the help so needful for a minister, but wherever her minister husband went to the conferences, to his services and into the homes of the people, she was his constant companion. She radiated cheer and a Christian influence wherever she went. The love of the people for her was abundantly attested by their expressions of sympathy and grief during the period of her wasting illness and at the time of her death.

Her faith and consecration were especially in evidence during the months of her declining health and great suffering. The writer visited and ministered as a pastor in this parsonage home during her sickness and failing strength. Repeatedly she expressed her faith in Christ and her readiness to go and be with the Lord.

She was buried in the cemetery at Carthage. The writer, assisted by Revs. J. H. Buffaloe, J. W. Bradley and F. B. Peele, committed her body to the earth and commended her spirit to Him who is able to keep, and who will bestow the crown of righteousness upon His faithful servants.

Besides a host of friends, there remain the following loved ones to mourn her departure: her husband, Rev. R. F. Taylor; a daughter by a former marriage, Mrs. L. E. Dixon; two sisters, Mrs. Sallie Thompson and Mrs. Fannie Fisher; and three brothers, A. S., Will, and Joe Thompson.

Her life may be summarized in these words: she was a devoted wife, a loving mother and a loval servant of the Lord.

In 1890 North Carolina territory in the Holston Conference and in the Virginia Conference, except that beyond the Chowan River, was transferred to the North Carolina Conference, and the Conference was divided into the North Carolina and Western North Carolina Conferences. In 1894 the remaining North Carolina territory in the Virginia Conference was transferred to the North Carolina Conference.
