CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY

MORNING SESSION

The Holston Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met for its Ninety-Fifth Annual Session at the First Methodist Episcopal Church, Knoxville, Tennessee, at 8:30 o'clock A. M., Wednesday, October 19, 1938, Bishop Edgar Blake presiding. Conference sang "And Are We Yet Alive" and the opening Devotional Address was given by the Bishop.

Holy Communion. Bishop Blake, assisted by the District Superintendents and Dr. J. Homer Slutz, pastor of the local church, administered the Communion.

Memorial Service. An impressive memorial service was held for our honored dead, with Memorial Address by Rev. W. H. Ragan. Those who had died during the year were; conference member, J. H. Amis; probationer, Rowland Hall; wives of conference members, Mrs. S. A. Hopper and Mrs. A. J. Murphy.

Roll Call. The secretary of the last conference called the roll and 107 conference members answered to their names. The roll of probationers was called and 11 were present. The roll of supply pastors was called and 15 answered to their names. Names of conference members and probationers present at this or any other sessions of the conference will be indicated in the conference directory.

Organization. O. R. Tarwater was reelected secretary and nominated as his assistants, C. B. Tarwater and J. M. Hampton and they were elected by the conference. Cicero Dobbs, statistician, nominated as his assistants, E. C. Trentham, C. R. Athearn, J. H. Meyers, G. W. Atkinson and W. H. Lewis and they were elected. W. F. Pitts, conference treasurer, nominated as his assistants Harold Harris, T. O. Marshall, G. E. Blanchard, D. W. Donaldson, C. V. Bellamy, Dan Jones, W. L. Hart, E. E. Cavaleri, John Watkins and H. G. Williamson and they were elected by the conference.

Bar of Conference. On motion of J. M. Hampton the bar of the conference was fixed to include the first eight rows of pews in the church auditorium.

Official Program. On motion of R. L. Stapleton, the printed program was made the Offical Program of the conference.

Special Resolutions. A resolution expressing the pleasure of the conference on having Bishop Blake as its presiding officer and having Mrs. Blake present was introduced by J. M. Melear and adopted unanimously by rising vote. Fitting response was made by Bishop Blake (See Resolution). A resolution concerning the statistics was introduced by C. V. Bellamy and referred to the statistician and staff.

Greetings and Sympathy. On motion duly made, seconded and passed the secretary was directed to send the greetings and sympathy of the conference to D. L. Howell, I. B. Leonard, R. E. Walker and any other members who are sick and detained from attending the conference sessions.

Bishop Kern. Bishop Paul B. Kern, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was escorted to the platform by E. H. Ogle, District Superintendent of the Knoxville District and F. B. Shelton, Presiding Elder of the Knoxville District M. E. Church, South, and introduced by Bishop Blake. Bishop Kern addressed the conference and occupied the chair during a part of the business session.

Introductions. F. B. Shelton, Dr. Beard, Presiding Elder of the Big Stone Gap District, Rev. Charles W. Loven, pastor of the Federated Church at Rogersville and Rev. Mr. Miller, pastor of the Federated Church at Pennington Gap, were introduced to the conference.

Drafts. Drafts for \$60.00 from the Chartered Fund and for \$419.00 from the Board of Pensions and Relief were presented by Bishop Blake. A check for \$400.00 from the Reserve Pension Fund was presented by W. M. Dye and for \$248.00 from the Advocate Journal Fund by R. L. Stapleton. These were accepted with thanks and placed in the hands of the conference treasurer.

Bishop Brown. A telegram from Bishop Brown, extending greetings and best wishes was read by the secretary, who was directed by the conference to send suitable reply.

After the announcements the morning session adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Blake.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference convened at 2 P. M. and some time was spent in singing some of the uplifting hymns from the Methodist Hymnal.

Question 34. The characters of the District Superintendents were passed and the characters of all Effective Elders passed by districts.

Question 21. Who have been received by transfer and from what conference? W. H. Lewis from Kansas, as of October 15, 1937 and Frank E. Trotter, probationer from New Jersey, as of April 15, 1938, subject to approval of Bishop Brown. On motion of W. M. Dye the Journal of the 1936 conference was corrected to show the transfer of Orbun White from Georgia Conference as of October 15, 1936 and the Journal of 1937 the transfer of Kirk Waldo Robbins, from Newark, as of April 1, 1938.

Question 37. Who have been transferred and to what conferences? None.

Question 44. Who are the Triers of Appeals? J. L. Chaney, W. K. Harris, W. L. Pickering, R. C. Elzey, E. N. Tarpley. Reserves, T. O. Marshall, Solon McNeese.

Question 42. The roll of the retired ministers was called, those present responded and all were continued in the retired relation.

Question 43. On motion of R. L. Stapleton, Enos Wagner was granted a year's leave of absence.

Question 41. H. C. Coleman and E. C. Paustian were continued in the Supernumerary Relation.

Questions 20, 22 and 23 were asked and properly answered. (See Disciplinary Report).

On motion of R. L. Stapleton, Northern New York Conference was requested to restore E. F. Wood from location to conference membership for the purpose of transfer.

Church Property. A motion confirming sale of property of Axley Chapel, in Johnson City District was introduced by W. E. Bishop and adopted. (See Resolution).

History of the Conference. The question of the history of the conference, in view of coming unification of the three branches of Methodism, was raised by J. S. Burnett. On motion of the secretary Dr. Burnett was requested to gather material for such history and he, with other members of the Historical Committee, directed to take such steps as they deem wise looking toward its publication.

J. E. Milburn was added to this committee, the other members being J. S. Burnett and J. M. Melear. Request was made that all help to secure material for this history and place it in the hands of the committee.

Order of the Day. J. M. Hampton moved that the report of the Commission on Reserve Pension Fund be made the Order of the Day for Thursday morning during United Session.

Introduced. Rev. L. P. Hoppe, Presiding Elder of the Sweetwater District, was introduced to the conference.

Bishop Blake announced adjournment of the business session for a brief recess before the Inspirational Address by Bishop Kern at 4 o'clock.

SECOND DAY

Morning Session

Conference convened at the usual hour and the devotional address was given by Bishop Blake.

Group Portrait. W. L. Roberts, supply pastor, presented to the conference a portrait of Holston Conference as of 51 years ago.

Journal. The Journal of the previous day's sessions was read by the secretary and approved by the conference.

Calling of Classes. Questions concerning the calling of classes were taken up and John S. Deck, Roy T. Wampler and Harold Harris were elected to their Deacons Orders and to full membership in the conference, subject to their answering the Disciplinary Questions.

Question 25. Edgar Eldridge, Carroll Skeen, John M. Watkins, O. R. Tarwater, Jr. and Charles E. Palmer were continued in studies of the first year.

J. Dan Gibson was continued in studies of the second year. Clyde N. Rogers in studies of Second Year conditioned.

Question 30. Ralph E. Cline and Perry T. Rule were graduated from the Course of Study and elected to Elders Orders.

Elected and ordained Elder previously Frank E. Trotter.

Question 29. What members are in studies of the Fourth Year. Frank T. Branson.

Question 31. What others have been elected and ordained Deacons? (a) As Local Preachers, Michael Latham. (b) Under Seminary Rule, Harold Harris and Roy T. Wampler.

Delegate to Uniting Conference. Tellers were appointed and a ballot taken for one delegate to the Uniting Conference. Report from this ballot showed no election and a second ballot was taken.

Introductions. Rev. Chas. T. Gray, pastor of the M. E. Church, South, in Harriman, J. L. Hardin, Supt. of the Holston Orphanage, W. D. Burk, W. J. Fesmire and M. D. Clayburn members of Central Tennessee Conference, S. C. Rice, F. E. Sanders and C. N. White from the Kentucky Conference, Rev. Mr. Phillipps, and Rev. Mr. Hammer of the M. E. Church, South, Dr. John Hains and Dr. Sam White, of the Baptist ministry and Mrs. John A. Patten and Mrs. Edgar Blake were introduced to the conference.

Evangelism. The report of the committee on Evangelism was read by C. V. Bellamy and adopted by the conference.

Composite Report. The District Superintendents Composite Report was read by E. C. Wareing, Superintendent of the Chattanooga District.

Report of Tellers. The tellers reported the second ballot for delegate to the Uniting Conference. Total ballots cast, 109. Number required to elect, 55. R. L. Stapleton received 57 ballots and was elected delegate to the Uniting Conference. A ballot was taken for one Reserve Delegate.

Dr. Palmer. Dr. A. M. Palmer, President of the University of Chattanooga, was introduced by the Bishop and spoke briefly in behalf of the Institution.

Commission on Reserve Pension Fund. Dr. W. M. Dye, Executive Secretary and Treasurer of the Reserve Pension Fund read his report which was adopted. See Report. J. E. Milburn, chairman of the Commission read his report and the recommendations of the Commission and they were adopted by the conference by rising vote. See Report.

Dr. Burnett. The order of the day was the Recognition Service for J. S. Burnett, who is completing fifty years in the ministry. An appropriate address was given by Dr. E. D. Kohlstedt in appreciation of the services of Dr. Burnett with the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. Dr. Burnett, in response, brought a most interesting and inspiring message from the story of his life-work as a minister and missionary of the Board among the people of the Southern Highlands. The Bishop escorted Mrs. Burnett to the platform and she and the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Burnett were presented to the conference.

Report of Tellers. The report of the tellers on first ballot for Reserve delegate showed that there had been no election. A second ballot was taken.

Conference sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" and adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Blake.

Afternoon Session

Conference convened for the afternoon session at 2 o'clock and after the singing of hymn No. 248, Dr. C. P. Hargraves led in prayer.

The report of the tellers from the second ballot for Reserve Delegate to the Uniting Conference was given and there was no election. A third ballot was taken.

Excused. Worth Grier was excused from attending the sessions of tonight and tomorrow and Enos Wagner from attending further sessions of the conference.

Referred. On motion of W. E. Bishop, W. C. Winslow and D. L. Howell were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations with a view to retirement.

Holston Orphanage. On motion of D. B. Cooper conference voted to recognize as an Annual Conference Benevolence contributions to the Holston Orphanage. Dr. Hardin Supt. of the Orphanage and F. A. Carter, Pres. of the Board of Trustees, were introduced and addressed the conference. Charles E. Palmer, member on probation and pastor of our newest church, the church at Gatlinburg, Tenn. was presented to the conference.

Adjournment was for recess before the Inspirational Hour at 4 o'clock.

THIRD DAY

Morning Session

Conference convened at the usual hour and joined in singing "Come Thou Fount of every blessing." D. W. Donaldson led in prayer and the Devotional Address was given by Bishop Blake.

Dr. Stafford. Dr. T. A. Stafford, of the Board of Pensions and Relief, addressed the conference in behalf of the interests and plans of the Board.

Bishop Brown. Bishop Blake, the Presiding Bishop, called Bishop, Brown to the chair, asking him to preside while he met with one of the conference boards.

Journal. The secretary read the Journal of the previous day's sessions and it was adopted.

On motion of J. M. Melear the conference directed that in the Journal the Secretary omit all titles in reference to the names of conference members.

Order for Saturday. On motion of R. L. Stapleton a meeting of the Preacher's Aid Society was made the order of the day for Saturday at 10 o'clock A. M. and that the corporate session follow.

Report of Tellers. The report of the last ballot taken for Reserve Delegate to the Uniting conference was made by the tellers as follows: Total number of votes, 75; necessary to choice, 38. J. E. Milburn received 39 votes and was elected Reserve Delegate to the Uniting Conference.

Board of Education. The order of the day was the report of the Conference Board of Education and the Chairman, Mark M. Moore, presented H. G. Williamson, Conference Director, who called the names of a number of young people who gave personal testimonies in regard to their experiences in Summer Schools and other activities under the direction of the Board during the past year.

These young people were; Russell Leedy, from Bristol District, Ray Hicks, Harriman, Ruth Tietze, Chattanooga, Juanita Baker, Johnson City, Olive Stanley, Knoxville, Lawrence Eisenburg, President of Holston Conference, Methodist Youth, and Sterling Turner, of Harriman who spoke and sang for the conference.

W. C. Daniel read the report from the Division on Religious Education in the Local Church and it was adopted. See Report which includes budget for the coming year. The report from the Division on Schools and Colleges was read by F. A. Hamilton and adopted by the conference. See Report. As a part of the report, the conference reelected R. R. Kramer, J. M. Melear and C. E. Rogers as members of the Board of Trustees of Tennessee Wesleyan College. Previous to its adoption President J. L. Robb and General J. A. Fowler, President of the Board of Trustees, spoke on the report with its recommendations concerning a campaign for \$150,000.00 endowment.

Million Unit Fellowship. Dr. C. P. Hargraves, of the World Service Commission, was introduced and addressed the conference. The report of the World Service Council was read by D. W. Donaldson and adopted. As a part of the report, the Council accepted the quota of 2408 units, the same as last year.

Motion on adoption was made by a layman, D. A. Harkness, and seconded by a layman, J. A. Grigsby.

Rev. H. P. Keathley, of Central Tennessee Conference was introduced. The Bishop presented Dr. John W. Haywood, President of Morristown College, who spoke briefly in behalf of the Institution.

After announcements the morning session adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Brown.

Afternoon Session

At 2 o'clock Bishop Blake announced hymn 240 and after prayer, took up Disciplinary Questions.

Questions 1, 2, 3, 13, 14, 15 were asked and properly answered. See Disciplinary Report.

Question 19. Where shall the next conference be held? On invitation extended by W. A. Smith, pastor of Trinity Church, conference voted to meet at Trinity next year.

Statistician's Report. Cicero Dobbs, statistician read his report, which was adopted by the conference. Brother Dobbs nominated as statistician for next conference, W. L. Russell and he was elected.

Dr. H. W. McPherson, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was introduced and spoke in behalf of the Board.

The business session adjourned for the Missionary Sermon by F. A. Hamilton.

FOURTH DAY

Morning Session

Conference convened at the usual hour, and after singing and prayer, the devotional address was given by Bishop Blake.

Journal. The Journal of the third day's sessions was read by the secretary and approved.

Business pertaining to the publication of the Journal was taken up, additional pledges for the Minute Fund were taken and the District Superintendents were instructed to cooperate with the secretary to raise from the charges such additional amounts as may be necessary to publish the Journal.

Bristol District Parsonage. Upon inquiry by F. D. Watson the conference ruled that the Bristol District and the trustees of the

Bristol District parsonage have authority to negotiate a loan on said property.

Treasurer. The report of the treasurer was called for, and after statement from the treasurer, W. F. Pitts, the report was read by G. E. Blanchard, one of his assistants.

On motion of W. M. Dye the treasurer was authorized to use the sum of \$11.03, in the hands of W. F. Pitts, treasurer of the Board of Incorporators and left over from transactions involved in sale of property to the Tennessee Valley Authority, for the expenses of the Treasurer's Office.

On motion made, duly seconded and carried the treasurer was authorized to pay premium on his bond from money in the treasury and available for such purpose. W. F. Pitts was reelected as treasurer for next conference.

Question 11 was asked and referred to the Board of Stewards.

Annuity Rate. On motion of W. M. Dye the Annuity Rate was fixed at \$10.00 for the coming year.

Retired. On recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations, W. C. Winslow and D. L. Howell were granted the retired relation.

Preacher's Aid. The order of the day was the Annual Meeting of the Preacher's Aid Society and the cabinet nominated for the office of Ministerial member of the Board, J. F. Reed and J. M. Hampton. The ballot was taken and J. F. Reed was elected. Laymen nominated were; J. A. Grigsby and W. I. Marshall, whose terms of office had expired, and L. R. Hite and C. E. Rogers. The ballot was taken and L. R. Hite and C. E. Rogers were elected.

Bishop Cushman. Bishop Blake invited Bishop Cushman to the platform and he occupied the chair during part of the morning session.

Penalty for Non-Payment of Dues. J. L. Chaney renewed the motion of last year to eliminate the portion of the by-laws placing a penalty of \$2.00 per year on those who failed to pay their dues of \$2.00 per year to the Society. The motion was adopted and the penalty eliminated.

Corporate Session. The order of the day was the corporate session and the Trustees of the Conference brought in a resolution recommending that the loan made to the First Church at Johnson City for \$2,250.00 be cancelled with accrued interest. W. M. Dye offered as a substitute for this resolution a resolution to the effect that the interest be cancelled and that the loan be extended for five years without interest. The vote was first taken on the substitute which was lost. The original motion and resolution was then adopted and the note cancelled.

Trustees. G. T. Francisco, R. L. Stapleton and J. S. Burnett were elected as trustees of the conference for a term of three years. The group of trustees of the Holston Assembly Ground was elected for

three years. See Conference Boards. Corporate session adjourned and regular conference session was resumed.

Auditing Committee. The report of the Auditing Committee was read by L. R. Hite and adopted. Conference voted directing the secretary to publish in the Journal the report of the Auditing Committee of last year as this report did not appear in last year's Journal. W. M. Dye moved that the action by the conference last year, asking that the request for audit of the records of the Treasurer of the Preacher's Aid Society be resumed and that the action contemplated therein be carried out by the Trustees of the Society, in view of the statement that the audit which had been made did not cover the requirements. The moton was adopted.

Sunday Movies. A resolution pledging support to the churches of Knoxville in their fight against Sunday Movies was read by Solon McNeese and adopted by the conference. See Resolution.

Minimum Support. On motion of G. T. Byrd, \$800.00 was fixed as the Schedule of Minimum Support in answer to Question 14.

W. L. Roberts was added to the list of supply pastors, on motion from the Board of Ministerial Training.

Bishop Brown. A resolution was read by W. A. Smith requesting the Uniting Conference to return Bishop Wallace E. Brown to this area in the United Church. See Resolution.

Introduced. Erwin Omohundro a former member of the Conference and Rev. Harry L. Upperman of Central Tennessee Conference were introduced.

On motion duly made seconded and passed conference required that all other reports, including that of Nominating Committee and Conference Boards nominated by the cabinet, be printed in the Journal without reading.

Journal. On motion of W. E. Bishop the Journal for the day was adopted without reading and the Journal for the entire session adopted as a whole and made the Official Record of the Conference.

Motion to Adjourn. The secretary moved that, on Sunday evening, after Devotional Exercises and the reading of the Appointments, the conference stand adjourned, subject to the call of the Bishop. The motion was adopted.

Adjournment was with the benediction by Dr. Harry L. Upperman.

Bishop Edgar Blake and Members of the Holston Conference:

In presenting this report I am confronted by the demand for a decision as to the direction I should take. This, doubtless, is the last composite report of the District Superintendents of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, since this may be the final formal session of this body. Next year we will gather as Methodist ministers, in a merged conference whose name is yet to be determined. The Historic Methodist Episcopal Church, by action of the unification conference, scheduled to meet next April in Kansas City, will have passed into history. We will appear for realignment under a new conference formation and prepared for the establishment of new relationships.

The past will pull hard upon us. Our history cannot be left behind and forgotten. As we look back at its record and the personalities who lead in making it a conquering host we can scarcely resist stopping and giving them a final salute. Even now, after the years have passed, which folded them in among the ranks of the immortals, they challenge us to carry on, to fight the good fight of faith and to hold high the banners of Methodism against a troubled and cloudy sky.

We could turn to that past and find sufficient material for this report. It calls loudly unto us, with a strong voice. We turn away with reluctant ears. Even then, a note of fear reaches us lest we are forsaking it, as though we had finished with it. Our turning away does not indicate we are taking another path as one retrieving a lost cause. We, by faith, are striking again the main highway after traversing a long detour. We want it to be known that we are not breaking with our past. We are carrying it forward as an enrichment and not as a burden or an embarrassment for which we owe apologies. We present it as our part of a great proposed and adopted merger. Our past with all its history of achievement, encourages us to make bold in declaring that in its day it was vital, living and enriching. It warrants us in resolving, we will not permit it to be lost in the archives of a dead past, as we turn away to a brighter and better future.

We carry all we have been, all we have accomplished, all we have preached, all we have written, into this merger, feeling that we make a contribution worthy a great leadership and a long history. With us the past is now to be a closed book, set for reference and enlighten-

ment. It is not to determine our action, or to prejudice our decisions. We submit ourselves to the future expecting it to form new minorities and majorities all in the interests of the Kingdom of God.

We Look Forward

We look forward. We do not merge with another church now in existence. We do not go with them. They do not come in with us. We go together to form a new church. It is no longer, you and us, ours and yours, but, we and ours. Any other attitude appearing at any time should be sighted and ejected from any and all conversations and assemblies. We are primarily interested in the future. We carry a heavy burden of responsibility. Also, we take with us a membership of over fifty-two thousand (52,000); four hundred and sixty churches (460) valued at three million, twenty-seven thousand, one hundred and eighty dollars (\$3,027,180). As a ministerial body we number one hundred and thirty-two active pastors, eleven men holding special appointments, with eight men left without appointment to attend school, and thirty-seven men on the retired list. We carry into the merger annual ministerial support amounting to one hundred and seventy-six thousand one hundred and eighty-four dollars (\$176,184); also, one of the most highly organized conferences in Methodism. Our Church Schools have a carefully thought out pro-Methodism. Our Church Schools have a carefully thought out program in operation, which brings the commendation of all leaders of religious education. These schools number four hundred and sixteen (416). While the churches supporting them maintain a program of leadership training, vacation Bible Schools totaling one hundred and seventeen (117) with an enrollment of four thousand two hundred and ninety-nine (4,299). The aggressive policy of this department of our conference organization has brought, within the intellectual reach of our postors the letter scientific methods and the most advanced of our pastors, the latest scientific methods and the most advanced principles of religious education. Furthermore, it has enabled the pastors to decidedly increase their effectiveness. Also, it should not be forgotten that it has kept open connections with the larger life of the church, frequently offering itself as the agency through which the denominational objectives are given enthusiastic support.

Educational Institutions

Our three educational institutions, the University of Chattanooga, Tennessee Wesleyan College and Pittman Center have places in this unification, that must not only be protected, but provided for, commensurate with their history and their ever enlarging opportunity for service to the commonwealth and to the new united church.

The University of Chattanoga is entering a new period of development. This was anticipated by President Alex Guerry before he vacated the office in which he had so signally served for over a decade. The new head of the University, Dr. A. W. Palmer, comes to his high office with all the equipment in scholarship necessary to command the respect of an exacting public. His reputation, as an executive and administrator, gives every encouragement for the belief that when the new church throws its united support behind the institution, it will continue to be recognized as one of the potent educational institutions in all the southland.

A similar thing may be said in behalf of Tennessee Wesleyan.

A similar thing may be said in behalf of Tennessee Wesleyan. This institution with its campus, so conducive to student life, has served in a most exemplary manner a large constituency for over fifty years. Its service has always had a strong missionary responsibility. With sacrificial generosity it has offered educational opportunity, for mountain boys and girls, which their devoted parents could never have provided. Now as the merger of the churches approaches its leadership comes prepared with a program of advance

that should bring the commendation of all the sober minded members of this conference. It is ready for the new day. No uncertainty is seen in its administration as to the course that should be taken. It is ready for an advance the moment the authority is given. This attitude of anticipation and preparedness should give all the graduates of the school, members of this conference, great courage concerning the future of their alma mater. Also, those who believe in Christian education, under the auspices of the church, should feel that the intitation material their alma is a second of the church.

stitution merits their unlimited confidence.

While Pittman Center with its associated auxiliaries remains one of the cherished institutions of the conference. Its activities are running at full register, serving the people of this mountain region in a most remarkable manner. Dr. J. S. Burnett, born in the altitudes of that region has brought the mountains to the notice of the entire Protestant Church of our country. He has been the agent of a sympathetic eloquence in behalf of the mountain people that has proven not only incomparable, but irresistible. He made Pittman Center, erected its buildings, enlarged its activities, created its program, interpreted its purpose and wrought much in giving it a permanent place in the Home Missionary program of the church. Now that he celebrates this year the semi-centennial of his entrance into the Methodist ministry, we heartily join in commending the work he has done.

Dr. Burnett removes his armor. Like King Saul, he gives way to a younger man whom he selects to be his successor. He lays his hand on the shoulder of that intrepid young leader, William Edward Bishop, feeling that the ministry he has built through the years can confidently be entrusted to him. Pittman Center passes into the united church with the stamp of the life work of Dr. J. S. Burnett

upon it, and with a new and trained hand upon its destiny.

Our Young People

Another organization that commands our attention as we con-

template unification is our "Young People's Work."

At the beginning of the Conference year in 1937, the young people of the Holston Conference, organized under the name of the Holston Conference of Methodist Youth, set for themselves four definite goals which they hoped to reach during the year, namely, more creative use of their leisure time; a continued program of training young people to become Christian youth leaders in the church; an increased interest in World Comradeship which would result in increased giving; and a deeper spiritual life for themselves which would mean more consecrated youth to Christ's cause in the world today.

All four of these goals have been stressed throughout the year. There are at present five District organizations, 17 Union groups, 198 reported local leagues, together with numerous Sunday School

classes in Methodist Youth registration.

To have a continued program of leadership training, there have been held numerous first and second series Leadership Training Classes throughout the Conference. During the Spring and Summer, the young people sponsored an Institute or School in Christian Living in each of the five Districts, as well as three separate Intermediate Camps. The Planning Conference, whose purpose was to outline youth work for the coming year, was well attended. It is estimated that 750 young people and 150 Intermediates have been definitely influenced by the Summer program.

Our Conference Interests

There are certain conference interests that require our attention as we contemplate unification. Our Assembly Ground at Gatlinburg

must find a permanent place in the life of the new church. It is located in one of the most strategic places, as a growing recreational center. Gatlinburg each year is becoming the destination of an increasing number of tourists. It has altitude and mountain atmosphere for which men and women travel round the world. The rushing streams and flowing springs, the piling up of heavy peaks and verdure covered ranges culminating in old Mt. Le Conte, have only recently been discovered by the people of our country. At the very entrance of this vast scenic region lies our assembly grounds. We have an investment there that must not only be protected, but promoted, until it too takes on the large values and extended proportions of that

rapidly expanding region.

Another vital interest of our conference, almost opposite, the one just mentioned is that of our retired ministers fund. Under the leadership of Dr. W. M. Dye we have accomplished some very encouraging results. However, the support for men who have given their lives to the ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ, is pathetically low. Now, as we face the merger, with the other bodies of Methodists, no action taken by the unification conference will be more vital than the legislation adopted relative to this fund. At present no definite plans have been proposed that appear to be satisfactory. Meanwhile, we carry on. The recent campaign for funds has closed. We are pushing collection on pledges. We urge the pastors to keep a lookout for wills, annuities, real estate and estate notes, with the assurance that our conference funds will not lose their identity in this change.

Our Honored Dead

During the year the ministers and their families have suffered much from illness. Some have been grieved by the hand of death. Before half the year had passed Rowland Wirt Hall, young and promising pastor of the Sequatchie parish and a senior student in the University of Chattanooga, was killed in an automobile accident. Mrs. S. A. Hopper, wife of our pastor at Loudon, after an extended illness departed this life supported by a great faith in Christ.

Mrs. A. J. Murphy, wife of our pastor at Whittle Springs, Knox-ville, passed out of this life with the sustaining influence of a life well

lived and a faith that failed not in the trying hour of death.

J. H. Amis, aged retired member died in California.

Rev. and Mrs. W. L. Roberts have suffered the loss of their promising and gifted son, Roy, in a bus accident, which drew the profound sympathy of all their friends to them in their irreparable loss.

District Surveys

Only a general survey can be given of the district work for the past year. We are all familiar with the geography of the Holston Conference. Its valleys and mountain ranges give rise to almost every form of the rural problem. Its cities and villages create for us the various phases of the urban problem. We face a demand for almost every form of Christian ministry. We could never expect to standardize our ministry and expect it to function at the same register of efficiency. We have to learn and practice, being all things to all men, on the broadest possible basis, if we expect to win the variously conditioned peoples, among whom we seek to serve in the name of Christ.

In presentng the five districts only a cursory glance can be taken. This may not be satisfactory to all of us. However, we will seek to review in such generalizations, each district unit, that its outstanding characteristics will be easily recognized and its achievements commended. Again we claim that they represent our contribution to the

new church.

The Bristol District lies at the extreme northeast end of the conference. It is manned by courageous ministers, whose pastoral labor is confronted by wide ranges of mountain spaces, by a sparse and scattered membership, fringed by a poverty that defies reduction. Never-the-less they have ample means to carry on the work of the Lord and an historic challenge which sends them forth to their fields of labor with an enthusiasm that will not be discouraged by the most formidable opposition. There are ninety-six church buildings and eighty-six Sunday schools with an enrollment of seven thousand eight hundred and forty-two (7,842) scholars. Twenty-two pastors minister in these ninety-six churches, receiving an aggregate salary of eighteen thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight (\$18,838) dollars. The property values are set at (\$321,000) three hundred and twenty-one thousand dollars.

During the past year four hundred and nineteen (419) have been added to church membership. The Sunday School attendance has increased five hundred and sixty-five (565). Over fifty-four hundred dollars (\$5,462) have been paid on old indebtedness and four thousand two hundred and eighty-one (\$4,281) dollars on improvements. The work among young people is prospering and the organizations promoted by the women's work are proving to be indispensable to the church. The missionary giving through world service will show an

increase.

The Chattanooga District with its sixty church buildings and twenty-six pastors, has maintained a steady growth during the past year. It may have a few units where a decrease may be registered, but on the whole it will show an increase. Nearly ten thousand dollars have been expended on repairs and improvements. Old churches have been reopened after extensive repairs. The church at Big Springs was dedicated, after being built at a cost of nearly fifteen thousand dollars. A number of new parsonages have been completed, eminent among them, North Athens, where the pastor now lives in a modern structure which furnishes, not only comfort, but a sense of satisfaction. A new parsonage is being enjoyed by the pastor and his wife at Fairmont, Signal Mountain, where after much hard labor on his part an attractive home was completed. The Mt. Olivet church on the Coalmont parish was repaired and reopened. The old historic church at Savannah on Parish No. 1, Cleveland, was renovated and improved by the expenditure of one thousand dollars.

Over five hundred members have been added to the rolls of the churches during the past year. Many debts have been reduced and no new ones made. It is expected that the World Service giving will be increased and that the ministerial support will register higher than any period during the past decade. The Sunday Schools have made a record of increase in membership, through various agencies adopted by church school leadership. The young people's work goes forward with that spiritual and intellectual quality that bids well for

the life of tomorrow.

The Harriman District contains all that area surrounding the Norris Lake property. It covers about thirteen counties filled with mountains and hills, valleys and coves that have furnished homes for good loyal Methodist and other folks from pioneer days. Now that region is changing. Many of the people have been compelled to sell their ancestral homes. Their dwellings and their churches have been closed. Their farms inundated. They have been called upon to relocate, and again build their homes and make themselves a part of another community. This situation has given rise to many problems. Never-the-less the church has carried on with an unfailing loyalty. Many hundreds of dollars have been raised for improvements and repairs. The completion of the church at Clinton and its dedication,

free of debt, by Bishop Wallace E. Brown, was an achievement unequalled this year in the conference. A new thirty thousand (\$30,000) dollar edifice is added to our list of churches as we enter the new and better day.

The Knoxville District lies in the center of the conference. It is named after the city where the heaviest Methodist population of the Holston conference is found. The district city holds the strongest influence throughout this region. As Knoxville goes, so go the churches of the district. It maintains a rapid, aggressive pace, both commercially and religiously, for Knoxville is a city of churches. Almost all denominations are represented within its corporate limits. It has numerous modern and valuable church buildings. Many of them impressive in their ecclesiastical architecture, extensive in their cathedral structure and appealing in their conformation to those demands that call for worship and the exaltation of the spiritual values of life.

The entire district is on the forward march. Over nine thousand students are enrolled in the Sunday Schools with an average attendance of five thousand six hundred and ninety-four (5,694). The condition of church buildings is good. The past year more than ten thousand dollars were expended on repairs and improvements.

A growing membership indicates a healthy condition. Nearly seven hundred have been received by profession of faith and transfer

during the past year.

The connectional interests have been steadily and consistently

supported with an increasing register of results.

Knoxville has been the entertaining city of our conference so often that every member of it feels perfectly at home on its streets and within the bounds of its abundant hospitality.

The Johnson City District is recognized as one of the most highly organized units of our conference. Its pastors salaries rate well in comparison with other districts. It pays its pastors an aggregate of thirty-five thousand two hundred and fifty-eight (\$35,258) dollars, showing an increase of over eighteen hundred dollars. Its church property is valued at seven hundred and fifty-six thousand, two hundred (\$756,200) dollars. This large sum is distributed among one hundred and twenty-seven churches (127). These carry a membership of fourteen thousand two hundred and ninety-three (14,293), with Sunday Schools enrolling over thirteen thousand and ninety pupils (13,090), showing an increase in average attendance of over six hundred (600). The Rally Day offering increased by nearly two hundred dollars. In many parts of the district young peoples institutes were held with good attendance and encouraging results. Debts have been paid and many improvements made on properties. The most outstanding piece of work in the district, as far as church building is concerned, is that on the Greeneville circuit. A new edifice was built out of the natural field stone, valued at ten thousand (\$10,000) dollars. It was dedicated this past summer by Bishop Wallace E. Brown, free of debt. The World Service will show an increase and all other obligations provided for by a church constituency that has been most loyal through the years.

The men's work of the conference is well organized and manned with some of the most outstanding lay leadership. Each district has its organization commanding the support of devoted laymen. They place themselves behind every movement, especially emphasizing evangelism, the circulation of Christian literature and Christian citizenship. In cooperation with the head of "Men's Work" in Chicago they seek to carry the program of the denomination to the local church

and to community life.

The Women's Work of the Conference. The activities of this department operate in two sections, the Woman's Home Missionary, and the Woman's Foreign Missionary societies. These, respectively have done a piece of most commendable work. The Home Missionary societies report over six thousand dollars with all obligations met. While the Foreign society raised over five thousand with many Jubilee memberships allotted to devoted workers and loyal supporters. These three years leading up to the celebration of the seventieth anniversary in 1940 of the founding of the society have made this past year one of the most outstanding in the history of the society.

The Passing of Aldersgate

We close this year's work. We recall that during this period we celebrated the two hundredth anniversary of Aldersgate. It created a spiritual saturation that still continues to work upon the numerous bodies of believers who look back to that great historic event. Meeting there, in mind and thought, we stand at the common origin of our world-wide Methodism, with its many varieties of organizations and common experience. There we discovered that we are of the same spirit, have wrought at one common task and have fought under the banner of a common faith. That celebration made us to feel that for two centuries we have victoriously sought in the name of the Lord, now we face the destiny of a third century church, upon which we enter with united forces.

For some reason, when we look forward, we discover the form of that Oxford Don, mitered and gowned, walking, making common cause, among us. His spirit has been brooding over a coalescence that could never have been brought about, apart from the immediate agency of one sent from God. There is gratification on his face. He makes as if he would speak, a light burns in his hand. He raises it aloft as though he would fling it afar. It is the torch of "The Burning Heart" Let it not foll to the ground. Methodism united and ing Heart." Let it not fall to the ground. Methodism united and empowered, seize it! March on! March on!

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

DIVISION OF SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

At a meeting of the Board of Education held October 18, 1938 in First M. E. Church, Knoxville, the following recommendations to the annual Conference were made:

1. That the Conference go on record as confirming its firm belief in the value and necessity of Christian Education as carried on in Church-related institutions of learning.

2. That the Conference, deeply conscious of their material, traditional and spiritual assets go on record as earnestly desiring that Tennessee Wesleyan College and the University of Chattanooga continue as strongholds of Christian Education in the new Methodist

3. That the campaign of Tennessee Wesleyan College, to secure the Second Unit of the Forward Movement Fund (\$150,000) be launched

as follows:

That the campaign to secure funds from monied individuals who are able to give be launched at the discretion of the college authorities.

B. That the campaign to raise funds in the pastoral charges be launched, if and when the resident bishop and his cabinet

deem the time ripe to begin.

That the two groups above named jointly work out the plans both as to time of inaugurating the different phases of the program and as to methods of procedure.

4 a. That the goal of the Conference education fund be set at \$6,600 and that more serious endeavor be made toward raising that entire amount than has been the case in recent years.

That the fund be divided as formerly, namely, 72% to Tennessee Wesleyan College, 25% to the University of Chatta-

nooga, 3% for expense.

2c. That Professor C. E. Rogers, Johnson City, be re-elected as

treasurer of this fund.

5. That the following be nominated for re-election, as representatives of the Holston Conference, to the Board of Trustees of Tennessee Wesleyan College:

R. R. Kramer, J. M. Melear and C. E. Rogers.

6. That in accordance with paragraph 1023 of the 1936 Discipline, sections 1, 2, 3, a Board of Financial Review be set up.

DIVISION OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN THE LOCAL CHURCH, BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Report of this Division of the Board of Education is based on the Report of a Special committee, appointed by the Board at its Summer meeting for the purpose of outlining the program and policy for the future work of Religious Education in the Holston Conference. This report has been approved by the Board of Education in session in Knoxville, August 23, 1938, and is now presented to the Ninety-Fifth Session of the Holston Conference for its approval.

A Brief Survey of the Last Twelve Years.

It is indeed a far cry from where we were in 1926 in Religious Education in the Holston Conference to where we are today in 1938. Starting practically from "scratch" we have come to a Conference wide movement consisting of Daily Vacation Bible Schools, City and Community Leadership Training Schools, District Schools of Christian Living, and in many churches a settled policy of leadership training extending throughout the entire year. In 1926, our Summer Program consisted primarily of one Conference wide Epworth League Institute for our young people, where as now we have one institute or school in each of our five Districts, one Conference Summer School for advanced workers, second to none in Methodism, a Conference wide planning Conference for Young People's program, and three separate camps for Intermediates. These Summer activities reach 800 young people and adults and are on such a high spiritual plane as to mean a vital revival of Religion according to the testimony of hundreds of those who have attended.

Furthermore, our Conference program has advanced from almost complete financial support by outside agencies to almost complete self-support. Besides there has grown up throughout the Conference a clearer understanding of the vital significance of Christian Nurture and the necessity of it for making effective the Christian religion in

the modern world.

Looking Forward to Unification

We are standing at the threshold of Methodist Unification. We are soon to unite with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church. The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, is nationally known for its outstanding program of Religious

Education and which now spends in the Holston Conference territory four times as much money as we plan to spend next year. The success of our Conference Program of Religious Education in the past twelve years has been a tremendous and vital factor in preparing us for Unification. We believe we will feel much more at home in the new church because of what has been achieved by our past program.

While the program of the Southern Branch is made up of greater numbers, we feel that we can boldly and justly boast of the quality of the leadership and achievements which we shall offer to the United

Church.

The program of Religious Education in the Holston Conference must go forward this year uninterrupted, unretarded, and, if possible, strengthened for the approaching Unification of our two Conferences in this territory. This is the least that we should expect in the face of Methodist Unification.

We Propose the Following Emphasis for the Coming Year

To the end that the Program of Religious Education in the Holston Conference may go forward, we the Board of Education ask the Conference to heartily endorse, promote, and support and make effective the program known in Methodism at large as the Church School Advance. We ask the Conference to commit itself to the aggressive promotion of a four-fold forward program as follows:

An advance in leadership training in the entire Conference.
 An advance to improve the quality of the work that is being carried in every local church to the end that we may hold our

present enrollment without further losses.

3. An advance in our effort to bring into our church schools the

vast multitudes of unreached people.

4. That we advance in our efforts and concern to arouse our teachers and other leaders to see that they have not succeeded in their work until they have brought their people into a vital relationship with God through Jesus Christ and into a happy membership in the church. Our teachers and other leaders need to become personal evangelists in all their work.

Suggested Activities for Carrying out the Above Program

We feel that the time has now arrived when every Church in our Conference must have a carefully thought out and planned program and policy for training the leaders it needs to carry on the program of Kingdom Building. Any Church can promote Correspondence Courses. Any Church can use the First Series Courses provided by our Leadership Training Department. Any Church can send as a minimum one delegate to our Conference Summer Schools—many send several.

We feel that the Conference Summer School held at Athens each year must continue and be kept on the high plane upon which it has been moving in recent years. By mutual agreement with the Conference Board of the M. E. Church, South, we extend an invitation to the lay leaders of the Southwest section of the Holston Conference of the M. E. Church, South, to attend our School at Athens and strongly urge our lay leaders in the vicinity of their Leadership Training School

at Emory and Henry College to attend their School there.

We recommend that the program of the District Summer Schools and Institutes and Camps be continued in the way that seems best to the leaders in each of the various Districts in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education. We strongly recommend the closest sort of cooperation with the M. E. Church, South, in all of these activities where it is at all possible and practicable. This holds with regard to the Methodist Protestant Church, also.

We see no hope of our holding our present Church School enrollment without a greatly improved and revitalized program. It is our conviction that most of our Sunday Schools in the Holston Conference are far from what they ought to be. We cannot hope to compete with other agencies which are demanding the time and attention of our Young People unless they are tremendously improved in their effectiveness.

The complete staff of officers and teachers in every local Church School needs to be organized into a working unit, that knows its objectives and has some clear-cut ideas of how they are to be attained.

Such features as schedule, literature, grouping of the pupils, etc. need to be carefully studied with a view of improving the quality of

the school as a whole.

Much of our equipment, such as, for example, buildings themselves, black boards, tables, etc., need to be improved and adjusted to the needs of the different age groups and made more attractive. We need an effective system of following up our absentees. We will need to make systematic effort to find and enlist the multitudes of men and women, boys and girls of the various communities which we serve, and strive to get them into the proper classes in our Sunday Schools and Churches. The spirit of our schools greatly needs improvement.

Staff and Budget

To this end we recommend that the Rev. H. G. Williamson be continued as Director of Religious Education for the coming year.
We recommend the following Budget for the coming year:

REPORT OF WORLD SERVICE COMMISSION

As a Conference in United Session last year we voted to accept 2408 units of \$12.00 per year. The Treasurer's report, just completed, shows that we actually raised 1358 units, or 1050 short of our goal. The total conference giving for World Service was \$380.00 short of the previous year.

In view of this situation we might be inclined to lower the goal for next year. On the other hand we should slightly increase our goal each year if we are ever to reach our share in the million unit endeavor. But in keeping with the recommendation of General World Service Commission we are setting 2408 units as our goal for 1938-39.

We urge each church to present frequent programs in all departments which will enlighten our people as to the meaning and purpose of the 2408 units, and do all we can to achieve it by another year. And with these units of money let us set out to win that number of souls to the Kingdom as a minimum achievement.

We thank God for this movement within the church which puts new emphasis on this most important part of our task. We rejoice that so many churches have already reached the goal. Let us keep emblazoned on our banners the command of our Christ that we go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, and the watchword of our illustrious founder—"The World is My Parish."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE

This committee desires to give expression to the conviction that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is both personal and social, that it is the good news for the whole of life and for the entire race. Its primary appeal has always been to the individual heart and mind. It has been perpetuated among men by individuals whose inner lives have been transformed by divine grace, whose outward lives have been transformed by divine grace, whose outward lives have been motivated by the mind of Christ, and who, in consequence of their spiritual experience and insight have proceeded to make its social implications an actuality in everyday life. The cooperative effort of men and women who by spiritual experience, consecration, and growing social insight are completely committed to the Christian way of life is the only basis on which a progressively Christian and enduring social order can become a reality in the world.

It is our further conviction that the church, as the visible fellowship of those committed to the Christian way of life ministers to human needs that are deeper and more basic than the issues raised by current economic and social conditions. The church's fundamental mission is to stimulate those spiritual experiences and insights on which valid social ideals and institutions must ultimately rest, to exemplify the social ideals implicit in the Gospel of Christ, and to further them in human society. Since the Gospel is concerned with the whole of life, the church cannot be indifferent to any condition which affects the welfare of human beings. On controverted social and economic questions, the church, as the custodian of the Gospel, as the human fellowship professing peculiar responsiveness to the promptings of the Spirit of God in human life must act, not in a partisan spirit, but in the spirit of Christ, as the mediator between conflicting interests and classes, seeking to create in all a higher unity of purpose and cooperation for the attainment of the greater common good.

Two principles appear to be basic in the Christian social ideal, and should, in our judgment, guide the church in its social ministry: 1. The intrinsic and infinite worth of human personality; 2. A keen and ever deepening sense of social responsibility. We believe that these two principles belong together, and that the one is the correlative of the other. When they become fully operative, social maladjustments in time right themselves; when either or both are ignored, social and economic maladjustments, class consciousness and strife ensue. We believe that the present conflicts between capital and

labor, with the primary concern on the one side to oppose the demands of labor in the interests of preserving the existing economic structure, and on the other side the primary interest to fight and possibly to destroy the existing economic structure in order to secure a larger share of economic goods and leisure have resulted largely from the disregard of these basic principles underlying the Christian social ideal. The degree of social justice and cooperation between all groups in society which is essential to a sound economic and social order can be achieved only by the application of these principles to all groups alike; and it is the high obligation of the church to strive toward the achievement of this end in society.

Dealing as it does in eternal truth and values, the church as such cannot rightly commit itself to any one social and economic philosophy or plan of social and economic reconstruction, and close the door of opportunity for ministering to any group by taking a partisan attitude in politics, economics, or on social issues. While permitting and encouraging a wide range of freedom to its members to follow the dictates of their consciences as to plans and programs, the church is committed to the larger task of preventing and seeking to remedy the violation of inherent rights of human personality wherever they occur. By the very nature of the Gospel, the church is opposed to the use of violence and coercion wherever they occur, for they destroy the very values they seek to gain. The appeal of the church is and must always be to conscience and reason, to the way of love and cooperative brotherhood.

In view of the principles herein set forth, we deeply deplore the violence that is being manifested in controversies between employer and labor groups. We call the various groups to a more earnest consideration of the deeper issues of the value of human personality and the total welfare of society than seems to obtain in these controversies at present.

As to practical procedure in realizing more effectively the Christian social ideal among us, we suggest the following:

1. A more widespread and earnest effort to teach the social implications of the Gospel of Christ in church schools, in young people's groups, and in preaching.

2. We believe that the church should manifest a more vital concern over social and economic issues by encouraging an impartial study of these problems before church groups. One way in which this could be done would be to invite representatives of employer and labor groups to present their views before church groups. Wherever this is practicable, church groups would by this means gain a better understanding of the issues involved, and the church would give better evidence of its impartial but deep social interest.

3. We recognize that evangelism is a widely used method of gaining converts to Christ and the Kingdom among us. We urge that evangelism be more intensively used for developing an enlightened conscience on such social issues as labor, unemployment, race relations, war, and every social injustice pertinent to the community, in order that our converts may develop a higher sense of social

responsibility.

4. Since it is the mission of the church not only to proclaim, but also to exemplify the Christian social ideal, we are deeply pained over the fact that pastors of small churches and rural circuits in our conference are laboring with financial support far below the standard of decent living, and that often the promised support is not paid in full. Securing a more effective pastoral leadership for our weaker charges, and achieving the financial support that will make this possible is a crucial social problem among us, and we believe that in its solution the laymen's organization should cooperate actively with

the ministers. We cannot honestly proclaim the ideal of social justice to the world, if in our own institutional life we do not seek earnestly to practice it.

EVANGELISM

Basic elements can never be outmoded—neither can they be disregarded with impunity. The harvests are limited at seedtime and not at the time of reaping. The great commission of the 28th. chapter of Matthew cannot be looked upon as an optional endeavor. It is the basic element of the Christian Church and the hope of the continuance of our civilization. It is the evangelistic challenge. It is the fulfillment of the purpose of God in the Church. Evangelism is primal in the program of the Church. With its fervor rises and falls the power of the Church.

Maximum achievement never results from minimum emphasis. Qualified introduction of Jesus Christ will not create a desire to become acquainted with Him. A sin laden, war ridden, sorrowful world needs Jesus Christ the risen Lord. To herald that name in its fulness is our glorious mission as Ministers of "The Glorious Gospel of the son of God." There is no emphasis of Grace that a Minister should be ashamed to fully declare. We are fully aware that we cannot declare beyond our experience effectively. There is evidence of the need of a Spiritually endowed ministry and laity if we are to retrieve our Methodist heritage.

We therefore recommend that our preachers make their sermons thoroughly evangelical, emphasizing the diety of Jesus Christ and the office work of the Holy Spirit and the absolute dependence of man upon God for salvation.

And further; That our institutions of learning also conform to the tenets of our doctrines as contained in the articles of religion, particularly articles number 2, 8 and 9, see discipline paragraphs same number. By institutions we mean the Conference Board of education, Classes in leadership training, the Epworth League institutes, the schools and colleges, and the Board of ministerial training.

And again; That the fires of evangelism be kindled upon the altars of the home, in the Sunday School classes, in the daily contacts of busy life and in special revival services.

And further; That the cabinet appoint a conference secretary of evangelism who shall be chairman of the conference commission on evangelism, composed as follows: A Pastor from each district as district secretary of evangelism and a layman from each district as an associate member. This commission shall encourage and promote the evangelistic program in the conference through the year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING

It will be the purpose of this report, not so much to say what has been done, but what is to be done. It is hoped, then, that the report may serve in the nature of a manual for those with whom the Board of Ministerial Training must cooperate.

Three classes of ministers serve as pastors for our churches: (1) those who have graduated from the course of study; (2) undergraduates in the course of study; (3) accepted supply pastors.

GRADUATES. Eighteen correspondence courses are offered to the ministers of this group. The Athens Summer School of Ministerial Training has organized a graduate section, lasting five days of the first week of the school. Also, it is recommended that each District Superintendent give earnest consideration to the opportunity offered in the graduate courses for organized study groups in his district. A committee on graduate work will help in the organization of such groups in each district. The committee is composed of: Kirk Waldo Robbins, J. E. Milburn, D. W. Donaldson, W. R. Curtis, W. C. Daniels. Further information concerning graduate work may be obtained by addressing Dr. Allen MacRossie, 150 Fifth Avenue, New York.

UNDERGRADUATES. To be received on trial and admitted to the Conference Course of Study as an undergraduate, a candidate must have graduated from an approved college and have passed the subjects for "Reception on Trial" (Discipline, paragraph 545, Section 1). When he has been so received he advances through the course of study as prescribed in the remainder of paragraph 545, under conditions set forth in paragraph 541-544. Books for each year's study, called "Directions and Helps," guide the student in his work. All work must be done according to the requirements as set forth in "Directions and Helps."

The instructors assigned to each subject and their Post Office addresses will be found in the Conference Journal. All written work must be sent to the assigned instructor. Return postage should be included.

Examinations are given only at the Summer School of Ministerial Training, with the exception of subjects for Reception on Trial which may be taken at the seat of the annual conference on the day preceding the opening of the annual conference.

Exemption from the Course of Study will be allowed only on the bases of official transcripts from the colleges and seminaries concerned. These must be in the hands of the Conference registrar two weeks before the meeting of the annual conference.

"Approved" colleges and seminaries are those approved by the University Senate. The conference registrar and the chairman of the Board have lists of the approved institutions. Most earnestly we request that every candidate for our ministry consult with these officers that he may ascertain whether the school of his choice is an approved school. Otherwise, he may present his credits in vain.

Required written work in subjects for examination must be received by the instructors before the opening of the Summer School of Ministerial Training. Refund of traveling expenses will not be made to students who fail to comply with this rule. All other written

work is due two weeks before the annual conference. The Board will not be responsible for omissions in its records of work turned in after this time limit.

ACCEPTED SUPPLY PASTORS. All that has been indicated above under the heading of "Undergraduates" applies to accepted supply pastor candidates except that there is no scholastic college requirement. The following items are emphasized. The Accepted Supply Pastor must come to the Summer School of Ministerial Training (Discipline, paragraph 544, section 7). Note a ruling of the Board of Bishops given May, 1937, namely: An Accepted Supply Pastor who has completed the Course of Study for Local Preachers, is required, whether ordained or not, to take up the regular conference course.

THE SUMMER SCHOOL. The next session of the Athens Summer School of Ministerial Training will be held June 12-22, 1939.

The Annual Conference Benevolence for the Summer School was not largely honored this last year. We beseech the conference to continue this benevolence and enter into it much more heartily. It is used to pay the traveling expenses of the students whom the church requires to attend the Summer School. One dollar per 100 members of fraction thereof, sent to Reverend Rupert R. Ghormley, Treasurer, before June 1st, will be mony invested in better ministers.

We wish to make the following recommendations and ask the Conference to approve them.

- 1. We recommend that The Methodist Church continue the Ministerial Training program as it has been carried on at Athens, Tennessee, in the Summer School of Ministerial Training.
- 2. We recommend that training for the ministry be a General Conference function.
- 3. We recommend that these proved values be conserved: (a) The Summer School for candidates for the ministry; (b) The application of the training program to the Supply Pastors; (c) The continuance of the correspondence graduate courses.
- 4. We recommend that these items receive more careful attention than heretofore: (a) that there be more intelligent and efficient recruiting of candidates for the ministry, and on the basis of such recruiting, a more careful selection; (b) that training for the ministry include both scholastic and clinical factors; (c) that, where necessary, in order to receive such training, properly qualified students receive a subsidy from the church.

THE COMMISSION ON COURSES OF STUDY and its executive director, Allan MacRossie, receive our most hearty thanks for their helpful contributions of both money and guidance. We gladly give ourselves to the excellent program which they have created for the training of the ministers of Methodism.

ADOPTED BY MEMBERS OF THE JOHNSON CITY DISTRICT AT JOHNSON CITY, JANUARY 25, 1938 MINISTERS' FELLOWSHIP UNION

Knowing there is a great need of immediate aid to the dependents of members of Conference and of the Accepted Supply pastors, in the event of their death, a group of ministers working within the bounds of the Johnson City District after discussing how we might help to supply the need, have formulated a plan which has as its purpose to assist in helping the families of Methodist ministers in Holston Conference to pay burial expenses to bring about a greater sense of brotherhood in thus sharing in some material way in times of grief.

This plan provides:

First, that all ministers who choose to participate be expected to pay as dues the sum of one dollar and ten cents for every death in

the fellowship, the ten cents to be used for operating expense; the first payment to be made at the time of entering fellowship, which payment will be in advance and make available funds to be used at once or when needed. The next payment is to be made after the first death occurs, and so continued, by those who participate.

Second, that the membership in the Fellowship will be purely voluntary and that the organization or plan can begin with any number who choose to go into it.

Third, should the membership exceed one hundred members the fellowship will pay only one hundred dollars for each death which is the maximum amount allowed by state laws unless operated as a regular insurance company. The remainder of the amount collected for dues will be allowed to accumulate. When this sum amounts to one hundred dollars it is agreed that the members will not be asked for dues at the time of the next death.

Fourth, should any member withdraw from the Fellowship, either Voluntarily, or by failure to pay dues within 30 days after being notified by secretary that payment is due, it is understood that his family is not eligible to receive aid. But he may be reinstated by paying the current assessment provided he is in normal health.

Be it further understood, that the governing body shall be composed of a committee of three, the Chairman, Executive Secretary and Treasurer. These officers shall be elected each year at the seat of Annual Conference by the members of the Fellowship.

The officers elected at the seat of the Conference this year are:

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE: HOLSTON ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Re: W. F. Pitts—Conference Treasurer:

The books of W. F. Pitts as Conference Treasurer have been checked for the conference year 1935-36 and were found correct. The books of record were checked in detail against receipt vouchers and disbursements were supported by cancelled checks all of which were examined.

In connection with the Conference Treasurer's books we also checked Bro. J. M. Hampton's expense account for the year 1935-36 which he furnished us in some detail, and we are of the opinion that it is excessive at least to the extent of the repairs charged in addition to milage. It was the understanding of the Auditing committee that

the conference instructed Bro. Hampton to furnish them with an itemized statement of his expense account for the year 1934-35. The committee has not yet received such a statement.

Re: Dr. W. M. Dyc—Treasurer Reserve Pension Fund:

The books of the Treasurer of Reserve Pension Fund were checked in detail for the conference year 1936-37 and found correct. The receipts were supported by proper records and disbursements were represented by cancelled checks or by supporting vouchers all of which were checked and examined.

Re: G. F. Lockmiller—Treasurer Preachers' Aid Society:

Last year we made as thorough audit as possible under the conditions and made certain recommendations to the Board of Trustees but in the judgement of the auditing committee it seemed wise to have a commercial audit made to discover the actual value of the assets. Based on this belief, we recommended to the Trustees that such an audit be made this year by a Certified Public Accountant and that a copy of his report be furnished us to be used as a part of our report. Copy of this audit has not yet been received and we presume such an audit has not yet been made.

Memoirs

ROWLAND WIRT HALL

Rowland Wirt Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Hall of Chattanooga was born November 28th, 1917. He received his elementary education in the public schools graduating from Central High School. Upon entering the University of Chattanooga he pursued his studies through his junior year.

He was a member of the Highland Park Methodist Episcopal church. Baptized at its altar and educated in its Sunday school he learned how to live the Christian life. Under the pastorate of Rev. E. H. Ogle he expressed his belief that he was called to the Christian ministry. Later he was recommended for license to preach as a local minister. With that recognition he requested that he be admitted on trial in the Holston conference. This was accomplished in the fall of 1937, when he was appointed by Bishop Wallace Brown and his cabinet to the pastorate of the Sequatchie parish.

He entered upon his new duties with zest and devotion. He was carrying his university studies and doing his pastoral work as one who had been born and reared for a ministerial career. He gave every evidence of being talented with large promise for usefulness in the church. He spoke with a clear, strong, resonant voice a well thought out message. Frequently he was asked to speak over the radio at which task he was unusually efficient. He was interested in folks and seemed to possess a sincere human sympathy that carried a boyish freshness which drew men to him in a kind and friendly way.

He drove back and forth over the mountains to his parish, often picking up travelers he found on the road. Those who knew him learned that he seldom permitted a person to ride with him without speaking to him of Christ and urging him to live the Christian life. It was just such an act as this that cost him his life in an automobile accident May 1st, 1938.

His death came as a great shock to all his friends. He had preached the unsearchable riches of Christ less than an hour before. His untimely death carried a dispensation of providence for which there is no explanation. He went early to his reward, while the flush of youth was still on his face and his hands ready for the great work of the world.

He leaves to mourn his loss an aged and saintly grandmother whose prayers had borne him up during the years, his father and mother, one sister, Mrs. J. C. Copenhaver and his younger brother Stanley Lee. Also a large group of relatives and friends, most all of whom are found in the ranks of our Methodist membership. They looked upon him with high anticipations as they recognized in him a gifted and talented young minister.

MRS. S. A. HOPPER

Millie Ann Hopper was born in Marietta, Georgia, April 16, 1876, and passed away July 26, 1938, at the age of 62 years.

At an early age she made her decision for Christ and joined the Methodist Church at Walnut Grove, Alabama. This was the beginning of her Christian life which grew to be so rich and beautiful and such a blessing to so many.

She was married to the Rev. S. A. Hopper on December 3, 1895. To this union six children were born—four girls and two boys. Clarence, the second child, died in infancy. Those living are Anna (Mrs. J. M. Hampton), Luvena (Mrs. Charles Strange), Pearl Jo (Mrs. D. W. Weems), Gladys who is still at home with her father, and Wilbur who is on official duty at Norris Dam.

Mrs. Hopper was a faithful wife, a great mother and a beautiful Christian soul. I first went into their home when I was a student in our school at Boaz, Alabama. Brother Hopper was brushing up on some courses of study before going into the pastorate, and Mrs. Hopper was keeping boarders to pay their way. Here she spread her motherly care over all the school boys who came into her home to live. She washed their clothes, sewed on buttons and mended their garments, often with tired hands. But even so her spiritual watchcare over them was greater still. Many shall rise up to call her blessed.

She was a great stay in her husband's life through all the years of his ministry. No matter what difficulties arose or how hard the going on the charges she was always patient, calm and steadfast. No one ever bore their hardships with greater fortitude or sweeter spirit. She deserves a large share of credit for all of Brother Hopper's successes in Kingdom building.

May the bereaved ones in their lonely hours feel that she is not far away, for she is not dead.

MRS. A. J. MURPHY

Susie Bell Boynton was born September 2, 1878. She was the daughter of Lewis and Orissa Boynton. Her father and her mother moved from New Portland, Maine 1874 and bought a home in Pikeville, Tennessee. Susie Bell was married to the Rev. A. J. Murphy, January 7, 1902 at Pikeville. Before her marriage she taught school for a few years. She seemed to be especially called and fitted to be a preacher's wife. Her husband published his appraisal of her while she was still living. In dedicating his book to her, "Baptismal Regeneration," he says: "To my wife, Susie Bell, who has so largely contributed to whatever success has attended my ministry." While she loved the church work with a passion, yet she never neglected her home and her children. "Her children rise up to call her blessed." There were five children born to the home. Catherine departed this life when but a child. Those who remain are: Mrs. Otho Richardson and Mrs. C. D. Brooks, both of Kansas City, Mo. Mrs. James M. Henderson of Alcoa, Tennessee and Judson B. of Knoxville, Tennessee. They were all present when their mother departed this life October 2, 1938. The large number of telegrams and flowers sent from the churches where she served with her husband expressed the high esteem of people for her. The funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church, Maryville, and they were conducted by the Pastor, Rev. O. R. Tarwater, and assisted by the Rev. Glenn Lippse and the Rev. E. H. Ogle. Mrs. Murphy was serving as a Secretary and Treasurer of the Preacher's Wives Association of the Knoxville Dis-The Pastors and their wives of the District were almost all present at the funeral services.

REV. JAMES H. AMIS

Rev. James H. Amis was born in Rogersville, Tennessee, January 8, 1853. He died November 16, 1937 in Monterey Park, California at the home of his daughter, Miss Ethel with whom he had made his home for a number of years. He was married in 1884 to Olive Florida Petree, to this union were born two daughters, Miss Ethel Amis of Monterey Park and Mrs. Joyce Garcia of Glendale; two sons Frank A. and Albert H., both of Los Angeles.

He began his ministry at the age of 22 years, for many years preaching the gospel in Tennessee and Kentucky, being a Methodist preacher for 62 years. He was admitted on trial in Holston Conference in 1875, received into full membership in 1877, he was ordained deacon in 1877 by Bishop Harris, elder 1882 by Bishop Simpson.

For nearly 30 years he was a resident of Monterey Park, California and was the founder of the Community Church in that place. No member of the community commanded the love and respect of his fellow citizens more than Brother Amis. One said of him, "He was a scholar, teacher, poet, preacher and saint." His "Weekly Sermonettes" appearing in the local paper, "The Progress," were not only a joy and inspiration but were like guide posts pointing many to the Eternal City of Everlasting Joy and Peace.

He was buried in Forest Lawn Memorial Park, Glendale, California.

CONFERENCE RULES

- 1. No person shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave unless he be sick or otherwise unable to attend.
- 2. The Secretary shall keep a journal of the Conference proceedings, which he shall cause to be published in the Annual Journal of the Conference, and it shall be the official journal. He shall edit the Minutes and all matter for publication, and shall make contracts for the printing of the journal as in his judgment may seem best. He shall have charge of the Journal and Conference files and forward them to the place of meeting of the Annual Conference each year.
- 3. All committees whose reports are to be printed in the Journal shall present their reports to the Secretary in writing, otherwise the committee on publication is not required to insert such reports in the Journal.
- 4. All candidates for admission on trial, for admission into full membership, for admission on credentials from other churches, for re-admission, and for recognition of orders, shall be required to appear before the Committee on Conference Relations and the Board of Examiners, and to furnish such information as may be required touching their general character and their qualifications for the ministry.
- 5. All cases involving a change in conference relations or withdrawal shall be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.
- 6. Widows of deceased ministers who have ever traveled with their husbands may be temporary claimants, and may be referred to the Board of Stewards, who shall decide each case from year to year.
- 7. The chairman of the Board of Stewards shall be ex-officio one of the assistant secretaries of the Conference for secretarial work in connection with the Conference Claimants, and shall be the last member of the Committee on Memoirs.
- 8. The Memorial Service for deceased members, and for the wives of members shall be the special order the first day of Conference at the close of the Communion Service.
- 9. Conference visitors shall be allowed 10 minutes in which to address the Conference. District Superintendents' reports shall be limited to 15 minutes, and reports of committees, except the Board of Stewards, to five minutes.
- 10. All applications for special collections to be apportioned to the charges in the Conference shall be referred to the Committee on Special Collections.
- 11. There shall be elected each year a Nominating Committee, consisting of three members, which committee shall nominate the Standing Committees and the Committee on Nominations for the ensuing session. No member of the Nominating Committee shall be eligible for consecutive re-election to the committee.

RESOLUTIONS

TEMPERANCE

Every person who is informed on the liquor situation in America at the present time knows that the traffic has grown by leaps and bounds since the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment to the Federal Constitution. It seems apparent that if the traffic is not curbed and ultimately destroyed, countless millions of our people will be destroyed body and soul. Therefore,

- 1. BE IT RESOLVED, That Holston Methodism now rededicate itself to the cause of temperance and stand unrelentingly and unalterably against receding in any degree from the advanced position our church has previously taken on the liquor problem.
- 2. That our Pastors and Lay-leaders be urged to continue to preach and talk on temperance and the evils of the drink habit, as well as the curse of the traffic in liquor, including beer and wine, and that they inform themselves so that they may educate, as well as denounce.
- 3. That Pastors of all our churches be asked not to name on any official Board of his Church any person who drinks intoxicating liquors, who sells liquor, beer or wine, or who owns or rents property for carrying on the traffic, or who is known to be in sympathy with the liquor traffic.
- 4. That we resist in every way possible, the untruthful and pernicious advertising of liquors, and that we make known to newspapers, magazines and other advertising agencies our objections to the advertising of all kinds of intoxicating beverages.
- 5. That we stand unalterably for total abstinence on the part of the individual and for prohibition by the government, local, State and National; and that we continue relentless war upon the liquor traffic, both legal and illegal, until it shall be banished.
- 6. That the secretary of this conference be authorized and he is hereby requested to convey to the Governor of Tennessee before the 1939 session of the General Assembly convenes in next January, the earnest desire of Holston Conference that there be no backward step in temperance legislation in Tennessee; and that he use the influence of his high office, and all the influence at his command, to secure legislation which will reduce or prohibit the sale of all liquors in Tennessee including beer and wine.
- 7. That our churches be urged to give their full moral support to the prohibition cause, and to give a more liberal financial support to dry organizations which stand for the united action of our people against the liquor traffic. Especially do we urge a stronger support of our own church Board of Temperance, Prohibition, and Public Morals.

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Recognizing that the Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Anti-Saloon League of America are the two great national organizations co-operating with the Churches to oppose and destroy the liquor traffic, we commend them and the Tennessee Anti-Saloon League and the Tennessee W. C. T. U. for their useful activities, and we urge our Pastors and Churches to cooperate with them for the purpose of opposing and destroying the awful liquor traffic.
