FIRST DAY

Thursday, November 7, 1940.

Opening:

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church convened in its second annual session, in Fifth Avenue Methodist Church, Wilmington, North Carolina, on November 7, at 10:00 a.m., with the administration of the Lord's Supper, Bishop Clare Purcell presiding.

Roll Call:

T. M. Grant moved that the registration in the office be taken as the roll call and it was carried. The absentees are shown in the Chronological Roll and Roll of the Lay Delegates.

Organization:

T. M. Grant was elected Secretary; W. H. Brown, F. W. Paschall, and E. L. Hillman, Assistant Secretaries; W. C. Wilson, Statistical Secretary; B. H. Houston, Assistant Statistical Secretary.

Committees:

The Conference by vote gave the Cabinet authority to make nominations not otherwise provided for, and B. B. Slaughter read nominations for the Committees and Boards. The Conference approved these nominations. (See Boards and Committees.)

1. That the annual salary of each of the seven district superintendents shall

3. That we authorize the Conference Treasurer to borrow, from month to month, an amount up to 50% of the combined monthly deficit of salaries of the district superintendents.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

HOME MISSIONS

Your Board of Missions is faced with increasing demands to minister to neglected groups of both rural and urban sections of our North Carolina Conference. Urgent appeals have come to your board to send preachers and Christian workers to large neglected groups in our cities that are not attending either church or Sunday school. Your board is very sympathetic to these appeals but a depleted treasury makes such help impossible.

To provide money to support this home mission work, we request every pastor, in co-operation with the Board of Stewards, and local Board of Missions of each church, to give every congregation an opportunity to make a special offering during the early spring of 1941, preferably in February, to be used for Home Mission work, within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference—the offering to be sent to Mr. J. C. Braswell, Treasurer, Rocky Mount, N. C.

This fund is to be known as The Home Mission Special and is to be administered by the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, cooperating with the City Missionary Societies and the Commission of Town and County Work.

We further urge our district superintendents and pastors to discover neglected groups in or contiguous to each charge, and make all possible effort to supply them with Christian services, using our Christian laymen in establishing Sunday schools and worship groups and in doing evangelistic work.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Your Board of Missions and Church Extension submits the following report:

1. This board is becoming more keenly aware of the increased responsibilities and opportunities which have come to it since unification of these three branches of Methodism, and is trying diligently to apply itself to its sacred task. Operating under the new legislation passed by the General Conference in Atlantic City, the work of this board has been broadened, and at the same time lifted to a higher place of Spiritual importance. During this session of the Conference, several meetings have been held and many discussions entered into in an effort to get a proper perspective of every situation and make the wisest possible decision in every problem. We were delighted to have as our guest in several of these board meetings Dr. A. J. Walton, representing the General Board. He confronted us with our task, and offered helpful suggestions.

2. Dates and places for holding the District Missionary Institutes will be announced early in the new year, and it is our sincere hope that strong emphasis will be placed upon these district gatherings by the pastor and laymen of every church. It is our task to re-create a passion for missions in Methodism. We recommend and earnestly urge that a School of Missions be held in each church immediately following these institutes, and that the interest of the men, women, and young people be aroused in these schools. The study book to be used this year is being written by Dr. Henry Van Dusen, and is called "Methodism Facing

Its World Task," Dr. Van Dusen has recently made a trip around the world and is eminently fitted for this responsibility.

3. The several District Missionary Secretaries have done good work in promoting the cause of missions in their districts. Good use has been made of the stereopticon machine purchased by this board. We recommend that Bishop Purcell continue the custom of appointing a Missionary Secretary for each district, and ask for him the hearty co-operation of every pastor and church.

4. This board also recommends that authority be granted the Board of Missions and Church Extension, working through the Conference Missionary Secretary and at least three members of this board appointed by the Chairmen, to set up in the larger cities of 10,000 or more, City Board of Missions and

Church Extension where deemed advisable.

5. We recommend the appointment of Rev. F. S. Love as Conference Missionary Secretary. We heartily commend him for the fine work done in creating missionary sentiment and promoting the cause of missions in our Conference.

6. We recommend the appointment of F. S. Aldridge as Conference Golden

Cross Director.

REPORT NO. 4—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The board has been handicapped in the Extension work because of lack of funds. Practically every application has of necessity been reduced from the amount asked. Fourteen churches and three parsonages have received aid from the board during the year. This board has assumed and paid its part of the outstanding debt against the Board of Church Extension of the former Methodist Protestant Church, amounting to \$600.00.

We are glad to report that new parsonages have been built this year at Williamston, Moncure, and on the Pasquotank Charge. A new church has been built at West Burlington, and also at Nakina in Columbus County. A parsonage has been purchased by the Shallotte Charge. The board has assisted in building and improvement programs in twelve other churches. We feel that special mention should be given the fact that, largely through the initiation of this board, and assistance given by it, two long-standing debts have been paid in full during the year. Ahoskie has cleared its burdensome debt of around \$25,000, and St. Paul Church, Rocky Mount, has paid its debt of \$1,300. We rejoice with these congregations, and are glad the board could lend some assistance.

We would call the attention of the ministers and laymen to the fact that through the wise planning of those in charge of this work in our Conference in former years, this board has built up a loan fund, from which assistace may be secured for building churches and parsonages. Some of the brethren have overlooked that fact, and in making application for loans, many of them apply to the General Board, when our own Conference has this fund and would like for it to be in circulation. The interest rate is four per cent if the payments are made promptly when due, otherwise the rate goes to six per cent. However, we recommend that no minister or church apply for a loan from this fund unless the officials are willing to sign the proper papers. In some instances applications have been made, and loans granted, then the officials would refuse to sign proper papers to secure the money. This money is handled in a business-like manner, and of course can not be loaned without proper security and endorsements.

We recommend that all our church properties be protected with adequate insurance.

REPORT NO. 1—THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

I. THE LOCAL CHURCH

This is the first report of your Board of Education in the new Methodist Church. Your board has endeavored to give faithful and efficient leadership to every local church within the bounds of this Conference.

During the year a series of meetings was held throughout the Conference for adult workers with youth. In every district a keen interest was shown in the youth work of our church. For several years there has been an annual increase in the number of vacation church schools held. This year there were more schools held, and more workers and pupils in these schools than in any previous year.

Separate Summer Assemblies were held for the senior age young people and for the older young people. Both had larger enrollments than in past years. In addition, there were three Assemblies for intermediate boys and girls. For the first time in the history of our Conference, a Conference-wide Assembly for Adult Workers in the Church School was held. The attendance and interest was so encouraging in this first venture that plans have been made for a second Assembly next summer.

Many of our local churches held Youth Crusade Weeks. During the week youth leaders led other young people in worship, recreation and fellowship. From the reports reaching your board these meetings were of much help to the

young people and to the churches where such meetings were held.

We are glad to report an increase in the offerings to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise. The offerings this year were the largest in the history of this Enterprise in our Conference, Church School Day offerings were not as large as last year and we are hoping that this day will be more widely observed in the coming year. Efforts are being made to increase the number of local churches observing Childhood and Youth Week and to build up a larger and more effective leadership education program.

Whereas the service of Reverend Floyd M. Patterson, as Extension Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, terminates at the close of this Conference year: we, the members of the board, wish to express our sincere gratitude for the splendid leadership he has shown and outstanding contribution which he has made to the educational work of the Conference and regret to lose him in

this most important phase of the work.

II. SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES

Having reviewed the situation as we close the Conference year, we submit the report on Schools and Colleges, as follows:

DUKE UNIVERSITY

Duke University has again enjoyed a splendid year. Students enrolled in the regular term numbered 3,673. Summer School enrolled 2,606. Number of officers and teachers, not including assistants, 442. The present endowment is \$34,936,-169.00. Plant and equipment are valued at \$29,881,142.00. The University has 28 loan funds valued at \$2,027,832.94. Scholarship funds amount to \$304,763.39. The value of Duke University Miscellaneous Special Funds is \$477,009.60.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

Greensboro College, our fully-accredited four-year college for young women, has made marked progress during the year, including improvement in the library, in buildings and grounds, in equipment, and in the quality and effectiveness of

its work. Noteworthy is the installation of an automatic sprinkler and fire alarm system in Main, Fitzgerald, and Hudson dormitories. The enrollment for 1939-40 was 446, an all-time record. We commend Greensboro College to parents having daughters to send to college and to all persons in position to assist in further strengthening this, the first college for women ever chartered by the Methodist Church.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

Gratifying improvement is continuing at Louisburg College. The debt has been reduced by \$13,000.00. A donation of \$1,000.00 has been made for Labor Scholarships for worthy students. Four new courses have been added to the curricula. Rev. Walter Patten was inaugurated as President at commencement. The student enrollment this fall is 290.

SCARRITT COLLEGE

Scarritt College has had the best year of its history. The dream of her leaders is continually being realized. It is now the training school for all Methodism for missionary and lay workers. The future looks especially bright with its place of enlarged usefulness as a training center for united Methodism.

HIGH POINT COLLEGE

High Point College is rendering a real service; there has been marked increase in student enrollment. The enrollment for the current session is 475. The past Summer School enrolled 129 and there are now 141 Extension students. The property valuation totals \$711,711.29.

PASTORS' SCHOOL

The 1940 Pastors' School rendered a distinct service. The Institute for Rural Ministers also maintained its excellent record. Both are worthy of commendation and support.

REPORT NO. 2—THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE WORK OF THE YEAR

We make the following recommendations regarding the work in the local church during the coming year:

- That every phase of work projected in the three age-group levels be given full emphasis by the Conference staff.
- 2. That every effort be made to enlist all our church schools in the observance of World Service Sunday, with an offering to the World Service program of our church.
- 3. That Church School Rally Day be emphasized in every church school for the support of the program of Christian Education in the Conference.
- 4. That we make leadership education a matter of chief concern during the year, that we may have a better qualified leadership throughout the Conference.

APPOINTMENTS RECOMMENDED

We recommend the following appointments:

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

APPRECIATION WILLIAM PRESTON FEW 1867-1940

"We live in deeds, not words-nor figures on the dial of time." William Preston Few was one of the most outstanding and influential laymen in The Methodist Church. Possessed of rare wisdom and courageous leadership, he inspired other laymen with zeal to serve the great causes of the church. Independent in thought, he revealed in his life a happy balance of highly developed mental faculties with great moral perception and spiritual insight. He was a man of deep and uncompromising moral convictions, quick and firm in his comprehension and decisions, yet generously tolerant of the sincere opinions of

Dr. Few was gentle, unassuming, and modest in manner, easily winning confidence and esteem of all with whom he was associated. He was great because he was good. He was a man of clear vision and had a deep and abiding faith,

based upon the eternal principles of justice and right.

Among the many and varied services which Dr. Few rendered his church was the creation of a greater interest in the place and work of its laymen. He was largely instrumental in the re-organization and development of the Board of Lay Activities and served most effectively as Chairman of the General Board and as Lay Leader of the North Carolina Conference continuously since the reorganization of the Lay Work in this Conference. Under his wise leadership and great influence the work of the laymen and generally all the causes of the church have greatly prospered.

In recognition of these services he deservedly received the highest honors the church can confer upon its laymen, and he generously shared them with local co-

laborers and the Conference.

Having fought a good fight and having kept the faith, he finished his course on October 16, 1940, when a Providence, kind and unerring, called him hence from works well done to the rewards provided by an atoning Christ, whom he loved and served. Rest to his ashes and peace and joy to his eternal spirit.

THEREFORE, BE IT SUBMITTED by the Conference Board of Lay Activities and RESOLVED by the North Carolina Conference of The Methodist Church, in sessions held in Wilmington, North Carolina, November 7-11, 1940:

FIRST: That in reverence and pride we commemorate the life, and in sorrow note the passing of this friend, comrade, and great Christian leader, recording our gratitude for his fruitful life, effective works, and surviving influence.

SECOND: That we humbly bow in submission to this dispensation, and in

faith that our earthly loss is our brother's eternal and glorious gain.

THIRD: That these Resolutions be copied in full in the minutes of the Conference Board of Lay Activities and in the Conference Journal; that a copy be sent to the bereaved family, and copies be released to the press for publication.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

In accordance with the Discipline of the Methodist Church, each Annual Conference has authority to adopt a schedule of minimum support for its pastors, to apportion a sustentation fund to the pastoral charges in order to maintain this schedule, and, if it desires to supplement this fund, to make an equitable apportionment on that part of the salaries of all effective ministerial members of the Conference above the minimum salary fixed by the Annual Conference.

The Conference Board of Lay Activities recommends that the North Carolina Conference request the presiding Bishop to appoint a committee of five members of the Conference to study the problem of adequate support for the pastors of this Conference and to report its findings and make its recommendations to the meeting of the North Carolina Conference in 1941.

REPORT NO. 5—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We, the Board of Lay Activities of the North Carolina Conference, beg leave to present the following report:

The spirit of uncertainty that prevails in our economic, social, and political affairs demands that the cultivation of the spiritual life be made central and foremost in all our activities.

In times that try men's souls and shatter their faith, let us, more than ever, hold fast to that which is good. Let us experience a closer walk with God, conscious that we live in an ordered and orderly universe and that somehow good will be the final goal of all.

Let us ever be mindful that the ultimate aim of the layman's work is to help

bring sinful men and women to God by the witness of Christian living.

Let us promote the program of lay activities for the coming year in the spirit of loyal partners and trusted representatives of Jesus Christ. We are his witnesses and the world will not believe a bit more about the Son of God than it sees in us who profess to be his faithful followers.

With this high purpose in view, we recommend that the following objectives

constitute the program of lay activities for the coming year:

- 1. That we earnestly seek to persuade all the members of our churches to accept and practice the principles of Christian Stewardship.
- 2. That each local church be fully informed concerning each item in the benevolent askings and earnestly urged to accept in full its benevolent apportionment; and that the goal for 1940-1941 be the payment of one-half of the benevolences by May 1, 1941, and the full payment of benevolences by at least one month preceding the meeting of the Annual Conference.
- 3. That each charge adopt an adequate financial system, including the "every-member canvass," weekly payment of pledges and monthly settlement of all financial obligations.
- 4. That a course for the training of the official board be given in each church and that the pastor or some qualified layman teach the course, using as the basic text Morelock's A Steward in the Methodist Church.
- 5. That the cause of the Golden Cross by earnestly promoted in each local church; and that the goal for the coming year be the enrollment of at least 1,000 members in each district of the Conference.
- 6. That the District League of Stewards hold its first meeting as soon as practicable after the Annual Conference, and that the program of the meeting be focused upon the ways and means of accomplishing, in each district, the objectives of the Conference Board of Lay Activities.
- 7. That, during the coming year, we strive to put the North Carolina Christian Advocate in the home of every member of the official board.
- 8. That we continue to give our unqualified endorsement and whole-hearted support to the Conference program for the Methodist Orphanage; that, in keeping with this purpose, a special offering be taken in the churches and church schools during the Thanksgiving season or the Christmas holiday; and that a free-will offering be made in the church schools every fifth Sunday.
- 9. That evangelism, especially personal evangelism, be given a central place in all our activities because the supreme task of the church is to bring sinful men and women to God.
- 10. That the mid-year meeting of the Conference Board of Lay Activities be held at Goldsboro, North Carolina, in April, 1941.
 - 11. That Laymen's Week, February 23-28, 1941, be observed in every

charge of the Conference and that Laymen's Day be observed in every charge on February 28, 1941, or as near thereto as practicable.

12. That the Board of Stewards assume the responsibility for promoting the program of lay activities in the local church.

13. That a copy of this program of lay activities be placed in the hands of each charge and church lay leader, with the request that he read these objectives to the members of the Board of Stewards and appoint appropriate committees to promote them in the local church.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Your Board of Hospitals and Homes, having examined a financial statement of the Methodist Orphanage, and being personally acquainted with the work being done by that institution, submits the following report.

Three hundred children are being cared for in an adequate manner. Special consideration is given by the Orphanage administration to the health, education, recreation and spiritual training of the boys and girls entrusted to its care. This broad program is being conducted on an economical basis. The per capita cost at the Methodist Orphanage is lower than the average of the other five large orphanages of the state.

The board wishes to express its gratitude to the churches and church schools of the Conference for their sympathetic and generous support. We are especially grateful to Mr. Graham Woodard for his gift of \$18,000.00 for a fully equipped gymnasium; to Mr. J. C. Braswell for his gift of \$500.00 for a new athletic field; and to Mrs. G. G. Allen for her gift of \$500.00 for campus improvement.

Beginning with this Conference year, funds raised by former M. P. Churches for orphanage support will be sent to the Methodist Orphanage at Raleigh.

We wish to make the following recommendations:

That the Orphanage apportionment for each church be an amount equivalent to 10% of its pastor's salary for the current year.

2. That all churches and church schools take offerings during the Thanksgiving season to go as specials and not to be applied on the 10% Orphanage

apportionment.

We further recommend that all church schools take offerings each fifth Sunday to go as specials. It is necessary to request and emphasize these specials and to ask the Conference to raise the percentage of apportionment. In addition to income derived from the apportionment, Duke Endowment and Orphanage Endowment, approximately \$35,000.00 is needed to give the Orphanage a balanced budget. An increase of the apportionment from 10% to 171/2% would be necessary to take the place of these specials.

3. We suggest and urge that the pastors raise as much of their Orphanage apportionment as soon as possible in the early part of the new Conference year.

4. We recommend the re-appointment of Rev. A. S. Barnes as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage at a salary of \$3,600.00. We also recommend the appointment of C. K. Proctor as Superintendent of the Oxford Orphanage and M. O. Fletcher as General Manager of the Tayloe Hospital.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

REPORT OF ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

The Special Committee of the Methodist Orphanage, appointed by the Board of Trustees to confer with special committees of the Methodist Protestant Home at High Point and of the Children's Home at Winston-Salem on the question of the continued operation or otherwise of the High Point Home, met with those committees at the West Market Street Church, Greensboro, N. C., on or about July 1, 1940. After much discussion, the committee from the Raleigh Orphanage agreed to take from the High Point Home the children who had gone there from the territory of the former Methodist Protestant Church now in the territory of the North Carolina Conference. This was agreed to by the full Committee, subject to the Board of Trustees of the High Point Home agreeing to the transfer of those children from High Point to Raleigh. The Trustees of the High Point Home subsequently met and agreed to the transfer, and twelve of the children at High Point were received at the Raleigh Orphanage.

Those three committees were not again convened. We were later informed that, after consultation between persons representing the High Point and Winston-Salem Homes, and in preparation of a suggested closing of the High Point Home, the Trustees of that institution decided to convey the property of the Home to the High Point College, and that arrangements would be made to transfer the rest of the children at the institution to the Winston-Salem Home. Some of the details of the suggested arrangements were subsequently communicated to this committee by the Superintendent of the Winston-Salem Home by two letters, one dated October 17, 1940, addressed to the undersigned, and the other dated November 2, 1940, addressed to the Rev. A. S. Barnes, copies of which letters are attached to this report. We have also information that at the recent Annual Conference of the Western North Carolina Conference, held at High

Point, these transfers and arrangements were ratified.

In view of the above circumstances, this committee concurs in the action of the Trustees of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home at High Point and of the Children's Home at Winston-Salem, as confirmed by the Western North Carolina Conference.

The material assets of the High Point Children's Home are being transferred by the Board of Trustees of the High Point Children's Home to the Board of Trustees of High Point College. We do not share in any of these assets except from the sale of a strip of land opposite the High Point Children's Home buildings, south of the High Point-Greensboro boulevard. This land has been sold by the High Point Board of Trustees on the deferred payment plan and I have heard unofficially that it brought a little over \$5,000. Just what the net proceeds will amount to in the run of three years I do not know, but I am expecting to know definitely within the next few weeks, certainly before the meeting of your Annual Conference.

The only unfinished business connected with this merger, as I see it, is a proper division of assets and liabilities of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc., to your institution and ours. An audit is being made of the affairs of the Methodist Protestant Children's Home, Inc., and when this is available we will definitely know where we are. It now appears that the operating liabilities at the High Point institution will about balance the available assets.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

WHEREAS, the use of intoxicating liquors is admitted universally to be hurtful, both to the persons who use the same and to society generally;

WHEREAS, the legalization of beer throughout North Carolina and the establishment of liquor stores in 26 counties in our state have increased drinking, drunkenness and all of the other evils that accompany the liquor traffic, and,

WHEREAS, the Methodist Church always has been and still is opposed to the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors and opposed to the legalization

of the nefarious business;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: By the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, assembled in Wilmington, North Carolina, on this 8th day of November, 1940, as follows:

- That we are chagrined by the fact that the 26 counties in North Carolina in which liquor stores are being operated are all within the confines of our Conference,
- 2. That we urge the General Assembly of 1941 to enact statutes to prohibit in North Carolina the manufacture, transportation and sale of beer, whiskey and all other intoxicating liquors; and, if the General Assembly is unwilling to outlaw the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, we urge the General Assembly at least to give the people of our state the privilege of voting in a state-wide referendum for or against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.
- 3. That we urge particularly the governmental authorities, federal, state and county, to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors in the counties and districts surrounding Fort Bragg and other military camps where our boys are being trained in our National Defense program.
- 4. That in order to aid in the development of sentiment against the liquor traffic, we urge that the instruction in our public schools and in our church schools, relative to the harmful effects of alcohol be made as effective as possible, and that our pastors preach often in behalf of total abstinence, that each year the subject of temperance be allotted a place in the program of our Annual Conference, and that each year the subject of temperance be allotted an adequate place in the program of the annual meeting of each District Conference.
- 5. That we beseech all pastors and other church officers that they do not recommend, nor approve, for official position in any phase of church life, any person who drinks alcoholic beverages, advertises it, manufactures it, sells it, advocates its sale, or in any other way seeks to promote the liquor traffic.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

At our last Annual Conference the Committee on Evangelism urged that our Bishop, our district superintendents, our pastors, and our laymen make much of the pre-Easter season as a time for earnest evangelistic effort. We asked that each organization in the local church face its evangelistic responsibility and make the Easter season a time of spiritual refreshing.

We are unable to report what has been accomplished by the ministers appointed to serve as District Directors of Evangelism. We believe that each one did his assignment to the best of his ability; and that our pastors and people made an honest effort to co-operate to the full in this great work of the church.

Let us try to keep our vision of God unclouded in these dark days. The message which we are to proclaim is that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself and that He "will have all men to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth." He is seeking to bring our lost humanity to its senses, wooing it with love, calling it back to joy and peace. It is our high privilege to share in that joyful task. It is difficult to hold fast to love and not be tempted to answer violence with violence.

Does anyone doubt that ours is a world almost lost because of its reliance on force? We have looked in vain to commerce and science and education and many other things to save us. We ought to be convinced that only God's plan will work; that "His church has the answer." Let us resolve to try it before

we perish.

We recommend that we consider together the new and urgent call to evangelism. To seek and to save that which was lost is a colossal challenge. It calls for almost infinite compassion and patience. In order for ministers and laymen to comprehend and deal wisely with all the aspects of salvation, they must be possessed of deep insight and broad vision. If men are to be evangelized, Christ cannot be kept in a corner. Christ is more than conditioning goodness. He is a person to be known and received as Savior, Lord, and Master.

Let us think of it as our supreme business, our opportunity, our high privilege to take the ancient passion for the souls of men and put it into the stream of modern life. Let us ressolve to spend lavishly the riches of divine grace to the end that others might know Him "whom to know aright is life eternal."

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD PEACE

Due to the influence of the church and other religious agencies, the recent Conscription Act, calling millions of our youth to register for military training, makes specific provision for those claiming exemption from military service on the ground of religious conviction. It is a foregone conclusion that many young people will avail themselves of this opportunity to register their protest against war.

The past General Conference of the Methodist Church declared that "those of our members who, as conscientious objectors, seek exemption from military training in schools and colleges or from military service anywhere or at any

time have the authority and support of their church."

If the church is to give its support to such of its youth as seek exemption under the present Conscription Act, it must know who so declare themselves and the particular grounds of their decision. Fortunately and wisely, ample provision has been made for securing this information. The General Commission on World Peace, with headquarters at 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Ill., is prepared to supply information for the guidance of pastors and conscientious objectors, and cards upon which the individual's decision may be registered with the church.

As the first draftees will be called for examination within the next few days or weeks, it is of urgent importance that all pastors inform themselves concerning these provisions and prepare to meet their responsibility in this emergency. It is suggested, therefore, that our pastors carefully study Paragraphs 1712 and 1716 of the 1940 Discipline, wherein the position of our church with reference to war and military service is conclusively stated; that they take the first opportunity of informing their people of the position of the church in this matter and acquainting them with the facilities arranged for meeting the needs of objectors to war; and that they supply themselves with the materials furnished by the General Commission on World Peace.

We would declare our conviction that the present conflicts in the world have come about, not because of any failure of God; but are themselves a judgment upon a world that has disobeyed God's righteous will, a disobedience in which all men and nations share. We re-affirm our faith that through the chaos of these times God will be able to work out His own purposes and bring nearer the establishment of His kingdom. The conditions of our time do not indict Christianity, they demand Christianity. We urge our preachers to devote themselves especially in these critical days to renewing and re-inforcing in our people a faith in the triumphant power of God.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POLICY AND OBJECTIVES

Union for conquest demands the full correlation and the finest co-operation of every agent of Methodism-joined in the one common task to make the Kingdom of God come and the will of God prevail among men. Only the personal and continued presence of the living Christ can furnish the dynamics sufficient to render potent and give power to the personal and institutional life of our Methodism. Souls aflame for the union of all the agencies of our united Methodist Church give assurance of victory. Unfortunately, we are too much concerned about our personal and institutional affairs here in North Carolina to deliver the full force of our church for the needed conquest. Every pastor, every church, every Society of Christian Service, every Young People's Crusade, every Layman's Association should subordinate individual pride and glorified success to the welfare of the whole church in the one task of bringing men to God. Then the salary paid, the record made in the local church, the work of the Woman's Society, the church school, or what not, will become simply agencies in the work of the entire church. To this end much of self must go on the altar.

More than this. Many radical adjustments should be made in our procedure. District superintendents, secretaries, laymen and laywomen must get away from much of our burdensome routine. We are paying too much for supervision in our church. Failure to meet the needs in city and town and country mission fields, in enlarging our contributions, in the better support of our orphanage and in saving the lost calls for abnegation of self and more heroic endeavor. Instead of the district superintendent's holding three services and the rushing through of three Quarterly Conferences a Sunday, certain needed adjustments should be made so that much of their time can be given to martialing the forces for a real conquest in the neglected and unproductive fields so much in need of leadership. To get out of the ruts and break with the present routine calls for wisdom and enterprise on the part of the leaders. This is an essential to make our supervision

count for most.

EVANGELISM

Let it never be forgotten that all the educational, benevolent, and missionary enterprises of the church are not ends in themselves but means to the accomplishment of the fundamental aim of the church.

In the first place, the church should seek to re-enlist the interest and support of a vast company of nominal church members who have lost their devotion to God and their interest in the causes of His church. They must be reclaimed for active service.

We urge every local church to organize a Committee on Evangelism whose purpose should be to give each agency of the church's life a clear understanding for which it exists and works-the bringing of boys and girls, of men and women to God-and to create in that agency a sense of its primary responsibility for the accomplishment of that task,

The local church must extend its labors to the vast, unchurched areas of city and rural life. Fields are white unto the harvest in rural settlements and in the city slums. The rural population, particularly, must become a foremost concern of the church. Just as Christ came to seek and to save that which is lost, so the church must go wherever a needy soul can be found.

MISSIONS

The church that lives for itself dies. Christ put the church where he did in the center of its own orbit—to give light unto all, and a church cannot find its reason for being in anything short of the channel through which the redeeming power of Jesus Christ can flow out to the ends of the earth.

The message of Christ is not a piece of private property or personal luxury and men cannot serve God and neglect men. They must share in the great task

of bringing lost men to Christ.

To meet the imperative demands for a complete missionary program let there be organized in all our cities City Missionary Societies. These should survey

the field and, where possible, meet the needs.

Let the pastors co-operate with the Committee on Town and Country Work and the district superintendents in organizing such societies that can and will meet more adequately the needs of our rural areas. Our Conference, in conformity to General Conference legislation, has directed the forming of this Commission. It offers an opportunity we should most certainly use.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The church school is the great teaching agency of the church, and every member of the church, together with every child whom it is meant to serve, should be a member of the church school, receiving guidance and adequate information in all the causes and areas of service for which the church school is responsible.

Let there be a recognition of the importance of youth in the church. They constitute the material out of which the church of tomorrow is built. We must carry forward the magnificent beginning registered in the Youth Crusade in

enlisting youth in the total church program.

The church of the future will be vitally influenced by the theological training of the students of today. We need a better trained and more effective ministry—a ministry of deep spiritual insight, equipped with a message of divine power and truth. It must be a ministry taught by men who love God with all their hearts, who have experienced in their lives the redeeming power of Jesus Christ, who are as much at home in the spiritual universe as in the world of the intellect, and who believe in the fundamentals of our faith.

OTHER AGENCIES OF EDUCATION

The crying need of our church is that our people be informed as to the urgent causes in our program for the redemption of mankind. We urge the active co-operation of every minister and lay leader in the circulation of our Conference organ—The North Carolina Christian Advocate—of the Christian Advocate of the Methodist Church, of the Upper Room, and of the World Outlook. The education of our people, through the influence of Christian literature, will result in the deepening of their spiritual life. They will then render a larger service in the local church and make a more generous response to the appeal of all the benevolent and other causes.

LAY ACTIVITIES

The important problem we face is how to carry this program to the local church and make it function in the life and service of its members, These objectives must be carried to the local church if we are to accomplish the task committed to our hands. To this end we urge the enthusiastic support, and ready co-operation of every district superintendent, minister, and lay leader in helping the Conference Board of Lay Activities to create an active working force in each local church. These plans are definitely set out in the report of the Board of Lay Activities.

BENEVOLENCES

Let no man interpret our plan of voluntary acceptance of the benevolences to mean that the support of the benevolences is optional. It is really a matter of fine privilege and high responsibility. We must translate our love of Christ and our brotherly affection into a more costly sharing of our material possessions. The gap between the askings and the acceptances must be closed. Our peril is right here: There is no significant forward movement possible in our church until we lift the level of our benevolent giving. Our benevolences will suffer until we make the causes represented theerin so alive that churches now accepting far less than the askings will steadily increase their needed support.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend that, during the first year or two years of the quadrennium, the cabinet, in co-operation with proper boards and committees, undertake studies of selected churches with a view to strengthening these churches so as to provide more pastoral appointments and to make possible more intensive cultivation of the people in these areas. On this basis of this study, we suggest that definite experiments in this direction be undertaken during the quadrennium.

In this connection we recommend further that during the coming quadrennium the Conference works definitely toward the objective of lessening the differential between support of preachers and services to churches in the rural areas. This committee and others may, from time to time, recommend specific steps in this direction.

The foregoing objectives fixed for our Methodism in this Conference are presented for your approval. They call for prayer, faith, patience, loyalty and honest work. Devotion to our Christ and heroic courage will mean a better day for evangelism, education, missions, benevolences, debt-paying and spiritual conquests in all our efforts to bring men to God by this co-ordination of every agency of our Methodism. Only men and women who have been with Christ in the dark; have felt their hearts burn as they have trudged the dusty roads; have held high fellowship with Him in the third heavens, and are able to show the marks and scars suffered in high and heroic struggles are of real value in winning glorious conquests in this present evil world with its war, death and hell. Only the cross-bearers, with their scars and nail-prints, count for much in this present crusade right here in the North Carolina Conference. A passionate devotion to our Christ is the first and the last demand of us all to make an impact upon this present world.

REPORT OF WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

Through the Wesley Foundation Commission the two Annual Conferences in North Carolina are sponsoring the church life of 1,450 Methodist students at Chapel Hill and at Greensboro, where 650 of these students attend the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. There are several other state colleges where assistance is greatly needed. It is devoutly hoped that the near future will bring resources enabling proper attention to be given to every Methodist student who attends a state school. There are about 3,000 young people from our Methodist homes in these schools in North Carolina. There is no more promising field for intensive Christian cultivation.

The work at College Place Church for Woman's College of the University of North Carolina students may be reported as follows: Miss H. Louise Paginot,

from Vanderbilt University, is the new Wesley Foundation Director; 345 affiliate members are enrolled; Christian instruction is given in Sunday classes and dormitory Bible classes; the spiritual life is cultivated through the Sunday worship services and through distribution of the *Upper Room;* Christian service is emphasized through the raising of a considerable student financial budget, and through charitable visitation in homes and institutions of need; Christian fellowship abounds in frequent social features, especially for new students, and through happy visits in local homes on the invitation of College Place families.

The report from Chapel Hill is encouraging. Without the service of a paid director, the program is in the hands of a Council of a dozen very capable students. The pastor accepts much of the administrative responsibility. There is a Student Bible Class in the Church School, a Vesper Fellowship hour, and the students participate definitely in the worship services of the church as ushers, members of the choir, and workers in the Church School. Informal social fellowship is frequently enjoyed in the parlors of the church, and occasionally a more formal dinner or banquet is given. Students lead in some feature of community

social service.

There has been a decided improvement in the type of program offered, and a gratifying increase in the number of students participating, particularly in

the Sunday morning worship service.

Memoirs

JOHN MONROE WRIGHT

On Tuesday morning, April 23, 1940, the King of kings recalled a royal ambassador when John Monroe Wright fell on

sleep.

Brother Wright was born at Laurel Hill, N. C., June 19, 1876. He was the son of the late C. J. and Mary Ann Wright. He received his education at Union and Wake Forest Colleges. After completing his course in college, he taught in the public schools for nine years before he entered the ministry. He was married to Miss Estelle Jones of Hyde County on June 21, 1905. To this union was born one son, John Monroe, Jr., who with his mother survive him. He is also survived by one brother, Mr. Durant Wright of Laurel Hill, N. C.

Brother Wright was received into the traveling connection, on trial by the annual conference at Wilson, N. C., in November, 1905. He was ordained deacon at New Bern in December, 1907, by Bishop C. B. Galloway and was ordained an elder at Kin-

ston, N. C., in November, 1911, by Bishop E. E. Hoss.

He served faithfully the following charges: Shallotte, 1905-6; Jones Circuit, 1907-8; Bridgeton and Riverside, 1909-12; Elm Street, Goldsboro, and Caswell Street, Kinston,, 1913-1914; Elm Street and Princeton, Goldsboro, 1915-1916- Mount Olive, 1917; Northampton, 1918-21; Ayden, 1922-23; and Carthage, 1924-27.

In his fourth year at Carthage and in the very prime of his life, he was stricken down; broken in health, believing that his work was done, no longer to go out and in as a loving shepherd of the flock, he took the superannuate relation and retired from the active ministry, patiently and without a murmur waiting for the summons on high. The call came in the early hours of Tuesday morning, April 23, 1940, and I am sure he was ready and waiting.

As a pastor, he was tender and sympathetic. He knew and loved his people. He visited them in their homes and places of business. He entered into their joys and their sorrows. He truly

"lived beside the road and was a friend to man."

For 22 years he served in the ranks as an itinerant Methodist preacher, and during those years he wore the white flower of a blameless life, living above suspicion and above reproach. He went gladly wherever he was sent, with the profound conviction that he was called of God to preach the gospel of his grace to all mankind. He always left his tracks in every charge that he

served, but no one ever saw any dust in one of them—they were always clear and clean.

As a preacher, he never sounded a false note. He rang true in every critical situation. He was an uncompromising ambassador for Jesus Christ; one who never lowered the standards of his Lord.

In the fall of 1925 he was honored by his church when he was elected a delegate to the General Conference.

The funeral was conducted from the Methodist Church in Jackson, N. C., where he was once pastor and had lived since he retired. Rev. W. L. Maness had charge of the service, assisted by Revs. B. P. Robinson, E. B. Craven, and E. R. Clegg. Burial was in the cemetery at Goldsboro.

Noble knight of the cross, humble Methodist preacher, devoted husband and father, we shall meet you in our father's

house on high.

FRANCIS ERNEST DIXON

Francis Ernest Dixon, son of Joseph Dixon and Martha House Dixon, was born October 14, 1872, in Craven County, near Grifton, N. C. He received his preparatory education in the schools at Bethel and Greenville under Mr. Zack McWhorter. After spending a fall semester at Old Trinity College, he entered Trinity College at Durham in the fall of 1894, and was a member of the class of 1898, but due to poor health he dropped out in his senior year. He was physically frail from a child.

After receiving license he served the Vanceboro Circuit as a supply the year of 1898. He joined the Pacific Conference at Oakland, California, in 1899 and served the Kingsburg Station

for two years.

He transferred to the North Carolina Conference in 1901 and served the following charges: Straits 1901-2; Mt. Olive Circuit 1903. He took the supernumerary relation in 1904-5. Served Kenansville 1906-7; Bath 1908-9; Mattamuskeet 1910; Pelham 1911; Stedman 1912, 13, 14, 15; took the supernumerary relation in 1916; served Grifton 1917-18; took supernumerary relation in 1919-20; served Roberdell 1921-22; Mt. Gilead Circuit 1923, 24, 25; Mamers 1826; Glendon 1927-28; Chowan 1929, 30, 31; Aulander 1932; Bath 1933-34; Grimesland 1935; Newport 1936. After giving thirty-five years of faithful service to his church, he asked for the superannuate relation at the Conference which met in Raleigh November 17, 1937. He was ordained a deacon in 1895, and an elder in 1907.

Brother Dixon was married to Miss Nancy West of Lenoir County, near Kinston, N. C., on October 21, 1897. To this union three children were born: Gladys West, Hope Judson, and Garland Kilgo, all of whom preceded him to the heavenly home.

Brother Dixon was suddenly called from his home in Newport, N. C., to his eternal reward June 6, 1940. Funeral services were held from the Methodist Church in Newport by Rev. C. S. Boggs, pastor, assisted by Rev. T. G. Vickers and Rev. M. O. Stephenson of Morehead City. His body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Bethany Church, near Kinston, N. C. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Nancy West Dixon, of Dover, N. C., and three grandchildren, and a brother, J. J. Dixon of Grifton, N. C. He was a good, true husband and father. He had a high sense of honor and those who knew him best said, "He was all that was good."

WILLIAM CALHOUN MERRITT

The great English preacher, Dr. J. H. Jowett, once said that a Christian preacher had to do something sensational in order to make the newspaper headlines. That the work of teaching little children, giving courage to men and women who were carrying heavy loads, and comforting the old, did not make good copy. When I read that I was reminded of a statement which my first presiding elder made to me. He said, "After you have left a charge the people will soon forget what you said, but they will always remember the kind of man you were." After telling us of a number of people who through faith worked wonders, the writer of Hebrews refers to a great unnamed multitude who through faith subdued kingdoms, out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in the fight, turned to flight the armies of the aliens. Rev. W. C. Merritt was not a sensational preacher, his work did not often make newspaper copy, and I imagine that the people he served have already forgotten most of his sermons; but they will never forget the noble face which reflected his Christian character, and his pure, sympathetic heart. They will never forget what he was.

Brother Merritt was born in Sampson County February 27, 1866, and died in Duke Hospital June 14, 1940. He entered Trinity College in 1889 and was a student there when the college was moved to Durham. His was the first class to graduate in Durham. He joined the North Carolina Conference in 1893 and was sent to Roper. It was there that he met Miss Mary Woodley to whom he was married in November, 1895. Mrs. Merritt played an important part in the work which they did together. He served charges for the most part where the work was hard and the salary was small. But he lived within his income and

educated his four children: Woodley Closs, Julia Woodley, Ruth Willard, and Mrs. O. M. Hedrick. He was a devoted husband and father. There was no sacrifice he would not make for his

family.

In 1937 Brother Merritt superannuated and moved to Durham, where he fully enjoyed two and a half years of well earned rest, having given his church forty-four years of service in the active ministry. He and his family identified themselves with Luke Memorial Church. Until his last sickness he was a regular attendant upon all church services. His presence was always an inspiration, he was so interested and sympatheic in all the church was trying to do. When he was called upon to pray we felt that one was speaking to God in our behalf who knew him. The very tone of his voice told us he was not praying to be heard of men. He had a silent influence for good at Duke Memorial of which I am sure he was not aware.

It was very fitting that Revs. M. T. Plyler, L. S. Massey, and W. F. Craven, old schoolmates of Brother Merritt, should be associated with the writer in the funeral service. Dr. Plyler said, "We are not weeping today in defeat, we are rejoicing in a victory." It is a victory when after three score and ten years in a world like this we can say, "he has fought a good fight, he has kept the faith." I feel a personal loss, for I came to appreciate and love Brother Merritt for what he was. Another good and faithful servant has gone to his reward, but his memory

lingers as a benediction.

JAMES MARION LOWDER By Edgar Parke Billups

Rev. James Marion Lowder, the son of Thomas A. and Katherine Shoffner Lowder, was born in Stanly County near Albemarle on December 31, 1852, and died at Rutherford College, N. C., on August 16, 1940, being in his 87th year. A brief service was conducted in the Abernethy Memorial Church at Rutherford College on Sunday morning, August 18, and again at the Methodist Church at Norwood in the afternoon, with interment in the cemetery at Norwood. The services were conducted by Rev. E. P. Billups, assisted by Rev. J. R. Duncan, Rev. Cecil G. Hefner, and Rev. J. W. Bradley.

By inheritance, natural endowment and training, Brother Lowder was well equipped for the work of the ministry, and it is not surprising that he did such outstanding work in the fields he served. In a memorandum in which he left a record of his life and ministry he said: "My parents were good, industrious folk, very unsophisticated. My father was a steward, a class leader and a Sunday school superintendent for many years, and my mother was an old time shouting Methodist." He received

his education in the public schools of Stanly County and at

Trinity College in Randolph County.

On March 23, 1881, he married Miss Sue Shankle, the daughter of Hon. Eli Shankle, of Stanly County. God blessed this union with eleven children, eight of whom are now living. All of the children have achieved success in their chosen professions, two of whom are now serving their church with distinction: Miss Sallie, as a deaconess in the home field, and Miss Rosa,

as a missionary in Korea.

Brother Lowder was licensed to exhort in 1884. He was licensed to preach in February, 1885. He was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference at Fayetteville, N. C., in November, 1887. He gave an interesting account of this Conference: "Bishop Key presided. The image of that holy man of God has never left my memory. His sermon on Sunday morning was a rare gem, yea, a feast for the soul. The question was asked, 'Who are received on trial?' and Dr. W. H. Bobbitt, the presiding elder, began to eulogize me more than I deserved; then others with equal zeal. I was thirty-five years old, on a farm, and doing reasonably well. And most of all, I had a wife and two children. It would be a good thing to let well enough alone. But the vote was taken and I was put in by a substantial majority. I made my way home to tell my wife and eager children." He was received into full connection and ordained deacon at Greensboro, December 1, 1889. He was ordained elder at Asheville November 4, 1891. He served the following charges: Double Shoals Circuit, Danbury Circuit, Hillsboro Circuit, Pekin Circuit, Rockingham Circuit, Pamlico Circuit, Grifton Circuit, Aurora Circuit, Bath Circuit, Kenansville, Richlands, and Swansboro. He very reluctantly took the superannuate relation at the Conference at Greenville in 1917 and moved to Rutherford College.

It is easy to write the record of a man's work, but how difficult it is to put in writing those intangible qualities of a man's character! The quality that impressed me, and I think, most of his friends, was Brother Lowder's geniality. His face fairly beamed goodness. One could not walk into his presence without being uplifted by his gracious and winsome personality. Tennyson's words in praise of the Duke of Wellington are applicable to him:

"Foremost captain of his time, Rich in his saving common sense, And as the great only are,

In his simplicity divine."

He was also a man of unfailing kindness. As intimately as I knew him, I never heard him give expression to an unkind attitude. On the charges he served he was greatly loved as a man of God. And it was this overflow of goodness that gave empha-

sis to his sermons. He did not so much practice what he preach-

ed as he preached what he practiced.

Brother Lowder's ministry was marked by the spirit of humility and sacrifice. He never sought an easy place. He wrote of his work: "In my itinerancy I have served hard work. Many times I have waded the lakes of the eastern part of our state and climbed the mountains of the west-the angry waters of the former rushing through my buggy and the ice and snow plentiful in the latter. Also we have gone to our new appointment with the thermometer near zero, but for all that I wish I could have done more, that is, could have been more efficient."

Brother Lowder represented a past generation. Sometimes we of the present generation look upon the past generation as a bit old-fashioned, and consider their patterns of conduct a little outmoded. But when we make honest appraisals, we see that the only thing that matters is the kind of life a man lives; that gooodness is never outmoded, and that kindness is never out of date. And we know, too, that the hope of the future resides in the man of God, the man like God. So we honor this venerable man of God, using the words in one of the most fascinating passages in all literature, the words of young Christian in Pilgrim's Progress, words which reflect our own deepest desire to follow in his trail: "If they see any place where the old pilgrim has lain, or any print of his foot, it ministers joy to their hearts, and they covet to lie or tread in the same."

EDWARD NORMAN HARRISON

Brother Edward Norman Harrison, son of the late Rev. Z. T. and Mrs. Hettie Coghill Harrison, was born in Granville County, N. C., December 20, 1880. His mother died while he was quite young, yet the power and influence of her good life followed him to the end. He was also fortunate in having a father who was a minister of the Gospel, whose godly admonitions and examples he faithfully followed, serving three of the charges his father had served. Under these parental influences he gave his heart and life to God and joined the Church at the age of nine years at Swan Quarter.

He received his education at Trinity Park High School, and Trinity College, Durham, N. C., and his four year Conference course of study was taken with Vanderbilt University.

Brother Harrison joined the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church at Wilson in 1905. He was ordained deacon 1908 and elder 1910. The charges he served and the number of years on each are as follows: Pasquotank, 1; Gates, 1; Elise (now Hemp), 2; Garysburg, 3; Battleboro, 2; Caswell Street, Kinston, 3; Plymouth, 2; Enfield, 2; Rosemary, 4; Hookerton, 1;

Grifton, 1; Mount Olive Circuit, 4; Warren, 2; Saint Pauls, 2; Windsor, 4; and died while serving his first year at Bath.

On December 14, 1905, Brother Harrison and Miss Helen Ditmars were happily married in Norfolk, Va. To this union four sons were graciously given: Frederick Taylor, deceased; Edward Norman, Jr., and Gordon D., Knoxville, Tenn.; and Willis S., Chicago, Ill.

Only those who knew Brother Harrison best can properly estimate the value of his ministry. To many of us his sermons were truly great. While serving as my pastor on the Hemp Circuit I heard him preach many times. The most of those sermons I have forgotten. But there is one I can never forget, because it seemed so characteristic of the life he lived. The text was 2 Peter 1:16, "We have not followed cunningly devised fables, when we made known unto you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but were eyewinesses of his majesty." His message was that of reality: the reality of God, the reality of Jesus Christ and his Gospel, and the reality of eternal life. It was an inspiring message. He preached as a man of God who knew that the Gospel of Christ is no cunningly devised fable. It was real to him, and God in Christ Jesus was an experience to him. This message of truth he preached, and in this faith he died.

Perhaps his best and most enduring work was done as a pastor. She who loved him most and knew him best, and who now mourns because of her inestimable loss, Mrs. Harrison, says, "To me his outstanding work was as a pastor. The many letters coming to me testify to the help and comfort given in times of dire need." To these words I would like to add that no preacher has ever meant so much to me as a pastor as Brother Harrison. Coming to my home charge he found me struggling with the call to preach and at once became a good Samaritan to me. Soon I was assisting him in his preaching services, and soon my life work was begun.

In addition to his pious and consecrated life several things are characteristic of him-a cheerful word, a friendly smile, a warm handshake, and sacrificial service. Of the latter his son, Willis, appropriately says, "Father closed his ministry on a

high note of sacrificial service."

Perhaps as he would have had it, Brother Harrison died in active service. Having been ill for only a short time he died in Tayloe Hospital, Washington, N. C., October 22, 1940. The funeral was conducted from the Methodist Church, Nashville, N. C., by Dr. E. L. Hillman, assisted by the Reverends B. B. Slaughter, E. R. Clegg, and W. L. Maness. The choir sang "O Love That Will Not Let Me Go," and "Abide With Me." He was buried in the cemetery at Nashville under a covering of floral offerings numerous, beautiful and most appropriate. And, now, being numbered with the blessed who die in the Lord, he rests from all his labors.

HERMAN THEOPHILUS COLEY

It was an earthly life of only twenty-seven years, but in that brief period Herman Theophilus Coley proved his ability to live well. He was born in Stantonsburg, N. C., June 18, 1913, the son of James Perry Coley and Flora Smith Coley. After completing his work at the Eureka High School in 1932, he became a student at Textile Industrial Institute, Spartanburg, S. C., from which he was graduated in 1934. During his student days at Textile he was a conspicuous campus leader, holding membership in practically all the student organizations. President R. B. Burgess of the Institute says of him:

"In scholarship he was well above the average. In the discharge of every duty and the responsibility of school life he was above reproach. He enjoyed the complete confidence and respect and affection of all the students and faculty. He was a leader among the students and particularly outstanding in his influence and leadership among the Ministerial Band. The contagion of his optimism and personal charm spread throughout the entire campus. I am confident that but for the fact that he was stricken in the very morning of his youth he would have made one of the most illustrious alumni our school has ever had."

In the fall of 1934 Brother Coley was admitted to the junior class of Wofford College. He received his A.B. degree in 1936. In this institution he continued his forward march to victory after victory, participating in numerous extra-curricular activities. During his senior year at Wofford he had the opportunity to begin the work for which he had long been making preparation-the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He became the assistant pastor of Saxon Church, serving under the Rev. B. B. Black, who gives this testimony:

"He was a great spirit. He was a good influence for righteousness on the campus, and an earnest minister of the Gospel

of Christ. His death is a great loss to the Church."

Returning to his native state, Brother Coley entered the Duke School of Religion in 1936, and in November of that year was appointed to the pastorate of the Eno Church in West Hillsboro, where he served until his death. At the 1937 session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, held in Raleigh, he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection. He was ordained deacon by Bishop W. W. Peele in Fayetteville in 1939. His duties in the pastorate and in school were well done, and he would have received his Bachelor of Divinity degree with the class of 1940 but for the illness which overtook him in the early spring.

On August 10, 1937, he was happily married to Miss Gladys Liner of Hillsboro. Together they labored faithfully in the Eno pastorate, and were deeply loved and loyally supported by the congregation. During this busy period Brother Coley looked

after every interest of the church. Additional land was purchased in order that the church building might have a better setting, the church was moved and remodeled, and a heating system installed. He was an effective evangelist and pastor, and the membership grew from seventy-two in 1936 to 166 in 1940.

A good minister of Jesus Christ, this pastor was always loyal and co-operative. Although his ministerial service had been limited, he truly conceived the great program of the church and the kingdom; and he worked in a most brotherly manner with all his fellow laborers. His local church was not a unit alone and apart, but he regarded it as a vital link in connectional Methodism. His future was filled with promise, but God saw fit to relieve him of his earthly labors. He moved peacefully to his heavenly appointment on the evening of Sunday, August 18, 1940. The funeral was conducted in Eno Church by the Rev. A. J. Hobbs, the district superintendent. The body was taken to Eureka, N. C., for burial. Rev. C. W. Robbins, pastor of the Fremont Charge, assisted in the committal service.

"Our life is but a winter's day.

RALEIGH ALEXANDER BRUTON

Raleigh Alexander Bruton, son of David Alexander Bruton and Salina Baldwin, was born in Montgomery County, near Troy, North Carolina, November 16, 1863. He attended school at Bingham Academy, then at Trinity College 1891-1893. He was licensed as a local preacher May 30, 1889. He was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference at Durham in the year 1894 and was ordained deacon the same year. He was ordained an elder at the session of the conference held in Elizabeth City in 1898. On January 29, 1902, he married Miss Clyde Swindell of Swan Quarter, N. C. To this union were born four children: Gaston Swindell, now a teacher at Sewanee, Tenn.; Lecelia Espet, who remained but a little more than two years to bless and brighten the parsonage home; Lawrence Allen, now a teacher at Alliance, N. C.; Margaret Jannette, now Mrs. Stanley Mann of Newport, N. C.

Brother Bruton received the following appointments: Princeton, 1894-95; Roseboro, 1896; Lillington, 1897-98; Grimesland,

1899; Swan Quarter, 1900; Newton Grove, 1901-2-3; Troy, 1904; Hatteras, 1905-6; Mann's Harbor, 1907-8-9; Scott's Hill, 1910-11-12-13; Tabor Circuit, 1914-15-16; Lumberton Circuit, 1917-18-19; Newport, 1920-21-22-23; Burlington Circuit, 1924-25; Ocracoke, 1926-27; Dare Circuit, 1928; Kitty Hawk, 1929. He asked for the superannuate relation at the conference in Henderson in 1930. He gave thirty-six years of devoted and faithful service to the Methodist itinerant ministry. When no longer able to receive an appointment, he did not lose interest in the Church, or the work of the Conference. He did not miss a roll call of

his Conference for forty-three years.

Brother Bruton believed profoundly in the value of an education and was determined to give his children a college education, whatever the cost. From the small salary which he received from his ministry he loaned young men and young women money to go to college, most of which, he said, was never repaid. He was a hard worker wherever he went. No task was too small or too common, if by doing it someone would be benefited. His entire ministry was among the rural people, whom he understood, and where he found great opportunities for service to his Lord and to his fellowman. He not only felt the call to preach the gospel of salvation to others, he also felt the call to demonstrate the power of that gospel in his own life. He believed the vessel which was to bear the message of his Lord should be clean. His son said of him, "He was the most unworldly man I ever knew." No conference committee, or presiding elder ever had to exhort him to abstain from the use of tobacco, but some of his brethren felt the bitter sting of his reproof of those who were exercised thereby.

After his superannuation he made his home in Greenville, N. C., where he was married to Miss Mattie Hearn February 28, 1930. His last years in the flesh were years of suffering, undergoing three major operations during the last five years. He answered the final roll call August 25, 1940. Funeral services were held from Jarvis Memorial Church in Greenville, conducted by the pastor, T. M. Grant. His body rests in Greenwood cemetery,

Greenville.

JOHN BOLIVAR HURLEY

The family to which Rev. John Bolivar Hurley belonged came over from Ireland in the early 18th century. They settled first in Johnston County, but later moved to Montgomery County, where on February 24, 1859, John Bolivar Hurley was born. He was a babe in arms when his father joined the Confederate Army. He was badly wounded in one of the battles in northern Virginia and came home broken in health, and died when John was about twelve years old. Brother Hurley remembered those

years of sacrifice and hardship which followed the Civil War, and who knows but that they enabled him to develop his optimistic disposition. For he could dare life to be harder than it had been to his mother and her three young children in those early days.

Brother Hurley joined Shiloh Methodist church when quite young. He worked hard on the farm and made great sacrifices to secure an education. After attending the Troy and Mount Gilead schools he entered old Trinity College in September, 1380, and graduated in three years. Trinity College, later Duke University, never had a better, more loyal friend. He was a trustee of that institution for forty-five years.

He joined the North Carolina Conference in 1883 and was sent to Calvary Church, Charlotte. He was married to Miss Lena Leonard of Lexington in February, 1889. Their three children: Mary Maud, now Mrs. W. C. Chadwick, Dr. Leonard B., professor at W. C. U. N. C., Helen Ione, now Mrs. T. S. Newbold, were educated at Trinity College and Greensboro College and are following in the footsteps of their Christian parents.

Brother Hurley was an active member of the North Carolina Conference for forty-eight years, serving the following charges: Calvary, Charlotte; Mount Airy; Louisburg; Central, Raleigh; Oxford; Wilson; Financial Agent for the Orphanage; Presiding Elder; Durham District, there years; New Bern District, four years; Fayetteville District, four years; Centenary, New Bern; Rockingham: Roxboro: Burlington: Clayton: Maxton.

It was my good fortune to be associated with him as his presiding elder during his last two years in the pastorate. I knew he had been a Conference leader for many, many years and I wondered how I would get on as his presiding elder. But he soon put me at ease. He was more help to me than I was ever able to tell him. I soon learned to appreciate him and love him. I would often go in to cheer him up in his sickness and find myself being cheered up. How we need his sunny optimism in these days through which we are passing! He was one of the most beloved members of our Conference. I feel I must quote here a few lines from a letter I've just received from his son: "My father, I think, loved people as genuinely as any man I have ever known-not in any sentimental fashion, but simply and joyously and wholeheartedly. And that love brought him love in return. He and my mother have left their three children a very precious heritage. I think the home atmosphere which these two created was the most beautiful I have ever seen. You can imagine what it has meant to me to have shared in it.

After retirement, Brother Hurley moved to Lexington, Mrs. Hurley's old home. They were happy there among old friends where he was able to teach in the Sunday school and otherwise ass'st in the work of the Church. Mrs. Hurley, to whom he gave much of the credit for his success, died in 1937. Up until September 7 Brother Burley continued in good health. On that date

he suffered a cerebral hemorrhage from which he never rallied. He died in Greensboro November 4, 1940. The funeral services were conducted in Lexington, Rev. D. R. Ware, Rev. John W. Hoyle, Jr., and Rev. Jacob Leonard officiating. He brought us sunshine and made life's load a little lighter. We are thankful he came our way.

WILLIAM PRESTON FEW: CHURCHMAN

On Wednesday, October 16, 1940, Dr. William Preston Few, President of Duke University and long a leading Methodist layman, was summoned from his arduous field of labor to a richly earned heavenly reward. His death was due to an acute heart ailment which had struck him down just a week before.

North Carolina Methodism extends its deepest sympathy to Mrs. Few and her four sons. Mrs. Few, prior to her marriage on August 17, 1911, was Miss Mary Reamy Thomas, of Martinsville, Virginia. William, the oldest son, is an electrical engineer; he is married and lives in Cleveland, Ohio. Lyne S. and Kendrick S. are graduate students in Harvard University. Randolph R., the youngest surviving son, is a sophomore in Duke University. Yancey Preston, the fifth son, died in 1939, at the age of 16 years.

Dr. Few was descended from a staunch old South Carolina family, and he was born in Greenville, S. C., December 29, 1867. His father, Benjamin F. Few, was a physician who had served in the Confederate Army. The family traces its ancestry to Richard Few, a pioneer Quaker who came to America with the Pennsylvania colonists in 1681. Dr. Few himself displayed not a little of the Quaker temper and spiritual poise throughout his long and difficult career.

It is not proposed here to dwell upon his academic career in detail, for his record as an educator is well known; but rather to note his almost equally remarkable career as a churchman. It is, of course, true that in Dr. Few's life these two phases of his career cannot be clearly distinguished, for his educational philosophy had a religious center to it, and his churchmanship had throughout an educational turn to it. He bent every effort to lift the educational level of the Church and its ministry; but no less strenuously did he strive to sound a clear spiritual note in American education.

It was no accident that Dr. Few gave practically his whole professional career to a school which sprang out of the life of the Christian Church. Himself a graduate of a Methodist institution, Wofford College, in 1889, Dr. Few taught for three years in St. John's Academy, Wofford College Fitting School, and Wofford College. After a subsequent period of graduate study in Harvard University, where he attained the Master of Arts and the Doctor of Philosophy degrees, Dr. Few became professor

of English in Trinity College in 1896. From that time until his death he remained continually in the service of Trinity College and its successor, Duke University. In 1902 he was made dean of Trinity, and in 1910 president. It was inevitable that he should become the first president of Duke University, and that he should be its intellectual and spiritual guide throughout the first great period of its development. It was always a point of pride with him that Duke University was from its beginning loyal to the traditions and genius of the religious institution which gave it birth.

Thus it was no accident either that the architectural design of the new university should largely be keyed to its splendid Tudor Gothic Chapel. In the mind of President Few, as in that of the donor of the university, Mr. James Buchanan Duke, the religious interest for which the Chapel was to stand ought to become the key interest of a university dedicated to the highest and best in the life of the American people. Until the erection of the Chapel Dr. Few was a regular and devout attendant upon the services of worship of Duke Memorial Methodist Church in the city of Durham. After the Chapel was opened for Sunday morning worship he felt it his duty to present himself there with his students and their friends. It was a rare Sunday indeed when President Few was not in his accustomed seat, unless professional duties had called him away from the city.

But as a churchman Dr. Few was in no narrow sense of the word campus-minded. His interests and activities ranged far out in the larger life of the Church. He was closely identified with the life and work of the North Carolina Conference, and served as Conference Lay Leader from the inception of that office in 1922 until the end of his life. He was also related to the Conference Board of Publication, and in that relation he was an active supporter of the North Carolina Christian Advocate. His name weaves in and out of the activities of the North Carolina Conference like a living thread throughout the many years

of his connection with it as lav leader.

In the larger circle of general Methodism, Dr. Few served for about ten years as chairman of the General Board of Lay Activities, and he occupied that office until the merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, with the Methodist Episcopal and the Methodist Protsetant Churches to form the present Methodist Church. In the new church he remained a member of this board, as also of the General Board of Education. His connection with the latter runs back to the late 90's, when he served as a member of its accrediting agency to raise the standards of Methodist colleges in the South.

Dr. Few's interest in the Church was never of a merely general kind, but on the contrary very specific. For example, he was specifically and persistently interested in the education of young ministers, as two facts in the development of the Duke University School of Religion reveal. One is that the graduate

School of Religion was the very first of the professional schools in the university to be established, and that it remained in a peculiar way a special object of affectionate concern to President Few. The other, that he was especially interested in the creation of the scholarships which opened the way for divinity students in Duke University to render service throughout the Conference during the summer, in return for financial assistance which was the necessary condition upon which many of them could remain in school.

Another example of Dr. Few's specific interest in the projects of Methodism is to be found in his relation to Lake Junaluska Assembly. He was a member of its board fo trusees for at least fifteen years, and he continually studied the possible ways and means for its welfare and advancement. No heart rejoiced more than his when the institution was at length taken over officially by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the lifting of its burdensome debt seriously taken in hand. For many years Dr. Few was actively concerned in the establishment of a branch summer school of Duke University at Lake Junaluska; and in the latter months he was busy with plans for converting this school into a specialized agency for the training of Christian workers.

But Dr. Few's interest in Methodism was not confined to its progress in the Southern States; he was an ardent advocate of the reunion of the major branches of American Methodism. He was a member of the commission that prepared the legislation for the Uniting Conference. As early as June 13, 1924, he contributed an article to the Nashville Christian Advocate entitled, "One Methodism." in this article he attributes his initial impulse toward Methodist unity to President Carlisle, while Dr. Few was yet a student in Wofford College. He says that through the intervening years he gave a good deal of thought to this question, but that his attention was focused again on it in 1906 by Dr. John C. Kilgo, then president of Trinity College. Then come two sentences which are very charactertistic of Dr. Few: "I have heard that Bishop Kilgo afterwards changed his opinion about unification. But I have seen no reason to change mine, developing as it did develop through a period of years and becoming pretty well fixed in 1906."

In a subsequent paper, written probably in 1937, Dr. Few throws a clear light on his attitude toward unification in the

following paragraph:

"I have recently had an appeal from a long-time friend of mine urging, 'Why not let this thing alone; there are so many people that are opposed to a change?' The answer I am obliged to make is that many, even most of these, are old or oldish. They ought not to be forgotten, but we must also remember the young and those who face toward the future. With them the future of the Church will lie; and among them, so far as I know, the spirit of co-operation is well-night universal."

Dr. Few had a kind of horror of growing old. He entertained no foolish sentiment toward the steady march of the years in his own life, but he fought against any appearance of crystallization such as old age commonly means. In the best sense of the word, he retained a remarkable youthfulness of spirit which sturdily resisted the bludgeoning of the years. As Edwin Markham wrote of Abraham Lincoln, so may it be said of William Preston Few:

"He held his place— Held the long purpose like a growing tree— Held on through blame and faltered not at praise. And when he fell in whirlwind, he went down As when a lordly cedar, green with boughs, Goes down with a great shout upon the hills, And leaves a lonesome place against the sky."

MRS. JOHN H. HALL By H. K. King

Ida Holland Hall, widow of the Reverend John H. Hall, slipped from our midst quietly and suddenly on the evening of February 7, 1939.

Mrs. Hall was born July 31, in Fayetteville, N. C. Her parents were William Hall Holland and Charlotte Elam Holland. In the historic city of Fayetteville, on December 18, 1883, in Hay Street Methodist Church, she was married to John H. Hall, who became one of the great ministers and leaders of the North Carolina Conference. A noteworthy event in this romance was that the bride and groom had joined Hay Street Church on the same day, in 1878. The unting of this couple gave to the Church and its ministry the united service of two of its most splendid spirits. For thirty-eight years, together they gave of their best to the Master. And for eighteen years afterward, following her husband's superannuation in 1921 and his death in 1925, Mrs. Hall continued to give her presence and prayers and labors to the Kingdom.

She was ever an able and beloved minister's wife, a devoted helper to her preacher husband, a loving mother of five children, and a skillful parsonage manager when the days were sometimes difficult. But besides these things, there was within her the quiet strength of a sweet nature and a noble character that was a benediction wherever she lived. The writer will always be glad for the touch of that influence upon his life when her husband served as his pastor during four years of his boyhood at Wilmington. And he is grateful that during the last two years and more of her life it was his high privilege to serve as her pastor, in Elizabeth City, where her husband was stationed as pastor and presiding elder, where three of her children now live, and where twenty-six years of her life had been spent.

Other cities that have known the gracious presence of this woman of God, besides Elizabeth City and Wilmington are Durham, Oxford, Bynum, Rockingham (twice), and Aberdeen. Into this parsonage home were born three boys and two girls. William H. Hall is head of the Duke University School of Engineering. John H. Hall is a prominent attorney in Elizabeth City. Gilbert P. Hall is in business in Raleigh. Louise is now Mrs. W. A. Brock, and Emily is Mrs. M. B. Sawyer, both of Elizabeth City. There are eight grandchildren and one great-grand-daughter; also one sister, Mrs. H. I. McDuffie, of Asheville, N. C.; one brother, R. L. Holland, of Fayetteville, N. C., and many nieces and nephews.

Mrs. Hall was in good health and active in her church almost until the hour of her summons. She attended her Sunday school class meeting on Monday afternoon, suffered a sudden heart attack that evening, and passed away quietly at 7:30 o'clock, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. B. (Emily) Sawyer. Her funeral service was conducted by the pastor, the Reverend H. K. King, assisted by the Reverend B. B. Slaughter, district superintendent, and her body was laid to rest in the beautiful

Hollywood cemetery in Elizabeth City.

Her vacant place at her church seems to have a halo about it. For such a servant of the Master's, and for such a life as hers, we thank God.

MRS. J. W. HARRELL 1876—1940

Mrs. Ora Aldridge Harrell took passage from earth to heaven from her home in Norfolk, Va., early Sunday moning, January 14, 1940, fifteen months after her husband's retirement from the active ministry, and seven and one-half years after she had to give up all work and accept the role of a semi-invalid.

During these years her interest in the work of the Lord and in the home was marvelous. She had a long prayer list with the names of people and the causes that she loved so greatly and

constantly kept them before the throne of God.

She was a great believer in prayer, and this was the source of her strength during the years of her semi-invalidism. Her husband often told her that she was his greatest backer in the

years of her suffering and waiting.

The following Tuesday after she passed away the funeral service was conducted by Rev. B. B. Slaughter of Elizabeth City, from the Stallings Funeral Home, Norfolk, Va., and the interment was made in Liberty Spring Church cemetery, near Norfolk.

Mrs. Harrell was the daughter of the late William Henry and Nancy Crawford Aldridge. She was born in Alamance County, Burlington, N. C., March 13, 1876, the fourth of five children, three sons and two daughters. She is survived by one brother, John W. Aldridge of Burlington, and her husband and one son. Her childhood was spent in a prosperous Christian home; she came into the church early in life and learned to love its services.

Mrs. Harrell graduated from Elon College in 1896 and spent the following year at the home of her parents and gave her entire time to painting under the instruction of a private instructor. She had talent and painted some three dozen canvases, and a group of them made twelve parsonages look like home, and now adorn the walls of her son's home in California. While evidencing a gift for painting, she soon laid it aside for greater things.

On October 19, 1897, she and Dr. Harrell were happily united in marriage, and at once she became absorbed in the home of her husband and in his ministry, giving all her gifts and talents to the work for forty-three years. She was a hard working, happy preacher's wife, busily studying, teaching, singing, rehearsing, directing, organizing, praying and home making. From Waverly, Va., where she went as a bride, to Portsmouth, Va., where they organized a congregation, remaining there thirteen years, during which time they built a \$50,000 church; to Dayton, Ohio, two years; to Burlington, N. C., where they erected a \$100,000 church, and a missionary was sent to Japan; three years at Troy; two years at Centenary, New Bern; one year at City Road, Elizabeth City; four years at Farmville; one year at Roanoke Rapids; two years at Plymouth; two years at Kenly, and three years at St. Paul.

I have given the data of the charges that they served, because Mrs. Harrell, in health and sickness, was the co-worker of Dr. Harrell in all that was accomplished in building the kingdom of God.

I was Dr. Harrell's first presiding elder after he joined the North Carolina Conference and was a frequent visitor in their home, where I had every opportunity to observe her in the "gentleness of her great heart," and saw there the "mind that was in Christ Jesus" loved and lived in all the relations of their lives. It was always a gracious benediction to enter the portals of a home made so attractive by the presence of the queen who reigned there. She met with a faithful courage all the responsibilities and the exactions of a preacher's wife with beautiful Christian patience.

We observe in the lives of most Christians one outstanding grace of character, but in the life of this good woman the graces of Christian character were so perfectly balanced that it was difficult to discover in her life one grace that outshone the other graces.

What a journey, what a life, what dreams, what battles, what victories—marching under a General who never loses a battle—using men and women in the glorious task of publish-

ing His gospel, happy that they have have been called to go forth on the long road, with a bit of heaven's glory in their souls.

MRS. F. B. McCALL By A. J. Groves

Ella Bell, daughter of Rev. Elijah Newton and Hepsy Morton Bell, was born near Swansboro in Onslow County, December 24, 1859. When about twenty years old she was happily converted in a meeting held by Rev. M. H. Burkhead in Swansboro, and from then on through she lived a radiantly beautiful Christian life.

On March 16, 1881, she was married to Rev. F. B. McCall, a young preacher then serving his third year in the Conference on the Pamlico Circuit. This was the beginning of an itinerant career of usefulness for this devoted couple which continued for forty-seven years till Brother McCall's superannuation in 1920. After Brother McCall died eight years later, Mrs. McCall lived with her daughter, Mrs. Usher, at Laurel Hill until she passed away. To this union were born nine children, three boys and six girls. Five of these, Mrs. R. N. Mullen of Durham, Mrs. L. T. McColman of Faison, Mrs. Lula Usher of Laurel Hill, Mrs. C. E. Ruffner of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. F. E. Tomlin of Griggsville, Ill., with a step-son, E. C. McCall of Laurinburg, survive. There are also eighteen grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and one sister, Mrs. Mollie Hollowell of Conway, S. C. Thus in brief outline is the life of one which if it were written in full would fill volumes. Mrs. McCall possessed a stern and uncompromising sense of justice and right, yet withal such an amiable disposition that she made true and lasting friends wherever she went.

Mrs. McCall had a courage and stability of character much above the average person. Think of her honeymoon. Married in the early morning and immediately starting out on a hundred mile trip, or over a three days' journey to her husband's appointment in an open buggy. How would that work in this soft age? It was such courage as that which guided that itinerant bark of Rev. F. B. McCall's safely through the trials, difficulties, hardship, pain and suffering for nearly a half century to the port of eternal rest. What a great, big, generous, loving heart she had. In 1907 I helped Brother McCall in a meeting at St. John's Church, and spent part of the time in their home. The congeniality between father, mother and children, the unselfish devotion to and the earnest solicitude for each other's welfare, together with their generous hospitality to their guest, made an impression upon me that I have never forgotten.

MRS. JOHN L. DENNIS By William A. Parsons

Mary E. Dennis passed away at the home of her son in Troy, N. C., October 23, 1939. She was born in Montgomery County just after the Civil War and grew up amid humble, respectable surroundings. Her name then was Mary E. Thompson. She was married to John L. Dennis of the same community. In 1891 her husband was received on trial in the Blue Ridge Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church; then for thirty-six years she was the faithful companion of a Methodist itinerant, sharing with him the experiences incident to that work. They served at Eagle Springs, Misenheimer, Troy, Kannapolis, Leicester, Pisgah, Walkertown, Morehead City, Parmele, Pine Bluff and Ashley Heights. He was also presiding elder five years.

Mrs. Dennis traveled with her husband and was known and loved in hundreds of homes. No hardship daunted her and no service was too lowly. She was gentle, unassuming, hospitable and appreciative. After the death of her husband in 1927 she lived with her only son, Henry Dennis of Troy. She continued loyal to her church and took every opportunity to visit the Con-

ferences and greet acquaintances of former years.

She died just three days after the final adjournment of the Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference. The funeral was at New Bethany Church in Montgomery County and was under direction of Rev. Z. V. Arthur. Her body was laid beside that of her husband in the church cemetery.

We are not able to judge wisely the lives of those whom we know best, but I am confident that when this great woman stood before the Lord of us all she heard him say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, for inasmuch as ye did it unto the least of these ye did it unto me." She rests in peace but her work lives on to bless those who never knew her name.

MRS. FRANCES CUNINGGIM BAILEY

Sister Bailey was truly a servant with her husband in the ministry, for, in addition to the using of her talents and strength in the keeping of parsonage homes and building her own Christian home, she devoted much time and strength to the work of the Woman's Missionary Society and to local welfare work in the various communities where their work called them. She lived a life of devotion to His cause and was close enough to her Saviour to feel, as she so often expressed it, that He was guiding her footsteps. She took her problems to Him in prayer and was satisfied to leave them with Him, feeling that her life was truly a fellowship with God and that whatever she under-

took was a sacred task to be a part of her contribution toward

making the Kingdom come on earth.

A number of years ago Brother Bailey retired from active service and they moved to Raleigh to spend their last days. They joined Edenton Street Church there and the work of the missionary society in that church was one of her main interests as long as she lived.

Two sons rise up to call her blessed, Palmer E. Bailey of Raleigh, attorney and business man, and Dr. Jesse Lee Bailey of the U.S. Veterans' Hospital, San Fernando, California,

Sessions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church was composed of the former North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South, and parts of the former North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church and former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

NOTE: The Distributing Committee at the 1940 session of the Western North Carolina Conference added three retired ministers of the former Methodist Protestant Church to the roll of the North Carolina Conference. The names of these preachers should have been included in 1939 in the list of preachers coming into the North Carolina Conference from the former Methodist Protestant Church.
