



HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES Wednesday, May 31, 1978

In accordance with ratified S. J. R. 915, the House of Representatives is called to order by The Honorable Carl J. Stewart, Jr., Speaker, at 12:00 noon on Wednesday, May 31, 1978.

Prayer is offered by Dr. Albert G. Edwards, House Chaplain.

Representative Ramsey, for the Committee on Rules and Operation of the House, reports the Journal of July 1, 1977 has been examined and found correct. Upon his motion, the Journal is approved as written.

Leaves of absence are granted Representatives Fulcher and Setzer for today.

The Speaker announces the following resignations of members and the appointments of their replacements:

Representative H. M. Michaux, Jr., of the 16th House District resigned as a member of the House of Representatives on July 18, 1977, to accept an appointment as United States District Attorney. Appointed by the Governor to fill this vacancy on August 3, 1977, was Mr. Arthur John Howard Clement III. The following oath of office was administered to Mr. Clement on August 4, 1977:

"I, Arthur John Howard Clement III, do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States; that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; that I will endeavor to support, maintain, and defend the Constitution of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; and, that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a member of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of North Carolina according to the best of my skill and ability, according to law; so help me, God."

Representative W. S. Harris, Jr., of the 22nd House District resigned on September 2, 1977, to accept an appointment as Judge of the Fifteenth Judicial District. Appointed by the Governor to fill this vacancy on September 19, 1977, was Mr. Timothy Hill McDowell. The following oath of office was administered to Mr. McDowell on September 19, 1977:

"I, Timothy Hill McDowell, do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States.

"I, Timothy Hill McDowell, do solemnly and sincerely swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain and defend the Constitution of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability.

"I, Timothy Hill McDowell, do solemnly swear that I will well and truly execute the duties of my office as a member of the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of North Carolina according to the best of my skill and ability, according to law, so help me, God."

Representative Conrad Riley Duncan of the 22nd House District resigned on October 6, 1977, to accept an appointment to the State Senate. Appointed by the Governor on October 13, 1977, to fill this vacancy was Mr. Robert McAlister. The following oath of office was administered to Mr. McAlister on October 13, 1977.

"I, Robert McAlister, do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States; that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; that I will endeavor to support, maintain, and defend the Constitution of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; and that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a Representative of the General Assembly of North Carolina according to the best of my skill and ability, according to law; so help me, God."

Representative Robert L. Farmer of the 15th House District resigned on December 14, 1977, to accept an appointment as Resident Superior Court Judge for Wake County. Appointed by the Governor on January 13, 1978, to fill this vacancy was Mrs. Wilma C. Woodard. The following oath of office was administered to Mrs. Woodard on January 18, 1978:

"I, Wilma C. Woodard solemnly swear that I will support and maintain the Constitution and laws of the United States; and,

"I do solemnly and sincerely swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain and defend the Constitution and laws of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; and,

"I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a Member of the House of Representatives of the 1977 General Assembly of the State of North Carolina to the best of my skill and ability, so help me, God."

Representative Peter W. Hairston of the 30th House District resigned on December 31, 1977, to accept an appointment as Resident Superior Court Judge for Davie County. Dr. Ramey F. Kemp was appointed by the Governor to fill the vacancy on January 6, 1978, and the following oath of office was administered to Dr. Kemp on January 28, 1978. "I, Ramey F. Kemp, do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States; that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; that I will endeavor to support, maintain, and defend the Constitution of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; and that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a Representative of the General Assembly of North Carolina according to the best of my skill and ability, according to law; so help me God."

Representative Richard Erwin of the 29th House District resigned on January 3, 1978, to accept an appointment as a Judge on the North Carolina Court of Appeals. Mr. Harold L. Kennedy was appointed by the Governor on February 9, 1978, to fill this vacancy and the following oath of office was administered to Mr. Kennedy on February 17, 1978:

"I, Harold L. Kennedy, solemnly swear that I will support and maintain the Constitution and laws of the United States; and,

"I do solemnly and sincerely swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain, and defend the Constitution and laws of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; and

"I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a member of the House of Representatives of the 1977 General Assembly of the State of North Carolina to the best of my skill and ability, so help me God."

Representative Joy J. Johnson resigned on February 10, 1978, to accept an appointment to the State Parole Commission. Mr. Robert E. Davis was appointed by the Governor on February 17, 1978, to fill this vacancy and the following oath of office was administered to Mr. Davis on February 22, 1978:

"I, Robert E. Davis, solemnly swear that I will support and maintain the Constitution and laws of the United States; and,

"I do solemnly and sincerely swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain and defend the Constitution and laws of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; and,

"I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a Member of the House of Representatives of the 1977 General Assembly of the State of North Carolina to the best of my skill and ability, so help me, God."

Representative Thomas O. Gilmore of the 23rd House District resigned on January 2, 1978, to accept a position as Deputy Commissioner of Human

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Resources. Mr. Byron Haworth was appointed to fill the vacancy by the Governor on May 9, 1978 and the following oath of office was administered to Mr. Haworth on May 9, 1978;

"I, Byron Haworth, solemnly affirm that I will support and maintain the Constitution and laws of the United States; and,

"I do solemnly and sincerely affirm that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain and defend the Constitution and laws of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; and,

"I do solemnly affirm that I will faithfully discharge my duties as a Member of the House of Representatives of the 1977 General Assembly of the State of North Carolina to the best of my skill and ability, so help me, God."

MESSAGES FROM THE SENATE

S. J. R. 918, A JOINT RESOLUTION RELATING TO BILLS WHICH MAY BE CONSIDERED IN THE 1978 ADJOURNED SESSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, is read the first time.

On motion of Representative Ramsey, the rules are suspended, and the resolution is placed before the House for immediate consideration.

Representative Huskins offers an amendment which is adopted, by electronic vote, with 111 members voting in the affirmative and 1 member voting in the negative.

The resolution, as amended, passes its second reading, by electronic vote, with 109 members voting in the affirmative and 4 members voting in the negative.

The resolution, as amended, passes its third reading, by electronic vote, with 109 members voting in the affirmative and 4 members voting in the negative and is ordered returned to the Senate for concurrence in House amendment by Special Message.

ADDENDUM

It will be noted that a number of bills and resolutions passed second reading and then were read a third time on the same day.

Rule 41(b) states:

No bill shall be read more than once in the same day without the concurrence of two-thirds (%) of the members present and voting.

In order to comply with this Rule, no bill which had passed its second reading is read a third time except:

- (1) When a member moves that the Rule be suspended, and this motion carries by at least a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- (2) When the Chair determines that there is no objection from any member present. This constitutes unanimous consent of those members present that Rule 41(b) be suspended.

In these cases, the bill is read a third time.
