

RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE
for
THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE
of
THE METHODIST CHURCH

I. RULES OF ORDER

1. The Rules of the preceding Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference in so far as they may apply, otherwise Roberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall govern the procedure of this Annual Conference.

II. ORGANIZATION

2. (1) The Secretary: The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Conference, at its first session; and on nominations arising from the floor.
3. (2) Assistant Secretaries: The Secretary shall nominate his assistants and the Conference shall elect.
4. (3) The Treasurer: The Conference Treasurer shall be elected, on nomination of the Commission on World Service and Finance, at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference. He shall serve for the quadrennium, or until his successor be elected and qualified. (See Discipline, 1940, Paragraph 838.)
5. (4) Statisticians: The Conference Statistician shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Cabinet. There shall also be one assistant statistician from each District, nominated by the several District Superintendents and approved by the Cabinet as a whole. It shall be the duty of the Conference Statistician, in keeping with paragraph 228 (13) of the Discipline, 1940, to supervise the work of the District Statisticians in compiling the statistics as the Conference may order.
6. (5) Auditor: The Auditor (or auditors) shall be elected annually by the Conference on nomination of the Commission on World Service and Finance. (See Paragraph 801, Discipline, 1940.)
7. (6) Conference Stenographer: The Conference Secretary shall employ the Conference Stenographer.
8. (7) Compensation: The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine, subject to the approval of the Conference, the compensation given the above officers for their services and also the method and amount for meeting expenses of said offices. The Conference Treasurer shall pay these amounts.
9. (8) Boards, Commissions and Committees: The Bishop and his Cabinet shall determine the size of and nominate the members to all Boards, Commissions and Committees authorized by the General Conference, the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference and this Annual Conference, except in those cases in which the Discipline directs otherwise. The recommendations and nominations shall be subject to the approval of the Conference.

10. (9) Program Committee: There shall be a Program Committee of the Conference consisting of the Resident Bishop, the Conference Secretary, the District Superintendent of the District in which the session of the Conference is held, the pastor of the host church, and the Conference Lay Leader. The Committee shall determine the compensation and expense for invited speakers; and this shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
11. (10) Entertainment Committee: There shall be a Conference Entertainment Committee, composed of three ministers and two laymen. This Committee shall be elected at the first session of the Conference, following the General Conference, and shall serve for the quadrennium. It shall be the duty of this Committee to advise with the local entertainment committees, and, as the Conference may direct, to determine the place and method of entertaining the Conference sessions.
12. (11) Committee on Memoirs: The Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Memoirs. The members of this Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of providing for all the details of the Memorial Service.
13. (12) Committee on Daily Minutes: A Committee of two members shall be elected each year to examine the daily minutes of the sessions of the Conference and report to the Conference for approval.
14. (13) Courtesies and Resolutions: At the first sessions of the Conference, annually there shall be constituted a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions.
15. (14) Conference Journal: At the first session of the Conference, following the General Conference, there shall be elected a Committee on the Publication of the Conference Journal. This Committee shall be composed of two ministers and one layman and shall serve for four years. The duties of this Committee shall be to advise with the Editor of the Conference Journal and make recommendations to the Conference regarding the publication of the Journal.
16. (15) Bible Board: The Conference shall constitute a quadrennial Bible Board. This Board shall be elected at the first session of the Conference following the General Conference. To this Board shall be referred all matters relating to the relation of the Conference to the American Bible Society and its work.

III. REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

17. (1) All reports and resolutions presented to the Conference shall be written (typewritten if possible) in triplicate. Two copies shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary before the report or resolution shall be read to the Conference for consideration.
18. (2) Any amendment offered to any paper and all motions of more than a single sentence must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary.

IV. MINISTERIAL CHARACTER

19. Ministerial character shall be passed in open Conference; provided that the Conference may order an executive session of the ministerial members to consider questions relating to matters of ordination, character and Conference relations. (See Paragraph 465, Discipline, 1940.)

V. LAY DELEGATES TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

20. (1) Lay delegates, regular and reserve, from the pastoral charges to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually by the Quarterly Conference at least thirty days prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
22. (2) The District Superintendent shall complete the list of the lay delegates to the Annual Conference from his District at least thirty days before the Annual Conference session and shall immediately transmit the completed list to the Conference Secretary.

VI. PASTORS' REPORTS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE
AND STATISTICS

22. (1) Each pastor shall complete tables I and II of his annual report to Conference and transmit the same to the Conference Statistician at least two weeks' prior to the opening of Conference.
23. (2) Table III shall be completed and turned in at the time of registration the first day of the Conference.
24. (3) Each table of the report shall be filled out by individual churches with totals for the charge.
25. (4) Table III shall be made out in even dollars only.
26. (5) Tables I, II and III shall be printed in the Conference Journal only by charges.
27. (6) A fourth table of individual church reports, as approved by the Annual Conference, shall be compiled by the Statisticians from the pastors' reports. This table shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

VII. THE CONFERENCE JOURNAL

28. (1) Editor: The Conference Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of editing the Conference Journal in keeping with the regulations of the General Conference and of the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference and under the direction of the Conference Committee on the Publication of the Conference Journal.
29. (5) Each Conference claimant shall be sent one copy of the Journal each year without charge.
30. (6) All other copies (See paragraph above) except those used strictly in Conference business and those sent to General and Conference Boards and Commissions, shall be sold at 25 cents each, or single copies by mail at 30 cents each.
31. (7) Each District Superintendent shall serve as an agent for his District from whom the pastors may receive additional Journals if needed and to whom they may return unsold copies.
32. (8) The District Treasurers will receive the money from the charges for the Journals sold, and the District Superintendent will be charged with the responsibility of having a check-up of Journal accounts by the meeting of the District Conference. Pastors shall be expected to pay for Journals not returned by the meeting of the District Conference.

VIII. DISTRICTS

33. (1) A District Conference shall be held annually in each District.
34. (2) Each pastoral charge shall elect annually two lay delegates to the District Conference. These shall be in addition to those named by the Discipline as *ex officio* delegates.
35. (3) The District Superintendent of each District shall be required to furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Statistician, and (two copies) to the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, as early in the Conference year as possible, an official copy of the apportionments to the charges for World Service and Conference Benevolences and the amounts accepted by the charges, also the amounts approved by the charges for the support of the ministry.
36. (4) The District Superintendent, as early in the Conference year as possible, shall furnish the Bishop, the Conference Treasurer and the Statistical Secretary a schedule of the salaries of the pastors as set by the Quarterly Conference.

IX. AMENDMENTS

37. These Standing Rules may be, by a two-thirds vote, amended on the next day after an amendment has been presented in writing; provided, the rules fixing the number of Districts and concerning the Conference Journal may be amended by a majority vote; provided further, a change in the number of Districts may not be made later than the second morning of the Annual Conference session.

X. WHEN RULES BECOME EFFECTIVE

38. These Standing Rules of the North Carolina Annual Conference shall become effective immediately upon passage by the vote of the majority of the Conference.

REPORT NO. 1—COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

PART I

Acting in accordance with the Discipline of the Methodist Church, the edition of 1940, under authority of Paragraph 840, your Commission recommends:

1. That the annual salary of each of the seven District Superintendents shall be set at \$4,500.00, including expenses attendant to their offices.

2. That 7% of a sum equal to the amount estimated for the then current Conference year for the pastor and assistant pastor, if any, of each and every charge in the Conference, be apportioned to each charge, said sum to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer, who shall administer it according to the financial plan as stated in Paragraph 840 of the Discipline of 1940. Provided, however, that the District Stewards of each and every District may, if they so elect, estimate a sum equal to seven per cent of the combined estimated salaries of all pastors and assistant pastors, if any, in the District for the then current Conference year, and distribute said sum among all the charges of the District according to their ability to pay.

3. That we authorize the Conference Treasurer to borrow, from month to month, an amount up to fifty per cent of the combined monthly deficit of salaries of the District Superintendents.

3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be directed to pay the above items one and two (1 and 2) from benevolent collections before distribution to approved causes.

- All special gifts for building or endowment purposes made either to the local church or the Orphanage.

All Orphanage specials except that raised by the Woman's Society of Christian Service are to be credited on this 7% asking.

5. SUSTENTATION FUND. That an apportionment of an amount equal to 2% of the total amount raised by the charge in all departments for the previous

Conference year be made to all charges within the Conference; the following items to be deductible, namely:

- a. Funds raised and paid on building, repairing, paying interest and debts on church and parsonage property.
- b. All special gifts for building or endowment purposes made whether to the local church or to the Orphanage.

6. GENERAL ADMINISTRATIVE FUND. The distribution of this fund of \$2,878.00 to the several districts, as follows, being 6/10 of 1% of pastors' salaries:

and the increased World Service giving plan.

2. The Commission recommends that representatives of High Point College, Greensboro College, and Louisburg College, be granted the privilege of visiting the various charges, within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference, and of soliciting funds within those charges for the support of their respective institutions.

3. We recommend that the Conference Board of Trustees be empowered to solicit funds to increase the endowment for retired preachers.

4. We recommend that remittances to the Conference Treasurer be made not more often than once each month and that charges of more than one church remit through one person, the pastor or some other. The purpose being to reduce bookkeeping and to avoid handling very small amounts, as far as possible.

5. We approve the request of the Board of Missions and Church Extension that they be permitted to go before the churches of the Conference to raise a fund of \$15,000 for religious, educational and recreational work in camp areas within the bounds of the Conference.

6. The Commission has approved and submits herewith the report of the Sub-Committee appointed as directed by last Conference to study "the fairest basis to use in making apportionments." (See Supplement.)

7. We recommend the employment of A. M. Pullen & Co., C.P.A., as auditors of accounts of Conference Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE AS TO THE FAIREST BASIS FOR MAKING THE APPORTIONMENTS

At the North Carolina Annual Conference held in Durham, North Carolina, November 13, 1941, the following resolution was read by Rev. C. E. Hix, Jr.:

"I move that the Board of World Service and Finance be instructed to constitute within its membership a Sub-Committee to study during the coming year the matter of a basis on which to apportion the various Conference askings and to report to the next Annual Conference its findings as to the fairest basis for making these apportionments."

The resolution was adopted and E. L. Hillman and Gurney P. Hood were appointed to constitute the Sub-Committee.

Pursuant to the above action your Committee submits the following report:

We find the various Conference askings to be:

1. The Support of the Ministry which includes three items—The Episcopal Fund, the District Superintendents' Fund, and the Conference Claimants' Fund.
2. The General Administrative Fund and the Jurisdictional Fund.
3. The World Service Fund.
4. The three items created and set up by this body to serve intra-Conference needs, such as: 1. The Ministers' Retirement Fund, 2. The Sustentation Fund, and 3. The Methodist Orphanage Fund.

With regard to the first group of three items which constitute the Support of the Ministry, namely: The Episcopal Fund, the District Superintendents' Fund, and the Conference Claimants' Fund, we find this specific direction in the 1940 Discipline of The Methodist Church.

In Section X, paragraph 552, page 178, and again in paragraph 806, page 251, quote:

"The specific amount of the payment for the support of the pastor having been determined, the other three items of Ministerial Support shall be related to the pastor's salary on a percentage basis, so that the respective payments required for the support of the Bishops, District Superintendents, and Conference Claimants in each pastoral charge shall be exactly proportional to the amount paid to the pastor."

As to the second group comprising the General Administration Fund and the Jurisdictional Fund it is to be noted that the Jurisdictional Fund was raised as a special item by an act of this Annual Conference. (See Report No. 2, Commission on World Service and Finance, page 143, Conference Journal, 1939.) The Fund was to be sent to the Conference Treasurer by March 15, 1940. (Misprint says 1949.) A part of the cost for the Jurisdictional Conference was recommended to be paid to the Conference Treasurer this year. (See Conference Journal, page 54, 1941.)

The General Administration Fund is being paid this year on the percentage basis of $\frac{2}{3}$ of 1% of the pastor's salary. This was done by the Annual Conference in November, 1941. (See Report No. 2, Commission on World Service and Finance, page 54, Conference Journal, 1941.)

The item of the World Service Fund is likewise allotted to the charges of the Conference on the percentage basis of 42.6% of the pastor's salary. This action was done by the Annual Conference in November, 1941. (See Report No. 3, Commission on World Service and Finance, page 55, Conference Journal, 1941.)

The Ministers' Retirement Fund is now being raised on the percentage basis of 1% of the pastor's salary. This action of the Annual Conference was done in November, 1937. (See Resolution on Special Superannuate Fund, page 76, Conference Journal, 1937.)

The Sustentation Fund and the Methodist Orphanage Fund are being raised on the percentage basis of the total money raised by the charge, less certain deductible items, such as: the amounts raised and paid for new buildings, repairs, debts and interest. This was enacted by the Annual Conference in November, 1941. (See Report of the Special Committee on Adequate Support of the Ministry, page 86, Conference Journal, 1941, and the Report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, page 76, Conference Journal, 1941.)

Your Committee finds that the General Conference has definitely declared how the funds for the Support of the Ministry, namely: The Episcopal Fund, the District Superintendents' Fund, and the Conference Claimants' Fund shall be raised. The Discipline is specific in saying these items "shall be related to the pastor's salary on a percentage basis, so that the respective payments required for the support of these shall be exactly proportional to the amount paid the pastor." This action of the General Conference is final, and cannot be changed by the Annual Conference.

The Committee finds:

As to the General Administration Fund and the Jurisdictional Fund the Annual Conference may determine how these items shall be allotted to the several charges of the Conference.

The Committee finds with regard to the World Service Fund that the Annual Conference has the right to determine the basis on which this fund shall be apportioned to the several charges of the Conference. It can reject the percentage basis on the pastor's salary and enact another basis for allotting this Conference asking if the Conference so desires.

The Committee also finds that the Ministers' Retirement Fund is allotted on the percentage basis of the pastor's salary to the several charges of the Conference.

The Committee further finds that the Sustentation Fund and the Methodist Orphanage Fund are being raised upon a percentage basis of the total money raised less certain deductible items. This has been done by an act of the Annual Conference.

In view of these above mentioned conditions, namely: the limitation set up by the General Conference in providing that the three items of Ministerial Support "shall be related to the pastor's salary on a percentage basis, the fact that the Conference may determine the basis or bases on which the other apportionments are to be allotted to the several charges of the Conference, your Committee reports that it is possible to have only one basis on which to allot the apportionments of the various askings of the Conference during the present quadrennium. Since the action of the General Conference limits the Annual Conference to the percentage basis of the pastor's salary on these three items of Ministerial Support, the percentage basis for allotting all other Conference askings much conform to the norm of action set up by the General Conference if the Annual Conference wishes to have one common basis for the allotment of the various Conference askings.

If the Annual Conference desires to continue the effort expressed in the resolution, a Memorial to that effect should be sent to the next General Conference.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH
EXTENSION

The Board of Missions and Church Extension is delighted to find that the missionary interest in the Conference is at high tide. This is indicated in a number of ways. The missionary program of the Conference, under the direction of the Conference Missionary Secretary, Rev. F. S. Love, has met with a fine response on the part of laymen and ministers alike. The number of Schools of Missions held each year has been on the increase. The number of persons enrolled in such schools, and the number of Mission Study books sold has also given encouragement. Attendance upon Missionary Institutes as well as Conference-wide meetings of a missionary nature has given cause for rejoicing to those responsible for the promotion of this work. The types of programs presented have been of a nature that would create a sustained interest in the cause of missions.

This Board would call attention to the new plan for the coming year, which is designed to bring all District meetings into two main gatherings, namely: the District Institute to be held in the early part of the Conference year, and the District Conferences to be held in the spring. It is the hope of this Board that all will co-operate with this plan by having large representative delegations at each of these meetings. We urge also the organization of a School of Missions in each church, to be conducted at the specified time, under the leadership of the pastor and his assistants, at which time the two small booklets, "Latin America Circuit" by Elizabeth M. Lee and Alfred W. Wasson, and "Latin America—U. S. A." by Elmer T. Clark and Harry C. Spencer, are to form the bases of study. Let us strive to give the largest possible emphasis to these Mission Schools if we would reap the best results. We commend the good work of the several District Missionary Secretaries working with the Conference Missionary Secretary in promoting the cause in their respective Districts. We ask for them the continued support of all to whom this great and worthy cause makes its appeal.

We are glad to note the organization of the Commission on Town and Country Work, and believe that with proper co-operation there are possibilities of real achievement in this movement.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. F. S. Love as Conference Missionary Secretary to succeed himself.

We also recommend the appointment of Brother Love as a member of the Board of Managers of the North Carolina Pastors' School to succeed himself.

APPROPRIATIONS

We are very happy to report that there has been a fine response to the sustentation plan adopted by the last Conference. It is the purpose of this plan to bring all pastor's salaries to a minimum of \$1,200 for single men, \$1,350 for married men without children, and \$1,500 for married men with children. There has been such fine response to this plan that the Board now believes it will be able to meet the provisions of this arrangement, although it cannot be certain at this time. Members of the Board feel very keenly the responsibility this plan places upon them, and have faithfully tried to see every angle involved in order that the proposed goal might be achieved. We ask the patient indulgence of the Conference, however, in this matter. This is the first year of operation under this plan. It stands to reason, therefore, that the Board will necessarily have to feel its way along in reaching the desired ends. We are glad to report that already in this, the first year under the new system, more money has come in than under the old plan. For obvious reasons the matter of appropriations cannot

now be read as usual, but will have to be held over for certain adjustments after the appointments are read. Through the liberality of our people the Board has an appreciable sum with which to make these adjustments, and will endeavor to use its best judgment in so doing.

CHURCH EXTENSION

In the matter of church extension our Conference has gone forward as usual. A number of new churches have been erected, and others have been improved. Several parsonages have been built and others greatly improved. This Board is proud of the privilege to have a part in these very worthy causes. Donations and loans have been granted where it seemed advisable and the funds in hand justified such action. In a number of cases burdensome debts have been paid with the assistance of funds from this Board. The dark cloud of debt no longer hangs in discouragement over many of the churches of our Conference as it once did. For this we are grateful.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The Board of Missions and Church Extension is keenly aware of the unusual conditions existing in many areas of our Conference due to the location of large military training camps. This has brought a flood of people into these sections. These people need religious care. In many sections permanent communities have sprung up and many thousands of people have moved into these localities. The church faces an opportunity as well as an responsibility because of this condition. Appeals have been made to the Board for assistance in erecting buildings and otherwise meeting these needs. But the funds of this Board are barely sufficient to meet the normal demands in normal times. Therefore, in the light of these facts

and conditions, and after lengthy discussion of the matter, and also after having received the approval of the Commission on World Service and Finance, in order to meet the challenging need in our Conference, the Board of Missions and Church Extension by unanimous vote recommends that a special fund of \$15,000.00 be raised as a cash free-will offering by the churches of this Conference during the month of December, the exact date on which it is to be presented, and also the purpose for which it is to be used to be determined by a Committee consisting of Bishop Clare Purcell, Rev. F. S. Love, Conference Missionary Secretary; Mr. W. J. Smith, Conference Lay Leader, and Mrs. W. C. Chadwick, President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service. The money to be sent to Mr. J. C. Braswell, Treasurer of the Board, to be administered by the Board as a special fund for the above purposes.

REPORT NO. 1—THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the General Board of Education we express thanks for the visit of Dr. H. C. Wilson, Editor of Youth Publications, Nashville, Tenn. Dr. Wilson brings good news concerning 24 periodicals now published for use in church schools. They have a combined circulation of something over five million. Further good news comes from Nashville concerning the Service Men's Christian League, an inter-denominational Protestant League for spiritual cultivation and instruction among our service men. The work it proposes to do, and the leading part taken by our own educational workers give reason for rejoicing in the hearts of Methodists.

Fortunately the program of Christian education in our Conference has managed to carry on through the first war year without curtailment, and without any loss of effectiveness. Naturally, in the year ahead, more adjustments will have to be made to war conditions. But in the year 1941-42 we reached a new high peak in attendance at assemblies and institutes, and projected new features in the Conference program. Our first Young Adult Assembly was held, and Young Adult Fellowships were organized in the Rocky Mount and New Bern Districts. The Youth Caravan work was begun in the Conference. A training school for Bible Conference leaders was conducted at Duke University.

Increased contributions are reported from World Service Fourth Sunday collections and from Church School Rally Day offerings. Much praise for the success of the year's work is due the Conference Board staff, Rev. R. W. Bradshaw, Miss Mary Elizabeth Meyers, and Miss Lorene Weaver.

The Pastors' School surprised all in that it enjoyed its highest enrollment ever, over 500, and is said to be the largest Pastors' School group in Methodism.

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Our Conference takes pride in its four educational institutions. In our three colleges and one university we have 586 teachers, 4,884 students, property valued at \$32,413,379, and a total endowment of \$39,537,337.

DUKE UNIVERSITY

The Duke University campus is crowded with the addition of a large number of men enlisted in the United States Army Finance School. Training in the Naval Reserve is being received by many students. The Medical School and

Hospital have found ways to serve in the war effort. One out of every five B.D. graduates of the Duke Divinity School are serving as Army or Navy Chaplains. All the usual work and service of the school flourishes in addition to contributions being made to the war effort.

GREENSBORO COLLEGE

The restoration of Main Building, since the fire, has been judged an outstanding success by all observers. Additional fire protection has been provided. Last June Greensboro College graduated the largest class in its history, 77 students. 400 courses in religion were taken by students enrolled in Christian education. A special prayer room has been dedicated.

LOUISBURG COLLEGE

At Louisburg a special gift has been used to refinish the fourth floor rooms so that they are now in use. This gives the maximum dormitory space for young women. A larger number of girl students are enrolled, compensating for the young men who have sought direct routes to Army and Navy training. There was an operating surplus of \$6,565 the past school year.

HIGH POINT COLLEGE

At High Point there are 17 Methodist ministerial students, five of these being from the North Carolina Conference. Of the 18 students whose fathers are Methodist ministers, seven come from the N. C. Conference. Of the six Methodist ministerial students who graduated last June, five are enrolled in the Duke Divinity School. Nine students are graduates of Methodist Orphanages in North Carolina, four of them coming from the Raleigh Orphanage. Since June 1, \$6,100 has been paid on debt and a sum of \$3,600 is on hand for further reduction of obligations.

SCARRITT COLLEGE

The North Carolina Conference has an added interest in Scarritt College, through Dr. J. L. Cuninggim, President. He has tendered his resignation, having reached the retirement age, but is still serving until a suitable successor can be found.

Louisburg College Trustees, to succeed themselves for a period of three years—A. P. Brantley, James E. Hillman, Mrs. George H. Hutaff, T. A. Person, and T. B. Upchurch, Jr.

Greensboro College Trustees—Charles S. Wallace, to succeed himself; W. A. McGirt, to succeed Marvin L. Wade, deceased, whose term expires December 31, 1943; R. E. Brown, to succeed G. T. Adams, deceased, whose term expires December 31, 1944; and Mrs. W. R. Odell, to succeed Dr. Peter John, resigned, whose term expires December 31, 1947.

We recommend the confirmation and appointment of R. W. Bradshaw to succeed himself as Conference Secretary of Education and Director of Young People's Work at a salary of \$3,300 with an allowance of \$600.00 for house rent.

We announce the continuing services of Miss Mary Elizabeth Meyers as Office Secretary and Assistant Director of Youth Work; and of Miss Lorene Weaver, Conference Director of Children's Work.

The Financial Statement of our Treasurer, C. K. Proctor, and the certificate of audit by M. E. Parham, are appended hereto.

* We recommend that paragraph 5 reading "If a participating member dies while in the active service, the Board of Finance shall pay to his widow, any other dependent or dependents, an amount equal to the amount the member has paid into this fund," be amended to read, "If a participating member dies while in the active service, the Board of Finance shall pay to his widow, any other dependent or dependents, an amount equal to the amount the member has paid into this fund, plus twenty dollars for each year of service after Conference year 1941-42 in which his charge pays its assessment to this fund in full, provided, however, that a maximum death benefit shall not exceed five hundred dollars unless the participating member has personally paid in an amount in excess of five hundred dollars, then the death benefit shall be the actual amount such a member has paid personally into the fund. Members of the Conference who serve appointments other than as pastor may be made eligible for the twenty dollars per year additional benefit upon a three-fourths vote of the Board of Conference Claimants but the Board of Conference Claimants shall not approve a member for this benefit for more than one year at a time."

That it be further amended so that where the words "Presiding Elder" and "Board of Finance" appear, that there be substituted "District Superintendent" and "Board of Conference Claimants."

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Your Board of Lay Activities is interested in every phase of the work of the church and is eager to co-operate and assist wherever possible. Full well do we realize that the minister is the key man in our church organization, and that to him we must look for leadership. It is with pride that we embrace this fortunate circumstance and offer again our services wherever needed.

During these distressful and chaotic days, the responsibilities of the church have increased many fold. No one of us is able to abandon his obligation to

humanity through failure to recognize and accept this larger and growing opportunity to share in successfully solving these additional problems confronting our church.

After much study and careful thought, the General Board of Lay Activities has given us its recommendations for our work for 1942-1943. Our report is based upon these findings and is now presented to you by the Chairman and officers of the various Committees of our Board:

Christian Stewardship includes all that we mean by Christian living with special emphasis on the Christian thought life, the use of time, ability, and wealth. We acknowledge that God is the Giver of all things, and that mind, time, ability, and wealth are given to us in trust from God. Our use of these gifts must contemplate our returning a just share to the Giver. Stewardship is an individual matter, and we recommend that the leadership of the church, both cleric and lay, through sermons and talks, strive to place this matter in the hearts of all Methodists.

World Service, as known to our church, depends largely upon Christian Stewardship. God invites every Methodist to share in the salvaging of humanity both today and tomorrow. In this great crisis of war, and in the greater crisis of rehabilitation of broken nations and peoples after the war, we must inevitably face the urgent need for greater consecration and more sacrificial giving. In order that Methodists may be better prepared to meet this challenging situation, we recommend that pastors and charge lay leaders see to it that their membership understands fully the use of Methodist money. Bishop Purcell's pamphlet on this subject will help in this undertaking.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Lay evangelism has proved to be a valuable assistance to the spiritual life of our churches, having increased membership, deepened devotion, and brought new strength to every interest and activity of the church. We recommend the widest possible use of this approach to the community, so that no month will pass without every church making a definite effort to enlist its members and its community in a spiritual advance.

Too few of the men of the church are working, and many times they are not at fault for this situation. The exceptionally fine work being done by the women through their organizations in the church leads us to believe that every charge should consider seriously the possibilities of a like effort among the men. We recommend that the pastor and charge lay leader study the features of our general organization known as *Methodist Men*. A careful survey of the *Handbook for Methodist Men*, provided by our General Board, might open the way for greater participation by the men in the affairs of the church.

As we think of the children throughout this land whose fathers have entered the armed services of our country, youth work takes on a new and significant meaning. Surely, companionship and guidance in these and many other cases

becomes a vital interest of our church. We recommend that we concern ourselves with the youth of the land and enlarge our efforts in this directions.

REPORT NO. 3—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We recommend that we give our whole-hearted support and unqualified endorsement to the Conference program for the Methodist Orphanage; that, in keeping with this purpose, a special offering be taken during the Thanksgiving season or the Christmas holidays, and that a free-will offering be made in the church schools every fifth Sunday. Men's Bible classes should make the Methodist Orphanage a special project for the year with a view of assuming the care of one or more orphans and of having our young friends at the Orphanage visit in the homes of the individual members of the class for a week during the summer.

We recommend that the month of May be known as enrollment month for the Golden Cross, and that every effort be made to secure 1,500 members in each District. We commend Brother F. S. Aldridge for his fine work, both as Director of the Golden Cross and as Chaplain of Duke Hospital. We also urge his reelection to each of these services.

In the first year of the operation of the Sustentation Fund, we are able to see the wisdom of the Conference in adopting this plan for more adequate support of our ministers. We recommend continued support for this fund as well as for the Minister's Retirement Fund, and for the Conference Claimants' Fund.

REPORT NO. 4—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We recommend continued emphasis on a program for greater distribution of our *N. C. Christian Advocate*. Our goal should be the placing of the *Advocate* in every Methodist home, and we urge that, in addition to securing one new subscription for every fifty members in a church, that special effort be made to place the *Advocate* in the home of every church official throughout the Conference.

The trade paper for our laymen is the *Methodist Layman*, edited by our General Board in Chicago and published four times a year. We recommend that the charge lay leader in every charge in the Conference arrange a club of at least five subscribers to this paper. The cost is only twenty-five cents for each subscription in clubs of five or more to one address.

Greater use of other church literature should be made by all Methodists. There is no finer literature on earth than that published by our various Boards and Commissions.

Official Boards and Lay Leaders should know more about their church and their responsibility to it. We recommend that a sincere effort be made to inform these officials about the church and its activities. Part of Sunday night and

mid-week services could be used for this purpose, as well as part of the time of the Bible classes. Special study classes should be arranged.

REPORT NO. 5—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

General reports from all sections of the country are to the effect that church attendance is steadily growing. Trouble and disaster usually draw men together and cause them to recognize their own weaknesses and their complete dependency upon God. Christians have a truly great opportunity during these days to make church fellowship mean something. In the light of the present tendency to return to church by many people, we ought to resolve to provide a cordial and sincere welcome to all comers. We recommend that church fellowship become a most important program in our church during next year, and that every effort be made to improve church attendance.

Finance in the local church is most important. People will lose interest in anything that rocks along from day to day in a worn out, dilapidated condition. Such is the position in which we have placed our church finance. There can be no justification, real or pretended, for a church official who practices industry and wisdom in his personal finance and allows his church to become a beggar. We recommend that efforts be made to cause church officials to give the same degree of care to church finance that they give to their personal affairs. A careful survey of possible income or revenue is the first step in sound finance; an every-member canvass to secure this necessary income is the second. Both steps should be made immediately after Conference instead of a week before next Conference. During these days of inflation, many churches should strive to collect their budgets in advance; it will help in the days of deflation which lie ahead. While more business is needed in every church, we would not have it replace in any degree the individual's responsibility and privilege to give, to return unto God that which is His. Making an offering is a matter between the individual and his God, but as a church member, the adequate support of our ministers and of our church must be paramount in the lives of Christian people.

REPORT NO. 6—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We recognize that in spite of war and difficult travel, the work of the church must go forward. May we ever keep fresh in our minds the image of our predecessors as they wended their way into the wilderness, without benefit of modern travel, to lay the foundations of our great church.

REPORT NO. 7—BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We recommend most careful co-operation between the various Boards, Committees, and Commissions of our church. Surely such vital matters as World Peace, Temperance, World Reconstruction, Education, and other important efforts invoke our most prayerful thoughts. No one of us is able to live unto himself, nor to foresee all the problems of tomorrow. United efforts are necessary for Christian progress.

We recommend that the men in the armed services of our country be the subject of our most conscientious and Christian planning. Our Chaplains should be supported, and each local church should keep the closest possible contact with its members in the service, following them into the camps with letters and other expressions of interest. Regardless of one's feelings about the war, the boys are ours, and it is not only our duty, but our Christian obligation to do everything possible for their physical and spiritual welfare.

We recommend that every effort be made to increase the attendance upon the Annual Conference of the duly elected lay delegates. This phase of our work needs our interest because of the informative features involved. The delegate can assist the pastor in presenting the program of the Conference to the local church.

REPORT NO. 1—BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

There is a very serious shortage of trained nurses throughout the nation, both for civilian as well as war service. The government has asked the Nursing School of Duke University to enroll a class of eighty-five young ladies every nine months instead of twelve for training. The number of well qualified applicants for the school is not sufficient. In order to help to meet this situation, the Hospital is asking the Golden Cross Director to present the following resolutions to the North Carolina Conference in Wilson for endorsement:

(1) That the pastor in each charge be requested to present this resolution to each congregation in his charge and to emphasize the urgency of the request, some Sunday in January that is practical.

(2) That the District Church Directors of the Golden Cross and the members of the Board of Hospitals and Homes do all they can to reach those who are qualified to take the training. The next enrollment is March 1, 1943.

Further and complete information as to the qualifications and expense for entrance will be sent to all of the pastors, Golden Cross Directors and the members of the Board of Hospitals and Homes before January 1st.

In general, however, all young women of good character, who have had as much as one-half year of college, are eligible for this particular March class. Loan funds are available to those who need them. These loans are sufficient to cover all costs of tuition, room, board, and laundry.

REPORT NO. 2—BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Your Board of Hospitals and Homes believes that North Carolina Methodists are more Orphanage minded than they have ever been before. This, we believe, is the result of the Conference-wide educational program which has sought to acquaint our people with the work of the Orphanage. We wish to register our appreciation for the splendid fifth Sunday church school programs which were prepared this year by Rev. James H. Overton, and we shall welcome those being prepared next year by Professor B. M. Madison, Principal of the Orphanage School. These programs, along with the faithful work of many pastors and interested laymen, have made our people aware of the fact that when they invest money in the Methodist Orphanage, they are putting it into a Christ-like ministry which supplies the moral, the spiritual and the physical needs of more than three hundred children who are sacred charges of North Carolina Methodism.

The new financial plan that was adopted by our last Annual Conference has worked very successfully. However, after the report was adopted by the Annual Conference of last year, an error was discovered in the Conference Journal which threw the Orphanage budget some \$15,000 out of balance. The Board of World Service and Finance came to the rescue and asked for an amount which provided \$10,000. Due to the fact that this amount will not be available this year from this Board, we recommend that an apportionment of an amount equal to 7% of the total amount raised by the charge in all departments for the previous Conference year be made to all charges within the Conference. The following items to be deductible, namely:

1. Funds raised and paid on building, repairing, paying interest and debts on church and parsonage property.

2. All special gifts for building or endowment purposes made either to the Orphanage or the local church.

All Orphanage specials except that raised by the Woman's Society of Christian Service are to be credited on this 7% asking.

We further recommend that the Conference request the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Orphanage to change its rules and regulations in regard to taking children into the Orphanage. As the law now stands, only whole orphans or half orphans with living mothers can be accepted. It is well known that during the last quarter of a century our social order has undergone radical changes. Many fathers who have been left with motherless children need the tender ministry of our Methodist Home. There are mothers whose husbands have deserted them and have gone to parts unknown who are knocking at our door for relief.

We urge that every pastor, together with his local church leaders, continue in their charges the splendid educational program which has borne such fine fruit in Orphanage appreciation and support. We believe that the first three

months of the Conference year, which includes the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons, offer the very best time of the year in which to appeal to our people and churches for Orphanage support. We, therefore, recommend that as much of the Orphanage apportionment as possible be raised during November and December.

The wonderful ministry which the Golden Cross Society renders through our hospitals is reaching larger and larger numbers of suffering people who are unable to pay for treatment which they so much need. Professor F. S. Aldridge has led the way in this work and we heartily recommend his reappointment as Conference Golden Cross Director. We also recommend the appointment of Golden Cross Directors in each of the Districts of the Conference.

We further recommend that the month of May, 1943, be set aside as Golden Cross enrollment month in our Conference, and that every church member be given an opportunity to enroll, and that 95% of all funds raised be administered by the Director of Golden Cross within the bounds of this Conference, and that the remaining 5% be put into the General Golden Cross Fund.

We believe that this is an opportune time to emphasize in a practical way the matter of providing homes for our supernuminate preachers. To this end we recommend that the Secretary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the North Carolina Conference be appointed to promote interest in and to receive all gifts for this purpose, such funds to be held by this Board.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. A. S. Barnes as Superintendent of the Methodist Orphanage at a salary of \$3,600 per year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

WHEREAS beer, whiskey and other intoxicating liquors are injurious to the health, efficiency, morale and morals of our fighting forces, our industrial workers and other citizens;

WHEREAS it is urgent that our nation conserve at this critical time all of her resources, both in manpower and in materials;

WHEREAS the legalization of beer throughout North Carolina and the operations of liquor stores in 25 counties in our state, have increased drinking, drunkenness and all of the other evils that accompany the liquor traffic;

WHEREAS the Methodist Church always has been and still is opposed to the legalization of the nefarious business;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church, assembled in Wilson, North Carolina, on this fourth day of November, 1942, as follows:

1. That our Federal Government prohibit the waste of sugar, grain and other vital materials in the manufacture of beer and whiskey; that the many millions of gallons of beverage alcohol that the distillers say they have in storage for future consumption, be redistilled so the same might be used in the manufacture of rubber, gunpowder and other war equipment; that the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors be prohibited, especially during the present World War; and that particularly the sale of beer, whiskey and other intoxicating liquors be prohibited in and near the training camp areas.

2. That we urge the Governor of North Carolina, our two United States Senators, Messrs. J. W. Bailey and R. R. Reynolds, and our Congressmen to use their influence to accomplish the foregoing objectives and that particularly they use their influence to procure the enactment of the Sheppard Bill, SB 860, to outlaw liquor and vice in and near the training camps.

3. That we urge the General Assembly of 1943 to restore the Turlington Act throughout our state in order to prohibit the manufacture and sale of whiskey, beer and all other intoxicating liquors; and that, if the General Assembly be unwilling to restore prohibition throughout North Carolina, it at least grant the people of our state the right to vote in a State-wide referendum on the question of prohibiting the sale of all intoxicating liquors.

4. That we urge the pastors, churches, and church members of our Conference to co-operate with the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and other organizations in their efforts to have our State Department of Public Instruction among its personnel at least one staff worker, whose soul duty and responsibility shall be to provide for and supervise adequate instruction regarding alcohol in our public school system.

5. That in order to aid in the development of sentiment against the liquor traffic, we urge that the instruction in our public schools and in our church schools, relative to the harmful effects of alcohol be made as effective as possible, and that our pastors preach often in behalf of total abstinence, that each year the subject of temperance be allotted a place in the program of our Annual Conference, and that each year the subject of temperance be allotted an adequate place in the program of the annual meeting of each District Conference.

6. That we beseech all pastors and other church officers that they do not recommend, nor approve, for official position in any phase of church life, any person who drinks alcoholic beverages, advertises it, manufactures it, sells it, advocates its sale, or in any other way seeks to promote the liquor traffic.

REPORT NO. 1—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

As in no previous war, the church is now seeking to know the mind of Christ and understand its own distinctive mission as the bearer of His gospel of redemption for the whole world. This in itself is a sign of a new life and spirit within the church. For this spirit of earnest seeking we may be grateful. This, however, is no easy undertaking. The church is of God, it is ordained to declare His Word and reveal His will to men. But the church is made up of men and women; the divine spirit which lives in it has to work through faulty human beings. Because of this, the church's own understanding of its message and mission is not complete and clear. There are questions concerning this war upon which there is now "no common judgment among Christians." We must continue in humility and charity to seek a fuller understanding of God's will. But out of our seeking there have emerged certain primary convictions which are common to the main bodies of Christendom. These, we believe, are a part of the Word of God for our time.

I.

First, the church holds that this war is the judgment of God upon our human sin. That is to say, it is the natural result in a universe under moral law of the waywardness of men and nations. It is the harvest of the seed which the world has sown. Further, the church understands that in this sin all men and all nations have shared. There are none who can stand before God with clean hands. It is the duty of the church, therefore, to call all men everywhere to repentance.

But this the church cannot do with conviction and power except as it confesses that "judgment begins at the house of God." For the church itself, by sins of omission and commission, has shared in bringing this disaster upon the world. As Christians we have failed to give ourselves or our substance in sacrificial measure for the evangelizing of the world. The church has failed to

pronounce with clarity and courage the judgments of God upon the sins that led to this war. More than this, the church has shared positively in the world's sin, accepting within its own life the world's racial divisions and its economic motives and relationships. As we call men to repentance, we as a church must come to our knees in contrition and confession.

II.

Second, the church has come to see itself anew as the body of Christ, bound by His spirit into one unbreakable fellowship. Thus, while it lives in nations at war with one another, the church itself is not at war. It is not an American church, nor a German church, nor a British church. It is the Church of Christ. It derives its life and duties from and gives its supreme allegiance to, not any national state, but Christ. Because the church belongs to Christ, those in every nation who are Christ's are a part of its fellowship. The church is called, therefore, in the midst of the world's divisions, to keep the unity of the spirit between the Christians of all nations.

III.

Third, the church is called today to a new adventure in becoming itself a Christian community in the full sense of the name. The crisis of our time is such as to demand swift and far-reaching changes within the church itself so that men may see in practical expression the meaning of the gospel that we preach. By the inclusiveness of its worship, the division of its support for ministers and other workers, and by its service to human need, the church must make a present demonstration of that Kingdom to which it calls men.

IV.

Finally, the church is called to lead in the preparation of a just and lasting peace. Only the church is the bearer of the revelation of God's will in Christ; and only that world order which is in accord with God's will can stand. Only the church exists today as a universal fellowship which may become the seed of a community of nations. The church is uniquely obligated today to become the world's peacemaker. To this task the church is giving itself with energy and devotion. Its councils have taken the lead in discovering the bases of an enduring peace. But, since the achieving of peace depends in the final analysis upon the attitudes and will of the people rather than upon political plans and leaders, the church has a primary obligation to arouse and make intelligent the will to peace in the masses of the people. In the nature of the case, this can be done only through local congregations and individual Christians. We therefore call upon all our preachers and laymen to inform themselves of the findings of the church upon these questions, and to use every opportunity to educate for those things which make for peace.

V.

These things we believe, and hold to be the will of God for His church. With a deep humility for our past failures but a steady faith in our Lord and His power to save, we commit ourselves as a church to the doing of His will.

REPORT NO. 2—COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

Following the pledge of our church to support its conscientious objectors to war, and in view of the fact that conscientious objectors who are assigned to Civilian Public Service Camps under the Selective Service Act are required to pay for their upkeep, this Conference at its last session made an offering of \$75.49 to assist its conscientious objectors. During the year, forty-four of our preachers have contributed regularly to this cause. Up to the opening of this session, \$471.79 had been contributed in this way; making a total of \$547.28 given from our Conference to the Civilian Public Service Fund.

The need for such support increases as more men are assigned. From the churches of our Conference there are now three men in Civilian Public Service Camps: L. Earl Hodges and Roland Hodges of Washington, N. C., and Robert Lee, of Clayton. Approximately \$100.00 a month must be raised for the support of these boys; and others are expecting to be called in the near future. In view of this need, we ask all of our laymen and preachers who will to contribute to this fund. Those who wish to make pledges or contributions should communicate with the Secretary of this Committee.

In addition, we call attention to the fact that the Methodist Youth Fellowship, at its National Convention, designated Armistice Day and another day later in the year as times when Methodist youth will make sacrificial offerings for support of conscientious objectors. We urge the young people of all our churches to share in this. Also, we direct that at a proper time during this session the Chairman of the Conference receive a special offering, the proceeds of which shall go to the Civilian Public Service Fund.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

The message which we are to proclaim is that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself and that He "will have all men to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth." He is seeking to bring our lost humanity to its senses, wooing it with love, calling it back to joy and peace. It is our high privilege to share in that joyful task.

We have looked in vain to other things to save us. We ought to be con-

vinced that only God's plan will work; that His Son is the answer. Let us resolve to try His plan; lest we suffer greater losses for our neglect.

So then, it is our supreme business, our opportunity, our high privilege to take the ancient passion for the souls of men and put it into the stream of modern life. Let us determine to spend lavishly the riches of divine grace to the end that others might know Christ.

We recommend that we consider together the new and urgent call to evangelism. There is no phase of the church life comparable to that of bringing people to Christ. This work calls for almost infinite compassion and patience. In order for ministers and laymen to comprehend and deal wisely with all the aspects of salvation, they must be possessed of deep insight and broad vision. If men are to be "born again," Christ cannot be kept concealed. Christ is more than conditioning goodness. He is a person to be known and received as Savior, Lord, and Master.

We urge that trustees, stewards, lay leaders, superintendents and teachers and all other officers and members support the minister with a genuine spirit of co-operation in bringing people to Christ.

1. Let us give special consideration to the children. Here we may be sure of the largest returns from the amount of time and energy expended.

2. We feel that the morning and evening services should be regarded as fruitful evangelistic opportunity. Let us work to the end that a spirit of expectancy permeate the personnel of the church in all the services. Give people a chance to accept Christ as their Savior.

3. Give attention to special days and seasons. The sentiments and memories which they carry contribute much to the evangelistic appeal.

4. Let us not lose sight of the opportunity that is ours to enrich the spiritual life of the men in the armed forces. These men are called to make the supreme sacrifice upon the altar of our country and we should be eager to give them the consolations of the Christian religion.

5. Let us emphasize by precept and example the place and worth of personal work. This may prove to be tedious work but when it is tactfully done the returns will more than compensate for the cost in time and energy.

6. Let us try to get groups, in our churches, working to win others to Christ. That is, groups of men, of women, of young people, bringing people to Christ and into the church. When other methods fail, we believe that this plan will work.

REPORT OF THE METHODIST BOARD OF PUBLICATION, INC., TO THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

This corporation is jointly owned by the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences. Its main business, as you know, is the publication of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*, and this paper has 10,200 subscribers within the bounds of the two Conferences. The assets of the corporation as reflected by the audit is \$111,269.11, after deducting \$84,206.31 for depreciation, and this seems to us excessive depreciation. The Advocate building, built at a cost exceeding \$74,000.00, is in good physical condition and it and the other property are adequately insured.

Owing to war conditions the business has been conducted at a loss, this year, of \$2,788.05. This has been caused by the payment of taxes of \$1,524.00, the increase in costs of material, and the receipt of less money from the job department. We are eager to get out of the "red" as soon as possible as we are doing our best to reduce operating expenses. After the expiration of the coming year the Board will have only one Editor and Business Manager, and we think that other economies can be effected.

The Board desires to observe the spirit of the Retirement Law of the Methodist Church; and the present Editors expect to retire in October, 1943. The Board has already appointed a Committee to find a suitable Editor before that date.

The term of office of Dr. S. B. Turrentine as a member of the Board representing the Western North Carolina Conference has expired and the corporation nominates him to succeed himself.

The corporation elected the following officers for the ensuing year:

President, Rev. A. J. Hobbs; Vice-President, N. L. Eure; Secretary, Thos. C. Hoyle.

Editors of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate* and Business Managers of the corporation: Rev. A. W. Plyler and Rev. M. T. Plyler.

We respectfully solicit from the preachers and laymen of North Carolina Methodism a fair share of their job printing, but since the main business of the corporation is to publish a religious paper for the Methodists of North Carolina, we would stress the increase of circulation of the *North Carolina Christian Advocate*; and following the suggestion of the Editors in their report to us we recommend:

1. That the plan, inaugurated this last Conference year, of one yearly subscription for every fifty members of each church or charge, be continued for next year, so that this quota will extend over two years instead of one, thus allowing each pastor an additional year in which to complete the quota.

2. That our Methodist colleges, Societies and Boards be urged to turn all possible business to the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc.

3. That the Methodist laymen of the state and businesses controlled or operated by Methodists in North Carolina be requested to give the Methodist Board of Publication, Inc., a fair share of their job printing.

REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMISSION

COLLEGE PLACE, GREENSBORO

The Wesley Foundation work at College Place, Greensboro, continues under the leadership of Rev. R. M. Courtney, pastor, and Miss Louise Panigot, director. 100 of the 300 first-year students from Methodist homes have become affiliate members of College Place Church. There are 700 Methodists in the student

body at Woman's College, U. N. C. A new feature of the work this year is the activity of fellowship groups in the dormitories. Thirty young women are active as leaders in these groups. These leaders are working together with the fourteen members of the Wesley Foundation Council and the Freshman Council. The girls are conducting a project for the underprivileged in an area near the campus. On three afternoons each week there are two club meetings for underprivileged girls, as well as supervised play periods and hand work classes for younger children.

FAIRMONT CHURCH, RALEIGH

Fairmont Church has developed as a church home for Methodist students in Raleigh. It has accepted responsibility for the spiritual welfare of about 700 Methodist students at State College, 100 in the Blind Institute, and 50 at Meredith College. The effective work of the pastor, Rev. H. M. McLamb, and of the Campus Church Relations Committee, with Dr. John W. Cell as Chairman, has developed a student church program which is worthy of the highest praise. This has been done without any assistance from the Annual Conferences, such as has been given to help our workers at the Chapel Hill and Greensboro units of the University of North Carolina. Help is needed, and deserved, at Fairmont.

CHAPEL HILL

The University Church at Chapel Hill has a greater responsibility to youth than ever, now that "the Hill" is crowded with the young men of the Naval Pre-flight School in addition to the usual student body. Dr. J. M. Culbreth, pastor, is carrying on, with the assistance of volunteer workers. For a short time during the year, Willis Sutton, Jr., was employed as part-time Wesley Foundation Director. Since his departure for army service, the effort to employ a part-time leader has been unsuccessful, and funds have been insufficient to secure a full-time Director. During this Conference year the Wesley Foundation Commission, on behalf of the Annual Conference, has contributed an amount monthly to help maintain and operate the church plant at Chapel Hill, where Methodist students far outnumber the local members. The part-time worker was supported for two months by the Commission. The Chapel Hill Church has made a significant forward step in the general situation by assuming entirely the salary of its pastor, without any help from any outside source.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

The Commission on Town and Country Work, organized at the 1941 session of the Annual Conference, has held two meetings during the year, the one in Raleigh, January 8, 1942; the other in Kinston, October 12, 1942. In addition, an Executive Committee meeting was held in Durham, October 22, 1942.

The substance and the aims of the work of the Commission are outlined in the following recommendations, adopted at the Raleigh meeting:

1. That each of the District Superintendents be asked to establish a Group Ministry in which several ministers located on contiguous charges may work together to (a) conduct surveys; (b) to co-operate with other agencies interested in rural life; and (c) to meet periodically for fellowship, conference, and study.

2. That the Chairman of the Commission appoint a Committee of three to seek out, and recommend to the Cabinet in the Annual Conference session of 1942, some particular area where a group of ministers, selected by the Cabinet, may work together in a rural church project.

3. That a circulation library be set up in each District, the District Superintendent to designate some minister through which this may function.

4. That there be organized the Methodist Rural Fellowship of the North Carolina Conference.

5. That the Bible Conferences being sponsored by the Board of Education be expanded in the town and country churches.

6. That a Committee be appointed by the Chairman to investigate the feasibility of securing appropriate and reasonably priced markers for our many unmarked churches in town and country.

7. That the Executive Committee co-operate with Dr. J. M. Ormond in formulating practical and definite programs for the guidance of the Duke University Divinity School students in their summer work in the rural churches.

As recommended, the Methodist Rural Fellowship of the North Carolina Conference has been organized. The officers are: Rev. H. B. Lewis, President;

Rev. I. T. Poole, Vice-President; Rev. C. W. Goldston, Secretary-Treasurer;
Dr. J. M. Ormond and Rev. R. E. Walston, Committee members.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON "THE WEEK OF DEDICATION"

All through the past year, leaders in every area of the life of our great church have felt the need of a season of rededication and sacrifice. At a joint meeting of the Council of Bishops and of the General Commission on World Service recently held in Chicago, it was decided to call the church to a church-wide week of dedication, February 28 through March 7, 1943. Our people will be urged to observe daily Bible reading, daily meditation and prayer. Large emphasis will be placed upon personal dedication and the erection of family altars.

The month of January shall be called "Preparation Month." During this month the plan and purpose of the Week of Dedication will be given by each pastor to his local church so that all may be informed. Sunday, January 3, will be known as "Covenant Day."

Sunday, February 21, shall be observed as Layman's Day and shall be made a feature in the preparation for the Week of Dedication.

Beginning Sunday, February 28, and continuing through Sunday, March 7, the Week of Dedication shall be observed throughout the church. The pastors will be urged to hold meetings in their several churches daily throughout the week.

Sunday, March 7, shall be Dedication Day when every pastor shall call upon his people for a personal dedication.

A SACRIFICIAL OFFERING

In a time of wide-spread suffering like the present, it is the clear call of the gospel that we engage in a great ministry of rescue and healing. We are, therefore, planning to give our people an opportunity to make an offering on the last day of the Week of Dedication, Sunday, March 7.

Should we fail our men and women in service now, they will fail us when they return home. *We shall not fail them!* During the Week of Dedication let each local church remember daily in prayer our preachers now serving as chaplains.

Memoirs



H. M. JACKSON

Hampton McRae Jackson was born on a farm near Dillon, S. C., August 5, 1860, the son of James Owen and Margaret Murchison Jackson. On the fertile plains of Dillon County Brother Jackson learned that persistent labor must precede the harvest. He never forgot that lesson. Throughout his long and successful career he emphasized the importance of work. He enjoyed his work and continued it until shortly before his death when his health would no longer permit it.

Brother Jackson attended Bingham Military Academy at Mebane, N. C. and often referred to his experiences there with pride and pleasure. After completing his course at Bingham School he attended Wofford College, Spartanburg, S. C.

He was twice married. November 24, 1886 he married Miss Maggie Aydelotte of Maxton, N. C. To this union were born three children. Two of them survive him, Mrs. S. T. Mitchiner of Garner, N. C., and Herbert Kavanaugh Jackson of New Orleans, La. After the decease of Mrs. Maggie Aydolette Jackson, Mr. Jackson married Miss Eva Lyon on December 19, 1895. To this union was born a son, Hampton McRae Jackson, Jr., who with his mother survives.

After leaving Wofford College Mr. Jackson was engaged in educational work for a number of years. Though his school work was a success, he felt an irresistible call to preach. He yielded to the call and joined the North Carolina Conference at Fayetteville in 1887. Until he retired in 1929 he rejoiced in serving eighteen charges in the eastern section of the North Carolina Conference. He died January 26, 1942, and was buried in Raleigh, N. C.

J. H. BUFFALOE

James Henry Buffaloe, the son of W. D. and Katie Wilder Buffaloe, was born in Wake County, North Carolina, near Raleigh, October 3, 1874, and died at Marston, N. C., March 3, 1942, being in his 68th year. His funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. E. H. Measamer, assisted by several other of his brethren, and his body was laid to rest in New Bethel Cemetery, near Garner, N. C.

Brother Buffaloe was converted at the age of twelve, and very soon thereafter he heard the call to preach. All through his High

School days he engaged in all kinds of religious work in his home community. Upon graduation from High School his father asked him what he was going to do, he replied, "I am going to preach, and I am determined to be the very best preacher I can possibly be," and he held this determination to the end. He entered Trinity College and would have graduated, but sickness cut short his work about two months before commencement.

He began his ministerial work as a supply, serving as such for nearly two years, and was admitted on trial into the North Carolina Conference at Wilmington, North Carolina in 1902. He was ordained Deacon in 1901, admitted into full connection, together with the writer, at Henderson, N. C., 1904, and was ordained elder in 1906. He served the following charges: Plymouth, Elm City, Buckhorn Circuit, Jenkins Memorial, City Road, Garner Circuit, Franklinton, Hamlet, Dunn, Carr Church, Clinton, Carthage, St. Johns-Gibson and Laurel Hill Circuit. He retired in 1938.

James Buffaloe was of a quiet, unassuming nature, as modest and as timid, as a woman. His life was clean and wholesome. He never exalted, but rather humbled himself, hence he never sought the so-called good appointments, but true to his conference vows he gladly went wherever he was sent. If he was sent among a poor, or an illiterate people, he loved and served as earnestly, and as faithfully as when he was sent among the learned and well to do. He was happy just to have a place in the ranks of the servants of his Lord.

As a pastor, Brother Buffaloe was not excelled by any of his brethren. He believed in visiting his people, in encouraging them in right living, and in helping them to bear their burdens. Many are the people on every charge he served who remember him as a good pastor, a good preacher, but above all, as a good man. His face radiated a Christian character, a pure and a sympathetic heart.

As a preacher, he was above the average. People liked to hear him because of his humility, the directness of his messages, which abounded in instruction, encouragement, love and comfort, and because of his consecrated life. He was an uncompromising representative of the Christ, one who always held up the high standards of his Lord. He carried the injunction of Paul to Timothy, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

On February 11th, 1901, he was married to Miss Mattie Buffaloe of Garner, N. C. To this union were born three children: Mrs. E. J. Aplin of New York City, whose husband is a Methodist preacher; James Henry, Marston, N. C., and William of Carthage.

Brother Buffaloe's devotion to his home and family was beautiful. He and his wife were as truly mated as any two I have ever known. He was a source of help, strength, and comfort to his children, sacrificing for them whenever such was necessary.

On March 3rd his feet having grown tired with the roughness of the way, he crossed the narrow vale that intervened between this life and the eternal world and entered into rest. A faithful, a consecrated, conscientious servant has gone to his reward.

Allen P. Brantley

The Rev. Andrew James Groves was born in Duplin County, August 3, 1857, died April 19, 1942, interment at Sanford, N. C. Eighty-five years and eight month he lived a full, wholesome, profitable and fully adjusted life to this world. This good man left us as he had lived, vivacious, full to the brim, overflowing with the fullness of life and active to the end. Brother Groves joined the North Carolina Conference at Kinston, N. C. in 1896. He served the following charges: Moore County Circuit 1897-1900, Roanoke Rapids Circuit 1900-1901, Bladen Circuit 1901-1905, Roberdel 1905-1909, Richmond Circuit 1909-1912, St. Paul 1912-1916, Rowland Circuit 1916-1920, Mt. Gilead 1920-1924, West End 1924-1928, Wilmington-Winter Park 1928-1930.

Brother Groves superannuated in 1930 and came to Sanford to make his home. Even though he has been living among us for twelve years with the classification of a Superannuated minister, he has by no means been retired. On the contrary he has been very active in this church and elsewhere over the conference. Only this past summer he was engaged in a week's evangelistic services with a brother minister, having preached three times on his 85th birthday. Brother Groves spent 34 years of his life in the active ministry. To this we may well add these last twelve years, making nearly a half century of a life devoted to a cause for which he gave the last full measure of devotion. The philosophy of his life may well be summed up in one stanza of poetry, namely:

"So on I go not knowing
I would not if I might,
I would rather walk in the dark with God
Than walk alone with the light.
I would rather walk with Him by faith
Than walk alone by sight."

It is by no means strange, then, that the last public meeting that Brother Groves attended was a Church worship service in this church about six weeks ago. On that day he was taken ill, leaving the service rather early, he went home and took his bed realizing from the outset that journey's end was near. But during these past six weeks he faced the inevitable, as he had faced every great experience in life fully conscious of this life's limitations and the fullness of

life hereafter. During his brief illness he demonstrated the great soul he was. He was fully contented with the measure of God's goodness having given him a long and fruitful life in His ministry. He was most patient in the last days of his suffering, ready at God's command to move on to a higher and richer field of service. He moved into that spiritual Garden of God to continue his services with the Master, as enthusiastically and as willingly as he had moved from one charge to another here among men. He lived with such noble assurance that "when his summons came to join the innumerable caravan that moves to that mysterious realm, where each shall take his chamber in the silent halls of death, he went not like the quarry slave at night scourged to his dungeon, but sustained and soothed, by an unaltered trust he approached his grave, like one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams."

As was said of Barnabas "He was a good man," so we may say of our brother minister "He was a good man." His going has taken a great soul from among us; but his noble spirit will live on and on in the lives of the multitudes for whom and with whom he so devotedly and spiritually moved. His memory will be held as a priceless heritage by all those whom this spiritual guide, of so many years, directed and led into the more abundant life of which the Master architect of our lives, came to give.

To this end, therefore, we ask:

"What must it be to step on shore, and find it heaven;
To take hold of a hand, and find it—God's hand;
To breathe a new air and find it—Celestial air;
To feel invigorated and find it—Immortality;
To rise from the care and the turmoil of earth
Into one unbroken calm;
To wake up and find it GLORY."

MRS. G. B. PERRY

Mrs. George Bascom Perry, age 87, quietly slipped away to her eternal home with the Heavenly Father, after a long illness at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. D. Blackburn in Rocky Mount, North Carolina, January 13, 1942.

Mrs. Perry was the widow of the late Rev. George Bascom Perry, a well known and beloved minister of the North Carolina Conference. For 42 years they served The Methodist Church with a zeal and faith that so characterized their consecrated lives to the service of God and man. She spent the larger part of the last 17 years in Selma, North Carolina, having moved with her daughter to Rocky Mount about six months before her death.

Mrs. Perry was the daughter of Captain and Mrs. J. A. Pugh of Chatham County. Her father served in the Confederate Army during the War between the States. She had the courage and convictions of her father and the gentle spirit of her mother. These virtues went into the making of a parsonage home for her family and friends.

There were six daughters, who mourned her going home, Mrs. Mozelle Allen, Durham; Mrs. A. L. Davis, Mrs. Jennie D. Moore, Burlington; Mrs. D. R. Mauney, Sr., Cherryville; Mrs. Charles Highsmith, Dunn; and Mrs. R. D. Blackburn, Rocky Mount; and one sister, Mrs. John Bright, Sanford.

Funeral service was held at the Edgerton Memorial Methodist Church in Selma, Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock by her pastor, Rev. O. L. Hathaway, assisted by the Rev. E. L. Hillman, pastor of The Methodist Church in Rocky Mount, the H. I. Glass, Superintendent of the Raleigh District, and the Rev. O. W. Dowd, pastor of the Divine Street Methodist Church in Dunn. Mrs. Perry's body was laid to rest beside the body of her husband in Oakland Heights Cemetery in Smithfield, North Carolina.

Mrs. Perry had a wonderful prayer life that seems to have had its origin in early childhood. Her early prayers became a comfort to her through her many years of service. Her prayer life revealed a deep insight into the reality of God. Her prayers for the fellowship of the Church were voiced on many occasions and she remained faithful in the services as long as her health would permit. She was truly a servant of the Christ working with her husband through his long pastorate. MRS. D. L. EARNHARDT

On July 12, 1942, the Reverend D. E. Earnhardt gave up his pastorate at Calvary Church, Durham, N. C. to become a chaplain in the United States Army. The writer of this sketch was appointed preacher-in-charge to take Mr. Earnhardt's place. By a strange coincidence, the first duty that the new pastor was called upon to perform was the burial of the former pastor's mother, Mrs. D. L. Earnhardt.

Mrs. Earnhardt was born and reared in Rowan County, the daughter of Solomon and Elizabeth Ayres. She was a descendant

of the same pioneer Quaker stock that founded Guilford College, near Greensboro, N. C. Her father was killed in the Civil War at the Battle of Spottsylvania Courthouse. She was married to the Reverend D. L. Earnhardt in 1877 and worked with him in the Methodist Church of North Carolina for forty-five years. To this union were born thirteen children, eight daughters and five sons. Long years ago one little girl died at the tender age of two. Her husband also preceded her to the other world, he having passed away in 1928. Since that time she lived with her children in Durham, a benediction and inspiration to all who came in contact with her.

The deceased is survived by seven daughters: Mrs. H. E. Lance and Mrs. Lula Troy Harvey, both of Durham, N. C.; Mrs. W. C. Worrell of Rich Square; Mrs. Joe Gay of Roanoke Rapids; Mrs. L. W. Flythe of High Point; Mrs. Jack Peele of Washington; and Mrs. C. R. Aycock of Richmond, Va. Five sons also are living: Messrs. L. S., W. J., and D. E. Earnhardt, all of Durham; G. N. Earnhardt of Tarboro, and A. P. Earnhardt of Huntington, W. Va. She numbered also among her direct descendants, twenty-eight grandchildren and twenty-one great-grandchildren.

Another coincidence that seems almost providential was the fact that Mrs. Earnhardt died just as her son was leaving to enter the armed services. He had told her goodbye with the full knowledge that her feebleness and extreme old age made it doubtful that he would ever see her alive again. The long trek westward to Kansas where he was ordered to report, and the uncertainty of his whereabouts in the service made it further unlikely that he would be allowed to be present at her burial. Just as he was about to leave town, the end came and he was reached in time to keep him home for her funeral. It must have been a blessed relief to him to have the privilege of being with her mortal remains until they were laid away by the side of her husband in the cemetery.

The funeral was appropriate, impressive, beautiful. The writer was assisted by two devoted friends of the family; long-time fellow-ministers with the departed husband; and related in many common ties of friendship and fellowship with the deceased. These were the Reverend B. H. Black and the Reverend W. F. Craven, both superannuate members of the North Carolina Conference. The sincerity of their sympathy, the genuineness of their Christian hope, and their joyous anticipation of another meeting, made profound impressions upon all who were present. Hundreds of friends of the family were there to pay their tribute of respect to the deceased and to attest their loyalty and devotion to the family. Most impressive was a guard of honor composed of the entire police force who were not compelled to be on duty at that time. This tribute was an expression of appreciation for the services which the Reverend D. E. Earnhardt had rendered in the capacity of Chaplain to the Police

Department. The various societies and organized classes of his former church sent profusions of flowers and acted in the capacity of floral bearers and honorary pall bearers.

Never has the writer conducted a funeral when he felt more keenly the assurance of immortality, and the truth of the time honored funeral phrase: "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord." Never has he felt like shouting more triumphantly: "O grave, where is thy victory? O death, where is thy sting?" Tears at parting streamed down the faces of those who loved her most, but they were triumphant tears, tears of joy as well as sorrow. Smiles of genuine happiness greeted the singing of that most appropriate old favorite: "The Wayworn Traveller." The voice of the singer gave forth those notes of victory:

"They bore her on their pinions
Safe o'er the dashing foam,
And shouted glad hosanna
Deliverance has come."

It seemed that heaven was very near and that there could be no sorrow save that of temporary parting. The funeral procession filed out of the church while the choir sang another triumphant hymn: "I'm Going Home to Die No More."

Mrs. Earnhardt was one of the few remaining of the old-school "Mother of Israel." Through the long period of service in which she helped her husband in his work, she rendered a service in the kingdom of God which only eternity can properly evaluate. A loyal servant of the church, a friend to all who knew her, a faithful wife, a loving mother, thousands of friends join with her large and useful family of children who "rise up and call her blessed."

MRS. WILLIAM TOWE

Mrs. Katherine Towe, the wife of Reverend William Towe, a retired minister of the North Carolina Conference, was born in Orange County, New York, on October 25, 1868. She was the daughter of John Erskine and Sara Thompson Crawford. In 1885 she moved to Elizabeth City, N. C., where she became acquainted with Brother Towe. It was on November 30, 1887 that they were united in marriage. To this union were born seven children, all of whom survive: Robert Leslie, Roanoke Rapids, N. C.; Kenneth Crawford, Greenwich, Conn.; William Thompson, Greensboro, N. C.; Sara Elliott, Rocky Mount, N. C.; Mrs. H. R. Parker, Greensboro, N. C.; Frances Alice, Rocky Mount, N. C.; and James Marvin, Rocky Mount, N. C. Since Brother Towe's retirement from active service

in the Conference, they have lived at their home which is near Rocky Mount.

Mrs. Towe died on November 1, 1942, just one month before she and Brother Towe were to celebrate their fifty-fifth wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Towe was a Christian mother and home-maker. She knew that her most important task in life had been that of rearing her children and training them in Christian principles. It was a task to which she had devoted her life, and one in which she was successful. "Her children rise up and call her blessed." One who visited in her home would leave with a firmer step and a more optimistic spirit. One could be certain she was one of God's noblewomen.

But Mrs. Towe's interests were not confined to her home. She also took an active interest in the work of her community and her church. She was able to attend the church services until two weeks before her death. Her presence in the church was always a benediction.

Mrs. Towe lived her religion throughout the week in the same manner that she did on Sunday. She was a Christian neighbor. As long as she was able, she visited often in the homes of the sick and discouraged people about her, carrying with her a spirit of hopefulness and good cheer that was as real and beautiful as the flowers she had gathered from her own garden. Sessions of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church

The North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church was composed of the former North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South, and parts of the former North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church and former Blue Ridge-Atlantic Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The former Methodist Episcopal Church gave to the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church 9 preachers, 11 charges and 1,837 members; the former Methodist Protestant Church 23 preachers, 20 charges and 9,152 members; the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 273 preachers, 226 charges and 132,735 members.

NOTE: The Distributing Committee at the 1940 session of the Western North Carolina Conference added three retired ministers of the former Methodist Protestant Church to the roll of the North Carolina Conference. The names of these preachers should have been included in 1939 in the list of preachers coming into the North Carolina Conference from the former Methodist Protestant Church.
